Canton man charged with explosives, terror threat

A Canton man has been arraigned on five felony charges after he allegedly attempted to damage a railroad overpass with a pipe bomb early Sunday morning.

Ian Michael Douglas, 18, has been charged with false report or threat of terrorism, a 20-year felony; placing explosives near property, a 15-year felony; two counts of assault with a dangerous weapon, each a four-year felony; and felony firearm, a two-year felony.

Two people contacted township police Sunday after Douglas allegedly pointed a 12-gauge shotgun at them and asked their identities. Douglas, who came across the two at a railroad overpass near I-275

and Haggerty, then apparently ignited a pipe bomb on the ground under the overpass.

The witnesses told police that Douglas talked of derailing a train. The explosive did not damage the overpass.

With assistance from the Western-Wayne Special Operations Team, Michigan State Police Bomb Squad and CSX

Railroad Police, Canton officers identified Douglas, a student at Starkweather Educational Center, through an investigation and arrested him at his Kaiser Street residence where bomb-making materials, such as

Plymouth.

Magistrate Eric Colthurst ordered a \$500,000 cash bond and set Douglas' preliminary exam for Aug. 8 at the Plymouth courthouse.

Douglas is currently being held in Wayne County Jail.

Hopefuls pouring cash into court election

Some of the 35th District Court judge candidates in the Aug. 5 primary had predicted at the start of the race campaign spending would reach \$100,000 for the six-year seat on the

In campaign finance reports required by the Michigan Secretary of State, as of July 20 half of the six candidates were well on their way to reaching the unofficial spending goal they expect will lead them to one of the two top finishes in the primary.

According to Secretary of State records, Joe Barone of Plymouth Township had spent the most. Barone reported spending \$61,101 through July 20, with another \$2,734 left in campaign funds.

Martha Snow of Northville Township spent \$60,527, leaving her with \$14,521 in available funds. Jim Plakas of Northville Township - who spent \$98,000 trying to win a seat on the bench two years ago - had spent \$46,616 through the reporting period, but had the largest remaining balance of \$24,453.

Cam Miller of Plymouth reported spending \$15,865; Art Butler of Plymouth Township \$2,667; and Jim Malinowski of Canton Township

The two candidates with the highest number of votes will face off in the November general election for a chance to succeed Judge John MacDonald, who is retiring at the end of the year.

Meanwhile, in the race for the 20th House District, state Rep. Marc Corriveau, D-Northville, reported spending \$38,289 of his \$134,710 war

Republican Jerry Vorva of Plymouth had \$10,800 in his coffers, which included a \$5,000 donation from the Michigan Chamber of Commerce, which is supporting Vorva; a \$500 contribution from the Michigan Association of Insurance Agents and a \$5,000 loan to himself. Vorva has thus far spent \$2,896.

Corriveau and Vorva do not have competition in the primary race and are gearing up for the November election.

Developer's disappearing act frustrates buyers

Given that she and her husband had to move in with their daughter, find storage for most of their possessions and rush to find a new home, Vivian Lughermo would probably be the last person to tout Jeff Brown's skills as a developer.

"I just want to know how he sleeps at night," says Lughermo, who put up \$5,000 last year for Brown's

company to build her a new home in the Cherry Hill Gardens subdivision on the southeast corner of Cherry Hill and Denton roads. "I don't understand what happened to that sweet guy that we first met."

Lughermo and her husband, Vincent, were

among a handful of would-be Cherry Hill Gardens residents that were left without new construction after Brown, who operated out of Birmingham, moved to Las Vegas last summer.

In expectation of moving into Cherry Hill Gardens, the Lughermos put their Huron Township home up for sale. When it sold two months later, the couple's sonin-law learned from township officials that Brown had left the state.

"So here we are, our house sold, we have to be out in 30 days, our (new) house wasn't even going to be built, so we were homeless," Lughermo said, adding that before he left, she had spoken to Brown several times. "Talk about stress. We knew something was wrong when the condo model closed."

The Lughermos moved into their daughter's Rustic Ridge home and later purchased a different township property.

