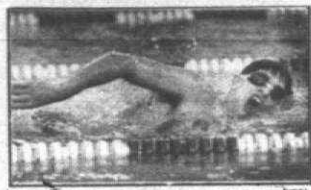

Boys hoop

Sub survey

The next subdivisions to be surveyed by the township will be Forest Brook and Salem Manor.

Oil drilling

There's concern at Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton high schools over pollution.

And because of that concern, 24 students collected more than 5,000 names on petitions opposing oil drilling in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge.

Michigan's Senators Donald Riegle and Carl Levin voted against the measure when it was defeated, but it's being revised.

The students' efforts were coordinated by Sally DeRoo, a life science and environment teacher at Canton High School.

Two students, Ron Cullen and Aaron Hentges, collected more than 500 signatures each.

New rules for primary worry clerk

It's bound to make a lot of potential voters angry. And it's likely going to create some spoiled ballots.

But Canton Clerk Loren Bennett is ready for the worst when it comes to the March 17 presidential preference primary.

If you want to vote there's some work to be done before then and it gets a little complicated. That's what Bennett is worried about.

Here are some of the rules:

- If you declared as a Republican any time up through Feb. 18 you are locked into that party choice. A poll worker must give you a ballot marked Republican. Declarations may not be processed after Feb. 18. Absentee ballots also are available.

- Republicans cannot declare on election day.

- You can declare as a Democrat up to and including Feb. 18. After that date any party preference declarations for the Democratic party must be accepted but held until election day.

Democrats may also appear at the polls and declare on election day.

Got that?

IF IT takes you a couple of times to process the information, you're not alone. Bennett is worried it's going to cause chaos at the polls in a couple of months. And he's not sure that the rules will stay the same until the election.

"I was told there may very well be

additional surprises and we'll let you know," Bennett said.

As the system is now, the poll workers will place an R or D on each ballot indicating party preference. Then the votes for each party are counted. More time will be necessary in counting votes, too.

For instance, if a person with an R on the ballot votes for a Democrat, or if the opposite situation happens, the ballot is spoiled.

"We'll be doubling the number of operations for counting," he added.

"Then there's the privacy issue. How many voters relish the idea of neighbors and township employees knowing which party they support? Although this is new in Michigan, State Rep. James Kosteva said 43 states already use the system.

Schools chase high-tech funds

With students in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools confronting a world in which knowledge is doubling every 30 months, the district is one step closer to receiving \$6 million in federal funds for instructional high technology.

A bill containing a high tech program initiated by U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth, was approved last month by the House Appropriations Committee and signed by President Bush. It's now in the hands of the U.S. Department of Education, which will determine where the funding goes.

Superintendent John Hoben testified before Congress last year, petitioning for a matching grant to equip Plymouth-Canton with interactive television and computer video, satellites, fiberoptics, laser and video discs, and other technology that would enable the district to become

a national demonstration site. Of the \$59 million in bond money approved by Plymouth-Canton voters last year, \$12 million is earmarked for high technology.

How soon the district will get an answer from the education department is hard to say, said Gary Cates, spokesman for Pursell.

"The Department of Education has to write regulations so they can accept proposals for the grant. That's currently where it is. We haven't been given a timetable. It could take six months, or it could take a year," said Cates. While appropriations funds can't be earmarked for individual recipients, funding, it is hoped, will be dispersed in such a way that some of it goes to Plymouth-Canton. "Plymouth-Canton is a lead applicant, but it is a competitive grant," Cates said.

Tea & romance

Sweet Afton serves up local authors

"By day, she is Elizabeth Thornhill, lovely young widow, by night, cleverly disguised, she becomes the notorious Blackberry Swift, riding a mission of vengeance against the ruthless villain who condemned her to debtors' prison. But she is not alone on the shadowed highway..."

So reads the back cover of "Midnight Raider," a just-published historical romance written by Shelly Thacker of Redford Township.

Thacker, 28, will autograph copies of her second book, published by Avon, during "An Afternoon of Romance" at the Sweet Afton Tea Room in Plymouth's Old Village. The Valentine's Day celebration is set for 1-4 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 16.

JOINING THACKER will be Detroit writer Lucy Taylor, author of "Avenue of Dreams," a mainstream book about the founding of the auto unions in the Motor City. The two will speak about reading, writing and romance, while Thacker's mother, tea room proprietor Sylvia Thacker, serves lunch, replete with British tea, imported coffees, and homemade Victorian desserts.

Set in 1735 London, "Midnight Raider" follows the adventures of Thornhill as she confronts the most feared highway man in England. Thacker treats readers to a colorful cast of secondary characters, among them a sassy Cockney shopkeeper, a clairvoyant viscountess, an illustrious French detective, and a villain inspired by the greedy Michael Douglas character in the movie "Wall Street."

The Livonia-born Thacker says that if readers expect to find perfect people in her romances, they'll be disappointed.

"To be honest, naively innocent heroines and nice-guy heroes just don't interest me," she said. "I want to read about people who

have to struggle to find their heroic qualities." "Midnight Raider's" hero and heroine do a lot of healing and changing during the course of the book, she added.

Thacker's award-winning first release, "Falcon on the Wind," is set in 13th-century France and Scotland. Published in January of 1991, it was chosen as one of six national finalists in the Romance Writers of America Golden Heart competition, and won four regional Romance Writers of America honors.

"Romantic Times" magazine lauds Thacker as "a new star of medieval romance on the rise."

Thacker's literary agent told her "Falcon on the Wind" set a company record for the quickest sale for a first-time effort. Avon bought "Midnight Raider" sight unseen.

COMPARING THACKER to bestselling author Johanna Lindsey, romance reviewers have praised Thacker's work as "irresistible," "captivating," and "a must read."

"Falcon on the Wind" has been an exceptional commercial success as well.

Sales figures are secret, but "it did double what they expected," said the author.

Avon's executive romance editor, who bought "Falcon on the Wind" in less than a week, called Thacker personally to say she was very pleased with sales. So pleased that Avon and Thacker just signed a new three-book contract.

Thacker is now at work on her third novel, "Silver and Sapphire," a sweeping story of exotic 18th-century India with a plot that revolves around priceless jewels.

Like her first two efforts, "Silver and Sapphire" will be a blend of history, romance and adventure with a twist of intrigue," says Thacker. "Sort of 'Moonlighting' meets Robin Hood."

Five years ago, the author gave up a job in public relations at Rochester's Crittenton Hospital to freelance full-time. She's written for national magazines including "Country Living," "Entrepreneur," "Writer's Digest," "American BookSeller," "Flowers &" and "Romance Writers Report."

Headquarters is a three-bedroom bungalow on Glenmore overlooking Bingham Golf Course. Thacker

works in a home office furnished with a huge antique desk, and painted and stenciled in pale lavender and white. French-style "lady's handkerchief" curtains Thacker copied from a magazine adorn the windows. Dried roses grace a 1920-vintage typewriter.

When she's not encoiled in the library doing research, 9 a.m. finds the Northville High and Albion College graduate finished with aerobics and working on her manuscript. She usually breaks for an hour at noon to enjoy a sandwich and "Loving." "That's my secret," she says — "it's the only soap on between 12 and 1. I figure I have to have some entertainment."

Romance writing truly is a labor of love, says Thacker. Without the supplemental income of her husband Mark Meinhardt, writing for a living — at least right now — wouldn't be financially feasible, she says.

IT IRRITATES Thacker to hear people label romance authors as money-grubbing writers of trash.

"Despite the fact that critics continue to reinforce negative stereotypes — denigrating us as hacks and calling our novels inferior or trash — the romance genre and our books celebrate life, celebrate optimism for lasting relationships, and celebrate the theme that ordinary people can win against extraordinary odds," Thacker says.

Thacker also is a believer that "as our genre continues to evolve and mature, exploring new themes and attracting new readers and writers, I believe we'll outgrow the prejudice and criticism of the literary establishment, just as mystery writers outgrew the criticism they suffered in the 1930's and '40's, and science fiction writers outgrew the criticism they suffered in the 1950's and '60's."

Romances account for 40 percent of mass-market paperback sales, according to "Entertainment Weekly," adds Thacker. "Midnight Raider" is available at the Village Paperback Exchange, 819 N. Mill in Plymouth, and at Books Connection, 18756 Middlebelt in Livonia.

must submit a written proposal to the Department of Education.

IN THE MEANTIME, the district has hired a high technology consultant who will recommend to school officials a plan to revamp media centers in elementary, middle and high schools.

It's possible that the high tech media centers may be available for public use. "We are taking a look at how we can best serve the community in all ways," said Dick Egli, community relations director.

Hoedel said. "Opening the libraries after school hours takes money."

Even if the district doesn't receive federal funding, Plymouth-Canton will do what it can to equip K-12 classrooms with advanced technology.

"We will go ahead, regardless," said Egli. "We can work with whatever funds we have. We can provide considerable technology obviously with the \$12 million."

"We're looking basically at things like students having instructional television options," he added. "They will be able to view things like C-Span and things directly in terms of two-way communication from other schools and from things like Texas' instructional television network."

Plymouth-Canton's move toward high technology has prompted some to think that the district is doing away with textbooks.

"That's how rumors get started," said Egli. "Ultimately, there will be less need for textbooks as we know them. Whether that is going to happen in five years or 10 years is hard to say. But ultimately that is where we are going. We probably won't be using textbooks."

"We do see some things in terms of video discs," Egli added. "We won't be required to buy encyclopedias (in book form). Students will be able access them (electronically) from any location and have them in a central location."

Egli theorizes that "we will all end up with a pocket viewer that a variety of books will fit into. We'll be able to read from them just as we read today. It's simply changing the form

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Church stopped from housing the homeless

Providence can work in strange ways.

Under heavy snows last week, the roof of a church whose members wanted to open their doors to the homeless began to give way. No one was hurt in the incident, which occurred above the kitchen.

Plymouth Township officials shot down efforts by the First United Methodist Church on North Territorial to provide a shelter for the homeless as it would have violated zoning ordinances, building and fire codes.

