Business leaders meet Bush

Before President George Bush staged his economic roundtable in Canton Township last week, few were privy to what would be talked about, or even who would attend.

As soon as Air Force One left Willow Run, the gag rule was lifted, and participants were free to speak.

Local developer Bob DeMattia said participants talked about "problems they perceived as caused by the government. Bush was mainly listening. He

did take notes, and hopefully something will come of it. He's given his pledge that he is going to work to make sure the deficit is cut," he said.

Topics ranged from competitiveness and fuel economy to "over-regulation, which is a constant concern of ours, government, and of course the deficit, a concern for most of the people," said DeMattia. "Other people had concerns about ways government can help us with exporting our products."

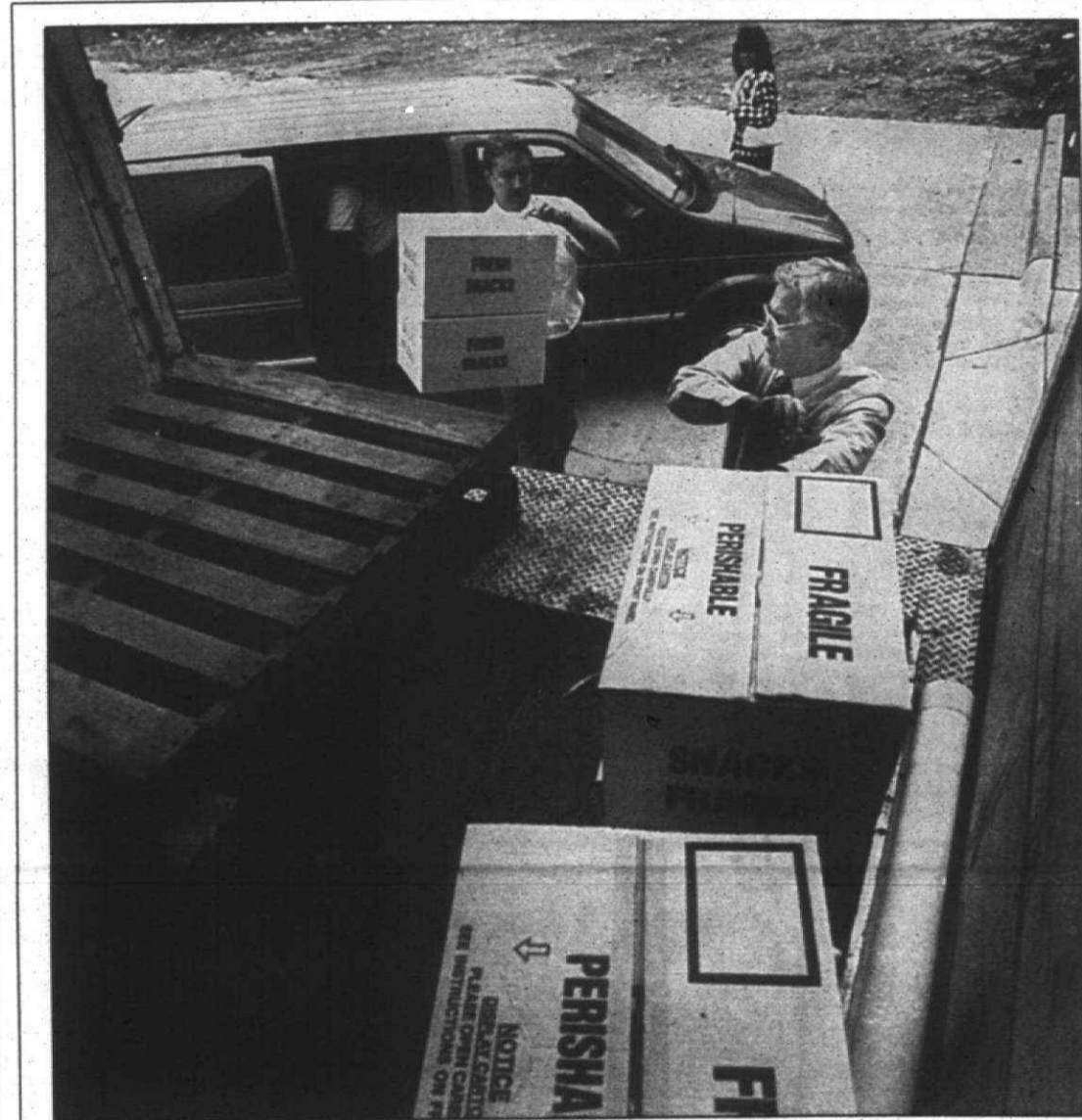
DeMattia was "favorably impressed

by the president. I believe he is doing a fairly good job. We are in difficult times, and I think he is providing some pretty good leadership," he said.

The exercise was productive, DeMattia said. "It was very worthwhile for the president to get feedback from people who are actually out in the entrepreneurial area, without having the feedback filtered through reports and briefings."

School officials say dump cut and cap

Cut and cap — Proposal C on the fall ballot — received a chilly reception Thursday during a public forum in western Wayne County.

But audience reaction may not represent general attitudes because of the heavy presence of teachers and school administrators.

Area schools have been especially opposed to cut and cap, which would reduce school operating taxes by 30 percent and cap assessment increases to no more than 3 percent each successive year.

Lost school revenue would be made up by the state Legislature, most likely through business growth and spending cuts from other budget areas, said

Michigan Chamber of Commerce vice president Richard Studley.

"One of the things on which we're all in agreement is the overdependence on the property tax," said Studley, urging audience members not to be "Chicken Littles" in their approach to Proposal C.

But audience members appeared unmoved.

"If this passes the sky will fall," said Mike Witucki, associate superintendent for finance for the Wayne County Regional Education Service Agency.

Witucki and others said they were concerned the state wouldn't make up the difference, at least to the point of matching dollar-for-dollar.

