## Leaders wary on personal property tax proposal

City and township leaders in western Wayne County are wary of an eight-bill package introduced in the state Senate to reform personal property taxes without a solid plan to replace the lost revenue for local services.

The result would be a devastat-

ing blow for local governments already forced to slash budgets due to recent cuts in state-shared revenue and decreased property values.

A complex reimbursement formula proposed after the initial legislation does little to ease fears, local officials said.

The bill, SB 1072, would only reimburse local governments when the lost personal prop-

erty tax revenue exceeds 2 percent of the government funds received. Distressed communities would receive a 1-percent threshold.

The package of bills recently passed the Senate, but the state House is not expected to pick up the discussion until this fall.

"I'm not comfortable with anything. Some cities are more reliant on personal property tax

than other bedroom communities. There's an inequity here. Older communities with industry are going to get whacked hard," said Redford Township Finance Director John Cubba.

Redford collects \$566,000 in revenue from personal property tax for its \$45 million budget, he said.

## Quartet of hopefuls enters county race

The decision to shift Wayne County Commission district boundaries and move Canton into the newly redrawn 10th District with Plymouth has acted as a beacon drawing a crowded field of candidates for the Aug. 7 primary.

Two Republicans and three Democrats beat the Tuesday deadline for filing.

The Republican primary attracted political veteran Shannon Price, last seen running in the 2010 race for state representative, and high-profile local attorney Richard Convertino.

The three Democrats who initially filed for the open seat are Clifton Nealey of Canton, who ran for the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools Board of Education last year, Wayne County employee Matthew Fiems of Canton, and James

Amar, a retired State of Michigan employee, most recently serving as the labor mediation supervisor with the Michigan Employment Relations Commission.

However, Nealey withdrew from the race and threw his support behind Amar.

Price, constituent relations staffer for Attorney General Bill Schuette, was the first to enter, announcing his intentions last September. He cited his broad political background as a former government relations lobbyist and ex-chairman of the GOP's Wayne 11th District Committee.

Price last year narrowly lost his bid for the GOP nomination in the 21st District state House race, though party choice Lori Levi was defeated by Democratic incumbent Dian Slavens of Canton.

"This is essentially a new district," Price, 40, said, "and we need someone who will know how to get to work right away."

Convertino is a Canton resident with a Plymouth-based law firm. Most recently, local residents might remember Convertino as the attorney who defended popular teacher Ray Schepansky on gun-related charges.

"I want to restore confidence, integrity and financial accountability into Wayne County government," Convertino said. "We seem to have a battered, and beleagued and totally ineffective county executive and a county commission that's feckless."

Amar was born and raised in Highland Park, and has lived in Plymouth the past 30 years. Amar served on the Highland Park Citizens' Participation Council, an appointment made by the mayor, and was also a member of the Recreation Taskforce and the Neighborhood Action Development Program as part of the national Model Cities program.

"I chose to run for the 10th district seat to make sure that Wayne County government is operating in a transparent environment and is providing the best services at the least cost possible," Amar said in a statement released by incumbent Commissioner Kevin McNamara, who is endorsing Amar. "My priorities will be public safety and veterans affairs. I plan to bring a sense of responsibility when it comes to oversight of contractual services."

Neither Nealey nor Fiems could be reached for comment on their candidacies.



One would think Farrand Elementary School Principal Troy Reehl would have known better, having been forced to eat a worm once before.

But there he was Friday, in front of the majority of Farrand's student body and staff, choking down a wiggler to settle an agreement he made with his PTO and, more importantly, his students.


At the beginning of the year, Reehl agreed to eat the worm if students raised at least \$10,000 in the school's annual Farrand Fox Trot fundraiser.

It was the second time Reehl had agreed to eat a worm as part of a school-spirit event. He made a similar agreement a few years ago back in the West Ottawa school district, not believing for sure the students would meet the goal.

They did, and so did the Farrand kids this year.

"I did see how much it sparked the interest among the kids," Reehl said before downing the worm. "I think they just like to see their principals do silly things."

The Farrand Fox Trot raises money for the general PTO fund, which sponsors events and initiatives that promote quality education at the school, including books for the media center, school assemblies, updat-

ing classroom technology and after-school events.

The Fox Trot was introduced in 2004 as a way to involve all students in an event that could be the primary PTO fundraiser ending all catalog sales.

According to PTO President Tonya Barker, kids found a variety of ways to raise money, ranging from doing chores for others to getting plain, old-fashioned donations.

Barker said the \$10,000

fundraising goal was set high figuring on a couple of variables.

"We set the bar pretty high," she said. "We figured either we'd get a lot of money or we'd save Mr. Reehl. The kids started fundraising like crazy."

Reehl took the worm from kindergartner Gage Ellis, who at \$350 was the top earner in the fundraiser.

"It was funny," Gage said of watching Reehl

down the worm.

The total came in at just over the \$10,000, which turned out to be good for the rest of the PTO. Barker said if the kids had reached \$15,000, the whole PTO would have had to drink worm milkshakes.

