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# **Canton weathers \$20 million revenue loss**

Township coffers suffered through Great Recession

### By Darrell Clem

If property values had re-mained at 2007 levels rather than crashing, Canton Town-ship by now would have re-ceived an additional \$19 million to \$20 million in tax revenues, local officials said.

"It's unbelievable what we've been through," Supervi-sor Phil LaJoy said Tuesday night, after a township board caseion

ngin, arter a township board session. LaJoy and Finance Director Wendy Tirumbull confirmed the startling figures, which reveal just how much Canton has suffered after taxable values plunged amid the Great Recession. Despite huge hits to its po-lice, fire and general funds,

Canton has managed to avert budget deficits by securing employee concessions, impos-ing a 1.75-mill public safety tax and slashing sponding across more concession and the state of the stands to lose another \$45,000 a year unless state lawmakers find a solution to replace reve-nues local communities are park personal property tax on businesses.

Last week, local officials still were watching the situa-tion closely, in hopes Lansing lawmakers find a way to re-place the lost revenue rather than dealing local govern-ments another blow. Township Trustee Tom Yack, former supervisor, said he believes eliminating the personal property tax was the right move. "But replace it 100 percent."

"But replace it 100 percent," he said. And even if that hap-

pens, he said, "I don't trust the Legislature to live by that com-mitment." Yack said he is frustrated that both major political par-tites- largely due to special interest groups, lobbyists and political action committees-have made decisions over the years that continually hurt local communities. "It's very frustrating to try





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

Sarting at prices around \$40,000 and offering 28mpg in both the city and on the highway, the Highlander Hybrid stakes a claim to be perhaps the best of offered across the industry.
