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

Canton rates high on safety

■ Canton Township is the second safest community in Michigan – and 14th in the U.S. – with a population over 75,000, according to a survey of recent crime statistics by a Kansas firm.

Canton Public Safety Director John Santomauro was in a good mood at Tuesday's Board of Trustees meeting, passing out press packets to reporters.

Not that the director avoids reporters. He doesn't, he just doesn't usually seek them out. But this was different.

What he was handing out were the results of a survey conducted by Morgan Quitno, a Kansas-based research and publishing company, that ranked Canton as the 14th safest community in the United States with populations greater than 75,000. More than 300 communities were rated in the survey.

"I think it's pretty significant for the community," Santomauro said Wednesday. "I think that foremost on the minds of people in any community ... particularly a developing one ... is how

Open House seat attracts 5 hopefuls

The race for the 21st District House seat, being vacated by Rep. Bruce Patterson (R-Canton) who's running for an open state Senate seat, has turned into a five-way contest as of Tuesday's filing deadline.

Three Republicans and two Democrats have filed for the position, setting up two primary elections on Aug. 6.

Republicans seeking the seat are Ruthann Bruce, Philip J. LaJoy and Herb Scott, all of Canton.

Democrats who have filed are Eric LaCruze of Van Buren Township and Mark Slavens of Canton.

LaJoy, 57, is vice president for business development for LaJoy Group in Plymouth, a family-owned staffing services company. An elected member of the Canton Township Board of Trustees for the past 13 years, LaJoy stresses his business and political background as strengths he would bring to the legislative position.

Goals and issues

Among his priorities for the district, which includes Van Buren Township, the city of Belleville and all of Canton except for a narrow strip east of I-275, he lists the economy, education, roads, unemployment,

natural resources and health care.

"There are a lot of issues and challenges right now," he said, "and I have a lot of experience both professionally and politically ... a well-rounded background. I've been planning and working toward this for quite a while. I'm ready to talk to the voters."

Scott, 54, is vice president of Major Pharmaceuticals in Livonia. He says he wants to take his experience in the pharmaceutical industry to Lansing to reduce the cost of prescription drugs for seniors.

Resident input sought on features, look of park

If you're a Canton resident and would like to have a say in the type of park being developed at Ford and Ridge roads, you've got two more chances to speak your piece.

The Canton Leisure Services Department has scheduled a series of three public meetings (one's already taken place) for residents to give their input as plans for the 120-acre park evolve. Each workshop will feature a design session that will give participants an opportunity to see how different facilities and features will fit into the park. Last week about 10 residents showed

up for the first brainstorming session, held at the Summit on the Park.

Leisure Services Director Ann Conklin said the session was "very interesting," although she'd like to see more people show up for the next two meetings.

"I thought it was a great process," she said. "It was interesting to see the different points of view."

She said participants came up with a variety of ideas as to what they would like to see in the park, located on the northwest corner of Ford and Ridge.

Things such as soccer and basketball fields were among the ideas thrown out by residents.

"There were a variety of ideas," Con-

klin said, "but it was unanimous that everybody really wanted some passive areas (in the park) and to protect the natural features already there."

Tom Borg, a Canton resident and a Dale Carnegie training consultant, served as a facilitator for the session.


"People were real excited about being

able to contribute to something like this," he said. "It's a great way to get ideas that might be overlooked if the (township staff) just went with their own ideas."

Observer series looks at teens and alcohol



Today we begin a two-part report on teenagers and alcohol.

On May 9 eight teenagers from local high schools sat down to discuss teen drinking.

In today's Hometown Life section we present their conversation on the prevalence of teen drinking, its effect on the social

life of local teenagers and their views on why drinking is so important for many young people.

Though each of the participants has made a personal decision not to drink, they all say that drinking is common among their peers.

"The sad thing about it is that people do it every weekend," said Patrice Wade, a student at Farmington High School. "A lot of people do it who you wouldn't even think do it."

On the opinion page we offer our view of the situation.

On Sunday we'll present information on resources available to help young people with drinking or drug problems.

Our Health section will examine the health consequences of alcohol abuse by teenagers. Our Taste section will offer some alternatives to serving alcohol at graduation parties.

On college campuses across the United States binge drinking has become a major problem. And the problem begins in high school.

Patrice Flax, a professional social worker who

counsels students on drug and alcohol problems and served as moderator for our student forum, said regular and excessive drinking in high school sets a pattern for college.

"Students who drink heavily in high school tend to go into the Greek (fraternity and sorority) system," she said. "It has to do with familiar behavior. They learned at a young age how to handle anxiety ... it's a very difficult behavior to change."

We do not expect this series to change behavior, but we hope that it raises questions and stimulates conversation, especially between parents and their teenagers.

Sides are 'close' in school talks

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After seven long days of contract talks, taking only Sunday off to rest, there are hints that a new contract for the thousand-member Plymouth Canton Education Association may be near.

Neither side will comment publicly about what was discussed at the May 1-8 bargaining sessions held with the help of facilitators; however, chief negotiators for both sides appeared confident the talks were headed in the right direction.

"We're very close, and talks were very productive," said Ray Bihun, executive director of human resources for Plymouth Canton Schools. "There were a

lot of topics discussed, and we've come to some agreements. I feel comfortable that both sides have a true understanding of the issues.

"We still have to write all the language before we can take it any place (for ratification)," said Bihun.

Chuck Portelli, PCEA president and the union's chief negotiator, concurred with Bihun

that talks were productive.

"We worked very well together," said Portelli. "It was nice having two facilitators to work with us. It kept personalities out of negotiations, and it was data driven."

"We've informed staff that we're pleased with the process and we're close to finalizing an agreement," he said.

The current contract expires at

the end of August.

For the first time, negotiators are using interest-based bargaining, which allows for both sides to discuss topics at the bargaining table, with each side introducing solutions to outstanding issues.

The Plymouth-Canton Board of Education received an update on talks before its Tuesday night meeting. Portelli said he will talk with his team again today.

No date has been set for further talks, but both sides said they hope to resume negotiations soon.

Meanwhile, the district is also in contract talks with unions that represent principals, secretaries and licensed technicians.

3 charged after armed robbery, freeway chase

A Canton man and two Detroit men are facing felony charges relating to the armed robbery of Valvoline Instant Oil Change on Ford Road last week.

Mark Anthony Gilkes, 30, of Detroit is charged with armed robbery, possession of a firearm by a felon, felony firearm and commission of a felony with a motor vehicle. He also faces charges as a habitual offender.

John Westley Fleming, 28, of Canton and Dalaynard D. Jackson, 34, of Detroit face similar charges. Each is being held in the Wayne County Jail on \$1 million bond. A preliminary exam is scheduled for May 24 in 35th District Court in Plymouth.

The three were arrested in Livonia on Thursday after a five-hour standoff while they were holed up in a business on Schoolcraft Road.

Canton Police believe the suspects stole an unspecified amount of money from the Ford Road business shortly before 8 p.m. on May 9. According to police, three men drove into the oil change bay and asked for a new filter. Once inside one man got out of the car armed with a handgun. Another passenger

and the driver then pulled handguns as well and forced two employees into a lower-level storage area while a third was forced to destroy a security tape then open the store's safe.

After taking money from the safe and forcing the other employee into the lower level, the men left and headed eastbound on Ford toward I-275. Minutes later Plymouth Township Police spotted the car and began pursuit. The chase continued on eastbound I-96 into Livonia where the suspects left the freeway onto Schoolcraft Road near Newburgh, where they crashed into a utility pole.

They then fled on foot into a Schoolcraft Road business where the standoff began. They were eventually arrested by police.

Spring fever?

A 14-year-old Canton youth was ticketed for retail fraud (shoplifting) and turned over to his mother after a security officer at Meijer last week saw him take some merchandise and attempt to leave the store without paying for it.

According to police reports, the youngster put on a \$55 pair of

Adidas tennis shoes and hid a bottle of Neutrogena Instant Bronze sunless tanning lotion in his clothes and attempted to leave the store.

Police dropped the youth, and his bicycle, off at his home in the custody of his mother.

Hot tub damaged

A resident of the 44200 block of Dartmouth told police that sometime between December and last week someone damaged her hot tub pool liner.

She said the tub had not been used since December but when she checked it last week it was not holding water. Further examination revealed that someone had used what appeared to be an ice pick to poke 30 to 60 holes in the tub liner. Damage was estimated at \$1,000.

Car smashed

A resident of the 45000 block of Horseshoe Circle told police someone smashed the front windshield and roof of his 1991 Ford Mustang.

He said the car was parked in a common parking lot near his residence. Damage was estimated at \$1,000.





Dr. Conway Jeffress, Schoolcraft College president, presented introductory remarks and degrees and certificates.

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

safe it is. One is the perception and survey after survey shows that 90 percent of our respondents feel safe here.

"The other is the reality of how safe we are and this (the Morgan Quitno survey) certainly speaks to that."

Morgan Quitno used final crime rates per 100,000 people from the year 2000 as the basis for its rankings. Six equally weighted categories, including rape, murder, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary and motor vehicle theft, were used to develop a numerical ranking.

Only one other community in Michigan — Sterling Heights, which was ranked the ninth safest community in the country — was ranked safer than Canton.

Other communities in the metropolitan Detroit area and their rankings were:

Troy, 16; Livonia, 30; Ann Arbor, 44; Farmington Hills, 52; Westland, 87; Dearborn, 164;

and Southfield, 222.

Last on the list, with a ranking of 327, was Detroit.

And Santomauro found significance in that statistic also.

"Certainly to be a part of that area and to be able to rank nationally at the level of 14 is pretty significant," he said.

He cited the township's community policing efforts, which started about a decade ago, for a large part of the safety factor.

Under community policing, Canton is divided into four geographic areas. Each area has a defined community policing team that is empowered to deal strategically with crime issues.

"I don't think our ranking would be as high if there wasn't a genuine partnership between the community and the police," Santomauro said. "This is a very community-oriented department that works hard on professionalism and development, but also

thinks strategically about how to address problems within the community."

Overall crime in Canton fell by 27 percent in 2000 from 1999. Categories such as robbery, aggravated assault and arson continued to fall in 2001, according to Canton Police statistics. In crimes per 100,000 people, Canton has seen a steady decline in violent and property crimes.

Violent crimes per 100,000 people have dropped 25 percent in Canton since 1999, according to police records, while property crimes declined 30 percent in the same period.

This is the first year Canton has been ranked in the survey, apparently because the 2000 census figures placed the township's population at more than 75,000 for the first time.

The safest community, as ranked by Morgan Quitno, was Amherst, N.Y., with a population of 109,574.

surprised at the size of the park property.

"It was a lot larger plot of property than most people had thought," he said.

