# Cops pay respects to 'one of our own'

the same purpose.

It wasn't a blood-relative to whom the police officers from all over the region were paying their final respects Friday morning at St. Michael Lutheran Church in Canton, but it might as well have been. They were there to bid farewell to Jackson Police Officer James Bonneau, a 26-year-old from Canton shot and killed in the early hours of Tuesday morning while responding to a domes-

Hundreds of officers turned out for the funeral, standing in formation and rendering a salute as bagpipers and drummers from Detroit escorted Bonneau's casket into the church.

"A lot of these guys went to the academy together," said Patrolman Paul Albrecht, a cop for 27 years who works the day shift for the Jackson Police Department. "When you lose one of your own, you feel it. Lines aren't drawn at city boundaries. Everyone feels the loss.

The police officers gathered for the funeral snapped to attention as Blackman Township Officer Darrin McIntosh, injured in the incident that felled Bonneau, was wheeled into the church. Then the hundreds of officers filed past Bonneau's casket at the front of the church, paying their final respects to their fallen comrade.

# D.C. trip brings Discovery classrooms to life

Caili Johnson has been to Washington, D.C., once before, and she's looking forward to going back. Julian Gabriel hasn't ever been there, and he's excited about his first trip to the nation's capital.

Both are among the 64 Discovery Middle School students (and 22 adult chaperones) headed to Washington, D.C., on a school band field trip designed to connect their love for music with the knowledge their gaining in the classroom. The trip, led by Discovery band director Marc Whitlock, takes place April 28 to May 2.

"This trip will provide a rare insight into the subjects of music and American history and it will connect them to what they're learning," Whitlock said of students making the trip. "Our goal is to make Washington, D.C., an extension of our classroom.

The band will play a slate of music including songs such as  $America\ the\ Beautiful$ and The Star-Spangled Banner - near the

reflecting pond at the Lincoln Memorial. They'll also get a visit to places like the Smithsonian, where they'll see such artifacts hen he w John Wilkes Booth, and the snare drum used to lead his funeral procession. They'll also visit the Vietnam Memorial.

It's a chance to put a tangible touch on the things students are learning in school, Whitlock said.

There's only so much the textbook can teach," Whitlock said. "We have an opportunity to bring the classroom to life by showing the kids the sights and sounds of Washington.

It sounds like a good plan to Johnson, 13, a Discovery seventh-grader who remembers being impressed with Arlington National Cemetery - "It's a sacred place, with a peaceful feeling," she said - the last time she went to Washington.

"I love the music we're going to play," Johnson said. "Washington has so many

## Township freezes pay for non-union workers

A 70-member group of nonunion Canton Township employees will not get a pay raise this year as local officials tighten the purse strings to combat declin-

Except for built-in "step" increases for newer employees who haven't reached the top of their pay scale, the nonunion workers will receive a pay freeze for 2010 following a decision Tuesday night by the Canton Township Board of

Trustees The decision means that annual pay levels will continue to range from \$39,539 for the lowest-paid employees, such as a newly hired cable TV technician, to \$124,048 for topranking department directors, Human Resources Manager David Medley said.

The decision by Canton's elected officials to freeze the pay followed a recommendation by the township's three-member Merit Commission, whose duties include setting pay levels for non-union workers

Township board Trustee Pat Williams said he believes the Merit Commission acted prudently considering Canton expects to suffer a \$5.2 million loss for a two-year period ending in 2011 — largely due to declining property tax revenues.

They are recognizing the need to contain our costs this year," Williams said.

And while employees may not embrace a pay freeze, Williams said he believes most of them recognize that an economic downturn has weakened Canton's financial position. "I do believe they are stepping up to help us get through this,"


Medley said most employees seems to recognize that the township is trying to trim expenses as it battles declining "We're trying to avoid layoffs,"

he said

Medley said some non-union employees with less time on the job will see their pay levels increase slightly due to so-called 'step" increases. Those workers haven't yet reached the top of the wage scale for their posi-

However, he said at least 30 workers — those who already have reached the top of the pay scale - will get nothing in 2010.

# 'Team Canton' hitting its stride

Team Canton, a group of community leaders assembled by Supervisor Phil LaJoy to help the township and its residents weather an economic storm, has made strides after just two sessions.

