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## Livonia Noble Library's future still unclear

Branch has been closed for 3 years due to mold concerns

Rumors that Livonia will permanently close the Alfred Noble Library are, according to city administration, premature.

But, nearly three years after the library first closed in October 2019 due to mold concerns, its future is still uncertain.

"We have not made that decision yet," Mayor Maureen Miller Brosnan said regarding a potential closure. "But, obviously, there's a couple things that have happened that created an opportunity for the library commission to ask where our library system is headed in the future."

The city's library commission is in the process of

selecting a firm to create a strategic plan for all three of the city's library buildings - an initiative originally pitched in 2021. Brosnan said that process will help her office decide what to do with Noble. The process will allow residents to voice their concerns and ideas as they've been able to do with the Livonia Vision 21 and Greenmead master plans.

"The cool thing about this is it will look at the entire

## **Stevenson grad faces** long recovery after carjacking, shooting

Justin Schultz has his whole life ahead of him. But what's ahead looks a little murkier than it did a few weeks ago.

Schultz, 22, a Livonia Stevenson graduate, survived a gunshot wound he sustained Aug. 17 when three men stole his car. He had been leaving his apartment in Southfield to grab some food.

"I saw someone running up with a rifle, and he got like four or five feet away from me," Schultz said. "He said, 'Give me them keys.' That's verbatim what he said. My mind must have just been in shock, like, this can't be real.'

He said the next thing he knew, he had been shot in the leg, and he threw the car keys toward the trio.

The three assailants almost immediately crashed Schultz's car and fled the scene on foot. Police have two of the men in custody and are working to locate the third as well as a fourth man who showed up later with a getaway car.

"Thankfully, they didn't take his cell phone," said Paul Schultz, Justin's father. "If they had, he would have bled to death and we'd be planning a funeral in-

The gunshot broke Justin Scultz's right femur, severed his femoral artery and damaged the nerves in his leg. He's expected to begin inpatient

expect to find in a wholesale club, the store also offers two of its own brands: Wellsley Farms and Berkley

The Wellsley Farms brand incorporates a full selection of dairy products, produce, snacks, juices, desserts and fresh heat-and-eat meals, while the Berkley Jensen brand includes general merchandise products and sundries items.

"I welcome you to match the quality and price of the national brands to our brands," Frangie said, adding that customers can expect to pay about 25 percent less for BJ's brands.

The store also offers rotisserie chickens for \$4.99 and, unlike some other wholesale clubs, has a fullservice deli counter.

"We also have a bake shop," he said. "The cookies are awesome. I buy them for my kids and they're gone before I even get one."

In addition to the usual fare, the store is always stocked with seasonal merchandise, currently including fall and Halloween décor, with large pumpkins available throughout the store.

The new BJ's location also includes a tire center, optical center, and sells wine and liquor.

"Our offerings are always changing," Frangie said. "We always have our ears to the ground so we can provide what our customers want."

rehabilitation at Michigan Medicine in Ann Arbor soon, but doctors are unsure what his recovery will

'That's the unknown right now," Paul Schultz said. "When I did speak to the nerve specialist, they said there's so much swelling going on right now, his nerves are compressed and there's been a lot of disruption so it'll be two to three weeks after the injury that they can assess that. ...

"Nerve pain will probably be a reality for Justin for the rest of his life."

Justin Schultz, a senior at Oakland University in Rochester studying finance, said he's focusing on regaining function of his leg and, consequently, his independence.

"My first goal for my leg is just being able to get out of bed and being able to use the walker independently," he said. "Right now, I can barely lift my leg. It's being able to get up and take a few steps on my own and do basic, everyday things like go to the sink and brush my teeth."

The family is hoping to raise \$55,000 through a

GoFundMe titled "Justin's road to healing." Paul Schultz said the biggest concern is medical expenses, because the family's insurance isn't covering many parts of the rehabilitation. He said his son's apartment rent, vehicle recovery, potential car repairs and other unforeseen costs related to the incident are also loom-

"I can just imagine what's coming down the road," Schultz said. "He's got enough to worry about without finances."

Though Justin Schultz ventured outside Livonia for college, his family still lives there. While at Stevenson, he played on the varsity soccer team for three years, spent his senior year as soccer captain and was involved in DECA and National Honors Society. He took a hefty number of Advanced Placement courses, too, and joked that he's always been a bit of a "try-hard" when it comes to school.

