Officials balk, consider smaller water rate increase

Canton Township residents will see a water and sewer rate hike this year, however it won't be a 20-percent increase proposed earlier by the administration.

Reacting to concerns by residents that 20 percent was too high in tough economic times, the Board of Trustees received three new recommendations from the administration at Tuesday's workshop meeting. The seven-member board is expected to approve one of them next week.

The highest of the proposed water

and sewer rate hike increases, 16.9 percent, assumes operating expenses can be reduced by \$700,000 with no reduction in the \$11.8 million cash balance in the water and sewer fund. A second alternative would

increase rates by 12.5 percent, but

would use \$1 million of the cash balance to pay for operations of the system.

A third plan would drop the increase to 8 percent, with \$2 million taken from the cash balance.

In all the proposed rate hikes, the fixed charges to consumers would not be increased.


Nearly two dozen residents attended the workshop meeting, and those who spoke implored trustees to keep the rate hike as low as possible.

"We're digging into our reserves to carry us through unemployment, layoffs ... those who have jobs are taking pay cuts to maintain it,"

Rohan Peters said. "I'd rather you not raise the rates — period — but if you have to, I wish you'd consider using \$2 million because eventually your cash fund will come back once the economy turns."

Trustee Syed Taj asked the administration to consider raising rates after peak usage in the summer to save consumers money. However, Finance Director Rick Eva said delaying the rate hike past May would just cause further financial stress on an already taxed system.

Deficits loom as district eyes budget process

If the Plymouth-Canton school board does nothing else and the numbers crunch the way the district's financial team has planned, there will be enough money to cover the district's projected \$2 million deficit in 2009-10.

It's the following year that really presents problems.

As budget predictions sit now, the school district faces a potential \$7.4 million deficit in 2010-11, when it will have only about \$2.5 million in its fund equity. The numbers take into account a foundation level

 the per-pupil amount of state funding staying at a consistent \$7,604 over the next two years. Gov. Jennifer Granholm has said the level will remain the same while the state gets projected revenue from President Barack Obama's stimulus package.

Originally, administrators had expected a \$59 cut in state funding. And not everyone is convinced it still won't happen.

"This is my fourth budget ... and I don't think the state has met what it said it was going to do at this time of year," Trustee Steven Sneideman said. "I'm a little nervous about them doing that again."

The school board, which has made some \$16 million in budget cuts over the last eight years, is beginning the budget process for the 2009-10 school year. Superintendent Dr. Craig Fiegel and Jim Larso-Shidler, the district's assistant superintendent for business services, presented the initial budget document for trustees to begin considering.

The proposed budget calls for more than \$156 million in revenue, but also more than \$158 million in expenditures. Among the factors impacting the budget: \$2.3 million in STEP increases and related costs and an

8-percent increase in health care costs. Some have called for an end to the STEP process - where teachers get an automatic raise as they move through their contract - but Fiegel warned the board it was a contractual obligation.

"STEP increases are part of contracts," he said. "You'd have to negotiate that out."

Yazaki sheds 10 percent of its workers

Just like the auto industry has suffered because of the economic downturn, auto suppliers have found it difficult to stay afloat because of production cutbacks at General Motors, Ford and Chrysler.

Yazaki North America in Canton Township — which supplies advanced power and data networks for auto companies worldwide — is one of those companies feeling the pinch of the current economic slowdown. Companý officials have announced that approximately 150 people have accepted severance packages, reducing its workforce at the North American headquarters by about 10 percent.

Kimberly Reed, director of associate relations at Yazaki, said the buyouts were conducted in January and early

February.

"We had two plans, one in which an associate could receive a severance with medical benefits or an associate could take a lump sum payment," Reed said. "It was commensurate with years of service and the position within the company.

"Even though these actions are very difficult, there was a need to improve our competitiveness and position us for future growth," added Reed. "We certainly had to take a lot of thought and consideration in making the reductions. (Concerning future layoffs) we still have to assess the economy."

Reed said the buyouts will leave the Canton facility with 1,600 employees.

According to Ron Olesky, a workforce consultant for the Michigan Department of Energy, Labor and Economic Growth, the jobs were salaried

technical positions.

Olesky said there was an orientation meeting for the former Yazaki employees Feb. 26 to brief them on options.

