



Canton talent debuts

The two songs Nicole Meredith sang in the amphitheater at Heritage Park Friday night are just an inkling of her musical interest.

Her favorite type of music: "It's pretty much all over the place, but I guess country. It's really sweet," said the 14-yearold Salem High sophomore, who belted out "At Last" by Etta James and "Heartbreak Hotel" by the one and only Elvis Presley.

She joined some nine other vocalists and a band to kick off Canton's first-ever Open Mic series in the park. "It gives people a chance to perform in the amphitheater," said Jon LaFever, youth development specialist. "We had so many requests for people who want to sing there."

LaFever and his colleague Jennifer Eubanks decided to give the amphitheater a chance to host new area talent. Audition tapes were accepted and the line up for three Open Mic programs was underway. "I think they recognize it is a stepping stone to performing before an audience," Eubanks said. "Some of them are really extraordinary."

Pesticide program offered

Subs, condos with detention ponds ' eligible for treatment against West Nile virus

Canton Township is offering a free mosquito treatment program to subdivisions or condominium associations which contain a detention pond that was required as part of the development's site plan.

The treatment is being offered as a way to combat the potential development and spread of West Nile virus, a mysterious malady that can be transmitted from mosquitoes to birds and subsequently to humans.

Township-owned ponds are already being treated. Ponds that are strictly on private property - not required detention basins are not eligible for the program. Private storm sewers or wetland areas are also not included.

Tom Casari, Canton Township engineer, said homeowners' groups desiring the treatment must provide a permit from the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality for treating open water. The form is available from the DEQ Web site at www.wnv.state.mi.us.

They must also provide a hold harmless agreement, available from Canton's Public Works Division at (734) 394-5150.

Casari said the pesticide being used is a naturally occurring bacteria, B.t.i., which attacks the mosquito larvae.

Aware parents are the best filters when surfing Internet

Despite all the high-technology filters available in the marketplace to block certain inappropriate sites from kids and teens surfing the Internet, parents may be the very best filters available.

"Parents should sit down and browse things with their kids. They should chat about what is inappropriate and why," said Carl Miller, Canton Public Library information technology specialist.

In the wake of a recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling that allows government to require libraries to filter all computers connected to the Internet - or lose certain federal money and grants - Miller says the answer may be as simple as a parent learning what their kids are surfing, teaching them what is inappropriate and knowing when to pull the plug.

"I think that's the answer," Miller said. "It's almost like putting kids in front of the TV and walking away."

BE STREET SMART

Parents need to continually monitor what their kids are looking at on the Internet. One shot won't do. That's because those who make Web sites that offer pornography, nudity, violence and the like are pretty

"Guile is the word that comes to mind. But sneaky is better,"

Miller said. "They try to figure out ways people can end up at their site.

Pop-ups — those little boxes that show up while you are visiting a site — are often the ones of which to wary, especially for kids and teens. That's why it is

so important for parents to scrutinize their children's Web surfing, Miller said.

"People have to be street smart, especially when you are asked to provide your name






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

Pitch your tent for all-night campout

Get ready Canton campers. This is your once-a-year chance to pitch that tent in Heritage Park, just west of the library and administration building.

Starting at noon on Friday, July 11, campers can start setting up in the park for the allnight campout, featuring a family movie and other family oriented entertainment.

It's the eighth year for the event, which last year drew 385 families to the park.

"The park looked like one of those big campgrounds," said Bob Dates, Canton recreation coordinator. "Tents were everywhere."

This year's movie, which starts at dusk in the amphitheater, is "Treasure Planet," an animated Disney film based on Robert Louis Stevenson's "Treasure Island." Only this version takes place in outer space.

Before the movie, at 7:45 p.m., the amphitheater will host "Max, the Moose," a family musical variety series featuring former Plymouth resident Mark Thomas.

"It's always a good show,"
Dates said. "He gets the audience involved."

Also on hand will be face painters, strolling magicians making balloon animals for the kids and a "chalk the walkway" event, where children can take chalk (which will be supplied) and apply their artistic talents to the sidewalk leading to the amphitheater.

Limited concessions will be available, such as chips, nachos, popcorn and candy, but Dates said people are encouraged to bring their own coolers and food.

Above ground grills will be allowed, but no open pit campfires. Dogs are also welcome as long as they're on a leash.

Campers can begin unloading their supplies and tents (no motor homes or campers are permitted) at noon on Veterans Drive. But once they're unloaded, cars must be moved to a nearby parking lot.

"In the past some people wanted to leave their cars on Veterans Drive overnight," Dates said. "That created a real jam. Starting at 5 p.m.
Veterans Drive will be closed to

traffic." All tents must be cleared out by noon on

Saturday.
Dates said, cautiously, that the campout has been blessed

with good weather in the past.
"I don't think we've ever
been rained out," he said. "Over
the last few years a lot of families gather friends and neighbors and camp together. You'll
see five or six tents together.
This event has been popular

from the very beginning."

"It's harmless to other bugs, fish or humans," he said.

Brad Sharp, parks manager for the township, said the ponds on Canton's parks and golf courses have already begun the treatment.

"We had a few calls from residents asking about it," he said. "We wanted to do whatever we could to help."

He said probably 25 ponds have received the first treatment. It's a six-part treatment

of adding granular material to the water.

In 2002, West Nile virus infected 3,862 people in the United States, with 263 deaths reported. Michigan reported more than 400 cases and at least 33 deaths.

"I don't want to downplay

any kind of thing that causes people to get sick," Casari said. "But thousands die from the common flu each year." According to one statistic,

the flu infects 10-20 percent of the U.S. population (about 28-56 million people).

Casari said that like the flu, people most at risk from West Nile are those with weakened immune systems.

Nevertheless, Casari said the township decided it should do something to deal with the mosquito situation.

He said the treatment for a typical detention pond would cost about \$200, depending on the size of the pond.

Township Supervisor Tom Yack said he brought the issue up before staff members last winter. "They had started getting lots of calls from people who back up to existing detention ponds," he said. "These ponds were always looked upon as an amenity or an attribute. But then people began to react negatively about them."

But Yack and Casari both said mosquito control involves more than just treating detention ponds.

"Mosquitoes tend to breed in very shallow water that gets a warm temperature," Casari said. "Standing water outside the house, if it sits for several days, could breed mosquitoes."

He said gutters and downspouts that cause water to pond in the yard or a birdbath that isn't cleaned regularly can also provide breeding grounds.

"Even where a car makes a rut in the grass and water stands can lure them," he said.



Filters, firewalls and smarts will help

Carl Miller, Canton Public Library information technology specialist, offers some suggestions for parents who are interested in protecting their children from inappropriate material as they surf the Internet. His first suggestion, get a good filter software program. Listed below are some suggestions, with three Miller considers top notch: Cyber Patrol, Cybersitter, Net Nanny and Safe Surf. Bess, which is the filter used by the library, is a proxy server.

Miller also suggests installing a firewall. "It is like a lead door." It is something that keeps the fire (junk) out. It can determine what is good and what isn't good." He suggests using Zone Alarm, which is a free version. Or you can pay for the professional version. Another brand is McAffee. But firewalls are not filters. "They protect against people on the Internet getting into your computer,"

Miller said. Computer owners should

also invest in antivirus software to protect against viruses transmitted by email.

and other personal information," Miller said. "It is best to be leery."

The Supreme Court ruling upholds the Children's Internet Protection Act, signed into law by former President Bill Clinton.

It requires public libraries that receive certain types of federal money to install filtering software to prevent access by minors to "inappropriate matter" on the Internet.

Library Director Jean Tabor said the ruling will have little impact on Canton.

The library uses the Bess filter software on computers used by kids and teens, and computers in public areas where children may pass and view the screens.

To allow adults access, a separate Internet room was created during the library's expansion that does not have filters on the comput-

No one under 18 is allowed in the room. And that is enforced, Tabor said.

In a second reading of the ruling, Tabor said it will have less impact than initially

anticipated. The library uses approximately \$11,000 in federal money for the telephone system.

Originally, Tabor suspected that would be lost. In fact, the filtering provision does not apply to telecommunication costs such as voice or data

Canton will pass on federal grant opportunities in wake of the ruling.

Tabor said that also has little impact as Canton does not often apply because of the cumbersome application process for the small amount of money that can be obtained.

The machines patrons use at the library are actually not full computers, rather just screens. "Programs run on a server. We use the Citrix system, which is a thin client solution," Miller said.

"People see things on the screen, but a computer is not connected. Our filters are on the server."

AVAILABLE FILTERS

Three types of filters are available in the marketplace. One is the keyword filter, one of the earliest types available. From a list of "bad" words, documents are filtered.

But problems crop up with

false positives — blocking something that shouldn't be as well as false negatives blocking things that should be blocked.

"A keyword filter is not very sophisticated and easy to get around," Miller said.

The second type of filter is an image content filter that measures the percentage of flesh tones.

Again, easy to get around because a photo of a mosquito bite on a human arm would be blocked because of the high

percentage of flesh tone. A woman scantily clad in a fishnet outfit, for example, could pass the filter because of a lesser percentage of flesh

tone. "There are ways to have pornography without lots of skin tones," Miller said.

A third is content filtering. In this one, humans go to sites and rate them: hard core pornography, soft core pornography, nudity, educational nudity, online gambling and games, for example. Bess, the filter the library uses, is a content filter.

"Once a day, the computer is updated with new ratings," Miller said, adding you can let Bess know of any sites that need reviewing.

Parents are reminded that when accessing the Internet

through the library from a home computer, the information is not filtered. "We do count on parents to monitor their children and to get filters for their home computers," Miller said.

