

Soccer parents set goals for improvements

A group of Plymouth-Canton Schools parents is undertaking a \$200,000 project to build a freshman/junior varsity soccer field and improve practice facilities at Plymouth-Canton Educational Park.

"Although we've got a really first-class soccer program at all three high schools ... we don't have first-class physical facilities," said Bob Harris, a member of the committee that presented the plan to the Board of Education.

Committee member Mike Marsh said there are just too many teams using the current high school facilities.

"When you look at the expansion across the Park from two to three high schools, and in many cases where you have a varsity team and junior varsity-freshman teams, that's now expanded to six teams across each high school, 18 teams participating on each site," said Marsh. "That, obviously, puts a tremendous amount of pressure on the existing field.

"In benchmarking it with other facilities, when you consider all the elements of the soccer program - the bench area, concession booths, restrooms and the like - we are among the worst in the Western Lakes Conference, ranked at the very bottom," he said.

As well as improving the practice facilities and constructing a new game field (\$50,000), the plan calls for constructing a multi-purpose building to include a concession stand, cap accessible restrooms and storage (\$115,000); building "best in class" bench areas, including an announcer's booth and dugouts (\$30,000); an improved public address system; and constructing handicap access to the specta-

Marsh said there is strong interest among the parents of soccer players, past and present, to support the comprehensive effort to upgrade the soccer complex.

We plan to use extensive private funding, with a very aggressive campaign," said Marsh. "We have a lot of passion in making this a success. We'd like to have all this operational and ready to go by August."

Marsh said the group has already secured \$10,000 in private commitments. But, while







Meetings to go paperless Diversity a never-ending journey

Canton trustee and Planning Commissioner Melissa McLaughlin remembers when the packets that commissioners got for the meetings were so big she asked for a wagon to carry them in.

"I jokingly complained that they should get us little wagons," she said. "They actually got us these little dollies. I used it a couple of times but that was it.'

Just by their nature the packets have to be big. They contain all the requests and proposals that trustees and commissioners will act on, including documentation, backup materials, blueprints, architectural renderings, photographs - whatever is needed to understand the project under review

"We're producing a phone book stack of notebook paper every two weeks," McLaughlin said. "That's just insane."

But no more. The phone book has turned into a laptop - as in computer. This month, trustees, planning commissioners, elected officials and township department heads received laptop computers and electronic board packets.

That huge paper packet is now all there on a tiny compact disk. And so far everyone seems happy with the changeover.

"There's still a learning curve involved," said Clerk Terry Bennett. "But there are so many things you can do with Adobe Acrobat (the program used to build the packets). You can highlight text, put notes on a page, all sorts of things to play with and learn. We're going step by step as we learn

Supervisor Tom Yack said the decision to go paperless was not made quickly.

"We first started talking about this seven or eight years ago," he said. "We intentionally decided not to become pioneers. The technology was there but we didn't feel there were enough choices."

He said by allowing other communities to become the

innovators, Canton was able to play off their experience.

In addition to saving on paper, the system has other advantages.

"You're talking hundreds and hundreds of pages for each meeting," Yack said. "That's a lot of paper and it takes a lot of staff time to move it around. This way it moves through so quickly it's amazing."

Agenda items are generated by the various departments in the township. But each item has to be approved by the supervisor and the finance department. In the past that meant hand-delivering the paperwork back and forth among the departments, a process that could take days in itself.

"We spent an incredible amount of time preparing the board packets," said Tony Minghine, director of finance and budget. "The process could take almost a week, sometimes more. It was literally thousands of pages a week."

Now staff members can access the packets through their desktop computers, plug in the laptop and load the information into it, take it home to work on it, and take it to the meetings.

While officials are still tweaking the process, Minghine said he's happy with the system.

They are still working with the technology people, but when the kinks are worked out the plan is to make the packets available through the township's Web site (www.cantonmi.org), so that members of the media and the general public can access them from home or work.

Though the laptops cost around \$3,000 each, Minghine said the savings involved with the system should offset that.

School program honors King's life, message

As a 12-year-old boy growing up in the cornfields of Canton Township — near Ridge and Napier roads — Frank Wu always knew he'd be different. As the son of Asian-Americans, Wu heard the stereotypes.

"Are your parents communists? How can you see with your eves like that?" remembered Wu. "It didn't matter how I tried to be like the kid next door, things will always be different for me."

Wu, a 1988 graduate of Salem High School and now the dean of Wayne State University's Law School, spoke to Plymouth-Canton educators Monday during a professional development seminar focusing on diversity, while honoring the works of Dr. Martin Luther

Wu said he still hears the stereotypes.

"On the street I'm greeted with karate chops, as if I was Jackie Chan or Bruce Lee," he said. "People think I sell Ginsu knives, or break cinder blocks with my head."

On the day set aside to honor King, Wu said "it's the one day of the year I don't expect it."

Wu noted diversity is a never-ending journey, just like democracy.

"It's not a march to a destination, not to ever think about it again," said Wu. "But, realizing once we march, and rest, we pick up and march again.

"The march isn't about a destination, but about a jour-

That's why Wu, who had a tenure track job at Howard University in Washington,

D.C., decided to come home. "It was a chance to be part of

the renaissance of a major U.S. city," said Wu of moving to

center, the riverfront being redone and houses being built in the city, I wanted to be a part of that," he said.

Wu said he made a conscious effort to live downtown in Detroit's Lafayette Park, to show he was serious about being part of the city's turnaround and reshaping its

"The work I do is about democracy, participation and civil rights," he said. "If I'm serious about what I write and talk about, I've got to roll back my sleeves and go back to my hometown. Otherwise, it's all

Wu, now 37 and the author of Yellow, Race of America Beyond Black and White, said King was great at bridge building, asking people to live up to what they claim are their ideals.

"It's important for us to see that Dr. King, although he spoke profoundly and compellingly about the condition of African Americans specifically, his message was universal," said Wu. "It's not just a matter of self interest. It's a matter of the principles we believe in, and whether or not as a nation we live up to them."

Angela Wong, a fourth-grade teacher at Field Elementary with a bi-racial ancestry, said she could relate to Wu's stories, remembering growing up in

"I got the same questions," she said. "Where are you from? Were you adopted? Half breed, go back to where you came from.

"It was horrible," she said. "As a young kid, there are mean things that come along every day. But, when you have those thrown into the mix, it was tough."

Carolyn Washington, the principal at Hulsing Elementary, has lived in Canton the last 21 years and watched as the population has become more diverse. Washington, an African-American, said her daughter was once the target of "skinheads" while attending Salem High School.

"I've seen things change, and I see things that need to be changed," said Washington. "Race and prejudice isn't just black and white, but with people who are different.

"Learning to appreciate and respect diversity is a journey, not a destination," she

"It will never end, and we just have to keep working on

lege tour next month." But it was not all music at the ceremony. There were also remembrances to King.

"He was a son and a husband and a father," Barker told the audience before the music program got under way. "He was a pastor, a man of God, a humble and decent man. He was rather ordinary. He was also Time Magazine's man of the year and the winner of the Nobel Peace Prize.

"He made remarkable changes in our world, in our social world and in our moral world and in our awareness of each other. Martin Luther King's vision of a nonviolent, colorblind, loving society is here with us forever."

And 19th District Judge Mark Somers of Dearborn, who lived in India where his parents were missionaries, added his own insights to the ceremony.

"I opened my newspaper this morning and I saw a message," he said. "It's a Martin Luther King Jr. Day We Always Have a Free Phone for Your advertisement,

"One of the phones they advertise is a Sprint phone and I'm pleased to tell you that on Michigan Avenue in front of the Sprint store they tell you that the free phone

comes in many different colors. I don't think that's what this day is really about and although I'm laughing about it, there's a part of me inside that cries."

Calling King "arguably the greatest African American to ever grace the earth," Somers said you don't have to lead a civil rights movement to honor the man.

"Just take advantage of the opportunities in your own community to teach another," he said.



School board President Mark Slavens likes the community effort, but is cautious about committing scarce district funds.

Superintendent Jim Ryan seemed a bit more optimistic, but still said "it's a slim possibility.



