#### St. Mary Mercy Livonia gets new name

#### Parent company rebranding across state

Livonia's only hospital — St. Mary Mercy Livonia — is going to look a little different moving forward.

St. Mary Mercy's parent company, Trinity Health, announced a rebranding effort April 13 that will create uniformity across the company's facilities.

The ownership and care level will remain the same, but all eight Michigan

hospitals in the health care system will receive a new name and branding.

That means St. Mary Mercy becomes Trinity Health St. Mary Mercy Livonia, eventually Trinity Health Livonia, and will get some new signage. But, it will be the same place the community already knows and loves.

"We are transforming our identity to

assert our presence as one of Michigan's largest healthcare systems, with a singular commitment to keeping our patients at the center of everything we do," said Rob Casalou, president and CEO of Trinity Health Michigan and Southeast Regions. "We are peeling back the layers

## Indian banquet hall, eatery opens in former Livonia bar

Longtime patrons of Kickers All-American Grill could take one step inside the new Punjab Indian Cuisine and The Celebration banquet center and never recognize it.

The property at 36071 Plymouth in Livonia, vacant for years after the sports bar closed, has new life in the form of an Indian restaurant and banquet facility.

The improvements have garnered a lot of attention from area residents who remember what the building used to look like.

"A lot of people come. They are so surprised," said Mohit Dwahan, the restaurant's owner.

Gone is the dark bar area with dance space on the first floor. It's been replaced with a bright, fresh banquet hall, complete with crystal chandeliers and golden chairs, enough to seat more than 250 people. The room also has several décor pieces straight from In-

Dhawan said he began working in restaurants when he lived in Chicago.

He moved to the Detroit area for an IT job and decided to open his own

#### PCCS set to buy new IT, maintenance building to save money

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools is pivoting on one of its multimillion-dollar 2020 bond projects, saying the current real estate market is better suited for buyers than builders.

District Chief Finance & Operations Officer Deborah J. Piesz revealed during the April 12 board of education meeting that the district is looking to purchase a 37,000-square-foot Plymouth Township building for about \$3.6 million to house its information technology and maintenance departments.

The departments are currently housed in separate, outdated buildings, said Piesz, who added the ideal situation would be to have the departments in one location.

The district originally earmarked up to \$6.9 million in bond money to build a two-story building to serve the same purpose on property near the Plymouth-Canton Educational Park.

"Due in part to supply chain issues, our current bond projects are facing up to 20% cost overages," Piesz told the board of education. "Purchasing this building would cost \$96 per square foot compared to the \$250 (square foot) cost of building."

The building targeted for purchase at 14967 Pilot Drive is in an industrial park east of Beck Road and south of Five Mile Road.

The original plan called for a building to be constructed just off of Joy Road, near the district's salt barn.

the sale of beer and wine at the new Shake Shack in Livonia, 39300 W. Seven Mile has been submitted to the city.

Patrick Howe, an attorney representing Shake Shack, told the city's planning commission beer and wine are typically sold at Shake Shack restaurants, though the license was not originally applied for when the restaurant was going through the initial approval process.

If allowed, it would permit the fast-casual restaurant to sell drinks to-go for customers wanting to enjoy a beer or glass of wine at home.

Since Shake Shack was built on the site of a restaurant that had a liquor license, Romano's Macaroni Grill, it retains that license, Mark Taormina, the city's planning and economic development director, said.

"No special requirements or conditions were imposed by the city at that time, thus the waiver carried over to Shake Shack, allowing it to operate a Class C license at this location without the need to go back through the process," he said. "However, this 1993 approval does not apply to the requested SDM license and is the reason they're before us this everyone."

ning."

Alcohol could be purchased both for inside customers to take home themselves or via a delivery service and brought to their door. It would not be sold through the restaurant's drive-thru window.

The restaurant opened its doors in February, serving up burgers, sandwiches, French fries and milkshakes. It includes a drive-thru and online ordering and pickup. A sign advertising beer and was coming soon was posted

Howe said alcohol would be a tiny part of the business: he estimated about 5% of the shop's revenue would come from beer and wine sales. The amount of types of drinks served would also be minimal, he said.

