Jobs talk makes points for governor

Gov. Jennifer Granholm's State of the State address seemed somewhat familiar to Rep. Bruce Patterson (R-Canton Township).

"In my opinion, it was more a Republican conservative speech than that of a Democrat," said Patterson. "She didn't want to raise taxes, and the importance of jobs and job creation; those are the things we in the Republican Senate caucuses have as our theme.

Granholm's main theme included ways to lure and keep jobs in Michigan, including a proposed \$500 million job creation plan to help attract and retain high-tech and small business in Michigan.

Canton Township Supervisor Tom Yack gave the speech an A+ for presentation and a C for substance.

"The proof is in the details," he said. "She's very good. Maybe the best governor I've seen in my life at presentation."

Yack said Granholm lost him in the beginning.

"When she started off my initial reaction was you've gotta be kidding me," he said. "We need to get international trade on a fair foot ing. We need a worldwide minimum wage. I thought you and the state Legislature aren't going to be able to do anything about that."

But then, he said, she started talking about "doable" things.

"Speeding up the process of giving permits to business," he pointed out was "doable."

Yack said he thought Granholm and the legislature were on the right track when she talked about what could be done to retain jobs in Michigan. And State Rep. Phil LaJoy (R-

Canton) also picked up on that point. "I think she's right about jobs,"

he said. "It's about jobs, jobs, jobs. There were 55,000 jobs lost in the state last year." But LaJoy wanted to hear more

about government.

"An area I wished she would have addressed a little more is the size of government itself," he said. "Are we really structured the way we should be?"

LaJoy has introduced legislation, which has passed the House and is now in the Senate, to consolidate various human resources departments in the state government into one.

Yack, who was often an outspoken critic of former Gov. John Engler, was less critical of Granholm. "I think she's benefited om the majority side being willing to work with her," he said. "She's been there too short a time to throw stones or accolades."

Super Bowl is primed to host women's tourney

Canton's Super Bowl is one of five metro Detroit bowling alleys keeping an eye on the city's bid for the Women's International **Bowling Congress 2008** Championship Tournament and annual meeting.

The event is one of the world's largest participatory sporting events for women and the premier event for women bowlers, according to the Detroit Metro Sports Commission.

"Metro Detroit has the most registered bowlers in the United States," said Dave Beachnau, executive director of the DMSC. "We'd be a great choice as host of the 2008 tournament and annual meeting."

Mike Reffitt, Super Bowl manager, said the annual tournament runs for four months every day of the week from March through

June. The lanes are closed to the public for the entire duration, but the event is so huge that it's necessary.

'Typically, this tournament attracts upwards of 80,000 bowlers plus guests," he said.

According to the DMSC. the 2004 championship in Wichita, Kan., will draw about 42,500 bowlers, with an expected impact on the local economy of more than \$22 million.

In addition to the Super Bowl, other area bowling centers that would host the tournament are the Thunderbowl in Allen Park and Skore Lanes and Taylor Lanes in Taylor.

A decision on which community wins the tournament will be made at the Congress' annual convention in May in Wichita, Kan.

Lifelong resident remembered as 'big brother'

A big brother is how Ross Hauk is described by boyhood friends who worked for him in the 1960s on his family farm on Ridge Road.

"That's where I found out I didn't want to milk cows all my life," said farmer Duane Bordine.

"Their kids weren't old enough yet to milk them."

Phil West remembered hitting his head and knocking himself out on some irrigation pipes at the Hauk farm. When he came to, he walked up to the farm house and knocked on the door.

"He came to the door, grabbed me and washed the blood off of my head," said West.

Bordine and West were among longtime friends and family who shared their memories of the consummate farmer who died Tuesday, Jan. 27, in Canton.

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Canton Dems ready for caucus

Canton Township voters will help Michigan decide its Democratic presidential choice during caucuses scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 7.

Democrats will cast their ballots 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at one of three locations: The Canton Public Library, UAW Local 735 or UAW Local 845.

Voters cannot choose where they will go, however. Certain precincts will be tied to certain caucus sites:

■ The Canton Public Library is set for Canton voters from Ford Road to Palmer. The Canton Public Library is located at 1200 S. Canton Center Road.

■ Voters from Palmer to Van Buren vote at UAW Local 735, located at 48055 Michigan

■ Voters from Joy Road to Ford Road should vote at UAW Local 845, located at 8770 Canton Center.

■ Voters in the city of Northville vote at the Northville District Library, 212 W. Cady; Northville Township voters vote at Northville Township Hall, 41600 W. Six Mile.

Canton Township Clerk

Terry Bennett is not involved in the election. Voters with questions can call the Michigan Democratic State Central

Committee, (517) 371-5410. Voters going to caucus sites should have identification showing that they live in

Democrats also have two other options for voting, according to Michigan Democratic Party spokesman Jason Moon.

Voters may cast ballots on the Internet through 4 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 7, he said. They also may vote by mail, but they have to file an application by this Saturday, he said. For those options, visit a Democratic Party Web site at www.applytovote.com.

As of mid-January, nearly 23,000 voters had applied to vote by mail or by Internet.

Moreover, there will be a record 590 caucus sites in' Michigan.

"The record number of caucus sites is part of an extensive effort to create the most accessible election in Michigan Democratic Party history," MDP Executive Chair Mark Brewer said.



O'Sushi offers cuisine as a delicious work of art

Q. When is a restaurant also an art gallery?

A. When it's O'Sushi, a newly opened Japanese restaurant and sushi bar at Ford Road and Lilley in Canton.

But at O'Sushi the artwork is not on the walls — it's on the plates and in the display counter. It isn't paintings or sculpture, but the food itself that is a work of art.

It's also delicious and moderately priced.

The restaurant, which opened about two weeks ago, is owned by Dr. Babiano Kim of Grosse Ile and Sophia Kang of Ann Arbor.

Kang runs the restaurant, along with the Pinetree Party Store in the same plaza (on the northwest corner of Ford and Lilley). The party store opened last year at the site of the old Wilderberry Party Store, which closed down about two years ago.

Kang, who's Korean, said she opened the store and restaurant because she feels there's a market in Canton for them.


"I used to run a dry cleaners and laundromat in Ypsilanti," she said. "And I ran a convenience store in Ann Arbor a long time ago."

The party store, which also carries a line of Oriental food items, is bright, clean and col-

"I want to make women feel comfortable when they come in," Kang said.

Conspicuously missing from the party store are the racks of magazines that usually grace the front entrance and checkout desk. Kang said she doesn't need them to attract customers. But it's the restaurant that she hopes will be a big draw. And she said business so far has been good.

With only 38 seats (the restaurant also does carry-out) Kang didn't spare expenses when setting it up.

The eight or nine employees include chief sushi chef Minoru Yoshi, who spent 10 years as a sushi chef in Japan and another 20 in Manhattan before Kang convinced him to come to Canton.

Billy Lee is the second sushi chef and Fujiko Koshizawa, a graduate dietitian from Japan, is the cuisine chef.

"They all have their own secret recipes," Kang said. "They won't share them with anyone, including each other." The menu includes

raw sushi created with as much artistic flair as a fine piece of jewel- Sushi chef Billy Lee prepares a sushi roll. ry. For the less venturous, they also offer cooked sushi or vegetable rolls.

The restaurant also offers a lunch menu and a full dinner menu with complete course meals. Hours are 11 a.m. to 2:30

p.m. and 4:30 p.m. to 9:30

p.m. Monday through Saturday

and 4-9 p.m. Sunday. And that 'O' in the name doesn't make it an Irish/Japanese restaurant. In Japanese 'O' means "quality" and "traditional." And that's the feeling you get here.



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Subdivision will be a bit brighter soon

Pickwick Village subdivision will be a little bit lighter in the future ... or at least four entrances will.

Residents were successful in getting approval from the township for a Special Assessment District to install four streetlights at four entrances to the sub.

"It's not that unusual to have a special assessment district for something like this," said Township Clerk Terry Bennett. "Pickwick is an older subdivision and was built before the township required entry level streetlights."

The proposed locations for the lights are on the north side of Greenwood, south side of Ashbury, south side of Hanford and in the island on Barchester.

Residents of the sub circulated a petition requesting the township to provide an estimate for the lights.

The township subsequently surveyed the 290 residents of Pickwick Village as to whether they were for or against the SAD. The estimated cost to each homeowner will be a onetime installation charge of \$31.20 and the first year annual maintenance charge of \$3.86 per lot. Subsequent yearly maintenance charges will be billed on yearly winter tax statements.

Forty-nine percent of the residents responded, with 79 answering yes and 64 no.

A half dozen residents showed up at Tuesday's public hearing on the request, although none spoke out for or against. The board unanimously approved it.

1924, and attended Ypsilanti High School from which he graduated in 1942. He worked with his father on the Ridge Road family farm and became the largest producers of sweet corn and melons in the state.

In fact, Hauk was known for the corn boat he made. "It had large tractor tires and would straddle the corn," Bordine said. "We could pick eight rows at a time. Other people came out to look at it too. I think the Palmers bought a couple of them."

"He was fussy about planting crops," Bordine said. "And he was very precise around equipment."

Hauk produced not only sweet corn and melons, but wheat, soy and pumpkins. "He was farming until the day he couldn't drive a tractor anymore," Bordine said.