When kids go to the library's Web page and access the kids' area, the information is purely for kids.

"The librarians are always looking for stuff for kids." Miller said.

Parents are also to be cautioned that e-mail is not filtered and of course, unsolicited e-mails of questionable content come pouring in.

"E-mail is untrustworthy," Miller said.

"Some companies manage to get your e-mail and put it on a

Reputable sites will honor your request to unsubscribe.

But disreputable ones will allow you to unsubscribe and then sell your address to yet another company providing

questionable e-mail messages. Miller warns that some emails generate viruses.

Anti-virus software may help. "It will stop some of the flood of e-mails that go around," he said.

according to Canton Treasurer Elaine Kirchgatter.

"For most people the bill probably went down just a little bit," she said. "And the taxable value went up a little bit."

Summer tax bills are for school taxes and the amount billed will vary according to the school district residents are in.

For Canton residents in the Plymouth-Canton district, the total millage levied this summer is 9.9524 mills. For Canton residents in the Wayne-Westland district, the millage is 10.12. Both of those districts include Schoolcraft College.

For Canton residents in the Van Buren district, the total millage is 6.2645, but Van Buren is not in the Schoolcraft district so those taxes are not included.

She said this tax bill season (so far) has gone smoothly.

"The phones have been busy but you always expect that," Kirchgatter said. "Some people were calling because of the one mill difference. And some didn't realize they had a mortgage company that received the bill."

For those people who have their taxes paid by a mortgage company, Kirchgatter said, they receive a copy of the bill rather than the bill itself.

"In that case make sure your mortgage company pays it and you don't," she said.

Residents can check their tax bill information and payment status on the Internet or by calling a toll-free number.

On the Internet, residents can check for up-to-date information on when their taxes have been paid by going to www.ugotpal.com. Select Canton from the pull down menu and type in your address or property parcel number.

Kirchgatter said the information is updated on a daily basis. Residents can get the same information by calling toll free (800) 846-8725. The automated menu gives you the option of having the information faxed to you or read over the telephone.

"Some people ask why we make this information available for people to see," Kirchgatter said. "We tell them it's public information."

She said others complain that the information shouldn't be so easily accessible.

"But it gives people 24 hour a day access seven days a week to check that information," she said. "And it saves taxpayers money because we don't have to have staff dedicated to answering those questions. And there's no question about who said what to whom."

For those people who pay their taxes directly, Kirchgatter urged them to pay in August and not wait until September. With the expansion of the administration building, she said parking can be a problem. Checks and tax bills can be placed in the drop box outside the building.
For people who pay in per-

son, Kirchgatter asked that they do not bring cash. And the treasurer's office doesn't accept credit cards.

ROAD CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

Canton Center Road bridge (over Lower Rouge) - The south portion of the substructure has been partially constructed and now the north portion is being built. It is anticipated that construction will be completed

by late August 2003. Ford Road (easterly township limits to Marlowe Boulevard) - Project entails milling and resurfacing and is anticipated to be completed before Labor Day. Work will occur during nights and weekends to minimize disruption, but daytime work will also take place from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. This project will allow for one lane minimum in each direction that will be open along with left turns and major intersections. New traffic signage will be installed to replace the old in the project area.

anticipated to start in the fall of 2003 if the property owners approve the costs from publicly bidding the project in the near future.

Lotz Road (Palmer to Cherry Hill) -Wayne County and Canton Township are working to have the two unpaved portions. Construction anticipated to begin in August of 2003.

■ Saltz Road paving (Canton Center to Beck) - Anticipate construction in

September 2003 or spring 2004. Joy Road paving (west of Beck Road) - Anticipate paving to begin in the last summer/fall of 2003. Posted speed limit is anticipated to be 40 mph.







Library makes correct decision

The Canton Public Library's method of providing filtered Internet access for children and teens, and unfiltered access for adults in a separate, restricted setting offers the best of both worlds.

That's particularly true in the wake of a U.S. Supreme Court ruling last week that upholds the Children's Internet Protection Act, signed into law by former President Bill Clinton in 2000.

The law requires public libraries that receive certain types of federal money to install filtering software to prevent access by minors to "inappropriate matter" on the Internet. In other words, the federal government says: Do what we think best or you won't get the money.

Without a doubt, the board of trustees for the Canton library and Library Director Jean Tabor believe in the need to protect children and teens from life's ugly underbelly. Computers used by kids and teens and those in public areas where the younger generation may pass are

Adults are another matter. Refusing adults access to whatever site they wish to access is tantamount to censor-

Libraries are about information and the free flow of information. Whether that information is considered good or bad for the general adult population is not the issue. To ban certain Web sites from adult viewing is the same as banning certain books. Both fly in the face of the First Amendment, and an act that is abhorrent to democracy and the freedom of thought and expression.

True, the Canton library does not have a special aisle filled with pornographic materials. Nor are they likely to do that. But allowing adults unfiltered use of the computers assigned in a separate room - where those under 18 are not allowed - also doesn't mean they are traipsing in and out for their daily dose of pornography.

The issue is freedom. Freedom of thought. Freedom of choice. These are rights that come along with being an adult, a citizen, a taxpayer.

Tabor and library trustees should be lauded for hanging tough on their position to protect kids and teens, yet provide adults unrestricted access to the Internet. In a second reading of the court ruling, Tabor has found that the only thing the library will lose is its ability to apply for federal grants, something that the library does not often do because of cumbersome applications and slim chances

That Big Brother wants to tell us what is right and good is not unusual. In our world of big government, how libraries, like townships, are the institutions and forms of government closest to the people. And that is where they should remain.

Whether computers should be filtered is a decision that rests in the community where the library director and its elected board of trustees live and work, and in which they know the standards its residents want followed.

This is a special year to pay tribute

Americans have several occasions throughout the year Memorial Day, Veterans Day — to celebrate the contributions made by their countrymen in defense of our way of life and the freedoms associated with it.

But none are as symbolic as the one we celebrate Friday. The Fourth of July is the hallmark holiday when it comes to what the United States stands for. And, in a year when we successfully fought off what our leadership deemed was a considerable threat to that way of life, we should take more than just a moment to realize how lucky

From the war that led to the signing of our Declaration of Independence right through this year's Operation Iraqi Freedom campaign, Americans have laid their lives on the line, at home and abroad, standing up for the rights we hold so dearly today.

Not every military campaign has been a popular one. World War II brought us Rosie the Riveter, war ditties and bond drives, while the Vietnam conflict brought us protests and ugly images. The Persian Gulf War sent the first President Bush soaring in approval ratings; its followup - Operation Iraqi Freedom - while drawing a generally favorable response, was marked with fierce protests.

As you go about your holiday, especially in the aftermath of war, we urge you to take time to embrace that feeling, to honor those who have died defending it.

And to remember what it took to achieve it.

Now, some lawmakers who are opposed to cutting the state's budget are looking for new revenues by changing the past practices that have been used to

determine the SBT burden on Michigan's companies - a burden that some national experts say pushes Michigan to the fourth highest business taxes in the country. Of course, these changes all result in higher tax revenues for the state - about \$100 million more in total. These aren't loophole closings. They

are fundamental changes in the state's tax system. They come at a time when Michigan's businesses are facing some of the toughest challenges they have faced in 20 years or more.

We don't need taxes. We need a state budget that is balanced.

Alternative energy key for Michigan's economy

t didn't seem particularly special at first glance - just a big room at the airport Westin Hotel, jam-packed with engineers, marketers and assorted business types. But it just might be that the conference last Friday — "Striking Connections for the Alternative Energy Industry," sponsored by NextEnergy — could solidify Michigan's leading role in the automobile indus-

It's been clear for a number of years that there are all kinds of drawbacks to basing our energy

economy on hydrocarbons, whether gasoline for the internal combustion engines that power our cars or coal for the power plants that generate our electricity. When you burn hydrocarbons, you dump carbon (plus a bunch of other nasty stuff) into the atmosphere, which in turn generates the greenhouse gases that contribute to global warming. Moreover, an increasing percentage of our oil comes from abroad, which puts us into the

charitable hands of various Middle Eastern

Power

regimes. The answer, of course, is to develop an alternative energy source. The most likely candidate to date is hydrogen, whether in the form of fuel cells or used alone as fuel in an engine. The great advantage of hydrogen, of course, is that when you burn it, you get water vapor instead of pollutants and greenhouse gases. And if we could figure out how to generate the hydrogen domestically - a very big "if," given present technology we'd eventually be independent of foreign energy

So the issue is how best to do this? And, more to the point for us in Michigan, how to do it right here at home? It was this question that led Doug Rothwell, who was the CEO of the Michigan Economic Development Corp. (MEDC), to propose back in 2001 creating something called NextEnergy. Its purpose was to promote the development of alternative energy technologies and provide tax incentives for business to do research, development and manufacturing.

Ultimately, the MEDC put \$32 million into NextEnergy, which is now chartered as a nonprofit corporation. Under the direction of COO Steve Arwood - a, well, high-energy type from Lansing — NextEnergy is busy building a building in a Smart Zone near the Wayne State University campus. And it was NextEnergy that

sponsored the conference I attended last week. The stakes are big for Michigan. Currently, 35 percent of all engine manufacturing and 39 per-

cent of transmission building are located in Michigan. If a new energy basis for automobile engines is developed and takes root outside Michigan, almost 200,000 of our best jobs would be at risk. If they go away, that could be a \$10 billion hit to our economy. So there is some real urgency in the job Arwood and his colleagues have undertaken at NextEnergy.

