Spring cleaning

It's spring cleaning time in Canton. Trash and debris may be taken to Canton Waste Recycling, 42020 Van Born Road, just east of Lilley Road, on Fridays between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. and Saturdays between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Proof of residency will be required.

Residents will be allowed to drop off three yards of trash per week free. That's equivalent to a pick-up truck filled level. Items accepted are: furniture, carpeting, bags of trash, swing sets, tire rims, bicycles, wood (maximum 6 ft. long) and brush (maximum 4 ft. long). Stumps are accepted if they can be lifted by one person. Car tires will be accepted at a charge of \$6 per tire. Items not accepted include barrels, gas tanks, oil tanks, oil drums and hazardous materials. For more information, contact Canton Waste Recycling at 397-5801.

Millage decision

Whether voters in the Plymouth-Canton school district will be asked to approve new millage in the June 8 election will be decided at tonight's budget workshop. The session is set for 7:30 p.m. in the board office at 454 S. Harvey in Plymouth.

The board of education has been considering a short-term, one- or two-mill levy to help make ends meet in 1992-93, when the district expects to face a deficit of up to \$5.1 million.

The revenue shortfall is anticipated in light of legislative actions including the property tax freeze, a cap on social security payments to districts, and tax-base sharing.

In order to place a millage proposal on the ballot June 8, the district must take action by May 11.

Hoben wants extra year at schools' helm

The contract of School Superintendent John Hoben, 68, expires next year, but he wants to stay on the job for an extra year.

While it's frustrating to watch the Legislature bludgeon the district's budget, Hoben, 68, says he isn't tempted to throw in the towel.

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools project a deficit of up to \$5.1 million next year. The total budget will be in the neighborhood of \$75 million.

"I see it as a challenge, to make some reason out of it and to salvage the best we can with the elements we have," he said.

There are so many unknowns that trying to budget for next year "is like grabbing a bowl of jello," he said.

"I'm also very much imbued with the technology process we're going through (to bring high technology into Plymouth-Canton classrooms), Hoben said.

"I'd like to bring home \$6 million from the feds. So I am not discouraged at this point. I just know we have a lot of work to do, and we are having at it."

Hoben has lobbied for a U.S. Department of Education grant that would help equip K-12 classrooms with interactive TV, laser and video discs, satellite capability and other forms of information access.

Hoben, who earns \$109,128 annually and receives a car allotment of \$7,200, announced at last week's school board meeting he would take a pay freeze in 1992-93 in light of the district's financial woes.

Meanwhile, the school board is evaluating Hoben's performance.

AN INFORMAL SURVEY of school employees, parents, local government officials and residents showed there's a variety of opinion on whether Hoben should stick around.

'Labor of love'

Trout released in Rouge tributary

Brown trout are facing upstream in the Rouge River system for the first time in recent history.

The more than 4,500 trout were planted in Johnson Drain, a Rouge tributary, on Wednesday by the state Department of Natural Resources in cooperation with the Western Wayne County Conservation Association.

"It was a labor of love," said Liz Hay-Chmielewski, a DNR fish biologist, who studied the stream for three years before determining that it was clean, cool and unpolluted enough for trout.

"I wanted to try brook trout, but the water just wasn't cold enough," she said.

The planting of trout in the Rouge River system is an environmental victory for Wayne County because trout unlike other species of fish need cool, fast running, unpolluted water that has a high oxygen content, according to Bob Laich of the Wayne County Conservation Association.

About a dozen local officials and about 50 spectators were on hand for the historic planting, but even with the election year handshaking, the trout still took center stage.

And even politicians lent a hand

when DNR workers needed a line of people to pass buckets of fish from a tank truck to the stream.

BUT WHILE THE DNR and members of the conservation club are eager for the trout planting to be successful, the verdict won't come for another year. That's when Hay-Chmielewski and other DNR officials will check the fish population to see if the trout survived.

The fish were released at five sites in western Plymouth Township, including at a bridge over Napier Road.

"Trout are very territorial," said Laich. "We'll have to come back next year, trap them and move them to other portions of the stream."

He said the fish will stay in one spot unless moved.

The trout planting was a result of the annual Rouge Rescue during which people spend the day cleaning the river that drains portions of Wayne and Oakland counties.

The idea to plant trout was hatched at such a cleanup seven years when Laich and others from the conservation club were working on a portion of the Johnson Drain that runs through the club's property in Plymouth Township.

"We really didn't find that much junk in the stream during the first

clean up. It was mostly natural stuff," said Charles VanVleck, a Plymouth Township fire official and conservation club member.

But while there wasn't too much junk, there was trout water. And when Laich realized it, the Westland man started to dream about the day when trout could be planted in the water.

LAICH AND other club members eventually approached Hay-Chmielewski about the planting. At first she was skeptical, but after doing some historical and stream research, discovered that not only were the stream conditions there for trout, but also that the water had once held brook trout.

At one point Johnson Drain once had a fish hatchery, established in 1874 by Nelson Clark.

She also discovered that the stream also produces the insects needed by brown trout for food. She said mayflies, caddis flies and stone flies all hatch in the stream.

For the first year, the five-inch fingerling trout will be allowed to feast on the insects without being chased by fishermen. But after that Hay-Chmielewski will determine what type of fishing season will be allowed. A catch and release system is favored, she said.

Here's what they had to say:

• Dennis Williams, president of the Plymouth-Canton School Council: "The key question is not Dr. Hoben's age, but what the district needs at this time, and what the best way is to use Dr. Hoben. It may be better for us to contract with him to be a specialist on statewide things, and let someone else take over the actual superintendency in terms of really building on the things that need to be done today."