Hauk married Lillian M. Crisovan in 1956. They adopted six children – Jimmy, Sonja, Richard, Mary, Colleen and Ross Jr. "He was well-liked," said son Richard. "He didn't have a mean bone in his body. He was the best dad in the world for us. He loved his kids and his grandkids."

The Hauk children worked on the farm as they grew up. And they worked hard. "But they learned a lot of values," West said. "He was a loving person. He was always willing to help anyone."

Daughter Mary Hauk, a farmer like her dad, will remember his blue eyes and big smile. "He was such a good man. He never spoke a bad word about anyone. And if he didn't, we couldn't either. And if we did, he would say, 'That's enough."


Mary's farming education literally began when she was 8 years old. "He grabbed me in the back yard one day and showed me how to drive the tractor. He was one to teach by example."

A devout member of Cherry Hill United Methodist Church, Hauk as a boy would walk to church every Sunday. As he grew ill and couldn't make it to services, the minister would visit him. "He always told us we needed to go to church," Mary said.

Life for Hauk centered around Ridge Road. He will be buried Saturday by his parents in Cherry Hill Cemetery. "He never moved far from Ridge Road. His family and his farm were important to him. That's what made him happy," Mary said.

Remembered as a serious farmer, Bordine said he nonetheless always had time to talk and to answer questions, especially about farming. "You would learn a lot. I really enjoyed him. I

would go up to the house and talk to him. He was kind and he was gentle. And he was very intelligent."

West would pick corn up and down the rows as Hauk followed doing the same behind him. "He would show me how to do it."

Described as a kind and gentle man, West and Bordine said they never heard Hauk raise his voice in anger. But when he was upset, they knew it. There was the time Bordine left the tractor in gear and it rolled and broke a wheel on the manure machine. "I never did it again."

Bordine also remembered West walking on the 4-inch top rim of Hauk's 40-foot-tall silo. "That part Ross never heard about," he said, laughing.

Hauk and his wife, Lillian, have 21 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. The young ones each have memories of being put to work by their grandfather. One of the granddaughters tried to avoid the work and told him she had a broken arm. He quickly told her, "Well, your fingers aren't broken," Mary recalled. "All the kids would crack up. They have such good memories."

When he was in the hospital recently, the newest babies would be brought to visit. "He would spry right up," Mary said. "Then he would say, 'Who's this one?'"

Funeral services for Hauk will be at 11 a.m. Saturday, Jan. 31, at the L.J. Griffin Funeral Home-Canton Chapel, 42600 Ford Road. Visitation will be 4-9 p.m. Thursday and noon to 9 p.m. Friday.

Burial will be Cherry Hill Cemetery on Ridge Road. Memorials may be made to the Cherry Hill United Methodist Church, 312 S. Ridge, Canton 48187.

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

part-time job at the library. Her charge was simple: start a Friends of the Library group.

A year after that, Barker was put in charge of volunteers. By her fifth year at the library, her job was made full time and she was a permanent member of the staff. Not too long ago, adult programming was added to her roster.

She has been known as
Marcia Barker — friend, volunteer, program coordinator.
Her job is a smorgasbord of
working with people, especially
those who volunteer their time
and efforts for the library.

Library Director Jean Tabor says Barker's title has been changed yet again. Actually, it's been shortened to program coordinator, though her duties remain the same.

"She is so much fun," Tabor said. "She has just been dynamite with these adult programs. She is clever and creative. She is good at thinking of themes, slogans. Marcia is high-energy."

Barker and her late husband, Rob, moved to Canton 31 years

"When we moved here my mother felt sorry for us," she said. "We had to drive into Plymouth to get our mail. But we were young and had a baby. We were looking for an affordable house."

say about Canton, where she
and Rob raised their daughter,
Alysia, 31, and son, Chip, 27:

A dental hygienist by profession, Barker left the business to raise her children. But she didn't stay home. She embarked on a volunteer career that included serving as president of the Gallimore PTO, an officer in the Plymouth Symphony League, president of the women's guild at St. John Neumann Catholic Church, a Cub Scout den mother and a Girl Scout leader.

"That's what essentially brought me to the library," Barker said.

When Rob died unexpectedly seven years ago, life changed for Barker. Sad, but determined to keep going, the library and its staff was there to help.

"I had a lot of support," she said. "The library gave me something to come to and something to do. My job has continued to grow and keeps me busy."

So impressed was Tabor with Barker's interest and energy, she didn't want to lose her. She wanted Barker on her team and made her job full time. "She is so flexible. I was thrilled to make her full time," Tabor said.

When charged with creating a friends group, Barker, who had done research on food service for the school district, jumped right in and taught herself all she could about volunteer organizations. Today, the Canton friends group has pledged \$25,000 to the library's endowment fund. It has opened Second Hand Prose, a used book store in the library, and works on many efforts in the library, such as the Summer Reading Club.

"The friends know how to make their dollars stretch far," Barker said, adding the group provides some 3,000 hours of volunteer service annually. So much does she know





about friends groups that she is now executive director of the statewide friends organization, which hosts seminars for other libraries. "I know about as much as you can know about friends," she said.

Approximately 40 volunteers work behind the counter and another 40-50 work the used book store.

"I have the best job in the world," Barker said. "I work with people who want to be here. With part of my job, I feel like a bartender. A need is filled in people who want to volunteer and people know they can talk to me."

The adult programming part of her job lets her be creative and fun. Under her auspices, the library offers "Learn to ... with Friends" and "Friends, Authors and Others." Both are adult programs that give patrons a chance to learn something new, be entertained and have plain fun. Also on her schedule are the "Lunch and a Book" programs.

Under Barker's direction is

the Multicultural Initiative, designed to recognize the community's diversity, and to bring programming that celebrates the various ethnic, racial and religious groups in Canton.

As if that isn't enough,
Barker is an officer on a metro
Detroit Book and Author
organization that brings
famous authors to the suburbs.

She also works on the library's strategic planning, and organizes the Plymouth-Canton-Northville Author

Luncheon every year.

Schools should seek '04 vote

It's pretty easy to see Plymouth-Canton Schools Superintendent Jim Ryan is in a tough spot.

He's got millions of dollars worth of work to be done on existing buildings in a growing district crying out for even

What with schools facing near-certain financial reductions as Gov. Jennifer Granholm tries to pare the state's budget deficit, and with Plymouth-Canton already facing large deficits of its own, the only way the district is going to

be able to do what needs to be done is through a bond issue. Which Ryan is fairly certain wouldn't pass in difficult economic times.

There is evidence to back him up. The City of Plymouth, facing huge deficits and needing cash to simply provide basic services, last year went to the voters for a tax increase and was turned down flat.

In Plymouth Township, voters approved the sale of \$6 million in municipal bonds to help pay for a new township hall. Township officials weren't going to seek voter approval until a citizens' group offered a successful petition drive to force it to a vote. Plymouth Township officials were able to sell voters by convincing them they would not seek a tax increase to pay for the bonds.

Canton Township officials are expanding their township hall using bonds, but again there is no tax hike involved.

The district's bond steering committee outlined some \$91 million in needs, but Ryan doesn't think the economic climate is such that voters would be willing to shell out that kind of money. Some \$14 million of that is in what Ken Jacobs, executive director of support services, termed "immediate needs" repairs, things that are likely to go wrong in the next 18 months if the district doesn't address them.

That puts the district squarely between the proverbial rock and hard place. The district doesn't have the money to do all these repairs - no district does any more - but the repairs are necessary. A bond issue is the only way to address the need.

If that's the case, we think the district should address them this year. All putting off a bond request until next year accomplishes is delaying the improvements that would be funded by the request.

Board President Judy Mardigian indicated a decision would be made by the board's April 27 meeting. While reserving judgment on the merits of the eventual proposal, we believe the board should go for the request this year.

Consider tweaking state term limits

Constitutionally limiting the number of years Michigan lawmakers can serve wasn't the best of ideas to begin with, so an Oakland County legislator's call to tweak the state's term limits rules is worth considering.

John Pappageorge, a Troy Republican, is pushing a plan that would allow individuals to spend longer stretches of time in the Michigan House of Representatives or Senate. His idea is not to do away with term limits, but rather introduce an option for politicians to toil longer in either legislative chamber if they - and the voters - so choose.

, Under Michigan's term-limits law - passed in 1992 - a person's lifetime tenure in the Legislature is restricted to three two-year terms in the House and two four-year terms in the Senate.

Supporters of the current term-limit law say tampering with the system is contrary to the will of the people.

Pappageorge counters that term limits, which first affected the House in 1998 and the Senate last year, create a "leadership continuity problem."

Specifically, he says term limits force individuals out of key leadership positions not long after they've finally acquired the experience to hold them and the ongoing turnover only increases "the influence of non-elected staff, lobbyists and the other branches of government."

Pappageorge makes a valid point, although he's come under criticism by some who believe his true aim is amending the law so he can extend his own tenure in Lansing.

Regardless, his idea merits consideration because experience and leadership are factors that should, and do, matter in the Capitol. Pappageorge's plan addresses those areas, but remains in tune with the spirit of the original term-limiting proposal the public passed more than a decade ago.

Since it's unlikely Michigan's term-limit law will be discarded anytime soon, the option for longer stints in the House and Senate - without removing the overall 14-year cap – may well be worth putting to a vote.