Cutting taxes on the November ballot

State voters have an opportunity to vote on two tax cutting proposals that will be placed on the November 3 ballot. Below is an explanation of what each proposal would do.

Proposal A

- Constitutionally limits assessment increases on all residential property to 5% or the rate of inflation, whichever is less until the property is sold.
- Out-of-formula school districts, cities, counties, and townships would receive no state reimbursement for revenues lost due to the assessment limitation.
- No state of funding to cover the State's cost of indirect reimbursement to in-formula school districts has been determined.

Proposal C "Cut and cap"

- Would amend the state constitution to cut property taxes for school operations 30%, phased in over a five year-period.
- Would cap increases in individual assessments at 3% or the price index, whichever is less.
- The state general fund will reimburse school districts for the lost revenue due to the 10-30% cuts but not for the 3% cap. There's no reimbursement for cities, villages, townships, counties or community colleges.

Language has been included in a federal bill asking for an \$18 million grant to offset Western Townships Utilities Authority project costs.

WTUA chairman and Canton supervisor Tom Yack said the language was included in a bill going before the House appropriations committee.

September at the earliest, or as late as the end of October," Yack said.

"This is very positive news. It's a necessary first step," he said, toward winning the grant for the \$95-million project affecting Canton, Plymouth and Northville townships.

Farm finds its 'charm' for dancing

With its unbridled pop music filled with expressive hooks and melodies, Charm Farm has moved to the head of the pack of the burgeoning dance scene ready to sweep this area with raves.

The Charm Farm founder Dennis White raps his fingers against the table. He's seething with impatience in search of the common reward every producer seeks at the end of a tiresome day in the studio.

Something cold to drink. "When I was asking if you had Diet Coke, I wasn't just checking to see if you had it or not," said White within ear shot of the dilatory counter help in the steamy Coney Island restaurant.

In these moments, one wonders if Charm Farm is a moniker of contradiction. White and his four cohorts promptly prove themselves quite patient when exhorting the virtues of dance music to a knock-kneed neophyte.

Charm Farm is at forefront of the burgeoning dance scene ready to sweep this area with raves at Industry and Club X nights at the State Theatre.

There is an unbridled pop music, sprinkled lavishly with expressive hooks and melodies. Those elements combined with a rousing stage show, which includes a dancer - Birmingham resident Mikki Lutes - has Charm Farm being lauded in many circles.

In a genre synonymous with faceless production and technically induced soul, White quickly attaches a personality on Charm Farm.

"It's a trip," said White beginning a discourse on dance music. "The weird thing is, the guys who invented dance music are from this city. They had been doing that for three years before the house music scene in England. It didn't catch on in Detroit until much later."

The irony of which White says is an embarrassment. He goes on to add Detroit has yet to experience an authentic rave, which he says by definition is an unsanctioned dance party in nontraditional settings such as warehouses and fields.

Raves hit their peak in England in the late '80s, especially in Manchester where bands such as Happy Mondays were conceived. Around that time, White was busy forming Charm Farm with fellow Berklee College of Music student Tommy Onyx on this side of the pond.

As the story goes, the outfit included Tin Machine guitarist Reeves Gabrels and they released an album, "Unharm'd" in 1988. Restless, White and Onyx came to Detroit. Charm Farm activity was put on hold as the duo landed with Inner City, a rolling dance outfit that released a record and toured Europe and Japan.

White left Inner City to follow up with Charm Farm while Onyx stayed with the band. When Onyx returned, he promptly linked up with White to reform Charm Farm. The musical partnership is a trade-off on talents.

"I can't tie a Windsor knot to save my life," Onyx said. "But this guy (White) can." The outfit, which has an album coming out in the fall, includes bassist Dino Zoyes, guitarist Steve Zuccaro and drummer Eric Hogemaster along with dancer Lutes. White and Onyx are the producers, writing all of the songs.

No secret exists to what they're trying to achieve. "At the end of the day if you can write a song that people can hum," White said, "that's all you need to do."

Lampoons fit into musical sound of Joy

Raucous rib ticklers or musical revisionists? Too Much Joy adroitly hopscoches between both labels and transcends them as well.

"We have the perception of four white kids growing up in the suburbs," said guitarist Jay Blumenfield. "Our (view of the world) is reality. CNN's is skewed." Their sound is slurred together, bonded with the dripping edge of suburban spunk and musical grit.

The third installment of the New York foursome's pitiary-inspired mayhem will be released on Tuesday, Sept. 1 (The band also performs Labor Day at Pine Knob). "Mutiny" is an endless whirlwind of frenetic songs hitting on the continual self-effacing themes in accordance with being anti-rock heroes. According to band members, "Mutiny" was recorded in mad-dash fashion. One member would come up with a song title and the rest would have two hours to hammer out a salable number.

The process reaped 14 tracks good enough for the album. "There are 73 others that weren't," cracked Tim Quirk. Along with the thump and crash, Too Much Joy does produce some mercurial pop standards such as the infectious "Donna Everywhere," which sounds like a '60s garage classic. The band is collaborating with illusionists (sic) Penn & Teller on a video for the single.

"Mutiny" is highly anticipated by the devoted followers. Too Much Joy has amassed since their 1988 major label debut "Son of Sam I Am." The band's unglided lead was enticing enough for MTV to put its video "Making Fun of Bums" into rotation and had the foursome performing with "Weird" Al Yankovic at the Whiskey Club.

If those items didn't garner Too Much Joy enough publicity, getting arrested and spending a night in a Florida jail for performing 2 Live Crew covers certainly did. There's was more to it than just fattening the press kit, according to band members. "We got a bunch of publicity for the stunt," said Blumenfield, who entertained inmates on acoustic guitar along with other band members. "What were we supposed to do, not do it because all these people were writing about us? ... I don't buy that argument at all."

