

Kosteva stresses jobs



State Rep. James Kosteva could face a tough challenge thanks to redistricting that leaves him with a more Republican constituency. The Democrat is campaigning on an issue that cuts across party lines — jobs.

State Rep. James Kosteva is asking voters to return him to Lansing for his fifth term and he said he's earned the ticket back.

Kosteva maintains legislators "must make alterations in the way schools are financed in the state and that means

the elimination of property taxes as a funding means."

Using income taxes would be more proportional, he said. It's unfair, Kosteva added, that someone could lose a job and pay the same amount of property tax.

The other important educational change, he said, is to adjust the curricu-

lum to what businesses need. Michigan has lost 288,000 manufacturing jobs in 13 years. The jobs that were lost paid \$16, \$18 and \$20 an hour and were replaced by service jobs that paid \$4.50, \$6.50 and \$8.50 an hour.

"Major employers are seeking lower labor costs," Kosteva said. "The best hope and opportunity is to work smarter and that means to have a well-educated workforce. We have to focus on job training and we have to connect the workforce with the educational system."

Whyman runs in tennis shoes

Deborah Whyman wants voters in the newly created 21st state House district to know that she's committed to winning the race and she's wearing the tennis shoes to prove it.

Sneakers with a skirt has become her campaign trademark. In fact, at the Plymouth Fall Festival parade, Whyman said, "onlookers stopped her and promised their votes, because she was smart enough to wear sensible shoes."

She plans to win others over with a platform that includes generating jobs; redistributing tax dollars; reforms in education finance and instruction and accountability of legislative campaign funds.

Last Tuesday the 33-year-old Canton resident started a leave of absence from Ford Motor Co., where she works as a data processing consultant. All her energies will go to the campaign, which will include a visit from Gov. John Engler.

"Taxes are out of control at the state level — Michigan has the second highest business tax in the nation," Whyman said. "And we have the fourth highest property tax in the nation. We're destroying the American dream. A lot of social problems are not going to be cured by government."

She wants to reduce the business tax rate, Whyman said that although she's usually against business tax abate-

Schools seek dismissal of parents' lawsuit

A Circuit Court case that cuts to the core of one local family remains unresolved after a hearing Friday seeking a resolution from Judge Samuel A. Turner.

Attorneys representing Plymouth-Canton Community Schools filed a motion to dismiss the case involving the 1990 death of 8-year-old Stephen Nalepa of Canton Township.

Nalepa was found March 24 hanging from his bunk bed with a noose made of belts around his neck. His parents, Deborah and Lawrence, blame their son's

death on the schools because the day before his death, his second-grade class viewed a film called "Nobody's Useless."

The movie shows a handicapped boy trying to commit suicide in a similar manner, but that boy is stopped by his brother. The movie was made for students in grades 4 to 6, according to an accompanying instruction guide.

The Nalepas filed a lawsuit shortly after their son's death against the school district, as well as Encyclopedia Britannica and the makers of the film.

Attorneys for Encyclopedia Britanni-

ca asked that the firm be dropped from the suit and the judge ruled in their favor, saying the company's distribution of the film was protected by the First Amendment.

The Nalepas, represented by Barry Waldman and Mary Katherine Norton, asked the court to reconsider.

"Now the judge has to respond to two motions," said John W. Crimando, attorney for the school district.

The judge took Friday's motion under advisement and allowed Crimando an additional 10 days to present his argument. His decision could take weeks, Crimando said, and the case could

eventually end up in the Court of Appeals.

"Nobody wants the judge to rush his decision," Crimando said. "No one wants to try the case with these questions still unanswered."

The case is riddled with complicated legal issues concerning the First Amendment and a school district's responsibility to censor materials more critically. It has gained a great deal of attention.

"It's a high-profile case so it is better that we take our time," Crimando said. "Nobody wants to see this family hurt anymore than they already have been."

Sheldon Road Ford plant marks 25th anniversary

The Ford Motor Co. plant on Sheldon Road celebrated its 25th anniversary Saturday with a carnival.

Singing groups, a magician and ventriloquist performed on three stage areas set up inside the plant from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Kids were treated to face painting, vintage cars were displayed along with future prototype cars, and information was provided about the plant.

In property taxes alone on the plant, the Ford Motor Co. pays \$631,893 annually, making Ford Plymouth Township's biggest taxpayer.

The plant, which is just north of M-14, is also the township's biggest employer. "We have been collecting a lot of data on the history of the plant," said Dave Landon, a Ford communications employee.

Jenny Teehey, plant newsletter editor, researched the plant history by going through old issues of the Plymouth Observer and by studying records of the Michigan Department of Transportation.

"They (Ford) bought the property from a Mr. Rossow (in 1967)," she said. Rossow, now 95 and living in Livonia, had a farm on the land.

A house on the parcel had been used as rental property since 1934, she added.

"When they built the plant they brought about 1,000 people over from the Rawsonville plant," Teehey said.

"It was originally opened to meet the

needs of growing air conditioner market for North American vehicles," Landon said. In 1966, just 20 percent of all cars had air conditioners, and Ford executives predicted that percentage would surge.

"We built this plant to meet that need," Landon said, adding the plant also began building car heating unit cores.

The plant's peak employment, in the '80s, was 2,700. Ford now employs just under 2,000 employees at the plant.

Today, the 800,000 square-foot plant — expanded from the original 642,000 square feet — produces 13,000 air conditioners and 7,500 car heaters each month.

Also each month, 250 rail car loads are shipped out of the plant.

Since the plant's founding on Feb. 5, 1967, the plant has gone on to produce climate control systems, injection molding and plastic housings for the air conditioner units.

Starting in 1987, air conditioner units for Mazdas built in Flat Rock have been built at the Ford Sheldon plant.

ments, currently they would jump start the sluggish economy.

Malpractice reform

—And, if elected, Whyman said, she would also work on medical malpractice reform. Hospitals that would otherwise come to Michigan have gone elsewhere to avoid the devastating lawsuits, she added.

"We need someone to fight to create a new environment to foster business growth and thereby create new jobs," Whyman said, adding that she was endorsed by the Michigan Chamber of Commerce during the primary.

An important step after creating jobs is to prepare children with a better education when they enter the workforce, she said, lauding the importance of basic reading, writing and math skills.

Pointing to the high illiteracy rate, Whyman said, school systems and teachers "get a bad rap." Where are the parents when you have a child, 15 or 16 years old, who can't read?

"The direction we're going is to put more responsibility on the state level," she said. "We need to put control back into the local hands."

And for that matter she's against the so-called Robin Hood policy of allowing poorer school districts to take money from richer districts.

"Although he failed to mention it in his political literature, my opponent's education funding votes have

been devastating for the Plymouth-Canton district," she said. "He voted for the Robin Hood tax base sharing plan that cost the district nearly \$1 million in 1991 and 1992."

high taxes

It's unfair for districts to endure high tax rates and foster industrial growth in their backyards and give up 50 percent of that, Whyman said, adding that poor districts should be financed more heavily by the state general fund.

And she wants to lessen the dependence schools have on property taxes by taking the money from the general fund, which would be bolstered by eliminating programs, like

aerobics classes in prisons and state funded smoking cessation classes.

Whyman also promotes privately funded arts programs. Organizers are "extremely lax in raising money," she added. "The subsidizing of the arts is way beyond the scope of inflation or a reasonable increase. I would propose a tax credit for people who give to the arts."

If elected, Whyman said, she would also call for accountability of office holder expense funds and line item budgeting for the \$34 million in state coffers.

Pro-life issue

Whyman, who is pro-life, said she doesn't believe the abortion issue

will be in the forefront in this race, because Kosteva is also a pro-life candidate.

"I'm a community person with a long line of community service, she said listing volunteer commitments that include working on food drives, Big Sisters of America, distributing clothing and counseling domestic violence victims.

She has also worked as an elected precinct delegate, a member of the executive committee in the 15th Congressional District, a delegate to the Republican State Convention, and she is a member of the Detroit Institute of Arts Founder Society.

"I'm not a politician," Whyman said. "I'll represent the common person."

About her opponent, she said: "Jim is a nice man. Jim may not have positions that are a detriment to Michigan, but he votes with the House leader. The House leader is Democratic and that's not good for the state of Michigan."

She also called his attendance record poor. "It's in the bottom 25 percent of the legislators. We pay you to show up and to vote. That is an issue if you don't show up."

And, she said, Kosteva sits out on important votes. Kosteva said the allegation was unfounded and a common campaign tactic.

"He's a very popular legislator and I don't underestimate him," she said. "The fact is that I took a leave. That shows I'm serious and that I'm running to win."

Pilgrims take to the sky

If climbing into the cockpit of, say, a World War II-era fighter plane, taking the controls and soaring into the clouds has been a lifelong dream of yours, you're in luck.

There's a club in town that can help you experience the thrill of flying — and you don't even have to leave the ground.

Members of the Flying Pilgrims RC Model Club get together at a site on Lilley Road north of Van Born in Canton to fly remote control model planes.

"They fly like the real ones," says club member Bert Brian. But you can judge for yourself. The skies above the field will be filled with model planes from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sept. 26 and Sept. 27 during the "Fall Fly for Fun Phase Out."

Spectators are invited to attend. A \$2 parking fee is optional and food concessions will be available.

If it doesn't rain, organizers expect between 2,000 and 2,500 spectators to see remote control biplanes, monoplanes and sail planes that will be among the aircraft

flown.

The 85 members of the Flying Pilgrims include a 14-year-old girl and a 76-year-old man from Plymouth, and others from Canton, Livonia, Romulus, Westland, Bloomfield Township, Monroe and Ontario.

Flying Pilgrims president Richard Vukmircovich, of Detroit, was at the field last week with his P-47 Thunderbolt flight aircraft, a scale of a World War II fighter used in Germany and in the Pacific.


Building the plane himself, he constructed the framework in about two weeks and spent another two months on finishing touches.

Members of the Flying Pilgrims joke that Vukmircovich owns the Airforce, referring to his 12 model planes.

