Fisher trial

A third trial will be held in the first-degree murder case of Dr. Charles Fisher.

Wayne County Prosecutor's were denied a request last week by the Michigan Supreme Court to reverse its 1991 decision granting a new trial.

Fisher, who had been serving a life sentence in the suffocation death of his wife, Ella Maria Mercado Fisher in their Canton Township home, is free on bond. A new trial has not been scheduled.

Two juries found Fisher guilty of first-degree murder.

The first trial was thrown out, after a Wayne County judge ruled mistakes had been made by the prosecutor during closing arguments.

Late last year the Supreme Court ruled that additional errors were made in the second trial when Mercado Fisher's diary was admitted as evidence. The court said it constituted hearsay.

Wife's gift of life sparks generosity

When Brenda Wilson donated her kidney to her husband, Jeff, two weeks ago it started a domino effect of generosity.

Her co-workers at Meijer Hair Salon in Canton kept it going. One idea led to another until they decided to hold a fund-raiser dinner party. The money, along with donations collected in a can at the salon, will go to living and medical expenses for the Romulus couple.

And it's promised to go to good use since other medical problems have kept Jeff from working, Brenda Wilson's co-worker Cassandra Janas said. Brenda, a hairdresser, is the

family's sole provider. "I'M OVERWHELMED," Brenda Wilson said last week. "It's an extremely nice thing that they're doing. I thought I'd do my thing, go back to work and everything would be back to normal."

"It's very generous of them." Meanwhile, the Wilsons are recovering from their operations. Last week, Jeff returned to Beaumont Hospital during a down slide of an expected roller coaster ride while his body works on accepting his wife's kidney.

Brenda Wilson remains optimistic, however, she said she doesn't plan to return to work until early April.

'Home grown' man named chief

Canton's newly appointed fire chief is home grown.

That's how Canton Supervisor Tom Yack introduced Sgt. Michael Rorabacher, a 1970 Plymouth High School graduate, when he announced his promotion to Canton fire chief last week.

Rorabacher has worked with the Canton fire department since January 1974 and was promoted to sergeant in 1979. He's also served as past president of the Canton firefighters union.

HE IS trained as an emergency medical technician and was recently involved in the coordination of the department's joint dispatch communication center. Rorabacher also is a member of the department's computer committee.

"I don't see any major changes in the department," Rorabacher said adding that he can't think of any major problems the fire department is facing.

"To maintain this reputation, the fire department must progress as Canton progresses," he said. "This can be accomplished by staying current with all the latest firefighting and emergency medical procedures and training firefighters accordingly."

The fire department will continue to promote a fire prevention program, he said. The spotlight is on Canton's fire safety house, a specially equipped miniature home, that serves as a tool to teach children how to escape rooms with excessive smoke and fire.

New sewer line gets official OK

A sewer line extension, announced Friday, could end a major source of Rouge River pollution — and flooded basements.

But it could also bring new development and higher service rates.

Plymouth, Canton and Northville townships said they will extend a new sewer line to the Ypsilanti Communities Utility Authority treatment plant, expanding wastewater capacity, but also eliminating waste currently dumped into the Rouge.

The Western Townships Utility Authority, representing the townships, announced an \$81 million construction project to extend its major sewer line, already under construction, to the Ypsilanti treatment plant.

"This makes us the first three communities in Wayne County to be in full compliance with the Rouge River Remedial Action Plan," said

Canton Supervisor Thomas Yack, chairman of the three-community authority.

The communities are under state Department of Natural Resources orders to address sewer discharges.

The line is an alternative to the North Huron Valley-Rouge Valley "son of super sewer" project, involving other western Wayne communities. Townships declined to join that project, predicting they could meet state guidelines better, and more cheaply, on their own.

PHASE ONE of the sewer line is scheduled for completion this year. It extends the line to the Michigan Avenue/Haggerty intersection in eastern Canton.

The second phase, unveiled Friday, will extend southwest to the treatment plant. It is expected to be completed in 1993. Bids have already been submitted, township officials said.

