

Public will have school bond input

In the past 10 years, Plymouth-Canton has built a new high school, three elementary schools and a middle school as a way of handling increased student enrollment. And taxpayers are still paying for three of those buildings.

In the present, school officials want to learn what the district should look like in the future more specifically, the next 5-10 years. To begin this task, the school board outlined a "visioning" process that would consist of public meetings and listening to suggestions from the public.

If Plymouth-Canton voters pass another school bond, TMP & Associates of Bloomfield Hills would become the project archi-

needed to accommodate future idea, but suggested taking it a step

■ If aging facilities can be renovated, sold, or put to other uses Asking voters to approve a tax

increase for new buildings Spearheading the meetings will be a housing and facilities committee, made up of community members. The committee will be guided by TMP, which will, if a bond passes, become the project architect.

The firm has worked with a variety of school districts in getting bond issues passed.

"Passing any election is about getting the public informed," said Jim Ryan, Plymouth-Canton's interim superintendent. Plymouth-Canton taxpayers are

already paying 3.3 mills for a bond that included the building of Dodson Elementary, Discovery Middle and Plymouth High schools. So even the well-informed taxpayers may be a tough sell for a new bond, Ryan said.

"I believe the community values its school district," Ryan said. "I want to make the school district the number one reason to be in the Plymouth-Canton area."

John Castellana, senior vice president of TMP, said that the sessions will begin in November and continue through February. Specific dates and times have not vet been determined, but each session will last no more than two hours.

"After two hours, that's enough," Castellana said.

Tentative OK for strip mall

Two commercial projects that raised a series of red flags for planning commissioners this month won approval Tuesday from the Canton Township Board of Trustees, although one faces additional hurdles before construction can start.

Board members unanimously approved the site plan for an Arby's restaurant and Sunoco gas station combination along Michigan Avenue and granted a special land use request for a 51,000 squarefoot shopping center at Canton Center and Cherry Hill Roads.

Commission approves chamber site plan

The Canton Chamber of Commerce got approval from the Planning Commission Monday night to construct a pair of buildings on Hanford just west of Community Federal Credit Union - but

not before some residents

expressed concerns over a buffering wall.

The two residential-style buildings will be built on a one-acre site between the credit union and Sunflower Village subdivision. A 2,500square-foot building will serve as the chamber's headquarters, while a second 3.800square-foot building will be

built on spec and leased for other use such as doctors' offices, according to developer

Bob Paciocco. The chamber has launched a \$400,000 fund-raising drive to pay for construction, which is expected to cost around \$430,000.

The submitted site plan included a 6-foot-high masonry screen wall along the west property line to provide screening between the site and the nearby houses. But resident Jeff Martin, whose property adjoins the site, said the wall, which stops a few feet short of the sidewalk on the north side of the property,



Veteran's Day observance set; township seeks storytellers

On the eve of probable war in Iraq, the township will hold an observance of Veterans' Day in the hopes that residents never forget what it means to send fighting forces into harm's way.

The township will host a salute to those who've served their country on Sunday, Nov. 10 - the day before Veteran's Day - in the banquet rooms at the Summit on the Park.

There will be military memorabilia, music and one of the chefs at the Summit, a former military cook, will prepare chipped beef in a style that normally has a more colorful nomenclature amongst those with military service.

Township Volunteer Events

Coordinator Pat Van Dusen said students from the Plymouth-Canton Educational Park will also be taking part.

Jeffrey Squires of the marching band will play "Taps," she said. The P-CEP chamber strings, under the direction of Catherine DePentu, will play "Amazing Grace" and "When Johnny Comes Marching Home." For the past few years, the township has floated a standing offer to veterans of all branches of service in all conflicts to come in and tell their stories for a Veteran's Day video. Canton Township Cable Specialist Dave Harris said the response has been less than overwhelming.

"There hasn't been a good turnout," he said. "Over the past veterans who contribute their three years only six people have

come in to tell their stories." The offer has even been extended to those who have stories about life on the homefront during times of war. But, being entirely voluntary, it's not like he can force people to share their memories. The tape runs at township hall every Veteran's Day, it is not broadcast on the township's cable

access channel. "It's too long," Harris said of the two-hour tape. "The general consensus is that we shouldn't clutter the channel with items other than government business. It tends to confuse view-

Elementary moving forward

The Plymouth-Canton Board of Education took a first step this week toward building an elementary school in one of the fastest-growing areas of Canton Township.

At its regular meeting Monday, the school board approved an "intent resolution" to buy property in Cherry Hill Village to build a school.

This means that if a school bond passes, the district's general fund would be reimbursed from the bond sale.

The district has already purchased nearly 20 acres of land for \$1.2 million on the northeast corner of Cherry Hill and Denton. The southwest Canton area is considered one of the fastest-growing areas of the school district.

A citizen-based housing and facilities committee, which will meet in the coming months, will help determine future building needs.

Interim superintendent Jim Ryan said that the community may need to give present buildings as much consideration as new ones.

"We really can't open another building until we close one," Ryan said. One idea he mentioned was moving the district's administration building to Central Middle School, building a new middle school, and

selling the administration building.

Former superintendent Kathleen Booher issued a controversial report in 2001 that mentioned "repurposing" Central Middle School.

Many interpreted that as a sign that the district wanted to close the building, which is the former Plymouth High School

"We have to determine how best to use that space," Ryan said. "Central is one of those big." issues for us that we need to make a decision on."

GOP, Kelley trade raps over 'Hoodstock' campaign flier

Controversy over a rap concert in a park in Redford Township last year has resurfaced in a local Congressional race

The Michigan Republican State Committee, in a recent mailing, criticized township Supervisor Kevin Kelley's involvement in scheduling rapper DMX's Oct. 20, 2001, appearance at Bell Creek Park. The free concert, which drew about 2,500 people, was part of the black rapper's "Hoodstock 2001" tour.

The flier also makes a pitch for state Sen. Thaddeus McCotter, a Republican and Democrat Kelley's opponent in the hotly contested race for the U.S. House of Representatives in Michigan's 11th District.

The new district includes Livonia, Westland, Garden City and Plymouth, and Redford, Plymouth and Canton townships.

Kelley calls the piece character assassination and "an attempt to pit city vs. suburb." But, he added, "It doesn't surprise me."

He says the flier exaggerates

his involvement in the DMX concert and is a diversion from the issues, such as the economy. prescription drugs and health care, on which his campaign has focused.

"In the race for Congress, I don't know why we're talking about rap music," Kelley said.

JUDGMENT AT ISSUE?

McCotter's campaign manager, Paul Bukowski, said the flier is about poor judgment on Kelley's part.

"There's a lot of people who were angry because of what was going on in their neighborhood," Bukowski said.

One side of the flier is headlined "Welcome to Kevin Kelley's Hoodstock" and says the DMX show "featured rappers whose lyrics are obscene. racial, degrading towards women and promoted violence towards police officers."


It includes an out-of-focus photograph of a leering young white man standing next to an electric guitar and holding a bottle of beer.

The other side has a photo of McCotter playing acoustic guitar with his son George.

The text says the candidate wouldn't tell people what kind of music to listen to, but suggests he wouldn't have allowed DMX to perform in a public setting. "And yes, Thaddeus still loves rock 'n' roll," reads the last line in the main body of text.

"This isn't about what or who this person (DMX) is," Bukowski said. "It's about what's in the lyrics" heard during the concert by nearby residents at their homes.

Bukowski said Kelley should have used the Internet to look at lyrics to DMX's songs. "He

didn't have to give them permission to go to that park," he said.

A review of lyrics to several DMX songs found through an Internet search showed them peppered with obscenities, derogatory terms, racial epithets and violent imagery.

"It has nothing to do with race, it has to do with the fact that he exercised very poor judgment," said Jason Brewer, a spokesman for the state Republican party.

DISTORTION CHARGED

The GOP flier says Kelley "invited" "Hoodstock" to the park, but Kelley said that is a distortion and that he proposed the Bell Creek Park site as an alternative only after forbidding the show to take place at the site requested by promot-

"I'm not a censor," he said. "I made my judgment based on what I thought was best for the community."

The concert was originally planned for the parking lot of the Mr. Alan's Shoes & Sportswear on Telegraph Road, but Kelley said he denied a permit for a show there after he and other officials decided it would pose too many hazards at that location.

Promoters later called, Kellev said, and asked for help in finding an alternative venue.

Kelley suggested Bell Creek, a county park, and made arrangements with the county, he said.

Other outdoor concerts have been held at the park.

Redford park.

Kelley said.

"I was trying to accommodate a local business (Mr. Alan's) that is a taxpayer,"

The "Hoodstock" tour, which DMX was using to promote an album, involved surprise concerts on short notice, and Kelley said promoters approached the township less than a week before the event.

Kelley said he wasn't familiar with DMX but heard the rapper was "on the tamer side." He didn't attend the concert, but said he heard it was toned

Police presence at the concert was provided at the promoters' expense, officials met with

DMX's security beforehand, and pre-concert publicity was limited, Kelley said. Promoters were bonded for \$2 million in liability insurance, he said.


"I stand by the decision," he said, but added later, "I probably wouldn't do it again."


The concert drew complaints from people who live in the area of the park at Five Mile and Inkster Road, and some attended a subsequent township board meeting to protest. But young people in the township, Kelley said, applauded his handling of the event.

Bukowski dismissed the contention that the flier was racially divisive.


