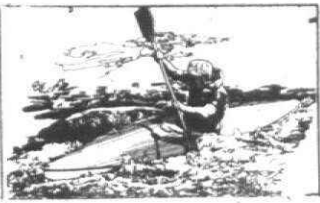

# Master plan up for adoption

In an effort to continue work on a revised Master Land Use Plan, Canton Township Board members and township planning commissioners will discuss the plan at 7 p.m. Tuesday at township hall.

Loren Bennett, a member of both the township board and the planning commission, said the meeting apparently has been called to discuss questions raised by Dave Berry, a township attorney, and Supervisor James Poole.

Bennett said the planning commission had delayed a vote on the plan after a firm sued the township for rejecting its rezoning request. The Centrum Corp. had sought rezoning for 17 acres on Haggerty Road between Cherry Hill and Ford from residential to multiple-unit residential.

Bennett said that lawsuit would likely be discussed at the Tuesday meeting, along with the question of whether too much rezoning is

planned for the western portion of the township.

While some planning commissioners complained last December of the time it was taking to adopt a new Master Plan — under review for more than two years — Bennett said, "There is no specific time limit."

The present Master Plan, adopted in 1976, "is very outdated," Bennett said. The township, occasionally sued over rezoning denials, would be

better able to defend its zoning decisions in court following adoption of the plan, he said.

The 1976 plan limited most of the western part of the township to either agricultural or large-lot residential. The tentative plan — called a snapshot of Canton development in the next 10-20 years — calls for dividing lots into minimum sizes to allow one to three buildings per acre.

Condominiums and one-or-two-

story apartments would be allowed east of Napier, west of Ridge and about 1,000 feet north of Ford Road. Commercial development on Ford west of Canton Center would be permitted to boost the community's tax base.

West of Beck Road, a planned development district would accommodate creative site design and avoid strip development. It could include residential, office and commercial uses, according to the plan.

# Claims court: justice for all

They come to the 35th District Court Wednesday mornings looking for justice in the small claims division. The cases won't make legal history. But that doesn't mean they aren't important to the people involved.

During a recent session:

- A company was sued for labor and materials after a pool wall shifted and the lining was torn.
- A therapist sued for non-payment of bills.
- An excavating company was sued by a motorist who said his car was damaged by debris that fell from a truck on the freeway.
- A motorist sued for damages resulting from a collision not covered by the state's no-fault law.

Damages in small claims court can't exceed \$1,500. Individuals, by law, present their own cases. Magis-

trates' decisions can be appealed but the vast majority aren't.

ERIC COLTHURST, a lawyer in private practice and a part-time magistrate, arbitrates most small claims in 35th District Court.

"It's good because it's easy to get into, it's cheap and you receive a ruling relatively fast — normally three or four weeks from filing," he said.

"As you listen, you can tell after a

while which one is telling the truth. People in the audience generally know the decision as soon as I do. In cases too close to call, I'll ask them if they can settle."

"I can't tell if people are happy," Colthurst said of his rulings. "I can at least see they get a fair shot at it."

Through the first six months of this year, 415 small claims cases were heard or set for trial in 35th District Court, which includes the

township and city of Plymouth, Canton and the township and city of Northville.

Some cases were settled prior to hearing dates.

While figures weren't immediately available on who wins most of the time, the plaintiff — the individual filing the lawsuit — received an award in three of the four cases cited earlier in this story. The fourth,

it seems, will win, too, if the situation isn't soon settled.

THE MONETARY awards, though, were less than requested in every case.

Some people might liken small claims to People's Court on television. It is, to a degree.

Both sides present their cases in an informal atmosphere. The judge or magistrate frequently interrupts with questions, sometimes adding humorous asides.

Court Administrator George Wiland maintains that the television program isn't an accurate portrayal because both sides are paid regardless of who wins.

"It's so glamorized, people come here with such high expectations and it doesn't happen," he said. "A lot of times, a judgment is great but it's only as great as the paper it's written on."

## Life without attorneys exists

It's fairly simple to file a small claims case.

Forms and instruction sheets are available at the 35th District Court building, 660 Plymouth Road west of Haggerty. A filing fee of \$12.95 must accompany claims of less than \$600, \$22.95 for claims more than \$600. Claims can't exceed \$1,500.

