Canton Toyota dealer confident despite recall

Victory Toyota of Canton employees are working longer hours to repair eight models recalled for gas pedal-related problems, and dealership officials said they remain confi-dent they will keep their customers despite a global public relations

Technicians employed by Michigan's No. 1 Toyota dealer are working 7:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday to make repairs, service director Dean Stewart said, after the Japanese auto giant recalled millions of vehicles worldwide.

Moreover, Victory Toyota's general manager, Rick Hodges, said

in a video address at www.victorytoyotacanton.com that the 38,000square-foot dealership, on Michigan Avenue east of Beck, has extended its hours as late as 2 a.m. to accommodate customers who need to bring in their vehicles.

"We are here for you today, tomorrow and years to come," Hodges said, seeking to reassure customers of Victory Toyota's service by promising that "we're more committed today than ever before.

Toyota dealerships everywhere have been besieged by customers who became scared of their own cars amid a recall of more than 8 million vehicles for issues including gas pedals that could potentially get stuck in floor mats or fail to return to position even when no pressure is applied.

"It's a very small, minute possibility that you're going to have an issue," Stewart said.

Still, he said Victory Toyota early on gave some fearful customers other vehicles to drive until their recalled autos could be fixed.

"We're telling people not to fear their cars, but if they do fear their cars we're here to help them," Stewart said.

Hodges, in his video address, indicated he has placed his family's safety in Toyota's hands.

"I drive a Toyota. My wife transports our kids in a Toyota. My whole family drives Toyotas," he said.

Stewart couldn't predict how long it might take Victory Toyota to make

repairs, saying the effort would partly depend on how quickly customers get their vehicles to the dealer. However, he said he believes that, long term, customers will continue to trust the dealership.

"We've built a good reputation," Stewart said, "and we're doing everything we can to keep that going.'

Stewart, a Toyota employee for 17 years, said Victory Toyota sold 1,200 vehicles last year alone.

"I think Toyota has a very loyal customer base," he said. "I think the customers will stay with the cars."

Expansion project results in safer, roomier lockup

Jail overcrowding conditions that potentially threatened the safety of Canton police officers and prisoners have been alleviated by a \$450,000 cell block expansion nearing comple-

A jail that once accommodated only 32 people can now house 58 prisoners an 81-percent increase that marks the first major cell block expansion since the facility opened in 1985.

'I'd say it's a significant improvement in the ability of the employees, as well as the prisoners, to move around safely," Deputy Police Chief Robert Kerr said, providing a tour of the cell block area.

Lockup space, now 3,848 square feet, has increased by 1,000 square feet amid a construction project that also ushered in a better security camera system, a much larger prisoner booking area and hallway "panic buttons" for officers who need help subduing violent arrestees.

Former FBI Special Agent John Anthony, who serves on the Canton Township Board of Trustees, said the expansion project has eased potentially unsafe conditions that can lead to injuries

or, in dire situations, an officer's death. Police officers have been killed in booking situations," said Anthony, who worked 25 years for the FBI. "It is an area of concern for law enforcement. It's a very risky situation. By expanding the capabilities and enhancing the holding facility of

Canton locals differ on Granholm's speech

Gov. Jennifer Granholm called for diversifying Michigan's economy to create new jobs during her last State of the State address Wednesday night - a move that brought hope to an unemployed Canton autoworker, but left some local officials saying broader reforms still are needed in the state's business tax structure.

Granholm applauded one Canton company, Danotek Motion Technologies, for helping to create new jobs. Her remarks came after Danotek, a renewable-energy company that manufactures magnetic generators for windmill turbines, said in October it plans to invest \$5 million in its local facility, with the potential to quadruple its workforce to as many as 200

employees within five years. Granholm cited alternative

energy, life sciences, homeland security, the film industry, tourism and efforts to help small businesses as ways to broaden Michigan's job base while still protecting the auto industry.

Canton unemployed autoworker Anne Marie Graham-Hudak, who said Granholm inherited much of Michigan's economic woes, was hopeful after hearing the governor's final State of the State address.

"Gov. Jennifer Granholm was handed a mess eight years ago," Graham-Hudak said. "Many of us who worked in the auto industry knew we were on a slippery downward slope at the time. Her speech deeply touched me when she spoke of job loss, losing businesses, homes and

witnessing historical plants shutting down - as I, my family, friends and neighbors personally experienced much of that, as well as loss of health care. She was right - 2010 was a bad year that marked the changing of an era in Michigan.

