

Arlen-Tonda team wins; Benson unseated

Although the vote on the millage issue was extremely close, there never was any question on the outcome of the contest for the Plymouth Board of Education.

A half an hour after the polls closed Monday, it was apparent the winners would be

Richard T. Arlen of Plymouth and Flossie B. Tonda of Canton Township.

Arlen led the field of six candidates with 3,127 votes followed by Mrs. Tonda with 2,997. Incumbent Marda Benson, board president, lost by 411 votes with a total of 2,586.

Steve Harper placed fourth at 2,223 followed by Betty Hamann at 1,178 and William L. Brown at 819.

ARLEN WON in five of the nine precincts, carrying Central Middle, Isbister, Starkweather, West Middle, and Miller. Mrs. Tonda placed first in three precincts—Allen, Farrand, Fiegel—and Ms. Benson in one, Gallimore.

Arlen and Mrs. Tonda were both endorsed and backed by Concerned Parents, who have organized against modular scheduling at the Centennial Educational Park.

Arlen, well-known in the City of Plymouth, placed first in all city precincts. Mrs. Tonda of Canton did well in all Canton precincts except Gallimore, placing second in Miller and first in Fiegel.

There was no direct correlation between the vote on the millage and votes for trustee. In the three precincts which gave "yes" votes to the millage, Arlen placed first in Miller, second in Fiegel, and second in Gallimore. In the pro-millage precincts, Mrs. Tonda placed second in Miller, first in Fiegel, and third in Gallimore.

Ms. Benson, the incumbent who would be a normal target of a "no" vote on millage, placed first in Gallimore, and third in Miller and Fiegel.

Instead of millage being a primary factor on the board race, the factors seemed to be the choices of Canton residents and the campaign put together by Concerned Parents.

Concerned Parents' membership is drawn heavily from Plymouth, where Ms. Benson, a city resident, normally would have run strong. The result was that the Concerned Parents' ticket eroded Ms. Benson's votes in the Plymouth area and carried Canton votes as expected.

The impact of Concerned Parents on the trustee race is seen by the fact the group has a following of about 500 persons with ability to influence more votes in a campaign. The 400-vote victory margin for Mrs. Tonda suggests the anti-modular forces were a major factor.

The election still leaves three Canton residents on the school board—Mrs. Tonda, Tom Yack and George Lawton. E.J. McClendon and Joe Gray are Plymouth Township residents. Monday's election leaves the City of Plymouth with two residents on the school board, board Vice-president Marcia Borowski and Arlen.

A record number of 7,123 voters cast ballots Monday. The previous high was about 6,400. With some 27,000 voters registered in the Plymouth Community School District, the turnout was 26 per cent. Some 261 persons went to the polls but didn't vote for the Plymouth millage.

Recount likely

School millage fails by one-vote margin

On Monday the millage for Plymouth Schools had been defeated by the narrowest of all possible margins—a tie. By Tuesday afternoon, however, the margin widened when the announcement was made that the millage was defeated by one vote.

The final vote on the request for 4.75 mills was 3,434 no and 3,433 yes. The Board of Canvassers recessed at 5 p.m. Tuesday and was scheduled to officially certify the results Wednesday.

FROM ABOUT midnight Monday through all day Tuesday the millage election results were at a 3,431 tie vote. For the district, the difference between a tie vote and a defeat by one vote is negligible because the proposal would have failed with the tie.

The millage question did have a yes plurality of 13 votes when all nine precincts had reported in at about 9:30 p.m. Monday, but ended up in a tie when 281 absentee ballots were counted about midnight. The absentee ballot vote on Monday was 142 no and 134 yes.

There were, however, five absentee ballots which were not counted because of technical faults, such as an improperly signed application for an absentee ballot. The Board of Canvassers met to certify the election but recessed at about 1 a.m. Tuesday to determine what should be done with the five absentee ballots.

During the day Tuesday, the district consulted with its attorney, the state attorney general's office and the Wayne County elections' office. Late afternoon a legal interpretation was given by the state that the ballots could be counted.

At about 4 p.m. the absentee ballot counting board reconvened to count the five absentee ballots and submit a new report. The Board of Canvassers received that report and then announced at about 5:30 p.m. that the votes of the five ballots were three no and two yes, the same pattern followed by the other 281 absentee voters.