"Last year there were 60 pilots and 70 airplanes at the show," Vukmircovich said. "This year they'll be bigger and better. All the pilots just come out for a fun time."

Low blood supply prompts Red Cross to call on donors

While the nation is rallying to help Hurricane Andrew victims, local health administrators are asking for help in Michigan.

The Southeastern Michigan Blood Services Region of the American Red Cross said the area desperately needs donors. Everytime someone donates blood it's processed into three components, red blood cells, plasma and platelets, which allows hospitals to give patients the needed component.

Inventories were depleted by a series of medical emergencies that began last week requiring large amounts of platelets, which are most often used by leukemia and cancer patients.

"At the time we were already quite low with inventory of platelets and Wednesday we had to rush imports of platelets from around the country, according to Mark Cornille, a Red Cross spokesman.

"We tend to have blood shortages just about every summer, but it is unusual that we become urgent on platelets first."

While all the emergency needs were met last week, there could be a problem if there are additional emergencies requiring large amounts of platelets, according to Dr. A. William Shafer, principal officer for the

Red Cross Blood Program in Southeastern Michigan.

"A sudden demand could wipe out our safety net," he said.

The Red Cross is asking donors to call 1-800-582-4383 and schedule an appointment.

"We're trying to open various centers and

extend hours and make things as convenient as possible for them to donate," Cornille said. "We prefer people to call so we can schedule them."

Several of the centers will be open on Sunday in response to the shortage.

Meanwhile, mobil gas dealers are trying to meet the needs of disabled children. Some 150 dealers in the Detroit, Lansing and Grand Rapids area will be participating in a program to help children in need of physical rehabilitation at Beaumont Hospital's Pediatric Rehabilitation Center.

Between September 17 and October 3 participating dealers will donate two cents per gallon for all Super Unleaded Gasoline

sold between Sept. 17 and Oct. 3. They hope to raise \$40,000.

Beaumont's rehabilitation center provides specialized treatment for infants, children and teenagers who suffer from a wide variety of physical injuries, illnesses and birth defects, including cerebral palsy, spinal cord injuries, amputations, muscular dystrophy, sports injuries, and arthritis. "We know that Mobil cares about kids, Vera Stojanovic, Children's Miracle Network director said.

Rumors of Mettetal's death exaggerated, businessman says

The government effort to buy Mettetal Airport may be over, but the airport is still open, businessman Dan Malone stresses.

Malone owns Emerald Aviation, the airport's largest employer with 10 employees.

He was concerned with a recent news story detailing the end of the Plymouth Township-Canton effort to seek a federal grant to buy the airport.

The headline read, "Mettetal Goes Down in Flames."

"I've got a few hundred thousand invested out there, it affects the private businessman when people see these things," Malone said.

Malone said he doesn't claim to speak for the Klocko family, which owns Mettetal Airport, just south of Joy Road in Canton.

"But Steve Klocko has told me he's never intended to close the airport," Malone said.

Both Steve and Tom Klocko, partners in Desert Sand Inc. which owns Mettetal, have declined comment on the airport's future, after

the failed attempt of local governments to buy Mettetal.

Malone speculated that some other government entity could still seek to buy the airport, as has happened in other areas.

He said the federal government has awarded grants "to a non-profit institution — they will give it to a college," he said, citing an Ohio college-owned airport as an example.

"It could be county-owned, it could be state-owned, there's possibilities of other public avenues," he said.

But while the future of the airport gets sorted out, Malone continues to operate Emerald Aviation, which operates a flight school and an aircraft maintenance and fuel service.

He employs mechanics, flight instructors and a flight school manager. At this point, "It's barely a break-even relationship," Malone said.

"I think that when times get better it could be a comfortably profitable business," he said.

Malone, an automotive design engineer and former developer said, "I've had an attraction to aviation most of my life."

He said that to a point, he understood the opposition of some to public ownership of the airport. "People are fearful of taxes and the government — People don't believe the government."

Malone maintains that some opposition to the airport was based on a fear of flying. "Some people don't understand why an aircraft stays in the air," he said.

Malone stresses that the public is welcome to visit the airport.

Until the airport's fate is decided, "I'm not here to close. I'll be here until they throw me out," he said.

"I really believe they're going to resolve the ownership of this airport. I have a lot of faith in the owners."

Board, teachers reach tentative agreement

A tentative contract settlement has been reached by Wayne-Westland teacher union leaders and school officials, virtually erasing years of a strike.

Bargaining teams have refused to divulge details until today, when the proposed pact will be made public after it's revealed to the school board during a special closed session.

But the school administration has confirmed that the tentative agreement comes within the "parameters" of the board's latest proposal, which offered teachers a 3-percent salary increase this year and a 5-percent raise next year.

The agreement was reached about mid-day Thursday, after a long day of talks. Copies of the tentative agreement will be submitted Wednesday to the 999 members

of the Wayne-Westland Education Association, union president William Reese said Friday. The union has called a meeting Wednesday to answer questions.

The teachers union is expected to ratify the contract during a meeting next Monday, Sept. 28, — the same day the board is expected to approve the pact during a business session.

The sudden breakthrough in negotiations came after union leaders had earlier scoffed at the proposed raises of 3 percent this year and 5 percent next.

Robert Kowalczyk, the WWEA's executive director, had earlier called the offer "unacceptable." Union leaders had demanded an 8 percent raise this year, alone.

Reese, when asked what swayed union leaders, said Friday, "We have no comment at this time."

Regardless of the settlement, the salary

increase will come on top of a 2-percent raise that teachers already received this year. That increase had been negotiated and approved in February, 1991.

Teacher union leaders, however, had tried to distance themselves from the 2-percent increase, saying it shouldn't be considered during the latest contract talks.

"It's there, and it's new money this year, no matter how you cut it," board member Fred Warmbier said Friday.

School board president Leonard Posey last week stressed that the board had refused to budge on its latest offer. Under that plan, teachers who have a master's degree and who are at the top of the salary schedule would be earning \$55,395 by the end of the contract.

Superintendent Larry Thomas also had insisted on a nine-point educational im-

provement plan "calling for smoke-free schools, more elementary parent-teacher conferences and an additional work day for teachers, among other measures. Those proposals remain intact in the tentative agreement."

In reaching an agreement Thursday night, it appears the WWEA leaders had received at least some pressure from the union ranks to settle with school officials. School board member Vicki Welty said she knew of several teachers who had approached their building-level union representatives to show support for the contract offer.

Welty commended teachers for staying on the job and behaving as professionals while contract talks continued past the initial Aug. 10 deadline.

"There has been no tension in this district," Welty said.

Although the school board isn't expected to receive specific details of the contract offer until today, some members have already indicated they won't support it.

"I didn't agree with the parameters to begin with, and I didn't like the rush-rush job," Warmbier said of the contract talks.

Teachers and administrators have "long way off the bandwagon" on salary increase, he said.

Moreover, Warmbier said, teacher salaries have increased dramatically while progress has remained elusive in trying to boost student scores on state achievement tests.

A majority of the seven board members would have to support the contract for it to be approved. At least four members have shown support for the board's latest offer.



What a week: Greg Park last week fended off a squirrel attack, then four days later chased and cornered a naked man spotted peeping in his neighborhood.

Vicious squirrel, naked man bewilder construction worker

If you think you've had a strange week, consider what's happened to Greg Park lately.

First, there was the incident with the squirrel.

It happened a week ago, Sunday, Sept. 13, who works in construction, was walking along Roe Street just east of downtown, with his girlfriend, Jennifer Herter.

That was when the squirrel attacked.

"It tried to go after my girlfriend. I couldn't believe it," he said.

After sending her away, the squirrel came after him.

"It just ran out from behind a tree," he said.

"It climbed up my pant leg and I tried to shake it off, and it bit me twice on the left hand."

Because the skin was broken "in

four or five places," Park went to get a tetanus shot from the doctor, and antibiotics.

Some of Park's Roe Street neighbors also report problems with the squirrel. Longtime resident Ernie Archer reported that the squirrel chased a second grader who lives on the street. When the squirrel returned to the girl's house the next day, "her mother threw a shoe at it," Park said.

The squirrel stands out, Park said, because, "He's the biggest one out of them all."

Then there was the incident early Thursday.

"I was just walking home, at about a quarter to 2 (a.m.)," Park said, along Roe Street.

That's when he spotted an unusual sight. "I saw him coming out of a backyard — He was naked," Park said.

Because Park noticed the man was peeping into a neighbor's win-

dow, he called for him to stop. Instead, the naked man — Park said he was about 30 and 6 feet tall, started running.

The naked man ran through a backyard and hopped the fence, and continued on, Park said.

During the chase which continued through three backyards, they passed by Park's apartment. Park called out to his girlfriend to call the police, and she did.

Finally, "I cornered him in a backyard," Park said, adding the naked man was also holding the clothes of a female child in his hand.

Plymouth police arrested the naked man and charged him with indecent exposure.

After two uncommon experiences, within four days of each other, was Park wondering what might happen next?

"I think I'm going to stay inside," he said.

Super 8 Motel clerk robbed at gunpoint

Does Oakland County profit by Detroit divorce?

The federal government has given five Detroit-area counties, including Oakland, a chance to disassociate themselves from Wayne County and the Motor City, at least in a statistical sense.

It goes like this: There are these things called primary metropolitan statistical areas, also known as PMSAs, that are used in commercial atlases and retail guides to give businesses some idea of how likely they'd be to succeed in a given area.

PMSAs are also used by the feds as a guide to how much federal tax money will be spent in a given area.

The Detroit PMSA is the 5th largest market in the nation and made up of Oakland, Wayne, Macomb, Livingston, Lapeer, St. Clair and Monroe counties.

The feds are offering Oakland, Macomb, Livingston, Lapeer and St. Clair counties the chance to form a new PMSA that wouldn't include Wayne and Monroe counties.

That means that the new Detroit PMSA would probably comprise

only Wayne and Monroe counties.

The pro argument is that businesses looking for places to put stores would find cities in the Oakland metropolitan area more attractive because the negative aspects of Detroit (like crime, unemployment and poverty) would not be included in the statistics.

