

Survey rates schools

Schoolcraft, schools make the grade

Plymouth-Canton Schools could raise additional revenues for a cashstarved budget by charging students for enhanced educational opportuni-

And, Schoolcraft College in Livonia gives as good an education as many four-year universities.

Those are some of the results from a survey conducted by Plymouth-Canton Community Schools (PCCS) and Schoolcraft College. The 380 registered voters who completed the telephone survey live within the boundaries of both educational institutions.

When questioned about alternative approaches to raising new revenue sources for Plymouth-Canton Schools, 78 percent suggested charging for after-school tutoring in special subjects; with 77 percent suggesting initiation of a fee for talented

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



While Summit Gourmet is the Summit's official caterer, the chefs don't limit themselves. With Thanksgiving only a few days away and the holiday season already in swing, they are up to their recipes in all kinds of functions, even dinners in homes, for as few as eight to as many as 1,000. Then there are those days when they are preparing meals for seven or eight functions.

"If they have a special dish, we'll do it," Chef Paul said.
Sit down or buffet, or omelette stations – you name it. Hospitals, one of the Summit Gourmet's consistent customers, are fond of the food stations. Ethnic meals?
Anytime. "We have done Indian meals. People have come in and shown us how it's done," Chef Ruby said.

Of course, it's the season for turkey dinners, but plenty of people are stepping outside of tradition. And that goes for holiday events, as well.


Michigan chicken is a favorite. It's a chicken breast stuffed with wild rice, pecans, dried cherries and chevre cheese. Filling the plate are steamed vegetables, potatoes and a raspberry melba sauce.

Another favorite is marsala chicken accompanied by potatoes, sliced, steamed in chicken juice and onion, followed by a dusting of parmesan cheese. It's then baked until golden

Where do they get their ideas? "We take ideas and we add our own touches to it," said Chef Ruby, who received his culinary training in the Armed Services and later at Ford Motor Co. food services.

The chefs developed
Michigan chicken by trying
and doing. "We added our own
basic ingredients until we liked
it," said Chef Paul, who trained
on the job and by being a third
generation Roma family of
Roma Hall fame. "I learned
from my grandmother."

The chefs use guinea pigs – not literally. But thankfully, there's plenty around the cor-

ner. "We use the Summit staff," Chef Paul said.

Most dinners or luncheons feature chicken. Price-wise, it's the best. And most people can and will eat it. "Beef is getting expensive. People stay away from it unless it is totally cooked," Chef Ruby said.

Fish is not uncommon anymore. An upcoming dinner catered by Summit Gourmet will feature salmon – 116 plates of salmon.

One of the chefs' trademarks is a colorful orchid placed just so on the plate. "Anything you put on a plate has to be edible. It's a board of health rule. The

ordids are organically grown.

Don't wait for New Year's to be healthy, active and wise

Think of the holidays and most people likely think of food. New Year's follows and most people are planning their next diet. But there is an easier

"Look at the menu. Go for what is baked or grilled, not fried," said Sarah Benninghoff, an intern at the Summit, who is studying sports medicine and exercise science at Eastern

Michigan University.

The holidays do not have to be a time for pigging out and inactivity. "Moving around is the lear" Benningh off said

the key," Benninghoff said.
Easier said than done? No.
Go for a walk. Find an activity
for the family. Eating and then
sitting into a comfy couch for
the evening won't do it. "People
stop exercising at the holidays.
You can go online and fine different ways of exercising. "Get
up more and move around,"

she said.
And then there's eating.
Benninghoff has lots of tips for avoiding overeating. You just have to follow them:

■ Drink water - plenty of it - instead of pop. Add lemon for taste.

Split a dessert with some-

■ Eat fruit - for the sweet tooth - instead of a dessert.

■ Watch the size of serving. Don't bigsize what you order in a restaurant. Ask for a take out box as soon as you are served. That way you know your quantity is limited.

Cook and use whole wheat flour instead of the regular

white flour.

Fruits and vegetables - eat them.

Drink fruit juices.

■ Order salad dressings on the side and dip. You will use less.

Mayoria Avoid butter and mayornaise. Use mustard. At home you can use butter in spray or pump that is for flavor - not quantity.

Remember that fats have a way of, well, making you fat. "You do need fats in your diet," Benninghoff said, but they can add up fast. "Think about eating a spoon of lard. That's really what fats are."

Teach yourself how to read nutrition labels on packaging. "Look at how many calories from fats. Grams and calories

are not the same thing."

Nothing has changed from when you mom told you that breakfast was the most important meal of the day. It still is. "Your brain needs glucose to

Above all, watch what you eat, how much you eat and move that body.

"Everything in moderation," Benninghoff added.

students to attend summer school.

Among other choices, 62 percent suggested charging a fee for on line courses; 58 percent favored creating magnate schools, such as an arts academy, that might draw out-ofdistrict and private school students; with 45 percent in favor of increasing fees for all sports and extra-curricular activities.

Suggestions as to where Plymouth-Canton could make budget cuts, respondents proposed extra-curricular activities, administration positions and salaries.

According to the survey, the community perception of Plymouth-Canton Schools is very favorable. Results indicate 34 percent of respondents perceive PCCS as an excellent district, while another 53 percent give the district a good rating. High marks were given to all the programs, including preschool, K-12 and community

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Most perceptions of the Park Plymouth, Canton and Salem high schools - were high. The areas rated the highest were music and art programs; sports; clubs; overall academic reputation; and the opportunity for parent/community involvement.

"I think the information on the Park validated the community's idea that good things are happening out there," said Superintendent Jim Ryan. "They value athletics, the marching band, the fine arts


"We want what the community wants: A good quality of life with a really good school district to support and protect their tax investments," said

and extra-curricular activities.

Meanwhile, survey respondents rated the quality of education at Schoolcraft College very high.

Nearly 81 percent said the quality of education at Schoolcraft is the same or better than at a four-year university. And, compared to other community colleges, Schoolcraft was seen as better (40 percent) or the same (42 percent) in quality education.

Concerning community perception, 41 percent rated Schoolcraft as excellent in pro-



viding educational services, with another 53 percent noting

the college does a good job. The study did show that residents have only a general idea about the cost of a college education. Denise Sigworth, dean of instruction at Schoolcraft, said that's one area the two-

year college needs to addres.

'We need to do a better jo of helping the community understand the support the give - through the local tax base, state monies and tuition and fees - to make community college costs affordable," said Sigworth. "And, that in these

economic times, a community college is a viable option to sending a child to a four-year college for \$60,000.

"Students can attend fulltime at Schoolcraft for about \$2,000 a year, with classes taught by master level teachers, or the equivalent; with the average class size at 22," she said. "It's small classes with qualified faculty at affordable

Among the most notable conclusions in the study, a mix in confidence that high school graduates are prepared to take college level courses. Survey respondents said high school graduates were well prepared (24 percent) or prepared (44 percent) for college level courses.

However, another 20 percent viewed high school graduates as not being ready for secondary education.

generalized area than his work with the utilities authority.

"Before working for WTUA I was assistant director of public works for the city of Windsor," he said. "The driving force that caused me to want to come over to Canton is that I've worked with a number of their staff over the past seven years. They know their work and that's the kind of staff I want to come in and lead."