On the evening of the 15th, the kitchen roof began to collapse, said church administrator Alex Meszaros Jr. "While it didn't fall completely through, several of the supporting trusses had created a problem and the roof began to sink."

"It was noticed first thing in the morning on Thursday."

The area that collapsed is in a section of the building added in a 1989 expansion.

"To my knowledge, everything was built according to code and to the plans that were approved by the township," said Meszaros.

Engineers are in the process of determining what happened and how the roof should be repaired. For now, activities in the church kitchen and parlor are suspended.

MESZAROS SAID the church will make the needed repairs as soon as possible, and will pursue the idea of providing a homeless shelter.

"We are still working with the township on trying to resolve the issue," he said. "We are interested in continuing to explore the opportunity to be of service."

One possibility is to have the county declare a state of emergency, "which would allow the township to override local building ordinances and permit the emergency shelter," the church administrator said. "I am hopeful that a plan can be worked

out where we will continue a project we have set out upon."

The problems plaguing the homeless are staggering, he said.

"All you have to do is read the newspapers and listen to TV and radio broadcasts to understand the homeless' needs," Meszaros said. "The homeless situation is everywhere — it isn't a Detroit issue. It's a Michigan issue as well as an issue throughout the United States."

"There are a great number of homeless folks because of the economic consequences of the recession and the impact on the automotive industry," he said. "I think the church as well as the township recognizes the severity of it."

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP supervisor Gerald Law sees the issue from a different perspective.

The township didn't act arbitrarily in denying the church a permit to house the homeless, he said.

"If we waive our ordinances or choose not to enforce them and then someone gets hurt, and we knowingly do this, then we are liable."

"There is a need for building safety and fire ordinances. That's why they were developed by the state," added Law, a former state representative. "There weren't adequate codes many years ago, and there were tragedies that happened, so the state changed things over a period of time."

The township must enforce ordinances fairly across the board, whether a church, residence, or industrial building is involved, he added.

"The church was asking for multiple family housing in a single family area," Law said. "The church hasn't been inspected or built for multiple family rooms, or the amount of sanitary toilet facilities necessary."

"And we don't know where these people would sleep," he said. "We don't even allow businesses to put boxes in hallways, let alone sleeping people."

'House Calls' gets word out

You're not alone if you've ever shuddered at the thought of being hooked up to life support when there's a little chance you'll live.

Folks at Canton United Home Health Services offered some options last week on a radio show the company broadcasts weekly. The show deals with health issues.

They want to get the word out about the durable power of attorney for health care form, according to Penny Rhein, a registered nurse and clinical director at health services.

THE FORM not only allows you to resist extra treatment, but you may also indicate that you want every medical technique possible. Rhein said during a WCAR broadcast of House Calls, 10:30 AM.

Emphasizing that this option shouldn't be confused with assisted suicide or euthanasia, Rhein said. "If you want everything done, you can indicate that you want as much treatment as can be done."

United Home Health Services, like all facilities aided by Medicare are required, as of Dec. 1,

1991, to make patients aware of DPOA and the rights it offers. The seven page form is simple and has detailed explanations of how to fill it out.

"It's an optional form," Rhein said. "You don't have to fill them out."

Where living wills aren't legal in Michigan, Rhein said, DPOAs are considered a legal document and let patients name another person who would make medical decisions if they're unable to be named a patient advocate.

The form can be changed at anytime if you've designated someone, like a husband you've since divorced, as your patient advocate and you don't feel comfortable having that person speak on your behalf anymore, according to Helen Levandovsky who hosted the broadcast with Gloria Brubowski, health services executive director.

Copies of the form should be sent to your attorney, physicians and the patient advocate you've chosen. The forms are available at hospitals, government offices and state and by writing federal representatives.

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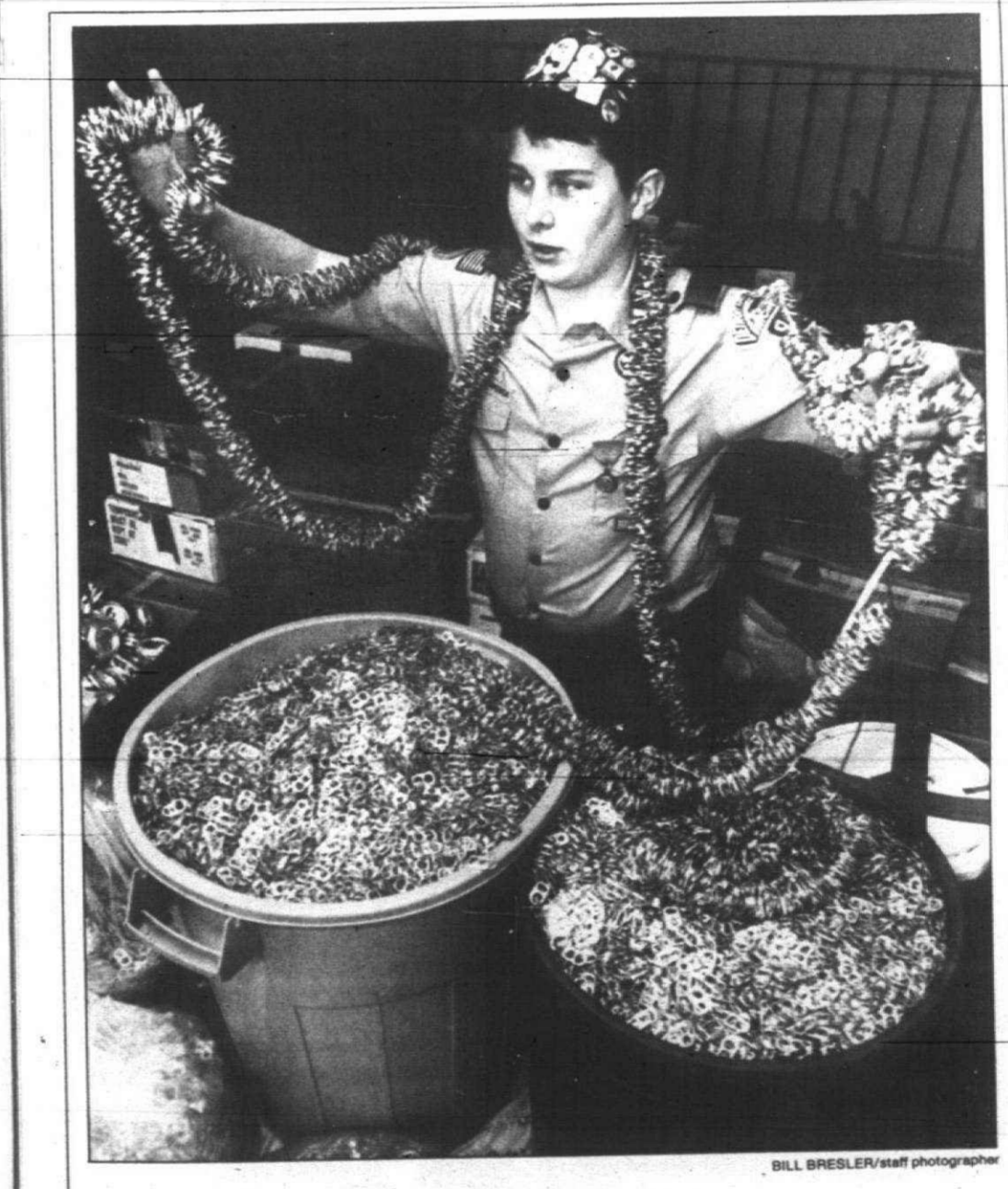

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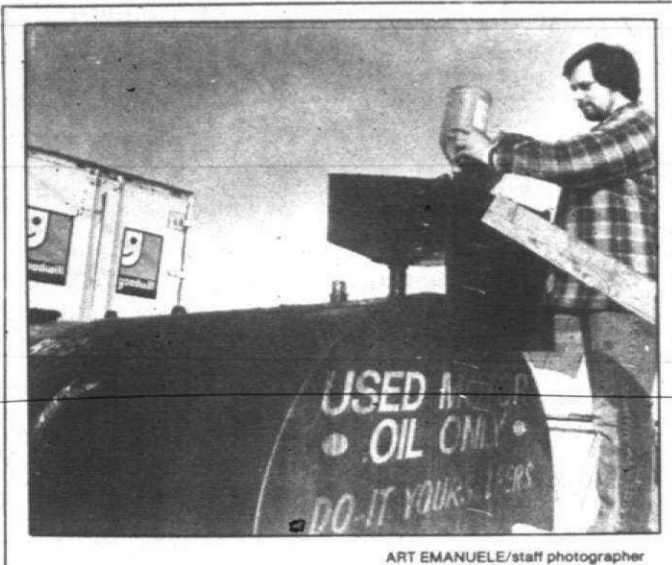

Debate continues

State liquor agents oppose privatization

Gov. John Engler wants to get Michigan out of the wholesale liquor business — and that makes Michael Bacon nervous.

Bacon, manager of the State Liquor Store on Levan south of Livonia, is responsible for distributing hard liquor to all party stores, bars and restaurants in such area communities as Livonia, Redford, Plymouth and Westland.

"I try to be fair, but when your job is on the line it's hard to be absolutely neutral," said Bacon, a 20-year veteran of state employment.

He's concerned about proposed legislation calling for the privatization or deregulation of the state's liquor traffic and Gov. John Engler's instruction to the Michigan Department of Commerce to devise a plan for private wholesaling beginning Jan. 1, 1993.

"Over the past 10 years, the state has spent \$500,000 on studies for privatization. Every three or four years the issue comes up. But this is the most serious threat since I've been here," Bacon said.

THE MOST recent study, commissioned in 1990 by the state Commerce Department and conducted by Price Waterhouse, concluded that under privatization the state could not impose enough new liquor taxes to replace revenue it gets as the state's monopoly wholesaler.

"Privatization doesn't make sense. It doesn't make more money. It's an ideological thing," Bacon said.

Since prohibition, the Michigan Liquor Control Commission has been the sole wholesaler of liquor

in the state, issuing licenses, setting prices and earning money from taxes as well as a markup on distillery prices.

The operation nets some \$95 million annually which helps fund education, fire protection, tourism and the housing authority.