• Plymouth Township Supervisor Gerald Law: "I found Dr. Hoben to be very knowledgeable about issues affecting education and the Plymouth-Canton school district. He kept pace with legislation and how it would impact them. As far as evaluating him, I can't speak to that. The only thing I'd say is that it's very important to have a good superintendent, so it is probably good for any school district, let alone Plymouth-Canton, to have a good phase-in period to replace a superintendent. A smooth transition would probably take a major district a good year to interview candidates and get them prepared to step in."

• Dorian Soper, of Plymouth Township who helped found the Plymouth-Canton Parent Academy to help parents grapple with educational and developmental issues affecting their children, said: "With the district facing the unpleasant prospect of laying off 156 teachers, not renewing Hoben's contract would be reactive, she said."

• A veteran teacher who asked not to be named said: "It's not like he has a big crushing thing to go do. I bet he will stay on. You know what I think is sad is that Dr. Hoben has always managed to get a board that thinks they work for him. He has never had a board that sees him as an employee, and that to me is a sad thing. Supposedly, these people out there have been elected by the citizens of this community and have a sensitivity to what should be going on. Barbara Graham does, but I don't think the rest have such a sensitivity."

• A para-professional who requested anonymity said: "There is a change needed, because the district won't change until he is gone. We need someone who is more of a people person."

"To me, a superintendent has to be PR person, as well as keep a reign on everything going on. I know the board wants labor peace, but I don't know that we are going to have it. I don't know how much Dr. Hoben is involved with any of this."

At 78, Hollywood legend Dorothy Lamour thrills luncheon guests

One woman attending a Canton Economic Club luncheon for former movie star Dorothy Lamour wondered aloud why Lamour continues to work at the age of 78.

She had her answer when Lamour walked into the room and received a standing ovation from the group of perhaps 150 in attendance at the Mayflower Meeting House in Plymouth.

Once Lamour was seated, three or four photographers crowded around to snap pictures of her. And just before she left for the Tonquish Creek Seniors Center, fans lined up for autographs. Someone even made off with the remains of three cigarettes Lamour smoked (Vantage ultra light 100s).

Plymouth master gardener Ernie Archer was perhaps the most elated guest to be amidst the presence of Hollywood royalty. Thanks to Plymouth city commissioner Dennis Shrewsbury, Archer was permitted to sit beside Lamour during lunch. Shrewsbury bid \$300 for the privilege of being adjacent to Lamour, then made a gift of the seat to Archer, a longtime fan.



About her sarongs, Lamour said, "The first one is in the Smithsonian. Somebody told me it's next to The Spirit of St. Louis. The rest of them were auctioned off for charity."

Lamour. "All I can say is thank you from the bottom of my heart, and where's my proclamation?" Miller handed it to her.

LAMOUR ANSWERED questions for five minutes.

AFTER LAMOUR HAD gone, Archer admitted a debt to Shrewsbury. "I'm in bondage now for the rest of my life," he said.

Two women approached Archer to say, "I want to shake the hand of the man who sat next to Dorothy Lamour." The 77-year-old gardener pucker up and said, "She kissed me, too!"

Archer added that he told Lamour a story about a doctor he knows who named the three things he needs to be mentally motivated: "Cadillacs, champagne and Dorothy Lamour."

Mettetal could be grounded

The joint Plymouth-Canton townships effort to get federal and state grants to buy the Mettetal Airport — so local government could run it — is apparently close to failing.

"It appears that the federal government or FAA is not too willing to accept those 10 conditions," said Plymouth Township trustee Abe Muntakh.

He was referring to conditions Canton and Plymouth townships agreed to in accepting a federal grant. The one federal official was most wary about was one allowing Canton to sell the airport in 10 years, if the airport was losing money or if officials were tired of having it around.

Canton supervisor Tom Yack said that remained a sticking point with federal officials, whom he last talked to in January.

"MY LAST IMPRESSION from them, which was pretty plain, was they were not going to support the 10-year language. My impression is they're not interested," Yack said.

airport buying effort.

"I would like one last ditch attempt to possibly talk to the FAA and the state of Michigan," Muntakh said. "We've been waiting and waiting and hearing nothing, we don't need to sit down and wait forever."

SHOULD BOTH townships drop the airport-operation effort, thousands of dollars spent on legal fees related to the airport acquisition and other expenses would not be recouped through airport operation proceeds as trustees have sought.

"Much of the money was really to defend ourselves from the lawsuits," Muntakh maintained, from airport opponents and Canton, which originally opposed the public ownership of Mettetal Airport, at Joy and Lilley roads in Canton.

"You don't spend bad money after bad money, let's just take the hit and move on to other things," Muntakh said.

Airport owner Steve Klocko could not be reached for comment. Yack said that when he talked to Klocko earlier this year, "He was still committed to keeping an airport, but it's a big asset to carry."

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Foreign film winner has a belated Detroit premier

Lets call it nepotism. After all, had it not been for good old uncle Oscar this year's winner for best foreign language film probably wouldn't have made it to Detroit at all.

And it may not have been that tragic a loss. "Mediterraneo," an Italian anti-war comedy headed for an exclusive run at the Maple Theatre in Bloomfield, gives you the impression that Academy members choose international winners by sticking a pin in the map.

Although given to occasional clever moments, it doesn't have nearly enough charm to hold together an entire film. It wisely keeps the running time to under 80 minutes.

During World War II, a motley crew of Italian soldiers land on a small-Greek Island with the intention of occupying it. A sweep through the city finds no one living there — or so they think.

Soon the local women, children, and senior citizens start to venture from their hiding places. German invaders have recently taken their

men, yet the Greeks treat the new soldiers with open arms — "one face, one race," they say to one another.

Ultimately, their three-hour tour of duty develops into a worthy shore leave. The castaways hardy care whether or not the Axis powers are winning the war and abandon efforts to fix their radio to signal passing ships and planes.

"Mediterraneo" desperately wants to capture the magic of the great Scottish film "Local Hero." It beckons us to enter uptight and bask in the simple pleasures of faraway lands.

