School district shifts election dates to save money

The Plymouth-Canton Schools Board of Education voted Tuesday night to move its odd-year May school board elections to every November.

As a result, the May 2009 election is now scheduled for November 2009.

Plymouth-Canton had been splitting the \$100,000 cost of an oddyear May election with Schoolcraft College. However, Schoolcraft trustees recently voted to move to evenyear November elections to reduce their cost to zero.

Under the new timetable, trustees said elections in odd-numbered years will cost Plymouth-Canton \$84,000 per election as it shares costs with the city of Plymouth. On even-numbered years, the district won't have to pay any election-associated costs because

the five municipalities within the district's boundaries will already have a national election ballot.

Trustees approved the motion on a 6-1 vote, passing on an option to hold elections only on even-year Novembers which would have cost them nothing.

"I'm a little shocked," said Trustee Dianne Gonzalez, the lone dissenting vote. "It's still a huge expense on the district, and it's only saving a small amount of money in changing to every November. The only true savings to the district and to the budget and to the students of this district is to do it even-November."

Trustee Nancy Eggenberger said she didn't want to wait until 2010 to hold the next school board election.

'If we choose to do (even-November) right now we're putting $2\frac{1}{2}$ years onto people's terms, and I think that's unfair to the community," said Eggenberger. "We need to give them the opportunity to vote on school board members."

The four seats up for re-election in November next year are those currently held by President Judy Mardigian, Barry Simescu, Tom Wysocki and John Jackson. Jackson, who was appointed to the seat vacated by Mark Slavens

in 2007, is slated to seek re-election on the next scheduled election date, which now has been pushed to

November 2009. Trustee Steven Sneideman said he's concerned the even-November elections in the cycle will become political.

"Holding even-year November elections will encourage political parties to influence our elections." said Sneideman. "When they're the ones that are in Lansing deciding how much money we get every year, I think that's a recipe for disaster."


Tuesday night marked Tom Yack's last evening at the helm of township government.



'Illogical' decision

Officials baffled by decision not to make Ford a plowing priority

The Michigan Department of Transportation said something had to give this winter and has decided it will be a possible reduction in overtime for plowing and salting certain stretches of roadway.

"We are not saying that we are not going to be plowing and salting, we are adjusting operations because revenue keeps declining but the cost

of operations keeps rising," said MDOT spokesperson Rob Morosi.

Morosi said roads that fall under the state's responsibility, such as Ford Road and Michigan Avenue, are slotted in two categories, orange and blue.

During the instance of a blizzard, all roads would be treated equally, but during lighter snowfalls, orange roads will be plowed and salted to. the bare pavement regardless

of the possibility of overtime. Blue roads would be plowed and salted once and after that, Morosi said operators would make a "judgement call" on whether to go over the road a second time.

"We are hoping to curtail, to a reasonable amount, the extent of overtime," he said.

While Michigan Avenue is in the orange-road bracket, Ford Road, west of I-275, is in the blue category.

At Tuesday's Township Board meeting, Canton officials expressed disbelief at Ford Road's designation.

Melissa McLaughlin. "We are the 11th largest community in Michigan."

Retired Township Supervisor Tom Yack agreed and called the designation

"pretty illogical." Morosi said the orange and blue categories were based on traffic volume, but insisted that blue roads will be safe for motorists.

"We are not putting the public at peril," he said. "The roads are not going to go unattended."

Connor P. McKinney, a senior at Plymouth High School, has received a Presidential Appointment to the United States Military Academy at West Point, NY. This distinctive accom-


plishment is awarded only to outstanding students deserving an offer of admission based on top grades, test scores, athletics, extracurricular activities, community service and leadership potential.



Family pets killed in house fire

Sunday was a busy day for the Canton Fire Department, which responded to 21 calls, including three fires. The most serious call was a house fire on the 43000 block of Barchester, which resulted in the deaths of two dogs that were trapped inside the

The department received the call at 9:44 p.m., and first arriving units reported fire visible coming from the

Fortunately, the home's owner, Patti Balint, and her 13-year-old daughter, Sara, were not home at the time of

Canton Fire Chief Michael Rorabacher said the fire is being viewed as accidental and that the home is no longer livable. He said the house sustained significant fire and smoke damage.

"Unfortunately, the dogs were probably gone by the time we got the call," he said, adding that firefighters were able to extinguish the flames soon after arriving at the home.

