Plaza undergoing renovations

Plan to bring in national retailers

Some call it construction, others label it demolition, but the businesses in the Canton Corners shopping center are happy to see some action.

In addition to the new building being constructed in the plaza's parking lot, the middle of the development has been gutted to make room for three

The plaza, located on the southwest corner of Ford and Lilley, has been cleared in the space between Wesley Berry Flowers and Paul's Fine Jewelry. Tic Tac Nails has been temporarily relocated from the west side of the plaza into an open space on the east end.

"We knew something was in the air (with the plaza), but we weren't sure of what was going to happen," said Bob Mathews, manager of the Red Wing Shoe Store, of the plans to bring in the national retailers.

The stores have been rumored to be Home Goods, Dick's and buybuy BABY.

The outlot building, one of three scheduled for the development, is slated for an AT&T Store and a GameStop. The stores are expected to open in the summer.

"I definitely think this is going to bring new life into the place," Mathews said. "It has got to be an improvement because we've been dealing with a half-empty (development). We are all looking for big things.

Tom Eiden, manager of Richardson's Super Drugs, said he believes the project will be impressive once it's complete.

"I believe it's going to bring people into the plaza that have never been here," he said. "Then maybe they will see some of the other stores."

Joe Kosik of JFK Investment Co., who previously declined to release the names of the retailers expected to move into the center of the plaza, did not return calls for this story.

In addition to the AT&T Store and GameStop, a Potbelly Sandwich Works is slated for the east outlot building. "This is going to generate more traffic into the plaza," Mathews said. "It's going to be a trickledown for all of us."

Along with the ovation, interim Principal Patrick Fitzpatrick - who has a 40-year friendship with Ostoin - read a special tribute to his colleague.


An eight-minute video from the Class of 2008 was also played, which several times spelled Salem Spirit as O-S-T-

"It was such a lovely tribute," said Jan Ostoin, Jerry's wife.

"We were both very overwhelmed by the experience. The video really speaks to Jerry and caught his spirit for the school and how he loves Salem."

Fitzpatrick, who said Ostoin's appearance "was very emotional," noted how important it was for Ostoin - who began his career with Plymouth-Canton Schools in 1974 as an area coordinator for Salem and was appointed principal in 1986 to be at graduation.

All together now



An outdoor classroom

Many hands contribute to building school yard habitat

Parents, students and volunteers recently helped with a one-day blitz to build an outside classroom at Workman Elementary in Canton Township.

The schoolyard habitat became a reality with a \$23,000 Wayne County grant, another \$7,000 raised by school fund-raisers and the help of dozens of people, including Canton Township employees and the Ford Motor Co. Volunteer Corps.

The impetus behind the project was parent

Gillian Marceau, a member of the Thomas Workman Oversight Committee, who two years ago came up with the idea after visiting habitats at other Plymouth-Canton schools.

"I just thought it was something every school should have," said Marceau. "There were nothing but homes going up all around the school and I wanted to have nature in

the back yard so teachers and students could have a learning environment.

"I also wanted something for Cherry Hill Village so everybody who comes through can be a part of it," she said. "There will be cork boards where teachers can display student works and people can find out what the kids are learning."

A full day of activity included building a bridge over a pond where students will be able to view turtles, crawfish and other water life. Native Michigan plants are visible throughout the area. And, a 16-by-16-foot gazebo will have a "live" roof with small plants.



"There will be an irrigation system with a crank so kids can take turns watering it," said

Workman Principal Jim Burt said the habitat is a great addition as an outside classroom.

There are aspects to the science curriculum at several grade levels that are about animal species or habitats, and schools don't often have an on-site resource like this one to learn from," said Burt.

"Students will be studying everything from plants to amphibians to water quality ... all kinds of learning activities for kids.





Postal patrons do best to stamp out hunger

They say neither rain, nor snow nor dark of night will stop a mail carrier from his (or her) appointed rounds.

Neither, apparently, will more than 38,000 pounds of

That's how much food (38,488 pounds to be exact) was collected by Plymouth and Canton postal carriers during their annual partnership with the Plymouth Salvation Army in that organization's "Stamp Out Hunger" campaign, which had residents leaving food by their mailbox for letter carriers to collect.