By using aerial photographs of the property and cutout versions of various facilities (such as soccer fields or football fields) par-

ticipants were able to visualize how the park would look with different features in place.

One of the ideas that came out of the session, according to Borg, was a walking trail around the park.


"We've got to ask people what they want," he said, "and this is

a golden opportunity for them to express their ideas."

Two more sessions are scheduled, one for Saturday, June 1, at 9 a.m. and one for Thursday, June 13, at 7 p.m. Both sessions will meet at the Summit.

Conklin said all sessions will feature the same format and because she wants to hear from as many people as possible, participants are asked to attend only one session.


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
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
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Stewart gets primary challenger

With Tuesday's filing deadline come and gone, the race is on for the 20th House seat held by State Rep. John Stewart (R-Plymouth Township).

Stewart will be challenged in the Aug. 6 primary by political newcomer Jonathon Grant of Plymouth. The Democrats will run a challenger, Mark Blackwell of Wayne, in the November general election.

Stewart, nearing the end of his first term, is hoping for another two years in a newly redesigned district which has a strip of Canton Township east of I-275 and the City of Wayne replacing the City of Livonia, to go along with constituents in Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Northville and Northville Township.

"I want to continue with my efforts for education, environmental protection and providing support for local businesses," said Stewart. "I've gone out of my way to protect small business in my district."

Stewart, himself a small business owner and the Small Business Association of Michigan's Legislator of the Year for 2002,

said the number one issue is the state's fiscal responsibility despite what he calls "a budget revenue stream problem." Stewart, a longtime Plymouth resident and local attorney, said regardless of the state's economic problems, he'll continue to support reductions in the single business tax and personal income tax.

"No question, I'm continuing to maintain those tax cuts, despite discouraging numbers," he said. "I expect an economic recovery in the fall. We need to keep small business taxes down."

Stewart said he has the endorsement of a number of school board members in Plymouth-Canton and Northville, as well as Plymouth Township Supervisor Steve Mann.

Meanwhile, Grant said he's received a "huge groundswell of support throughout the district." And, that includes several Plymouth city commissioners and Mayor Bill Graham, who last month hosted a fundraiser for Grant in which State Rep. Bruce Patterson gave the challenger a \$1,000 check.

Grant, owner of an Internet company, said he's hearing from people in the district concerning

two main issues.

"People are very concerned about the economy, and parents want choices in education for their children," said Grant. "By-and-large, they want the cap raised on charter schools."

Grant, who for the most part has focused on his own campaign, did take a swipe at Stewart, challenging him for his participation in the Summit on School Funding held at Salem High School in March. The event is sponsored by the Michigan Citizens for Fairness in School Funding, of which Stewart is a board member.

"My opponent serves on the board of an organization who's sole purpose is to increase and make equitable the state's school funding. He also serves on the Appropriations Committee in the State House," said Grant. "Having served on these boards and committees for two state budget cycles, it is disappointing that Representative Stewart never once introduced legislation or offered a single amendment to increase school funding."

Blackwell was unavailable for comment.

Grants helps Salvation Army

With the help of its parent organization and the Plymouth Community United Way, the Plymouth Salvation Army Plymouth Corps has erased a \$120,000 deficit.

The corps serves the Plymouth, Canton and Northville communities.

Marie Morrow, president of the Plymouth Community United Way, said her organization this week issued a one-time grant of \$30,000 to the local Salvation Army to help pull it out of its budget shortfall.

"We're very happy to help the Salvation Army in its time of need. That's why we're here," said Morrow. "We had a successful campaign this year (\$1.3 million) and we want to help whenever we can."

The United Way came through with the money, which is in

addition to the \$47,000 it gives the Salvation Army as part of its annual allocations.

"We're delighted to receive the additional funding from the Plymouth Community United Way," said Dan Herriman, finance committee chairman of the Plymouth Corps' advisory board. "It's a major source of funding for the Salvation Army, and they came through for us again."

Herriman said he also received word this week that the Salvation Army division headquarters in Southfield will give an additional \$20,000.

"We asked them for the proceeds of the mail contributions from Belleville, Van Buren Township and Sumpter Township, which the Plymouth Corps serves, and they agreed to immediately forward the money to us," Herriman explained. "So, the future looks bright."

The corps found itself facing a \$120,000 deficit as the result of

the events of Sept. 11, and the resulting economic downturn. There was a drop in donations from the Christmas mail campaign, and expansion into Belleville, Van Buren and Sumpter put a strain on the \$848,000 annual budget.

Herriman said the Plymouth Corps also made several reductions in its budget, which he said are short-term fixes.

"We cut some capital expenditures, furnishings, equipment and property improvements," he said. "We also eliminated overtime, and are delaying filling a couple of open positions. It's a short-term fix, and we need to concentrate on bringing up contributions to 2000 levels."

"None of the cuts will affect programs or services," Herriman added. "The division headquarters will also assist us with prospecting for new donors in the communities we serve."

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

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
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Battles set for new senate seat

There is plenty of interest in the newly formed 7th District Senate seat, which was a part of Thaddeus McCotter's district before it was redrawn by state legislators after the 2000 Census.

There are four candidates — two Democrats and two Republicans — who want to be elected the first senator from the district, which is an L-shape that stretches at its northernmost point from Northville, Canton, Plymouth and Plymouth Township south to Grosse Ile.

Two familiar names will battle it out in the Republican primary Aug. 6. State Rep. Bruce Patterson, (R-Canton) wants to be elected to the Senate after two terms in the 21st House District. And former state representative Gerry Law of Plymouth Township wants back into politics after taking two years off when he was term-limited in the 20th House District.

"I've met with countless activists from all over the new

7th District ... and through it all I heard how I am the Republican Party's best chance at winning this seat, helping my party retain majority in the Senate, and keeping Michigan moving in the right direction," said Patterson, who is also a former Wayne County commissioner. "It's a difficult district to represent. Issues for Northville are not on the radar screen for Grosse Ile or Trenton."

Patterson is hoping for a leadership position in the Senate, just as he has in the House as majority floor leader. He's also chairman of the House Oversight and Operations Committee, as well as the Redistricting and Elections Committee.

Meanwhile Law, who previously served 14 years in the House, sponsored more than 250 bills, of which 50 became state law. He served as the chairperson of the Health and Policy Committee during his tenure.

Law, a former Plymouth Township supervisor, said the state's budget is going to be a top priority for the next legislature.

"There's going to be a big

budget shortfall unless we do something, and that's going to mean more revenue sharing cuts for local communities," he said. "Proposal A has not delivered the money it promised, and it will get worse. Higher education costs will be going up by double digits, and health care costs are increasing. This state is close to failing."

Law said he wants to develop additional local control for public schools by allowing communities to pass their own enhancement millages, wants to help small business provide health insurance by preventing insurance carriers from overpricing policies, and develop a partnership between the state and counties to improve prescription discount programs for seniors.

"The state's not moving on these issues," said Law. "Tough decisions need to be made in the next term, or a lot of people will be hurt."

On the Democratic ticket for the 7th Senate District are two

Trenton residents. State Rep. George Mans said he believes he can make his name known in the western Wayne County communities, just as he has downriver, because the issues are basically the same.

"Insuring educational funding is a problem, roads and transportation, and everyone has a concern on state revenue sharing cuts that affect local government," said Mans. "The issues aren't ideological. People want a candidate who can solve the problems. A new approach is needed."

Mans is no newcomer to politics. He is a former mayor of Trenton, serving from 1983-89, and is term-limited in the state House after being elected three times.

Mans will be opposed in the Democratic primary by Wade Bielby of Trenton, who was unavailable for comment.

The party winners in the Aug. 6 primary will meet in the Nov. 5 general election.

Local truancy ordinance strikes the right balance

The Canton Township Board of Trustees is expected to approve a local ordinance allowing Canton Police to ticket kids and their parents for truancy. The move, which treats violations as a civil infraction similar to a traffic ticket, would serve as a companion effort to a new truancy prevention program run by the Wayne County prosecutor's office (although the two aren't directly related).

The idea is a good one. It will be an additional tool for those in the community who are closest to the problem and will give local law enforcement some pull in an area where none currently exists.

We say that even though chronic truancy doesn't appear to be an overwhelming problem here. In fact, kids skipping school is one of those issues like suburban gangs, where parents and local officials put a strong emphasis on being proactive sometimes to the point of overkill.

But an ounce of prevention is worth at least a pound of cure when you're talking about children. Plenty of evidence suggests that truancy is an early warning sign that kids are headed for bigger problems. At the very least, it's a near guarantee for academic failure. "Everyone is concerned about school truancy and the potential problem it presents," said Canton Public Safety Director John Santomauro.

The ordinance, which could go before board members in draft form by the end of the month, is an outgrowth from meetings between the police and local school officials. It would require a 35th District Court appearance for the ticketed minor, along with a parent or guardian. Fines aren't

specified, but they would likely mirror the \$500/90-day jail sentence maximum for most misdemeanors.

It reads, in part: "It is unlawful for any minor under the age of 17 who is enrolled in a public school in the Plymouth-Canton school district to be absent from school and found in a public place ... between the hours of 9 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. of the same day when said minor's school is in session."

Legitimate, documented absences from school are excepted.

Currently, Canton Police can't take action against juveniles hanging out in the community instead of the classroom. "We could always stop and talk to kids," Santomauro said. But more persuasive tactics are off limits.

Once the ordinance is approved, the focus will be on chronic truants at the high-school level and Santomauro said people shouldn't expect sworn officers to become truancy cops. That also makes sense. In a community approaching 80,000 residents, there are lots of public safety issues that need to be addressed.

The county program allows for criminal prosecution of parents and truant school-age children and is primarily aimed at younger kids. Wayne County Prosecutor Mike Duggan made it one of the centerpieces of his 2000 election campaign.

In backing the proposed ordinance, we echo the words of Bob Hayes, school district director of student services:

"Parents need to be responsible. We support anything that gets and keeps kids in school. Students cannot achieve if they are not in school."

A well-deserved salute for police, firefighters

Their work is usually difficult, often dangerous and sometimes unappreciated. Yet they never flinch when asked to respond to a crisis. Dial that all-too-familiar three-digit number and they're on your doorstep in a matter of minutes, sometimes even seconds.

We're talking about Canton's public safety officers, of course.

So it has been good to see local police officers and firefighters singled out for recognition by their respective departments over the past few weeks during individual award ceremonies at the Summit. The Observer printed a complete list of honored firefighters on May 5 and we'll do the same with the police awards being handed out today. (Look for them in Sunday's Observer.) A couple of the incidents for which awards were given truly stand out:

Early on New Year's Day, Canton EMS crews responded to the scene of a fatal accident on Warren Road. Although one driver had died at the scene, three other patients were still breathing. Firefighters facing a tricky extrication from two vehicles, had all patients en route to area hospitals within

25 minutes, perhaps saving additional lives. The firefighters commended for that incident included Capt. James Davison, firefighters Timothy Dunn, Wendy Murphy, Paul Pavloff, Robb Glenn, Josh Meier, Todd Lemke, Craig Poike, Tom Lutkenhoff, Ron Battani and Travis Winston.