For school districts struggling with shrinking foundation grants in the faltering Michigan economy, it was Granholm's pledge to "draw the line against additional education cuts in the year ahead" that had officials at least hopeful. However, since she didn't specify how she would balance that on the revenue side, Dr. Craig Fiegel said he'll wait and see what happens to a cut state officials have been talking about making to education funding.

"We figure, depending on what happens, we've got somewhere around a \$9 million deficit next year," said Fiegel, Plymouth-Canton Community Schools superintendent. "About half of that or a little more would be in that \$268 cut they were talking about. That would reduce (the impending deficit) significantly, if that's what (Granholm) means."

But it can't be simply a matter of throwing money at the problem, according to Tom Salapatek of Canton. He cited something he read about test scores in Kansas City dropping even though funding was doubled.

"My gut feeling is money isn't the answer," Salapatek said Thursday morning over a cup of coffee at the Plymouth Panera Bread. "Better use of existing money is the answer. Don't just throw money at it."

Township Supervisor Phil LaJoy agreed with Granholm that a diverse economy is needed to create more jobs, but he said he "didn't see a lot of substance" for changing the state's tax structure to lure more businesses and become more competitive.

"As far as creating jobs and diversifying our economy, I agree wholeheartedly with her, in that what was normal before is not normal anymore," LaJoy said, but added, "I think we need to be more competitive

with our business taxes."

Graham-Hudak appeared hopeful that efforts mentioned by Granholm will begin to turn Michigan's unemployment rate around.

"Many of us unemployed autoworkers are seeing an increase in interviewing in many different jobs - that is hopeful, and it was exciting to hear all that she had worked hard to bring to Michigan," Graham-Hudak said. "Many of us are also starting businesses — the changing of an era — and we hope to bring a change here as Gov. Granholm has tried hard to do the past years."

LaJoy, a former Republican state legislator, commended the Democratic governor as "a very good communicator," but said she hasn't championed efforts to improve the business tax structure and make state government more efficient by making it more right-sized for this new economy.

LaJoy also called for greater efforts to ensure Michigan doesn't lose out on federal dollars it needs for repairing the state's crumbling roads.

Carmine Palombo, transportation director for the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, recently said state lawmakers will need to make difficult decisions such as considering a gas tax increase and increasing vehicle registration fees. Otherwise, he said, the state could risk losing money it gets from the U.S. government to fix roads.

Two state legislators already have introduced bills to increase the tax on gas and diesel fuel. Palombo, during recent talks with township officials, acknowledged that such efforts become more complicated during an election year, when lawmakers can face a voter backlash.

Graham-Hudak welcomed Granholm's remarks for ending lifelong benefits for incoming Michigan state legislators, but said she wished lawmakers currently serving also would "unselfishly" cut lifetime health coverage for themselves to combat budget problems.

She called the finale of Granholm's speech "inspiring" and said it "touched many of us who have struggled over the past years. Her enthusiasm and caring spirit will be missed."

The project also involved installing a large window between two rooms used for prisoner interviews - a change that allows the rooms to double as a visiting area where attorneys, clergy and others can see prisoners and talk to them by phone.

"I think it was a good idea to double up the use," Kerr said.

While expanding lockup areas for men and women - along with a "detox" area for drunken drivers - workers also hauled out the former steel bunks and mattresses, which were replaced by concrete sleeping areas.

"We weren't looking for comfort," Kerr said, "We used to have to replace the mattresses because they would get destroyed."

Though mostly finished, the jail project still entails converting a one-time booking room into an area that will have a three-pronged use: a place for video arraignments of prisoners, food preparation and Breathalyzer tests.

"Hopefully everything will be done by the end of February," Kerr said.

The \$450,000 cost of the project — funded by public safety dollars — is far less than early projections of as much as \$2 million. The expansion

58,128 to 87,508 by 2007, according to statistics provided by police officials. Simultaneously, the number of arrests skyrocketed from 931 to 3,811.



On Thursday, students at West Middle School had a chance to find out when they had a visit from professional dog sled racer Dan Anderson and his team of Siberian Huskies. "Mr. Dan the Dog Sled Man," as he likes to be called, is from Coopersville, Mich., and owns Tun-Dra Kennels in Nunica, Mich.

Anderson has always been an outdoors man, but it wasn't until he married his wife that he became interested in dog sledding.

Jokingly, he said, "I married into it." He said his deceased father-in-law, Dean Cheadle, was one of the co-partners of the Iditarod. Cheadle trained Anderson and Anderson soon learned it's a year round commitment, which is no different than other professional athletes. He raced for about 10 years and then took a break to spend more time with his children. He fondly remembers the Johnson Park Race near Grand Rapids several years ago, which he won by mere seconds.

In the offseason, mushers teach the dogs and puppies to get along with other dogs because, if they interfere with another dog during a race, they would get disqualified.

