A week after meeting with a dozen community leaders who urged her not to leave, Plymouth-Canton Schools Superintendent Kathleen Booher has decided not to seek other career opportunities.

"The major reason I reconsidered is the enormous groundswell of support from employees and community members that I had not remotely anticipated," Booher said in an interview with the Observer. "A lot of people were able to demonstrate to me that we have already made some significant differences in 20 months, and that we have a good start to a number of things we have to do here. The recognition of that was more widespread than I would have imagined."

Booher, hired in February 2000, told school board members last month she was seeking other opportunities because outside forces were causing disruptions, resulting in her losing

#### effectiveness.

"In my heart of hearts, it wasn't time. to leave Plymouth-Canton as long as I could be effective," she said. "I made my decision to leave because weekly I was being rendered less and less effective.

Soon after making the announcement, parents, teachers and community leaders began an effort to keep Booher from leaving. For Booher, it became a tough decision. While she was being courted to stay, she was one of three finalists for the Livingston County Educational Services Agency superintendent's position, and one of six scheduled to be interviewed for the Hillsdale County Intermediate School District's top job.

"I wanted to make sure that once I had my mind made up, there were no doubts. Intellectually, I worked hard at making the decision, but I also allowed myself to look emotionally at all three options," she said. "With the support in place, where this communi-

# Hearing reveals many dislike water park plan

Convincing the Wayne County Commission to help finance a Canton aquatics park was going to be difficult, but after Monday night's citizen input meeting, plans for the facility may be sunk.

Most of the 150 Canton residents who attended spoke out against the park's construction at Ford and Ridge Road, and only a handful gave it a lukewarm welcome.





# On Michigan Avenue, things are looking up

Once a pretty, rural highway, Michigan Avenue has over the last few years become a jumbled mix of commercial, industrial and residential development. A few businesses are betting the road has the potential to provide profit.

"You see an opportunity, and you take it," said Mark Kwilos, co-owner of Vinnie's submarine shop, which opened two weeks ago just west of I-275. "There really aren't a lot of restaurants

in the area, and this part of Canton is going to take off really soon."

Kwilos and business partner Vinnie Altier researched locations in Livonia and Northville, as well as along Ford in Canton, and chose the Michigan Avenue location.

"Ford Road is too congested. It's saturated," Altier said. "But right here we have 5,000 cars passing every day, all day long."

The little Italian sub shop isn't the only business banking on Michigan

The negative comments didn't fall on deaf ears. The plans still need to be approved by the Canton Township Board of Trustees, and will likely be put to a vote this month. During the next two months, the plan will be reviewed by a Wayne County committee, and will either be brought to the Commission for approval, or will be scrapped in committee.

Two banks, Bob Evans restaurant, Kroger and Arby's have announced plans to build along the highway.

"There hasn't been a lot happening down there, at least there wasn't for a number of years," said Canton Township Trustee and Planning Commissioner Melissa McLaughlin, "But there will be a lot of things that will happen if the economy would pick up or if the state would finish the road improvements," on Michigan Avenue west of Beck.

"The current zoning for the highway includes a few pockets of commercial, interspersed with high-quality industrial and research park-type developments," said McLaughlin.

However, the planning commission at its last meeting approved expanding uses on some of the commercially zoned and light industrial areas in hopes of attracting car dealers.

When Auto Nation left, we really had to look at whether we wanted another car dealership to locate on Ford Road," said Township Supervisor Tom Yack. "The land there is really too expensive for that use, and the area is largely commercial, and not appropriate. So we looked at the possibility of car lots on Michigan Avenue."

The commission reduced set-

backs and made other concessions to address the odd shape of the lots, which had made them previously unusable, McLaughlin said.

"Often property owners were stymied by the shape of the land, so we broadened some of the possible uses. We have a lot of vacant property on Michigan Avenue and we needed for peo-

ple to be able to use their land in a positive way."

The commission will, during the next year, examine the master plan, concentrating on Michigan Avenue.

"We need to focus some attention on that area to try to answer some of the difficulties we've had there," she said. "We don't really like the way the road

pictures please' looks either in some areas, and there have been long-term drainage issues that'll eventually work themselves out so we can do some landscaping.'

Another obstacle for Michigan Avenue has been neglected properties.

"There are a number of properties on Michigan Avenue that have not been maintained. There are a few that have made real improvements, like Keller-Stein and the cemetery is putting up a new fence, but it's still pretty patchy," she said. "There are just a lot of property owners that have not been motivated because the know they'll be bought out eventually, or they're a small business and they don't have a lot of revenue."

Improvements won't happen overnight, but they're on the way, according to McLaughlin. For those that invest, good times are coming.

"With all of the building on Geddes and the future growth on Michigan just about any business that opens will have ready customers.

From behind the counter of his new restaurant, Altier said he believes the location will help his

business thrive. "I've already established a pretty good customer base, and it's only going to get better."





### **Donation helps restore old school**

The school opened in 1868 and was named for Timothy Sheldon and his family. Sheldon was a farmer and operated an inn nearby in the early days of Canton Township. At one time there was a small community in the area known as Sheldon Corners. Lewiston was presented with a

A 35th District Court employee developed a rash while opening mail at the courthouse in Plymouth, forcing court officials to evacuate nearly 150 people for nearly 45 minutes Monday.

The courthouse resumed business after police and hazardous materials teams decided there was no danger to anyone. A court official said six employees were taken to St. Mary's Hospital in Livonia as a precaution.

"A group of individuals were

opening mail and one developed a rash," said Kerry Erdman, 35th District Court administrator. "As a precaution they were taken to the hospital. However, a rash is inconsistent with anthrax, which takes a couple of days to develop boil-like symptoms."

The rash on the woman was beginning to clear before she was sent to the hospital, Erdman said.

No powder was found on the mail, said George Berg, a court security officer. "Hazmat said they couldn't find anything to clean.

Ironically, court officials met

last week to discuss security measures, some of which were planned to begin Monday but were delayed.

"Not all the pieces of the pie were ready, but it's obvious there are areas that need to be addressed," said Erdman.


Monday's mail was supposed to be opened in a secured basement location before being dispersed to various departments. Erdman said that would definitely begin Tuesday.

"We will also learn how to shut down the heating and cooling system to keep any potential threat from spreading," he said.



"It was going to be a hard sell for me to bring the park to the western edge of the county, and it's going to be even harder if the community isn't 100 percent behind it," said Wayne County Commissioner John Sullivan, who attended the meeting. Sullivan chairs the county's Public Services Committee, which oversees parks, roads and county buildings. Sullivan is Canton's commissioner (11th District).

"At this point I don't think I can support it, and I can't ask my fellow commissioners to support it if Canton can't either." Only three residents

spoke at the meeting in favor of building the park. "This appears to be an

"This appears to be an upgraded municipal pool," said Drew Crosier of the plans. "That would serve the community very well. I think the noise would not be that big of a deal....chalk one vote for it."

Jeanine Gillikin, mother of three, also favored the park.

"If you're looking at what they're emulating, which is Rolling Hills (in Ypsilanti), it's a beautiful park." Last month, Wayne County

included in its 2002 capital outlay budget a \$4 million item which would have paid nearly half of the construction costs for a county aquatics park.

The decision to build the park at the Ford and Ridge Road site came after a series of focus group discussions, informal phone and mail surveys, and public hearings in 1999 and 2000, according to Township Supervisor Tom Yack.

The township conducted a telephone survey of more than 200 residents, and sent out more than 1,200 mail surveys, 400 of which were completed and returned.