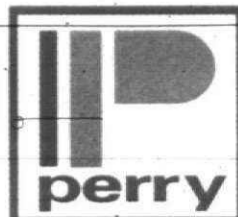

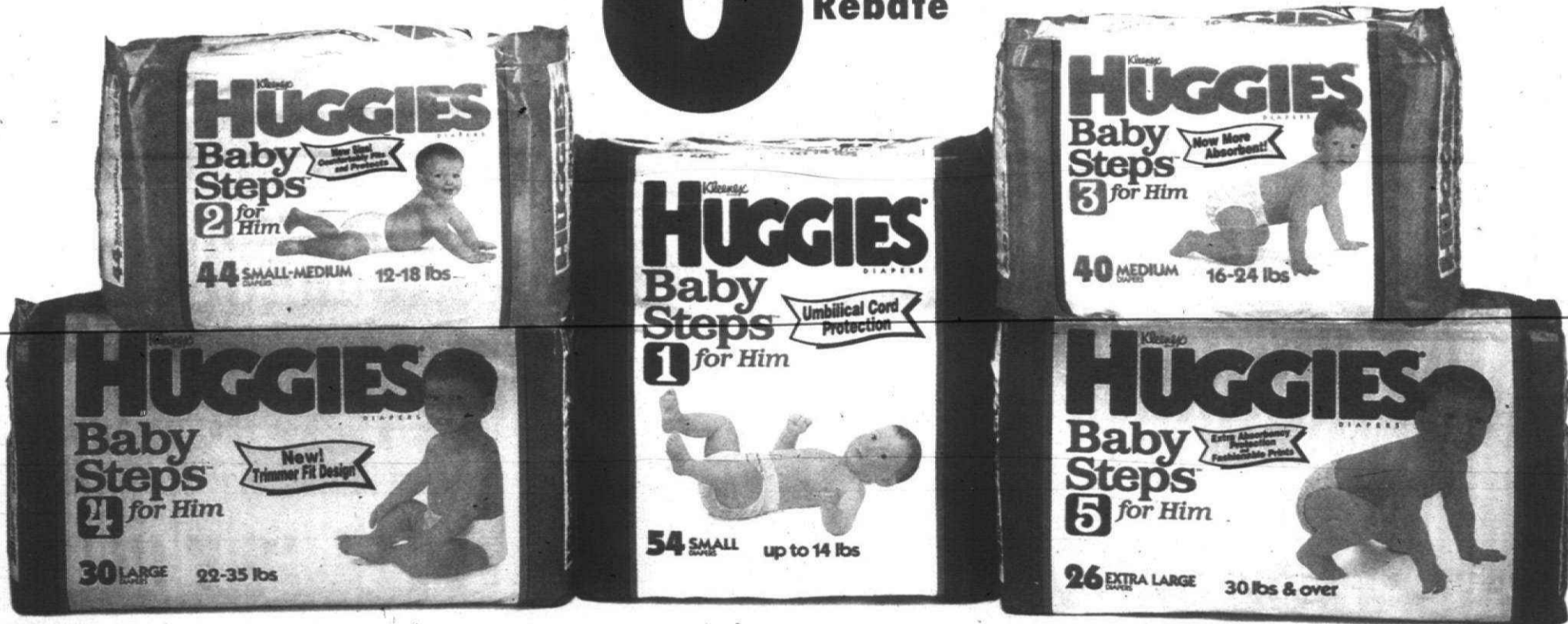

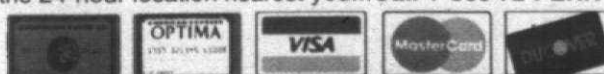

Canton captures 2nd in Observer meet

3 Rocks tourney champs

Other teams had more individual champions, but nobody could match the overall depth of the Farmington wrestling team Saturday in the first Observerland Invitational.

The Falcons overwhelmed their area opponents as 11 of 12 wrestlers earned medals (finishing fifth or better) and enabled Farmington to amass 194 1/2 points at Garden City High School.

"Maybe we can get ranked on top now," Farmington coach Al Beyar said, referring to the fact that Redford Catholic Central and Plymouth Salem had been rated ahead of the Falcons in Observerland.

"Everybody won it for us. That's the way it's been all year. We placed everyone but one kid, and he won two matches for us. So it was a total team effort."

CC and Salem finished lower than expected, in fifth and sixth place, respectively, and the meet offered a few other surprises, with Plymouth Canton, Westland John Glenn and Lutheran Westland taking the Nos. 2-4 positions.

SALEM'S DAN Bonnett and **CC's Dan Kelly** were named the most outstanding wrestlers.

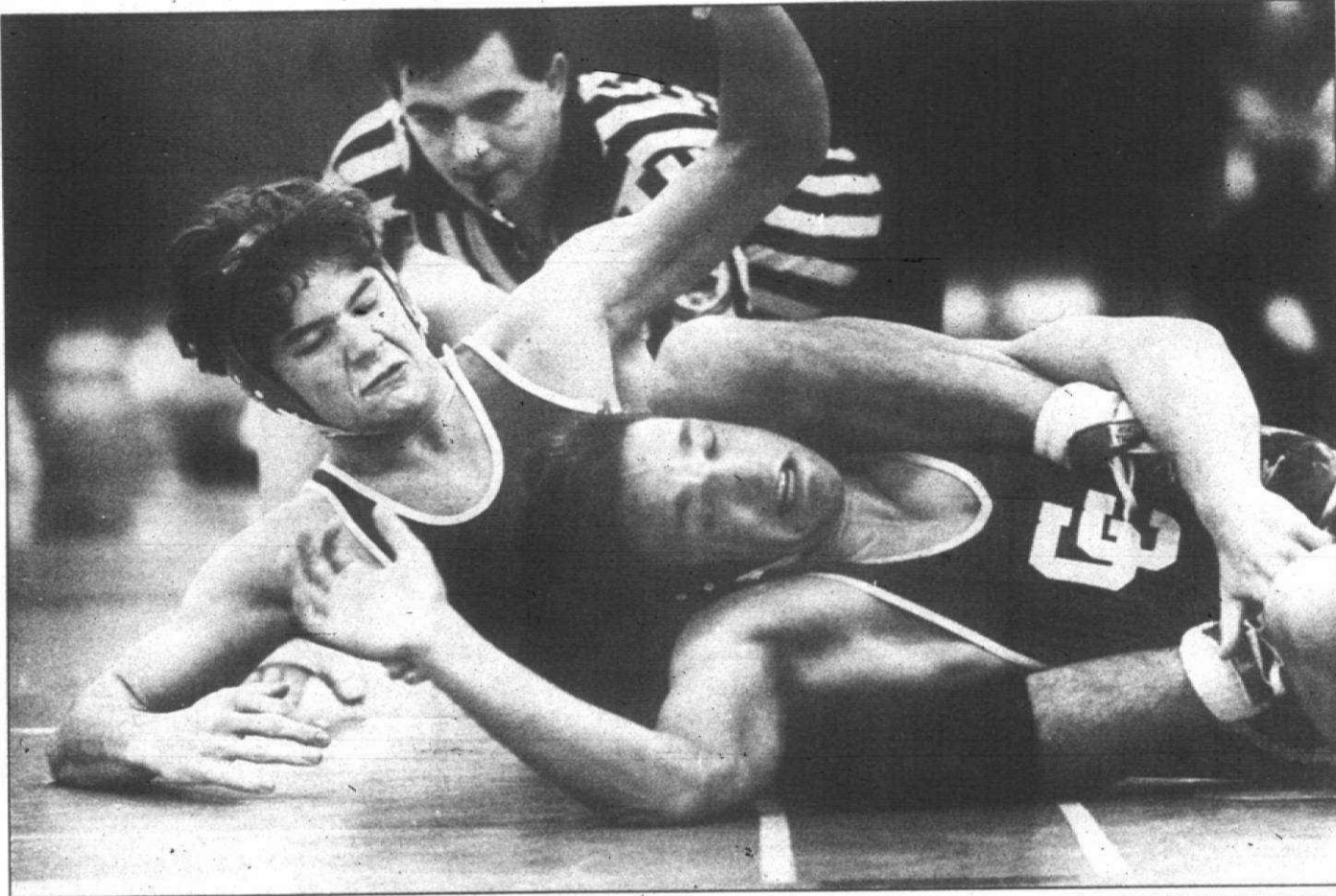
Both were the top seeds in their weight classes and defeated the No. 2 seeds in the final. Bonnett pinned two opponents in 30 seconds or less before winning 13-0 over Jon Duff of Farmington at 125 pounds. Kelly also had two pins at 171 and defeated Canton's George Young 13-7 in one of the best matches.

"You get warmed up and get your confidence in the first match," Bonnett (26-1) said. "In the second, you find out what you're doing wrong and correct those things. By the final match, you've got what's working for you that day."

Farmington, which won its third tournament title, had one champion in Rob Cavagnol at 189.

In addition to Duff, the Falcons got third-place finishes from Matt Siskosky, Ryan Adams, Mike Pallo, Dave Monge and Jason Holliday. Steve Lemieux, John Economy and Mike Prough were fourth, Matt Smith and Rob Sutton fifth. Chris Darnell got sixth place.