In addition to his job, Faas has worked as a private consulting engineer, designing

municipal services for residential and industrial subdivision projects and has conducted computer modeling of storm water control systems.

"My father founded a family business in residential construction in 1952 that our family was very proud to be a part of," he said. "That's where I got my real work experience."

Faas has an engineering degree from the University of Windsor and a diploma in construction engineering from St. Clair College of Applied Arts and Technology in Windsor. He's a graduate of Leadership Canton and a licensed professional civil engineer in Ontario.

Faas said outside of work his passion in life is cycling.

"We've traveled as far as France to go riding," he said. "But generally we just ride around Oakland County."

He's a certified cycling coach and a certified spinning instructor. Spinning, he says, is the latest form of an indoor exercise craze.

the restaurant will be closed to the public, Ellsworth, his managers and about 40 staff members will be serving Thanksgiving dinner to 250 people, ranging from battered women to the homeless.

"I called United Way and asked for the names of local organizations that might be interested," he said. "We have 250 spots here in the restaurant, so I contacted the local organizations and asked how many people they'd like to send."

The dinner - turkey, mashed potatoes, gravy, stuffing, the works - will be prepared by the Friday's staff and served between 11 a.m. and 2

p.m. Thanksgiving Day. All staff members, including Ellsworth and other managers, are donating their time. For that matter, they're donating most of the food.

'We've bought 10 turkeys and other things so far," he said. "So far we've chipped in over \$200."

Baker's Square, which is in the north end of the same

shopping center, is donating 25 pies for the occasion.

Ellsworth said so far as he knew no other Friday's restau-

rant is doing anything similar. "This is just a fun project for us," he said. "Next year I hope we can serve 300-400

people."

For Ellsworth, who commutes from Owosso to his Canton restaurant, it will be a family activity. His wife, Debbie, a floral manager for a Troy firm, and daughter, Stephanie, 15, will also be helping out.

Friday's opened its Canton location on Dec. 22 last year.

relatively benign. Gibson said he would enter a business he had hacked into and tell them they had holes in their system that they might want to fix.

But a Lowe's store in Southfield was not so lucky

Gibson, along with Canton Police Sgt. Chuck Raycraft, talked to the business people

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looking out for in the approaching holiday season.

Many Internet crimes, Gibson said, are committed by people using their computers at work. And computer fraud is one of the fastest growing crimes, he said.

Raycraft said burglaries in Canton increased rather dramatically last November and December in what he called a "typical holiday crime spree."

He cited the case of one man who was arrested after a series of incidents in which purses were stolen from vehicles at day care centers while mothers were dropping their children

"He'd take credit cards, go to

a gas station and put some gas in his car to see if the card was good, then go to stores and make purchases before the card could be reported stolen," Raycraft.

The man's arrest cleared up nine such cases in Canton. In another theft spree, a

man was arrested after a series of thefts from cars in the Lifetime Fitness Center parking lot.

They all started around the holidays," Raycraft said. "It wasn't that Canton had a increase in crime particularly. It was just a lot of crimes being committed by a few people."

He said the number of burglaries in Canton doubled last December.

His warnings to shoppers were the usual holiday cau-

"Don't carry a lot of cash with you and keep purchases in the trunk and out of sight,"

But with a steady increase in the crime of identify theft, he had another warning.

"Buy shredders and shred all your documents," he said. Watch what you put out in your trash, even businesses. Guys jump into Dumpsters and get credit card numbers and other personal information."

He also warned business to buy good surveillance cameras to keep track of possible criminal activity.

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

🏿 ears ago, I was doing some research at the John F. Kennedy Library in Boston, and I asked to see Dave Powers, the president's friend, a working-class Irishman who had been sort of the court jester of the New

Frontier. "You're from Detroit?" he said, eyes twinkling merrily. "I love Detroit. A great thing happened to me there. We

were campaigning in Cadillac Square on Labor Day and I broke my watch." Puzzled, I asked why in the world breaking his watch during the madness of a campaign rally was a great

That's exactly what Powers, then sort of a ceremonial curator of the magnificent library, was waiting for. "Because Jack Kennedy took his off and gave it to me!" he said triumphantly. That was a legendary day state Democrats still talk about. John Kelly, for many years a state senator, perched on his father's shoulder that day, his 11th birthday, and briefly grasped the senator's hand. Thousands saw him, at rallies across the state.

Mary Ann Watson, a professor of telecommunications at Eastern Michigan University, was a little girl of 4 when the candidate's car whizzed by and she saw him, as she imagined, looking straight at her. She grew up to become the nation's leading academic expert on television in the Kennedy era.

Last week, as television flooded the airwaves with specials, and younger Americans struggled to figure out what the fuss was all about, those who knew remembered. Michigan played a small, but significant, part in sealing Kennedy's victory.

On Election Day, it was those same Detroiters who gave John F. Kennedy the margin he needed to carry the state by a whisker in one of the nation's closest elections. Some say it was Millie Jeffrey who did it, the tiny dynamo of a labor organizer who ran JFK's campaign in the state.

"I met him at a dinner in Grand Rapids in 1958, and was instantly taken with his charm, his ideas, his freshness," Jeffrey, now 91, remembers.

But labor and civil rights groups were suspicious. Jeffrey, the highest-ranking woman in the United Auto Workers union, chaired his campaign, made him acceptable to the Democratic Party's base, rallied and fired up

When Michigan, after seesawing all night, finally went to JFK at 6 a.m. the next morning, tne Secret Service took that as its cue to mov in and protect the president-elect. (In those long-ago and supposedly gentler times, mere candidates didn't get Secret Service protection. jlessenberry@homecomm.net.

Nor would they, until after the public saw an unguarded Bobby Kennedy dying in a pool of blood on the floor of a hotel kitchen.)

Michigan's narrow, but solid, margin for Kennedy in 1960 also was a large part of the real reason why Richard Nixon didn't contest the highly suspicious result in Illinois that year. What is often forgotten is that even if the Republicans could have proven vote fraud there, Nixon still needed another large state to win. Michigan was his last hope.

"They loved him. We all did," said Frank Kelley, the nation's longest-serving state attorney general. He was a recent appointee to the job when the president came to Michigan to campaign for Democratic candidates for a day in 1962.

"You know, that grace, those perfect moves, those tailored suits, that face, made quite an impression on a middle-class Irish kid like me," Kelley said.

Asked about his own race, Kelley made some comment about his opponent's ego. "And I'll never forget - Kennedy looked at me and said. We are all egoists, Frank. The one who hides it the best wins." Kelley would go on to serve 37 years as attorney general, leaving office at last the year JFK's son died.

When he retired, I asked him what his best day on the job was. He couldn't say. He knew what the worst one was, though. He was swimming laps in the YMCA pool in Lansing on Friday afternoon when he looked up to see a grim-faced aide come in.

"All I could think of was that something had happened to one of my kids," he said. It was Nov. 22, 1963, and when the aide told him what had happened, Kelley felt no sense of relief. "That was the hardest thing to take as a public person. A lot of hopes and dreams died that day in Dallas," he told me as he was leaving office.