Canton Police Sgt. Debra Newsome today was named the department's Officer of the Year. Newsome, who worked in the detective bureau before her promotion made significant contributions investigating child abuse and child pornography cases and also in a Sept. 19 double-homicide case.

Meanwhile, one of Canton's original full-time officers, Bruce Roderick, was given the Director's Recognition Award.

We'd like to believe Canton Public Safety Director John Santomauro when he talks about a "wake-up call" for Americans on who our heroes and role models really are. But until we see more concrete proof, we'll take celebrations like the two this month as reminders of the hard work and dedication that characterize the staffs of both departments.

Listen to your children about teen drinking

The kids know. Just ask them.

They may not admit to taking a drink themselves, but they'll tell you that a lot of other kids do. They'll tell you that many Monday mornings other students come to school with hangovers and stories. They'll tell you about parties where alcohol and drugs are a common, and to some necessary, ingredient to having a good time.

"It's very common," said Julie Patterson, a senior from Plymouth Salem High School, who participated in our May 9 forum of teenagers discussing the problem. "It's ridiculous, you come back on a Monday and you hear, 'Oh, I went to this party and everyone was so smashed.'"

They'll tell you about girl friends who found themselves pregnant after a party where they couldn't remember what they'd done. They'll tell you about friends they've picked up from gutters and put to bed.

You may even suspect that your son or daughter is experimenting. They come in late and go right to their rooms. They look a little too tired the next morning. They look glassy eyed. Their once stellar school grades have plunged. Experimenting is part of growing up. As adolescents we all want to try things that aren't supposed to be good for us but that we see adults doing all the time. When we're 18 we might wonder

what's so magical about being 21 that suddenly makes it OK to have an alcoholic drink. We might wonder what all the fuss is about marijuana. That's why lecturing the young is so ineffective. They are masters at hair splitting. They are masters at throwing your own behavior back at you.

Even their own experiences don't often convince them. A friend's death in an alcohol-related accident may give them pause. But young people often see themselves as indestructible.

Our young panelists have all made a decision to postpone drinking until they're adults. They've seen adults drink responsibly and they've seen adults and their peers abuse alcohol. As one panelist said, she didn't want to be in a situation where she didn't have control over herself.

Graduation is a particularly tempting time. Young people want to celebrate the way adults often celebrate.

We urge them to consider the dangers of losing control. But most important we urge parents to ask their sons and daughters about these issues, talk with them about what they've seen, heard and done. Be open, honest, fair. Listen.

That's what our forum was about but the real conversation needs to go on in every home of every graduating teenager.

Will Michigan's new leaders have skill to grow economy?

Starting next January, we'll have a whole new leadership team in Michigan. A new set of executive officers — governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, maybe attorney general — and a mostly new legislature in both houses, coupled with a possible change in partisan control of at least one.

That new team is going to have to figure out how to govern the state amid very great budgetary stress — best guess is there is already a built-in imbalance of nearly \$1 billion. And they'll face considerable political uncertainty — term limits will have eliminated most experienced lawmakers and the new executive officers will be uncertain how to go about their jobs.

Among the happy things they'll have to deal with is Michigan's remarkably improved business climate. Remember the early 1990s? Michigan was the very definition of a Rust Belt state, with more than 19 percent unemployment and only 4 million (very nervous) jobs. In the year 2000, we boasted a jobless rate of less than 4 percent and a growing economy of 5 million jobs.

That's a terrific record. Gov. John Engler and the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (not to mention a booming national economy) deserve lots of credit for managing such an impressive turnaround.

The big question is what our new leaders are going to do starting next January. Will they keep hammering away at improving the economic climate or will they take the easy way out and let Michigan fall back again?

At a minimum, the policy agenda will have been set out. At the Michigan Competitiveness Conference, sponsored last week in Lansing by the MEDC, a new study by Stanford Research Institute showed that Michigan ranked No. 9 among the 50 states and No. 2 among Midwestern states as a good place to do business. I attended; it was an eye-opening day.

We ranked especially well in our quality of life (No. 4 in the nation), based on "low living costs, good education system, clean air and first-rate nature and recreation assets." We came in No. 7 in what SRI calls "innovation resources," the compound result of world-class universities and technology base. Our infrastructure came in No. 22, the middle of the pack, the new terminal at

Metro Airport balancing out deficits in roads and Internet and broadband connections.

Michigan rated worst (No. 42) on business costs, mainly because of high taxes on business. According to MEDC President Doug Rothwell, even though the Single Business Tax has been cut by one third since 1990, it's still twice as high as the next-highest state that we benchmark ourselves against.

Rothwell argues that instead of gloating about how Michigan fared against the rest of the nation, we should compare ourselves against the 17 states that are our primary competitors for new business investment and high technology. Eight of these ranked above Michigan in the SRI study — Colorado, Texas, Minnesota, Virginia, California, Georgia, Massachusetts and Washington, in order — while our neighbor rivals, Ohio and Illinois, were just behind. So there's plenty of work to do.

The Single Business Tax is a real problem. No other state has a unified business tax structure like it, so it stands out like a sore thumb in the tables of the comparison. Most states tax businesses on their profit plus some other factors, while the Michigan unified SBT taxes a combination of employment and "value added." Worse, as I know from personal experience, the SBT is very complex to calculate.

Among the 300-odd people attending the conference, most felt the SBT needed at minimum an overhaul to include at least some component of business profit. As I remember it, the SBT was written in literally the dead of night in 1975, largely by lobbyists for the automobile industry, General Motors in particular. Virtually none of the lawmakers who voted to adopt the next morning understood the tax; most had not even read the complex legislation.

The conference discussed a large range of suggestions coming from six breakout groups.

If there was consensus, it was that our economic development competitive strategy for the future should be to try to get our business tax and cost climate at about the national average, fix our roads and extend our broadband connections and let our other advantages play out undiminished.

The real question is whether our new leaders have the foresight, guts and skill to do so.

Great Lakes make Michigan a treasure and responsibility

Astronauts in space can see its bold outline on cloudless days. Two peninsulas surrounded by deep blue water. The northern peninsula jagged and elongated, stretching toward Canada. The southern peninsula, a wonder of nature or a cosmic joke, the very image of a mitten formed eons ago by glaciers.

Our Michigan is a special place, a place defined by the Great Lakes that surround it.

When the state sought suggestions for the Michigan quarter it was inevitable that the design would highlight the two peninsulas and the lakes around it. Yes, the automobile has been important to the state's economy and the reason for its growth. But it becomes clearer every day that Michigan's great treasure, and its great responsibility, is the Great Lakes and its inland lakes and rivers. In a world parched for water, Michigan is uniquely blessed.

May 18-27 has been designated Michigan Week, a time to reflect on the special qualities of this state and its people.

Those of us who live in Southeast Michigan often see the state as two very distinct realities. One is the engine that drives the state's economy, a cliché that has a literal resonance in this place that put the world on wheels. This Michigan is an industrial behemoth, auto capital of the world. It is also an emerging high-tech center and a life sciences corridor. It is a place of cultural institutions, great centers of learning and an urban center troubled with economic and racial strife that often seems never-ending.

The other Michigan is a land of woods and water, a "wonderland." Going "up North" is a ritual part of life for residents of Southeast Michigan. Whether it's boating on the Great Lakes, walking the beaches along Lake Michigan, hiking the hardwood forests, fly-fishing in numerous streams and rivers, bicycling along scenic shores or through deep woods, or stalking deer in November chill — the other Michigan is an easy escape for some. For downstaters this is paradise!

The reality is more complex. Northern Michigan has its own problems. Its economy once based on mining, timber and fishing, is now dependent on tourism. Many of the full-time residents live at or near the poverty level.

Yet the region is still rich in natural resources. There is and will continue to be a tension between the two interests.

There is also a tension between those who wish to enjoy Northern Michigan for its simple pleasures and those who see the Great North as a Disney-style theme park. Petoskey's Bay Harbor and the proliferation of Indian casinos could be a frightening vision of things to come.

Gov. Engler had to back away from directional oil drilling along the lakes after an outcry from

people who realize that if anything destroys the lakes or the shore, Michigan will lose its specialness. No amount of oil (and the prospects are small) could ever justify that loss.

We know that the demands on our state for water and other natural resources will be great in the years to come. We will need leaders with a firm resolve to harvest what we have intelligently and protect those assets that define who and what we are. Too often we have allowed short-term business interests to take precedence over long-term planning. Too often we have favored the few at the expense of the many.

We need to learn the limits of growth and development. Not all "progress" is good. Economic needs must be balanced by the needs of the environment. Property rights need to be balanced by public rights.

We have much to think about during this Michigan Week. Our two beautiful peninsulas demand that we be good stewards so that they continue to radiate as special places in the world.

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Scene is set for some contentious August primaries

With the passing of Tuesday's filing deadline, the ballots that voters will see for the Aug. 6 primary election are set.

Well, almost.

The candidates vying to represent their party for Wayne County executive and on the county commission, as well as for a number of important state representative and senate seats, are set in stone.

However, due to a lawsuit filed by a group of Michigan voters over the Republican-endorsed alteration of state voting districts, the filing deadline for congressional elections has been pushed back to June 11.

The lawsuit will be heard May 21, 22, and 23 in the federal district court in Detroit, and a decision is expected by the end of next week. It is possible the court will rule to change the districts.

According to spokesman Brad Whittman, the Michigan Bureau of Elections is taking a wait-and-see approach.

"Right now we have established districts in place, and we've taken a number of filings from candidates who are running in those districts," he said. "However, if the court does modify the district lines to any degree, we will make sure we give the candidates enough

notice to deal with the changes. But for now, we've advised candidates to proceed as normal."

County executive

The congressional races notwithstanding, voters in Wayne County will have a lot to think about when they enter the polls Aug. 6. And the race for the Democratic nomination for Wayne County executive should be one of the most interesting.

Current Wayne County Sheriff Robert Ficano and former Detroit Police Chief Benny Napoleon are just two of the candidates with name recognition. Detroit residents Ricardo Solomon, who is currently the chairman of the county commission, and state Sen. Joe Young Jr. are also vying for the position, as is Bernard Youngblood, the county register of deeds.

The five candidates are vying to replace Ed McNamara, who has led the county since 1987. McNamara, who is not seeking reelection, has yet to endorse a candidate, which leaves the door wide open.

There are also some interesting races for county commissioner.