Some of the residents called the survey results misleading because they only included fewer than 0.5 percent of Canton residents.

Gillikin suggested conducting a more formal survey of at least 1 percent of Canton residents before continuing with the plans. Canton included the park in its recreation master plan more than a year before the opportunity to partner with the countywas presented.

Wayne County received several proposals earlier this year, and favored Canton Township's plan, which would place the 15acre park on a 120-acre township-owned parcel of park property on the northwest corner of Ford Road and Ridge Road.

The park would be the first Wayne County park built in Canton. Currently, Canton residents pay about \$500,000 annually to the Wayne County parks budget. Seven out of 10 Canton voters supported the special parks tax levy in the 2000 election.



# Guile expected to leave school board

Plymouth-Canton Schools, which already is planning for the regular election of two school board members next June, will have a third vacancy to fill.

Treasurer Steve Guile, who recently lost his job as downtown development director in Westland, is negotiating to assume the city manager's position in Beaverton, Mich, a town of 1,200 people.

"I've been offered a contract, but nothing has been settled yet," said Guile. "We're still negotiating, but I should know by the end of this week."

Guile said he expects to attend the Nov. 13 regular meeting of the Board of Education, scheduled for the E.J. McClendon Educational Center in Plymouth. "After that, we'll just have to see what we can work out," said Guile.

After Guile's departure, the school board will appoint someone to fill Guile's spot until the June election. Voters in June will decide who will fill the position for the remaining one year of Guile's term.

Board member Susan Davis, who will complete her second four-year term in June, said last summer she will not seek re-election. She and her husband will be retiring out of state.

And Darwin Watts, who will be at the end of his four-year term, has not yet indicated whether he will seek re-election.

Guile said he's enjoyed the challenges of being on the school board and believes Plymouth-Canton Schools is in good financial shape.

"I don't see a major crisis coming in the next several years, but the state controls the funding level," he said. "However, I think we have enough fund equity to adjust to any budget deficit that may loom in the future. We're in better shape than a lot of school districts."



# Republicans can't reach consensus on airport committee

A lack of consensus among state Senate Republicans over what to do about Detroit Metro Airport – even as they released a review committee report critical of airport operations – appears to have put the issue on hold in Lansing for the time being.

GOP senators talked in caucus about proposals to create a state oversight board to would review and approve all airport contracts, Sen. Glenn Steil (R-Grand Rapids) confirmed Thursday, Oct. 25. But with no agreement about how to proceed, Steil said he was unsure when senators might take up the issue again.

It's not clear if that means the issue is dead in the legislature.

"I heard there was a great deal of dissension in caucus. Some wanted to get even more tough with the airport, others thought they should just back off," Detroit Regional Chamber lobbyist Sarah Hubbard said.

"With little or no support expected to come from Democrats, they are going to have to have a united Republican caucus if they are going to go forward."

Steil aide Brandon Stewart saw it differently.

"I think they want to take some time and let everybody digest the committee report. I find it hard to believe that they could read through the report and not want to take action."

Although members of the Airport Review Committee voted to approve the report, in a 3-1 vote with one abstention, GOP members differed regarding the solution. Steil, as chairman, has already introduced Senate Bill 690, which would create the oversight panel, reviewing all contracts.

Sen. Leon Stille (R-Spring Lake) pushed for even tougher action. Previously, a complete takeover had been discussed.

Sen. Loren Bennett, (R-Canton) felt the panel would likely stalemate with Wayne County overseers, just slowing down airport decision making.

But the final report of the committee's review was harsh in dealing with airport operations. "The operation of the Airport

by Wayne County reflects a deeply ingrained culture of mismanagement. The problems discovered range from an absence of clear policies for contracting (and failure to follow those policies they do have) to an almost grossly negligent lack of oversight of contracts and projects to questionable ethical practices to a haphazard accounting process," the report stated.

Conclusions reached by the committee in the report included:

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Seventeen percent of contracts showed no evidence that a request for proposals had been issued. More than half showed no evidence RFPs had been published.

Use of overly specific specifications precluded effective competitive bidding.

The airport does not adequately oversee contractors and performs no oversight of subcontractors.

The airport maintains no

inventory to track maintenance repair materials.

"A significant number" of conflict of interest disclosure statements were missing or were not produced.

The report recommended creation of an independent oversight entity that would ensure all airport projects are bid, awarded and completed "in compliance with federal, state and local laws.

Airport officials see that over-

sight committee as essentially the same as a state takeover, and say they believe it would significantly bog down the process of issuing contracts.

Airport director Lester Robinson "vehemently" disagreed with the process used by the committee and the conclusions drawn.

"We believe the committee and the (Auditor General) have selectively chosen a small number of the thousands of contracts and projects at the airport, questioned some apparent irregularities, and used that information to allege widespread mismanagement at the airport," he said.

He said the review had identified some accounting problems, but the airport has already. moved to correct them. He noted. that Wayne County has already; been working to build a new terminal that will greatly improve. service there, and has installed a Stakeholder Committee to oversee the letting of contracts.

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

Any person in violation of this Notice of Water Shortage shall be subject to penalties as prescribed in this Ordinance. (ord. no. 30 eff. May 14, 1968; amend. eff. Sept. 18, 1979; Nov. 17, 1993, Nov. 1, 2001)

#### 112.210 Section 21. VIOLATION AND PENALTY

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE REGULATION AND CONTROL OF THE CONFIGURATION, FABRICATION, LOCATION, INSTALLATION, AND MAINTENANCE OF SIGNS WITHIN THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON; PROVIDING FOR GENERAL PROVISIONS; PROVIDING FOR CERTAIN DEFINITIONS; PROVIDING FOR CONFIGURATION AND FABRICATION REQUIREMENTS; PROVIDING FOR INSTALLATION AND LOCATION REQUIREMENTS; PROVIDING FOR THE LIMITATION OF THE NUMBER OF SIGNS; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT AND VIOLATIONS; PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES; PROVIDING FOR APPEALS; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR SAVINGS CLAUSE AND EFFECTIVE DATE.

### THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON ORDAINS: 29.001 Section 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS.

The purpose of this ordinance is to promote the general safety and welfare of the residents of Canton Township by regulating and controlling all public and private graphics communications and displays. (ord. no. 120 eff. Dec. 28, 1989)

#### 29.002 Section 2. DEFINITIONS.

Words or terms contained in this ordinance shall have the meanings as defined in this ordinance. Any words or terms not defined in this ordinance shall have the meanings normally ascribed to them, or as they are defined in the other ordinances.