Dave Powers had died the year before. If he were still around, I doubt that he would have been very visible this week. He didn't like talking about the president in November; when he did, all people wanted to know about was the assassination. He knew all about it. It was he who ran to the limousine at Parkland Hospital, wrenched the door open, looked down on what he should never have had to see.

Who wants to talk about that?" he said. "My goal is to keep the memory alive, you know?" I knew. Last summer I was at the Kennedy Library again, and saw people, old and young, with stars in their eyes, watching the Inaugural Address. In some crazy way, that part of our past isn't, in fact, over. It isn't, as they say, even

She stands tall, proud despite bearing a life of arthritis

Then Melissa Hafeli set off for the University of Michigan 13 years ago, she faced the same challenges and fears every freshman encounters ... learning to live independently, adapting to university life, meeting expectations, making new friends, finding her way around the massive campus. Stressful, admits Melissa, but nothing like the anxiety of overcoming the one thing she feared most: putting on her socks.

"I hadn't been able to put my socks on by myself because I couldn't reach my feet," said Melissa, who now lives in Tennessee. "We looked around for an apparatus, a sock-putteronner-thing - that's the scientific name for it and finally found one that worked. I think I'm on my fourth now; I'm pretty rough on them, she casually jokes.

It's painful imagining what this young woman has gone through in her 31 years. Before she could even walk, Melissa was diagnosed with juvenile rheumatoid arthritis; a shock to her parents who perceived arthritis as an old person's disease. They quickly discovered how wrong they were. Arthritis is anybody's disease. In fact, doctors now believe that osteoarthritis, the most common form of arthritis, begins as early as in one's 30s.

"I don't know life without arthritis," Melissa matter-of-factly says, her round cherub-like cheeks revealing a pair of sweet dimples. "At 10 months old, my parents began to notice that I was not necessarily meeting the milestones I should be at that stage of my life. I began to have fevers and swelling and after eight months, and a battery of tests, I was diagnosed with juvenile rheumatoid arthritis."

At age 3, Melissa began taking prednisone and hasn't been off since. She remembers heading to kindergarten, her new school dress nicely complemented by a pair of cumbersome arm braces. Her morning ritual took hours, beginning long before sunrise with a warm bath to ease her stiffened joints. Years later, the surgeries began. Her first hip replacement was immediately followed by a broken foot. Both of her knees were replaced, then her other hip. Within the past two years, two separate falls resulted in two broken femurs and subsequent surgeries. While recovering from the first surgery, she lost her job. "That was the hardest thing I ever went through," reflects Melissa. Now, doctors have told her she has both osteoporosis and osteoarthritis.

Melissa - as a child and now as an adult - is one of the faces of arthritis, giving us a glimpse into some of the worst that this chronic illness offers. Amazingly she speaks easily of her past and her struggles, even laughing at her escapades. Yet, her story of perseverance provides inspiration to the more than 7,000 Michigan children who have arthritis while her sentiments about the disease echo those of the

3 million others in the state with any one of the other 105 forms of arthritis.

"Arthritis is not an individual disease," Melissa recently told some 150 people gathered at the Oakland Hills Country Club for an Arthritis Foundation luncheon. Barely able to see over the podium, her fragile 5-foot-2 frame dwarfed because of the disease process and years of medications, this dynamo was anything but stunted in front of a

crowd. "My family lives with this disease, too. But, I'm one of the lucky ones as my parents have always been there for me, encouraging my independence. Not everyone is so fortunate. The reality of this disease is that independence has its fragile moments."

Melissa's fragility is something more and more Americans will soon experience firsthand. As baby boomers pour through the doorway leading to the second half of their lives, arthritis will be walking in with them. According to the Arthritis Foundation, 70 million Americans now have some form of arthritis. Within the next 20 years, that number could double.

The good news is living with arthritis will be easier than it was for Melissa, thanks to the incredible advances in the treatment of this disease. Still, as our knees, hips, toes and wrists begin to swell and ache more often, we are reminded that there is little we can do to prevent its onset, but we can manage it better.


Joint moving exercises such as walking and swimming, Melissa will tell us, are good steps toward healthy management of the disease. And even though the cold weather does absolutely nothing to make her or anyone with arthritis feel better, the annual Jingle Bell Run for Arthritis will.

This 5K event, being held Dec. 6 in Birmingham and Dec. 7 in Northville, is a chance for those with arthritis and those who care about arthritis to get out and support the Arthritis Foundation's mission to prevent, control and cure arthritis and related diseases. Melissa will be there. And so will her family,

who, even with those sock-putter-onner-things, still loves to help Melissa put on her socks.

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Self-esteem key for girls

Inside the circle, they were flowers, blossoming with innocent smiles and gentle rhythms.

Facilitator Shari Shepherd urged her group of young girls to imagine themselves first as seeds, then as tender shoots emerging from the earth. Even worms became allies in the process, loosening the earth to make room for their "roots" to grow.

Shepherd's workshop, which focused on movement and body image, was part of Saturday's Fourth Annual Original Girls Matter Conference, held at Orchard Community College's Orchard Ridge Campus in Farmington Hills. More than 270 attendees spent the morning focused on equipping young girls with the tools they need to become healthy, happy

The conference is organized s every year by representatives from OCC, Farmington, Birmingham and Southfield public schools and West **Bloomfield Community** Education. OCC's Womencenter Coordinator Arlene Frank said the group started working on the idea five

vears ago for one reason. "Some of us who work with girls or in the field of women's issues realized for our girls not to come back with the same issues that women do, we needed intervention," she explained.

According to both research and anecdotal information, Frank said, girls' self confidence is fairly high until 11 or 12 years of age. At adolescence, many girls begin to more thoroughly accept the stereotyped notions of how they should behave and create themselves.

In one of the workshops for parents, psychologist Elana Goell-Varkovitzky pointed out that young women who can't identify their own emotions won't be able to make good decisions.

The lack of "emotional intelligence" can interfere with everything from dating to career decisions.

"If kids don't know how to figure out how they feel, they can get moody and depressed," she said.

Goell-Varkovitzky described the process of brain development as one of blooming and pruning - children develop more "shoots" than needed, and in adolescence, the brain goes into a massive reorganization and specialization in the area of identity.

She urged parents to teach their daughters to respect intuition, asking them about their "gut feeling" in the decisionmaking process.

While parents learned more about topics like setting boundaries, communication and nutrition, girls talked about what girls talk about: relationships, school, careers, peer pressure and making a difference in the world.

Sarah Van Dagens and Hayley Ward, both of whom are in eighth grade at East Hills Middle School in Bloomfield Hills, attended Career Discovery and Talking about

Sex workshops. "I learned to really think about what you like," Ward said of the career-oriented work-

shop. "What catches your attention has a lot to do with choosing a career," Van Dagens added.







Many hunters get frustrated ्रश्रेतीक the first couple days because they aren't seeing deer from their stand anymore. Instead of packing up and bareading home with your tail tucked between your legs, try a different strategy. If the deer

aren't moving, you should be. To find deer after opening weekend locate the thickest cover in your area. This may be a cedar swamp, cattail marsh or just an old, overgrown, dried-out floodplane. Find an area where hunters don't tread and you've likely found an area

holding deer. Stillhunting can be a productive technique during this "second season." The secret is to move at a 'snail's pace or slower', and to be as quiet as a

Casually strolling through the woods usually won't produce results, but a calculated still hunt will.

