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Schools cleared in child's death

A suit charging the Plymouth Canton schools with negligence in the hanging death of a second grader has been dismissed.

Wayne County Circuit Judge Samuel

Turner on Monday granted the schools' motion for summary disposition in the Stephen Nalepa lawsuit, agreeing with the district that the schools were not guilty of gross negligence in the March 24, 1990 death.

Stephen Nalepa, 8, was found hanging by a belt from his loft in his Canton Township home. The previous day, Stephen and his classmates viewed "Nobody's Useless," a film about a handicapped boy who eventually decides life is worth living after trying to take his own life.

The movie character first attempts to kill himself by jumping off a bridge, then by hanging himself with a belt.

Mary Katherine Norton, attorney for Stephen and Deborah Nalepa, said she and co-counsel Barry Wald-

man will appeal.

"We believe the opinion is wrong, and we will be filing an appeal," Norton said.

Plymouth-Canton Superintendent John Hoben said he received word of the ruling, but declined to comment until he reviews the case.

Plaintiffs in the suit include Hoben, the school board, and Gallimore Elementary Principal Joyce Reeder Deren, and school staffers

Persistent rainfall puts damper on crucial roadwork until spring

Blame it on the weather. The long anticipated improvements of the congested Warren-Sheldon roads intersection are now on hold for spring.

"If the temperature dips even below 40 degrees we need winter protection for the concrete. As it is, it (rain) hasn't let up long enough to dry," said Tom Casari, township engineer.

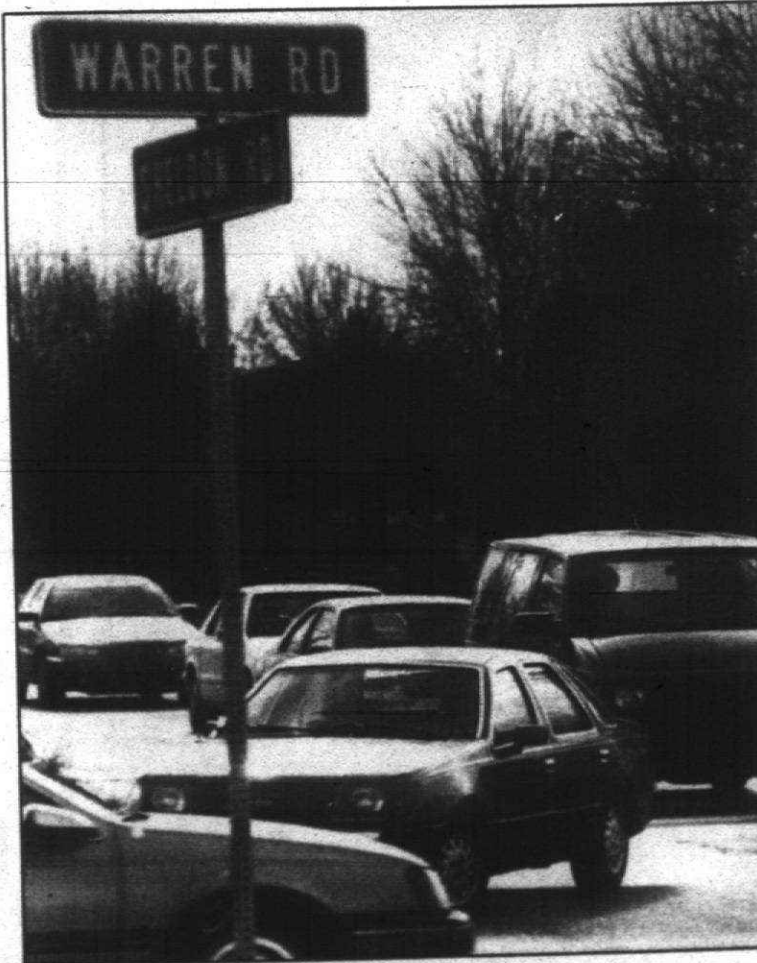
Neighborhoods in the Warren-Sheldon area were notified of the start of the project not too long ago. The decision to delay the project came with the increasingly poor weather, particularly heavy rains. If the project was started but couldn't be finished enough to allow for traffic, there'd be a real mess, Casari said.

Improvements include the widening of all four legs of the intersection. Each leg of the intersection will have a center left turn, a right turn and a through lane. "It will be a four-lane intersection in each direction," Casari said.

The decision to do something with the intersection came as a result of a 1988 traffic study, staff observation of problems, including accidents and long delays at the lights, as well as resident complaints. It's believed that the paving of the eastern boundary of Warren Road added to the traffic volumes on Warren, leading to Sheldon Road, Casari said.

Wayne County, which has juris-

Brawling bear returns

Ceaser is returning.

That's Ceaser the wrestling bear, whose presence in the Urban Cowboy Saloon in Canton earlier this year got the dander up on animal rights activists. As with last summer, however,

activists will be invited to watch WXYZ-TV 7 sportscaster Don Shane — "Dare Don" — wrestle the 1,200 pound black bear for charity.

Ceaser will make his return appearance at 8 p.m. Thursday at the saloon, 39940 Ford Road, one-quarter mile east of I-275. The national television show, "A Current Affair" also will be taping the event live.

"I assume there will be some controversy but not like there was last time," said bar manager Roy Jean. "People who were involved with animal activist groups were invited and they said they found no cruelty. It was done tastefully."

Sherry Silk, director of operations for the Michigan Humane Society, attended last summer's bear wrestling. "There was no cruelty. The bear is in excellent shape. We don't like any animal used for entertainment purposes. We don't like it just like we don't like rodeos." But there are no laws on the books now to prevent this type of event, Silk added.

Ceaser is the descendant of a line of wrestling bears. His cub, in fact, travels with him around the country, accompanied by trainer Sam Mazola of Ohio, who has a bear handling license, Jean said.

"He is a totally tame bear," Jean said. "This gives people a chance to come out. When people think of a bear, they go, 'wow.' But the last time the bear came he took a peppermint out of my daughter's mouth."

Ceaser, who stands at 7-feet, 6-inches tall, has not been defanged or declawed. Training is what allows Ceaser to do the things he does — gently. Jean will award a cash prize to anyone who can pin Ceaser. Patrons, both men and women, are welcome to try their luck with the bear. The wrestling matches will be held inside the bar. Wrestling mats will be rolled out for the event. And the bear's trainer will be on hand, Jean said.

Jean also has contacted the Detroit Drive about attending the event and taking their chances with Ceaser. Some Detroit Lions players also might be on hand.

"This bear is treated like a human being," Jean said. He travels in an air-conditioned trailer. And a muzzle is not used.

Goodbye Bob

Bob Suggs has already left the community, but that wasn't enough reason for Canton trustees not to say a formal goodbye to the longtime chairman of the building authority.

"We salute Bob for his years of contribution to the community," said township supervisor Tom Yack.

Trustees adopted a resolution honoring Suggs' work not only on the building authority since its inception in 1978 but also as a part-time recreation director.

"Bob also will go down in history as the last constable in Canton," Yack added.

Suggs has moved to Idlewild, Mich.

Jacqueline Hisey, William O'Connor, Ann Wood-Alatolo, Jane Armstrong, Norma Foster, and Alice Brown.

In the opinion issued last week, Turner held that the schools were not negligent.

The judge said the Nalepas allege that the schools breached a duty to exercise due care in failing to screen the film "Nobody's Useless," an action which led to imitative conduct resulting in the minor's death.

"The defendants submit that they are not beholden to any duties such as those alleged by the plaintiff," wrote Turner, "and the free speech clause of the U.S. Constitution enjoins the type of action sought to be maintained. Although the defendant owed the decedent the duty of reasonable care, as a matter of law, that duty did not include an obligation to view and thereafter decline to exhibit the subject film based on the contingency that a student might resultingly commit suicide."

"The court finds that the result that in fact occurred (i.e. the suicide), was not as a matter of law, foreseeable."

The school district and court are characterizing Stephen's death as a suicide. Canton police and the Wayne County Medical Examiner's Office, however, said the cause of death was undetermined, and that it wasn't possible to say whether it was suicide or an accident.

A New York medical doctor called as an expert witness said that Stephen "at his age, was not able to form the intent to commit suicide. His death resulted from a foreseeable act of imitation."

Stephen Nalepa's death isn't the first incident involving "Nobody's Useless" at Gallimore Elementary School.

A Canton woman recently testified that her son, who attended Gallimore from 1983-88, tried to kill himself after watching "Nobody's Useless" while a student at the elementary school.

Shortly after he saw the movie, "my daughter telephoned me at work and said that my son had just tried to kill himself by climbing on top of a freezer in the basement, tying a noose around his neck and pretending to jump," she testified.

"When I came home and asked why he had done this, he said because the boy did it in the movie he'd seen at school."

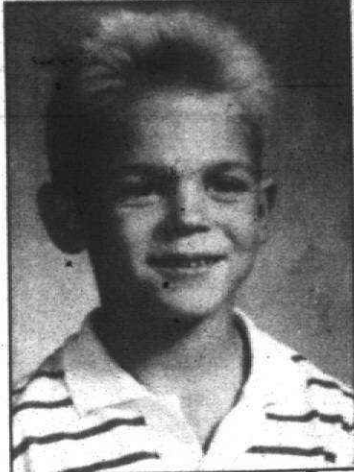
The woman said she went to Gallimore and told Principal Joyce Deren what had happened.

"Mrs. Deren said that my son's actions could not possibly be connected to the movie, and she said I was making far too much of the situation," she testified.

"Mrs. Deren further said that the school board believed 'Nobody's Useless' was an excellent film."

Another issue involving the Nalepa case already has made its way to the Michigan Court of Appeals, where it is pending.

Turner agreed with the Nalepas' attorneys, ruling that Plymouth-Canton school administrators and school board members are not entitled to governmental immunity in the suit. The district's attorneys have appealed the ruling.

dition over the township's public roads, also agreed to the need for improvements at the intersection. But the agreement doesn't mean it'll be paying for it, or helping pay for it.

The approximately \$750,000 cost will be paid for by the township, whose trustees have already budgeted the money over a couple of years. The county, however, will be putting a cap on the paving north and south of the intersection.

When the project starts in the spring, it will be completed in two phases. The northwest and southeast corners will be worked on first with right turn lanes. The northeast and southwest corners will be next.

"That way the intersection will remain open," Casari said.

An added bonus for the inter-

section will be work on 12 township-owned acres on the northwest corner of the intersection.

The township is allowing developers to replace or mitigate wetlands from other projects on the site. Developers will pay the cost of mitigation. The swampy area or wetland will be surrounded by a berm. Paths, perhaps of woodchips, will be featured, as well as

picnic tables.

"It will be a real nice area when it's done," Casari said.

Not too far from the Warren-Sheldon intersection, construction crews are finishing up the paving of Haggerty Road, north of Koppernick, as well as the straightening of the Haggerty-Joy Road intersection, which will eliminate the traffic jog there. The roadway should be open to traffic soon. A special assessment district of the commercial and industrial facilities in the Haggerty Road area is paying for the project.

On the other side of the township, developers are paying 100 percent for the paving of Warren Road, a little more than half-way between Beck and Ridge roads by the Buckingham Place and Royal Pointe residential developments.

