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State Bep. Dian Slavens said she delivered petitions with some 8000 signatures from peo-ple urging Gov. Rick Snyder to veto a Senate bill that would have made it easier for gun own-ers with conceald weapons per-mits to carry guns into schools. On Tuesday, Snyder gave them what they wanted, vetonig the controversial legislation that would have allowed concealed

Bill failure Snyder said his veto was pri-marily based on the bill's failure to let designated public entities such as schools, day care centers and hospitals opt out of the new concealed carry provisions. Cur-

seek clarity in Conn. tragedy

There are always questions and concerns after a tragedy such as the one that unfold-ed Priday in Newtown, Conn., a search for answers for how and why something like that could happen. Rather than wait for them to come, Plym-outh High School teacher Beth Savalox decided to send her practical law students on their own quest for answers in a stirring, thought-provoking hour of discussion Mon-day morning.



Ford CEO Alan Mulally and other top ex-ecutives announced the new campaign in (where else?) New York's Lincoln Center Plaza with supporting events on tap in Miami and Los Angeles as well.

Mami and Los Angeles as well. "Today we are announcing a new begin-ning for a brand that has been part of our company and the American fabric for more than 90 years," Ayulally said. "The new Lincup horal will be defined by great new Loury yehicles, such as the new MRZ. that feature quality, unique style with substance and innovative technology. These elements, coupled with a new level of warm, personal and surprising experi-nces, will enable Lincoln to appeal to today's new Luxury customer."

Jim Farley, Ford and Lincoln CMO, said that the way "for Lincoln to grow is to transform our conquest power," said Far-ley. "The fact of the matter is for us to grow, we have to take share away from someone else. When you look on the coast, our competitors are gaining automatic loyalty every time a customer comes back to the dealership to return their lease."

With the introduction of four new Lin-coln vehicles — the MKT, MKS, MKX and MKZ, which is about to arrive in show-rooms — there is an opportunity to in-crease exposure, attract new customers

and establish new ammittes. The first phase of Lincoln's brand re-launch was unveiled during ford's ap-perance at the Los Angeles Auto Show, and will culminate in a Super Bowl TV ad on February 3. Interestingly, Ford has shunned advertising during the big game for the last few years. Heading back into the Bog annew the Lincoln first is an inter-

esting choice esting choice. Lincoin plans to build on its new ads in the Super Bowl by focusing on its heri-age as well as its new fleet of cars that are beginning with an overhauled MKZ. The Super Bowl ad, the brand said, will be consumer-generated via a social-mar-keting campaign in which fans are being invited to "co-create" the 60-second spot via weets using the hashtag streethe-script, in a fun effort that will be curated by TV host Jimoy Fallon. That whole ef-fort began on December 5.

Lincoln originally was called the Lin-coln Motor Company in 1922 when Edsel Ford signed the agreement purchasing the company from its Founder, Henry Le-land. By dusting off the old moniker, Ford hopes to begin to re-educate American

luxury buyers about a brand in which it is only now investing significant resources again, after essential-ly neglecting it for the last few years.

"The campaign cap tures the founding principles of the [Lin-coln Motor] company and brings them for-ward to a new gen-eration of progreseration of progres-sive luxury buyers," Ford said in its press release. It also noted