County commission

In District 9, which encompasses Redford Township, Dearborn Heights and part of Garden City, incumbent Philip Cavanagh is battling five other candidates for the Democratic nomination. State Rep. Bob Brown, who must step down because of term limits, and former Redford Township Trustee Mary Haney should make the race competitive.

In District 11, Republicans

Fred Bolden, Kris Schimelpfenneg, and Deborah Whyman, all of Canton Township, are seeking the opportunity to face incumbent John Sullivan of Wayne, who is the only Democrat running.

In District 12, which encompasses Westland and part of Garden City, William Steele of Westland is the only Republican on the ticket. He will face longtime incumbent Kay Beard, who is the only Democrat to file, in the November general election.

District 10 incumbent Lyn Bankes of Livonia will run unopposed in both the primary and the general election, as she is the only candidate of either party to file for the seat.

All commission seats are two-year terms.

State House

Among the races for state representative, perhaps the easiest contest will be in the 16th Dis-

trict, where incumbent Jim Plakas of Garden City is the only Democrat running. He will face Republican Eric Homeier of Dearborn Heights in the general election.

In the 17th District, the battle for the Republican nomination should be contentious, with Redford Township Trustee Miles Handy battling former Wayne County Commissioner and Redford resident Kathleen Husk, as well as Jill Parent, also of Redford. For the Democratic nomination, Redford resident Pat McRae is going up against Daniel Paletko of Dearborn Heights.

In the 18th District, old Westland City Council foes Glenn Anderson (the incumbent) and David Cox are vying for the Democratic nomination. The winner of the primary will face either Bhagwan Dashairya or Kip Lipford, Westland residents seeking the Republican nomina-

tion.

In the 19th District, Livonia residents A. Tony Collins and Kerry Lowry are competing for the Democratic nomination, and the opportunity to face John Pastor, of Livonia, who is the only Republican running.

The 20th District race should prove to be a contentious one, with incumbent John Stewart battling Jonathan Grant, both residents of Plymouth, for the Republican nomination. Despite never having held any public office, Grant is politically active and operates the Web site AllPlymouth.com, which he uses to espouse his political opinions and beliefs. Stewart has been a regular target on the Web site.

In the 21st District, which encompasses Canton Township, Canton Trustee Philip LaJoy is attempting to win the Republican nomination, and is up against Canton residents Ruthann Bruce and Herb Scott.

Mark Slavens, a member of the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education, is seeking the Democratic nomination against Eric LaCruze of Belleville.

State Senate

One of the more interesting state senate races will be in the incumbent-less 7th District, where current state Rep. Bruce Patterson of Canton will do battle with Plymouth resident and former state Rep. Gerald Law for the Republican nomination.

There is also no incumbent in the 6th District, where current state Rep. Laura Toy is battling Thomas O'Connor of Redford and John Dillon of Livonia for the Republican nomination. Former state Rep. Eileen DeHart of Westland is seeking the Democratic nomination against Eric Stempien of Livonia.

The state senate and representative races are all for four-year terms.



Schoolcraft offers scholarships

Almost a quarter of a million dollars in scholarships is available to Schoolcraft College students for the fall and winter 2002-03 terms. The scholarships are awarded through the Schoolcraft College Foundation.

The Schoolcraft College Foundation alone grants more than 400 scholarships annually, with funds applied to tuition and college fees. The deadline for applying is June 10. 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

Local couple balances family life and filmmaking

Movie making has become a way of life for a local couple with three young boys who don't seem to let Hollywood parties and celebrity awe affect their modest lifestyles.

Todd and Tommy Brunswick live in a Canton townhouse raising their 2-, 4- and 6-year-old sons and seem like the average suburban couple until they talk about their jobs, producing, writing and

filming horror and psychological thriller movies pushing them into the L.A. spotlight rubbing shoulders with television and movie stars.

Their second film, *Lurking Terror*, will have its world premiere at 8 p.m. and 10 p.m., Thursday, May 23 in the Maple Art Theatre in Bloomfield Hills. Reminiscent of the old days when double features were the norm, after the 10 p.m. showing the theater will run another Brunswick movie, *Biker Zombies*.

Todd, 32, and Tommy, 31, were thrust into the film making business after Tommy's business selling educational books for Dorling Kindersley Family Learning came to an end. The company was purchased and home sales were eliminated.

Right around the same time, Todd found himself out of work following a vacation from his job as media director at a Livonia family-run business. He planned to take time off to start writing a movie and it turned out his department had been axed.

"That threw us full-time into filmmaking," explained Tommy, short for Thomasita. "It was a sink or swim kind of thing."

Before they formed Crossbow 5, the couple came to the job with years of experience working on the commercial end of filmmaking — mostly creating commercials and industry and corporate videos.

"We always wanted to make our own movie," explained Todd.

Their first attempt, *Biker Zombies*, was released April 30 and is available for sale on the Dead Alive Productions label or by going to the Internet site, www.amazon.com.

Todd wrote the film in three days and it took only nine months from conception to the sale of the movie.

More importantly, it marked the beginning of their lifetime goal to be filmmakers.

"Even when we started dating (in June 1994) we said we were going to make a movie," said Tommy adding that they both graduated from Livonia's Churchill High School.

They now have three films, *Biker Zombies*, *Lurking Terror* and *Dumping Ground* slated for the Cannes Film Market, which runs in conjunction with the Cannes Film Festival. The movies will be made available for distribution worldwide at the market.

Todd and Tommy won't fly to Paris for the event, but their agents are there through May 26.

The Brunswicks have their own special engagement to attend, May 23 with the local release of *Lurking Terror*, a horrific story about a young woman named Betty (played by Angela Ransdell) who has a multitude of personal troubles, including a slim escape from police after she and her boyfriend held-up a party store.

She tries to hide in a backwater farming community where the towns folk are prisoners of an evil curse that dates back to 1805. On dark nights, when the fog rises from the forest, a creature known as the Evil appears with an insatiable bloodlust.

Over the last 200 years, residents have figured out a gruesome means of satisfying the Evil. The young heroine is forced to battle her captors and escape the Evil.

"Tommy and I grew up with the drive-ins in the late 70s and early 80s and this is an ode to the drive-in movies," explained Todd who wrote the script and directed the filming.

"It is a movie that you go into thinking it's a creature movie and you realize the people are the creatures," he said.

Tommy credits her dad, Dr. Rudy Hatfield, a clinical psychologist, for nurturing her love for movies when she was a child.

"My favorite thing growing up was going to movies," Tommy said. "If my mom was working nights, my dad would take me and my little brother to the drive-in."

Years later, Hatfield is realizing his dream of acting with bit parts in his daughter's movies. He

Since the young filmmakers formed Crossbow 5 Entertainment, named for a Canton street the couple lived on and the five members of their family, they swap jobs. One thing they never do together, however, Tommy said, is write. It's not good for their marriage, she said.

"One of the reasons we decided to do this, is that one of us had to stay home with the kids and Todd was jealous," Tommy said. "Now it's pretty even."

When Tommy wrote the script it was intended for about \$2,000 budget.

They sent the work to Los Angeles for review by their attorney, Peter P. Starson, Jr. who gave it to Michael Madsen who passed it along to a couple of his celebrity friends.

One week later Starson called Todd and Tommy asking who they wanted to star.

Dumping Ground will be their first film where they didn't have to wear all the hats. The budget allowed them to hire professionals for the different roles.

They're learning early on in their careers, that the most important rule of filmmaking is that, "Just when you think you know all the rules, you understand you don't."

"And you realize it's always different," Tommy explained. "You have to be able to roll with the punches no matter what happens."

Karen Nyman, a Fenton resi-

We played regularly at Nino's sharing our music with firemen, Red Cross Workers and volunteers from all over the U.S. It was an honor to be part of this humbling and rewarding experience. We have made friends for life.

We find ourselves veering off into some new horizons. My brother Todd Curtis, actor and trumpeter, is currently in L.A. and will be joining us soon here on the East Coast. He is writing and producing a screen play and we collaborating with him, composing the film score for this project.

We've had many adventures. In fact, at one of our concerts, we were honored to have the famous rescue dog Bear (first on the scene at The World Trade Center) in the audience. His handler, Scott said that Bear loved our music! What more could we ask for? So now all we wonder...is there any time to sleep?

instantly the smooth sounds of Landis' voice meld with the air. It doesn't take a trained ear to know that she is good — really good. Landis' range goes up, down and sideways, and the delight she takes in her music is ever present.

"My mom has been the most influential in formulating my early taste. She had some good records — by Sarah Vaughn, the Getz/Gilberto Collaboration. (Stan Getz, an American jazz tenor saxophonist, collaborated with the Brazilian guitarist/composer/vocalist Joao Gilberto). It was Gilberto's then-wife, Astrud Gilberto, who was the singer of *Girl From Ipanema*, the huge hit from the early 1960s. It was the first instance Landis had heard Brazilian music spliced with American jazz. "I really ended up liking it."

As a lifelong resident of Rochester Hills, (with a little time spent in Royal Oak), Landis sang in vocal class or choir throughout school. "It was my favorite class," she says.

Singing career

She went on to launch SheLan Records in 1981. Oddly enough, her early days of vinyl are being

revived in Japan. Harbor Exports, a company out of Liberty, New York, recently made a request for and sold 4,200 vinyl records there.

Although the duo are working on two other CDs above and beyond *Colors of Brazil*, Landis says it's nice to focus on this one in particular.

"This is a compilation of different compositions, but all will make you sit up and take notice."

The music could fill up a concert hall, an intimate café, or a living room, such is its comfort level and richness.

There are songs you'll want to listen to again and again. *Summertime*, based on *Summertime and the Livin' is Easy*, is easily recognizable, but clearly Landis' own.

"It features a larger group than we usually use in public — a saxophonist, trumpet — about eight people. It's so exciting to hear it, especially with our arranger, Scott Peterson. This is more of an Afro-Cuban arrangement than Gershwin."

Then there are the bossa novas (translated from the Brazilian as "new beat"), intrinsic elements to

group.

A standing concert may also be held on a monthly basis in the main lobby.

any collection of Latin music. *House By the Sea*, a cooler than cool bossa nova is an original Matle composition, and at first only an instrumental.

"Later on," reports Landis, "I wrote some lyrics for his melodic song with a winding melody."

Versatile performers

Quite a few of the cuts on the CD are live, performed at the Ford Detroit International Jazz Festival in 2000 as well. Landis and Matle can and do perform as a duo, a trio, or in a larger group, one they've appropriately named Brazilian Love Affair. With six to eight pieces, this group will play for larger engagements such as the Ford Festival.

Pianist Phil Kelly (also a Rochester native) plays an amazing solo. A regular on the piano at Morels on Telegraph Road, in an all-occasion band, Kelly is really one-of-a-kind. The song is based on the samba, and happily lopes along.