The final absentee vote was 150 no and 136 yes.

THE FIVE BALLOTS had not been opened but were sealed in a ballot box. Ben Creech, chairman of the Board of Canvassers, explained that absolutely no one had known whether the five were yes or no votes until they were opened by the absentee counting board when it reconvened at 4 p.m. Tuesday.

The errors were discovered by Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes, chairman of the absentee ballot counting board and former treasurer of Plymouth Township. To be on safe grounds and make sure proper procedure was followed, she said, a call was placed to the state election commission in Lansing which instructed that the five ballots in question be sealed and not counted Monday night.

Creech said the five absentee ballots were put in a sealed bag and locked in the school safe for Monday night and the next morning placed in a sealed ballot box. "There's no question in my mind but that the security of those ballots was protected."

WHEN THE VOTE is officially certified, the election will be over and any change could result only from the due process avenues of a recount request or court action.

The voting machines and polling books will remain sealed for 30 days. A recount request, if one is to be made, must be made within five days of Wednesday's certification.

In case of such a request, the recount would be conducted by the state election commission in front of challengers and precinct election workers. It would be at least a week before a recount could get under way.

Members of the Board of Canvassers are Creech, Sylvia Rozian, Carolyn Sellman, Garnett Stickney, and Barbara McKelvey.

IN MONDAY'S voting, the millage was defeated in six of the nine precincts plus by absentee ballot voters.

The outcome would not even have been close except for positive support in significant numbers from Canton Township. Precinct Nine, Miller School, approved the request for 4.75 mills by 576 to 355. Precinct Eight, Fiegel School, which includes part of Canton, supported the millage 271 to 228 and Precinct Two, Gallimore, supported the tax 404 to 345.

Precincts voting against the millage were: Central Middle, 407 to 344; Isbister, 361 to 325; Starkweather, 269 to 185; Allen, 406 to 361; West Middle, 470 to 460; Farrand, 443 to 373.

The results suggest a large yes vote was generated in Canton by the opening of three new elementary schools next fall to handle that township's expanding population. Plymouth and Plymouth Township, with less population growth and older populations, seemed to be voting against the millage to prevent property taxes from rising.

A "no more taxes" attitude also seemed to be reflected in the voting on the Schoolcraft millage request which was defeated.

Sheldon-Hanford light OK'd

Faced with mounting pressure from township and school officials and Canton residents, the Wayne County Road Commission announced it will install a full phase traffic light at the corner of Sheldon and Hanford roads, the scene of a two-car accident that took the life of a four-year-old Canton boy on June 2.

The announcement that the light would be installed came almost three weeks in advance of expected action by the road commission. Lyle Nustad, a safety engineer, told the township board last week that traffic studies usually take 30 days to complete.

"We initiated investigations as soon as we heard of the accident because we anticipated a heavy public reaction," said Walter Meyers, county highway engineer.

"Our traffic volume count and turning movements at the intersection indicate a light is warranted. We'll be going to our board Thursday (today) for approval of the light."

Meyers said approval for the \$6,000 project will probably be granted because the road commission engineers have established the need for the light.

"NOT TO BE in a defensive position," Meyers added, "but a light probably wouldn't have saved that boy's life. It was a rear-end collision and that wouldn't have been prevented by a light."

"If anything, a light may cause more of those kinds of accidents. You can put up as many warning systems as you care to, but unless drivers heed them, there's nothing we can do," Meyers said.

Meyers added that while he was not positive, he anticipated the light would be on at all times.

The intersection is used several times a day by students crossing Sheldon to attend Miller Elementary.

Installation of the light is contingent on action by Detroit Edison, and the power company, at the request of Supervisor Robert Greenstein, said it will move immediately to aid the county in installing the light.

"We have to install the poles and a messenger or put up span wires before the county can put up the light," said Ralph Mertz, a spokesman for Edison.

"WE DON'T KNOW the background of the incident but we do know that the community has determined a light is needed there."

"We hope to have it all set sometime next week."

Mertz said Greenstein had asked him to get together with the county to expedite action on the light.

"He told us they had wanted a light for sometime, and we have to consider it a top priority item. Usually this sort of thing takes at least two weeks just to get ordered."