The conference was a real eye-opener. Arwood led off by saying that NextEnergy's purpose was nothing less than the retention of Michigan's economic base. Next came Anthony Earley, chairman and CEO of DTE Energy, the company that owns Detroit Edison and MichCon. Earley pointed out that the utility industry has a big stake in alternative energy, partly to reduce pollution and partly to develop a distributed power generation system. Just as distributed computing replaced the old centralized main frames, distributed power generation is the wave of the future: It's cheaper, more flexible and more convenient for users.

Jerry Mader wound up the plenary presentations. An engineer who played football while he was getting his engineering degrees from U-M, Mader is the advanced energy technology consultant for the Center for Automotive Research, the leading outfit in the field.

His point was simple: There are a whole lot of people very interested in the alternative energy field - the Big Three, DTE, the federal government, the University of Michigan, NextEnergy, to name just a few. The pressing issue is how best to bring all this interest together in such a way that the whole becomes more than the sum of the parts ... and that the whole remains in Michigan.

We have everything right here in Michigan to allow us to pull everything together," Mader said, "but we need to develop a collaborative partnership for a badly-needed national agenda.

He got a big round of applause. As the opening session wound up, it was interesting to watch the crowds of engineers and business types clustering around each speaker, excitedly asking questions and exchanging business cards.

There's a long way to go and success is by no means certain, but outfits like NextEnergy deserve a lot of credit for getting the ball rolling.



The culinary arts portion of the \$27 million VisTaTech Center already has opened and is in full operation. Now the business functions are fully

VisTaTech is a technology-rich venue for training, business meetings, corporate events, certain community events, and innovative learning for business students in addition to the culinary arts component. Businesses or community groups using the facility can arrange for catered meals or eat at the American Harvest restaurant.

Now that it is fully operational, business or community service groups may call (734) 462-4610 to inquire about using the facilities, or e-mail queries to vistatech@schoolcraft.edu or visit the college Web site at www.schoolcraft.edu.

"We consider VisTaTech to be our economic development engine, promoting business in our service district," says John Walsh, executive director of development and government relations. "It allows Schoolcraft to help businesses improve and that results in an improvement in the economy we serve. The derivative effect is better paying jobs and more people living in the area.'

"Schoolcraft is a service provider to small, medium and large businesses by providing customized training to their needs with our faculty or with a faculty that we retain, if needed."

WIDE APPLICATIONS

The business portion of VisTaTech includes meeting rooms for large and small groups, advanced telecommunications technology, conferences and teleconferences, training sessions and work meetings, product

demonstrations, and industry expos. Rooms for meeting and education include: 3 bays, each accommodating 50-60 people; a classroom for up to 22 people; presentation room with theater-style seats for 294. The presentation room stage is six feet deep with a large projection screen behind

The presentation room is designed for conference keynote speeches, award ceremonies, major presentations, and even interactive meetings spanning continents. Presentations

and teleconferences can be broadcast anywhere on campus and could be displayed on VisTaTech's video wall in the public area on Main Street.

Everything that occurs in the presentation room can be recorded and transferred to CDs or DVDs. The podium has an integrated laptop, allowing speakers to make PowerPoint, DVD or CD presentations.

The multi-room is a 7,590-squarefoot room that can be used for major events such as expos and banquets, seating up to 600 for a conference and 432 diners for a banquet such as the college's Culinary Extravaganza and the Women's Resource Center's Spaghetti Dinner.

The room can be divided into four smaller areas.

Presentations in the multi-room can be simulcast elsewhere in the building or to off-site locations or conversely broadcasts from off-site locations can be beamed into the multi-room.

ENRICHED TECHNOLOGY

Technology for meetings and educational functions include: video monitors throughout the building; large projection screens in the multiroom and presentation room; plasma a writing surface, or link to the screens in the bays; mobile digital

whiteboards; touch-screen monitors outside the meeting rooms; and a four-monitor media wall in the plaza.

Hallway video monitors allow persons to check on what function is presently occurring in the room, check for open dates, and make a reservation request.

The digital whiteboards not only allows for simple erasure of notes but offers a way for the notes to be saved in digital form to be saved on disk or e-mailed - an advantage for several applications, especially brain-storming sessions.

The center also has a prefunction area near the bays suited for corporate receptions or breaks between training or conference sessions. This area has big leather chairs on castors, coffee tables with power and data sources for laptops, and other tables for food and drinks. The prefunction room also has a curved work wall that can be used as a meeting facilitation tool, message wall, or advertising mural.

Inside each Innovation Bay, everything is mobile and can be assembled according to the user's training or learning needs. The Innovation Bay has six Smart Boards, each with a high definition plasma screen that can be used like a desktop computer, Internet.

The Learning Bay is the curved portion of the building most visible from Haggerty. About 90 PCs will rest on mobile workstations. The room has a podium, three ceiling data projectors, a digital whiteboard than can e-mail information to participants' work or home computers.

The Strategic Bay, like the hub of a large corporation, can be used for instruction, corporate retreats, seminars, meetings and presentations.

And there are "Small Harbor" areas that can be used for groups of two to four persons for private discussions and informal presentations.

Mobile furniture and computers offer flexibility in room setup, both for instructional use and business functions.

The Business Development Center offers customized training to business in almost any subject matter applicable to business. Such training can occur at the company's site or here at Schoolcraft. It can be a oneday seminary or a year-long certificate training program we design for

VisTaTech has been designed to become the new "gateway" to the campus from the north entrance near Seven Mile and Haggerty.

A covered canopy at the entrance turns into a central corridor with skylight named "Main Street" that runs through the building and then empties into the main portion of the campus.

"Once you reach the center of the cafeteria, your view is redirected to the student campus through the southern windows, and you are invited into the campus courtyard," explains Brion Boucher, senior design architect for the project.

The center is attached to the Waterman Center which will be renamed the Waterman Wing and contain the main cafeteria for Schoolcraft students. Besides the expanded culinary arts department, the American Harvest restaurant will be relocated to VisTaTech. The **Business Development Center** also will be relocated to VisTaTech.

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

Fate wasn't always kind to Bill Gadsby as far as the hockey world was concerned.







to follow - including 17 years running a hockey camp for youngsters and adults at the Southfield Civic Center.

All of those blessings are recounted by the National Hockey League Hall of Famer in his new autobiography, The Grateful Gadsby (Immortal Investments Publishing, based in Wayne, Mich.).

He decided to go ahead and write it after being urged by Red Wings legend and close friend Gordie Howe, and his wife Colleen. "Mr. and Mrs. Hockey" wrote the book's foreword.

"Gordie and Colleen tried to talk me into it four or five years ago," explained Gadsby, relaxing on the patio of the home he and wife Edna have lived in since 1968, when Gadsby returned to Detroit to coach the Red Wings in 1968-69. "They said You've got a lot of stories and you've had quite a life. Why don't you write a book?'

"They finally talked me into it. I got excited about doing it because it started bringing back memories about the things that we did."

Perhaps with the help of Howe publicist Del Reddy (whose brother, Mike, is publisher of Immortal Investment Publishing), the book idea quickly blossomed into reality.

LOOKING BACK

In 2001-02, over a span of about 12 months, the hockey legend sat down with Michigan resident and USA Today hockey writer Kevin Allen to go over Gadsby's extraordinary life.

Gadsby's tape-recorded words were transformed on to pages thanks to the work of Allen. Interviews took place both at the Gadsby residence and at


Western Golf and Country Club in Redford Township, where Gadsby is a member.

"We went chapter-by-chapter, year-by-year, story-by-story," said Gadsby, adding he is very satisfied with how the final product came out.

He's already signed about 1,100 of the 5,000 initial press run, leaving room for special inscriptions for future orders on his Web site

(www.billgadsby.com). "I'll usually sign maybe 20 or 25 (at home), and if there's nothing on TV I'll sign another 25."

Hopefully there soon will be book signings at the Franklin Racquet Club in Southfield and at other locations. Gadsby also



hopes to sign copies at Joe Louis Arena, perhaps between periods of Red Wing games. Gadsby's Web site will include informa-

tion on such appearances. "I was hoping they'd be in the playoffs (longer)," he said, referring to this year's four-game sweep by Anaheim. "We were really planning on that."

Not all of the stories in Gadsby's life have been happy ones, however. And, to his credit, a couple are included within the pages of The Grateful Gadsby.

Gadsby still gets slightly agitated when recalling the cruel twist of fate in the 1964 Stanley Cup finals and when discussing the 1969 weekend he was broomed by Norris.

In the spring of 1964, when playing defense for the Wings, Gadsby's bid for a Stanley Cupclinching goal in Game Six of the finals missed the mark only because it struck the stick knob of completely screened Toronto goaltender Johnny Bower. A minute later, at 2:43 of overtime, Bob Baun scored the win-

Wings' Terry Sawchuck. Game Seven also went to the Maple Leafs leaving Gadsby and his teammates to watch the Stanley Cup celebration and wonder what happened.

"I was at the point and I remember giving the puck back to (forward) Floyd Smith," said Gadsby. "He gave it back to me and I shot it. I looked at Bower and he was just standing there. ... The son of a (gun) was going in the top corner and it hit the handle of his stick."

returned to the finals in 1966, only to lose to Montreal on a controversial overtime goal by Henri Richard. Gadsby said Richard slid into Detroit goalie Roger Crozier with the puck under his arm - and Richard, Crozier and the puck all wound up over the goal line.

"You've got to get the breaks." Gadsby said quietly.

As far as his October 1969 firing by Norris, the Red Wings had just defeated Chicago, and the owner and coach had some happy moments in the dressing room immediately after.