Reaction sought

The con argument is that economic development in Wayne and Monroe counties would suffer because, without Oakland County

boosting up the positives, the Detroit PMSA would rate only 16th nationally. It's also possible that Oakland County wouldn't do as well either because its PMSA would rate 17th in the nation.

The federal office of management and budget issued a letter Sept. 2 asking the U.S. congressmen who represent the Detroit PMSA to solicit opinion about this potential change. The OMB wants an answer before Oct. 17.

But the congressmen seem to be taking their time. Aides to representatives William Broomfield, R-Birmingham, and William Ford, D-Taylor, said those two congressmen aren't doing anything about this issue yet. As of last Friday, Broomfield hadn't even received the OMB letter, his aide said.

Oakland County Executive Dan Murphy opposes the change, as he

did in 1983 when a similar offer was made. "I didn't see any value in doing it 10 years ago," he said. "I still don't see how it's going to do anything for us to go our own way."

Nevertheless, the Oakland County statistical information officer, Dave Hays, said he's going to study the pros and cons of breaking away from the Detroit metropolitan area as soon as he sees a copy of the OMB proposal.

Stalking bills likely to reach governor before election day

Four anti-stalking bills are likely to reach Gov. John Engler's desk in time to benefit both sides of the political aisle on election day.

Stalking is defined as "malicious harassment which causes substantial mental suffering or distress." It most often occurs in a husband-wife breakup.

The state House of Representatives last week adopted two bills by Rep. Dianne Byrum, a Democrat from Ingham County. She's in a tough re-election battle against the father of Engler's press secretary.

On the House floor, the bills were pushed by House Judiciary chair Perry Bullard, D-Ann Arbor, who is in a tough campaign for district judge.

House Bill 4532 creates the crime of stalking and provides for a one-year jail term and fine of \$1,000. HB 6038 would allow a warrantless ar-

rest of someone violating an anti-stalking court order. They sailed through the House Thursday on 103-0 votes.

But the House held up action on Senate Bill 619, by Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, creating the crime of "aggravated stalking," a five-year felony.

The bill sat in Bullard's committee since the Senate passed it in May and was reported out only last week. Geake is in a tough battle for Congress.

Geake was unperturbed that the House failed to vote on his bill. "They want the bills to come out together," he said.

Meanwhile, the Senate Judiciary Committee reported out the fourth bill in the package — Geake's SB 1095 would allow civil lawsuits for damages caused by stalking and allow victims to obtain court orders against the stalker.

"This creates the new tort of stalking. It allows exemplary dam-

ages, court costs and reasonable attorney fees," Geake told the panel. "Victims of domestic violence are a big percentage of the victims of stalking," said Kathy Hagopian of Safe House in Ann Arbor. "They have no remedy until the stalker takes action."

"There are 27,000 domestic crimes a year," said Kate Young of the state Department of Social Services. "They often occur when a victim has fled for safety. We think in the long run this bill will save lives."

The Senate Judiciary Committee reported out the bills to the Senate floor on a 3-0 vote. They are likely to be voted on this week.

Voting yes were Republicans William Van Regenmorter of Jenison, Dan DeGrow of Port Huron and Jon Ciskis of Saginaw. Missing the vote were Democrats Virgil Smith of Detroit and John Kelly of Grosse Pointe.

CUSM delights in its brattiness

Carter the Unstoppable Sex Machine — the name only hints at the brattiness Jim Bob and Fruitbat are capable of.

"It's not a deliberate thing, but we do like to stir up a little trouble now and then," said co-conspirator Jim Bob in a trans-Atlantic telephone interview. "Like putting up a phone interview of Jimmy Carter with Carter the Unstoppable Sex Machine (name underneath it in New York (on last year's tour with EMF)). His office called up and was quite upset about it."

"Anything that winds people up is a bit fun."

Even if it means attracting litigation as CUSM has regarding the use of lyrics from the Rolling Stones' classic "Ruby Tuesday." The courts are still trying to sort that one out.

If attention is the sole desire, the London-based band's skittering, breakneck syncretized cross between pop and shards of punk aptly speaks volumes.

A rolling tenor of cynicism underscores a fair amount of CUSM tracks on "1992 — The Love Album," the band's sardonic attempt to herald in the year of a united Europe.

"Suppose You Gave a Funeral and Nobody Came" enshrine moments of melancholy in a mayonnaise jar for public viewing.

But Carter is not all bile. By contrast, "England" speaks to an overall restlessness that pervades amid the stagnation of day-to-day life in the economically strapped land of Churchill.

"Look Mum, No Hands" is a poignant — albeit a rather knee jerk — examination of the insanity of paramilitary violence engulfing Northern Ireland. ("He flies through the air with the greatest of ease/That daring young man in the blue dungarees/Struck down by the G force of a Semtex surprise/He bucks like a sea horse, keels over and dies.")

"I suppose I should have written it years ago," said Jim Bob. "I decided to write it right before we recorded the album with the latest spate of bombings going on in London — that and what was going on in Yugoslavia at the time."

"It's sad. We haven't gotten anywhere in the last god knows how many years. It was sort of a gut reaction to innocent people being killed accidentally through the bombing."

Much of what CUSM performs is an immediate reaction, unedited for profanity and rambling emotion.

Carter the Unstoppable Sex Machine performs Thursday, Sept. 24, at St. Andrew's Hall, 431 E. Congress, Detroit. Doors open at 9 p.m. For information, call 961-MELT.

Bonney swaps punk for country

To hear Simon Bonney, one would think he's from Texas. But not so for this punker turned country wailer. He's from the Land Under and he's pursuing a '90s spin on the traditionally U.S. musical genre.

The mammoth jump from punk to country is one even Bob Beamon wouldn't contemplate. For Simon Bonney, the leap wasn't as daunting as one would perceive.

In fact, the soft-spoken singer/songwriter will tell you in a reflective moment that it's the most natural path for him to have ventured.

The native Australian fronted the European avant garde conglomerate Crime and the City Solution, which earned its spurs at the height of music's most nihilistic and rudimentary phase. A host of members filtered in and out while the band released five critically acclaimed albums in the early to mid-'80s.

One of the knocks on Bonney at the time was his lyrics were a tad too serious for a genre largely beset by irreverence. His dexterity and willingness to explore the inner-

depths of pain and sorrow would later become his biggest attribute in his country solo album "Forever."

"That's one of the things I really come to like about country. It's music written by older people, people like Merle Haggard who can take pain and express it simply in lyrics," said Bonney, who listened to American country music as a kid working on the farm in Australia.

"He's using the music to liberate himself from the pain."

The tradition of music in America is to use it to talk about experience and pain in your life. In England, that doesn't seem to be the case."

So upon leaving England and relocating in Los Angeles, Bonney found a home in country music and it shows on "Forever."

Bonney's songs in a timeless, plaintive tone, sounding more like he's from Mesquite, Texas, than

Melbourne, Australia. His own interpretation of American country comes through in an echoey, desolate landscape created through diverse instrumentation.

This is achieved partly through a booming, atmospheric guitar sound that resonates throughout the release.

Highly regarded guitarist J.D. Foster performs on "Forever" as does a host of equally lauded musicians that includes Jon D. Graham, who performs on pedal steel and dobro, and violinist Brown Adams.

"Originally, all through Crime and the City Solution I'd listen to Hank Williams and Patsy Cline," he said. "But I also listened to the instrumentation of Johnny Cash and people like Ry Cooder. They used it an atmospheric way."

Bonney also credits people like Foster, who has worked with

'School Ties' packs punch and avoids being preachy

When he's asked to play football for a New England prep school in 1955, David Greene doesn't know what he's getting into. The Scranton-born teenager quickly realizes that he must hide his Jewish background from his rabidly anti-semitic classmates.

From all indications, "School Ties" should have degenerated into a preach fest of social correctness. Thanks to meticulous direction and casting, the movie not only packs a punch; it's also fun to watch.

Light years ahead of his starring role in "Encino Man," Brendan Fraser plays the martyred David with the proper blend of toughness and sensitivity. He immediately fits

in with the guys and proves his mettle on the gridiron.

David's success doesn't wear well with Dillon (Matt Damon), an insufferable rich kid from a Kennedy family who loses his quarterback position and girlfriend (Amy Poehler) to the charismatic teenager. Dillon uses newfound information about David's true identity in the nastiest way possible.

Little-known actors give the movie an added realism while Freddie Francis' cinematography focuses on both the beauty and state tradition of St. Matthew's. The action on the football field is especially well executed, as is a fight against the stark white tile and steam of the boys' shower.

Director Robert Mandel ("F/X") and screenwriters Dick Wolf and Darryl Poniscan fortunately don't bore us with sermonizing "School Ties" works on another level when David, like any kid Jewish or not, is

thrust into the world of the rich and privileged.

In "Bob Roberts," playing exclusively at the Kennedy, a popular folk singer vies for a Pennsylvania senate seat. Adopting and altering the appeal and even album covers of Bob Dylan, he woos right wing voters with his platform as a "rebel conservative."

Tim Robbins, who wowed audiences in Altman's "The Player" earlier this year, stars as Roberts. He also directs the film in a mock-documentary style where the candidate is seen solely through the lens of a British filmmaker.

What starts as a simple profile of Roberts' well-machined campaign soon develops into a stinging look at his overall insincerity. He is seen as shallow and money-grubbing, traits which appeal to his constantly growing stable of fans.

"Bob Roberts" doesn't pick on one political party.

Cases of animal cruelty are multiplying in state

Just last week, this newspaper editorialized on state legislation which, if approved, would make mistreatment of animals a felony. Yet, it would provide for punishment, but more importantly, it would provide for psychiatric help so that the reasons for the mistreatment could be understood and not repeated.

It was coincidence that in the same issue the Westland Observer published a story about a dog, Cleo Bo Jackson, who had died from rat poison. It had taken a week for Patricia Cope-Byrne and her fiancé, James Hanson, to recover enough to report the incident to the Observer & Eccentric and offer a \$100 reward for information leading to whomever poisoned the dog.

