## **School board inks** pact with new chief

The Plymouth-Canton Schools Board of Education put its stamp of approval Tuesday night on a three-year contract to hire Craig Fiegel, voting unanimously to hire the superintendent of Evergreen Park (Ill.) Elementary School District 124.

Fiegel's starting salary will be \$195,000, a boost from his current \$180,000. It's also higher than his predecessor, Jim Ryan, who earned \$161,000. Fiegel said he'll take over full time July 1, when his contract with Evergreen Park

After visiting Fiegel's district last week, Trustee John Jackson said he discovered from many school and community groups that Fiegel has a collaborative style which should be successful in Plymouth-Canton.

"He listens to all sides of any issue, and takes in the information before making a decision," Jackson said. "Once all the information is taken in, he's not afraid to make the decision ... and he will stand behind the decision and carry it through. People respect him for that."

Trustee Dianne Gonzalez, who was the lone dissenting



forward with negotiations with Fiegel. voted in favor of the contract Tuesday night. "My reserva-

tions about

hiring him . are more about the process we went through than the candidate. I would have liked to see if he was the best candidate," said Gonzalez, who would have preferred to see the applications of all the candidates, not just the three presented by the search firm. "This (my vote) is about compromise and I plan to root for him like hell."

The only concern expressed by board members during the interview process was whether Fiegel, whose current district has only 1,900 students, could handle Plymouth-Canton's enrollment that's nearing 19,000 students.

"I understand, and that's a valid concern," Fiegel said. "I do feel comfortable I can make the adjustments. I can't say there won't be a huge learning curve, but I hope there will be patience as I find my way

## Big expansion on tap for health center

### St. Joseph Mercy plans call for new cancer, surgery centers

The St. Joseph Mercy Canton Health Center was given approval to expand its operations in the township Tuesday night.

'We feel like we have a commitment to this community and we are very excited about this new phase," said Kathy Kasperek-Korelis, the director of cancer services for St. Joseph. "We are pleased to bring in technology that's not available in the community."

The township board unanimously voted for the plan, which calls for the existing center at 1600 S. Canton Center Road to be expanded

BY TIFFANY L. PARKS by 56,300 square feet. The addition, which nearly doubles the size of the complex, will include minimally invasive surgery suites, imaging facilities and a cancer center.

The health center, which has about 100 employees, will hire 25-30 workers for the cancer center and about 20 people for the surgery center.

Kasperek-Korelis, who serves as the project manager for the expansion, said the cancer center is expected to benefit township residents.

days a week for five to six weeks. "When we opened up our Brighton cancer center, the community was thrilled. Anyone who has been through cancer knows its tough enough without (having to deal with a daily commute). This was the right thing to do for our cancer patients.'

St. Joseph is slated to break

ground on the addition and celebrate the 10th anniversary of the existing facility in May. If all goes according to plan, the imaging center will open in January and the cancer center will be complete in September 2009.

## Citing unfinished work, Zarbo seeks re-election

When Karl Zarbo touched down in Canton 25 years ago, he didn't set his sights on local government.

"I didn't even know what a homeowner's association was," he joked. "I asked 'Why am I writing this check every month?' but I got up to speed pretty quick."

Zarbo, who has spent six years as a trustee on the Township Board, has announced his plans to run for re-election.

"This just gets into you," he said. "There is unfinished work for me.

Zarbo, the director of operations for Konover South, which owns the Livonia Mall, said he plans to go door to door this summer to connect with residents.

"Canton faces many challenges as we continue to provide first class services," he said. "It is my goal to be a continued voice of reason and stability for residents."

## Planning commissioner formally resigns



Months after she was asked for her resignation, Catherine Johnson has officially stepped down from the Canton Planning Commission.

Johnson, who did not return calls for this story, submitted a letter to the township Monday.

Described by one township official as "short and sweet," the letter arrived a day before Tuesday's township board meeting where a public hearing was scheduled to discuss Johnson's removal from both the Planning Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals. The item, which was still listed on the meeting's agenda, was not mentioned at the meeting.

A resolution brought by Township Supervisor Tom Yack called for Johnson's

removal because of comments at a Dec. 3 Planning Commission meeting that were "offensive to the petitioner, derogatory, hearsay, inappropriate (they were not

germane to the petitioner's request), and cast the Planning Commission, Board of Trustees, and the Canton community in a negative light."

While offering her opinion on the proposal to rebuild the Hindu Temple on Cherry Hill Road, Johnson questioned whether public urination was included in the temple's practices.