Matle is as seasoned a musician

as they come. As the guitarist and producer for the duo, he has done it all. The genesis of his career stems from time spent at Oakland University. He admits to having been brought up on classic rock — Santana, Jimi Hendrix — like many a Detroit Rock City youth (he grew up in Bloomfield), but didn't find his passion until at school.

"Without any career plans of any sort, I gravitated toward music there. I was always interested in jazz but didn't really play it until I was there," Matle reports.

Eventually he picked it as his major and received a degree in jazz performance. Seven years later, with much experience and

ability under his belt, he was more than ready to expand.

Musical duo

Landis and Matle have worked together for close to ten years.

Nothing, it seems, can put this duo down. In addition to making their own music, Landis and Matle book clients into their studio. Then there is distribution. A few places buy and distribute their CDs nationally, but they are basically on their own. They have a Weblink to their own page on the homepage of HYPERLINK: <http://www.art-servemichigan.org/at/members/landis/>.

And then there are also the live gigs, where they end up selling a lot of their music.

None of this has gone unnoticed by the public or those in the know. Their awards include "Outstanding Traditional Jazz Group" from the Detroit Music Awards in 1999 and the Spirit of Detroit Award to the Sheila Landis Trio for the 1998 Jazz for Literacy Concert. In 2001,

Landis won her fifth "Outstanding Jazz Vocalist" award from the Detroit Music Awards; both Landis and Matle were also nominated for "Outstanding Jazz Composer" and Matle for "Outstanding Jazz Instrumentalist" as well.

Landis and Matle continue to lead the artistic attack on multiple fronts: The duo is awaiting delivery this month of their next CD, *Riding the Round Pool*, which is mostly poetry-based musical improvisations. Landis says it has made for some of their most interesting improvisation.

As if this were not all enough, Landis and Matle have started work on a R&B album and continue "Music and Metaphor" workshops in which they present music programs to the schools.

A recent e-mail brought yet another interesting project into the fold: Musicians Outreach of Michigan (MOM) has contacted Landis and Matle in an effort to bring music to cancer centers, playing for patients and their families. Cancer has touched both Landis' brother and father, so it is a program they wholeheartedly embrace.

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
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Sholem Aleichem Institute features Yiddish play excerpts

He was one of the very best trombonists in metro Detroit and Canada. He could play a wide range of music, everything from Dixieland to jazz and bebop." Sanders was primarily a jazz trombonist. He taught music, was an accomplished musical arranger, and played with Neil Hefti's band during the Swing era. "Stu was the best," said Knowles. "I met him 15 years ago. He played every Saturday at Lee's Imperial Tavern in Windsor. Chinese food and Dixieland and there was standing room only. He had a unique style of playing. He could throw in licks that would make you smile. He was a wonderful guy. We went to the same high school in Windsor." The son of English immigrants, Sanders was born in Windsor in 1920. His mother, Emma, was a concert pianist

Sanders is survived by his wife Jo, son, Lee and his wife Pat, and grandkids Bret, Stephanie and Ryan, four great grandchildren, and sister Gwen Rock.



Did metro Detroit need another Italian restaurant? If that question references the new Bacco Ristorante in Southfield, that opened at the end of March, the answer is an unequivocal "yes." Bacco is unlike all the others.

Chef-proprietor Luciano Del Signore of Fonte d'Amore in Livonia and his wife Monica have taken the concept of modern Italian to new heights in the complete remodeling of the former Ristorante di Modesta. With the aid of personal friend and private designer Carmine Martone, they've created a Manhattan-style, contemporary atmosphere with clean lines, and understated elegance.

Warm cherry wood, stainless steel accents, custom designs and paintings from Park West Gallery in Southfield form backdrops for the visual focal point, colorful murals painted by Barney Judge of Ann Arbor. Attention to the smallest details make Bacco unique among its Italian restaurant peers. The mood set is perfect from the decor and fresh flowers to the contemporary Italian music. No Frank Sinatra, no strolling musicians, no operatic arias, and no traditional Italian melodies. Bacco is about the unexpected and it's delightful.

"It's our personal interpretation of Bacco, the god of wine," Luciano said. "I'm passionate about Italian culture, food and wine. I consider la dolce vita as a balance of work, play, food and family. Italian lifestyle and regional cuisine is all about simplicity and the use of a few flavorful ingredients."

Complete package

Atmosphere and food do not create an outstanding restaurant. Human factors are essential. Luciano in the kitchen. Monica greeting and seating diners. Then, at Bacco, there's Milanese native maitre d' Mar-

cello Giuffrida who brings Italian five-star polish to each table. His European restaurant education is unmistakable and shows in the Bacco waitstaff whom he has trained. Dressed in tuxedo shirts, black vests, and bow ties with long white aprons, the waitstaff adds just the right note of tradition.

In addition to being the most stylishly-dressed maitre d' in the area, his knowledge of Italian wines is amazing. If you're not familiar with the extensive Italian wine list (predicted to grow even larger with time), allow Marcello to pair the wine appropriately to your menu choices. You won't be disappointed.

At Fonte d'Amore in Livonia, Luciano concentrates on foods from his family's roots in the Abruzzo region of Italy. "With Bacco," said Monica, "we're using the foods of many regions of Italy on the menu. Luciano renews his chef's skills continually and comes up with new ideas from our annual trips to Italy."

Bacco's lunch menu contains a number of the same items as the dinner menu but has more salads and three panini. At dinner, two cold antipasti, Caprese from the Campania region (imported buffalo mozzarella and red tomatoes with extra virgin olive oil,

fresh basil and sea salt) and Carpaccio di Melanzane alla Brace from Abruzzo (grilled eggplant topped with caramelized onions, capra cheese and aged balsamic vinegar) are standouts.


Among warm antipasti, try Capesante Dorate al Profumo di Tartufo (pan roasted diver scallops with porcini mushroom cream sauce), a specialty from Sardegna. Zuppa di Cozze all'Arabiata from the region of Puglia is the classic preparation of mussels, sauteed with garlic, olive oil, chili peppers and tomatoes. Strozziapreti Norcina is an outstanding pasta with Palmino sauce, Italian sausage, black truffles and wine. Spaghetti allo Scoglio from Puglia features scampi, shrimp, mussels, clams and scallops with fresh tomatoes, white wine and garlic. Try it with 1999 Don Luigi di Mayo Norante, a wine from the region of Molise. From Italy's Piedmont, Cavatelli ai Porcini is a fabulous mix of fresh porcini and wild mushrooms in a white wine cream sauce.

It's outstanding with the buttery, rich 1998 Antinori Cervaro della Salla Chardonnay.

Hands down favorite among Secondi Piatti (principal plates) is a Sicilian specialty Misto di Pesce alla Griglia. Marinated and grilled giant scampi, shrimp, calamari, diver scallops and salmon are served atop sauteed spinach. Try this with 1999 Lis Neris, a sauvignon blanc from Friuli.

Other top choices are Pollo al Rosmarino (pan-roasted Amish chicken breast), Costoletta di Vitello alla Brace (prime veal chop) and Scaloppine al Limone, a specialty of Lombardy. Portions are reasonably sized or can be shared, leaving the possibility open for dessert.




Clean decks to restore their beauty

Wooden decks in poor condition reduce the value of a house and are just plain unattractive. Many conditions contribute to this deterioration. Proper cleaning will maintain and restore their beauty and value.

There are many opinions as to the best way to clean wood. Here are a few of the more popular ways.

Most of the commercial deck cleaning products work pretty well. They are convenient and readily available but can be somewhat expensive for large areas. Use these as directed.

■ **Probably the most popular chemical is good old-fashioned chlorine bleach. About one cup of bleach to every gallon of water is a good starting point for this cleaner.**

Probably the most popular chemical is good old-fashioned chlorine bleach. It's good for removing mildew, fungi, and algae and is a reasonably good cleaner when mixed with other cleaning agents. About one cup of bleach to every gallon of water is a good starting point for this cleaner. Add more if necessary.

On the down side, sodium hypochlorite (bleach) is used in the production of paper. It breaks down lignin, which is the natural component that holds wood fiber together. DO NOT mix bleach with any cleaning product containing ammonia.

Trisodium phosphate or TSP substitutes chemically attack dirt. These can be found at hardware stores and in paint departments of home improvement stores. I prefer the substitutes because the phosphate in TSP supplies nutrients for algae in our lakes and streams. Avoid letting this product enter storm sewers. TSP can darken cedar and redwood. Wear protective gloves and eye protection when using TSP.

Oxygen based bleach products such as Oxi Clean are environmental friendly and a great brightener and cleaner. I'm not usually one to use "as seen on TV" products as Oxi Clean. But this one really does work and can be found locally.

Use oxalic acid for removing rust stains.

Before starting, remove items from the deck. Sweep or blow away dirt and leaves including debris from between the deck boards. Cover, or better yet, turn any electric outlets off at the electric panel. Water mixed with electricity can cause injury or death! Hose down plants and shrubs.


Soak the wood surface. This helps keep the chemical near the surface and reduces evaporation. Apply the solution with a garden sprayer. Allow the solution to work for 10 to 20 minutes. Covering the surface with plastic will help reduce evaporation in very hot, dry conditions.

Use a stiff brush on stubborn areas. Rinse with a garden hose or a pressure washer. Use only enough pressure to get the job done. Too much can damage the wood. Pressure washers can cause severe injury. Follow safety precautions and wear eye protection. Dilute the over-spray from plants and shrubs with fresh water.

Allow about 48 hours for the wood to dry before applying sealer.


There are many fine sealers on the market. I like Penofin. It soaks deeply into the surface, dries with a flexible finish and comes in a variety of colors. See <http://www.nuforest.com/Penofin/penofin.htm>.



A new coat of paint, a couple of throw pillows, a potted plant – interior design never sounds particularly deep.

But it does have its more profound points. Namely, design choices can affect how people feel in a particular space and transform their mood and general sense of well-being.

For nationally renowned interior designer Alexandra Stoddard, who recently spoke to an audience of 260 at the Michigan Design Center in Troy, that concept is a recipe for happiness.

Author of the newly released book *Choosing Happiness: Keys to a Joyful Life* and host of the Home and Garden Television

network's *Homes Across America*, Stoddard spoke about her book and how to create "happy rooms," showing slides of her design work as examples.

"Our home is our haven. It's our safe place. It's so important that it reflect our spirit," said Stoddard. "As an interior designer, I have found a lot of people who are homeless in their own houses."

Back to the basics

While Stoddard offered plenty of unique tidbits about interior design, she emphasized many basic design concepts.