The fee, refundable if the plaintiff wins, includes registered mail service on the defendant.

Jurisdiction — where a claim should be filed — depends on where the defendant lives, where the incident occurred and where the plaintiff lives in that order, said George

Wiland, administrator for the 35th District Court.

A defendant always can have a case removed from small claims court to the regular district court docket where lawyers may appear and jury trials may be requested.

# Telephone strike impact felt here

The short strike by the Communication Workers of America ended late Friday night when a tentative agreement was reached with Michigan Bell.

CWA and Bell agreed to a three-year labor contract, ending a statewide walkout of about 12,600 workers. Spokesmen for Bell and CWA said workers returned to their jobs beginning with the Friday midnight shift.

Two Bell facilities in Plymouth — a switching office on Ann Arbor Road and a construction garage on Mill — were affected by the strike.

Normally, 45 union technicians and five supervisors staff the switching office, Marcia Buhl, corporate

affairs manager for Bell said. Only nine were on duty Friday during the strike.

At the construction garage, eight people were working Friday when normally 25 union and 10 management employees are on the job, she added.

Under terms of the tentative contract, employees would gain a minimum 11.87 percent increase in compensation. Buhl said that increase could rise to 17.25 percent, based on a profit-sharing clause included in the three-year pact.

Buhl said all local employees had returned to their jobs by this morning.

Jim Bundoff, president of CWA

Local 4015 representing Bell employees in Plymouth, Livonia, Northville and South Lyon, said workers would vote on the contract in the next 30 days.

"In present times with other companies continuously taking cuts and concessions, our people are satisfied," said Bundoff of the tentative agreement.

Buhl said the agreement, which ended the three-day strike, would not result in rate hikes for Bell customers.

How had the strike against Michigan Bell affected the Plymouth-Canton community?

Most noticeably, it took much longer to make connections with a

directory assistance operator.

During two test calls from Plymouth Friday, it took 21 rings to reach an operator at 10:25 a.m. and 18 rings at 1:25 p.m.

Other service areas also had been affected, Buhl said.

People requesting telephone installation were asked to wait until the strike was over.

CWA workers — operators, installers and repair people — walked off the job last Tuesday after Bell indicated it was no longer willing to extend the existing contract on a daily basis.

Points of contention, both sides

agreed, centered on wages, health care and job security.

Chester Ford-Ballenger, picketing Friday in front of the Plymouth switching office, said he had prepared for a strike "by putting away as much as I could for the last six months. I figure I could comfortably last 12 weeks."

CWA strikers don't receive strike benefits from the union unless they can demonstrate extreme financial difficulty.

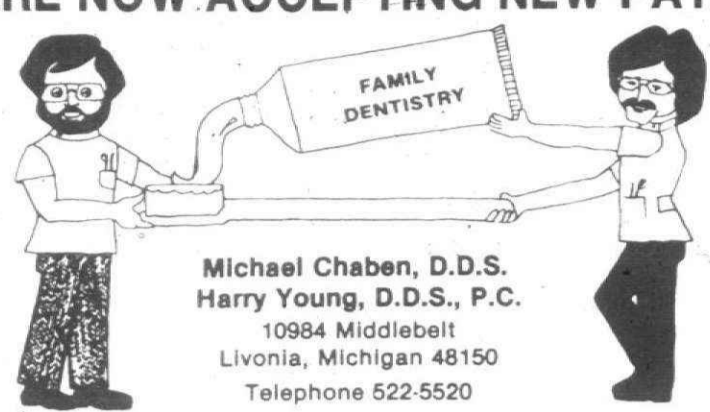
The union struck American Telephone & Telegraph Co. for nearly three weeks three years ago before the break-up of the communications giant.

# Realtors move into state political arena

Area Realtors are declaring successful their first organized effort to influence elections through the delegate selection process.

The Realtors, members of regional real estate boards, formed a group called Team '88. The committee was part of a pilot program, sponsored by the National and Michigan Associations of Realtors, to encourage members to run as precinct delegate candidates.

The effort resulted in 313 filing as candidates statewide, according to Phillip C. Davis, who chaired Team '88. Incomplete tallies show about 170 were winners in the Aug. 5 primary.