"If we knew we couldn't live in (Cherry Hill Gardens), we probably would have stayed in our home for another year or two," Lughermo said, adding that until he saw the parcel inside of Cherry Hill Gardens, her husband was reluctant to move.

In addition to Cherry Hill Gardens, Brown was also the developer for Hampton Ridge North and is facing a lawsuit from Canton regarding that subdivision's unfinished roads.

"He left and didn't tell us," said Municipal Services Director Tim Faas. "This is the first time that has happened in recent history."

Faas said Brown called township officials about a month ago explaining that the security was still available for Hampton Ridge North. The call was prompted by a letter requesting that Brown complete the development's roadwork.

Brown's attorney, Mike Morganroth, said his client didn't simply abandon the two township developments, adding that Brown's former business partner, Dick Lewiston, is now responsible for Cherry Hill Gardens. Pulte has taken over development at

Hampton Ridge North. Brown, who moved last summer, felt compelled to go west after Lewiston instructed him not to move forward with any construction at Cherry Hill Gardens, Morganroth said.







Szczepkowski of Riverview, Keith Windham of Detroit, and Linda Kay Zebrowsk of Garden City did not respond to the questionnaire.



CAVANAGH SAYS FORECLOSURES TOP ISSUE

What makes you the most qualified to hold this position?

I have served as a Wayne County Commissioner for the last eight years, overseeing the budget and trying to get a handle on how many properties have gone through

foreclosure auction process. The commissioners are told there are 9000 vacant parcels sitting idle but the treasurer's office has

never disclosed the annual proceeds or the accumulative total from auctioning off our county's assets. I am not sure they know how much money they are holding. I have an MBA and a law degree, both would prove invaluable with the continuous avalanche of litigation plaguing the treasurer's office from improper procedures. I have also studied at Harvard University and learned nationally acclaimed programs to fight foreclosure and blight from other county treasurers. I have the energy and ambition to bring proven best practices from around our state and

country to turn the tide on the escalating problems facing our neighborhoods.

What are the two most important issues facing the treasurer's office and how would you address them?



Dress code push not a rights violation

Administrators and educators spent the last few weeks using summer school students to tune up enforcement of Plymouth-Canton's dress code, following plans hatched during months of committee discussions among administrators, teachers, students and parents.

We think it was time well spent.

The district has decided, after its dress policy committee started studying the issue as far back as October, to increase enforcement of the code. For the second straight year - last year, it was cell phones - officials decided to begin the enforcement in summer school, giving them those few weeks to tweak and teach, to let students and parents alike know what was coming, and gauge reaction to it.

District officials maintain the policy itself isn't changing — indeed, they say the policy has been pretty much the same for 15 years — but that a stronger

enforcement has become necessary.

The targets are items the district deems distracting - plunging necklines, sagging pants that reveal undergarments, clothing that glorifies drugs, alcohol or sex. Also on the radar are potential safety items or possible weapons, such as large belt buckles, and colored contact lenses, which educators say can mask the fact the wearer could be high or inebriated.

We agree such things can be a distraction, but if you don't want to listen to us or to administrators, listen to the students themselves, who said so in an anonymous survey taken as part of the committee's discussions.

Of course there are also students calling this new enforcement push a violation of their freedom of expression. Kids, they say, use dress as a means of expressing themselves. We agree with that part, and that's all fine and good, in the right circumstance and

But a classroom is not the right venue. Students are there to learn, and those who push the envelope on things like the dress code do a disservice to those they would deter. It's a matter of respect, for self and others, a lesson best learned young, because it's one students will need as they move on to the more heavily regulated world of the adult work force.

Conspiracy theorists would have you believe such a move on the district's part is a first step toward a uniform policy, but there's no indication anyone in the district wants that, and we don't think it should.

What district officials want is a more uniform enforcement of an existing policy. Such enforcement removes any gray areas; students now know what constitutes a violation and what the resulting penalty will be. It gives the policy, and the district, a much more regimented code.

Schools have never been intended as bastions of democracy. There are certain rules to be followed. It can only benefit students to make those rules - and resultant consequences -

We support no-reason absentee voting

Every Election Day, there are countless people who plan to vote, but don't make it to the polls for one reason or another.