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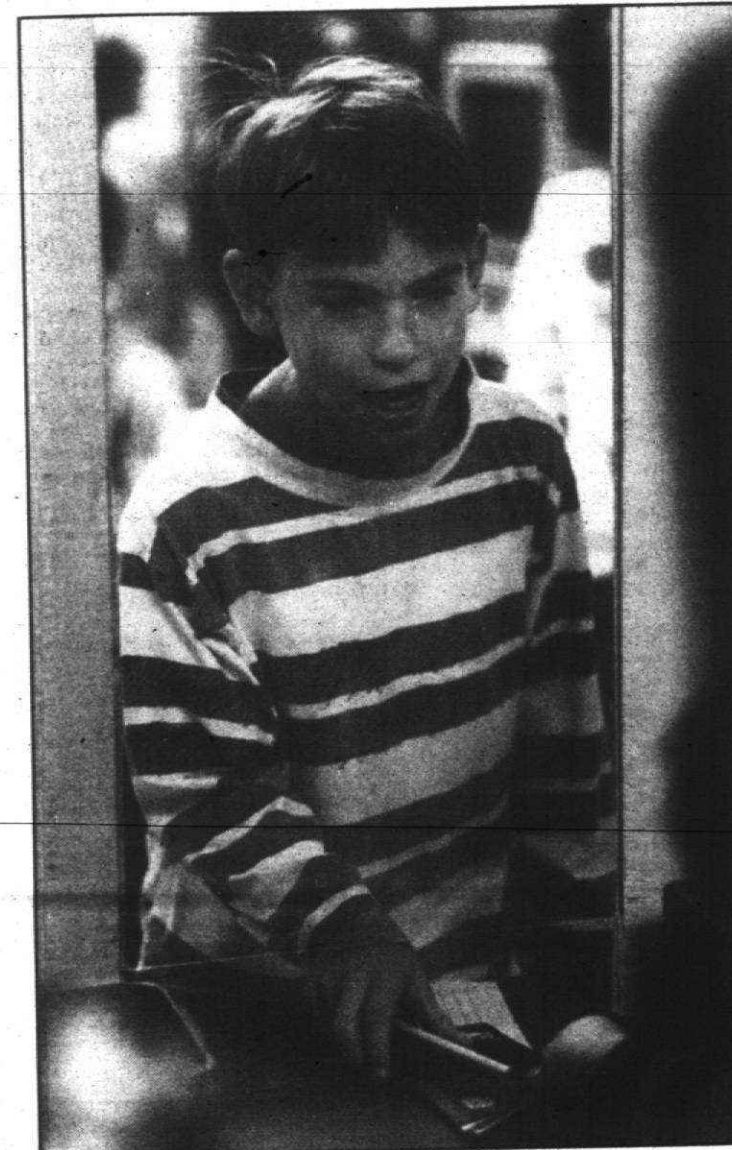

Water stink? Taste funny? The weather strikes again

No need to worry. There is a reason why your tap water has been smelling and tasting a bit different lately.

"There are no contaminants in the water," said Karl Gorham, supervisor of Canton's water department.

Temperature inversion is the culprit. Mix that with a strong wind and the water takes on a new personality.

What happened is that the top

level of water in Lake St. Clair — the source for Detroit's water — flip-flopped with the cooler water on the bottom. "This happens in the fall," Gorham said.

Added to that natural phenomenon was a storm in the area with strong easterly winds, which pushed the water into Detroit's intake system. "This will happen only every 10 years or so and it has to do with the wind and the

change in the lake," Gorham said.

Canton's water department got only about five complaints, all on the same day and from the same area. The smell and bad taste are more noticeable when the tap water is hot. In the shower, for example, the steam also will make the smell more noticeable, Gorham added.

To fix the problem, Detroit put the water supply through activated charcoal filters. "The carbon gets rid of the odor," Gorham added.

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Schools spare 17-acre mature forest — for now

Plymouth Township residents' efforts to save a climax beech and maple forest from developers' bulldozers received a shot in the arm Monday night with action taken by the Plymouth-Canton school board.

The board agreed to delay until February the disposition of the site. The district put the 17 acres, adjacent to Plymouth Township Park, on the market after it determined it wouldn't be needed for a new school. The Selective Group of Farmington Hills made a bid on the property.

In the wooded seven acres are trees up to 200 years old. "I'm pleased the folks interested in the land are speaking with

the township," said trustee David Arley. "There are a lot of issues involved — woods, open space and the developer. I'm pleased we're going to pass this and give them time to take a good hard look at this."

Agreed school board member Dean Swartzwelder: "It's important that the newly-elected Plymouth Township officials review this and how the property fits in to their long-term zoning. The land can only be used in a manner consistent with how the township zones it. This will give them time to hear citizens' input."

Dr. Ann LaFond is one of the homeowners concerned about preserving the woods. She pointed out that the township is, in the view of many, entitled to a discount on the land since it was

Plymouth Township taxpayers' money in part that purchased the land more than 30 years ago. Plymouth Township tax revenue accounts for 39 percent of the school district's state equalized valuation. The district includes part or all of six communities.

While the purchase price was much less than the selling price will be, "Plymouth Township taxpayers put money in at that time. Whatever money came back would be appreciated," said LaFond.

"The question is why should people pay again, when they paid for it before?" Trustees Carl Battishill and Dean Swartzwelder opposed the discount. "We are supporting residents in

their effort of have the township buy the land, but I don't support a 39-percent discount on this property," said Battishill. "I'm troubled by a philosophy that says, 'This is mine, we are going to keep this for ourselves.'"

"That moves us further away from bringing our communities together. We have an obligation to those resources. We need to consider what the costs are to the entire district."

Swartzwelder said, "As far as I'm concerned, when money comes into the district, it should lose its identity as to where it came from."

LaFond said none of the homeowners are trying to make a split off division in the Plymouth-Canton school community. "It's not the purpose at all," she said.

Trustee Jack Farrow disagreed with Battishill and Swartzwelder. "The money that bought that land originally came from taxpayers of this community, and it's jointly owned by all taxpayers. In a sense, Plymouth Township taxpayers put up at least a portion, so in a sense, it's partly theirs," Farrow said. "They paid for it. When we go to sell it back to them, that should be taken into consideration."

Appraisals ranging from \$585,000 to \$890,000 have been made, varying with the number of single family homes that would be built on the parcel between Ann Arbor Trail and North Territorial off McClumpha Road.

The district has not decided on an asking price. The township, which has the right of first refusal, hasn't yet made an offer on the property, said school board president Roland Thomas.

Trustee Barbara Graham advised finding a practical solution. "There is a need for kids in the community to have open space to enjoy. We have a lot of school property, but official uses of it prohibit them from using it any time they want to. I would like to see the residents of the community stand to benefit from this as best we can arrange."

Thomas said, "The monies that bought that site were those of the whole district. The funds from the sale must be put back into the school coffers for school expansion of one type or another."

Police believe death was accident

A 64-year-old Westland man died Friday morning when he apparently fell on his revolver, which discharged into his chest, Westland police said.

Police don't suspect foul play or suicide, Detective Sgt. Marc Stobbe said.

Vernon Elam, 64, died sometime between 8 and 11 a.m. when he apparently went to his van to get his .38 revolver. Stobbe said. The van was parked in the garage of Elam's residence at 34000 block of Hazelwood, between

Wayne and Wildwood.

Elam was home alone at the time. His wife left home earlier Friday morning to take their child to school, and she had not yet returned, Stobbe said.

Elam was found by his wife when she returned home later, Stobbe said. The wife telephoned for help, but Elam was already dead when emergency personnel arrived on the scene.

"It appears he fell on the gun," Stobbe said. "It appears the gun discharged."

Elam died of a single gunshot wound to the chest, police said.

Stobbe said Elam had not given any indications he might commit suicide, nor were there any known disputes with possible enemies.

"It looks like it (the shooting) was accidental," Stobbe said.

The sergeant said his preliminary investigation revealed that Elam was very well-liked in the neighborhood. "He was a good neighbor."

During an investigation, Stobbe had conversations with family members and those in the neighborhood who knew Elam.

Based on those conversations, Stobbe concluded, "This was a great family."

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New OU president started as high school art teacher

She began her career as a high school art teacher. Now she's out to paint a bright portrait of Oakland University — one that will attract more local attention.

Sandra Packard, 50, was inaugurated as the fourth president of the Rochester Hills-based university last Friday, has been surprised to find that the school's national reputation seems to have bypassed the local area. "In the region, we're not as well known."

In recent talks to Oakland County officials and corporate executives, she told them about "what I regard as their university. I don't think we have done a very good job of telling our story. I want to open us up and have them know they can access what we have."

Her journey from art teacher to president of a public university of

about 12,500 students seems unlikely, if judged by traditional academic progressions. But in her mind it's not startling because "Things I had been doing were actually administration. And I liked doing those things."

Some of those include perpetuation of art therapy programs, chairing faculty research committees and beginning a national women in art organization.

"Even as a 10-year-old, I met a little boy with cancer who died. I organized a neighborhood carnival and we raised \$124 for cancer research."

Although she was picked as a prestigious ACE (American College of Education) Fellow — considered a training ground for college presidents — she said she had no long-range goal to be one.

That became her goal — "the day I learned I was getting this position."

Packard has put in six days a week, 16 hours a day in her first months on the job. That, she acknowledges, has been hard on her husband, Martin, who is in the midst of setting up his clinical psychology practice in downtown Rochester.

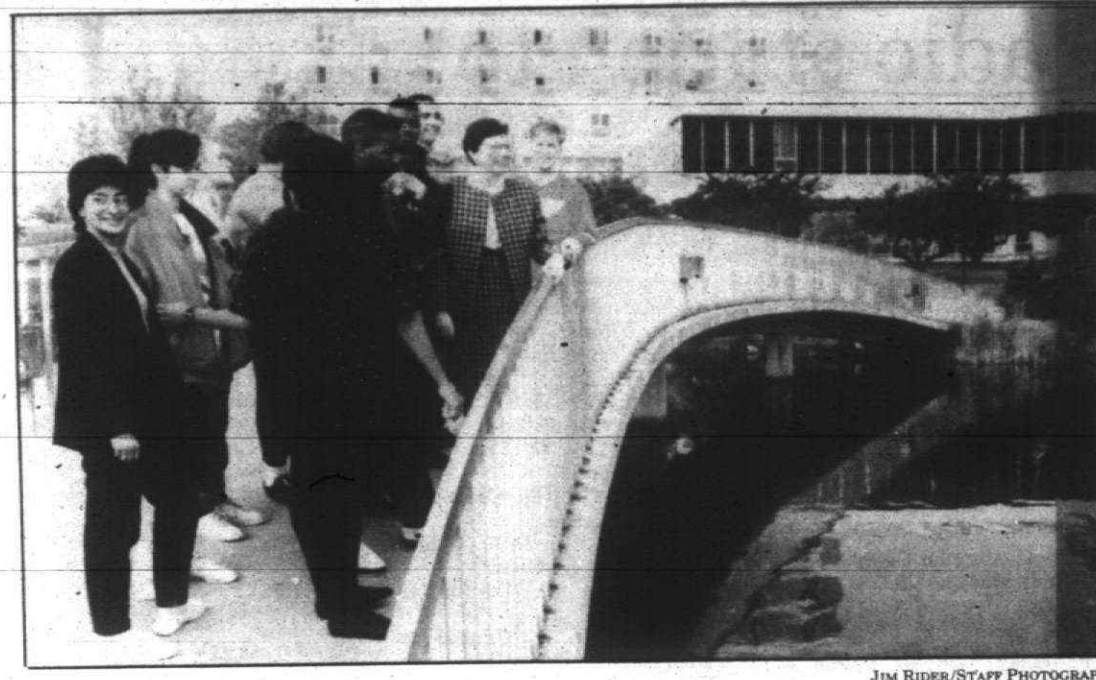
"He misses my company. If he's got a cold and needs TLC, I'm not there."

The up side is that he has had time to take advantage of Oakland University's health institute. "He's lost at least 18 pounds," she said.

Her first priority

Packard's first priority has been to meet people. "I've been spending my energies getting to

know people in the region and the university as a whole.

Her office door is open to the public on Friday afternoons and as she walks the campus, it's obvious that both faculty and students know who she is. And they aren't shy about telling her their concerns, ranging from a tight campus parking situation to dormitory food.

In this regard, she counts being a woman, indeed OU's first woman president, as an asset. "People might be a little less scared of a woman president. The title can be a barrier to getting the job done and having people be honest with you."

She turns the traditional roles of women as nurturers and homemakers into positives.

"I have a certain nurturing part of me. A university has to care about the people who teach and learn here. They have to make sure it is a humane and a safe place. I've been a mother."

Of her daughters, Dawn, 23, is a seasonal park ranger in Boulder, Colo., where she graduated from college, while Shana, 21, is a senior psychology major at the University of Kentucky.

A "purebred mutt," Leo, rounds out the family, and is "the son my husband never had."