Reehl probably envied them their good luck. "It doesn't taste like chicken," he said.





## What is PPT?

Personal property taxes are paid exclusively by businesses on items such as machines, equipment, furniture, fixtures, and tools.

For example, if a business buys a computer, it pays a tax based on its value over the life of the equipment, in addition to real property tax, the tax homeowners are accustomed to paying yearly.

Many neighboring states don't levy personal property tax, resulting in a move by Gov. Rick Snyder to eliminate the tax to retain and attract jobs to the state.

Many officials said businesses deserve a break, but not at the expense of local governments without a reimbursement plan in place.

In the city of Livonia's \$52 million budget the personal property tax elimination would cost the city about \$7.5 million overall for the 2011 tax year, according to Mike Slater, the city's finance director.

State Rep. John Walsh, R-Livonia, who opposes the elimination of personal property taxes because of its impact on Livonia.

"There's still no consensus on how we would

replace the revenue," Walsh said. "Very few of the state lawmakers would vote on it because it really would hurt our municipalities. It's a work in progress."

## No tax hike

Walsh said residents do not want any taxes raised at this time, including a sales tax, so using that as a replacement does not appear feasible. Walsh

expects talks between the governor's office and a bipartisan group of lawmakers from both chambers will continue, but added that no timetable was set for any action.

Canton Township Supervisor Phil LaJoy said elimination of personal property taxes for businesses would cost Canton nearly \$500,000 a year — not as much as some communities that rely more on an industrial tax base.

"It still would have a significant impact, obviously," he said. "That's still a lot of money."

LaJoy said the measure would benefit businesses, but he said state lawmakers would need to find a way to replace the money for local communities.

If legislators can find a way to eliminate the tax yet replace the funding for communities, he said, "then I'm all for it." But, he said the replacement funding mechanism would need to be long-lasting, not temporary.

LaJoy said communities already have been hurt by reductions in statutory state-shared revenue, and he wouldn't welcome other measures to take away money without replacing it.

In other Wayne communities, Northville Township collected \$2.75 million in personal property taxes in 2011 and

the city of Northville, \$610,330. The city of Plymouth expects to generate \$350,000 in personal property taxes this fiscal year and Plymouth Township will collect \$780,000, which is down from more than \$1 million a few years ago.

Garden City Treasurer/City Clerk Allyson M. Bettis said at 2011 millage rates, the city expects to receive approximately \$400,000 for personal property taxes in 2012.

## More cuts

"If the tax was eliminated, it would result in additional cuts to our budget, services, and/or personnel," said Bettis.

The legislation as written proposes to eliminate the tax for small businesses with a taxable value of \$40,000 immediately. Other business sectors, manufacturing and commercial,

would be phased out by 2016.

Statewide, the personal property taxes paid by businesses to local governments, generate \$1.3 billion per year for local police, fire, libraries, local roads and bridges and public schools, according to the Michigan Municipal League.

## Campaign

The MML has launched a "Replace Don't Erase" campaign calling for a constitutional amendment to guarantee replacement revenue for eliminating the personal property tax and protect local homeowners from property tax increases that the legislation would trigger.

The Michigan Township Association claims the constitutional amendment would not be approved by two-thirds of the legislature. The group is calling

for local governments to receive a credit against the Corporate Income Tax, expected to increase if the personal property tax reform spurs more business activity within the state.

William Anderson, legislative liaison for the Michigan Township Association told the Senate Finance Committee on April 27 that the "state has no skin in the game" as the legislation currently stands.

"Many local governments that will lose 8 to 10 percent of their property tax revenues would not be eligible for any reimbursement using this 2 percent of government funds formula," Anderson said.

# Downtown Plymouth prepares to 'rock it out'

Growing up in neighboring Northville Township, Plymouth was like a second home for Gia Warner.

"We were always over in Plymouth," whether it was to take piano lessons or visit Taco Bell, said Warner in a brief interview Friday. "We were over there a lot and we was this town grow. ... I like what's its grown into."

Now, Warner returns on a regular basis, bringing her five-piece rock band, which concentrates on her own material and songs by female rock and country-rock artists. Warner and her band will appear in Kellogg Park on Friday, July 27, during the free Music in the Air concert series, which begins this Friday.

"We definitely rock it out when we play there," Warner said, adding that her shows draw 3,000 or more people. "Everybody comes out."

Warner, who sings and plays acoustic guitar, says her show is family oriented but "definitely those cool rock classics that the girls did," naming Bonnie Raitt, Sheryl Crow, Janis Joplin and Faith Hill as among those artists whose songs she covers.

"I sort of take them and make them my own," she said.

Warner performs and records her own songs, too; she is currently working to

complete her third full-length album, which she is calling *The Assurance of Clouds*.

"It's about love. It's about heartbreak and wishes and love redeemed and hope," she said. "I'm thinking it's the best work I've ever done."