"I think the (DMX) lyrics are more racially divisive than anything," he said.

"It sounds like we're in agreement that a wall should be put up instead of a berm," he told the commissioners. "We see this for reasons of security and keeping headlights from the parking lot from coming into homes. We'd also like to recommend that the wall extend all the way to the sidewalk as it is north of Hanford at that point."

Township Planner Judy Bocklage said that township ordinance prevented extending the wall to the sidewalk.

"Those types of structures are not allowed within the front yard setback," she said.

Commissioner Melissa McLaughlin asked why the residents would want to extend the wall all the way to the side-

"Primarily security," Martin said, noting that the homes were within 15 feet of the parking lot area.

McLaughlin asked if the detention ponds and the shrubbery would not be the equivalent of a fence or wall for buffering purposes.

"It takes considerably more effort to scale a wall than it does to jump through the shrubbery," Martin replied.

At this point commission chairman Vic Gustafson entered the exchange.

"Let me get this straight," he said, "who's going to scale the wall?"

"The shrubbery isn't going to keep anybody out," Martin said. "I don't understand why peo-

ple would want to get in," Gustafson replied.

Lynn Evans, another resident whose property abuts the site, said she didn't like the idea of having that fence section open.

"Somebody could walk through any of this parking area or from the credit union which is adjacent to this property," she said. "Across from the credit union is a video store which is open until midnight. And now the strip mall is over there. I'm concerned about security factors."

After some more discussion, Gustafson said the wall was chosen as "the lesser evil,"

"We prefer a heavy buffering have to draw the line tonight on the buffering of the property," he said. "Whether the wall pertains to security or not really can't be weighed into the decision tonight. In terms of extending that wall all the way up, we just can't do it. It would be in violation of an ordinance."

Commissioner Katy Bovitz asked if the developer could use a brick wall instead of masonry. Paciocco said they could.

On a motion by McLaughlin, commissioners approved the site plan with a 6-foot-high brick screen wall and upright evergreen borders north of the wall. They also asked that, due to the primarily office use of the buildings, there be no dumpsters on the site.

The plan now goes to the board of trustees, who will likely vote on it next month.

Q&A

Q: "When was the Internet created?

A: The first connection on what would become the Internet was made on Oct. 29, 1969. Bits of data flowed between computers at UCLA and the Stanford Research Institute.

This was the beginning of Arpanet, the precursor to the Internet developed by the Department of Defense. By the end of 1969, four sites were con-

nected: UCLA, the Stanford Research Institute, the University of California Santa Barbara and the University of Utah. Ten more sites were added the next year and soon there were applications like email and file transfer utilities.

The @ symbol was adopted in 1972 and a year later, 75 percent of Arpanet traffic was e-mail. Arpanet was decommissioned in 1990 and the National Science Foundation's NSFnet took over the role of backbone of the Internet.

Re-elect Sullivan to commission

Although it doesn't seem to carry much political weight these days, the Wayne County Commission hasn't lost its relevance. The commission acts as a check and balance on the executive branch and a conduit for local residents to a county government responsible for more than 2.1 million people living over a wide geographic area.

The next commission will get something of a fresh start with the retirement of longtime Wayne County Executive Ed McNamara. That chance for additional input on county issues,

coupled with his previous experience over two terms on the commission, makes John Sullivan of Wayne the best qualified and best suited candidate for election on Nov. 5.

Sullivan, a Democrat, is seeking re-election against Canton Republican Deborah Whyman. The 11th District, which Sullivan has represented for the past four years, has changed slightly with last spring's redistricting. It now includes Canton, Sumpter and Van Buren Townships, as well as the cities of Wayne and Belleville. (Huron Township and

Romulus will be dropped from the district on Jan. 1.) Sullivan has built a solid, if not always noticed, track record during his two terms on the commission. He has pressed the administration to be more open and accountable in handing out contracts, particularly those at Metro Airport. As chairman of the Public Services Committee, Sullivan has helped funnel more county money for area road and park improvements.

He has worked for four years on a proposal to build a satellite office on Michigan Avenue in Westland. Sullivan says the office, which would eventually offer local residents services provided by the county clerk, treasurer and register of deeds should be up and running next year.

While we have been critical of Sullivan's lack of presence in Canton - the district's largest community - in the past, he has taken steps to address the issue and we urge him to continue along that path.

Whyman, who represented Canton for six years in the Michigan House of Representatives before losing a 1998 bid for the state Senate, has a track record as well. Unfortunately, it isn't one that generates confidence in her new bid for elected office. Her voting record and the positions she advocated were often extreme, and certainly not in keeping with views held by the majority of her constituents.

Whyman also has a history of questionable campaign tactics, including racist materials that were tied to her campaign during a 1996 re-election bid against Canton resident Debra

Stewart has earned another House term

Before the August primary in the race for the 20th state House District, we felt incumbent Republican John Stewart of Plymouth Township was the right man for the job. After a resounding win in that primary, we still think so.

Although he was hardly alone, Stewart did vote to over-ride Gov. John Engler's budget veto, which would have cost Stewart constituent communities hundreds of thousands of dollars in revenue sharing funds.

Mostly, though, Stewart has earned the right to continue because of his devotion to his community. Stewart is highly visible, and not just during the political season. His accessibility is one of his key virtues.

For these reasons, we support John Stewart for re-election to the state House of Representatives in the 20th District.

Most of the time most folks usually don't pay much attention to politics or elections. But if people are ever going to pay attention, they'll be doing it just now with Election Day just two weeks off. And so maybe this plea will not fall on deaf ears.

We badly need to fix two continuing absurdities in our politics: Electing justices of the Michigan Supreme Court and voting for statewide education candidates on the

November ballot.

In the first place, I see little basis in electing justices of our Supreme Court. Other than a tiny minority of lawyers, nobody casting a ballot has any idea about who the candidates are, their qualifications, their views on jurisprudence and so forth. Incumbent justices always get re-elected; after all, they're designated as justices on the ballot, conclusive proof that the only thing that counts for the

voters is the incumbency label. Political pros (and polls regularly published in Inside Michigan Politics, the newsletter bible of political junkies) say that people overwhelmingly want to hang on to their right to elect Supreme Court judges in ignorance because they don't trust the politicians to make good appointments. OK. Realistically, I doubt that will ever change.

Power

But allowing campaigns for our highest court to be funded privately is a continuing scandal. Consider these facts, as documented in a careful survey compiled by the Michigan Campaign Finance Network:

Campaigns are becoming very, very expensive. Since 1994, the average amount raised by successful Supreme Court candidates has quadrupled from \$286,000 to \$1.3 million in 2000. You can bet your bippy that Joe Six-Pack isn't coming up with that kind of

Worse, people appearing before the Supreme Court often have contributed to the campaigns of the same judges who hear the cases. Between 1990 and 1999, an amazing 86 percent of cases heard by the Court involved a litigant or a lawyer who made a contribution to one or more of the justices hearing their case. Somehow, I can't recall a justice ever excusing him or herself from a case because of a conflict caused by a campaign contribution.

Worst, special interests are pouring millions of dollars into TV advertising in judicial campaigns, usually claiming that one candidate or another is nothing more than a bum. In 2000, more than \$6.8 million went into such "issue" advertising, the net effect of which

was to cheapen the public's opinion of our justices and in the integrity of the Supreme

Alfred P. Carlton, Jr., president of the American Bar Association, got it right: Special interests are pouring millions of dollars into judicial campaigns because they want judges to serve their interests, not the public interest. As more and more judges face skyrocketing campaign costs, more and more people believe justice is for sale. Public funding is one solution states can use to enhance public trust in our courts."

North Carolina just broke new ground in adopting the first system of public funding for candidates for their Court of Appeals and Supreme Court. Michigan should do the same.

As to voting for statewide education candidates - for University of Michigan Board of Regents, Michigan State University Trustees and Wayne State University Governors, and for the State Board of Education — consider how many of the candidates you actually know anything about. Zero, nada, nothing. Right? That's why there is a 35-50 percent drop-off in votes from governor to education candidates.

How come? Easy. The news media are entirely preoccupied with covering and opining on more important contests on the November ballot. So they don't cover education races and only a few - the big Detroit papers and some Booth Newspapers, to their great credit - even bother to endorse. And, frankly, some people who really don't belong on the boards of our great state universities get nominated by the special interests that dominate both party conventions and get elected riding coattails at the top of the ticket.

A solution is easy: Go back to the system we had in Michigan before we adopted the new Constitution in 1963. In those days, statewide education offices were elected - along with school boards and local school taxes - in elections held in the spring of odd-numbered

This had the useful effect of converting spring elections into "education elections" when a wholesale debate over policy and funding for education had some chance of catching public attention. Michigan now spends more state money for K-12 schools and higher education than on any other category, making education an apt subject for statewide public debate. But without an "education election," we lack a vehicle to stimulate that needed

Solutions should be focus of protecting our water

In recent years, we have all heard numerous politicians discuss water as one of the biggest issues we will have to face in the future.

For people living in southeast Michigan, it is clear the future is now.

There are currently several important water-related issues confronting us, which is fitting because this week marks the 30th anniversary of the Clean Water Act.

One such issue dominating recent headlines is a push by suburban leaders to take more control of the Detroit Water and Sewerage Department, which supplies water to more than 4 million residents in 126 communities.