#### COVID-19 cases, deaths tracker for Wayne, Oakland counties

New coronavirus cases leaped in Michigan in the week ending Sunday, rising 105.5% as 7,725 cases were reported. The previous week had 3,759 new cases of the virus that causes COVID-19.

Michigan ranked 18th among the states where coronavirus was spreading the fastest on a per-person basis, a USA TODAY Network analysis of Johns Hopkins University data shows. In the latest week coronavirus cases in the United States decreased 10% from the week before, with 225,931 cases reported. With 3% of the country's population, Michigan had 3.42% of the country's cases in the last week. Across the country, 31 states had more cases in the latest week than they did in the week before.

Wayne County reported 1,653 cases and 17 deaths in the latest week. A week earlier, it had reported 758 cases and 10 deaths. Throughout the pandemic it has reported 401,129 cases and 7,912 deaths.

Oakland County reported 1,520 cases and seven deaths in the latest week. A week earlier, it had reported 656 cases and nine deaths. Throughout the pandemic it has reported 287,896 cases and 3.821 deaths.

Within Michigan, the worst weekly outbreaks on a per-person basis were in Washtenaw County with 255 cases per 100,000 per week; Alpena County with 176; and Oakland County with 121. The Centers for Disease Control says high levels of community transmission begin at 100 cases per 100,000 per week.

Adding the most new cases overall were Wayne County, with 1,653 cases; Oakland County, with 1,520 cases; and Macomb County, with 967. Weekly case counts rose in 71 counties from the previous week. The worst increases from the prior week's pace were in Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties.

Michigan ranked 35th among states in share of people receiving at least one shot, with 66.8% of its residents at least partially vaccinated. The national rate is 77.3%, a USA TODAY analysis of CDC data shows. The Pfizer and Moderna vaccines, which are the most used in the United States, require two doses administered a few weeks apart.

In the week ending Sunday, Michigan reported administering another 104,243

vaccine doses, including 7,900 first doses. In the previous week, the state administered 109,894 vaccine doses, including 8,216 first doses. In all, Michigan reported it has administered 15,718,745 total doses.

Across Michigan, cases fell in eight counties, with the best declines in Mackinac County, with 0 cases from 6 a week earlier; in Van Buren County, with 26 cases from 30; and in Keweenaw County, with -2 cases from 1.

In Michigan, 81 people were reported dead of COVID-19 in the week ending Sunday. In the week before that, 70 people were reported dead.

A total of 2,400,990 people in Michigan have tested positive for the coronavirus since the pandemic began, and 35,857 people have died from the disease, Johns Hopkins University data

shows. In the United States 80,632,301 people have tested positive and 988,618 people have died.

Note: In the Johns Hopkins University coronavirus data, cases and deaths for the Michigan Department of Corrections and the Federal Correctional Institution separately from Michigan counties.

Hospitals in 22 states reported more COVID-19 patients than a week earlier, while hospitals in 15 states had more COVID-19 patients in intensive-care beds. Hospitals in 32 states admitted more COVID-19 patients in the latest week than a week prior, the USA TODAY analysis of U.S. Health and Human Services data shows.



#### Outdoor seating coming to Farmington restaurant

A longtime restaurant building on a prominent Farmington corner is about to get a facelift.

Bellacino's, 22424 Orchard Lake, plans to make some improvements as well as add some space for diners to enjoy a pizza or sub sandwich outside.

Steve Schneemann, an architect working on the project, said the addition would take up two parking spaces and serve as a casual space for dining that would not include table service.

The plans would also bring another kind of cuisine to the space just north of Grand River as well, he said.

"The owner actually owns another business in addition to Bellacino's, and it's a hot dog business," said Schneemann, who is also a city council member in Farmington. "And he would actually like to use a portion of the building using the same kitchen facilities for the hot dog business."

The plans were reviewed by the Farmington Planning Commission during its meeting April 11 at Farmington City Hall. The commission voted to approve the site plan amendment, moving it forward.

The shop has a storied history in the Farmington community: for 50 years, the building was home to Dan's Giant Submarine Sandwiches, a longtime icon that lasted until the shop closed in 2017. Bellacino's took over the space after the closure, serving up not only pizza but grinders and salads, as well.