During the interactive assembly, Anderson covered several topics, including Alaska's Gold Rush Era and

current riches of oil and gold. He also spoke about dog sledding equipment, including different size sleds. He explained the possible friction between the sled and the snow or ice.

Anderson also demonstrated all the gear a musher needs. The boots may be cumbersome, he said, yet can withstand temperatures as low as 100 degrees below zero and "are not heavy like you'd expect." Even the dogs have special equipment, including "booties," which he explained protect their paws on the ice. The booties are strapped on

with Velcro. He also passed around several animal skins, including covote and beaver

Naturally, Anderson spoke about the Iditarod, which is the world famous dog sled race that is about 1,049 miles of Alaskan territory. This year, it's set to start on March 6.

The Language Arts Teacher, Nicole Lerg, was happy with the presentation.

She said, "Starting next month, when the Iditarod actually starts, we'll read a book called "Bright Star, Black Dawn" and this is kind of their little preview for that," Lerg said, adding students learn about social studies [because] he talks about all these different locations and different cultures

"It's just fun because it gives them a chance to be hands-on and it gives them something they are so excited about, which is the dogs," Lerg said. "It's perfect for when we go to Language Arts next month, I'll just remind them about this and they'll already have seen it and it gives them that firsthand experience."

Once the indoor assembly was completed, Anderson took the students to the snowy field outside and introduced his team of dogs: Storm and Ruby (lead dogs) and Sky,


Sable, Maverick and Faun, the newest member. Anderson said his dogs have the same bloodline as the original Balto. Balto was famous for his heroic efforts in the 1925 dog sled relay race, which brought relief to the citizens of Nome, Alaska, who had the diphtheria epidemic.

As the students gathered around the team of dogs, their playful excitement built up and soon, sixth-graders, Drew Smiley and Nour Chehadi

were whisked off on a dog sled ride. The dogs know several verbal commands such as "haw," "gee," "whoa" and "straight ahead."

"Straight ahead" is exactly the direction that Anderson is planning to take. Now that his youngest child is graduating from high school, he is ready to get back into dog sled racing and have some adventures again. This time, he'd like to take along his young grandson.

Township Teamsters agree to concessions

A second Plymouth Township employee union has agreed to a concessionary contract in the face of tight township budgets and a bleak revenue forecast.

The tentative deal with Teamsters Local 214, which represents six people in the Department of Public Works, calls for a pay cut of 7 percent but, unlike in a larger township union, no furlough days.

"We can't afford to lose them," said Supervisor Richard Reaume, explaining the department is already thinly staffed. The six workers maintain the township's water and sewer system, he said, and are paid out of the township's water fund, which faces a decline in revenue because of a drop in water usage.

"It was important to even get concessions in the water fund," Reaume said.

The contract would also have the workers pay more toward their health insurance and increase their

out-of-pocket health-care expenses, Reaume said.

The tentative agreement, already ratified by the Teamsters, goes before the township Board of Trustees at its next meeting on Tuesday, Feb. 23. The deal would expire at the end of

The township's Teamsters at the top of the pay scale earn just over \$44,000 a year, before the 7-percent pay cut. Five of the six are at the top of the scale, Reaume said, and the sixth will be at the top shortly.

Early last month, the township's Technical, Professional and Officeworkers of Michigan workers agreed to a contract that calls for 26 unpaid days off as year. which amounts to a 10-percent cut, and other concessions. Officials estimate the TPOAM contract will save \$300,000 a year.

Charitable contributions must be documented

Q: Dear Rick: I'm preparing my 2009 tax return. The instructions state in order to deduct charitable contributions you must make the contribution in that calendar year. I thought I read something that said you were allowed to deduct charitable contributions on your 2009 return as long as a contribution was made before February 2010. If this cor-

A: Like most things when it comes to tax law, there are always exceptions to the rules. Last week Congress passed, and the president signed, new legislation that dealt with the Haiti relief effort. In order to encourage Americans to contribute to Haiti, Congress passed legislation that does allow you to deduct contributions for the Haiti relief effort on your 2009 tax returns as . long as they are made by the end of February. This exception applies only to charitable contributions for the Haiti relief effort.

One last note regarding charitable contributions. In

general, it is important to save documentation. It is no longer sufficient to just save the cancelled checks. You also need **Money Matters**

Q: Dear Rick: Last year I inherited \$250,000 from a friend's estate. It was a CD outside of his IRA. How should I report this for tax purposes? I'm not sure it's important but I do my tax return using a software package. I know I have to report the money, I just can't figure out where it goes. Can you help?