Warner is one of the more popular acts in this year's lineup, said Tony Bruscatto, operations director for the Plymouth Downtown Development Authority,

which organizes the shows. Each of the Friday concerts begins at 7 p.m. in Kellogg Park, starting Friday with the Bugs Beddow Band, described as Earth, Wind & Fire meets Motown.

"We have a pretty good lineup of the things people like," said Bruscatto, adding that country, rock-n-roll and blues styles are all represented. Each concert can draw 3,000 to 5,000 people, he said.

"We're one of the largest community concert series in the state," Bruscatto said.

"Everybody I know loves those events," said Warner.

Bruscatto and City Manager Paul Sincoc said the Friday concerts grew out of smaller, street-corner concerts on Fridays in the summer, which Sincoc dated to the late 1980s and early 1990s.

"The crowds got to be pretty big on the corners and it would spill out onto the streets," Bruscatto said. "Finally, the idea came, 'Why don't we just do it in Kellogg Park?'"

The lineup — the schedule has been at 14 shows each summer for several years — costs more than \$40,000 a year, Bruscatto said. He said longtime sponsors Blue Cross-Blue Shield, Hines Park Lincoln and a number of individual sponsors who pay \$1,000 to have their name attached to one show are the heroes of the series.



# Just say no to variable annuities

**Q:** Dear Rick: I was at a speech you delivered a few weeks ago and I asked about variable annuities. I have the bulk of my money in a variable annuity. It was a rollover from my 401(k) Plan. I asked you a question about variable annuities and you were negative towards

them. You said they have high fees and adverse tax consequences. I asked my adviser who sold me the annuity and he told me all I'm paying is \$30 a year in fees and that variable annuities have great tax advantages because all the money grows tax deferred. My annuity is coming up for renewal and I'm confused as to what I should do. My adviser wants me to roll it into another annuity. What do you think?

**A:** There is no doubt in my mind that you should not roll the money into another

variable annuity. As I mentioned at my talk, variable annuities have high fees and adverse tax consequences. Let me first explain the tax consequences.

With a variable annuity, all the money grows tax deferred. You only pay taxes when you withdraw the money. In some situations, that can be a slight benefit. However, when the money is withdrawn, it does not receive the favorable capital gain treatment like other investments. The distribution is taxed as ordinary income.

Currently, the maximum tax someone would pay on capital gains is 15 percent. Someone's ordinary income tax bracket can be double that. The ordinary income tax bracket for most Americans is 28 percent and their capital gain rate is 15 percent. Thus, by deferring the taxes, you are actually doubling them. Even though you can defer the taxes for a number of years, it doesn't offset the fact

that your rate is nearly double.

In your situation, there is absolutely no tax benefit with a variable annuity. After all, your money was in a 401(k) Plan; which means it was already tax deferred. Therefore, if you had transferred the money into an IRA, that money would have grown tax deferred. The variable annuity did nothing for you.

With regards to fees, I believe your salesperson did not tell you the whole story. In addition to the annuity fee, which generally is low, there are also other fees. First, you also have an insurance fee. Remember, variable annuities are an insurance

product. What this fee is depends upon the annuity but it can be significant. In addition, what he did not tell you is that you also pay higher fees for the investment sub accounts within your variable annuity. It is not unusual that the management fees on these variable annuities could be more than double what you would have paid for the same fund outside the variable annuity framework.

Like many insurance policies, fees can be difficult to discover. Unfortunately, you have to read the prospectus — which sometimes are written by lawyers, for lawyers. It's not unusual for you to pay two to three


percent per year in unnecessary fees with a variable annuity. While that doesn't seem like a lot, considering how low returns are today, two to three percent is significant.


Another downside of most variable annuities is that they have substantial back-end penalties. In most investment products, if you want to sell your investment after you buy it, no problem. That's not the case with a variable annuity. With a variable annuity, if you want to sell the product before maturity, you generally have to pay a back-end penalty. I'm not a fan of products with high back-end penalties; after all, what is the benefit for the investor?

Simply put, there is no benefit for the investor.

I stand by my statements that variable annuities are too expensive and are not an investor-friendly product. If your goals are like mine, to keep more money in your pocket where it belongs, then you would reach the same conclusion. For the great majority of people, variable annuities are a product that should be avoided. Good luck!



downtown Detroit. Woronchak's action followed unsuccessful attempts

"Contrary to some early reports, I did not personally block Commissioner Cox's attempts to force the issue," said Woronchak, D-Deerborn. "We followed the procedures and rules of the commission, and when she finally made a proper motion under our rules, the commission voted against her request to add the resolution to today's agenda."

Cox attempted to have the matter taken up with two procedural motions. One was ruled out of order by the chairman because it was not made at an appropriate place on the agenda, and the full commission did not challenge the ruling of the chair.

Cox later made a proper motion under the "New Business" portion of the agenda to have the resolution added, and

after some debate, the full commission rejected taking it up by a 9-6 vote. "This resolution has been in process for a few months, and up until now it appeared there was just one commissioner interested in moving forward," said Woronchak. "I have consistently indicated that if a growing number of commissioners wanted to take it up, we would have the debate."