"We met with the impacted employees to brief them on the available state services and benefits, to help them make a successful transition back into the workforce," Olesky said. "The company was very coop-

erative." Canton Township Supervisor Phil LaJoy said he was made aware of the cutbacks at Yazaki.

"It's not good for the community ... there are people, many who live in Canton, who are affected," said LaJoy. "We want Yazaki to be strong, they're a very important player in our community. We hope things will turn around and we can get those 150 people back."

to use up more of the cash reserves," Eva said. "That's putting the system at risk and the rates will go even higher."

Township Treasurer Melissa McLaughlin said she's not certain which recommendation she'll vote for next Tuesday.

"It's predicated on the idea we can take down \$700,000 from the operating expenses, and that's putting off maintenance we were supposed to do, which could cause bigger problems," McLaughlin said. 'And if we see consumption decreases, then prices go up. It's like walking on the sharp edge of a knife.

While trustees want to keep water and sewer rate hikes as low as possible, it's using the cash reserve that has them concerned about paying for future improvements or unanticipated repairs and expendi-

"I think we can use some of . the fund balance and probably worry about things when it comes," said Taj, who said he favors using some of the fund balance to keep the rate hike more palatable. "We may turn around, we may not need the fund balance. I'm a taxpayer, too, in this community and that makes some sense."

 Trustee John Anthony said he never did like the 20-percent proposal, and the three additional alternatives "look more reasonable."

"But I would probably rule out the 8-percent increase because it doesn't satisfy the needs of the system and would be taking out \$2 million from cash reserves," Anthony said. "Using \$1 million from cash reserves, I like that a lot.

"If we don't adopt the 16 (percent), and I'm not sold on that either, we'd better pray there's no major (water main) breaks because there's going to be a tremendous cost involved in replacing those pipes," he said. "Some of it is hedging your bet against future problems we're hopeful won't

Eva said if the expected operating cost reductions don't come in at \$700,000 and water consumption — read that as revenue - is down this year, the township may be forced to dip even further into the cash reserves.

When the building boom had developers contributing to the water and sewer fund through tap (connection) fees, administration officials said the cash fund was growing \$3 million to \$4 million annually - at one time topping out at \$40 miles lion. However, as the economic downturn stopped much of the construction, administrators said the tap fees amount to about \$1 million a year.







County commission studies transparency

Wayne County residents or anyone who has access to the Internet, for that matter – soon may be able to access county budget expenditures online.

County Commissioner Laura Cox, R-Livonia, who chairs the Task Force on Transparency in Wayne County and the commission's Ways and Means Committee, conducted a public hearing Monday at Livonia City Hall with hopes of starting a process where county government can become more transparent, that is publicly accounting for every tax dollar that is spent.

The transparency dis-

cussion has moved to the forefront since 2006, when Congress passed and President Bush signed into law the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act. That bill was supported by then U.S. Sen, Barack Obama. The bill created a publicly searchable Web site for all federal contracts, grants and loans and other financial assistance

able format. Several state lawmakers updated the commission on what they were doing on the issue. Others updated the audience on potential misuse of dollars and how lawmakers were addressing it.



State Rep. Marc Corriveau,

D-Northville, said lawmakers were considering a bill that requires that lawmakers who leave their office would have to wait two years before they can be employed as lobbyists. That bill would help remove any potential conflict of interest on votes that lawmakers may make on a contract for a company they may represent later. "We didn't see it as a problem, but more of a building block to get where we want to be," said Corriveau.

Sue Hall, director of administration for Sheriff Warren Evans, said the Wayne County sheriff department wanted to be transparent on the revenue and expenditure side of it, but reminded commissioners that exemptions were allowed for law enforcement employees.

Scott Hagerstrom, state director for Americans for Prosperity, named six states that list their expenditures online, including Minnesota, Oklahoma and Texas.

"Let every taxpayer see where the money goes," Hagerstrom said. Hagerstrom challenged state lawmakers to bring the transparency bills up for a vote. "We want the state budget online immediately," he said.

Local governments, like Brighton Township, update their expenditure list with a PDF file every two weeks. "We'd like to see you do that immediately," Hagerstrom told commissioners.