Already, LaJoy's administration has compiled a 45-page Team Canton resource book detailing how corporate officials, educators, health-care professionals, church leaders, community volunteers and others say they can help their community.

The book contains names and e-mail addresses of Team Canton members who indicated they can provide food, clothing, free medical screenings, foreclosure-prevention advice, potential jobs, student tutoring, nursing home visits and numerous other resources.

Just two weeks after a kickoff session, nearly 80 people returned Wednesday for a second gathering inside Summit on the Park. They brainstormed in small groups for ideas to help Canton and its residents.

"I've seen an incredible number of ideas," LaJoy said.

Even so, some Team Canton members indicated that a clearing house will likely be needed to help match the volunteer efforts with people or organizations that need help. LaJoy said a third session appears likely in mid-April.

The latest gathering again drew help from management consultant Charles Fleetham, president of Farmington Hills-

based Project Innovations Inc., a company that assists government leaders and business officials in developing action plans amid an economic

"I hope Canton takes this energy and keeps it going so that Team Canton has life beyond this session," Fleetham said Wednesday morning. "I'm looking at this as a long-term centerpiece."

During a Feb. 23 kick-off meeting that drew a crowd of nearly 150 people, Team Canton had been asked to perform random acts of kindness in the community and report back Wednesday. Members cited efforts such as comforting an ailing friend, providing free car repairs and donating clothing.

Although attendance had dropped off Wednesday, local officials didn't appear discouraged, because others who attended the first session already had submitted ideas for helping their community — ideas that resulted in the Team Canton resource book.

In small groups Wednesday, members began discussing a wide array of ideas for helping the Canton community. To name a few:

• Municipal Services
Director Tim Faas said volunteers — both skilled and
unskilled — can help provide
repairs for senior citizens'
homes during a Christmas in

• 35th District Judge Ron Lowe said the court can provide court workers to help with certain projects, such as cleaning up dilapidated properties, as long as the program is orchestrated by the township and not by private enterprise.

Scott Coates, an Amerprise financial advisor who lives in Canton, said residents should be encouraged to spend their money here to help the local economy.

"Do business with small business owners here in Canton," he said.

# Former civilian clerk pleads guilty to embezzlement

A former civilian clerk who worked in the Livonia Police Department's records bureau pleaded guilty Tuesday to a charge of embezzlement by a public official over \$50.

Jane Anne Delaney, who is in her 60s, of Canton made the guilty plea before Circuit Judge Michael Hathaway. With the plea, Delaney may face a sixmonth jail sentence and two years probation. She is scheduled to be sentenced April 6.

Police recovered \$20,369 with \$20,270 from her home and the remainder from her purse, according to Detective Tim Larion. That money will remain in the city's possession, Larion said.

"All that money was recovered and it was money she never spent," Larion said.

Larion thought that the amount was close to what

police believe the clerk took, which she confessed was about \$22,000 over a five-month period. The suspect also kept a ledger with dates and amounts collected with a total that was close to the amount recovered, Larion

When asked why the money wasn't spent, Larion said she indicated she wanted to keep the money she had for retirement. "She didn't spend any of it because she felt comfortable with it," Larion said.

After a police investigation last fall, Delaney was arrested and arraigned on the embezzlement charge.

Delaney's job as clerk involved processing requests from the public for accident reports, copies of police reports, gun permits and notary duties, as she was a public notary.

Delaney, who worked for the city for 21 years and for the police department for at least 10, was terminated after her arrest Oct. 2.

## Hearing waived; drunken driving suspect headed to circuit court

Choos, who also lives in Canton, now faces two counts of causing a serious injury while driving drunk, one count of marijuana possession and one count of illegally possessing a pistol. District Judge Mike Gerou sent

the case to Wayne County Circuit Court; Choos is to be arraigned there on Friday, March 26.

Choos, a member of a Westland podiatry practice, is accused of driving a Lincoln MKX into the rear of a Chevrolet Trailblazer driven by Hengesbaugh on the evening of Jan. 29.

Hengesbaugh's husband, Larry, and two children, a boy and a girl, were also in the Trailblazer. The crash occurred on Ann Arbor Road near I-275.

Police said Choos did not have a permit for the semiautomatic pistol found in the Lincoln. He is free on bond and required to submit to alcohol testing several times a day.