What no one will argue, though, is Too Much Joy seeks to destroy the rock'n'roll myth, especially the cliches. Band members admits this presents constant inner-conflict. After all, the very platform from which they lampoon others is the vehicle of their success. One band member said they've come to realization they must ultimately also destroy Too Much Joy.

"And we're well on our way, believe me," Blumenfield added. Band mates Sandy Smallens (from left), Tommy Quirk, Tommy Vinton and Jay Blumenfield have their act together as the tuneful Too Much Joy.

Timothy Moore would be (1) punished and (2) we wouldn't have to put up with him again," he said in an interview.

Talbot will be seeking the remainder of a two-year term to which Justice Conrad Mallett Jr. was appointed in 1990 by outgoing Gov. James Blanchard. "Mallett never tried a jury trial. He's Jim Blanchard's revenge," Talbot said.

GOP favorite

Now a Grosse Pointe Farms resident, Talbot grew up in Livonia where his mother was 16th District Court administrator.

He considers Circuit Judge James Mies of Livonia his favorite because "he has a beautiful legal mind, he's a great scholar, he's on top of the law, and he takes time and patience with both sides."

There was never any doubt Talbot would be nominated. He was backed by Gov. John Engler, and his July 9 announcement was handled by the Republican State Committee, which usually keeps hands

off until a candidate is actually nominated. (Although nominated by political parties, Supreme Court candidates run on a nonpartisan ballot.)

Talbot came up through the ranks of the Common Pleas Court (appointed by Gov. William Milliken in 1978) and Detroit Recorders courts before becoming a circuit judge.

Grandstanding

Talbot thought Moore's crime was particularly heinous. When Moore's ex-girlfriend fell to her knees and pleaded for her life, Moore wounded her with a gunshot. As she fled bleeding to another room, Moore followed and slashed her seven times with a knife, according to trial testimony.

Michael Cavanagh, now chief justice, wrote the 1989 opinion reversing Talbot. Cavanagh said the law intended that a sentence for a term of years be less than life. Moore, 34, could be expected to live another 34.5 years.

Cavanagh and the court majority said Talbot "abused his discretion" and "abdicated his discretion by entering an order that is impossible to obey," adding:

"It is not an opportunity for a judge to display for the benefit of the press and the public how 'tough on crime' the court might be."

Dissenting, Justice Patricia Boyle said, "The issue is not whether the defendant can serve the sentence, but whether the court can lawfully impose it . . . The (Supreme) Court now declares as a matter of law that an older offender must receive a different sentence than a younger offender who has committed a similar offense."

Voting with Cavanagh were Charles Levin, James Brickley and Dennis Archer. (Archer quit the court late in 1990 to run for mayor of Detroit after Blanchard's defeat. The move prevented Engler from filling the vacancy.)

Dissenting with Boyle were Dorothy Comstock Riley and Robert Griffin.

Riley is seeking a full eight-year term. Democrats Sunday were scheduled to nominate Court of

Appeals Judge Marilyn J. Kelly of Bloomfield Hills to oppose her.

A wordy court

Talbot has other complaints about how the Michigan Supreme Court works:

- **Employment law** — "Attorneys can't explain (to employers) how to hire, fire or treat employees because the state of employment law is utter chaos. Business people say, 'Why should I bother to go into business here?' We need respect for precedent and stability."

- **Insurance** — "Try defining 'serious impairment of bodily function.' We thought we knew in the '80s. Then the Supreme Court said we were wrong."

- **Wordiness** — Michigan ranks 49th in the number of Supreme Court decisions, "but our volume of verbiage was huge," Talbot said, citing a Detroit College of Law Journal article. Added Talbot: "Plain English is a challenge."

- **Criminal cases** — The court "shows gross insensitivity to victims."

