Former lacrosse coach faces porn charges

Facing what his defense attorney called "crushing accusations," a Canton resident who coached the Plymouth High School girls lacrosse team and supervised a younger girls basketball league is facing a March 25 court hearing on charges he distributed child sexually abusive material on the Internet and used his computer to commit crimes.

Stephen Jay Nyquist, a 64-year-old divorcee and grandfather, stood mute Thursday as 35th District Judge Michael Gerou entered a notguilty plea for him on multiple child pornography-related felony charges.

"He's very scared and he's very concerned about the serious charges that have been brought against him," defense attorney John McWilliams said, standing outside the courtroom after Nyquist's arraignment.

McWilliams said Nyquist is "presumed innocent" on six counts of using his computer to

communicate with another to commit a crime, which carries a 10-year prison term; three counts of distributing child sexually abusive material, a seven-year felony; and three counts of possession of child sexually abusive material, a four-year felony.


MONTHS OF WATCHING

Authorities say the incidents happened from Jan. 30 through March.

Nyquist coached the Plymouth/Canton/Salem girls unified lacrosse team last school year and had just one practice this year as coach of Plymouth High's team. He is no longer coaching lacrosse or supervising the Community Education Girls Basketball League for girls in grades three through eight — a position he held since 2007.

The school district was "shocked and disappointed" to learn of Nyquist's arrest, accord-

Tried and true

Schools show reading really is fundamental

Kay Elaster knows kids hear the message so much, they might tend to tune it out. She understands it

sounds a little trite and a lot corny. But Elaster, Plymouth-Canton Community Schools ELA and social studies curriculum coordinator, knows one major thing about it.

Reading really is fundamental. That's why Plymouth-Canton, like school districts across the country,

puts together a massive effort to support March is Reading Month, the annual focus on getting students excited about reading.

"If you can't read, you can't access other areas of the curriculum," Elaster said. "I know it sounds trite, but reading really is fundamental."

Leisure Services keeps programs, slashes budget

Canton's acclaimed Leisure Services - an umbrella for a vast network of parks and recreation offerings - has slashed its costs by an estimated \$650,000 without making massive cuts to programs and services touted by local officials as crucial to this community's identity.

Scores of cost-cutting measures include reducing part-time workers, trimming energy costs, closing Summit on the Park an hour earlier, eliminating the Liberty Fest parade and negotiating employee con-

"We're looking at every way possible to save dollars," Leisure Services Director Debbie Bilbrey-Honsowetz said.

She and several of her high-ranking employees met for talks Tuesday evening with the Canton Township Board of Trustees, which holds the purse strings for local spending. Leisure Services has a nearly \$10.3 million budget for 2011 - an amount Greg Hohenberger, the department's supervisor of administration, said is about evenly split between user fees and general fund tax dollars.

Leisure Services workers perform another \$1.8 million in duties, such as building maintenance, that fall outside the scope of parks and recreation.

DEMANDING CUTS

Elected leaders have demanded spending cuts across all township departments to avert a menacing budget deficit that officials say could soar to \$15 million by next year. Canton has suffered steep losses

"The administration is going to make the presentation they made to us and they're going to take questions," Jackson said. "We want to let people know what situation we're in."

The "situation" to which Jackson referred is an estimated \$17 million deficit being projected for the 2011-12 school year. That number has been pushed upward by a variety of factors, including a state-mandated boost in retirement payouts, the loss of one-time funding such as the federal stimulus money and Gov. Rick Snyder's proposed \$470 cut in per-pupil spending

Among the options being considered by the board are the closing of an elementary school

and moving the Starkweather Educational Center, changes to the Talented and Gifted program, changes in busing and staff reductions.

The closing of an elementary school appeared to be the toughest to swallow for a board trying to keep cuts out of the classroom.

"I realize we have to take some bigger steps," Vice President Dianne Gonzalez said. "But this (closing a school) is going to be an emotional decision."

Jackson said several board members and Supt. Craig Fiegel were in Lansing this week for talks with the Michigan Association of School Boards, and heard enough to want to pay heed to board member Steven Sneideman's call for more public involvement.

"When we were in Lansing

we were told legislators weren't hearing as much about school issues as they were about other issues," Jackson said. "The consensus seemed to be it was either because the public didn't know or they didn't care, and they felt it was the former. We got together with administration and came up with this solution."

On Tuesday, Sneideman and others called for more public involvement as the district moves through the budget process (the board has to approve its budget by June 30).

"I have a concern about the public not being involved so far," Sneideman said. "Maybe over the next couple of months we can get them more involved. Last year, dealing with a \$7 million problem, we got them involved. This year, its a \$20 million problem and they should be involved. These are their schools."



Ficano taps Canton man for water board

Wayne County Executive Robert A. Ficano has nominated James G. Fausone of Canton for appointment to the Detroit Water and Sewage Board of Commissioners.

"Jim brings the skills, qualities and leadership needed to continue the progression already accomplished," Ficano stated. Police: Arrest part of porn 'epidemic'

A Canton man's arrest on charges he kept child pornographic images on his home computer and shared them online underscores what authorities say has become a growing problem on the Internet.

"It's probably up to epidemic proportions now," Michigan State Police Sgt. William Liczbinski said.

Liczbinski's remarks came as the multi-agency Michigan Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force had a press conference Thursday inside the Livonia-based MSP criminal investigation division, on the day Canton resident Stephen Jay Nyquist, 64, was arraigned in 35th District Court in Plymouth on 12 felony charges

involving child pornography. Liczbinski said authori-

ties are sifting through thousands of pornographic images they say they found on Nyquist's home computer some involving girls and boys Liczbinski said appear to range in age from 5 years old to pre-teen.

Authorities searched Nyquist's home Tuesday and arrested him amid allegations he shared child pornographic images with an undercover police officer in Burlington, Wis., who contacted the Michigan task force.

Michigan State Police Detective Lt. Thomas Kish said some of the children in the images are known to the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children.

Authorities have no evidence any of the images are of local

children, and they aren't aware of any sexual contact the defendant may have had with

"No local victims have been identified," Kish said.