"Under privatization, an estimated 500 state employees at 72 statewide liquor stores will likely lose jobs, including the 12 who are employed in Livonia. The number does not include additional contract employees.

Bacon's assistant manager John Fisher asks, "We're such a big revenue-maker for the state. The money trickles down to everyone, including school kids. Why monkey with the system?"

THE PRICE Waterhouse study also concluded prices of liquor would jump under privatization, up some 36 percent based on markups from distillers to private wholesalers to retailers.

This point is of grave concern to Romeo Hesano, who for six years has operated a family-owned business called the Pilgrim Party Shoppe in Plymouth.

"We'd probably go out of business. It's a tough industry as it is and when you do something like privatization, the bigger stores with bigger buying power can get better wholesale prices. They have the money behind them."

RICHARD GEORGE of the Wine Barrel in Redford Township shares Hesano's concern. George serves on the executive committee of the Associated Food Dealers of Michigan, a trade association that represents 300 dealers.

"I've been in the liquor industry for 30 years. I've seen Meijer's come into the state. Right now,

you can buy vodka for the same price from me or Meijer's, but ask consumers where it's cheaper and 50 percent will say Meijer's.

"Don't get me wrong. I like Meijer's. I shop at Meijer's. But with privatization, I estimate they will take over probably 50 percent of the existing (liquor) market.

"This is the second largest revenue maker in the state. Why fix something if it isn't broken. If the state wants to increase revenue, why not hire someone like me, whose been in the business my entire life, to tighten up the existing system.

"There's too much inventory, too many distribution centers. I could fine tune the system and make the state an additional 25 percent."

Until recently, state Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, whose 6th District includes Livonia, Redford, Plymouth and Canton, supported privatization. He now "questions the wisdom" of such a proposal.

"We need to do a great deal of research before we jump on this."

A PRIMARY issue, Geake said, is money. Present state income from liquor wholesaling could not be matched under privatization, even with increased taxes. And, he added, an estimated \$30 million windfall from the sale of current liquor stock owned by the state is misleading.

He also fears privatization means heightened marketing and advertising strategies by private companies. The state currently does no advertising whatsoever.

"I would be very concerned about any state initiative that leads to more advertising of liquor. More advertising could be the result of privatization."

Primary setup 'an absolute mess'

If you want to vote in the Republican presidential primary March 17, you'd best declare your party affiliation by Feb. 18.

To vote in the Democratic primary, you can declare yourself a Democrat March 17.

"It's an absolute mess," said Republican state Rep. Jan Dolan of Farmington Hills. But it's the best advice the Grand Old Party can give its followers at this point.

Meanwhile, Michigan voters accustomed to open primaries, continue to gripe about the party declaration rule.

Why the difference between parties?

DEMOCRATIC Party national rules say delegates to the national

convention must come from a Democrats-only system — either caucuses or a closed primary.

The party says its rules take precedence over state law, and the U.S. Supreme Court says the Democrats are right. "The National Democratic Party and its adherents enjoy a constitutionally protected right of political association," said the highest court.

Michigan Attorney General Frank Kelley ruled, "Where a political party's rule of general application contradicts a state statute, the rule prevails."

After the Michigan Legislature passed a 30-day party declaration law to accommodate the Democrats, the state Democratic Party adopted a same-day declaration rule. Said Kelley: "The rule also prohibits individuals who have previously filed a

different party preference from declaring their Democratic party preference.

As usual, people must be registered to vote 30 days before the primary, but Democrats can declare their affiliation at the polls.

REPUBLICAN national rules say state law takes precedence. Michigan law says they must declare party preference by Feb. 18.

Dolan said House Republicans last week tried to force a bill out of committee to allow an open primary. The discharge effort failed on party lines.

A number of Democrats chose not to vote so they're not on record as voting for an open primary," she said.

It's possible that the Republican State Committee could adopt a rule allowing same-day declaration, she

said. But that would put the state party rule in conflict with the national rule.

So far now the official Republican advice is "If you plan on voting, you'd better declare."

THE DEMOCRATIC ballot will have the names of Sen. Tom Harkin of Iowa, Gov. Bill Clinton of Arkansas, former Gov. Jerry Brown of California, former Sen. Paul Tsongas of Massachusetts and Sen. Bob Kerrey of Nebraska.

The Republican ballot will have the names of President George Bush, columnist Patrick Buchanan and state Rep. David Duke of Louisiana.

A Republican strategy may be to stick with the 30-day declaration rule, however unpopular, because it might hold down the turnout for former Ku Klux Klansman Duke.

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

When our number was called, the Woodmobile was placed on the track beside a metallic red machine that, except for its size, looked ready for a race.

"But look at them," I said. "They look like the concept cars from the auto show. Half of them have been turned on lather. That one's got an aluminum shell over the wood. These weren't done by kids."

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Eight Mile wish list

Residents seek better lighting, crossings

Given their preference, area residents would like to see more street lights and safer intersections along Eight Mile Road — and maybe light rail lines and underground parking, too.

Those were among suggestions made Wednesday, during a public hearing on the future of the Eight Mile corridor.

Elected officials, municipal department heads and urban planners are already considering ways to revitalize the 13-community traffic belt. Wednesday night's meeting gave area residents a chance to do some planning of their own.

"THERE'S NOTHING that says you have to use the road as it is," said John Rajovich of Farmington Hills, a member of his city's planning commission.

While light rails and underground parking were among the more far-reaching proposals, residents also suggested improving traffic entrances, exits and turnarounds, add-

ing street lights, improving drainage and reducing speeds along some sections of the road.

Suggestions will be included in an Eight Mile revitalization plan to be presented at future hearings this spring.

Long a barrier between communities, Eight Mile Road should instead be considered a "linear city" of its own, according to the revitalization plan's proponents.

Eight Mile connects houses, shopping malls, factories and offices from western suburbs to Lake St. Clair, said urban planner Albert Bogdan, who conducted Wednesday's meeting at the Farmington Hills city hall.

The corridor includes Northland Center, the State Fair Grounds and the Chrysler complex at Mound and Van Dyke roads.

But it also contains topless bars, abandoned buildings and aging neighborhoods.

Instead of being a multi-community showplace, Bogdan said Eight Mile is often shunned.

"IT'S THE front door for 13 com-

munities, but some communities are treating it like it's the back door," said Bogdan, a member of Farmington Hills-based McKenna Associates. Eight Mile use patterns are changing in the wake of the 1989 expansion of I-696. Daily traffic is down as much as 50 percent along some stretches and businesses are concerned, Bogdan said.

Longtime Farmington Hills resident George Roberts said he wished planners well, but remained skeptical about bringing all communities together.

"You're not going to get anything until the mayor of Livonia marries the daughter of the mayor of Farmington Hills," Roberts said. "Plain and simple, it's a turf battle, Farmington Hills goes its way, Livonia goes its way."

Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara, Detroit Mayor Coleman Young, Oakland County Executive Daniel Murphy and representatives of all 13 communities — including Farmington, Farmington Hills, Redford and Southfield — have been at

least peripherally involved in the revitalization plan.

The plan's success, Bogdan added, involves bringing Wayne, Oakland and Macomb communities together in a single coalition. The coalition would not only seek newly available federal road grants, but also conduct regional planning.

"Most communities have done planning, but almost no community has done any planning with any other community," he said. "If we put out a report and it goes on a shelf, then we've obviously failed."

Communities aren't the only ones involved. Jurisdiction varies among the state and counties over the road. Eight Mile is a state road through Macomb County, an Oakland County road to Halsted and a Wayne County Road from western Livonia to the county line, Bogdan said.

Canton swimmers gain momentous win

Chiefs earn 1st win over Rocks

It would be an understatement to say Plymouth Canton's 104-82 victory over Plymouth Salem in boys swimming was a long time coming.

The Chiefs had never beaten their arch-rival until Thursday night when they finally accomplished the feat in the Salem pool.

"It feels good to get the monkey off our back," Canton coach Hooker Wellman said, adding the Chiefs (2-1) were the last Canton team in any sport to beat the Rocks (0-4-1) in a dual-meet competition.

"The hype for this meet is incredible. I got here an hour and a half early, because I couldn't stand sitting at home. But it will be just another dual meet by next week."

Wellman observed the victory involved a twist of irony, too.

When the Chiefs previously made their strongest bid for a victory in 1989, Salem thwarted the attempt (89-83) in large part due to an outstanding individual talent — high school All-America Ron Orris.

CANTON HAD to wait three more years for its win but did so with the help of another Orris — Mike, the younger brother of the former Salem great.

"We've had better teams than this — back when we had (Jeff) Homan, (Scott) Swartzwelder, (Jimmy) Hartnett and (Mike) Helmstader — but they had Ron Orris and we couldn't

stop them," Wellman said.

"When we lost that real close one to them, it was probably the best team they have ever had, and it was the best team we have ever had."

Orris was the leadoff man on Canton's winning 200-yard medley relay team and anchored the first-place 400 freestyle relay. In between those events, he won the 200 freestyle (1:54.19) and the 500 freestyle (5:03.8).

"He's incredible," Wellman said. "He comes out of the backstroke in the medley relay and goes right into the 200 freestyle. There aren't many kids who can do that. I learned that from (Salem coach) Chuck (Olson), because he used to do it with Ron Orris."