Overall, more than 297,000 pounds of food were collected by postal carriers and The Salvation Army of Metro Detroit. It's the nation's largest one-day event of its kind, and

it couldn't have come at a better time for the Plymouth Salvation Army, which services Plymouth, Canton, Northville and Belleville. The cupboards in the Salvation Army's food pantry were getting pretty bare, and in one day those shelves were restocked.

The food drive was part of The Salvation Army's "Doing the Most Good" week and is designed to call attention to individuals and groups, who through their actions and donations are "Doing the Most Good" to help the communities in which they live and work.

The level of caring and the willingness to give in these communities never ceases to amaze. It's a community that's heavily dependent on the auto industry which, like pretty much everything else in the state, is struggling. One postal worker said on her route alone there are at least seven houses being foreclosed.

Yet there they were, providing bags and bags of groceries so that others might not have to go hungry. Salvation Army officials said local giving was up some 19 percent over last year. Capt. Jim Irvine, commander of the Plymouth corps, estimated the Salvation Army would have had to spend some \$5,400 to buy the amount of food that was donated during this drive.

With as many groups as there are in these communities, there always seems to be someone asking for help.

During the "Stamp Out Hunger" campaign, residents around here proved - again - help is as close as the

State lawmakers need to pass Great Lakes Compact

The Great Lakes State. That's what they call Michigan. And for good reason — the state is home to 3,200 miles of Great Lakes shoreline (more freshwater coastline than any other state) and touches all the lakes except Lake Ontario.

Yet we will likely hold the dubious distinction of being the last or one of the last states to pass the Great Lakes Compact — an agreement between the eight states and two Canadian provinces bordering the Great Lakes that will ensure regional control over the lakes (and their water). In this increasingly thirsty world, passing the Compact is critical if we are to preserve and protect one of the greatest natural resources on the globe, and prevent large-scale water diversions to other, drier parts of the world, including the parched American

Before the Compact becomes binding, each of the states must pass the legislation in identical form before it can go to Congress for its endorsement. Minnesota, Illinois, Indiana and New York were the first states to sign the Compact into law. Last month, Wisconsin joined them, and there has been some agreement reached in Ohio that should lead to the law's passage there. Pennsylvania lawmakers are also expected to act on it soon. That leaves one state — Michigan.

As the only state entirely within the Great Lakes basin, Michigan has much more to gain through the Compact. We cannot afford to wait. Yet the state Legislature has been unable to come to an agreement on some of the most important details. The Democrat-led House and Republican-led Senate have agreed on much, which is promising, but some differences remain. The main difference is about who will need permits for large-scale withdrawals of water within the state. The Senate wants only users of two million gallons per day to get a permit, whereas the House calls for permitting for withdrawals of one million gallons per day. Another source of contention is about so-called "Adverse Resource Impact Definitions" — how withdrawals will impact coldwater streams, as well as the fish and organisms they support.

Also, there is disagreement about when the laws would go into effect. The Senate recently introduced an exception to allow a full year before they would take effect. The fear by some is that this will create an incentive for future users to rush in and register large quantity withdrawals before these

laws would apply. Leaders in the House and Senate say they are getting closer to coming up with an agreement, which needs to happen before the Legislature's summer recess that begins June 26. Each lawmaker needs to put Michigan's most important resource before party loyalty, so a bipartisan agreement can be reached that will not only make our state proud, but also put us where we should be — in a leadership role when it comes to protecting the Great Lakes.

Help Dad save money

It may be that your father has always been there to provide advice, whether he was showing you how to throw the perfect pitch or cast a fishing line. Maybe he told you how to dress for your job interview or encouraged you to save for financial goals in your life, such as a car, a house and retirement.

Now it's your turn to give your dad a bit of helpful advice that he can take all the way to the bank. Show him how he can save as much as \$3,600 per year on the cost of prescription drugs.

We all know the high cost of medicine can be a burden on fathers who have limited income and resources. But there is extra help — available through Social Security — that could pay part of his monthly premiums, annual deductibles and prescription co-payments. The extra help could be worth up of \$3,600 per year.

To figure out whether your father is eligible for the extra help, he must be receiving Medicare and also have:

■ Income limited to \$15,600 for an individual or \$21,000 for a married couple living together. Even if his annual income is higher, he still may be able to get some help with monthly premiums, annual deductibles and prescription copayments. Some examples where income may be higher include if he or his spouse support other family members who live with them, have earnings from work or live in Alaska or Hawaii.