These well-intentioned citizens want to participate in our democratic system, but the logistics of life prevent them from doing so.

Perhaps they have to work a long shift or stay late at the office to finish up a project. Maybe they commute a long distance to work and have to leave before 7 a.m. and don't get home until 8 p.m.

Maybe they have young children or an elderly family member to care for at home and can't get anyone to relieve them. Or perhaps they have to rush home after work to fix dinner for the family and then rush out the door again to drive a child to soccer practice or attend a child's recital.

Whatever the reason, it's no reason not to vote. That's why we support no-reason absentee voting in

Michigan.

Currently, the only people in Michigan eligible to vote by absentee ballot are those who are 60 years old and older, incarcerated, have religious reasons for not voting on election day, plan to be out of town, or need assistance voting.

Earlier this month, state Sens. Liz Brater, D-Ann Arbor, and Gilda Z. Jacobs, D-Huntington Woods, announced a "No Excuses Voting Initiative" that supports the passage of Senate Bill 12, which would allow voters to vote by absentee ballot for any reason.

We support the passage of S.B. 12 as well. Any change in law that would give more people the chance to participate in democracy gets a yes vote from us.

It is misleading when Canton Township incumbents claim to reduce taxes, when tax revenues have increased every year since 1993. The portion of property taxes for police, fire, and township has grown from \$8.4 million in 1993 to over \$31.3 million

Our township board has spent money irresponsibly. The Village Theater, originally estimated at a cost of \$5.5 million in 2000, ended up costing \$11.7 million. The Town Hall expansion, first projected at \$0.5 million for minor expansion totaled \$20 million. Utility lines were buried underground at a cost of over \$8 million. In the last 10 years, Canton's government debt has grown from \$24.2 million to over \$89.5

It is easy to balance the budget if you simply increase debt. That is what our present board has done. I am interested in candidates who plan to reduce unnecessary expenditures:

Joan Noricks: "Canton faces reductions in revenue sharing and assessments which will reduce the amount of taxes available to spend on services ... what services are essential and what is expendable... what services can be reduced or eliminated."



hile I've never run for public office, I've covered enough elections to understand it's a tough way to make a living. Can you

imagine having to go out every four (or two) years and beg people to vote for you so you



and gumption to run for public office. Democracy wouldn't exactly work with-

out them. I've tried to keep all this in mind as I've watched the race for Canton treasurer between Melissa McLaughlin and Joan Noricks get nastier and nastier. Anyone who has seen the recent candidates forum sponsored by the League of Women Voters (it is playing twice a day on Canton Cable) or read recent letters to the editor knows exactly what I'm talking

It's unfortunate, because you have excellent candidates who have spent years serving the Canton community. McLaughlin is a current Canton trustee, as well as a member of the planning commission and DDA. Noricks has been the president of the Canton Community Foundation for 15 years, and was formerly involved with Plymouth-Canton Schools.

Canton voters are lucky to be able to make a decision between the two. This is what democracy should be about. Here you have a couple of community-minded individuals who bring

a depth of life experience to the table. It is a challenge for the voter to determine who would be best for the job, a sign of a healthy government. If you think about it, far too often we don't really have a choice when we enter the

So I think McLaughlin and Noricks - and some of their supporters — have done a disservice to the voters - and themselves - by dragging the campaign into the mud. Both have complained the other is responsible for the campaign's negative tone. There is no doubt in my mind both candidates deserve some of the blame. But there are others who deserve some of the blame, as well.

In recent weeks it has become quite clear that Noricks is not just running against McLaughlin. She's running against people who have controlled Canton government for a generation, foremost among them outgoing Canton Supervisor Tom Yack, who has taken an active role in McLaughlin's campaign. State Sen. Bruce Patterson is also among this group.

Noricks has tried to sell herself as the candidate of change, the premise being McLaughlin is part of this small cadre of power brokers that has become too comfortable and is no longer responsive to the needs of everyday residents. Noricks has taken this message with her while knocking on a lot of doors talking to residents. My guess is that she has probably said some things she will some day regret.

So it is no surprise that Yack and Patterson, who have done some wonderful things for the Canton community, would want McLaughlin to defeat Noricks. I'm just a little amazed by the tactics they are using to make sure that happens.