Unfortunately, director Gabriele Salvatores has such a light touch that you have the constant feeling that something really wonderful is being lost in the translation from Italian.

Some scenes do stick with you. The daily soccer game on the beach is interrupted by the arrival of an airplane, whose image shimmers on the sun-soaked beach and sneaks up

behind the unknowing sergeant so totally immersed in the game.

The luteerant, meanwhile, buses himself in the local church. The pastor admires his sketches and offers him the chance to paint an elaborate fresco.

THE AZURE blue Mediterranean looks stunning in some scenes but not in others. A glimpse of the two mountain brothers swimming naked with one of the maidens is too often followed by washed-out images taken in the unflattering light of afternoon sun.

No problem with the performances. The Italian actors — Vana Barba, Diego Abantouano, and Claudio Bigagli among them — have unusual physical qualities and character quirks that endear them to an audience after while.

A running gag finds one of the soldiers constantly trying to escape from the island. Another finds his true love in the form of a gray-haired donkey.

Still you expect something more out of the best foreign film winner. The best way to appreciate "Mediterraneo" is to simply enjoy it on its own merits as a tiny, unpretentious, and occasionally witty fable.

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Crime rises in county, state

Major crime increased in Wayne County in 1991, according to recently-released Michigan State Police statistics.

There were nearly 195,880 major crimes reported in the county last year, roughly a 2 percent increase from 1990.

The number of major crimes reported in neighboring Oakland County rose to 51,229, an increase of 3.7 percent.

Figures are based on state police "index offenses" including murder, non-negligent manslaughter, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson.

Figures for both counties are incomplete. Not all communities submitted crime information to the state police.

Statewide, major crime was up 3.4 percent last year — the biggest increase in a decade.

"I SUPPOSE the first thing we all look at is the economy and unemployment and the continuing drug problem, the same thing we've been talking about for years," said Tom Hendrickson, executive director of the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police.

Roughly two-thirds of Wayne County's offenses were reported in Detroit.

Here are the figures, by crime, for western Wayne communities:

- Canton — murder/non-negligent manslaughter, 0; rape, 33; robbery, 25; aggravated assault, 80; burglary, 388; larceny, 1,686; motor vehicle theft, 559; arson, 21; Total, 2,472.
- Garden City — murder/non-negligent manslaughter, 1; rape, 5; robbery, 15; aggravated assault, 59; burglary, 208; larceny, 1,029; motor vehicle theft, 98; arson, 12; Total, 1,427.

Law enforcement officials said the twin evils of drugs and lack of jobs continued to spawn illegal activity.

Total crime reported in the state was up 2 percent from 1990, to 1,292,310 crimes. That translated into one crime for every seven Michigan residents, the state police said.

It was the second straight year of increases, following two annual declines. Last year's 1.5 percent increase was the second-largest in the 10-year period that began in 1982.

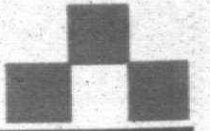
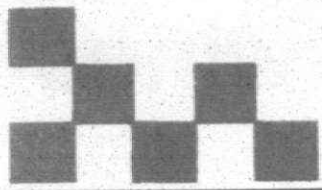

Kids learn by helping in kitchen

NOT LONG ago, The New York Times ran a feature describing the plight of men and women suffering from culinary dysfunctionism. Fast food, prepared food, working mothers (as opposed to loafing mothers?) and just plain inertia were blamed.

Relax. Here in the Midwest, mothers are still cooking, and children are still in the kitchen helping and learning.

Take Michelle Krebs Migaki and daughter, Lauren, 4. "As soon as Lauren could sit up, I put her in her high chair and gave her a bowl of flour to play with while I baked," said Migaki. "And when she could stand on a chair, she helped with the dishes."

"NOW, SHE'S so involved that when she doesn't feel like helping me, she'll say, 'It'll be good even if I don't help.' She can even crack an egg without getting shell in the bowl."

"Families that cook together have an appreciation for food. Lauren loves to try new foods, and is curious about their ingredients. Her father, Greg, is Asian-American and an excellent

cook, so she has learned to cut mushrooms for stir-fry, too."

Migaki, a free-lance writer, has co-authored a book of recipes with restaurateur Chuck Muer and is currently working on a cookbook that provides menus and recipes for gourmet clubs.

"I was the oldest of six children, and Christmas cookies were always a big thing at our house. I've always made tons of cookies for the holidays. Last year I didn't because our son, Tommy, was born Dec. 7, but all my friends made cookies for me, so I was twice-blessed."

Tommy is already sitting there watching Lauren and Greg or me cook together. He isn't quite old enough for a bowl of flour yet, but as soon as he can hold a cup, he'll be ready. And when he can stand on a chair, he'll help with the dishes.

LAUREN BRINGS home recipes from the Whitney Bloomfield Nursery and Daycare School, as well. One of her (and her father's) favorites is monkey bread, which the children bake for "Circus Week."

"Cooking helps develop math concepts

through measuring, and science concepts, such as the change in Jello from a liquid to a solid because of cold," said Whitney Bloomfield's principal, Faye Dow.

"The experience with textures and colors helps build knowledge about taste and smell, and for pre-reading groups it helps build vocabulary. Most parents love the idea of their children cooking. We send home recipes of anything the children cook in the hope of encouraging child-parent involvement."

When there are 11 children in a family, everybody does KP. That's the philosophy of Livonia resident Mary Ellen Erickson, who just happens to be the mother of 11 children.

"The four oldest are boys; Leif, 19; Kirk, 18; Dean, 16; and Aaron, 14," said Erickson. "The oldest girl, Leah, 12, would rather care for the younger children than help in the kitchen. The boys start helping in the kitchen when they're learning simple fractions, and they know what a half cup means. About that age, 12, or so, they're old enough to be trusted in the kitchen."