Suburban leaders, led by State Rep. Leon Drolet (R-Macomb County), have criticized the DWSD for being inefficient. This, they say, is evident in the double-digit increases in the cost of service the department has handed down to suburban communities over the course of the last couple years.

Drolet has hosted several public hearings about his proposed state bill that would give the suburbs more representation on the Detroit Water Board, which oversees the DWSD. At the meeting last week in Royal Oak, it became clear the issue is driving a wedge between the suburbs and the city.

DWSD officials and Detroit residents compare the bill to a hostile takeover, and have even implied there are racial overtones involved.

DWSD officials say the increases are necessary to fund federally mandated projects to clean up the Rouge and Detroit rivers. On Thursday, the department took members of the media on a bus tour that visited several of these projects.

Most of the projects are addressing the issue of combined sewer overflows (CSO), which are designed to send combined sewage and storm water into our rivers when there are major storm events.

"It's not a good thing to discharge sewage into our rivers," Gary Fujita, the DWSD's interim director, said on the tour.

That may seem like the understatement of the year, but pumping sewage into our rivers was a common practice of past generations. "Dilution is the solution" was the prevailing philosophy when the system was designed years ago. For years, the practice has degraded the water quality of our rivers, especially the Rouge, and made them unsafe for human contact.

One of the projects we visited on the bus tour was the DWSD's Connor Creek CSO

basin on the east side of Detroit. It is a massive project, which will cost close to \$200 million by the time it is completed. It will be the largest such project in the state.

During major rains, it will have the ability to hold more than 60 million gallons of combined sewage and storm water, preventing it from entering the Detroit River. As Fujita explained, much of that storm water comes from the suburbs.

Standing next to the Connor Creek basin, which is only one of the projects begun by the department, one can begin to understand why there have been such increases in water service charges.

Clearly, cleaning up our waterways is a problem we as a region must solve together, which is why it is unfortunate that there has been such inflammatory language coming from both Detroit and the suburbs.

Marilynn Gosling, Oakland County's representative on the Detroit Water Board, may have summed it up best last week at the hearing in Royal Oak. "Future wars will be fought over clean, drinkable water. Don't make this the first," she told suburban lead-

In the upcoming election, we as voters will be asked to vote on a state ballot proposal (Proposal 2) that will allow the state to borrow up to \$1 billion to improve water quality in the state's rivers and lakes by financing sewage treatment works projects, storm water projects and water pollution projects.

If approved, the proposal will certainly give some relief to the DWSD and us as water customers. It will also be a step in the right direction, and help us correct the practices of the past.

The future is now.



students with the opportunity to become involved in this exciting industry, and we're pleased to be partners with Eagle Flight Center and Willow Run Airport as we enter this new endeavor."



College unions hold informational picket

Union members from three bargaining units picketed outside Schoolcraft College 5-7 p.m. Wednesday before the 7 p.m. college board meeting as a means of letting the community know that they still have not reached an agreement with administration.

Contracts for faculty, office personnel and maintenance workers are all expired. Negotiations are under way with all three unions for new three-year contracts. A mediator has been brought in to talk with two of the unions - the clerical and maintenance workers - about how to best come to an agreement.

Robert Hudson, president of the college's Support Personnel

Association union, said the purpose of the picket is to inform the school community and public that they have not reached a labor agreement.

"We're trying to get information out to the community and the students that we're working without a contract, Hudson said. "We're trying to inform the students and community that we believe the college is being unfair about the

proposals." Steven L. Berg, president of the faculty forum, the faculty union, said that informational picketing is a valuable communication tool.

"Our picketing is an absolutely necessary tool to spread the word about the college's effort to pare back benefits," Berg said. "That's a con-

Bargaining units currently in negotiation with Schoolcraft College:

62-member The Association of Office Personnel union, made up of clerical employees. Contract expired June 30.

The Faculty Forum union - made up of 111 full-time and 357 part-time personnel. Contract expired Aug 20.

■ The 44-member Support Personnel union, made up of maintenance personnel. Contract expired June 30.

Major sticking points in negotiating are health insurance and salary increases. Hudson said that the most recent proposal from the college requests that union members pay percentage-based health insurance premiums.

The premiums may cut into

raises to the point of making them negligible, Hudson said.

As for salaries, the college has proposed increases of 2.5 percent for the first two years and 2.3 percent for the third and final contract year.

Marty Heator, Schoolcraft spokesman, declined to comment specifically on negotia-

"It is a delicate time, but progress is being made," Heator said.

"The administration would rather withhold comment at this point - and give the negotiating teams the space they need to continue to work. All parties are striving to act in the best interests of their constituents."







Edgar Degas was the master of bringing the private world of dancers to life. Known as the "painter of dancers," the French Impressionist spent countless hours observing classes and rehearsals under the roof of the Paris Opera, home of the national ballet and opera in the 19th century.

But Degas did more than document the training of aspiring young dancers. His use of color and roving subject matter draws the viewer into a place where dancers stretch at the barre, adjust tutus and chat amongst themselves.

Degas allows us to peer into a world normally unseen.
Backstage, male admirers flock around the dancers. Then he switches perspective taking the viewer beyond the footlights and



Have some fun with dim sum

Originally a Cantonese custom, dim sum, meaning "a little bit of heart," is closely linked to the Chinese tradition of "yum cha" or drinking tea, yet it took several centuries for the culinary art of dim sum to develop.

At first, it was considered inappropriate to combine tea with food. Perhaps this was due to a famous third century Imperial physician's claim that it would lead to weight gain. As tea's ability to aid digestion became known, tea house proprietors began adding a variety of snacks, and the tradition of dim sum was born.

Today, dim sum is served throughout China, particularly in Shanghai. Yet, EATING OUT

culinary experts indicate that although the broadest assortment of savory and sweet dim sum dishes can be found in Canton, the best dim sum chefs are not in China but in Hong Kong, where restaurants begin serving dim sum as early as 6:30 a.m. and continue through midafternoon.

"The Detroit metro-area, including Windsor," Jim Lark, proprietor of The Lark restaurant in West Bloomfield said, "is one of only a handful of cosmopolitan areas with restaurants serving traditional dim sum using carts, like they do in Hong Kong. Some area restaurants serve dim sum only on weekends, and even then, do


not use carts." Lark and his wife Mary are dim sum aficionados.

Serving traditional, Hong Kong style dim sum is challenging and but three area restaurants do it. Hong Kong style dim sum is served daily at Shangri-La in West Bloomfield. At Wah Court's two Windsor locations, the tradition can be experienced on weekends only.

Jewish Ensemble Theatre celebrates its bar mitzvah

So what's a Catholic boy from Warren doing directing a spoof on a bar mitzvah party?

Greg Trzakoma is having a laugh while helping to raise funds for the Jewish Ensemble Theatre, a nonprofit professional theater company dedicated to making a difference. The theater professor from Wayne State University is always looking for a good time. Jeffrey Eric Tischler's Bar Mitzvah at Temple Israel in West Bloomfield Sunday, Nov. 3 is no exception and probably more enjoyable than his last role as the rotund letter O in the Detroit Piston's commercial. The bar mitzvah production after all does celebrate the theater turning 13. Jeffrey Eric Tischler is really JET in disguise.

"It's going to be fun," said Trzakoma. It's not a serious affair but there will be some serious moments when we honor people who've been instrumental in keeping JET alive through the years. The biggest thing was for me to learn about bar mitzvah – a ceremony and party held when a young girl or boy turns 13 and becomes an adult in the eyes of the community and with that comes responsibility.

"But I had good teachers. I earned my union card at the Jewish Ensemble Theatre. Half the people who meet me on the street think I'm Jewish. I've learned a lot about being Jewish just being around JET and directing the children's theater camp at the Jewish Community Center."

It's obvious that guests don't have to be Jewish or an actor to have fun participating in the interactive dinner theater production put on by the Jewish **Ensemble Theatre of West** Bloomfield. Jonathan Frank, an attorney from Bloomfield Township, is just enjoying the process of creating the production. He wrote the original script before joining forces with Trzakoma who spent 18 months on the road with the national touring company of Second City.

After a dar mitzvan or dat mitzvah there's typically a party," said Frank, JET board president. "There will be hors d'ouvres in the lobby of Temple Israel, dinner and toasts in the Social Hall. It's a spoof of a bar mitzvah party, not a service. It's like Tony n' Tina's Wedding with a group of actors playing family, the boy. Star Trax is providing the DJ, dancers and light. It's interactive improvisational with scripted stuff. The father has gone over budget and as a result is obsessed with keeping costs

down. Someone takes a plate of hors d'ouvres and he wants to make sure they eat them all or give them to someone who will. One grandfather is a gambler and has a hard time focusing on the festivities. The other grandparents are arguing. This is the way they've been living for the last 50 years. The bar mitzvah boy (played by Bradley Gonik who performed in JET's Conversations With My Father) is mortified his parents have forgotten to invite his friends and his father has bought him a suit way too big so ne can grow into it.

"What's not a spoof is honoring people who've been instrumental. The challenge is to get people to understand about the Dorfman Foundation Youth Education Services Program. We're not just theater. That's half of what we do. We reached 50,000 kids last year, 10,000 with a production of The Diary of Anne Frank at Masonic Temple.