Moreover, authorities said they weren't sure if Nyquist, while allegedly online with the undercover officer, believed he was communicating with an adult or a minor.

Liczbinski obtained a search warrant for Nyquist's home, and Kish said Nyquist cooperated with authorities by admitting he kept child pornography on his computer and traded images online.

Nyquist, a divorced grandfather, has lost his job as a coach for the Plymouth High School girls lacrosse team and as a supervisor of a basketball league for girls in grades three through eight.

Though he has no criminal history, Nyquist has been charged with six counts of using his computer to communicate with another to commit a crime, three counts of distributing child sexually abusive material and three counts of possession of child sexually abusive material.

Defense attorney John McWilliams said the allegations against Nyquist have caused "fear, concern and embarrassment" for a defendant who is "presumed innocent" as the case moves

ing to a statement released by Frank Ruggirello Jr., the district's community relations director. The district has informed Nyquist that he is no longer an employee and told him to stay off school property.

"It is important for the public to know that public schools perform background checks and fingerprint scans of all staff, including coaches, before they are hired," the statement said. "We can confirm that our human resources department did a background check and fingerprinted Nyquist. Our

files indicate that he had a spotless record and there was no reason for us not to hire him at the time.'

Law-enforcement authorities have confirmed Nyquist had no criminal history.

IN PLAIN SIGHT

Nyquist, dressed Thursday in blue jeans and a gray, longsleeved Army shirt, faces a March 25 preliminary exam to determine whether he should stand trial in Wayne County Circuit Court.

The alleged behavior of this defendant is that of a predator hiding in plain sight," Wayne County Prosecutor Kym Worthy said in a statement.

Gerou entered a not-guilty

plea for Nyquist and set a \$50,000/10 percent bond, which McWilliams said would be posted for the defendant's release.

However, Gerou ordered Nyquist not to use a computer or access the Internet and not to have contact with anyone under the age of 18.

According to the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office, Nyquist is accused of engaging in crimes using his computer while he was in contact with an undercover officer in Wisconsin who notified the Michigan Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force, which searched Nyquist's home Tuesday and arrested him.

The computer-based crimes

allegedly happened in the 1500 block of Hampshire, near Haggerty and Lilley, though authorities aren't aware of any direct sexual contact between Nyquist and children.

Some of Nyquist's friends watched Thursday as he was arraigned in Gerou's courtroom.

We know the charges are serious, and we are going to address the charges,' McWilliams told Gerou.

Sgt. William Liczbinski of Michigan's Internet task force told the judge Nyquist has no criminal history and no outstanding warrants for his

Gerou ordered Nyquist to seek psychiatric care within 24 hours after his release on bond.

Spanish teacher wins human rights award

Kate Hunt of Allen Park teaches her students Salsa and Merengue, but not in a dance studio. She teaches them to cook Hispanic recipes and sing Spanish songs, but she's not a culinary arts or music teacher.

Rather, Hunt teaches Spanish to high school students at Plymouth-Canton Educational Park.

But that's not all. Now in her 21st year at P-CEP, Hunt continuously develops and implements programs which enhance cultural awareness in the school and the community. That's why the Michigan Education Association is recognizing her with the Elizabeth Siddall Human Rights Award, to be presented April 29 at the MEA Human Rights & Excellence Awards Banquet in Lansing.

Hunt grew up in Livonia and was always interested in language.

"As a child, I remember creating my own language," Hunt said.

GROWING INTEREST

Her interest grew and by high

school, she took Spanish courses. She felt like she truly learned the language during her year abroad program with the University of Michigan/Cornell in Spain. Hunt then pursued and attained a degree in Spanish and Secondary Teaching Certificate at the University of Michigan. Hunt further expanded her experience and education with a summer abroad program in Mexico and attained a Master's degree in Foreign Language and post graduate work in Bilingual Education from Eastern Michigan University.

"I appreciate this recognition," said Hunt, "and I am proud to accept the award on behalf of all the amazing, talented teachers and heartfelt staff, principals and assistant principals in the Plymouth-Canton district who care. They should all receive an award. They all help me do what I do inside and outside the classroom."

Hunt teaches Spanish using the TPRS method (Teaching Proficiency through Reading and Story-Telling), which prioritizes the development of fluency over grammatical accuracy.

She believes this allows for more natural learning. She also likes to bring real-world experiences into the classroom, including Hispanic food, songs and dances.

One of Hunt's past programs was making a connection between her students and Hispanic senior citizens from Río Vista Senior Citizens Apartments. The students interviewed the seniors, shared Spanish and learned about the culture first hand. She believes this cultural awareness promotes acceptance of differences.

PEN PALS

A current program is "Amigo Secretos" whereby advanced students become pen pals in Spanish over the course of a year with first and second graders from Maybury Elementary in Detroit. This connection between the younger and older students is culminated when they meet in May and speak and read in Spanish.

Hunt believes the students learn more Spanish when they have to speak to native speakers and she inspires them not to fear speaking a second language.

Another ongoing program is one where Hunt encourages and assists students to teach Spanish, over a few weeks, to students at Hulsing Elementary in Canton.

Additionally, Hunt requires community service hours from her students, whereby they choose a project that brings the Spanish language or culture into the community. Students sometimes choose to tutor, make Hispanic food for their family or teach others Spanish. The class also participates in charities such as Latino Family Services and

Backpacks for Success, which helps needy children and families.

Her two majors goals are teaching a life-long lesson of tolerance by helping students and the community to understand and accept different cultures and teaching that bilingualism is an attainable goal that is worth it.

"I am reaching my dream to reach kids that I would not have reached before," Hunt said.

She'd like to continue to build and improve programs to reach out to the community and for students to learn about the culture around them and around the world. She wants them to take what they learn from the classroom and share it with others, even with something as simple as cooking a Hispanic dish or singing a Spanish song.

Through these types of programs and charities, Hunt believes her students are building connections to Hispanics in the community and enhancing international or intercultural awareness.