"They help stir things, cut meat, peel vegetables and mash potatoes. We make almost everything from scratch, except for a couple of cake mixes. The first recipe they make is for

brownies, and then they graduate to cakes. One of their favorites is for black-bottom cupcakes, a recipe they found in Bon Appetit."

SIX YEARS ago, Erickson broke her arm, and the boys had to do all the cooking for a while. "But I supervised. On the whole, they enjoyed cooking, but cleaning up is a part of cooking, too, and they're not as thorough at that as I'd like."

If there is a radical change in attitude, it's that cooking isn't as gender-specific as it once was. At Kitchen Glamor, for example, they're about to launch a whole new series of "men-only" cooking classes, conducted by Observer & Eccentric food columnist/Chef Larry Janes.

"We've had so many requests from men that we just had to offer these classes," said Kitchen Glamor education director Tula Petsalis. "Chef Larry will start out in September with basic procedures like measuring, braising and boiling, and subsequent classes will build on those skills. We expect these classes to be very popular."

Mom, daughter cooking healthy

Business is bustling at their newly opened cafe, Dawson and D'arcy (pronounced

Dar-say) at 225 E. Maple in downtown Birmingham, open 7 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Wednesday, 7 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. Thursday and Friday, 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Saturday, and 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sunday.

"Dawson was my grandmother's name, and D'arcy is my first daughter's middle name," said Masselink who used to work at Lafayette Clinic in Detroit as a psychologist.

"I listen to people all the time. I was in a health food store and heard people talking about how oat bran lowers cholesterol. I started playing with an oat bran muffin recipe and learned there was a market for it. I had no intention of doing this, I liked being a psychologist."

She took a year's leave of absence from her job and never went back. Four years ago she opened Muffins and More, Inc. on Eaton Street in

Birmingham. That success led to her opening the cafe with Denise.

They offer fresh-from-the-oven muffins, cookies, bread, homemade sandwiches like chicken and tuna salad, two or three daily specials, homemade soup, freshly squeezed orange, apple, carrot, and celery juice and 24-flavors of gourmet coffee.

They roast their own turkey and chickens for sandwiches, and use fresh, in season fruits and vegetables. White bean chili, vegetarian chili and mushroom barley soup are popular items. Customers can eat in at one of the white wrought iron tables or carryout.

"We offer a healthy alternative for lunch," said Keegan who painted the bright yellow interior. "We would like to do dinners and Sunday brunches some day."

How did you teach your children how to cook?

"I encouraged all three children to help in the kitchen. Denise was very creative. I put her in charge of salads, and said 'see what you can create.'"

Who does the cooking at your house?

Now that her children are grown, Masselink eats out a lot. "I've always loved to cook," said Keegan who has two children, Melanie, 2½ and Haley, 1. "My husband and I cook. He's starting to be more creative."

What's a normal dinner at your house?

Keegan and her family are vegetarians. Dinner at their house might consist of a quick stir-fry of fresh vegetables, served over brown rice or pasta, with fresh fruit.

Favorite herb or spice.

Keegan likes garlic, her mother likes thyme and rosemary.

What is the secret to your harmonious relationship?

"Denise and I are very much alike," said Masselink. "We have a good understanding, and are very open to what the other is doing, and to criticism. A good hug helps, too." Denise agrees that communication and affection are the two reasons

she and her mother work so well together.

Healthy tip.

"Reduce fat intake," said Masselink. "Meat can't continue to be the main focus of the meal," said Keegan. "Use more grains like brown rice, whole wheat pasta, more vegetables."

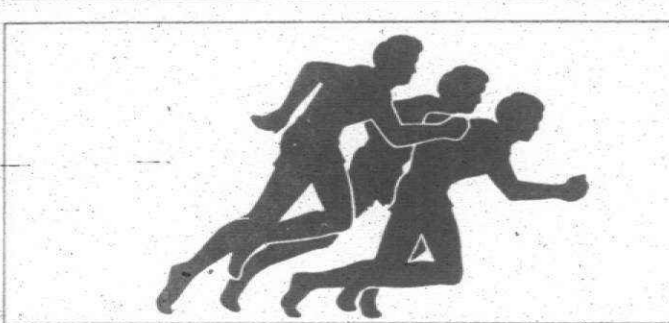

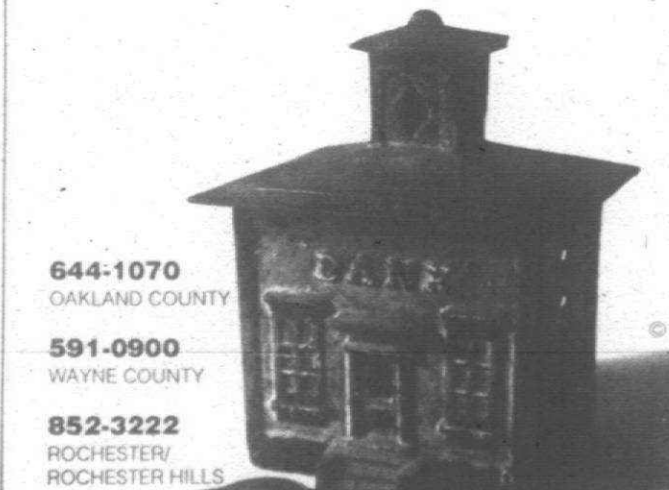

ART, AMUSEMENTS LIVE ON IN THE ETERNAL CITY

As Europe's capitals go, Romans acknowledge with a mix of pride and regret that theirs best exemplifies the old adage that time is money. In other words, in this city it is virtually impossible to spend time without spending money in substantial dollops.