Commission Chairman Edward Boike wondered about the cost of placing the information on-line and whether taxpayers would want to pay anywhere between \$200,000 to \$1

million for the service. But Haberstrom believed the costs would be minimal if the information is copied from PDF or other computer files. Several states were doing it for less

than \$300,000, he said. Lisa McGraw, public affairs manager for the Michigan Press Association, supported transparency as an "advocate for open government," she said. "Taxpayers have a right to know," McGraw said. "It will help to educate the public

and help democracy." Rose Bogaert, chair of the Wayne County Taxpayers Association, said taxpayers need this information.

"We need it to compliment you when your doing something right and guide you when you're doing something wrong," Bogaert said. Bogaert also told Boike that she saw county expenses for far more money that made less sense

to her."

Cox's staff has already placed her office's expenditures online for the public to

Commissioner Kevin McNamara, D-Canton, said the commission supports transparency, but added that privacy concerns needed to be considered regarding payroll, and checks issued for the care for mental health patients and the indigent. "Do we really want to reveal child support information?" he asked. But the big issue remains what can the commission spend when it has cut nearly \$1 million from the commission's budget and have been asked to cut another 20 per-

cent. "The 20-ton elephant is what it's going to cost," McNamara said.





One good week doesn't tell us much

fter months of free fall, the stock market finally put together a good week. All three of the major indexes ended the week in positive territory — the best week on Wall Street in four months. The Dow Jones Industrial Average was up 9 percent for the week, while the S&P 500 and the NASDAQ market were both up nearly 11 percent last week.

Obviously, last week's stock market rally was a breath of fresh air for investors who've been beaten up over the last year. However, the real issue is what does the stock market rally mean?

I don't have an answer. I would love to say it marks the bottom of the stock market and we are on our way up. I can't. In today's volatile times, where we have seen incredibly wide swings in the market over short periods of time, one good week in the market does not mean that the worst is behind us. Basically, one good week in the market means simply that we had one good week.

Not unexpectedly, I have received numerous e-mails from investors who have bailed out of the stock market and are questioning whether now is the time to jump back in. My response to these individuals is that I am not a market timer and I do not believe that is a strategy that most people should implement. After all, when you time the market you have to be correct twice, once when you buy and once when you sell and over the years, no one has been able to do that consistently.

What I have told those investors is that it's not the market that determines whether you should be investing or not, but rather what your individual goals and objectives are. I've always

thinking they will get rich quick. Typically, when you invest thinking that you can get rich over the short run, the only thing that happens is inevitably you lose money.

I know this seems like oldfashioned advice, but the stock market is for the long run and what happens over any week should not cause an investor to change their strategy one way or the other. Therefore, if you are a nervous investor and pulled out of the market because you were concerned with the volatility, one week of an up market should not cause you to jump back in.

The stock market rarely goes straight forward in one direction. When the general trend of the market is up, there are many down days and vice versa. When the market is trending down, there are many up periods. Because of the wide fluctuations in the market, it is difficult to see overall trends over short-term periods of time. The only way we will know what the bottom of the market was is when we look back over time and say yes, that was the bottom of the market. It may take another year for us to determine when the actual bottom was hit. After all, in this volatile, crazy market, anything can happen. Next week may be another great week in

the market or we may give up . all the gains that we saw last week. We just don't know.

There are all sorts of soothsayers who claim that their stock system can predict when the bottom has been reached and when it's the right time to get back in. I wish that their claims were accurate as it. would make life a lot easier; unfortunately, they are clueless. That is why the one sure way to invest, the way that gives you the highest chance of success, is to invest based upon your individual situation. What that means is that short-term needs for money are kept out of the market and only long-term money is in the market. Of course, you do have the aberration like last year where everything went down; however, remember last year was the aberration, not the norm.

I've always told investors not to let emotions dictate their investment decisions. Emotions are a two-way street. I don't believe we should get overly giddy when the market is rising; nor should we get overly depressed when the market is falling. Emotions need to be kept out of investing as much as possible. You need a clear mind when it comes to investing so you can make the right decision not the decision that provides you with the most short-term comfort, but the one that best suits your situation both short-term and long-term. 