In a recent letter to the editor, Yack ripped

Noricks for her "lack of leadership and management skills" at the foundation, writing "the foundation's finances are in disarray, substantial donors have been driven away, income has plummeted, expensive software is yet to be implemented, staff retention is a problem, board communication is lacking, and board meetings are disorganized."

Board members I spoke to, who have no interest in who wins this election, refuted every one of Yack's charges. In fact, several told me they are looking forward to the day when Noricks returns to her job (she has taken a leave of absence while running for treasurer). They also told me that Yack, who helped form the foundation, hasn't been to a board meeting in "years."

Patterson also wrote a recent letter to the editor, suggesting that the foundation's recent newsletter was essentially a campaign piece for Noricks, and that it threatened the foundation's non-profit status. He wrote "no current political aspirations should be permitted to sully the noble efforts of so many, over so long a period."

I've seen the newsletter. Noricks' picture appears in it several times, but in each case the photos are group shots from recent foundation events. Perhaps I don't have a "trained eye" like Patterson, but I just don't think it's unusual for the president to appear in group shots. There is also a short item letting people know Noricks is on a leave of absence.

Why would Patterson want to tarnish the reputation of the foundation (the one he professes to care about so much) in this way, considering all the good it has done? I can tell you why. It's called politics. I think what is more telling about Patterson's letter is that he never

discloses the fact that McLaughlin used to work for him.

McLaughlin certainly is not innocent either. She went on the attack at the recent forum, making some of the same charges Yack made about Noricks' inept leadership skills at the foundation. This doesn't surprise me because if Noricks has an advantage over McLaughlin, it is that she has led an organization. McLaughlin has not.

But I was surprised McLaughlin criticized Noricks for hiring her daughter to do some work at the foundation. As it turns out, Noricks' daughter did do some work — she got paid \$10 an hour on a short-term basis to work on the foundation's Web site. The work was always approved in advance (and never questioned) by the foundation's board of directors.

Frankly, I'm not sure why McLaughlin would make Noricks' daughter an issue. I have never heard her once complain about Yack's daughter, Elizabeth Knoll, being the only paid employee at the Partnership for the Arts and Humanities, another local charitable group that Yack helped get off the ground.

I just hope voters aren't influenced by all of this. It would be so nice if people enter the booth and put a check next to the person's name who they think deserves the position the most -- based on their own qualifications and not because they were able to tarnish the name of their opponent enough to discredit them.

I hope that's not what our democracy has become. Because if it is, maybe it would be better if nobody ran for public office.

All of the township trustees are part-timers and have outside jobs - jobs that could take them out of Canton with either a promotion or a pink slip. One of my jobs is being a reserve US Marine. Make no mistake about it, I am proud to be a US Marine and never hesitate to tell people that I could be ordered to go back to Iraq or Afghanistan. If that will ever happen is certainly unknown as the situation in Iraq/Afghanistan is very dynamic. Just now, they are speaking of the great successes and the pulling out of troops under a general timetable - talk like that was unheard of not long ago.

The fact is our military remains ready for any mission at any time. Our Founding Fathers envisioned a nation that used citizen soldiers and they continue to be a pivotal force in

America's arsenal. Serving one's country or community need not be mutually exclusive — they are, in fact, complementary as it has given me the perspective and impetus to take on a wide variety of issues that affect Canton residents be they at the local, county, state, or federal level. This has been at the heart of my many successes as a vocal advocate for Canton residents.

Here is yet another opportunity for me to help across the board: at least six states have constitutional amendments that allow legislators to appoint someone in their absence if deployed for war. Michigan is not one of them. I have spoken to this issue previously in May of 2006. I have been working with State Rep. Phil LaJoy (a former US Marine) on this issue and he has agreed to introduce legislation to allow municipal leaders to nominate and appoint interim members for the duration of a combat deployment.

It is ironic that extensive legislation exists to protect one's employment against discrimination with regards to military service, and we draw no distinction in serving one's nation or community for our police or fire personnel, yet for local, state and county leaders, discrimination has been encouraged by some. This action unnecessarily deprives both the military and government of good leaders (and gosh knows the government could use some more).