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

Now we owe Northwest a deserved pat on the back

ver the years, I've done my share of whining about Northwest Airlines: expensive fares, poor service, bad on-time record. The list goes

But in recent months, possibly because I've been flying more than usual, I've changed my mind. Mind you, I'm still grumpy about high fares, especially when there are no low-cost competitors serving most routes. But things at Northwest seem to have improved substantially. Both at the gate and on the plane, staffers seem genuinely friendly and interested in being helpful. Departures and arrivals now bear a fairly direct



relationship to the posted schedule. Planes are clean. If you want, you can order something to eat on the flight instead of overdosing on pretzels and nuts. The new McNamara

Terminal is attractive, efficient, a pleasure to use. And there's no doubt whatsoever about the enormous advantage of having a major new and spiffy

Northwest hub at Detroit Metro.

We can fly nonstop to essentially

anyplace in the world. Anybody who's had to suffer the thrash and inconvenience of changing planes once or twice en

route recognizes what a terrific thing a major hub is. Plus there's even another dimension to the issue of high fares, at least if you listen to Andrea Fischer Newman, a University of Michigan regent and Northwest's senior vice president for government affairs. According to Newman, if you take the average cost of an airline ticket in 1978 (before the federal government deregulated air travel) and compare it with today's prices, you'll find the inflation-adjusted cost of air travel overall has declined by around 50 percent. And if you add to that the very low-fare charter operations now clustered at Detroit Metro, we may well be benefiting from the deflationary impact of the Northwest hub ... and just don't know it.

But there's much more to this story, especially here in Michigan where the big problems are economic: a jobless (and slow) recovery, an evaporating manufacturing base, concern about increasing export of good jobs to places like China and India. Upon reflection, I think the single greatest engine for this region's economic growth is hidden in plain sight at Detroit Metropolitan and Willow Run airports.

Here's why. Most historians agree the regions that offered the best transportation infrastructure are those that showed over time the greatest growth. Think of the seaports in the 18th century, when sailing ships were dominant, or rail hubs in the 19th century. Closer to home and in the late 20th century, it's probable that Livingston County's enormous growth comes in large part from the advantages in road transit produced by

the intersection of U.S. 23 and I-96.

Plainly, air transit for both passengers and cargo will be dominant factors in the world economy of the 21st century. And regions that have developed the capability to link air passenger and air cargo infrastructure have shown enormous growth over the past decade. Consider the great airports at Dallas-Ft. Worth, Los Angeles, Hong Kong, Amsterdam and even Memphis, the main hub for FedEx's planes. These regions have added literally hundreds of thousands of good-paying jobs leveraged out of their great air transit facilities; the phenomenon is sometimes called an "aerotropolis."

Experts, led by Dr. John D. Kasarda, director of the Kenan Institute of Private Enterprise at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, say the potential offered by the combination of an excellent passenger facility (the Northwest hub at Detroit Metro) and a good cargo operation (at Willow Run) is as good or better than anyplace elsewhere in the world. They point to the development prospects of the 25,000-acre area between the two airports. bounded by I-94 on the south and Ecorse Road on the north and including the Pinnacle project south of Detroit Metro. And they endorse the wisdom of having created an airport authority with governance powers over both airports.

So the potential is great, but there's lots of work to be done to make it real. Willow Run, for example, needs considerable work if it's going to reach its potential to be a serious hub for air cargo: An extended runway to service fully loaded 747s (which will irritate the neighbors), better storage and cargo handling facilities. Coordinated regional development plans need to be worked out by the various local government bodies affected. And a link to the Port of Detroit - adding ship-borne cargo access to the Atlantic seaboard and Europe needs to be worked through and developed.

Fortunately for the state of Michigan, which has no extra money, much of the work that needs to be done now won't cost much. Identifying the region as a key economic development target would be a good start. Wayne County needs to make the aerotropolis a development priority and work to include various townships along I-94 in the planning process. Asking senior leaders in the automotive assembly and parts industries for their input would help.

And, while people are at it, they might want to include folks from Northwest Airlines. After all, the essential precondition for an aerotropolis is a first-rate passenger hub, and Northwest has already contributed that. We've been whining about Northwest too long; today, we all owe them a pat on the back for a job well done.

Recycling is the answer for Wayne

Central Wayne trash incinerator company as a crisis, but it actually presents Westland, Dearborn Heights, Garden City, Inkster and Wayne with the opportunity of a lifetime.

For years now, the five communities (members of the Central Wayne County Sanitation Authority, CWCSA) have been paying at least three times more than neighboring cities to get rid of their trash. If the right steps are taken, the incinerator's failure can lead to cheaper and cleaner trash disposal.

Central Wayne Energy Recovery Limited Partnership (CWERLP), the company that owns parts of the facility, abandoned its responsibilities to the cities and several local businesses in August and filed for bankruptcy on Dec. 29, 2003. Incineration is an excessively expensive and

dirty way of "disposing" of trash. Pollution goes out the smokestack and into our lungs or gets concentrated in toxic ash that is buried with the risk of groundwater contamination. Incineration is not recycling. You can

only burn the trash once.

The metal left behind is

contaminated.

The electricity that can be generated is less than the energy saved from reusing

the raw materials, so instead of waste-toenergy, incineration is just wasted energy.

COMPREHENSIVE, CURBSIDE RECYCLING

The CWCSA has some advantages that it needs to use. The five cities should band together and use their combined buying power to negotiate lower landfill and hauling prices through a smart, joint, open-bid process. The current facility should be cleaned up and refurbished as a transfer station and a Materials Recovery Facility. This could be done with assistance from the state, such as a Brownfield Redevelopment grant.

A state-of-the-art Materials Recovery Facility for sorting and bundling the collected recyclables could benefit more of Wayne County than just the five communities.

Real recycling means collecting a wide list of recyclables at the curb from both residential and commercial sources. The material is sorted to separate out what can be used again as a raw material from hazardous materials. Hazardous materials need special attention. The rest is landfilled for now. The larger the volume of materials collected for recycling, the more efficient and cost-effective the program. In other Michigan communities, and across

the country, dozens of comprehensive recycling programs are operated at less expense than ordinary trash disposal. A small subscription

ocal officials are treating the bankruptcy of the program is very inefficient and not cost-effective, so it can never achieve the true potential of a recycling program. Recycling is not something extra that has to pay for itself. Residents should not have to pay extra for recycling. Comprehensive, curbside recycling should be a standard piece of an integrated waste management plan that prevents trash from filling up landfill space or going up in smoke.

ECONOMICS OF RECYCLING

Because recycling is more labor intensive than landfilling or incineration, recycling creates local jobs. This means more resources are spent here locally on job creation instead of paid out to huge, corporations based outside of Michigan. Items collected become raw material for other companies, some of which are based in Michigan. Kalamazoo, Dundee, Manistique and Filer City have companies that accept recyclables as raw material. The five cities of the CWCSA could even try to attract similar companies.

The state Legislature is currently debating a tipping fee surcharge that would apply to all trash disposed of in Michigan - including imported trash. Of the \$40-\$50 million collected each year, 80 to 90 percent would go back to Michigan's cities for the exclusive purpose of supporting recycling programs. If the five cities through the CWCSA start planning now, they will be wellpositioned to receive those state funds and implement a model program within Wayne County.

A number of cities in the United States have reduced their trash by more than 50 percent through comprehensive recycling and composting. The experience of Ann Arbor could be very valuable to the five cities of the authority as they seek a clean alternative. Successful trash reduction does not just happen in college towns like Ann Arbor. Los Angeles, Calif., reduced its trash by 55 percent in 2001 through recycling and composting.

Westland, Dearborn Heights, Garden City, Inkster and Wayne can act together within a public authority now for a cleaner, cheaper and more prosperous future. They need to do more than just react to the current failure of the trash incinerator. They need to begin planning and implementing policies that will dramatically reduce their trash and save scarce financial resources through a joint comprehensive recycling and composting program.




Because of Tuesday's snow, library officials didn't think they would have a full house for the celebration. They miscalculated and had to add chairs to accommodate celebrants.



Grubaugh excels at NMU

She won't talk about it too much. Not in a singular sense, anyway.

Tiffany Grubaugh will talk about the improvement in her Northern Michigan University women's basketball team.

And, yes, she puts the emphasis on *team*.

"After last season, we all got together and talked about things we needed to change," she said while undergoing treatment for her knee. "We talked about reaching the final eight (in the NCAA Division II), but first and foremost is winning the conference.

"Our first goal is to win the GLIAC, then go from there." Grubaugh's athletic career is a strong indication that opponents don't want to get between her and her goals. She showed it at Salem HS, and not just on the basketball court: At the 2000 girls track state finals, Grubaugh won a title in the shot put and placed fourth in the discus.

Last season, her first playing at NMU — she started her collegiate career at Wayne State, but transferred after her freshman year — Grubaugh, a 5-foot-8 guard, averaged 15.4 points a game. She ranked 11th in the GLIAC in overall scoring and was second in free-throw shooting accuracy, converting 55-of-64 attempts (85.9 percent).

But that wasn't good enough. The Wildcats posted a 16-10 record, eliminated in the GLIAC tournament quarterfinals by Grand Valley State.

Things were going to be different this season. That's what that season-ending meeting last March was aimed at accomplishing.