With such a focus on outdoor dining in recent years due to the COVID-19 pandemic, some planning commissioners inquired about how the city's current ordinances surrounding dining outdoors governed the space.

Kevin Christiansen, the city's planning and economic development director, said the proposal is one that falls between rules when it comes to outdoor dining. The typical table service for outdoor dining runs from the middle of April to the end of October.

"This is the next step of that, because it's not table service and it's not a place where wait service comes and takes orders," he said. "This is kind of a step back from that but it is a defined area."







#### Your change could be worth big bucks to coin collectors

Al Raddi is happy to give his two cents on what your change might be worth - and what is actually the most valuable may not be what you think.

The chair of the Huron Valley Numismatic Society has been collecting coins for more than six decades.

In an age when cash is no longer king and money changes hands in the form of credit cards, Venmo and Apple pay rather than paper bills and metal coins, coin collections may be on the way out.

"It's a hobby diminishing in the number of collectors, but in certain areas like error coin collection it is growing like crazy," Raddi said. "Certain areas are very strong. Not all areas of numismatics are dying at the same rate."

The 77-year-old Milford Township resident first became enamored with coin collecting when a family friend who worked at the Philadelphia Mint sent him a 1955 proof set specially prepared for collectors prior to issue of circulated coins.


Raddi still has that proof set with "perfect" penny, nickel, dime, quarter and half-dollar coins. But what the collector of more than 3,000 coins searches for now is the imperfect: coins that have blatant errors and therefore are worth much more.

Indeed, he is thrilled whenever the U.S. Mint errs, which happens frequently due to the sheer volume of coins

'Whenever the mint makes a mistake, I get excited — that is why I have so many coins," Raddi said. "Sometimes small mistakes become collectible, just like the inverted Jenny stamp."

It is a dream to find a coin mistake in the magnitude of the famous stamp displaying an upside down airplane, one of which a Birmingham stamp collector sold in 2020 for more than a quarter of a million dollars after holding it in a vault for four decades.

Raddi continues to search circulated coins for small errors like cracks or offcenter stamps, but for dramatic mis-

takes the coins must be purchased from

Older errors are more valuable and harder to find, he added, not because fewer errors were made, but because fewer coins were made.

For this reason, an Indian head cent that is struck off center is more valuable than a Lincoln penny, simply because there are fewer.

Lincoln cents have been made continuously since 1909, but Indian head pennies minted from 1859-1909 are often sought after for particular years in which fewer were minted.

Raddi notes that in 1943 wheat pennies were made mostly of steel due to the war, but a few copper pennies were struck in error, and those can sell now

for between \$100,000 to \$250,000.

While they are found "now and then," Raddi is much more likely to see far less valuable coins on the appraisal nights his group hosts a couple times per year.

Most common are buffalo nickels, mercury dimes and the Indian head pennies that are not rare. He also sees rolls of 1964 half-dollars featuring John F. Kennedy and many coins from the Franklin Mint with no collector value.

Many people don't realize that a coin that is shiny and new may be far more valuable than one that is ancient. When it comes to coins, it's not just age that matters; condition is very important.

Raddi notes that a friend of his collects coins that are mentioned in the Bible, including the "widow's mite," a coin

spoken of in the Gospel of Mark in which a poor widow gives the smallest and least valuable coin, but Christ said her offering was more pleasing to him than those given by the wealthy.

Those coins, over 2,000 years old, can still be purchased by modern collectors, Raddi said, for the bargain price of \$5 or \$10 and even Roman and Greek coins from 500 to 1.000 years before the Christian era can be obtained for \$40 or

Condition and rarity are important and it's not just how many were made, but how many survived. He is looking forward to seeing what coins people have been holding on to and helping them trace their origins.

So what would Raddi most like to see? Two coins in particular: a 1913 Liberty nickel, of which there are only five known to exist; and, more likely, a 1909-s VDB Lincoln wheat penny, which denotes the cent came from the San Francisco mint and bears designer Victor D. Brenner's initials.

The Huron Valley Numismatic Society meets monthly and holds coin shows and appraisal nights periodically. For more information, visit hvns.org.