Evelyn Orbach is especially proud of the outreach program and the theater she originally conceived the idea for some 15-

years ago. YES, JET's Youth **Education Services presents** stimulating theater programs that focus on the end results of hate, bullying and name calling. Orbach stars in Dear Esther, a story about one of the survivors of the escape from Sobibor, a Nazi death camp.

"In the Jewish community this is a momentous occasion when a child reaches 13," said Orbach. "We thought about how are we going to celebrate this. We're not a child. We're a theater. Jonathan had the idea of a spoof and it was only natu ral to turn it into theater. He started to write a script and Greg said it would be more fun if we did it Second City style.

"It's our major fund-raiser of the year, half of the more than \$600,000 budget goes to outreach programs. We gave 115 performances in schools last year plus Anne Frank. This fall we're doing 73 performances in schools. People don't understand how much that costs."

Orbach doesn't want to take all the credit for the youth the-

ater program or presenting thought provoking theater such as last season's The Laramie Project about the murder of a young gay man or the production continuing to Nov. 3, Tommy J & Sally, Mark Medoff's play about an African American man struggling with issues of race, religion and personal identity. That kind of programming won the theater several awards last year but Orbach couldn't pull it off alone. She had to have help not only putting on the productions but starting a Stop Hate Campaign and partnering with organizations such as the

NAACP last year. The program includes workshops designed by Plymouth actress/director Gillian Eaton as a way to provide diversity and sensitivity training for businesses, community-based organizations and schools.

On more of an entertaining note, this year the theater began a guest artist series featuring a production of Shylock by Royal Shakespeare alumnus Gareth Armstrong Nov. 6-24 and a play loosely based on a work by Aristophanes by Mosaic Youth The series opened with a panel discussion on the mystery of

creativity with author Elmore "Dutch" Leonard, percussionist Efe Bes, and JET and Performance Network set designer Monika Essen who also is properties designer for Michigan Opera Theatre.



into the boxes and orchestra pit. It is here inside the theater that the audience is mesmerized by dancers dramatically lit

by primitive rows of gas lamps. Now a landmark exhibition brings all of these experiences together for one dazzling look at the ballet. Degas and the Dance gathers more than 120 of his paintings, drawings, pastels, and sculptures from 97 collections in nearly a dozen countries for Degas and the Dance. Organized by the American Federation of Arts, Detroit Institute of Arts and Philadelphia Museum of Art, this large-scale survey took five-years for curators Richard Kendall and Jill DeVonyar to research and assemble. It is the first to explore Degas' work on the Paris ballet.

"The American Federation of the Arts contacted the two curators who researched Degas' relationship with the Paris Opera Ballet. They estimate half of his total artistic output focuses on dancers," said George Keyes, DIA curator of European paintings.

Keyes became involved in the project more than two years ago. One hundred sixty pieces, more than 120 by Degas himself, are on display in the exhibition premiering at the Detroit Institute of Arts. Close to 20 pieces come from the DIA's collection, approximately 10 of them by Degas. The remaining 40 pieces include set designs and work by other artists.

THEMATIC SEGMENTS

Broken down thematically in segments that follow the activities and careers of dancers, Degas and the Dance features Portraits of Known Dancers, Private Worlds, The Classroom, On Stage, In the Wings, Movement of the Greeks which records Degas' respect for theater begun in the Greco Roman era, and Orgies of Color - the late work when Degas was losing his eyesight and experimented with properties and possibilities of color. The smoldering, intense aqua blue of three dancers' dresses merges with the green blue of trees in stage flats in one of the paintings from around 1900.

The Paris Opera in the second half of the 19th century was the ultimate stage for public theater," said Keyes. "It employed more than 7,000 people at any one time. In comparison the DIA has 300 staff members.

"People went to opera to be seen. Gentlemen rented boxes and paraded their mistresses. It was the bourgeois mixing with the older aristocracy."

An 1873 fire destroyed the old opera house, the rue Le Peletier Opera. A new one, the Palais Garnier, already in the planning stages, opened in Jan. 5, 1875 but Degas never lost his affection for Le Peletier with its classroom lit by a wall of arched French windows. In later paintings he drew on his imagination to recreate it. Exhibition designer Elroy Quenroe uses architecture to echo Degas' paintings and create a sense of space that evokes a world inhabited by bal-

let dancers. "Dancers came from the lower segment of society," said Keyes. "They started as pre-teens in order to make the grade to be accepted into troupes and were regularly assessed."

Keyes is extremely knowledgeable about Degas and the dancers. Gallery by gallery he spotlights work in which Degas experimented with color, technique and composition.

"The portrait *The Ballet* Master (Jules Perrot) shows he's an incredibly experienced artist," said Keyes. "Degas diluted oil with turpentine to sketch the figure then highlighted with pastel. He used the study for the painting next to it."

SKETCHES AND SCULPTURE

The exhibition's second thematic segment combines drawing technique and sculptures. It's apparent by looking at the sketches of dancers that Degas was a master draftsman. For the sculptures Degas worked only in wax after constructing an armature of wire so that he could change any element he felt imperfect.

"At the time of his death in 1917 about 130 of the waxes were found in the studio," said Keyes. "About 70 were salvaged and the family authorized editions of about 20 sculptures of

dancers, nudes and horses.

"The sculpture Little Dancer, Aged 14 recalls a young girl who was thrown out of the ballet troupe. It was remarkable for it's time because Degas incorporated actual dance shoes, tutu and wig. It was also quite controversial. When it was exhibited in 1881 it created a controversy because it was big enough to seem real and her vixen-like personality was being paraded before the public."

Breathtaking is the only word for Degas and the Dance.

"Dancer with Red Stockings, a pastel, is bold and spontaneous and has an intimacy that's quite remarkable. These dancers went through rigorous training six days a week," said Keyes. "Dancer Stretching (1882-1885) shows she's in pain, totally exhausted. It's a remarkably candid drawing as is The Dance Examination (1880). Degas was influence by the world of photography. The dancer on the right is cut

off as if in a photograph. It makes it instantaneous, in the moment. It creates a psychological reaction. You get caught up in the tense world."

A selection of drawings demonstrates Degas' penchant for using paper in a rainbow of colors including pink, beige, mint green, and Venetian blue. But Degas went beyond changing his color of paper to employ extraordinary innovations. In one work, ballerinas stand on toe in front of a wall mirror which reflects a vista of Paris and its Mansard roofs. Other dancers are occupied with their own activities as Degas once again uses roving subjects to draw the viewer in. The activities never resolve themselves and hence the eye keeps roving around the composition. Degas work is never static making the viewer feel as if he or she is there watching and listening.

"Degas is one of the gr modern painters of late 18th and early 19th century," said



When Paul Thomas Anderson, the director of the Academy Award-nominated films Boogie Nights and Magnolia, wrote the new film Punch-Drunk Love, he did it with two things in mind. First, he'd write the script for Adam Sandler who would play the lead character, Barry Egan, a hardworking, offbeat and, oftentimes, erratic guy who is hen-pecked by his seven sisters, entangled in a phone-sex conversation gone awry and, somehow, manages to find instant love with Lena Leonard, played by British actress Emily Watson.

That's the second thing Anderson had in mind, writing the role of Lena for Watson. What he didn't have in mind was who would play Sandler's sisters. Anderson knew he wanted non-actors - no divas, no pre-conceived actor methodologies - just regular chicks who could banter with the best of them at a big family dinner scene, while heckling and putting down their brother, as "regular" siblings often do.

SIX DEGREES OF

Enter Aaron Weinberg, a 36year-old independent film producer, who grew up in West Bloomfield and now lives in L.A. Instead of six degrees of Kevin Bacon, these days, it's more like six degrees of Aaron Weinberg. For, you see, Weinberg and his wife, Blasi, are friends with Paul Thomas Anderson's casting director's brother. The brother told his sister, Casting Director Cassandra Kulukundis, that Weinberg had some non-acting sisters who could probably pass for Sandler's sisters.

Kulukundis called Weinberg's older sister, Lisa W. Spector, and asked to meet with her and Spector's younger sister, Mia Weinberg. And, over coffee and snacks at Mia's L.A. apartment, the three met for two hours, talking about growing up in a large, close-knit family in Michigan. They showed pictures of every family member and just chatted casually. That chatting led to an audition with Paul Thomas Anderson and other sister

prospects. A few weeks later, Spector got the call: "You and your sis-

ter, Mia, are in the movie." "It was completely hilarious. because I'm not an actress," laughs Spector, age 37, who is prominently featured in the dinner scene as well as one phone conversation with Sandler. "I live in L.A. with tons of people around me who are in the business or want to be in the business and we get called that we're in this major film with Adam Sandler. It was so exciting, and funny at the same time."

A SHEAR DELIGHT

Even more funny, and very ironic, is that while the Weinberg siblings - Lisa, 37; Aaron, 36; Mia, 34: and Matthew, 32; used to be in the high school and camp plays, it's their mother, Henrietta

Hermelin, who's been an award-winning, professional actress since 1958. Hermelin currently stars as a wealthy Grosse Pointe socialite in the whodunit comedy Shear Madness at the Gem Theatre in Detroit.

