

# Halloween is harvest time for local family business

Four years ago, Amanda Goodenow was driving through Canton on her way from school when The Pumpkin Patch caught her eye.

"I said 'Ooh, pumpkins!' and I turned in here," said Goodenow, a Dearborn resident and Eastern Michigan University student. "And I've been coming here every year since then. You can't find prices like this in the grocery store and I would rather support local growers anyway.'

The Pumpkin Patch, located on Cherry Hill Road just west of Canton Center, is the brainchild of Silvio and Helen Vano's son, Larry.

"He came to us (in 1994) and said he wanted to do this and he started with one row of pumpkins," said Helen Vano as she looked around the farmland that has been in her family since 1941. "I am so proud of him and it has become a family project."


A place where no pumpkin is more than \$5, Larry, along with his wife, Ganya, have grown the Patch from one row of pumpkins into dozens of rows. His siblings, Maria and Silvio, Jr. and their spouses, Gerry and Ann, also tend to the land.

"They grow them, we sell them," Silvio chuckled. The Patch, a former fenced-in home to cows,

sheep, rabbits and chickens, is only open during the month of October and has become a destination spot for families.

"We'll have someone drop by when they are alone and then they come back with their kids and then they come again with their in-laws and then they bring their neighbors," Silvio said, adding that many

# District's backpack program will feed struggling families

Plymouth-Canton Schools will begin a program next month designed to help keep financially struggling families fed through the weekend.

The district's food service supplier Sodexo will partner with Plymouth-Canton in the company's nationwide Backpack program.

"Our goal is to very quietly send food home with students of need," said Mike Miller, district manager for Sodexo School Services. "There's roughly eight to 10 pounds of food in a backpack each week. We found that's more than enough food to feed several household members during the course of the weekend.

"Hopefully students will be better prepared Monday morning to learn and not be hungry," he added.

Teresa Arnold, the school district's director of food and nutrition services, said there will be 20 families identified at each of two yet-tobe-determined elementary schools. District officials hope the program can be expanded to the remaining 14 elementary schools in the near

"They don't necessarily have to be a family on the free and reduced lunch list, but it could be a family the principal knows is struggling," Arnold said. "The backpack will be filled with canned goods, soups, pastas and foods that will be stable over the weekend. The backpacks will be exactly like the ones students have, so no one will know

what's in it.

"We were shocked at how many applications we received this year for free and reduced lunches," Arnold added. "It's a 17-percent increase from last year."

Miller said food will be provided by Gleaners Food Bank in Detroit. During the past year, Miller said the Sodexo Foundation donated nearly \$20,000 in support of the Backpack pro-

Arnold said the plan is to have Gleaners drop off the food at Salem High School, where the district's Food Service offices are located.

"We're going to ask students to help us pack" the backpacks. That would be a great way to get them involved," Arnold said. "No one will know who the family is that gets them."

to 1 p.m. in the Summit. Van Dusen said the socks will be



FBI says **Canton safest** 

community in region for 2007

Among metro-Detroit communities of similar size, Canton had the lowest overall crime reported per 1,000 residents in 2007.

In a recently released annual report from the FBI, the township, which had a population of 88,126 residents last year, had 110 violent crimes -1 per 1,000 residents - and 1,562 property crimes — 18 per 1,000 residents.

The FBI defines property crimes as burglaries, larcenies, motor vehicle thefts and arson. Violent crimes are murder, rape, robbery and aggravated

Overall, Canton had 1,672 crimes - 19 per 1,000 residents - which is down 8 percent from

Canton Executive Director John Santomauro said based on the growth of the community and downturn of the economy, officials hadn't expected a decrease in crime.

"We were pleasantly surprised," he said. "Looking at normal factors that affect crime, we were looking for an increase but getting a substantial decrease surprised us."

Santomauro credited resident involvement, community support and a visible, proactive police department for the decline in reported crime.

"It has long been a philosophy (in Canton) that crime is not a police problem but a community problem," he said, adding that as township planners have worked throughout the years on Canton's development, police officials have simultaneously mapped out plans to address the growth.