However, Leo must reside in the unheated dog room attached to Sunset Terrace — the president's official residence — because "I'm allergic."

She says she's also very sensitive to the way the campus looks. "We just painted our weight room. I told the maintenance crew. You have to remember I've been a homemaker. I'm going to be a nitpicker."

In fact, the campus at the University of Tennessee/Chattanooga, where she was provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs, looks somewhat neater, she says. "Our students in Tennessee come to school a little more formal in going to school."

But, in OU's favor, "We don't have the same kind of problems with alcohol (as U-T)." She is pleased with OU's "wellness dorm" which offers students smoke, alcohol and drug-free rooms — and where there is more demand than space.

"College is a place where students need to learn their limits."

Organization seeks cowboys

Heifer Project International, a non-profit international development organization, is trying to locate thousands of "cowboys."

The organization wants to find 7,000 men (and a few dozen women) who accompanied livestock on ocean freighters destined for war-ravaged developing countries in the 1940s and 1950s.

Heifer Project International was founded in 1944 by a church relief worker named Dan West. As he doled out cups of powdered milk to hungry refugees from the Spanish Civil War, he realized that a more sustainable solution — the gift of a food source rather than food stuff — would preserve the dignity and work ethic of the recipients. That idea was the birth of a process and a philosophy of development: "Not a cup but a cow."

West also decided that each family receiving an animal would be asked to "pass on the gift" by giving the first offspring to another needy family, thus continuing a chain of giving.

Over the years, both the name of the game and the game plan have remained steadfast while heifers have been joined by livestock such as goats, yaks, pigs, rabbits and sheep.

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McNamara vetoes county budget

The Wayne County Commission is expected to decide Wednesday if it will override all or any of Executive Edward McNamara's vetoes in the 1993 budget or simply live with them.

Using his line-item-veto power, McNamara crossed out several things the commission wants to spend money on. (The commission could vote to override any or all of the vetoes.)

As submitted by McNamara by the commission, the 1993 general fund budget (about \$315 million) was \$1.8 million in the red.

The new fiscal year begins Dec. 1.

McNamara's main complaint is that the commission wants to increase its personal budget by more than \$700,000 to \$6.9 million.

In a written veto statement dated Nov. 6, McNamara said, "Given the nearly \$3 million increases the commission has voted into its own budget in the last five years, nearly doubling (its) budget, and knowing the fiscal problems the county faces with the property tax freeze issue this year, this is an impossible appropriation."

McNamara also has a problem with the commission's desire to add about \$300,000 to the auditor general's budget. "While we have

little quarrel with the auditor general's function, it seems (that) each year funds for staff in (that) division go unspent and the commission relocates those funds to cover overruns in other commission activities," he wrote.

The commission also wants to add about \$1 million to the budget in other areas. McNamara crossed out these items, too.

If the commission still wants to spend that extra money, he said in the veto statement, it should do so by eliminating the proposed increase to the commission's personal budget.

Bets are off

Commissioner Bryan Amann, D-Canton, who opposed the commission's budget adjustments, said he's glad McNamara vetoed the budget. Amann doesn't believe commission Chairman Arthur Blackwell can get the 10 votes he needs to override the vetoes, but "as unpredictable as the commission has been, it's not safe to bet on any outcome."

Deputy executive Michael Duggan said he doesn't believe there are enough votes on the commission to override any of McNamara's vetoes.

Commissioners Kevin Kelley, D-Redford, Edward Bolke and Amann were alone in their opposition to the out-of-balance budget when it was passed in late October.

Commissioner Kay Beard, D-Westland, voted for the budget along with the seven commissioners from Detroit and Susan Hubbard, D-Dearborn.

Beard, Hubbard and Blackwell did not return the Observer's phone calls by press time.

Not so fast

McNamara also opposes the commission's desire to take \$1.4 million from the \$11 million foster care fund. The commission wants to use that money to increase spending in other areas.

The money currently in the foster care fund is supposed to be saved in case the state court of appeals reverses an Oct. 23 ruling by Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Richard Kaufman. Kaufman said that the state should pay for foster care in Wayne County, but the state appealed. Duggan called Kaufman's decision "the first ruling in a case that's likely to go on for years."

Regarding the commission's desire to spend some of that foster care money, Duggan said, "It's not responsible to be spending that money until (the legal decision) is final."

with our fragile daydreams.

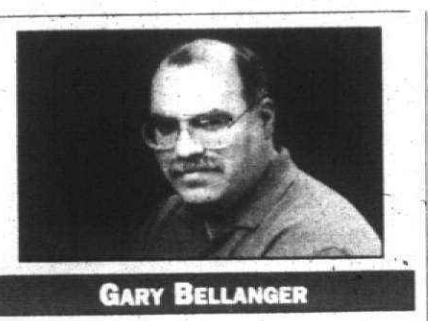
Intimate disclosures

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Local woman shared high school with Hillary Clinton

Sandy Alfasser opened her 1963-64 Maine Township High School East yearbook to yet another page pasted over with yellow Post-It notes that mark where a now-famous classmate appeared.

Then the West Bloomfield School District employee pointed to a black-and-white picture of classmates at the suburban Chicago high school and couldn't help but smile.

Standing tall in the photo of junior class officers was someone named Hillary Rodham. Now, more than 28 years later, that class vice president is married to someone named Clinton and is all set to become America's First Lady.

"Whether it's on purpose or by accident, she's the one standing above everybody else, including everybody else — including the

class president who happened to be a man," said Alfasser, who in high school was known as Sandy Welter.

Alfasser emphasized she didn't really know the teenaged Hillary, even though for three years they attended the same high school in affluent Park Ridge, Ill. and were part of the same 1,300-student graduating class.

Another face

They had different interests, for one thing.

"At that time she would have been just another face," Alfasser said.

According to Alfasser's husband John, who graduated from the same high school in 1962, Rodham's parents were "big-time Republicans." But he didn't have much recollection about Hillary, either.

"She was several years younger than me," John Alfasser said. "It was not really high school etiquette for older people to talk to younger people."

Meanwhile, both of the classmates were in the National Honor Society, but Sandy Alfasser didn't make it until her senior year, one year after Rodham was one of only 38 juniors to make it into the select group.

By that time, the two were physically separated, with Rodham being transferred to Maine High School South, which opened for the 1964-65 school year. (Even though the students attended two different buildings, they were considered part of the same graduating class, Alfasser said.)

Hillary had a high grade-point average (approaching 5.0, the top mark at Maine High School), served on committees and the student council. Meanwhile, Sandy

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Leonid meteor shower won't be easy to view

There's good news and bad news about the second meteor shower of the month. The Leonid meteor shower, like the Taurids, is not one of the year's best. Its peak is from the evening of the 16th through morning of the 17th, during which time you can expect to see an average of 15 meteors. The good news: as each year passes we could be building up toward an exceptional display. In the past the Leonids have set the sky ablaze with meteors. In the years 1833 and 1866 as many as 200,000 meteors were visible within the span of a few hours! The bad news: bright light scattered by the moon will interfere with seeing the fainter meteors this year.

It is believed that the Leonid shower, like most meteor showers, is the remains of a comet that disintegrated. The comet had a period (completed an orbit) of 33.3 years, and although the earth passed through the Leonid stream every year, the meteor display was exceptional every 33.3 years as we orbited through the greatest concentration of debris. The displays of 1899 and 1933 did not live up to expectations, but in 1966 observers in some southwestern states saw as many as 140 meteors per second.

The closer we get to 1999, the better the Leonids may become! Occasionally an extremely bright meteor (called a fireball or bolide) is seen. While very rare, they are spectacular.

During this year's October Draconid shower a fireball was seen by hundreds of people along the Atlantic coast. The fireball was so large it failed to burn up completely, and it crashed into the back of a car near Peekskill, New York. What was left of the meteor weighed 13.6 kilograms (30 pounds)! There are no guarantees that the Leonid shower will spawn a fireball, but then there are no guarantees that it won't!

Last quarter moon will be at 6:39 a.m. on Nov. 17.

Six degrees to the left of the moon will be Regulus (REG you lus), the "heart" of Leo the lion. On the following morning the moon will be 12 degrees below and to the left of Regulus.

The moon moves from Leo into Virgo and, on the morning of the 20th, is six degrees below and to the right of Jupiter. On the next morning the moon is two degrees to the right of Spica.

Notice how much higher Jupiter and Spica are this morning, as compared to their location earlier this month.

Mercury is at inferior conjunction on the 21st. It is located between the earth and the sun and is not visible.

New Moon will occur at 4:11 a.m. on Nov. 24. The moon is located between the earth and the sun and, like Mercury, is not visible. Don't worry about a collision between Mercury and the moon. Yes, they are both between the earth and the sun, but they are separated by millions of kilometers!

The waxing (growing) crescent moon will be visible after sunset on the evening of the 26th. Notice brilliant Venus to the left of the moon. Venus will pass 1.9 degrees

(less than four full moon diameters) below and to the left of Uranus tonight.

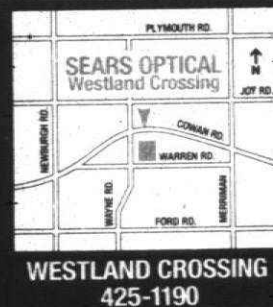
Uranus is NOT a naked-eye planet; if you want to look for it use binoculars or a telescope. Uranus will look like a faint greenish disk at the "one o'clock" position with respect to Venus. (If you are using an astronomical telescope that inverts the image, look toward the "seven o'clock" position.) Good luck, and happy hunting! (Neptune is also in this part of the sky, but it will be out of the range of binoculars and small telescopes.)

The moon will be located nearly mid-way between Venus and Saturn on the evening of the 28th. Venus will be below and to the right of the moon; Saturn will be above and to the left. On the following night the moon will be three degrees from Saturn.

Another event occurs on the 29th; Mars is stationary. It has been drifting eastward through the stars of Gemini from night to night, but after the 29th Mars begins retrograde (backward) motion. Mars will have moved 19 degrees westward by the middle of February. The planet doesn't really halt in its tracks and go backward. What we see is an optical illusion, caused by the faster moving earth overtaking slower orbiting Mars.

Smorgasbord features delectable, hearty fare

My cookbook library is stacked with volumes of cookbooks and articles on just about everything. At my fingertips are recipes for classic French Onion Soup, German bratwurst, Greek Moussaka, Chinese egg rolls, Canadian beer cheese soup and Russian Borsht; as I research this story however, I find my library somewhat lackluster when it comes to Scandinavian cooking, especially Swedish fare.

My experiences with foods from the northern Baltic regions are about as sparse as the clothing touted by the Swedish Bikini team, whom by the way, I am still waiting to be visited by.

Culinary traditions

Yes, I have enjoyed a true Swedish Smorgasbord and have developed a taste for delectable Baltic herring. I have sampled enough aquavit to make even the largest room spin, but when it comes to true Swedish fare, my tastes are about as basic as the mock Swedish meatballs momma can toss together with some ground beef, ground pork and a couple of cans of Campbell's soup. Little did I realize that the Swedes are also known for the rich culinary traditions of well seasoned pates, luscious salads including rich potato salads, an abundance of cheeses, breads and exotic berries with enticing names like bliss and clouds.

Snuggled between Norway and Finland, Sweden's coast offers bountiful riches from the Baltic sea. The notable Baltic herring is a Swedish staple that is nothing short of delectable when marinated, smoked, creamed and even sweet and soured. Planked on some crispbreads their flavor has been known to rival expensive caviars. The more adventuresome will also delight in the Swedish eel so often served in aspic or a savory jelly.

But the true stars from the region are by far the trout and salmon. These fish rival the famed Norwegian versions and are nothing short of spectacular when smoked, baked or in the true Swedish tradition, pan fried.

Meat scarce

When it comes to beef, the Swedes know their meat. Meat is scarcer than fish throughout most of Scandinavia, especially in the northern regions where there is no land suitable for grazing.

Beef is considered a luxury with reindeer meat being more readily available than any other. Meatballs are considered a national favorite and are more delicate, soft, tender and well seasoned than any other. Cream sauces abound and no Swedish smorgasbord is complete without a pot of browned meatballs accompanied by crisp cabbages.