"Cavagnol did a tremendous job,"

Beyar said. "He wrestled a very smart match (in the final) and technique-wise was about as perfect as you can get."

"WE'RE JUST a real strong, well-balanced, dual-meet team, and we can place just about everyone in a tournament. That's been our strong point all year."

The tournament not only provided a venue for area wrestlers to demonstrate their talents, but also for the Observer to showcase one of its employees. Salem's Scott Martin, who won the 119 championship, delivers the Observer newspaper.

"I was Carrier Of The Month, too," he said. "It's a good job. The Observer is a good paper. I'm glad to deliver the paper, wrestle in the tournament and be associated with the paper."

Canton also made an impressive showing. The Chiefs placed nine wrestlers, including Joe Hunter, who won the 152 title on an injury default over Lutheran Westland's Mike Kaitner. In addition to Young, Andy

Strahan was second, with Nick Spano and Jerry Flynn getting thirds.

Glenn had a pair of champions in Tom Pace (103) and Mike Mancini (112), and Matt Graca (130) and Shane Hall (145) captured second-place spots.

"Mike probably wrestled the best I've seen him wrestle," Glenn coach Dave Hill said. "The Plymouth Salem coach (Ron Krueger) said we looked like an entirely different team, and it's a good time of year to start wrestling that way."

In an unfortunate situation, Glenn's Mike Reeves, who was undefeated and seeded No. 1 at 152 pounds, was disqualified for using an illegal move in his semifinal match with Kaitner and was subsequently withdrawn from the tournament by Hill, who said he did so to protect Reeves, an emotional competitor who finished sixth, from any further problems.

"IF YOU continue in that same vein there are other things that can

happen, so I chose to pull him," Hill said, adding the Rockets lost more than 30 points by the move. "He's such a good boy. It leaves a bad taste. I know the parents are not happy but it bothered me, too."

Lutheran Westland capitalized on its opportunity to go head-to-head with the Class A powers in the area. Tony Horvath won the 130 championship, and six others also placed, including Kaitner, Mace Mattieson, Doug Johnson, Craig Shafer and Jamie Hardy.

"It's about time they start getting respect in the area," Garden City coach Phil Freeman said. "People say they have a weak schedule, they're a Class C school and they don't wrestle in tough tournaments. They showed a lot today."

"Lutheran Westland sure woke up a lot of people," Beyar said. "A lot of people have been taking them lightly for years but not any more."

Salem had the most champions with Jeff Shumate capturing the 145 crown. CC and Garden City also had

two winners. Jason Krueger, who won a decision over Jared Lawrence of North Farmington in the 160 final, upheld the CC reputation by winning the title as expected.

"Coach (Mike) Rod(riguez) tells us everyone is shooting for us, so it's there no matter where you go," Krueger said. "I was a little tense. I had never seen the guy before and I heard he was a good wrestler. I started off slow and got my shots at the end."

Garden City's Chris Gorak and Jason Peterson took first-place medals at 135 and heavyweight, respectively. Peterson beat Siskosky in the semis and got an escape in the final seconds to edge Hardy 5-4. North Farmington's Marcus Brown won the 145 title and boosted his record to 23-5.

"We got our fair share of championships," Freeman said. "Peterson wrestled great all day, and Gorak was Gorak. He always wrestles tough at tournament time. He's a real spark plug for our team."

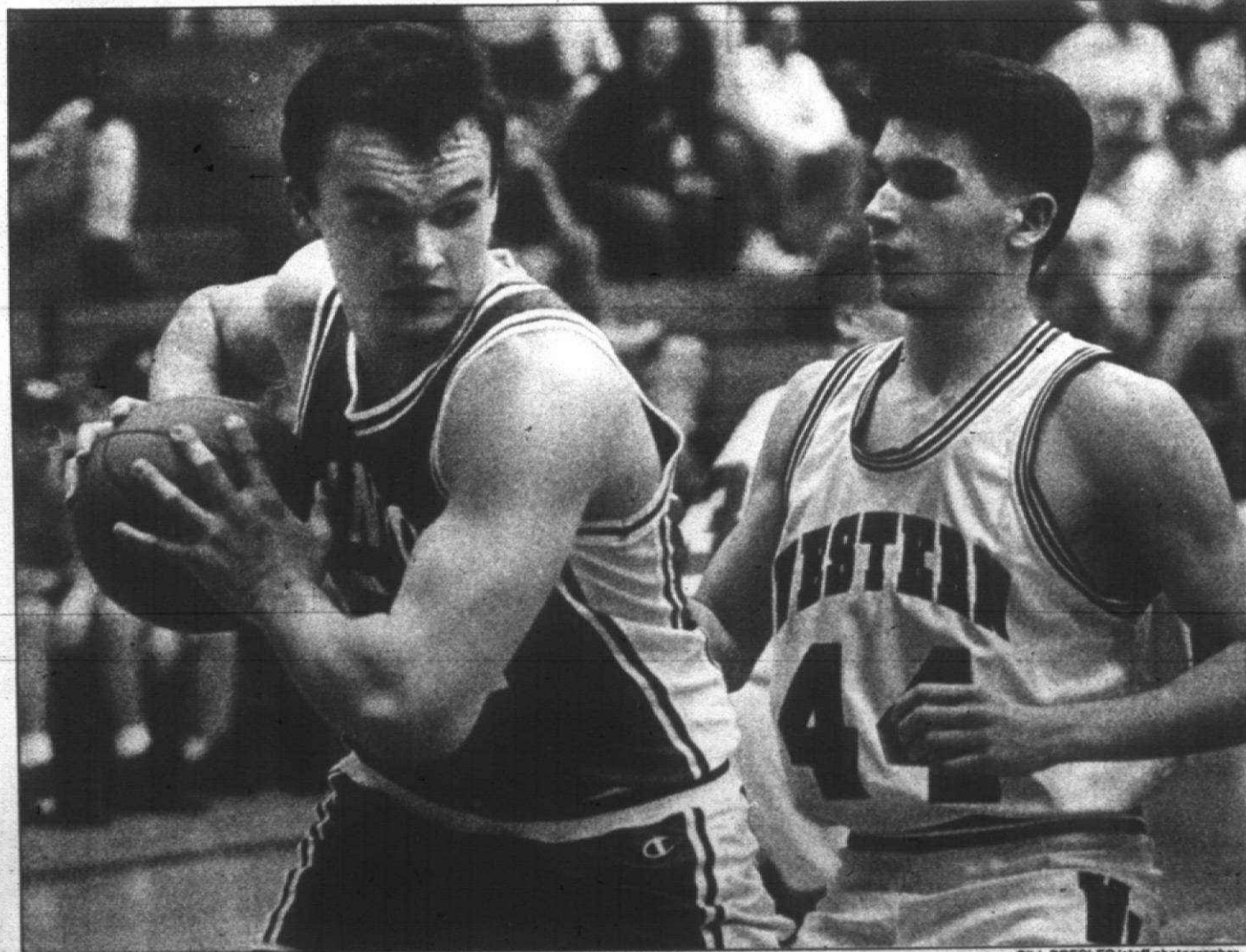

Central building cage reputation

Banners in the Plymouth Salem gym show the successful tradition of its boys basketball program, which has captured conference championships 12 of the past 17 years.