"Consistent with that position, since six commissioners voted to add it to the agenda today, I have referred it to the Committee of the Whole, where we will discuss the matter thoroughly. And the entire commission, not just one member, will decide where it goes from there."

Ficano's office did not return a call or email from *The Observer* on Friday.

## Humanities grant funds Glenn's World War II project

A teacher at John Glenn High School is looking for World War II veterans and people who worked in defense industry as part of a project planned for the 2012-2013 school year.

Michele Anderson plans to have students to interview members of the country's "Greatest Generation" for the project which will culminate in a World War II style USO dance for them.

"I want to make sure their story is told and I want students to understand what they did," she said. "I think that's important because we're losing these people now."

Anderson estimates that 300 students in all will be involved. In addition to the history classes, members of the JROTC and Interact Club will be involved. The high school band and choir will provide the music and songs of the era at the dance.

She's also getting help with the project from the Westland Rotary Club and American Legion.

While the main body of work will be done during the 2012-2013 school year, the process is starting now. Anderson is looking for veterans and/or their families and people who worked in the war industry who are interested in being interviewed. 

# Riding on ... safely

## State officials push safety as motorcycle season gears up

Warm spring weather always brings out the rumble — of motorcycles on the roadways.

Michigan's Secretary of State Ruth Johnson, who has been riding motorcycles since age 12, rode in to the Motor City Harley-Davidson dealership in Farmington Hills on Tuesday, on a midnight blue Sportster, to bring attention to motorcycle safety.

Johnson was joined by riders from around the state and safety officials from Michigan State Police, the Office of Highway Safety Planning and the Michigan Department of Transportation.

"Michigan has more than a half a million motorcyclists and as we head into the warm weather, we need to do everything we can to be safe — wear the proper gear, stay aware and take rider education classes," said Johnson, who noted more bikers will likely be on the roads this summer, given the anticipated \$4 per gallon gas.

Scott Wilson, general manager of Motor City Harley-Davidson, said his dealership's rider education class called Rider's Edge, has had 2,858 students since it started in 2000.

"We really want to put an emphasis on training and making sure people have the right equipment," said Wilson.

Jennifer Loberman, of Farmington Hills, is the marketing director at Motor City Harley-Davidson and longtime rider. She noted that women are the fastest growing demographic in motorcycle riding. She encourages riders to enroll in the Rider's Edge program.

"Rider's Edge isn't a lecture, it's a fast-moving, interactive seminar," she said, adding that it provides education to raise the comfort level of the rider in a controlled and

### A FEW FACTS

safe environment.

The state has rolled out its Ride Safe to Ride Again campaign to raise awareness.

Michael Prince, director of the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning, said motorcycle fatalities, through the years, have steadily increased, however, there were 109 statewide in 2011 compared to 125 in 2010.

"Motorcyclists are much more vulnerable," he said. "They are 39 percent more likely to die in a crash than (people in passenger vehicles)."

He advocates high visibility gear for motorcyclists.

nearly half of all motorcycle crashes are caused by riders who do not have the endorsement on their license or the proper training.

"There's no substitute for proper training," he said.

### No helmets?

The recent repeal of Michigan's helmet law means there's an extra emphasis on safety, officials said.

Under the new law, riders who are at least 21 years of age, have had a license for at least two years or have taken motorcycle safety classes, and also carry at least \$20,000 in medical insurance, are allowed to ride without a helmet.

"If you decide you don't want to wear a helmet — which we do not recommend — then you don't have to wear a helmet," said Shaw.

### Enjoying the ride

Loberman, who fell in love with motorcycles while riding on the back of her dad's Harley-Davidson dyna low rider, said she enjoys the freedom of riding.

"I enjoy the 'me time' and the freedom of having the wind in your face. Whatever is going on, it kind of fades away once you get on your bike," she said.

Loberman, who is a member of the local chapter of Harley Owners Group, the official Harley-Davidson riding group, said she shares a close bond with other riders.

"Bikers never cease to amaze me," she said.

"(They) are very charitable. There's a special kinship among all riders. You have to be a rider to understand it."

She said "four wheels might move the body, but two wheels move the soul."

"I want to wish everyone a very safe riding season — we want you all to be back riding in 2013," said Prince.

Johnson introduced a new video, which is now playing in all Secretary of State offices, on motorcycle safety. She said it focuses on the importance of

wearing the right gear, paying attention on the road — especially in construction zones — and getting training and the motorcycle endorsement.

"We're hoping that a little nudge will help get more riders trained and hopefully save lives," said Johnson.

RJ Wilson, who is with the Motorcycle Safety Foundation and is an instructor at Macomb Community College, said the safety courses are 20 hours, over one weekend — 4 hours in the classroom and 16 hours riding.

Michigan State Police Lt. Mike Shaw said


partial proceeds from the evening going to St. Jude's Children Research Hospital in Beirut."