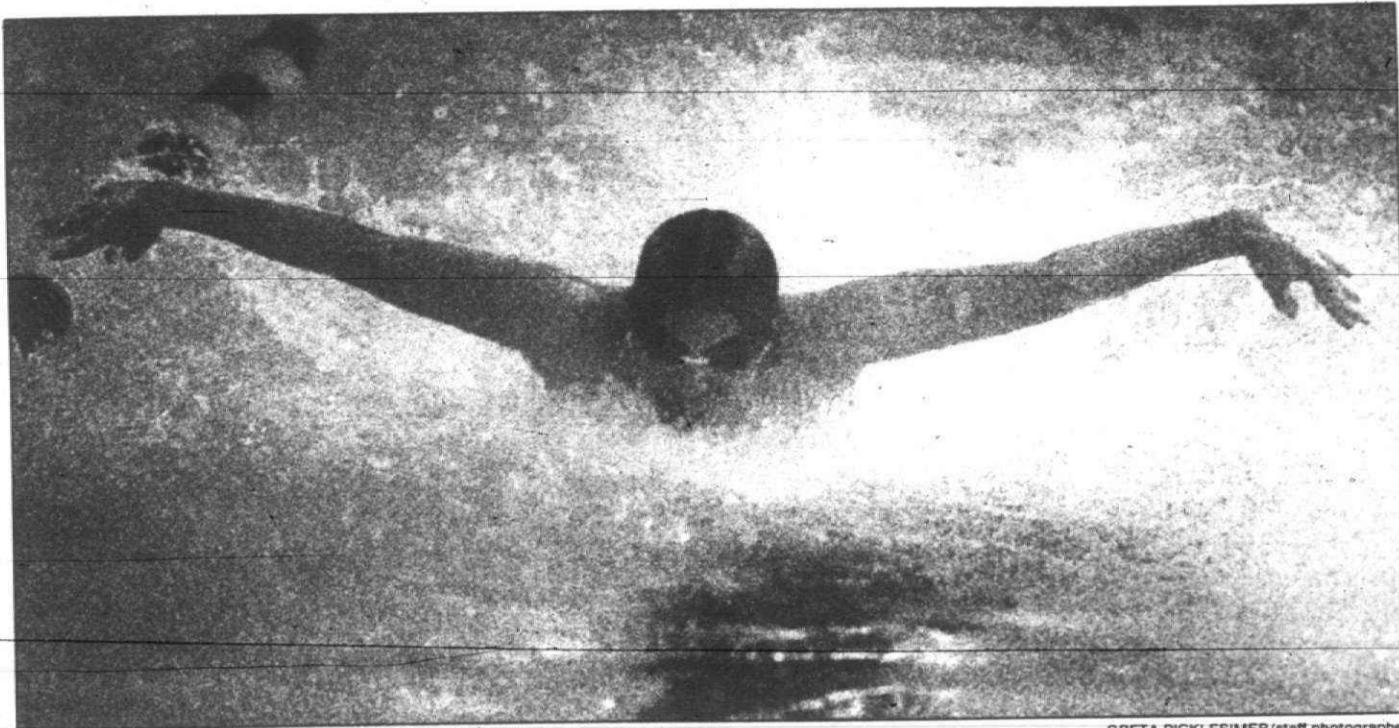
Olson suspected the Rocks were underdogs because of people like Mike Orris, whom Wellman could place in nearly any event and still expect to win.

"I HAD A GUT feeling there might not be an event we could win," he said. "That tells you we might be in trouble. As it was, we only won one."

"But it's probably the best we swam this year. To win only one event and keep it that close was pretty good."

Wellman was a little skeptical of his team's pre-meet status as the favorite, given Salem's long winning streak and apparent invincibility in the series.

"I had a funny feeling," he said.

"We've gone into meets with them before and felt we had a chance. This meet was different. It looked like we had better than a chance, and they looked like the underdog."

"To me that's the kiss of death, especially against them. They've done that before — not swim well in their first three or four meets and then come up against us and swim out of their minds."

"But the kids were real confident."

They felt they could put it together and, with the times we had, you can see why they were confident."

CANTON WON every event but the backstroke, finished one-two in three events and recorded a number of personal-best times.

The Chiefs also had double winners in Craig Steshetz and Jeff Clark. Steshetz won the individual medley (2:13.58) and breaststroke

(1:07.14). Clark the 50 freestyle (23.32) and 100 freestyle (51.77).

Canton's Mark Ealovega won the butterfly (58.39), and Scott Helmstader had Salem's only first place in the backstroke (1:00.45).

Steshetz, Ealovega and Clark followed Orris in the medley relay, and the Chiefs qualified for the state meet with their time of 1:42.96.

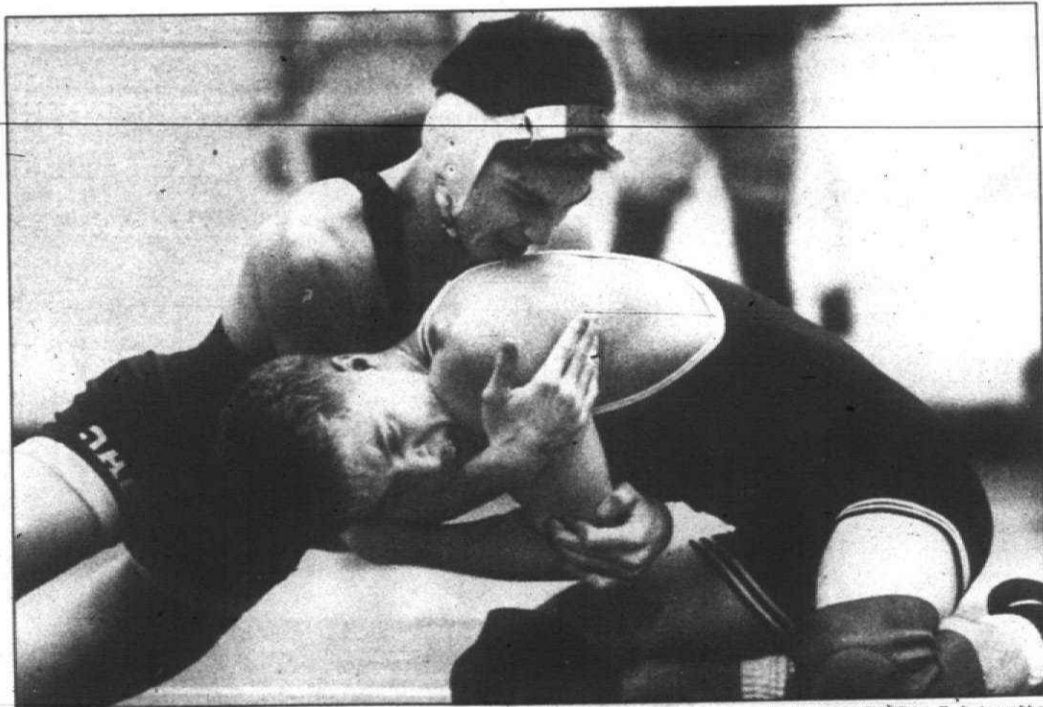
Pat Lancaster, Steshetz, Matt Terrel and Clark comprised the 200

freestyle relay team (1:34.65), and Lancaster, Ealovega and Terrel preceded Orris in the 400 freestyle relay (3:34.18).

"We had three of our four seniors on that (last) relay with Orris on the end," Wellman said. "That was a great way to finish off the meet."

Sweet success

Rocks outperform North on hoop court

There was nothing flashy or exciting — just a good of fashion win.

Host Plymouth Salem used a 14-5 mid-third-quarter run to defeat North Farmington 61-41 in a boys basketball game Friday night.

"We lost, there's nothing else you can say," North Farmington coach Tom Negoshian said. "It wasn't something that my team didn't do. You have to give Plymouth Salem credit."

Salem, which improved to 5-3 overall and 2-1 in the Western Lakes Activities Association, was led by senior center Mike Abraham, who scored 16 points. Sophomore forward James Head scored 12 points and junior guard Bob Schneider, playing in his first game since transferring from Redford Catholic Central, 10 points.

Senior guard Dean Pennala led North Farmington with 14 points. Senior forward Eric Hewett contributed eight.

THE RAIDERS dropped to 3-5 overall and 1-2 in the WLAA.

"I think we did a decent job tonight," Salem coach Bob Brodie said. "We held a good three-point shooting team to 41 points, and I'm pleased with the number of contributors we had coming off the bench."

"I'm still not satisfied with the offense. We shot a little better, but we were not into the flow. We saw shades of it coming."

A Schneider three-pointer with two seconds left in the first half gave Salem a 27-21 lead heading into halftime.

The three-pointer broke an eight-point spurt by the Raiders that cut the Salem lead to 24-21 with 36 seconds left in the first half.

Salem led 24-13 with 2:13 left in the second quarter after scoring five straight points on free throws by center Don Johnson while Schneider hit a basket and a free throw. North scored the next eight on a three-pointer by senior guard Brian Lee and five straight points by Hewett on a three-point play and a pair of free throws.

"I THOUGHT we had some good things going, but Schneider hit a three-pointer to make it a six-point game at the end of the half," Negoshian said. "It carried the momentum (for Salem) into the second half."

Salem, which led most of the game, broke it open in the third quarter.

Head took a feed from Schneider and hit a layup to open the third-quarter run with 5:31 left in it. Schneider hit a trey from the right wing to put Salem up 34-25.

A basket by Abraham put Salem up 36-25 before North scored five straight points on a three-

pointer by Pennala and a basket by senior center Brad Pawlowski.

Salem finished the run, scoring the last seven points of the quarter, including five from Head.

Salem led 43-30 at the end of three quarters. "We got down 10 or 11 points and we did some things to get back into the game because we were playing to win," Negoshian said. "They did a nice job executing their press breaker."

EACH TEAM traded baskets early in the fourth quarter and Salem, leading by 15 points midway through it, cleared the bench.

"We're about where I expect us to be at this point (of the season)," Brodie said. "We're not great but we're getting better."

"James (Head) is capable of playing a little better, but he's playing well off the glass. Abraham has been steady every game and Schneider stepped in and contributed quite a bit. He's a welcome addition to our team. He fits into the mesh of the team and takes some of the pressure off the guards. Now we have three players that can step in and bring the ball up the floor."

Negoshian said he found some positive things from the outcome.

"Our bench brought us back and played hard," he said. "We will be positive and hopefully we learned something from this loss."

Canton cagers stop Chargers

Livonia Churchill's slowdown tactics worked for three quarters Friday, but the Chargers came unglued in the final period as Plymouth Canton roared back for a 53-35 Western Lakes Activities Association cage triumph.

Canton outscored Churchill 24-4 in the fourth quarter after trailing 31-29 following the end of the third quarter.

"We figured they (Churchill) would play zone and be patient on offense," said Canton coach Dave Van Wagoner, whose team is 5-3 overall and 3-0 in the WLAA. "It was definitely a slowdown, but the kids hung in there until the fourth quarter."