**THE NUMBERS ARE** astonishing, Davis said. He is president of the Birmingham-Bloomfield Board of Realtors and also is vice-president for corporate relations with Schweitzer Real Estate/Better Homes and Gardens in Birmingham.

"I'm so excited about what's happened," Davis said. "Realtors have run before but not because they were Realtors. This is the first time the National Association of Realtors decided to test the waters to protect individual property rights."

**AMONG THOSE** elected were about 10-12 Realtors in an area including Southfield, Royal Oak, Birmingham and Bloomfield, said G. Warren Gould, executive vice-president of the Birmingham-Bloomfield Board of Realtors.

They include Douglas Whitehouse, a Lathrup Village Republican who is with Chamberlain Realtors; Ron Miller, a Birmingham Republican who is with Century 21 Today in Lathrup Village; Julie T. Richie, also a Birmingham Republican who is with The Residential Group; Cicely Brookover, a Birmingham Democrat with Weir Manuel real estate; and Margaret Ann Gnan, also with Weir Manuel.

The results weren't as conclusive in Wayne County, according to a spokesman for the Western Wayne-Oakland County Board of Realtors, where a spokeswoman said an office reorganization resulted in less time and effort for Team '88.

"If it sounds like we were disgruntled, it's because we were," said Jan Detweiler, director of communications for the board.

Anthony Rizzo, who is chairman of the board's political affairs committee, admitted Friday he didn't know how many local Realtors had run for precinct delegate or whether any of them had won.

According to Detweiler, three members of her board ran and all three were successful. They were Dorothy Dingman, a Century 21 agent who won election in Walled Lake; Jay Hughes, a Mayfair Realty

Combine remaining ingredients in a large saucepot, except rum; simmer about 15 minutes. Drain and rinse pears. Poach pears in water about 5 minutes, cooking one layer at a time. Pack pears into hot jars, leaving 1/4 inch head space. Remove from heat. Stir reserved pineapple tidbits and rum into syrup. Carefully ladle syrup over pears, leaving 1/4 inch head space. Add a cinnamon stick to each jar. Remove air bubbles with a non-metallic spatula. Adjust caps.

Michigan plum orchards produce about 22 billion tons of fruit a year. Plums ripen from August until early October.

# Seasonal fruit is plum perfect during Michigan's harvest

The plum is the most widely-distributed of all American native fruits, and Michigan ranks third in the nation in plum production, with an average crop yielding 22 million pounds.

The harvest of the Michigan crop begins late in August. It continues to early October, leaving a two-month period where consumers can watch for the Italian variety of plums produced in this state.

The primary varieties are the Stanley and Bluffe strains. Stanley plums are the large, dark blue-black, freestone plums with a firm, greenish-yellow flesh. Bluffe are larger than the Stanleys, but with the same general characteristics.

REGARDLESS of the variety, consumers should choose purple plums that are plump, clean and fresh appearing, fully colored, pleasingly aromatic and soft enough to yield to slight pressure in the palm of your hand.

If you select a plum which has not fully ripened, let it ripen at room temperature, but not in direct sunlight, for a day or two. Ripe plums should always be refrigerated, and kept in plastic or moisture-proof bags to prevent shriveling.

Purple plums contain vitamins A and C, plus several other minerals. For the weight-conscious, one cup of fresh plums has just 94 calories.

- Now, let's look at a few recipes using Michigan purple plums.
- PLUM NUT BREAD**
- 1 cup butter or margarine
  - 2 cups sugar
  - 1 tsp. vanilla
  - 4 eggs
  - 3 cups flour
  - 1 tsp. each salt, cream of tartar and ground cinnamon
  - 1/2 tsp. baking soda
  - 1/2 cup dairy sour cream
  - 2 tsp. grated orange peel
  - 2 cups diced Michigan Purple Plums
- 1 1/2 inch pieces  
1 cup chopped nuts
- Cream butter or margarine with sugar and vanilla until fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, beat after each addition. Sift together flour, salt, cream of tartar, cinnamon and baking soda. Blend sour cream and orange peel, add to creamed mixture alternately with dry ingredients. Stir until well blended. Add diced plums and nuts, mix well. Divide between two greased and floured 9 by 5 inch loaf pans. Bake in 350 degree oven 50 to 55 minutes or until bread tests done. Cool bread in pan on rack 10 minutes; remove from pan and cool thoroughly on rack. Yield: 2 loaves.
- PLUM-CHICKEN SALAD**
- 4 cups cubed, cooked chicken
  - 6 sliced Michigan Plums
  - 1 cup thinly sliced celery
  - 2 tbsp. sliced green onions
  - 3/4 cup mayonnaise
  - Salt to taste
  - 1/4 cup toasted, slivered almonds
- Combine all ingredients, except almonds, until well mixed. Serve on lettuce with almonds sprinkled on salad. Yield: 6 servings, 1 cup each.