The new kid on the block, Walled Lake Central, invaded the Salem gym Friday hoping to begin its own tradition, and the Vikings dominated the Rocks for a 76-63 victory.

Central improved to 8-2 overall and 4-1 in the Western Lakes Activities Association. The Vikings remain atop the Lakes Division and tied with Farmington Harrison for second place, one game behind league-leading Plymouth Canton. Salem fell to 7-4 overall and 3-2 in the WLAA.

The Rocks outrebounded Central 36-24, scored three more points at the free-throw line and converted three more two-point field goals than the Vikings. But thanks to 10 three-pointers, Central easily escaped with the victory.

The Vikings were coming off a 69-60 loss to Canton, but Friday's win gave Central impressive victories at Salem and Livonia Stevenson this season.

"It's tough to win in here," Central coach Steve Emert said. "It's only the third time we've beaten Salem since I've been here (13 years). Coach (Bob) Brodie does a great job and I have a lot of respect for him."

"OUR ATTITUDE is that we can beat anybody," guard Steve Rabaut said. "We definitely think we're the team to beat. We know we can win in anybody's house."

The Vikings last won the WLAA regular-season title four years ago after beginning 16-0. If they win the conference this season, they'll accomplish it with 12 juniors and only two seniors. Adding to the lack of experience is the fact they only have one bonafide big man (Chris McFarlane).

"We're not a big team but a team of mostly all guards," Emert said. "I think we are a contender but to be successful we have to continue applying pressure and scoring a lot of points. The size of Canton wore us down Tuesday."

The Vikings connected on 10 of 24 (41 percent) triple attempts and 26 of 53 (49 percent) field goal attempts. The Rocks were held to 35 percent (21-59) from the field and only 27 percent (3-11) from three-point range.

The first quarter lead see-sawed. Central took its first lead at 3-2 on a Rabaut triple. Rabaut scored 14 points, including four three-pointers.

Salem stayed close with a strong game from sophomore James Head. The 6-foot-6 forward had four points and four rebounds in the first quarter en route to his game-high, 26-point, 13-rebound performance.

THE VIKINGS took a 17-16 lead into the second quarter and extended their lead to 25-20 after back-to-

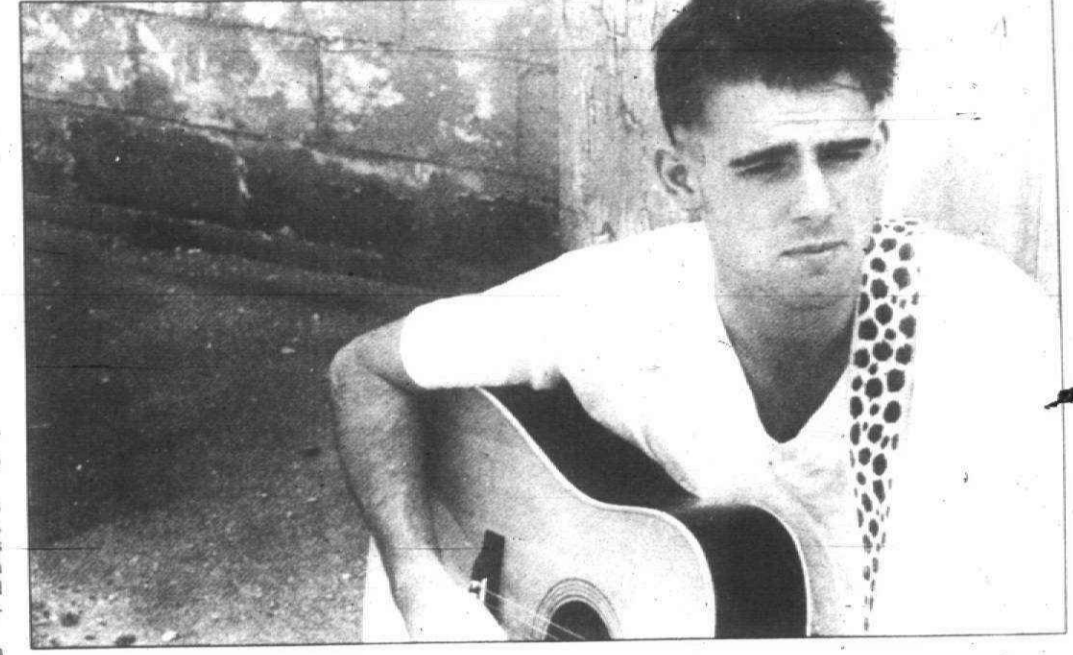

Since his debut release, "Songs About Stuff," Pleasant has found a niche opening up for fellow East Lansing power pop outfit the Hannibals.

"I think I'm getting more into deeper themes and I like to keep the humor aspect going," Pleasant said. "I'm apt to write a song with humor not as a central theme but to fill in the cracks to make sure people are paying attention."

THE ACOUSTIC MOTORBIKE — Luka Bloom

On "Riverside," Luka Bloom's major label debut in 1990, the Irish singer/songwriter spoke of the transformation of a stranger in a strange land. Shaded with the right inflection of brogue and the temperament of an impatient romanticist, Bloom scored well with Irish-American audiences and beyond with his acoustic folk renderings.

"The Acoustic Motorbike" (Reprise) shimmers with like brilliance, but the setting has changed. This time out Bloom (whose real name is Barry Moore) purports an Irishman-who-moved-to-America-and-moved-back-home-again theme.

Aside from musical accolades, Bloom at least deserves the Atlas VanLines Award for trans-Atlantic moves in a career.

Though there has always been an immediacy to his music — mainly wrought through a fervid style of electric-acoustic guitar playing — the energy of American big city has obviously worn off on him. His most apparent souvenir of four years in New York is Bloom's Irishified cover of LL Cool J's "I Need Love."