Among other communities with populations ranging from 50,000-100,000 residents. Farmington Hills and Novi had 21 overall crimes per 1,000 residents, Livonia had 27, Westland had

"Criminals make decisions," Santomauro said. "If they are driving down Ford Road and see (patrolling officers), it does act as a deterrent."

In addition to the police presence in the community, Santomauro credited the township's Community Watch program with getting residents engaged and informed about crime.

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
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# Commission rejects W-W recall language

Organizers of a recall of several members of the Wayne-Westland school board plan to submit new language this week after having their first attempt rejected by the Wayne County

Elections Commission. Shawnn Maxwell of Wayne-Westland Parents for Quality Education, called the decision "a minor setback.

'We intend to file again," she said. "We need to step back and regroup because we don't want this to happen again."

The group had targeted school board President Martha Pitsenbarger and Vice-President Skip Monit and dropped efforts to recall board Treasurer Steve Becher and Trustee Ed Turner because the two men will be running for reelection in May 2009. Maxwell is confident voters will speak by not re-electing them to the board.

Monit was pleased with the outcome of the hearing, saying that the commission "saw through the distortion" in

making its ruling. He added that the recall effort was "being done because of other outside interests."

"If I know I'm doing the right thing, I'll take the heat," said Monit, who has served on the board for 10 years

The recall language stated that the board members had rejected the Wayne-Westland Education Association's offer to extend its contract for one year with a reduction in class size at all levels and had voted to discipline teachers for conducting an illegal strike. State law provides wide interpretive latitude for recall petitions, however, the commission's ruling found the language to be "unclear, imprecise and vague," Monit said.

We were able to argue that the wording was incorrect and the commission upheld that," he added. "At least for the first round, we were able to have the petitions knocked down."

Maxwell said the group had a feeling that the language would be rejected, because it wasn't strong on the first part. However, the group is "stand-

ing where they're standing" on the recall issue.

According to Maxwell, the 10-member group planned to meet Wednesday.

"Everyone is disappointed, but we're not going to give up," she said. "We're doing this for our kids and the teachers and we're not going to back down."

Pitsenbarger and Monit also are standing by their work as school board members.

"If you want to recall me because I put children first then feel free to do that," said Pitsenbarger, a 12-year board member. "But, I will not be intimidated to meet demands based on distortion and lies."

Monit said the board wants to work with the teachers union to reach a contract agreement, but the board wouldn't bankrupt the district "to meet unreasonable demands.'

"I will see this through," he said. "I know I'm doing the right thing as a school board member.'

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# Commission moves closer to altering parks millage

The Wayne County Commission moved closer Tuesday to passing an ordinance that will take a portion of the county's parks millage and dedicate it back to local communities for recreation initiatives.

Meeting in Canton, the Commission's Ways and Means Committee voted in favor of altering the 0.25-mill tax, which county voters first authorized in 1996 and have renewed twice since. It generated more than \$13 million for the county parks system in 2007.

If it ultimately passes,

the ordinance — proposed by Commissioners Kevin McNamara of Canton, Laura Cox of Livonia and Bernard Parker of Detroit - would transfer 25 percent of the annual millage back to cities, townships and villages to use on local parks projects.

Tuesday's public hearing attracted a large audience, including Livonia Mayor Jack Kirksey and Canton Township Supervisor Tom Yack, two of the millage's biggest critics. Both expressed support for the proposed ordinance.

"Livonia puts in about \$1.25 million each year. In return, we've received pennies on the dollar," Kirksey said. "This (the ordinance) is a bright spot, to say to local communities we want to partner with you in these difficult economic times."

Yack said the ordinance would take the politics out of where the millage money is

However, Wayne County Assistant Executive Alan Helmkamp warned the commissioners that the ordinance was illegal, because it would "constitute a different

purpose" than what voters approved.
"This is a very tantalizing

proposal, especially at this time of year," Helmkamp

said, referring to the upcoming election.

Commissioner Cox said the ordinance was about making sure there was an equitable distribution of funds from the parks millage.

"Every community will see this," she said. "We need to level the playing field."