# Michael's message: Libraries help keep son's memory alive

After Paula Mallia experienced the tragic loss of her infant son, Michael, she looked for picture books that could help her 5-year old daughter cope.

However, she couldn't easily find them, even at the public library. The need for this type of book was on her mind at the same time her family was deciding on a way to keep little Michael's memory alive. She said,

"Michael loved to sit on my lap and look at books," Mallia said, "so we knew it would have to be related to books."

That's how the idea was formed to create the first "Michael's Message Library of Hope" at Allen Elementary School in Plymouth, where she taught first and second grades. The library is a living memorial to Michael and is dedicated to providing families easy access to a collection of books that spread hope during difficult times.

Dodson Elementary, where Mallia currently teaches Kindergarten, is home to a second Michael's Library. which also honors the memory of Andrew Holmlund, a former Dodson student. The cost of this book collection comes from fund-raisers and donations.

Each February, Mallia faithfully holds a pop can/bottle drive. She said, "Dimes turn into books so that children may see that there is hope in all situations." She's thankful that this year's fundraiser brought in \$300 and donations were about \$200.

Recently, two Canton authors, Tia Barbero and Melissa Israel, visited Dodson and donated their picture books to Michael's Library. Each book is exactly

the kind that Mallia wants children and caring adults to read together, as a way to promote appropriate discussion during troublesome





Retired Jackson Police Sgt. Alan Combs made the trip from his Rockford home. Combs, a 27-year veteran officer who retired 10 years ago, was long gone before Bonneau joined the Jackson Police Department in November 2007. "It's like losing a family member," Combs said. "You're thinking, 'There but for the grace of God go I.' (Bonneau) hired in after I retired, but he was still one of my guys. I had to be here.

A 2002 Canton High School graduate, Bonneau attended Schoolcraft College before transferring to Eastern Michigan University's criminal justice program in fall 2004.

Those who knew Bonneau at Eastern recalled his intelligence, his work ethic and his sense of humor.

"Jim was a great student, a pleasure to be around and very dedicated to the law enforcement profession," said Donna Selman, assistant professor of criminology at Eastern. "He was one of our top students and earned an A in every single course he took. He really

was one of the good guys." While at Eastern, Bonneau

"He was very quiet and had a dry sense of humor," said Knapp, who interacted with Bonneau for about two years


"He was a really good guy who wanted to be a cop.'



# Vernors: 'Detroit's Drink' has distinctive taste, history

Keith Wunderlich of Trov began collecting Vernors memorabilia about 30 years

"I love Detroit, love Detroit history," said Wunderlich, speaking Thursday to the Plymouth Historical Society. His parents gave him some old Vernors pop bottles

"They were delighted to get rid of them," he told some 150 historical society members and guests.

Wunderlich, an administrator with the L'Anse Creuse schools, wrote a book on Vernors history, Vernors Ginger Ale, published in 2008 as part of Arcadia Publishing's "Image of America" series. "Most of you probably know more about it than I do because you lived it," he said

"I am not the only Vernors

nut out there," the father of four said. "I don't own this." he said, showing a slide of the Miss Vernors hydroplane.

His wife is understanding of his hobby, provided his memorabilia collection stays in the basement. "I like to tell my wife I don't have this in the back yard," he said of the hydroplane.

The evening at the Plymouth Historical Museum, which drew some 150 people, ended with Boston coolers, the name of which prompted some debate. Also served were Better Made potato chips, a Detroit product.

Wunderlich's collection includes a business card from 1875-80, which notes that James Vernor was both "pharmacist and florist." The company's roots go back to the

James Vernor was a delivery boy for a Detroit drugstore. "He began to experiment

with a formula for ginger ale," Wunderlich said. Vernor was in the Union Army in a medical unit in the Civil War. After the war, he opened his own pharmacy and florist shop at 235 Woodward Ave. in

"Much like the CVS of today," he said of a photo of the store, much like modern drugstores with a variety of merchandise. Vernor's store was in the Grand Circus Park area, then considered too far north of downtown for a good business. He formed the Michigan Board of Pharmacy, out of concern for better druggist standards, and held license No. 1.

Vernor opened an oak barrel of ginger ale he'd created before the war.

"It had aged for four vears and was now perfect," Wunderlich said of the barrel's contents. The druggist expanded his business

by selling extract; the cost seemed a bit high for the time, but Wunderlich said a gallon would make 355 cases of the pop. Soda jerks, a term of endearment, served pop then, with Vernors among those that didn't start as a medicine.