For instance, take advantage of natural light with windows, window treatments and mirrors strategically placed to capture light. "No space is too miserable or ugly for you

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Q: How do I get rid of dust and how often do I need to dust?

A: It will be a continual challenge, but not an impossible task to rid your house of dust. Everything in your house either attracts dust or causes dust. You need to schedule a consistent dusting time and use the right tools to conquer those dust bunnies.

Plan to dust once a week. Some areas will need dusting every week and you will be able to quickly identify these areas, which include the top of furniture. Other areas such as baseboards, under furniture, ceiling fans, vents, and high shelves can be dusted monthly or several times a year. You will need a written or

mental plan to remember what you need to dust.

Dust can accumulate anywhere including in your carpet. Look at the carpet area next to the baseboard. This area will accumulate dust bunnies if you do not use a narrow attachment on your vacuum cleaner to suction the dust.

You need to grab the dust before it settles on your furniture. There are many places in your house that are dust culprits. You need to attack these areas first before the dust spreads throughout your house. Make sure you regularly clean the following: Dryer lint screen, window screens, window ledges, the furnace filter, return air vents, and heating/cooling vents. Check for any openings along

your dryer vent where lint could escape. Change your vacuum bag regularly before it is completely full.

Some furniture shows more dust than others, such as dark furniture and glass tops. You will need to dust these more often than the lighter wood tops. Items such as: Knickknacks, pleated lamp shades, frames, silk plants are dust collectors and will require more time dusting. Minimize the number of items you have displayed on furniture so you can dust quickly. Use decorative dresser scarves on some furniture and you will not need to dust as often.

You need the right tools to conquer dust bunnies. You can avoid chemicals and grab dust by using a micro fiber cloth of lamb-

swool. Extended lambswool dusters reach high areas like ceiling fans, return air vents, and ceilings. A micro fiber floor duster works well at grabbing dirt and dust on wood floors, linoleum, and ceramic tile.

You need to dust the following items in each room:

Furniture (include front, back and sides); Bed frame; Blinds or shades; Curtains; Lamps; Decorative items; Baseboards; Doors; Window ledges; Walls and ceilings, especially the corners, where dust collects faster; Ceiling fans; Light switches and outlets; Books on bookshelves; Electronics, such as the television and computer.

to make it beautiful and happy," she said, showing a slide of a tiny bathroom where floral window treatments over a sink distract the eye from the mundane and direct it to the outdoors.

Mirrors elsewhere in the bathroom work to draw in extra light and enlarge the space. "The use of mirrors makes so much of a difference in a small space," she said.

Stoddard later showed a kitchen where mirror panels on refrigerator doors draw in light from the other side of the room, demonstrating that the reflective material often works well in less obvious places.

Color your mood

Of course Stoddard also emphasized the effect of color on mood. Shades of blue, for instance, bring solace and comfort, she said.

"Blue is good for bedrooms. It's very soothing, calming and restorative."

But don't fear working with less pragmatic shades, including white, she said. "I love a white

background. Let your fabrics show the dirt. Don't be practical."

How about pink in the kitchen?

In a slide showing singer and dancer Sandy Duncan's New York penthouse kitchen, soft watermelon walls brighten up the eating space.


In addition to the importance of color in interior design, Stoddard urged listeners to incorporate their favorite objects and personal effects into living spaces.

"It makes a huge difference," she said, showing several examples of her own rooms, including a closet chock-full of beautiful wrapping paper and spools of colorful ribbons.

"An inanimate object becomes animate when we love it," Stoddard quoted her mentor Eleanor McMillen Brown of the design firm McMillen Inc. in New York.

"We will never be alone or lonely, when we have a space we have created of and for ourselves."

- Sun.


So lather on that sun screen, fire up the grill and get outside and enjoy it while you can. Our lovely summer days may be numbered, but you can bet they will be savored.

A sobering look at teen drinking



Editor's note: Eight high school students recently shared their thoughts and observations about teen drinking. They candidly talked about the allure, the popularity and the consequences of drinking alcohol, as they've witnessed it. The forum was moderated by Patrice Flax, the Alcohol and Other Drugs Campus Initiatives Coordinator at the University of Michigan.



The halls on Monday mornings at area high schools are often buzzing with gossip about who did what at the parties over the weekend. Local high school students say it's not gossip, it's the truth — drinking is commonplace among their peers.

"It's very common," said Julie Patterson, a senior from Plymouth Salem High School. "It's ridicu-

lous, you come back on a Monday and you hear, 'Oh, I went to this party and everyone was so smashed.'"

And the story doesn't end there. The teens who shared their thoughts on alcohol during a recent forum hosted by The Observer Newspapers said their classmates seldom remember what they did while drinking at a weekend party.

"I think it goes too far when you get to school and you hear rumors about people... then, you talk to them and they're like, 'Well, it could've happened. I don't remember,'" said Patterson.

There's nothing funny about excessive drinking, according to the students.

"Alcohol, it makes you stupid," said Charlie Pepper, a student at Farmington High School. "You can go out driving and kill yourself, or kill other people. It's so easy to screw up."

Watching drunken behavior and seeing the consequences of drinking alcohol has steered some teenagers away from it.

"I don't drink because I like to know what I've done," said Kate Keim, a student at Plymouth Salem High School. "I've had times when I look back and think, 'What was I thinking?' You just don't use your brain."


Weekend parties

Whether it's a small gathering in the basement of a friend's house, even if the parents are home, or it's a crowded, rowdy party at some unsuspecting, vacationing parents' house, the scene is pretty much the same week after week.

"The sad thing about it is that people do it every weekend," said Patrice Wade, a student at Farmington High School. "A lot of people do it who you wouldn't even think do it."

Familiar Behavior

Drinking during teens sets pattern for adulthood

Social habits that revolve around drinking during the high school years will likely carry on to college.

Patrice Flax, a professional social worker who coordinates the University of Michigan Alcohol and Other Drugs Campus Initiatives program on the Ann Arbor campus said regular and excessive drinking in high school sets a pattern for the college years.

"Students who drink heavily in high school tend to go into the Greek (fraternity and sorority) system," she said. "It has to do with familiar behavior. They learned at a young age how to handle anxiety... it's a very difficult behavior to change."


A survey of 2,824 U-M students, including 2,041 undergraduates, conducted by the U-M Substance Abuse Research Center, shows 45 percent of undergraduates, most of whom are under 21 years of age, binge drink. That's on par with the national average of 43 percent, according to a 1997 Harvard study.

Of those students surveyed, 72 percent said they increased their drinking once they arrived on campus. Eighty-three percent of the students considered themselves to be light to moderate drinkers and 4 percent said they were heavy drinkers. Forty-five percent admitted they had at least one binge drinking episode in the past two weeks, when surveyed via the Internet in 1999.

Flax said the goal isn't to eliminate campus

we're seeing and it's a whole different world."

Hanging out with friends, taking long drives in the car, going to the movies or going bowling are things the teens said they enjoy.

"We don't need alcohol to have fun, there's a lot of better things to do," said Pepper, who admits his outgoing personality has caused people to think he's been drinking.

Jessica Nance, a student at John Glenn High School, said her personality allows her to be herself, without alcohol.

"I have a pretty outgoing attitude," she said. "I'm always laughing and stuff all the time. Everybody is like, 'Whatever you're on, I want to be on it, too.'"

Angela Tablac, a student at Plymouth Canton High School, said the general acceptance of drinking by most teenagers is disturbing.

"I think it's become almost like a bragging thing for some people, where they come to school and it's all about what party they went to, how drunk they got, who they were with and all that stuff," said Tablac. "It's kind of sad that teenagers accept that and allow that to happen and don't step in and say something's wrong."

For Garden City High School student Chuck Nance, alcohol has come between him and his friends.

Livonia church, pastor celebrate anniversaries this weekend

Like many churches, Livonia's Memorial Church of Christ had humble beginnings. Sixty years ago, a handful of Christians gathered in a home in Detroit for a church service and Bible school. Six locations and 1,000 members later, the congregation meets and celebrates at its building on Five Mile, and for the last 30 years, has been led by the same minister, Mark McGilvrey.

The congregation will honor Mark and Jeannie McGilvrey at a banquet at noon, May 19 at Burton Manor.

"The congregation has been so good to us," said McGilvrey, who came to southeast Michigan from Cincinnati with his bride, Jeannie. "When we came here, most of the church's leaders were about the same age as my parents. And they treated us like we were their own children."

The McGilvreys have raised their two sons, Ryan, 23, and Rob, 20, while serving the church, which has become like family, according to Mark McGilvrey.

The church has also grown, along with the McGilvrey family. When McGilvrey came to the church in 1972, it had 500 members, and had just moved into its then-new location on Five Mile. Since then, the congregation has doubled, as has the size of the building.

The church has expanded and has purchased neighboring plots

of land to accommodate growth and additional parking.

McGilvrey was fortunate to land the job right out of seminary, who was hired by the church as a youth minister. Only months after he arrived, the senior minister left the church, and McGilvrey filled in as interim minister, before the church directors hired him to lead on a permanent basis.

"I felt like they gave me a chance. I was only 23 when I became senior minister and that's kind of unusual," he said, and added with a chuckle, "I really think they just got tired of looking for another minister."

Just as unusual is a minister who stays with the same congregation for three decades.

"Most move on to another church after fewer than 10 years. I would say it's not

uncommon for a minister to stay only three, or four, or five years," McGilvrey said. "I didn't leave because I feel like they took a risk on me, and I should stay to repay them."

Like family, the congregation has shown their appreciation and affection for the McGilvreys in some unconventional ways.

One of the Bible School Classes took the McGilvreys on a trip to Hawaii, and the church members sent them on a cruise to the Holy Land, and a trip to Eastern Europe after the fall of the Iron Curtain.

On McGilvrey's 15th anniversary of coming to the church, the congregation surprised him and brought his parents to Livonia.

"I have a sense of family here and a sense of calling. I've felt this is where God wants me to be," McGilvrey said.

"When all your friends are doing it every weekend, it just kind of upsets you, really," said Nance. "When you just want to do something else and they just want to continue doing this. So, you try to find other (friends) to hang with instead. It's bad because you're losing your friendships."

Peer pressure

Peer pressure, more so between guys than girls, is a big factor, said the students.

"It's kind of something they do to prove themselves to other guys," said Marcella Coats, a student at John Glenn High School.

Parents also play a major role

in the decision, said the teens.

"I would be scared to death if my parents found out," said Wade. "They wouldn't trust me and I wouldn't be allowed to do anything. By instilling those values in me, and placing that trust upon my shoulders... it has kind of made me not want to mess around with that kind of thing."



drinking altogether, but to educate students about healthy, social alternatives to frat parties and such.

The first six weeks of college are the most volatile time for students, she noted. Anxiety, new-found freedom and the cultural expectation that college is a place for heavy partying play into it.