Schultz said he'd like to be back at Oakland in time for the winter semester so he can wrap up his degree and, he hopes, work alongside his father as a financial

"I want to go back to school and start working again," he said.

library system," Brosnan said. "It looks at all of our libraries and the role of libraries in a community, not just as a distribution point for books."

#### A question of whether Noble should reopen

Back in 2019, officials determined the repairs Noble needed would cost \$1.6 million. Those funds weren't in the budget at the time, and then the library closed along with the Sandburg and Civic Center branches when the COVID-19 pandemic began in early 2020.

· If Noble were to reopen, it would likely need extensive repairs. Brosnan said the water damage that caused mold has been a reoccurring issue for years. An ongoing capital needs assessment the city is undertaking will help determine exactly what Noble

Brosnan said a timeline for a decision on the building's future will hinge on how much residents engage with the strategic plan process - more information takes more time to go through.

"Sometime next year, I think we're going to have a really good idea," she said.



## **Deciding the library's role in Livonia**

While Noble has been shuttered, Livonia residents have been using the Civic Center and Sandburg libraries more. According to circulation data, use of both libraries has steadily risen since 2018. Library programming overall, even without Noble, is also up.

At the Civic Center campus, circulation between August 2021 and July 2022 was 420,426. That's up from 371,142 in 2018.

In the last two years, Livonia has also started using its libraries to loan out seeds and facilitate a city-wide

Brosnan said she hopes a strategic plan will help Livonia's libraries continue evolving. She envisions creating more ways for people to meet and exchange ideas, whether that means meeting in person or not.

"We as a city want to look at how we advance our library system to make sure we're keeping pace with the challenges people are facing today," she said. "We absolutely are trying to make the libraries more relevant."

Livonia has been reinvesting in the Civic Center and Sandburg branches. Recent progress on that front has included newly-approved funds to repair the roof, plus a new auditorium and furniture at Civic Center, and a new sidewalk at Sandburg.

City council recently put a request for a new roof at Sandburg on hold until council holds a committee meeting about the future of the libraries.

Council President Jim Jolly was in a minority who voted against that move — he and Council Vice President Laura Toy voted in dissent at council's Sept. 7 meeting, during which Councilman Brandon McCullough was absent - and said he sees value in the brickand-mortar facilities the city has.

"Although these libraries are changing, their value is absolutely no less important than it was the day they opened up," he said.

Brosnan's office also plans to request new air conditioning for Civic Center and new building controls for both libraries. Both of those projects would need city council approval.

Formally known as the North American International Auto Show, the event has historically brought hundreds of thousands of people to the motor city. This year, the multi-day event is meant for everyone – car fanatics and those who are less passionate.

From flying cars (yes, you read that right) to rock stars to food trucks, the exhibits appeal to a wide range of interests.

This year, the show is placing an emphasis on the electrification of the industry.

With so many pit stops, it can be hard to know where to start. Here's your comprehensive guide to the event:

#### When is the auto show?

The show is open to the general public from Sept. 17-25.

From Sept. 17-24, hours are 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. On Sept. 25, it's open 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.

Other events:

• Industry Tech Days and Auto-Mobili-D, a chance to preview emerging technologies and new start-ups, are on Sept. 14 and 15.

• The Black Tie Charity Preview, a fundraising gala, is on Sept. 16.

#### Where is the auto show?


The event will be scattered across downtown Detroit. It will be both indoors and outdoors for the first time in the show's history.

Locations include Campus Martius, Huntington Place, Hart Plaza and Spirit Plaza.

#### **Ticket prices**

For the public show, tickets are \$20 for adults, \$12 for seniors 65 and older and \$10 for children ages 3-12. Children 2 and under can get in for free. A family pass is \$50.

Tickets for the Industry Days, meant for those who work in the mobility in-

dustry, are \$75 per person.

Black Tie Charity Preview tickets cost \$400 each or \$700 per pair. This includes access to the entire show and the VIP Ribbon Cutting Ceremony inside Huntington Place.

#### Take flight

The future has become reality with the auto show's air mobility exhibits – from jet packs to flying car technology.