Time to consider school board run

If you're still considering running for the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education, you don't have as long as you might think to make the decision.

Ānd if you're not thinking about it, maybe you should. Either way, the filing deadline is coming up faster than it has in previous years, thanks to the new state law that only allows elections in four months of the year. With the school board election moved from June to May, the filing deadline has also crept closer, coming this year Feb. 8.

Which gives prospective board members just under four weeks to answer this basic question: "Do I want to have a role in determining the course of our schools?"

Historically, there isn't a whole lot of interest in running for the board. Traditionally, there aren't a lot of candidates. And, judging by the annual vote totals, where the last few years turnout has been less than 5 percent, there isn't a lot of interest in the school board ... period.

This always baffles us, because perhaps nowhere in elective government can an elected official affect more lives than on the school board. It's the one body that has control over the future of our most important asset — our children.

And in these tight economic times, the Plymouth-Canton school board - along with school boards across the state, really — faces huge challenges, particularly with its budget. With state revenue sharing taking hits the last several years, Supt: Jim Ryan said he put together five different budgets in an attempt to anticipate what the state would do.

There's only one seat up for grabs this year — that of incumbent Tom Wysocki - which might keep the field lower than normal. And there's also an inclination to think that inexperience will keep you off the board. However, in the last few years, first-timers Wysocki, Carol Saunders, Joanne Lamar, Rich Ham-Kucharski and Barry Simescu have all been elected.

There are a lot of reasons not to run for the school board: "I don't have the time." "It's a big responsibility." "I don't know anything about running a school district." "The dog ate my filing application."

The truth is, not running is much easier than running. However, the one true reason for getting involved trumps all excuses for not: You can help determine the future of our children.

Taxpayers deserve frugal governments

At the end of last year, Gov. Jennifer Granholm and Lt. Gev. John Cherry made a gesture in the fight to rein in the troubled state budget by volunteering to take a pay cut.

Though small and fiscally insignificant, the symbolism is mportant. We must look at every option to trim fat from government at all levels, eliminate non-essential services to preserve essential services, cut back administrative costs and find ways to eliminate duplication of services.

Right-sizing government won't be easy. People in power want to retain that power. Any reductions in work force or benefits are going to be resisted by employee unions. Offestions of ownership and power sharing, as in the ongoing dispute over water and sewer rates and services, are a legal tangle with racial and urban vs. suburban overtones.

And some residents feel they have more control and get

more response from their local government. But it is clear that taxpayers are willing to pay only so much for government services and they want to know that they will get a fair return on their dollar. They also want to

know that they aren't paying twice for the same service. Governments are aware that more needs to be done. Plymouth and Plymouth Township share a joint fire department and police/fire dispatch. Livonia, Redford and other communities have been in discussions about combining emergency dispatch services. Farmington and Farmington Hills combine library and recreation services

and are discussing combining police/fire dispatch. *The Conference of Western Wayne County, a consortium of 18 western Wayne communities, gathers together the chief elected officers of those communities to discuss common concerns, pending legislation and services. The Southeast Michigan Conference of Governments acts as both a research department for local governments and a conduit for regional funding for transportation and other projects.

But in this time of reduced revenues, we need to take a hard look at the layers upon layers of government and decide what is necessary and what isn't.

We need to decide whether government is here to serve residents or to serve itself. At the local and county level, we need, to borrow the governor's favorite phrase, to think outside the box and create a leaner, less top-heavy government structure.



Need fairness

The president has declared his intent to overhaul the federal tax code along with Social Security. That can only mean one thing, doing away with the progressive income tax. Ever since the "modern" income tax was implemented in 1913, the fairness of a progressively higher rate for people with higher incomes has been well-accepted.

The argument is that it is fair for the wealthy, who benefit more from our economic system and have a higher percentage of disposable income, to pay a higher percent than the rest of us. Until now. Some are suggesting a flat income tax rate. Even a federal sales tax. The clever idea being to invert the whole deal and tax those of us at the lower end of the ladder more. Local, state and federal taxes are already stacked against the least fortunate.

It surprised me to learn that due to special breaks, a very high portion of business pays no federal income tax whatsoever (and don't tell me it's because they aren't making money).

Let me make one very simple suggestion. If a flat tax is fair, it seems like it would also be fair to eliminate the \$87,000 cap on income taxable for Social Security. That would mean, for example, that a person earning \$200,000 would pay \$26,000 (instead of under \$6,000), or just about enough to cover their own retirement benefit for one year.

That seems fair to me. Oh, incidentally, it would pump billions into the trust fund and go a long way toward bailing our Social Security - without the inherent risk of "privatizing" that the president insists on.

Help the tsunami victims, but be careful how you do it

t's been nearly four weeks since a killer tsùnami snuffed out an estimated 150,000 lives in parts of southeast Asia, and caused untold billions of dollars worth of property damage.

Even with the passage of time, images of one of the worst natural disasters in history remain fresh. Still, it is hard to grasp the magnitude of the disaster, even with a steady stream of videotape and news reports flooding the Internet and television on an hourly basis.

Predictably, the world — led once again by the United States - has mobilized to

> help the tens of thousands of people whose lives and spirits were broken by the giant waves. Not since the terrible day that the twin towers of the World Trade Center came crashing down have we seen such an outpouring of support.

Locally, it seems everybody is raising money for the relief effort. The vast Bauman majority of the efforts, I'm sure, are sincere and wellintended. Still, being a

trained cynic, some of the press releases that have come across my desk recently from businesses promoting fund-raisers have activated my scam radar. I'm not saying any of the efforts are a

fraud or in any way illegal. But I have to question if some of the fund-raisers are intentionally or otherwise - using a tragedy to promote a business or product. Many local businesses are using their

locations as collection sites for donations, which is a good thing. Several are going a step further and matching the donations up to a set amount, which is a great thing. But a fund-raising effort that requires the

purchase of a product or service calls into question just who is really benefiting from the effort. Some recent examples of fuzzy fund-rais-

ers that have crossed my desk in the past week include:

A group of 40 car dealers pledging to donate \$25 to the Salvation Army for each vehicle sold during the month of January.

A Southfield chiropractor offering \$25 evaluations with the proceeds being donat-

ed to the relief effort. A Franklin bead store offering to host free bead parties and donate a percentage of the resulting sales.

A "local gay church" boasting it had collected \$1,214.17 from its congregation and then using the rest of the six-paragraph

release to promote the church.

■ A local university offering to donate the proceeds from a soup supper to the relief effort, and throwing in either a ticket to a women's basketball game or salsa dance les-

Asking people to give money to any cause is never easy. Over the years, I have been involved in many fund-raising campaigns for various groups and organizations I have worked with.

My experience has been that if the person you are asking believes in the organization you are pitching or, more importantly, has faith in you, the cash will come. Demonstrate a need, build a sense of trust that the money raised will be spent for the intended purpose, and the rest will take care of itself.

Hundreds of millions of dollars have been raised to date to aid the tsunami victims and begin the rebuilding process. It will take years, and hundreds of million dollars more, before the physical scars caused by the disaster are repaired.

Events like the tsunami serve as painful reminders of just how fortunate we are to live in a time and place where most of us take for granted life's basic necessities of food, shelter, clean water and sanitation. We can't help but feel a need to reach out and help those who now have none of these things.

We all need to do our part. But before deciding how to help, ask yourself this question: Does it make more sense to simply write a check directly to one of the relief organizations, or buy a car, take a salsa lesson, host a bead party or schedule a chiropractic evaluation in the name of tsunami

With new job in hand, Canton mom looks forward to far better days

enée LaForest gets to do something this week she hasn't done in nearly three years. LaForest, the Canton mother of three whose youngest daughter, Delaney, has been battling a

brain tumor, finally gets to cash a paycheck. That may not seem such a big thing to you or me, or to anyone else with a regular job that pro-yides a check every week or two, no matter how small. To LaForest, who for three years has had to watch her savings dry up and then, particularly in the last several months, had to depend on the kindness of strangers, it's everything.