- Rece Cox at 135, although he's wrestling this year at 140, and Jake Fairchild, back to defend his title at 189. The Shamrocks' Trevor Stewart is the field's only other title winner, as he beat Stevenson's Dario Mainella in


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Whalers blast No. 1 Knights

Friday's loss at London was tough to take for the Plymouth Whalers. Their games Saturday and Sunday, however, made up

The Knights entered the weekend as the Ontario Hockey League's best team. The Whalers, second in the OHL's West Division (London is first in the Midwest Division), played the Knights tough on Friday, losing 3-2 in London.

On Saturday, it was London's turn to be the visitor as they met Plymouth at Compuware Arena. In front of a standingroom only crowd of 3,679, the Whalers stuck it to the Knights, building a 5-0 lead before settling for a 6-4 victory.

On Sunday Plymouth was on the road again, playing its third game in as many days, this time traveling to Saginaw. It wasn't easy, but the Whalers managed to pull out a 3-2 victory.

The second period was a nightmare for the Knights. The Whalers scored four times in the 20-minute span, John Vigilante collecting his 20th of the season and Fiedler netting his second of the game, with Gino Pisellini and Sean Thompson getting goals in between.

The scores by Vigilante, Pisellini and Fiedler all came on the power play.

The Knights did manage to regain some momentum with a power-play goal by Corey Perry with:44 left in the period.

They added to it in the opening 12:36 of the third period, Rob Schremp scoring twice (the first on the power play) and David Bolland making it a onegoal game with 7:24 still to play.

Rane Carnegie ended

London's comeback hopes, however, forcing a turnover in the Knights' end and scoring unassisted with 4:16 left to push Plymouth's lead to 6-4.


Paul Drew made 30 saves in goal for the Whalers, who also got two assists from Ryan Ramsey. Gerald Coleman had 22 stops for London.

Grubaugh's role in the Wildcats' surge is undeniable. She was named conference Player of the Week after riddling Findlay for 30 points (on 12-of-14 shooting) and six assists in a 77-51 NMU victory Jan. 19, followed by a 26-point, four-rebound effort in the win over Ashland. It was the second time this season she earned the honor.

Again, she'll take little of the acclaim.

"It helps to have teammates like mine," she said. "It brings out my game. We're confident in each other, and that's a huge change from last year. Now if we're down in a game, we come together and go do it instead of just talking about it."

Statistics show that Grubaugh is a major reason the Wildcats are getting it done this season. If she was defining her role in her first season as a Wildcat last year, this year she's found it.

At week's end, Grubaugh was second in the GLIAC in scoring, averaging 20.5 points a game. She was also second in the conference in 3-point shooting percentage (43.0 percent) and 3-pointers per game (2.69), fourth in assists (4.62), eighth in steals (2.19), 12th in free-throw shooting (80.3 percent) and 16th in rebounding

Nice, but they mean little to Grubaugh without the 'W.' "We just focus on getting the win," she said.

And how does she think she's helped her team the most? Never mind her improved shooting accuracy (she's making 48.3 percent of her floor shots, which is outstanding for a guard) or that she's scoring an average of five more points a game.


"The thing I've improved upon is my rebounding," she said. "Our team is kind of small, so I really wanted to do that better.'



Matthew, that's a whole bunch of questions for such a little problem and no, you do not need special tools for this one. Bring a screwdriver, a Phillips screwdriver and a pair of pliers along with two band-

 Whirlpool washers represent the majority in America's laundry rooms because they are also sold under the Kenmore brand name through Sears. They are a good washing machine at what I consider a good value for the fair price, but they have always had a high pump replacement, even going back to the days of the belt- driven machine.

This machine happens to be a direct-drive design. Whirlpool no longer uses a belt in this model. I think you are

correct in the assumption that the pump is leaking but let's make sure by taking a look at it.

Try as people might, the back panel cannot be removed. Even attempting it can be a problem. Millions of homeowners owned the old beltdriven machines, and yes, the back did come off of these models, but not this latest one!

Take a look at the console area and under the edge on each side you will see a Phillips screw. Remove these screws, lift the console up a little and you will see two shiny clips which pop out easily with a screwdriver.

There are two plastic wire harnesses which you will unplug and now you're ready to remove the whole casing. Grab the back portion of the cabinet, lift it up and towards you and you will be amazed that the whole cabinet, sides, front and top came away from the machine. Step back and take a look at how simple it was to get to the pump and all the other components.

Before you attack the pump, let's have a look at all hose connections leading to the pump and any bleach or dispenser hoses going up the side of the cabinet. A leak usually leaves a white or gray trace mark at its origin. Proceed next to the pump (which is right there in the front) and you'll see hoses connecting to it. Remove the clips on the front of the pump. You can take the pump, hoses connected and move it off the motor shaft. The leak is usually found where the shaft of the

motor entered the pump. It will be obvious that the leak is where the shaft enters into the bearing of the pump. Disconnect the hose clamps,

remove the pump and replace it with one from your local appliance repair center.

Take the pump with you or write down the model number of the washer. You should expect to pay a retail price of less than \$50. (You may want to make a few phone calls to shop the price of said pump because some charge different prices.) It is important that you ask how long the warranty lasts with a new pump.

When you are installing the new pump, you should clean the shaft of the motor with some very fine emery cloth. Place a dab of vaseline on that shaft and it will help with any corrosion factor. Replace the hoses, making sure the clamps fit tight, and reverse the procedure of replacing the cabinet.

Slide the washer back into position, level it properly using a level, check the fill hoses for corrosion at the couplers and ask your significant other for a basket of dirty clothes you can wash to check out your repair


I'll put Mailblocks through the ringer and report back in a future column.

In the meantime, you can try the service yourself (www.mailblocks.com) with a free, ad-supported account. Or pay just \$10 per year for an ad-free account.

I didn't find anything else at CES nearly that cheap.

In fact, if I had \$3,500 to spare, I'd give serious consideration to Epson's Livingstation

(www.epson.com), the company's first foray into the television market. This HDTV LCD projection TV, available next month with 47- and 57-inch screens, has memory-card

slots for viewing photos taken with your digital camera.

And because it's from Epson, the Livingstation includes a built-in (and nicely hidden away) color printer that churns out 4-by-6-inch glossies. It even comes with an external CD burner for archiving your photos.

Speaking of photos, Sony (www.sonystyle.com) made my heart palpitate with the Cyber-shot DSC-T1, a 5megapixel digital camera that's thinner than a deck of cards. Despite its size, it sports a 2.5-inch viewscreen (much larger than most) and a 3X optical zoom.

Sony also unveiled a home theater system with wireless speakers. Finally!

Altec Lansing (www.alteclansing.com) previewed its own wireless speaker system, this one intended for desktop computers and game consoles. Good riddance, wires!

And good riddance, keyboards! Well, almost. The iBiz Virtual Keyboard (www.ibizcorp.com) connects to a PDA or PC and projects a laser

image of a keyboard on any flat surface. You're effectively typing on light.

This is one of those see-itto-believe-it gadgets. I saw it, and it's just as cool as it sounds. However, it didn't work too well - the company needs to iron out some glitches in the software.

Finally, we come to my favorite gadget from CES the ZVUE (www.zvue.com).

This handheld wonder is not only an MP3 player, but a video player and photo viewer as well. It has a color screen, a slot for SD memory cards, and an impulse-buy price: \$99.

I think this thing could be huge, provided the fledgling company offers an easy and affordable way to buy videos. We'll have to wait and see.

Here are some pointers to help you get good winter photographs:

■ Sun or very bright snow can cause flare in your shots. Always use a lens hood.

■ Back or side lighting give dramatic effects. Your pictures will capture the sparkle of sunlight on and reveal textures and patterns not obtainable from direct, overhead light.

On a blue sky day, use a polarizing filter. The sky's blue hues will darken for added impact. For you black and white shooters, try a red filter to obtain a much more dramatic sky.

■ The abundance of white areas in winter scenes can fool your meter which is always cal-

ibrated to read "grey." Open up a stop or two, and you'll get much better exposures.

■ For a special effect in color, try using tungsten balanced slide film outdoors without the correction filter.

What will happen is that your pictures will pick up a romantic blue tint that can be quite unusual.

■ Keep your vision tuned for • close-up possibilities. Frost patterns on a window, sun shimmering on an icicle, or snow delicately etching a tree branch will all reward you with a fine

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

Memorize them: Memorize as many numbers as you can so vou do not waste time searching for numbers. Of course, most of you know all the numbers that pertain to you personally such as phone, business phone, beeper, fax, car phone, address and Social Security. In addition, memorize the house phone, car phone and addresses of people you need to call or write regularly.

My son, Brian, memorized all the phone numbers of the toy stores and discount stores close to our home. He shops prices on the phone before asking me to take him to the store. He does this on a regular basis and discovered it was more efficient to memorize the numbers than look them up in the yellow pages.

File it: I have a file box in my hall closet with important numbers separated into folders by categories. This would include model numbers (of everything we own), car insurance, house insurance, account numbers and Social Security numbers of everyone in the family.

Put them in a drawer: I keep numbers I use regularly in a drawer by the phone in my kitchen. This drawer contains my neighborhood directory, area hospital listing, church directory, school buzz book, emergency numbers, commu-

hometown newspaper.