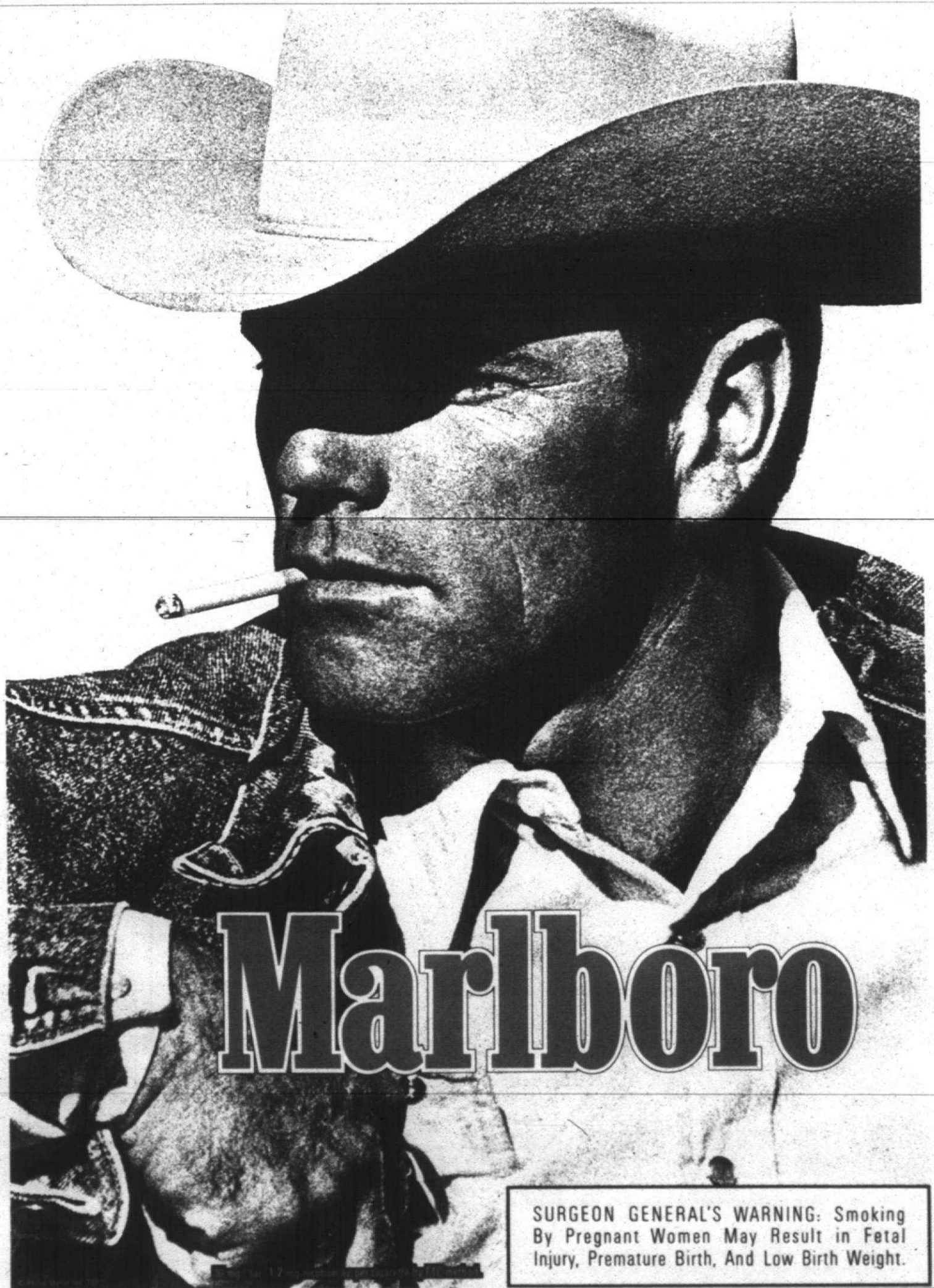

Chef gets in a pickle trying to copy recipe

Anyone who's ever stopped by Getsie's Pub in beautiful downtown Northville has probably, at one time or another, sunk their teeth into one of Dorothy's incredible bread and butter pickles. I've been going to Getsie's now for way past a dozen years or so and every year the fall harvest brings the taste of what I consider to be the best pickles I have ever tasted.

When asked her secret, diminutive Dorothy just blushed a little and says: "It's the same I've been doin' for 25 years and it's nothing but a standard pickle recipe."

Standard recipe, my foot. Dorothy's pickles crunch and have just the perfect balance of what pickle fanciers call "tooth." I liken it to the snap, crackle and pop of my favorite breakfast cereal.

Pickle secrets

So every year when I ask Dorothy for her secret pickle recipe, every year I get in return a jar of pickled nirvana. Certainly not a bad trade-off. So this year, I checked out everything I could about the secret to great pickles. The Ball Blue Book, long the canner's bible has more pages on pickling than any other topic.

The Farm Journal's Canning Cookbook lists secret upon secret. I tried them all and have come up with the following information. Although my pickles have yet to come close to Dorothy's, I'm right on the fringes of your apron hem, so watch out!

Both of the canning bibles mentioned above agree that in order to make great pickles, you have to start out with great pickles. Consultant upon consultant say that it's best to grow your own.

Growing pickles

Grow pickles? I ask? Secret number one for the best pickles start with growing your own cucumbers. Not that you want to grow cucumbers here folks, but rumor has it that the best pickles start with the immature cucumbers. Slicing cukes do not make good pickles, as don't the ones from stores. You need immature pickling cukes. Preferably, fresh, immature pickling cukes that have been picked no more than two hours before.

If that sounds like a pain, it is. It meant a trip down to the Eastern Market at 5 a.m. while farmers laughed when I asked if anyone had pickled the cukes during the full light of the moon. I finally found an old babushka clad lady who assured me her pickling cukes came in late Friday afternoon. I trusted and believed. How could you not? Experts agree that it's a waste of time pickling after the cukes are more than 24 hours old. Supposedly, it makes them tough.

Dorothy uses the fresh pack method for her bread and butters and they do require refrigeration. The brine cured or fermented pickles are a bit softer and have a more pronounced pickle taste. Whatever method you use, the pros again say that just as important the pickles is equally as important the vinegar.

Vinegar recommendations

Pros use clear vinegar with a specified (on the label) acid strength of 5 percent or 50 grains. Some of the clear vinegars from the grocery store are lighter. White vinegar gives pickles their best color while cider vinegar gives off the best aroma and flavor. Yours truly used a 60-40 blend of white to cider.

Last, but certainly not least, I search the metropolitan area for fresh herbs. It would have been a lot easier had I purchased the bulbous onions and fresh dill and mustard seed from another bib-clas Osh-koshed farmer just a few stands down from the cucumber lady, but I went to an herb farm, paid three times the price and got a written guarantee that there were no insecticides on my precious bunch of herbs. After all, I was going to spare nothing in my quest for an acceptable alternative to Dorothy's bread and butter pickles.

I cleaned, I boiled, I blanched, I experimented. I made two pints at a time, alternating the blends, changing the yields and switching the times of processing.

My reward was what I consider to be a challenging batch of bread and butters that come as close to Dorothy's as I'll ever get.

Would you believe that while entering my car with a jar to exchange with my pickle queen it slipped from my fingers and smashed in a sea of glass shards, only to be tasted and appreciated by the Rubbermaid trash container?

Here is the effort of my slavery. I like it, you might not. But when it comes to bread and butters, the only thing Dorothy at Getsie's has on me is experience.

Relish green tomatoes

It's commonplace that movies inspire trends in fashions and furnishings, but seldom does a movie focus on a particular food.

The movie, "Fried Green Tomatoes," brought to public attention a dish that a good many people had never heard of. A lot of people thought they were a manufactured product that just never had an organic green stage.

But there are more greens out there than you might expect who not only fry green tomatoes, but also make pickles, relishes, and even a variety of mince-meat. Interestingly, green tomato dishes are often thought of as regional, according to the area of the country the cook grew up in.