# Local man follows long road from former Soviet Union to U.S. success

Dan Milstein came to the U.S. at the age of 16 Dec. 4, 1991. "We were political refugees," he said. "Jews were not welcome" in the former U.S.S.R. He came here with his parents, younger brother and grandmother. Each was allowed a suitcase and minimal money. Fast forward and Milstein, 36, is a successful businessman and CEO of Gold Star Mortgage Financial Group of Ann Arbor. He lives in the Northville- Novi area with a Northville Township address and is a single dad to a daughter, 9. Milstein will be hon-

ored May 19 with first-place kudos in the Paris Book Festival, in the how-to category for "The ABC of Sales." The international competition recognizes books for general excellence. "I took pride in everything I did," said Milstein, who began as a teen working at McDonald's and is grateful for that opportunity. He'd work long hours and attend Huron High School in Ann Arbor, graduating in 1993. "And of course I didn't speak any English. It was a huge challenge," said Mil-

stein, who graduated with honors from Cleary University in Ann Arbor with a B.B.A. in business management. "The ABC of Sales" stands for Always Be Closing, with the book published in June 2011. "I've learned by default," said Milstein, who's also had sales disappointments. "I wrote about my experiences and my challenges."

## Day job

Milstein has been recognized as the No. 1 loan officer in the U.S. and has achieved more than \$3 billion in personal mortgage originations. His company, of which he's founder and president, has been named a Top Workplace in Michigan for three years

by the *Detroit Free Press*. "The ABC of Sales" (Gold Star Publishing) also earned an honorable mention earlier this year in the New England Book Fair and the San Francisco Book Festival as well as first-place honors in the DIY Book Festival, Los Angeles. The book sold 10,000 copies in March and became the top Sales Book on Amazon and the 31st top seller of all eBook sales. He won't go to Paris or to San Francisco this weekend for the book awards ceremony. "I'm too busy," he said. "I will not be traveling this weekend. I was there (Paris) not too long ago." His company has over

500 employees in 43 offices in the U.S., with one opening soon in Plymouth, in addition to Livonia and Southfield. The main office is in Ann Arbor. Kirkus Indie Reviews says of the book: "His message is clear: love the product, love the customer and do whatever it takes to close the sale. An excellent, persuasive handbook for salespeople." Of his business success, Milstein said, "We decided not to participate in the financial meltdown." He'd worked as COO of a mortgage company before founding his own business, and previously in banking, including for TCF and Comerica. He's pleased his par-

ents and brother have also done well professionally and notes the importance of hard work in business success. Milstein will receive his honorary doctorate from Cleary June 2 and give the commencement speech. "My story's still being written," he said. His second book, due out in August, will focus on sales. The third will be a novel based on his life: "Ninety-nine percent of it's going to be a true story." He chose Northville- Novi to live and is glad about that. "It was conveniently located to all our offices," Milstein said. "And it's a beautiful area."

# Kidney disease motivates Westland woman to take a walk

An estimated 5,000 people gathered at the Detroit Zoo today for a common cause: to fight kidney disease and support the National Kidney Foundation of Michigan's (NKFM) Kidney Walk. Among them was Sharon Wroblewski, the team captain of Team Kidney Beanz, who walked in the event for a second year. Although she did not find out she had kidney disease until she was 18 years old, Wroblewski was familiar with it. In fact, Wroblewski is one of many individuals in her family who have been diagnosed with polycystic kidney disease, a condition that causes numerous cysts to grow on the kidneys. Over time, PKD cysts can replace much of the kidneys, leading to a reduction of kidney function and ultimately, kidney failure. About 600,000 U.S. residents have PKD, making it the fourth leading cause

of kidney failure. There is no treatment for PKD at this time. Luckily, Wroblewski found out about her kidney disease early on and did not experience kidney failure for some time. "They found it in the early stages," said Wroblewski. "It was something that had to be monitored throughout the years."

## 'Silent killer'

Since kidney disease often has no signs, it has been referred to as "the silent killer." Of the more than 900,000 Michigan residents living with kidney disease, most don't know they have it. Wroblewski admits that being told she had kidney disease was hard to fully understand at first, mostly because she never felt sick. "Even up until the point that I started dialysis, I didn't feel any different," she said. She said she'd sometimes feel a slight pain in her back in the kidney area, but the pain was due to the cysts caused by

PKD specifically. Over time, her kidney function slowly declined under the weight of PKD and in August 2011, she was advised to go on the transplant waiting list. In March, Wroblewski had the surgery for the peritoneal catheter and began dialysis less than a week later. Peritoneal dialysis requires regular exchanges throughout the day and can be managed without visiting a medical facility, but also has many risks related to having a permanent tube in the abdomen. Sharon chose to do peritoneal dialysis because it allows her to live a relatively normal life. "I have to go straight home from work to do my dialysis, but then I can go to dinner with friends or run errands," said. "Not being on hemodialysis for four-six hours every other day allows me to continue working and doing my daily activities."