We now have an opportunity to support our legislators who serve in the reserve military or National Guard, and have answered the call to duty at great risk and personal sacrifice, without penalizing them, or their constituents. I hope you will write your state representatives and encourage them to take on this fight for our "warrior legislators" across the State of Michigan. Anything less than meaningful and total support for our troops is, frankly, un-American.





Woman, 53, steps into ring 200 pounds lighter

How in the world did a Redford Township woman lose over 200 pounds, shed the need for high blood pressure medications, free herself of a "borderline diabetic" label and become a highly respected boxer — all after she turned 50?

Simply by changing her life's motto from "No Sweat" to "Know Sweat" — and by falling in love with the sport old-time sports writers referred to as the "Sweet Science."

Roughly five years ago, Sarah Gilbert, now 53, weighed more than most household scales can register. Her excess poundage not only made her feel miserable and listless—it made living dangerous, considering heart disease sprouted up all too frequently in her family tree.

"I finally said enough is enough, started working out and watching what I ate and my weight went from 312 pounds to around 165," recalled Gilbert. "I wanted to lose another 30, but everything I tried failed."

That's when, approximately three years ago, she crossed paths with Greg Wright, a former world champion boxer who taught a boxing class at Lifetime Fitness in Canton.

"I was working out regularly at Lifetime, I'd walk by Greg's class and thought it would be fun, but I was afraid I'd make a complete idiot of myself if I tried it," Gilbert said. "Finally, I got the nerve to give it a shot and I totally fell in love with boxing. It was very rigorous and demanding, but it helped me lose the extra 30 pounds I wanted to lose."

Along with losing the pounds, she acquired enough ring skills to regis-

ter for last year's Women's Masters competition at the Ringside World Championships in Kansas City.

Gilbert's amazing improvement in the ring floored Wright, who chuckled the first time he saw her footwork.

"Honestly, after the first time I saw Sarah box, I didn't think she'd last very long," said Wright, the owner of Canton-based Wright Cardio Fitness, where Gilbert and several other local athletes train. "She had two left feet. But she kept going, and going and going and now she's a whirlwind in the ring.

"I've worked out in gyms alongside some great boxers — Tommy Hearns, Lenox Lewis, Oscar De La Hoya — but I tell everybody, Sarah is the best athlete I know. To see someone

her age who came from where she

came from to do what she's doing now, it's truly inspirational. If I would have worked out in my prime like she works out now, I would have been a champion a lot longer than I was."

Gilbert has the undivided support of her biggest fan — her husband, Dallas, even though he's never seen her in action.

"He won't watch my fights," Gilbert said, smiling. "He's afraid that if he saw somebody hit me in the face during a fight, he'd jump in the ring and go after them."

Gilbert's visit to the Ringside Championships in 2007 ended in dis-

appointment.
"The only other lady in my age division backed out at the last min-

ute," she said.

When the 2008 event kicks off
next Tuesday in at the KCI Arena
in Kansas City, she's guaranteed to
square off against one opponent in

the 35-and-over women's division.
"I talked to a lady from New York who's entered and she said she'll be there for sure," said Gilbert.

The bouts for the first three rounds of the tournament consist of three one-minute rounds. The champion-ship match will include five 90-second rounds.

ond rounds.

Win or lose, the admiration for Gilbert at Wright's training facility won't be diminished.

"She is an unbelievable inspiration to all of us," said Shannon Vanderen, a workout colleague.

Gilbert's advice to middle-aged, overweight women who may want to follow in her footsteps is as direct as one of her punishing jabs. "If I can do it," she said, "you can do it."

Division 1 schools Michigan State, Toledo and Central Michigan all vied






The bucks gave up a late goal in regulation and two more in overtime in suffering a season-ending 3-1 defeat to the Kalamazoo Outrage.

A priest for peace goes to war

Jesuit priest the Rev. Timothy Meier does not exactly fit the typical profile of a soldier serving in a war zone. And yet Meier, director of the Honors Program in Biology at Stanford University, was mobilized to go to Iraq on June 30.