Emerald Isle lull. Yet Bloom manages to pull it off with no injuries to either his or LL Cool J's good name (though let's hope he hasn't taken a shine to any Too Live Crew recordings lately).

Base your decision what is true at that time

Dear Barbara,
My husband just finished three weeks of intensive day treatment for marijuana addiction at a local hospital. He has used the drug for more than 20 years (off and on with periods of abstinence), and it has been a problem which has slowly eroded the foundation of our marriage (honesty and trust) for the last 10 years.

Finally, at the end of June, I caught him using again (he supposedly had been clean for 18 months) and gave him an ultimatum — treatment or divorce.

Treatment was the lesser of two evils, apparently. The issue was brought out by his counselor in the program that Bill's treatment was mostly a "head trip" (intellectual) rather than a "heart trip." His counselor talked about the emotional repression Bill has, which is probably a lifelong thing. (Bill is 42.)

His attitude about all of this is fairly cooperative although I sense a lot of resentment and a belief on his part that this is something to just be "gotten through." "I'm willing to go along with whatever they said," is what he said.

I think a lot of his resentment stems from the fact that the main thing he wanted to do is to STOP SMOKING POT, and this, in his opinion, has been done. Now, he says, EVERYONE wants him to make big changes in who he is as a person, i.e., become less artificial and agreeing with everyone, more genuine, more feeling and emotionally available, etc.

I might mention we are both ACOAs (Adult Children of Alcoholics) and his role was (is) definitely Lost Child. He had no interest in addressing his ACOA issues — feels quite comfortable that the "past is past."

It is possible for a person to really recover and essentially be the same person? I've talked to other recovering people who laugh and say things like "Oh, you wouldn't have liked me before..." I wouldn't have liked me before... I'm a totally different person now, more outgoing and honest, able to connect with people," etc.

This was said by an alcoholic with five years' recovery who really hit rock bottom before he got help. My husband never reached "rock bottom." He has been in a class all his own as an addict; even his counselor agrees. Perfect attendance at work,

all house jobs taken care of, fairly good father, fairly good husband, etc.

Do big changes go hand-in-hand with a successful recovery? Can he be recovering but not changing? Somehow, I think not. It just seems like change would have to accompany growth.

Your sense of caring, wanting to help, along with your willingness to say you're not always perfect either has really given me the sense of a "real person" behind the column, and I hope you can share a little of yourself with me.

I read your letter and felt how deeply troubled your situation would be for any wife. In your letter you present a treatment program for yourself and your husband for the next six months. My immediate response to you would be to take this time to see what happens. Then, base any further decisions on what is true at that time. Many individuals who have attended AA meetings have started with attitudes like your husband. Some of them have changed dramatically, like the man you refer to in your letter. Some, as you fear with your husband, have failed. Make this a trial of labor, and put 110 percent effort into it. If you do that, perhaps you will change in six months and then you will see things clearly and know what to do. As you are now, you are naturally indecisive. If you change, you may be decisive. I hope this helps to some degree. Keep in touch. I know that we will all learn from your experience.

Aromatic paella worth the work

I'll never forget the first time I sampled paella, pronounced (pie-eh-yah).

It was a cold, rainy, thunderous night and of course I had to park six blocks away from the restaurant I was reviewing. The name of the place is not important; it closed long ago, another victim to Ann Arbor's ever-changing culinary whims.

MY SOURCES warned me about the size of the portion. Cooked in an authentic Spanish paellero, there would have been more than enough to share with my friend and possibly one other hungry person.

For the uninitiated, a paellero is a cooking vessel similar to a slope-edged frypan, about 24 inches in diameter with two small grabbing handles rather than one long one, and a tight fitting lid.

WHEN OUR waitperson presented the pan with lid intact, it proved to be a sensory overload when the lid was lifted, giving forth a burst of steam while wafts of saffron, spicy sausage, garlic and shrimps filled the air.

If memory serves me correctly, I knew I would be a fan of paella forever just for the enchanting aroma. It tasted even better than it smelled.

It was only fitting that the Wednesday after the blizzard of '92 fell upon us, I was rummaging through the fruit cellar looking for my whetstone when I found my paella pan, hidden in the back under placemats, breadpans and numerous springforms. I knew then and there I would venture to the market in search of ingredients for the perfect winter feast of the senses — a pot of paella.

ONE DOES not venture to the corner grocery for paella "fixins". My usual 20 minute drive to Alcamos on Schaefer in Dearborn for chorizo proved to be a little over two hours with the snowfall.

A stop at Anna's Seafood Market just west of Telegraph on Joy Road landed me prawns that had the checkbook gasping for air.

The cupboard was well stocked with an assortment of rice, the freezer replete with chicken parts. Even the spice drawer had an ample supply of spun gold saffron. By the time dinner rolled around, I was in full swing, anticipating a meal that was sure to titillate anyone's tastebuds, and it did.

Does one really need to have a paellero to make an authentic paella? No. Any large covered casserole will suffice, even those Corning things with lids you received for a wedding present 20 years ago.

WHEREAS AN authentic Spanish chorizo bursting with hints of pepper and garlic would prove outstanding, chunks of a good solid pepperoni would work, and probably offer a more international appeal.

Chicken parts are nothing but chicken parts and most grocery store varieties will do. What you cannot compromise, however, are the three main staples that add texture and aroma like no other.

First, do not skimp on the rice. Forget the instant, boil-in-bags and converted rice here, opt for the real stuff. Settle for nothing less than fresh garlic, if just for this once.

LASTLY, IF you have never purchased saffron before, be prepared for a surprise, one that you will not soon forget. Is the price worth it? You do not make paella without real saffron. Period.

There are two versions of paella that I have tried, both garnering rave reviews. The authentic, made with chicken, shrimps and chorizo, and another like the one at the Ann Arbor restaurant with seafood. You decide, you'll love them both. Trust me.

PRESSURE COOKERS

Taking the lid off old fears of explosion

MENTION "PRESSURE cooker" to a dozen people, and 11 of them will respond — "My mother had one: they explode."

Toula Patsalis is doing her best to dispel the old fears about pressure cookers. "High tech has entered the kitchen," said Patsalis, cooking school director of the Kitchen Glamor stores based in Redford. "The same technology that brought us compact disk players and microwave ovens has been applied to the pressure cooker which ranges in price from \$100 to \$200. Please put it in caps: THERE IS NO WAY A NEW PRESSURE COOKER CAN EXPLODE — EVER, EVER, EVER!"