When it comes to desserts, Scandinavians certainly know how to put on a spread. As mentioned earlier, berries play an important role in Swedish cuisine. In addition to canning, the long hard winters necessitate the drying of fruits like apples, plums and pears.

Delectable desserts

Dessert pancakes, similar in composition to thick crepes are brimming with the likenesses of fruits and berries, but not to be outdone are the famed Swedish custards. Sinfully rich caramel custards are also enjoyed as are basic creams. Stuffed with fresh berries and loaded with calories. Pastries are not as prominent as cookies and are best left to the Danish but when prepared are usually well seasoned with almonds, cinnamon, cardamom and molasses.

Winter warm-ups

Ranking up there in popularity with herring, the Swedes are well known for their Gloggs and mummies. Not to be confused with mummies, mummies are blends of gin while Gloggs are laden with wine, aquavit, sugar, spices and almonds. True Swedish gloggs are heated gently to incorporate the flavors of fruit and spices that are always well received on those long dark winter days and nights. The mummies are usually enjoyed during the short summer repast.

As grand as the smorgasbords, seafood and drinks are of Swedish heritage, nothing is more heralded than the coming of Christmas. Christmas is the feast of light and warmth, culminating after weeks of dark skies, gray clouds and snow.

Baking usually begins weeks in advance and when the great season arrives on Christmas Eve, the table is prepared for 12 days of feasting. Gingerbread houses are as common as wreaths beaming the symbol of domestic happiness.

Sweden is the land of the Midnight Sun and deserves to be remembered as a nation rich in culinary heritage.

On the darkest, longest day of the year — Dec. 13, Swedes celebrate St. Lucia Day. Usually one of the younger girls in the household is chosen to be "the Lucia." Dressed in white, with a crown of candles on her head, she serves coffee and buns, preferably early in the morning.

"It's a way to brighten the day. After Dec. 13 the days will start to get longer. The Lucia wakes people by singing special songs," say the women who belong to the gourmet cooking club of SWEA — Swedish Women's Educational Association International Inc. "It's a national holiday celebrated all over Sweden."

Holiday traditions

Boys aren't excluded from Swedish Christmas traditions. Dressed in long white shirts with high, cone-shaped paper hats, the star boys sing Christmas songs. According to custom, they carry a star and are followed by the figure of Judas whose job it is to be funny and beg for money.

Originally, the star boys belonged to the celebration of Twelfth Night, and the legends around the birth of Jesus and the coming of the Wise Men. The star was the Star of Bethlehem — young people in different areas of Sweden dressed up and went around begging food and aquavit for a Twelfth Night Party.

Swedish national holidays, and traditions like St. Lucia Day are celebrated in the United States by members of SWEA. Unlike immigrants before them, members of SWEA who live in the metro Detroit area including Bloomfield Hills, Farmington Hills, Livonia, Rochester, Troy, Westland and Redford, have one foot in the United States, and one in Sweden.

"The members in our group didn't leave Sweden because they had to. Some came here because of job transfers, and will go back to Sweden. With airplanes, fax machines and telephones we can have contact with the old country, said Tottie Samuels of West Bloomfield, president of the SWEA Michigan chapter, and a member of the gourmet cooking club.

To be a member of SWEA, you have to speak Swedish. Some of the women in the group have been in the U.S. for less than a year. They came here because of job transfers, and will return to Sweden one day.

Others like Samuels and Inger Graf, who owns Graf's Pastry Kitchen in Farmington Hills with her husband, Peter, have lived here for over 20 years.

Although they're here for different reasons, and maybe for a short time, the women share SWEA's objectives which include preservation of Swedish language, culture and traditions.

Founded in Los Angeles in 1979, SWEA has chapters throughout the U.S., Europe and Asia. A portion of membership fees are allocated to a scholarship fund. Locally, SWEA helps various groups including Lekotek in Redford which helps children with special needs who need special kinds of toys. A portion of the proceeds from SWEA's Christmas Bazaar noon to 5 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 21, at Savior Lutheran Church, 5631 N. Adams in Bloomfield Hills, will

benefit the scholarship fund, and Lekotek. For information, call 626-7822.

Admission is \$1, and there will be lots of Swedish goodies both imported and homemade for sale. They'll have several kinds of imported mustard and Pommace, a non-alcoholic sparkling fruit flavored beverage.

In preparation for the event, the women have been busy baking dream cookies, ginger snaps, almond tarts, Lucia buns.

Cooking club

The cooking club is just one of the special interest groups within SWEA. There is also a children's group. There are only eight people in the cooking club, more would like to belong, and are on a waiting list.

Every six to eight weeks, the women get together and plan a gourmet dinner. "If you like to eat, you like to cook," the women said, adding that planning and cooking is half the fun. Tasks are delegated — two people make appetizers, two work on the main course, someone brings wine, another sets the table. The cost per person works out to \$10 to \$16, and the women say they don't scrimp.

"We start eating at 5 p.m. and it's midnight before we finish," said Kristina Larsson. Other club members include Ebba Cedergren, Gunilla Skogfeldt, Inger Lindqvist, Barbro Lundberg, and Lena Dahlgren.

We met recently at Samuels house to take the photo for this story, and talk about Swedish food, and Christmas traditions. Greta Mader, Henrik's grandma was there too.

These women take cooking seriously. Some even bring their appliances with them. This summer they had fun making ice cream with the ma-

chine Larsson brought from Sweden. In Sweden they made their own bread, and hardly ever went out to eat. "It's just too expensive."

Christmas celebrations begin with the lighting of the first Advent candle the fourth Sunday before Christmas. St. Lucia Day is celebrated on Dec. 13, and Christmas presents are opened on Dec. 24.

On Christmas Eve, families enjoy an array of food — hot and cold dishes, laid out on the Christmas table. It lasts for days, and in Sweden, families go from house to house visiting, and enjoying foods from the Christmas table.

"At Christmastime we do a lot with gingerbread," said Samuels. "The heart is the most common shape. People use them as decorations in their homes."

Spices which distinguish Swedish baked goods from others include, cardamom, saffron which is used in yeast breads, allspice, ginger and cloves.

Fish is plentiful in Sweden. Baltic herring is one they can't get here and miss. You'll see a lot of sausages on the Christmas table and lutefish in a mustard sauce.

In Sweden, the women used to pick cloudberry for desserts, now they have to rely on friends to get them from import shops in Chicago and Toronto. "You find out where you can get things," said Samuels.

Savor sumptuous fruit flavors all winter

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Thanks to a centuries-old technique, these flavors are available in liquid form year-round in spirits bottledings known collectively as eau de vie.

Translated as "water of life," eau de vie is a generic French term for brandy or spirits.

Exact origins of alcohol distillation are unknown, but a 13th century French alchemist Arnaud de Villeneuve is given the credit for first describing it in detail.

Today, many regions of the world make brandy by distilling wine or by distilling grape pomace (remains after the grapes have been pressed), or distilling fruits after the completion of fermentation.

Eau de vie, as discussed in this column, will refer to fruit brandy, usually a clear, unaged spirit carrying the intense aromas of fermented fruit from which it is distilled.

The most well-known eau de vie is produced from the Williams pear, a relative of the U.S. Bartlett pear. France and Switzerland produce the greatest quantities of this eau de vie, simply labeled Poiré Williams, but a small, quality production is beginning to make its appearance from California and Oregon. In addition to the Williams pear, eau de vie is traditionally produced from plums, cherries, raspberries, elderberries, apricots and quince.

Kirsch or Kirschwasser (cherry brandy) is produced from a wild black cherry indigenous to the Rhine Valley. Due to the meanderings of this great river, Kirsch is produced in three countries — Switzerland, the headwaters of the Rhine; France in the Alsace region, along the Rhine's western banks; and the Black Forest region of Germany to the east.

Important elements of production are strictly followed in the creation of the world's finest eau de vie. Fruit, picked at the peak of ripeness is carefully prepared for the month to 10-weeks-long fermentation, and only free-run juice is distilled. The Williams pear is slightly crushed to open the fruit. Stone fruits and berries are fermented whole.

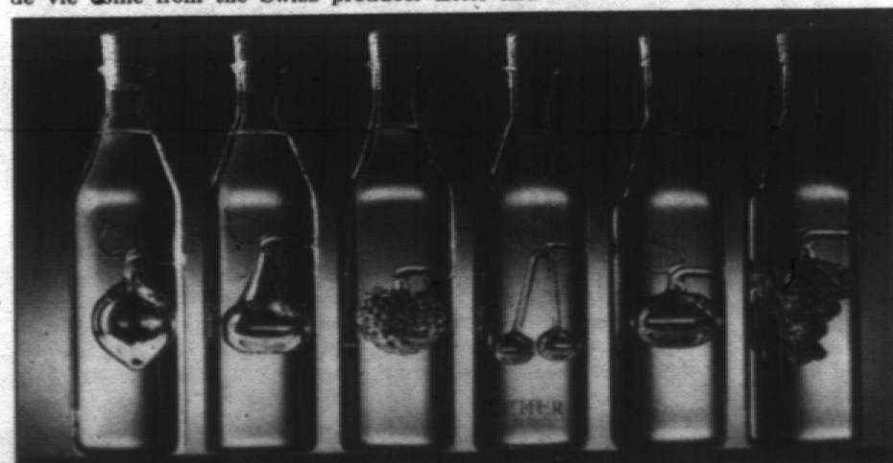
After fermentation completes, the fruit wine is doubly distilled as soon as possible. To preserve the fruit aromas and flavors, it is most important that the distillate be chilled quickly.

To our taste, some of the most interesting eaux de vie come from the Swiss producer Etter and

make a stunning after-dinner companion strikingly enhancing any meal.

Etter's eaux de vie are exclusively imported to the United States by Birmingham's Robert Denton & Co. Ltd. and sold through the Elite Spirits division. Denton also distributes the internationally recognized artisan bottlings from Clear Creek Distillery in Portland, Ore. In addition to standard eau de vie, Clear Creek produces an Apple brandy that is smoother, more complex and flavorful than most Calvados.

Etter's artistic packaging is unrivaled. Hand-blown bottles with suspended handblown fruit in the middle are produced by renowned Swiss glass artist Peter Schreiber. They are collector's items, and if you're looking for an unusual gift presentation, search no further. They are available in all fine wine and spirits shops in the area. Approximate cost is \$191.33.

GINGER SNAPS

1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup light brown sugar
2 tablespoons molasses
3 tablespoons cooled, cooled water
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 tablespoon cinnamon
1 1/2 teaspoons ginger
1 scant teaspoon cloves
2 1/4 cups sifted flour
1 cup pulverized or ground cardamom seeds
Cream together butter, sugar until very smooth. Dissolve molasses in boiling water. Let cool. Add syrup water and lemon rind to butter and sugar mixture. Sift flour with baking soda, cinnamon, ginger and cloves. Fold in flour. Blend well, and place in refrigerator to chill.
Turn dough onto floured surface. Roll out very thin and cut in desired shapes with floured

cookie cutter.
Bake on buttered cookie sheet in 350° F. oven for 8-10 minutes. Cool on sheet. Garnish with icing if desired.

ALMOND TARTS

1/2 cup sweet butter
1/2 cup sugar
1 cup blanched almonds
1 teaspoon almond extract
1 egg
2 1/2 cups all purpose flour
Cream butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Grind almonds and add them, almond extract and egg. Mix until well blended. Stir in 2 1/2 cups flour.
Knead dough slightly on floured surface until smooth. Add more flour if necessary. Chill well. Butter or spray insides of fluted tart molds. Using your thumbs, coat the insides evenly with a thin layer of dough. Bake in 375° F. oven 12-15 minutes or until light golden.

Turn molds upside down and tap gently with spoon to loosen the tart. Lift molds from tarts. Cool. Serve plain or fill with jam and whipped cream. Makes 45 tarts.