"Bruce Norris loved to beat Chicago because his brother owned the club," Gadsby said. "He had his arm around me after the game and said, 'Bill, you've really got these guys going.' And I said, 'We're going to have a good year.' The next day, ..."

Gadsby made a screeching sound, indicating he got the socalled ziggy.

But he doesn't have any regrets - except for not winning a Cup, of course.

"Just like it (book) says, I'm grateful," Gadsby said. "When you read it, you'll see. You'll know why. I am so grateful and that's why I named it that."

FAMILY PRIDE

He is especially grateful to still be happily married to his childhood sweetheart Edna, together raising daughters

Brenda, Judy, Sandy and Donna. There are nine grandchildren, including some who

have played hockey. He gets out to the golf course about four times a week and is now relatively pain free after hip-replacement surgery in the

late 1990s. There also is involvement with the Red Wings Alumni (he doesn't skate) and occasional visits to the Joe for games.

This winter, however, he had a scare when doctors found an irregular heartbeat during a routine checkup. Unlike Howe's recent hospitalization for chest pains, Gadsby did not experience that kind of discomfort. But still, a pacemaker needed to be inserted, and the Gadsbys had to forego their annual twomonth trek to Maui, Hawaii.

These days, he's doing just fine, and they intend to make it back to their island retreat in early 2004.

All four of his daughters contributed their personal insights into the book. Their participation is what Gadsby likes most

about it. "If you knew them you'd say, 'What nice people," Gadsby

noted. "Everybody likes them. They love each other." The Gadsby sisters grew into

adulthood living with their parents at the ranch Bill and Edna bought in 1968.

"Gordie (Howe) got us a real estate agent," said Gadsby, noting that Howe then was a Lathrup Village resident. "We looked at 60 homes over three days, and all were in Southfield. This was the second house we looked at."

The Gadsby's were taken by the central location and the fact it was a quiet, well-treed oasis in the middle of a growing metrop-

Now, he putters in the garden, or he watches for birds from the patio. But there's less time for that, with so many boxes of books to sign. "It (the ranch) is too big for us now, but we're going to stay put."

Doing so is just another reason Bill Gadsby is grateful.

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
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
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

Be sure your attic is properly ventilated. Make sure the vents are not covered with insulation.

Inspect your air conditioning system. Cleaning and replacing dirty air filters can help reduce cooling costs 10 percent. Inspect ductwork regularly to repair and prevent leaky joints, elbows and connections. Use mastic to seal leaks since duct tape will dry out and crack.

Check your basement, crawl space, eaves and attic for carpenter ants. Check eaves for wasps and hornets'



WHAT DO THE COLORS MEAN?

The Continental Congress established general criteria for the first "American" flag June 14, 1777. Several changes have been made over the years.

The 13 horizontal stripes represent the original 13 colonies, with one star for each of the 50 states. The meaning of the flag's colors have been subject to speculation, myth and oratorical interpretation over the years.

Perhaps the best explanation comes from Charles Thompson, secretary of the Continental Congress, who referenced the flag when explaining the meaning of colors in the Great Seal of the United States, adopted in 1782. Red symbolizes hardiness and valor, white purity and innocence, blue vigilance, perseverance and justice, Thompson said.

Making your own DVDs can be frustrating Sunflowers sought for contest

hen you sit down at the TV to watch the first DVD you've ever created, it's kind of a magical moment. After patiently copying hours of home video to your computer, carefully editing the footage into a cohesive movie, and recording it to that shiny blank disc in your spiffy new DVD burner, you can't help feeling a bit like Spielberg: so this is what it's like to make movies.

And when your masterpiece appears on the screen upsidedown, as mine did, you start feeling more like Alan Funt: Am I on Candid Camera?

Upside-down. How could a digitally recorded image end up upside-down? It wasn't like I threaded the film into the projector backwards. I've seen plenty of computer weirdness in my day, but this was within arm's reach of taking the cake.

Let me start at the beginning. Now that so many of us own DVD players, it's only natural to want to create our own home-

movie DVDs. What better way to archive all those old tapes or share precious moments with distant friends and family?

Of course, it's nothing new to be able to transfer video to your PC and spruce it up with titles, transitions, and other faux-Hollywood effects. But as for actually copying the result to a DVD, one you can view on any DVD player, that's a fairly recent option. Recordable DVD drives (or "burners") have finally become fast and affordable enough to be prac-

Witness the Pioneer DVR-A05 (www.pioneerelectronics.com), an internal drive that's not only one of the fastest DVD burners to date, but also one of the least expensive at \$299 (less if you shop online). It comes with some great software, most notably a program called MyDVD, which allows you to easily assemble your video clips and produce fancy DVD menus.

I decided to take the Pioneer drive and software for a spin, hoping to archive to DVD about 12 hours' worth of baby and toddler video.

As you already know, the end result wasn't pretty. Of the two movie clips I burned to that

fateful first DVD, one played upside-down. The other looked fine when played on my PC, but jerky on my DVD player.

Admittedly, I may have messed things up by generating the wrong video format from my movie-editing program. A subsequent effort with a different clip resulted in a flawless DVD. But the whole exercise demonstrated that while DVD creation has come a long way in a short while, it's not yet as easy as it should be. And with blank DVDs still selling for about two bucks apiece, mistakes are not only frustrating, but costly as

I won't even bore you with the ridiculous standards war that continues to plague recordable DVD (it's like VHS versus Beta all over again). Yessiree! The 2003 sunflower contest is on! If you have planted seeds, continue doing everything you can to keep them growing. If you have decided to plant sunflower seeds this year and haven't quite gotten around to doing it, it's best to get started.

As you can see by the photograph, we had some happy winners last year, and we hope to encourage more of you to participate.

In the 2002 contest, the tallest sunflower in Oakland County was 12 feet 1-1/2 inches, and in Wayne County, the tallest was a whopping 14 feet 6 inches. A tie in the counties for the largest seedhead was 17 inches.

Sunflowers, the common name, are in the Compositae (daisy) family. You can tell this by looking at the flower and seeing the resemblance.

The botanical genus is Helianthus and it is an annual plant. The common name is translated from the genus name, made up of two Greek words: helios ("sun") and anthos ("flower").

For fun you can say, "I'm going to go out to the garden and see how my helianthus is doing."

The blossoms of original sunflowers are bright yellow and the disc in the center (the seeds) are reddish brown. Now sunflowers have been bred so that they come in other colors that are quite interesting.

Original plants grew to a height of 3 to 10 feet; now they grow taller, as we have learned from the contest, and there are miniature ones, too.

The Inca Indians of Peru worshiped the sunflower as a symbol of the sun. The priestesses in the temple wore necklaces of sunflowers made of gold.

When Spanish explorers arrived they took the seeds back to their country, where they were cultivated and hybridized, and hundreds of years later they were reintroduced as cultivated plants in America.

Nineteenth century American settlers planted the

seed near their homes as protection against malaria. Leaves and stalks were used for fodder, fibers were used to make cloth, the leaves were dried and smoked like tobacco.

The settlers also ate young sprouts and the seeds; the seed husks were ground to make a coffee-like drink. The oil from the seeds was used for cooking and for making soap. So the sun-

flower was quite a valuable plant. It's interesting to learn about such an old plant. But now it's time to get out in the garden and begin to grow the tallest. sunflower and the one with the largest seedhead for the con-


My windows need replacing, what windows should I use?



Too often, I've seen stock replacement windows installed in existing openings that were considerably smaller, reducing the amount of glass and light and increasing the amount of trim around the windows.

Technology improves toilets

nly a few years ago many Detroit area residents were going to Windsor for something they couldn't get

No, it wasn't a visit to the casino to gamble. Instead they traveled to Canada to buy, of all things, toilets that would flush properly.

In 1992, Congress passed the Energy Policy Act. This law gave plumbing fixture manufacturers less than two years to convert from the standard 3 1/2-gallon flush to the mandated 1.6-gallon flush toilet.

With such little time to reengineer, they modified existing products. The results left a lot to be desired. The modified units got a reputation of clogging and often requiring two or more flushes to clear the bowl. The 3 1/2 gallon flush toilets could still be purchased in Canada.

Most of today's 1.6-gallon toilets perform as well or better than the 3 1/2-gallon units they replace. Given the extra time, the fixture manufactures have been able to design units that are more efficient.

TANKS AND TRAPS

The first major change was in the trap. The trap is the part of the toilet that allows the waste to flow to the sewer but keep the sewage gasses from

entering the home. Using computer-aided modeling techniques, they developed a freer flowing trap that provided optimum flow with less clogs

while, of course, using less water. Next, using very old toilet

technology, tanks were redesigned to increase water flow velocity. Early Victorian toilets had the tank mounted several feet above the bowl, providing a more forceful flush. Modern bowl mounted tanks don't allow this extra head pressure. By designing tanks that hold 3 or more gallons of water, but only use the required 1.6 gallons, the weight of the additional water creates a more forceful flush.

A side advantage of these toilets is they tend to sweat less. Since not all the water in the tank empties, the room temperature water left in the tank tempers the incoming water.

OTHER OPTIONS

There are a wide variety of pressure-assisted toilets available for the residential market. Some work with a sealed air tank that creates a cushion of compressed air. This causes the flush water to have commerciallike pressure. Pressure-assisted units typically cost about \$150 more than conventional toilets and tend to be much noisier than typical gravity-fed units.