And it comes at a time when nobody could have blamed LaForest for giving up. After all, in the last

three years, she'd lost two jobs, had her daughter diagnosed with Ewing's sarcoma and struggled to keep her family afloat.

It was a fight neither the battle-weary LaForest nor her children ever quit fighting.

Now, with a New Year and a new job at Borders in Ann Arbor, she can look forward to rebuilding the life she enjoyed before Laney's illness.

"This job was a godsend," said LaForest, whose primary skill is in corporate training and com-

puters. The job wasn't the only thing LaForest believes God sent her. A deeply Christian woman, LaForest doesn't think her family could have survived the long ordeal without a lot of prayers being

answered. Members of her former church in Ohio and families in her Canton neighborhood have responded in ways LaForest couldn't have imagined.

Church families at St. Thomas a' Becket in Canton (her new church), along with the St. Vincent dePaul Society and the Plymouth Salvation Army, responded to her story with kindness and help. It was a lot for the proud LaForest to accept after an adult life spent providing for her own children, but she knew it was either that or crumble.

She bit her tongue, swallowed her pride and let people - genuinely caring people, she was pleasantly surprised to find - help her. Families with names like Carter, Barman, Dunn, Faunce-Jones, Hulett, Weiser and Trost all banded together to provide food, clothing and shelter.

Strangers appeared at the Salvation Army and St. Thomas a' Becket with grocery bags, shopping bags or just envelopes. Some contained cash, some simply good wishes.

All touched LaForest's heart equally. The generosity actually got to be too much, and when LaForest's pantry overflowed with donations, she was able to give some back to other needy families. That eased the pain of her own need.

"When I think of all the families that reached

out in one way or another to bring cheer to our lives this past holiday season, prayers, gas or grocery cards, or gifts of toys and clothing for the children, it warms my heart," she said.

Still, LaForest struggled. Employer after employer heard her tale and, while sympathizing,** pointed out either that LaForest would have to miss too much time with Delaney's medical appointments, or that she'd been out of work too long.

It was a Catch-22: The high-paying companies wouldn't hire her because she hadn't had a fulltime job for a couple of years, and she couldn't get the lower-paying jobs because employers figured rightly so — LaForest would bolt at the first sight of greener pastures.

Then came the Tuesday before Christmas, when a recruiting agency found her resume on Monster.com and recommended her to Borders. Twenty-four hours later, LaForest had a threemonth commitment, with a chance at full-time employment in April.

Until then, she's happy. The job is challenging, ~ her employers are willing to let her work around Delaney's medical schedule and she can even wear, jeans if she wants.

The company seems very family-oriented, the women I work for and with have children, one woman has survived cancer herself," LaForest said. .. "They were not at all fazed when I explained my time away from corporate America since Delaney became ill and I chose to leave the work force. They focused instead on what I could bring to their organization, as it should be."

She's not used to being up at 5:30 a.m. to be at work by 7:30. She's not used to having to go to bed when her kids do, so she can get enough sleep. But you definitely aren't going to hear her complaining. "

"I'm thrilled to be back at work after two-and-ahalf years off, so excited really!" LaForest said. "Good stress, bad stress, it's all stress ... but I will find a way to manage the good and be grateful that

The entire experience has LaForest reassessing ... her life, and her goals. She's considering going back to school to do social work, something she's learned a lot about the last three years. She would, like to help others fighting some of the same kinds of problems the way others have helped her.

It's the one saving grace of enduring the ordeal. "It has served a purpose — to point out where my focus must remain going forward, the importance of family, and reinforced my faith, hope and love in God," LaForest said. "I still pray early and often for those of you getting your lives back together, and those still fighting. I've always looked 3 at all of you as a 'family' of sorts, and you will remain in my thoughts always."



VENDORS PUSH FOR SALES

I'm criticizing the shows. In fact, this much competition in one place is advantageous for consumers.


As with any sales agreement you enter into, do it as a smart consumer. It's definitely best to get at least three quotes on any project. You'll find that there may be vast price differences between vendors for the same job.

Don't be afraid to ask for an explanation of these differences. The cheapest (or most expensive) are not necessarily the best choice. Don't forget to get and verify references. Ask to see a copy of the copy of the contractor's license and their certificates of insurance before making your final selection.

A homeowner is responsible for payment to subcontractors or vendors who were not paid by the contractor. Licensed contractors in Michigan pay into the construction lien recovery fund. This money is used to compensate a homeowner who has a lien put on their property by an unpaid subcontractor or supplier. Further, you can be held responsible for an injured employee or damage to a neighbor's property if the contractor doesn't have proper protection.

Most important, don't sign on with anyone you are not entirely comfortable with. Be certain to get everything in writing and keep a copy.



"I was a kid who hated spinach and broccoli," Trombley said. "But I totally did a 180-degree turn."



BRAISED VEAL SHANKS

(Osso Buco) 8 1/2-inch sliced veal shanks 2 ounces olive oil

3 cloves of garlic 2 sprigs of thyme 1 cup julienne white

1/2 cup carrots, large dice (or parsnips) 1/2 cup celery, large dice, 1/2 cup dried tomatoes 1 cup red wine (semi dry) 1 cup low-sodium beef

broth Salt and pepper, to taste

Heat oven to 325º F. When oven is hot, also heat your heavy gauge pan that has a tight lid.)

Season the veal lightly. Add oil to pan. Brown veal on all sides. (If pan is too hot, adjust tempera-

ture.) Add vegetables, garlic and thyme and sweat (cook at low temperature) for 2-3 minutes. Add stock and red wine, then cover and place in oven and cook for approximately 2 hours.

After 11/2 hours, add the dried tomatoes.

Check for tenderness. If meat is tender, pull veal and vegetables out. Reduce sauce to thick consistency.

Taste and season if necessary. Place veal and vegetables back in to pan to re-warm and serve.



Braised foods taste great

hen I think of the word braise, a lot of ideas come to mind.

I enjoy cooking this way because it reminds me of homey comfort food. It also reminds me of cooking in a professional kitchen.

Braising is simple. This cooking method began in heavy pots called "braisiere," a heavy-gauge vessel in which one would heat and brown a tougher cut of meat in animal fat. Mirepoix vegetables (carrots, onions and celery) were added, along with water and sometimes stock. This vessel was closed tightly and placed in hot coals for several hours until the meat was rendered tender.

I am happy to say it is now a little easier to braise. You still need that heavy pot or pan with a lid, but we don't need the coal (just use an oven) to accomplish this.

If you choose to braise, keep in mind several valuable ideas.

Though animal fat is best for flavor, olive oil can be used for both some flavor and health concerns. The vegetables don't have to be just mirepoix, but any of a merit of others, including parsnips, which can replace carrots for a similar, but unique, flavor. Most grocery stores carry these items.

But don't be afraid to try other types of vegetables that you may not have considered, such as dried tomatoes (Vo know, the kind in the plastic bag that you couldn't saw through if you tried.) As long as these tomatoes aren't 20 years old, they are packed with flavor. Add them a half hour before the end of the cooking process. (I would say "Bamm!" but someone stole that.)

Just make sure the ingredients are compatible with whatever recipe you are preparing.

When you have chosen your ingredients and are ready to proceed, have all of your prep work done ahead of time.

Peel and cut your carrots and place them in a bowl. Pull the skin off your onions. cut them and reserve them.

too. What you want to achieve is almost a systematic routine and not just this recipe, but for all the cooking you may do. By prepping earlier, you will be able to cut your total cook time in half.

Find a better balance on your plate

Obesity in the United States has become a public health issue. In response, the American Institute for Cancer Research is recommending that Americans shift the proportions as well as the portions on their plates.

The AICR recommends a plate with two-thirds or more vegetables, fruits, whole grains and beans and one-third or less of animal protein. Research suggests that a diet rich in vegetables, fruits, whole grains and beans will have both short-term and

long-term benefits. It can help with weight management and impede the process that leads to cancer. Natural plant substances, called phytochemicals, have been shown to have cancer-fighting properties. So the AICR recommends increasing the intake of fruits and vegetables while cutting back on animal fats.