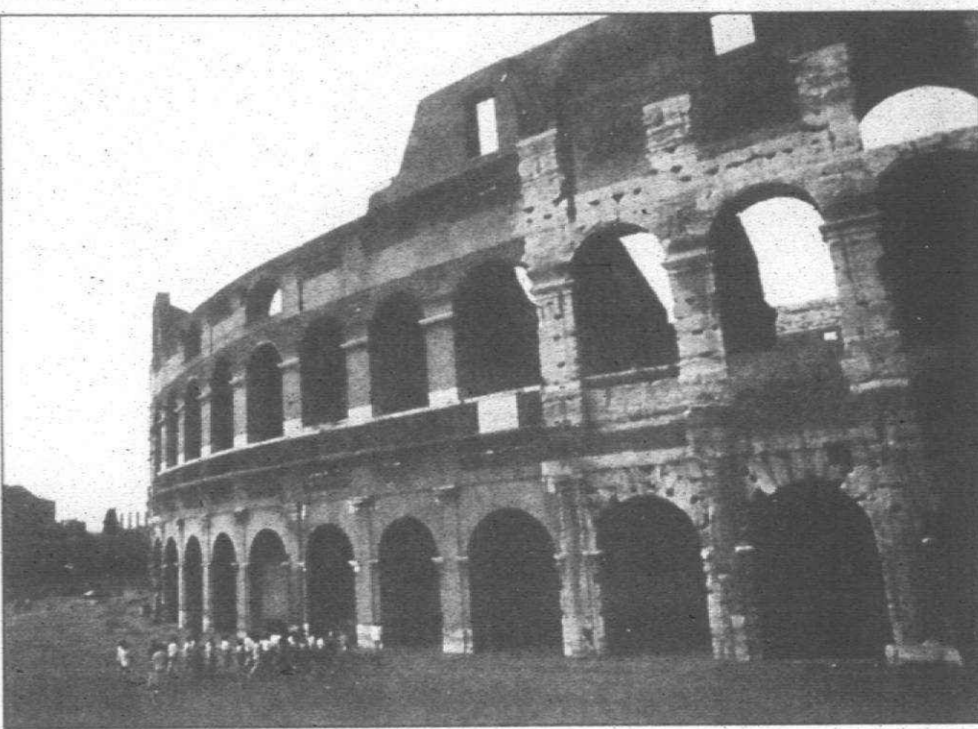
For all the buzzing, high-decibel motorini, the purse-snatchers, the suicidal lemming-rush of the traffic and the pall of carbon monoxide over the Pantheon, this is still a city of art and amusement, of romance that extends from the young couples locked in a koolhaik embrace to the sudden glimpse under some archway on some cobbled byway of a cascade of geraniums catching the sunlight by a fountain and a statue.

Starting at 5 p.m., especially on Saturday, Romans take their strolls and do their shopping and coveting along the main central arteries and their tributaries, from the Piazza del Popolo along the Via del Corso to the Piazza Venezia.

Follow the flow to the Piazza Novona with its fountains and curbside artists — \$40 for a caricature sketch, the Pantheon, where any number of ice-cream parlors in adjacent side streets offer exotic flavors for just under \$2 a cone, and, for a morning outing, stroll through the open-air market of the Campo dei Fiori, where shoppers buy their fruit, vegetables and other produce from 7 a.m. to 10 a.m.

Whatever else has changed — and despite the traffic — central Rome is still a compact stroller's city, and it is still possible to experience that particular thrill of getting a glimpse of Italy beyond the monuments for nothing more than the price of a cup of coffee.

EVENTS The major art exhibitions will be displaying the works of Caravaggio, Raphael and the Italian futurist Enrico Prampolini in May. And, though its reputation is

nowhere near as exalted as La Scala's in Milan, the Rome Opera will be presenting a program of opera and ballet from May to early June. The Caravaggio exhibition, smaller than "The Age of Caravaggio" at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York in 1985, runs through May 24 at the Palazzo Ruspoli, at 418 Via del Corso. It is open from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily. Admission is \$9.50. For more information call 68321777. See what's cooking in Paris' many culinary, wine shops

In Paris, conversation about food and wine takes precedence over many things in daily life. Not surprisingly, there are many shops devoted to every aspect of culinary art and viticulture. Two of them are especially well-known.

Dehillerin (18 Rue Coquilliere, Paris 75001; telephone 011-331-42-36-5313) has aisles filled with copper cookware, oyster knives, bread pans and wire whisks of every shape and description, wine carafes, wine-cellar thermometers and heavy blue-cotton aprons for about \$18.50 each.

Lescene-Dura (10 Rue Boissy-d'Anglais, Paris 75008; telephone 011-331-42-66-5974) sells all the adornments of an artfully set table, from asparagus plates to breakfast sets designed with images of sunflowers. A couple other shops are more off-the-beaten path, but just as much fun.

Lescene-Dura (63 Rue de la Verrie, Paris 75004; telephone 011-331-42-72-0874) is the place many bistros and brasserie owners buy wine glasses. The shop has been in business since 1875, serving the needs of restaurant owners, as well as the average Parisian. The interior has all the aesthetic charm of a plumbing-supply house. But there's usually a fire in the pot-bellied stove, a good place to warm the hands before holding a fragile glass. It is an art to select the right glass for the right wine. The Institut National des Appellations d'Origine (INAO), a Paris-based organization, has made it easier by classifying the appropriate glasses to use for various occasions.

High court ruling throws workers comp 'wide open'

Nurse Vera Weiss of West Bloomfield and widow Emaline Holden of Melvindale can collect workers compensation benefits after a major Michigan Supreme Court decision.

The high court last week upheld the power of the Workers Compensation Appeals Commission (WCAC) to overturn decisions of magistrates who rule on comp cases.

"This decision opens it up pretty wide," said A. Donald Kadushin, the West Bloomfield attorney who handled Weiss' case at the lower level.

"My view was that if you lost (before the magistrate), there was no sense for an appeal. This will increase the number of appeals dramatically."