A California company (Microphor) is selling a toilet that flushes with only one-half gallon of water, using compressed air supplied from an air compressor

mounted in the basement or garage. Kohler has a powered toilet that uses a submersible electric pump to increase water flow. (This requires a GFIC outlet near the toilet.) Both supposedly work very well but the additional equipment can make them impractical for many installa-

In the past few years, American ingenuity has been able to comply with government regulations in the most crucial part of our plumbing system.

After my recent story on mudjacking, I received several e-mails.


Part of Andrea's and John's recent remodeling to their home involved changing the garage door from the rear of the garage to the front. The floor of the garage is sloped towards the door to allow water to flow out. Since the door is now the back wall, water is pooling against the wall. They wanted to know if mudjacking

could help their problem.

The answer is "Maybe." The floor would have to be separate from the foundation/ratwall. I suggest contacting a mudjacking contractor for this specific situation.

sturdy as a conventional fourlegged kitchen stool.

A large painting by contemporary, Michigan-born artist James Stephenson is on one wall.

Two commanding furnishings stand in the living room: an unusual Art Deco dresser by Italian designer Maurice Schellman, and a Chinese wedding armoire. The dresser, with detailed inlay work and tall, arching mirror, has served as a bar. The armoire holds a TV.

On the wall is an abstract painting of a chair. The work was given to Chisholm by her parents. Under it stands a small English chair from the late 1800s, with a double-circled back resembling that of the chair in the painting. Chisholm reupholstered it with a pattern of large, colorful flowers.

Next to the window is another vintage piece, a box-shaped sofa. Nearby is a little oval table that belonged to Chisholm's grandmother. Among the items on its classic marble top is a vase holding spherical "flowers" that Chisholm made by covering Styrofoam balls with mohair.

Chisholm made the arrangement for Orchestrations for

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the Home, a showcase of vignettes by local designers at Michigan Design Center earlier this year to benefit the Detroit Symphony Orchestra.

Other chairs in the room feature elegant legs and upholstery in floral needlepoint or tapestry designs.

ON THE SIDE

Chisholm's upstairs office contains part of the Donald Deskey set, a glass-fronted cabinet that holds books. It is between panels painted by Chisholm's sister.

On one side of the cabinet are her grandmother's vanity chairs from the 1920s, in the original striped covering. On the other side is a glass-topped table, featuring a retro-style lampshade in cream, pink and red.

A bedroom features a bed from the 1920s, its metal frame resembling pewter. A cloth-covered mannequin form that Chisholm got from Jacobson's stands near a painting of a ballerina.

The kitchen is dressed in white. The tiles on the countertop and backsplash have an original vintage feel. Chisholm placed a mirror at the sink to open up space.

This mirror, with etched designs at the top, and the small gold clock nearby, aren't the usual kitchen type; they add a vanity-like element to the area.

A home should be livable, Chisholm says. She describes her job as that of an interpreter.

"Some people can communicate their styles, and other people can't," she said. "What I try to do is have (clients) cut out pictures, thumb through magazines (to illustrate) what they like. I also ask what they don't like."

Mixing the familiar with the new can create something of your own. Chisholm lives with examples.

The Morrises also have flown the Marine Corps flag and a POW-MIA flag under the American flag on a large pole in front of their home.

Eric Phipps is commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars DeWolfe-Dreon Post 4037 in Troy. He's heartened to see the American flag fly from individual homes.

"It's not just a piece of cloth," said Phipps, a Marine Corps veteran of the Persian Gulf War. "It means something. No other country has a flag with so much history sewn into it."

The times between Memorial Day and Independence Day plus the Christmas holidays are especially active times for home flag purchasers, said Michele Prud'homme, manager of American Flag and Banner in Clawson.

"Every person has their own individual reason for buying," she said. "For me, it would be we all live in the U.S. and it's a matter of respect for country."

Porch kits with flag, staff and brackets start at about \$20, kits with a flag and 15-foot ground pole about \$110, Prud'homme said of her store.

FLAG ETIQUETTE

When displayed on the same pole, the American flag should always be higher than a state flag, municipal banner or other pennants. The American flag and the flag of another country should never be displayed on the same pole.

The American flag should be at the highest point and centered when clustered with state or municipal flags and other banners on separate poles. When clustered with flags of other countries, all flags should be at the same level and the American flag should be displayed on the extreme left as most frequently viewed. The American flag should be illuminated when displayed at

A tattered flag should be turned over to a veterans organization for proper disposal.

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

Be smart, simple in photography

s my photography stu-dents all know, I like to promote the idea of the KISS (keep it smartly simple) theory in my classes. (And no, it doesn't mean smoothing with the student next to you.) KISS means to be smart and to maintain a simplicity in your photographs.


A good writer, for example, doesn't clutter up his work with superfluous words. They get right to heart of the matter which makes their writing easier to understand. You'll also find a simplicity of style and content in many of the great paintings that we all enjoy.

Similarly with our photography, keeping things simple will often result in impact shots that will capture our attention.

One of the best ways to apply the KISS theory in photography is to simply move in close and express a single idea.

A close-up of a rusted latch on a weathered barn door can tell a lot about the barn as a whole. A well-executed intimate shot of a single bud will usually have more impact than a picture of an entire garden of

a flower-laden window ledge in a small French village? Such a picture can convey the feeling and charm of all of Europe. Even when photographing your pet, moving in close and keeping it simple can produce a terrific picture for you.

As in all good photography, watch your backgrounds. Simplifying your compositions also means simplifying the background. Look for backgrounds that are uncluttered or select a background that complements the subject.


Remember, a well done shot that utilizes the KISS theory and contains the essence of the whole will reward you with a photograph of which you'll be

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
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Dryer fires, forgotten pots can create dangers

ot summer days bring back memories of growing up in northern Canada.

It was a time of year when, as a young boy, I was taught the dangers of fire. I was never allowed to go into the wilderness for two or three days after a lightning storm. Lightning striking a forest causes what is called a "deep burn" and it may not surface or spread until the wind has died down.

Picture a scout making a fire without matches and blowing on the little chips of wood. Only when you stop blowing will you have the ignition you need.

A similar ignition can take place inside your dryer.

I spoke with Barry Novick who is a professional in the home construction industry. He had just finished an \$82,000 job for a family who had a clothes dryer fire in their home. This fire was caused by having plastic vent line hooked up to the dryer which is against the state construction code in Michigan. The fire was contained totally inside the dryer and did not spread to other areas of the room or house. It was classified as smoke damage because the fire

was inside the dryer drum. It's amazing how much damage can result from smoke alone. My friend had a similar problem two years ago when during dinner time a transformer failed the neighborhood. Everyone knew that the power would be off for several hours before repairs by the utility were completed. The

family went to bed after the 11 p.m. news and they completely forgot about the pot of beans that was cooking on top of the stove during the electrical outage. At 3 a.m., power was restored and the stove burner was still in the "On" position. The beans continued to cook until they were burnt and the pot reached such a high temperature that the handle of the pot and the knob on the lid slowly melted.

Just these 2 little components alone caused over \$16,000 in smoke damage in their home. When they awoke in the morning to the smell of smoke and came flying out of the bedroom, they considered themselves lucky to be alive.

These examples I have given you in this column should point out that these things happen constantly across America. If we go back to the day of invention for these products such as a kitchen range and a clothes dryer, can you imagine how many hundreds of thousands of fires have occurred in America's homes? The end result in many of these cases goes beyond just smoke damage and includes deaths and injuries. Think also of the billions of dollars paid out by the insurance industry

in most of these claims. The responsibility of all this should fall squarely on the shoulders of the manufacturers. But it

These guys are so busy designing appliances of the future which will start from your office telephone and yet they care too little about your safety. They are not afraid to jack up the product costs because they know how America loves to spend their money especially for new features and gadgets. Couldn't they include just a little extra safety feature such as a canister of chemical inside a clothes dryer drum which releases during a fire and extinguishes the flame? How about a simple circuit switch on a kitchen range which you have to reset anytime the power is killed to the stove?

Here is a sample of a new kind of phone call I've been getting lately. "Mr. Gagnon, my kitchen range came on without my touching anything on it. It just started to cook by itself and I couldn't shut it off. I had to go to the circuit breaker box and throw the switch. Thank God I was home or what would have happened?"

There is more coming on this subject, as I am not done. Stay tuned.





"I had a piece of 4-by-8-foot plywood that was already painted black," she said. "I took some old white enamel and painted it over the bottom half of the board.

"On the black (upper part) I drew the outline of flowers I decided to paint, then used

ers come alive. The flowers are orange tiger lilies, tuberous begonias in hot colors of red, yellow and orange, and some white for contrast.

A yellow butterfly flits above the flowers.

When I was finished with the painting, I set the board against the porta-john and now we have a lovely view with no part of the red showing," Marjorie said.

Live tulips, bleeding heart and blue forget-me-nots are growing in front of the painting. Many lilies will bloom soon. This makes the flowers in the painting look very real and gives it a three-dimensional effect.

A great variety of plants adorns the gardens that surround the home of Marjorie and her husband, Erwin.

Spring flowers such as Virginia blue bells, pink bleeding heart, yellow meadow rue, chartreuse lady's mantle, white anemone, rich violet-blue monkshood and other shade plants grow along with "lots of white trillium."

Hostas, low-growing blue tinged with red lungwort, primroses, ferns, blue scilla, astilbe, yellow trollius and other lovely flowers add much color and interest to the wellcared-for beds.

As the season progresses, a great number of Asiatic and Casa Blanca lilies add a formal note with their large white blooms. Oak leaf hydrangeas add another tall element to the gardens, and a soft orange azalea 'Mollis" brings in another color.