For example, research has shown that American diets are overloaded with omega-6 fats and deficient in omega-3 fats, a condition that has been linked to increased cancer

Omega-6 fats are found in vegetable oils such as corn. safflower, sunflower and soybean oil. They are often used in processed snacks, baked products and commercial salad dressings

Cold-water fish are the best dietary source of omega-3 fatty acids, but recent concerns about toxins in some fish have confused many people who are looking to get more omega-3s into their diet. One

Savor the slowcooked meal

Braising is one-pot cooking that is tenderizing, aromatic, incredibly flavorful and easy. Technically, it means cooking food, with just a little liquid and tightly covered, over low heat for a long time.

Braising differs from stewing, which uses lots of liquid and can be done in an uncovered pot. It doés not produce the seductively intense sauces you get from braising.


Because it tenderizes, braising is ideal for today's leaner, often tough cuts of meat, especially the less expensive ones. The moist heat is also ideal for making skinless poultry as succulent as possible. In fact, a recent cookbook, In Praise of Brigising, by Molly Stevens. recommends short braising, which takes, at most, an hour of intended simmering, perfeet for both poultry and fish because of its ability to infuse them with deep flavor.

The best pot for braising is heavy, ideally made of cast iron, enameled or not, or stainless steel-clad aluminum, both of which conduct heat slowly and evenly and work both on top of the stove and in

the oven. A tight-fitting lid holds in the braising liquid along with the juices, so as the food cooks their flavors can mingle and concentrate. Use a pot that holds what you are cooking snugly. Placing a sheet of cooking parchment or foil between the pot and lid can assure a good seal if a lid does

Two of the best braised dishes I know are Shanghai redcooked pork and Greek green beans simmered with tomatoes. Most of the braised dishes you know probably have foreign origins, from coq au vin - French - and osso bucco - Italian - to pot roast, which was Americanized from French boeuf à la mode and German sauerbraten.

Many Indian dishes are braised, including this one. It uses onions two ways - puréed in a spicy sauce, and sliced to cook on top of the chicken. Draining the yogurt first before it is stirred into the sauce at the end makes this dish creamier. I suggest using a Greek- or Turkish-style yogurt. Thicker and richer, even when reduced-fat or fatfree, they have become increasingly available at super-

Indian-Style Braised Chicken

1 container (6 ounces) low-fat plain yogurt, preferably Greek-style

1 medium yellow onion, coarsely chopped

½ cup orange juice 1 tablespoon grated or finely

chopped ginger 2-3 garlic cloves 1 teaspoon ground coriander ½ teaspoon turmeric

% teaspoon cayenne pepper 4 skinless and boneless chicken breasts or thighs

1 tablespoon canola oil Salt and white pepper, to taste 1 Spanish onion, quartered and sliced thinly

Place the yogurt into a fine strainer lined with a paper towel and let drain while preparing the other ingredients. (The yogurt

can also be drained overnight, if refrigerated.)

In a blender or food processor, purée the onion, garlic, ginger, coriander, turmeric, cayenne pepper and orange juice. Set aside.

Heat the oil in a medium skillet over medium-high heat. Brown the chicken on all sides, about 8 minutes. Season chicken with salt and pepper to taste and transfer to a plate.

Reduce heat to medium. Carefully pour the puréed mixture into the pan to avoid sputters. Bring it to a simmer. Return the chicken to the pan.

Cover tightly and simmer gently 15 minutes.

Turn chicken, cover, and continue to simmer. When chicken is almost done, add onions, cover and simmer until the meat is thoroughly cooked through. Place the chicken on a serving plate and cover with foil to keep

Turn off heat under skillet to allow mixture to cool slightly. Stir in the drained yogurt.


Reduce heat to low and continue stirring until mixture is hot, taking care not to let it boil or the sauce will separate.

Spoon the mixture over the chicken and serve.

Pomegranates: Culinary jewels made easy

Pomegranates are the fruit of the moment. Thanks to their health benefits, the burst of culinary creativity they inspire, plus marketing promotions, this jewel-like fruit is receiving the attention it well deserves.

Recent scientific studies report the various good effects pomegranates can produce, thanks to their abundance of vitamin C, heart-benefiting polyphenols, and high levels of flavonoids, antioxidants that also seem to protect against heart disease and cancer. Evidently, drinking pomegranate juice can be better for you than consuming red wine, green tea, or cranberry and orange juice.

Chefs are using fresh pomegranate seeds, pomegranate juice, and even more intensely flavored pomegranate molasses in a feast of ways. Menus with media appeal feature salads with its succulent, ruby seeds scattered over

Pomegranate-enhanced main dishes and desserts also sparkle with these seeds. Using fresh pomegranates can be messy. The juice that can spurt out as you pry out the seeds can stain clothes. But there are tricks that help. Place a strainer or colander in a bowl and set it in the sink. Hold the pomegranate so the cut side is facing down. Pull the seeds from the fruit's leathery skin and let them drop into the colander. Then detach the seeds from the membrane holding them in place.

Fresh pomegranates have a short season that runs from September to December. Fortunately, savvy producers now offer pomegranate juice at local supermarkets as well as natural foods markets. And pomegranate molasses, generally found only in Middle Eastern groceries, is now more easily available as well. The juice is perfect in savory dishes as well as delicious to drink.

The molasses, made by reducing juice and sugar to a thick syrup that is pleasantly tart and astringent, is interesting added to tomato or citrus sauces. Pomegranate juice, excellent in this vinaigrette for spinach salad, also helps create a tempting dessert when drizzled over berries and other fruits.





Beans, rice combine in this salad

Interest in financial wealth and getting the year off to a healthy start come together in one food in particular – beans. Dishes made with an abundance of beans, a legume, is traditional in our South and Southwest, particularly Hoppin' John, a combination of black-eyed peas and rice.

In the Caribbean, rice and beans are also important, including the Cuban dish called Moors and Christians, with black beans representing the dark-skinned Moors (Ottoman Turks) and white rice the Christians.

For many Italians, eating lentils, another legume, is important because their round shape and color resemble that of coins.

Color also signals prosperity in yellow rice by evoking the color of gold. In the following recipe, it comes from curry powder and turmeric. This dish also has the red and green of the season and black beans, combining everything you could want for a healthy, prosperous year.

YELLOW RICE AND BLACK BEAN SALAD

1 can (14.5 ounces) fat-free, reduced-sodium chicken

broth
2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
1 cup brown rice

¼ teaspoon chipotle chile powder, or red pepper flakes ¼ teaspoon ground turmeric 1 can (15-ounces) black beans,

rinsed and drained 1 red bell pepper, seeded and diced

1 small green bell pepper, seeded and diced 1 medium red onion, chopped

2 tablespoons fresh lime Juice 1 teaspoon curry powder 1/21 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon sugar 1 tablespoon canola oil 1/2 cup cilantro leaves, for gar-

Heat /4 cup of the broth in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Add the garlic and cook 2 minutes or until the garlic softens. Add the remaining broth, rice, chile powder and turmeric. Pour in½ cup water. When the liquid come to a boil, reduce the heat, cover and simmer 45 minutes, or until the rice is tender. Remove from heat and let the rice sit, covered, for 5 minutes. Fluff the rice with a fork and turn it into a large mixing bowl.

When the rice is cooled to room temperature, add the beans, bell peppers and the onion.

In a small bowl, combine the lime juice, curry powder, salt and sugar. Whisk in the oil. drizzle the dressing over the rice and beans, tossing with a fork until blended. Arrange on a serving platter, sprinkle on the cilantro and serve. Makes 6 servings.





solution is to add plant foods. that contain omega-3s. These include green leafy vegetables such as kale, spinach and broccoli.

Cruciferous vegetables such as these are rich in antioxidants and a group of phytochemicals called dithiolthiones, which are believed to fight carcinogens and help inhibit the development of

cancer. Another substance found in many cruciferous vegetables, isothiocvanate, is one of the most effective cancer-fighting agents known. Kale, spinach, okra, and collard and mustard greens contain phytochemicals that appear to help ward off macular degeneration and decrease the risk of lung cancer.