JULGLOGG

1 bottle Burgundy
10 cardamom seeds
10 cloves
1/2 cup sugar
2 cinnamon sticks
1 piece whole ginger
1/2 cup Absolut vodka or brandy
1/2 cup raisins
Mix all ingredients except vodka, raisins and almonds in saucepan, heat, but do not boil, until sugar melts. Remove from heat and let stand. Steep the spices for about 3-4 hours or overnight.
Strain the spices and add vodka and pour in a bottle. Before serving, heat desired amount in a saucepan and serve in small glasses, garnish with almonds and raisins.

REAL SWEDISH MEATBALLS

Meat mixture:
1 pound ground beef
1/2 pound ground pork
1/2 cup fine bread crumbs
1 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon white pepper
1 egg
2 tablespoons finely chopped onion
gravy:
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 cup beef stock or Half and Half
1 tablespoon cornstarch
2 tablespoons cold water
Combine meat mixture ingredients. Lightly blend with a fork. Shape mixture into meatballs.

Heat margarine in a large skillet over moderate heat. Brown meatballs on one side; turn and brown other side.
Reduce heat to low and cover the pan; simmer for 10 minutes. Remove meatballs, pour off fat. Add Half and Half or beef stock. Blend cornstarch with water and add to the pan. Stir over moderate heat until the mixture comes to a boil. Taste and add salt and pepper if necessary. Serve gravy with the meatballs.

SWEDISH CARAMEL MOLD

1 cup sugar
6 eggs
2 cups light cream
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup whipped cream
2 tablespoons brandy
In a heavy pan, melt 1/2 cup of the sugar over very low heat just

until golden brown. Pour into the bottom of a nine-inch ring mold; spread to cover the entire bottom.

Beat eggs; add 1/2 cup sugar, cream and vanilla. Pour into the mold. Set mold into a pan of hot (not boiling) water and bake at 325 degrees for one hour.

Cool. Dip mold quickly in a pan of hot water and unmold. Whip cream and brandy together until soft peaks form. Serve over custard.

The finest eaux de vie, even those in standard bottles, are expensive. The following details offer understanding. About 13 pounds of black mountain cherries are required for one 750-ml bottle of Etter Kirsch. About 50 pounds of specially tree-ripened pears go into each 750-ml bottle

of Etter Poiré Williams. Serving suggestions
For maximum enjoyment as an after-dinner drink or dessert accompaniment, serve eau de vie in a freezer-chilled glass. Heighten flavors of a fresh fruit cup with the addition of a small amount of your favorite eau de vie.

Prepare Crepes au Kirsh or flavor homemade ice cream with Framboise or Kirsh as a simple, yet elegant dessert.
If flaming desserts are your specialty, use an eau de vie next time for a delightful concentration of fruit flavors once the alcohol has burned off.

Relish adds pleasant tang to turkey

AP — Low-fat entrees turn surprisingly heavy when served with high-fat sauces or condiments. During this cool season when hearty foods appeal the most, steer yourself away from high-fat gravies and cream sauces, and toward rich-tasting condiments based on fruits and vegetables. For example, this vivid red relish lends a pleasant tang to chicken, turkey or pork without adding a speck of fat. What's more, you can cook the relish up to a week ahead

and store it in your refrigerator. **CRANBERRY-PEAR RELISH**
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 cup water
12-ounce package (3 cups) cranberries
2 medium pears, cored and cubed (2 cups)
1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon ground allspice
4 inches stick cinnamon
In a 2-quart saucepan bring sugar and water to boiling, stirring to dis-

solve sugar. Boil rapidly, uncovered, for 5 minutes.
Add cranberries, pears, nutmeg, allspice and cinnamon. Return to boiling. Cook for 3 to 4 minutes or until cranberry skins pop, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat. Cover and chill. Remove cinnamon before serving. Makes about 3 1/2 cups.

Maple syrup gives pecan pie a new twist

AP — In the following recipe, maple syrup is used instead of molasses or corn syrup to flavor classic pecan pie. You can also use pancake and waffle syrup. **PECAN PIE WITH MAPLE WHIPPED CREAM**
1 1/2 cups maple syrup
1/4 cup (1/2 stick) margarine or butter
1/4 cup sugar
1 1/2 cups pecan halves or chopped pecans

1 unbaked 9-inch pie shell
3 eggs, slightly beaten
1 teaspoon vanilla
Dash salt
Whipped cream topping (optional)
Heat oven to 375 degrees F. Heat syrup, margarine and sugar in a 2-quart saucepan to boiling. Boil gently, uncovered, 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Cool slightly.
Place pecans in pie shell. Mix eggs, vanilla and salt in large bowl.

Gradually stir in cooled syrup mixture. Pour over pecans in pie shell. Bake in a 375-degree F oven for 35 to 40 minutes or until knife inserted near center comes out clean. Cool on wire rack. Serve with whipped cream topping, if desired. Makes 8 servings.
Whipped Cream Topping: Beat 1 cup heavy cream and 1/4 cup maple syrup until soft peaks form. Makes 2 cups.

Add mixed vegetable juice, 1 cup water, and the lemon juice. Cook over medium heat, stirring frequently, until soup is thoroughly heated, about 10 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

Each serving provides: 1/4 milk; 2 1/2 vegetables.

SQUASH PUREE

4 cups cubed, pared butternut squash
1/4 cup reduced-calorie pancake syrup, (60 calories per fluid ounce)
2 teaspoons reduced-calorie margarine (tub)
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt

In 4-quart saucepan combine squash with enough water to cover and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to low and simmer until squash is tender, 8 to 10 minutes.
Drain squash, discarding liquid, and place in food processor. Add syrup, margarine, cinnamon, and

salt; process (using on-off motion) until smooth. Makes 4 servings.
Each serving provides: 1/4 fat; 1 bread; 30 optional calories.
Microwave Directions: In 4-quart microwaveable casserole combine squash with 2 cups water, cover and microwave on High (100 percent) until squash is tender about 6 minutes. Drain squash, discarding liquid, and place in food processor. Add syrup, margarine, cinnamon and salt; process (using on-off motion) until smooth.

LEMON CHEESECAKE TARTS

1 cup plain low-fat yogurt
3 tablespoons light cream cheese
1 envelope (four 1/4-cup serv-

ings) reduced-calorie instant vanilla pudding mix (25 calories per serving as packaged)
1 teaspoon grated lemon peel
4 graham cracker tart shells (1/4 ounce each)

In blender combine yogurt and cream cheese and process until smooth, about 30 seconds, scraping down sides of container as necessary. Add pudding mix and lemon peel and process until smooth, about 2 minutes. Scrape down sides of container and stir mixture to combine.

Into each tart shell spoon 1/4 of the pudding mixture. Cover and refrigerate until set, about 1 hour. Each serving provides: 1/4 milk, 1/4 bread; 110 optional calories.

- 1 can (4 ounces) sliced mushrooms, drained
- Herbed Tomato Sauce (recipe follows)

Mix cheeses, basil and pepper; combine vegetables. Spread 1 cup Herbed Tomato Sauce in bottom of 13 by 9 by 2-inch baking pan; top with 1/2 of the uncooked noodles. Spoon 1/2 of the cheese mixture over noodles and spread lightly with spatula; spoon 1/2 of the vegetable mixture over cheese. Repeat layers 2 times, ending with noodles and 1 cup sauce on top. Bake, covered, in preheated 350 degree oven 1 hour. Cut into squares. Makes 12 servings.

Tex-Mex peppers filled with good-for-you stuff

AP — Stuffed peppers, one of my all-time favorite comfort foods, stir up sweet memories of family dinners when I was a child. Now they're not only comforting, but they're also wonderfully quick, thanks to the microwave oven.

The Tex-Mex filling in these sweet peppers emblazons all the familiar Mexican ingredients — Monterey Jack cheese, lean beef, salsa and spices — that your family loves. The unexpected twist comes from fiber-rich barley, a grain you most often see in soup. Like other grains, barley needs a certain length of time to rehydrate, whether cooked on the range top or in the microwave oven. For the best use of your time, cook the barley ahead, according to package directions, so you can stuff and cook the peppers quickly.

- 1 cup chunky salsa
- 1/2 cup shredded carrot
- 1/4 cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese (3 ounces)

Cut peppers in half lengthwise. Discard seeds and membranes. On a 12-inch microwave-safe plate arrange peppers, cut side down. Cover with microwave-safe plastic wrap; turn back one corner to vent steam. Cook on 100 percent power (high) for 6 to 8 minutes or until crisp-tender. Drain; invert pepper halves over paper towels.

For filling, in a 2-quart microwave-safe casserole, combine beef and green onion. Cook, covered, on high for 4 to 6 minutes or until beef is brown, stirring once. Drain fat. Stir in cooked barley, salsa, carrot and cumin; mix well. Add 1/2 cup of the cheese; toss to mix.

Spoon beef mixture into pepper halves. Arrange pepper halves on a 12-inch microwave-safe plate. Cover with microwave-safe plastic wrap; turn back one corner. Cook on high for 5 to 6 minutes or until heated through, rotating the dish once. Top with remaining cheese; let stand for 1 to 2 minutes or until melted. Makes 6 servings.

Spectacle: Soul-searching soundscapes

Inspired by the likes of British soundscape bands My Bloody Valentine, Ride and Curve, local outfit Spectacle is a band whose heart-felt introspection belies their youth expressed through a billowing tonal twin-guitar attack.

Shoegazers? Spectacle vocalist and guitarist Travis Hawthorne looks sheepish at the mere inquiry.

"Yeah, we've been called that," said the vocalist and guitarist letting out a sigh.

Shoegazers is the term applied to the lot of English bands proficient in carving out surreal soundscapes but having a penchant to only make eye contact with their Doc Martens on stage.

Spectacle may be guilty on implication, perhaps, but glaring at their faces is an innocuous fault when compared with the array of honest emotion they pour out through their beguiling sound.

The oldest member of the band is Hawthorne, who is 19. Drummer Eric Campbell, 18, guitarist Loren Jackson, 17, and bassist Nick Sheren, 17, make up the rest of Spectacle.

Though mere fawns on the music scene, Spectacle has already released a 7-inch single on Vulva Records in Royal Oak — the same label as local visceral kingpins Majesty Crush.

On the two-song glimpse, sinusoidal guitars expel a billowing cloud of pent-up angst. Suffocating, yet exhilarating, the twin guitar foray gorges into the caverns of the soul.

The music reveals a band mature beyond their years. Hawthorne grapples with fleeting mortality in "Monody," a song he wrote in tribute to a friend who died 1 1/2 years ago in an auto accident.

In "She Doesn't Believe," the introspective songwriter portrays the feelings of a 6-year-old English girl during a conversation he had with her on a train ride. She was expressing some doubts to Hawthorne about the existence of God.

Hawthorne believes, though. "He went to Fairlane Christian School and later attended Jerry Falwell's Liberty University for a year before coming home."

"All I could think about is music, really," Hawthorne said. "Academically, I wasn't up to par and I figured why waste my money."

He made contact with Jackson, whom he knew from art class at the Bible-based school in Dearborn. The two began jamming informally before mutual friends put them through to Campbell and Sheren.

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Coppola sinks his teeth into 'Dracula'

The horror. Francis Ford Coppola pours out the original "Dracula" novel. It does try to capture that book's unique narrative style, which relies on telegrams, newspaper accounts and diary entries to tell the spooky story.

The movie opens with Vlad the Impaler, the common historical source for the Dracula legend, who returns from the bloody crusades to find his young bride has committed suicide. Four centuries after a bloody pact with the devil (now Count Dracula) reanimates the soul of his old love, Mina, the fiancé of young real estate clerk Jonathan Harker.

There's plenty of voice-over narration, often read with an antique page filling half the screen. The other side might find a full moon, a howling wolf, or the vampire's piercing eyes.

For someone who has been making movies for three decades, Coppola still has a lot of fun behind the camera. For this, his first pure horror film since his directorial debut of "Dementia 13" in 1963, he throws in every visual trick possible to keep us interested and off kilter.

When the vampire stalks across a yard in search of its next victim, the camera will skip frames, creating a jerky stop motion effect. In homage to the origins of movies, which began roughly at the time the story is set in 1897, Coppola sets a pivotal meeting between Dracula and Mina in an arcade exhibiting the first cinematographs. The image even speeds up slightly at one point to give the effect of those first movies.