The Eagles were outscored 21-9 in the first quarter and trailed 33-13 at halftime, but they regrouped in the third quarter to cut the Wesleyan lead

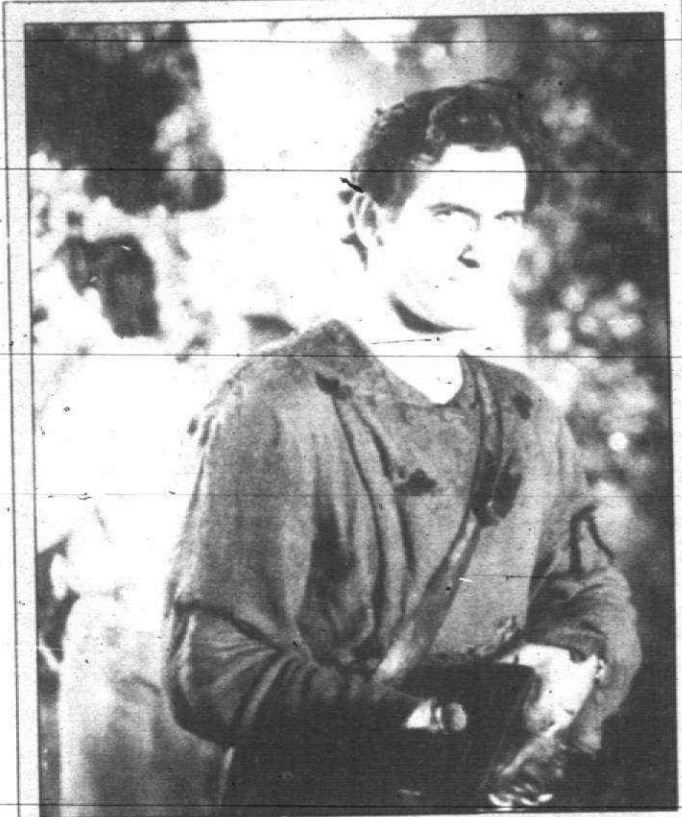

'Evil Dead III: Sam's baaack with his army

FANS OF THE "EVIL DEAD" films anxiously awaiting the sequel to the two previous thrillers, rest assured that director Sam Raimi is hard at work. Raimi has been shooting "Army of Darkness" (Evil Dead III) at Warner Bros. special effects lot. But a warning for those with less than iron nerves: this realistic confrontation with the dark side may cause nerves to melt as it transforms nightmares into reality.

Part three continues where part two left off. After reciting a phrase from the ancient book, bound in human flesh and inked in blood, Ash (Bruce Campbell), the hero and sole survivor of the "Evil Dead" saga, has been transported back through time.

He passes into another dimension — medieval England — when this Great Evil Force stalked the earth in its search for human souls on which to prey.

King Arthur has his Excalibur, Ash has his chain saw, double-barreled shotgun and a 1973 Olds Delta 88. A blacksmith later assists Ash in replacing his severed hand with a gauntlet. Working together, they make modifications to the Olds, creating the "death coaster." Move over, Batmobile!

The movie doesn't depend on gruesome special effects. Raimi gives us more. He deals with themes that relate to Good versus Evil — power, succession, revenge and deception. To this, Raimi adds a personal touch, his speciality. He takes us over the edge. He creeps into a part of our nightmares we try to avoid — its darkest corner, the Terror Zone.

WHEN "EVIL DEAD" was released in 1983, its innovative camera angles, gushing blood and exploding limbs helped Raimi gain recognition at film festivals in Chicago, New York and Ann Arbor. Acclaimed at the Cannes Film Festival, the movie won awards for both special effects and horror.

Stephen King called it "the most ferociously original horror film of the year."

FORMER MICHIGAN WRITER/director Raimi has come a long way. His earliest film production days began at age 12, making Super-8 movies to entertain friends in his home. Recently, Raimi reached success with last summer's box office smash, "Darkman."

Raimi's lugubrious wit and unique cinematic style is having an increasing influence on Hollywood's new movies.

Having seen Raimi at work, both in the past and the present, I recall a time, when he filmed a scene in my father's West Bloomfield store. He was instructing one of his friends in the art of properly hanging from a meat hook.

Even back then, Raimi — like Dracula prototype Vlad the Impaler — knew there was an art to inflicting terror. Vlad inflicted terror physically, Raimi psychologically.

Raimi wanted to slither into the darkest corners of the mind, that sacred, unthinkable spot where, under lock and key, we try to forget our scariest nightmares. This technique can't be learned in school. It must be experienced in the mind, by searching our deepest fears and opening those doors of darkness.

Although the groups are quite diverse in musical styles (Midwest power pop, rockabilly and techno are among those represented), they all share the bond of having their sounds re-

J.C. Whitelaw: A life after Can

In the dust of fractured dreams, disintegrated love and the dissolution of a band, John Campbell Whitelaw has made a rather buoyant album.

Which in itself is remarkable feat, considering the Birmingham resident completed "Out of the Ash Can" in a time when most couldn't lift their heads from the pillows in despair.

Not only did his group, Ash Can VanGogh, break up last year, the three-year engagement to his fiancée also dissolved. When conducting his personal inventory, Whitelaw even marvels at it all.

"Here I'd lost my best friends, I'd lost my band and I lost my fiancée," said Whitelaw, 25, who was one of the leaders of Ash Can VanGogh. "It was a real emotional time for me. It was like going into the studio without these (his two hands)."

"But I realized not only did I still have my two hands, they were two very big hands."

The composition of "Out of the Ash Can" certainly belies the artist's turmoil. Whitelaw endured during its recording. Most of the vibrant folk-rock numbers possess an upbeat tingle, relying on a mantle of catchy riffs and indelible hooks.

Upon closer inspection beneath the veneer of Whitelaw's pop sensibilities, though, the hurt is revealed. He carries no torches, nor does he wallow in his misery.

BUT THROUGH lyrical references to abandonment ("Don't Wake Me Up"), broken hearts ("Without It") and stolen souls ("Autumn Has My Heart"), the shards of unfulfillment cut against the rosy soundscape.

Whitelaw said "Out of the Ash Can" is not so much a testament of his pain, but a cathartic exercise. Though so emotional were some of the numbers he found himself crying when recording them in his Birmingham studio, "The Barn."

More so, Whitelaw uses the 12-song effort as furthering the musical

vision he shared with Ash Can VanGogh, whose folk-rock sound had made considerable inroads in this area.

"We were three writers (Billy Brandt, Mary McGuire and Whitelaw) who worked really well together," he said. "When it came down to choosing material is where

we had problems. I wanted to go for the big enchilada.

"Folk rock is definitely in my heart. I always wanted to make this record with Ash Can... I needed to make this record. I needed to close the door."

VanGogh. Brandt and McGuire are given songwriting credits on "Under the Sun," "Twilight's Witch" and "Let It Shine" as well as perform on some of the numbers.

WHITELAW SAID band members still communicate after the breakup, which occurred Jan. 11, 1991.

"There's a weirdness," he said. "But no bitterness."

"In the realization he could do it alone, Whitelaw found a new support cast. He credits the production work of Dennis Forbes and mixing done by Gerard Smerek for turning the eight-track production into a viable, seemingly effortless release.

Whitelaw admits there was a bit of trepidation entering the studio a few weeks after the band's demise. "Without it" with Jill Jack on back-up vocals, the worries quickly disappeared.

He's always had unshakable faith in his songwriting, which is inspired largely by emotion and somewhat by the peculiar.

"On what was behind the soft acoustic instrumental "Rosolo," Whitelaw describes a red, copper-like sunset he saw once looking out a window in Scotland. Thinking that was the sole inspiration for the number, he adds that it was the same shade as friend's pasta sauce.

The jaunty, hopeful "Rainbows (The Telegram Song)" came about while sitting in LaGuardia Airport in New York.

THESE LIGHTHEARTED numbers are designed to provide balance to "Out of the Ash Can," which is available at some area record outlets including Sam's Jams.

Whitelaw intends to market the independent release to major labels for wider distribution.

"I went through a ton of realization, not only on a personal level, but a musical level and a spiritual level," Whitelaw said. "It was very enlightening. It's like I put a lid on it, put a bow on the package."

Cronenberg's 'Lunch': It's not for every taste

Chances are William Burroughs never dreamed of cutting a movie deal when he dredged up his novel "Naked Lunch" in the middle 1950s. His crazy quilt of sometimes incoherent tales relies heavily on detailed descriptions of everything from flatulence to homosexual practices to drug use.

Over the years, however, several directors have toyed with the idea of bringing the book to the screen. David Cronenberg has taken the challenge by using the text as a jumping board for his own fantastic account in which a Burroughs-type writer serves as the main character.

In 1952, Bill Lee works as a New York exterminator and as "Naked Lunch" opens, we watch him spray yellow powder into cracks and floorboards, sending roaches scurrying.

When he runs out of insecticide on the job, his friends (based on Burroughs' Beat buddies Ginsberg and Kerouac) suggest it may be a "domestic problem."

has included "Barton Fink" and "Impromptu." She plays the hopeless addict Joan in the cockroach-infested apartment and the writer Joan who cruises Interzone with her husband in search of pretty young boys.

OBVIOUSLY, "Naked Lunch" is not for every taste. Even if you hate the picture (a number of walkouts were recorded during preview screenings), you can't fault the performances.

"Naked Lunch" had me hooked right from the opening credits, with garishly colored rectangles intersecting on the screen. Add to it a jazz score by Howard Shore, with Ornette Coleman sax solos, and it looks and sounds like something out of an old Otto Preminger movie.

Like-minded viewers will also feast on the ingeniously-designed monsters, including alien mugwumps who dispense intoxicating liquids from hot dog-shaped appendages on their head. Sit back and drink it all in and "Naked Lunch" can be a most satisfying trip.

"A Fist Full of Chaos" connects on both counts. Some 15 groups burn through 16 songs with unfettered zeal (The Generals get the honors of having two tracks "Goodbye" and "Rock N Roll All Nite" here).