- SIGN. A structure which includes the name, identification, image, 2.1description, display or illustration which is affixed to, painted or represented directly or indirectly upon a building, structure or parcel of land, and which directs attention to an object, product, place, activity, facility, service, event, attraction, person, institution, organization or business, and which is visible from any street, rightof-way, sidewalk, alley, park or other public property. Customary displays of merchandise or objects and material without lettering placed behind a store window are not signs. This definition includes the base, frame and support members of the sign. (ord. no. 120 eff. Dec. 8, 1989; amended eff. Nov. 1, 2001)
- 2.2GROUND SIGN. A sign which is mounted permanently in the ground on a masonry base or monument. (ord.. no. 120 eff. Dec. 8, 1989; amended eff. Nov. 1, 2001)
- INSTITUTIONAL BULLETIN BOARD. A sign which displays the 2.3name of a religious institution, school, library, community center or similar public or quasi-public institution, that may include an announcement of its services or activities.
- CANOPY SIGN. Any sign attached to or constructed on a canopy. A 2.4canopy is a permanent roof-like shelter extending from part of or all of a building face over a public access area and constructed of the same material as the building.
- **PORTABLE SIGN.** A sign that is freestanding, not permanently anchored or secured to a building and not having supports or braces 2.5permanently secured in the ground, including but not limited to, "sandwich" signs, "A" frame signs, inverted "T" signs, and signs mounted on wheels so as to be capable of being pulled by a motor vehicle.
- ROOF SIGN. A sign that extends more than twenty-four (24) inches 2.6above the roof line. 2.7ROOF LINE. The line of intersection of the plane of the outer surface of the wall and the plane of the outer surface of the roof.  $\mathbf{2.8}$ WALL SIGN. Shall be a sign that is directly attached to a wall of a building and neither extends more than twelve (12) inches from the wall nor projects more than twenty-four (24) inches above the roof line of the building. ABANDONED SIGN. A sign which no longer directs a person to or 2.9advertises a bona fide business, tenant, owner, product or activity conducted or product available on the premises where such sign is displayed or any sign not repaired or maintained properly, after notice, pursuant to the terms of this section. 2.10BILLBOARD. Refers to a non-accessory ground sign erected for the purpose of advertising a product, event, person, or subject not related to the premises on which the said sign is located. Off-premises directional signs as permitted in this section shall not be considered billboards for the purpose of this Ordinance. OFF-PREMISE SIGN. A sign which contains a message unrelated 2.11to a business or profession conducted on the subject property or to a commodity, service or activity, not sold or offered upon the premises where such sign is located. ON-PREMISE SIGN. A sign which advertises only goods, services, 2.12facilities, events or attractions available on the premises where located, or identifies the owner or occupant or directs traffic into or from the premises. PREMISES. Any lot or parcel of land as otherwise used in this 2.13Ordinance AREA OF SIGN. The entire area within a circle, triangle, 2.14parallelogram, or other geometric configuration enclosing the extreme limits or writing, representation, emblem or any figure or similar character, together with any frame or other material or color forming an integral part of the display or used to differentiate the sign from the background against which it is placed; excluding the necessary supports or uprights on which such sign is placed. However, where such a sign has two faces, the area of all faces shall be included in determining the area of the sign, except that where two such faces, are placed back to back as a mirror image in size and shape and are at no point more than two (2) feet from one another, the area of the sign shall be taken as the area of one face if the two faces are of equal area, or the area of the larger face if the two (2) faces are of unequal area. NON-CONFORMING SIGN. Any advertising structure or sign 2.15which was lawfully erected and maintained prior to the effective date of this Ordinance, and any amendments thereto, and which fails to conform to all applicable regulations and restrictions of this Ordinance, or a sign for which a permit was previously issued that does not comply with the provisions of this Ordinance. 2.16PERIODIC CHANGE SIGN. A sign where the wording, image, description, display or illustration changes at regular intervals of time 2.17NATURAL MATERIALS. Substances determined to be "natural materials" for the purposes of this Ordinance shall include, but not be limited to wood, stone and soft textured brick. Although plastic, plywood, pressed board, drywall, wood or metal paneling and sheet metal are generally excluded from this definition, consideration will be given to synthetic materials which simulate the appearance of a "natural material" through the manufacturing process and meet the intent of this ordinance GASOLINE PUMP ISLAND. A combination of more than one fuel-2.18dispensing device, clustered together, to provide a customer with more than one option of type of fuel or grade thereof, to be purchased. SIGN SETBACK. Where it is specified that a sign must be located a 2.19 minimum or other certain distance from property lines or public rights-of-way, such distance will be measured from the portion of the sign structure nearest to such specified line. For the purpose of this measurement, the property lines and public right-of-way lines extend vertically and perpendicularly from the ground to infinity. 2.20AWNING SIGN. Shall be a sign that is a roof-like structure made of canvas or similar materials, stretched over a frame and directly attached to a wall of a building. Awning signs shall extend more than twelve (12) inches but not more than thirty-six (36) inches from the wall. Awning signs shall not project more than twenty-four (24) inches above the roof line of the building. PROJECT ANNOUNCEMENT SIGN. Shall be a temporary ground 2.21sign used to announce the name and nature of a project or general information concerning rental or sales. (ord. no. 120 eff. Dec. 28, 1989; amended eff. Feb. 6, 1992; amendment eff. Nov. 3, 1993)

CHANGEABLE COPY SIGN/READER BOARD. A sign or portion 2.22thereof with characters, letters, or illustrations that can be changed or rearranged without altering the face or the surface of the sign. A sign on which the message changes more than eight times per day shall be considered an animated sign and not a changeable copy sign for purposes of this Ordinance. A sign on which the only copy that changes is an electronic or mechanical indication of time, temperature, or stock market quotation shall be considered a "time, temperature, stock market" portion of a sign and not a changeable copy sign for purposes of this Ordinance. (Ord. 120 eff. Dec. 28, 1989; amended eff. Dec. 2, 1999)

#### 29.003 Section 3. PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS AND PERMIT REQUIREMENTS.

Except as otherwise indicated in this Ordinance, the regulations of the State Construction Code as adopted by the Township shall apply to signs. Where the provisions of this section are more restrictive in respect to location, use, size or height of signs, the limitations of this Ordinance shall take precedence over the regulations of the State Construction Code.

- 3.1It shall be unlawful to construct, display, install, change or cause to be constructed, displayed, installed, or changed a sign requiring a permit upon any property within the Charter Township of Canton without first obtaining a sign permit.
- It shall be unlawful to construct, display, install, change, have, or cause to be constructed, displayed, installed or changed any sign upon 3.2any property within the Charter Township of Canton in violation of the requirements of this ordinance. - 29.004 Section 4. SIGNS PERMITTED WITHOUT REQUIRING A SIGN PERMIT

The following signs are permitted without a sign permit in all zoning districts where the principal permitted use to which they are related is a permitted use in that district.

- 4.1 Address numbers, name plates (including apartment units and office suites) identifying the occupant or address of a parcel of land and not exceeding three (3) square feet in area. All address numbers shall comply with the provisions of Ordinance No. 62.
- 4.2Memorial signs or tablets, not to exceed eight (8) square feet in area, containing the name of the building and date of erection, when cut into any masonry surface or constructed of bronze or other incombustible material and affixed to the exterior wall of the building.
- 4.3Signs painted on or permanently attached to legally licensed vehicles which are used upon the highways for transporting persons, goods or equipment.
- Traffic or other municipal signs including, but not limited to, the 4.4following: legal notices, historic site designations, municipal facility directional signs, street or traffic signs, railroad crossing signs, danger and other emergency signs as may be approved by the Township Board or any Federal, State or County agency having jurisdiction over the matter of the sign. Such signs may be located in any zoning district. However, all signs on governmental property on which a municipal building is located shall meet the commercial and industrial zoning district requirements in section 9.0 of this ordinance.

Community special event signs approved by the Township Board. 4.5Gasoline service stations may display the following special sign which 4.6is deemed customary and necessary to their respective businesses. Customary lettering or other insignia on a gasoline pump consisting of brand of gasoline sold, lead warning information, and any other data required by law and not exceeding a total of three (3) square feet on each pump.