Rate increase 'astonishing'

In regards to the recent article "Officials delay vote on water rate increase" there are many issues that the general public does not know. First and foremost, this year's recommended increase of 20 percent is the second installment of five recommended increases over the next five years. There was a study presented to the Board of Trustees in 2007 by Utility Financial Solutions, detailing the then current financial status of the water and sewerage revenue for the township. Due in part to increased rates from the Detroit Water Authority (DWSD) and reduced revenue from the slowdown in new construction it was anticipated that the township would begin to lose significant revenue if they did not increase rates. In order to satisfy the minimum cash reserve requirements and continue building the capital improvements account it was recommended that water and sewerage rates be increased by a minimum of 12 percent for water and 9.4 percent for sewerage through the year 2012. Without these increases, operating losses are expected to exceed \$16 million by year 2012.

Clearly, this is a very dismal situation for the township. However, to expect the residents to foot this bill during these economic times is foolish and quite frankly astonishing. Firstly, the township needs to go back to the supposed "contract" that they have with the DWSD and renegotiate these terms. What is the purpose of having a contract if the cost of water continues to rise on average 7 percent every year? Was a fixed price not negotiated with this contract? Cost is a pretty standard negotiation component for any contract that I have ever entered into.

Secondly, in the list of recommendations set forth by the Utility Financial Solutions

study, four of five recommendations involved raising rates and/or minimum. charges or fixed costs borne by the residents. There was not a single recommendation to curb expenditures, reduce and/or delay capital improvements, explore additional funding options (outside of charging residents) or make department reductions. In fact, the only recommendation that did not involve raising rates, and would have saved a considerable amount of money for those residents that have large irrigation needs and subsequently have very expensive sewerage bills (even though irrigated water does not go into the sewer so they are paying for a service that they do not use), was not approved. Not one measure was adopted that benefits the residents of this community.

It is unfortunate that in these terrible economic times, our Board of Trustees can think of no other option but to increase rates. Many of us have had to significantly tighten our purse strings and give up luxuries that we once took for granted. My suggestion to the township is to tighten your purse strings, re-negotiate with the DWSD for better rates, look to other water suppliers for our water needs, reduce your expenditures, use money from other funds, delay improvements and maintenance repairs and stop spending money.

Economic prudence should be exhibited by everyone during these tough times and

will go along way towards showing your community that you care.







Sizzling Whalers earn home-ice advantage with last-game win

Sunday's Ontario Hockey League regular-season finale between Plymouth and Sarnia proved to be much more than a pre-playoffs tune-up for both teams.

The Whalers' 6-1 triumph earned the OHL's hottest team home-ice advantage in the their first-round, best-of-seven playoff series against the Sting that faces off Saturday at 7:05 p.m. at Compuware Arena.

Sunday's resounding victory improved Plymouth's fourthplace Western Conference record to 37-26-5-0, two points better than fifth-place Sarnia, which finished 35-26-4-3.

On paper, the Whalers are favored to advance to round two based on their 4-1-1-0 mark against the Sting this season. They also carry a load of momentum into Saturday's opener, having won 15 of their last 20 contests.

Local matmen strike gold at the Palace

An elite seven-member contingent of local prep wrestlers did their respective schools proud at last weekend's Division 1 individual state meet at the Palace of Auburn Hills.

Five of the seven earned All-State status and a sixth upended the No. 1-ranked wrestler in his weight class.

The highest achievers were Canton juniors Brent Winekoff (145 pounds) and Donnie Watkins (135), both of whom placed third in the respective brackets.

Winekoff, who finished

59-2, advanced to the semifinal round before getting edged by East Kentwood's DeShawn Nelson, 4-3, on Friday afternoon. Undeterred, he battled back to win his final two contests: 3-2 over Highland Park's Dezmond Jones and 6-5 over Clarkston's Alex Popp.

"Brent wrestled very well," said Canton coach Cory Mancuso. "The kid he lost to he'd beat nine out of 10 times. His goal was to win a state title, so it was hard after he lost, but he refocused and fought back to take third."

Watkins' lone loss - 10-9 to East Kentwood's Paul Vilker in the second round - was also a heart-breaker.

"Donnie was leading with 20 seconds left, but the kid reversed him," Mancuso said. "The kid that beat Donnie went on to finish second, so that tells you how good he wrestled."

Watkins, who finished 57-3, went 5-1 over the three-day event, posting four straight wins following the setback to Vilker. One of the victories was against Flint Carman-Ainsworth's Joshua Goodman, who had handed Watkins one of his two previous losses.

One of the most impressive one-match performances by a local grappler came on Thursday when Salem's 215pound Sam Lepper knocked off Rochester Adams' Jason Finney, who entered the

tournament with a 51-1 record and No. 1 ranking.