■ Resources limited to \$11,990 for an individual or \$23,970 for a married couple living together. Resources include such things as bank accounts, stocks and bonds. We do not count his house and car as resources.

Social Security has an easy-to-use online application that you can help complete for your dad. You can find it at www.socialsecurity.gov. To apply by phone or have an application mailed to you, call Social Security at (800) 772-1213 (TTY (800) 325-0778) and ask for the Application for Help with Medicare Prescription Drug Plan Costs (SSA-1020). Or go to the nearest Social Security office.

To learn more about the Medicare prescription drug plans and special enrollment periods, visit www.medicare.gov or call (800) MEDICARE, (800) 633-4227; TTY (877) 486-2048.

So this Father's Day, give your dad a bit of advice and help him save up to \$3,600 a year on his prescription drugs. He'll appreciate the tip as much as you appreciate him.

What's in a name – a lot this political season

t's shaping up to be a pretty interesting political season — from the race for the presidency to the local contests for the Canton Township board, and just about every race in between.

At the local level, most of the races, if not all, will be determined in the Aug. 5 primary election, considering there are only two Democrats in the running for the seven Canton Township Board seats that have been dominated by Republicans for years.

Both the Democrats — David

Marsh is running for supervisor and Syed Taj is running for trustee — are political newcomers fighting tall odds and seasoned opponents.

The most interesting primary contests will be for the four trustee seats, where there are seven Republican candidates, including incumbents Karl Zarbo and Todd Caccamo, and the race for treasurer between longtime Trustee Melissa McLaughlin and Canton Community Foundation President Joan Noricks. The McLaughlin/Noricks battle is the most intriguing, because it pits two individuals with a long track record of community service. It is a race where you wish they could both win, or more correctly one didn't have to lose.

Ultimately, after the dust settles in November, the board will look quite different than it does today. Gone will be two longtime members, Supervisor Tom Yack and Treasurer Elaine Kirchgatter, who have both served for two decades. There is a chance McLaughlin, who has been trustee since 1992, could be gone. If she were to lose to Noricks, the board would be losing more than a half-century of service and experience.

And if Zarbo and/or Caccamo were to be upset, you could have a completely different board, with the exception of Clerk Terry Bennett, who is seeking re-election and doesn't have an opponent.

On the other hand, it is very possible, perhaps even likely, that there will only be two new names serving on the board after the general election. If all the incumbents win, it is possible that we will still have a Bennett, Zarbo, Caccamo, LaJoy, and McLaughlin anchoring the board. The LaJoy in the equation would be Phil as supervisor, replacing his son, Todd, who is currently

All of which brings me to the conclusion that names mean quite a lot in Canton politics. That will be obvious when voters take a look at their ballots in August and November. They will have the opportunity to

vote for two LaJoys (Todd is running to fill his father's term-limited state House seat) and two candidates named Slavens (Mark is running for circuit court judge and his wife, Dian, is running for state representative against Todd LaJoy).

Then there are the family members of former public office holders. Canton's Kevin McNamara, the son of longtime Wayne County Executive Ed McNamara, is running for re-election as county commissioner. Jerry Vorva, who is a former state representative, is running for the 20th State House seat — the same seat his son, Jason Vorva, ran for a couple years ago. And then there is Terry Bennett, who is the wife of former Canton Clerk Loren Bennett, who went on to serve in the state legislature and now says he is retired from politics.

It's surprising there isn't a Stewart on the ballot this year — as in former state Rep. John Stewart, who was term-limited two years ago, and his wife, Beth, who tried to succeed her husband, but lost in the primary to Mark Abbo in 2006. Of course, it is likely (as in very likely) that John Stewart will run for state Senate in two years.

Now, I don't have anything against any of these candidates. In fact, they are all very nice people, who, in most cases, have a long record of serving the Canton community well. But it just amazes me that, in a town as large as Canton has become, only a handful of families seem to have control of the town's political world. It's not because of some nefarious plot or that they have a strangle-hold on power. I think it's more of a case that so few people are interested in public service these days.

Maybe it's because people are intimidated or don't know how to get involved. Or maybe they don't want to subject themselves to the darker side of a campaign — all the negative ads and name calling that has become part of American politics. Perhaps they feel the media will be unfair to them.