About 1,000 Japanese students attend public schools in the Metro Detroit area, includ-

ing Plymouth-Canton schools. The highest concentrations attend Novi and Walled Lake schools

The families who plan to return to Japan typically enroll them in Saturday Japanese schools. The Japanese School of Detroit, in Birmingham, was founded in 1973 with only 23 students. Now JSD teaches about 800 students, with the majority in elementary. JSD's goal is for the children to retain the Japanese language and

keep up with their peers back home.

"They [also] recover their much needed confidence and pride in themselves," said JSD Assistant Principal/ Consultant Keiko Hong.

In 2010, about 60 local educators attended the JSD Open House, which focuses on bridging the two cultures and helping local educators to better understand Japanese students. The educators observed JSD classes, participated in

activities and learned about the Japanese culture. They also heard a presentation by local participants of the International Educators to Japan Program.

The IEJ Program is a cultural exchange program sponsored by the Japanese Business Society of Detroit and coordinated by the Institute for International Studies and Training in Japan. Its goal is to help local educators gain insight and understanding of what life is like in Japan for

their Japanese students.

"What an amazing experience," said Shannon Hadley of Novi High School.


The biggest difference between American and Japanese schools, according to JSD Principal Kenji Kimishima, is the federal government's role. In Japan, the Ministry of Education creates a national curriculum, including what each school must teach, how to teach it and which books to use. In the United States,

each state determines its own curriculum.

curriculum.

Because of this, JSD is able to keep their students on the same track as their counterparts in Japan. Of course, Saturday school means these children have a week's worth of curriculum crammed into one day and weeklong homework assignments. This is in addition to the homework they already have from their American schools.

Out of This World" plan had a space-based theme. Allen Elementary used "The Wild Adventures of Reading" to talk about wildlife and reading, using author and wildlife photographer Nic Bishop (who spoke at several schools) as a presenter.

At Smith Elementary, teachers set up Camp Read-A-Lot for the 11th year, putting up tents, laying in a "lake" and using a variety of stations in an effort to energize kids about reading.

"The idea is to celebrate March is Reading Month with something that gets the kids excited about reading," said Karen Ensor, the media specialist at Smith. "It's not just your ordinary, 'come to the library to sit and read' activ-

The interactivity of the camp is also the backbone of its success, according to Ensor, because it's designed to hook students who might not necessarily be frequent readers.

"Kids who already read are going to keep reading," Ensor said. "This is for those kids who might need that extra

Jackson, who made a point to read to his own children when they were young, has already been a guest reader at Bentley and Tonda elementaries, and is set to read at Hoben Elementary Monday.

"I think it's important to be in the classroom, to be in touch with the students," said Jackson. "I read to my kids from the time they were real little, and I think it's important. This is a chance to do the same with the kids in the district. I get a kick out of it."

State Rep. Kurt Heise was one of the many celebrities who made appearances as guest readers. Heise, the Republican from Plymouth Township, read at both Allen and Isbister elementaries.

"As a dad, I know how important reading is to each child's development, self-confidence and future success," said Heise. "I enjoy this opportunity to read to students and encourage them. I hope this will become an annual tradi-

Elaster stressed the importance of parents reading to their children at home.

"One of the things you can do is read daily to children," she said. "Share all different types of books with them, explain that reading will take you through life. We read for different purposes, and there are different types of reading. Reading will take you wherever you need to go."

in property tax revenues and state-shared dollars.

Bilbrey-Honsowetz assumed the helm of Leisure Services in early January after former Director Ann Conklin retired, leaving a department that earned the 2008 Gold Medal award for U.S. communities of comparable size from the National Recreation and Park Association.

Moreover, Canton and Dearborn are the only two Michigan communities among 97 across the nation to become accredited by the Commission for Accreditation of Park and Recreation Agencies - a status Canton has enjoyed since 2003, Bilbrey-Honsowetz said.

Township Trustee Todd Caccamo, who last year called for deeper cuts to Canton Leisure Services, said elected officials still need to find ways to trim costs for what he called non-essential services.

"But I think the new director is a breath of fresh air, and I think she's going after things with an open mind," he said Thursday.

REIN IN SPENDING

Amid budget woes, local leaders moved swiftly to rein in spending across all departments after officials such as Finance Director Rick Eva began a multiyear financial analysis that revealed the severity of looming money problems.

Local officials have said they can't allow budget problems to dismantle local programs that have made Canton a draw for residents and businesses.

Leisure Services is a key part of what makes Canton Canton," township Trustee John Anthony said Tuesday.

Gregg King, Canton facili-

ties supervisor, said the catchphrase he has imparted to employees is to safeguard pennies and transform them into dollars - a message officials say has become vital as the township has suffered revenue losses amounting to \$8.6 million since 2007.

Hohenberger said Leisure Services has trimmed spending by an estimated \$650,000 for 2011 without gutting critical programs and services.

"We want to keep the core services but trim where we can," he said.

ELIMINATING STAFF

Leisure Services has 51 fulltime employees - down several positions from past years, Hohenberger said. The department has about 300 part-timers, though their numbers and the hours they work have been reduced as the township has sought to rely more heavily on unpaid volunteers. A decision was made to eliminate seasonal staff from October through March.

Other cost-saving measures include reducing grass-cutting efforts; implementing new or higher user fees for certain programs and services; closing off unused parking lots in winter and not plowing them; not filling certain jobs that became vacant; and repairing more township equipment in-house.

Despite budget cuts, Leisure Services officials have actually added certain recreation offerings. Outside grants allowed the installation of seven wooden pedestrian bridges linking the Lower Rouge River Recreation Trail from Canton Center to I-275. And, grants and fundraisers have led to a dog park that Abe Vinitski, supervisor of parks, golf and facilities maintenance, said is scheduled to open May 20 off Denton Road north of Cherry Hill.

St. John's hosts organist performance Plenty to consider when researching mutual funds

Q: Dear Rick: I am a mutual fund investor. I've been investing in mutual funds for more than 20 years. I do my own research and I have my own criteria for selecting funds. When I pick a fund, my main focus is on performance. I generally look at a fund's threeyear track record. I've been pretty **Money Matters** successful in selecting funds, but I'm curious whether there is one Rick Bloom thing that you look at, other than performance, in selecting funds.

A: There are several factors I use when selecting a mutual fund. Performance is ultimately the most important factor. Other factors, however, are equally as important.