At age four, Hermelin started studying ballet. It was as a dancer that she got her professional Actors Equity union card. Growing up, Hermelin recalls, she and her brother David Hermelin, the former U.S. Ambassador to Norway who passed away in November 2000, would spend Saturdays watching double features at the Fox Theatre. And, at family functions, you could always find Henrietta and David gathered around the piano, performing songs from musical comedies, with their nine kids and David's wife, Doreen,

singing along. "When I had to go in for the audition with Paul Thomas Anderson, I was freaked out because I get very nervous reading in public - which is obviously not a Weinberg/ Hermelin trait," said Mia Weinberg who was told by Sandler that she looks very much like Sandler's actual sis-

CAN WE BE FRANK

Once the casting for the sisters had been completed, Spector got a call a few weeks later from the casting director that they needed to replace some of the sisters and could she call Spector's first cousins, Julie Hermelin Frank and Karen Hermelin Borman, who grew up in Bingham Farms. By the time the original dinner scene was shot, Lisa Spector was in it with two of her children, Mason, 81/2; and Isaac, 4 1/2 and her housekeeper; Mia Weinberg; Julie Hermelin Frank and her husband, Mitchell; and Karen Hermelin Borman and her daughter, Maddie.

The first dinner scene was cut (along with Mitchell Frank and Maddie Borman) and later reshot to what audiences will see when Punch-Drunk Love opens in Michigan Friday, Oct. 25. Spector says that in the first cut, there was a lot of swearing and a food fight which Spector's kids thoroughly enjoyed. And while Spector, who was 8 1/2 months pregnant at the time, was supposed to be on partial bed rest, she made the 6:30 a.m. drive to the set in the San Fernando Valley every morning because, after

all, it's not everyday that you get cast in a film directed by Paul Thomas Anderson, who recently won Best Director for Punch-Drunk Love at the 2002 Cannes Film Festival.

"They finally put me in a wheelchair and would push me back and forth from my trailer because they didn't want me having the baby on the set," said Spector, whose daughter, Lola, was born a few weeks later on February 10, 2001.

"Because Lisa was pregnant, she got a star trailer with a couch in it. So Julie, Karen and I would congregate at Lisa's trailer and we'd all sit around and talk about everything and laugh," said Mia, who is single and a gemologist in Los Angeles. "Can you believe that we're in this big Hollywood movie?" they'd ask themselves rhetorically. "We have friends who are actors who would give their left arm to be in a Paul Thomas Anderson movie and here we are - the non-professionals."

SEVEN SISTERS FOR ONE **BROTHER**

Spector and Weinberg say that Anderson is an excellent director to work with - very focused, hands-on and very much into reality.

Each day, the "sisters" would receive daily scripts, with very few lines. Anderson would set up the scene - a bunch of sisters who have teased their brother (Sandler) for his whole life and who have called him names, laughed at him and embarrassed him. From there, Anderson wanted improvised raw conversations, overlapping and rapid-fire -- just like the family dinners that the Weinberg/Hermelin's were very

familiar with. Anderson went so far as to ask Spector specifically what she makes for her Friday night dinners, which now include her blended family of five kids and husband, Neal. With Spector's input, they had chicken and

rice for the actual dinner scene. "I really got a sense that Paul appreciates the real part of life, said Spector, who was told that they should come to the shoot dressed as they would for a normal, everyday dinner - minimal makeup and all. "That's part of his craft and why, I would imagine, that he really wanted non-actors for the roles."

So far, Punch-Drunk Love has received tremendous reviews and substantial box office grosses in its limited-run opening and, for Spector, the impact of being in this film is finally starting to sink in.

"I wasn't nervous until I saw myself on the big screen," she said after seeing herself featured in television commercials, on The Today Show and in previews at the movie theater. "Now that it's being advertised and other mothers and the librarian from my kids' school are coming up to me, it's just a blast --something we never expected would happen."

"I was star struck the whole time," added sister Mia. "It was just so much fun. It was an amazing experience."

Meanwhile, they're not quitting their day jobs. But they're well-beyond their 15 minutes...

'What's special about Duke Ellington's music is the way it conveys emotion. He speaks the unspoken through his music. It conveys real longing and desire and is full of the elements of what love is all about. It's the power of it - I've Got It Bad and That Ain't Good, In a

Sentimental Mood. Duke was not only an innovator he was a master of jazz. Mercer Ellington wanted to showcase the vast talents of his father who primarily played with the same musicians throughout his career. Mercer took over the band after he died

and used many of them to bring the review to Broadway by 1981. The irony was Duke Ellington couldn't break into the musical and this show was a huge hit and remains a bigger hit than he ever had in his lifetime."

The Duke didn't have to take Broadway by storm. He was already making it everywhere else. Marcus Belgrave remembers his father playing Ellington in their Detroit home. Belgrave's been playing the music for at least three decades, including an eightyear stint with the Lincoln Center Jazz Orchestra and Wynton Marsalis in New York City. His only regret is turning down the opportunity to go on the road with Ellington. Belgrave had just returned from playing 5-years of one-nighters with Ray Charles.

"This is really a tremendous

honor to be involved with Duke Ellington's Sophisticated Ladies for two reasons - the music and the talent coming out of Detroit. It's Broadway quality," said Belgrave. "Duke's music is so universal. He never called his music jazz. It touches all genres of music, people, space and time. Ragtime? He did that too. He wrote a lot of music around the train. "Sophisticated Ladies showcases 32 of his songs and was on **Broadway with Gregory Hines** for more than four years. I'm excited just to be involved."


romantic lunch, then traditional dim sum may not be your best choice. At traditional dim sum, there's no ordering. Instead, choices are made from a wide assortment of dishes that waitstaff serve from carts. Dim sum is best enjoyed with a large group; otherwise you may fill up on a few items and miss the opportunity to sample many dishes.

Dim sum service has an order. Lighter, steamed dishes should be chosen first. These are followed by exotic items, such as chicken feet, which may not appeal to a strictly "western" palate. 



Decorating tips for fall

Here are easy ways to give your home that special autumn

- Dress up a pumpkin or gourd in organza (sheer) ribbons, beaded fruits, silk flowers, berries, bittersweet, exotic birds, fall leaves and other ornaments. Perfect as a centerpiece gift or to decorate your own home.
- Use a gourd as a beautiful birdfeeder for your favorite feathered friends or as an unusual bowl or candlestick for your home.
- Make a buffet piece inside the pumpkin. Cut the pumpkin open, clean it out, and put in button pomps, cattails and fall leaves.
- Try a taste of culture. Take an oversized, tall gourd, carve it out, decorate it with feathers, and make a tribal drum. When the seeds dry out, you can shake the gourd like a drum and hear the seeds rattling around.
- Create the stacked pumpkin (topiary) look with pieces of large Styrofoam and then paint it. Put it in a pot or a pretty container.
- Make other neat fall arrangements out of grapevine material. Try stacking, wiring or gluing them together and then wrapping with bittersweet (brown-stemmed, silk vine with yellowish color and orange centers), which blooms late summer/early fall.
- Use Foliage Sealer by Design Master, a eucalyptus spray, on real leaves to seal moisture, preserve the scent, and look crisp longer for decorating. This is a clear anti-desiccant spray, which runs \$4.99 to \$7.99 at most craft stores.

extra buck these days.

CAREFREE CRAFTERY

On a safety note, be sure not to leave candles unattended.

Though there isn't as much of a safety concern these days as in the past, care should still be followed with the components of certain craft materials.

"In the scrapbooking (department), you'll see they're listing them as UV- free," Zielke said. "The only area you have to watch are spray paints, but most of them are pretty safe." Zielke says because of governmental regulation in the past decade with artist supplies, consumers are more protected than ever.

"The hazards are listed on the products and we have a book that lists the hazards, so we keep up on that," she said.

SOME HOW-TO'S

"It's just the mechanics," said Baker. "People wonder how to make their cornstalks stay up. Just take a 4- to 5-foot stake, plant them in a barrel, then put bundles of hay inside and voila, they stand up.

"What's really good is going to fabric stores getting fall pillows 'cause they have the fall leaves," Baker said. For do-ityourselfers, he recommends "taking a 4-by-4 sheet of fabric and tacking the edges with an iron, you can make yourself a nice pillow."

Baker says people nowadays are really getting into the "Hallo-Autumn" look, a combination of autumn and Halloween, by putting together such items as sunflowers and preserved red and yellow maple leaves that are coated in a formaldehyde-like solution.

Another way people are doing this combo look is by decorating fall trees with Halloween ornaments.

And for couples looking for a seasonal yet amorous feel around the home, tree ferns and plumasa (a feathery, lacy plant) in a vase is one way.

'(This) gives it a romantic feel without going too overboard with the autumn look," Baker said.

AUTUMN AROMAS

"One thing that we have pushed this year as far as sight, scent and other senses for arranging is cinnamon sticks and different scents that we put in wreaths," said Stella Pendergrass, floral designer specialist at Michaels Arts and Crafts Store in Westland.

The enthusiastic designer says pumpkin scents can be created by putting essence oils (used on potpourri) on leaves, candle wax and dried flowers. Some of the fragrances are autumn harvest, pumpkin pie, apple and winterberry (a pine

and cranberry combination). For that outdoors aroma, try

scented cinnamon pine cones. "It makes a more natural, realistic scent and look,"

EASY DOES IT

Pendergrass said.

More people now feel "the easier, the better."

"I see a lot of simplicity," Zielke said.

"The silk flowers that we carry truly look realistic, and even the vine leaves and bushes are really easy to arrange, anybody can do it," Pendergrass said. "Even in the fall, we have turkeys and scarecrows on picks, and we carry a

But for this crafty creator, it's not all work and no play.