Yack has said the longtime commissioner, who had been on the board since 1980, didn't show remorse for the remarks. Johnson has said she meant no harm in making the inquiry and didn't mean to offend anyone.

"Heavens, no," she said in an earlier interview with the Observer.

"I did not mean any offense. I'm not that familiar with the (Hindu) religion

voters, the former planning commissioner said one universal concern has been the aging conditions of some township roads. With Canton being a township and not a city, its roads belong to Wayne County.

"I used to tell people 'These are not our roads' but then I realized that's not a good enough answer," he said, pointing to his involvement with the township's Intersection Action Committee.

With a handful of completed intersection improvements, such as at Cherry Hill and Sheldon, and more on deck for the future, Zarbo said the program has been a success.

"The township's leaders need to continue to find ways to improve quality of life while lowering taxes," he said.

Late last year, the board faced some criticism for approving about \$11,000 in salary hikes for the trustee, supervisor, clerk and treasurer positions. An unsuccessful attempt for a referendum followed the Nov. 27 vote.

Zarbo said he stands behind his decision to approve the raises but said the process is being reviewed for future township boards.

"The (amount) stayed fairly insignificant (for the trustees), but it's all being looked at," he said.

Zarbo has been a recipient of the Canton Chamber of Commerce Excellence Award, the Canton Community Supporter Award and is a board member of the Canton

#### THINKING ABOUT RUNNING **FOR OFFICE?**

Candidates for any positions on the Canton Board of Trustees must do the following to get on the ballot:

- If you are running as a partisan (affiliated with a party), you must submit a minimum of 200 and a maximum of 400 signatures of registered Canton voters to the Canton Clerk's Office by 4 p.m. Tuesday, May 13.
- Thinking about running for office? If you are running without party affiliation, you must submit a minimum of 600 and a maximum of 1,200 signatures of registered Canton voters to the Canton Clerk's Office by 4 p.m. Thursday, July 17.
- There are also six seats up for grabs on the library board, which is a nonpartisan office. You must either pay a \$100 filing fee or submit between 40-100 signatures of Canton voters to Clerk's Office by 4 p.m. Tuesday, May 13.

They may have fought in different wars and served in various branches of the military, but all veterans may be entitled to certain benefits and not even realize it.

A new veterans group and two Lansing legislators hope to change that.


"Other cities have sponsored these seminars and the seating has been full," Mehl said.

The Westland Veterans Association became an offshoot of a group that worked on bringing The Moving Wall - a smaller version of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. — to the Westland Summer Festival in 2006.

The group hopes to educate veterans about benefits they may receive.

This might sound morbid, but some people don't know that every veteran (and spouse) can apply to be buried in a national cemetery," Mehl said, "and we have one in Holly."

If the April 19 seminars prove successful, he said, it's possible another one may be scheduled in the fall.





Since a home is generally one's single largest purchase, it is important to protect it with homeowner's insurance. Unfortunately, the majority of people buy homeowner's insurance when they buy their house and then generally forget about the policy until they have a claim.

It pays to be proactive to protect yourself. So before spring storms arrive, it is important to review your homeowner's policy to make sure it is up to date.

make sure you are properly insured. A good agent also should be your advocate if you ever have a problem in dealing with the insurance company. One of the keys is to find someone who you can communicate with and with whom you feel comfortable asking questions. In addition to insurance, other ways to protect your home and its contents is to have a videotaped inventory. It's inexpensive and the benefits are invaluable in case of a natural disaster.

A videotape will help you remember what you have and provide some documentation. Once it's complete, store the videotape either in a safety deposit box or some sort of fireproof box.

If you own collectibles such as artwork, make sure you videotape the artwork and also any appraisals or receipts that you may have. Talk your way through the video. Remember, the purpose is to remind you of what you have and to provide proof to the insurance company in case of a disaster. Therefore, the more information you have on your videotape, the better it will be.

For individuals unhappy with their current homeowner's policy it pays to receive competitive bids. Make sure you ask about discounts. In addition, if you belong to a credit union ask for a competitive bid. Credit unions offer very good discount programs.

How often should you shop around for a homeowner's policy. Although, there are no hard fast rules, I generally

recommend at least every two to three years. We live in a very competitive society and you'd be surprised how fast homeowner's policies change. You may find that shopping around gets you get a better policy for less money.