Balint and her daughter. who attends Pioneer Middle School, moved to the home about four years ago, after her husband passed away from cancer and toxic mold was found in their home in Farmington.

"I haven't had too much luck with homes," she said.

Balint and her daughter are currently staying in a local hotel, and will soon be moving into an apartment until their house is rebuilt, which she said will take about 4-6 months.

Balint said her two poodles, Santa and Teddy, will be truly missed.

"They were like family.

They had their own room, ate at the table, and even played Scrabble with us," she

Although there isn't much fire damage on the exterior of the home, Balint said the inside is mostly ashes, espe-

cially Sara's room. "I've been in a dream the last couple days," Balint said Wednesday. "The only thing keeping me sane right now is the fact that had we been in the home, we wouldn't have been able to get out because of where the fire started. God was truly looking out

Balint said fire officials told her the cause of the fire was an electrical problem in one of the walls.

The fire marked the end of a busy day for the Canton Fire Department, which responded to two other fire calls and 18 medical calls on Sunday.

Sheldon opening comes ahead of schedule

When Wayne County closed Sheldon Road to start the railroad underpass project in January 2007, there were many who doubted the project would be completed within the two years projected by Wayne County officials.

And, after a plethora of first-year delays left work at a standstill for extended periods of time, there were few — besides Assistant Wayne County Executive Alan Helmkamp — who believed the underpass would be finished by the end of this month.

Helmkamp plans to make good on his promise to reopen

Sheldon Road — a couple of weeks early — on Friday afternoon. At 2 p.m. Wayne County Executive Robert Ficano will say a few words on the south (Plymouth Township) side of the project, followed by words from any dignitaries who want to chime in on what is forecast by Accuweather.com to be a mostly cloudy day with a high of 28, even lower at 14 degrees if you consider the wind chill factor.

"I'm not going to put a program together, and I foresee brief remarks because of the cold weather," said Helmkamp. "Instead of a ribbon cutting, we'll have the ceremonial driving of a vehicle through a ribbon. We'll have

some people holding the ribbon and some riding in the car going north. As we're driving through, we'll have people pulling the barrels away."

Helmkamp said Wayne County crews need one dry day to put down lane markers on the newly constructed Sheldon Road. However, if that doesn't happen, he'll improvise with Plan B.


"If we don't get that dry day, we're going to open at least one lane in each direction and use the barrels for delineators until we can get a dry day to stripe it," said Helmkamp. "That will at least give another

weekend for the community and businesses before Christmas."

The first vehicle will be one furnished by Bob Jeannotte Pontiac-GMC — in Plymouth Township on the north side of the project — which saw sales drop during the past two years of construction. Bob Jeannotte, Jr. said it will be either a GMC Yukon hybrid or a Yukon flex-fuel hybrid.

"I didn't think it would ever be done by the deadline, especially after all the delays in the first year," said Jeannotte. "I would look at the south side through our showroom and for the first six to eight months there was a crane that never moved an inch."

Judge blocks release of WWEA union president's e-mails

A Wayne County Circuit Court judge has stopped the release of messages sent by the president of the Wayne-Westland Education Association to a west Michigan education watchdog group.

Last week, Judge Kathleen McDonald blocked the release of the e-mails to the Education Action Group which requested them through a Freedom of Information Act request filed Nov. 11 with the Wayne-Westland Community Schools.

"The EAG was completely bush-

whacked," said Kyle Olsen, EAG vice president of strategy. "We did not obtain legal counsel because the issue was between EAG and the school district and the district never gave any indication that it would be unable to fill the request."

Olsen also called McDonald's decision "totally unfair" and "illegal," and said it denied the group due process.

EAG had requested copies of communications WWEA President Nancy Strachan had sent using a 'taxpayer-funded e-mail account." According to Olsen, the request was to determine the union's communications with the Michigan Education

strike in October as well as the extent of union involvement in the recall effort of Wayne-Westland school board members Martha Pitsenbarger and Skip Monit.

"We have no interest in Strachan's

communications with teachers regarding the education of Wayne-Westland kids," he said. "We're simply trying to get to the bottom of the union's involvement in the recall effort the organizers say stems from the union's 'illegal withholding of services' related to the four-day

Self-directed IRA is best option for transferring retirement money

he U.S. economy lost over 500,000 jobs last month. So far this year, over one million Americans have lost their jobs. Unfortunately, next year doesn't look much better. Even if the auto companies receive bailout money, about 90,000 Michiganders will lose their jobs.