#### These steps can help protect you from donating to fake charity scams

#### **Dear Rick:**

Last month I gave \$1,000 to a charity for the benefit of Ukrainian children. I received an email that was so disturbing that I had to act.

Unfortunately, I learned that the charity I gave to is a scam. I know I shouldn't have responded to the solicitation, but I did.

I know in the past you've written articles about giving to charity, and I thought you should write one again to remind people of the scams that are out there.

Thank you, M. M.

Dear M. M.

I salute you for coming forward.

All too often when people are scammed, they're too embarrassed to say anything and all that does is help the scammers.

Unfortunately, whenever there is a natural disaster or a geopolitical event, the scam artists come out of the woodwork. They know that Americans are the most generous people in the world, and they look to take advantage of our good nature.

It should not be a surprise to anyone that there has been an explosion of bogus websites, emails, and fake charities due to the Russia-Ukraine war.

When it comes to giving to charity, in order to protect yourself, you need to set rules for yourself. Here are some of the rules that I live by when it comes to donating to a charity.

My first rule is I never give through a phone solicitation. Even if I recognize the charity, I am not comfortable giving through phone solicitations.

Since so many charities sound alike, before I give to an organization I do my due diligence and thoroughly look into the charity. This takes time, and I cannot do this when I receive a phone solicitation

Therefore, if a charity contacts me by phone, more likely than not, I am not even taking the call, but if I do, I never

#### research before you write the check.

give to the phone solicitor.

My next rule is I never give pursuant to an email or something on social media, no matter how much it pulls at my heart strings.

The scam artists know that we all are affected when we see the pictures of children or animals in distress, and they try to exploit us. We must be smarter than them.

Remember, the scam artists are not only looking to scam you out of your money, but also to steal your identity. Therefore, to protect myself, I don't respond to an email solicitation from a charity.

When doing my due diligence, not only do I look into the legitimacy of the organization, but I also look at how the organization is spending their money.

After all, there are legitimate charities that are poorly run and waste donors' money. I don't want to give to them. Rather, I want to give to a legitimate charity that is a good steward of their donor's contributions.

I often look at sites such as charitynavigator.org, charitywatch. org, or give.org to collect background information on the organization. These sites provide a wealth of information, allowing you to make an informed decision as to whether you should donate your hard-earned

There's no shortage of legitimate charities that are raising money to help the Ukrainian people. Unfortunately, there's also a fair number of charities that are just out to scam you. The key is to do your research before you write the check.





to reveal a unified organization with a shared legacy and mission of service."

As the sole hospital in Livonia, St. Mary Mercy is a beloved part of the community that people have rallied around during the pandemic.

Local businesses, community groups and first responders showered the hospital with support, personal protective equipment and meals during 2020.

Trinity Health is the largest Catholic, not-for-profit healthcare system in the United States and operates in 25 states. Bringing every facility under the Trinity Health banner will not result in any closures. Trinity Health Michigan employs more than 24,000 workers across its

eight hospitals, physician groups, three home health and hospice agencies and senior living communities.

Health system leaders said during a news conference that the rebranding strategy will create clarity and, ultimately, save the company money with the use of just one name.

Metro Detroiters familiar with the St. Joseph Mercy Health System and IHA might not know the two are part of the same company, and now that confusion will be gone.

"Patients will continue to see the same doctors and providers they know and trust," said Dr. Rosalie Tocco-Bradley, chief clinical officer of Trinity Health Michigan.

"It's very expensive to build these days and way cheaper to purchase existing buildings," Piesz said. "The marketplace on buildings like this is tight and the price is reasonable, especially considering the building's current owner is leaving its furnishings and fixtures at no extra cost."

If the board of education decides to vote in favor of the plan at its April 26 meeting, the funds to pay for the building would come out of the district's general fund, not from the bond funds,

"That's because there is no language in the bond wording that would allow for a purchase for this purpose," Piesz said, adding there is surplus money in the district's general fund that can cover the cost of the purchase.

The district is projected to save between \$2 million and \$3 million by buying instead of building, said board of education treasurer Patrick Kehoe.