ABOUT FOUR years ago, Kitchen Glamor was approached by eight manufacturers of pressure cookers,

proposing that their products be used in the cooking classes conducted in the four Kitchen Glamor stores in Rochester, West Bloomfield, Redford and Novi.

"We try to be open to anything new, so we agreed to test them and consider classes in pressure cooking. Well, they're a great toy: I played with them at home for a whole summer, and while I loved the cookers themselves, I also saw how ineffective were the manuals that accom-

panied them. They were either so simplified that the user was limited, or so technical that the user was put off entirely."

Patsalis began collecting recipes, sometimes modifying them to taste, and developing recipes of her own. The results, 235 recipes ranging from soups to chutneys to cheesecake, were compiled into a cookbook, "Joys of Pressure Cooking."

"I WAS really a convert to pres-

sure cooking," said Patsalis. "It's the ideal cooking method for today's lifestyle. We're all concerned with nutrients. Pressure cooking offers one of the best ways to cook vegetables: the colors remain vibrant, the nutrients are retained, and most vegetables cook within a few minutes."

"And we all work. It's hard to get a meal on the table, synchronized with everything else we do. A pressure cooker can reduce the cooking time by as much as 70 percent."

Patsalis has offered the pressure cooking class in each store twice a year for three years. Average class size is 70 people, ranging in age from 25 to 70. Some of the older women are still using their 50-year-old Prestos.

"The new generation of pressure cookers are stainless steel with an aluminum core," said Patsalis. "Aluminum conducts heat, but if there is acid in a recipe, cooking in aluminum alone will impart a metallic taste to the finished dish."

"If I have a class of 80 people, and ask how many are afraid of pressure cookers, 40 people will put up their hands. If I ask how many of them have never cooked with a pressure cooker, the same 40 will show their hands," said Patsalis.

An enthusiastic alumna of Patsalis' class is Shirley Nachman of Southfield.

Tips for cooking under pressure

For perfect pressure cooking, follow these tips from the woman who wrote the book on pressure cooking - Toula Patsalis.

- Make sure the manual has been read and is understood.
- Examine ring and seal on unit as directed in manual.
- Read selected recipe thoroughly.
- Organize ingredients before starting to cook. Prepare them by washing them and cutting into specific size.
- Use proper measuring utensils.
- Check liquid measurements at eye level. Loosely pack dry ingredients and level off straight across top.
- Invest in an accurate timer.
- Use heat diffuser on the range burner when cooking pasta, beans or rice.

JEFFREY BALDWIN, 32,

corporate chef for Normans Restaurants which operates Norm's Diner in Farmington Hills, Salvatore Scallopi in West Bloomfield and Southfield, Norm's Oyster Bar & Grill in Southfield, Norman's Eton Street Station in Birmingham and Nifty Normans in Walled Lake, has been cooking since he was 14. Baldwin is also a partner in Norman's Diner and lives in Farmington.

He designs menus, decides what the restaurants will feature, trains staff, and looks after the day-to-day operations of Normans' restaurants.

In his junior year at Walled Lake Central High School, he enrolled in the culinary arts program at Southwest Oakland Vocational Education Center in Wixom.

After completing the two year program, he studied at the Culinary Institute of America in Hyde Park, New York. At the time, he was the youngest student ever to be accepted into the program.

As part of his training, he worked in a restaurant in Charlevoix, and later moved to Lake Tahoe.

He opened two popular Detroit restaurants, Van Dyke Place in 1981, and the Whitney, in 1982.

Who does the cooking at your house? "My wife Rosemarie and I both cook. We use our gas grill year round," said Baldwin, who has a 2-year-old son, also named Jeffrey.

Dinner at their house might include grilled salmon, pasta with a light cream sauce, and bibb lettuce salad with mandarin oranges and blue cheese. "Everything I

cook at home is fast," said Baldwin.

Favorite food: "The reason I'm in this business is I like everything. Seafood, especially crab legs are real high on my list. I don't put anything on the menu if I don't like it."

Worst experience as a chef. "I was working in a four-star restaurant in Nevada and one of the cooks pinched me with a lobster."

"I put an egg in his top pocket and smashed it. He threw something at me and missed. The whole staff got involved. Then the executive chef walked in. The next day we almost all got fired. We didn't because there would have been no one to work in the restaurant. It taught me to be strictly professional at work."

Best experience as a chef. "I cooked for Ronald Reagan's second inauguration. The theme was Taste of the Nation. I prepared Michigan game sausages, venison, buffalo, pheasant and Traverse City cherry sausage."

Favorite herb or spice. "Basil, it has a fresh taste. I buy fresh basil and use it at home and in the restaurants. In the summer I grow it in my garden. It adds flavor."

Favorite piece of cookware at home and at work. Baldwin likes good wire whisks for whipping up sauces.

Name five things in your refrigerator at home: "Dijon mustard, chopped garlic, freshly grated Romano cheese, fruit — apples, grapefruit, oranges, basil chopped up and stored in a small jar with oil."

Last cookbook read: "The New Basics Cookbook" by Julee Rosso and Sheila Lukins, \$19.95, Workman Publishing, New York.

If you could cook dinner for anyone, who would it be and what would you serve them? "I would do a party for the Pros Master's Tournament at the Augusta, Ga. National Golf Course. I would create a Southern menu starting with a really good gumbo, crayfish appetizer, good chicken liver pate, crusted French bread, shrimp jambalaya and mud pie for dessert," said Baldwin who likes to play golf and ski in his spare time.

Kitchen tip: "Have fun with cooking. Don't be afraid of it. Trust your taste buds. Put your ingredients out before you begin cooking. When you're disorganized that's when you'll burn things."