## Genetic link

PKD is genetic and can be

easily inherited, requiring only one gene. Sharon said that it has affected her family greatly and has led to significant loss over the years, including an aunt, an uncle and her father. "As far as my dad's side of the family, four out of the five kids had kidney disease," Wroblewski said. "My dad and three other siblings have polycystic kidney disease, and I don't even know how many of my cousins also have it. I've already had two cousins who have had kidney transplants." Although Wroblewski and her family have experienced many challenges and inevitable losses from PKD, she has exerted much of her energy toward raising awareness about kidney disease by participating in the NKFM's Kidney Walk at the Detroit Zoo. She said this opportunity has allowed her to connect with other people who have kidney disease, and also walk in the honor of her father alongside so many others that have

experienced loss due to kidney failure. "I started a Kidney Walk team and invited friends and family to join. Even people I didn't know joined the team and became friends that way." Wroblewski is proud to say that this year Team Kidney Beanz has been highly motivated and successful in its fundraising efforts. Through holding a dine-to-donate event, raffles and more, the team has raised more than \$5,000 and continues to move forward. In fact, Team Kidney Beanz is one of the top walk teams at this year's event. The walk took place at 8:30 a.m., but people can still help out teams like Kidney Beanz. 





Salem boys nip Plymouth in last event for regional title, Canton third

A photo finish in the final event of Friday's MHSAA Division 1-Region 4 boys track and field meet enabled Salem to edge campus rival Plymouth for a championship Rocks head coach Kyle Meteyer never saw coming.

"It's funny, I looked at the fully automatic picture they take at the end, and they had to zoom in

to see who actually won because it was that close," Meteyer said. "And Crawford tipped his shoulders forward, and that was enough to get him the win by that one or two hundredths of a second."

"Great race. It's been such an up-and-down season for us. We had a losing record in dual meets, we didn't do great at Observerland, we were mediocre at the conference meet and then to come here to tonight and win the whole thing in the

Or that Boucher can carry the load in the circle and at the plate, especially this year when top pitcher Hannah Warren went down with an injury.


"These two senior captains are showing these kids how to play Canton softball," Arnold said. "That's what we need."

Meanwhile, according to Boucher, also in her fourth season with the varsity, the key to being senior leaders is communicating the importance of learning, evolving.





basketball as well as four years of hoops at Salem.


Her father, Rick Berberet, had an important role in Brianna's development as a player. He started coaching her when she was young and also took an active interest in getting colleges interested in watching her play.



## What's under that dress?

Historian shows off drawers, corsets, bustles, and more

"Keep pulling, keep pulling, keep pulling ... and don't think that you're hurting me. If my face is turning red that means it's working."

Historian Kim Parr, outfitted in three layers of 19th century underwear, coached Barbara DeGrazia through the process of tightening corset strings.

"It's not as easy as you think," Parr told her audience of mostly American Association of University Women, (AAUW) Tuesday at Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Livonia.

DeGrazia, an AAUW member, grabbed the laces with both hands and pulled again and again, cinching the 1880s-style corset tight.

"Oh my gosh, this is hard on the hands," DeGrazia said.

"You did good," Parr reassured her, as the audience applauded and someone asked if she could bend in the constricting garment.

"Be lucky you're living today," Parr answered.

The corset demonstration was the crowning moment in her presentation, "Mentioning the Unmentionables," a look

at the history of women's underwear from medieval times through World War I. Her program, complete with photos, humorous stories, authentic and replica garments, and hands-on demonstrations, packed the meeting room for AAUW Livonia chapter's final gathering of the season.

"I used to wear period clothing every day to work ... when you wear a corset people seem to know and they ask questions. So I knew there was interest in it," said Parr, former living history coordinator at Greenfield Village and director of

the Macomb County Historical Society and Crock-House Museum for the past 10 years.

"I found the museum had a great clothing collection and some interesting undergarments. So, I made a display on it. A few board members, old

timers were mad about it. They thought it was really improper. But then it caught interest."

She developed a program for a Quarters group and word spread.

"I had no idea I'd be speaking about it 10 years later," said Parr, a Detroit

resident. "It's all word of mouth. I don't market it."

### Layering

Parr systematically layered underwear over her 1860s-style chemise — the nightgown-like foun-

dation of historical clothing — while describing each piece.

"The thing about the chemise was it didn't change a lot for years and years. This was your basic garment. It protected your skin from the corset and your corset from your skin."

Red stockings, held in place with ribbons tied above the knees, were popular in the 1700s. Parr wore striped stockings, which women often wore in the 1860s.

"One color stocking you didn't see until 1900 was black because the color black was hard to achieve without using an arsenic dye. It wasn't colorfast. Your feet sweat and the black would rub off on your feet."

The earliest mention of drawers, long underpants which women wore over the chemise, was in the early 1600s in a traveller's notes about his trip through Italy. Parr said English women were known to wear drawers about 200 years later.

"Ladies, why are they split?" Parr asked the crowd, showing a pair with an open crotch. "To use the potty. Remember, your corset goes over your drawers. You cannot pull your drawers down. If you have modern underwear on with a corset — good luck."