Unfortunately, Lepper lost his final two matches and did not place.

"Sam came into the tournament not thinking about placing, but after he beat (Finney), he made it his goal," said Salem coach Greg Woochuk. "Unfortunately, he lost a close match his next time out and then lost in the next round.

"Sam has no regrets, though. He's probably the only kid that was at that tournament who didn't win a match his entire freshman season. He has a lot to be proud of."

Canton senior Carl Lucke closed out a stellar career with a seventh-place showing at 119 pounds. Lucke went 3-2 to improve to 51-12.

"Carl beat the kids we thought he'd beat and lost to the better wrestlers," said Mancuso. "He wrestled hard, just like he always does."

Salem sophomore Nick Kim placed eighth at 103 in his first trip to the state


"It's just his second year of wrestling," said Woochuk. "There aren't two many kids who can say they placed in the state after just two years in the sport. If he continues to focus and work hard, he'll be back to the state meet again."

Canton junior Waleed Faraj went 2-2 and placed eighth at 112. Fellow Canton junior Keith Zech lost his only two matches in the brutal 171-pound weight class.

"It was Keith's first time at the state meet, so he may have been a little starryeyed," said Mancuso. "The kids he lost to finished second and third, so he definitely had a tough draw.

"Overall, I thought the guys did an excellent job the entire weekend. From what I understand, this is the first year Canton has had four state-placers in one year, so that's something the kids should be proud of."

Presentations bring biblical stories of Jesus to life

John Dzwonkowski is matter of fact as tells the Biblical story of Jesus in an upcoming production at two local Catholic churches. Audiences won't have to wonder what it would be like to be Jesus' best friend as the Livonia man's by-the-way manner brings the Savior's ministry, death and resurrection to life in the one-man show, "An Evening with Simon Peter."

Dzwonkowski plays the Apostle Peter in the 90-minute drama 7 p.m. Sunday, March 22, at St. Aidan Catholic Church, and 7 p.m. Sunday-Monday, March 29-30, at St. Priscilla Catholic Church, both in Livonia. A free will offering is asked to defray the cost of production.

Dzwonkowski has been performing the role since 1992. Over the years he has made changes to the script which now requires 58-pages of memorization, but it's definitely a labor of love. Dzwonkowski has a strong faith and energy that is sure to come through in the portrayal.


"I find people invested in their religion see this as a source of inspiration. Most leave with a tear or two but there is humor too especially in the beginning. The primary objective is to reach out to people who might not know what's so great about this Jesus fellow. In the first act as Simon Peter I tell them about what it was like to meet him for the first time, listen to him speak, watch him work with children and the sick.

Dzwonkowski moves on to illustrate the betrayal of Jesus by Judas Iscariot and the arrest and conviction of the carpenter from Nazareth. A 14-foot cross serves as an imposing reminder of the crucifixion.

"It's historical fiction," said Dzwonskowski, who has a master's degree in theology. "I continue to research it a lot."

Dzwonkowski's understanding comes from the years he spent studying for the priesthood with the Maryknoll Mission in New York. His love of theology and the stage led him to try his hand at acting as John the Baptist and Judas in an off-off-Broadway production of "Godspell."

His commitment to the seminary forced him to give up theater, but not for long. Dzwonkowski eventually left the seminary to start a business and marry. By day he writes for the Web and owns American Corporate Communication so it was only natu-

ral for him to put Jesus' message into words.

Over the years the presentation grew into a family affair with wife Cindi doing makeup and directing, sons Andrew, 17, and Lucas, 14, overseeing sound and lighting. Daughter Julie Bradner, 20, used to take part before enrolling in Western Michigan University.

"It's fun," said Dzwonkowski, 58.

But it's not easy being a best friend as Peter found out. His flaw is one of the reasons David Conrad wanted to bring the presentation to the community. Conrad is director of faith forma-

"We wanted to give the community an opportunity to break open the scriptures and realize scriptures are alive and relevant even in today's time," said Conrad. "The disciples of Christ's time can teach us something about being Christ's disciples today with all the warts and positive aspects. They were humans just like you and I. They failed and got up and continued to follow. We need to follow that example of stick with-it-ness. Originally Peter denied his Lord but was reconciled and made leader of the church. In realizing his weaknesses he never failed to mention all he was able to accomplish was because of the presence of Christ. Lent is an intensive time to renew our relationship with the Lord. In a way it can actually be a prayer. It's certainly not simply entertainment."