"This would allow us to put this savings into other bond projects," he said.

In addition to the expected cost savings, the purchase of the building would give the district more space for professional development training and spur enhanced collaboration between its

curriculum & instruction, information technology and maintenance staffs, Piesz said.

In anticipation of the purchase being approved, the district offered a nonbinding letter of intent to the seller and held three closed board sessions to discuss the purchase of the property under attorney-client privilege. The district

also conducted pre-purchase inspections that indicated the site requires about \$180,000 in maintenance.


"Given the age of the building (it was built in 2002), the maintenance required is what would be expected," Piesz said. "Overall, it has been well taken


If a purchase agreement ultimately is chiseled out between the district and the building's owner, district personnel could move into the building as early as July 1, Piesz said.

restaurant, which was the beginning of Punjab Indian Cuisine. The eatery has operated in Farmington Hills and Troy and most recently in Auburn Hills. The Auburn Hills location closed in order to focus all attention on the new Livonia spot.

He said he began looking for a space before the COVID-19 pandemic when he realized his customers were coming from western Wayne County.

"I was looking for a place in Canton because I have all of my customers in this area," he said. "We were delivering every day in this area."

An American concept restaurant was planned for the building back in 2015, but those plans never went forward. The parking lot has been used as storage for vehicles the past few years.

Dhawan held off on buying the building due to the pandemic. Records show the property was purchased in late space. In addition to the massive work done on the first level, he also added a bar to the upstairs — which formerly held Joey's Comedy Club - to accommodate the restaurant portion of the business. That section can also be used to host small events, like birthday parties or showers.


Despite all that work, there's still more to do. Dhawan said he's adding seats to the patio and hopes to have that open in the next few weeks.

The restaurant features a wide array of Indian cuisine, with butter chicken being the big seller since opening, Dhawan said. Carryout is also available.

Dhawan said plenty of employees at the nearby Ford Transmission Plant have stopped by in recent weeks to try the food. A buffet is served around lunchtime in the middle of the week.

#### Greenfield Village opens with first new addition in 20 years

In a land of old, something new has found its home — well, maybe not "new" in the common use.

The Henry Ford's Greenfield Village in Dearborn marked the start of a new season with the debut of an addition to its campus of relics from the past: The Detroit Central Market.

The market is the village's first permanent addition in more than 20 years since it last established the Detroit, Toledo and Milwaukee Roundhouse in 2000.

"We've been doing historic foodways here for 40 years and this is going to be able to allow us to broaden that discussion," said Jim Johnson, the director of Greenfield Village and the curator of structures and landscapes. "As far as not only the growing of food, the cooking of food at home, but also how were food systems in place in the 19th century?

"And how did that inform us about things that we really need to think about today?"

The Detroit Central Market was a bustling farmers market from 1861 through 1893 and was originally located in what is now Cadillac Square.

The Henry Ford acquired the former market shed in 2003 when the structure was slotted for demolition and a city historian alerted the museum to its significance — and potential.

"The building was much altered, it had a brick building put around it, and it was hard to really recognize what this building was," Johnson said, detailing the building's storied history, including its latest purpose as a riding stable on Belle Isle. "But photographs and the evidence left behind showed the true potential of it."

Over the course of three months, the structure was dismantled and stored away until sufficient funding was secured to restore it.

The project eventually broke ground in 2020 and construction ensued into early 2022, which Johnson said was no small undertaking. Each section of the building had to be cleared of lead paint, wooden timbers repaired and an entire engineering system had to be developed to get the building up to code.

The structure now stands in the village's Main Street District, across from the Roundhouse and Edison Illuminating.

Johnson said the new addition will serve as a multipurpose facility for special events and seasonal extravaganzas during the fall and winter.

It will also help visitors to further explore the evolution of food systems and food safety throughout history, and Johnson said he hopes to feature visiting lecturers, guest chefs and local produce.

The village is also building a new restaurant across from the Detroit Central Market that is expected to open in 2024.

Friday marked the start of a new season for Greenfield Village, which also signaled the return of Thomas the Tank Engine May 13.

It's open to the public Thursday through Monday through June 19 before returning to full week hours June 20.