Don't assume that the cheapest bid is the best bid. That is not always the case. In addition, just because one policy may be good for your neighbor does not necessarily mean it's good for you. The key is to take your time and find the right policy that's priced appropriately and matches your individual situation. Good luck!

Remember, the few minutes that you spend with your homeowner's policy may literally save you thousands of dollars down the road.

## There's a lesson to be learned in Johnson episode

Canton has changed fairly significantly in the last two decades. The old timers — those people who lived here long before IKEA, Pheasant Run Golf Club, or even Tom Yack and most current township officials - probably could have never imagined all the changes that have taken place.

Not only has the physical landscape changed with all the development, but the population has also exploded, both in numbers and in diversity. Canton has grown up.

Any community that goes through such a drastic change, however, is bound to have some growing pains.

The episode has not been a good one for Canton. It has exposed some ugliness and intolerance unbecoming of the image Canton is trying so hard to portray to the world.

And Canton has been experiencing a bout of them since former planning commissioner Catherine Johnson made some controversial comments about Hindu women urinating in public during a December meeting to discuss the Hindu Temple's \$5 million expansion plans.

A fire storm erupted about the comments, particularly among Canton's Hindu population, which according the U.S. Census Bureau is nearly 10 percent of the town's total population. In return, those

criticisms drew the ire of both Johnson's supporters and some people who basically said "if you don't like Canton, then get out."

Johnson, who has been on the planning commission for nearly 30 years and is a longtime community supporter, finally submitted her resignation on Monday. While this is what many were hoping would happen, it is doubtful that many people are actually cheering the news. The episode has not been a good one for Canton. It has exposed some ugliness and intolerance unbecoming of the image Canton is trying so hard to portray to the world.

But, as with other growing pains it has experienced, Canton will move past this. Hopefully Johnson will as well. She made a mistake. Like the rest of us, she is human. Hopefully this will not be what people remember about her. She has done a great deal to help make Canton the community it is, and that should be remembered.

There is a lesson here, however, for anyone currently (or thinking about) serving on a board or commission. Remember, when you speak at a meeting, you are representing the township, and, more importantly, all the residents of Canton, who, in recent years, have become a diverse bunch. Free speech is important, but remember words can do damage, and there are consequences for some words. If nothing else, Catherine Johnson has taught us that.

### Northwest, Delta merger could be a boon to area

In February, talks began about a merger between Delta and Northwest Airlines. Pilots from the two airlines are currently in negotiations on merging their contracts and ironing out ticklish seniority issues.

Delta and Northwest are two old, "legacy" airlines. They have both emerged from bankruptcy, but continue to face serious cost issues, especially as oil prices continue to rise. The large pre-deregulation airlines have had a difficult time competing against more nimble, smaller carriers like Spirit and Southwest.

The airlines hope to streamline their operations, eliminate duplicate service and build on their different strengths. Delta flies trans-Atlantic, while Northwest flies trans-Pacific.

As a hub for Northwest, Detroit Metro might hope to capitalize on the merger, especially as Wayne County continues to emphasize the development of an airport city. The strong international schedules could make Detroit a hub for both passenger and freight service from all corners of the world.

While all of that may be good news for the emerging "aerotropolis," the proposed merger has raised some serious concerns. How will it affect air rates? Will the merged airline, the largest in the country, drive out its smaller competitors? Will streamlining service eliminate routes to some areas that are now served? Will the merger result in large job losses at a time when unemployment is high?

These are questions that the U.S. Justice Department needs to examine.

We support the airport city concept and believe that a strong Delta-Northwest could play a key role in that development if those questions can be answered.

#### **Food safety paramount**

In light of the recent Hallmark/Westland beef recall, I want to remind consumers that the safety of Michigan's food supply from farm to fork — is paramount and continues to be the Michigan Department of Agriculture's top priority.

This is a serious responsibility in today's global marketplace where, if we're not vigilant, problems of every type can impact our food — whether it was produced here or on the other side of the world.

MDA, as well as our local and federal partners, have clear roles in assuring consumers that their food and the places they eat are safe.

While there are numerous challenges in today's dynamic global food supply chain, officials at all levels of government — local, state, and federal - strive every day to cre-

ate a seamless food safety system to protect the public.

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) is responsible for inspecting meat slaughter and processing facilities in Michigan.

Currently, there are approximately 220 USDA-inspected federal slaughter and processing plants in the state. MDA is charged with inspecting approximately 20,000 diversified food establishments, such as grocery stores, grain mills, fruit and vegetable processing plants, water bottlers and more. MDA also works closely with local health departments who inspect more than 40,000 restaurants and cafeterias statewide.