- 4.7 One sign advertising parcels of land or building for rent, lease or sale, when located on the land or building intended to be rented, leased or sold, not exceeding six (6) square feet in area, four (4) feet in height in residential districts and twenty-four (24) square feet in area, six (6) feet in height in office, commercial and industrial districts. One sign per parcel that fronts on a public street. All signs reflecting zoning classifications must be accurate with current zoning designation. An additional eighteen (18) square feet of sign area will be permitted if the sign faces the I-275 Freeway and if the property is adjacent to the I-275 Freeway. (Ord. no. 120 eff. Dec. 28, 1989; amended eff. Nov. 1, 2001)
- 4.8Institutional use bulletin board, not to exceed eighteen (18) square feet in area and not to exceed six (6) feet in height; including the frame and base of such sign set back ten (10) feet from any property line, for use by educational non-profit institutions licensed by the state, houses of worship or other public entities. # Say 'no' to WCCC tax Tuesday at the polls

Most Canton voters won't be going to the polls next Tuesday.

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But some will and that's where we have a problem.

Canton residents who live in the Wayne-Westland and Van Buren school districts – about 7,000 total – will, if they are aware or remember, cast ballots on a 1.5-mill tax increase for Wayne County Community College.

For a variety of reasons, the Observer believes voters in the college district should reject the proposal.

There are about 14,000 full- and parttime students enrolled on five WCCC campuses, the majority of whom live and attend classes in Detroit. In addition to portions of Canton Township, the district includes Redford, Westland, Wayne and a number of Downriver communities.

To begin with, the college is seeking what amounts to a \$32-million boost in annual revenue only a year after a similar tax proposal was defeated. \*

Canton voters were especially emphatic, defeating it by two-and-a-half to one. Although things have improved under current Chancellor Curtis Ivery, WCCC's history of questionable financial management stretched through much of the 1990s.

To its credit, the college has included ballot language ending the tax hike after 10 years, as opposed to the permanent increase it was seeking in 2000.

But the main reason for rejecting Tuesday's ballot issue is a lack of value returned for local taxpayers. By voting yes, suburban residents will be agreeing to pay taxes that are far disproportionate to their use of college facilities.

For example, only about 100 Canton residents currently attend the WCCC's Only about 100 Canton residents currently attend the WCCC's western campus in Belleville.

western campus in Belleville. Meanwhile, if the proposal passes, the township would send some \$428,000 to the college next year, up from \$286,000 in 2001. That works out to a \$150 tax increase for the owner of a \$200,000 home.

Higher suburban property values generally mean wealthier residents pick up an uneven share of the load on countywide millages – something that's inherent to taxes tied to property or income. In the case of the WCCC request, the difference is just too great to ignore.

In addition, most of Canton – the portion served by Plymouth-Canton Community Schools – is tied to the Schoolcraft Community College District and all township residents are eligible to attend.

While we can't in good conscience recommend approval of Tuesday's tax increase, neither can we support various bills floating around Lansing that would allow local communities to opt out of their college district whenever they choose.

In fact, the most recent legislation, HB5157 sponsored by state Rep. William O'Neil (D-Allen Park), has been narrowed to the point where WCCC is the only college it would affect. The goal here shouldn't be to punish any one institution, but to find equitable ways to pay for an affordable and worthwhile option in higher education.



### 4 for Booher

# County commission must fix airport business practices

Detroit Metropolitan Wayne County Airport and Northwest Airlines officials showed off the new Edward H. McNamara Terminal recently to Observer reporters and a photographer.

According to one airport official, "The wow factor is going to be there."

After years of being rated one of the world's worst airports, it's long past time that Metro offered its customers a little "wow."

For County Executive McNamara the new terminal, named in his honor, will put to rest the numerous complaints about "third-world" service and help lead Southwest Michigan to an economic revival. McNamara has been the prime mover in making the new \$1.2 billion terminal complex and other airport improvements a reality. Once the new terminal goes into operation in January, work will progress on reconstructing the aging current terminals.

McNamara has written with visionary fervor in this newspaper about how important the new terminal will be to the area's future while, at the same time, chastising those who have been critical of the airport's past service and accounting problems. He has vigorously defended his record on airport management, though acknowledging that mistakes were made. He has charged that criticism by state legislators is "just politics" and motivated by a desire to have the GOP-controlled state government take over airport management from Democratic Wayne County.

Now it seems that Republican legislators are having second thoughts about creating a state oversight committee on airport contracts. A recent party Senate caucus ended in a stalemate with some senators wanting to pursue the oversight committee, some wanting to move ahead with plans for a state takeover of the airport and others wanting to back off any action for now.

But the Senate's Airport Review Committee had harsh words concerning airport operations:

"The operation of the Airport by Wayne County reflects a deeply ingrained culture of mismanagement. The problems discovered range from an absence of clear policies for contracting (and failure to follow those policies they do have) to an almost grossly negligent lack of oversight of contracts and projects

to questionable ethical practices to a haphazard accounting process," the report stated.

Airport Director Lester Robinson criticized the report for "selectively" focusing on a few problem contracts and projects to paint a picture of widespread mismanagement. He also said many of the

accounting problems are being addressed and that the new terminal will address the service problems.

He also said that a proposed "stakeholders" committee would provide adequate oversight.

We have opposed any attempt at a state takeover or a permanent state oversight committee. But we believe that the state Legislature certainly has a right to investigate questionable activities within the state. We also believe that the manner in which the Republican Legislature has pursued its investigation and the rhetoric used seem to support McNamara's complaint of "just politics."

Still, the state committee and previous county audits raise real questions and concerns about past airport practices and about the future. The "stakeholders" committee has no real authority and skeptics will wonder about its impartiality in evaluating contracts.

Once again, we urge the county commission to step up to its responsibility and to counter the state investigation with a thorough investigation of its own. We also urge the commission to put in place new standards for letting contracts, hiring and monitoring of cost overruns.

### Likes MLK day

Last winter the Canton Township Board decided to form a Human Relations Commission. Their reasoning was that such a commission would be a substantial alternative to what they saw as the merely symbolic option of declaring Martin Luther King Day as a township holiday.

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

# **Make state government** regularly review efficiency

Experts say it's the state's worst fiscal crisis in 20 years.

Numbers coming out of last week's state revenue projection conference suggest the state general fund budget will be \$500 million (about 5percent) in the red and the school aid fund will face a \$330 million shortfall (around 3 percent) for the fiscal year that started on Oct. 1. Compared with revenue estimates originally devel-



oped last May, these numbers add up to a combined budget shortfall of nearly \$1 billion.

State revenue losses are coming from a soft economy that was weak before Sept. 11 and is now almost certainly in a recession. State fiscal agencies reported that income tax rev-

gle Business Tax collections are 8 percent below projections. Gov. John Engler is proposing enormous state budget reductions - from 5 to 10 percent - from every department. The cuts will have to be approved by a legislature already preoccupied to the point of obsession with next year's election and terrified of either cutting appropriations for favored programs or raising (or appearing to raise) taxes, or both.

The situation is already provoking violent and self-serving arguments about what to do.

Both Gov. Engler and state budget director Don Gilmer want to cut expenditures, maybe across the board, maybe not. Some legislators want to reduce the pain by tapping into the state's \$1 billion rainy day fund, while others are worried about the wisdom of draining the fund prematurely.

Some education officials want to postpone reductions in the state income tax and the Single Business Tax, a step that would increase state revenue by more than \$200 million. The Michigan Chamber of Commerce wants yet more tax cuts as well as reductions in unemployment insurance payments from business, while the Michigan Retailers Association has called for temporary elimination of the state sales tax.