"It's the first time I could talk about it without breaking down," she said. Anyone who has ever lost a pet can understand the sense of emptiness. Certainly I do. Thursday, I lost my 12-plus-year-old cat, Acorn, to advanced stages of kidney failure. It's still something I can't talk about, despite the support of my co-workers. At least I

have the consolation of knowing that his death was a biological process. But for Cleo, death brought senseless days of misery for him and his owners from a cruel act.

While our story was a coincidence, mistreatment of animals is anything but, according to Gary Tiscornia, executive director of the Michigan Humane Society. There were 10,000 rescue runs involving about 10,000 animals handled last year. "It's a very big problem," he said.

While Oakland County does a "very credible" job of handling strays, it's more difficult in Detroit, which sells strays for research, he said. The Humane Society's rescue unit runs from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. 365 days a year, and would like to run 24 hours a day when possible.

Nine out of 10 freed cats come down the first day, but the Humane Society will come out when they're up in a tree for longer periods, Tiscornia said.

Cases of poisoning, cruelty and lack of food, shelter or water totaled about 4,000 last year. And in August, despite

the cool summer, the society recorded its first animal who died from heat stroke — a Doberman with an internal temperature of 107 degrees.

There are all manners of abuse, from use of battery chargers to having pets placed in barbecue grills. Yes, that's a very gruesome thing to have to think about. But it may motivate you to write to your legislator to urge passage of Senate Bill 1092.

Cruelty is a "non-stop thing," said Sherry Silk, director of operations for the Michigan Humane Society. The

numbers are going up each year, and since "judges pay more attention to felonies," there is added impetus to getting the legislation passed.

There are other cases of abuse. She recounted the case of a 5-month-old Great Dane found shivering in a mud puddle at the end of a chain. The Humane Society got a search warrant and had the animal removed.

Sometimes it's a matter of just educating people, Silk said. Other times people are themselves homeless and abandon their animals; unfortunately, some are abandoned while chained to a fence and unable to search for food. Also confounding her is why neighbors don't call discreetly to report the abuse.

"I'm not making this stuff up," Silk said. Packs of dogs now roam Pontiac, and a recent immunization clinic there drew about 1,000 animals.

The Michigan Humane Society has tried to help out with free food barrels at each of its shelters in Detroit, Westland and Rochester. Information is re-

quested so there is no "scam" involved.

"Don't be cruel to a heart that's true," wrote our cartoonist, Arkie Hudkins, reminding us of an Elvis Presley tune last week. In no way does that trivialize the importance of animal life. At issue here is whether an animal is nothing more than a piece of property, to be disposed of at will, or whether he/she is a loving, giving entity expecting only, in the words of Silk, protection and food.

That's why it's so hard for Cleo's family to understand why he was poisoned a short time ago.

For those of us who have lost our pets, for whatever reason, there will be new friends to come along. But no one, and no thing, can take away our memories. We do insist, however, that the Legislature bring justice to those memories.

Going private continues to be a political issue

My first taste of "privatization," the latest Republican code word, was a bitter one.

It came in the 1960s with President Lyndon Johnson's Great Society. A Job Corps camp was near the town where I worked, and one Saturday there was an incident downtown that some folks termed a "riot."

A brother reporter tried to get some information out of the Job Corps industrial officer and was told to bag it. A private company based in Silver Spring, Md., was operating the camp under contract to Sargent Shriver and the Beltway gang. They didn't have to give the public any information and wouldn't.

In the 1980s, under Democratic Gov. James J. Blanchard, the state payroll fell, because work was being farmed out to private contractors. The AFL-CIO didn't like losing union jobs.

The theory of privatization is simple

enough: A governmental service needn't be performed by government employees. The governing body can take competitive bids and award the contract to the lowest bidder. A contractor who performs poorly is out next year.

The 1992 Republican national platform places privatization on a virtual throne.

"Privatization is an important alternative to higher taxes and reduced services. . . This is especially true of properties now decaying under government control, such as public housing, . . . airport operation and management" (pages 74-75).

The national Democratic platform skips privatization, but the Michigan Democratic platform bashes it hard.

"Privatization has become a Republican cure-all. Michigan Democrats don't believe all government services are better handled by private compa-

nies. Public employees are accountable to elected leaders and public taxpayers. We believe the people of Michigan deserve public control over programs and services that serve the public interest. We also believe that privatization risks the growth of private monopolies of service provision and huge private for-profit public service" (page 5).

(Note: "Profit" is still a dirty word in The Union's party.) We're going to hear much about pri-

vatzing government services in Michigan in the next few years, especially if Gov. John Engler's "Cut & Cap" property tax plan passes and the state has to reimburse local school districts \$1.3 billion a year with no tax hikes.

Let me suggest a few broad guidelines when the privatization alternative is discussed:

- Contracting out road maintenance, street sweeping, patching, trash collecting and building maintenance has been done for years. No problem.

- State parks, a public natural resource, shouldn't be privatized. A business has to generate cash flow to earn a profit. State parks are no place for hordes of vending machines, video games and chlorinated pools.

- We need to be extremely careful awarding contracts for social services because those contractors become a strident lobby for more social services. I saw it when Agnes Mansour was running Blanchard's Department of Social Services.

Education is ripe for all kinds of experimenting through privatization. Public education is absorbing a lot of tax money. Many private and church-related schools would like a cut of it. A jaundiced attitude is in order.

- Where private contractors perform essential services, their records need to be subject to the Freedom of Information Act, just like government records.

- The more privatization we have, the more we will need to require elected officials to list their private assets, business interests and receipt of gifts. Witness the shattering of public confidence in the Western Townships Utilities Authority, where contracts for pals were the order of the day.

DAYS OF Wine

Napa, Sonoma Valleys pick up for grape harvest

The end of summer is bittersweet in many parts of the world, but in California's wine country it's the most exciting time of the year.

The grape harvest, which gets under way in August, hits full tilt by September, with wineries shaking off their summer torpor and rushing to capture the flavor of the new vintage.

There's no better place to observe these annual rites than the Napa and Sonoma valleys, which lie next to one another about an hour north of San Francisco.

While Napa Valley can claim more wineries, more famous names and more glamour, Sonoma Valley has more rural charm, more history and equally wonderful wines.

Sonoma Valley, also known as the Valley of the Moon, includes the historic town of Sonoma, whose beautiful tree-shaded plaza was the site of both the last of old California's Franciscan missions and the 1846 Bear Flag Revolt, which marked the beginning of California's independence from Mexico.

To the north along Highway 12 are the even smaller towns of Kenwood and Glen Ellen.

On the other side of the Mayacamas mountain range the city of Napa is home to the majority of Napa Valley's people, but the vineyards and wineries are farther north, in and between Yountville, Oakville, Rutherford, St. Helena and Calistoga.

Since both places are popular destinations during harvest time, reservations are essential, particularly on weekends.

Events

The Valley of the Moon Vintage Festival, P.O. Box 652, Sonoma, Calif. 95476, (707-996-2109), takes place the weekend of Sept. 26 and 27 in the Sonoma Plaza.

The festival begins with the blessing of the new grapes and includes a parade, wine-tasting and food booths, music, marionettes and other entertainment, and a water fight between rival fire-fighting units. This year a special musical pageant (tickets, \$8) will dramatize the town's history.

The Sonoma Valley Shakespeare Festival at Gundlach Bundschu Winery, 2000 Denmark St., Sonoma, includes a performance of "Pericles" (Sept. 26). Tickets cost \$15 and performances begin at 6:30 p.m. The winery encourages audience

members to bring a picnic dinner and also sells wine and picnic items. For tickets and more information contact Odyssey Theater, P.O. Box 727, Sonoma, Calif. 95476, (707-996-2145).

Another winery, Buena Vista, 18000 Old Winery Road, will be the setting for the Sonoma Vintage Theater's production of "The Taming of the Shrew" Sept. 27. Tickets, \$10, and picnic-table seating in the winery's pretty courtyard encourages alfresco dining and dining before the play begins at 6 p.m.

The gate opens at 5 p.m. and tickets are available at the gate, or they may be ordered from Sonoma Vintage Theater, P.O. Box 312, Sonoma, Calif. 95476, (707-939-1369).

Sightseeing

Most wineries welcome visitors, although some smaller ones require an appointment, and many offer tours. Tastings are usually free on the Sonoma side of the mountains, while Napa wineries often charge a fee of \$2 to \$5.

A good general introduction to how wine is made is offered by the 45-minute tour at the Robert Mondavi Winery, 7801 St. Helena Highway, Oakville, (707-963-9611). The tour, including wine-tasting, is free, but it's wise to make an appointment.

The Sonoma Plaza would be worth a visit even if there were no wine in the vicinity. Picture-book pretty and surrounded by interesting shops and restaurants, it is central to the historic district and includes a monument marking the spot where the Bear Flag Revolt began. Across the street is a series of charming restorations that make up Sonoma State Historic Park, (707-938-1519).

The Mission San Francisco Solano de Sonoma at the north end of the plaza on the corner of First Street East and East Spain Street was built in 1824, the only California mission established under Mexican rather than Spanish rule. Alongside are the pueblo's barracks, which now house a small museum about Sonoma life in the mission era.

Also on Spain Street are the restored Toscano Hotel and, a short walk from the plaza, the elegant house and grounds of Gen. Mariano Vallejo, the town's Mexican commander. The sites are open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily and the admission fee of \$2 covers them all.

See Europe by car - your own

Some travelers go abroad to buy a new European-made automobile.

They may choose to buy a Volvo or Mercedes-Benz in Europe, drive it while on a vacation and then have it shipped back to the United States. This can be a cost-effective move.

"The biggest savings the consumer will realize is the elimination of the cost of a rental car for their vacation," says Nancy Nette, manager of Volvo's overseas Delivery Program.

Anyone who has recently rented a car in Europe knows it's common to be charged \$400 a week or more for a mid-size car. That price may not even include a country's value-added tax.

In France, for example, the value-added tax on car rentals is 18.6 percent. The rental price is usually higher if the driver requires an automatic transmission.