The proposed ordinance now moves to the full commission. However, many of the details still have to be worked out on how local communities will be able to use the money, such as for capital improvements or maintenance, or both, and if the county must first approve the projects. Several commissioners, including Phil Cavanagh of Redford, said they were in favor of simply providing the communities with a check for 25 percent of what they contribute to the

millage. Only Commissioner Keith D. Williams of Detroit voted

against the measure. "I think we're going down a slippery slope. We're going to start pitting communities against one another," he said.

Helmkamp said the measure could end up in court, but he is hoping the ordinance can be killed in the legislative process.

McNamara said he is not worried about Ficano vetoing the measure.

"We are going to succeed with this ordinance, and we have the votes to pass it," he


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# Forum focuses on influence in Supreme Court race

Races for the Michigan Supreme Court have become


expensive and highly contentious, with more than \$20 million spent to elect justices since January 2000. "Political influences are jeopardizing the integrity of the institution we rely on to protect our rights," says Eva Packard, president of the Oakland County League of Women Voters. "The Court is accountable to the Constitution and the laws, not to politicians and groups with a political agenda.

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
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### Prosecutor opens out-county location

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# Government financial package has benefits for taxpayers

here's been much written about the \$700 billion package that Congress passed and President George W. Bush signed, Most of the conversation has to do with Troubled Asset Recovery

Program, a plan that will allow the government to buy equity positions in certain financial institutions and troubled mortgages. The purpose of TARP is to provide financial institutions with the necessary

liquidity to start

loaning money and easing credit. Although the money for TARP is the most important aspect of the bill there are other aspects of the legislation that can be valuable to you and me.

In the legislation that creates TARP, there are a number of tax law changes that potentially can affect you and me. One of these provides some planning opportunities with regard to charitable contributions. For the last couple of years, individuals who were over age 701/2 and required to take minimum required distributions from their IRA had the option to have the distribution donated to a charity. This provided a great planning opportunity for people who do not itemize their deductions.

The law that allowed this tax treatment expired and was not valid in 2008. However, with the new plan this has changed and you now can, if you are over 701/2, contribute your required minimum distribution to a charity and avoid having to report the distribution on your income tax return. For individuals who are charitable in nature and who do not itemize their deductions, this is a great planning opportunity.

The legislation also contains temporary relief from the alternative minimum tax. Under the new law, the alternative minimum tax exemption for a single individual has been raised to \$46,200 and for a married couple, \$69,950. Without this temporary fix, millions of Americans would have been subject to the alternative minimum tax. The tax was established in the 1960s to tax the very wealthy that were using certain shelters to avoid taxes. Because Congress never indexed the exemp-

tion to inflation, many middleincome people are now subject to the tax. The temporary fix will spare millions of this additional tax burden.

The education deduction that had expired has been extended for 2008-09. This deduction allows you to deduct \$4,000 in education expense for a child, spouse or even yourself, whether or not you itemize your deductions. To qualify for this, if you're single, your adjusted gross income must be \$80,000 or less, and if you're married, \$160,000 or less.


Another important temporary tax break extended to 2012 deals with forgiven mortgage debt. Under previous law, if a mortgage company forgave your mortgage debt, such as in a short sale, the debt was taxed as ordinary income. As foreclosures started to mount, Congress passed a temporary fix and this has been extended to 2012. Basically, for the majority of people, if your mortgage debt is forgiven, the money will not be

Other tax law changes included in the recent legislation include energy tax credits for home improvements and the extension of the sales tax deduction. The sales tax deduction had expired in 2007 but now has been extended to 2008 and 2009. The \$500 property tax deduction for non-itemizers

has also been extended to 2008. I always tell individuals their goal is never to lower taxes but rather have more money in their pocket. In other words, don't let the tax tail wag the dog and don't do anything for tax reasons alone. However, that does not mean we do not want to take advantage of

the laws available to us. Take the opportunity to see if any apply to you and take advantage of the changes. Taxes are a necessary evil, however, it is not more patriotic to pay more money in taxes than you must. The key is to be smart about taxes and to make sure the tax laws work for

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

# Friends offer final seasonal chance to tour Miller Woods

Shirley Thayer of Ann Arbor has taken the nature tour at the Plymouth-Canton Schools-owned Miller Woods in Plymouth Township several times.