## Salad perks up with red tomato

Simple, yet colorful salads with fresh tomatoes can be a welcome change from the omnipresent "tossed greens." To make sure the tomatoes you pick, however, it's usually necessary to "brighten" them yourself at home. To reach this point leave them out on the kitchen counter for a few days until they're ready. You'll know they'll be a true tomatoed and yield slightly to the touch. By all means, don't refrigerate them; it kills the flavor.

**MONTEREY TOMATO SALAD**

- 4 medium-sized tomatoes
- 1 medium-sized red onion, sliced lettuce leaves
- 1/2 cup diced or shredded Monterey Jack cheese
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 2 tsp. vinegar
- 1 tsp. chili powder
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. garlic powder
- pinch ground black pepper

Use tomatoes held at room temperature until fully ripe. Remove cores and slice 1/4-inch thick. Arrange tomatoes and onion in any desired pattern on a lettuce lined serving platter. Sprinkle with cheese. Combine oil, vinegar, chilli powder, salt, garlic and black pepper; spoon dressing over salad. Yield: 4 portions.

**RAINBOW TOMATO SALAD**

- 3 tbsp. vegetable oil
- 2 tsp. lemon juice
- 3/4 tsp. Italian seasoning, crushed
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. garlic powder
- ground black pepper
- water
- 1 cup broccoli florets
- 1 cup red pepper strips
- 1 cup green pepper strips
- 3 large-sized tomatoes

In a medium bowl combine oil, lemon juice, Italian seasoning, salt, garlic and black pepper. In a large skillet bring 1 inch water to the boil. Add broccoli; simmer, covered, 1 minute. Add red and green peppers; simmer, covered, until crisp-tender, about 2 minutes. Drain well and toss with reserved dressing. Cover and refrigerate until chilled or overnight. Just before serving remove cores from tomatoes and cut in 1/4-inch chunks (makes 3 cups). Add to marinated vegetables, toss lightly. YIELD: 4 portions, 4 cups.

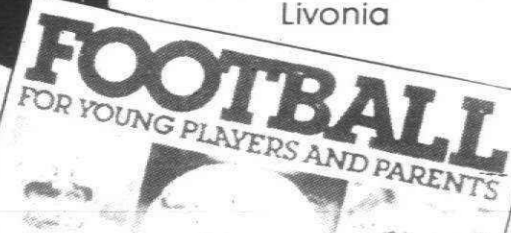

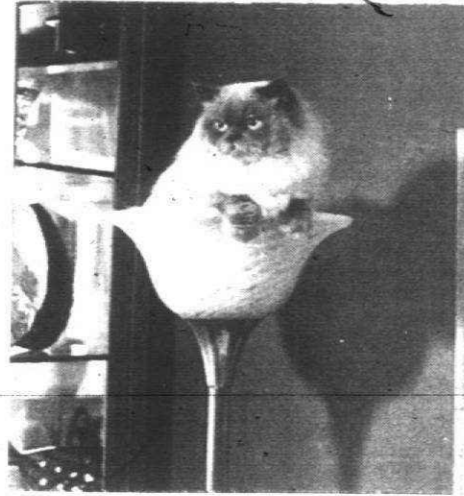

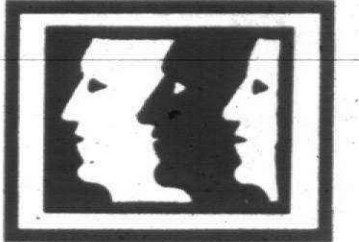

## Library fun keeps kids entertained

FOR MANY Plymouth-Canton children, the summer of 1986 has been a great time for reading.