Secondly, European-made cars are cheaper in Europe. The discounts aren't as big as those of 10 or 15 years ago, when the dollar was

strong. But there is an immediate savings.

It can amount to between 10 percent and 15 percent off the U.S. list price for the same automobile.

But buyers who used to go to Munich to purchase a BMW model that was only available in Europe will now find that BMW and most other automakers no longer make different models for each side of the Atlantic.

Still, the idea of buying a car overseas appeals to many drivers, who have romantic images of speeding down the autobahn or crossing the Alps.

Volvo's Overseas Delivery Program is now 30 years old. In 1991, under the plan, 500 cars were sold at discounts of 12 percent to 16 percent off U.S. prices. Those sales are expected to climb in 1992, as the U.S. economy slowly improves.

Here's how Volvo's program works. A buyer goes to a local Volvo dealer to actually purchase a car, such as the popular 240 Wagon with an automatic transmission.

The base price is \$22,528 in the United States and \$19,070 in Sweden, which means a savings of \$3,458. (California must add \$125 for the car to meet the state's emission-control standards).

That price includes free ship-

ment to the United States from Gothenburg, Sweden, U.S. Customs Duty, home shipment and port-clearance fees.

BMW's European Delivery Program is similar to Volvo's, but the buyer pays duty on the car when it is brought back.

"The best reason to buy a BMW in Munich is to be able to drive your own car under European driving conditions," says Tom McGurn, a spokesman for BMW.

Prices are also lower: The 1992 BMW 318i sedan, the least-expensive model, is \$22,900 in the United States and \$20,400 in Germany. Local BMW dealers handle the sales.

Parole reform bill passes by large margin in Senate

The sponsor was state Sen. Michael Bouchard, but the parole board reform bill could have been named after serial killer Leslie Williams.

"We accomplished what we wanted with this bill," said Patrick Urban, father of Michelle and Melissa Urban, two of Williams' victims in Livingston County. "We wanted more people on the parole board, and we wanted to inject more accountability, and we've achieved that."

The Senate last week gave 32-4 approval of a joint House-Senate conference report that goes back to the House for approval.

It expands the parole board from seven members to 10; removes them from civil service and makes them appointees of the corrections director effective Oct. 1; sets tougher standards for parole; and requires convicts serving life terms to serve lengthy minimum sentences before being eligible for parole.

"A first step," said Bouchard, R-

Birmingham, a former police officer. The first-term senator is preparing a separate bill to make the parole board follow the Open Meetings Act. The Legislature in 1987 allowed it to hold closed meetings.

How they voted

Supporting the measure were Sens. Bouchard, Mat Dunaskiss, R-Lake Orion, Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills, Robert Geake, R-Northville, George Z. Hart, D-Deerborn, and David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield.

Missing the vote was William Faust, D-Westland.

Opposed were Jackie Vaughn III and David Holmes, both Detroit Democrats. "It cost more to incarcerate a person than to send them to Harvard, but now we are increasing that, we are keeping them longer," said Vaughn, pleading for senators to show "humanity."

Replied Bouchard: "It is actually more expensive to recycle those ca-

reer criminals back (into society) than if they were kept there." Pointing to the balcony to the Urbans and survivors of Cynthia Jones and Kami Villaneuva, Bouchard said, "It says crime doesn't pay. Victims do."

Sen. Virgil Smith, D-Detroit, supported the bill but said Williams "was a white man, and that's why he was released time and time and time again."

"I don't care whether they are African-American or white or green," replied Bouchard. "If they have committed a violent crime and there's a propensity for them to do that again, they should not get out."

Bouchard cited the cases of Tyrone Green, "who was paroled for a violent offense and on the same day committed two murders of two African-Americans and fled the state. Or Darine Page, who was paroled for armed robbery and while in the (Wayne) county jail murdered Sergeant Dickinson."



Try new techniques, simplify your cooking

I have been cooking for many more years than I like to contemplate. One thing that sets me apart from other cooks is that cooking is my form of expression.

It is not something I have to do, but instead is something I enjoy doing.

A few weeks back, guests were invited over for dinner and the comment was made that "I must have been cooking all day" to put out such a feast. Hardly.

As a matter of fact, I actually didn't know what I would prepare until I went to the grocery store at two in the afternoon knowing darn well that dinner had to be on the table no later than six.

Find shortcuts

It never fails to amaze me that people fret over what and how they cook. I am completely at ease trying new techniques, new recipes and new ideas. I am always looking for shortcuts and ways to simplify recipes. If I can get by using one pot, one spoon, one dish and just a fork, all the better.

I am pretty much bored, also, with the word gourmet. At the moment, "gourmet" is a very in word. In itself, the word translates to using every pot, every inch of counter space and in my estimation, at least two dishwasher loads to describe.

Yesterday, I made salsa with the abundance of tomatoes ripening from my garden. If I would have followed Diana Kennedy's "The Art of Mexican Cooking," I would have chopped, measured, diced, minced, stirred and whirled myself into a culinary frenzy.

Even Jeff Smith, the Frugal Gourmet, would also have had me blanching, seeding, roasting, peeling and using every bowl and pan amongst my kitchen repertoire.

Instead I chose to use their recipes as an outline, only to make sure I used the correct balance of ingredients.

I wasn't about to measure out two pounds of tomatoes. Nor was I even interested in roasting the peppers to remove what was purportedly a bitter skin.

Yes, I made salsa and I made it using only one knife, one cutting board and one Pyrex bowl.

Don't get me wrong here folks, there is a place and a time for spending hours in the kitchen making a mushroom demi glace or homemade phyllo dough but why, I ask does it entail knowing the correct humidity of how the moon is in relation to the planetary system.

I have made what I could call gourmet French toast using a \$4 non-stick skillet and Wonder Bread. Yes, I could have used a sourdough baguette, brown eggs at room temperature and a precise mixture of butter and olive oil, but there comes a time when simplicity is the best healer.

Easier methods

When I choose to eat, I want to eat — now! No additional amount of precise dicing and skimming will satiate my hunger any more.

I have, on many occasions, stirred in many a tiny can of mushroom sauce into a homemade gravy made with institutional soup base for a simply delicious pot of mashed potatoes and gravy.

I have ventured to the fish market for a perfect tiny rainbow trout only to dust it with a minor sprinkling of flour, a bit of melted Weight Watcher's margarine in a skillet and a splash of bottled lemon juice.

Good cooks have to know that there are often easier ways to do things than the traditional methods of haute cuisine.

Time savers

I can't afford haute cuisine simply because, as I am sure you will agree, much of the time I simply don't have the time.

Point in fact, yesterday I visited my local produce store. The stock by was unloading a fresh case of Michigan sweet corn and I just couldn't resist.

Knowing that the corn would have enjoyed being shucked and plopped into lightly salted boiling water, I opted instead to break off the rigid stem and simply remove about 10 of the outer leaves.

I threw the corn into the microwave and pressed a few buttons and within minutes, thoroughly enjoyed an afternoon respite of fresh steamed corn on the cob. It was so good it didn't need butter.

We're giving prices as a guideline, but do investigate because some shops have good deals currently. From Avignonesi at just under \$20, we recommend the 1988 Vino Nobile de Montepulciano and 1990 Rosso de Montepulciano (\$14). The latter is the younger sibling of the Vino Nobile, produced from younger vines.

Bottle the aging will not however transform it into a Vino Nobile. It's delicious now and ready to drink.



was a baker in Italy and Rina's family had an Italian restaurant in Detroit while she was growing up.

Maintaining ties to Italy is important to both families who still have close relatives living there. On the day of the interview for this story, John and Lina Del Signore were packing for a trip to Italy to visit their relatives. Their children have accompanied them on previous trips.

Adriano Tonon just returned from Italy with his son, Giancarlo, 8. Another son, Adrian, 20 who attends Michigan State University, has also visited Italy to meet his relatives.

"We send our children to Italy to keep up the language and tie to the family," said Rina.

Both restaurants serve dishes that were passed on to them by their parents and grandparents. Fonte D'Amore recently changed their menu to include more dishes from the Abruzzo region where John and Rina were born.

At Cafe Cortina, the new menu features dishes from northern Italy, where Adriano is from, with a touch of south where Rina's family is from.

"They say the Italians have a romance with food, and cooking is our art," said Rina Tonon.

In Italy, as in the U.S. more women are working, and there is less time to cook. Both Lina and Rina said Italians today are eating less meat, and more vegetables and pasta.

But it wasn't always that way. Rina, said she remembers huge Sunday dinners with lots of courses, at least two meats, to be shared with aunts, uncles and cousins. "There were always 18 or 20 of us," she said.

"On Sundays we'd wake up to the smell of garlic and onions frying in olive oil because the family was getting together for the afternoon. We would start eating at noon, and finish at 4 p.m. Then as now, we would eat our salad last."

Like the Del Signore, the Tonons say they treasure the time they gather with their family, and while the feasts might not be as lavish, they're always made with the freshest ingredients and cooked with love.

Innovative Tuscan wines challenge tradition

FOCUS ON WINE

French varietals or redesigned blends of classic Italian grapes. Consequently, Tuscany is considered by many to be Italy's most innovative wine region, attracting international attention to its designer vino da tavolas known as Super Tuscan.

Super Tuscan are usually aged in small French barrels. The reds are produced either from a 100 percent Italian varietal of heritage, or blended with cabernet-sauvignon, cabernet franc or merlot. The white wines generally include a majority of the non-traditional varietals such as chardonnay and sauvignon blanc.

At the La Selva Estate, in the Tuscan region of Montepulciano, Avignonesi grows non-traditional varietals including chardonnay, sauvignon blanc, riesling, merlot, cabernet sauvignon and pinot noir.

"It is our intention to follow tradition as long as we can produce interesting, well-priced wines that can be showcased in the great restaurants of the world," said Avignonesi's manager, Alberto Falvo.

"We have departed with tradition because it offered us a challenge. Tuscany is not renowned for white


wines, so it is important for us to demonstrate that we can grow grapes prized in other regions and make world-class wines."