However, the visits weren't her first connection to the beech-maple climax forest located on Powell Road, between Beck and Ridge. Thayer — who grew up as Shirley Miller — lived on the 120-acre farm owned by her grandfather, Norman Miller. from the time she was 3 years old until she graduated from the old Plymouth High School, which is now Central Middle

School. "(The woods) was our big treat, every Sunday grandpa would take us down to look at the trees and we would pick the wild flowers," said Thayer, 80. "I always had a fall leaf project at school and I could get plenty of leaves from the woods.

"Grandpa helped me carve 'Shirley Miller 12-years-old' in one of the trees, and we'd go every year and see it," said Thayer. "Now, I can't find it. It wasn't until I took one of the tours that I found out you never carve in the trees because it harms them.'

The school district purchased 40 acres of the farm, which includes the 10-acre Miller Woods plot. University of Michigan students in the "Woody Plants" course visit Miller Woods to study the trees, a tradition for more than 40

years. And, Scout troops visit regularly to work on various badges.

The Friends of Miller Woods will hold the last of its guided walks for the season Sunday at 2, 2:30 and 3 p.m. The woods has a dozen different species of shade tolerant trees, most of them sugar maple and beech trees, of which some are nearly 400 years old.

"We want to raise awareness and get people to come and see the history of Miller Woods," said Cheryl Bord, president of the Friends of Miller Woods. "The more we make people aware of how neat and unique this is, the more people will want to protect it. There are very few urban forests left."

# Here are our picks for **Canton Township trustee**

When Canton voters head to the polls for the Nov. 4 election to vote for Canton Township trustee, they will have an interesting slate of candidates to choose from. There are four Republican candidates (John Anthony, Todd Caccamo, Pat Williams and Karl Zarbo), one Democrat (Syed Taj), and one Libertarian (Charlie Page). In our opinion, voters should reelect incumbents Karl Zarbo and Todd Caccamo, as well as newcomers Pat Williams and John Anthony.

Caccamo has consistently fought to rein in the cost of township government, and he has displayed independence and the ability to speak out on issues. While he was often combative during the early part of his term, he has learned the art of compromise. 

There is nothing more important, in his opinion, than for Canton Pat Williams residents to feel safe in their homes and neighborhoods.

Williams has lived in Canton for 23 years and raised his three children here. Williams, who was named a Canton Township Community Supporter Award in 2006, seems to have been groomed for the position of trustee. He is a past president of the Canton Chamber of Commerce, board member of the Canton Lions Club, and a graduate of the Leadership Canton program. He has also

Democrats have reason to be optimistic about retaining their majority in the U.S. House and picking up seats in the House and Senate. But Michigan's 11th Congressional District has been a safe seat for Republican incumbent Thaddeus McCotter.

McCotter's Democratic opponent, Joseph Larkin, is a Livonia attorney with no government experience. He offers basic Democratic talking points and seems honestly concerned about the war in Iraq and the foreclosure problems. But he has a superficial understanding of some issues and no record of government service that would suggest he could be a Congressional leader.

McCotter is a bright man with some complex and nuanced positions and observations on national issues. He sees himself as a true conservative and, as chair of the Republican House Policy Committee, he helps the party set its conservative agenda.

His voting record has generally been supportive of President Bush and Republican positions. He usually votes with his party. But as a member from southeast Michigan, he also votes the district on issues involving trade, the auto industry and minimum

We're often bothered by McCotter's rhetoric. He'll often label domestic positions he opposes with a pejorative use of the loaded word "socialist" and has labeled those who oppose his foreign policy positions as "appeasers." As someone who speaks about working with members of the other party, he needs to tone down his rhetoric.

Given his intelligence, his flexibility on issues of local importance, his broad legislative experience, his regular presence in the district and his constituent service, we support the re-election of Thaddeus McCotter for a fourth term.




be operational early next year. "Technology is our future," Kerstens said. "It gives us

The Plymouth Historical Museum has also been selected to receive the 2008 History Award from the Wayne County Council for Arts, History and Humanities for its cultural contributions.