A: Based upon the fact that you inherited non-retirement money I have good news for you. The \$250,000

you inherited is not subject to income taxes and does not have to be reported on your tax return. All that money is yours and you do not have to report it to the Internal Revenue Service.

The way our inheritance tax laws work is when you inherit money that was not in some sort of tax qualified retirement account, you inherit the money income tax free

On the other hand, if you inherit an IRA, 401(k) Plan or an annuity there are income tax consequences to you. The exception is a Roth IRA. When you inherit a Roth IRA, since it is a tax-free account, there are no income tax consequences upon death.

Good estate planning takes that into consideration - not only estate taxes but also income taxes. For example, you would want someone in a lower income tax bracket to inherit retirement accounts and someone in a higher tax bracket to inherit non-retirement accounts. By doing it this way, you can reduce income tax consequences to

the beneficiaries.

Sometimes, there is confusion between estate taxes and income taxes. One really has nothing to do with the other. Estate tax deals with how the estate itself is taxed while, generally, the income tax deals with how the individual beneficiary is taxed. Obviously, one of the goals of good estate planning is to reduce and eliminate both estate and income taxes.

Keep in mind that there are differences between inherited money and money gifted to you. Gift taxes, if any, are the responsibility of the person giving the gift not the person receiving the gift. However, there are different income tax consequences involving gifting money and inheriting it, particularly when it comes to determining your basis in the property.

Community reaches out to help Haiti

The national Presbyterian Church has responded to number of emergencies recently, using its stocks of relief kits at a low ebb.

So when a 7.0-level earthquake leveled Port Au Prince, Haiti, leveling homes and leaving gut-wrenching devastation in its wake, the Presbyterians needed help to provide relief, and reached out to its member churches.

That call for aid reached First Presbyterian Church of Plymouth, and the church's Presbyterian Women's group responded with more than 150 baby and hygiene kits, responding to the national church's Presbyterian Disaster Assistance program.

"They collect those kits and others, like school its and cleanup kits," said Alisa Blunk, a member of the Presbyterian Women at First Presbyterian. "They put out an urgent request for baby kits and hygiene kits because they'd sent their supply to other areas, and they were in need of them for the Haiti Relief."

A notice was put in First
Presbyterian's church bulletin, and some 40 people volunteered to help put the kits
together. Many more than that
donated the money to buy the
items that went into the kits.
In addition to the kits, money
needed to be raised to cover a
\$2-per-kit shipping charge.

While exact figures aren't available, more than enough money was raised to do both. And a church member also arranged for her company to transport the kits to their shipping point in Maryland.

Altogether, volunteers
put together more than 100
hygiene kits and more than 50
baby kits. Hygiene kits contain
items such as hand towels,
washcloths, combs, nail clippers, soap, toothbrushes and
adhesive bandages. The baby
kits include diapers, T-shirts,
washcloths, gowns or sleepers, diaper pins, sweaters and
blankets.

"It was a very generous

amount of money," collected from church members, Blunk said. "It was a total church effort. Everybody really came together."

OTHER EFFORTS

Cindy Rubio's 10-year-old twins saw the story about the earthquake that hit Haiti and, like many people, wondered what they could do about it.

According to Rubio, a Canton resident, her twins - Jimmy and Rachel - approached their Student Council at Erikkson Elementary School and, by week's end, the council had a flyer sent home with students asking for just \$1 per family. They were hoping the fifthgrade class could raise \$600.

The Rubio twins also canvassed the neighborhood asking for donations, even offering to take returnable bottles and cans in lieu of cash. In one day, the twins raised more than \$60.

The effort netted \$1,429 for Haiti aid.

"These kids are outstanding," Erikkson principal Kevin Learned said. "This is a school community in a struggling economy, and it has hit Erikkson families hard. They raised more than double what we asked. That definitely speaks to the character of our students."

"You've got to put in orders for apparel. Just everyday duties, making sure your younger level coaches have everything.



Johnson said the Mrs. Wayne County title seemed to fall into her lap.


She submitted her application and photos, and eventually met with a pageant organizer who gave her the go ahead to serve as Wayne County delegate to the pageant in April.



When a patient comes to a physician's office because of stiffness, the patient be prepared to answer a number of physician inquiries. The doctor will want to know stiffness is worse in morning or the evening, or is the stiffness present the same through

stiffness is worse in morning or the evening, or is the stiffness present the same throughout the day? Did the stiffness come on gradually over weeks or appear almost overnight? Does the stiffness return on arising after sitting for 20-30 minutes or more? Or does activity make the stiffness worse?