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nity service book, area recreational numbers, business cards for services (printer, cleaners, salons, doctors and mechanics), customer numbers for my business, and my personal address/phone book. In a cabinet underneath the drawer I keep the white and yellow

Use a folder: Each of my children has his own folder. I put important numbers such as locker number, student ID, school room number, school bus number, school phone number, teacher's phone number (if available), numbers of classmates and team sports numbers. I also have a folder that contains old directories from churches, schools, neighborhoods and other organizations. I do not use these often, but may need to refer to them from time to time. I keep these folders in the kitchen cabinet by the phone.

In my office I keep a directory of my customers and the white and yellow pages.

Store them in a purse: I keep the numbers of business associates, friends and family. These numbers include their car phones, home phone, business phone and beeper.

Use other areas: In the car I keep the phone number of our insurance agent.

My calendar is in my kitchen pantry. I can check each month to see if I need to mail a birthday or anniversary card to a friend or relative.

The numbers I put on the refrigerator are numbers I want visible in case anyone forgets a memorized number. I attach with magnets our car phone, beeper number, and a listing of committees or organizations that involve us.

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
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

Wintergreen plant is good in winter

BY LEE REICH AP WEEKLY FEATURES

What more hopeful way to go into winter than with a plant named wintergreen? The word conjures up an image of lush greenery against lily white snow.

If the word wintergreen brings to mind, instead, a refreshing aroma or flavor - yes – that's the same plant.

The oil has flavored teas and beers, and the leaves provide a refreshing nibble. The plant's berries, known as teaberries, also provide a nibble and flavoring in a chewing gum of that name.

Wintergreen also has been called checkerberry and partridgeberry.

More than just a flavoring, oil of wintergreen has soothed fevers and eased the pain of arthritis and rheumatism. The active ingredient is closely related to aspirin.

Wintergreen lives up to its name, helping keep a snowbare winter from looking like a wasteland of gray and brown, or peeking through the snow to break the white monotony of a snowy winter.

The plant grows only about 6 inches high, creeping along the ground by means of underground stems.

New leaves are yellowish green, soon turning glossy green, then take on a bronze tinge through winter, the colder the weather, the bronzer the

The leaves are only part of the display. All summer, they are accompanied by solitary, pinkish white flowers. And then red berries, ripening in late summer, add to the show and carry it on through fall and win-

Together, these qualities recommend wintergreen as an evergreen ground-cover plant.

Where it's native - over much of the eastern half of the country - the plant grows in moist, acidic soils in the shade of evergreens.

Why not do the same in the garden, planting wintergreen beneath such shrubs as rhododendrons and mountain laurels, or beneath a hedge of hemlocks? Wintergreen will tolerate deep shade at some expense to

growth and fruiting, and sun, if the soil stays sufficiently moist. Pay careful attention to the

soil before you plant winter-Add plenty of acidic peat

moss or well-ripened compost, as well as sulfur if the pH still goes above about 5.5. Use little or no fertilizer, though, because fertilizer can damage the plant's fine roots, and because the plant just doesn't need it.

With soil prepared, plant seeds or potted plants, the latter of which are available through many mail-order nurseries, including Forest Farm (www.forestfarm.com), Tripple brook Farm (www.tripplebrookfarm.com) and Gardens of the Blue Ridge (www.gardensoftheblueridge.com).

Stiffen flashing to stop rattling on roof

Q: Rosemary asks: The cap over our fireplace chimney was nailed in several places on top. The nails rusted and caused a leak. The roofer installed a new one exactly like the old one (about 4 feet square), but the wind seems to get inside and it sounds like it is buckling. The roofer said he didn't nail it down because the nails eventually would rust and cause another leak. He told me to lay bricks on it.

A: Whatever you do, don't weight the flashing down - with bricks or anything

Besides being an eyesore, the weight might cause water to puddle, and rust the entire flashing. You need to stop the flashing from rattling by stiffening it. This will also promote watershed.

It sounds as if the normal creases (stiffening bends), which usually radiate diagonally to the four corners from the hole where the chimney penetrates the cap flashing, are nonexistent. These creases also act to raise the center of the flashing higher than the edges, allowing for proper watershed. If the creases do exist, chances of recourse against the contractor are slim. If you are forced to use the existing cap, you will find that the proper fix is exactly the opposite of what the roofer suggested. You need to create a constant pressure on the sheet metal from below rather than from above. The rattle will disappear regardless of what side the sheet metal is braced from, but bracing it from below

can be useful to improve watershed. Water

sheds when the flashing is higher in the center than at the edges, and the chance for rust is diminished.

First, carefully remove the flashing. Then install hump-shaped wood braces at approximately 16-inch intervals from edge to edge at the top rim of your chimney. The 4-foot-long braces should measure from zero at each end and gradually thicken to about 1 to 2 inches in the center. Caution: Wood braces should be no closer than 1 inch from the metal fireplace

Finally, reinstall the flashing with hot-dip galvanized nails, using the old nail holes. As an extra precaution, use 3M Gutter Seal at each nail head and all seams. The building code requires that all exposed sheet metal flashings be painted (a good rust-preventive measure).

Whether you take your car in for a routine checkup at a service center like Jiffy Lube or do it yourself, these are some essential preparations for winter driving:

Check the battery's age to make sure the car will start on frigid mornings. On average, a car battery will last about four or five years. If yours is more than two years old, test it to see if it will withstand the cold.

According to the American Automobile Association, a battery loses 35 percent of its power at 32º F and 60 percent of its power at 0 degrees F. To minimize the strain on your battery, start the car with the heater, lights and window defrosters turned off.

Tire blowouts can be particularly dangerous, so make sure they are properly inflated, have adequate tread depth and have been rotated according to manufacturer's recommendations.

Make sure you have enough fresh antifreeze and washer fluid. Check wiper blades to make sure they glide smoothly and do not leave

Check engine oil, differential fluid and transmission fluid to see if they need changing according to manufacturer's recommendations.

CARRY THE ESSENTIALS

A properly packed emergency kit is essential during the winter. Make sure to have a flashlight, extra batteries, water, flares, blankets, shovel, snow brush and ice scraper. Also, keep some kitty litter or sand in the trunk-spreading it under your tires will give you more traction if you get stuck. Bring wire and cloth if you need to patch a leaking hose to make it to the nearest

Winding narrow roads and black ice (especially on bridges) make winter driving dangerous. Take extra precautions before driving to your favorite ski resort.

Test your brakes on hilly roads to get a feel for how they react. Reduce your speed, brake slowly, and leave plenty of space between you and other

Check the weather conditions before you leave and use sound judgment. If you get caught in a sudden blizzard, stay in your car. Do not idle your car for long stretches of time to keep warm.

Finding some plants is detective work

Seed and nursery catalogs already are enticing us with luscious descriptions of juicy tomatoes and richly colored roses

With so much offered, you'd think that any plant you could possibly want would turn up in at least one of these catalogs. Not so.

You have to do a bit of sleuthing if you want to grow something offbeat - seeds of the rare but delectable Belgian Giant tomato, for example. Tree peonies also are rare or nonexistent in most catalogs, so you would have to search especially hard to find a special variety of tree peony, such as the salmon red Yachiyo

Tsubaki. These plants are available; you just have to find out where.

If you can't find what you want in any of your catalogs or at a local nursery, the next place to turn is a book.

One of the many useful lists in Barbara Barton's Gardening by Mail is that of suppliers for specific categories of plants. The book has a category for both "Tree Peony" and for "Heirloom Tomatoes." Listings in this book reflect a plant's popularity.

Tomatoes are so popular that heirloom and hybrid tomatoes each get separate headings. But if you were delving for a source for an unusual vegetable, such as chufa, you would have to look under the general heading "Vegetables,"

and then contact all the companies listed.

Then again, none of the companies listed under "Vegetables" might offer chufa. Then turn to books dealing with narrower categories of plants, books such as Cornucopia, A Source Book of Edible Plants, The Garden Seed Inventory, Taylor's Guide to Specialty Nurseries and The

Gardener's Companion. Deepen your quest with books written specifically about the plant of interest. Such books often have appendices listing sources for the plants. So if you wanted to grow purple prairie clover, a meadow wildflower, you might find a source for it in Laura Martin's Wildflower Meadow

Kitchen has cooked up many changes

When we first began as remodeling contractors, there were two basic options for kitchen countertops - ceramic tile and plastic laminate. Occasionally we were asked for butcher block, but almost exclusively laminate or tile were requested.

In the late 1980s, a local countertop fabricator suggested that we add an amazing new solid-surface countertop product to our showroom. It was called Corian. He agreed to supply and install a complete countertop in our showroom free of charge - no strings attached.

The top was installed, and almost a year passed with no interest from any of our clients. We tried to interest folks in the innovation; it had the groutless beauty of a plastic laminate and the durability of ceramic tile and was easy to clean, good looking and easy to repair. Yet no one was interested.

We eventually got a call from the fabricator. "Hey, what the heck is going on with you guys? We installed a countertop for you over a year ago and you haven't had a single sale." We couldn't explain it.

About a week or so later, a customer asked for a quote on a Corian shower. It turned out to be one of the most beautiful showers we had ever built.

For no apparent reason, the product finally began to sell, and folks who remodeled their kitchens regularly asked for prices on ceramic tile, plastic laminate and Corian. Soon after, several other companies began to manufacture solidsurface countertop materials and the race was on.

Today, consumers are better informed and enjoying the kitchen as much as any room in their home.

