Canton drivers have long holiday wish list

The stretch of Saltz Road between Canton Center and Ridge roads is not Canton Township's version of the Autobahn — although the absence of even a single speed limit sign on either side of the 2.2-mile roadway might make one think otherwise.

The installation of speed limit markings along this heavily traveled pavement is just one of several upgrades township residents would like to see, at least based on a mini-avalanche of concerns posted on social media following the announcement that a full-functioning traffic light will be built at the intersection of Ridge, Saltz and Denton

Using both safety and waiting times as arguing points, motorists/social media posters argued that selected intersections were in dire need of left turn arrows to make navigating the crossroads more efficient.

Recently-installed turn arrows have proven to be life-enhancers, residents insisted, at two intersections: Warren and Lilley roads; and Cherry Hill and Lotz roads, both of which have experienced a rise in traffic congestion as Canton's population has steadily ticked upward since 1990.

The minimum cost of installing a left-turn arrow, according to quora.com, is \$50,000. The price could soar to close to \$1 million, depending on if right-of-

Northville's **Miss America** contestant reflects on competition

Juggling a 32-credit medical school course load while serving as Miss Michigan and competing in the Miss America pageant was equal parts exhilaration, exhaustion and reward for Northville native graduate Vivian

"When I returned home (Friday night), I slept 16 straight hours," Zhong admitted during a Sunday afternoon interview. "Myself and a lot of my 50 sister Miss America contestants have been texting photos of ourselves waking up from our extended sleeps.

"Every day I was there we were up until at least midnight rehearsing and doing other things, and then we'd be up at 6 a.m. the next morning. After a while, you're running on the adrenaline that the excitement of the event creates."

The 100th Miss America Pageant was held at the Mohegan Sun Resort in Uncasville, Connecticut. For the first time in modern-day history, it was livestreamed on the Peacock Network and not televised live on mainstream television.

Although Zhong was not selected as a top-10 contestant during the Dec. 16 finale, she cashed in on her intelligence and wide appeal across America by securing \$24,000 in scholarships.

Zhong, who performed a 90-second version of Frederic Chopan's Minute Waltz in the talent competition, won \$1,000 after being named the best talent of the contestants not in the pageant's top 10. She pocketed another

Ex-Menards security guard cleared of assault and battery charge

A jury cleared an ex-Menards security guard of assaulting a customer in Livonia's 16th District Court.

Jury members acquitted the unemployed man of a misdemeanor assault and battery charge Dec. 13.

The defendant, 57, of Walled Lake could not be reached for comment but

his attorney Steven Vitale said his client was relieved with the verdict.

The jury reviewed evidence, Vitale said, that showed the customer was physically aggressive and using foul language.

Leeway is often given, the attorney said, for people who have the right to defend themselves.

The security guard apparently had no prior convictions or contact with the

law.

"He's been a law-abiding citizen his whole life," Vitale said.

Hometown Life typically does not name misdemeanor defendants.

The Pinkerton security guard had incidents with two customers, and he lost the Menards detail and his job after they accused him of assault in August 2020.

Another man was charged in a second case that was dismissed months af-

ter an Aug. 3 run-in.

Before the trial, the second claimed he was pushed, struck, knocked back a few feet and jumped upon when he tried to leave the Middlebelt Road store on Aug 27

Greg Rohl, the attorney who represented both men, did not respond to a request for comment.


One of the week's highlights for Zhong was an opportunity to meet Farmington Hills native Kirsten Haglund, who earned the Miss America title in 2008

way purchases and lengthy construction are required.

The roads affected by intersection-

improvement demands are all managed by Wayne County, with the exception of Ford Road, which is handled by the State of Michigan.

The most aggravating intersection in the township, an informal survey of drivers revealed, is the intersection of Beck and Ford roads — a brake light haven during rush hour given its lack of a turn arrow.

Enhancements at this intersection are problematic due to the presence of Fellows Creek, which runs parallel to the north side of Ford Road.