Kale, especially, is a nutritional shining star. Not only is it packed with nutrients and phytochemicals, it brings a delicious, spicy flavor to

anything to which it is added. A member of the cabbage

family, kale has a mild flavor and frilly leaves. It is best in the winter, although it's available year round. Choose kale with a rich color and no limp or yellowing leaves. It can be stored in the refrigerator for two or three days. After that, the flavor becomes strong and the leaves become limp.

A stir-fry of kale and carrots is an attractive, colorful dish with a hearty nutritional punch. Carrots are also rich in health-protective substances, including lowered cancer risk.

STIR-FRIED KALE WITH SLIVERED CARROTS

3/4 pounds fresh kale **Boiling water**

2 teaspoons canola oil 2 carrots, peeled and cut in thin, matchstick strips

1-2 garlic cloves, minced 1 teaspoon ground coriander Salt and freshly ground black

pepper, to taste Pinch cayenne pepper, if

Remove stems from kale, including the large spine running through the center of the leaf. Place a few leaves on top of each other and cut into thin strips. Repeat until all the kale is cut. Add kale to a pot of boiling water and boil uncovered 10 minutes. Drain and set aside.

In a large skillet, heat oil over medium heat. Add carrots and sauté 2 minutes. Add garlic and sauté 1 more minute. Add coriander, salt and pepper to taste, and cayenne, if using. Cook 15 seconds. Add kale and cook 1-2 minutes. Makes 4 servings.





Steaks, salmon fill the plate this winter

Here are three recipes to try this winter.

Brandied Beef Tenderloin STEAKS

4 beef tenderloin steaks (6-8 ounces each and about 1inch thick)

Kosher salt and freshly ground

pepper 1/2 tablespoons olive oil

2 teaspoons minced garlic 1/4 cup beef stock 2 tablespoons brandy

3 tablespoons chopped fresh

If time allows, remove steaks from refrigerator about 1 hour before cooking.

Season steaks with salt and pepper. Heat oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add steaks. Cook 5-7 minutes per side for medium rare. Transfer steaks to platter and tent with foil to keep warm.

Add garlic to skillet; stir 20 seconds. Add stock and brandy. Boil until juices are reduced to a glaze.

Add any accumulated steak juices to pan; cook briefly and stir in parsley. Spoon glaze over steaks and serve. Serves 4. Recipes courtesy of Busch's Markets in Livonia, Plymouth and Farmington

ORANGE-GLAZED SALMON FILLETS

Four 6-ounce salmon fillets 1 tablespoon sesame oil

3 tablespoons soy sauce 1 cup freshly squeezed orange

1 teaspoon orange zest 3 tablespoons sherry

1/2 teaspoon grated ginger Preheat oven to 400° F.

Heat the oil in a large, nonstick skillet until it is hot but not smoking. Sear the salmon fillets one minute on each side.

Remove the fillets from the heat and transfer them to a glass baking dish or baking pan. Drizzle the soy sauce over them and bake for 10 minutes. Remove from the oven.

Meanwhile, heat the orange juice, zest, sherry and ginger together in a small saucepan over medium-high heat until it is reduced by half. Drizzle the sauce over the fish and serve.

MUSHROOM KNISHES

11/2 pounds russet potatoes (about 11/2 pounds) 1 tablespoon unsalted butter. optional

⅓ cup matzo meal

2 tablespoons potato starch (or cornstarch, if not preparing for Passover)

1/4 cup minced onion 2 egg whites, lightly beaten 1/4 teaspoon black pepper 1 teaspoon salt 1 tablespoon olive oil

Bring a pot of salted water to a boil. Peel potatoes and cut into 1inch chunks. Boil until fork-tender, 10-12 minutes. Drain and mash. Add one tablespoon of butter if desired.

11/2 cups finely chopped mush-

Preheat the oven to 375º F.

In a bowl, combine the mashed potatoes, matzo meal, potato starch, onion, egg whites, pepper and salt and knead together. Heat oil in a small sauté pan. Cook mushrooms with a pinch of salt until they are soft and most liquid is cooked

Divide the potato mixture into 6-8 portions. Shape into balls and flatten into disks about 3 inches wide. Place about I tablespoon of mushrooms onto the center of each circle. Gently fold over to make a half-moon shape. Press edges to seal.

Generously oil or coat a baking sheet with cooking oil spray. Arrange the knishes in a single layer and bake for 15 minutes on each side. Serve hot. Serve with a dollop of sour cream and garnish with snipped chives, if desired. Makes 6-8 knishes.

Co-owner should comply with access rule

We are having a problem, as a board, getting access to a condominium unit whose owner refuses to allow us to do so. Do we have any recourse?

The condominium rules (Michigan Administrative Code) mandate that all condominium bylaws shall provide that the association have access to the condominium unit as necessary during reasonable hours, except in the case of emergencies where no notice is required. If your bylaws contain this provision, you are best advised to write the coowner. If he or she doesn't comply, turn the matter over to your attorney, who can then proceed in the proper forum to obtain compliance from the co-owner. If your bylaws don't contain this provision, you should contact your attorney to amend them immediately.

I hired a buyer's agent and am wondering what responsibilities the buyer's agent has to the purchaser. I think there is some statutory requirement. Please help.

The six general fiduciary duties that Michigan Common Law requires of an agent on behalf of a client are obedience, loyalty, disclosure, confidentiality, accountability and reasonable care and skill. As to the duty of reasonable care and skill, an agent is expected to have certain skills and knowledge that he or she will use when pursuing the interests of the client.



30-year mortgage rates fall for second consecutive week, experts report

Rates on 30-year mortgages fell for a second straight week, helping to get the housing industry off to a good start in the new year.

Freddie Mac's weekly survey of mortgage rates showed that rates on 30-year, fixed-rate mortgages averaged 5.74 percent for the week ending Jan. 13, down from 5.77 the previous week.

Low mortgage rates have powered home sales. Analysts believe sales hit a record high for all of 2004 and the housing market is expected to post another good year in 2005. Amy Crews Cutts, the mortgage company's deputy chief economist, noted that 30-year mortgage rates averaged 5.84 percent for all of last year, a significant improvement over an average of 9.5 percent for the past 30 years.

"The onset of 2005 bodes well for the housing industry," she said.

She said rates are likely to end the year above 6 percent, reflecting in part the credittightening campaign of the Federal Reserve, which is raising rates to keep inflation in check.

Some analysts believe rates on 30-year mortgages could climb to around 6.5 percent by the end of this year, which would still be considered low by historical standards.

Rates on 15-year, fixed-rate mortgages, a popular option for refinancing, dipped this week to 5.19 percent, down from 5.21 percent the previous week. For one-year adjustable-rate mortgages, rates remained unchanged at 4.10 percent.

Freddie Mac added another type of mortgage to its weekly survey: a five-year, "hybrid" adjustable-rate mortgage. It's fixed for five years and then adjusts each year thereafter. The rate on that mortgage averaged 5.05 percent this week, up slightly from 5.03 percent.

The nationwide averages for mortgage rates don't include add-on fees known as points. The 30-year, 15-year and oneyear adjustable mortgages each carried a 0.6-point fee. The five-year adjustable mortgage carried a 0.5-point fee.

A year ago, rates on 30-year mortgages averaged 5.66 percent with 15-year mortgages at 4.97 percent and one year ARMs at 3.62 percent.

There isn't a figure for fiveyear adjustable mortgages because Freddie Mac just began tracking those rates this year.

Frank Lloyd Wright homes are hard to sell

'Dream' home has some drawbacks

Imagine having a dream home in a private, peaceful, bucolic setting and being unable to sell it because it was designed by Frank Lloyd Wright.

Some owners of one-of-a-kind houses conceived by the iconic architect are discovering it's not easy selling them in an era when cathedral ceilings and easy commutes are on the wish lists of many prospective purchasers.

But the sellers are also concerned about finding the right Wright buyers - ones who will cherish, not demolish, his creations.

After pouring tens of thousands of dollars into buying, repairing and renovating her Wrightdesigned house, Arlene Moran hasn't received any serious offers despite its pedigree. She's asking \$375,000 for the three-bedroom home in Galesburg, about halfway between Kalamazoo and Battle

"It's going on two years and I'm desperate," said Moran, 70. "I refuse to lower the price. I put in \$180,000 (worth) of restoration. I would like to have my money back."