A few years passed and our more affluent clients threw a new request into the mix - slab granite. Although not many made the purchase, almost everyone wanted to know the

CHANGES

With the coming of Corian which was more expensive than tile but less costly than slab granite - consumers were slowly moving to fancier and more unusual kitchens. Everyone seemed to want "unusual."

Many opted for granite tile. The grout lines in granite tile are narrow and usually colored to closely match the granite. Also, granite tiles typically are 1-foot square - making for even less grout than would be found in a conventional (4-by-4-inch or 6-by-6-inch) ceramic tile installation.

As the countertop metamorphosis was taking place, other changes began to occur. Our customers began asking for fancier appliances, better flooring, finer cabinetry and more extravagant lighting systems.

Where the end of a cabinet was once a flat piece of plywood, recessed panels that match the doors are coming on strongly. Adjustable shelves are a standard rather than an option.

Concealed (European)

hinges are in vogue. Oh, and note that you don't have the best unless they adjust six ways and allow snap-off door removal.

Even cabinet drawers are being scrutinized. The drawer boxes themselves must have dovetailed joints and full extension drawer glides. The dovetail joint isn't new, but is the strongest of connections. Also, it is the most costly.

Full extension glides allow the drawer to be pulled out all the way. In the open position, no portion of the drawer remains within the cabinet. The entire drawer box is fully available when open.

Consumers are even beginning to ask for drawer glides by weight rating. "I want 150-pound glides," one might demand.

Today, consumers are better informed and enjoying the kitchen as much as any room in their home.

Where we once found ourselves explaining how to design a kitchen that was simple and comfortable, we now find that the average consumer wants to be surrounded by something that looks like a restaurant with the luxury of a castle.

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

Parsnips have a sweet nutty flavor and have been a good source of starch, vitamin C, and fiber for people for

They are so hardy that they can be left in the ground over winter. Many believe parsnips that are left in the ground over winter and eaten in the spring are even sweeter in flavor.

The cold air starts the conversion of starch to sugar, which gives them the sweet flavor. Those purchased in the store have been in cold storage after harvest to make the starch to sugar conversion.

Parsnips can grow up to 20 inches long, however they are more tender when only about 8 inches long.

The real big ones can have tough, fibrous cores and aren't as flavorful. Buy ones that are more squat looking, they are easier to peel.

Don't wash parsnips until you are ready to use them. Cut off the top, scrub and peel. If you are going to purée them, cook and then peel. This also preserves the nutrients.

Parsnips keep fresh in perforated bags in a refrigerator crisper. Keep cool and wrapped they could be stored for a couple of months.

Don't over cook parsnips or they will not taste good. Add parsnips the last half-hour of cooking in a stew or soup.

Other winter root vegetables are turnips and rutabagas. They certainly aren't fancy but are economical and are a good source of complex carbohydrates and vitamin C. Both of them make great addition to soups, stews or salads. Add thin slices of both to a raw vegetable tray.

Parsnips make a wonderful side dish or a substitute for

They can be seasoned with stock and herbs or add orange or apple juice, brown sugar and ginger and cook like you would a sweet potato.

Herbs such as tarragon, rosemary, thyme, parsley, or chive compliment parsnips. Nutmeg, ginger, mace and cinnamon will bring out the sweet flavor of parsnips.

Parsnips can be cut into strips and stir fried in a little butter or oil and added to other stir fried vegetables. Roast them in an oven of 400° F in a little water until done. The parsnip can be oiled and oven roasted to caramelize the

Microwaving parsnips can be a little tedious so it is not recommended.

Cook strips or coined shaped parsnips and carrots together and serve as a side dish. Parsnips compliment many other vegetable dishes.

Other winter root vegetables are turnips and rutabagas. They certainly aren't fancy but are economical and are a good source of complex carbohydrates and vitamin C. Both of them make great

addition to soups, stews or salads. Add thin slices of both to a raw vegetable tray. Unlike the parsnips, these

are usually dug and stored before selling.

Place the roots that you purchase in plastic bags and store in the refrigerator.

If you're not sure you like them, cook and mash either turnips or a rutabaga, and add to an equal portion of mashed potatoes.

Don't cook turnips in aluminum or iron pots as they may darken.

Sweet spices such as ginger or cloves go well with turnips or rutabagas. Orange or lemon zest, fresh ginger, black pepper, basil and dill are also good seasonings for them.

A turnip should be golf ball size or just a little larger. A larger turnip tends to be a little bitter; the small ones are sweeter and more tender.

A turnip has a reddish pink top with the lower part (that's under the ground) is white.

A rutabaga is more the size of a baseball. For a sweeter flavor, choose those about four inches in diameter, the larger ones are more apt to have a woody interior and be stronger

A rutabaga is tan with a purplish band. They are lumpy and irregular in shape.

Rutabagas have wax applied that should be peeled away before cooking.

This wax is applied to prevent

moisture loss during storage. A rutabaga should feel solid and firm, not soft and spongy. They can be stored in the refrigerator for a couple of weeks.

Using a sharp knife, quarter a rutabaga before trying to peel, it makes it a little easier. Peeled, boiled, and buttered rutabaga makes a delicious companion to meats, ham, duck or pork roast.

Rutabagas can also be treated and served like sweet potatoes, with brown sugar and spices.

Raw the turnips or rutabagas make an interesting addition to coleslaw.

Winter vegetables are perfect for winter soup or stew. Make hearty winter chowder with parsnips, potatoes, carrots, celery, turnips or rutabagas added to the base

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
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Dieters drive sales of designer eggs

In their relentless pursuit of a healthy diet, many consumers are turning to a new breed of egg.

Designer eggs, produced by chickens fed sea kelp, flax seed and other nutritious ingredients, are finding their way to more and more markets and menus. Some consumers say they even taste better than regular eggs, and sales are booming.

"It's like the kind of eggs I had when I was a kid," shopper Liz Sigel, 56, said while buying a dozen large Organic Omega-3 eggs at a Santa Monica market. "It's more

dense than regular eggs." The trend is due in part to the popularity of low-carb regimens like the Atkins or South Beach diets and also to recent studies that suggest eggs are healthier than previously thought when it comes to cholesterol.

Eggland's Best Eggs, the nation's largest producer of

designer eggs, saw a 25 percent jump in those sales in 2003, compared to 2002, said Laura Finlayson, a spokeswoman for the company.

In the past 18 months, the Pennsylvania-based company sold over a billion specialty eggs nationwide, with many coming from its two farms in California, she said.

Chino Valley Ranchers Farms, based in Arcadia, doubled its production of low-fat eggs in 2003, said David Will, general manager of the com-

"A lot of what's pushing the sales is the protein diets, and people are more health-conscious," he said.

Designer eggs now comprise nearly 5 percent of the \$3 billion national egg market. The increased sales come at a time when overall egg prices are at an all-time high.

The average price of a dozen large eggs was \$1.44 in November, the latest month figures are available, said Don Bell, a consultant for the national cooperative United

Egg Producers. On average, designer eggs cost about \$1 more per dozen than regular

The price surge came after Exotic Newcastle Disease thinned chicken flocks last year and lowered production.

Along with kelp and flax seed, chickens that lay low-fat eggs are fed canola oil or other types of non-animal fats.

Hens raised on the special diet produce eggs with lower saturated fat that are fortified with omega-3 fatty acid, iodine and vitamin E.

If marigold extract is added to their diet, they lay eggs high in lutein, a nutrient that helps maintain the health of

The higher prices don't discourage buyers like Sigel, who paid \$3.49 for a dozen designer eggs.

She has been on the Atkins diet for five months and tries to eat as many organic products as possible. "Food quality is not based

upon price, it's based upon quality," she said.

Chase away winter blues

The warm golden colors of this roasted-peanut caramel tart suggest an antidote to winter blues, even before the good taste hits home.

The recipe has been worked out by pastry chef Karen Barker. acclaimed cookbook author and co-owner of the Magnolia Grill, Durham, N.C. The tart would make a fine cold-weather treat.

ROASTED PEANUT CARAMEL TART

For the tart:

1 refrigerated pie crust, pressed into 10-inch tart pan with removable bottom

For the Filling:

¼ cup cream

1 stick (8 tablespoons) butter ¾ cup brown sugar 2 tablespoons sugar 3 tablespoons honey

3 cups lightly salted honey-roasted peanuts

Preheat oven to 350º F. Combine butter, brown sugar, sugar and honey in a small saucepan and bring to a simmer while stirring over medium heat. Allow mixture to simmer for about 4 minutes. It should reach 240° F to 245º F when measured with a candy thermometer (just above soft ball stage). Remove from heat and add the cream. Add the nuts and stir to coat.

Transfer the mixture to tart shell, making sure the nuts are spread into an even layer. The amount of caramel filling will appear scant. Bake tart at 350º F for 15 to 20 minutes until filling is bubbling and crust is golden.

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Cookbook reveals tasty secrets of Texas cowboy cooks

The Texas Cowboy Kitchen, written by Grady Spears with June Naylor, iş an oversize cookbook that will pose a question for cowboy and cowgirl cooks, real or wannabes: Do they work from it in the kitchen or display it on the coffee table?

Bypass the purists who ask if Real Cowboys have coffee tables or even kitchens. The book from Texas Monthly Custom Publishing, distributed by Ten Speed Press, 2003, \$34.95 will surely add to the number of wannabes.