While this is true, it remains a fact that the Super Tuscan are very pricey. The better buys (if you can say this about anything Italian these days) are the traditional wines. From Tuscany, you should sample more than chianti.

We're giving prices as a guideline, but do investigate because some shops have good deals currently. From Avignonesi at just under \$20, we recommend the 1988 VINO Nobile de Montepulciano and 1990 Rosso de Montepulciano (\$14). The latter is the younger sibling of the VINO Nobile, produced from younger vines.

Bottle aging will not however transform it into a VINO Nobile. It's delicious now and ready to drink.

At around \$9, Castello Banfi's 1989 Centine Rosso di Montalcino, commonly referred to as a "Baby

Brunello" is atop the best buy list. In the \$8 price category, Bolla wines are consistently well made and flavorful.

Italy's Piedmont region remains fairly traditional. Here the great Barolos and Barbarescos produced from the nebbiolo grape are expensive, but generally excellent. Still available from the exceptional 1985 vintage is B.D. Vaira Barolo, Bricco delle Viole Vineyard (\$34) with ex-

plosive, powerful palate fruit and rich finish.

Spanna and Gattinara, also produced from the nebbiolo grape, are better priced.

The good news from the Piedmont is that mainstay wines like Dolcetto and Barbera have been highly stylized by individual producers and provide interesting taste comparisons. To illustrate, we suggest pairing the 1991 Cordero di Monzese Dolcetto d'Alba

(\$13.50) and the 1991 Pio Cesare Dolcetto d'Alba (\$18). The Monzese has a soft palate impression with the imprint of blackberry flavors while the Pio Cesare shows intense berry fruit with palate richness and is a much bigger wine overall.

Two Barberas provide contrast potential. The 1987 B.D. Vaira Barbera d'Alba Riserva (\$28) sports intense, generous blackberry, chocolate, coffee and spice flavors with

broad but straightforward palate softness. On the other hand, the 1989 (an excellent vintage) Pio Cesare Barbera d'Alba (\$17) is rich and robust with palate heft and intense blackberry fruit lasting through a generous, complex finish. It's great now, but is a wine with cellaring potential from five to eight years.

To make the best food harmonize with Italian wines, there's one ele-

ment to remember. Lighter red wines are knocked out by rich tomato sauces. Match styles with heftier palate impressions and rich tomato sauces or red meat dishes. To illustrate this, pair the 1990 Ruffino

Aziano (a single-vineyard chianti classics) with veal, roast chicken, lightly spiced pastas and medium to rich cheeses then graciously accept the applause of those around your dinner table.

Rice salad perfect for tailgate picnics

RICE SALAD

Zest of one lemon, finely chopped
Juice of one lemon
2 cups diced raw fennel or celery
1 3-ounce jar non-pareil capers

1 cup frozen peas, thawed
2 6-ounce jars marinated artichokes and marinade
1 8-ounce jar roasted red and yellow peppers, sliced
5 cups cooked rice (well cooled)
Salt and pepper to taste
¼ cup light virgin olive oil
Combine ingredients in order and mix well. Serves 8.

SIMPLE SALSA

4 large tomatoes, chopped
1 medium onion, chopped
1 can chopped green chilies
2 Tablespoons jalapeno pepper, chopped
a healthy 1/2 of powdered cumin (about 1 Tablespoon)
a little olive oil (about 2 Tablespoons)
salt and pepper to taste

Combine all ingredients in a glass or non-reactive bowl. Mix well. Always better the next day.

GOURMET GRAVY

2 Tablespoons beef soup base
1 cup warm water
1 cup dry red wine
3 Tablespoons flour
¼ cup milk
1 small can mushroom sauce
pepper to taste

Dissolve the soup base in the warm water and wine. Heat until just about boiling. Stir flour into milk. Whisk into simmering broth, stirring constantly until thickened.

Handy tips save time in kitchen

Here's a couple of handy tips. To keep fruits and vegetables fresher longer in your refrigerator, line the vegetable bin with paper towels or dry sponges to absorb excess moisture.

Cooking cauliflower with a little milk can help them keep their bright white color.

When seasoning ground beef or turkey for loaves or burgers, lightly mix in the seasonings with two forks and gently shape. Too much handling toughens the meat.

Let roasted meats and poultry rest at room temperature for 15 minutes before carving to allow the meat to firm up and re-absorb its juices.

To make sweeter onion rings, soak freshly sliced onion in milk before battering and frying. When making meringue, make sure the eggs are room temperature and add a pinch of baking powder before beating.

Make a rich vegetable stock from carrots, celery, onions, parsnips, zucchini, tomatoes and seasonings. Freeze for delicious autumn soups.

New chili champ to represent state

Event proceeds were used to award ten \$1,000 scholarships to culinary arts students in Michigan.

Also participating in the cookoff were Jim Admaki, Redford, 1979 Michigan State Winner, Shawn Booth, Garden City, 1990 Saline Regional Winner, Kathleen Cummins, Charlie Robertson, Nick Roncone, and Mike Maiman, Birmingham; Mike Ford and Ed Pitt, Farmington Hill; Marilyn Fredrick, Redford, 1991 Saline Regional Winner, 1990 Ontario Winner, Ken Horn and Walt Hunter, Plymouth; Robert T. Jones, Westland; Bud Pickett, West Bloomfield; and Gary Ray, Livonia.

Here's the winning recipe.

JOE JONES CHAMPIONSHIP CHILI

3 pounds flank steak cut into cubes

1 pound ground round, fat free, ground once
1 pound lean pork, fat free, ground once
1 28-ounce can crushed tomatoes
1 28-ounce can tomato sauce
1 8-ounce can rotel (blender)
2 4-ounce cans green chilis (blender)

1 16-ounce can chicken broth
1 teaspoon hot chili powder
1 bulb garlic
1 green pepper (blender)
4 onions, Spanish
8 teaspoons chili powder, level
5 teaspoons cumin, level
salt and pepper
garlic, granular

Marinate steak in chili powder, cumin, salt, pepper, and granular garlic.

Marinate ground round and pork as above.

In fry pan, add a little chicken broth and cook part of meat until broth is gone, continue until meat is finished. Add meat to other pan. Put pan on stove with all ingredients, bring to a boil. Then reduce heat and simmer 2 1/2 hours. Adjust seasonings to taste.

Southwest dinner features pork chops

AP — No time to broil pork? Cooking pork by direct heat in a pan takes about half the time it takes to broil the same piece of meat. Just be sure to choose steaks and chops that are not much more than 1 inch thick.

Place the meat in a heavy skillet. If the meat is extremely lean, brush the pan with a little oil to prevent sticking. Cook over medium-high heat, turning occasionally and removing any fat from the pan as it accumulates during cooking. Frequent turning is recommended for even doneness and browning.

PUERCO ADOBO

One 12-ounce jar jalapeno peppers, undrained
4 teaspoons oregano
2 cloves garlic, crushed
2 teaspoons ground cumin
4 tablespoons cider vinegar
4 boneless pork loin chops (4 ounces each), about 1-inch thick
1 teaspoon oil

For marinade, combine peppers, oregano, garlic, cumin and vinegar in a blender container. Puree. Marinate chops in this mixture for 4 to 24 hours. Heat oil in large skillet; panbroil chops 5 minutes on each side. Test for doneness. Makes 4 servings.

To test for doneness: Gently press with a fingertip on the surface of the meat can reflect the degree of doneness: soft to the touch meat is rare, some resistance indicates medium and firm-to-the-touch is well done.

SOUTHWESTERN MUFFINS

1 cup flour
1 cup cornmeal
2 tablespoons sugar
4 teaspoons baking powder
¼ teaspoon cumin
¼ teaspoon salt
2 eggs, beaten
1 cup milk
4 tablespoons vegetable oil
One 8-ounce can corn kernels with red pepper, drained

Stir together the flour, cornmeal, sugar, baking powder, cumin and salt. Blend the eggs with the milk, vegetable oil and corn kernels. Combine flour mixture with the egg mixture, stirring just until moistened. Spoon batter into greased muffin pans, filling two-thirds full. Bake in a preheated 425-degree F oven for 12 to 14 minutes. Makes 12 muffins.

PEPPERED CARROT SALAD

4 large carrots
1 tablespoon olive oil
2 tablespoons white wine vinegar
1/2 teaspoon cracked black pepper
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
Salt to taste

Peel the carrots, cut into thin slices. Boil in 1 quart water about 2 minutes, until crisp-tender. Toss carrot sticks gently with 1 tablespoon olive oil, white wine vinegar, cracked black pepper, nutmeg and salt. Cover and refrigerate overnight, if desired. Serve cool or at room temperature. Makes 4 servings.

Bob Kaump recalled the time he and his age-50-plus teammates took the field for a softball game against younger men in a 35-and-over league.

"There was some chuckling as we walked up," he said. "But the chuckling changed to 'Hey, these guys can play some ball' by the time we got to the middle innings."

"We like playing against younger competition — and if we lose that's OK — because it gets us ready for our own age bracket. But we don't take it any less seriously."

National Trails, which includes Kaump and many other Observerland players, is one of 103 teams competing this week in the Senior Softball World Series at Canton Softball Center.

Teams from the United States and Canada will play for championships in six age groups: over-50, 55, 60, 65, 70 and (for the first time) 75.

The opening ceremonies take place Wednesday morning, and the games begin at 10 a.m. The finals are scheduled for 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Sunday. Each team

plays four games to determine seeding for the double-elimination tournament. Admission is free.

Ken Maas of Clinton Township, who helped organize the SSWS four years ago, has seen the event grow from 63 teams the first year in Greensboro, N.C., and the quality of competition get better as more players take up the game.

"What we're seeing are members of these ballclubs who are former minor leaguers and some who played in the Major Leagues," he said. "We have smart players and many have kept themselves in good playing condition."

"The caliber of ball will be surprising to those who haven't seen it. I know of one fella (Mel Trebble) who's 83 and plays a heckuva shortstop."

The Kids N Cubs from Florida, a team of octogenarians who have been the subject of features on national television, are entered in the 75-over bracket.