"There's a high-risk period of time and what you want to do is get them through this time safely," Flax said. "There's a lot of risks associated with it. Our focus is on reduction. We want to help them make healthy choices and reduce the risks."

Making teens aware

Education should begin during the middle school years, said a group of high school students who recently participated in a teen alcohol forum hosted by *The Observer Newspapers* and moderated by Flax.

The alcohol and drug awareness and prevention programs introduced in elementary school are good, they said, but more needs to be done as students prepare to enter high school.

"I think DARE is a very good program, but my problem with it is that they're targeting too young of an age group," said Angela Tablac, a student at Plymouth Canton High School. "I think they should target 7th, 8th and 9th graders because that's when you really start getting into the peer groups and start wanting to be a part of something."

Health classes in high school, which cover topics such as alcohol and drug use, are "a little too late," she added, because students in 11th and 12th grade are "already a part of these activities."

Jessica Nance, a student at John Glenn High School, agreed. She said second and third grade kids really don't understand the issue.

Continual reminders on the dangers of drinking should be a priority for high schools, said Tablac. Compelling stories from young people who have been negatively affected by alcohol can impact teenagers' decisions.

"Aside from having people talk about drug abuse (prevention), we also need (students) who say, 'I'm against alcohol and drug abuse because of this, because of these influences in my life.' We need both ends of the spectrum to come together and say this is why it's bad," said Tablac.

On the college campus, Flax said the first challenge is to make people realize that excessive drinking is a problem. She said the social expectations and cultural mindset that it's OK to drink in college makes prevention and awareness difficult.

"It makes it challenging to really get a consensus that it's a problem," she said. "We need to work with the students to change that culture."

Christ Our Savior Lutheran Church was chartered with 108 communicant members on Feb. 6, 1977. It became a self-supporting congregation of the Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod.

The first church building was dedicated on Jan. 14, 1977, on a five-acre site. Expansion continued with the addition of an education wing, dedicated on May 6, 1984. To keep pace with the rapid growth of the congregation — from 243 members in 1977 to more than 1,300 members in 1992 — a new church seating 950 people, and additional office

The congregation also will dedicate a stained glass window of Christ blessing the children. Harry Flagg of Livonia designed the piece.

space, a library and an expanded lobby, were built in 1992. Six additional classrooms were completed in 1997.

Christ Our Savior expanded its ministry by starting a second worship site in Canton. The first worship service at Christ Our Savior - Canton was held on March 23, 1997. Worshipers at the Canton site were chartered as their own congregation, Grace Lutheran Church, in 2001.

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



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

Mothers of 43 U.S. presidents were all committed Christians

They form an exclusive sorority with 43 members: Mothers of the U.S. presidents. Some were impoverished and some rich, some unlettered and some college graduates.

But most shared one trait: Mild to fervent commitment to the Christian religion, often buttressed by daily Bible reading and weekly worship.

Harold I. Gullan tells what we know about the beliefs of the 43 in the popular history *Faith of Our Mothers: The Stories of Presidential Mothers from Mary Washington to Barbara Bush* (Eerdmans).

Because the record is sometimes thin, Gullan fills out the proceedings with other biographical material, including another trait most of these mothers shared: Unshakable faith in their sons' destinies.

Gullan doesn't come out and say so, but several recent presidents surpassed their mothers in religious zeal, three Bible Belters in particular.

Methodist George W. Bush, who experienced a midlife recommitment to Jesus Christ, expresses more fervor than mother Barbara, an Episcopalian.

Bill Clinton has been a committed Baptist since turning up at a local church at age 10 and informing the preacher he'd be coming to worship regularly, with or without mother Virginia Dell Cassidy Blythe Clinton Dwire Kelley (she was married four times).

Jimmy Carter added "born again" to the political lexicon and has taught Bible classes for decades, while mother "Miss Lillian" seemed a less robust style of Baptist.

Then we have the reverse, mothers whose degree of piety was not passed along with their genes.

These included the only Roman Catholic among the 43, Rose Kennedy. Her 104 years were a regimen of devotionals and Masses (often daily). Mrs. Kennedy was so old-school that she refused to attend the funeral of daughter Kathleen, who had married a Protestant divorcee. By Gullan's account, Catholicism gave Mrs. Kennedy a refuge from her husband's flagrant philandering. But she was able to pass on the faith "to her children only in part."

A Protestant version of the piety gap is seen in Warren G. Harding and mother Phoebe. The mother's "second home" was the Methodist church, Gullan recounts, and she became even more devout as a convert to Seventh-day Adventism.

Son Warren affiliated with the Baptists but displayed little piety and died in moral disgrace in the White House. Upon his mother's death in 1910 he

■ The enigmatic Abraham Lincoln revered his stepmother Sarah (in the book along with Lincoln's birth mother), who could not read but imparted a love of learning and of the Bible. Yet Lincoln stayed at home when his parents worshiped with the Baptists and he's the only president who never joined a church.

remarked that he could not say this for himself "but dear, dear Mother will wear a crown" of God in eternity.

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Two of the mothers failed to pass on the most distinctive tenet of their creed.

Hannah Nixon and her husband raised son Richard M. as a Quaker. Theirs was the western evangelical type, quite distinct from the quiet version of the Northeast, but both branches forbade the bearing of arms. Yet Richard fought in World War II and became commander in chief.

So did Dwight D. Eisenhower, whose father and mother Ida were devout followers of a "peace church," the Brethren in Christ (aka "River Brethren"). When Ike was an adult, the elder Eisenhowers converted to the Jehovah's Witnesses, who oppose participation not only in the military but voting or anything else to do with what they see as the wicked worldly system.

Many of the 43 were related to preachers. The most distinguished example was the husband of Woodrow Wilson's mother Janet ("Jessie"), who became a professor at Columbia Theological Seminary and the chief officer of what became the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.

Wilson, who wrote in his diary that he "professed Christ's name" at 17, married a fellow preacher's kid.

We know little about the mothers of some early 19th-century presidents. But the way things are going, Gullan remarks, "in the 21st, we will likely know too much about everyone."

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
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
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OHL's best

Erik Reitz, a Plymouth Salem HS graduate (2001) who plays for the Ontario Hockey League's Barrie Colts, has been named the winner of the Max Kaminsky Trophy as the OHL's outstanding defenseman.

A Wolverine hit
Volpe's bat carries Michigan to NCAA Regionals

One of the best: Salem grad Stefanie Volpe has proven herself as one of Michigan's best players ever. She's listed among the top five in nearly every all-time offensive category.

Stefanie Volpe was on her way into a different ballpark when the question was put to her: *Has the season been a surprise to you?*

One word could have summarized her reply — unexpected. But while that answer was meant to describe the surprising season the University of Michigan softball team has enjoyed, it could have encompassed much more.

It could have included Volpe's season. Indeed, her entire career.

The former Plymouth Salem standout has become one of the best players ever to play for the Wolverines. When she batted .345 as a freshman in 1999, driving in 43 runs (and tying the Big Ten record for RBI with 33), she surprised people.

"Actually, whoever we recruit, we don't know what to expect," said U-M coach Carol Hutchins. "But honestly, Stefanie Volpe was not someone we expected to come in and make an immediate impact."

"She really rose to the occasion. I don't think any coaches throughout the state thought she'd be this good."

But it was no fluke. And throughout her career, Volpe has continued to improve until, this season — as a senior — she surpassed all her previous bests in leading the Wolverines to the Big Ten regular-season and tournament championships.

And yet, when she spoke outside Comerica Park prior to Tuesday's Tigers-vs.-Anaheim game, her answer concerned the team, not her performance in particular.

"I didn't expect us to do as well as we have," Volpe said. "I knew we had the talent, I just didn't expect us to get the championships we have."

The reason for her doubt? The Big Ten is always a difficult road to travel. Players would have to step up, perform even better than they have.

Including Volpe. Sure, she'd been named all-conference in each of her first three seasons, the first two at catcher and in 2001 at third base. Matching those kinds of performances might be the only way U-M could realize its lofty goals.

She did — and then some. Volpe posted career highs in batting average with a team-best .424, and in runs batted in with 44 and runs scored with 51, both team-leading totals. She led the Big Ten in slugging (.717) and on-base (.565) percentage.

Her season totals in home runs — 11 — and stolen bases — 19-of-23 — surpassed her career numbers entering the season. Her 11 home runs is the second-highest season total ever posted by a Wolverine.



Those numbers are partially responsible for her being honored as the team's co-Most Valuable Player at Monday's team banquet. Thing is, they could still grow. Second-seeded (and 11th-ranked) Michigan hosts Canisius, the fifth seed, in the opening round of the NCAA Region 6 Tournament at 2 p.m. today at Alumni Field.

No. 1-seed Washington plays No. 6 Oakland University at 11:30 a.m. and No. 3 Ohio State goes against No. 4 Central Michigan. The double-elimination tournament continues through Sunday.

Volpe's value to the team is easy to see. "She's a bonafide hitter, a natural," was how Hutchins described her. "She's just got a great eye at the plate. "She's the best hitter I've ever seen, let alone coached."

That's one thing Volpe has been throughout her softball career — tough. Particularly on opposing pitchers.

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


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

The Detroit Cooley graduate played a pivotal role as a backup center last season with the 35-1 Ocelots, who finished third in the National Junior College Athletic Association Division I men's basketball tournament in Hutchinson, Kan.

Other former Ocelots to play in the MAC include Rob Brown (University of Buffalo) and Nick Evola (Western Michigan University).

Barrett's teammate this season, first-team NJCAA All-America forward Mike Williams, will also play next year for WMU.

O'Shea, who first spotted Barrett at Bridgeton when he was an assistant at Boston College, likes the attitude of his most recent signee.

"Delvar's also a kid who is trying to help his mom, he's a guy of good character," said the Ohio coach.

Barrett will become the third Michigan player to sign with OU.

Freshmen James Bridgewater (Ann Arbor Pioneer) and Kevin Shorter (Mount Clemens Chippewa Valley) are also back.





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Investigate 'mark' of all principals to development

I am purchasing a conversion condominium and am looking at the disclosure statement of the seller. It appears that he has done a number of condo projects, but under separate corporations. He claims that there is no litigation involving this project. But I'm wondering how can I find out about past litigation which he may be involved in?

Most developers operate under separate legal entities for each condominium project and that is particularly the case with respect to persons converting condominiums.

There are some converters who have had a history of being involved in frequent litigation because of claims against them for misrepresentations and other issues which have come up. You should hire an attorney who can look into whether the developer or, more likely, the principals of the developing entity have been involved in other disputes in the past, particularly in regard to litigation.

If the developer or the principals of the developer have had a long series of "fights" which have resulted in litigation and/or complaints with the state, you would best be advised to go somewhere else to purchase your condominium.