James was a Detroit alderman, active in civic affairs. Vernor Highway is named for

It's the oldest continuously produced pop in the U.S. "So it's some pretty potent stuff," said Wunderlich of the extract, which was being sold in places like New York state as early as

In 1896, a heavy bottle was developed to hold Vernors with a wired-on cap. Son James Vernor II came into the business, which moved downtown on Woodward south of Jefferson. Wunderlich recalled his parents going out for Vernors in the 1940s when they were dating. In its heyday, the soda fountain in Detroit served 60,000-75,000 glasses

"It was quite a night out to have a Vernors at the soda fountain," he said. The original had a cork to keep carbonation in. The formula is a secret, the speaker said, noting it includes ginger from Jamaica among its 19 ingredients. James Vernor V has the formula, but doesn't

The product was advertised as "Detroit's Drink," and earlier ads weren't all the yellow and green of today.

The plant had grown to a city block by the time of World War II. James Sr. died in 1927. James Sr. remained president and worked until his death.

His son was beloved as a company leader, with wives of staffers amazed he could remember their names and children at annual Christmas gatherings. "He was also a good businessman,"

mixers which were only on the market a few years. About 1920, the gnome appeared in ads, gradually replacing a delivery boy. The gnome's

appearance varied from artist to artist. There were even live gnomes featured in the Detroit Thanksgiving parade with a log-type float.

Wunderlich showed buildings specializing in serving Vernors (the apostrophe in the original name disappeared in the late 1950s). "The Detroit-Toledo market is the biggest market for Vernors," he said. The drink was also popular in Buffalo, N.Y., and closer to home in Flint.

Heir James Vernor IV didn't become company president. The city asked the company to move to accommodate riverfront plans, with the new plant costing \$5 million. In 1954, a recently remarried James II died. His new wife took a great deal of money from the company. In 1957, James III died at age 39, beset by personal problems.

"The 1950s were not kind to Vernors ginger ale,"


Wunderlich said. Stock was sold, and the business eventually left family hands; it's had a series of owners since.

It's still bottled in Detroit by Pepsi which doesn't own it but has bottling rights. In the mid-1950s, an old convention hall on Woodward was retrofitted at a cost of \$5 million to become the new Vernors plant.

"I'm painting a picture of a company bleeding millions and millions of dollars," he

Wunderlich's cousin, Bob Holmes of Canton was in the audience. "I learned a lot this time," he said. "I think he's changed it," Holmes added of the presentation. "I've seen his basement. It's something else."

Bob's brother, Richard Holmes of Farmington Hills, also Keith's cousin, came along to hear the lecture for the first time. "I thought it was really interesting," he said. "I think he's a really good speaker."

# W-W unions agree to concessions

The Wayne-Westland Community Schools district has gotten help from two employee groups and its top administrators in its effort cutting millions of dollars out of its budget.

Wayne-Westland Building Administrators Association and the Wayne-Westland Central Office Administrators Association have both agreed to forego a 1.5 percent pay increase and step increases for

2010-11. The changes affect the third year of four-year agreements. The unions also agreed to a \$480 per year co-pay for health care which is equal to what teachers now pay

Superintendent Greg Baracy and Deputy Superintendents Charlotte Sherman and Gary Martin also have agreed to pay freezes for 2010-11 and the same health care co-pay. This is the second year that the trio have taken pay freezes.

"I think these members for their efforts to help in this time of economic crisis," said board President Skip Monit. "I want to express our thanks for your stepping up and helping out."

The unions are the first employee groups to agree to concessions that represent \$315,000 in savings. School officials are in negotiations with its remaining employee groups, most of which are represented by the Michigan Education Association.

According to Martin, talks with those groups are in the preliminary stages. However, if the teachers were to agree to freeze their wages and

step increases next year, the district could save \$3.5 million.

"The administrators went out on a limb by doing it first," said Martin. They're leading by example."

Wayne-Westland officials want to cut costs by \$19 million in hopes of surviving the next two years with a minimal fund balance. It has a three-pronged plan which includes the closing of six elementary schools, which will save some \$5 million, and seeking \$4.5 mil-

lion in concessions from employees. The remaining \$10 million will come from "board actions," such as layoffs, a cut in supplies and selling property, Martin said.