Even when considering performance, it's more than just looking at a three-year track record. I look at three-, fiveand 10- year track records. I believe looking at longer periods of time can ensure that you have a more complete picture of a fund.

When doing research, I spend quite a bit of time focusing on the fund's management team. I generally don't want to see a fund that has constant turnover in management. I have found that mutual funds that are able to keep management in place generally will be less volatile than funds which are constantly changing up their team. I also prefer funds that are managed by a team vs. an individual. I have found that funds that use the team approach are better able to manage their way through the crazy gyrations of the market.

Another factor I focus on with regards to the management team is whether members are investing their own money in the fund. I prefer mutual funds where management has money invested. My experience has been that when

ed, he/she is

more sensitive

manager to have all his/her money invested in their own fund or fund family. However, I want to see more than just a token investment.

There are literally tens of thousands of different types of mutual funds, therefore you must have a process to sift through them to select the most appropriate fund for your situation.

We invest money to make money, so performance is paramount. However, it is not the only consideration, particularly when you only look at short periods of time. Investors need to be focused on many issues, including corporate governance. I want to make sure that when I invest my hard-earned money in a company - such as a mutual fund - that it plays by the rules. I don't want to invest in companies that play loosey-goosey with the rules.

One last note, there's something even more important than picking the right investment and that is to make sure you have the right allocation for your situation.

Paralyzed vets open fund with foundation

The Michigan Paralyzed Veterans of America has established an endowment fund with the Canton Community Foundation to create a planned giving program for the organization with some 550 members.

Michael Harris, MPVA executive director, said his board of directors chose the Canton Community Foundation for its expertise in nonprofit planned giving.

"This is one of the areas in which we are lacking," said Harris, a Westland resident. "People want to donate to us and we need to get our name out there."

Creation of the endowment is a positive move for both organizations. It broadens both organizations' exposure with donors and the public. The potential for collaboration between the foundation

and the MPVA is expected to strengthen both organizations through projects both can complete for southeast Michigan.

"It assures donors who support the MPVA that their funds are being managed and reported on properly by the foundation," said CCF board member Jim Fausone, an attorney and partner with Fausone Bohn, LLP, and Legal Help for Veterans, PLLC.

ANNUAL INTEREST

Through the Canton foundation, the MPVA will receive an annual distribution from the interest on the endowment to use for its purposes. The MPVA is strengthened by investing its money and receives a greater return than if they invested on their own, said Joan Noricks, foundation president.

MPVA donors also receive a state tax credit because the organization's endowment is placed with a certified community foundation, Noricks

"This is an example of why we exist," Noricks said. "We have been moving forward with this educational program letting nonprofits know the type of services we can provide them. This is proof that it works"

The new partnership followed the foundation's successful Veterans Educational Summit - "Navigating the Waters of VA Benefits" in

September. A well-known veterans' advocate, Harris spoke at the event about available social services for veterans.

Working together again on a veterans' summit in 2011 is a potential project for the foundation and the MPVA, Noricks

SERVING VETERANS

A former Marine, Harris leads the Novi-based MPVA that serves disabled veterans. His organization assisted veterans receive some \$10 million in benefits in 2010. "We are a small organization in numbers, but we have a loud voice," Harris said.

In addition to working with veterans to obtain benefits, the MPVA is a advocate for veterans and even non-veterans who are disabled or paralyzed to provide the highest quality of life. That includes working

with companies and organizations to ensure that access and other civil rights are provided for people with spinal cord injuries and other disabilities.

Harris has worked with the developers of Comerica Park, the River Walk Conservancy and the University of Michigan to provide access. The U-M stadium now provides 329 seats for people in wheelchairs.

"It's about finding the right people who have an understanding of what it means to be in a wheelchair," Harris said.

Approximately 1,200 spinal cord injuries are reported annually in the United States, with approximately 200-300 reported in Michigan. Membership in the MPVA is open to all veterans with disabilities. Veterans' disabilities need not be service related,

Comic Opera Guild brings 'Grand Duchess' to the stage

It's not often that a performer finds the "perfect" role. If it happens early on, it may be the only role an actor is known for, as in the case of former Ann Arborite Tom Hulse's "Mozart" (in Amadeus) and Christopher Reeve's "Superman." If it happens later, people wonder where the actor has been all this time.

Barbara Scanlon has been everywhere. A veteran performer on Broadway, she spent many years on the road, crossing the country in tours of shows such as "Phantom of the Opera," in which she played roles such as Carlotta and Madame Giry. The international tour of "Evita" broadened her career horizons to include a large portion of the globe.

Possessing a soprano voice of surprising range and clarity, Scanlon can navigate a great variety of roles, as she has done with the Comic Opera Guild. Her first role with the company was that of Ruth in 2007's "Pirates of Penzance," a comic character in the low mezzo range. The following year, she sang the role of Madame Pompon in "The Fortune Teller," in the high soprano range.

PERFECT PLATFORM

The Guild's upcoming production of Offenbach's operetta "The Grand Duchess of Gerolstein" provides a platform within which Scanlon can use her entire vocal and comedic range at the same time. Written for Hortense Schneider, a huge star in Paris in the 19th century, the role

of the Grand Duchess has been embraced by many of the world's most famous divas, especially later in their careers.

"The benchmark of the role is the ability to command both the top and the bottom of the female vocal register and be a fine actress at the same time," said Thomas Petiet, who will direct the show. "Not an easy task, but one that Barbara Scanlon accomplishes neatly."

This production of The Grand Duchess will be a premiere in Michigan, and the introduction of a new English version. Written in 1867, the show poked fun at all things military and was a great hit not only in Paris, but in England as well. Ironically, the Franco-Prussian war broke out three years later, and the work was banned due to the French defeat in that war. It is unfortunate that the generals could not see the wisdom of the show and thereby avoid a useless war. Today, Petiet said, its message still rings loud and clear, even though presented in a light and melodic way.


PLOT THICKENS

Fritz, stripped of his title, winds up happily in the arms of his girl friend, Wanda, and all realize that in the end, military victories or losses don't change things that much.