LOSER, IN THE Weiss case, was Prentiss Manor in Southfield, owned by the Jewish Home for the Aged, where Weiss in 1985 injured her back moving a heavy patient.

Holden's husband, Carl, was food service manager for three Ford Motor Co. dining rooms and four cafeterias. He also was responsible for executive dinners and company-sponsored parties. In 1986 he collapsed in his Renaissance Center office and died an hour later of a heart attack "caused by job-related stress and precipitated by stair climbing," the Supreme Court said.

The Supreme Court combined the cases and ruled 7-0 in favor of Weiss and Holden's widow. It was a rare

show of unanimity for the Michigan court in a labor case.

The legal issue was a 1985 state law designed, Kadushin said, to reduce the 6-8 year backlog of cases before the WCAC.

BEFORE 1985, Levin said, referees heard the cases, and an appeals board heard them *de novo* (from the start).

University of Michigan law professor Theodore J. St. Antoine, Gov. James Blanchard's special counsel on workers comp, recommended eliminating *de novo* review. The new WCAC, on appeals, would decide only whether the magistrate's decision was "supported by competent, material and substantial evidence on the whole record," the reform act said.

Said Kadushin: "The WCAC is not a rubber stamp for the magistrate." But his study of 50 cases showed the WCAC let 46 stand.

Justice Levin, writing in the combined cases, said: "We conclude that the WCAC did not, on administrative appellate review, exceed its authority in reversing the decisions of the magistrates and in awarding benefits."

A **MAGISTRATE** awarded Weiss only "closed" (limited) benefits, ending Sept. 5, 1986, for her injury.

An orthopedist at the industrial clinic recommended by the Jewish Home testified she was able to return to work in April of 1986.

But her own physician testified

that Weiss' problem was due to trauma rather than arthritic disease, and that she was disabled by the work-related injury.

Listening to the Jewish Home's witness, the magistrate found Weiss only temporarily disabled.

On appeal, WCAC modified the award to "open" benefits. It called the Jewish Home's witness' testimony "biased in favor of his employer." WCAC called the testimony of Weiss' treating doctor "always preferable

to that of a one-time examining physician."

A Court of Appeals panel upheld the WCAC, and the Supreme Court agreed.

Said Levin: "We conclude that the WCAC gave adequate reasons, grounded in the record, for reversing the fact finding of the magistrate."

Levin noted that at the time the case was argued, Weiss was performing electrolysis treatments in exchange for massage therapy and

whirlpool treatments.

"Weiss never got a dime," said Kadushin. "They owe her (benefits) plus interest."

A **MAGISTRATE** denied benefits to Holden's widow, relying on expert testimony from Ford's witness.

The magistrate rejected testimony that Holden was a worrier as

"grossly speculative and without foundation."

But the WCAC pointed to expert testimony by Dr. Werner Spitz, then Wayne County medical examiner, that the heart problem was caused by job-related stress and precipitated by climbing three flights of 10 stairs each.

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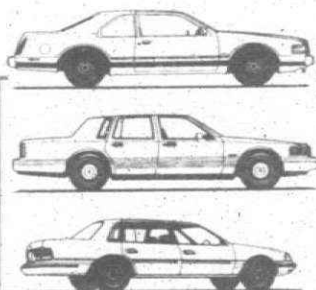

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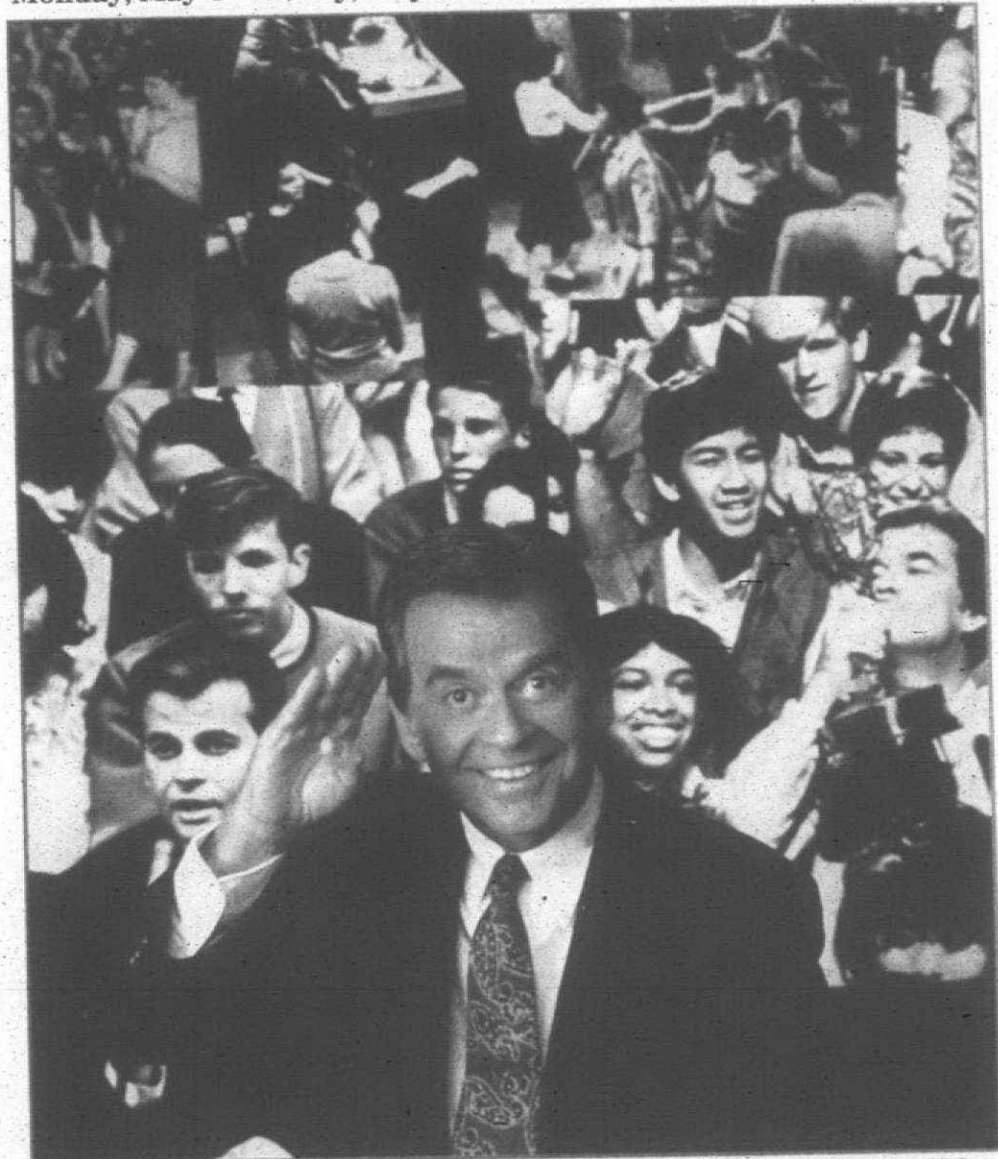