### Changing fashions

After donning drawers and a corset, Parr showed off a variety of "dress improvers," including hip extenders, which made dresses wider at the hips; a crinoline, the hoop-like structure that gave shape to voluminous dresses in the mid-1800s; and a horse-hair stuffed bustle from the late 1800s that extended fabric over the derriere.

"By the 1880s the bustle becomes

enormous. You could have tea on your friend's back end," Parr quipped.

Pat Smith, an AAUW member, modeled a pair of collapsible hip extenders for the audience.

"What was cool about it," she said later, "was that you could stick your hands into it and it was like you had two purses on each hip. You could collapse them when something was in your way."

Underwear evolved to suit changing fashions. When women began working in factories during World War 1 and became more active, the corset no longer fit in with their lifestyle nor outerwear. French lingerie companies created camisole-like tops that served as brassieres.

"This is where the Twiggy look started," Parr said, referring to the 1960s fashion trend. "No bosom, no hip. Historians believe the psychology of war was that people wanted to look and act like kids and just have fun."

# Improvement: Today's garments offer better fit and lighter fabric


"For years you had to go to a department store and squeeze into whatever size they had available, whether it fit you prop-

## FIBROMYALGIA OR LUPUS

Fibromyalgia is a condition characterized by bone, joint and muscle aches, inability to concentrate, transient numbness in the limbs, chest pain and fatigue. Systemic Lupus Erythematosus, or as it is usually called, Lupus, shares many of the same symptoms.

When a physician sees a patient with a combination of pain and fatigue, the question arises of either fibromyalgia or Lupus is present; the physician often orders a laboratory test called the ANA (anti-nuclear antibody test). A negative ANA rules out the possibility that the patient's condition comes from Lupus.

Where the problem arises is over a positive ANA. A positive test does not mean that the patient has Lupus. A positive test may occur because of past viral infection, or of the body's reaction to a drug such as an antibiotic. The test may be positive for unclear reasons but none are related to Lupus.

Unfortunately, patients may get the impression that a positive test means they have Lupus. At the next encounter with a new doctor, the patients will tell him that one of the conditions they suffer from is Lupus, and that the previous doctor diagnosed it from "the blood test."

In reality, Lupus differs from fibromyalgia by the intensity of the fatigue in Lupus, the fevers to 101-102 degrees that often accompany Lupus, and the involvement in Lupus of the lungs, heart, kidneys, blood cells/platelets, and skin. None of these features are part of Fibromyalgia.

While an experienced physician can quickly see that the patient is wrong to believe the problem is Lupus, a physician often encounters difficulty convincing the patient the truth of that conclusion.

# Explaining a job loss: seven tips

Downsized, restructured, displaced, canned, terminated - any way you put it, you're still out of a job and it's still not the easiest subject to talk about in an interview.

Recognize that there is life after a job loss and take some time to reflect and recharge your attitude. Think about what you learned from the experience, what you could have done differently, and what you will do going forward. Here are seven things to prepare you when the subject comes up in an interview:

## Don't lie.

Be prepared to be up front and honest about your dismissal. Don't lie. If you fail to disclose that you were dismissed for cause, it is likely to come out when the employer checks references and your perceived dishonesty for not sharing this information may cost you the job. When interviewing, be brief in discussing the situation, show what you've learned or what you are doing to change and then move on to what you accomplished and how you can contribute to the new company.

## Right job, wrong boss.

If your dismissal resulted from a change in management and you didn't get along with a new boss due to bad chemistry or a difference of opinion, acknowledge that you recognize some people just don't click, then share references of other supervisors you previously worked for and other colleagues.

You might say, "My new supervisor and I,


unfortunately, had very different personalities and management styles. I made a strong attempt to create an amicable relationship. I had very good relationships with previous supervisors and was well-thought of by my colleagues." Whatever you do, don't bad mouth the boss. You'll be the one who looks bad. Have a list of other supervisors and coworkers readily available to share with the interviewer. Most people have had a difficult boss at some point in their career and will likely understand.

## Change in strategy.

Briefly acknowledge that there was a change in company strategy that you didn't fully agree with, then move on to what you learned from the situation. Saying something like, "After the merger, my new boss had a different strategy in mind for our product group. I didn't fully agree with it. Looking back, I realized that I should have tried to find out more about the rationale for the change and find ways to support it." Don't trash the company. Don't blame the company for not following your direction. Every company will change. Show that you are willing to adapt to change.

## Lack of skills.

If your job moved forward but you didn't, it's probably time to acquire the necessary skills to succeed. If you haven't yet embraced technology, use your time off to take a few beginner computer classes and learn common office software. In addition to local colleges, many industry associations offer courses and workshops to keep your skills up to date. Take a refresher accounting course, attend a



workshop to recharge your creativity, improve your management skills or learn to write for the web. Share your new-found skills with prospective employers and show how these skills will add value at the new employer.