"I never dreamed of being a soldier," said Meier, 52. "I never, ever dreamt it. I was a kid during Vietnam and felt it a mistake for us to be there. I saw people mutilated from the war. My cousin, George, was severely wounded, his right arm damaged along with other wounds, and still walks with a perpetual limp."

Meier never thought he would become a Jesuit priest, either.

'Who wants to not be married and vow to a life of poverty?" Meier said with a chuckle.

Born in Detroit and raised in Farmington Hills, Meier worked seven days a week at his local parish and at a raquet club doing administrative work to help pay his tuition to University of Detroit High School, where he graduated as class valedic-

It was after completing bachelor of arts degrees in biology and music with honors from Kalamazoo College that Meier decided to become a priest. And it was while on foreign study in Spain that he felt compelled to become a Jesuit. From

1978-80, he was a Jesuit Novice. In 1982, Meier received a Master of Arts in Philosophy from Loyola University of Chicago. He was then sent to La Speccola Vaticana, the Vatican Astronomical Observatory, in Castel Gandolfo, Italy, where the pope has his summer residence.

While there, Meier identified 700 late-type red giant stars near the center of the galaxy. He also had the privilege of singing an a capella solo for Pope John Paul II at a Mass in his private chapel at the 17th-century Castel Gandolfo near Rome. The pope was still recovering from gunshot wounds he sustained in an assassination attempt the previous

"Every night I would walk to the heights of a spiral staircase of the medieval castle because I learned the acoustics were incredible. One day, some Polish children, who were visiting Pope John Paul II, heard me singing. For a few weeks we got to know one another and would sing together," said Meier.

One day, Meier was summoned to the Pope's private residence in the castle where he celebrated Mass. The pontiff had heard Meier's mellifluous tenor voice and the then 26-year-old was asked to sing at a Mass celebrated by John Paul II for a group of Canadian pilgrims. Afterwards, the pope gave him a modest pen and a photograph of Meier with the pontiff.

In 1984, Meier attended


Georgetown University and earned a master's of science in Biology (immunology), graduating again with distinction.

From 1984 to 2004, Meier vigorously pursued his studies. He was a Jesuit Fellow in Biology at John Carroll University in Cleveland Heights, Ohio.

From 1990-91, he attended the Weston Jesuit School of Theology in Cambridge, Mass., earning masters' degrees in divinity and theology. In 1998 and 1999, Meier received his Ph.D. in Biological Sciences (molecular neurobiology) and a post-doctoral degree in molecular virology from Stanford University. From 2002-04, Meier earned his postdoc in molecular neurobiology from Stanford, where he has been undergraduate research coordinator and director of the biology department's honors program since 2004.

"It is a joy to mentor students who are so dedicated to the pursuit of scientific research and advancement. They challenge me and I them. It is such a privilege," Meier

In 2006, Meier was commissioned a captain in the Chaplain Corps of United States Army Reserve. Later that year, he was transferred into the California Army National Guard. While at Stanford, Meier taught, coached and mentored R.O.T.C. cadets who studied there but travelled to train in military science elsewhere.

Army Capt. Meier knows he is unarmed in a dangerous place where his entire life's experiences will be put to the test.

"My goal in Iraq is to provide spiritual comfort to women and men who place themselves in harm's way," Meier said.

Meier is the son of Tom and Nancy Meier of Northville. Luis Carlos Montalván is a former

Army cavalry captain who served two tours in Iraq and is recovering in New York from various wounds sustained in combat. Meieris his Catholic priest and spiritual coun-

Q: One of our board members signed a contract against the property manager's advice. She could sit silently by and make nice with the new board or she could bring the matter to the association's attention and risk alienating the board. What should she do?

A: The professional manager should guide the board, but the best manager knows his or her role as an advisory one and the manager should never usurp the authority of the board. Some boards choose to ignore their manager's advice and when a decision could put the association in peril, it puts the manager in an awkward position of. following the board's wishes or taking a firm but opposing stand. A manager should state his or her position and let the minutes reflect same. Sometimes managers usurp the role of the board to fill the vacuum of power which is not good either. Proper balance should be between the board's decisions and that of the manager.