Frankly, I have no idea what our legislative, lobbying and political masters are going to wind up doing. As the constitution forbids deficit spending, I am moderately confident they'll wind up doing something, although it won't be pretty during the developmental phrases.

While they're doing whatever it is, they might

want to take up an old idea that still has plenty of juice. Way back in 1976, a volunteer citizen group called the Michigan Efficiency Task Force proposed 562 specific recommendations designed to improve management and organizational efficiency in state government.

The ideas ranged from relatively simple procedural changes to proposals for major departmental reorganizations and systems redesign. The task force's proposals wound up saving the state an estimated \$47 million in annual costs.

The task force's report has largely sat in dusty obscurity on library shelves ever since. It's the standard fate of "Blue Ribbon" citizen commissions, which normally start out in a frenzy of good intentions but wind up overtaken by events and then by general boredom. I should know; I was a member of the task force, and it took me a fair amount of rooting around to dig out the original report.

A useful step to take now would be to recreate,

by statute, a similar commission, charged with evaluating the effectiveness and efficiency of state government. It should be composed of a bipartisan cross section of private-sector residents appointed by the governor and confirmed by the legislature. Most important, it should be convened and asked to report periodically - say, every five years - which makes it and its recommendations a permanent part of the state's political and policy landscape, always fresh and correspondingly difficult to ignore.

We already have state agencies devoted to making sure accounts are properly kept (the Auditor General) and making sure we don't have excessive and expensive regulations (the Office of Regulatory Reform).

But we don't have a group specifically charged with evaluating the organization and management of state government so as to reduce cost and waste.

It won't solve our current budget crisis, but such a commission could make the next one a lot less severe.

#### Finally, there is trust

In recent days, people in our community have had many things to say about the possibility of Kathleen Booher leaving the Plymouth-Canton school district. I am hoping that the residents of our community would want to know how Dr. Booher's presence might affect our district's teachers and the important work they do.

It is no secret that district-wide staff morale was at a dismally low point just before the arrival of Dr. Booher, and no group was left feeling more disenfranchised than the teachers at our community's two high schools.

Our former superintendent portrayed the teaching staff at P-CEP publicly and privately as incompetent, unimaginative and selfish. We were viewed by that administration as opponents of change and told that our schools were out of control. I am still profoundly saddened when I think of those friends who chose an early retirement or sought new employment because they felt no hope. Predictably, the vast majority of us were more

than skeptical when a new superintendent was selected.

Among the many concerns was how our new leader would deal with the high school renewal initiative that was just getting under way. This initiative has the potential to affect the most sweeping change at P-CEP since the opening of Canton High School in 1973.

The key feature of this process is that the teachers and principals themselves would be trusted to

lead the renewal effort. As one who has been closely involved with the renewal project from the very start, I can tell you it has not been an easy thing to convince the teachers I work with every day that after years of disrespect, central administration had suddenly decided to trust them with the potential overhaul of the community's high schools.

For these doubtful teachers, there was only one question: Would they be supported in the renewal effort with the time, resources, and trust they need to do this important work or would it be just like so many other district boondoggles of the past?

Those of us who have been watching Dr. Booher over the past year-and-a-half have received our answer. Although the events leading up to high school renewal and the actual planning stages were begun before she arrived, Dr. Booher has demonstrated she is committed to protecting the process, supporting our work with the time and resources we need, and - most precious, nearly unimaginable – extending to us her trust.

It is my sincere hope the parents and citizens of this community can find a way to think beyond the short term, beyond the individual program or the single issue that may be of concern. Let it be fully understood that no one but the purveyors of discord will be served if we allow ourselves to descend into yet another abyss of distrust and instability. As one whose perspective is set squarely in the classroom, I urge both Dr. Booher and the responsible people of our community to protect our schools and our children from the disruption that another change of administration in such a short period of time will bring.

# SEMCOG approves transit plan, including SpeedLink

The Southeast Michigan Council of Governments has approved a regional transportation plan that will set the direction of mass transit in the region for the next 25 years.

The regional agency held the vote at a meeting at the St John's Conference Center in Plymouth Township late Thursday afternoon.

The \$2 billion plan includes bus rapid transit, known as SpeedLink, that would cover 259 miles along 12 of the region's busiest corridors. The high speed bus service would pick up riders at some 265 stations and transport them along dedicated lanes toward their destination.

Bus rapid transit may be expensive, at \$1.8 billion for development, but the price beats light rail transit, which would run somewhere between \$8 billion and \$14 billion to cover the same areas.

The plan will also feature a regional authority to oversee mass transit in the region. SMART and DDOT will continue to operate their systems, but the regional authority will coordi-

nate their activities with the overall plan.

Approval by the municipal members of SEMCOG is the first step in a process that will culminate in an election to approve the system. But first, the state Legislature will have to set up the governing structure. Bills to create the authority are to be introduced in Lansing yet this year.

Then a funding source will have to be provided. Which funding source is the best is under

study now by Citizens Research Council. Options for raising the money include an income tax, payroll tax, excise tax on services, sales tax, property tax, gas taxes or vehicle registration fees.


SEMCOG Director Paul Tait said he believes this is the strongest transit plan the region has had in many years. The review of the proposal over the summer included a survey of 1,400 households and 23 public forums which took input from more than 800 people.

Agreement among regional leaders on the proposal was first announced in the spring at the Detroit Regional Chamber's annual spring conference.







And when he's not performing, he's still running a small independent label, Amazing Grease Records, home to Oranger, The Moore Brothers and more. "The crowds in Detroit are always some of the best crowds in America," said Kannberg.

# Out of this world looks familiar in 'K-PAX'

A visitor from another galaxy has spent the past five years observing life on Earth. He's not sure if the human race will continue. He has doubts about our unpredictable and violent nature.

On the other hand, he loves our strawberries and bananas.

Welcome to the K-PAX, by far the most interesting film I've seen this year. It's a movie about human nature, relationships and memories.

Kevin Spacey plays Prot, an alien from the planet K-PAX who tries so hard to fit in with our world. Jeff Bridges is Dr. Mark Powell, a seasoned psychiatrist who has trouble connecting with the people closest to him.

Their worlds connect almost

by accident. The police turn Prot over to Dr. Powell in the opening scene after he tells them the light on their planet is too bright for him. Naturally Dr. Powell concludes Prot is suffering from delusions.

Without giving away the movie, it's safe to say his opinion will change.

Director Iain Softley (The Wings of the Dove) is not trying to tell us a science fiction story. In the end, Dr. Powell realizes it doesn't really matter where Prot came from.

Some disturbing scenes toward the end keep me from recommending K-PAX as a family film. At the same time, there are many themes here that would no doubt generate some entertaining discussion at the dinner table. That said, parents might want to check this one out by themselves before taking the

kids to see it.

Watch how photographer John Mathieson captures the light in almost every scene. He received an Academy Award nomination for his work on Ridley Scott's Gladiator. I won't be surprised if he earns one for his work on this film.



### Familiarity makes Sandtraps on 5 a cozy choice for dining

Dining at Sandtraps on 5 is akin to paying a visit to old friends, even if you don't know them yet.

The atmosphere is warm and cozy, light jazz and conversation fills the air, and chef and restaurant owner George Subu and his son Johnny, who manages the restaurant, tour the tables regularly to make sure customers are happy.

Happy customers are important to the Subus, who opened Sandtraps 10 months ago after extensively remodeling the location, a plantation-style clubhouse that overlooks Idyl Wyld golf course on Five Mile.

The remodeling has not only been related to the restaurant's interior. The Subus are also working on reversing the fortune of the location, which has housed a number of not-so-successful restaurants in the past.