While Keanu Reeves' phony English accent makes him completely unconvincing as Jonathan

Harker, Winona Ryder shines as virginal young Mina. She conveys genuine passion for the count, who woos her with diamond tear-drops and exotic sweet talk. She even holds her accent together.

Gary Oldman ("Sid and Nancy," "JFK") has the greatest challenge as Dracula, sometimes sporting an obscene hairdo that looks like a cross between a beehive and someone's posterior. He transforms into a wolf, a man-bat who hangs from the rafters, a green mist and an ape-like creature who ravages Mina's young friend Lucy in the stately English gardens.

Oldman has a queer quality that allows him to look alluring in his fashionable tinted sunglasses and stovepipe hat. Then, when he's flopping on the castle floor with a stake in his heart, his

When I read your letters my first impulse was to identify with the underdogs, those poor victims who are maligned by "insensitive clods." Therapists often consider this the most helpful response. It is also rightfully made fun of by those tough enough to handle the often hard realities of everyday living. The stereotype of a whining patient and a never-critical therapist who will accept any inadequacy is at common subject in mass media.

The readers of this column must realize by now that my replies to letters focus on the writer continuing to grow and develop in order to cope and to adapt to non-changeable realities. In any given situation maturation is not served

by blaming others for one's own discomfort.

It is true that there are many bullies in this world, but each of us is responsible to handle them adequately. It is difficult to impossible for reality to be changed. If you are able to change the reality, more power to you.

It is still important to know when it is not possible and when you are better off not hitting your head against a brick wall.

Further, not all of this kind of banter is bad; it is normal. Among male athletes a lot of kidding and joking goes on; from the time they are little boys, men often show their affection with teasing. A 10-year-old girl told me she knows the boy behind her really likes her because he is always pulling her ponytail.

All of us need to develop calluses and be able to take it and to dish it out. When we emphasize being hurt (which neither of you have done) then we are not adequate to the situation.

We have all heard ethnic and racial jokes. Some of us may even have told one or two ourselves. Comedians have built their entire careers making fun of others. Whether it is right or not, that is the way the world is.

It is possible that this is a more benign way of venting hostilities and so protects us from more dangerous ways of acting out. If you don't like it, then leave, don't give a lecture.

We live in a democracy, which means that whether or not we agree with what others say we must fight for each person's right to say it. For yourselves, you can decide never to make fun of another person and that is a noble choice. But to be adequate, you must be able to handle all kinds of people without malice in you.

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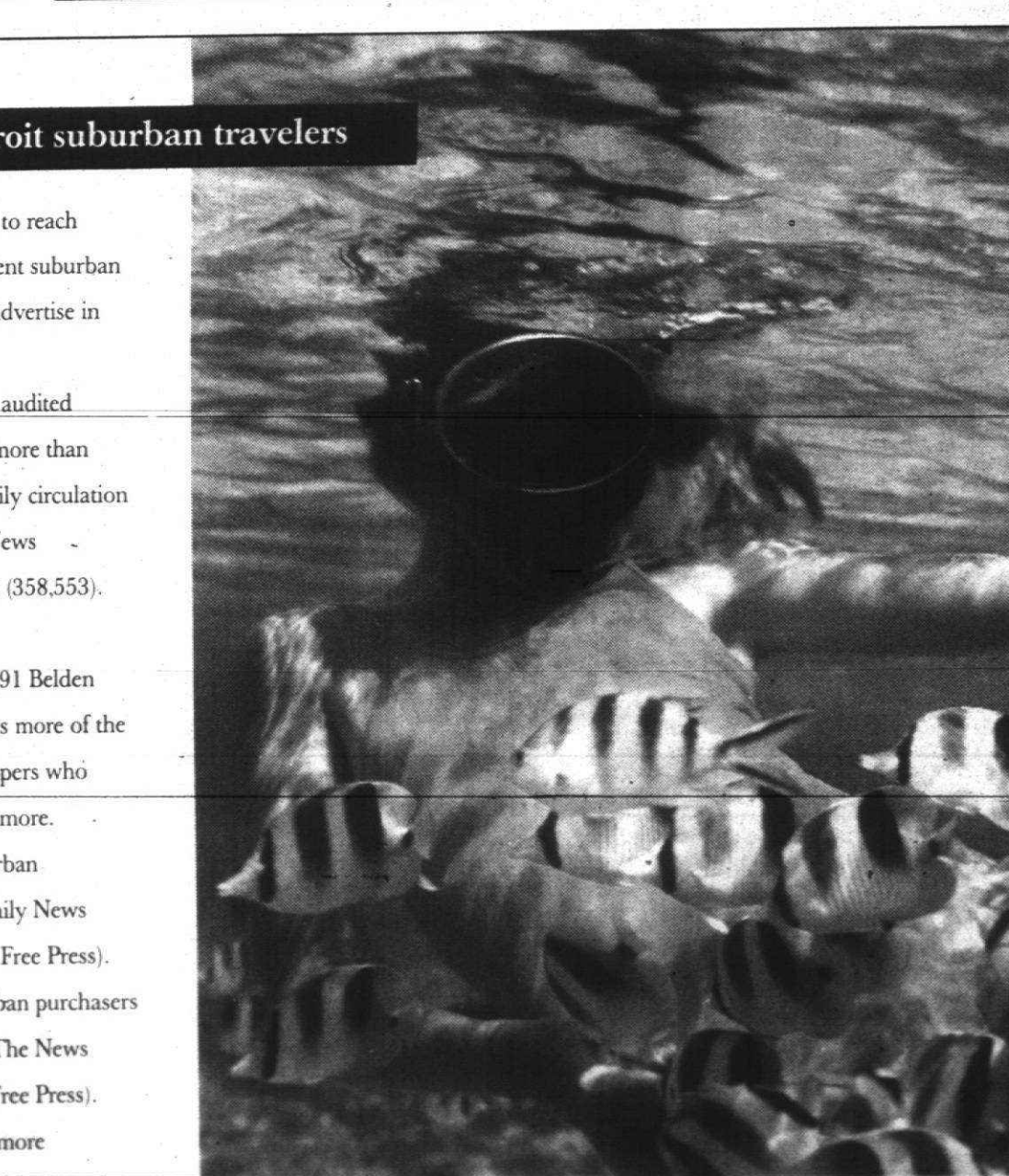
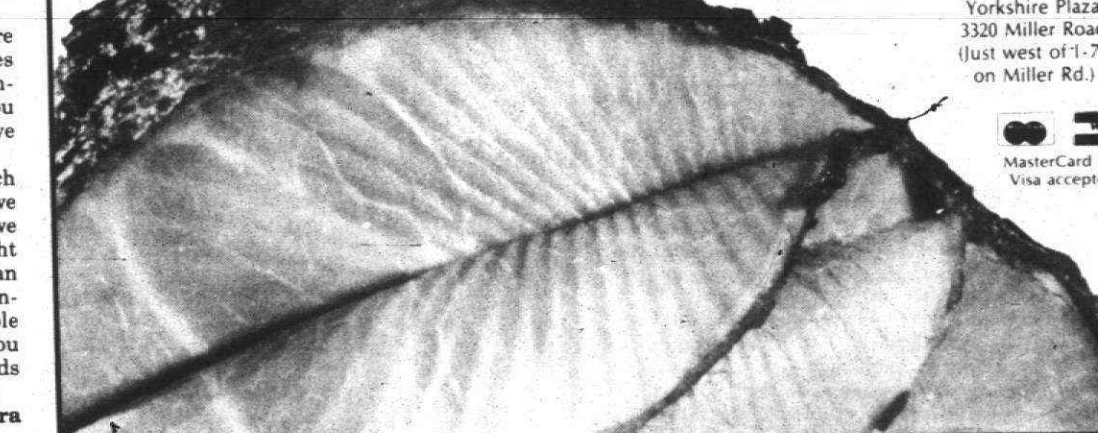

"Wouldn't they be absolutely striking on a table or a dessert tray?" A practical indulgence or a stunning gift, the fruit shapes and harvest colors are perfect for a seasonal table, but not limited to autumn.

Now that the table decor is decided, maybe this year I can find that little something extra to add some zing to the old-favorite family recipes. I wandered into Williams-Sonoma at the Somerset Collection, and joined the small crowd gathered around the sample tray. There, spread on a simple piece of cracker, I tasted the most delicious pecan pumpkin butter by Muirhead out of New Jersey (\$6.50).

Annmarie Kelly joined me at the tasting table and was equally captivated. We grabbed jars of the spicy-sweet condiment, and as we paid for our finds, she told me of her eight children and 22 grandchildren who inspired her to be the award-winning cook that she is. A Royal Oak fiber artist, Kelly plans to use the pecan pumpkin butter in her pumpkin pie recipe. "But I might just eat it by the spoonful," she quipped.

Whether your Thanksgiving table is laden with turkey or ham, cornbread or sweet potatoes, whether simple or ornate, spare or bountiful, I hope it is surrounded by those who mean the most to you.

GRASS-ROOTS SHOPPING

Southland's big facelift gives small retailers a chance

When the Rouse Company of Maryland bought Southland Mall in 1989, the first order of business was to arrange a facelift for the 22-year-old downriver shopping mall.

Thursday the bandages come off to reveal an 85-foot high glass pyramid towering over the Eureka Road entrance; 52,000-square feet of new retail space; a food court surrounded by a 40-foot high palm tree forest; fountains; footbridges; family-size restrooms equipped with toddler-accessible sinks; coat hooks and changing tables; a market on pushcarts; kiosk shopping; and boutiques enclosed in glass.

The grand reopening also marks the debut of the Southland Critters. These winged animals were designed to resemble hood ornaments

and appear on designs throughout the mall. "It's exciting with a capital 'E' to be a part of this reopening," said Charlene Lamphear, manager of sales and marketing. "A team of shoppers and merchants met three years ago to suggest improvements and new ideas for the mall, and this week it's finally going to happen. We're all very excited about the finished product."

Responding to the recommendations of the improvement committee, several new retailers were sought for the mall to close merchandise gaps. These include a sports equipment store, more restaurants, more gift shops, and more women's ready-to-wear stores.

Southland Mall has a tradition of steady sales — even through the early 1980s when a recession put un-

employment in the 17 downriver communities at 30 percent, Lamphear said.

"This area is big on family," she said. "Most families have one child more than the national average. They tend to grow up, marry, and remain in the area. It's not unusual to see three generations shopping together on a Saturday afternoon — mom, grandma and the kids."

A large population of Canadian shoppers also frequents the mall traveling south off the Ambassador Bridge. Lamphear said the mall advertises regularly in Canada.

Southland Mall offers a marketing program for fledgling retailers. New merchants can rent space in the Motor City Market. Here merchandise is displayed on kiosks, self-contained glass shelf units, which fold up when the mall closes. As their business grows, they can progress to renting pushcarts parked along a row known as The Assembly Line Pushcart Market.

"We provide these retailers with support through sales tips, merchandise suggestions and affordable

rents," Lamphear said. "When they reach a point when they need even more space they can move into one of six glass-walled boutiques known as our Central Shops."

The multi-million dollar expansion demonstrates the commitment of the Rouse Company and its partner CIGNA Investments Inc. to the downriver community, according to Jill Creps, vice president and general manager of Southland.

"Both owners of the center have enabled us to offer an enhanced retail offering to our shoppers in a beautiful and intimate environment," she said.