A spot check of customers at Western Market on Nine Mile Road west of Woodward in Ferndale, including Dee Dee Jervase of Birmingham, revealed that Southern cooks think of fried green tomatoes as a Southern dish.

But Jervase said she learned how to fry green tomatoes years ago from an Italian neighbor in Southfield.

"We've carried green tomatoes for

years," said Western Market co-owner Tony Salvaggio. "We sell about 150 pounds a week when they're in season."

"This year, because of the movie, we've sold a few more, and a lot of people who wouldn't look twice at a green tomato are stopping in front of the display and saying, 'Oh, look, there really are green tomatoes!'"

British cookbooks offer several recipes for green tomato chutneys and relishes, although none mention frying.

Frances Gibson of Farmington Hills said that green tomato recipes are common in Providence, R.I. where they don't have time to ripen.

"In Rhode Island, green tomatoes are readily available at the market," said Gibson.

My mother, Lois Oliver Weeden, made green tomato pickles and mince-meat until she was in her 80s. She

always served green tomato pickles on Saturday night with baked beans. The tartness of the pickle complimented the blandness of the beans.

"I still enjoy fried green tomatoes, although I don't cook them as often as I used to."

Gibson, a mechanical engineer who has co-authored several books and articles on reinforced concrete, recently compiled a book of family recipes for the family's grandchildren. For this article, she was kind enough to reach into her computer and draw forth her mother's recipe for green tomato mince-meat pie filling. (See recipe inside).

Renalda Tomlinson of Plymouth said she never really liked fried green tomatoes much.

"My husband and children like them, and I still fry green tomatoes when my children visit, or when I visit them,"

she said. "In southeastern Ohio where I come from, we made a variety of pickles and relishes such as piccalilli, out of green tomatoes."

Company sips success with El Tesoro tequila

At Robert Denton & Company in Birmingham, the motto is — "If you say it can't be done, then stand aside for someone who is doing it."

The company that imports super-premium spirits from Mexico and Europe is gaining national attention for El Tesoro de Don Felipe tequila, a "pure" tequila made from a fleshy, green succulent plant called an agave, which is part of the aloe and lily family.

There are more than 360 varieties of agave, but tequila can only be made from the Weber blue agave, said Robert Denton, company president.

The search for a "product that was honest, and what it said it was," took more than two years, said company vice president Marilyn Smith.

Finally, they found the La Altona distillery in the Los Altos Mountains, near the town of Arandas, Jalisco in Mexico.

The three generation, family-owned distillery produces tequila using the same methods that were used in the 1800s. Don Felipe Camarena, son of the founding Don Felipe, is handing over control, little by little, to his son, Carlos Camarena.

"I have found the finest tequila I could possibly find," said Smith. "There is a family behind this product. Someone made it that loves it."

El Tesoro, made from 100 percent blue agave, is not for everyone. Like fine wine, it's a product you grow into.

"It is a style of tequila," said Smith. It is distilled to 80 proof without the usual dilution with water. The less expensive tequilas add up to 49 percent sugar water to dilute, and use smaller amounts of immature agave.

Fully mature blue agave plants are harvested at the end of a very long, eight to 12-year growing cycle, said Smith. This is much costlier and more time consuming.

Robert Denton & Company imports two styles of tequila that are distributed by its selling agent, The Elite Spirits Company.

Plata (silver) or white El Tesoro which costs about \$26 a bottle, is bottled fresh, within 24 hours after distillation.

"It's clean, fresh and mixes beautifully," said Smith. "The nose and palate begin with a hint of black pepper and then turn to a wonderful fruitiness."

Muy Anejo, (gold) is aged two or more

years in Don Felipe's stone cellars in inspector-sealed oak bourbon barrels, and costs about \$31 a bottle. Smith compares the flavor to cognac or Scotch whisky.

"It is an elegant spirit with a great balance of fruitiness and oak-derived vanilla. It is refined enough to serve neat in snifter glasses."

Although tequila has gone upscale, some myths remain. "Unlike whisky or cognac with long ages, tequila gets decidedly worse after five or six years," said Denton. "It reaches its peak, depending on the region, in two to four years."

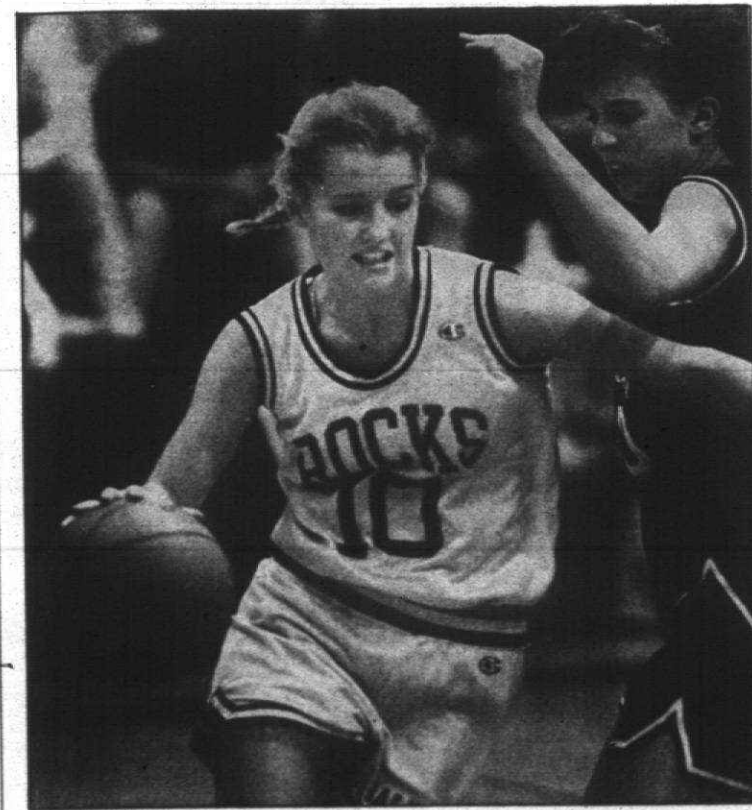

Besides a continuous flow of talent and coach Fred Thomann on the bench, one thing doesn't change with Plymouth Salem girls basketball.