Left-turn arrows at the Ford Road-Ridge Road intersection are also in high demand, especially since the construction of subdivisions and multi-unit developments continue to pop up on what was formerly farmland.

In addition to requests for any form of light at the meeting point of Sheldon and Palmer roads — drivers are currently guided at the intersection by fourway stop signs — the installation of turn arrows at the intersection of Beck and Ann Arbor roads would be greatly appreciated by residents of Canton and Plymouth townships.

Lastly, the speed limit on the signless stretch of Saltz is 55 miles per hour, according Michigan Vehicle Code 257.628.





The entire class is curious: What you do in your free time in the North Pole?



Canton Planet Fitness relocates to Ford Road

It's been a long wait, but the opportunity to work out on Ford Road has finally arrived.

The Planet Fitness that formerly operated on Canton Center Road in Canton Township relocated to the former Canton GDX 7 movie theater at 43555 Ford Road.

Sydney Schultz, the gym's assistant manager, said the move doesn't feel real to her yet.

"To be honest, it's still a little surreal," she said. "I almost feel like I'm helping out at another club, but then we have our own 'Canton, Michigan' sign so it's kind of a nice reminder, like, I'm at my club. This is mine. We did it, we moved."

The theater closed in 2019 accompanied by the announcement that Planet Fitness would take over the space, a process that took several years to complete. The gym relocated in early December into the building, which is about double in size.

Inside the gym are many of the same machines and offerings found at other Planet Fitness gyms. Many of the cardio machines, such as treadmills, are brandnew to the gym, having not been used until the new space opened.

They also have a lot more of them: there's double the number of certain pieces of equipment, as well as some new workouts for guests to use.

"With the brand-new equipment, they did come with a bunch of brand-new programs," Schultz said.

The center also has some new equipment it did not have at its former space, including rowers and hand bikes. Those hand bike machines were requested by guests, Schultz said, who were coming off of physical therapy and still wanted to use them.

"I'm so excited to have these," she said.

The gym also has its functional training room and circuit workout space as well, similar to what was offered at the previous location.

There's no telling the gym space was formerly a movie theater, though Schultz said there is one projection room that was kept intact that's currently being used for storage.

The space also has many of the amenities found at other clubs for Black Card members, which is the higher-priced membership tier. Those include tanning beds, massage chairs and the Total Body Enhancement machine.

The opening is something the club's employees and members have waited a long time for: Schultz said in less than a week of opening, more than 90 new members from communities like Westland and Belleville had joined the club, the lone Planet Fitness in Canton. She attributes that success to several factors.

"Definitely being on Ford Road has helped with the overall general traffic, but also I've had numerous members, even members from other clubs coming in and they want this to be their home club just because it's been such a long time coming," Schultz said. "I do think it's a combination of being so updated and so new and being on Ford Road."

Doug Fletcher, the gym's manager, said having a larger club is another benefit that new members have looked forward to.

"Everyone's just super thrilled to have it open," he said. "All the new members that have been joining, that's what we've been hearing."

A grand opening celebration is planned for Jan. 6 that will include giveaways, food and other activities. More information can be found at planetfitness.com.





Catholic Central driveway plan to be revised

It appears plans are moving forward with a new driveway connecting Detroit Catholic Central High School to 12 Mile Road.

The proposal, which would connect the high school campus at 27225 Wixom Road in Novi with a stretch of 12 Mile Road to the north, received support from the city's planning commission after being tabled earlier this fall due to issues brought up by surrounding residents.

"We are back after a two-month delay seeking approval for our project," Ed Turek, president of the high school, said during a meeting Dec. 8 at the Novi Civic Center. "We've made major concessions to the project."

Residents of the nearby Berkshire Pointe neighborhood came out en masse at a planning commission meeting earlier this fall when the plans were first publicy discussed. Many of those residents spoke out against the plans, saying it would negatively affect them. After the planning commission tabled the proposal, it gave time for meetings between the school and the neighbors to take place and hammer out issues.

Changes to the plans include keeping the current vegetation to help buffer between the development and the homes, as well as Catholic Central adding additional trees, in addition to other conditions.