Board Trustee William Gabriel noted that the agreements "are a great start," but the two unions only represent 100 of the district's 1,800 employees.

"I hope union leaders take this back to their members," he said. "This district has a lot of challenges. If we can get this done, I'll probably do a dance in the aisle.

# Be cautious on reporting ex-spouse to IRS

Q: Dear Rick: I recently read if you turn someone into the IRS for failing to pay their taxes you could get a reward. My ex-spouse hid some money from the IRS and didn't report it on our tax return. We have been divorced for about a year. I wouldn't mind turning him in and collecting on the reward. Is anything that I should be concerned with and can you tell me what I have to do to collect the

A: The IRS has a program that allows informants to receive up to 15 percent of the amount of the tax that has been underpaid.

In order to begin the process, you need to contact the IRS through the Web site at www.irs.gov or the fraud hotline (800) 829-0433.

In order to prevent someone from arbitrarily contacting the IRS with bogus claims, you must provide a variety of information when you contact the hotline or when you complete the form online. The information includes details about the

into consideration before you decide to contact the IRS.

You mentioned that you and your ex-husband filed joint tax returns. If you signed those tax returns you could have some liability to the IRS if they assess taxes and penalties. You need to be cautious. If you think you may have some liability you may want to seek the assistance of an attorney before you contact the IRS.

I recommend that people file honest and fair tax returns. I have no problem with people turning in tax cheats because when people aren't paying their fair share, it costs you and me more. However, there is a big

difference between someone who makes an honest mistake on their tax returns and someone who is cheating. Because consequences of falsely accusing someone of cheating on their tax returns can come back to haunt you, be sure to proceed with caution.





### STREETS OF GOLD

Hayes wrote the play as a tribute to Irish immigrants like Dovle who left their families behind in the 1860s for the town of Butte - known as a land where the "streets were paved with gold." They wound up working the copper mines until tragedy or labor disputes forced many of them out, and some left Montana for Michigan to work in the motor

Director Rogers is related to the main character Doyle. Her grandfather was one of the miners of Butte who headed east for a better life, and Doyle became his brother-in-law. Rogers refers to her grandfather as a "fierce advocate for the working man," through his role in the labor movement.

"The right to work, fair pay and safe working conditions were no doubt imbedded in his psyche by the injustices witnessed back in Butte," says Rogers, who also plays a role in the production.

Those injustices played out in the form of poor working conditions in 1917 that led to a horrible mining accident in Butte - 168 miners were killed and their deaths triggered a general strike. The walkout in turn led to the mysterious murder of a union organizer.

Married with two children, she said she also understands how important education is to the future


of Michigan. "Without our kids being properly educated we have no future in Michigan," McDonald said. "And, we can't let viable businesses go down the tubes." So, her platform consists





# Chiefs nab regional title

For most of the first half, Canton trailed Ann Arbor Huron in Thursday's Class A girls basketball regional final.

The River Rats were slashing their way to the Chiefs' basket on more than one occasion, scoring points, drawing fouls - or both.

But Canton finally pulled ahead late in the second quarter and totally took control after the break, registering a 54-37 triumph at Ann Arbor Pioneer for the program's first regional championship since 1994.

The 23-1 Chiefs now play 7 p.m. Tuesday against Midland Dow in a Class A quarterfinal at Davison.


"These are outstanding kids, hard workers, they deserve everything they're getting," said Canton head coach Brian Samulski, shortly after the team's second trophy presentation in less than a week. "They're getting it all because of all the hard work they put in throughout the spring, summer and fall."

It wasn't easy against Huron (21-4), who took an 11-7 lead after the first frame thanks to being able to get to Canton's rim for five layups. Quick, aggressive guards such as seniors Charlise Slater and DeVonyea Johnson (10 points) played havoc on the Chiefs.

It was a 17-13 lead for the River Rats with about five minutes left in the first half when Chiefs' sophomore spark plug guard Robyn Mack and her teammates cranked up the urgency dial.

Junior forward Sara Schmitt (10 points, four rebounds) sank two free throws and then twin sister Kari Schmitt (13 points, eight rebounds, two steals) nailed a jumper from the right flank to knot the score at 17-17

Then Mack pulled down a defensive rebound and sailed an outlet pass down court to the streaking Alyssa Cottrell and the

senior forward scored a layup to give Canton a 19-17 advantage.