Those who lose their job face a variety of issues. Not only do they have to be concerned about paying bills, but health care and retirement accounts need to be addressed. My general rule is when you leave an employer, you should take your retirement money. There are a number of reasons and factors that enter into the decision, but for the great majority of people it pays to take the money.

One issue that has come up regarding 401(k)

plans is what happens if your employer files for bankruptcy protection or just goes out of business. It is important to recognize that a retirement account is not an asset of the employer. Creditors of an employer cannot go after a retirement account.

Most employers will allow you to keep your money in the current retirement account. In those situations you can't add new money to the account, however, you can continue

managing it with the investment options. You will continue to receive statements on a regular basis. You are still subject to the employer's rules.

Another option, for those lucky to find a new job, is the potential to directly transfer the money from their former employer into the new plan. Although employers are not required to allow new employees to transfer existing retirement money, many employers are accommodating. To complete this transaction, have the money from the old retirement plan directly transferred into the new plan.

The third option — and the one that I recommend — is to transfer retirement money into a self-directed IRA. A self-directed IRA may be opened at companies like Schwab, Fidelity and Vanguard. There are no tax consequences and the money is totally under the individual's con-

The different options each have pros and cons.

The pros of leaving your money with your former employer are that you are familiar with their plan and it is easy because you do not have to make any changes. The downside is that employers frequently make changes to their salary deferral programs and you would be subject to those changes.



Whalers hitting stride under Vellucci

The Whalers enjoyed a 'Sweeps Week" during the first weekend of December. And although they didn't win awards or move to the top of the charts, they inched closer towards a Western Conference playoff berth.

Plymouth went on the road and defeated Peterborough, 3-2, on Thursday and Oshawa, 4-2, the next evening. The Whalers completed their best weekend of the season with a well-earned 3-1 victory over the Sault Ste. Marie Greyhounds on Saturday.

The three-game sweep left Plymouth with a record of 12-13-3-0 and just one point out of the final playoff spot in the Western Conference.

The conference is so tightly packed that the Whalers are also just four points out of claiming fifth place overall.

The Whalers have improved to 6-2-1 under President and General Manager Mike Vellucci, who stepped back behind the bench on Nov. 10.

One area Vellucci has concentrated on is improving the Whalers' special teams. The penalty kill and power play are starting to show signs of life.

The Whalers have scored power play goals in six of the nine games so far with Vellucci behind the bench (going 7-for-51), while the penalty killers have shut down the opposition's power play in five of the nine games in Vellucci's return while going 44-for-54, for 81.5 percent.

Rookie Tyler Seguin was named first star in both the Peterborough and Oshawa games tallying 2 goals and 3 assists between the 2 games. "Our penalty kill has

improved quite a bit," Vellucci said. "Our power play has a lot better puck movement, more shots from the point, more deflections and more traffic. The power play has been a slower process, but the penalty kill has gotten better and bet-

Indeed, subtract London going 5-for-9 on the power play in a 6-2 victory over Plymouth on November 15 and the Whalers penalty killing is 39for-45 for 86.7 percent.

With captain Chris Terry missing six games in November due to mononucleosis, the Whalers received a major shot of offense from first-round pick Tyler Seguin, who was named the game's first star in three games during Vellucci's return behind the bench - all Plymouth victories.

Seguin was the game's first star in a 5-1 win over Saginaw on November 14 and then the first star in Peterborough and Oshawa.

Welcome aboard, Caria

Plymouth Whalers President, General Manager and Head Coach Mike Vellucci announced the acquisition of 20-year-old center Matt Caria from the Sault Ste. Marie Greyhounds.

Caria (pronounced CARYah) was acquired for Windsor's 3rd round pick in the 2009 Ontario Hockey League Draft, Plymouth's 2nd round pick in 2010 and the Whalers 6th round selection in 2011.

Ontario Hockey League teams can carry three overage players, or 1988 birthdays, on its roster. Caria joins right wing Patrick Lee as the Whalers' second overage player. office at (734) 453-8400.