You can see Marjorie's work in the book Fired Magic, to be published this summer by Wayne State University Press. It is the story of a child discovering the beauty of Pewabic tile installations in the metropolitan Detroit area, such as Belle Isle Park, the Detroit Institute of Arts. Cranbrook Educational Community and the Detroit Zoo.

The book includes information about making tiles and other clay objects, and provides a glossary of ceramic items and a comprehensive list of Pewabic installations around the United States so that readers may discover the beauty for themselves.

It is written for students from age 8 and above; however, the book is enjoyable for art lovers of all ages.

Back to Marjorie's handling of the unsightly view she faced. Being an artist she had a perfect solution. But many of us aren't as talented, so we need to rely on other solutions.

There are many ways to "cover up" such eyesores in our own landscapes. One of these may work for you.

Build a fence. Fences come in many sizes and styles, so choose one that complements the "feel" of your garden (i.e., rustic for an informal look, something with classic lines for a formal design). A wall made of bricks or stone is a more permanent remedy.

Grow a vine on a trellis. Annual vines grow fast and can add drama to the garden. They're also easy to grow. You might try morning glories in colors of red, pink, white and blue; some are bicolored. Soak the seeds overnight before planting.

Their nighttime counterpart, moonflowers, have huge white trumpet blooms and are fragrant. At this time of year it's best to buy seedlings.

Scarlet runner beans are eye catchers. Keep the beans picked for continuous bloom. They can grow 10 to 15 feet in a few months.

Perennial vines won't have to be planted every year, so choose one carefully if you decide to use a perennial. Also, clematis grows quickly and will return each year.

Several evergreens make a dense border - although if they are all the same and a disease strikes, they could all be destroyed.

A better idea is to plant a variety of shrubs and evergreens. This would be a good opportunity to plant things that will feed and shelter birds and other wildlife.



There was a time when most salads consisted of a heap of iceberg lettuce and a wedge of tomato in exile off to the side of the dish. Today, these varied offerings of taste and vitamins have moved to the center of the plate.

Salads in summertime not only taste right, they make those skimpier clothes that go with the season fit a little less tightly (as long as you don't top these light plates of nutrient-packed greens and succulent fresh fruits with the wrong kind of dressings).

"The concept of a salad is a storehouse of nutrition, but not if we put dressing on it that is high in fat," said Dan Rowlson, instructor and registered dietitian at the Culinary Studies Institute of Oakland Community College.

MAKE YOUR OWN

Get the best tasting dressings that suit your preferences, by making your own. "It's a beautiful thing to make your own dressing from

scratch," he said. The idea that you have to mix the dressing the day before you plan to serve it is eliminated if you steep your herbs in vinegar - the same

way you steep tea in water. That releases the tastes

immediately. "The heat will reduce the oils from the herbs and spices and it's a vinaigrette that has a beautifully strong flavor with taste right now," Rowlson said. "Fresh herbs give you flavor that is much more mellow."

The salads themselves come in all kinds of varieties from multicolored greens salads to fruit, pasta and potato, Caesar salads and an endless assortment of choices once you start adding meats and fish to your

Simply explained, salads are anything that is served cold, explained Valerie Wilson, who teaches whole food and vegetarian cooking classes using organic ingredients in her

Garden City home.

Add pieces of grilled tuna to a beautifully laid bed of greens and you've got a hearty and impressive main dish.

More and more people are moving away from pasta salads toward the green salads, explained Karen Kierzkowski, Meal Solutions demonstration chef at Busch's Market Place with stores in Livonia, Farmington, Plymouth and nine other locations. Demonstrations are held at various times throughout the day at each store.

"I get more people who want a green salad compared to a pasta salad because they're watching their carbs," she said.

BE IMAGINATIVE

You know the (salad) bar has been raised when fast food restaurants add pizzazz to their salads with thick chunks of chicken, Mandarin oranges and a rich assortment of green

St. Clement is a gem in California's Napa Valley

ocated on the landmark Napa Valley estate, established in 1878 by San Francisco stained glass merchant Fritz Rosenbaum. St. Clement has both historic and vinous intrigue.

Rosenbaum created one of the earliest Napa Valley bonded wineries. For more than a century, several different labels were produced on the property.

The winery's rise to recognition began in 1975 when the St. Clement label was christened.

Today, the estate is a must stop on a trip to Napa Valley, for reflection on the grandeur of vesteryear, depicted by the Visitors Center located in the gothic Victorian Rosenbaum House, that has been fully restored. There, one also finds the home of a modern wine-

making facility where winemaker Aaron Pott is crafting some of the best kept wine secrets in the Napa Valley in one of the few remaining fullyrestored 19th century facilities.

STYLE STATEMENT

Acquired in 1999, St. Clement is the smallest of the wineries in the Beringer-Blass family of wineries, producing only 28,000 cases. A few years ago, Beringer

CEO Walter Klenz told us, "We view the St. Clement wines as a stylistic complement to what winemaker Ed Sbragia does at Beringer and to what Robert Brittain does at Stags' Leap Winery. St. Clement wines come off slightly more elegant and accessible earlier, while the Beringer Reserve wines have a very distinct Ed Sbragia style. And that's the point, we do not want all California wines from our various properties to taste like Beringer Vineyards."

This statement from his boss sits well with winemaker Pott who, with a University of California-Davis degree in oenology and work experience at both Robert Mondavi Winery and Newton Vineyards, jumped on the chance to work in France with his mentor, the renowned winemaking consultant Michel Rolland. After returning from France,

Pott became imports winemaker for Beringer and used his expertise to craft wines from Europe and South America.

IMPORTANT VINEYARDS

For more than a decade, Abbotts Vineyard in the cool Carneros growing region has consistently proven to be an excellent source of chardonnay for St. Clement. For the 2000 St. Clement Abbotts Vineyard Chardonnay (\$22), Pott employed classic Burgundian winemaking techniques, including barrel fermenting and aging on the lees in 100 percent

French oak, one half of which was new, for nine months.

Designed to accompany food, this chardonnay, made from a section of Abbotts with 35-yearold vines, has a broader profile than the typical lemon-lime notes found in many Carneros chardonnays. Nutty characters complement mineral notes in this mouthfilling and delicious wine.

Beginning with the release of the 2002 St. Clement Sauvignon Blanc, this wine will be a tasting room only sales item. Right now, the 2001 Sauvignon Blanc is available and a flavor delight at \$14.

If you read this column regularly, you know we're seldom jazzed by California merlots. But we are by the 2000 St. Clement Napa

and red lettuces. It doesn't take much effort to make your salads look and taste extraordinary at home, too.

In fact, there are so many different possibilities when it comes to salads, Kierzkowski said, that your imagination sets the limits.

"I always try to give customers ideas for delicious, nutritious but quick and easy salads," Kierzkowski said. "People are eating healthier and lighter. I probably do salads four out of five days I do my demos."

There's nothing wrong with using salad in a bag as a base and adding a few ingredients

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to make it special, she added. The everyday cole slaw, for instance, can be brought up a couple of pegs by making broccoli slaw, which is also known as rainbow slaw. Broccoli slaw's shredded broccoli and carrots have a high nutritional value, pack a big crunch and a lot of people think it tastes better than the traditional cole slaw made with cabbage, she

Mix the broccoli slaw with spinach and a nice vinaigrette.

Adding blanched green beans or asparagus, sliced almonds or dried fruit on top of any salad is quick and adds variety, Kierzkowski said.

Sometimes she uses spinach and field greens. Don't be afraid to add cubed meat to the dish, she said.

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"Go ahead," she said. "I try to load them up with nutritional stuff - nuts and seeds, mango salsa and fruit salsa."

Kierzkowski also steers customers toward healthier choices - like pasta salads with a vinaigrette dressing instead of a mayonnaise.

"I try to put different things in so people will try different things," Kierzkowski said. "With iceberg lettuce you might as well drink a glass of

The darker the green is in the vegetable, the more vitamins and nutrients it has.

"A lot of people like to put in a little spinach or dandelion greens," Wilson said.

Cleaning the greens properly is also essential, Rowlson said, explaining that cold water is best for washing.

There's nothing worse than dirt in a salad, he added.

"I love a salad spinner," he said. "You get all the water off of it and you have a nice dry salad. There's a crispiness to the greens and they hold so much better."

A FLORAL ARRANGEMENT

Rowlson said he builds salads like a florist would design an arrangement of flowers.

"Take two leaves as a backdrop to set your greens on," he said. "It really makes a statement. There's movement to it. Some things are fanned, some are sprinkled and some are architectural and everything is bite size, so there's ease in eating and there's set colors.'

Nuts and seeds provide good quality fat and they've got that

crunchy texture that a lot of people like, Wilson said.

Some of Wilson's favorite salads are tabbouli made with quinoa, which is a small grain that's packed with protein. Other top picks, she said, are garlic kidney bean salad and colorful vegetable salad with zucchini, yellow squash and radishes seasoned with fresh basil. She also likes using sautéed or broiled portabella mushrooms in her salads.

Try adding walnuts and pecans that are high in essential fatty acids, Wilson said.

"The main question I get is How do you make it flavorful?" she said. "It takes practice. You have to know your seasonings, so your end product is flavorful.

"You probably wouldn't want to add too many things of the same taste. You start with leafy greens that are bitter, so you probably wouldn't want to put anymore bitter tasting things

Add sweetness with vegetables like cucumbers and a pungent flavor with onions.

There's a mixture of flavors instead of a salad being all one flavor - that would be boring," Wilson said.

Key to consider when you're building salads, said Rowlson, is to use seasonal and regional products for freshness, better taste and the most nutrients at the best prices.