The Rocks always load up on tough, early-season opponents. And, regardless of the outcome, the goal is to be ready for the Western Lakes Activities Association season and peak when the state tournament starts in November.

Thomann is usually successful, too, as evidenced by another WLAA championship last year and Final Four appearances in three of the last six state tournaments.

"We definitely want to continue to improve as we go through the season," Thomann said. "With the playing base we gained this summer and with our non-league schedule, it should give us the wherewithal to figure out how to get better."

The Rocks, who were 18-5 last year and were defeated by Plymouth Canton in the district final, begin the season Thursday at home against highly-regarded Rochester Adams.

Four of the next five games are with Catholic League powers Farmington Hills Mercy, Birmingham Marian and Harper Woods Regina and defending Class B champ Flint Powers.

"With that kind of schedule, you get a real good indication of where you're at and what you have to do," Thomann said.

Salem returns seven seniors from its

last team, three of whom have considerable varsity experience.

Cyndi Platter, a 5-foot-11 post player, and guards Christy Parimucha and Leslie Gotts were regulars a year ago and comprise the nucleus of the 1992 squad.

"We have three players who had an awful lot of playing time, and we will highlight our game with those three to start the season because they have the most experience," Thomann said. "We're looking for the other seniors to fill out the starting roster and create the depth we need to play in this league."

The Rocks don't have the abundance of post players they did last year when Salem could run All-Observer standout Darcie Miller, Emily Giuliani or Martha Bol at the opposition, too. That means added responsibility for Platter, who averaged 10 points and six rebounds.

"For us to be successful, Cyndi Platter probably has to play 32 minutes," Thomann said. "We don't have another kid to go in there and do what she can do."

"She had a great summer and we're really looking forward to her having a great senior season."

The Rocks are solid at guard with Gotts (five points, three assists and four steals) and Parimucha, who started as a sophomore when injuries forced her into service and led the team with seven assists per game last year. They

Canton runners hope to regain WLAA crown

Plymouth Canton's girls cross country team followed an unfamiliar trail last fall, failing to win the Western Lakes Activities Association's Western Division for the first time in six years.

The Chiefs, who had gone five straight years without losing a dual meet, finished at 3-3 in duals. Getting back to the top may be difficult, however, since Canton coach George Przygodski is unsure about the status of his top returnee, junior Lana Boroditsch.

Boroditsch finished 11th at the Class A state meet in a time of 20 minutes, 58 seconds, but a thigh injury suffered last spring on the track team made her take the entire summer off.

When she gets healthy, Boroditsch looks like a

shoo-in to better her school-record time of 20:11 at Cass Benton Park that she shares with two other Canton runners.

"She's struggling with it (the injury) right now; we'll see what happens," said Przygodski, regarding Boroditsch's status for Canton's first meet Sept. 10 at the Early Bird Invitational in Ypsilanti. "We're not going to let her run until she's completely healthy."

Boroditsch a two-time first-team All-Observer choice, was fifth at the WLAA meet and fifth at the regional.

Canton's other top two runners at the end of last fall, sophomores Laura McWilliams and Kathleen Landelius, also return. McWilliams placed 30th at the WLAA meet (22:11) and Landelius 31st.

Przygodski predicts each runner will break 21:00 by

the end of the season.

Among the other returnees are seniors Lara Antczak and Karina Kilpelainen and junior Erin Hindman. This is Antczak's fourth year on the cross country team, and Kilpelainen and Hindman are rookies who have run track.

Another pair of runners expected to contribute are senior Michelle Magers, in her second year on the team, and senior Sueann Farris, a first-year performer.

Three runners — Kim Gudeth, Anne Dibble and Michelle Dean — graduated but Przygodski is confident his team of 17 runners can make up some of the difference.

"We're not used to finishing third and we'll do everything we can to improve," Przygodski said.

MDA Telethon to Entertain, Educate

TUCSON, Ariz., July 24, 1992—For the 27th year, American TV viewers will be treated to an annual Labor Day labor of love—the MDA Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon. Beginning at approximately 9 p.m. EDT Sunday, Sept. 6, and continuing for 21½ hours, the live broadcast will feature its traditional blend of stellar entertainment and information about neuromuscular diseases and MDA's battle to defeat them.

Starring show business legend and renowned humanitarian Jerry Lewis, the Telethon's entertainment lineup will offer some of the brightest stars of film, stage, nightclubs, television, music and sports, as well as some surprises. The show will originate from the Sahara Hotel in Las Vegas, with satellite feeds from other locations across the country.

The Telethon will also feature profiles of adults and children who are served by the Muscular Dystrophy Association's programs, and will update viewers on scientific advances achieved by MDA's worldwide research program during the last year.

More than 80 million viewers annually watch the Telethon, which is carried by more than 200 "Love Network" stations across the United States and Canada. In addition to enjoying great entertainment, viewers phone in pledges of support for MDA's programs of research and services to benefit more than a million Americans with 40 neuromuscular diseases. Last year's Telethon garnered a record \$45.1 million in pledges and contributions.

Lewis is considered the most effective fund-raiser in history for his more than four decades of volunteer leadership of MDA. He's best known for hosting the Telethon each Labor Day, but works for the Association year-round.

World-renowned as an actor, comedian, director, writer, producer and headline entertainer on stage, screen and television, Lewis has starred in nearly 50 films, including "The Nutty Professor," "The Bell Boy," "The Errand Boy" and "The King of Comedy." He wrote and directed many of his comedies. His television acting credits include the dramatic series, "Wiseguy," and the movie, "Fight for Life."