Dianne Pierson believes the audience will be equally inspired by the St. Luke production of "The Gospel According to John" 7 p.m. Wednesday, March 25, at Sacred Heart Byzantine Church Banquet Center in Livonia. The two-hour production features Leonardo Defilippis who is probably best known as the director of the film Therese, based on the life of the Catholic saint known as the Little Flower.

"It's a very spiritual program, has liturgical music, expansive staging and props," said Pierson, the church's administrative assistant. "It's a one-man show and he performs the entire gospel according to John in costumes based on sacred images. It's not Catholic, Baptist. It's the Bible. We think it will really make an impact on people, to infuse them with a knowledge there is something greater than us out there."



Local youngsters belt out 'Brundibar' on MOT stage

Ryan Hurley of Huntington Woods knows exactly when he fell in love with theater.

"What really got me started big was in first grade I went to theater camp in New York. We did the Wisard of Oz. We were all Munchkins."

Since then, Ryan, now 10 and a fifth-grader at Burton Elementary, has traded Follow the Yellow Brick Road and Ding-Dong the Witch is Dead for the music of Georges Bizet's Carmen and Tchaikovsky's Nutcracker Suite. This

"Everyone in the show has done a great job. It's really fun and the outcome is amazing."



Hospital food goes gourmet at Henry Ford West Bloomfield

Just the thought of eating hospital food is enough to make many people sick, but that's changing at the new Henry Ford West Bloomfield Hospital: The smell of fresh strawberries filled the air on a recent tour of the kitchen. These were no ordinary recipes the staff was preparing for patients. The vibrant red color of the berries illustrates the philosophy Matt Prentice developed as culinary director and consultant to make stays more enjoyable and healthier food wise. Except for tomatoes, all fruits and vegetables have never seen the inside of a can or

freezer. "First I had to start figuring out what our mission was by talking to hospital staff — dietitians, nurses and doctors. Their views were fairly diverse even among registered dietitians. A nurse on a heart ward said to get rid of the salt," said Prentice, who with his staff created more than 1,300 recipes for the hospital menu. "I took copious notes then started to read books written on what food does for you, what's good and bad. I'm not a doctor; I'm a cook. I was asked to assist the healing process. If we're serving rice, let's serve brown rice instead of peeling away nutrients, breads with whole grain flours. Let's give the body energy so it can heal

Prentice spent last summer writing a manual on healthy eating for the staff. It wasn't easy to make time since the Matt Prentice Restaurant Group owns a number of area restaurants including Coach Insignia at the Renaissance Center in Detroit.

To help with the project he

> BLUE SUNSHINE SUPER FOOD SMOOTHIE

Serves 6

2 cups fresh pineapple, diced 1 cup frozen banana chunks 1 cup frozen diced mangoes

1-1/2 cups almond milk 4 ounces agave or raw honey ½ ounce vanilla extract 1 cup fresh blueberries

½ cup raspberries

Combine all ingredients except berries in a blender and puree until smooth. Pour half of the mixture into serving vessels. Add blueberries to remaining mixture and puree until smooth. Pour blueberry mix over the back of a spoon on top of the pineapple-mango mix to keep

PECAN TOPPED PUMPKIN PUDDING Serves 8

2 eggs

15 ounces pumpkin puree 12 ounces evaporated milk ¾ cup brown sugar 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon ¼ teaspoon nutmeg 1/2 teaspoon cloves ½ teaspoon ginger 1 teaspoon salt ¼ cup vanilla

1 teaspoon pecans

for each serving

Mix all ingredients together except nuts in a mixing bowl with a whisk. Divide mixture into eight 4-ounce ramekins. Bake in a water bath 45 minutes in a 300 degree oven. Serve at room temperature

brought in his corporate chef and six executive chefs to train the management team he hired for the hospital. Prentice's executive chefs oversee the menus at Northern Lakes Seafood Company in Bloomfield Hills; No.VI Chop House, Novi; Shiraz, Bingham Farms; Deli Unique, West Bloomfield and Bloomfield Hills; Plaza Deli, Southfield, and Tavern on 13,

Beverly Hills. Each worked on different stations that include entrees from the Middle East, Africa, Spain, Greece, and "other areas of the world that eat very healthy." Prentice uses Michigan products whenever possible. He opened a refrigerated locker to show off organic fruits, vegetables and salad items like red leaf lettuce. Most of the items are organic, especially if served uncooked.