Caria - originally taken in the sixth round (118th overall) in the 2004 draft by the Toronto St. Michael's Majors (now in Mississauga) - is currently 11th in scoring in the OHL with 10 goals and 25 assists for 35 points in 30 games. He is a proven offensive player with 75 goals and 125 assists for 200 points in 202 career games. În 18 career playoff games, Caria has eight goals with nine assists for 17 points. Caria's best offensive season came in 2006-07 when he scored 33 goals with 42 assists for 75 points in 59 games and was named to the OHL Eastern Conference All-

"Anytime you can acquire a talent of Caria's caliber without giving up a player from your. lineup, it's a plus," Vellucci said. "I'm really excited to see how Caria and (Plymouth captain) Chris Terry mesh together."

Terry is the only other Whaler player with 200 points in his career. Terry is currently 11th on the Whalers all-time career scoring list with 88 goals and 133 assists for 221 points in 220 games.

Vellucci has been stockpiling draft choices since the Whalers' Championship season in 2006-07 and that fact made the deal possible.

Even with Caria's acquisition, Plymouth still has an ample allotment of draft choices remaining.

Caria was expected to report to Plymouth in time for the Whalers game Wednesday when they host Saginaw at 7:05 p.m. at Compuware Arena. Tickets are available by calling the Compuware Arena box





Fit fire safety into holiday celebration plans

Lt. Denny Hughes of the Farmington Hills Fire Department has plenty of common-sense fire safety advice this holiday season.

"We see them (house fires) all the time, but I think they're kind of amplified," Hughes said of fires during the holidays. "Even at home, the hustle and bustle is going on." People may be careless and have combustibles near the kitchen stove.

Cooking fires are the No. 1 cause of home fires and home fire injuries, according to the National Fire Protection Association. Nearly all cooking equipment fires start with the ignition of food, other cooking materials (e.g., grease, cooking oil), or other items normally found or installed in a kitchen (e.g., cabinets, wall coverings, paper or plastic bags, curtains).

"Fortunately for most of them they're not too serious," Hughes said of holiday fires.

Those marking the season also may use candles in the bath and other rooms. "Obviously they're pretty risky when they're in a room and they're not attended," he said. A pet may knock the candle over.

Sometimes alcohol is a part of holiday revelry, making people less careful. "They're accidents, but they do happen," Hughes said.

WATCH THIS

The Farmington Hills firefighters did a demonstration with a live Christmas tree that was well maintained, one not maintained, and an artificial tree. The well-maintained live tree was the best for safety.

"There are some keys to that." Live trees are for just a couple of weeks for use as they dry out. "It's really a common sense issue," he said, noting you need a lot of water, not many combustibles, and limited lights.

You should always turn tree lights off when you leave home or go to bed. "Just make sure it's well watered," the fire lieutenant said. "Try to keep it away from your floor registers." Don't have candles nearby, and don't block exits.

Watch out for gift wrap piling up near tree skirting, Hughes added, as there could be too many extension cords or lights. "That could be a source for a fire as well."

CANDLE SAFETY

- If you decide to light candle(s), be sure the candle is always in sight. Never leave a candle unattended or in reach of children or accessible to pets. ■ Place your candle in non-tip can-
- Keep candles away from combustible materials such as curtains, Christmas trees, furniture or other

decorations. Do not place them where they may get knocked over.

Weep candles away from drafts, vents or other air currents (ceiling fans) in the home. This will help prevent rapid, uneven burning, or excessive dripping of the wax. Drafts can cause the flame to blow onto other combustible items nearby.

■ Trim candlewicks to a ¼ inch each time before lighting. Longer wicks cause uneven burning and drippings.

■ Never use your candle as a light during a power outage or when checking pilot lights or fueling equipment such as a kerosene heater or lantern. Use a flashlight in these instances.

■ Never place a candle on a windowsill or near an exit ... and always extinguish all candles when you leave a room or before going to sleep.

He emphasizes having a smoke

detector and a carbon monoxide detector on each level of your home, as well as that important escape plan for all of where to head and where to meet.

Hughes offers these additional tips:

HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING

- Test all smoke alarms in the house, and let guests know your escape plan.
- If you or guests smoke, smoke outside. Provide large, deep ashtrays and douse them with water before calling it a night.
- Unattended cooking is the leading cause of home fires. Never leave cooking appliances unattended for any reason or length of time.