On a daily basis, local and state food inspectors assure the safety of the food supply by conducting inspections, collecting samples and testing food to detect hazards, responding to consumer complaints, enforcing food standards and labeling, removing unwholesome food from commerce. responding to recalls, food emergencies and opinions, but a five-page opinion seems very  $\circ$  disasters, licensing facilities, and providing



## Don't forget about our soldiers in debate on Iraq

et me first state that Todd Caccamo is running for re-election for the township board. And there will be some who feel writing a column praising him is unfair or shows bias toward his candidacy. But this column has nothing to do with Todd Caccamo the politician. And this is certainly no endorsement of his candidacy or his political ideas.

I just think the Canton trustee deserves a big pat on the back for his recent efforts to collect money and goods



Some cynics might feel he did this as a political calculation, to make him look good and help him get re-elected. I don't read minds, so I can't say if that's true or not. But my gut tells me these efforts were born of a sincere desire to help our troops, who are in a very dangerous place.

Unlike people such as myself, or many of his critics (and I have been one, at times), Caccamo understands firsthand what our soldiers are dealing with on a daily basis in Iraq. The hardships. The frustrations. And the dilemma of not knowing exactly who the enemy is over there. That's because he was there himself not all that long ago — he served a tour after volunteering with the Marines.

We can guess, but most of us just have no idea what our soldiers are dealing with in Iraq. However, if you want to get a glimpse into what their lives have been like, do yourself a favor and rent the movie, No End in Sight, a riveting documentary by filmmaker Charles Ferguson which examines our invasion and subsequent occupation

The film is full of interviews with our soldiers, who have served on the front lines, and includes footage of what their daily lives are like. In fact, it is the interviews that make this film so engrossing.

It begins with former Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld, who, at the press conference held when he stepped down, calls the Iraq war "complex for people to comprehend." He goes on to tell President Bush: "I know with certainty that over time the contributions you've made will be recorded by history."

This is probably one of the few statements on which I agree with Rumsfeld - only I think history will draw different conclusions than Rumsfeld does.

Later this month, March 20 to be exact, it will have been five years since George W. Bush, with the blessing of Congress, unleashed the war in Iraq. This is an anniversary no American will be celebrating. Least of all our soldiers, some of whom have served multiple tours and face the prospect of serving more in the future.

Bush's reasoning for invading Iraq will always be considered dubious, not only by many people in our own country, but around the world as well. And I'm not just talking about in the Middle East. Some of our traditional allies have deep concerns about what we are doing there, including Canada, France and even Great Britain, which will soon reduce its troop numbers to 2,500 because of major political pressures at home.

A comprehensive military study released Wednesday,

which was based on hundreds of thousands of seized Iraqi documents and thousands of hours of interrogations of former Iraqi government officials, came to the conclusion that Saddam Hussein had no connection to al-Qaeda or the 9/11 attacks.

Of course, we can debate about that all day. What Ferguson's film makes quite clear, however, is that the architects of this war, most notably Rumsfeld, L. Paul Bremer (appointed by Bush to oversee the reconstruction of Iraq) and Paul Wolfowitz (former U.S. Deputy Secretary of Defense), as well as the president and Vice President Dick Cheney, were negligent in its planning and execution. None of these men had any combat experience. And they planned the war from the comfy confines of Washington. Yet, as a result of the decisions they made, many of our troops and the Iraqi people themselves have paid a dear price and will continue to pay a price for years to come.

Before you start calling me a yellow commie traitor, watch the film. Don't take my word. Listen to those interviewed, including Richard Armitage (the secondin-command at the State Department from 2001-05) or Gen. Jay Garner, who Bush selected in 2003 to lead the post-war reconstruction efforts in Iraq only to be replaced by Bremer. These are men who have dedicated their lives to their country, and in fact have served Republicans dating back to when Rumsfeld, Cheney, Ronald Reagan and the first George Bush actually supported and armed the regime of Saddam Hussein.

Come this November, we are going to have to make a difficult decision about this war when we head to the polls to cast a vote for who are next president is going to be. In doing so, we are going to have to make a decision about what our relationship is going to be with the Iraqi people. Are we going to be an ally, a baby sitter, or a landlord? If it is either of the latter, then our military may very well be there for 100 years as Republican presidential candidate John McCain has suggested. But if that's the case, let's call it what it is - colonialism.