When you find some likely cover be sure to take a compass reading before entering. It's easy to get turned around in heavy cover, and even though you might not get lost, you could get turned around and a compass will save you valuable time when it's time to drag out

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Work around the outside of the cover to the downwind side so you'll be walking into the wind.

Work your way through the area and plot a course that takes you from tree to tree. Don't walk right down a deer trail and leave yourself standing out in the open. Try to

blend in as much as possible. Slowly, very slowly, walk five or 10 feet, then stop, preferably next to a tree or bush that will break up your silhouette. Stay put for a few minutes and study your surroundings.

Don't expect to see a deer. Rather, you'll likely see a deer leg as it moves through the brush, or the twitch of a deer ear as it rotates listening for any approaching predators hunters. Watch for parts of deer.

Before moving again, look ahead and plot a course. Don't walk over fallen branches or a pile of crunchy leaves. Look for a path to a tree up ahead that will make the least amount of noise, then move along it very slowly. If you cover more than a couple yards in an hour, you're probably moving too

Don't be afraid to stop and take a break for 20 to 30 minutes, either. You don't have to

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be constantly on the move.

If you see a deer, or movement that could be a deer, stay put and study the area. Look for a way to approach the area from the downwind side and. again, move slowly. Remember a bedded deer is on the lookout and watching for your approach. To fool him, you must blend in with the surroundings.

A grunt call can be a big advantage for a still hunter. If you can move to within earshot, a subtle doe bleat will often bring a curious deer into range. A rutting grunt can also be productive if a rutting buck is in the area.

However, if you're sneaking up on a doe and let out a rutting grunt she may just head for greener pastures.

Stillhunting can be fun and productive, and at the same time, you're scouting for another stand location. Don't give up after opening weekend. There is still a lot of great hunting to enjoy.


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Coaching change, new home won't hurt Catholic Central

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Hugs of hope

Observer Life

Livonia nun encourages children to seek better life

Sister Nancyann Turner reaches out to hug one of the children at the Capuchin Soup Kitchen on Conner. The Livonia nun can't seem to pass anyone in the hall without stopping to offer a few words of encouragement.

Sister Turner likes to say she's "taking all of the pieces and making a whole" here in the Rosa Parks Art Studio and Children's Library in Detroit.

After school a steady stream of children flock to her for comfort from a trying day that can include anything from being evicted from their home to having it firebombed.

Like a jigsaw puzzle, she's assembled art, tutoring and a variety of programs to create a beautiful picture of what the future could hold for them. On this day the children are making Thanksgiving Day cards to send to the most important people in their

"Children draw not by perspective, but by their own feelings," said Sister Turner. "About five years ago I started thinking about working with children. I asked myself what do I most want to do. Where could I use my gifts and skills best? I wanted to get children off to their best. If we want a more peaceful, more earth conscious world it has to start with children."

TEACHING HER START

Sister Turner began her work as a Dominican nun by teaching children in Alpena, Saginaw, Dearborn, and Southgate after earning degrees in art education and fine arts from Siena Heights College in Adrian and Syracuse University in New York. Later, she learned the value of using art as therapy while working with people in an Appalachian ministry.

"It was a wonderful opportunity to use my arts in north Georgia," said Sister Turner. "I wanted to retrieve arts such as quilting and basketry. It was wonderful to see them come together to have them do their arts. It was my first time working with lowincome people. I saw the great gifts

After six years, the social service agency program ran out of money and Sister Turner was sent to Washington, D.C. Insight gained in the Appalachian Mountains wasn't wasted. It led her to seek training as an art therapist. She did field work on the psych wards at Walter Reed Hospital. Now she's come full circle, instituting art and other programs for impoverished children at the soup kitchen.

"I worked with the mentally ill,

those struggling with alcohol and learned about the role the arts play," said Sister Turner. "It's a safe way to express inner confusion, inner angst, inner struggles. It's a way to come to grips with their own soul, a way to envision what could be. You can really tell what a person is struggling with when they do their art. They can screen their words, not their art. It gives therapist clues."

REACHING OUT

Here in the art studio, Sister Turner can tell by looking at a child's drawing the struggles they're facing. Five years ago this was an empty room.

'I serve by empowering people so they have tools and support," said

Sister Turner. "Dominicans have made strong commitments to work with women and children, the poor, to fight racism and build community wherever we can, not to just serve but help empower them to take their life and do something worthwhile with

Helping others to help themselves is not always easy. If a child has an especially bad day, Sister Turner leaves a little animal on the table where they sit to cheer them up. Those are the days Sister Turner goes home drained. Other times she's just plain physically weary from coordinating programs like the summer Peace Garden and a three-week camp featuring the arts and sessions for resolving conflicts.

"Sometimes I can hardly talk about it," said Sister Turner. "Right now especially you see all the ads for the perfect Christmas. This is a hard time for low income because you can never match what the ads say, and you can't explain that to children.

"This area is a lot of families with not a lot of housing available, or not kept up, even if available, not livable. Somehow I have the energy and call to go back every day to see people taking control of their life, see moms making progress, moms grateful to have a place for their children to come."

Sister Turner is thankful for volunteers like Delphine Sievert and husband Jerry, and Tina Adams and husband Pat for making the children's programs possible at the soup kitchen. Delphine and Tina wanted to pass on the love of books they acquired during years of teaching at St. Michael's School. The two retired from the Livonia school five years ago.

At the soup kitchen, they help organize the library and set up art projects for the children once a week for three hours.

"I think Sister Nancyann is doing a marvelous job. Those children need whatever she's giving them. Her thrust is art therapy helping with the problems, and the tutoring. It would be so sad if anything happened to that program," said Delphine Sievert. "If you just helped a few of the children it can make a difference."

GRATEFUL

"Volunteering awakened in my husband and I a feeling of how grateful we are for everything we have," added Tina Adams. "We're helping those that don't have. If we can make a difference in these children's lives, with good reading, if only every house could have a little library, and parents and people to take time to make them realize the importance of reading in

Sievert says anyone can help make that dream come true. Especially needed are donations of gently used or new African American books, educational and story books, and books for sixth-eighth-grade children.

School supplies like loose leaf paper and spiral notebooks are greatly appreciated, said Sister Turner who plans to begin a noon storytime for preschoolers at the soup kitchen in January. Books on math or spelling would help children in the tutoring program as would educational games.

"We need blankets for families that are burned out," said Sister Turner who prepares gift bags consisting of books, clothes, and a toy or treat for the children at Christmas. "The garden club needs funding. We're hoping to find a garden group to give us a grant for our peace garden. Last year people gave us money to pay kids a

Lots of love: Garden City family says there's no place like their home

Catherine Stoner has a special fondness for Garden City. This is where her late husband, Leo, landed "his first real job" delivering milk from house to house in the mid-1930s. If it wasn't for his route, they might never have met, married and raised seven children -Ann, Mary, Barbara, Nancy, Judy, Pat and Dan.