"This exciting addition to the show is a natural extension of the evolving transportation ecosystem, especially as people continue to look for creative ways to expand personal mobility," said Detroit Auto Show Chairman Joe Lunghamer. "We'll give auto show audiences a taste of the future today with a look at the whole spectrum of mobility – from the thrill of human propulsion to amphibious vehicles you can keep in your backyard to EVs leading the industry's transformation."

Electric vertical take-off and landing (eVTOL) companies including AIR, Airspace Experience Technologies and AERWINS Technologies will display their aircrafts. Visitors can fly in the cockpit of AIR ONE through virtual reality.

A jet suit from Gravity Industries lets humans fly, and Omni is bringing the world's first-ever flying hoverboard.

#### Family fun

The Detroit auto show is taking families on a blast to the past with the Dinosaur and Off-Road Vehicle Encounter.

A Jurassic walk-thru experience at the Huntington Place Ballroom features more than 80 life-like dinosaurs, a band, crafts and fossil digs.

While you're there, you can check out the one and only Flintmobile – the car used in the 1994 feature film "The Flintstones."

Meanwhile, attendees can watch a Monster Truck Throwdown in Hart Plaza, including the world's first battery-powered monster truck. The world's largest rubber duck, standing at 61 feet, will also be on display at Hart Plaza.

A hot spot for family fun, an arcade

on wheels will be parked at Hart Plaza where visitors can play Xbox, Nintendo Switch and PlayStation, with hundreds of games to choose from.

#### Music

Grammy-winning musician Nile Rodgers and CHIC are the headline performers at this year's Black Tie Charity Preview at Huntington Place in Detroit.

Rodgers, a Rock & Roll Hall of Famer, co-founded CHIC and is co-founded CHIC, which is best known for dance favorites like "Le Freak" and "Good Times."

Performances open to the public will be at Hart Plaza 6-11 p.m. Sept. 16.


#### Where to park


Parking in downtown Detroit is notoriously difficult, and the allure of the auto show won't make it any easier.

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




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
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## Nurse-midwives come to Trinity Health to work with expectant mothers

For centuries, midwives have been used to help women deliver babies. The idea of a midwife may sound old-fashioned, but the practice of midwifery has evolved. Now considered certified medical professionals, Nurse-Midwives can play an important role in a woman's journey through pregnancy.

Certified nurse-midwives are nurses who specialize in advanced practice nursing. They have a nursing degree and a master's degree and are accredited by the American Midwifery Certificate Board (AMCB).

Since 1996, nurse-midwives have worked at Trinity Health St. Joseph Mercy Ann Arbor, attending more than 2,300 births. With their arrival to Trinity Health St. Mary Mercy Livonia and the Trinity Health IHA Medical Group -Schoolcraft Campus this fall, expectant mothers from Livonia and surrounding communities will have additional options on where to seek support and care.

## What to consider when returning to work after retirement

Dear Rick:

A couple of years before COVID, I accepted a buy-out offer from my employer. At the time, I wrote you and you suggested that I delay Social Security until my full retirement age. Your theory was that my military pension and my Social Security would then cover all my living expenses and I'm happy to say that is exactly what has happened.

I began collecting my Social Security earlier this year, and even with the current inflation, my pension and Social Security cover all of my needs.

Recently, my former employer has asked me to come back to work. Even though I don't need the money, I have been somewhat bored in retirement. I am considering the offer; however, I have some concerns.

My first is, the company said I would be treated as an independent contractor, not as an employee. What does this mean for tax purposes? In addition, a friend of mine told me that I have to be cautious, because my Social Security benefits may be affected in the future.

I am curious as to your thoughts on these two issues.

Thank you, Rob

Dear Rob:

First, I want to thank you for your service to our country. It is people like you who protect our freedoms and our way of life. Our country is indebted to veterans like you.

There is a tax difference between an employee versus an independent contractor. As an employee, your employer is responsible for withholding state and federal taxes from your paycheck, including Social Security taxes. In addition, the employer is responsible for their share of your Social Security and unemployment taxes. On the other hand, as an independent contractor, the company is not responsible to withhold taxes or, in fact, to pay any taxes on your behalf. You are responsible for those.

Therefore, independent contractors must file a Schedule C with your normal 1040 tax return. The amount earned for your services, less any business expenses, would be taxed to you as ordinary income. (Note: As an employee, it is difficult to deduct any business expenses but, that is not the case being an independent contractor.)