That first sale

First transaction provided memories, well-learned lessons

You just never know about that very first residential real estate listing, sale or closing. It's like a first love. Some Realtors might remember the experience fondly, some as a nightmare. For still others, the memory has dimmed with the years. Here are a few recollections of that very first time when Realtors were part of a transaction that happened. Whether that first ride was smooth or bumpy, that first taste sweet or sour, that first review uplifting or deflating, these pros continue to chase the deal. And for the most part, they just love it.

Tim Winter, an associate broker and principal with Red Carpet Keim Carter Reed in Clarkston, said the first three closings of his career all happened on the same day about nine years ago. "It took me probably five months after getting my license to get a closing. It just worked out that way," he said of the trifecta. Two involved buyers who called while Winter was responsible for walk-ins on floor duty. Although they weren't interested in the initial home, they eventually did buy when Winter quickly forwarded them information on other homes available for sale. Then one of those buyers sold their existing house through Winter. "I think I probably learned most was that even though I got three (commission) checks, they weren't as big as I thought they'd be," he said. "I learned maybe it would be a good idea to put some money away for when things got tougher."

Gail M. Hodge, an associate broker with Real Estate One in Westland, made her first sale 34 years ago. "When I got in the business I had four children under (age) 4-1/2. I studied for the test at the encouragement of my mother when I went to the hospital for the fourth one. "In my first year, someone I knew found out I had a license. They had friends from Pennsylvania who were relocating. I took them around blind. A man in the office gave me some assistance, some houses to look at. "They found one they liked and we closed. It went smooth. The fellow who helped me even went to the closing." Hodge learned a valuable lesson from the experience that has served her well ever since. "I remember how green I felt," she said. "Getting your license doesn't mean that you're qualified to sell real estate. There's a lot more involved. That's when I decided to get more training." And the real kicker to this story - Hodge still remembers the address of that first sale, 26608 Five Mile, Redford, and has kept in touch with those buyers.



Zero down helps thousands

Whether by design or of necessity, many homebuyers find themselves in search of "nothing down" purchases. They seek to own property with little or none of their own money into the transaction. There are several different ways to get there. My favorite "zero down" mortgage is the VA loan. I used it in 1986 to buy my first home. I had a steady income, but barely a dollar to my name. Two years later, I was transferred and sold the property for a decent profit - all with no down payment.

Borrowers without VA privileges can get a "nothing down" deal with a willing seller. Sellers who own their home free and clear may offer worthy buyers a land contract which makes them the "bankers" for the buyers.

Depending on the type of loan and the lender, buyers can often use gifted monies to cover closing costs and down payments to affect a "zero down" purchase.

Homebuyers sometimes combine FHA mortgages with one of many popular down payment assistance programs. These programs require some degree of seller cooperation, but ultimately help borrowers get very close to a no-cost purchase.

Borrowers with good credit scores can often get to 100 percent without gifts or seller assistance. In fact, with exceptional credit they can get such loans without even having to verify their income.

Jumbo buyers seeking 100 percent financing sometimes "piggy back" mortgages, putting one loan on top of another. This mortgage structure allows them to pay for the majority of their purchase with one loan at a better interest rate and terms, and the balance with a smaller, higher-rate loan.

Need 100 percent financing, but have bruised credit? Do not despair. Even borrowers with credit scores slightly below 600 may qualify for "zero down" mortgages with some non-conforming lenders.

Regardless of the means, if you have desire and patience you can usually find a "zero down" deal that suits your needs. A well-seasoned lender can get you started on your way.

Ziegelman formed a partnership with longtime friend Carl Luchenback in 1980 after apprenticing with Minoru Yamasaki and Eero Saarinen.





Office vacancy rates here on the rise

Metro Detroit had more Class A (upscale, full-service) office space available for lease and sublease during the first quarter 2002 than at any time in the last five years.

The Class A vacancy rate of space available for lease directly from landlords climbed to 12.5 percent from 10.1 percent at year-end 2001, according to Paragon Corporate Realty Services in Farmington Hills.

With available sublease space considered, that vacancy rate jumped to 17.6 percent in the first quarter. That's up from 13.7 percent at year-end and from 9.1 percent a year ago.

The current figure is the highest overall Class A vacancy rate

recorded since the metro Detroit office market slowdown began, says Matthew Fenster, Paragon's executive director.

"The good news is that activity — both in terms of users looking at space and actual signed leases — picked up noticeably in the first quarter," he said.

"I think metro Detroit's market bottomed out early in the year, and the upswing is now beginning," Fenster added.

Much of the activity came from professional and consulting firms, while corporate users and automotive suppliers tended to remain on the sidelines, Fenster said.

Free rent grew common in every submarket during the first

quarter, even from landlords traditionally reluctant to offer it.

Increasingly aggressive landlords typically gave several months of free rent on a five-year lease and added more for longer-term leases, he said.

Broker incentive programs also became more prevalent, with landlords offering everything from \$50 per showing to trips, motorcycles and cars for large leases, Fenster said.

According to Paragon, direct vacancy rates (not including available sub-lease space) of Class A and B buildings combined by submarket as of April 1 were

- 7.7 percent in Southfield;
- 9.2 percent in Birmingham,

Bloomfield and Bingham Farms;

- 11 percent in Farmington Hills;
- 15.4 percent in Troy;
- 15.8 percent along the I-275 corridor;
- 18.2 percent in Detroit.

Average quoted (asked) rents in Class A offices were \$29.21 per square foot in Birmingham/Bloomfield; \$24.90 in Southfield; \$24.27 in Troy; \$23.91 in Detroit; \$23.52 in Farmington Hills; and \$23.45 along I-275.

"Ultimate price or rental rate is a combination of things — length of lease, lease improvements, credit of tenants," Fenster said. "Some landlords are more flexible."

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Big-city attitudes sunny as attacks fade into past

(AP) — While New Yorkers are more concerned than others about future terror attacks, an academic survey released recently shows most people in high-population areas aren't dwelling on the possibility.

In what is billed as the first comprehensive look at urban attitudes in post-Sept. 11 America, 22 percent of New York respondents said they worry a great deal about a future attack there, compared with 14 percent in Chicago and 13 percent in Los Angeles and Houston.

Outside the nation's four largest cities, only 5 percent of respondents are fretting about terror in their areas, according to the survey by the Center for Public Policy at the University of Houston.

This is important because residential and commercial real estate combine to forge lifestyles.

Richard Murray, director of the center, concluded that most Americans, regardless of geography, consider the attacks "a stumbling block, but not some-

thing that has really changed the way they live their lives."

The survey found 45 percent of New Yorkers either worry very little about future attacks or not at all, compared with more than 50 percent in the other big cities and 76 percent outside the four cities.

Surveyors quizzed about 400 people in each of the cities and about 770 people for the national numbers. The margin of error in the city surveys, conducted between March 31 and April 16, is 5.5 percent.

The poll of Americans outside the four biggest cities was done between April 15-23, and its

margin of error is 4 percent.

The survey was backed by millionaire developer and former Houston Mayor Bob Lanier.

While many attitudes measured in the 51-question survey were similar among the four cities, New York tended to stand out on terror-related issues.

For instance, while about two-thirds of respondents in other places believe post-Sept. 11 changes have been good for the country, only half of those in New York thought so.

And where less than 40 percent of respondents elsewhere believed the attacks had changed their communities a great deal, 67 percent of New Yorkers said the city has changed substantially.

Yet nearly nine in 10 of respondents from New York and the rest of the nation agreed their communities are at least somewhat back to normal, though about half said they'd be at least somewhat concerned about working or living in a skyscraper.

Fordham University professor Paul Kantor, in a paper prepared

for a conference, said New Yorkers who have serious concerns about their city's future have good reason to worry.

More than a quarter of all money earned in New York just prior to the attacks came from the finance, real estate and insurance sectors, with the securities industry the main source of growth during the 1990s boom years while other sectors, such as manufacturing, have dwindled.

"The result: New York is dependent more than ever on finance and its predominant location in lower Manhattan," Kantor wrote, referring to the Wall Street district around ground zero. "The city has become more vulnerable to external shocks than at any time in its history."

But Lanier, who watched Houston lose 250,000 jobs during the 1980s oil bust and rebound during the last decade, believes New York can do the same.

"Any great city, any great country that has catastrophes can soldier on," Lanier said.

Roof coating drops temp, saves lives

(AP) — A pilot program to put a white coating on some of Philadelphia's trademark black rooftops in order to reflect summer heat could save lives among the elderly — and become a model for new homes in other cities.

About 80 percent of the row houses in the City of Brotherly Love have flat or slightly pitched black roofs.

"The housing stock in Philadelphia was made for cold weather, not hot," said Lawrence Robinson, deputy Philadelphia medical examiner.

But black absorbs energy and white reflects it, making these urban heat islands dangerous to the elderly and infirm, who often don't have money for air conditioning.

More than 250 Philly residents, most of them elderly, died of heat-related causes during the sweltering summers of the 1990s, most in bedrooms on the top floors — and the blacktop roofs may be to blame.

So, two years ago, the nonprofit Energy Coordinating Agency Inc. began putting a thick, white acrylic coating on roofs of homes of older residents in low-income neighborhoods in south and southwest Philadelphia.

About 200 have been done so far, and the first analysis indicates that the coatings are working.

On the hottest days, with mercury soaring

into the mid- and upper 90s last August, rooms directly under the white roofs were about 3 degrees cooler than those beneath black roofs, according to a study by the Boston energy consulting firm Martin Blask Associates.

A drop in room temperature from 95.6 to 92.6 degrees actually doubles the degree difference between the room and the average body temperature of 98.6. Health officials say that could be the difference between life and death.

While blacktop roofs could rise to 170 degrees on a 95-degree day, and remain 150 degrees after dark, a white-coated roof on the same day would not exceed 120 degrees and would cool to near air temperature at sundown, researchers said.

The change can help cool an entire neighborhood; in one block where all 30 roofs were

coated late last summer, average outdoor air temperature fell about one degree compared with nearby black-roofed areas, researchers found.

"Even when it got moderately hot, people were telling us that they noticed a difference at ground level," program manager Neal Resnick said.

A study has shown that heating costs in white-roofed houses are about 3 percent higher, but that cooling costs are 22 percent lower, making them attractive for commercial buildings.

But Philadelphia's residential program, aimed primarily at saving lives, appears to be unique, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

Chicago next month plans to amend its building code to require lighter-colored roofs on new construction. Washington and Boston are looking at Philadelphia's pilot program, Resnick said.

The white coatings cost about \$1,200 per roof, but officials say they can extend roof life by 10 years. Grants from foundations and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Service allowed program leaders to work on 200 houses, with enough money left to do about 300 more.