Today, Stoner lives alone in a home in Garden City surrounded by the memories Leo left behind when he died from a stroke in 1992.

"I lived in Detroit around the old Olympia, 'the red barn' in 1936. He came down the street with a horse and wagon. I was 18. He was 23," said Stoner now 85. "My older sister suggested taking milk from him. Not long after he brought milk, rapped on the door. We started talking and he asked me out to the Creamery Dance at the Book Cadillac Hotel downtown. We were married on Devil's Night in 1936. The rest is history."

While many of the early photographs were lost during a flood when the family moved to Detroit for a brief time, several of the children remember those days vividly.

Leo was a jack of all trades who bought houses. fixed them up and then rented them to families in Garden City. Over the years, the Stoners lived in four of the homes on Marquette, Dillon, Belton and Barton. Many times, Leo had to park his milk truck on Merriman because the streets weren't paved. Leo worked hard to make a life for his family. After driving milk routes for Bodker Creamery, Wilds Creamery, and Twin Pines he went to work as a janitor for Garden City schools. Leo always seemed to

have his hand in something. A 1946 newspaper advertisement boasts of the famous chicken dinners served at Nelli's Lunch on Middlebelt at Ford. Back then city hall was on the second floor of the building now occupied by Orin Jewelers. Later, he owned Cassie's Sweet Shop in Detroit.

At age 50, Leo went back to school to become a senior tax accountant for the city of Detroit, then

"Taylor's Ranch was across the street and had horseback riding for \$1," said Mary Martzolff, the second oldest daughter. "There were 40 acres across the street, an all wooded area that ran all the way to Eloise (a former mental hospital and poor house in Westland). We'd go out in the woods and pick raspberries and strawberries. One day I found a park with swings and slides that must have been a prospective park at Cherry Hill and Merriman. I felt like Hansel and Gretel. Now I live out in the woods again on 10 acres in Pinckney. Garden City at one time was that many, many farms and Victory Gardens.

"We'd take a walk uptown to Ford and Middlebelt. Half the kids went to school on their horses. It was called Garden City because there were gardens every-

"It was so peaceful, no drugs," added daughter No. 6, Patricia Benefiel of Farmington Hills. Benefiel's worked as a paraprofessional with special needs students in Farmington Public Schools for the last 20 years. "We went to football games. I walked to school less than a mile away. I got a job at the first Kmart while a senior in high school."

Judy Sommariva remembers the houses on Marquette and Dillon as almost being on the edge of town. Born in 1944 in Providence Hospital in Detroit, she went to St. Raphael School in Garden City. Today she lives in Plymouth.

"The street was nothing but fields. My sisters brought horses back to the house," said Sommariva. "I have a very warm feeling about it being a small town, a neighborly community."

Dan Stoner says Garden City's friendly atmosphere is what still appeals to families. When Leo had a stroke in 1992, Dan and a neighbor pushed him in his wheelchair to Garden City Hospital's emergency entrance at the end of Belton street.

"Garden City was the first wave of the suburbs where mom stayed home," said Dan Stoner, a 50-year old history buff who lives on Barton. He is a member of the Garden City Historical Society and Detroit Historical Museum. "I enjoy the homey lifestyle. I remember you sat on the porch and knew your neighbor. It's still that way today."

One family's celebration touches all

t is on Thanksgiving that our family, like every other family, comes together for the holiday. We travel from far and wide, my brother from Missouri, my sister from northern Michigan and my other brother lives just a few miles from my Mom, all converging on each other to share a day of cards, football and food.

As everyone arrives, the once-quiet house fills with commotion.

Standing sentry at the front door, my Mom offers food, drink to the weary travelers and points me to the bathroom.

The house is warm and smells of bubbling turkey. Stuffed in the oven, a bird big enough to ensure there would be leftovers for weeks and months to come. On the stove, a pan of potatoes boil and a green bean casserole with crunchy little onion things waits to be warmed, and the gravy pan is on alert.

turkeys of feasts long passed. My 20-year-old nephew avoids the hubbub and steals to the empty bathroom. My sisters-in-law chatter happily, and my husband sneaks downstairs to the sanctuary

of peace and football. The table is set for 13, having abolished the kids' table years back. For the babies, two high chairs are strategically placed near the seats of each parent. Fresh flowers in the center of the table glow with orange candles on either end of the arrangement. The microwave, filled with dinner rolls, beeps, and the helpers in the kitchen spring into

action. My nephew tries to sneak out of the bathroom unnoticed, but I grab him in a bear hug. He blushes, embar-

rassed.

"Hewwo, Aunph Caphy." I stop to look at him, surprised. He speaks as if his tongue is swollen. His father, my other brother, is beside him in a flash.

'Open up." Opening his mouth reveals my nephew's brand new tongue piercing. My brother rolls his eyes and walks away in disgust. I stifle a giggle as I have to ask, "Didn't that hurt?"


"No," my nephew tells me thickly, "I wove it." Five weeks later the tongue ring was gone.

Allergies?

Does your nose seem to constantly drip? Are your eyes red and itchy? An appointment with your doctor is the perfect time to find out if it's allergies or a cold.

Itching of the nose, ears or mouth is a sign of allergies as well as spasmodic or "machine gun" sneezing; clear, watery nasal secretions (if you have a cold, the mucus is thick and opaque), and a normal temperature.

"Colds are often accompanied by a fever, sore throat or cough, and they are usually gone within 14 days," says Dr. Reza Haque, M.D., a spokesman for Novartis Ophthalmics North America.

Allergies linger as long as the allergen, the substance causing the reaction is present.

The Asthma and Allergy Foundation of America estimates 50-60 million Americans suffer from allergies – about one of every five adults and children. Allergies are the sixth leading cause of chronic disease in the U.S.

If your doctor suspects you have allergies, he or she may order tests to determine what substance triggers your allergies.

"If your allergist knows what triggers your reactions, then he or she can determine the best method of treatment," said Haque.

New book reveals revolutionary treatment plan

After 15 years as an OB/GYN, it became impossible for Dr. Ronald Rosenberg not to hear the subtle cries of patients with postpartum depression. The Birmingham resident felt he had no choice but to leave his position as chief of OB/GYN at Beaumont Hospital, Troy, to study psychiatry so he could help the women for whom "just being alive is difficult."

A decade later, Rosenberg, one of only six doctors in the country trained as a psychiatrist and OB/GYN, has gathered a team of experts to produce a revolutionary treatment for the disorder. The plan is outlined in a new book from Perseus Publishing – Conquering Postpartum Depression – a proven plan for recovery by Rosenberg, M.D., Deborah Greening, a clinical psychologist, and James Windell, family therapist.

Along with eliminating the helpless feelings brought about by PPD, Rosenberg is trying to remove the stigma of seeking treatment. He wants to assure women that only one-two per thousand of new mothers are as disturbed as Andrea Yates, the Texas woman who was found guilty of drowning her five children in a bathtub.