Governor's visit brings out boos and red-shirted UAW members

Greeted by a chorus of boos from UAW members, Gov. Rick Snyder cited Ford's new Michigan Assembly Plant as a shining example of the type of change for a better future that he wants for Michigan.

A 21-year plant employee and UAW representative, Dwayne Walker said he found the comparison ironic - very ironic in light of Snyderbacked legislation to allow emergency financial managers to have expanded powers that include voiding collective bargaining agreements.

"He had his say so. We like to think that that (the new plant) was all in place under Gov. (Jennifer) Granholm and President (Barack) Obama," said Walker, a Westland resident. "He (Snyder) showed up at the right time. We're very pleased to be up and running. It's been kind of a sigh of relief you never know how these things will turn out."

Walker was one of 1,600 UAW workers at the new plant launch celebration clad in red T-shirts that read "Solidarity in Wisconsin Day." The booing of Snyder subsided a bit after Bill Johnson, UAW Local 900 Wayne Assembly chairman, called on workers to be courteous to the speakers.

"We all came here to send a message and the message has been sent. Let's give each of the speakers the respect for their positions," said Johnson, a Westland city councilman.

Message to Snyder aside, there was a celebratory mood as Ford officially launched its redesigned Ford Focus and the Michigan Assembly Plant, retooled from a truck assembly plant with a \$550 million investment from Ford Motor Co.

"I'm so proud of our team. Not only did they build these beautiful vehicles, but also a new facility, new layout and a new product," Wayne Assembly Plant Manager Rob

Webber said.

Ford executives attending the launch included Mark Fields, Ford president of the Americas, who lauded the workers who transformed the plant into a modern facility which will be able to build up to four different vehicles on two platforms.

"You are putting out what will be a smash hit in the marketplace. This is no ordinary product. This is the next generation of the vehicle," Fields

said, referring to the new Focus. "Sales of the existing Focus, built next door, were up 42 percent this year. With the Fiesta, that has lifted our share of the small car market to 6 percent."

With gas prices on the increase, the 40-miles-pergallon Focus will be popular with drivers who won't find compromises made in return for economy, Fields said.

By 2012, the Focus Electric,

along with hybrid and plug-in versions of the Ford C-MAX small minivan, will be assembled at the plant. Ford also is investing \$450 million at the plant and at other locations in Michigan to develop the Focus Electric and other electric vehicles.

"I want to thank you for the hard work of the Michigan Assembly Plant team. I'm proud this was done through American investment and UAW jobs," Fields said. "Who says we can't compete when we're competitive?'

Wearing a green tie in honor of St. Patrick's Day and no sign of red apparel, Snyder said that he was glad to be at the plant to celebrate the success.

"As I travel around the state talking about what we need to do, I use Ford as a role model. It was a broken model and it needed to be reinvented, and the company that stood up the most and has done the best has been Ford Motor Company," Snyder said. "All of you recognize the need to change. Change is hard. Michigan Assembly is a great role model."

New plant is 'shining example' of One Ford

Top Ford and UAW officials joined Michigan Assembly plant workers Thursday to launch a new vehicle and a new plant that is expected to keep jobs in Wayne.

"I want to say thanks for giving us the opportunity to build the best car in the world with the new Focus. Thanks to the leadership of the UAW and Ford for giving us the opportunity," said Jim Stockdale, a UAW Local 900 chairperson. "This will prove that we can build the best car in the world, profitable and stylish."

Aside from some loud booing of Gov. Rick Snyder and less spirited boos aimed at Wayne County Executive Robert Ficano, what Ford called a launch celebration was just that. Ford and UAW officials were effusive in praising the cooperative effort that resulted in the \$550 million makeover of the plant, which will be producing an expanded lineup by

"This started a little over two years ago when the truck plant closed. People thought that was the end of the world," said Bill Johnson, UAW Local 900 Wayne Assembly chairperson. "You can't ask for a better group of folks. A lot of people will take credit for this, but you are the superstars."

But according to John Fleming, Ford executive vice president for global manufacturing/labor affairs, it wasn't just another product or plant launch. The Wayne plant

was described as Ford's most flexible with two platforms that will be able to build four models, making it able to adjust to the market without down time.

This is a shining example of One Ford in action - one team, one plan, one goal," he said. "We've increased communication and collaboration for the team. It's definitely not business as usual. Each plant will assemble the Focus in the same way with the same parts in the same order. We're concerned about being competitive worldwide wherever we sell vehicles."

Built on a common global platform - German, Russian and Chinese Ford plants will be on board in 2012 - the Focus will share 80 percent of the same parts in an effort to reduce development, engineering and marketing costs.

"Only 18 months ago, we stood here looking at an old obsolete dark plant talking about building a new plant," said Jim Tetreault, Ford vice president of North American manufacturing. "None of us can remember taking a whole plant of people to a new plant loaded with a new product."

This reinforced what I know - given the proper tools, U.S. workers can accomplish anything," Settles said. "What you have done here is what America needs."



Beginning band starting to find its own tune

When a friend called to see if she knew anyone who'd be interested in a part-time job working at Evola Music in Canton and directing the New Horizons Band headquartered there, Lauren Erickson knew just who she'd recommend.

That was two years ago, and now Erickson is having the time of her life directing the band, originally designed as a place where adult novice musicians could learn to play. In those two years, the band has grown from four members who had a lot to learn to 17 members who are getting pretty good.

"When I took over they were definitely a beginning band," said Erickson, who earned a degree in music education, with emphasis on band and conducting, from the University of Illinois-Urbana Champaign. "This band has progressed to an intermediate band level, to the point where we're not really able to take in people at the beginning band level because the music is too hard. It freaks (beginners) out, they think, 'Oh, I can't play that. I can play Mary had a Little Lamb.'

The Canton New Horizons Band is patterned after others under the international umbrella of the organization founded by Dr. Roy Ernst, who wanted to create a band open to adults who had "played an instrument in elementary school however many years ago," Erickson said, and who wanted to take it up again but needed a band situation that's really more of a beginning band setting for adults. The concept, according to Erickson, "is growing by leaps and bounds."