Box office gross receipts of Lewis' films total about \$800 million, making him one of the most successful performers in show business history. The Disney Channel this year broadcast a series of programs based on the "Colgate Comedy Hour," the TV show in which Lewis and Dean Martin starred in the early 1950s.

The only entertainer ever to be nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize, Lewis has also received the Jefferson Award from the American Institute for Public Service, the Legion of Honor and Commander in the Order of Arts and Letters, France's two highest awards, the U.S. Department of Defense Medal for Distinguished Public Service, and numerous other humanitarian awards.

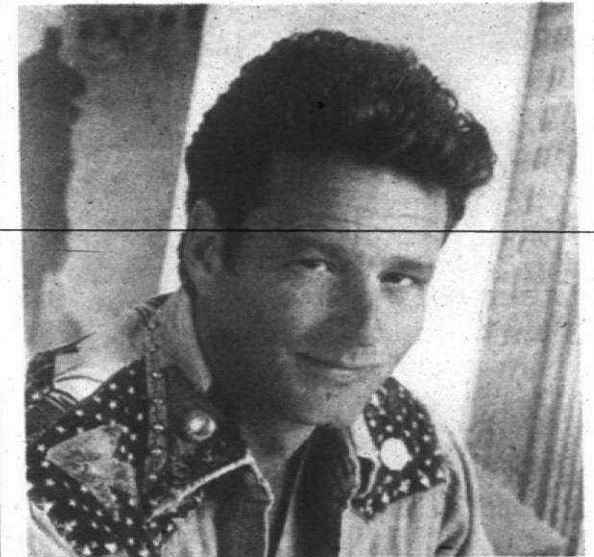
The first MDA Labor Day Telethon was broadcast by one TV station in New York in 1966. Lewis was joined by stars including the Muppets, Joe Namath and Sammy

Davis Jr., who would become a Telethon stalwart. Ed McMahon, still Jerry's Telethon co-host, made his first appearance in 1968.

The Telethon was aired coast to coast for the first time in 1970. Noted performers in the next decade ranged from John Lennon to Mickey Mouse. In 1976, Frank Sinatra surprised Jerry by bringing Dean Martin on stage for a touching live reunion of the former partners.

Show business's biggest names continued to grace the Telethon in the 1980s. In 1986, comedian Billy Crystal's moving monologue about a friend who used a wheelchair brought in the greatest telephone response in the show's history. Ringo Starr brought his All-Star Band, featuring classic rock stars, to the Telethon in 1989.

Leeza Gibbons became a co-host in 1990 for the 25th anniversary show, which Jerry dedicated to the memory of Davis.

'Roundhouse' adds punch to Saturdays

On a night when anyone old enough to have a driver's license is elsewhere, Nickelodeon offers Snick, or Saturday Nickelodeon, two hours of prime-time programming for kids. The second of Snick's four distinctly different series is *Roundhouse*, a bare-bones variety show that makes up for a small budget with big energy.

Call it *Sonny and Cher* with oversampling, *Donny and Marie* sans disco, but a more appropriate label might be *In Living Color* for pre-teens. *Roundhouse* producer Buddy Sheffield, a former *Color* writer, doesn't discount that comparison.

"I created a lot of the sketches that some of you probably hate," Sheffield recently said of his old job at a press gathering, "and ... a lot of kids watch (*In Living Color*). If they're going to watch that kind of show, we might as well give them one that has the right kind of values and is planned for them and not pick them up by accident."

True to at least one trait of its Fox ancestor, *Roundhouse* is peopled by an extremely talented ensemble cast that delivers both deft humor and dance moves with synchronous timing and acrobatic vigor. Wedged between established Nick faves *Clarissa Explains It All* and *The Ren & Stimpy Show*, *Roundhouse* makes a solid case for a new Saturday night fever.

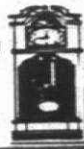

T-birds drummer Texan by any standard

 "I've lived here longer than I have anywhere else," says drummer Fran Christina of the Fabulous Thunderbirds, "so I feel like a Texan." The lanky, Rhode Island native laughs and adds, "But I know Texans won't go for that."

Christina needn't worry, for he's earned his Lone Star credentials with the propulsive beat he provides for the state's best known rhythm and blues band. He's been a T-bird since the mid-'70s, with time out for a stint with Western swing curators Asleep at the Wheel.

A baseball star since his Little League try-out (he hit it out of the park), Christina had his eye on playing in the major leagues but loved drumming just as much. "I was bangin' on oil cans when I was 10," he recalls, "and got my first drum set when I was 12." Eventually, music won out and Christina says he has no regrets.

Christina and the rest of the Thunderbirds will be featured in an episode of TNN's *The Texas Connection* airing Saturday, Sept. 5. The drummer reports the band was allowed to assemble the show, and the rousing, music-filled hour features songs by Texas blues greats Delbert McClinton, W.C. Clark and original band member Lou Ann Barton ("a Thunderbirdie," Christina laughs). The band is also currently touring the nation in a blues revue featuring Buddy Guy and B.B. King.

The picture was wonderfully directed on location by David Lean (*Lawrence of Arabia*, *Great Expectations*). Incidentally, the film's "controversial" theme narrowly escaped the iron fist of the then powerful Legion of Decency in the United States. Most video stores with a good selection should have it.

Q: Please settle a bet I've had with my husband for some time. He thinks that Elizabeth McGovern (She's Having a Baby) and Elizabeth Perkins (He Said, She Said) are the same person, but I am positive they are not. (He thinks she changed her name!) —Tracy W., Portland, Ore.

A: It's been said that love conquers all, Tracy, and I hope your devotion to your husband will allow you to forgive him for believing the two Elizabeths are the same person — they aren't. For further comparison, check out McGovern in *Ordinary People*, *Ragtime*, *The Bedroom Window* and *Racing With the Moon*. Other films with Perkins include *About Last Night*, *From the Hip*, *Sweet Hearts*, *Dance and Big*.