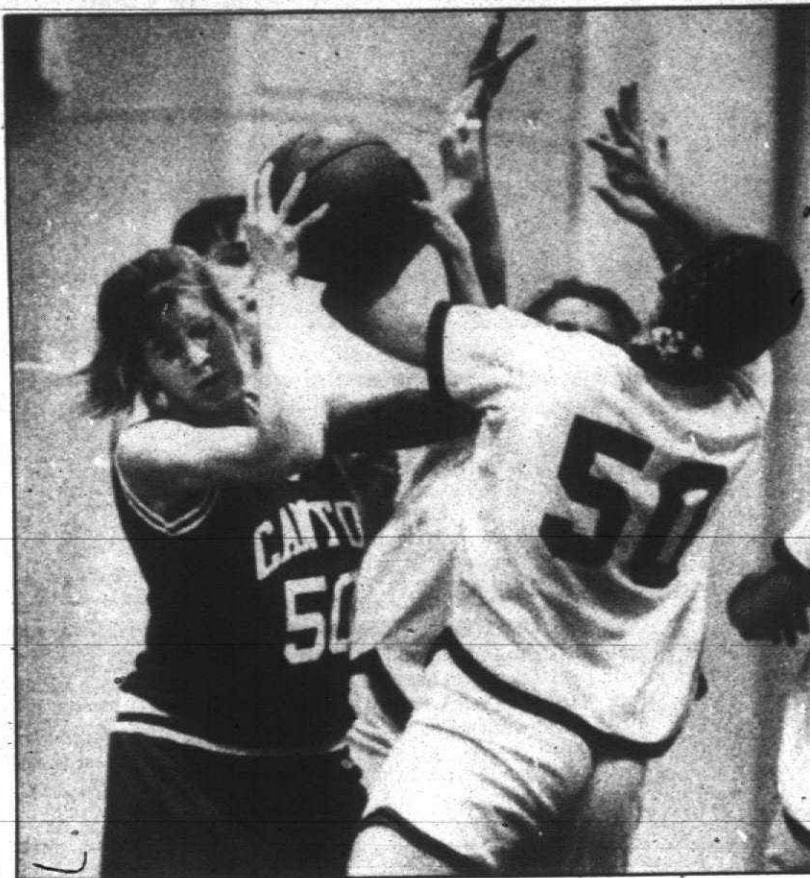

The state girls basketball tournament starts tonight, but Plymouth Canton tied up some unfinished business Saturday night.

The Chiefs capped the regular season by capturing the Western Lakes Activities Association title, breaking Livonia Stevenson's 19-game winning streak with a 57-42 triumph in the playoff final at Northville High.

Canton, now 18-2 overall, avenged one of its two losses this year by using a balanced scoring attack.

Senior center Stephanie Gray, despite picking up her fourth foul early in the second half, led the victorious Chiefs with 14 points.

Junior forward Erica Anderson chipped in with 12, while junior point guard Alyson Nounne contributed 10.

Senior guard Amy Westerhold had eight, including a key basket off a drive with only 3:32 remaining in the game. The basket came with the Chiefs clinging to 45-42 advantage.

The 6-foot Gray then scored on put-back after a missed Westerhold free throw and added another basket with only 2:07 remaining to give Canton a nine-point bulge.

Stevenson wasn't able to close that gap as Canton went on to secure its first playoff championship since 1989.

"It was a great team effort defensively," Canton coach Bob Blohm said. "We held Stevenson to 10 field goals, and when you do that defensively, you're playing well."

The Chiefs also put the clamps on Stevenson's outstanding junior point guard, Mo Drabicki.

In the last meeting, a 48-43 Stevenson win, Drabicki had a game-high 24 points, and hit eight of nine free throws.

But on this night, Drabicki was limited to seven points on one field goal (in just five attempts) to go along with five-of-eight shooting from the line.

"We wanted to keep Mo in front of us because when she penetrates to the basket, she can create easy scores for her teammates," Blohm said. "I thought overall we did a pretty good job on her."

Drabicki's running mate at guard, senior Lori Shingledacker, finished with a game-high 21 points, including a pair of three-pointers.

She connected from beyond the three-point stripe with 4-31 to go, pulling the Spartans, who trailed most of the way, to just three back,

We wanted to make something happen spontaneously instead of running our offense. And that was very uncharacteristic of us."

"It's hard to tell what caused them to do it. Either it was Canton's defense that forced us, or the emotion of the night got to us."

Stevenson couldn't take advantage of Gray's absence as Kelly Holmes (five points) and Jori Welchans (five free throws) picked up the slack coming off the bench.

"We had a lot of balance, we got something from just about everybody," Blohm said. "When Stephanie got her fourth, I said, 'Come on Kelly.' Amicie (Crayton) also came on and helped us out, and Erica (Anderson) played a solid game."

The loss prevented Stevenson from completing a 20-0 season, but Henry said his Spartans will not hang their heads.

"This team has come behind to win games and they've come back from some adversity earlier in the season," he said. "There's no reason why we can't come back in the districts."

Meanwhile, there are no breathers in the Class A districts for Canton or Stevenson.

The Chiefs face neighbor Plymouth Salem (11-9) tonight (see pairings), while the Spartans take on Livonia Ladywood (12-5) on Wednesday.

Rocks capture league consolation title

er kicked the ball during the scramble.

That call disturbed Central coach Ken Butler, since the ball didn't go out of the bounds. Cyndi Platter's free throws with 14 seconds left iced the win for Salem (11-9).

"We had a nice little lead (47-43) when (Norris and Czach) started going out," Butler said. "But we played a good game. Salem is a better team than it was at the beginning of the year."

Platter scored a game-high 22 points, including 18 in the middle quarters. After the Vikings (13-7) took the early lead, the Salem center scored 10 in the second period to keep the Rocks within two (27-25) at halftime.

"That was part of the reason Norris

got in foul trouble, because she was active at the rim," Thomann said.

Sockow finished with 12 points, and the Rocks got an unexpected lift from Tubaugh, who came off the bench to score a career-high 10 points, including eight in the last quarter, when Salem outscored the Vikings 21-16.

"We felt she couldn't hurt us, but she did," Butler said. "We were sagging in to help out and left her alone (on the perimeter) and she just banged us."

Kobus, who averages 19½ points, was on target with 20 for Central. Cindy Muha made her presence felt from the second quarter on and finished with 12, Toni Flood nine, Czach eight and Norris seven.

Would shot clock help girls hoop game?

Plymouth Salem girls basketball coach Fred Thomann is a meticulous scout. Normally he won't leave a game until he has a thorough report on the team he came to see.

So it was quite conspicuous on Nov. 4 when Thomann walked out during the second quarter of the Catholic League semifinal game between Redford Bishop Borgess and Harper Woods Regina.

"I'm not going to sit in there and watch somebody stand around and hold the ball for eight minutes," he said. "Come on."

With the game tied after one quarter, Borgess coach Dave Mann instructed his team to hold the ball, hoping to draw Regina out of its zone defense. Regina was content to sit back and watch Borgess. Thus, a close, fast-paced game came to a screeching halt. Only one basket was scored in the quarter. Borgess went on to defeat Regina, 39-37.

"I understand the strategy of it," Thomann said.

"But in high school athletics at this point and time, the kids need to play. As coaches, we need to develop players, all of the players, and a shot clock makes you do that."

The shot clock. It might be the loudest non-issue facing high school girls basketball today. The players and coaches who have been exposed to it, mainly through AAU and summer camp competition, see the shot clock as a necessary step in the continuing evolution of their sport.

"It makes for a wonderful game," Thomann said. "A beautiful game. And we really need it to prepare the players for the next level. As it is now, these kids are having a heck of time adjusting to the 30-second clock at the college level."

Said Troy Athens coach Joe Clinton: "I sure would like to see a shot clock, because, first of all, the kids love it. It would produce a fast, up-tempo

game and it not only forces coaches to coach, it would also encourage coaches to use more players. It goes back to what high school sports are supposed to be about: kids having fun."

But even the most ardent campaigners for the shot clock realize the odds are long against them.

"It'll never pass," Thomann said. "There has been some talk about it, but a lot of guys (coaches) don't want to have to work too hard. They say 'Oh no, now we have a shot clock. Now we've got to teach these kids how to play. Now we can't just sit back in our zone and let the best two players handle the ball all of the time.'"

To the legislators and administrators of high school sports, both locally and nationally, the shot clock is and has always been a non-issue.

"There just hasn't been any great clamoring for it," said Dick Schindler, editor of basketball rules for the National Federation of State High School

Athletic Associations. "We have had discussions on it the past eight or ten years. We've sent out questionnaires and we've had it on our agenda. But it has never come to an official vote. There is just not overwhelming support for it at this time."

Like the three-point and the coaches' box, a shot-clock rule would have to be approved at the national level first.

"There are 11 people on the basketball rules committee and an item needs seven votes to pass," Schindler said. "My guess is that if we put this to a vote, four would be for it and seven would be opposed."

States can enact a shot-clock rule on an experimental basis. New York and California have experimental shot-clock rules. But don't look for one in Michigan any time soon.

"We haven't had any substantial requests for it," said Jack Roberts, executive director of the Michigan High School Athletic Association. "Not from the coaches and least of all from the administrators who would be responsible for paying for the equipment and for the person to run it."

Cost and logistics lead the list of arguments against the shot clock.

Shot clocks cost between \$1,500 and \$3,000, and schools would need to purchase two of them.

"Some of the schools in the Detroit Public School League have just this year got game clocks. Now we are going to ask them to buy a shot clock?" said John Johnson, communications director for the MHSAA. "Not only that, but where do you put it? On the backboard? On the wall? On the floor? Will there be a uniform standard? Then you have to find a quality person to run and believe me, it isn't a no-brainer to operate. So now we will be asking athletic directors to hire a shot-clock operator on top of a score-board operator and a public address person — I just think we would be taxing the high schools too much."

There is also strong sentiment that the sport simply doesn't need a shot clock.

"If the game ever reached the point where it needed a shot in

Hunter activity is at a premium on opening day. Ardent hunters will be in the woods throughout the season, but even the "Week-end Warriors" will be out in force on opening day. All this hunter activity in the woods will keep the deer moving around throughout the day.

Hunters who experience opening day success on a regular basis do a few things to increase their odds. Here are some of their tips:

■ Pack a lunch and stay in the woods all day. Forget about the afternoon trip to the buck pole unless you have one to hang. Many hunters leave the woods between 10 and 11 a.m. and don't return until 2 or 3 p.m. Everyone

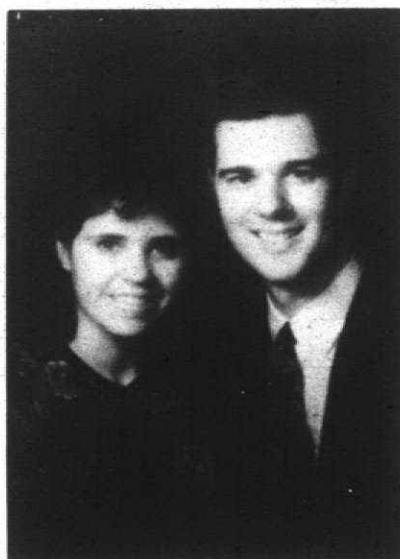

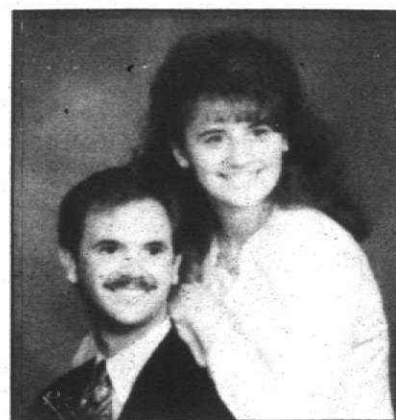

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Dean Jones goes Hawaiian with 'Saved by the Bell'

Saturday morning hit gets prime-time shot

The cast of NBC's *Saved by the Bell*, the top-rated Saturday-morning series for teens, has been rewarded by the network with a working vacation in the tropics. The prime-time movie *Saved by the Bell Hawaiian Style*, airing Friday, Nov. 27, also treated the young cast to the influential presence of former Disney leading man Dean Jones.

Jones plays the grandfather of high school student Kelly (Tiffani-Amber Thiessen) and invites her and her friends to his quaint Hawaiian Hideaway resort. There the gang helps Jones save his business from a ruthless real estate developer.

Without mention of how public school students can afford the exorbitant airfare, the movie jets the teens into a story that, while reminiscent of madcap Disney movies of the '60s, still maintains the successful format of the *Saved by the Bell* series. That translates to well-meaning, vivacious teens stumbling on their own ineptitude while pursuing higher goals, yet ultimately

proving that good will out.