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

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
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



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# JACE THE ACE

### Bearden spearheads Salem kickers' District title effort

Most teams rely on their ace during crunch time of do-ordie showdowns.

During Saturday's Division 1 District final soccer game at the PCEP stadium, Salem turned to its Jace.

Senior captain Jace Bearden, who has been slowed most of the season by a nagging knee injury, knocked home the clinching goal in a tensionpacked shoot-out to give the No. 1-ranked Rocks a 2-1 victory over a determined Livonia Churchill contingent.

Bearden also assisted on the Rocks' lone regulation goal, handled most of his team's pivotal throw-ins and provided stellar defensive support in a game played under Salem blue skies.

"Honestly, I was pretty nervous," Bearden said, recalling his emotions seconds before his shoot-out kick. "But I knew I had to do it. It's my senior year and I didn't want this to be my last game."

Salem will take its 21-0-4 record into Tuesday's 5 p.m. Regional semifinal contest at Saline High School. Churchill finished 16-4-1.

The five-shots-per-team shoot-out became necessary when the two teams were deadlocked at 1-all following 80 minutes of regulation play and two sudden-victory 15minute overtimes.

The Rocks nearly won in regulation, however, Charger senior forward Andrew Sieber steered in a sliding rebound shot from the doorstep with nine seconds left in the second half to keep his team alive.

Salem buried its first four shoot-out shots while Churchill canned three of four, putting the Rocks' No. 5 shooter — Bearden — in the position to be the hero.

When his shot found the top right corner of the net past the diving fingertips of Churchill keeper Christian Adams, a smiling Bearden sprinted away from the goal, raising a No. 1 sign with his right hand, before getting engulfed by his ecstatic teammates.

"If it wasn't for Jace, we probably don't win today," said Salem coach Ed McCarthy. "No. 1, his throw-ins were very, very dangerous today and he created a lot of opportunities for us. Having him back in the line-up changed the game completely."

After Salem carried the play for a good chunk of the first half, Churchill turned the tables during the second 40 minutes and the overtimes.

The Rocks seized a 1-0 lead with 3:59 left in the first half when Bearden fired a perfect throw-in from the east sideline that bounced once off a Salem

player's chest before Lachlan Savage controlled the ball and rifled a low sizzler past Charger net-keeper Adrian

Motta. The Chargers applied relentless pressure throughout the second half. It finally paid off with nine ticks left when Sieber

finished in front.

"The fact that we got to go in the locker room not long after they scored was good because it allowed for their momentum to die down," said McCarthy. From off the radar to all over the map — that's the course the Plymouth boys cross country team has followed this season.

The once-unheralded and now-surging Wildcats' latest accomplishment came Saturday when they captured the inaugural Kensington Conference Championships at Kensington Metropark.

Led by first-place finisher Elmar Engholm, Plymouth posted 54 points, just three fewer than runner-up Canton. Novi (72), Northville (93) and Salem (133) rounded out the top five places.

'To go from a team that wasn't on anybody's radar at the beginning of the season to one of the top teams in the area, well, it means a lot to us,' said first-year Plymouth coach Jon Mikosz. "I knew the guys had a lot of potential heading into the season, but I'm not sure I expected this."

Plymouth was led by Engholm, a Swedish exchange student, who broke the tape first with a time of 16:21. Warren Buzzard and Derk Lax finished 11th and 12th, respectively, just ahead of 14th-place teammate Joe Porcari.

Matt Neumann rounded out the Wildcats' scorers, placing 16th in 17:19.

"The keys were Elmar winning it and Joe stepping up like he did," said Mikosz. "It was an off-day for a few of our guys, but Elmar and Joe finishing where they did was the difference.

"After our division race last week, I knew Canton was going to be right there with us. I thought Novi would be tougher than they were."