But, Moran said, "I can't have just anybody" buy it. She considers her home, which she never has lived in, a work of art.

Don Schaberg is ready to sell the Okemos house he and his late wife commissioned Wright to design, and where they lived happily for four decades. Schaberg realizes it won't be easy finding someone willing to spend \$1.6 million for a 3,800-square-foot ranch without a garage, but also said he's under no real pressure to sell and doubts he will come down much on his price.

"I'm just certain the value is

going to increase," he said, calling the house and its six acres southeast of Lansing "the closest thing to heaven on earth."

Susan Sweetow, a real estate agent in Scottsdale, Ariz., who for two years worked as a tour guide at Taliesin West, Wright's sprawling, 600-acre winter home and work campus near Scottsdale, said "the market is narrow for his homes and limited to people who appreciate a work of art and a piece of history. It's important the market be geared toward that target market."

She said modern home buyers want big garages, large kitchens and spacious bathrooms - features not generally found in Wright's usonian homes.

You have to find the right buyer who will appreciate the qualities that were in his homes," Sweetow said.

Moran's southwestern Michigan home is part of a 72-acre association featuring four Wrightdesigned homes and one designed by a Wright apprentice. A unique feature shared by the five houses is that each sits on one circular acre of land, with the remaining property jointly owned by the members of the association.

The retired high school art instructor said no matter how enticing an offer she may receive, she would not sell to someone who would demolish the home.

Moran, who lives in the Chicago area, has tried advertising in local newspapers and in the Chicago Tribune. She has listed it for sale on the Web site of the Frank Lloyd Wright Building Conservancy.

The Chicago-based group is dedicated to preserving the architect's 400-plus structures that still stand.

The group was caught off guard weeks ago when a dilapidated Wright cottage in Grand Beach, on Lake Michigan near the Indiana border, was purchased and razed by its new owners to make way for a new home.

Ron Scherubel, the conservancy's executive director, said that as in other real estate transactions, there are a few important basics to keep

in mind when buying or selling Wright homes: price, location and condition.

While many of the grand homes from Wright's "prairie" period of the early 20th century were built in or near large cities, his smaller usonian homes - such as those owned by Schaberg and Moran often ended up in remote rural settings, which was part of the appeal.

"Many of these are still located in nice, scenic, country areas but they're not convenient for today's buyer who has to work in the city,: Scherubel said.

Ken Goldberg, a real estate agent trying to sell one of Wright's prairie homes built on Chicago's north side, said he expects a developer to purchase the 90-year-old structure. The asking price for the well-maintained house, which has been on the market for about six months, recently dropped from \$2.5 million to \$1.9 million.

Its view of Lake Michigan shrank over the years as taller buildings went up around it, but the property includes two adjacent lots that offer room to build.

North American Auto Show and Design

There are multiple kinds of buzz emanating from the North American International Auto Show this week in downtown Detroit. On one level, we're hearing that it's speed and horsepower - and future indications of more - that are causing excitement among consumers. Of course, there also are an increasing number of potential car buyers who are demonstrating a "green" sort of anticipation over the growing number of hybrid vehicles that are becoming available.

Then there's the technology crowd: The folks who come especially to see what doodads they might find on future vehicles. One of the most extreme conceptual examples of interesting new technology can be found on Ford's SYN SUV, essentially a consumerfriendly armored vehicle complete with self-deploying shutters that cover the windows when the vehicle is parked and bullet-proof glass that protects drivers from stray gunfire.

But more than anything else, both the show - and recent results in the marketplace - show that what consumers relish more than anything else these days is vehicles that simply look sharp. That makes design itself the new rudder of the automotive marketplace.

The renewed preoccupation with design is understandable, given a little history. The Seventies and Eighties snuffed out the industry's bolder renderings under safety and fuel-economy concerns. Then, auto makers spent the Nineties essentially copying the unvariegated "jeallybean" design of Ford's best-selling Taurus sedan. But global competition, the rise of the SUV and the digitization of the design process have combined to produce a profligate number of new vehicle types and models these days.

With quality and technological differences among products largely having leveled off over the last decade or so, eye-catching design can be decisive. "Both consumers and the car companies are ready to see more chances taken out there," says Chris Chapman, director of automotive design for DesignWorks USA, a unit of BMW. "People are kind of sick of the same old thing, and they're looking for something new."

But there's been a narrowing gap between "futuristic" designs and the exciting stuff that's already on the road. Chrysler exemplifies that better than any other

American company. It scored a hit a few years ago by quickly moving its retro-looking PT Cruiser wagon from concept status into production. Chrysler's encore this year is the 300 series, a line of mainstream sedans that features high window ledges, extremely short front and rear overhangs, and a blunt and bulky front end with a yawning grill that give the car an unmistakable machismo unlike anything else on the road these

"It gets people into the showrooms and gets their emotions going," says Trevor Creed, Chrysler's senior vice president of design, who was weaned on the great winged beasts of the Fifties such as the Chevrolet Bel Air.

Creed's crew also are responsible for the design renaissance at Chrysler's Dodge division, which has used huge, "horse-collar" grilles and grand curvature as the styling signatures of a whole range of distinctive models including Magnum, the wagon-like cousin of the 300; a bigger new Durango SUV; and the new version of the venerable Dodge Charger nameplate that Chrysler unveiled to great acclaim at the Detroit show.

After decades of serving as the avatar of bland design, General Motors also is taking a worthy number of chances these days -- and connecting with many of them. They include the Cadillac line, with a distinctive, chiseled styling theme that has helped revive the entire nameplate, and even the spiffy overhaul of the Envoy SUV, part of the company's relatively anonymous GMC brand.

Japanese auto makers, known more for killer fitand-finish than for daring design, also are moving the needle here. Nissan went first a few years ago as it struggled for survival, spawning bold new models such as the pod-shaped Murano "crossover" model and the Quest minivan, which sports an industrial-looking, design "that was meant to resemble an urban loft," says Diane Allen, a Nissan Design America manager.

Interiors also have benefited from the new energy behind design. The raw pleasure in beholding the severely rounded design of Audi's two-seater TT Roadster is amplified by the symphony of brushed-aluminum cylindrical shapes that dominate the cockpit. And the minimalist theme of Nissan's Quest wouldn't be complete without an instrument panel that looks like something out of "Lost in Space."

Of course, design risks don't all result in marketplace success, as exemplified by Chevrolet's SSR. Five years ago, this two-seater convertible -- featuring a retrolooking front end, a foldaway hardtop and a very practical, truck-bed-style rear -- wowed car-show crowds as a concept vehicle. So GM began producing the \$42,000 roadster two years ago to create buzz for the Chevy brand and build showroom traffic. But SSR has only sold at about two-thirds of GM's modest expecta-

So it's back to the drawing boards for the designers. That's just where car buyers want them.



'Oliver!' the musical is dark but family-friendly

If the trials and tribulations of orphan Oliver didn't scare your generation, they won't startle today's youth.

Nonetheless, Chris Danner, company manager of the touring musical production of *Oliver!* headed to Detroit, describes the show as "having some darkness."

"It's a great show for a family, but it is the Charles Dickens story," he said.

The new production of *Oliver!*, which is based on the original Lionel Bart version, opens Jan. 25 and continues through Jan. 30 at the Fox Theatre in Detroit.

Based on Dickens' novel *Oliver Twist*, the story follows an orphaned boy as he escapes a 19th-century London workhouse only to be taken in by a gang of apprentice pickpockets.

The original musical debuted in London in 1960. On Broadway, it garnered 10 Tony nominations and won three. The 1968 film version won five Academy Awards.

Though the classic story and plot are intact, producers updated the show for contemporary audiences.

"It's a different show than what people may have seen on Broadway," said Danner. "It's not the same old *Oliver!* that everyone might have seen."

So how dark does the new version get? Well, everybody's favorite boy orphan isn't the only one having a hard time. There's plenty of death with which to contend, said Danner.