ABC celebrates 40 years of "American Bandstand"

Assembly of show becomes nostalgic journey for Dick Clark

 "It's kind of like looking through a scrapbook," says Dick Clark, describing the two-hour "American Bandstand's 40th Anniversary Special," airing Wednesday, May 13, on ABC. Putting together a show such as this, Clark says, is "a mammoth undertaking" that requires "a small army" to accomplish. "The biggest challenge we have before us," the veteran broadcaster explains, "is this: We really do have only two hours."

Clark admits "it's impossible" to sum up 40 years of historic television in two hours of commercial air time. Instead, he reports they've tried to assemble a fast-paced collage of vintage clips, recent performances and personal reminiscences. Montage segments reflectively deal with particular themes, like teen idols, stars who are now deceased and world events that helped shape the music of the last four decades. As a whole, the show is designed to place "Bandstand" in historical context. Besides, says Clark, "It's going to be terrific entertainment."

The "live" segments of the special were taped in the same ABC studio that "Bandstand" called home from 1964 on (where the network has installed a commemorative plaque, Clark notes proudly), and feature performances by Alabama, Boyz II Men, Neil Diamond and Gloria

Estefan & The Maimi Sound Machine. Don McLean will be on hand to mark the 20th anniversary of his chart-topping single "American Pie" and doo-wop masters Little Anthony and the Imperials will reunite for their first TV appearance in 24 years.

Stars like Paula Abdul, Natalie Cole, Pat Boone, Garth Brooks, John Mellencamp and Pauly Shore will offer their personal reflections on the significance of "Bandstand," while Clark himself chats with former audience regulars from as far back as the show's Philadelphia days. In the segment, scrapbook-style stills from vintage episodes will dissolve to reveal the same folks in 1992. Regarding his own changing appearance being so graphically depicted, Clark laughs and says, "The ravages of time will be seen."

The bulk of the show will consist of vintage performance clips and feature an astounding variety of stars, including Bryan Adams, George Harrison, David Bowie, Fats Domino, Michael Jackson, the Rolling Stones, The Temptations, The Who and Stevie Wonder. Deceased stars spotlighted include Jim Morrison (with The Doors), Buddy Holly, Bill Haley, Marvin Gaye and Roy Orbison.

Rock pioneer Bo Diddley will head the special's roof-rattling finale, leading an all-star romp through his "Hey, Bo Diddley."

Participants in the jam include Greg Allman, Stanley Clarke, Clarence Clemons, John Entwistle, Lita Ford, Johnny Rivers, Tom Scott and Max Weinberg.

"American Bandstand," TV's longest-running music/youth series, debuted in 1952 on Philadelphia's WFIL-TV. Clark took over as host in July, 1956, and the wildly popular local program made the historic leap to ABC and national exposure in August, 1957.

"Even though I told everyone at the network that we'd duplicate our success in Philadelphia," Clark recalls, "it was a little overwhelming. Within one month, it was the number one daytime show in America."

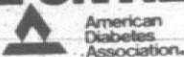
Clark believes the success of the show stemmed from its relationship with the audience, as well as just being in the right place at the right time. "When it started," Clark says, "it immediately became the national corner drugstore for a generation that had just found its own identity." Referring to Wednesday's special, Clark says, "Forty years of youth culture are reflected in this show."

And how does it all affect Clark himself, a consummate businessman and practically his own media conglomerate? "This touches me very deeply. I've spent all my adult life with this show," Clark reflects.

"It's been with me longer than anybody in my family. My parents are deceased. My oldest son is one year younger than I was when I started with it. It's just been with me for so long."

ESPN has yachting's wind at its back

Last month when the Stars & Stripes defeated rival Kanza in a sudden-death sail-off, executives at ESPN must have breathed a collective sigh of relief.

A Kanza victory would have meant that both boats in the finals would have been owned by a single syndicate, turning what should be an exciting, drama-filled sea battle into an academic drill. The sports network could have found its ratings stalled like a sailboat on a windless day, but Stars & Stripes' victory ensured a ratings swell, with colorful veteran skipper Dennis Conner facing Bill Koch and the America3 Foundation for the right to meet the successful challenger yacht in the America's Cup finals.

Riding the wave of interest created by Conner's successful 1987 bid, ESPN made an unprecedented commitment to this year's coverage. Host Jim Kelley and crew Gary Jobson, Peter Isler and Sharlene Hawkes will call the best-of-seven America's Cup finals races, except for the first, which airs Saturday, May 9, on big-sister broadcaster ABC.