For some characters, island romances provide valuable life lessons. Zack (Mark-Paul Gosselaar) learns sacrifice and commitment from an unwed mother (Rena Sofer). Kelly falls for a young lawyer with ulterior motives. Slater (Mario Lopez) and Jesse (Elizabeth Berkley) discover even a lovers' paradise can be ruined by petty bickering. Meanwhile, Lisa (Lark Voorhies) finds some new malls to shop at and Screech (Dustin Diamond)...well, Screech has his idea camera.

The first prime-time outing for *Saved by the Bell* is not going to win any new viewers outside its original demographic group—adults, for example—but it won't disappoint any fans in its stretch from a half-hour to two hours. Never mind that a subplot in which Screech's resemblance to a carved statue causing natives to believe he is the descendant of their tribal god is all too similar to an episode of *Gilligan's Island*.

Jones, known for his roles in *Bee-*

thoven and Disney films including *That Darn Cat*, *The Shaggy D.A.* and *The Love Bug*, took the part as a favor to his friend, executive producer Peter Engel, who, Jones says, backs up the positive teenage image on *Saved by the Bell* with the claim that "not every teenage girl is pregnant, and not every teenage boy is a drug addict."

Extensively involved with child-care organizations, Jones enjoyed the time spent on the *Saved by the Bell* project.

"When I can go to work as an actor, it's a vacation for me. I concentrate on one thing, which is my job, and in between shots I relax and enjoy my fellow actors and craftsmen. It truly is a vacation for me. I have a perfect excuse to cancel all appointments and show up on the set."

Jones' lively co-stars made the experience all the more memorable for him.

"It's challenging when you've got all of that teenage exuberance around you to maintain your concentration on what you're supposed to be doing. If you do with it, it takes on a life of its own and becomes a lot of fun."



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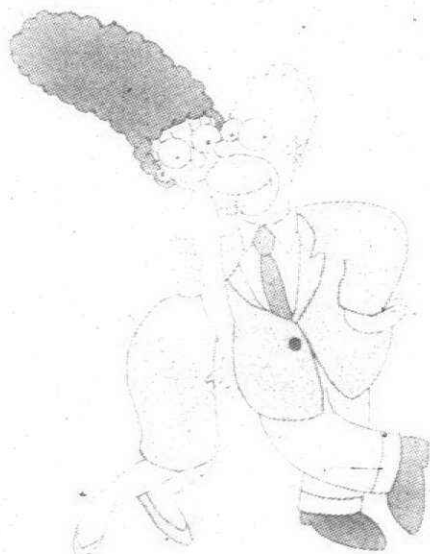

"I will never forget the moment," says director Ivan Passer, "the first day of shooting in Russia, when Mr. Duvall came out of the makeup trailer made up as Stalin." Duvall, who has the title role in HBO's three-hour film *Stalin*, also recalls that day, when he emerged after four hours of wig fitting, nose plastering and eyebrow painting. But Passer, who grew up in Czechoslovakia during the Stalinist era, says the effect was worth it.

"We had about 80 soldiers — extras, Russians, dressed up as soldiers — and about 60 people in the crew, and they just froze. And he walked through them and they couldn't look at him, they looked down and they parted so that he could go through, and they stopped talking. I got the chills."

Passer also notes that Duvall stayed in character between takes, which must have been a fine way to maintain discipline on the set.

One good turn deserves another. Fashion critic Mr. Blackwell will play himself in a talk-show sequence on an upcoming episode of ABC's *Civil Wars* titled "The Triumph of DeVille." Blackwell recently granted series star Mariel Hemingway a place on his annual Best Dressed list and has apparently earned a reward.

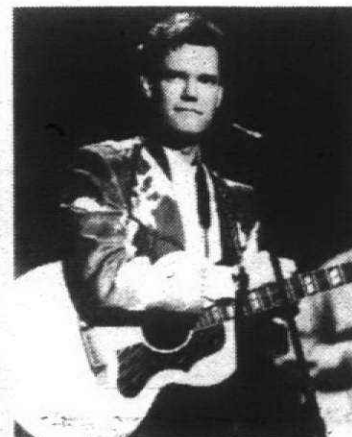


Robert Duvall in makeup for *Stalin*

Clearing the globe of environmental evil might be their full-time jobs, but the eco-warriors of *Captain Planet and the Planeteers* work overtime in a new episode airing in syndication on Saturday, Nov. 21, and the following day on the Planeteers' base station, TBS.

"A Formula for Hate," wherein the Planeteers purge polluted minds in lieu of the usual lakes and streams, is the first cartoon to deal squarely with the issue of AIDS.

The show features the voice work of Elizabeth Taylor as Donna, a mother who learns her popular, athletic child is HIV-positive and the object of a citywide hate campaign.

Taylor's own family has been directly touched by the disease, and even through a Southern drawl obviously thickened for effect, heartfelt pain and indignation are effectively emoted. Other guest voices include Neil Patrick Harris (*Doogie Howser, M.D.*), as Donna's afflicted high-school son Todd, and Danica McKellar (*Winnie, The Wonder Years*), as his unwavering girlfriend.

Surprisingly few stones remain unturned in this episode's path to better understanding, especially considering its animation. But as loyal Planeteers and their parents can attest, this is what *Captain Planet* creator Ted Turner envisioned, a cartoon with a conscience.

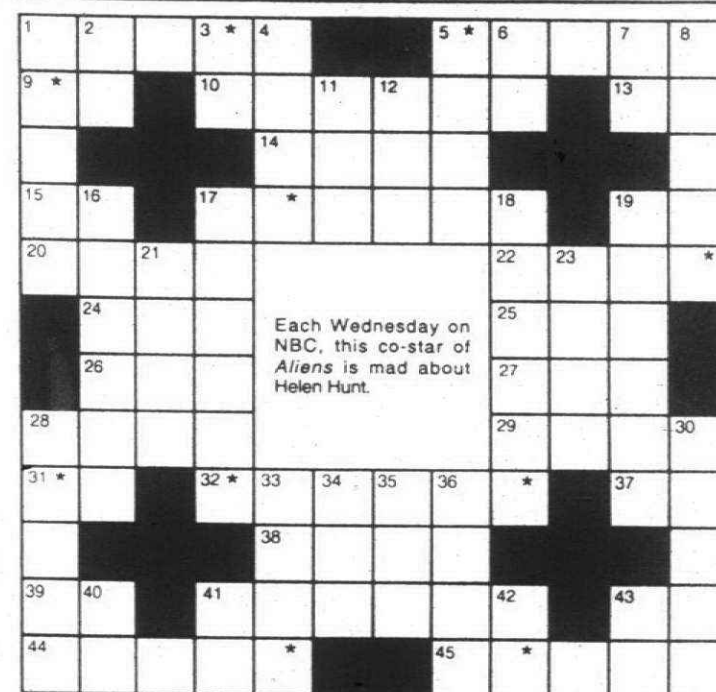

Spend some time on the Emerald Isle this week as The Learning Channel celebrates "The Glory of Ireland" with daily documentary offerings focusing on its beauty, history, literature and song. The selections include *In All Her Sins and Graces: J.P. Donleavy's Ireland*, making its television debut Wednesday, Nov. 18. In the one-hour program, the Irish-American novelist guides the viewer around his motherland, reminiscing about the writing of his first book, *The Ginger Man*, and offering insight to the nature of the Irish people.

The son of an Irish bartender, James Cagney is remembered Tuesday, Nov.

17, on A&E's *Biography*. The former vaudevillian made his mark in the American cinema as a tough guy, dancer and consummate professional and was in 1941 the second-highest-paid man in America.

Has the nation forgotten its roots? The question of whether the family farm still has a place in America is addressed in *There But For the Grace of God*, airing Saturday, Nov. 21, on The Discovery Channel. The program examines the economic struggles that threaten the very concept of small farms.

Debuting Saturday on HBO, *Stalin* stars Robert Duvall as the Russian tyrant who committed genocide against his own people. The three-hour film also stars Maximilian Schell and Julia Ormond.

Three Gabors, dah-ling; Swayze not a dad

Q: We are really curious about the Gabor sisters. How many of them are there, and what are their ages and names? Also, is Eva the youngest and does she pronounce her name "A"-va? —Phil Richards, Portland, Ore.

A: There are three Gabor sisters. Zsa Zsa (born Sari), Eva (indeed pronounced with the long "a" sound) and Magda. Zsa Zsa, the eldest of the three Budapest, Hungary, natives, was born on Feb. 6, 1921 and married eight times. The star of films including *Moulin Rouge* and *Queen of Outer Space*, she was once convicted of slapping a policeman. Eva, the youngest sister, chirped "Ah-lee-vah!" on TV's *Green Acres*, was born on Feb. 11, 1924, and has had five husbands. Magda's birthday is not widely known, since she has not pursued a screen career.

Q: Will you please tell me what you know about an actress from the '30s and '40s named Beulah Bondi?

A: She was cast as the mother of the hero in many classic films. Two of my favorites were *Bondi* as Gary Cooper's mother in *Sergeant York* and as James Stewart's mother in *It's a Wonderful Life*. —Barbara Sudheimer, Kihei, Hawaii.

A: Beulah Bondi (originally Bondy) was born on May 3, 1892, in Chicago. She had appeared in small stage productions even before the turn of the century, and her acting talent would be relegated to stock theater for 25 more years before she won a major Broadway role in *One of the Family*. Five years later, she appeared in her first film, *Street Scene*, at age 39. The remainder of her career was spent in mature characterizations.

Topping the list of her long and illustrious film roles are her two Oscar-nominated performances, for 1936's *The Gorgeous Hussy* and 1938's *Of Human Hearts*.

Bondi also won an Emmy in 1977 for Outstanding Lead Actress for a Single Appearance in a Drama or Comedy Series for "The Pony Cart" episode of *The Waltons*, portraying a dying, reclusive Walton who touches the lives of the mountain family before she

passes away. Bondi never married; she died in 1981.

Q: Can you tell me if Patrick Swayze and his wife have any children? I say "yes" and my friend says "no." Who is right? —Sharon Gallagher, Portland, Ore.

A: Just saying "no" seems to pay off in many ways, and this is one of them. Sorry, Swayze and his wife, Lisa Niemi (see 'em both in *Steel Dawn*), have no children.

Q: Several years ago we saw a great movie on television and have never seen it again. The wife is an absent-minded person who can't get through a normal day without reminders and written notes from her husband. They relocate, and she must travel alone to the new city where they will be living in the family station wagon. She forgets to fill the tank, and she witnesses a robbery and murder when she finally stops for gas, and afterwards she is chased cross-country. What is the name of this movie, and is it available on video? —Carol Gerue, Stephenson, Mich.

A: The frightfully forgetful character was played by Valerie Harper, and the movie of which you write is *Night Terror*, a 1976 made-for-television effort co-starring Richard Romanus, Michael Tolan, Quinn Cummings and Nicholas Pryor. *Video Hound's* reference book says it's available on both VHS and Beta tapes.

Baseball's expansion teams go to market

Dennis Burlingame and Jim Poole aren't household names, but to the Florida Marlins and the Colorado Rockies, they may spell future success. Burlingame and Poole are among the big league prospects expected to be selected during ESPN's exclusive six-and-a-half hour coverage of Major League Baseball's expansion draft, airing live Tuesday, Nov. 17, from New York.

"Nothing like this has ever been shown before on television," says Keith Olberman, who will anchor ESPN's coverage with assistance from Peter Gammons, Ray Knight and a host of floor and field reporters.

During the draft, owners of the two expansion teams will put their scouting ability to the test when they select 36 players each from the unprotected lists of the 26 existing major league teams, who are allowed to protect just 15 of their major and minor league players.

Simple? Hardly. Some of the rules behind the draft read like a superpower arms treaty. Existing teams have been preparing for this day since the rules were spelled out over a year ago, and the draft-day wheeling and dealing as teams scramble to protect their young prospects and established stars should be interesting, to say the least.

"There will be an element of the three-ring circus here, but I really think that will make for some great television," says Olberman.