## Poor reviews.

If you received a series of poor performance reviews, you need to truly assess why. First, if you can muster the courage, consider calling your old boss and asking for advice. You may find the conversation easier than you think, now that the ties of employment have been broken. Call or meet with a former colleague or two and ask them for their honest opinion of how you could improve. Don't be defensive. Listen openly.

If you made repeated mistakes, if you weren't thorough enough in your reports, or missed your sales quotas, consider what you could do to improve. You may

find that the job you had wasn't really right for you. If you were a great sales administrator who was promoted to an outside sales position but lost your job because you couldn't make the quotas, perhaps you need to seek an administrative position. If you were a great sales person who was promoted to manage the sales force then let go due to your poor management skills, maybe you'd be happier and more successful if you were back in front of customers instead of behind a desk.

## Misdeeds or dishonesty.

If the reason for your dismissal was for something more egregious, like misusing company funds, sexual harassment, substance use or falsifying company information, you may need to accept that companies could be reluctant to hire you. Whatever the reason always be honest, say only what you need to say, share what you

learned and how you've changed and focus on the more positive aspects of your performance and accomplishments.

## Solid and legitimate references.

Ideally, your former employer will agree to just give the facts, by verifying your dates of employment and your titles. Secure references from other supervisors and colleagues who will give you a positive review and vouch for your integrity and ability. It's best to have two to three business references as well as a couple of personal references.



# TOYOTA AND ITS NEW MODELS SEND MESSAGE: WE'RE BACK!

Toyota has sent a message to its rivals: The sales-volume champion of last decade is back and gunning to regain the crown that it lost to General Motors last year.

The recent earnings report by Toyota was the most robust indication yet that the biggest Japanese automaker is putting three years of major problems behind it and has begun consolidating gains again rather than trying to cut losses.

The elements of Toyota's brisk recovery and rosier outlook include:

**A stream of new products:** Set aside Toyota's other problems: The company had languished for too long without significant or imaginative new products, a period that overlapped with the handicaps it

experienced last year, and a nagging reality that exacerbated the challenge of climbing out of its hole.

Now that Toyota has its supply situation straightened around again, it almost seems serendipitous that the company also has some hot new products. Of Toyota's 18,000-plus extra sales in May in the U.S. market over May 2011, for example, about 17,000 of those units were sales of new or recently overhauled models.

Camry, for example — America's best-selling car for 13 out of the last 14 years, is hot again. The new model launched by Toyota last summer was rather wanly received as derivative by automotive critics, but consumers — both those who have purchased some of the 15 million Camrys sold over the last 30 years, and new buyers — love it.

Featuring a new design, technology enhancements, better fuel efficiency and ride, the new

Camry sold 36,280 units last month in the United States, about 21 percent ahead of sales of about 30,000 units of the old version last May.

Meanwhile, Toyota's strategy for Prius has proved savvy — extending the world's only popular hybrid brand into a "family" of vehicles, first to include the larger Prius v and the smaller and more affordable Prius c. Both new models have sold strongly, contributing to a doubling of Prius sales in May over the supply-constrained May 2011, when only the original model was available.

Sales of the Prius family, at more than 25,000 vehicles last month, now exceed those of every other Toyota nameplate, including the previous No. 2, the Corolla compact.

**The strong U.S. market:** With China's growth cooling from its

torrid pace of auto sales, Europe a mess, and Japan recovering only moderately, Toyota is putting a lot of chips on the resurgence of the U.S. market. And they're beginning to pay off. Toyota's first-quarter sales were 12 percent ahead of a year ago in the U.S. and its share, 14 percent, was about even with the first quarter of 2011, before its supply lines were devastated.

**Aggressive promotions:** Toyota traditionally was the king of incentive restraint, able to disdain the game of buying sales with expensive, brand-debasing financial lures that became part of the undoing of the Detroit Three in the United States.

But that was then, before the world changed. This is now, and Toyota has shown a willingness to give its American dealers, at least, new incentive levers to work with as they regain their

footing. That included big zero-percent-loan programs in March and April, and this month Toyota is offering zero-percent loans on its seven most popular models and good lease deals across its product lineup.

**More nimble, imaginative management:** Akio Toyota, grandson of Toyota's founder, seems to have lit a fire under management in a cultural shift whose fruits are just now beginning to become evident as he leads the company from a nearly continual mode of crisis into stability and a renewed growth mode.

Exhibit A might well be the uncharacteristic design of the new 2013 Toyota Avalon, which debuted at the New York International Auto Show in March. The styling of this full-size sedan traditionally has been the most sedate of any nameplate in a sedate overall product line-up.

But the new Avalon — featuring a large lower grille and horizontal LED tail lamps, and a more aggressive stance overall — "foreshadow(s) the more compelling and passionate nature of future Toyota products," the company crowed in a press release.

**Lack of fresh disasters:** There's no telling how much it helps Toyota not to be courting — or anticipating — any significant new major setback. Its product-recall fiasco of 2010 was still in play when the earthquake and tsunami hit last March. Then flooding in Thailand also beset the supply lines of Toyota and other manufacturers.