Franklin antiques show Indian corn is colorful sign of autumn

ndian corn – with the pretty kernels of gold, yellow, orange, purple, deep red and other colors – reminds us that fall has arrived when we see it

fall. Gosh, I can almost smell the raked leaves burning (oh. to be able to do that again), and taste the cider and donuts we gobble up so readily in this beautiful season.

It's interesting to learn that corn, also called maize or Indian corn, is an annual herb, Zea mays, of the grass family that has been cultivated for so many centuries it can't be traced back to a wild plant.

But there is evidence that corn is an American Indian cereal that was a staple food for many centuries before the coming of the white men. American Indians cultivated a wide variety of corns. To them, this plant, often called Sacred Mother, was considered a gift from the gods.

Corn wasn't known in the Old World until after Columbus discovered America. In 1498, Columbus reported to King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella of Spain that his brother had "found a dense population entirely agricul-

ture," and at one place passed

through 18 miles of cornfields. **CLASSIFICATIONS**

Corn is still fed to animals, as is the silage, or stalks on which it grows. The tall stalks can be grown to provide an informal and effective windbreak in the vegetable garden.

Here are some classifications: Sweet corn, which

humans eat. Field corn, with names such as dent corn, which has dent in each kernel when drv. Field corn is generally fed to cattle.

Flint corn, which has rock-hard kernels. ■ Flour corn, which makes

the best quality corn flour. Ornamental corn, which can be popped like popcorn. The variety that is so colorful has a higher starch content than sweet corn.

Growing any corn is the same, but the difference is in the harvesting.

Popcorn (Indian corn) has been a part of the American diet for years and years, and

the pilgrims ate it hundreds of years before it became such a popular snack item. This corn takes longer to grow than does sweet corn.

If you want to try growing popcorn, here are some you might want to try: Tom Thumb, a new England heirloom with short stalks that bear yellow kernels; Robust, a gourmet-quality, tender popcorn with golden yellow kernels; Ruby Red, with burgundy red kernels that are as decorative as they are tasty; Shaman's Blue, with blush-red, decorative kernels; and Top Pop, with tall stalks that produce yellow kernels. These varieties are suggested in Edward C. Smith's book, The Vegetable Gardener's Bible (Storey Books, published in 2000).

Rosiland Creasy, author of The Edible Heirloom Garden (Periplus, published in 1999), recommends the popcorn variety Strawberry. It takes 80 to 110 days to maturity. The ears are dark red, I inch long and strawberry shaped. The plants grow 5 feet tall and are resistant to corn earworm.

A couple of ornamental

corns Creasy recommends are: Squaw Corn, a flint corn with large ears and red, yellow, orange and blue kernels (105 days to maturity); and Hopi Blue, flour corn with blue kernels (90 days to maturity).

Hopi Blue is an old Hopi variety used ceremonially to make blue piki bread that also makes blue tortillas. It is drought tolerant.

HARVESTING

To harvest popcorn, leave the ears on the plant until the kernels are dry. If the weather is very wet, cut the stalks after the husks begin to turn brown and store them in a dry place.

Then when the corn is completely dry (which may take weeks), husk the ears and store them in a dry place, or remove the kernels and store them in a glass jar.

Rub two ears of corn together to release the seeds. Creasy recommends the fol-

aren Williams is happy to help provide a Christmas complete with presents for needy children around the world. But it's the

other aspect of her involvement in Operation Christmas Child that brings the most personal satisfaction to Williams and others of the hundreds of volunteers in the program: The chance to bring home the message of Christ.

It's a two-pronged program for Operation Christmas Child, an offshoot of Samaritan's Purse, the relief ministry of

Franklin Graham, the Rev. Billy Graham's son. Last year, the program provided some 5.4 million Christmas boxes to children in 94 countries around the world.


Williams is the focal point for the local program, for which NorthRidge Church is a collection point. Last year, some 4,500 boxes left NorthRidge, bound for a regional distribution point in Minneapolis, then on to New York's JFK International Airport and then into the arms of eagerly waiting children.

"The idea is to give kids a Christmas, because it's the only gift they might ever get," said Williams. "But, more importantly, it's to share the story of Christ."

Palm reading reveals inner truth about self

I have until my birthday Dec. 22 to ask for what I want because I'm laying the foundation for the next nine years.

Darlene Denning told me so. She should know, she's an experienced palm reader.

"Next year you will really need to speak up," said Denning, who reads palms at Spiritual Reflections in the back of the Village Mall, located at Grand River and Farmington Roads.

"Keep putting out your requests: 'I want to be editor, whether you want to or not. I want a condo. I want a man, whether you are married or

I love being a reporter, and I've been married for almost three decades on those points.

Denning's wide-open thinking amused, fascinated and intimidated me a bit to think the world is truly at my finger-

Denning, a Farmington resident, also invited me to an open house and grand opening noon-6 p.m. on Oct. 12 at Spiritual Reflections. More than a dozen small businesses will display their wares and

Denning, a clairsentient, is a guest lecturer and teacher at 35 community education sites in metropolitan Detroit. That includes Clarenceville, Westland, Troy and Plymouth-Canton. She's also at White Owl, a store in Garden City.

As a clairsentient, she could tell how I felt just by touch. She used numerology based on my birthday, astrology and my two palms to help me better understand my life, where I am in the life cycle and new beginnings.

The left hand shows what you are born with; the right hand is what you've done with your talents, she said.

Denning likes to tell the story about a job interview she had on Oct. 10, 1989 with a vicepresident of sales, also a palm reader. Reading her left hand, he would hire her. But, if he went by her right hand, he would not.

"I'll hire you for 90 days," he said.

She spent years upper management and traveled to 89 countries. "Then I realized my boys were getting older," Denning said. Though she thrived on work, it deprived others of spending more time with her.

"Do you know anybody who, on their death bed says, 'Hey God, hold on a second. I need to finish this project at work."

I laughed. Funny she should say that. My plan is to say, "I'm not done yet. Please send me back." I can't believe it all ends at death.

During our session, she also consulted a book called "The Secret Language of Destiny." I'm supposed to be on the same karma path as actor John Travolta, Frederick the Great and Walter Cronkite.

I like being on the same path with Walter. "Deja vu, there are no coinci-

dences," Denning said. "Everything happens for a reason. Before we came here we picked our parents. We picked our sisters and brothers to learn lessons."

Diligent, persistent, persuasive are my gifts, she said. My pit falls are wanting to be solitary, a need to be alone.

"You get what you are given," she said. "You've got to get rid of this, your tendency to be a workaholic. But, you are a Capricorn."

She's also a Capricorn and can understand.

part in Operation Christmas Child. Last year, the U.S. sent 2.9 million boxes around the world; other participating countries included Canada, Great Britain and Australia. Among the recipient countries: Sudan, Uzbekistan, Serbia, Russia, the Solomon Islands, Kosovo, Mexico, Poland and Romania.

Donors put together their shoe boxes and decide what age group it goes to: 2-4, 5-9 or 10-14, and whether it'll be for a girl or a boy.

The biggest need? Boxes for boys between the ages of 10-14.

"It's easier to buy for little kids," Williams said. "I tell people, 'Don't think in American terms.' They're happy to get anything."

Among the suggested items are toys (small cars, balls, dolls, etc.), school supplies, hygiene items (toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, comb, etc.), and items such as hard candy, gum, lollipops, caps, Tshirts, watches, etc.).

Items not to be put in the boxes include used items, war-related items such as toy guns or knives, chocolate or perishable foods, liquids, medicines and breakable items.

"People get very creative," said Williams, who is in her fifth year of volunteering. "It's fun to see what they're going to do."

While the program is not a religious fund-raiser, a \$5 donation is necessary to help with postage and shipping.

AT NORTHRIDGE

Anyone is eligible to put together a box and drop it off at NorthRidge, which is serving as a relay center for the third straight year. Williams said a variety of groups - Girl Scouts, Brownies troops, other churches and school


groups - have donated in the past. They can be dropped off whenever the church is open, which Williams said is basically all day, every day.

Boxes should be shoe box size (boot-size or larger won't work), and they can be as simple or as ornate as the donor wants to make them. If they're wrapped, the lid should be wrapped separately. Donors can also include a photo or a note to the receiving child. While the incidence of responses from children who receive

the boxes isn't high, it is growing.

"More and more people are telling me each year they're hearing back from kids who got the boxes," Williams said. "That's really cool, because it makes it that much more real." 

went against the Eagles.





"We've finished second two of the last four years," Gorski said, "but don't know about the last time we were champions. It was before I got here. And before the coach before that."







she goes. "We have friends all over the country," Sarah's father said. "After awhile you start running into the same families and you get to know them like family. We've probably spent over \$10,000 a year, traveling all over the country to compete."

Baldwin likes to compete in other events, but she's best at fig-

ures and artistic skating.
"That's what I do best," she said. "I like solo dance as well, but figures are more enjoyable."

She will skate in Juniors for one more year and then she has to move up to senior competition. But Baldwin has other aspirations for life after she is finished skating.

Deaths point to safety issues; pheasant season on tap

hree Michigan hunters have already died this fall in tree-stand related acci-

A bear hunter in Schoolcraft County fell to his death on Sept. 26 while hunting from a climb-

ing treestand. Officials surmise the hunter leaned over too far to one side after shooting a bear and fell out of his stand.