In addition, being self-employed, you would be responsible for the self-employment tax on your net income. Currently, the self-employment tax is 15.3

With regards to your Social Security benefits, the fact that you are working would not negatively impact your benefit. I think your friend is confused about the impact regarding working before your full retirement age.

If someone chooses to collect Social Security before their full retirement age and their earned income exceeds a threshold, they will see a reduction in their Social Security benefits. However, since you are at full retirement age, your benefits would be unaffected. In fact, it is possible that your benefits may increase because you are paying more money into the Social Security system.

There are tax issues to consider when returning to work after already collecting Social Security. However, as I always advise people: don't let the tax tail wag the dog. The focus should always be what ends up in your pocket, not what ends up in the tax man's pocket.

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


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
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

It was the second time in 3 weeks that ArJon Thompson has been in serious pain.

While the Livonia Stevenson quarterback clutched a bottle of Gatorade Gatorlyte in his left hand, he barreled over, placed his palms on his knees and fought back his vomit.

ck his vomit. He was woozy,

He was absolutely spent.

And he almost threw up on his teammates in the post-game huddle Friday night at Westland John Glenn.

And while this pain was more severe than what he endured in Week 1, the dual-threat QB will take this type of nausea any day of the week.

That pain he felt in Week 1? That was emotional pain. That was realizing the Spartans could've done more. They could've made fewer mistakes. They could've fought back. Instead, they lost to Howell, 18-0.

Vomiting sucks. But feeling heartache with your teammates is much worse.

And that's what was going through Thompson's mind late against the RockStevenson trailed, 20-14. There was only 1:29 remaining. And it was fourth and 1 near the goal line.

"We didn't have an option," Thompson said of the moment. "The other team (John Glenn) might have an option to lose. We don't have an option to lose. After that first game, we told ourselves we were never going to feel like that again. We were never going to feel (embarrassed from defeat) again.

"A 20-7 loss? Nah-uh. We're going to fight back no matter what. We're going to fight back until they physically kick us

With a comeback in Week 1's Xenith Prep Kickoff Classic well out of reach, Novi brought in backup quarterback Caleb Walker to close out the game.

And in Week 2, the junior led the Wildcats to a late-game upset against Hartland. Walker tossed a 5-yard touchdown to Boden Fernsler to secure the 13-10 victory.


Week 3 proved to be Walker's breakout performance. Novi downed Salem 43-10 thanks to the QB finishing 21 of 32 passing for 408 yards and a staggering six TDs. And on the receiving end of one of those TDs? Luke Aurilia.

When Jim Sparks took over the program a year ago, Aurilia was the new coach's safety blanket. Aurilia brought both a passing and running threat to the QB position. Plus, he's been a heck of a leader. If you didn't see that side of him on the football field, you for sure saw it on the basketball court.

He entered this fall as one of the top returning QBs in the Kensington Lakes Activities Association.

But it's clear the Wildcats have a better chance to win the KLAA-West with Walker behind center. And that's not a slight at Aurilia. Aurilia is a pure athlete. He could play running back, fullback, tight end or receiver if need-

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# Wanna see some football? These are the five best Week 4 games

All games kick off at 7 p.m. Friday, Sept. 16.

#### Livonia Churchill (1-2, 0-2) at Livonia Franklin (3-0, 2-0) (KLAA-East)

The first matchup for the Livonia City Championship doesn't have as much sheen as we'd like.

Livonia Franklin and Livonia Churchill have been trending in different directions

The Patriots have followed up last year's Division 2 state semifinal appearance by ripping off three-straight wins, including beating two solid teams in Canton and Dearborn.

The Chargers couldn't have looked better in their opening week victory over Plymouth during the Battle at the Big House. But they've since dropped back-to-back games, getting upset by Westland John Glenn in Week 2 and losing to defending state champion Belleville a week ago.

Churchill needs this win more than Franklin, but that doesn't mean the Patriots are going to roll over and die. This should be a great Week 4 matchup, despite the Chargers entering on a two-game losing streak.

#### Livonia Stevenson (2-1, 2-0) at Dearborn (1-2, 0-2) (KLAA-East)

During the post-game huddle following last week's 21-20 comeback win at Westland John Glenn, one of the Spartans jokingly shouted, "Let's win the Dearborn City Championship next week!"

Even if that comment was tongue in cheek, Livonia Stevenson can do just that in Week 4.