If it is the former, however, then we must actually liberate the Iraqi people and give them back their country and their autonomy.

There are some public officials who like to bat around words like "victory" and "defeat" as if Iraq was some kind of big football game. In addition to fanning flames of division in our own country, these statements are not grounded in reality. There will be no military victory in Iraq, only a political one.

Once the Democrats get a presidential nominee, the debate about Iraq will rage across America — as it should. My concern, however, is that we will lose sight of the sacrifice our soldiers have made, which is why I commend Caccamo and any others who take the time to let them know they are in our thoughts and prayers.

Soon the number of our troops that have died in Iraq will reach 4,000. Thousands more are bringing back physical or psychological wounds. Nearly all will come back changed in some way. Those who know them most will tell you a part of them died in Iraq, just as a part of America has died there. The question is, how many more

## **Holding interest rates firm is** right medicine for economy

e all know the economic pain we're facing in Canton and the rest of the country — with falling home prices, rising gas prices and a stagnant economy.

The Federal Reserve in Washington has been aggressively cutting interest

rates to revive the economy — which is what the Federal Reserve always does when the ence the direction of

economy slows down. Manipulating interest rates is just about the only thing the Federal Reserve can do to influour free market economy. But in the present

case, lowering interest rates may be the wrong medicine for our economic illness. In fact, it may make the patient's condition worse.

The reason we are in this sub-prime mortgage mess is precisely because credit was available too easily — too much money was lent out to questionable borrowers. Lowering interest rates in the current environment does nothing to fix that problem — in fact, it makes borrowing even easier by increasing the money supply.

Interest rates are the cost of money and, by extension, are a measure of the value of our money. High interest rate means it costs a lot to borrow dollars. Lowering the interest rates implies our money is available cheaper and in more plentiful supply.

But there is a more sinister effect of lowering interest rates in our global economy. It depreciates the value of the dollar. This may not seem a serious side effect to those of us who don't invest globally. But it is a global economy we live in now, and every American is invested globally, whether they know it or not. When we spend money at a gas station, at a jewelry shop or a bakery, we are competing with buyers from Europe, China and India who are also using their currencies to bid on the same assets (oil, gold, wheat, etc.) in the world market.

The dollar has fallen more than 30 percent against the euro, and by similar percentages against other world currencies. What it means is that the value of all our financial assets, which are denominated in dollars, including our wages and salaries, our retirement plans, domestic investments, etc., has gone down by the same amount. Part of the reason the prices of oil and gold are going up so much is that the dollar in which we measure their prices is going

We hear news about how home prices in Canton have gone down by as much as 10 percent in the last year. But that hides the real truth. They have gone down 10 percent when measured in dollar terms. But the dollar has gone down 30 percent or more against the world currencies. So in terms of the euro, the yen and even the Indian rupee, home prices in Canton, and in many parts of the country, have fallen 40 percent or


To me this is the larger story. When American asset values are being eroded so rapidly, it severely limits the options American businesses have in the world stage. Foreigners have this new-found confidence since the money they hold goes a much longer way in America in terms of buying our assets such as real estate and businesses. Americans find they are at a disadvantage and have to invest a lot more (in dollar terms) to buy assets abroad or to invest in global busi-

For better or for worse, the U.S. is committed to globalization. We have negotiated free trade agreements with many countries, and are pushing for more open markets in many developing countries. Given our commitment to globalization, it is very important to maintain our competitive edge by keeping the economy and the dollar strong so American businesses have a fighting chance when they go abroad with their dollars to do business.


Each time the interest rates are cut, the dollar depreciates further, which makes goods cost more in dollar terms, which leads to inflation. One hopes the Bush administration is not steering this economy toward higher inflation during a period of stagnant growth — a pattern that economists call stagflation, which is what plagued Jimmy Carter's economy in the late 1970s.

The correct medicine for this economy may be to hold interest rates firm to kill inflation and keep the dollar strong. This will increase the real global wealth of Americans who largely hold dollar denominated assets. It will also wring out the excess from the economy by administering a bitter medicine for our reckless borrowing — by letting the subprime mortgage holders default on their mortgages, which is eventually what must be done to correct this economic mess. Trying to fix the problem by artificially keeping interest rates low may lead to more serious unexpected consequences for our global health.

The final point Salem senior Jeremy Epley earned in his stellar high school wrestling career proved to be the biggest.

On Saturday at the Division 1 Individual Wrestling State Meet at the Palace of Auburn Hills, Epley escaped with a thrilling 1-0 victory over Ziad Kharbush of Livonia Stevenson to secure a third-place finish in the 160-pound weight class.