Although the groups are quite diverse in musical styles (Midwest power pop, rockabilly and techno are among those represented), they all share the bond of having their sounds re-

berate of the red brick walls of Finney's Pub — a haven for some of the Midwest's more-motivated, creative outfits. Sue Summers of Chaos Network deserves a heap of overdue credit for making it one of the most vibrant scenes in the area.

Where to begin? How about the sensually languid offering from Vavoom, "Detroit?" Angie Hanna's voice oozes with indifference.

"It's a cool place, but it's not as cool as Detroit. It's a scary place, but it's not as scary as Detroit," sings Hanna, a model of apathy. This feeling of corresponds with some scraping guitar and hyring bass lines that drip closely to the lurid realm of Iggy and the Stooges' "I Wanna Be Your Dog."

While Vavoom exercise some restraint, others here plonder away with laudable amounts of tear. The Culture Bandits, a formidable trio, pass through their track "You're Someone Else" with enough unbridled energy to construct a railroad.

Another threesome by way of Alma, Mich., Instant Zoo checks in with another example of pure rawness succeeding with the alluring "Mile Marker 92."

Those taking a shine to immaculate pop sensibilities will find Trust Fund's contribution, "Try Again," an indelible, compact piece of songwriting while the immediacy of Bigger Than Mass "White Rice on Demand" wants to burst through the speakers — a definite highlight in the package.

Of the techno outfits who contribute cuts here, Skinhorse's "Souls At Zero (Water into Wine Mix)" manages to find a happy median between modern gadgetry and emotional rendering. By contrast, Wrath of Christian delves more towards the darker, ominous realm with "Thrill Me."

If a particular number doesn't impress you, at least the way the band tackle its craft will.

Four years later, with a budget of \$3.5 million, "Evil Dead II" was released. Horror fans thrilled to scenes in which Campbell as the hero Ash severs his right hand with a chain saw after it becomes possessed by the Evil Dark Force and another in which a screaming woman swallows the exploding eyeball of a beast.

With delight in his eyes and a smirk on his face, Raimi once said, "The ratings board wasn't too happy about the flying eyeball. Especially after a woman swallowed it."

"They were also not very pleased with the scene where Bruce's hand becomes possessed by dark powers, forcing him to chain saw it off at the wrist. I suspect they have some sort of pee pee about self-mutilation."

The movie was released without a rating.

RAIMI DESCRIBED how his earlier directing and filming techniques were based on his experience doing films with small budgets. For example, a chase scene was set up like this: "OK, Bruce, when I say go, you run and I'll chase you with the camera."

Asked how he created the illusion of attacking trees in "Evil Dead II," he explained: "That special effect was created by wrapping vines around someone and then pulling them away. We would take the film and run the sequence in reverse. By doing this, it appears that the vines are moving towards the victim."

Raimi was drawn into the motion picture industry because of its ability to capture, then alter it and replay it. It was desire and determination that made him strive for success.

Now, he's in Hollywood, the city of bright lights and big stars. The sets have changed. The budgets are larger. Many things have changed, but not everything.

Raimi is easily recognized. He's the guy in the starched white shirt,

ironed jeans and white leather sneakers. Of course, his ability to choose ties has improved.

As in the past, he seeks top-notch production people and equipment. Film companies now give Raimi an opportunity to work with. His earlier films were financed by soliciting money from family and friends.

MANY of his friends and co-workers remain the same. Bob Taupert, Bruce Campbell and Ruth Jessup are a few of the cast and crew members who have been with Raimi since Renaissance Pictures was established in Ferndale in 1979.

Raimi is a serious, charismatic professional. He enjoys his work, averaging a 16-18-hour work day. He does whatever is necessary to finish the job. Yet, he never misses an opportunity to smile, to laugh, to relieve the tension that develops naturally on a movie set.

He has a special talent for making the production an enjoyable experience for both cast and crew. It's rare to find that quality in a

man so focused on his work.

For instance, on the set of "Army of Darkness," they were ready to shoot an action scene:

"Wait. I'm picking up machine noise from the back."

"Shut off the smoke machine," Raimi yelled. "How's it now?"

"All clear."

"Wait," said Raimi. "I still hear noise... some sort of thumping sound."

The crew began searching for the source of the noise.

A MOMENT later, "Just kidding. It's me," bumbled Raimi with a smile. He was bumping his chair against mine.

The slight delay was perfect. Now everyone was smiling. Prior to Raimi's little stunt, cast and crew were slightly tense and irritated over the fact that shooting had been delayed.

This may be the greatest trilogy ever created in horror film history. But viewers should heed these words from the wise: "Don't worry, try to remind yourself it's only a movie."

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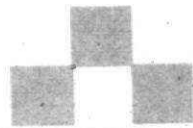
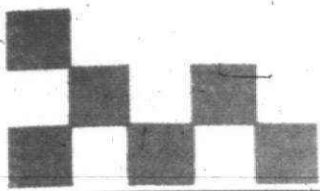

Oriental cuisine — Um Goh!

Um Goh! (That's Good!) That's what a group of Oriental cuisine aficionados will be proclaiming Feb. 4 as the Year of the Monkey is rung in in typically grand New Year's style.

The metro Detroit Oriental dining scene is blessed with an abundant number of restaurants featuring the food from the Far East. Cantonese, Hunan, Szechuan, Thai, Vietnamese, you name it and there's a place, certainly within driving distance.

MANY OF these "mom and pop" type establishments where the entire family gets involved in the day-to-day operations will be featuring a special menu for the Chinese New Year. Pot stickers, Princess shrimps, Peking duck, sesame beef and crispy fish will share the spotlight with dragon and lion dances, fireworks and toasts of good cheer for the new year.

ONE ESTABLISHMENT that's betting on a booming Chinese New Year is the Hunan Palace in Farmington Hills. Linda Parker and newfound associate, executive Chef Jack Dai are planning three straight days of partying beginning Feb. 2 and continuing through Feb. 4.

No stranger to gourmet Szechuan and other northern regional Chinese dishes, Parker has been in the restaurant business going on five years while Chef Dai has been wielding razor sharp cleavers for more than 20 years. Parker calls it "The K mart of Oriental stores that features everything for the kitchen." I remember shopping there when I was a kid, especially when we needed some exotic mushrooms with magical names like "cloud ears."

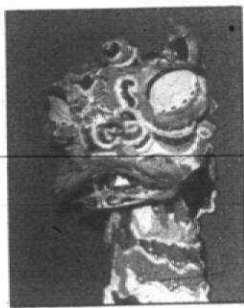
Momma was never proficient and to this day wouldn't know what to do with a wok, but has turned up many a satisfying beef chop suey dinner in her Farberware skillet.

Follow monkey's lead to make money in '92

TODAY, CHINESE food is more popular than ever. General Tso's Chicken is trendy and regarded as healthy good. It's flavorful spicy sauce delights the palate and is easy on the waistline.

Moo Shu chicken, duck or vegetables with Mandarin crepes is labeled gourmet. Szechuan spicy anything is stylish.

Additionally, celebration of the Chinese New Year has become the "in" way to cure mid-winter blahs.

THE CHINESE lunar year has a month of 29 or 30 days. The 15th of the month was always a full moon. Twelve months totaled 357 days, less exact than the solar calendar. Accordingly, leap years were given an extra month to compensate. The western calendar has been used in China only since 1910.

According to the Chinese Zodiac, each successive year is named after one of 12 animals, in this order: rat, ox, tiger, rabbit, dragon, snake, horse, sheep (or goat), monkey, rooster, dog, boar (or pig). The Chinese believe that the year a person is born influences personality.

FEB. 4 ushers in the year of the monkey. Chinese astrology describes people born under this sign as achievers, clever, intelligent and even genius. According to Shen Yu, proprietor of New Peking restaurant in Garden City, "Chinese people regard the monkey as smart. In this year, people should follow the monkey's lead and develop ingenious ideas to make money."

Sounds like good advice in a recessionary economy! Chinese New Year holiday customs go back thousands of years when people celebrated for five days or more. Traditionally, Chinese families prepare for the New Year by cleaning house, settling quarrels and paying debts. Parents and children shop together for special foods.

STORE ROOMS of Chinese pastry shops are bursting with ingredients for special holiday delights that will carry the "fu" or happiness stamp. Children practice an ancient custom of decorating the house with red paper, a symbol of good luck. Parents give red-wrapped "lucky money" to their children.

Guests come bearing gifts of sweet lotus seed, preserved ginger or the holiday's special red "luck candy."

Recipes

SHRIMP LOVER'S STIR-FRY

Serves four.

- 1 1/4 pound peeled shrimp
- 4 ounces or 1/2 cup green vegetables (spinach or steamed broccoli)
- 4-5 green onions, chopped 1/2 inch long, including part of the green stem
- 30 slices of ginger, cut in 1/2 inch slices
- 1 egg white
- 1 1/2 tablespoon cornstarch
- 1/4 tablespoon salt
- 1 tablespoon wine
- 1/2 tablespoon salt
- 1/2 tablespoon sesame oil
- 3 tablespoons tomato ketchup
- 2 cups oil

Clean shrimp with a little salt, rinse with water, pat dry. Marinate them for 30 minutes or longer (the longer the better) in a mixture made up of: 1 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch, 1 egg white, 1/4 tablespoon salt.

Fry green vegetables in a frying pan or wok with a little oil and salt for a few seconds. Remove and place in the center of a platter.

Heat 2 cups of oil in a frying pan. Deep-fry the shrimp for 15 seconds, removing them from the pan when the shrimp turn white. Place on a paper towel to drain. Drain off all but 1 tablespoon of the oil from the pan.

Heat the oil again and saute the green onions and ginger for a few seconds, then add the shrimp and stir quickly. Combine the wine, salt and sesame oil and pour the mixture over the shrimp. Mix thoroughly and remove half of the shrimp and place them on one side of the platter.

Add the tomato ketchup into the pan and fry with the other half of the shrimp for a few sec-

onds. Remove and place on the other side of the platter. Serve hot with rice or noodles.