"We have three people who die in the show. One is murdered, and the townfolks get together at the end of the show and kill the bad guy. And there's an old

woman who dies of old age."

Lightening the mood are all the children on stage – 17 in total, said Danner, who was born in Pontiac and grew up in White Lake.

"And that's the best part of the job," he added. "That is what keeps us lively. It keeps the backstage area family-focused."

Of course, the same energy and mood trickles on to the stage, especially as the kids launch into the show's most popular musical numbers, from Food, Glorious Food to Oom Pah Pah and You've Got to Pick a Pocket or Two.

Running two hours and 30 minutes with one intermission, the new show, like the original, is packed with good, old-fashioned life lessons with underlying moral significance.

"I definitely think it's a production that a family should go to," said Danner. "If we're teaching our children lessons, what better way than the art of the stage?"



'Coach Carter' scores with a strong cast

You pretty much know what you're getting when you walk into a sports movie that bills itself as "an inspirational account . . . inspired by a true story."

And with *Coach Carter*, you pretty much get that.

The story of Ken Carter, the basketball coach at Richmond High School in a tough section of the San Francisco Bay Area, features rousing, crowd-pleasing moments and breathless buzzer-beating action.

It's also full of the obligatory speeches about turning athletes into students and turning boys into men.

The difference here is that the person making those speeches is Samuel L. Jackson.

He's not threatening to strike down upon anyone with great vengeance and furious anger, as he did so famously in *Pulp Fiction*.

He has dialed down his wrath, but despite his character's overly polite practice of calling everyone ma'am and sir, he's still a formidable presence.

Jackson avoids melodrama – it just isn't part of his repertoire – and director Thomas Carter, who previously directed another MTV movie, *Save the Last Dance*, for the most part does the same, though he could have trimmed the film by about a half hour.

The result, like the recent Friday Night Lights and Miracle, is a movie that manages to transcend its predictable, by-the-numbers structure, even though its tough-love themes inevitably will remind you of Stand and Deliver and Dangerous Minds.

As told by screenwriters Mark Schwahn (creator of the WB series One Tree Hill) and John Gatins (Summer Catch), the rigid Carter is hired to coach the dismal Richmond High basketball team, for which he was a star player in the early 1970s.

These kids are failing both on the court and in the classroom, and he immediately sets out to fix both problems.

He works them harder than they've ever worked before, with endless drills, sprints and push-ups, and he forces them to sign contracts requiring them to maintain at least a 2.3 grade point average.

Carter's innovative tactics include naming strategies after his ex-girlfriends and sisters.

Everything seems to be going great in the film's first hour, which includes the de rigueur montage of practices and victories as the team cobbles together a surprise undefeated season.

He also kills his players with kindness and tricks them through reverse psychology, tactics familiar to his son, Damien (Robert Ri'chard), a freshman who has pulled himself out of private school and enrolled at Richmond, just to play for his dad.

Then Coach Carter becomes a totally different movie when Coach Carter realizes that several of his players haven't been upholding their end of the contract academically, with the complicity of their teachers and parents.

He padlocks the gym, forces the entire team to meet at the library to study and cancels games, drawing the ire of parents and the community, who just want to see a winning team.

If all this hadn't actually happened, it would sound too impossibly feel-good to be true.

While Jackson plays a huge role in making the film believable, the casting is exceptional all the way down the line.

Rob Brown, who made his acting debut starring with Sean Connery in *Finding Forrester*, is quietly confident as one of the team's stars.

R&B singer Ashanti, who plays his pregnant teenage girlfriend, proves she can act beyond the meager skills she has displayed in videos opposite Ja Rule.

And Rick Gonzalez (who played Spanish in *Old School*) provides a palpable nervous energy as a student torn between the easy camaraderie he enjoys on the basketball team and the easy money he makes helping his cousin deal drugs on the streets.

Take a guess which one he chooses.

Coach Carter, a Paramount Pictures release, runs 137 minutes. Two and a half stars out of four.

'Racing Stripes' lags in heart

Dismissing *Racing Stripes* as a paltry retread of *Babe* would be mean, and it's hard to be mean to a movie that's so well-intentioned.

The similarities are awfully hard to miss, though – as are the differences.

Whereas the talking little piggy of *Babe* wanted to be a sheepherding dog a decade ago, the talking baby zebra of *Racing Stripes* wants to be a racehorse.

Actually, he thinks he is a racehorse, and is devastated to learn otherwise when he grows up (and is voiced eagerly by *Malcolm in the Middle* star Frankie Muniz).

Like Babe, Stripes the zebra lives on a farm, where he arrived after horse trainer Nolan Walsh (Bruce Greenwood) found the former circus animal abandoned on a country road and brought him home.

And like Babe, Stripes is surrounded by a menagerie of computer-enhanced creatures who crack wise – only here their voices are provided by a much higher-profile assemblage of celebrity talent, a joke in itself in Belgian director Frederik Du Chau's movie.

Whoopi Goldberg provides the voice of Franny the goat, who keeps all the other animals in line.

Jeff Foxworthy voices Reggie the rooster (though he's essentially doing his youmight-be-a-redneck act, wearing feathers atop a barn).

Snoop Dogg growls lazily a couple of times as a bloodhound named Lightning.

But the best of all is Dustin Hoffman, who sounds like he's having a ball goofing

around as a cranky Shetland pony (with a heart of gold, of course) named Tucker.

This is the first and probably the last time you will see Hoffman and Snoop in the same movie together, but based on the critical praise Hoffman has received for his wacky work in *Meet the Fockers*, anything seems possible.

What Racing Stripes offers in star power, though, it lacks in heart.

Babe, which never hit a false note, will make even grown-ups cry every time. This new film, meanwhile, is strangely distant, with its superficial platitudes about tolerance and daring to go after big dreams.

Stripes wants to race, and the farmer's daughter, Channing (Hayden Panettiere), wants to be a jockey, but her overly protective father won't allow it after her mother's death in a riding accident.

Together they sneak their way into the prestigious Kentucky Open, where Stripes competes against the spoiled thoroughbred Trenton's Pride (voiced by Joshua Jackson from *Dawson's Creek* with appropriate frat-boy swagger).

The enthusiastic young zebra gets help from a filly named Sandy (Mandy Moore), a New Jersey pelican named Goose (Joe Pantoliano, relegated to regurgitating every famous line from every mob movie, ever) and a couple of flies named Buzz (Steve Harvey) and Scuzz (David Spade), whose painfully repetitive routine consists of singing songs like *U Can't Touch This*, passing gas and wallowing in piles of poop.

(The proliferation of scatological humor will crack the kiddies up, but prevent

adults from enjoying the film completely.)

Pantoliano's shtick also feels hackneyed, especially after the animated, mobthemed *Shark Tale*, but he does offer a great line when he mistakes the zebra for an ex-con because of his stripes.

HUMANS

As for the human beings, they're much better than you might expect in a feel-good kids flick.

The underappreciated Greenwood, so solid in movies such as *Thirteen Days* in which he played John F. Kennedy, brings warmth and resonance to the role.

He also has a believable father-daughter dynamic in his scenes with Panettiere, who has turned into a strong, beautiful young actress after roles in *Remember the Titans* and *Ally McBeal*.

But too often David Schmidt's script forces the humans in the movie, like M. Emmet Walsh as a grizzled track rat, to utter lines like, "That zebra really wants to race – I can see it!"

It's ideal for children, though, and its heart is in the right place – which almost makes it a winner.

Enter Breathe Art Life Theatre Project. The relatively new upstart company, which splits its performance time between Detroit and Windsor, has committed itself to producing solely contemporary plays.

The group opens a production of True West, Sam Shepard's dark comedy about the rivalry between two estranged brothers, on Friday at Windsor's Capitol Theatre. The play continues Jan. 22 and Jan. 28-29.

"We just didn't understand why contemporary theater wasn't being done in this area," said 31-year-old Valerie Bonasso, one of the company's four founding artistic partners.


fourth partner, 32-year-old David Court, is currently pursuing his master's in scenic design at the Detroit university.