The two Western Lakes Activities Association rivals had split a pair of previous encounters this

Epley, who finished with a 46-5 record and 103 career victories, registered an early escape then held on to hold off Kharbush's late-match challenge.

Watkins, a two-time All-State performer, finished with a 44-12 record.

Canton sophomore Brent Winekoff joined the All-State contingent by placing seventh at 140 pounds. Winekoff capped his second prep season with an incredible 50-6 mark.

Altogether, a school-record six Chiefs qualified for last week's individual state meet.

"All six guys wrestled well," said Canton coach Casey Randolph. "While all six are proud of their accomplishments, I know they're not satisfied.

"The three who didn't place (103-pound Waleed Faraj, 171-pound Rodger Kropp and 215-pound Dan Wanshon) lost close matches. Dan was up 5-0 after the first period against a kid with only two losses, but he got caught in the second period."

You'd be amazed how far Pete Krupsky's voice travels when he broadcasts Plymouth Whalers hockey games from high above Ontario Hockey League ice surfaces two or three times a week, eight months a

With the help of 21st century Internet technology, Krupsky's smooth and polished play-by-play commentary flows up to Essex, Ontario, Canada, where a 77-yearold grandmother listens intently for the sound of her grandson's name.

It makes its way through highspeed wires to Waswanipi, Quebec, so the members of a Cree Indian village can catch up on the latest exploits of one of their own.

And just as importantly — if not as jaw-dropping — it echoes throughout southeastern Michigan so that die-hard Whalers fans can follow every bounce of the puck from the comfort of their own living rooms.

#### Trusted voice

Krupsky's words not only travel far via Internet streaming on www. plymouthwhalers.com — they travel well, thanks to the 20-plus years he's honed the craft that he embraces like a loved one.

"I get emotional when I talk about my broadcasts reaching the players' families because I know it's very, very important to them," said Krupsky, his eyes welling up with

emotion. "Some nights, there may be only 50 people listening, but I know those 50 people are very passionate about the Whalers.

"I open every broadcast by saying hello to the Whalers' extended family, wherever they may be listening.

(Whalers player) Joe McCann's 77year-old grandmother has told me that when I say that, I'm saying hello to her. I'm not necessarily saying it to anyone in particular, but that's how they feel."

#### Patient climb

Krupsky's ascension to the lead play-by-play voice of the Whalers was a lot like the home game-night climbs he makes up the narrow, 20rung metal ladder that leads from the floor of the Compuware Arena press box to the facility's broadcasting site just below the rafters: steady and focused.

Armed with persistence, patience and the willingness to work through some rough times, Krupsky's radio days commenced in the mid-80s and were coated with some remarkable circumstances.


"I didn't pursue a broadcasting career right off the bat," said Krupsky, who spent a good chunk of the past two decades working in a southwest Detroit refinery plant that eventually became Honeywell (he retired as a laboratory manager

"Myself and a guy I played softball with used to pretend to broadcast the games from the outfield when he was in left field and I was in leftcenter. He told me if he ever got on the air somewhere, I was coming with him.

Well, in roughly 1985, he called

me and said, I got a TV gig on local access. Do you know anything about high school hockey?' Coincidentally, I had just started writing about high school hockey for 'Hockey Weekly.' He did the play-byplay and I agreed to do the color commentary."

#### Rough start

In the early days, Krupsky's love of hockey couldn't overcome his woefully miniscule amount of broadcasting experience, he admitted.

"For the first three years, I was terrible — I mean terrible!" he emphasized. "I didn't know what I was doing. I was nervous on the air. I couldn't eat before games. I couldn't sleep the night before games.

But they kept me around for one reason," he added, smiling. "Because I was free."

#### Big break

Like a hockey team's No. 1 line that gels the more it plays together, Krupsky got better with age. And as his skills sharpened, his love for the profession swelled.

"When the Detroit Compuware Ambassadors (the Whalers' predecessors) joined the OHL in 1990, I kept calling their offices to let them know that I wanted to do their broadcasts," said Krupsky. "Well, finally, Jimmy Rutherford, who was the team's GM at the time, called me back and said, 'You don't have to call any more. We know you're interested and we're going to find something for you."

That "something" turned out to be a play-by-play role on AM 580 CKWW, based out of Windsor.