If approved and constructed, the plans call for a driveway built from the high school's parking lot that would extend through the currently-vacant field to the north of the buildings and exit onto 12 Mile Road south of Grand River.

While the audience had significantly fewer people in it than during the initial presentation of the project in October, there were some people who spoke out and said they still had issues with the

one of those people was Lori Rich, who lives in

the nearby Leisure Co-Operative just north of 12 Mile in Wixom near where the driveway will connect. She said she's concerned not only about environmental issues with such a development, but with additional traffic through the neighborhood.

"We're concerned about cut-through traffic," she said. "The 50-and-up community should not be a major cut-through street."

The agreement and collaboration between the school and the neighbors nearby was one Commission John Avdoulos said he was pleased with.

"It seems like quite a bit of work has been done to get this in the right direction," he said. "I just want to encourage the continues communication between Catholic Central and the neighbors and the city."

The proposal next goes to the city council for its review and determination.

Plymouth Christian senior marks 1K career points

The finish wasn't what Plymouth Christian Academy wanted to see during its girls basketball game Friday

But the start is something Anna Fernandez will never forget.

Two weeks ago, the senior scored her 1,000th career point, which is a huge accomplishment, especially considering PCA is one of the smallest schools in the state and it plays one of the toughest schedules.

The only problem is she did it during the Ice Breaker tournament against Schoolcraft at Kalamazoo Central. That

Two weeks ago, the senior scored her meant hardly anyone, outside of a few of the players' parents, was around to witness her achieve such an accolade.

So the Eagles did it right when it got the chance.

Their first game back in their home gym, before the opening tipoff, they celebrated Fernandez by presenting her with a game ball for her achievement. She took pictures at halfcourt with her family, and most of the student section was waving signs congratulating her. Some were even wearing shirts that depicted the number "1,000."

It was a huge deal. The only thing that sullied the evening was PCA host-

Plymouth freshman from familiar family

The chatter about Jace Petree was non-stop among the support staff at the scorer's table after Thursday's game.

"How about the freshman tonight, huh?" one person from the athletic department said. "He had 25 points? It looks like he's going to have a pretty good career here."

What Petree did in the Wildcats' 72-62 victory over Berkley as a first-year player was almost unthinkable.

But then you realize he's one of *THOSE* Petrees, and it all just makes sense.

Plymouth (3-0) got its first true test against a scrappy Bears squad that punches well above its weight in the Oakland Activities Association-Blue. They're not on the same level as Clarkston, Ferndale or North Farmington in the tougher Red division, but they have some talented kids who can play.

Namely, Tamir Runinkevich, who sat most of the opening half in foul trouble. His absence allowed the Wildcats to get ahead by as many as 18 points before halftime.

The junior came back after the break and proceeded to score 15 of his 20 points, including leading Berkley on a 10-0 run that trimmed its deficit to just

46-42 with 2:45 left in the third quarter. Berkley's Ben Maurice (16 points) buried a pair of 3-pointers early in the fourth, and then Runinkevich nailed a fadeaway to make it a 57-54 score.

On the verge of giving up a complete comeback, Plymouth needed some answers.

ing Ypsilanti Arbor Prep, an early favorite to win the Division 3 state championship.

Led by four-star Texas A&M commit Mya Petticord (23 points), the Gators had no trouble outmuscling the Eagles to a 72-55 win.

"It was a really cool experience," the fourth-year starter said. "My family got to come to the (Schoolcraft) game, which was really cool. My friends, it was nice to have them here celebrating at our home game. After I practiced here for so many years, to be celebrated here, it was really cool. I really appreciate them. It was super nice of them to come out and watch me. I really appreciate them."

Fernandez scored 10 of her team-best 19 points in the opening quarter, and the Eagles (3-1) played the Gators tough during certain spurts throughout the night. But they just didn't have enough to keep up with Arbor Prep, which made 11 3-pointers.