For physicians, he wanted to fill in the gap between OB/GYN and psychiatry. Unlike the "baby blues" which affect four of five mothers, PPD affects 10 to 20 percent of all live births in the U.S. For more information, Rosenberg suggests visiting

TOUGH TO DIAGNOSE

"Most doctors don't catch it," said Rosenberg, who specializes in PPD at his office in Farmington Hills. "With 'baby blues, women are grasping for help, trying to mobilize their support system. The blues should be gone by three veeks. With PPD, women are withdrawn, detached. The majority of times the OB will start a woman on a low dose of anti-depressants and she's told to call in a few weeks. While that does work for mildly depressed patients, women with PPD feel even more isolated and alone. The women who don't ask for help are the women I worry about."Patients like Lisa Daenzer knew immediately that something was wrong after the birth of her daughter. Instead of taking the baby home, the two went to her mother's. A few days after the birth, she called her OB who said she had the baby blues. It was a chemical imbalance that would pass. A few weeks later, her parents were going to the casino. She couldn't stop crying. She didn't want her mother to leave. She called her OB's office again. He gave her a prescription for Zoloft,

and the phone numbers of Rosenberg and Greening.

CHECK OTHER FACTORS

Rosenberg's first step in diagnosing PPD is to make sure diabetes or thyroid disease aren't at the root of the problems a woman is experiencing. If it is PPD, treatment goes beyond altering brain chemistry with drugs. He recommends a team approach involving the OB/GYN, psychotherapist, and parenting expert or family therapist.Confidence in parenting skills is especially important. If a woman feels incompetent as a mother, it starts a negative cycle."You pretend everything's great," said Daenzer. "As soon as the door closes at night you shatter into a thousand pieces. When I became pregnant we were ecstatic. I hadn't been able to get pregnant and took fertility drugs. I had a very hard pregnancy and a horrible delivery, three days of labor. The sad thing is we planned this for so long. I used to think how could you be sad after having a baby? It has nothing to do with being sad."

According to Rosenberg, a genetic predisposition to depression, hormonal imbalances brought on by pregnancy, sleep deprivation, and stress can trigger PPD, leaving women like Daenzer feeling inadequate. Before the birth, she managed 600 apartments. After, she

couldn't even feed her baby.

"When the baby came out, she wouldn't breast feed," said Daenzer. "We ended
up substituting bottles. I didn't have
what I expected – that overwhelming
love for the baby. Today (in the hospital)
the baby sleeps with you. I sent my baby
to the nurse's station. I didn't want to be
responsible for this baby. It was very
scary. I was afraid of the baby. Every
time I looked at her I saw her blue and
choking. I didn't feed her for weeks."

Two years later, Daenzer is still struggling with the disorder but is making progress with the support of husband Ed who did all of the night feedings. She sees Greening once a week.

Daenzer was fortunate that she recognized the need for professional help but not all women seek treatment willingly. Rosenberg suggests husbands encourage women to go to their OB/GYN as well as pull up the Web site to learn about the disorder.

Greening suggests calling the woman's OB if they think she's dangerous to the baby or herself.

HELP AVAILABLE

"Let her know there's help," said Greening. "PPD is going to change pathways in her brain like any untreated anxiety or depression. Treating can restore it to balance so it won't affect the development of the baby."


A pediatrician can be an excellent allay when encouraging a woman to seek treatment. Most women won't hesitate going for help if they feel they're harming the child.

James Windell's seen how a mother's untreated PPD affects the children he comes into contact with as a psychologist at Oakland County Juvenile Court in

"A recent research article ("Pathways to Violence in the Children of Mothers Who Were Depressed Postpartum," published in Developmental Psychology, Vol. 39, 2003) suggests adolescence with behavioral problems may have a mother who was depressed," said Windell, an adjunct instructor in the criminal justice department at Wayne State University and a Troy resident. "What happens to a child if PPD goes untreated is children can be depressed, have higher stress levels, be withdrawn, irritable with lowered activity levels. Attachment problems with the mother can eventually lead to not relating to other people. In general, if a mother is depressed and untreated for the first six months, the baby will show emotional difficulties, social problems within the first year."

As part of the book's treatment plan, women are encouraged to see a family

March of Dimes message: More needs to be done to find answers for premature births

The statistics rattled off during Monday's "National Prematurity Awareness Day" luncheon at Carrabba's Italian Grill in Novi were astounding.

"Someone is born premature every ... minute," said pediatric nurse Sharon Wallace to the gathering of March of Dimes volunteers, health care professionals and families with premature babies. "How many minutes have we been here today? Think about it. Half an hour? Thirty (preemie) babies have been born during this

time. Wallace, and Detroit Henry Ford neonatal intensive care unit doctor Richard E. Smith discussed why more information needs to get out to the public to fight premature birth - a common, serious and costly to ask you about them and give problem for many American

To that end, the March of Dimes is at the forefront. Earlier this year, it launched a five-year, \$75 million prematurity awareness campaign. Monday's luncheon underscored efforts in southeastern Michigan.

Pink wrist bands were distributed to luncheon guests. with the inscription "Premature Birth: The Answers Can't Come Soon Enough."

Guests were asked to wear the bands all day Monday, as a conversation starter.

"Do you have your bands on?" Wallace said. "If you go put them on, someone is going you a chance to talk about preemie babies. ... So wear them. Think of them."

If asked about the bands, they might answer that more than 475,000 premature babies (before 37 weeks of gestation) are born every year in the United States, about one per eight newborns. They might answer that a problem pregnancy resulting in premature birth can happen to anyone, for sometimes unknown reasons.


To raise money for research, the March of Dimes Web site (www.marchofdimes.com) features a photo of a "save the babies" wrist band. Every time the picture is clicked on during November, sponsors will

donate \$1 to research, up to \$150,000.

Luncheon guests contributed in another way. Their tips to VIP waitstaff, including WJR vice president and general manager Mike Fezzey and Steve Garagiola, of WDIV-Channel 4, were donated to the March of Dimes.

Dr. Smith told the guests that prenatal care has improved, thanks to the March of Dimes, but much more needs to be done. "Prematurity prevention is whât we're trying to do with the March of Dimes, so that every baby born in the United States has a healthy start."

Still, although chronic health problems do impact

premature babies, more preemies are having those "healthy beginnings" than ever before because of ongoing medical research.

Research is one part of the equation. Raising awareness is another, and that's where books and other materials are essential.

One guest at the luncheon, Observer & Eccentric sports editor Tim Smith, wrote a hope-filled book of family stories, titled Miracle Birth Stories of Very Premature Babies - Little Thumbs Up! (Greenwood Publishing; www.littlethumbsup.com.)

The book was written after the premature birth of his daughter at 25 weeks gestation in November 1994.

Copies of Smith's book were available after the luncheon, along with other books and gift items, with proceeds going to March of Dimes.

Miracle Birth Stories ..., which in part highlights families of the "Preemie Stars" WalkAmerica team, provides hope that premature birth doesn't always mean automatic health problems. The majority of surviving preemies do go on to lead normal lives.