"Steve Bell did the Windsor Spitfire games and I was back in Detroit with the Ambassadors," he said. "During the intermissions of the Spits' game, Steve would say, '...and let's take it back to Detroit and Pete Krupsky for the story on the game between Detroit and the Soo Greyhounds.' We were doing cut-aways long before ESPN ever did."

The seed that was planted that year has grown into a sturdy 18-year-old relationship between Krupsky and the Whalers' organization, which hired him as its full-time director of communications in


"I do everything from write press releases, to take care of the media when they come in from out of town, to co-editing the team's Web site along with Natalie Shaver," he said.

While those duties are important, they pale in comparison to Krupsky's role of making sure 77-year-old grandmothers and proud family members and fans throughout the United States and Canada are kept abreast of their beloved Whalers' threetimes-a-week battles in OHL rinks from Plymouth to the





## Law aims to stem foreclosures

Q. I understand that Congress passed some legislation to eliminate taxes on mortgage debt. Do you have any information on that?

A. On Dec. 18, 2007, Congress approved legislation to eliminate taxes on mortgage debt,

presumably, to help struggling homeowners to avoid foreclosure. The legislation which was subsequently signed into law by President Bush on Dec. 20, 2007, provides

a temporary, three-year change to the tax code to eliminate any taxes homeowners might face when banks renegotiate the terms of a home loan and forgive a portion of the outstanding mortgage debt. The change in the tax law caps untaxable forgiven debt at \$2 million and applies only to principal residences. This change was necessitated because existing tax rules under Section 108 of the Internal Revenue Code impel many struggling homeowners to seek foreclosure over restructuring their loan with lenders because forgiven mortgage debt is taxed as ordinary income. The Mortgage Forgiveness Debt Relief Act removes this tax burden on mortgage indebtedness, encourages market-based restructuring between lenders and homeowners and discourages foreclosures. The legislation also includes a provision that extends the deductibility of mortgage insurance for three more years.

Q. I have heard something called the "D" list put out by FannieMae and FreddieMac as it relates to mortgages. Do you know what that means?

A. I believe that "D" stands for the deciding value, but some people have suggested that it means "death spiral." It is my understanding that the USDA and FreddieMac are fighting as to whether or not they will continue to take zero down mortgages, or possibly any mortgages for Michigan properties. Apparently there is a battle as to whether the USDA will prevail or if FannieMae and/or FreddieMac will do so. In an even worse note, is something called the shark list which is a list for investors that buy depressed properties. The shark list has Michigan listed as interested only if the property values decrease by another 40 percent. Some say that Michigan is in a depression, but apparently the news media and government will not admit same, although collections are booming in this business.

### **MOBILE MARKETING ATTRACTS MORE AUTOMAKERS**

Auto-marketing executives know they'll be advertising more on cell phones and other mobile devices in the coming months. But they still have a "prove-it" attitude toward the medium, as mobileservice providers work through issues such as image enhancement and platform standardization.

The biggest issue with mobile is still that we have to do everything different for each different carrier," said Gregg Benkendorfer, Toyota's national manager of media and digital. "Until they really sort that out, I don't think you're going to see tremendous

Christine MacKenzie said that mobile-advertising providers still can't "provide us enough data to justify a major move into mobile yet. Chrysler's executive director of multi-brand marketing and agency relations said that "it's still an area where we're learning, and we'll continue to

But carmakers clearly are moving into mobile in a significant way nonetheless, encouraged in part by the booming popularity of Apple's iPhone and the richness of its interface.


From Ford's mobile ads for its Sync voice-activated feature to a Mercedes-Benz mobile campaign that drove consumers to test-drive events for its C-class sedans, at least the industry is aggressively experimenting with advertising even as the mobile medium is still constructing itself.

"We're upping the bar in terms of delivering richer and more mobile interaction with consumers, even while the landscape underneath us is still shifting very rapidly," said Stephen Cannon, vice president of marketing for Mercedes-Benz USA. But you'd better set some money aside to try stuff out in mobile – and if nothing else, you try to digest your learning, so next time you go at it, you're a little

Ford 'Syncs' with Early Adopters
Ford has been relying heavily on mobile to help
establish its technology chops for Sync, the
Microsoft-developed, voice-activated cockpitelectronics system that the company began rolling electronics system that the company began rolling out on several higher-end models last fall. "Sync

lends itself to mobile advertising and that audience," said Ted Cannis, Ford's director of marketing