The team uniform of long white pants, white shirts and black bow ties distinguishes its members. One of its players, former Michigan resident

George (Buck) Bakewell, is the oldest in the World Series at 100.

Al Moran of Farmington Hills, the second baseman for National Trails and assistant baseball coach at Redford Catholic Central, is one of the many former pros. He was the starting shortstop for the New York Mets in the early 1960s.

"If we don't get hurt, we should do pretty well," Moran said, adding the team has had a lot of recent injuries. "Our chance of winning is just as good as six or seven others. We could play a possible 12 games in four or five days, and that's a lot of games for 50-and-over players."

National Trails is one of two Michigan teams in that age group, the other being Nothdruff Tool from Mount Clemens. They finished fourth and third, respectively, last year in West Palm Beach behind the hometown Florida Legends and Premiere Cruise Lines.

In its preliminary games, National Trails plays Vancouver at 5:30 p.m. and the Legends at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday. It plays the California Classics at 5 p.m. and the Rhode Island Colts at 6:30 p.m. Thursday.

"Some people scoff at this, but those who come out will see pretty good softball because there are very few bad teams in this," said Kaump, a Redford resident who teaches in Farmington.



Salem gridders rebound with 35-14 win

Plymouth Salem's football team demonstrated why the triple-option attack can be a nightmare for opposing defenses Friday night.

Quarterback Rob Kenney and fullback Andy Szydlowski teamed up to lead the Rocks in their 35-14 victory over visiting Walled Lake Central.

Kenney scored twice on option keepers resulting in runs of 74 and 42 yards and threw a 42-yard touchdown pass to Szydlowski, who also ran 18 yards for another Salem TD.

Kenney rushed for 146 yards on five carries, Szydlowski 103 on 13 attempts, as Salem outgained the Vikings 361-51 on the ground. Central got most of its 257 yards through the air in the second half.

"Our fullback started off having a good night, and they were taking the pitch away," Salem coach Tom Moshimer said. "We knew Kenney could run. All he needed was a little experience and some confidence, and I think he got that tonight."

"He threw the ball fairly well, and I thought he ran the offense extremely well."

The Rocks (2-1) did a reverse of the previous week when they trailed Farmington Hills Harrison 22-0 at halftime and built a big lead themselves against the Vikings, 21-0.

Salem didn't have a turnover, either — a complete turnaround from the previous game when they committed seven — and the field conditions (wet and muddy) were much worse.

"We got a couple big plays early, and it gave us some momentum," Moshimer said.

Salem scored the first time it had the ball. A 31-yard run by Brandon Walton and a face-mask penalty set up Szydlowski's TD run early in the first quarter.

Kenney's 17-yard pass to Scott Helmstadter on fourth-and-8 from the Central 21 led to Walton's 4-yard TD run midway in the second.

The Rocks scored again with a minute left in the half, driving 75 yards in five plays. Kenney threw a screen pass to Szydlowski in the right flat, and the stocky fullback turned up the right sideline, sidestepping a tackler at the 20.

The Vikings (1-2), forced to throw in the second half, had some success passing. Mike Gluski was 13-of-26 with two interceptions for 160 yards, Ken Shiller 2-of-3 for 46 yards.

"The field conditions hurt us psychologically, because our kids know we do better on a dry track," Central coach Darrell Harper said.

"We never got going offensively. They were more physical than us. They deserved to win. They outthrew us."

Gluski passed 12 yards to David Johnston for a TD on Central's first possession of the second half. But the Rocks needed five plays to score again and make the score 29-6.

Kenney kept the ball on the option, stepped inside of the defensive back on the slippery field and sprinted 74 yards for the score. He also ran for the two-point conversion.

"The fact we came back and scored right away was a real key, not because it put the game out of reach but it made it difficult for them to come back," Moshimer said. "I didn't feel safe, not with them throwing the ball around, until Kenney scored the last one."

On first down from the 42, Kenney dashed off another TD run, giving Salem a 35-6 lead with 7:12 remaining in the game.

"We work on (the quarterback keeper) all week; they just run it very well," Harper said. "We tell our players 'They're going to run the fullback and run the fullback' — and as soon as you cheat and come in they go with the quarterback."

Shiller passed 21 yards to Chris Kourtakis for Central's second TD late in the game. Roger Wilson gained 33 of 51 rushing yards for the Vikings. Kenney was 3-of-5 passing for 65 yards.

Warriors win 3rd at Canton expense





Youthful energy charges CMA Awards

CMA Awards founder Hall of Fame nominee

Country music is more popular than it's ever been, as is evident from runaway record sales and growing concert attendance. Younger performers and audiences have brought a higher energy level into the industry, and the Country Music Association shows its gratitude when *The 26th Annual CMA Awards* airs Wednesday, Sept. 30, on CBS.

The two-hour event, which originates from the Grand Ole Opry House in Nashville, Tenn., pairs returning host Reba McEntire with first-timer Vince Gill at the podium. Both are "Entertainer of the Year" nominees. Among the artists slated to perform at the ceremony are Mary-Chapin Carpenter, Alan Jackson and Trisha Yearwood.

The executive producer for the event, Irving Waugh, has been at the helm of the CMA Awards since its inception in 1967. With music

publisher Jack Stapp, Waugh persuaded NBC's Kraft Music Hall to televise the ceremony for the first time in 1968. Waugh, a visionary who was instrumental in the development of the Opryland entertainment complex and Nashville's first television station (WSM-TV), credits the burgeoning of country music to its increasing appeal to younger listeners.

"The Garth Brooks, for example, are bringing much younger audiences to country music," Waugh says. "I attended a Garth Brooks concert in Dallas, and I was amazed at the large percentage of teenagers."

Waugh also believes technological progress has widened the country-music audience. "This world of ours is not urban and rural anymore because of communications, because of television. We're closer to being one as far as taste."

Waugh calls on his showbiz savvy

when asked to name some of the hottest contenders in this year's awards show. "Travis Tritt (tied with Vince Gill for the lead in nominations with five each) has a tremendous youth appeal. Mary-Chapin Carpenter is a totally different artist but very attractive and writes some interesting material."

"A phenomenon, of course, is the Billy Ray Cyrus thing," Waugh continues. "Many people think he's just a flash in the pan, but many people thought Elvis (Presley) was a flash in the pan or that the Beatles wouldn't last. So I'd be slow to say that Billy Ray wouldn't be here next year."

Cyrus' megahit, "Achy Breaky Heart," which was composed by Don Von Tress, is nominated for three awards: Single of the Year, Music Video of the Year and Song of the Year. Though the song is a popular dance tune in country-music nightclubs, it is up against some tough competition in the last category, including Mary-Chapin Carpenter's "Down at the Twist & Shout," Travis Tritt's "Here's a Quarter (Call Someone Who Cares)" and "Don't Rock the Jukebox," penned by Alan Jackson, Roger Murrah and Keith Stegall.

Every third year of the Awards, the CMA Hall of Fame inducts a non-entertainer into its ranks. In 1992, Waugh is one of the five nominees for the honor. With a blend of modesty and pragmatism, Waugh, who is the namesake of the annual Irving Waugh Award of Excellence, observes that "There's one gal (Beverly Sills) against four old men, so my guess is the gal will get the award, which is fine."

Waugh, a man who mentions his wartime interview of Gen. Douglas MacArthur as one of the high points of his long and illustrious career, has a matter-of-fact attitude about his many achievements. "If you live long enough," Waugh says, "you have some highlights in your life."

'News for Kids' a head start in issue-sorting

They know how to trick the baby sitter into letting them stay up until midnight, and they even know about the birds and bees long before mom and dad get around to spilling the facts. But further from home, the world is much more difficult to conquer.

News for Kids, TBS' latest endeavor to help children understand the big picture, begins in syndication on Saturday, Sept. 26, then debuts on the cable superchannel the following day.

Pre-adolescents, who may have a faint grasp of worldwide headlines and indeed may not care, can enjoy cartoons for a few more years. But *News for Kids* intended audience of 10- to 13-year-olds, the "tween" crowd, should take note. Young students from around the country have been commissioned into action as bureau chiefs and correspondents.

Her crusade against the rampant commercialization of children's television is firmly established, and *News for Kids* seems a perfect showcase for presenting a positive alternative.

Hearts Afire

Washington, D.C. Ritter is a divorced father of two whose ex-wife has shackled up with her female therapist, while Post is a globe-trotting journalist who frequently mixes business with pleasure. She's also an outspoken feminist, but Bloodworth-Thomason's sympathies are such that she can find no better way to represent her character's irritating side than to make her a chain smoker, and irritating she certainly is.

Down on her luck, Post begs Ritter, a

top aide to an aged, out-of-fashion Southern senator (if you guess Strom Thurmond, you've got the picture), to hire her as a press assistant. Somehow, she and the elderly black woman (Beah Richards) who raised her end up living with him, too.

Also starring are Billy Bob Thornton as Ritter's good 'ol' boy best friend and co-worker and Beth Broderick as the senator's mistress, a bimbo with something to say for herself.

Though Bloodworth-Thomason calls Post and Ritter "the sexiest couple on television" and is eager to hurry their relationship along, there is a sleaziness to this nascent affair that makes the viewer something of a voyeur. But that's a quality that will hardly stand in the way of *Hearts Afire* becoming a hit.

Love and War (CBS) - ★★

Among the dozens of scenes of romantic seduction in this season's pilots, only one involves a discussion of safe sex. Susan Dey (*L.A. Law*, *The Partridge Family*) and Jay Thomas (*Murphy Brown*, *Murphy Brown*) play those cautious lovers in *Love and War*, a new Monday-night comedy from *Murphy Brown* creator Diane English.

A nimble comedian, Dey plays a just-divorced New York restaurateur who stumbles out of the courthouse and into a seedy bar that is a favorite of the city's journalists, including opinion columnist Thomas. Borrowing a stage device, English allows each to turn away from the action and tell the audience what they're thinking. By degrees, we see Dey and Thomas become attracted to one another - and consider the consequences. Future meetings are assured when Dey impulsively buys the bar, then hires the former owner (John Hancock) to manage it.