During the Sept. 28-29 special youth deer hunt, an unsupervised 12-year-old boy was killed when he

dropped a loaded rifle while descending from a treestand. The rifle discharged upon hitting the ground and the youngster was hit and killed by the bullet. State law requires youth hunters to be accompanied by an adult or guardian at all times during this special season.

Then, on opening day of the archery deer season, another hunter fell to his death, this time in Jackson County. Officials report that the hunter's safety strap apparently broke during the fall and he plunged some 20 feet to his death.

These three preventable tragedies illustrate the need for hunters to follow the rules and to take safety precautions.

Before purchasing a treestand be sure it is right for you. Is the platform big enough so that you feel comfortable? Are there any weight limitations?

Most tree stands have weight restrictions. If your stand is rated for a maximum load of 250 pounds, as many are, and you weigh 225, buy a higher-rated stand. Don't push the limit. Remember, you'll gain a few pounds when you put on your hunting clothing and strap on your gear, especially as the season progresses and the weather gets colder. Boots, heavy jackets and a fanny pack full of accessories can easily put you over the maximum weight limit.

Read all the instructions for your treestand and practice setting it up at ground level a couple times before setting it up in a

■ Check your treestand and safety harness for wear and tear. Check all the stress points and moveable parts and replace any worn equipment immediately.

Always wear a safety strap or safety harness. The harnesstype setup is by far the best. Unlike a safety strap, which holds all your weight over a small area, a harness distributes your weight to several points. With a harness-type system your odds of internal injury from a fall that is broken by the harness is drastically reduced.

■ Be sure the safety strap/harness you choose will not restrict

your breathing if you do fall. If possible, choose one with a quick release system.

Always use a haul rope to raise and lower your gun or bow Always unload your gun

when raising or lowering it from a treestand. ■ Be extra alert when climb-

ing up and down from a tree stand. This is when most accidents occur. ■ Avoid hunting from a tree-

stand if you are overly tired or on medication. Never hunt while under the

influence of drugs or alcohol. Always let someone know where you are hunting and an

approximate time you will return.

All of these safety precautions are basic common sense, but, as most hunters will admit, we sometimes throw caution to the wind when pursuing the wily whitetail. That's something we iust can't afford to do. Take the time to keep yourself safe.

PHEASANT SEASON ON TAP

As I sit in my home office writing this column, my springer/German shorthair hunting buddy, Scooby, is intensely watching me with his soft hazel eyes. His ears are on alert as he studies my every move. It's past 5 p.m. and Scooby knows it's time to go for a run. We've been practicing our routine for the past couple months in anticipation of the Oct. 20

pheasant opener.

Bird numbers in Michigan are certainly not what they once were when Michigan hunters annually killed around a million roosters. However, some quality hunting can still be had, especially here in southern Michigan.

Good hunting can be found in Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties, but public lands there gets hammered on weekends. Mid-week and light hunter pressure are usually synonymous with each other.

Jackson, Washtenaw, Livingston, Ingham and Shiawassee counties should also provide pockets of birds.

Don't be afraid to knock on a few doors if you see some goodlooking grassy habitat like switch grass or sorghum. Many farmer are more receptive to pheasant hunting than deer hunting because pheasant hunters are usually in and out in a few hours, rather than several weeks, or

even months, for deer hunters. It will take a little work to locate prime areas for birds, but my newest hunting partner, my 12-year-old daughter Kayleigh, Scooby and I will be out there stomping the brush until the

regular season ends on Nov. 14. Hope to see you in the field.







Starters don't derail Salem

So how good is Salem's soccer team? How far can the Rocks advance in the state tourna-

Let's put it this way: Subtract the first two weeks of the season, and everyone would have them ranked at the top.

The Rocks could very well end up there, if Monday's state district opener against Saline, played at Canton, is any indication. Salem scored twice in each half and keeper Tom Huls kept everything out of the Rocks' net in the 4-0 victory.

There was nothing really unexpected about the ease of the victory - Saline finishes at 9-7-3 — except that three Salem starters, including co-captains Kevin Savitskie and Brian Popeney, began the game on the bench for an undisclosed violation of team rules. Midfielder Eric Vanston was also sidelined for the start.

Which means the Rocks were good enough to take control of this match with their lineup scrambled and their best players

In fact, for the second-straight game, neither Popeney nor Savitskie — the team's leading scorers - put one in the net.

"Showing that other people can score for us is big," said Salem coach Ed McCarthy. "I was really pleased with the way we played in back. Saline has a couple of good finishers. Limiting their opportunities was a key for us."

If there was a pivotal moment in the match, it came after 11 minutes. Jeremy Boothroyd, who shares the goalkeeping duties with Huls but was at midfield in this game, crossed the ball in to Jeff Everal, Hornets' keeper Ross Sweitzer got a piece of Everal's shot, but it deflected into the net and Salem had a 1-0 lead.

The goal came with 28:52 left in the half; a minute later, Popeney and Savitskie checked in, although Savitskie's stay was abbreviated by a yellow card (which carries a mandatory 10 minutes on the bench); he drew it with 15:28 left in the half.

A quick break with Ryan Fazio carrying it in and crossing it to Brandon Ross resulted in a second Salem goal with 10:08 to go before halftime.

"The early goal by Everal was huge," said McCarthy. "And Ross had another big goal for us. He only has four for the year, but he had one last week in the conference final (a 2-0 win over Northville) and now this one."

For the most part, the Rocks were in command. If time of possession were kept track, their advantage would have been better than 2-to-1.

"I think our possession was what we expected it to be," said McCarthy. "We created a lot of chances and finished a fair percentage of them."

Despite numerous opportunities, the Rocks didn't supplement their lead until only 12:06 remained. That's when Savitskie centered the ball to Matt Wielechowski, whose hard drive got past Sweitzer to make it 3-0.

Salem continued to apply pressure and had several scoring chances, finally putting another one in — finishing the match the same way it started, with an Everal goal. His second of the game came with 5:09 to play, Parker Stinar assisting.

It was a solid way to finish, and it certainly served notice to all other state contenders. Salem. which started the season 3-4 (three losses in 60-minute tournament matches), showed it has more just a couple of good play-

"I guess it was your typical survival-mode, playoff soccer," Stevenson coach Lars Richters said. "It goes without saying they were pushing us to the limit. "We weren't smooth, but I'm proud of the way we were able to keep it out of our goal and put a couple in theirs.

Novi, runner-up to Brighton in the Kensington Valley

Conference, bowed out at 14-4-1 overall.

"They (Stevenson) are better top-to-bottom as far as their 10 field players go," said Novi's sixth-year coach Brian O'Leary, who guided the Wildcats to the 1998 Division I state crown. "Their strengths are good foot skills, and they do that better than we do.

"We wanted to keep the game close and get a break?

Novi made Stevenson work throughout the game, but the Spartans drew first blood with just under eight minutes to go in the first half when senior Brady Crosby notched his 29th goal of the year on a header. He timed Jon Spray's sideline throw-in perfectly to beat Novi goalkeeper Sean McClinchey.

"It was a low, line-drive throw, which is the hardest for a goalkeeper to get," O'Leary said. "It was a quick, low throw and we

didn't have anybody behind him (McClinchey).

The goal, however, hardly gave Stevenson any breathing room as Novi continued to get restart chances

"It was very tough first-round game because they (Novi) are a big, strong team," Stevenson senior midfielder Paul Johnson said. "It was hard, physical contact. They are a very scrappy team who got a lot of throw-ins to the box. They were getting free kicks and winning balls in the year. It was a good game for us because we had to fight through it."

Northville's top defender Mike Allie shadowed Stevenson's senior playmaker Nik Djokic throughout the match. Djokic and Allie both went off for 10 minutes apiece late in the first half for drawing simultaneously

The second half also proved to be choppy as Djokic and senior

defender Patrick Kolodziejczak also collected vellows, as did Novi's Brad Simpson.

"We knew who to pester," O'Leary said. "Number nine (Allie) is our best defender and he did a good job. Our plan was to get under the skin of their forwards, and to annoy the right people."

After Spray's shot slammed off the crossbar with 10:16 left in the match, Novi nearly came up the game-tying goal with 5:50 left when a shot caught Stevenson keeper Mike Maciolek out of position.

But Spray came to the rescue as the senior midfielder booted the ball away just before it crossed the goal line.

With Novi pushing up late in the game in search of the equalizer, Stevenson's Brian Ennis put it away when he took a short cross from Johnson and drilled it home with only 1:48 remaining.

"Ennis did a good job coming in and creating some activity," Richters said. "And Spray made a huge contribution tonight, not only with his throw-in (to Crosby), but also clearing the ball off the line late in the

match. Breathing a sigh of relief, Richters was glad his team was able to persevere and to get through its first-round match with a win.


"They (Novi) must have had 40 throw-ins into the box and that's far too many," he said. "But against an opponent like that it's difficult. We knew they played a deep sweep and we felt prepared for a lot of their stuff. What we saw we were not caught by surprise.







Rules for senior units set by HUD

Can you still use the words "adult housing" under Federal

You would be OK if you say senior, retirement or 55plus. Just don't say "adult."

HUD didn't back off from its requirements when Congress passed the Housing for Older Persons Act of 1995, which removed the significant facilities and services requirement in the Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988 and replaced it with the requirement that housing for older persons verify the ages of occupants no less than every two years with rules promulgated by HUD.