I'm not sure what the answer is. I do know that it probably isn't healthy for a small group of people to hold power for so long. My feelings are the more people that get involved, the more ideas are brought to the table, which can lead to a more dynamic government. I hope people don't read this and say he's telling people not to vote for any of these candidates. That's not the point I'm trying to make.

I just know that Canton likes to tout its diversity, as it should. It would be nice to see a little more at the top.

Educational journey needs to begin early and last a lifetime

ast week, my grandson proudly walked across the auditorium stage to accept his diploma. He had fulfilled all the requirements for his diploma and was now officially a graduate — of preschool.

A couple of weeks earlier, his father had graduated summa cum laude from law school.

Both events are significant markers along an educational continuum. As we are constantly being told in this ever-shifting global economy, this brave new world, education is a lifelong process that begins very early and never really ends.

Aidan's graduation from preschool and his advancement to the rigors of kin-

dergarten are in recognition of the need to engage young minds at the earliest possible time. Very young children absorb information and are able to fit that information into the most abstract associations more easily than adults.

That's why so much emphasis is being placed on early childhood education, preschool and kindergarten. While some parents wonder about "pushing" children into education too early and not letting them "just have fun," educators and experts on child development see these trends as vital to a child's future. They also know that while play itself is an important kind of learning, learning is also an important kind of play.

Play and learning go hand in hand and they are most encouraged in homes where parents take the time to engage their children and actively participate in the educational process, at school and at home. This seems so obvious, but we lose generations of children to parental neglect, which is often in turn a product of a broader social neglect.

We know that children from low-income neighborhoods often do not have the opportunities that other children have. Many come from one-parent homes, where the parent is stressed and has little time, or personal resources, to help. Drugs, crime and other problems feed on themselves. Children who emerge from these conditions are often stronger for it, but far too many are lost.

Early childhood education for all children, that is cognizant of the special problems in low-income neighborhoods, is essential.

A report by the Center For Michigan, a public policy organization founded by Phil Power, looks at a broad range of issues important to Michigan's economic survival. Michigan's Defining Moment's Principle

No. 1 is "A talented and globally competitive workforce" and its first goal is "dramatically improve learning and completion rates from early childhood to K-12 through higher education."

Gov. Jennifer Granholm and Lt. Gov. John Cherry, who chaired a task force on education, have emphasized Michigan's failure to increase the rate of college graduation compared to other states. Our problem, as they also know, actually begins in those early childhood years. The Center for Michigan report says it clearly, "Emphasize school readiness by expanding high-quality pre-kindergarten education that recognizes the importance of both academic and social development. Build a culture of education by increasing parents' and students' recognition that education is essential for prosperity." Its Web site is www.centerformichigan.org.

On Tuesday, The New York Times ran an ad for a "Broader, Bolder Approach to Education," signed by a distinguished task force of educators, social thinkers, medical doctors, journalists and others. The group advocates for small classes in the early grades; improved teacher training; and making college preparatory classes available to all. But there is also a focus on the roadblocks to better early childhood education, advocating for high-quality early childhood education that promotes "not just academic readiness, but positive lifetime social, economic and behavioral outcomes for low-come children." It advocates for better children's health, better access to pediatricians and dentists. And it advocates for better quality out-of-school time with summer and after school enrichment programs.

Seventy-five percent of the






"Defensive Player of the Year." "Mac was our leader on defense this season," said Riley. "He is a tremendous close defender who could check the ball away from any player.'



Gulf Coast project rewarding for volunteers

In mid-May, local volunteers headed south to the hurricaneravaged Gulf Coast, working with Habitat for Humanity to build much-needed new homes.

There were some 55 people in Hancock County's Kiln, in Mississippi, in a site known as Camp Coastal, said Gretchen Hurlbert of Lake Angelus, volunteer relief coordinator for Habitat for Humanity of Oakland County, based in Pontiac. A Macomb volunteer went along with the group.

"Most of them were from Oakland County," Hurlbert, a former teacher now retired, said of those on the Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter Work Project 2008.

The volunteers from a number of states were in the area where Hurricanes Katrina and Rita struck in Bay St. Louis, Miss. The Oakland affiliate has made previous trips to the region to build homes.

This was the 25th anniversary for former President Carter and his wife being involved with Habitat. Last year, the Carters were in Los Angeles and in India the year before.