Monitor your consumption of alcohol, so that you can make good, sound decisions in the event of an emergency at your home.

DECORATING

■ Purchase lights with and electrical decorations with the name of an approved independent testing lab.

Inspect new and used lights and replaced any damaged light strings. Read directions on how many strings may be connected to one another. Typically only three strings of lights can be connected to one another.

■ Use proper clips or hangers and do not nails to mount lights. Wire insulation can be damaged and lead to a fire.

■ Keep young children and pets away from electrical decorations.

■ Use decorations which are flameresistant or flame retardant, or use noncombustible materials.

MEVER leave a candle unattended, and keep away from combustibles. In 2005, U.S. fire departments responded to 146,400 home structure fires that involved cooking againment.

responded to 146,400 home structure fires that involved cooking equipment in 2005. These fires caused 480 civilian fire deaths, 4,690 civilian fire injuries and \$876 million in direct property damage.

Cooking equipment fires are the leading cause of home structure fires and associated civilian injuries. These fires accounted for 40 percent of all reported home structure fires in 2005 and 36 percent of home civilian injuries.

HOMES SOLD

Twelve percent of the fires occurred when something that could catch fire was too close to the equipment.

Thanksgiving is the peak day for home cooking fires, according to NFPA's Fire Analysis and Research Division.

The leading cause of fires in the kitchen is unattended cooking. It's important to be alert to prevent cooking fires.

SAFETY TIPS

These are NFPA safety tips on cooking:

Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.

If you are simmering, baking, roasting, or boiling food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.

Keep anything that can catch fire

oven mitts, wooden utensils, food
packaging, towels or curtains — away
from your stovetop.

Keep the stovetop, burners and oven clean.

Wear short, close-fitting or tightly rolled sleeves when cooking. Loose clothing can dangle onto stove burners and can catch fire if it comes in contact with a gas flame or electric burner.

Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

Always use cooking equipment that has the label of a recognized testing laboratory.

Follow manufacturer's instructions and code requirements when installing, cleaning, and operating cooking equipment.

Plug microwave ovens or other cook-

ing appliances directly into an outlet.

Never use an extension cord for a cooking appliance as it can overload the circuit and cause a fire.

Check electrical cords for cracks,

breaks, or damage.

IF YOU HAVE A COOKING FIRE

Just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire. Call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number after you leave.

If you do try to fight the fire, be sure others are already getting out and you have a clear path to the exit.

Always keep a lid nearby when you're cooking. If a small grease fire starts in a pan, smother the flames by carefully sliding the lid over the pan. Turn off the burner. Do not move the pan. To keep the fire from restarting, leave the lid on until the pan is completely cool.

In case of an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed. After a fire, the oven should be checked and/or serviced before being used again.

Emergency access generally allowed

Q: The neighbor adjacent to my unit refuses to give a copy of his key to the management company or any board members. I am concerned because he is often out of town and I feel as though my unit is in jeopardy if there should ever be an emergency with his unit that management is unable to deal with.

If there is an emergency such as a gas leak or a severe water leak, the association should strongly consider the option of entering the unit even if they do not have the member's permission. Associations have an obligation to protect their members and property in the event of an emergency and, thus, have the right to enter a member's unit in an emergency situation, particularly if the documents give the right to do so.

Q: I am a new board member at my condo association, and I have discovered that the names of delinquent co-owners are being included in the minutes of our board meetings. Is this a good idea?

A: While many individuals who serve on condo and/or community association boards may have an in depth understanding of parliamentary procedures, they may not fully understand what they should and should not include in the minutes of their board meetings. As a practicing attorney of over 39 years, I can tell you that this is not a good idea for several reasons, but the main reason would be that if a board is incorrect in terms of what they are saying about a delinquent co-owner, they may be opening themselves up to a discrimination and/or libel claim.

2009 Lincoln MKS Gives Nameplate A Makeover With Lots Of New Toys

I've never really thought of myself as a Lincoln kind of guy. Lincolns, like Cadillacs, were something for old people to drive to play golf or hit the early-bird special. Both nameplates have introduced new models designed to change that image. Lincoln's new luxury flagship, the 2009 MKS, is one of those models and could go a long way in bringing younger, hipper buyers into Lincoln showrooms.


We'll ignore Lincoln's goofy naming system - the same system that also gives us the MKX and MKZ - and focus on the actual car. Full of all manner of new technology, the MKS is a gadget-lover's dream.