The patient's answers to these questions help the doctor decide the cause of the stiffness. Most stiffness comes from being out of shape, and is the most common type of stiffness found in people over age 70. Insufficient exercise means muscles are weak and sluggish to respond to sudden demands. Arising easily from a seated position requires both strength and stamina, the very qualities of muscle lost when an individual does not undertake regular exercise.

However, a doctor must be careful in this assessment. Another condition - Polymyalgia Rheumatica - has stiffness as its main feature. The stiffness is intense, comes on rapidly and lasts through the day, though aching is worse in the morning. The doctor wants to make a correct diagnosis of Polymyalgia as its treatment is straightforward and results in cure of the stiffness.

Finally, stiffness can be the result of strain. For example, a stiff back may reflect an arthritic knee. Poor posture because of knee impairment can create strain that the individual feels as a stiff back.







Laura Torres, a 28-year-old development associate in Boston, knows firsthand about being frustrated with a job search. She was laid off in December 2008 and didn't find a job for about nine months.

The most frustrating aspect was not feeling totally in control of the process particularly once you started interviewing at a job," she recalls. "Obviously you can play the game and even play it well, but your fate is still up to a small group of people. The agonizing wait between the interview and the follow-up is eerily reminiscent of trying to date someone who 'just isn't that into you.

Elena Sokolow-Kaufman, 30, who works at small nonprofit in Massachusetts, also had a frustrating job search. After being unemployed for a little more than two months, she reached a breaking point.

"I had sent out a lot of résumés and



had a few interviews for specific job opportunities, but nothing seemed like it was moving forward. At the time I was going on a lot of informational interviews, and at that point I started to feel-very burned out," she recalls.

If you do reach a breaking point like Sokolow-Kaufman, Blumenthal says it's important to switch things up and try something new in your job search. Doing so will reinvigorate you and

help you stay motivated. 'When you've been searching [for a job] for a long time, it can wear you out. You need to do things to keep you excited about your job search so that you keep going," he says. "The most important thing you can do is keep yourself eager, motivated and energized to continue the search."

To revitalize her efforts, Sokolow-Kaufman says she started a blog, in addition to working on her search in coffee shops with friends who were in the same position.

"It helped me a lot to feel less

isolated and was a good reminder that many other people were in the same boat I was in," she says.

Torres also took measures to revive her job search by narrowing her focus in order to find a job she really wanted. In the meantime, Torres challenged herself by applying for jobs outside of her interests or background.

"I never got interviews for these jobs, but it helped me think outside the box a little," she says. "I also sometimes just had informational interviews with people whose careers were markedly different from mine. Again, this was to broaden my horizons a bit and give me more perspective.

If you (and your job search) are stuck in a rut, here are five ways Blumenthal suggests to rejuvenate your job search and mix things up a

1. Go online

"You've sent out more résumés than you can count. But have you tweeted? It's a social networking world. Build your online connections on services like Twitter, Facebook and LinkedIn. Then use that platform to make valueadded observations about your line of work and job searching. You never know where your electronic connections can lead," he says.

2. Separate yourself

"Hiring managers and recruiters receive tons of résumés. Some are better than others, but frankly, none of them stand out. You need something else," he says. "Try writing an article or two about your field. Print them up on glossy paper with a nice graphic design. Add a professional bio, and put it all together in a nice folder. Now, instead of sending a résumé, you're sending a press kit on you. That stands

3. Have fun

"I know a woman who once sent her résumé folded up and stuffed inside of a baby sneaker. Her note said she was sure to be a 'shoe-in' for the job," he recalls. "If you are bored with your job search, it will show in your materials,

your applications and your interviews. So have some fun." (And yes, the 'shoe-in' did get the job.)

4. Set a big goal

"You've already met 100, 200, 500 people? Set a goal to meet and have one-on-one conversations with 100 new people this month. Is it possible? Can you do it? Use Facebook. Go to professional meetings. Ask 10 friends to introduce you to 10 new people. It doesn't matter if they are in your field. This is the "Six Degrees of Separation" game. Meet up and let the new connections take you where they will," he says.

5. Go to work

"Volunteer at a local charity or political organization. You have the time, and this helps you in so many ways," he says. How? It feels good to help; you're using your skills; you're meeting new people; you're getting off the couch and out of the house; and you will build your stockpile of stories. "When you meet people or interview, the connections you make are through your stories. What better story to tell than something that happened while you were helping make the world a better place?

Ultimately, Blumenthal reminds job seekers to treat their job search like a job, and like a project that has a longterm objective.

"Do what you would do if this were such a project. Celebrate milestones and accomplishments along the way. Appreciate what you love about this job. After all, you can work in your pajamas, set your own hours, work from Starbucks and pick your kids up