CHINESE SALAD

- 2 cups shredded carrots
- 1 cup cellophane noodles, cooked
- 1/2 cup shredded egg pancake (fry one egg until the yolk is hard and cut it up into thin pieces)
- 1/2 cup shredded cooked pork or cooked ham
- 2 cups shredded cucumber
- 1/2 cup green onions, chopped

Seasoning Sauce

- 3 tablespoons soy sauce
 - 1 tablespoon vinegar
 - 2 tablespoons sesame oil
 - 1 teaspoon sugar
 - 1 teaspoon pepper
 - 1 teaspoon garlic
- Combine the seasoning sauce in a small bowl and mix well. Arrange all of the vegetables in a pretty way in a large crystal or glass bowl. Pour the seasoning sauce over them and toss well just before serving.

ALMOND GELATIN CHINESE STYLE

- 2 envelopes of unflavored gelatin
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 3 tablespoons milk
- 2 tablespoons almond extract
- 2 cups cold sugar water (2 cups cold water and 1 cup sugar)
- 1 can fruit cocktail or your choice of dried fresh fruit

In a medium-sized mixing bowl, combine the 2 tablespoons of sugar with the gelatin. Stir to blend them and add the milk and 1 tablespoon of the almond extract. Stir the ingredients briskly until thoroughly mixed and refrigerate for at least 2 hours or until firm.

Remove chilled almond gelatin from refrigerator and cut into small cubes. Place in dessert bowls and put fruit cocktail or dried fruits on top and pour the almond-flavored sugar water over everything.

CRABMEAT RANGONN APPEZZER
(New Peking Restaurant)
1 pig. wonton wrappers
6 oz. cream cheese (softened)
1/4 pound finely chopped crabmeat
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
1/4 teaspoon white pepper
1/4 bunch chopped green onions

Mix all ingredients together. Place a generous teaspoon of the mixture on a wonton wrapper and seal in any shape. Deep fry in vegetable oil until golden. Serve hot.

HOT AND SOUR SOUP
(Mon Jin Lau Restaurant)
1/4 cup tiger lilies
2 dried black mushrooms
1/4 cup wood ears
boiling water
1/4 cup lean pork
1/4 cup bamboo shoots
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cornstarch
2 tablespoons oil

6 cups chicken stock
2 tablespoons light soy sauce
1/4 teaspoon pepper
3 tablespoons vinegar
2 tablespoons cornstarch, dissolved in 1/4 cup water
2 pieces fresh bean curd, cut in strips
2 beaten eggs
1 tablespoon sesame oil
2 scallions, cut in 1-inch pieces

Put mushrooms in stainless steel bowl, cover with boiling water and let soak 3-4 hours or overnight. Remove stems and woody parts from mushrooms. Finely julienne mushrooms, pork and bamboo shoots and held separately.

In a bowl, mix pork with salt and cornstarch. Heat wok to 375 degrees Fahrenheit, lightly drizzle in oil and stir-fry pork until the color changes. Bring chicken stock to a boil, add mushrooms, pork and bamboo shoots. Stir constantly. Add soy sauce, pepper and vinegar. Chicken with dissolved cornstarch, stirring constantly over moderate heat. Add bean curd and bring to a boil.

* Turn off heat, add beaten eggs and stir quickly for 30 seconds. Add sesame oil. Remove to soup dishes and garnish with scallions.

SHITAKE MUSHROOMS WITH SNOW PEAPODS AND OYSTER SAUCE
(Mon Jin Lau Restaurant) (serves four)
1/4 pound Shitake mushrooms
8 oz. snow pea pods
1 1/2 tablespoons oil
1 tablespoon Mirin or rice wine
1 tablespoon light soy sauce
2-3 tablespoons oyster flavored sauce
1/4 cup beef or chicken stock
1/4 teaspoon sugar
1 teaspoon cornstarch
3 tablespoons water
1/2 teaspoon salt

Rinse mushrooms and trim stems if woody. Cut into 1-inch pieces. Stem, string and blanch snow peas. Transfer to serving platter. Combine cornstarch, sugar, salt, soy sauce, oyster sauce and water. Heat skillet or wok to high heat, add oil and saute mushrooms with Mirin or rice wine, for 1-2 minutes until mushrooms are tender. Then add stock and bring to a boil. Add cornstarch mixture, thicken and remove from the heat.

Pour mushroom mixture over snow peas and serve.

With all this celebrating, isn't wine in order? "Champagne and sparkling wine works wonders with Chinese food," said Marshall Chin, proprietor and culinary director at his family's Mon Jin Lau restaurant in Troy. This suggestion hits the mark.

We've also been confident recommending an Alsace gewurztraminer or dry California gewurztraminer to accompany Chinese cuisine. "Currently, there's no better California Dry Gewurztraminer than the 1989 Z-Moore," said Chin. "With appetizers, I recommend the 1990 Coldridge Semillon-Chardonnay from Australia. It's sturdy and refreshing - just what's needed as a first wine with spring rolls, Chinese ravioli or sushi."

FOR A highly stylized fish or chicken entree such as Cantonese Roasted Cornish Game Hen that's honey-roasted with Chinese herbs and spices topped with shredded scallions and cilantro, a bigger, fuller Chardonnay is needed. My current favorite is 1989 Newton. This wine also pairs handsomely with shrimp, sea scallops and pickered fillet in taro's nest.

To complement dishes such as Mongolian Rack of Lamb with spicy peanut sauce or Mandarin Steak (a marinated filet mignon topped with spicy ginger garlic sauce), Chin recommends the 1989 Rosemount Show Reserve Syrah and the 1990 Bogle Merlot.

With such upscale, but value-priced wine suggestions, it's easy to understand that Chin has departed from a "traditional Chinese" cuisine at Mon Jin Lau. He has studied and worked in family Chinese restaurants since 1965. He's worked with chefs from China, Taiwan, Singapore, Malaysia, France and America. His food is an eclectic blending of local and imported ingredients plus techniques adapted mainly from China.

TO COMPLEMENT his contemporary Chinese offerings, and educate his palate, Chin samples wines frequently. He is among Michigan's most accomplished wine tasters.

Chin also recommends several beers as flavorful and refreshing matches to spicier dishes. These include: the Chinese Tsing Tau and Asahi Dry, Kirin Ichiban and Soppo from Japan.

In the year of the monkey, we wish you prosperity. "Kung Hai Fa Tsai" (in Mandarin) or "Kung Hai Fat Choy" (in Cantonese). See recipes inside.

EGG DROP SOUP
4 cups chicken broth
1 tablespoon soy sauce
1 egg, beaten
1 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch dissolved in 1 1/2 tablespoons water
2 green onions, chopped
a few drops sesame oil

Bring broth to a rolling boil. Lower heat and stir in soy sauce. Add cornstarch mixture. Cook, stirring frequently for 3 minutes. Hold egg high and slowly pour into swirling soup. Add green onions and a few drops of sesame oil. Ladle into bowls and serve immediately.

HOMEMADE EGG ROLLS
1/2 pound lean pork, chopped fine
1/4 cup dried black mushrooms
2 cups shredded cabbage
1/4 teaspoon salt

Marinate pork in soy sauce, rice wine, five spice powder and 1 tablespoon water for 15 minutes. Add 1/4 teaspoon salt. Chop mushrooms fine. Set aside. Cook meat in marinade, set aside. Cook meat in marinade, set aside. Squeeze out excess liquid from mushrooms. Stir into pork mixture, set aside. Stir fry cabbage in 2 tablespoons oil for 2 minutes. Add pork and mushroom mixture. Drain off excess liquid and cool mixture slightly before wrapping in egg roll wrappers. To fill an egg roll wrapper, place wrapper in a diamond position facing you. Place 1/4 of filling in lower half of panel and begin rolling, wetting the edges with water to ensure a tight seal. Heat 2 inches of oil in wok and fry only 3 rolls at a time to avoid crowding.

SWEET AND SOUR SAUCE
1 teaspoon soy sauce
1/4 teaspoon cornstarch
1/4 cup maraschino cherries, drained
1/4 cup orange marmalade
3 tablespoons sugar
1/2 cup white vinegar
1/4 cup ketchup

Combine all ingredients in a blender or food processor and process until cherries and marmalade are well chopped. Pour into a small saucepan and bring to a boil. Lower heat and simmer for 3 minutes. Cool and refrigerate until ready to serve.

Report shows need for seafood regulation

Some area fish market owners and managers are reeling over a Consumer's Union study of fish in February's Consumer Reports magazine. A few have noticed a drop in business and fear some of their customers are assuming bad things about fish.

The article focused on the bacteria counts of 113 samples of seven different kinds of seafood - bought at 40 randomly selected stores in New York and Chicago. Consumer Reports said their analysis showed 30 percent of the fish was "already spoiled" and 9 percent was on the verge of spoiling.

IN CONCLUSION, the report said there were abuses in handling seafood, which is largely unregulated by the federal government.

Brad Vargo, manager of Jack's Seafood Market in Farmington Hills said some of his customers were talking about the article. Anna Georgiou, owner of Anna's Fresh Seafood Market in Redford, said the same thing.

Vargo, Georgiou and other people I talked to said they were upset with the article in Consumer Reports because the conclusions were based on a small sampling of markets. Fish markets in Michigan were not tested.

On the positive side, Roy Phillips, vice president purchasing for Salasnek Fisheries, Inc., Detroit, which supplies fish to Jack's Seafood Market and other area grocery stores and restaurants, said the arti-

cle brought out the need for mandatory seafood inspection.

FISH MARKETS in Michigan are inspected by the Michigan Department of Agriculture Food Inspection Division at least once every four months. If violations are found, the markets are inspected more frequently.

Here are some tips from the National Fisheries Institute for buying and handling seafood.

When purchasing whole fish, look for eyes that bulge a little and are clear.

When buying frozen fish, whole fish should be clear of ice crystals with no discoloration.

After shopping, get seafood home and into the refrigerator as soon as possible. Eat it within 24 hours or freeze it. Use frozen fish within one to six months.

Fish is done - when the flesh is opaque and begins to flake easily when tested with a fork at the thickest part. You can also check with a thermometer. Fish is ready when its internal temperature reaches 145 degrees F.