"Other than the weather, it went very well," Hurlbert said of the recent trip, May 10-17 for most volunteers. They made early progress on the three homes, but then electrical storms hit and power tools couldn't be used safely.

"We didn't get our houses finished, which was disappointing," she said. "We were split among three different houses.'

It was the Oakland affiliate's fifth trip to the region, having a partnership with the Habitat affiliate in Bay-Waveland. Another local group will go in November, although the Carters won't be there then.

They must have very good connections because the sun came out," she said of the time the couple visited each home. There was a large kickoff with some 300 volunteers.

"We will keep doing this because the need is ever present," said Hurlbert, noting you can call Habitat's Oakland affiliate at (248) 338-1843 or visit the Web site at www.habitatoakland.org. If Mississippi's too far, there will be a Blitz Build with four homes in Pontiac ongoing this month "and always looking for great volunteers."

"It's going to take a long time," she said of rebuilding the Gulf Coast. Some areas are coming back, but there are insurance problems and other areas remain devastated.


"Some there was nothing to abandon," Hurlbert said.

A number of Habitat affiliates are working on many homes all along the Gulf Coast: "It was a huge, huge undertaking," she said.

This was Hurlbert's third trip to the region, and she tips her hat to former Habitat staffer Gwen

Joseph who preceded her in those duties. Joseph now lives in London, England, due to a family job trans-

The volunteers who head south November will likely work on one house, Hurlbert said. She noted the warm welcome from Gulf Coast merchants and others in the region volunteers received.

"The soreness goes away after awhile," said volunteer Linda Forrester of Birmingham, who went on the May Mississippi trip with husband Oz. "This was actually our third trip" to the Bay St. Louis

The Forresters, retirees, got involved with Habitat in Pontiac and decided to go to Mississippi on a project. This most recent trip, he did framing, doors and windows, while she did painting and siding, "pretty much everything that needed to be done."

Oz Forrester was an engineer and took a building course; the couple built a home Up North and have done home renovations here.

Lawyer can help with discrimination complaints

Q. Do you have any suggestions as to how we might be able to prevent discrimination complaints under the Fair Housing Act as an association?

A. Many associations can be saddled with discrimination complaints at any time from current members

wish to buy in the community. Some of the most common discrimination complaints involve the refusal to fulfill a disabled person's parking request, and any

association action that members or perspective members perceive as discriminatory. Three common pitfalls are: 1) inadequately fulfilled parking space request; 2) receiving discriminatory context such as raising fees during a sale and; 3) design and construction violations. You are best advised to consult with your attorney concerning ways to avoid these problems.

Q. I heard about recent legislation in Florida that would deal with condo associations and is close to being passed. Do you have any information?

A. I believe that you are referring to a bill being introduced by Rep. Julio Robaina's House Bill 995. The bill would amend the statute that governs condo associations. It would remove provisions providing for association windstorm insurance; require official association records be maintained for at least five years and be made available to members at specifically named locations; create criminal and civil sanctions against any officer, director or association manager who knowingly or intentionally defaces, destroys or fails to create or maintain accounting records; restrict a condo association from waiving a financial report for more than two years; and prohibits accessibility to certain types of personal information about unit owners. The bill alsoprohibits any board from adopting rules or regulations that step on the rights of an owner to practice his or her religion, and prohibits associations from spending association money to prosecute a suit against an individual unit owner. However, the Community Association Institute (CAI), local chapter apparently is opposed to these proposed changes. You are best advised to consult with your local legislator in Florida regarding the status of the bill.

He decided to expand Joe's Produce and began working with a consultant. Finally completed last year, the expan-

winery position) to assistant winemaker.

During those six years, Wright met amateur winemaker Mike Magee and Corvallis, Ore., attorney and investor Steve Allen. They drew up plans for Belle Vallee Cellars and made it a reality. Currently, in a modern 18,000-square-foot winery in downtown Corvallis, Wright, as the head winemaker for the partnership, makes 18,000 cases, 95 percent pinot noir, four percent pinot gris and a few cases of reds grown in the Rogue Valley of southern

WHAT TO BUY FROM BELLE **VALLEE CELLARS**

2005 Oregon Pinot Gris \$15: In Oregon the official name of the grape variety is pinot gris. Pinot grigio (the Italian name

for the same grape) is disallowed. This well-priced version has a panoply of aromas and flavors including apple, citrus, pear and wild honey.