"Robyn's been big for us all year," Samulski said. "That's what she does."

### STOPPING MEDICATION THEN STARTING IT AGAIN

The question arises concerning the effect on the arthritis of stopping arthritis

medication and later starting it again.

For most arthritis medications re-starting is straightforward; go back to the dosage and scheduling used previously. If a patient was on Enbrel 50 mg one time a week and can now afford to take the drug again, his doctor would prescribe 50 mg one time a week. The same holds for methotrexate: if the person previously took 15 mg/week, then restart the medication at 15 mg/week.





# 10 Careers That Didn't Exist 10 Years Ago

Every so often, you meet someone with a job title that makes you go, "Huh?" Either it's too technical to understand, too hard to describe or in some cases, people just may not have heard of it. But, why would someone not have heard about a job's existence?

Simple: All the changes that have come about in the past 10 years, from environmental policy to emerging technologies to the recession, have contributed to the creation of careers that never could have existed before.

Dom Sagolla, co-creator of Twitter, for example, recently made the switch from working in research and development at Adobe to creating iPhone applications with his company, DollarApp. Sagolla is also authoring a book, "140 Characters," which demonstrates the effect of hypertext on literature by redefining the concept of "the book" using Twitter and iPhone to start, he says. Could he have done this 10 years ago? Doubtful

"I've noticed that the best-of-breed iPhone apps incorporate Twitter and social networks, and the best Twitter apps seem to be on iPhone," Sagolla says. "That is no coincidence: The two came to prominence at roughly the same time. I've worked hard to position myself at intersection of those two industries, which form a vortex of attention and zeal that is unmatched.'

Here is a little information about 10 careers that didn't exist a decade ago:

Bloggers

What they do: Bloggers research and write blog posts in a conversational style to engage readers online. They work for themselves or for corporations, but their goal is the same: to develop and maintain blogs to promote a brand, mission or objective. Jimmy Moore, owner of "Livin La Vida Low-Carb," started his blog in April 2005 after losing 180 pounds. He wrote about it while still employed in a customer service position. He began blogging full time in October 2006. "My annual income increased from about \$25,000 a year to nearly \$60,000 now. I get to work out of my home, I've written two books, host my twice-weekly health podcast show on iTunes, do YouTube videos and so much more. This is literally my dream job," he says. ### 2. Community managers or content managers

What they do: Community or content managers are an extension of a typical marketing role, but on a more personal level. They serve as a liaison between the company and the public, managing a Web site that allows them to engage with community members and spread the word about the company.

This isn't a 9-to-5 job; it's one that involves being an extension of the brand almost 24/7, which is why loving the company and the job is a prerequisite."

3. Green funeral directors

What they do: Green funeral directors incorporate environmentally friendly options to meet the needs of families who want a green service.

"A green funeral may include any or all of the following basic options: no embalming or embalming with formaldehyde-free products; the use of sustainable biodegradable clothing, shroud or casket; using recycled paper products, locally grown organic flowers, organic food; car pooling;

natural setting; [or a] natural or green burial," says Elizabeth Fournier, a funeral home owner who works as a green mortician. "It's a fabulous opening for an individual who is green-minded in all aspects of their

4. Interior redesigners

What they do: Instead of spending \$500 on a new couch, why not use that money to hire an interior redesigner who will find new ways to decorate with items you already own? Interior redesigners remodel your home using the things you already have, either repurposing them for other uses or putting them in other rooms, etc. Jennifer Schweikert, owner of Just My Style by JMS, says, "In a time of 'less is more, people streamlining possessions, baby boomers and seniors downsizing, and the green movement of reduce, reuse and recycle, interior redesign is an up-andcoming field of work that addresses these needs in today's lifestyle and economy.'

5. Patient advocates

# Silverado Is A Great Truck To Pick Up

There's a reason the Chevrolet Silverado was named the North American Truck of the Year a few winters ago. It's because traditionally it has had enough capability and configurations to suit everyone from the working man to the off-road enthusiast.

The Silverado, a truck of the year in 2007, looks awesome and performs like a trooper.

The most economical Silverado is the WT, short for "work truck." The WT comes with an AM/FM stereo, satellite radio, vinyl-covered front seats, dual glove boxes, two auxiliary power outlets, one year of OnStar service and a fourspeed automatic transmission.