"Jason Hayden out at No.VI Chop house loves big fat steaks. He's come up with phenomenal food on a nominal budget. He was in charge of the American entree station, which is often the feature of the day for patients, and came up with grilled marinated tofu served

with bulgur roulade," said Prentice. "It's really simple food. We're trying to stick with fresh ingredients loaded with vitamins and minerals. We make everything from scratch. It's all about the healing power of food."

Prentice realized early on that food had to taste good too since the same recipes were being served in Henry's, the cafeteria where the seven stations offer deli items like turkey sandwiches on 100-percent whole wheat bread with Russian low-fat dressing, and cole slaw and potato salad with low-fat mayonnaise made fresh in the kitchen.

The beef sandwich cuts red meat to three ounces and tops it with spicy plum ketchup on a house baked onion roll.

"We tried to stay away from unhealthy meats like corned beef. My favorite is a vegetarian sandwich with avocado, sprouts and Swiss cheese and I'm not a vegetarian kind of guy," said Prentice of West Bloomfield. "You eat the sandwich and it perks your energy."

The Asian station features rolled sushi, rice boxes and

noodle bowls developed under the direction of Chef Jaime Kalmus. Prentice's staff is scheduled to leave around mid-April when total quality control will be in the hands of Executive Chef Frank Turner who previously was corporate chef for the Prentice group.

"My restaurant chefs are definitely embracing the recipes. We have a healthy healing area with Asian on the Northern Lakes menu. Chef Jaimie Kalmus is teaching them to roll sushi, how you use a wok, how to use herbs to make noodle bowls flavorful. We have six different soups every day — none with sodium."

Salt was banned from the kitchen except for baked goods. Recipes rely on ingredients to add flavor. A seared salmon with tomato jam is served over Israeli couscous with currants.

To spice up the menu for kids, Prentice adds special touches. Cookies are being baked in the image of Henry, the hospital's therapy dog.

"We need to be able to put a smile on a sick boy or girl's face," said Prentice. "We're going to have Henry cookies and they get to decorate it themselves."



Court considers smoking nuisance issue

Q: I understand that there may be a recent case out of Massachusetts regarding banning on smoking. Do you have any information?

A: In our effort to keep you advised of developments in community association law, I can tell you that there is a recent case out of California which ruled that a complainant could continue with her nuisance claim against an association

the association had a "duty to maintain its premises in a reasonably safe condition." The association's decision to allow smoking in the outdoor common areas created a condition which was harmful to health and obstructed the free use of the common

because she alleged that

areas and interfered with the comfortable enjoyment of life or property. Obviously, the theory upon which the case was brought still has to be substantiated by the evidence but the court resisted an attempt to throw out the case based on an alleged failure to state a claim for relief under a nuisance

Q: Our house is in foreclosure and we have been contacted by a so-called foreclosure consultant who is making us an offer to relieve our distress. What should we be looking for?

A: In this economic environment, the appearance of so-called foreclosure consultants, who track foreclosure notices and contact borrowers in distress, has proliferated. These individuals persuade the homeowner in foreclosure to sign a contract whereby, for a fee, the foreclosure consultant agrees to provide services such as saving the financially distressed individual's home and contacting lenders and other third parties on the homeowner's behalf in order to delay, postpone or even cancel the foreclosure. Unfortunately, foreclosure consultant contracts often require the homeowner to deed the property to the consultant in exchange for the consultant's promise to make all delinquent and future mortgage payments to help restore the homeowner's credit and to grant the homeowner the right to stay in the home as a tenant at a stipulated rental rate, often combined with an option to repurchase. Unfortunately, some foreclosure consultants take advantage of homeowners. The homeowners soon find that the promised services have not been provided even though the homeowner paid full compensation for such services, and the homeowners could eventually lose their homes. Although reputable foreclosure consultants can perform valuable services, there have been a number of recent negative publicity situations resulting in the enactment of several state statutes regulating foreclosure consultants' activities as well as an increase in case law finding certain practices by foreclosure consultants unenforceable and void. Many states have dealt with the statutory relief, but as yet, Michigan has not joined the