The Chiefs were bolstered by three top-10 finishes: Duncan Spitz crossed third in 16:55, Kyle Clinton was fifth in 16:58 and Zach Spreitzer was ninth

"Falling short last year has been a big motivating factor for us this year. Plus, we don't want to let coach Mary down."

The past four years without Slavens and Heldmeyer on her team would be like, well, Plymouth coach Mary Kerwin would rather not think about it.

"Molly's older brother, Pat, ran for Plymouth, so she'd come to a lot of our meets when she was in middle school," Kerwin recalled.

"I'd say, 'Molly, why don't you go run a warm-up lap with the girls,' and she'd say, 'Sure.' A lot of younger girls wouldn't have done that,

but she jumped right in there." Along with collecting four varsity letters, Slavens holds the

school record. "I've come a long way since my freshman year," she admitted. "My best time in ninth grade was 20:10 and now I'm down to around 19:11.

"When I get to the tough part of the race, I keep thinking that this is going to make me better. This is what separates the weak from the strong."

Amazingly, Heldmeyer recorded her best 5,000-meter time – 19:31 – her freshman year. She's staved consistently strong since and hopes to peak over the next couple of weeks.

"I love cross country because it's a self-motivating sport," she said. "It makes me push myself."

Given their admirable dedication to the sport. Heldmever and Slavens may help push Plymouth into the state meet as

a team on Saturday. And wouldn't that be a ray of sunshine in their final season?

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


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# Whalers topple Generals in shootout, 4-3

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


#### Two-way standout

Parling lobbied his coaches to play defense prior to this season, but they steadfastly refused, not wanting their quarterback to risk getting hurt on the other side of the ball.

he defended Churchill's fastest player — Jeff Ricketts — in the Chargers' spread offense.

"Last year, I begged the coaches to let me play defense, but it was happening," he said. "I was really happy when they put me in there after the first game this year.

"It's nice to be able to hit instead of being hit for a change. It's also fun to sack the quarterback instead of the other way around."

The Rocks have struggled to find the win column in Parling's three-year varsity career, registering a 2-24 record heading

into Friday night's season finale against Canton.

#### Turning the corner

Unlike the previous two seasons, however, Salem (1-7) has been in practically every game until the waning moments.

"It's definitely been frustrating, losing like we have," Parling said, "but I've never even thought about quitting or giving up. It's still fun. We all still want to win very badly.

"Of the four teams I've played on at Salem, this one is definitely my favorite. In the past, we've had some players that, let's just say, shouldn't have been here. This year, everybody is working hard. We don't have any bad seeds, I guess you can say."

The adversity Parling has faced has a silver lining, he said.

"It's actually helped me a lot, teaching me to never give up," he said. "If we lose a game on a Friday night, I've forgotten about it by Monday morning. I'm just thinking about playing Canton now."

### Athlete for all seasons

Parling is a member of a dying fraternity: three-sport high school athletes. Once football season ends, he'll take a week off to chill before firing up jumpers in the Salem gym to prepare for hoop season. In the spring, he'll begin his third season on the Rocks' varsity baseball team.

When he graduates in June, he'll have accumulated eight varsity letters, a feat rarely accomplished in this age of specializa-

"Before I started high school, I thought about just playing two sports, but I couldn't do it; I love playing all three," he said. "Football is my favorite probably

because I've played it the longest." There's a good chance Parling will be taking his considerable quarterbacking talents to the next

level.

"I was invited to go to Butler (Ind.) University this weekend to watch a football game and I've heard from Duquesne in Pittsburgh," he said. "Or I may try to walk on to a bigger school like Western Michigan."



# could create legal woes

Q: Some board members of our association are concerned that a committee chair has taken it upon herself to set up an interactive Web site using the association's name on the home page. The Web site offers a calendar of association events and a downloadable architectural request form. Neighbors are having conversations on the Web site and I as a board member wish to have her take the site down because the association attorney is worrled about the association's potential liability for what residents might say. She has apparently refused to do so. What can we do?