Evola Music jumped in as the sponsor for New Horizons Band of Canton. The music store provides rehearsal space, support the band financially in

terms of discounts on instruments and music, and the band's concerts are held there.

Patty Jones had the director's position now held by Erickson before accepting a full-time job leading the Lowery Organ department at Evola. It was Jones who initially asked Erickson to suggest a replacement. She said supporting the band is just good public relations.

"It's a great community thing," said Jones. "It gives adults who always wanted to be in a band, but never could be, a chance to be part of something. We're happy to play a part in that."

Erickson said the program New Horizons offers stands apart from other community bands, which are often audition-only and require more of a commitment than some of these beginning adults can make. There are similar New Horizons bands in Waterford and in Saline.

Instead, New Horizons offers the opportunity to meet one night a week in eight-week sessions in what is "really geared as a learning environment" where Erickson not only teaches instrumentation, but also incorporates music theory, lessons about compos-

"The band members leave after their performances feeling exhilarated," Erickson said. "They're proud of their accomplishment, and they're extremely pleased their music provides enjoyment for other people. Some of this community outreach is striking a chord with our band members in a really positive way."

The next goal for the band is to grow. Erickson said she'd like to see it get to some 25 members, though not much larger because of space considerations. Regardless, the band will continue to expand its

musical horizon. "We are a small-time band with a very big heart," Erickson said. "We'll play for whomever wants to listen.'



Veterinarian helps put red-tailed hawk back in the air

This weekend is expected to be Stella's Independence Day.

And Dr. Kevin Smyth of Morrison Animal Clinic in Garden City, and his family, planned to celebrate the red-tailed hawk's release into Maybury State Park in Northville.

Stella was injured last November on a road leading into a golf course downriver, intent on catching some prey and apparently oblivious to the car which struck her. She broke her right wing and

"The biggest issue is traffic," Smyth said. "Hopefully, she learned her lesson from a car."

Stella is about a year old and besides repairing her broken wing, Smyth also attached new feathers to the shafts, using a piece of bamboo and epoxy. A falconer downriver assisted him with the hawk.

Earlier this year, Smyth received his certification as a wildlife rehabilitator from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and the federal U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. His federal license makes him unique in Wayne County.

MAKING REPAIRS

For weeks, his family watched the veterinarian, a raptor rehabilitator, work with the red-tailed hawk to repair her right wing and broken feathers.

The Plymouth Township resident has a flight pen at his home where Stella's flying has

"She is in really good flying shape," Smyth said. "She carries both wings just about equally.

In all birds of preys, females are significantly larger than the male, Smyth said. The brick-and cream-colored bird weights 21/2 pounds, down from three pounds and three

"She was overweight," he said. "We fed her a lot while she was recuperating. Housed outside, when it was zero or below, we wanted to make sure that she had enough calories. We started gradually cutting back on her food and flying her more and more. She is at a good weight now."

Stella eats mostly frozen mice and occasionally a road kill squirrel.

"Broken to the glove," as Smyth puts it, Stella knows that he won't hurt her when she perches on his glove.

Raptor rehabilitation is a field of veterinary medicine dealing with care for sick or injured birds of prey, with the goal of returning them to the wild. Since raptors are highly specialized predatory birds, special skills, facilities, equipment, veterinary practices and husbandry methods are neces-

Raptor rehabilitators often use falconry techniques or gain assistance from falconers to exercise the birds prior to their release, as their muscles often atrophy during their convalescence.

LICENSING REQUIRED

In the United States, a license is required to possess any bird which falls under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act of 1918. The rehabilitators are also under some scrutiny from their state wildlife management authority as well as the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Raptors that cannot be released back into the wild are sometimes used for education or transferred to licensed falconers. Some states require that birds that cannot be placed or released be euthanized. Most states do not allow rehabilitators to keep raptors under their rehabilitation permit for more than a few months.

No funds for raptor rehabilitation are provided by the U.S. government, although it claims ownership of all raptors protected by the MBTA.

Coop is a Cooper's hawk which Smyth also is also rehabilitating. He suffered a concussion when he flew into a garage window in Westland. The Westland family had watched him around their house for about two years, Smyth said.

He is an adult bird, at least two years old, and his recovery has been more difficult.

"He has a lot of neurological

issues," Smyth said. "His balance isn't very good."

Coop is being fed by syringe special soft veterinary food. "About 90 percent of their food is other birds," Smyth said. "These birds are great fliers but, for whatever reason, Cooper's hawks fly into windows a lot. They catch

other birds in flight. They are commonly seen around bird feeders. They are not an endangered species, but they are somewhat uncommon in this area.'

If Coop recovers, he will go back to his home area in Westland from which he came. The residents who watched him for so long around their home spotted the injured bird




Howell knocked home his second goal of the night after Ferriss slid him a pass from behind the goal to earn his third point of the night.

Detroit Cup promotes dodgeball

In 2008 Janigan, with the help of some former tournament organizers, decided to put together a tournament by drawing on what had worked in the past: lots of games and standard rules.

And so the annual Detroit Dodgeball Cup was born.

The tournament eventually got so big that Janigan had to find bigger facilities. Last year, the event moved to the Total Sports Complex in Novi to accommodate 37 teams, including squads comprised of Michigan State, Central Michigan, and Grand Valley State college dodgeball players.

This year the event hosted teams from Michigan,
Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and
Canada. In the end, Western
Springs Dodgeball of Western
Springs, Illinois defeated
mid-Michigan-based team
Final Justice to be crowned
the 2011 Detroit Dodgeball
Cup Champions in the men's
division. Final Justice won the
2010 Detroit Dodgeball Cup.

"We traveled to the Detroit Cup because we were looking a for a big tournament that had a lot of talent and would provide a good challenge for us, and we found both," Western Springs Dodgeball player Brett Furlong said. "We play in several tournaments in the Midwest and this was one we had on our calendar for a long time."

The cup was more than just a chance for Western Springs, Final Justice and others to showcase their old school playground skills as proceeds from the event benefited inner city families, Janigan said.

"The other great thing now is other venues are seeing the success of the Detroit Dodgeball Cup and have been calling me about running dodgeball tournaments for them," Janigan said.