Using fresh rather than processed foods offer lower sodium and higher potassium levels, he said, adding that studies show eating a diet high in potassium reduces the risk of high blood pressure.

"By using things that have no processing in them you'll get higher vitamins and higher minerals that will lead to more health advantages," Rowlson said. "That's not just for salads, but for everything."

Chicken Caesar salads have been popular for years. But. family chefs are finding they can combine a lot of different fish and meats to their lettuces and other vegetable mixes, he added.

BASIL-BALSAMIC DRESSING

2 red onions 2 yellow peppers 10 plum tomatoes 3 cucumbers

6 Portabella mushrooms 1 pound asparagus or broccoli 2 bags spinach, 10 ounces each 1-2 heads red tipped leaf lettuce 1 ounce Parmesan cheese, grat-

1 bunch green onions, thinly

Place onions with skin on in a baking sheet and bake in a 400ºF oven until tender (a fork can pierce to the center). Let cool, skin, cut in half and thinly julienne and segment. Set aside.

Roast yellow peppers over a burner until skin blackens all over. Remove, place peppers in a blastic bag to cool, then remove skin, cut in half, remove top and seeds. Julienne peppers.

Blanch plum tomatoes in boiling water 25-30 seconds, shock in ice water, remove skin, cut into 6-8 wedges each. Set aside.

Peel cucumbers, cut in half, remove seeds. Cut into half again, thinly slice on a diagonal.

Wash mushrooms well, drain. toss with /2 cup dressing. Broil, cook, quarter, slice into a fan.

Remove tough ends from asparagus or broccoli, peel the bottom 2 inches, blanch and

minutes. To Serve: Top greens with 1/4 cup (approximate) of marinated vegetables, sprinkle with parmesan cheese (1 teaspoon), parsley (1/2 teaspoon), and a few slices of green onion.



Swallow pride to save deal

We are in the process of selling our home and have entered nto a purchase agreement whereby the purchaser has the right to an inspection of the oremises as well as radon esting.

the inspection resulted in us having to commit as sellers to fix the roof, well pressure tank, and pay for some of the purchaser's closing costs. Now the purchaser wants us to install a radon reduction system which will cost us \$700 more.

We don't believe the radon reduction system is reasonable since the test that was conducted would not yield 100 percent accuracy, but we hate to lose the deal. What are your thoughts?

It would appear that this all boils down to a matter of dollars and cents in terms of how much you are willing to pay in order to save the deal.

Whether or not the radon

reduction system is necessary is not the issue since the buyer is apparently demanding it as a condition preceding to the purchase.

The other items which you have agreed to fix would be necessary to fix, in any event, should you wish to sell the property and now that you are on notice of these defects, they should be fixed.

The radon reduction system is more of a nebulous issue, but if it comes up again and your sale is dependent upon it, you may be well advised to swallow your pride and hit your pocketbook for the cost of the system.

Buyers today look for larger master bedrooms, preferably suites, says Lana Byrne, affiliated with Century 21 Premier in Canton.

Buyers want bigger rooms, more privacy

Dagwood and Blondie probably wouldn't recognize the place. Nor would Ozzie and Harriet. And Donna Reed, high heels and all, would be hanging her curtains in different kinds of rooms.

And father most likely would know best that today's typical American home isn't like the house he used to live in.

The "average" house used to include a living room, dining room or area, serviceable kitchen, three minimally functional bedrooms, a bathroom, maybe also a half-bath, maybe a utilitarian basement, maybe a garage. You know, the house where millions of Americans grew up for most of the 20th century.

If you ask Lana Byrne about the changes she's seen in American homes over her 23 years of selling them, she'll start with the master bedroom.

"The master suite is much larger now," said Byrne, an associate broker with Century 21 Premier in Canton. "They have a larger bath – or two – and larger closet space.

"That's one of the big things that's changed in houses. We have more clothing. It used to be that everybody had a suit and a coat and a pair of shoes," she said.

INNOVATIONS

Byrne thinks that new construction during the 1980s - houses which now are in the used-home market – brought innovations that further changed the concept of the family home.

Along with the family rooms popularized in the 1960s, "we started seeing jetted tubs and showers in new construction, which motivated some homeowners into adding on a master bedroom over the attached garage if they didn't want to move," she said.

"In some of our traditional three-bedroom homes of the '50s, people would knock out a wall, making it a two-bedroom and giving them room for a king-size bed."

A major change she's seen in family life, Byrne said, is the privacy issue. "People started demanding to not share a bathroom. When I grew up everybody shared one."

A first-floor laundry – sometimes even a second-floor laundry – Byrne said, became a requirement, not just a convenience.

She said she speaks from experience as mother of three and stepmother of three – "six kids between 13 and 20, including four teenage girls, each with her own curling iron."

In addition to curling irons, Byrne said, there's all that other stuff that gets plugged in. With technology comes the need for places where it gets used.

"The TV, the stereo – you had to have places where those things could go – separate

from a reading area or a piano area," she said. "Now it's changing again because we need places for computers. The living room is changing. Kids take online courses and need to have the Internet. My home is networked with four

computers throughout.

"Homes had been designed in fundamental compartments and we accommodated ourselves to them," Byrne said.

"Now we require the building to accommodate us."

And even if it seems that today's Americans spend less time cooking at home than previous generations did, "we want larger kitchens with built-in grills and other appliances – a large area with an island and bar stools," she said.

Meanwhile, outside the house, Byrne said, the one-car garage is passé, two is acceptable, three or more is desirable.

WORKING AT HOME

"People are looking for space for a home-based business," said Michelle Phaup, a sales associate with Clarkston

Realty, Clarkston.

They need a library or a den for that purpose, she said, speaking of the house-hunters she works with these days.

When she started selling 17 years ago, she said, these people couldn't have imagined they'd be working out of their

houses, full or part time.

"Kids no longer want to share bedrooms," she added. "Teens want their own bathrooms.

We're seeing more Jack-and-Jill baths between two bedrooms, sometimes sectioned off so someone can shower while someone else is using the sink.

"And families are looking for separate play areas for kids, maybe a playroom or living room on the second floor," Phaup said.

In his 32 years of selling, John Hannett has seen that buyers often have to choose between "the traditional, charming house and the newer one" with all the updated features.

Hannett, broker/owner,
Hannett, Wilson &
Whitehouse, Birmingham, said
he knows that "older houses
didn't have the extravagant
master suites and kitchens" and
the absence of such elements
can affect used home sales.

And in Westland, Mike Mangold, sales associate with Real Estate One, said he finds "everyone wants bigger."

While the standard house in his area is about 900 square feet, he said, his buyers seem to prefer 1,500 to 2,000. "They want bigger bedrooms, bigger kitchens. The family room has become the living room, and with the kitchen, it's the heart of the house. There are fewer formal areas. More space is needed for TV's and computers."

But reality still controls the choice, Mangold said, and features are sacrificed because of cost.

Well, Blondie might understand that.

Rates reflect Fed's cut

ippee. The Federal
Reserve Bank dropped
interest rates yet another
percent last week for the
13th time in a couple years,
and that's supposed to be
great news for mortgage interest rates. Right? Not always.

People often ask, "Why do mortgage interest rates sometimes rise when Mr. Greenspan cuts rates?" After all, doesn't "The Fed" call the shots on where mortgage rates are going? The answer: Not exactly.

The Federal Reserve Bank does not loan money directly to you. It loans its money to lending institutions who, in turn, loan that money to you. That "wholesale" money is loaned to major banks at a deeply discounted rate called the Federal Funds Rate. When Greenspan "cuts interest rates," he is actually discounting the money that's available for member banks of the Federal Reserve. He is not cutting mortgage rates. Mortgage lenders determine mortgage interest rates

Mortgage lenders mark up the Fed money by a small percent, then loan it to you while keeping a margin as their profit. They price each loan based on several factors including the length of the mortgage, the terms of the note, and the sum of the mortgage's risk factors, to name just a few. To remain competitive, they must select rates that will be profitable while slightly undercutting other lenders. This often calls for a speculation. They sometimes guess wrong.

Two weeks ago, many lenders reduced their mortgage interest rates in anticipation of a Federal Funds Rate decrease of 1/2 percent. They did not wait for Greenspan to announce the change. Instead, they made their interest rate decisions fully expecting the larger reduction. When the decrease was not as large as they hoped it would be, they had to readjust interest rates slightly upward to compensate. What you, the consumer, saw was the Federal Reserve announcing a rate cut and mortgage interest rates rise slightly.

Fixed-rate mortgages move up a bit

(AP) – Rates on 30-year and 15-year mortgages rose slightly last week, but still hovered near record lows. Rates on one-year-adjustable mortgages, meanwhile, dropped to the lowest level ever.

The average rate on a 30-year fixed-rate mortgage for the week ending June 27 was 5.24 percent, up slightly from 5.21 percent, Freddie Mac, the mortgage giant, reported in its weekly nationwide survey.

Rates on 30-year mortgages

had fallen to a new low of 5.21 percent the week ending June 13 and stayed there a week after that.

The rate of 5.21 percent was the lowest since Freddie Mac began tracking 30-year mortgages in 1971. Records that reach back earlier indicate that the rate is the lowest in more than four decades, economists said. For 15-year fixed-rate mortgages, a popular option for refinancing, rates inched up to 4.63 percent last week from 4.62 percent.

Rates for one-year adjustable mortgages declined to a new low of 3.45 percent last week, surpassing the previous low of 3.51 percent set the week ending June 20. Freddie Mac's records on one-year ARMs go back to 1984.