According to George Subu, the reversal of fortune is well underway

"I feel this way," Subu said. "This is Livonia's best kept secret.'

Sandtraps is Subu's first venture into the restaurant business as an owner. Born in Yugoslavia and of Rumanian descent. Subu has worked in restaurants all of his adult life.

He started cooking at a truck stop before becoming an apprentice chef at the Chambertin in Dearborn. He sharpened his talents as a chef at the Dearborn Inn before he settled for 18 years at Topper's in Dearborn.

Johnny Subu was steeped in the restaurant business at Top-

per's, where he started as a busboy at the age of 15 and became a bartender. He was later hired as restaurant manager at Ginopolis Parthenon in Plymouth Township.

After chalking up all those years of experience, the Subus decided to strike out on their own.

"I worked all my life for someone else," Subu said. "It was time for me to put in some time for myself and my sons." In contrast to corporate chain

restaurants, Sandtraps is truly a

family-operated restaurant where homemade and fresh food is served.

George, another of Subu's sons, works in the kitchen. So does Subu's mother, Vicki.

"Grandma makes all the bread fresh daily," Subu said.

Soups are also prepared daily, and Sandtraps specializes in a number of fresh seafood dishes, which are made available dependent on the market.

Seafood specialties on the menu include marinated pesto salmon and planked whitefish. But Sandtraps is not an ordinary family restaurant, Johnny Subu said.

"What we strive for is to become one of the best," he said. "We want to become a new landmark in the city.'

Entrees at Sandtraps cover a broad spectrum.

Menu items such as steaks and chops, chicken and veal, seafood, sandwiches and vegetarian stir fry dishes vie for the diner's attention, as does a healthy selection of daily lunch and

evening specials.

The restaurant's desert menu includes Snicker's pie, tiramisu, New York cheese cake, apple pie ala mode and a homemade rice pudding, which served warm and with cinnamon on top is worth saving room for.

"We have a different type of menu than most people do," said Johnny Subu, who recommends that customers try the almondcrusted pickerel when its available. "We pay attention to detail."

On a recent Friday, specials included the pickerel, all-you-caneat fish & chips, prime rib of beef and a flavorful chicken Tosca topped with Alfredo sauce.

In keeping with Friday traditions, the Subus served up a zesty

Others were from the Livonia area but the smiling chef greeted them as if they were old friends just the same.

Livonians Gary Dixon and Ruth Olsen said they make it a point to dine at Sandtraps at least once a week. Olsen described the restaurant like it was a personal treasure, but one she was more than willing to share.

Dixon warned against leaving without trying the calamari.

"We love the food and we come



#### **Pruning**, mowing

Roses shouldn't be pruned until spring; late fall pruning often will result in more severe winter kill.

Begin winter protection just after the first hard frost. To protect them from the changing temperatures, mound the soil up about 8 to 10 inches around the

It's not too crown of the plant. You can also late to plant use a mulch. bulbs,

If you choose to have additional protection, straw or peat moss can be used to cover the exposed soil and the top of the plants. Before adding either of these products, tie all branches together so the tops won't break under heavy snow.

Don't prune trees now, but wait until late fall and winter to take out crossed or dead branches from trees. If pruning is done when the weather is warm, some diseases such as Oak Wilt and Dutch Elm Disease may be spread by insects attracted to the wound sites. So this is the time to sharpen and clean your tools to be ready when it's time to prune.

Keep mowing the grass until it stops growing. A mulching mower can be used to shred the fallen leaves while the grass is mowed, then they can be left in place.

The compost pile will appreciate chopped fallen leaves, also. Use black plastic garbage bags filled with leaves or surround the compost heap with bales of straw to "heat up" the pile so it will cook.

After the ground is frozen, use

#### mulch or compost to protect Rosemary plants during the cold months

Many of us have no luck keeping a rosemary plant alive indoors during the winter, but hope springs eternal! Tom De Baggio, owner of T. De Baggio Herbs in Arlington, Va., says that rosemary does well with a coarse, free-draining soil mixture: one part sphagnum peat to one part perlite, plus 1 teaspoon of lime for a 6-inch pot.

It needs a nearly neutral growing medium, and lime reduces the peat's acidity. Using a clay pot allows the medium to dry out more quickly between waterings. Brown or black leaf tips or leaf

shredding, starting at the base of the plant, are signs of overwatering. Droopy stem tips or leaves that are a little grayer and angle up more sharply than normal are signs of underwatering.

Keep spindly winter growth pruned, leaving one branch of soft, new growth as a water meter. The soft growth will wilt when the rosemary is too dry.

De Baggio never prunes the roots or moves rosemary into larger containers in the fall, but waits until spring to cut off a third of the roots on the bottom and sides and repots in the same or a slightly larger container.

It may take a while to find the right spot in your home. A cooler room (around 55 degrees) keeps the growth compact but lengthens the time to dry; warmer .rooms let the rosemary dry out more quickly but encourage spindly growth.





# Family-owned wig shop helps women restore self-confidence

After plumbing problems forced her to close her wig supply business in Taylor, Ellie McDermott of Canton thought she'd have to close up shop for good. She wrote letters to all her customers informing them of the closing, but she never mailed them.

"I carried them in my car for two weeks," she said. "They're my friends, not just my customers. We deal with a lot of cancer patients, and they said if you close, where are we to go?

Several months ago, McDermott's daughter, Denise Kuehn of Novi, who works with her mother, decided to take Telegraph Road home after work. It was the first time she had taken that route. She had always taken the expressway.

Later, she reflected her decision was due to Divine Providence. She spotted an empty storefront on Telegraph just south of Michigan with a "For Lease" sign in the window.

"After I saw that sign I went home and prayed for an answer," said Kuehn.

#### Doing what they do best

Today, the family-owned business, established in 1967, continues serving customers in its new Dearborn Heights location. McDermott, Kuehn and Lisa Winslow of Canton, McDermott's other daughter, continue to do what they do best - help women who have lost their hair due to alopecia or chemotherapy look their best.

New customer Lucille Schroeder of Dearborn Heights loves her new wig. "My husband, William, picked it out. He said it's the best I have looked in 20 years."

"We do more than other shops in cutting and fitting," said Kuehn. "There's not a wig that doesn't need cutting. If a wig doesn't fit, you're not going to wear it. You don't want people to know you're wearing a wig.'

McDermott has had an alopecia client since the woman was in junior high. McDermott put her in a "shag" wig, a popular style at the time. "Now she's graduated from college, married and expecting her first baby. She is still with me. She looks like a doll. She wears a bob. It's just so cute."

Choice When Winslow first sits a customer

knows that a wig, which has more hair than the average person has, will reflect a different image.

"I recommend starting with something you're used to seeing. Once you get used to the wig, then you can be a little more adventurous," she said.

#### Making the right selection

Color is another important factor, said Kuehn. "You shouldn't get stuck with the wrong color."

Although Mikel's carries natural hair wigs, they don't recommend them. Synthetics are lighter, hold their curl better and require easier upkeep. However, they are heat sensitive and can singe from excessive oven heat.

"After you open the oven door, stand back and let that first surge of heat out before removing your roast," said McDermott.

"Many of my cancer clients choose a synthetic wig because they won't be in chemotherapy long," said McDermott. "But if you have alopecia, a monofilament wig may be a good investment."