Reaching out

Jewish, Palestinian women find trust, friends through dialogue

Irene Butter is a Holocaust survivor, having been in a concentration camp in the Netherlands and then in

Bergen-Belsen. "I made it to Switzerland," the 80year-old Ann Arbor resident said. adding she then lived in northern Africa before coming to the U.S. She was reunited with her mother and brother, but the pain of losing her father to illness remains.

She was among four Ann Arbor women - Be Kaimowitz, Wadad Abed and Huda K. Rosen - who spoke to the Plymouth-Canton Branch, American Association of University Women (AAUW) Thursday, March 17. The women are members of Zeitouna, a group that brings Jewish and Palestinian women together. It's named for the Arabic word for olive, both a symbol of peace and used for opposition purposes in the Middle East in cutting down olive trees.

"Our voice is international," said Abed, a Palestinian who comes from a Christian family.

The women began meeting in 2002 and now speak to a number of church, school and synagogue groups. They showed the trailer of their film, Refusing to be Enemies, at the AAUW meeting last week.

The group began around the time of the second intifada in Palestine, said Butter. "Things were getting very turbulent and hostile there," she said.

She was in a group of Jewish women who had children in Israel and met for coffee. They wanted to begin a dialogue with Palestinian

The first efforts didn't all suc-

ceed, but the core group of women remains, six Jewish and six Palestinian. Butter knew Abed from a similar dialogue group and Zeitouna began.

HUMAN PERSPECTIVE

All the women are U.S. citizens with Judaism, Christianity and Islam represented. Butter was born in Germany and has been in the U.S. most of her life.

Rosen, a Muslim, came from Haifa, Israel, in 1962, Abed in 1968 from Mablus, Palestine.

"We're invited to organizations like this, to schools, to universities," Kaimowitz said. "Part of our purpose is to be a model. It puts a human face on everything."

That means listening and trusting each other, Abed said. The women, ranging in age from early 30s to 80, found "We could learn from each other and we would broaden our perspective," Butter said.

The women saw a film of a similar dialogue in California, but noted only men spoke while women served food. They chose a women's group and meet at each other's home every other week, one taking the role of "topic

There are also such jobs as facilitator and scribe, and they begin with a meal. Rosen noted the women have larger retreats.

"What we like to stress is the importance of talking to others, dialogue," she said, "not to speak over



each other and to be arguing. We're not trying to persuade each other 'I'm right and you're wrong.

Kaimowitz called herself a "standard garden variety Jew" whose family was Zionist. After the 1967 war when Israel became an occupier, her views changed.

Abed said discussing Zionism was hard: "You don't get to the second sentence because you're ready to kill one another." It helped to frame topics in terms of their own narratives, which enhanced trust.

'That's how our conversations have become richer and richer," she said.

FIRSTHAND VIEW

Some of the women visited the region in 2006, and noted how difficult it is for such mixed groups to travel together if not foreigners. 'Jews aren't allowed to go to the West Bank," Butter said.

Her daughter went to Israel to find her Jewish identity and ended up marrying a Palestinian Muslim. They have two daughters.

Through them I have learned firsthand what this conflict is all about," said Butter, who wants acceptance for her grandchildren. They are the ones that can bring us forward. Maybe it's possible in this country but over there it's extremely difficult.'

The women touched on the current uprising in Libya and recent ones in Tunisia and Egypt. "We all grew up looking up to Egypt," said Abed,

explaining the country was a leader

The involvement of U.S. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger during the Nixon administration brought a sense of defeatism, she said. That has changed with recent developments and the realization that it is possible to stand up to a government that's

"There was a sense of pride in every single Arab heart," due to Egypt's uprising, she said.

Rosen's husband was surprised the women could discuss their fears. "He said, 'I don't think men will ever admit to fears." Other topics Zeitouna has covered include loss, displacement, peace and forgiveness.

We kind of cling to each other because within our own groups it's not easy," Kaimowitz said

The women of AAUW, about 20 that night, were impressed with the program held at the Plymouth Community Arts Council's center.


'It's been marvelous, such great dialogue," said program co-chair Shirley Zaetta of Plymouth Township. "Maybe there is a possibility for peace around the world." The retired Garden City elementary teacher liked the focus on dialogue and how each woman felt. "I thought it was outstanding," said

member Dorothy Grant of Plymouth Township, who teaches college reading and critical thinking at Schoolcraft College. "It really opened my eyes to so many things. It really touched my heart.'

Grant plans a trip to Israel soon with a Catholic group, and was pleased to learn so much.

Faith-based group helps girls, women learn and prosper

Sister Maureen Mulcrone and colleague Amy Amador, a social worker, brought an important message to Plymouth March 15.

The women run the Mercy Education Project, based in Detroit's Corktown and serving girls and women of southwest Detroit. Sister Mulcrone, a Sister of Mercy, told of Melissa, who dropped out in ninth grade, as she spoke to Plymouth A.M. Rotarians.

"She had a child and then she had another child," Sister Mulcrone said. Embarrassment came when Melissa couldn't help her children with schoolwork.

"We taught this girl that her

mom could also get help at Mercy Education Project," she said.

Felicia came from an abusive home and ran away. She lived on the street and was in and out of prison before her judge helped her get to Mercy Education Project.

"A few years later, her judge came to her graduation program at Mercy Education Project," Sister Mulcrone said. Another girl made it to 12th grade thanks to an aunt's loving care, but had to drop out to care for the aunt when she got cancer.

"We are helping people whose lives have been chaotic, who have had an experience of failing over and over," Sister Mulcrone said. That includes women who've failed the GED test because their academic skills aren't up to ninth-grade level.

Amador, who holds a master's degree in social work and is executive director, described the transportation offered to participants, as well as hot meals and 65 minutes of oneon-one tutoring for the girls, age 6 to approximately 14. There are more than 70 girls in tutoring during the school year.

There's also an Emerging Leaders program in the summer held at the University of Detroit Mercy. Participants visit other colleges and places of employment over four

STRESSING EDUCATION

One young woman got a full ride to the University of Toledo, but didn't want to leave her family and didn't go. Parents are now involved to

encourage participation and higher education.