Low mortgage rates are keeping the housing market healthy. And they're feeding a home-mortgage refinancing boom, something that is helping to support spending by consumers, a key force keeping the economy going.

Refinancing activity has accounted for about three of four mortgage loan applications filed in recent months, the Mortgage Bankers Association of America reported.

Mortgage rates reported by Freddie Mac don't include add-on fees known as points. A point is 1 percent of the loan amount. Each loan type carried an average fee of 0.6 point last week.

The family moved to Lansing June 13 from their home in the Detroit-area community of Northville, which was a roughly 70mile commute for the gov-

So far, things are going smoothly, said Granholm's husband, Daniel Mulhern.

"We're glad to have moved - better for all of us," Mulhern said. "It was a long time anticipating a difficult move."

Granholm's commute is now just a few miles. Mulhern has found a running route, and the couple's two daughters are perfecting their game at basket-ball camp at Michigan State University.

Daughters Kathryn, 13, and Cecelia, 12, even won the "hustle" award at camp the first day, Mulhern said. The couple also have a son, Jack, 5.

"They're meeting new people. They're meeting new friends," Mulhern said.

"We told them that we'll work some things out to get back to Northville and for their friends to come visit in Lansing," he said. "We're trying to allow them

for all of us. Everyone can see her a little longer in the morning and little bit earlier at night," Mulhern said.

But some of the family's belongings may have to stay in boxes a little bit longer, as renovations to the house are set to get under way before the end of this month.

The residence will get an addition and undergo a number of renovations in the next few months to better accommodate the family. All the work will be paid for with private funds donated to the Governor's Residence Foundation, a private nonprofit organiza-

The 6,800-square foot residence is in desperate need of repairs, foundation chairwoman Debbie Dingell has said.

The roof leaks in several places, the electrical wiring isn't up to code and the

plumbing is outdated.

The three-bedroom home will get two new bedrooms and a private family room in the addition.

Manufactured homes make a comeback

anufactured homes - a far evolution from the old-style single "trailers" customarily sought out by low-income singles and families - have attracted the upscale and middle class.

Manufactured home communities or mobile home parks, no

longer called trailer parks, have developed into a multi-billion dollar industry in Michigan. Newer homes produced by the manufactured housing industry are

sound, solid homes. These newer homes aren't only installed in these parks, but also in communities all over the state.

Manufactured home quality is top rate - the homes are built in factory warehouses, using the same state and federal uniform building codes, without exposing the building materials to the outside weather, so there is less chance of warping, mold and other building pitfalls.

These homes are far less expensive than traditional homes: a three-bedroom, 2-1/2-bath, 2,000square foot manufactured home starts pricing at about \$40,000. Manufactured homes include carpet, flooring and most kitchen appliances. There is a variety of floor plans and features - the selections are awesome.

The land choices for manufactured homes can be a bit overwhelming. Forty-five percent of manufactured homes are placed in park communities - you lease a lot from a community. The other 55 percent are installed on private land, adding a basement or garage.

In Michigan, manufactured home regulation falls under the jurisdiction of the Mobile Home Commission, a state commission formed to regulate the various aspects of the sale, installation and business practices of broker/dealers, retailers, installers and park communities.

The commission regulations, formed under Public Act 96, follow the basic uniform construction codes and incorporate other federal and state laws, acts and statutes

related to the industry. A state-produced booklet, The

Manufactured Home Buyer's and Resident's Handbook, is a guide to the specifics of buying a manufactured home and leasing land in a park. All retailers and communities are required to give this booklet to prospective buyers.

All manufactured communities built in Michigan must meet or exceed the standard building codes, the same as residential communities, apartment or condominium complexes, with plans, blueprints, inspections and approvals specific to state codes and the cities and municipalities where they are built.

Retailers, brokers and dealers must have a license to sell, installers and services must have a license to install and service. Communities must have a license to operate, as do utility installers.

Many low-income singles and families can afford to buy a manufactured home for a price within a budget and lease a lot in a park. With the usual government regulatory processes, there are glitches in the system, and due to lack of produceable tax income from the lower priced homes and rentals, the systems put in place for these communities don't get the same regulatory checks and balances as a \$200,000 per home condominium complex.

Actually, condominium regulations were included in the same statutes and class as mobile or manufactured homes, until those homeowners formed associations and coalitions to enforce laws, and lobby for better laws that give them the same rights and protections as "regular homeowners."

Most of the manufactured home and community standards fall under the local jurisdiction, as regulated by the Mobile Home Commission and PA 96. Unfortunately, most local building departments don't know or realize that they have jurisdiction.

Most city service departments, when asked, will state emphatically that a manufactured home park is private property, and they aren't allowed to respond to complaints

from residents; they refer everyone to the Mobile Home Commission.

Most local jurisdictions have the responsibility to issue the utility and occupancy permits for all home and building construction - the same standards that apply to manufactured home installation and occupancy standards.

Some local service departments balk and ignore complainants when presented with the commission's documentation that they have jurisdiction.

The sale and resale of manufactured homes is poorly regulated as are the communities and practices. Homeowners find that banks and finance companies are willing to finance new homes, yet refuse to refinance at standard industry rates or not at all. Homeowners' insurance policies are priced higher than other sectors. Manufactured homes, unlike the old-style "trailers" of the past, are still regulated and titled by the Secretary of State Motor Vehicle Division, not registered as regular

If a manufactured home is placed on private land, finance options are plentiful, the home appreciates in value, as does the land. The same home placed in a leased community has few options, only a few finance companies fund leased land purchases and the homes depreciate.

The Mobile Home Commission has a complaint process. Each year hundreds of consumers file complaints against retailers, installers, services and communities for breaches in the system. Most complaints take months to get response and resolution.

Michigan state and local agencies need to reassess and refocus on servicing the communities' needs. New laws might make things better, but enforcement of the existing laws is a given. The retailers, installers and community owners and managers need to clean up and revisit the integrity of their business practices and follow the laws.

2003 TOYOTA 4RUNNER


It's a simple but telling thing: I love the clearly labeled, easy-to-use climate controls in the 2003 Toyota 4Runner. When an auto maker can get the simple things so right, it's a good sign that the rest of the vehicle is just as well thought out.

That's certainly the case with the 4Runner, which with this year's model now is in its fourth generation as Toyota's workhorse truck-based SUV. This new model is bigger, wider, longer and stronger than its predecessors, and in the \$40,000 Limited version that I drove, 4Runner offers a wide range of utility that makes it ideal for a single-SUV household.

The 4Runner's appeal begins with its redesigned exterior, which is both stylish as well as obviously functional, with a hint of the up-class styling that Toyota uses so well in its line of Lexus luxury SUVs; in fact, 4Runner shares its basic design with the new GX470 from Lexus. The all-new chassis design of 4Runner features a wide, rounded front end with a thick-barred horizontal grille that is complemented with a front bumper and skid plate and wide head lamps. In back, large tail lamps complete the look.

For 2003, 4Runner gained 4.5 inches in its wheelbase, 5.7 inches in its body length, and 200 pounds. But not surprising for Toyota, its engineers have found a way for 4Runner to seem to haul the extra load effortlessly. The 4.7 liter, dual-overhead-cam, V8 Force engine that powers the Limited, along with the automatic five-speed transmission, gave me easy acceleration and cruising power in that remarkable Toyota way that, unfortunately, is too easy to take for granted.

While the ride isn't as smooth as, say, in the Lexus line, 4Runner handled small bumps and significant potholes in stride and not nearly as much in the jostling, "aftershock" manner of many of its truckbased counterparts. I imagine the ride is a tad better in

the Toyota Highlander, the much newer car-based SUV that appeals to a similar market as 4Runner. Mileage for the four-wheel-drive Limited is a creditable 15 in the city and 19 on the highway.

The new 4Runner also sports extensive safety technology, with four-channel anti-lock brakes and helpful technology known as brake assist and electronic brakeforce distribution all standard, resulting in dependable, quick and even stopping.. Vehicle skid control and traction control also are in place on all models, along with advanced air bag and belt-restraint systems. The side air bags on the 2003 models are a first for 4Runner. There's even a new set of two convex mirrors on the rear pillars near the top which, when viewed through the rear-view mirror, give the driver a great view of what's behind the vehicle in the blind spot.

It's evident in how the ample cargo space is arranged that Toyota hasn't forgotten that 4Runner which has been around in some form since the mid-Eighties - still has substantial appeal as a "working" SUV. For one thing, Toyota designers didn't cut rear cargo space by angling off the hatch. The split-rear seat folds without the head rests having to be removed. And they've included plenty of handy tie-downs, nets and cubby holes.

My favorite nifty cargo innovation is a double-deck

cargo shelf, standard on Limited and available on other models, that unfolds from the floor with varioussized compartments. It has a weight capacity of 66 pounds. When I didn't need the shelf, it easily folded flat with the floor.

The Limited, of course, offers a variety of luxury touches including leather upholstery, heated power seating, rear radio controls with wireless headphones, a universal garage-door opener and more. But I didn't like the gray trim that we had with our Pacific Blue Metallic exterior.

And the things I liked best about the interior of 4Runner are common to the whole line. One of them was the inclusion of many various-sized compartments in the center console plus a huge, and very flexible, drink-holding compartment.

Then, of course, there were the controls for the dual-zone climate control. A simple control for "fan" was on the far left, "temperature" in the middle and "zone" on the far right. It's amazing how much more complex - and confusing - that most other vehicles can make climate controls. Yet 4Runner was plenty comfortable, and it was easy for me to figure out how to make it so.

All of which helps make 4Runner an easy purchase