Patience with customers is a must in the wig business, said McDermott and her daughters. A customer undergoing the stress of chemotherapy and a changing body image should never be rushed into a decision. them at (313) 724-880l. "When people lose their hair, they

# Students raise awareness of alopecia areata

It would be easy for Lauren O'Connor to be a student at Ladywood High School in Livonia and never draw attention to herself as a person living with alopecia. The condition causes sufferers to lose existing hair or have the inability to grow hair at all.

However, the Livonia sophomore and her friend, Brittany Cauley, recently helped increase awareness of the affliction during Alopecia Areata Awareness Month by hosting a bottle drive at their school. The monies they raised were earmarked to benefit a scholarship program for young people wishing to attend the National Alopecia Areata Foundation's Annual Children's Conference Camp.

Lauren, 16, was born with one of three forms of alopecia called alopecia totalis which means total scalp hair loss. Two other forms of the autoimmune disease that afflicts 1.7 percent of the population overall include alopecia areata - the affected hair follicles are mistakenly attacked by a person's own immune system causing arrest of the hair growth stage or alopecia universalis --- complete body hair loss.

Lauren's friend Brittany collaborated on the project because her mom Linda Cauley was diagnosed with alopecia universalis more than a decade ago.

'I want to be like Lauren one day,' said Linda Cauley of her daughter's friend who has never worn a wig. "My ultimate goal is to feel completely comfortable not wearing a wig like Lauren and to not be stirred when people look at me differently."





#### Confident

One would think it would be a strain on a teenager, who attends an all-girls school, to live without hair but Lauren; says she's never really given it muchthought. Her mom Charlotte O'Connor, attributes Lauren's positive attitude to; the way she raised her two daughters (Lauren's sister also has alopecia areata).

"It's not a big deal to me," said Lauren. "I think I wore a wig once or twice but they are really hot and itchy. I don't think I've worn it since then."

For two consecutive weeks, public. service announcements from NAAF were read and videos broadcast over Ladywood's in-school television network to educate students, teachers and. staff about alopecia. Raising peoples: awareness of the incurable condition» included dialogue about the illness, existing treatments, current research, updates and promoting the concerns of people afflicted with alopecia areata.

No cure

While there is no current cure, it is possible for the hair in some instances to grow back and then fall out again. Researchers have concluded that something triggers the immune system to suppress the hair follicle but it is not known what the origin is. Heredity does play a role in the development of alopecia and it often occurs in families whose members have other autoimmune diseases.

Linda, who is now bald, had hair formuch of her young adulthood. She said at that time doctors weren't aware of, the condition, so she suffered through unusual treatments like hanging her. head upside down to increase blood flow to her scalp and 12 years worth of prednisone shots. They didn't know if it was the result of something physical, psychological or emotional, added Linda.


In all, Lauren and Brittany collected approximately \$500 to donate to the NAAF fund for their annual children's camp. Between the bottle drive and a designated day where students at Ladywood wore jeans for \$1 donation they were pleased with their first efforts.

"We hope we can do this next year with Sister's support," said Brittany. "It was really nice of her to allow us to do this at school and for the students to support it."







AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING FEEDING AND OFFERING TO FEED PIGEONS, DOVES, GULLS, OR WATERFOWL; PROHIBITING PERMITTING CONDITIONS TO EXIST THAT ENCOURAGE THE CONGREGATION OF PIGEONS, DOVES, GULLS, OR WATERFOWL; PROVIDING FOR TITLE; PROVIDING FOR PURPOSE; PROVIDING FOR DEFINITIONS; PROVIDING FOR UNLAWFUL ACTS; PROVIDING FOR NUISANCE PER SE; PROVIDING FOR EXEMPTIONS; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT; PROVIDING FOR VIOLATION AS CIVIL INFRACTION AND PENALTY; PROVIDING FOR FOR REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES, SEVERABILITY, AND SAVING OF ALL PENDING MATTERS; AND PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION AND THE EFFECTIVE DATE HEREOF. THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON ORDAINS: SECTION 1. THE

SECTION 1. TITLE.

This Ordinance shall be know and may be cited as the Feeding of Pigeons, Doves, Gulls, and Waterfowl Ordinance of the Charter Township of Canton. SECTION 2. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to prevent such conduct that may attract and/or concentrate pigeons, doves, gulls, and/or waterfowl to or on any public or private property in the Township; and to prevent a public health nuisance by limiting the presence of large numbers of these

- Waterfowl. Ducks, geese, and swans, belonging to the order Anseriformes and the family Anatidae. С.

Lingering. The act of being slow to depart. Roosting. The act of settling down for rest or sleep. SECTION 4. UNLAWFUL ACTS,

No person shall feed or offer to feed pigeons, doves, gulls, or waterfowl Α.

in any manner on any private or public property within the Township. В. No person shall keep, permit, or allow conditions to exist by the placement or discard of food, food by-products, vegetables, garbage, or animal or bird feed of any type that encourages the lingering, roosting, and/or congregation of pigeons, doves, gulls, or waterfowl on any private or public property within the Township.

SECTION 5. NUISANCE PER SE.

In addition to the penalties provided for in this Ordinance, a condition which results in lingering, roosting, and/or congregation of pigeons, doves, gulls, or waterfowl is hereby declared to be a nuisance per se, and the Township may commence and prosecute proceedings in a court of competent jurisdiction to correct, remedy, or abate such nuisance.

#### SECTION 6. EXEMPTIONS.

The provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to pigeons and doves kept at all times in cages, nor to any agricultural or commercial use(s) of waterfowl regulated by the Michigan Department of Agriculture or permitted by the atur


Plymouth Salem, despite another great performance by Justin Hajduk (second overall), finished just behind Churchill with 82 points. Stevenson was next with 88.


Most coaches in the Western Lakes Activities Association have learned that lesson. If Walled Lake Central didn't know it before, it does now.

They come together during the sweltering days of early August and don't part until the bone-chilling afternoons of late October and early November. For five days a week during this three-month period, they sweat together, learn together, win together and lose together.

They are the approximately 300 boys and girls who participate in the Plymouth Steelers and Canton Lions junior football clubs - organizations that emphasize the importance of camaraderie, teamwork, sportsmanship and volunteerism as much as they do proper blocking technique and how to perform a cheer in unison. "The things these kids learn when

they participate in our football and cheerleading programs — teamwork and discipline to name two - are things they can take with them for the rest of their lives," said Plymouth Steelers unit director Bill Nickles. "Our programs also build the kids' confidence and, I think, makes them better students because we stress to them the importance of doing well in school."

"The kids who participate in our program gain a lot of respect for each other because they're working hard, side by side, just about every day for three months, doing things that not everyone their age can do," said Matt Meares, unit director for the Canton Lions Football Club.

"I don't want this to sound uppity,

but it's a difficult contact sport played in a difficult environment, and the kids who go through an entire season know that they have done something special."

Junior league big in community

The football and cheerleading clubs are divided into three teams: freshmen (ages 8 to 10), junior varsity (ages 11 and 12) and varsity (ages 13 and 14). Each football team has a weight limit,

which ranges from 125 pounds for freshmen to 155 pounds for varsity.

The programs are funded by registration fees (approximately \$100 per participant) and various fund-raising projects, including candy sales and 50/50 raffles.

"It's not cheap to run these programs," Nickles confirmed. "We spend \$9,000 a year for new equipment alone.

"I figured out that when you add up all the practices and games from August through November, it ends up costing each kid about 40 cents an hour, which is pretty reasonable compared to some of the other sports and activities kids participate in. The coaches and members of the executive board put in a lot of hours and there can be some stress involved, but we wouldn't do it if we didn't love it."