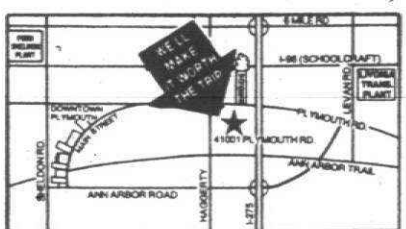

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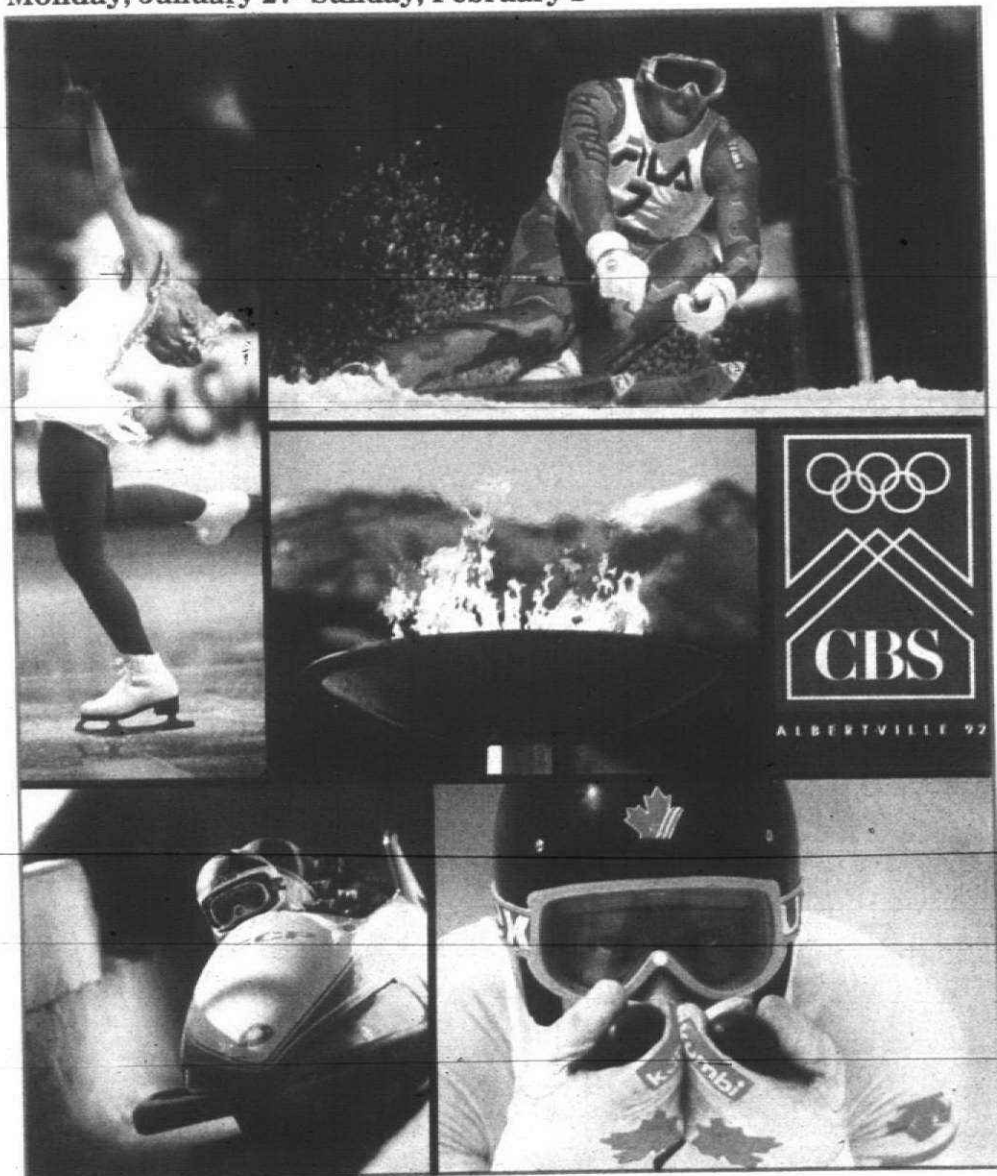

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Winter Olympics: CBS has it covered

Roughly 1,500 of the world's best amateur athletes will gather in Albertville, France, for the 1992 Winter Olympic Games, which begin on Saturday, Feb. 8. Following them will be hundreds more reporters, many with radio and television production crews in tow.

CBS, which has not covered a Winter Olympics since Squaw Valley in 1960, has dispatched an army of news and sports personnel to cover these Games, offering 116 hours of coverage over 17 days. The network has sold an additional 50 hours of weekday coverage to TNT, marking the first time an Olympics has been carried on cable TV.

Anchoring CBS' prime-time coverage of the Games are Paula Zahn and Tim McCarver. Highlights of the evening coverage will include a pre-Olympics special on Thursday, Feb. 6, the opening ceremonies on Saturday, Feb. 8, a variety of skiing and skating events, including pairs figure skating on Tuesday, Feb. 11, and ice dancing finals on Monday, Feb. 17.

Coverage begins each weekday during the "CBS Morning News, with Harry Smith and Greg Gumbel at the International Broadcast Center in Moutiers, France. Live events during these hours will include ice hockey, alpine skiing, speed skating and biathlon. In addition, half-hour wrap-up shows will air each weekday at noon (Eastern time) and once again after the late news. Correspondent Pat O'Brien anchors the late-night show, while announcer James Brown holds forth at midday.

Reporting and feature stories will be done by CBS stalwarts Mike Wallace and Morley Safer, Charles Kuralt and Charles Osgood, Andy Rooney, John Madden and former Olympic gold medalist Scott Hamilton. Their stories range from the sublime (French cuisine) to the insidious (the doping of athletes) and include dozens of athlete profiles, plus stories of tragedy and triumph in Games past.

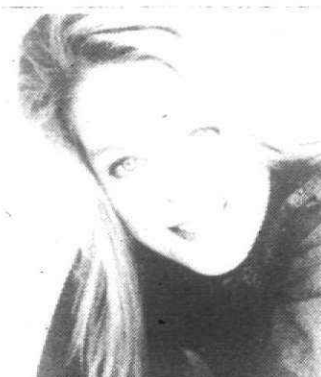

Lifetime, the cable channel with sensitivity, has acquired the defunct series' library of 85 episodes for its exclusive broadcast beginning in March. Winner of 13 Emmys, the yuppie melodrama will join the ranks of the channel's successful recycled acquisitions which include *China Beach* and *L.A. Law*.

TV, the window on the world, will soon open doors for students. Fifteen public television stations and their local schools will begin a four-month test in March of a new satellite system that promises to provide a nationwide interactive communications network for educational institutions. Very small aperture terminal (VSAT) technology, which enables the transmission and reception of voice, video and printed data, has the capability of linking students and teachers to libraries, museums, databases and other classrooms throughout the PBS service area. Funded by public television stations and the Corporation for Public Broadcasting, Project VSAT expects to have all PBS stations in America equipped with the cutting-edge technology by 1993.

Ken Burns tells an American story

Ken Burns is one of the rarest of filmmakers: a documentarian of whom you've probably heard. His monumental achievement, *The Civil War*, has been called the best television documentary ever made. His newest work, *Empire of the Air: The Men Who Made Radio*, premieres Wednesday, Jan. 29, on PBS.

The 38-year-old resident of New Hampshire has been in the business of putting truth on film for half of his life now. His list of other award-winning documentaries include *Songs of the Civil War*, *The Shakers: Hands to Work, Hearts to God* and his first film, *Brooklyn Bridge*, which will air along with *Empire* on Wednesday.

Citing the late John Ford as the director most influential to him, Burns didn't always want to make documentaries. "I had planned to be a Hollywood director, but I ran into a bunch of teachers who reminded me that the ways things are and were, if told carefully, are much more dramatic than anything I could imagine on film."

The next big project for Burns is a film dealing with the history of baseball, which he expects to complete by the fall of 1994. His treatment of the American pastime promises to be much more than just a day in the park.

Kevin Costner tops on reader's list

Q: Could you please send me Kevin Costner's address? I'm his No. 1 fan and would be grateful if you would send me some information on him. A: Costner was born in Compton, Calif., on Jan. 18, 1955. In high school he was the class jock. He was halfway toward a degree in marketing at California State University before he decided on acting. Never one to put all his eggs in one basket, he continued his college courses and enrolled at the Southcoast Actors Co-op and appeared in a number of community productions. He earned his degree, married his college sweetheart, Cindy, and got a job at a major national firm.

Determined to break into movies, he quit his job after 45 days. Finally, he landed a part in PBS' *Testament*. His reviews helped him get the role of Gardner Barnes in *Fandango*. After that, his career soared. Costner and his wife live in California with their three children. Even if I had a home address, I wouldn't give it out. Harrison Ford was born July 13, 1942, in Chicago and was raised in the suburbs. He flunked out of college three days before his class was to graduate, then moved to Los Angeles and was signed by Columbia Pictures for \$150 a week. He was released from his contract (Ford claims he was too difficult) and headed over to Universal Studios. In 1977, George Lucas, who had picked Ford for a small role in *American Graffiti*, chose him for a lead in *Star Wars*. The movie was a hit, and Ford was catapulted to fame. Ford resists publicity, claiming it blurs an actor's vision. He is currently married and has two children from his first marriage. No address is available for him.

Q: I've seen the address where to write Richard Dean Anderson in your column several times. Can you please give some information about him? —Mary Bowling, Corbin, Ky.

A: The tall (6'2") actor was born Jan. 23, 1950, in Minneapolis. His mother was an artist and his father a jazz bassist. Anderson wanted to be a hockey player, but after breaking both arms in different accidents, he decided to find a less violent occupation. He developed an interest in acting and moved to Los Angeles. Stints as a stage manager, street mime, juggler and even a jester singer at a Renaissance-style cabaret preceded a role in *Superman the BONES* at a Los Angeles theater. Next came a role on *General Hospital* for five years. In 1982, he appeared in the short-lived series *Seven Brides for Seven Brothers*. From 1983 to 1984, he appeared in *Emerald Point, N.A.S.* In 1985, he began his lead role in *MacGyver*.