The 1 LT adds a cloth-covered front seat with lockable storage under the seat, a CD player and mp3 compatibility, power windows/locks/mirrors, remote keyless entry, auto-dimming rearview mirror with compass and outside temperature displays, 17-inch chrome-styled steel wheels and power folding and heated exterior mirrors.

The more upscale 2 LT comes with premium cloth front bucket seats with six-way power adjustment, dual-zone automatic temperature controls, audio controls mounted on the steering wheel, fog lamps, aluminum wheels, chromed bumper, and a spare tire lock.

The LTZ adds heavy-duty trailering equipment, an automatic locking rear differential, body-colored bumpers, reclining and heated leather front seats with 12-way power, an in-dash six-CD changer with Bose speakers, turn signal indicators in the exterior rearview mirrors and heated windshield washers


The three main packages for the Silverado are

the Z71 Off-Road Package, which gets you skid plates, off-road suspension and locking rear differential, the Safety Package that consist of power-adjustable pedals, side-curtain airbags and park assist and the Texas Edition. The Texas Edition is all about power, including a 5.3-liter V8, 20-inch alloy wheels, heavy-duty trailering package, locking rear differential and special

Notable stand-alone options are a navigation system, rear-seat DVD entertainment system, sunroof, power sliding rear window, cargo management system that features tracks with sliding hooks, rear park assist and an "EZ Lift" tailgate that requires very little effort to open and

Work trucks come equipped with a 4.3-liter V6 that is good for 195 horsepower. A 4.8-liter, 295 hp V8 powers the 1 LT trucks. A 5.3-liter V8 that makes 315 hp comes standard on 2 LT and LTZ pickups, with a FlexFuel version optional. Available engines on all Silverados but the work truck is the "Vortec Max" 6.0-liter V8 that makes 367 horsepower. With the optional Max trailering package, towing capacity is 10,500 pounds.

A four-speed automatic with a tow/haul mode is standard on all Silverado pickups, with a heavy-duty version mated to the 6.0-liter V8. Buyers have a choice of either rear- or four-wheel drive. The Work trim with 4 WD has a traditional floor-mounted selector for the transfer case. All other 4 WD trims have Autotrac, which features an automatic setting that shifts into 4 WD when wheel slippage is detected.

The Silverado 1500 LTZ gets 14 miles per gallon in the city and 19 miles per gallon on the highway.

The Silverado's suspension eats up bumps and potholes as the truck motors on with power and great handling. There is a minimum of body sway through the sharpest of turns.

Extended cab and crew cab models have back seats and power-operated rear side windows that lower completely. A power sliding rear window is also available on extended cab and crew cab configurations with LT and LTZ trim levels. The extended cab has rear access doors that open to 170 degrees to provide full access to the rear

The standard cab can be ordered with a standard 6-foot, 6-inch bed or a long 8-foot bed. The extended cab also offers a short 5-foot, 8-inch bed, which is the only bed available on the crew

Safety features on all of the Silverado models include dual front airbags, anti-lock brakes, a tire pressure monitoring system. Safety options include driver and front-seat side-impact air bags, side-curtain airbags, StabiliTrak electronic stability control and Ultrasonic rear parking assist.

Silverado models are very spacious inside, with a lot of storage capacity. This roominess is made possible by the "low and forward" instrument panels.

The Silverado features an interior that can be outfitted for work or pleasure.

The pure pickup interior includes two glove boxes in the dashboard. A single glove box is big enough to hold a pair of work gloves and a few small items. The 40/20/40-split front bench seat has a center section of the seat back that folds down to form a wide arm rest with lots of storage space. This interior also features interior large door handles that can easily be manipulated even while wearing bulky work gloves.

The luxury version interior includes bucket seats with a permanent center console with 20 liters of storage capacity. The center stack also puts climate and audio controls within easy view and reach of the front seat passenger. This version has a single glove box in the dash.

Extended cabs feature stadium-style seating with an elevated view for those sitting in the second row. The rear seats are split 60/40 so one side can be folded up for cargo while the other is used for seating.

With so many variations, the Silverado is a great buy no matter what you want to use your pickup for. Be warned, you may get dizzy deciding on exactly what kind of Silverado you