Besides having great dishes from the Lone Star State, the book is chock-full of wonderful archival cowboy photography from the Erwin E. Smith Collection at Fort Worth's Amon Carter Museum of Art. It also has mouthwatering food photography newly made by Ralph Lauer.

Grady is a seasoned author as well as a cowboy cookrestaurateur. His previous books include A Cowboy in the Kitchen (1998), Cowboy Cocktails (2000) and The Great Steak Book (2000).

He opened the Nutt House Restaurant, Granbury, Texas, in the spring of 2002, and the Chisholm Club in downtown Fort Worth, in the Renaissance Worthington Hotel, in September 2002. More recently, he's opened the Burning Pear restaurant in Sugarland,

His latest book has some basic cowboy recipes, including chicken and dumplings, and Blue Ribbon combread, as well as newfangled recipes from some of Texas's innovative chefs.

In general, the recipes are not difficult to prepare and the dishes I tested from this book were solid, worked beautifully and required very little fuss.

I did use much less salt and pepper than they called for. I love salt and pepper as seasonings; they do wonders for the flavor in many dishes. But I think that perhaps when these recipes were tested, the testers relied more on experience and

always on measuring spoons when they added salt and pepper. So I have adjusted the following recipes to use less salt and pepper than the originals, and suggest you taste and add more if you wish.

In fact, that's a good rule any time you season with salt and pepper: Let good sense and your own taste be your guide.

Garrido often guest-chefs at the James Beard House in New York City. He displays his culinary skills at Jeffrey's in Austin, combining Southwestern and Latin flavors, and has opened a Jeffrey's in Washington, D.C., within reach of a favorite patron, President George W. Bush.

His paella recipe is incredibly easy and requires very few ingredients.

CHICKEN THIGHS PAELLA

6 tablespoons extra-virgin olive

4 chicken thighs (if the thighs are small, use 8) Salt and pepper to taste 2/3 cup diced onion 6 cloves garlic, finely chopped 2 serrano chilles, stemmed,

seeded and finely chopped 2 cups texmati rice (see note) 2 pinches saffron threads 2 cups chopped tomatoes 3 cups water 6 bay leaves

1/2 teaspoon sea salt, or to taste 4 lemon wedges for garnish

In a medium saucepan, heat the olive oil over medium heat. Season the chicken thighs with salt and pepper and sear 4 to 6 minutes or until golden brown.

Add the onion, garlic and serrano chilies and cook for 2 to 4 minutes or until the onion is translucent. Add the rice and saute 2 minutes or until rice starts turning light brown.

Add the remaining ingredients. When the mixture starts to boil, reduce the heat to low and cook for 14 to 17 minutes or until the rice is tender. Serve hot and garnish with the lemon wedges.

Makes 4 servings.

Note: Texmati rice is an aromatic rice that's a cross between American long-grain rice and basmati rice.

This hearty recipe has become a Hood County favorite at Grady's Nutt House. JUSTIN'S CHICKEN AND

DUMPLINGS

10 cups chicken stock 6 chicken thighs

6 chicken leas 5 cups flour

3 tablespoons baking powder 1 teaspoon Kosher salt

1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper

2 cups heavy cream 4 ribs celery, diced

1 large onion diced 6 large carrots, diced

6 sprigs fresh thyme

Salt and pepper to taste

Heat the stock in a large, heavy pot and cook thighs and legs over medium-low heat for about 45 minutes to 1 hour, until very tender. Remove from heat and allow to cool, reserving stock in its pot. Remove chicken and discard skin.

Pick chicken from the bones and set meat aside.

To make dumplings, combine flour, baking powder, salt and pepper in a large mixing bowl and mix well. Add heavy cream to mixture, stirring just until dough is thick and sticky. Turn onto a floured work surface and knead dough until you can roll it out to a thickness of 1-16th inch.

Add the celery, onion, carrots, and thyme to stock and reheat over medium heat just until boiling. Cut dough into dumplings that measure 1-by-1-inch. Add dumplings to boiling stock, cover, simmer, cooking for about 20 minutes.

Add chicken meat and salt and pepper to taste. Serve hot. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

Besides his career as a baseball player, Nolan Ryan is also a rancher and wrote the foreword to this book.

Spears likes to make this hearty meatloaf with Ryan's ground beef, so it is named for the town close to the Nolan's family ranch. Preheat the oven to 350° F. Ing. a large bowl, combine all the ingredients, mixing well. Place the mixture in a greased loaf pane Bake for 75 minutes, then increase the heat to 425º F and cook for an additional 15 minutes or until the meatloaf is firm to the touch. Remove and serve warm.

Take steps to perfect lien on construction

i had heard about the term construction lien and am wondering who can get one as I am a new contractor.

A contractor, subcontractor, supplier or laborer who provides an improvement to real property may require a construction lien under the Michigan Construction Lien Act. The lien attaches to the interest of the owner or lessee who contracted for the improvement to the real property and any after acquired interest. Construction liens can arise in both commercial and residential construction projects. However, some of the legal procedures applicable to the creation and enforcement of a lien will differ depending upon whether the project is deemed "residential" under the Construction Lien Act. You are best advised to consult with an attorney to advise you of the steps necessary under the act to perfect your lien.


I am the owner of a home where we have had some work done by a contractor who has threatened to record a lien but there has been a period of about 50 days since his last work. Am I out of the woods, so to speak?

While I would have to know additional facts in terms of what has proceeded at this period in time in regard to the lien filing process, generally, failure to record a lien within 90 days of the last work will invalidate the lien but you should be cautioned that unless an owner pays pursuant to sworn statements and lien waivers provided by the contractors and their material men and laborers, the owner risks that an unpaid contractor or supplier will later record a lien against the property. However, if you were dealing with a residential builder, he must be licensed under the Occupational Code in order to be able to claim a construction lien against your interest in the property. The statute is somewhat complicated and you are best advised to consult with an experienced attorney.

Buying a home with bruised credit

e all know somebody who has been through rough times.

Businesses fail, marriages fall apart, and people get laid off. Sometimes affected individuals can hold themselves together financially, sometimes not. When life's challenges cause people to juggle bills and miss payments, they often end up with bruised credit.

Some potential homebuyers wrongfully assume that they are doomed to a lifetime of renting because of their blemished credit record. This notion is often false. Many of these borrowers have compensating factors that may allow them to still purchase a home even in the wake of financial maelstrom.

Recent bankruptcies or current collections do not automatically disqualify borrowers from getting mortgages. Mortgage lenders in these "non-conforming" sce-narios will usually grant mortgages if the borrowers have a minimum credit score, if they have one or more "good" scored credit references, and if they can put a meaningful down payment toward their home purchase.

Depending on the type of mortgage, it often helps for borrowers to write a letter to the mortgage underwriter explaining the situation that caused their financial problems. Some of my recent clients have legitimately cited the death of a sibling, the loss of a primary breadwinner, and long-term hospitalization. In each of these cases, we were able to provide the loan underwriter documentation validating the claim.

In most cases, lenders primarily want to know how you have handled your credit since your financial struggles. If you exhibit the same pattern of behavior that led to your earlier financial problems, you will likely have trouble getting a mortgage. Conversely, if you bounced back and maintained excellent credit since your setback, you may have a good shot at a mortgage.

If you have been denied credit for any reason, you may get free copies of your credit report from each of the three major credit repositories: (800) 685-5000 (Equifax), (800) 888-4213 (Transunion), or (888) 397-3742 (Experian).

Remember, a skilled mortgage professional can usually find financing for borrowers if the borrowers are truly motivated. It takes hard work, creativity and patience, but often borrowers are very happy with the result – a home of their own.

BIA projects steady home sales

The Building Industry Association of Southeastern Michigan is expecting continued strength in 2004 in new home construction and sales.

BIA projects 14,682 new

housing permits will have been issued for single-family homes in Wayne, Oakland, Macomb, Washtenaw, Monroe, St. Clair and Livingston counties in 2003 - the second straight year the number of permits issued has increased from the year before.

"Permit numbers indicate the builders' belief in a demand for housing, and in 2003, it looks like the builders were rightfully optimistic," said Stuart Michaelson, BIA president and president of Windmill Group in

Farmington Hills.

"Many homes are built on 'spec' - they are not pre-sold, but are built on speculation that there will be a demand. not unlike automakers who build cars in anticipation of demand.

"Looking ahead to 2004, we think residential real estate will continue to be a driving force in southeastern Michigan's economy, and new housing permits will remain at, or near the levels of 2003," Michaelson said.

David Seiders, chief economist for the National Association of Home Builders, (NAHB), forecast 2004 new home starts nationally will be 1.45 million, a 3.5-percent decrease from the 2003 total projection of 1.5 million. Still, Seiders remains optimistic.

"2003 was a record year for

the single-family market and for homeownership in the U.S.," said Seiders, "While 2004 numbers are expected to be a bit lower, outlook is positive for another strong year of home building."

If the projections hold true, it means a healthy and steady year in the building industry. Locally, in 2003, the metro Detroit area experienced 0.5 percent growth in new housing permits from 2002.

LOCALLY

Oakland County saw the largest jump in new housing starts, up 489 to 3,800, a 14.8percent increase from 2002. Wayne, Macomb and St.