Bob Khoenle: 'Football was his life'

It borders on ironic. Plymouth Canton's football team is heading towards playoff territory previously undiscovered by anyone from this school district. Yet the man who first guided a Canton team that for years languished in the depths, rarely able to manage a winning record, into the state playoffs. won't be around to see it.

Bob Khoenle, Canton's head coach for 12 seasons and an assistant coach for another eight, died last Wednesday (Oct. 24). He was 66.

Khoenle had battled cancer and other health problems for years. Khoenle took over as head coach, succeeding Barr, in 1986. In his dozen seasons he posted a 51-59 record, his best coming in 1990 when they went 9-2 and beat Westland John Glenn in the first round of the state playoffs before losing to eventual state champ Redford Catholic Central in the sec-

Khoenle retired from both coaching and teaching in the spring of 1998, but he didn't stay away from coaching for long. A resident of Grosse Pointe, he served as defensive coordinator at Mount Clemens HS this past season.

Khoenle's football history is an illustrious one. He grew up in football-mad Massillon. Ohio, where he was all-state in both football and basketball in the early 1950s. He was recruited by several schools. including Ohio State, but - in a story Riggs recalled Khoenle telling him — the tactics used by then-coach Woody Hayes turned his attention elsewhere.

When he went down to Columbus for a visit, Hayes called him into a room, where he started shaking him and slapped him, telling him You're from Ohio and there's only one school for you to even consider," Riggs retold. "After

that, he signed with Purdue." At Purdue, Khoenle — a tight end — played with pro football Hall of Fame quarterback Len Dawson. He still visited his hometown of Massillon, taking Riggs with him to the annual Massillon-vs.-Canton McKinley clash, a seasonending game that still draws nearly 30,000 people.

"He could be stubborn and cantankerous, but he had a heart of gold." Riggs said. "After a game we'd be sitting in his office and Bob would get mad and he'd fire me, and I'd tell him 'You can't fire me because I quit!' But we'd always end up getting back together.'

Riggs left Khoenle's staff in 1988 to pay more attention to his family (he's still the girls golf coach at Canton), but remained close to his long-time friend. "He was like a big of bear, but inside he was a teddy bear," he said. "It's like losing a big brother. "I'll miss him."

"The weather hurt their offense more than ours," admitted Canton coach Tim Baechler.



"That's why we're praying for a dry track,' said Zdebski. "We've got some quick kids. If Bell gets into open space, he can hurt teams.'

The key for Canton won't be just containing Western's speed and quickness, but once again — controlling the ball. In these team's last meeting, the Warriors managed just four first downs.

The defense, which was responsible for the Chiefs' 9-7 opening round win over Novi last Friday, will again be a key to their fortunes. We talked all year about wanting our defense to lead us," said Baechler. "Like that

old TV show, it's 'Have defense, will travel.' "It can make up for a lot of mistakes, and it can allow the offense to make some mistakes."

Baechler admits he isn't certain what kind of attack Western will throw at them. In the Warriors first five games, they averaged 160 yards passing a game; in their last five, they've averaged 60. A lot of that has to do with weather conditions, Zdebski insisted.





A contract becomes binding when both parties have signed the contract and there are no contingencies in the contract.

The time for which a contract can be rescinded would be based upon a statute of limitations of six years. But in order to invalidate a transaction, you must establish that there was fraud in the inducement of the contract or other reasons that would justify rescission under the law.

If you are dissatisfied with your builder/ developer, find out who it is and they can provide you with the complaint form to fill out.

Today's the day everyone in town has been invited to your house.

So you've dusted your Hummel figurines collection and you've vacuumed every carpet north to south and east to west.

You've picked up the kids' underwear from their bedroom floors. The bathroom and kitchen are spotless.

On the stove, you've started a huge pot of applesauce with sticks of cinnamon. Simmering slowly, it sends its homey perfume wafting enticingly from room to room with the message that this is a wonderful place to live.

You've dispatched the children to the movies, dog to a friend, spouse to wherever.

Yes, today is the day you're opening your front door to the entire community. Your home is for sale, and your hope is that there will be at least one buyer among the visitors during the open house your sales agent is having at your place.

Sorry, dear seller, but you probably shouldn't get your hopes up too high. It appears that the odds are against you. It appears that the more likely beneficiary of the open house isn't you but the agent.

As the residential real estate market softens, it's the sales agent's job to generate activity, said Ron J. Fron, broker, Clark & Fron, Livonia.

"In this market," Fron said, "when homes are moving slowly, we need more traffic. Even though we get a lot of tire-kickers, you never know when the right person might walk in."


Fron thinks current national and world events "have had some impact" on the housing market. "But I think the economy was slowing down before the Sept. 11 attacks."

Yet, Fron said there are good reasons to buy now, among them that "interest rates are so attractive.

"You'd think buyers would be grabbing up all the property" that's for sale now. That they're not "is a contradiction," he said.

To ease the seller's potential disappointment about an unsuccessful open house, Randall E. Bhirdo begins each initial marketing presentation by showing them a pie chart representing the likely sources of home sales.

Bhirdo, a sales associate with Cold-



well Banker Preferred, Plymouth, said the slimmest slice of his source pie is the open house, which he believes is good for no more than 6 percent of sales.

"The agent," Bhirdo said, "must educate the seller regarding expectations and that the open house is not a major factor. The open house is essentially a marketing tool for agents to get business" by meeting buyers.

Bhirdo said he would rank the open house somewhere below his top marketing activities, which include the multiple listing service, contact with other agents, signs and other advertising.

He said that he knows sellers are sometimes urged by friends and family to ask for open houses, but "opinions of others aren't going to sell your home - the market is going to sell

your home." That crowd of lookers coming to your open house can include persons who aren't really interested in buying and are just spending time walking through other persons' homes. "They don't have lives. It's their entertainment" on a Sunday afternoon, he said.

If the open house doesn't work for you, should you try it again? And how many times after that?

"Up to three or four" until you're convinced it isn't helping, said Diana Perella, sales agent, Real Estate One, Westland. "I'm working on one now.

"Sometimes, it's effective and other times you wonder why you do it. But you get sales leads."

And the homeowner gets applesauce.

## These 'gifts' can help you buy a home



Creditworthy borrowers may now be eligible for one of several different down payment assistance programs offered by corporate America.

The most notable of such programs comes as a supplement to the garden-variety FHA loan – the one with the low 3-percent buyer contribution requirement. One such company, the Nehemiah

Corp., seeks to prevent a required down payment from keeping Americans from their dream of home ownership.

Nehemiah and a few other companies have established unusual programs to help qualified homebuyers get beyond even that 3-percent hurdle. They do so by taking advantage of the "gift" provision in the FHA's underwriting guidelines. Normally, homebuyers may use money received as a gift from relatives to help buy a home. Corporate gift donors offer an alternative for borrowers who do not have relatives able or willing to help them out.

The borrowers may also be required to meet the donor's credit score guidelines.

How does it work? The donor corporation gives the borrowers a down payment gift at closing ranging from 1 percent to 6 percent. The sellers agree to make a matching donation (plus a small administrative fee not to exceed 1 percent) to the donor corporation immediately after closing. Sellers can sweeten the borrowers' deal even more by increasing the gift size to cover all of the borrowers' closing costs, too.

Savvy sellers using down payment assistance programs can gain a profound marketing advantage by making their homes available to a larger number of prospective borrowers while still getting full market value for their property. Meanwhile, borrowers who