So, Ford made what Cannis called "heavy investments" in a variety of mobile-specific digital initiatives for Sync, including creating special ring tones and "wallpapers" that mobile-phone users could download. Ford also placed codes in print advertisements that users could immediately enter into their cell phones to learn more about Sync. "It was connecting old media with new media," Cannis

Ford also "did a lot of different mobile ads with different content to see what kind of information really works well on that small screen," he said. And really works well on that small screen," he said. And Ford tried to appeal to various types of Sync prospects in part depending on how they used their mobile phones. One question, Cannis said: "How do you talk with people who might be interested in the music elements of Sync versus someone else who might be more interested in the phone capabilities?" Even more important, Ford's mobile efforts for Sync have coincided with new internet initiatives, such as "webisodes," and other marketing trial

such as "webisodes," and other marketing trial balloons. "We did a lot of experimentation in targeting the right piece of creative to the right audience in the right medium in an engaging way," Cannis said.

Luxury Brands Take the Lead

Mercedes-Benz was pleased with a mobileadvertising effort last fall in which it used mobile messaging with customers and prospects in its database in last-minute efforts to fill out the guest lists for driving events in the 11 top markets for a new clean-diesel version of C-class vehicles. "We had some nice results with that," Cannon said.

Land Rover is another luxury brand that is pushing the envelope in mobile marketing for the entire industry. It will be "a bigger part of our media mix in 2008," said Jonathan Renker, the brand's mix in 2008," said Jonathan Renker, the brand's digital marketing manager. "Even though it's still hard to find the right targets, people with iPhones and Treos and so on fit with our basic demographic profile, so we've tried to give mobile a chance."

Renker pronounced Land Rover pleased with its two mobile-aid campaigns of 2007.

Last summer, it used the Nokia ad platform to target prospects for the LR3 SUV by providing them with vehicle and local-dealer information. Then, last

with yehicle and local-dealer information. Then, last fall, Land Rover upped the ante in a just-concluded campaign on iPhones for its Range Rover Sport, a few months after Apple introduced the new, paradigm-busting mobile device.

Despite such campaigns, however, automakers' interest in mobile advertising remains largely experimental. The technology and creative execution remain too raw, and the real audience too undefined, for the industry to treat the mobile milieu as much more than an important marketing laboratory at the

And in the United States at the moment, automakers say, is that cell-phone usage by Americans still hasn't caught up with penetration in Asia and Europe, said Betsy Lazar, General Motors' executive director of advertising and media operations. GM, in fact, is still testing more mobile advertising outside the United States than in this country.

Nevertheless, Lazar said that GM will be "scaling up" mobile-marketing applications in the American market as the carriers' varying platforms "become more common over the next year or so."





to foster her, I said no, out of fear. Now I'm grateful to have opened my mind to research these amazing dogs. She loves kids, they climb all over her. She loves my other dogs too and lays all over them. She's lived with me almost a year now.

I'm discussing pitbulls because of the "vicious dog" issue in Plymouth. One question there is whether the animals should be allowed to live in the city.

City commission officials, I'm sure, are sophisticated enough to avoid a witch-hunt mentality against a whole breed. City-aftercity nationwide, as people become more educated, are now welcoming the animals.

People are realizing it's time to punish the deed of dog-fighting,

rather than ban an entire breed of dog. Irresponsible media has helped create paranoia.

"First it was the Bloodhound, sensationalized in the dramatizations of Uncle Tom's Cabin. Then it was the Doberman Pinscher. symbol of the Nazi menace for a nation at war. Today, it is the pitbull that is vilified for the depravity of his master," author Karen Delise writes in her well-documented book, The Media, Myths and Politics of Canine Aggression.

Her studies reveal three factors play a role in canine aggression toward humans:

■ Owner responsibility: Was the dog trained to fight or be a junkyard guard dog?

■ Owner responsibility: Does the dog roam loose and therefore become confused? Is the dog left unsupervised with kids who don't understand boundaries (when I was a kid I knew not to take away our beagle's bone or I might get bit)? Is the dog encouraged to be

Owner responsibility: Does the dog have puppies and is in protection mode? Is the male dog un-neutered?

Remember there are millions of

pitbulls in the U.S. Dog attacks are rare and that's

why they make news. From 1965 to 2001, there have been at least 36 different breeds of dog involved in fatal attacks in the United States. Delise says there's hysteria, without actual fact, placed upon pitbulls.

A pitbull isn't even a breed of dog. It's actually a term to describe the American Pit Bull terrier and American Staffordshire terrier. My dog is a Staffordshire.