Clair counties all saw a slight decrease in new housing

Wayne County issued 2,756

new housing permits in 2003, 67 fewer than 2002, or a 2.4percent decrease. Mácomb County saw an 11.3-percent decrease in new housing permits issued - 3,121, down 395 from 2002. St. Clair County saw a decrease to 872 permits, down 61 permits, or 6.5 percent from 2002.

Seiders says that the number of homes locally is amazing, since the nation's recession has hit especially hard in industrial sectors, like metro Detroit. In addition, the value of the

U.S. dollar on the foreign exchange market will drive up the demand for U.S. goods and corporate profits are expected to cause the stock market to rise. As the global economy begins to regain steam, the United States will once again be at the forefront.

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Mortgage rates drop to lowest figure in six months

Mortgage rates around the country dropped for the second straight week, welcome news to people thinking about buying a home or refinancing the one they already own.

The average rate on 30-year mortgages fell to 5.64 percent - the lowest rate in six months, and down from 5.66 percent last week - Freddie Mac, the mortgage giant, said Thursday in its weekly nationwide survey of mortgage rates.

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Rates on 30-year mortgages have bounced around after sinking to a fourdecade low of 5.21 percent in the middle of

For 15-year mortgages, a popular option for refinancing, rates decreased to 4.95 percent this week, down from 4.97 percent last week. Rates for one-year adjustable mortgages dipped to 3.56 percent, compared with 3.62 percent last week.

"Mortgage rates remain low as the economy picks up steam, allowing families a chance to purchase a new home or refinance if they haven't yet," said Frank Nothaft, Freddie Mac's chief economist. "With low prospects of inflation increasing anytime soon, mortgage rates should remain affordable over the first half of this year."

Home-mortgage refinancing activity also has been kept healthy by low mortgage rates. The Mortgage Bankers Association said refinancing accounted for 57.7 percent of all mortgage applications filed last week, up from 51.6 percent the previous week.

The nationwide averages for mortgage rates do not include add-on fees known as points. Thirty-year and 15-year mortgages each carried an average fee of 0.6 point this week, while one-year adjustable mortgages carried an average fee of 0.7 point.

A year ago, rates on 30-year mortgages averaged 5.91 percent, 15-year mortgages were 5.31 percent and one-year adjustable mortgages stood at 3.93 percent.

The housing market, powered by low mortgage rates, helped to support the economy throughout 2003. The Mortgage Bankers Association, in an economic outlook Thursday, predicted home sales would slow slightly over the next two years.

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The 2004 Cadillac SRX

Cadillac's recent aggressiveness in developing and rolling out new models has been paying off more and more in worthwhile, often exciting, new vehicles and increased sales. And while not as innovative as, say, the Escalade SUV that Cadillac introduced a few years ago or its new XLR convertible, the 2004 Cadillac SRX was something well worth introducing.


SRX is the first car-based SUV offered by Cadillac, a true wagon-SUV "crossover" that is meant to compete with sundry other new vehicles. On the top end, SRX, whose suggested retail prices begin at about \$39,000, could be considered in the same breath with Chrysler's Pacifica and the Nissan Murano. But Cadillac really is aiming at the BMW X5 and Mercedes-Benz M-class vehicles, and indeed offers a raft of options that can push the price of SRX close to \$60,000.

I'd get off somewhere in the \$50,000's. SRX is nifty, but not worth that kind of outlay.

Like every other Cadillac lately, SRX makes a styling statement, beginning with its extremely blunt and angular front end that has become a modern signature for Cadillac design. The rest of the vehicle is rather understated, distinguishing itself clearly as closer to the low-profile outline of a station wagon than that of an SUV. Still, its distinctive styling makes CRX stand out in a sea of increasingly lookalike SUVs and endemically cookie-cutter minivans.

On the V8 version I drove, the addition of 18inch wheels was a nice touch as well. Overall, SRX's styling inspires confidence that this is a well-appointed but no-nonsense vehicle.

That ethos carries through the interior of the vehicle. The appointments are clearly deserving of the Cadillac moniker, including dashboard controls that are at once complex but easy to use. The centralized display screen – with its nice organization

of information for the radio, the climate system and other features in one place – represents an advanced evolution of a device that the industry, overall, is still struggling to perfect in terms of being user-friendly. Walnut trim and leather upholstery establish a modern-luxury feel, yet the industrial-dimpled dashboard suggests utility as well.

The only problem with the interior front is that it is home to a long roster of a la carte options that quickly can ramp SRX into the pricing stratosphere. The possibilities include an Ultra View sunroof (that sheds light on the rear as well as the front) for about \$2,400 a rear-seat DVD-entertainment system (\$1,200), XM Satellite Radio, OnStar and an upgraded Bose audio system (about \$1,000). The most popular options are available in "moneysaving" packages as well.

Standard safety features include dual-stage front airbags, front side seat-mounted airbags, roofmounted side curtain airbags for the first and second rows of seats, daytime running, lights, anti-lock brakes and traction control.

As you move back in SRX, things simplify a bit but get even better. The back seat is plenty roomy for three, and the slight elevation of the second row of seats gives it a "theater-seating" feel that kids

usually like. In the far rear, there's plenty of cargo space in the configuration that I drove, a \$49,000 version. Three different panels pull out of the floor of the rear cargo area with various sizes and shapes of compartments. But I couldn't resist thinking how impractical they really must be. Occasionally or even regularly, I would guess, the driver of an SRX might come up with a bunch of things for which specific compartments would be a perfect fit. Yet on the whole, I concluded, they're probably little used.

What you really want in the rear of SRX is the optional third-row seat for up to three people. Floor space is a bit at a premium and the seat is difficult to get into and out of. But for an extra \$1,000, you can get a power version that is activated with a button along the wall.

Besides the styling, perhaps the best aspect of this vehicle is the V6 and V8 powertrains - the latter being a 320-horsepower, 4.6-liter Northstar engine - that provide plenty of oomph, though fuel economy is a fairly standard 15 mpg in the city and 20 on the highway. Add in all-wheel-drive for fine traction, and away you go in SRX - to a satisfying ride indeed.

The Snow Looks Beautiful, But How Is Your Car Doing?

The Car Care Council reminds motorists to have the following items checked for Winter's **Freezing Weather:**

Tune up - Although these days a tune up is often referred to as a "performance" or engine analysis" the intent is the same, to make certain your engine is running properly. This process addresses problems such as rough idling, poor acceleration, hard starts, weak acceleration or poor fuel economy.

Cooling System - Every two years the cooling system should be flushed and refilled with fresh antifreeze, also referred to as coolant. To ensure maximum protection, the rule of thumb for this mixture is 50% water and 50% coolant. If your system has been flushed in the last 24 months, double-check the coolant's freeze protection for the winter season.

Note: Many vehicles are equipped with special components/coolant designed to last for 5-years or 150,000 miles. Although this is an extended interval, motorists should be aware that this coolant does require changing. In addition, this special coolant should not be mixed with standard antifreeze.

Heater and defroster - This system ensures both comfort and visibility. Have it checked (including proper operation of all ducts) prior to the onset of cold weather.

Exhaust system - Throughout the winter months we read news reports of deaths due to carbon monoxide poisoning: Leaking exhaust is to blame, This can be prevented with a an on-the-lift inspection for holes in mufflers or exhaust pipes that allow the deadly gasses to escape into the car.

Oil - Because winter weather exaggerates the effects of any harmful automotive situation, it's important that your oil/oil filter are changed according to your owner's manual. Many manuals refer to "severe service" driving. This is not necessarily a designation for semi trucks going on long hauls. In fact, this classification may include your car if it is subjected to stop and go driving or a number of short trips around town.

Battery - Your battery grows weaker in cold weather. A battery's power is reduced by 35% when the thermometer drops to freezing and 60% when the temperature dips to zero. Ask your technician to check the battery. He/she should scrape any corrosion from the posts/cable connections and check the fluid level when appropriate.

Hoses and belts - Many new cars have several hoses but only one belt. This makes service an important issue. Ask your technician check these for any cracks or tears. Mushy feeling hoses need to be replaced. Check the owner's manual for a belt/hose replacement schedule. If you have lots of miles on your vehicle, you might want to do a complete changeover.



Wiper blades - Heat and the summer sun take their toll on windshield wipers. If your blades are cracking, chattering or smearing invest in new ones. Those designed to dislodge ice from the windshield can be especially helpful. Invest in an ice scraper, and keep your washer reservoir filled. This will ensure that you'll

never have to peer through a grimy windshield. Tires - Driving on worn tires is scary in any weather, especially winter. Make sure your tires are wearing evenly and that all treads are at least 1/16th of an inch in depth. Many motorists in cold climates replace all season tires with winter tires. These are designed with special compounds that grip ice and dispel

Too much air pressure reduces traction and handling; too little air also makes for poor handling and increases rolling resistance, which increases fuel usage. Keep tires inflated to owner's manual recommendations and check pressure monthly on "cool" tires. Don't forget to check the spare.

Fuel - Keep your gas tank at least half-full. This serves two purposes. First, you'll never be caught with an empty tank. Second, condensation will be less likely to take place, keeping water out of your fuel tank.

Finally, don't forget to prepare yourself for an emergency. Cell phones are great but not always 100% reliable. Consider the worst case scenario and pack your car accordingly. Don't forget blankets, flares, a flashlight, snacks, water and vital medications.