Summer reading programs at both the Canton Public Library and the Dunning-Hough Public Library in Plymouth attracted their share of young readers this year.

At the Canton Public Library, 1,002 children participated in the Summer Reading Club for those in the first through eighth grades and the "Read to Me" program for younger children.

"That was a record for us," said Judy Teachworth, children's librarian. During the summer of 1985, 854 children participated in those programs at the Canton Public Library.

The Dunning-Hough Public Library had approximately 315 children sign up for the summer reading program for 6- to 14-year-olds this year, according to Pam Rawlinson, assistant director and children's librarian. Of that number, approximately 190 fulfilled the contracts they had signed stating how many books they would read.

THAT REGISTRATION figure is comparable to last year's, Rawlinson said, with this year's percentage of those fulfilling their contracts a bit higher than last year's.

Both libraries held a number of activity sessions for children participating in the programs. Summer Reading Club youngsters at the Canton Public Library were entertained by Ann Arbor musician Peter "Madcat" Ruth and by professional actors from Crossroads Productions who presented a "Golliwoppers' Tall Tales in the American Tradition" program.

A session of "Appalachian Mountain Tales" with storyteller Mary Hamilton was also planned for the Summer Reading Club in Canton. The festivities ended July 24 with a party at the Skatin' Station in Canton.

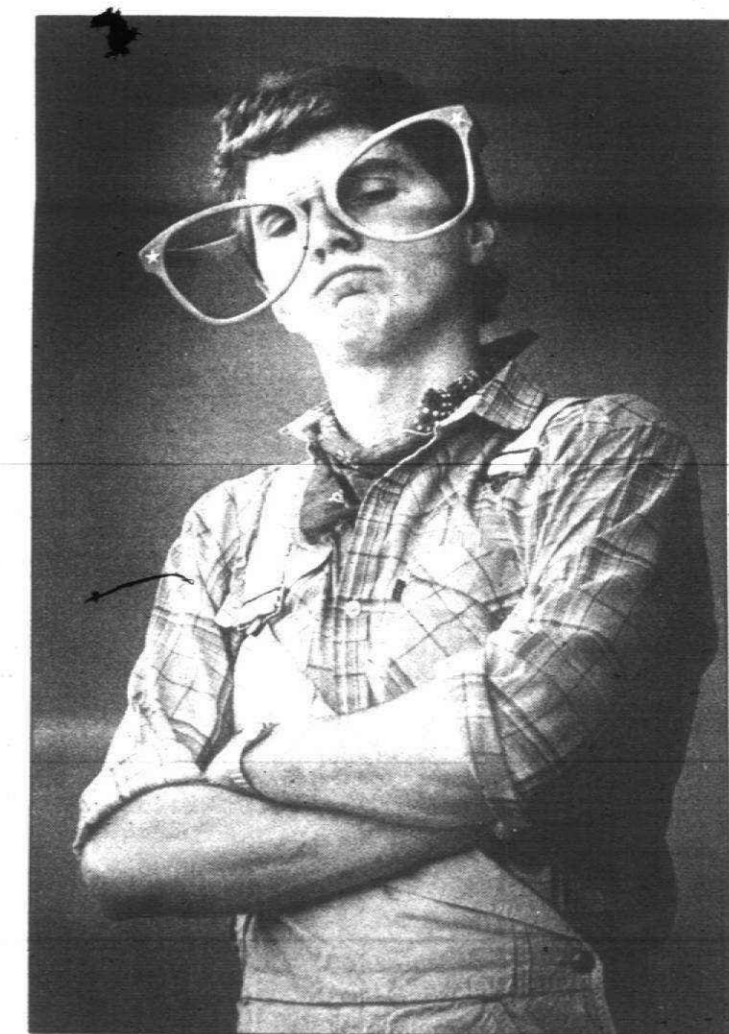
"That was the last thing we had, the last event," the Canton facility's Teachworth said. She estimated that more than 300 participants came to the skating party.