Dearborn is coming off back-to-back losses to Belleville and Franklin, arguably the two best teams in the KLAA-East. And Stevenson has proved it can play as a unit and fight through adversity since losing 18-0 to Howell in the opening week.

Coach Randy Micallef admitted the Spartans were almost caught sleep-

The Raiders finally picked up a win after edging Troy, 9-0, in Week 3. But their defense is once again getting a serious test, this time against rival Farmington

Cameron Pettaway has proven to be one of the top running backs in the Oakland Activities Association, and QB Dominic Pesci has been able to air it out each week for the Falcons.

That's trouble for the Raiders, who were gashed both on the ground and through the air against Caledonia two weeks ago.

Yes, it's a rivalry game, so throw out the records. But unless North Farmington's defense shows up, this game could get out of hand.

## South Lyon (2-1, 2-1 LVC) at Detroit Country Day (3-0)

The Yellowjackets enter this matchup undefeated, but they haven't faced a team as challenging as South Lyon, which beat Detroit Country Day 31-7 a year ago.

## 6. Milford (2-1, 1-1 LVC); Last week: No. 7)



off this field."

And then he raced 27 yards down the far sideline for a TD to turn a 13-point deficit into a 20-14 score with 9:28 left.



ed. And he knows all the plays for each position.

Walker is more of a traditional QB. He's not a threat to break off 80-yard runs like Aurilia. But he's got a cannon for an arm. Having him throw the passes allows Sparks to use Aurilia as a gadget guy in his fun-and-gun offense.

Hey, this kind of setup worked for the New Orleans Saints with Drew Brees and Taysom Hill. Now it appears to be working for the Wildcats, who just got stronger on offense by moving a few pieces around their chess table. That just speaks to Aurilia's selflessness. The 'we' is definitely bigger than the 'me' at Novi.

## Will the Cougars actually make the playoffs?

Without counting the COVID-19-shortened season in 2020, when every team in Michigan was allowed to compete in the playoffs, Garden City hasn't made the postseason since 2018.

That's why coach Thomas Michaelson is putting his team in a position to get there this season.

The second-year coach went for the win in the Cougars' 29-27 victory over Melvindale in Week 3.

After the Cougars punched in a TD late in the fourth quarter, Michaelson elected to go for two points, both entrusting his offense to secure the win and giving his defense a little breathing room should the Cardinals attempt the comeback.

Garden City QB Nathan Wasil pitched to Jessey Chavez to score the two-point conversion

Melvindale scored on the ensuing possession with 2:08 left. But it was forced to go for two to knot the score. Cougars lineman Paul Wint plugged the hole, which allowed Travis Hartwell and Christopher Kosniewski to swarm to the ball and wrap up the ball carrier just short of the goal line.

Michaelson's gamble paid off. Now Garden City is 2-1 overall and undefeated in the Western Wayne Athletic Conference. And it's likely the second-best team in the league behind Redford Union, last year's WWAC champions.

There's a lot to like about this Division 4 squad, including do-all running back Owen McGraw, and now the Cougars have games coming up against D-2 Dearborn Heights Crestwood and D-3 Redford Thurston. Wins over the next two weeks will yield plenty of playoff points. They likely need five or six wins to get in

## Who else can make plays for the Spartans?

Livonia Stevenson quarterback Ar-Jon Thompson wasn't a surprise entering the fall.

The dual-threat junior turns likely sacks into TD runs. He bounces a likely 3-yard gain into an 80-yarder. And, when given time behind the line, he can laser passes down the field.

But he cannot do it alone if the Spartans (2-1, 2-0) expect to keep winning games. He scored all three of their TDs on the ground in Week 3 at Westland John Glenn, willing them to a 21-20 comeback victory

They used running back Alex Bowser in spurts. And a handful of receivers hauled in chains-moving catches.

But Stevenson is missing a playmaker or two.

You only have to look across town to see what I'm talking about. Livonia Franklin has running back Cordell Mabins Jr. running for hundreds of yards, Tyler Garrett catching passes and racing for TDs and QB JD Bates finding his rhythm. Livonia Churchill has running back Jon Lytle-Montgomery, receivers Jayden Allen and Johnny Pallozzi and QB Evan Snead.

Bowser does a good job of keeping defenses honest. Defenses can't only pay attention to Thompson.

But who else can be a stud playmaker on Stevenson's offense? Hopefully, we find out in Week 4.