But Smith, whose daughter remains healthy, and everyone else at Carrabba's fully understands that the job is far from

ONE KNEE - 2 ARTHRITIS CONDITIONS

It is possible, even common, to have 2 arthritis conditions in the same knee. The usual combination is osteoarthritis of the knee combined with gout in the same joint.

occurs from football or motorcycle riding sets up the osteoarthritis. In turn, the damage to cartilage makes the knee vutnerable to an attack of gout. Gout arises when the uric acid concentration in the blood rises to a point that crystals of urate will precipitate on the surface of joint cartilage. Damaged cartilage predisposes to this precipitation just like a craggy rock will gather debris.

Your doctor can tell an attack of gout in your knee from a flare of osteoarthritis in the same knee. A gout attack comes on suddenly and the pain is to intense, you require crutches or a wheel chair to get into your doctor's office. In contrast, osteoarthritis causes a gradually increasing discomfort, one that is relieve by rest, and worsened, by walking a considerable distance.

It is important to make a correct diagnosis. A gout attach required immediate removal of fluid from the knee and the need for medicine for a long term to prevent another attack. Osteoarthritis may be treated by removal of fluid, but often medication for pain will suffice to control the condition.

For reasons unknown, it is rare for a patient with rheumatoid arthritis to develop gout in

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
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
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
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Wealth of windows bathes spacious tri-level in light

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
























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Critics worry farmland being conserved for wealthy

Illinois executive Peter Redding bought a 360-acre former dairy farm in Vermont's scenic Mettawee Valley in 2000 for \$550,000, about twice its value as farmland.

He's renovating the farmhouse, running 13 Morgan horses and renting some of the cropland to a nearby farmer. He lives at the Rupert farm about 70 percent of the time, he said.

"I wanted a place that was kind of private where I could raise horses. It was Vermont or Sonoma in California," Redding, 70, said recently.

The sale has some farmers, state agriculture officials and conservationists worried. They fear Redding is the first of a crowd of well-to-do, out-of-state buyers with the money to buy conserved dairy farms and turn them into private estates. Redding's farm was forever conserved from development in 1989.

Vermont has spent \$37 million in public money since 1987 to pay farmers for the development rights on more than 100,000

The deals protect the farms from development and require that the land be kept from going back to brush. There's nothing that requires the farmers to keep farming or to sell their land to other working farmers when they retire.

"It sure is scary when you see the land changing," said Fred Stone, 62, who milks 130 cows down the road from Redding. "That farm will never, never, never go back to being a dairy farm"

In his valley, he said, there are as many or more cows than there were 30 years ago. Farmers have to compete for land to support their herds.

"If more of this land turns into estates, what will the farmers do?" he asked.

At the state's Housing and Conservation Board and the nonprofit Vermont Land Trust, leaders say Redding's purchase is one of only two estate sales they can identify.

Such sales have become a big problem in Massachusetts. For Vermont, it's only a matter of time, they say.

"Down here in the south, we are kind of in the first wave of these sales - we are really very, very affected by the city flight thing," said Donald Campbell, who runs the land trust's office in Bennington and Rutland counties.

PRICED OUT

Farmers are being priced out of farmland that hasn't been protected, he said.

"In Pawlet, I'm working with a farmer who wants to buy a piece of ag land that sold six years ago for \$92,000 and now they want over \$250,000 for it," he said.

Many farm-protection deals in Vermont are collaborations by the Vermont Land Trust, local land trusts and the state board, which provides some of the money.

The deals say that if a farmer later wants to sell his land, the groups holding conservation easements on the farm must be given the chance to match the buyer's offer.

Recently the land trust exercised that option, when a nonfarm buyer offered \$350,000 for a dairy farm on Lake Champlain in Orwell.

To keep a working farm, the land trust bought the land and resold most of it to a local dairy farmer. The group could afford to do so only because the price was close to the land's agricultural value. If the non-farm buyer had offered an "estate" price, the land trust could not have stepped in.

State officials say big issues are at stake.

"We have a strong tradition of owner-operated farms in Vermont. Do we want to see that change?" asks Nancy Everhart of the Housing and Conservation Board.

Would Vermonters be willing to continue spending tax dollars to protect farms that will end up as private estates?

Steve Kerr, secretary of the state Agriculture Agency, said at least the choice needs to be clear to policymakers and the public.
"We've said for 25 years that we were conserving land to have affordable farms for the future," he said.

"If we are conserving land to have open space, regardless of its use, we need to say so," he added.

STRATEGY

Conservation groups are considering a new strategy. This month's meetings will seek comments from farmers and community members on it.

Future conservation deals might include a clause that says that when a farmer sells a protected farm, the land trust has the right to buy the land at its agricultural valueeven if that is less than an "estate buyer" offers.

Farmers would be paid more, upfront, by the conservation groups, but might be forfeiting future profits from land sales.

Massachusetts has a similar provision, Everhart said.

"They've never had to use it, but it acts as a deterrent," she said. "That would be the hope and intent in Vermont."

Kerr said he supports this kind of approach that would ensure the goal of affordable farmland.

"We want Vermont to be an agricultural state, not just a pretty state," he said.

Some farmers are skeptical. Clark Hinsdale III, president of the Vermont Farm Bureau, said a better solution might be for the land trusts to concentrate on protecting farms that are unlikely ever to have estate value.

"Estate buyers don't want to be big, open, flat fields. They are looking for the cute little farms on rolling hills with hedgerows and pretty places to ride your horse," he said. "They typically aren't as good for dairy farms anyway."

In many parts of Vermont, he said, it's competition among farmers for the best farmland that has put prices at \$1,000 an acre or more.

"We don't need the state to get into the business of telling farmers what they can and can't sell their farms for," he said.

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
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





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Thomas Ervin Let's Talk About Real Estate

As an example, a property located on one street may not be as valuable as an identical home on an adjoining street. Here are some of the factors that could cause them to have different values:

Traffic

One of the homes is located on a cul-de-sac while the other is on a street that carries heavy traffic, which may serve as a deterrent to most potential buyers.

A tree-lined street usually has greater appeal than one that is sparsely populated with foliage.

Value of Adjacent Homes

If one of the homes is surrounded by homes of greater value, it will rise in value faster than a similar property surrounded by homes of lesser value.

Condition of Adjacent Homes

If an adjoining home is of greater value, but in very poor condition, it can tend to discourage buyers despite its greater value.

School System

It is possible that the two properties could be in different school systems. This factor could cause a major variation in value between them.

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
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
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
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
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




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Smart remodeling choices add up to more savings

Armed with the right information and some insider tips, homeowners can cut remodeling project costs without cutting corners.

"First, find a professional remodeling contractor you've checked out thoroughly and feel comfortable working with," said Adam Helfman, president of **Eairway Construction Company** of Southfield. "They are a wealth of information just waiting to be

To determine the budget, think the project through and select everything to be included. Allow 10 to 20 percent for changes that may come later. Product choices are the best way to save money. Shop around and compare products and prices to see if you can get the same look with a lower-priced alternative. "Keep an open mind and be creative," suggested Helfman.

Considering the amount of labor that goes into some projects, there may be a less timeconsuming option. Some homeowners choose to start small with plans to add on later, to help spread the cost out. However, staging a remodel in this way can sometimes cost more in the long run. Ask your remodeler.

CREATE ILLUSION OF SPACE

Adding square footage to a home can be costly. Other ways to add space include space reconfiguration - stealing space from a neighboring room - such as using a linen closet to expand a bathroom. A bay window, skylight or vaulted ceilings are other ways to give the illusion of added space in a small room.