With superlative writing and a well-chosen cast, English makes falling in love the second time look much the best of all.

Tuesday

Class of '96 (Fox) - ★★

Fox intends to become a seven-night-

a-week network with the introduction of two light dramas, *Class of '96* and *Key West*, in late October.

Among this fall's pretty-faced ensemble shows, *Class of '96* stands out for its attempts to put substance in its characters' lives. Jason Gedrick (*Iron Eagle*, *Backdraft*) stars as David Morrissey, a kid from a working-class family whose love of ideas has led him to Ivy League Havenhurst College. His fellow freshmen include Brandon Douglas (*Ferris Bueller*), Lisa Dean Ryan (*Doogie Howser, M.D.*), Perry Moore (*For Richer, For Poorer*) and Gale Hansen, a 33-year-old former student of acting coach Sanford Meisner. To its discredit, fictional Havenhurst has only good-looking, non-geeky students, few blacks, and no Asians or Hispanics.

Class of '96 strives to have the writing of *thirtysomething*, but it has one of the stars instead. Series consultant Peter Horton is co-star and director of the pilot, which has more the feel of an intellectual journey than a mating dance - but only just barely. Producer Leonard Goldberg (*Family*) wants to show that "it's good to learn and it's okay to be smart," and, to a greater extent than most, he succeeds. His task now is to improve on that beginning.

English's second series
a hit not to miss

While some TV producers are fond of saying they're making "a little movie" every week, Diane English is not among these cultural effete. English, the award-winning creator of *Murphy Brown* and the target of election-year criticism for her characters' lack of "family values," is bringing a new comedy to CBS on Monday, Sept. 21.

But don't think of the premiere of English's *Love and War* as a TV show or even a movie. Think of it as an evening at the theater.

Set in Manhattan, *Love and War* has a Gershwin theme and the feel of a sophisticated, 1930s romantic comedy. It features Susan Dey as a just-divorced restaurateur and Jay Thomas as an opinion columnist and 42-year-old bachelor. Despite their differences and their mutual fear of new disappointments in romance, the pair begin to fall in love.


To give us a glimpse of her main characters' souls, English employs the common stage device of having them turn and speak to the audience — or in this case, the camera.

But besides such calculated theatrical elements, the one-hour premiere episode plays like a play because it was filmed that way — in one pass, with no time for retakes, extra camera angles or flubbed lines. The live-on-film effect was a child of necessity: After a 10-day rehearsal schedule and a day's delay due to union negotiations with the crew, the pilot had to be shot on the first evening of curfew during last spring's Los Angeles riots. Otherwise, English would have lost two of her actors — Dey and co-star Michael Nouri — to other commitments.

"At about two o'clock in the afternoon, the manager of the lot that we were shooting on came to us and said, 'We're evacuating the lot, and you must all go home.'"

"There was no way we could postpone. So Joel (Shukovsky, English's husband and co-producer) negotiated for us, and they allowed us to shoot our show, only one pass, at 4 p.m. At 6:30, everyone had to be in their cars going home."

Even their planned studio audience

was unavailable. But a tour bus of 40 teenagers (some with Super Soakers) turned away from *The Dennis Miller Show* was located in time.

"They weren't the people that we expected to respond to our show," English continues, "and yet we got a wonderful response from them."

Besides Thomas' Jack Stein and Dey's Wally Porter, the cast includes Suzie Plakson as Meg, an acerbic sports writer; John Hancock as Ike, the owner of journalists' watering hole The Blue Shamrock; Joel Murray as a sanitation worker who feels at home in the seedy hangout; and Nouri as Dey's ex-husband, a narcissistic actor. Future episodes will include Joanna Gleason as a suburban housewife hired as a Blue Shamrock waitress.

"So we went ahead. There's some bouncy camera work here and there that we'll live with. But we kind of considered it a small miracle and are looking forward to going on from there."

"From there" includes the development of both the romance and The Blue Shamrock, which Wally buys on a kind of self-imposed dare to prove to herself and the world that she's still a success. (Her first place, Chez Wally, had to be sold in the divorce settlement.)

With top-notch writing and acting, and a premium Monday-night time slot, *Love and War*, Wally and Jack and The Blue Shamrock should all be long-running hits.

Balfour followed acting dream early

Fifteen-year-old Eric Balfour is definitely stage-struck. But at an age when many would-be actors are trying out for the school musical, Balfour is hoping his network series will get renewed for midseason.

The son of a chiropractor, Balfour got his first taste of theater when his mother took him to a touring production of *Cats*. By the time he was in fifth grade, he had won a part in a school production of *Uncle Tom's Cabin*. These days, he takes acting, singing and dancing lessons four afternoons a week.

This spring, after several seasons on the children's variety show *Kids, Inc.*, Balfour decided to take a chance on an ABC summer comedy, *Arresting Behavior*. The seven-episode series, airing Wednesdays, is shot with a hand-held camera, giving it the feel of a home movie. It focuses on a middle-age policeman (Leo Burmeister), his colleagues and his family. Balfour plays Burmeister's son, Billy. Evidently, the two actors have formed an off-screen bond as well: In typical teen parlance, Balfour calls Burmeister "the coolest guy."

While the crime-fighting scenes usually involve over-the-edge behavior by the officers, Balfour's young character is frequently getting into jams of the adolescent kind.

"He's kind of a moody kid," Balfour notes, "and gets into a lot of trouble — he's very self-conscious."

Hercules no kin to Superman; looking for a moving Van?

Q: Could you please tell me if Christopher Reeves (sic), who plays Superman in all the movies, is any kin to George Reeves, who played Superman in the television series The Adventures of Superman? —Michelle Strickland, Benton, Ark.

A: Superman is quite a topic of interest among the readers of this column, including Shirley Baldasaro of Claremont, N.H., and Ginger Lowe of Oakley, Idaho, and I will attempt to answer all your questions.

The most recent *Superman* movies starred Christopher Reeve, therefore making his relation to George Reeves not only unlikely, but untrue. A few readers have even wondered if the modern Man of Steel is related to Steve Reeves, who many also mistakenly believe played Superman. Steve Reeves is an actor best known for his portrayal of another strongman, Hercules.

George Reeves did star in *The Adventures of Superman*, which made him a big star, and, perhaps at the same time, hopelessly typecast him to the point that no one would accept him in any other role. Though he had appeared in great films like *Gone With the Wind*, *Rancho Notorious* and *From Here to Eternity*, the trauma of being forever identified with a cartoon character supposedly led to his suicide in 1959. Singer/songwriter Don McLean ("American Pie") has begun a personal vigil in an attempt to prove Reeves did not kill himself and may have been murdered. He's also written a song on the subject.

Q: I really like the voice of the Crypt-Keeper on Tales From the Crypt. Can you tell me his name and address so I can write him a letter? —Rachel Boyer, Condon, Ore.

A: Designed by ghoulish guru Kevin Yagher, the caustic Crypt-Keeper, who opens each segment of the popular HBO anthology series, is voiced by John Kassir. You may write to Kassir in care of The Gersh Agency, 232 Canon Drive, Beverly Hills, Calif., 90210.

Q: I am a great fan of all Westerns and have on videotape over 500 movies,

but only four of my favorite Western actor, Clint Walker. I know he made more than those four movies, and that is why I am asking how I can write to Mr. Walker and ask him what other movies he made. —Tony Gaik, Sedona, Ariz.

A: Walker is best known for his title role in the TV Western series *Cheyenne*, a part he reprised in the 1991 miniseries *The Gambler Returns: The Luck of the Draw*. A list of his film credits includes: *Fort Dobbs* (1958), *Yellowstone Kelly* (1959), *The Night of the Grizzly* (1966), *The Dirty Dozen* (1967), *Yuma* (1970), *The Bounty Man* (1972), *Pancho Villa* (1972), *Snowbeast* (1977) and *White Buffalo* (1977). I'm sure you'll still want to write Walker, and you may do so in care of First Artists Agency, 10000 Riverside Dr., Ste. 6, Toluca Lake, Calif., 91602.

Q: Can you please tell me the name of a movie with Van Johnson and Jane Wyman (I think)? He goes off to war and dies holding a medallion that she gave him. He comes back (from the dead) to see her, but no one believes her until they see she has the medallion in her hand. —Brandy Rice, Carthage, Texas.

A: The picture of which you write is 1956's *Miracle in the Rain*. Incidentally, bridging the hereafter must have been a favorite theme of Johnson's. He played in the similarly moving films *The End of the Affair* and *A Guy Named Joe*, the latter of which was remade in 1989 as *Always*.



Grant's latest character is a far cry from the sleazy guys he played in the past, and he equates the new role with a Clint Eastwood-type of character.

No dry remarks here. Adding to *Murphy Brown*'s recent Emmy win, the show's "On the Rocks" episode has won the 1992 Scott Newman Drug Abuse Prevention Award for best comedy program.

Super Bowl of tennis or net gain of \$500,000?

The court is in session — the tennis court, that is. On Friday, Sept. 25, the two winningest tennis players in the history of the game will play each other in a contest dubbed the "Duel of the Decade." Martina Navratilova will face Jimmy Connors in a three-set match at Caesar's Palace in Las Vegas, with the winner to take home \$500,000.

Promoters are calling this event the "Battle of the Champions." In 1973, the match between tennis champ Billy Jean King and male chauvinist Bobby Riggs was given the title "Battle of the Sexes," and rightfully so. King was out to prove a point — that a woman could defeat a man in athletic competition. Her match against Riggs held great significance for women, and, from the moment she trounced Riggs, men had to think twice before making a disparaging remark about female athletes.

One has to wonder about the significance of the Connors-Navratilova match. If Connors does beat Navratilova, will women lose respect in the athletic world? Not likely. Her winning record alone should guarantee her place in tennis history. By the same token, Connors' record as the winningest male to play the game should not be overshadowed by a Sept. 25 loss.

Times have changed. Motivations have changed. In 1973, the motivation was proving the point that female athletes were a force to be dealt with. The motivation this time seems to be money.