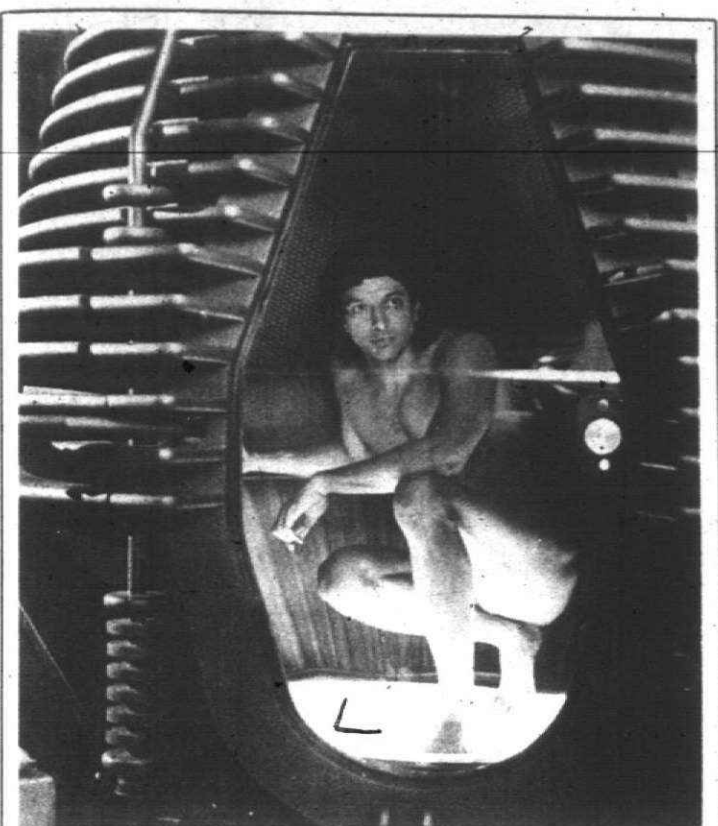

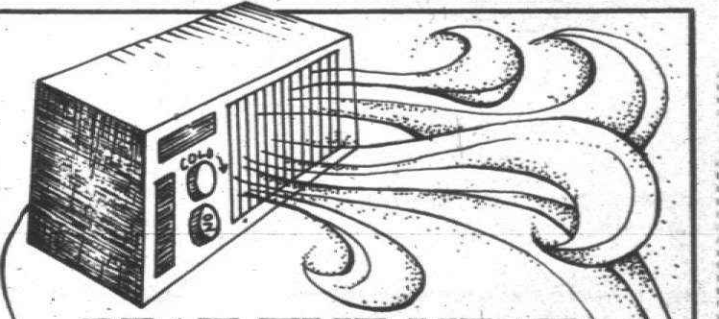

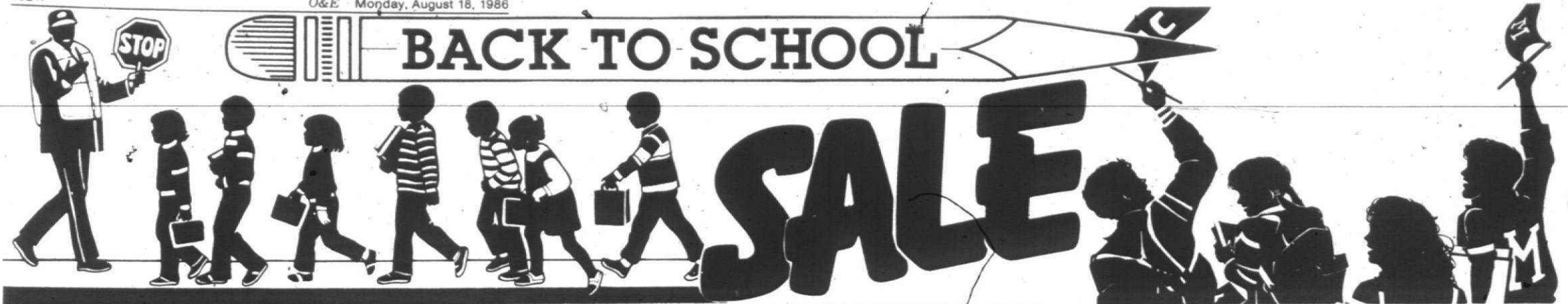