Q: Since returning from a trip to the British Isles, I've been looking for a video of the movie *How Green Was My Valley*. I have a vague memory of seeing this movie about life in Wales, probably in the '40s. Can you tell me if this is available on video? —Lois Scott, Fredonia, Kan.

A: Released in 1941 in slightly differing British and American ver-

It is available, but only on laser disc, according to Leonard Maltin's *Movie and Video Guide 1992*, and may only be for sale in some stores.

Q: What happened to the show ALF? I know it was cut, but they left ALF surrounded by the Alien Task Force and "To Be Continued," and that was the last I saw of the show. Did I miss something? —J.D. Stolk, Gresham, Ore.

A: If you saw "Consider Me Gone," the last original episode of ALF to air, you've probably seen the last one. The one-time top-10 program continued only in reruns and syndication. ALF debuted on Sept. 22, 1986, and was a surprise hit for NBC. The cat-eating alien life-form inspired a successful line of merchandise and a Saturday-morning cartoon version of his adventures. The series was canceled in 1990.

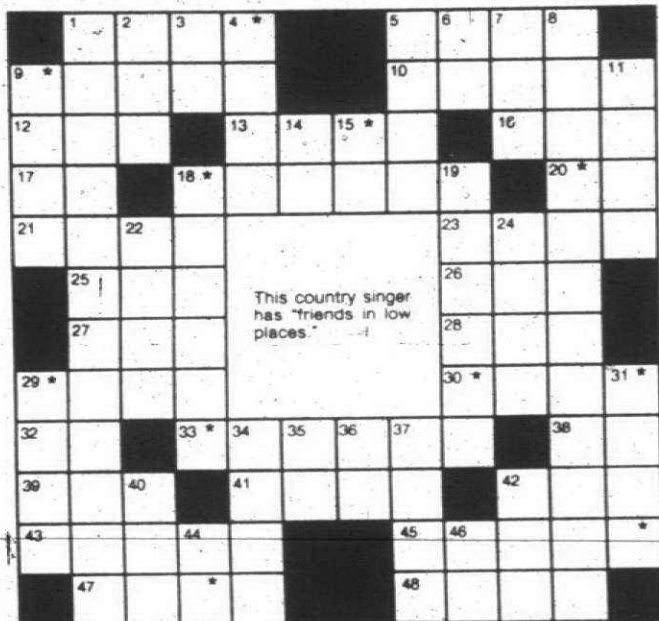

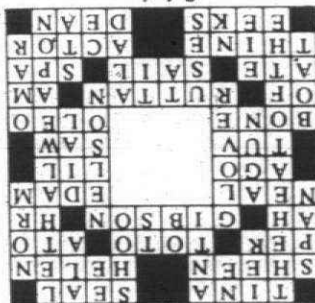

On a recent edition of BET's *Live from L.A.*, Keenan Ivory Wayans, executive producer and star of *In Living Color*, commented on his brother Damon's new film, *Mo' Money*. "The great thing about college football is its storied traditions and the way campuses come to life on game day. We'll be tapped into the emotions of college football and all the things that make it unique and different."

NBC flies away with '92 Emmy nods

Kirstie, Dennis, Tim and no Gilbert

NBC got 100. CBS received 70, and ABC followed close behind with 63. The next closest recipients, ahead of networks like HBO and PBS, were producers Joshua Brand and John Falsely with a whopping 30.

What they got were nominations for this year's Emmy Awards. The trophies presented by the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences will be handed out on Sunday, Aug. 30. For the sixth year, the Fox network will carry the star-studded special, scheduled to run about three hours ... but don't bet on it.

"I'm your long-form awards show director," laughs Walter Miller, recalling his experiences producing big awards programs, including this year's Tonys and a memorable Emmy telecast that ran 4 hours, 15 minutes. Executive producer Miller admits there's really no way to insure the show will stay on course because of variables like acceptance speeches and unscripted banter between presenters. He also declares "there isn't any protection" from unexpected (and unwanted) incidents like that of last year, when comedian Gilbert Gottfried took advantage of the live broadcast to launch into a vulgar comedy routine. In minutes, the switchboards at Fox affiliates lit up like Christmas trees.

Miller says the key is to keep the show moving and keep it funny, a job primarily in the hands of the program's three hosts: Dennis Miller, Kirstie Alley and Tim Allen. The trio will appear in rotation throughout the show, with Miller kicking off the evening with a monologue that's sure to touch on the presidential race and the recent demise of his syndicated talk show. Alley will anchor a segment saluting television's "Women of Comedy," and Allen will likely contribute some of his trademark male-oriented humor.

Other highlights of the show will include appearances by Jerry Seinfeld and Richard Lewis (sure to bemoan the cancellation of his *Anything But Love*), a final fanfare for several long-running series that came to a close this season

and the presentation of the Governors Award to cable mogul Ted Turner. Longtime Turner-watchers will surely expect the controversial entrepreneur's acceptance speech to contain some of his well-known, irreverent wit.

Falsely and Brand netted their nominations with just two shows: NBC's critically acclaimed period drama, *I'll Fly Away* and the quirky *Northern Exposure*, one of CBS' brightest success stories in the last few years. Both shows are up for Outstanding Drama series, as well as trophies in the writing and directing divisions. Leads Sam Waterston and Rob Morrow will compete for a prize in the acting category.

Several veteran performers compete in this year's Emmys. Kirk Douglas' guest performance in an episode of HBO's *Tales From the Crypt* is nominated in the Lead Actor in a Drama series category, and Edward Asner, winner of seven Emmys (a record) is going for his eighth trophy with a nod for his supporting role in CBS' defunct *The Trials of Rosie O'Neill*. Marion Ross, twice nominated for her work in the long-running *Happy Days*, will compete for the Outstanding Lead Actress in a Comedy Series award for her work in CBS' critical favorite *Brooklyn Bridge*. Among her competitors is *The Golden Girls'* Betty White, an 11-time nominee facing her third win.