Amador noted almost 94 percent of residents in Southwest Detroit lack a ninth-grade education. "That's one of the things we're trying to make a dent in," she said.

The facility, located near the old Tiger Stadium, has a waiting list of some 90-120 adults, due to capacity. Volunteers are always welcome in a variety of roles.

Some of the women come from Freedom House, a facility for political refugees seeking asylum, said Sister Mulcrone, director of development and marketing for MEP. MEP started in 1992 with 14 young students and one staffer.

"We almost immediately got into offering programs for women as

They've just started Open Doors for women who've been in the criminal justice system, helping with resumes and job searches.

The MEP "Doorway to the Future" Dinner will be held May 5 as a benefit to support the faith-based group's work. Graduation is also held, complete with caps and gowns.

"No limos or prom dresses, but when you see mom graduate, that's a big deal," said Sister Mulcrone.

"This is a way I can help and put food in hands that need it the most.'

He contacted Gleaners for advice and said Wayne Metro Gardens Program offered the use of tilling equipment.

"We need to work fast in getting this set up so we can get land and manpower," he

He hopes to recruit three volunteer leaders per garden site and be ready to break ground by April 20 and plant hardy seeds by May.




hood that was found with a rubber band tightened around its tail.

FIBROMYALGIA

The condition Fibromyalgia is a good example of how a diagnosis can cause more difficulties for a patient then not knowing what the problem is.

An individual with Fibromyalgia may see a different doctor, and tell that physician the fibromyalgia related difficulties experienced at the moment. That doctor may say: "You don't have Fibromyalgia, you have Chronic Fatigue Syndrome." Or the second doctor, on examining the patient, finds areas of pain in particular muscles and concludes that the problem is not Fibromyalgia but is Myofascial Pain Syndrome.

Both physicians are correct. Fibromyalgia has the ability to change its expression times, the condition will show itself as pressure points in the elbows, shoulders, back and legs. At times, a patient with Fibromyalgia cannot sleep for more than one or two hours at a time; then the person may go for weeks sleeping all the time, a feature of Chronic Fatigue Syndrome.

Current thinking is that the source of Fibromyalgia, Myofascial Pain Syndrome and Chronic Fatigue Syndrome is a malfunctioning pain center in the midbrain area. The manifestations of dysfunction vary. At first pressure point pain dominates, later on, fatigue asserts itself, at other times, muscle groups take on an aching quality that

No laboratory test can identify which aspect of Fibromyalgia is foremost at any one time. Some doctors make a distinction between presentations and other physicians, including me, do not. To understand their fibromyalgia problem, a patient needs to now both the diagnosis and the doctor.





10 Things Smart Job Seekers Do

What separates the smart job seeker from others looking for employment? Oftentimes, it is one of these 10 things:

1. They realize a potential job lead could be anywhere.

Smart job seekers aren't afraid to mention occupational aspirations to their book club, their parents' friends or their dentist. (One never knows whose golf partner might be the ticket to getting a foot in the door.) Caroline Ceniza-Levine, a partner at SixFigureStart -- a career coaching firm in New York City comprised of former Fortune 500 recruiters -- recommends putting your LinkedIn public profile hyperlink in your automatic e-mail signature. "This is an elegant way to attach your résumé to every correspondence you send. Even friends who think they know you may click through to your profile, learn more about you and perhaps think of you for a job or lead that they might have overlooked."

2. They surf job boards for more than just open positions.

Ceniza-Levine calls job boards "goldmines" for research. "You might see companies you didn't know before -- add these to your list of targets. You might see the same requirements again and again -- this indicates a standard for the job you want, so incorporate these

items into your pitch and cover letters."

3. They put adequate time and effort into their applications.

"Spend time to make your résumé the best possible written advertisement of you," says Lisa Quast, author of "Your Career, Your Way!" and founder of Career Woman Inc., a Seattle-based career development consulting

company. "Analyze the job requirements against your own skills and abilities, and customize your cover letter." Obviously, all correspondence should be free of

errors and typos.

And before sending off the application packet, look at the job posting one last time to ensure all desired material is included.

4. They do their homework.

It seems logical to smart applicants to know something about potential employers. From Googling a company to checking out its financial statements, they learn what they can -- and use the info to enhance their correspondence.

5. They know employers do their homework, too.

"According to [a 2010] Coremetrics [study], 75 percent of companies require recruiters to research job applicants online, so you'll want to

be sure you know what they'll find," states Sherrie Madia, coauthor of "The Online Job Search Survival Guide." Besides thinking twice about what you choose to post, she suggests doing a Google search on your name. If you find something undesirable, try to have it removed.

6. They make their value known quickly.

"An employer gives each résumé about a threesecond window of time before he decides to either 'delete' or read further," says Patrice Rice, author of "How to Interview" and president of the recruiting firm Patrice & Associates in Dunkirk, Md. A smart applicant answers the

"What can you do for me?" question right off the bat with a summary of strongest accomplishments at the résumé's

7. They look and act like a professional.

Simple but effective: A smart applicant arrives on time, dresses appropriately, both talks and listens, displays confidence and minds his manners.

8. They show that they want this

Smart job seekers are not "tire kickers." They focus on the needs of the employer and demonstrate how they are perfect for this particular position.

"Show enthusiasm during the job

interview," says Rice. "Always make certain that the company you're interviewing with feels as if it is your first choice, no matter what other companies are involved in your job search."

9. They don't get ahead of themselves.

As much as she may be dying to know about promotions, raises and vacation time, a smart candidate doesn't jump the gun and tackle these issues during the first interview. She focuses on landing the position, then on whether the package is suitable.

10. They ask for the position, follow up and thank.

"As strange as it sounds, you need to ask for the job," says Catherine Jewell, author of "New Résumé New Career: Get the Job You Want with the Skills and Experience You Already Have." "At the end of the interview, sum up your strengths, tell the interviewer that you are excited about the position and say, 'I would really like to contribute to this company. I am hoping you select me."

Then, a smart interviewee keeps his name in the game with a follow-up note reiterating interest and offering thanks -- knowing that a great last impression can seal the deal!