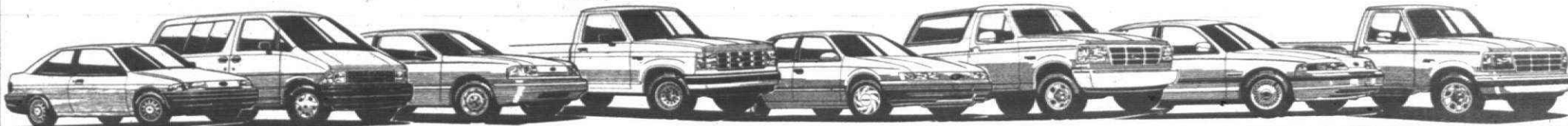

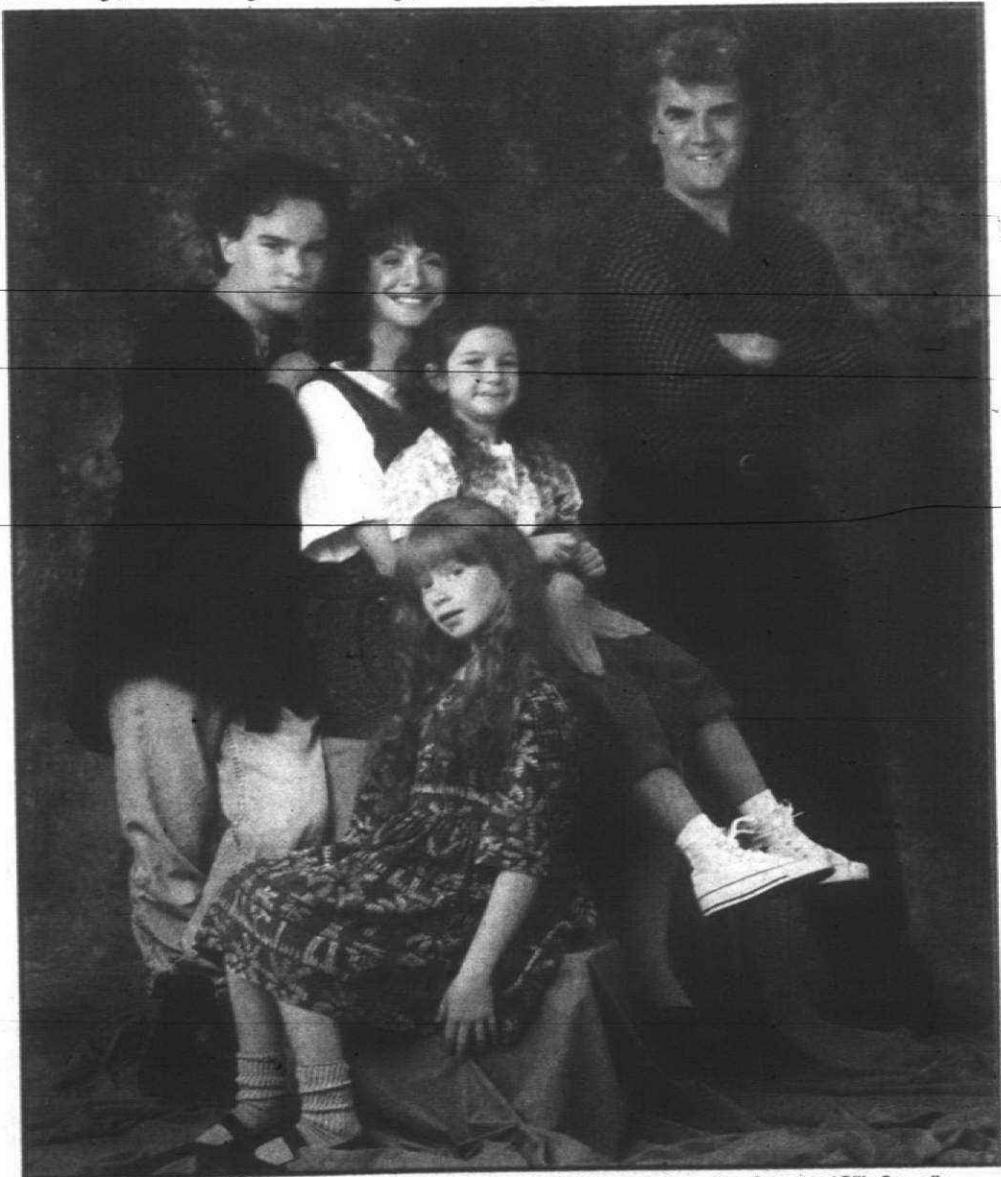

'Billy' gets a green light from ABC

Connolly starts fresh in new series

When "Head of the Class" needed a substitute for Howard Hesseman in its final season, producers Michael Elias and Rich Eustis hired Scotsman Billy Connolly to mentor the misfits of academe.

At the time, Connolly was gaining a national reputation as a funny but foul-mouthed stand-up comedian, but fortunately for Elias and Eustis, he was much more — an experienced musician, writer and comic actor with credits stretching from the Scottish Opera to the West End. When "Class" ended its run last spring, the producers dismissed their younger stars and hung on to Connolly.

And so "Billy" landed on cat feet in the ABC Friday-night schedule two weeks ago, marking the start of a particularly strong-looking spring season for the network. With some fanfare but very little hype, the series slipped unpretentiously into the schedule.

It is the kind of series that belies

the desperate notion that there is a "formula" for success in situation comedy. The premise, about a marriage of convenience between a struggling single mom and a college professor in need of a green card, is contrived, unoriginal and even illegal. None of that mattered to its test audiences, nor does it matter on the home screen.

Everything about "Billy" looks "broken in" and comfortable. The cast looks at home on the set, the set isn't a distraction and the story lines jump right into the middle of the family's life, without self-conscious exposition. Add to this Connolly's occasional ad libs, and "Billy" has an unforced spontaneity that's truly lifelike.

"The qualities that are written for me in the show just suit me lovely," says Connolly in his native burr. Though his character, Billy MacGregor, is technically married to divorcee Mary Springer (daytime drama veteran Marie Marshall), she considers him a boarder. Her children, a teenage boy (Johnny Galecki) and two younger girls (Clara Bryant and Natanya Ross), accept him as a sort of black-sheep uncle. Connolly especially likes the give-and-take between his character

and Galecki's 14-year-old David.

"I like the way MacGregor handles the situations, especially with David. Little kids are easier to get along with, but you can't pull the wool over his eyes at all. So that's a bit I really enjoy."

The head of an off-screen household that includes five children between 2 and 20, Connolly downplays his experience at parenting.

"I'm not one of those guys you see in commercials fawning fatherly on their children. But I'm a pretty good monster from time to time; you know, growling behind you up the stairs and all that."

"I have a kind of Victorian side, (too), and I say, 'Where are you going? Where have you been?'"

As for the expletives, he's managed to delete them from his television persona because, he says, he accepts the "parameters" of the medium.

"In the last episode we did, there was a big ad lib where I'm speaking to people who want to be citizens of America. And when I came off, Rich Eustis said, 'That was 16 minutes and three seconds and you didn't swear once!'"

Peterson back as U.S. hockey coach

When the subject is modern history, the question is, "Where were you when Kennedy was shot in 1963?"

When the subject is space exploration, the question is, "Where were you when Neil Armstrong stepped foot on the moon in 1969?"

And, when the subject is great Olympic moments, the question is, "Where were you when the United States hockey team won the gold medal in 1980?"