If you are going to add square footage, a 2- to 4-foot addition may eliminate the need for excavation and foundation changes.

In the kitchen, reuse appliances if possible and build new cabinets around them. This can save thousands of dollars. Keep major fixtures in place to avoid moving plumbing, wiring and iacks.

Chrome faucets are the least expensive. Neutral appliances and laminates are less expensive and won't be out of date when color schemes change. Vinyl or laminate is less expensive than wood, tile or slate flooring. Use the existing floor if it's in good

shape. A hardwood floor may be underneath your old vinyl ready to be sanded and refinished. A synthetic floor leveler can be installed over existing vinyl flooring with a new floor on top, eliminating the need to rip up old flooring.

CABINETS

Cabinets are the bulk of the cost in a kitchen. Refacing cabinets is a major savings. If you go with new, choose standard over custom cabinets or a combination if possible.

For countertops, laminate is the most economical. Add wood or tile trim for some pizzazz.

Connect new light fixtures to an lad existing box instead of adding new lighting, which may require

a new ceiling. To cut costs with a bathroom

remodel, reglaze a worn tub. Less expensive marble sheets and fiberglass surrounds are easier to clean than tile.

Sinks and countertops in one unit save time on the installa-



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
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

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Care for aging parents has Boomers looking in mirror

To paraphrase Pogo, "We have seen our aging parents, and they is us."

Boomers, especially those who assume caretaker roles for homes of aging parents. The same problems they see in the home they may have grown up in – poor lighting, slick floors and a host of other safety issues they need to help their parents resolve – are concerns they will face sooner rather than later.

For Melissa Birdsong, design director for Lowe's, it's a take-care-of-two-birds-with-one-stone phenomenon. "When Boomers step away from their fast lifestyle and see their parents age, it dawns on them perhaps these fixes would work in their home, too," says Birdsong. "They realize their golden years are just down the road."

ASSESSMENT

Birdsong suggests an assessment of parental homes in four distinct areas: lighting, space, accessibility and comfort. Safety is a common thread through the categories.

Diminished eyesight welcomes brighter lights for general illumination and close-up tasks such as cooking and reading. Lights should be installed where once there were none. "It's OK to walk down a dark hallway or stairs when you're 50, but not when you're 75," says Birdsong, Motion detectors bring instant light to a room without elderly hands groping for wall switches.

Cushy carpets and high thresholds once suited to a lively gait are no longer kind to legs and feet that aren't as spry or ean't be lifted as high. Firm pads and tighter weaves with harder finishes are best, and are better, too, for walkers, canes and wheelchair assistance. Room-to-room transitions should have low or zero thresholds.

Mobility is paramount for many seniors insistent on living at home. Many find it trying to navigate narrow spaces between furniture. Create wider paths around and between objects. Remove trip hazards such as cords and loose carpets or throw rugs. "It doesn't mean you strip a room down, you're just mindful of opening the

space a bit," says Birdsong.
Grab bars are de rigueur in bathrooms but need broader use in hallways or next to beds where a steadying grip is reassuring. Another suggestion: it's less of a strain for aging arms to push a lever than twist a door knob.

Look into restyled appliances and fixtures to reduce the need to stoop or bend. Taller commodes work well in bathrooms, and both washers and dryers come in versions atop pedestals. Pedestal sinks with lower lips, even in the kitchen, are easier to reach, as are sidemounted lever faucets.


But products considered as concessions to age don't need to be bland.

Birdsong says stores such as Lowe's see more products once slotted for users in need now attractively designed for general market. For instance, taller toilets are marketed as "comfort height" devices for all age groups.

"What consumers will see much more frequently is mainstream aesthetics with maximum functionality," says Birdsong.

Still, adult children should tread lightly when talking to their parents about necessary changes. "I would silently scout the house, then couch your suggestions in the name of safety and convenience," says Birdsong. "It's important not to patronize them, because your parents want to maintain their dignity without being lectured to."



Mazda Tribute is a very nice vehicle for families

Slipping behind the wheel of the new Mazda Tribute, you tend to think this small sport utility vehicle would come up short on functionality and maybe even on per-

Turn that ignition key and you'll find that performance and function are the key to the success of the Tribute. Introduced in 2001, the Tribute is sister to the Ford Escape and is built on the same line as Escape in Flat

There are three trim levels of the Tribute: DX, LX and ES, with the ES being the top-of-the-line level. In the DX is a 130-horsepower, dual overhead cam 16 valve 2.0-liter in-line four cylinder mated to a five-speed manual transmission.

Both the LX and ES are powered by a 3.0-liter dual overhead cam 24-valve V6 capable of 200 horsepower. With it comes a four-speed automatic transmission. You can choose your Tribute with front-wheel drive or opt for the on-demand four-wheel-drive system that Mazda calls "Rotary blade coupling," so you can take your Tribute wherever and whenever you want to go.

Acceleration and merging on the freeway was a snap with this V6 engine and whenever it needed a little prodding, it took very little to get it going around a slow-moving tractor-trailer.

As with most Mazdas, the handling and ride characteristics are masterfully done because of its tuned suspension and solid rigidity. Not only does the Tribute have unibody construction, but also there are body reinforcements in the roof, side sills and floor, making this vehicle as solid as solid can get.

I must mention that there's standard power-assisted rack-and-pinion steering, as well as standard front disc brakes and a four-wheel anti-lock brake system.

I enjoyed the nimble feel of the Tribute, which also

tends to have you perceive it as smaller than it really is. Most SUVs, even the small ones, aren't as nimble as the

What's new about this year's Tribute: the major interior upgrades it receives. On the ES, leather seating surfaces are much more comfortable and you can opt to have them heated to keep you warm during winter. There's also a two-tone dashboard and the center stack is covered in brushed aluminum. The sun visors now have small lights and the rear view mirrors can be heated.

There's seating for five, but I think that's a stretch. My kids were comfortable back there, but confided in me that a long trip would've made them uncomfortable and more room was needed.

But put down the rear seat and you've got nearly 64 cubic feet of cargo space, which is enough to allow plywood sheeting -- but the rear liftgate window has to be open. And when you choose the option of a trailer towing package, you'll be able tow up to 3,500 pounds.

The Tribute has a minimum ground clearance of almost eight inches. You don't need running boards on this one,

either. It's easy to pop into and out of without a lot of

There are a couple of nice amenities you'll find on the Tribute that you won't find in other smaller sport utility vehicles. Stuff like an in-dash six-disc CD changer and a six-way power driver's seat.

The audio system that's standard on the LX and ES models is a 190-watt AM/FM/cassette/six-disc CD changer that features seven speakers strategically located throughout the cabin. All six of the CDs can be loaded at once through just one slot. There's no magazine to play with.

And a pleasant change to make your life easier is the addition of a remote key fob to access the rear gate, rather than having to manually open it on your own.

The week was a pleasant one in the Mazda Tribute. Between the nice ride, ample power and performance and the fact that it was nice to drive a smaller sport ute that was big on everything, it was a really nice week.

Try one and have fun.