Accordingly, pursuant to federal law, 55-plus housing has to demonstrate three

One, at least 80 percent of the occupied units must be occupied by at least one person 55 or older.

Two, the community must publish and adhere to rules and regulations designed to effectuate the intent to provide housing for older persons.


Three, the community must verify the ages of occupants no less than every two years.

Two other types of senior housing are recognized under federal laws

All 62 housing wherein every resident except the resident manager must be at least 62 years of age and no other requirements. Also, housing for seniors built with federal and state monies.



Learning to become a Realtor

Do you know how joint tenancy differs

Well, with some studying, you might learn these concepts and others and go on to a career in real estate sales.

Armed with a real estate school certificate and a Michigan sales license, you'll be able to take potential customers to houses and other kinds of properties you might sell to them for a commission or fee.

But first you have to get that certificate. then you have to pass the state test.

Real estate sales is a work choice being made by hundreds annually, steadily adding to the current Michigan corps of sales agents.

Ann Millben, spokeswoman for the Department of Consumer and Industry Services, the state office which issues the licenses, estimates the number at 63,000.

Kathi Tarala, director, Real Estate School of Michigan, Troy, said she thinks current economic conditions are sparking rising interest in the career and that some persons are even "doing it as back-up employment."

She said she also meets "people who recognize that real estate is a wonderful investment. Some come through the school just because they want to do their own investing, especially with the stock market being not so great.

"Interest in real estate is driven by economic times," Tarala said. "The security of real property appeals in times of uncer-

"It's a good profession and success is up to the individual," she said. "People who go into real estate sales with a good work ethic are there to actually do the job and it really can be a very profitable business to be in."

Subjects studied in the 40-hour, \$175 course at Tarala's school include terminology, housing discrimination laws, estates, leasing, property management, agency laws, financing/mortgages and, of course, joint tenancy and fee simple.

At Michigan Institute of Real Estate,

There is a \$46 fee to take the real estate exam. It's given by appointment at 9 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. Monday through Friday at six sites throughout the state, including Canton and Troy.

Livonia, Yvonne Kasgorgis, educational consultant, said her school meets the state requirement for 40 hours as prerequisite

"Students can do the 40 hours daytime over five consecutive days or in an evening program over several weeks," Kasgorgis

The fee at her school, she said, is \$175 for either the day or evening program, including all books and materials.

Both of these schools also offer courses leading to licensing for real estate brokers, appraisers, builders and surveyors, among

other related occupations. Additionally, they offer the six hours of continuing education courses required for annual renewal of the sales agent's license.

"All salespersons have to work under the supervision of an employing real estate broker, who in turn is required to have at least three years of sales experience, 90 hours of study and pass a more stringent exam," Millben said.

To be accredited by the state, Millben said, real estate courses must be offered at "institutions of higher learning, public

schools or proprietary vocational schools." Currently, Michigan has about 40 state accredited schools.

Between October 2001 and August 2002, about 7,500 persons took the state's sales agent exam, with about a 70 percent passing rate, Millben said. Those who fail can try again.

The test consists of multiple-choice questions covering seven main subjects listing property, selling property, property management, settlement/transfer of ownership, financing, professional responsibility/fair practice/ administration, and

Michigan state laws and rules. Under each main subject, there may be four or five or a dozen or more topics ranging from lot size to differences between personal property and real property and from evaluating rental market to the Wetlands Protection Act and rules.

The test outline covers more than two letter-size pages with smallish type and offers sample questions to illustrate the type of items used in the exam. Here are several examples:

A person has been using a property for a long time. That person's rights have been determined to supersede those of the fee simple owner. This is called which of the following? A.) Escheat B.) Homestead C.) Eminent Domain D.) Adverse Possession (The correct answer is D eminent domain.)

All of the following should be considered encumbrances except A.) Encroachments B.) Mortgages C.) Easements D.) Closing Costs (The correct answer is D - closing costs.)

An agent who works for ABC Realty obtains a listing. Two days later, the agent begins working for XYZ Realty. Which of the following is true regarding the listing?

A.) The listing is transferred to XYZ Realty B.) The agent is entitled to compensation when she begins working for XYZ Realty C.) The listing remains with ABC Realty D.) The listing is automatically terminated (The correct answer is Cthe listing remains with ABC Realty.

Now, the difference between fee simple and joint tenancy? Don't ask. It's too complicated to explain here.

Market offers attractive deals

As the holiday season nears, home seekers may still be able to sniff out some very attractive deals for their next purchase.

There are still plenty of "For Sale" signs on front lawns. Qualified buyers willing to make purchase offers between now and the New Year may enjoy the convergence of multiple favorable elements in the real estate market.

Mortgage interest rates remain incredible. Even with a possible modest rise in the coming months, these attractive interest rates promise to provide home buyers with much more purchasing power. Categorically, lower interest rates mean more home for the same money.

Now that school is in session and most families have settled back into a routine, buying and selling a home is not a high priority for many. It is very likely that those sellers who are selling their homes are very motivated for some reason.

Some "snowbirds" may be delaying their departure to the South until they sell their home. Others may have to get rid of their home due to job transfers. Still others may be liquidating their rental property holdings as a part of a larger financial strategy.

Regardless of the reason, as we enter this traditionally slow part of the real estate season, there is certain to be a good number of buyers who see the value in making home purchases prior to Jan. 1. In the late 90s, my wife and I purchased our current home a full 10-percent below market value by placing a purchase offer in early-December and closing just before Christmas.

Apartment dwellers and house tenants with pending lease renewals should take this opportunity to re-evaluate their housing situations. For many, it is possible to purchase a home and still reduce their monthly after-tax cash flow. Typically, renters buying homes will "break even" with a monthly mortgage payment 35 percent higher than their current rent.

Finally, do not allow this extremely heavy refinance market to dissuade you from making a purchase offer. Your loan may take a little longer moving through its underwriting journey, but most lenders are giving priority to purchases over refinances.



Lender reaches settlement; information hotline established

(AP) - Michigan will get up to \$14 million in a settlement with one of the nation's largest home loan companies over allegations that it cheated customers, state officials have announced.

Household International Inc., which is based in Illinois, reached the settlement agreement with Michigan, 18 other states and Washington, D.C. The company will pay \$484 million nationwide and has agreed to change its lending practices.

The settlement affects 10,702 Michigan residents who took out real estate loans with Household International between January 1999 and the present.

Michigan Insurance Commissioner Frank Fitzgerald said Household was charging higher interest rates than promised. In some cases, consumers who expected to pay rates of 7 percent or 8 percent were paying double that.

State investigators also found that Household was charging penalty fees that weren't disclosed in contracts and was misrepresenting the amount that consumers would save if they signed up for certain payment plans.

Michigan hasn't yet determined how the settlement money will be distributed. Household International estimated customers will get between \$1,000 and

\$1,500 each. The state has set up a toll free number for customers to get updates on the Household settlement. The number is

(877) 598-0010. "This really does set new standards for the mortgage lending industry," Fitzgerald said. "Henceforth, people who go to a Household office are going to be treated much differently than they have to this point." Household International Chairman and

CEO William Aldinger released a statement apologizing to the company's customers. He also spoke at a news conference.

"I'm pleased to have this behind us, and we now look forward to setting new standards for the consumer lending industry,"

Aldinger said the company has adopted broader disclosure requirements and will increase its compliance staff.

'We simply didn't live up to our usually high operating standards," he said.

Fitzgerald said Michigan investigated Household from April to June of this year after receiving dozens of complaints from

Michigan has received 73 complaints about the company since January 1999, he

Nearly 80 percent of Household International's borrowers in Michigan live in the southeast corner of the state, but complaints have been coming in from all over, Fitzgerald said.

He said the settlement has the potential to drastically change the booming mortgage loan business. In 1989, Michigan had 300 licensed mortgage lenders; today, it has 3.000.

Mortgage lenders tend to lend to people with poor credit, Fitzgerald said.

"It's a legitimate and important role to play within the lending community, but it's also the part of the lending community that for a regulator creates the greatest challenge," Fitzgerald said.

"It can create a situation that can go very easily into the predatory area," he said.

Mortgage rates up across the board

(AP) - Home loan rates around the country edged up last week, with rates on 30-year mortgages climbing to their highest level since the middle of September.

Mortgage giant Freddie Mac, in its weekly nationwide survey of rates, reported that the average interest rate on 30-year fixed-rate mortgages rose to 6.15 percent from the previous week's 5.98 percent.

Rates for 15-year fixed-rate mortgages, a popular option for refinancing, moved up to 5.56 percent from 5.34 percent, the lowest level since Freddie Mac began tracking these rates in

For one-year adjustable-rate mortgages, rates rose to 4.27 percent, up from 4.23. That had marked the lowest level since Freddie Mac began tracking these rates in 1971.

Last week's rate was the highest since the week ending Sept. 13, when rates on 30-year mortgages averaged 6.18 percent.

Mortgage rates rose as a recent stock market rally slowed investor demand for bonds, helping to push long-term rates up.

"Several large corporations released strong earnings and sales forecasts recently, igniting a rally in the stock market," explained Frank Nothaft, Freddie Mac's chief economist.

"As a result, investors pulled money out of the bond market and put it into stocks, causing bond yields and other interest rate to rise. Mortgage rates followed suit, to a lesser degree," Nothaft said.

Still, economists predict that mortgage rates will probably hover around the levels where they currently are and won't jump dramatically, something that bodes well for the housing market.