Fans can warm up for the finals on Friday, May 8, when A&E presents *America's Cup 1987: The Walter Cronkite Report*. The special gives neophyte fans an overview of the Cup's history, from its origins in 1851 through 1987, when Conner took back the trophy lost to the Australians in 1983.

The six-hour "event series," which will air next season on ABC, is based on a comic strip running in *Details* magazine. The strip's creator, Bruce Wagner, will write the series and co-executive produce it with Stone.

The plot centers on a television executive who's involved with the mind-bending technology known as "Virtual Reality," a computer-generated world free from the constraints of time and space.

Cybill Shepherd says a mouthful

Cybill Shepherd may not have had a series since *Moonlighting*, but she hasn't been idle; she's spent time developing her own productions. According to Shepherd, too many parts require the woman to be either "the victim or the monster."

On Monday, May 4, Shepherd stars in the telefilm *Stormy Weathers* on ABC. Her character is a Los Angeles-based private eye who holds a black belt in karate. (Shepherd, a yellow belt, does some of her own stunts.) This gumshoe lets her fingers do some walking as well, tracking down clues on a computer.

It's the kind of role she enjoys, not only for herself but for the example it sets. An ardent feminist and the mother of two daughters and a son, Shepherd is outspoken in her support of women's causes.

With 4-year-old Ariel bouncing on the bed ("Take your shoes off first"), Shepherd enthuses about the dual joys of working motherhood and deplors the state of child care in America. She warns to her subject, lapsing into a pep talk on how women need to "deprogram" themselves and shake off old stereotypes: She insists women can "have it all" and notes that she breastfed her twins while continuing to work. "I did it for 20 months, and if I can do it with two, you can do it with one!" she urges her imagined audience.

'Lawrence After Arabia' removes veil of mysticism

Fiennes captures enigma of T.E. Lawrence

"The uncrowned king of Arabia," Lowell Thomas put it. The title is peculiarly fitting for T.E. Lawrence — Lawrence of Arabia — whose triumphs were never legitimized by power. Lawrence was first lionized by contemporary Thomas' film-and-lecture show, but PBS' *Great Performances* may have the last word with *A Dangerous Man: Lawrence After Arabia*, airing Wednesday, May 6, and starring Ralph Fiennes.

A middle-class Englishman of slight build, with sandy hair and piercing blue eyes, Lawrence was a gifted linguist and archeologist and a vaunting egoist. A perversely charismatic figure, he summons up — or sums up, rather — the image of German philosopher Friedrich Nietzsche's "superman": a transcendent hero who defies the accepted moral code in his "will to power."

Incapable of submitting himself to king and country, 30-year-old Lawrence, a British intelligence officer, became a hero by helping to lead a combined British and Arab force into Turkish-held Damascus in 1918. As a result of this unsanctioned campaign, Lawrence was, for a time at the conclusion of World War I, a world figure, straddling the gap between European culture and the mystical Arab world.

Fiennes' Lawrence is a colorful, mesmerizing serpent insinuating himself into the antichambers of power. He gives us Lawrence's willful, dramatic facade, a presence deliberately larger than life. (It is worth wondering

whether it is possible to play Lawrence without overacting.) Beneath the exterior was an illegitimate son, a terrified adolescent, a man whose wobbling moral gyroscope threatened to go skittering out of control.

Lawrence used clothes as costume, like a skin he could shed, appearing in

officer's uniform or the robes of a sheik as the occasion demanded — and sometimes in defiance of the occasion. Before our eyes, Fiennes peels off the layers. Soaking in a borrowed bath, Lawrence at last reveals his core. At the center is pure invention: a truly self-made man.

In *Dayo*, Shaughnessy's character, Ben Connors, is the husband of Grace Connors (Delta Burke).

"Delta is a lovely person and we had fun working together, says Shaughnessy. "The movie is a sweet, charming, family movie. It's quite a change from all the 'disease of the week' and 'I killed my daughter' movies."

So what has Shane been doing on *Days* during all this time?

"The last thing I know, he was in his wheelchair banging his fist on a table saying, 'I will walk, dammit,' and then the next minute he is never heard from for four weeks," laughs Shaughnessy.

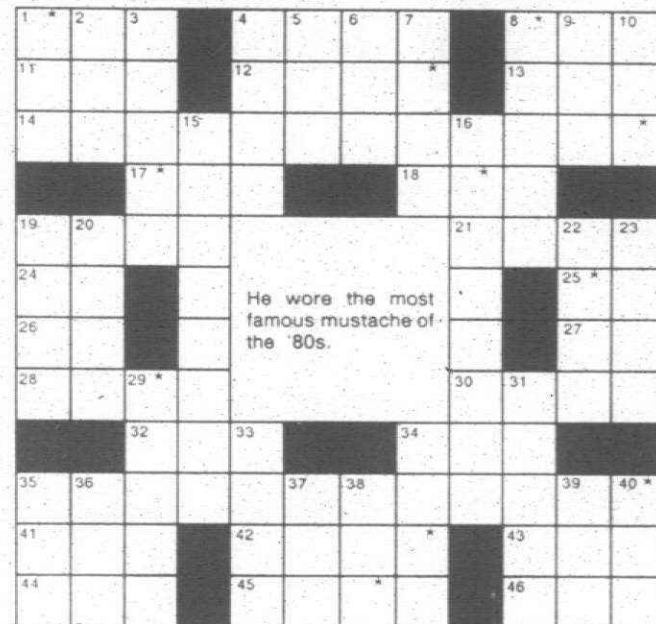
"I think they (the producers of *Days*) were a bit miffed when I went off to do the pilot, so it's like 'you sit and stew in your wheelchair and think about what you've done and when you are sorry you can come back,'" jokes the actor.

If, and that's a big "if" in the world of prime time, the pilot is picked up, we may be saying goodbye to Shane. But for now, Shaughnessy's happy with his daytime gig and plans to be around for a while.