A: It depends on who owns the Web site and whether the association's name is being used without

its permission. I would suggest that if in fact the Web site purports to claim that it is an association Web site, that the association board may

have a right to pursue the termination of the Web site as we have done in various instances on behalf of association clients. The association attorney should be consulted as to what actions he or she would recommend with regard to terminating the Web

Q: We purchased a home which we later found contained black toxic mold. We think the sellers failed to disclose it. The sellers claim that they had a new roof placed on the home and fully disclosed that mold had previously been found on the roof that was corrected. However, we found mold in another room and that mold had been there prior to the sale. Do we have a case?

A: If there was an

affirmative representation you probably have a good case and would be awarded damages for property loss and personal injuries. You should consult with an attorney. It would be important to get good expert testimony in connection with your matter. It is also important to note that under the Seller's Disclosure Statement, they are required to disclose whether the roof leaked and the Seller's Disclosure Statement statute places no limitation on disclosures of leaks.

Since being redesigned for 2006, Kia's Rio sedan and Rio5 five-door have garnered a lot of attention from the press. It was considered "Most Fun to Drive" by the Wall Street Journal in 2006 and voted a "Most

To offer more options, the Rio5 LX has been added to the lineup and provides yet another affordable option to those preferring the sporty styling cues and interior flexibility of

a five-door.

The Kia Rio comes in base, LX and SX trim levels, while the five-door Rio5 hatchback comes in the SX and LX trims.


You get what you pay for in the \$10,890-priced base sedan, it has manual steering and no air

conditioning.
Ordering the LX gets you airconditioning, a CD player, power steering, a
60/40-split folding rear seat, a tilt steering
wheel and bigger tires.
The sporty SX versions add foglights, 15inch allow wheels, a rear specifor metallic

inch alloy wheels, a rear spoiler, metallic interior trim, metal pedals, leather-wrapped steering wheel and a black-with-red-accents cabin theme. Options include the Power Package,

which adds full power features, keyless entry and tweeter speakers and 16-inch alloy wheels

A 1.6-liter 4-cylinder engine puts out 110 horsepower and powers every 2008 Kia Rio. All trims come standard with a five-speed manual transmission, while a four-speed automatic is optional on all but the base sedan.



Starting off at just \$10,890, the 2008 Kia Rio may be the smallest car Kia sells but it is definitely its biggest bargain. The hatchback version, the Rio5, is also a steal at \$13,765.

Manual Rios get 27 miles per gallon in the city and 32 mpg on the highway. Although compact cars aren't known for their room, the Rio offers ample amount of space for passengers and cargo.

Its 98.4-inch wheelbase and 57.9-inch

height is similar to segment competitors, yet through smart design the Rio provides 92.2 cubic feet of passenger volume, which is more room than larger sedans such as the Honda Civic and Toyota Corolla.

Trunk space is also generous with the Rio offering a deep and spacious 11.9 cubic feet while the Rio5 offers 15.8 cubic feet of

rear storage.
In addition, when the standard 60/40-split fold-flat rear seats are folded down, cargo volume in the five-door increases to 49.6 cubic

Every inch of the Rio's interior is utilized as evident in the form of numerous storage areas, a center stack tray, a front passenger luggage hook and a rear mesh seatback

On the outside, the Rio reflects its European-inspired exterior, featuring a black mesh grille and swept-back headlights. The bumpers contain black inserts, and black bodyside moldings.

The Rio comes standard with front-seat side airbags and full-length side curtain airbags. Antilock disc brakes are optional on the higher trim levels.

In National Highway Traffic and Safety

Administration frontal-impact crash testing, the Rio scored four out of five stars for driver protection and five stars for passenger protection. In the side-impact test, the Rio earned four stars for front-occupant protection and three stars for the rear.

To complement these high safety rating, all Rios are backed by Kia's comprehensive warranty program, which offers a 10-year/100,000-mile limited powertrain warranty, a five-year/60,000-mile limited basic warranty, a five-year/100,000 mile limited anti-perforation warranty and a five-year/60,000-mile 24-hour roadside assistance

The Kia Rio may be the least expensive model offered by a company that prides itself on being a budget brand, but it doesn't necessarily reflect that.

It looks stylish and is renowned for its high quality build in an economy car class littered with cheap plastic-filled interiors.






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