For starters, the MKS features Sync, the voice-activated hands-free entertainment and communications system developed in conjunction with Microsoft. The system integrates your Bluetooth mobile phone so you can dial a number just using your voice. That same voice command technology also powers the entertainment system, although it's not exactly perfect and does take some getting used to. Using the system to control the satellite radio, it sometimes took me to channels other than what I asked for. Overall, though, it was fun to use.

Lincoln says it's adding 911 Assist to the system soon. That will allow the cell phone to automatically call 911 in the event of an accident that deploys the airbags, sort of Lincoln's answer to General Motors Corp.'s OnStar system.

Add the optional navigation system and you get some more toys to play with. The system includes a 10 gigabyte hard drive that holds A LOT of music. Take the time to rip your CD collection into the system and you can leave your iPod at home. You can browse through the collection via voice command or the touch screen and the album art will appear on the screen while it plays. Like your mp3 player, you can create custom playlists, and you can also upload pictures to display on your screen. The system also includes a rear back-up camera.

The navigation system home screen is nicely done. The standard view shows the map on the left-hand side of the screen, while the right side shows audio information. You can, of course, make either side the full-screen view. The system also includes a six-month subscription to Sirius Travel Link. This feature gives you up to date information about gas prices (a roller coaster, from \$1.49 to \$4.25 per gallon in recent months), weather forecasts, sports scores and real-

time traffic information for 78 different metro areas. Oh, yeah. The system is a THX II 5.1 surround sound system and sounds great. You might have so much fun

playing with it, you won't want to arrive at your destination. Auto climate control, rear window defroster, power tilt steering wheel, universal garage door opener and anti-theft perimeter alarm are all standard on the MKS, but if you want to add some more cool stuff, you can opt for the Technology Package, which includes Intelligent Access with Push-Button Start. That allows you to get in the car, start it and drive away, all without pulling the key fob out of your pocket or

Just touch the keyless entry pad on the door pillar, open the door and, with the brake pedal engaged, push a button to start the car. While not the first, or only, model to use this technology, it's still pretty cool.

That package also includes rain-sensing wipers, rear window power sunshade, Adaptive Cruise Control, which uses radar to adjust cruising speed to match the vehicle in front of you, adaptive headlamps with auto high beam (as the name suggests, it turns on the high beams automatically in darker areas if no vehicles are in range, and turns them off when another vehicle approaches), and the Forward Sensing System that uses four hidden sensors that can tell you how close you are to other objects while trying to park.

OK, the toys are fun, but how does the MKS do on the road? Available as front-wheel or all-wheel drive, the MKS is equipped with a standard 3.7-liter 24-valve V6 that puts out 273 horsepower and 270 lb.-ft. of torque. It doesn't require premium fuel, but using premium will get you a bit more power (275 horsepower and 276 lb.-ft. of torque). Whether that slight boost is worth the added expense of premium fuel is up to you, but it's nice to know you can save a few pennies at the pump and still get out the gate quickly. Mileage is rated at 16 mpg in the city and 23 on the highway for the AWD and 17/24 for the FWD -- not bad for a car of its size.

As you would expect from a Lincoln, the MKS handles well and is comfortable to drive. The ride is smooth without lulling you to sleep, and the rack-and-pinion power steering is responsive. The AWD version can be a challenge to maneuver into tight spaces due to the larger turning circle, but otherwise feels solid.

Both driver and front-seat passenger get 12-way power adjustable heated and cooled leather seats. The rear seats are heated, as well, and there's plenty of room, both front and rear. The trunk is huge and easy to load and unload, but I'd like to see the MKS come with a full-size spare; this is, after all, the luxury flagship. But this is a luxury flagship with some cool design cues.

Its double-wing grille is inspired by the 1941 Lincoln Continental and it's nicely done. The MKS comes with 18inch wheels, but has 19-inch wheels available as an option. Fog lights are standard, as are heated power mirrors. Power moon roof is optional. The 2009 Lincoln MKS starts at around \$39,000. Add all

the fancy stuff (the Ultimate Package) and you're looking at almost \$45,000 -- in line for a luxury sedan with plenty of toys. Enough to make you forget about the early-bird special. Dave Menard is senior editor of Avanti NewsFeatures and