The company's name, Breathe Art Life Project, expresses the founders' philosophy about the relationship between art and life, said Bonasso. "You can't live without breath, and you can't breathe without art."

Except for a few donations, funding has come out of the partners' own pockets. So out of necessity, the group is taking small steps in developing the organization. The company was founded just more than a year ago; but this year marks the first full season and availability of advance subscriptions.

"We're trying to keep it as minimalistic as possible. We're not getting paid. We're not looking to make money, but to provide a service to the community and all the while do something we love to do."

So far, attendance is rising. Breathe Art's next production, Two Rooms, Lee Blessing's play about an American taken hostage by Arab terrorists in Beirut, is set to run March 11-19 at 1515

"A younger sensibility changes an outlook on a company," said Bonasso. "We're just starting out and getting our feet wet. We've all had a little bit of professional experience. Now we want to take that experience and create something of our own."

The Michigan.org Winter Experience, just east of the park, is where the snow maze, slide and dogsleds can be found. Just farther east and running along Monroe Avenue is the Detroit Snow and Ice Spectacular's carving competition.

"Campus Martius could be called the centerpiece, but each area stands alone in providing great entertainment," said Witz.

To the west of the park on Michigan Avenue, enormous tents will provide visitors not only with heat, but also food and live music. Taste of Detroit features 20 metro restaurants, including Andiamo's, Sweet Georgia Brown, Seldom Blues, Small Plates and the Hard Rock Cafe, plus music by more than 50 local bands.

"Oh, heat, heat, you can get heat every 150 feet," exclaimed Witz. "So if you need a break, it's there."






eager Epicureans.

Although Bravo is essentially a chain restaurant that now boasts 42 locations and got its start in Columbus, Ohio, the moderately priced Italian eatery has managed to maintain a particularly local and unique flavor by hiring Schoolcraft College grad Jeff Condit as the restaurant's head chef.

Still in its infancy, Bravo has already lured in a steady stream of regular customers who swear by the restaurant's dedication to good service, good food and drink in a 200-seat room divided by smoked glass. The room is decorated with faux Roman ruins and Italian-flavored wall hangings and also contains a full bar and other amenities designed to give customers a complete Italian dining experience.

"We will be back," customer Edward Moore of Dearborn said. "The service here reminds us of the Emeril restaurant in Orlando - very attentive.

Moore and his wife, Darlene, were Bravo first-timers who came to the restaurant based on a request from their granddaughter, Lauren Steward, a Plymouth resident




Alluzo confidently professes little fear of rapidly multiplying competition near the

restaurant's location, and says Bravo is well-geared to come out on top.

Although the restaurant is for the time being easy to miss due to the continued construction in its strip center location, which will soon include several retail outlets as well as additional restaurants, patrons can expect to see more on the site when the winter thaws.

A bocce ball court as well as two outdoor patios will be completed in the near future. Both are intended to complement Bravo's highly successful presentation of Italian dining.

A relative newcomer in the metro Detroit area, Bravo has nonetheless managed to

mine local dining clientele with locations in Rochester and Lansing as well as Livonia.

Next summer, Bravo will be opening another new location in Troy at the Somerset Collection.

"Michigan has turned into a very good market for us," Alluzo said. "And this really fit what we were looking for as a destination."

Alluzo, who's been with Bravo for about a year, underwent an extensive 16-week training program that saw him doing everything at the Rochester location from working in the kitchen to waiting tables.

In keeping with the current trend of offering specialty pizzas and freshly baked Italian flat breads, Bravo! Cucina Italiana is equipped with a wood-burning stove that not only serves its utilitarian purpose but offers guests an appealing and comforting hearth to gaze upon.

"We also have an extensive wine list with a lot of Italian wines," Alluzo said. "We're able to keep them affordable by dealing them in our 42 stores."

Although most of its restaurants are located in the Midwest, Bravo has successfully established itself in extremely competitive dining cities like New Orleans.

Alluzo, who has accumulated 22 years in the restaurant business and most recently managed the Big Buck Brewery and Steakhouse, got a taste for the restaurant business at an early age.

"I grew up in a big Italian family, where kitchen and food were the center of the house," Alluzo said. "My mom's still the best cook. Things have kind of come full circle for me. It's just fun to be working around lasagnas and spaghettis."

Head chef Condit, who works with a menu designed by corporate chef Phil Yondolini, has in the past put in many hours as chef at his own restaurant in Colorado as well as at the Rattlesnake Club and the Whitney in Detroit.

"If you walk in here and see the white tablecloths and the décor, you expect to pay a lot more," Condit said. "We always have 10 or 11 pastas and the service of at least a three-star restaurant. [The competition] can't beat us with the food. To me, that's a triple threat."

MORE MENU ITEMS

Specialties at Bravo, apart from pizza and pasta, include a Parmesan-crusted fish selection at \$18.95 that changes according to the day's fresh catch and is complemented with crispy potato and spinach in butter sauce side dishes.

The restaurant also prides itself on its dessert menu, which is crowned by the Bravo! Trio, a three-tiered gastronomical extravaganza composed of tiramisu, crème brulee and Bravo's own specialty cheesecake that at \$12.50 serves four or more.

Pizzas, which are built on top of traditional dough and carb-conscious Italian flatbreads, are delivered piping hot to the table at under \$10 apiece.

Pasta Bravo, the restaurant's signature pasta dish that is tossed with wood-grilled chicken, mushrooms and red-pepper sauce, is priced at approximately \$12.

Steaks, chops and seafood dishes are also available with the most expensive menu items costing about \$20.

Bravo also has a family-style catering menu for those who want to bring the taste of Bravo to the home or office, and pasta and specialty dishes designed to feed a dozen people can be obtained for about \$100.

Condit, who graduated from Schoolcraft's culinary arts school in 1990 and has cooked for clientele in Michigan, Colorado and even for a short spell in Bermuda, is only glad to serve.

"All I've ever done is cook," Condit said. "We've got seven different pasta noodles; we substitute pastas and make everything fresh on the day that it's served."





Photograph exhibit helps Holocaust survivor heal

She's so strong in spite of terrifying childhood memories.

During the Holocaust, Miriam Brysk hid in a forest with her family after they escaped a Nazi-occupied Jewish ghetto in Lida, Byelorussia, near Warsaw. In those woods, Brysk and about 500 other children and adults lived in fear, hunger and cold.

When the ghetto was liberated, Brysk was one of just 150 people who survived in the forest. More than 10,000 residents of that ghetto were killed.

To honor the victims, Brysk contributed her photographs to an exhibit, *In a Confined Silence*, on display at the Janice Charach Epstein Gallery, inside the Jewish Community Center through Thursday, Jan. 27. Henry Friedman, who also uses art to heal and tell haunting stories, is displaying sculptures.

Brysk's photographs of Holocaust survivors and victims are digitally enhanced to clearly capture their faces.

"My goal was to make them real ... bring them out as real people, not numbers," Brysk said. "I want people to look into their eyes."

When she finally settled in the U.S., Brysk, along with thousands of other survivors, struggled with fear, sadness and anger. But it did not stop her from becoming a successful scientist and artist.

She could have tried, perhaps in vain, to forget the faces of those who perished.

Remembering can be painful. But, remembering, she said, is the only way to keep their spirit alive.

"Î suffered depression for many years," she said. "I think many survivors do, but it's not often discussed. Anger and fear... I dove into my work to try to forget. But the best thing we can do is live ... for those who did not survive. And while doing so, we must honor them and show their faces."


One of the pieces is an image of Brysk's cousin, Sarah, as a child in the ghetto. Brysk overlaid six photos to create *Ghetto Uprising*, a photograph that depicts Nazis burning the ghetto. Sarah's image is in the foreground. Another, *Hungry Children*, shows two children begging. Others show children hiding.

Friedman's work, on the other hand, isn't about the faces, it's about terrifying buildings.


He created the miniature sculptures of buildings with metal and wood to capture Holocaust scenes.

Friedman's sculptures sit on tables throughout the gallery, and Brysk's oversize photos are the backdrop. Patrons can also watch a video that details how Friedman created his art.