"They have great talent over there," longtime coach Rod Windle said. "Basketball is a physical game, and our kids need to learn what that's like in terms of that level of play. I thought we rose to that a few times ourselves in terms of our physical play, but it was more reactionary than initiation. I felt like we felt it out more in the first half more than the second half when we just came harder, I think. We learned a lot about tough defense tonight."


Also contributing for the Eagles were Hailey Maulbetsch with 17 points and Morganne Houk with 11.

Arbor Prep kept Fernandez scoreless in the the fourth quarter.

Nevertheless, the loss will be looked at as a tool to get the Eagles ready for postseason play. It won't overshadow Fernandez's big pre-game moment.

"Anna has just been a shining star for our team," Windle said. "Her personality is outgoing and infectious, and she invites others to work alongside of her in ways that make others work better, too. She has a work ethic that's really hard, and somehow she wants others to come along with her, and she does it without wearing them out. It's a fine line for captains to do that, but she's like, 'Hey, let's go! Let's get after it!' Her positive attitude and her own work ethic rubs off on other kids."

When Windle tabbed Fernandez as a varsity player in ninth grade, he was unsure where she'd fit in the rotation. It

took no time for him to realize she needed to be a starter.

"As a coach, you kind of push freshmen down a little bit," Windle added. "Then she stepped up defensively and did some things in practice that were eye-opening. Then I was like, 'I guess she needs to be starting out there right away,' because she was a true starter as a freshman.

"As a varsity coach, having a freshman, I kind of didn't let it be Day 1 and kind of pushed her off a little bit, but she showed me her tenacity and toughness. She has a gentle spirit. Sometimes

that's deceptive because she has a gentle spirit about her. She's tenacious. She showed her mettle early in the practice sessions as a freshman."

Eagles benefit from playing tough competition early on

If boys basketball used the new football playoff points system to determine postseason seeding, PCA would be well on its way to hosting every game in March.

The Eagles (1-3) allowed Arbor Prep to make 15 3-pointers and run away with

an easy 75-59 win.

But that doesn't matter. PCA scheduled the game because the Gators are a talented Division 3 program, one that's only going to make the Eagles improve at a quicker rate.

And that's been the theme for PCA. It's already split with D-1 programs South Lyon East and Livonia Churchill. It'll face two more in Plymouth and Livonia Franklin before winter break.

For a D-4 squad with an enrollment of only 178 students, it certainly has been punching above its weight.

In football, the bigger your schedule, the more you're rewarded. The EAgles are hoping these tougher tests prepare them for a deep playoff run.

"Our December schedule has already been Class A, Class A and Class C," coach Matt Windle said. "We finish out December with Plymouth and Livonia Franklin. So we build that schedule on purpose in December. December is meant for us to really break down what we're trying to work on so we can prepare for a really tough conference and a long stretch in March. As much as we misstepped on some things tonight, we learned some things and got better, which is why we schedule those games in the first place."

Jordan Scott led with 17 points, Chibi Anwunah added 14, which included a pair of two-handed dunks, Nate Pierson nailed two 3s and finished with 10 points and Cam Weller had eight points as well as a dunk himself.

The issue for the Eagles, though, was not trusting their defensive assignments.

The Gators (5-0) kickstarted many of their possessions with drives to the basket. PCA would suck in on defense and leave Arbor Prep's shooters wide open on the outside

on the outside.

That must change going forward.

"Tonight we specifically talked about trusting our rim protectors and not getting sucked in on attacks," Windle added. "We got sucked in way too many times. They probably had 12 3s wide open because our guys got sucked in because that's just a natural reaction. Our job is to trust our teammates, Chibi Anwunah and Cam Weller, whose job is to protect that rim and make them shoot (inside) with two over the top vs. an easy kick outside for a 3.

"That was the big thing for us tonight: They just shot way too many 3s because we weren't playing our rules that we talked about before the game."



big-game guy. We're glad he's here on our side. He's a coachable kid, and his parents did a good job with him in that regard. He's very humble."


So humble, in fact, that he had few words to say about burying the gamewinner.