America's storybook victories over Yugoslavia and the Soviet Union against overwhelming odds in 1980 raised the country's spirits during the hostage crisis in Iran. But they also

raised expectations for the future that have dogged American Olympic teams that followed. A second consecutive seventh-place finish in 1988 had the media looking for a scapegoat, and they finally settled on coach Dave Peterson.

Criticism of the three-time coach of the U.S. hockey team became so harsh during the 1988 Games that even Peterson was surprised when he was selected to coach this year's team in Albertville, France. His experience with the media four years ago has caused him to be cautious when talking to reporters, but he insists that it didn't leave him bitter.

"A lot of people have the idea that 1988 was a bad experience, but it really wasn't," Peterson said. "They're surprised to learn that it was one of the greatest experiences of my life."

"Quite often when I work, I am the special effect," says 3-foot, 7-inch actor Michael Anderson, who won fame as the Red Dwarf in *Twin Peaks* dream sequences.

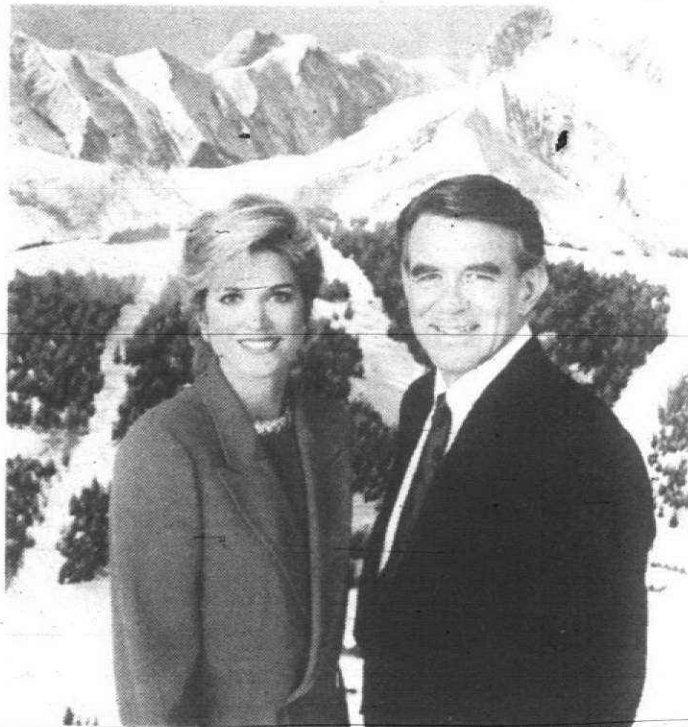
Anderson, who was born and raised in Denver, says he did not pay special attention to his size until he was an adult. "I grew up in a wheelchair. I had a genetic bone disorder (that caused) over 300 broken bones before I was 25. So I didn't really realize the fact that I was a little person. It wasn't the biggest obstacle at hand."

After a decade on the road earning his living as a street musician, Anderson entered technical school, eventually working on NASA computer systems. *Little Mike*, a film documentary about his work on the space shuttle, won international awards.

The two talents Anderson demonstrated in *Twin Peaks* — speaking backward and dancing — were picked up along the way as well, the former in high school, the latter in New York discos. Anderson will reprise the role in David Lynch's film *Fire Walk With Me*, which is due out this spring.

Also this spring, Anderson will appear on PBS' *American Playhouse* in *Fool's Fire*, an adaptation of an Edgar Allan Poe short story.

Winter Olympics: CBS has it covered

Roughly 1,500 of the world's best amateur athletes will gather in Albertville, France, for the 1992 Winter Olympic Games, which begin on Saturday, Feb. 8. Following them will be hundreds more reporters, many with radio and television production crews in tow.

CBS, which has not covered a Winter Olympics since Squaw Valley in 1960, has dispatched an army of news and sports personnel to cover these Games, offering 116 hours of coverage over 17 days. The network has sold an additional 50 hours of weekday coverage to TNT, marking the first time an Olympics has been carried on cable TV.

Anchoring CBS' prime-time coverage of the Games are Paula Zahn and Tim McCarver. Highlights of the evening coverage will include a pre-Olympics special on Thursday, Feb. 6, the opening ceremonies on Saturday, Feb. 8, a variety of skiing and skating events, including pairs figure skating

on Tuesday, Feb. 11, and ice dancing finals on Monday, Feb. 17.

Coverage begins each weekday during the *CBS Morning News*, with Harry Smith and Greg Gumbel at the International Broadcast Center in Moutiers, France. Live events during these hours will include ice hockey, alpine skiing, speed skating and biathlon. In addition, half-hour wrap-up shows will air each weekday at noon (Eastern time) and once again after the late news. Correspondent Pat O'Brien anchors the late-night show, while announcer James Brown holds forth at midday.

Reporting and feature stories will be done by CBS stalwarts Mike Wallace and Morley Safer, Charles Kuralt and Charles Osgood, Andy Rooney, John Madden and former Olympic gold medalist Scott Hamilton. Their stories range from the sublime (French cuisine) to the insidious (the doping of athletes) and include dozens of athlete profiles, plus stories of tragedy and triumph in Games past.

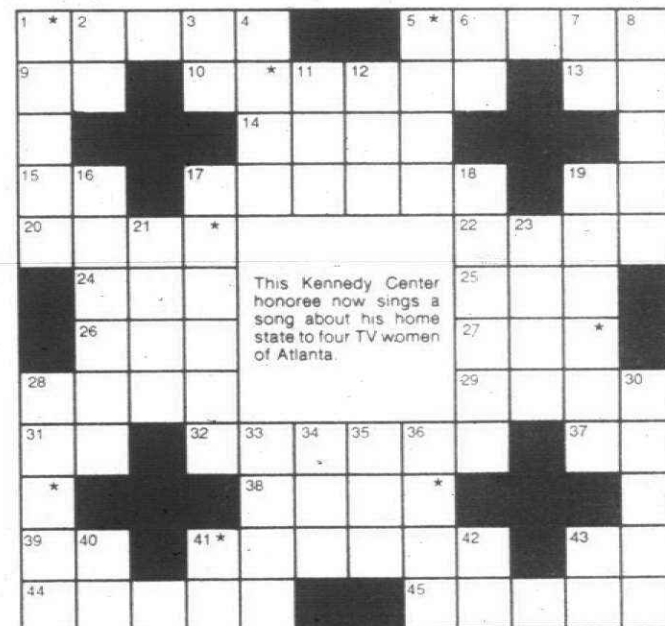