Mineral notes add to the wine's overall complexity. It's a fine match for grilled marinated shrimp with a jicama slaw, as executive chef Jeff Rose illustrated at Big Rock Chop House in Birmingham.

2006 Willamette Valley Pinot Noir \$20 may be the best pinot bargain from Oregon. The style is somewhat lighter than, as an example, a blockbuster from California's Russian River Valley, but it's elegant and delicious - perfect for summer drinking with grilled salmon.

2006 Willamette Valley Reserve Pinot Noir \$37 is, as might be expected, a bigger rendition as a blend of 16 vineyards, with 40 variations of

soil compositions, clones and rootstocks. With a solid fruit core of black cherry, blackberry and raspberry fruit, it's generous in the mouth and finishes long, juicy and satisfying. Chef Rose paired it with a sensational crispy rabbit roulade, not an easy prep for a home cook, so think a simple, grilled marinated pork tenderloin.

2005 Willamette Valley **Grand Cuvee Pinot Noir \$50** is a best of the cellar wine. Concentrated, velvety and silky, it's loaded with dark fruit characters. If you're a pinot noir aficionado, don't miss it.

more collector's wines," said Larranaga. "We have wines people can buy every day, and we have hard-to-find wines." Wines range in price from \$6.99-\$250. Larranaga also brought in more Spanish wines. "They can also talk to a chef about prepping foods with these wines," Larranaga said. There's also a winemaker's dinner set for June 16.

Events Planner Laura Livingston will book small house parties, corporate gatherings, weddings and graduations — groups ranging from 10 to 500. "We're full service planners, from a tray dropoff to outdoor events where you can book a tent, set up grills and specialty linens," Livingston said.

"We've had a lot of experts here and that's been a key to our success," Maiorana said. "What I did was set out to find experts in their field."

Larranaga is a California native familiar with the wineries there and has worked as a sommelier in restaurants. Teresa Summers, pastry chef, worked closely with Joe Decker, master pastry chef, at Schoolcraft College, and now she and a staff of five create appealing and creative desserts on display at the coffee cafe in the store.

Maiorana has built a short pipeline to Schoolcraft College, hiring recent Schoolcraft graduates like Summers, Bell-Constantine and Scott Swamba, executive chef of operations. Maiorana said he spoke with Schoolcraft instructors who recommended the chefs. "They were tremendous," Maiorana said of the instructors.

"My thinking was there has to be enough people who like the best foods, and the people here are behind the product, so they tell the customers (about the product)," Maiorana said.

Today the market represents a far cry from the original store. The addition includes counterspace dedicated to gourmet foods to go, more than 200 cheeses, an olive and antipasto bar, a full line of deli sub sandwiches, and a chicken rotisserie. Gourmet to go offers salads and entrees like Italian sausage with peppers, chicken kebabs and baby back ribs.

Swamba emphasizes seasonality in deciding what will grace the menu for the carryout foods. "We go with the seasonal and soon we will be moving into summer items." Swamba called the customer response "tremendous" to the prepared foods, whether he serves ribs, crab salad or pasta salads.

Swamba was hired eight months ago, Bell-Constantine three weeks ago.

"I'll try and make Joe's Produce's catering gourmet and upscale, on a level of Papa Joe's," Bell-Constantine said, naming the Birmingham and Rochester Hills market. She prefers to work on catering rather than in a restaurant kitchen because "I know what's

going on," she said.

"Catering (in markets) is
really new. We can really capture a wide range of audience
of customers."

Maiorana said the olive and antipasto bar is popular. "It's probably because of the growing trend of Mediterranean food. It's healthy and gives you variety. People have a far more expanded knowledge of food now. People travel to Europe, see something there and they have a taste for that."


Then there are the desserts and sweets, all on display at the coffee cafe.

Summers will put out a tray of minis (brownies and canuoli), with several other desserts with strawberries, raspberries and lemon raspberry, key lime raspberry parfaits and key lime mousse tart.

"This food is all made by people who know how to make food," Maiorana said. "It's made on site and they can purchase it. If there's something you don't see, you can ask for it and they can make it for you," Maiorana said of his chefs.

"It was a really big undertaking. I saw it being popular and it seemed to be the most viable way to expand. We expanded the building and it's busy but there is room to walk around and the turnover of food is great. The staff does the best job they can. They care about their jobs and the customers."