"I'd say we're moving on it pretty quickly. We've skipped a lot of the formalities to get the job done immediately."

Lou Stelly, assistant traffic engineer with the road commission, said that while volume on Sheldon has increased each of the past four years, the last year has shown a large increase.

"It took a very large jump since last year, principally I think because Sheldon is now paved all the way to Ford and there is a shopping center down there now. With the traffic volume as it is now, a light is warranted."

IN OTHER developments since the fatal accident two weeks ago, Jesse Perkins, 23, of 1912 Marlowe, Canton has been arraigned on charges of negligent homicide in the accident.

Perkins was driving the car that hit the vehicle in which the young boy, Munna Mohla, was riding.

Perkins was arraigned Friday before Judge Dunbar Davis in the 35th District Court and released to appear on a \$10,000 personal recognizance bond.

A preliminary examination has been set for July 8.

If convicted of the charge, a high misdemeanor, Perkins faces a maximum sentence of two years in jail.

Housing rehab guidelines issued for grant program

Low-income Canton families will soon have an opportunity to submit applications for township-administered federal funds designed to rehabilitate and bring houses in the township up to code.

The program, made possible through a \$21,556 federal housing grant, will offer a maximum \$4,000 to families meeting low-income requirements and living in houses with building violations.

Although members of the Canton Board of Trustees have identified McIntyre Subdivision, near Ford and Sheldon, and Dye Brothers Subdivision, near Michigan and Sheldon, as prime target areas of the program, township Supervisor Robert Greenstein says residents of numerous scattered areas are eligible for the grants.

"There are pockets all over the township which certainly will qualify for the program," he said. "People will be able to get money for anything necessary to bring houses up to code in the area of construction. You can do a lot for \$4,000."

Although the federal grant money cannot begin to remedy all the building code violations in the township, Canton officials hope to receive more federal housing funds in the years to come. Township officials will place the names of eligible residents who fail to receive grants through the 1975 allocation on a waiting list for future grants.

"We're hoping not everyone will ask for \$4,000," Greenstein said. Under the pro-

gram, people will receive outright gifts for housing rehabilitation. The only hitch is you must live in the house three years after you spend the money, or pay it back."

CANTON'S FEDERAL housing grant, part of the 1975 Community Block Grant program administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, represents the single largest chunk of the total \$78,000 in housing funds available to Wayne County communities.

Greenstein attributes the success of Canton's grant request to the housing program township officials proposed.

"We were in competition for this grant with several cities and townships," Greenstein said. "Other areas submitted low-cost plans to enable people to fix up their houses."

"We thought the one thing a low-income family doesn't need is another debt, even if it's at one or two per cent interest. We conceived the idea of an outright grant."

Under the program, a committee of three persons will review applications, determine eligibility and approve the grant applications, according to township planner Mike Manore, who expects applications will be available by August or September.

A MAJOR task of the committee, Manore explained, will be the determinations of financial eligibility. According to a man-

ual prepared by Manore's firm of Wade, Trim Associates, a family is determined "low-income" if its liquid assets are assessed at \$10,000 or less and its gross income equals:

*A maximum \$7,650 for one person.

Township places police tax on ballot

Plymouth Township residents will be asked to approve a property tax millage in the Aug. 3 primary to organizing a township police department.
The Plymouth Township Board Tuesday night approved the ballot wording for a tax proposal seeking two mills (\$2 per \$1,000 state equalized valuation).
THE BOARD made its decision after receiving a recommendation from trustees Frank Millington and Richard Gornick.

Gornick and Millington researched the alternatives of establishing a township police department or buying protection on a contract basis from the Wayne County Sheriff's Department, as done by the City of Romulus.
The plans are to organize a department which initially would consist of six patrolmen, one detective, one sergeant, one chief and one clerk-typist.
Gornick estimated overall cost of the department—to include three cars—at about

\$234,000. That estimate didn't include the cost of leasing facilities to house the department.
"THIS IS A closed kind of option on the ballot," explained Gornick. If the voters approve the proposal, the township's one course would be to establish its own police department. But I feel this is the best way to go for the township.
"One of the big advantages to having a township police department is better en-

forcement of local ordinances," said Helen Richardson, township clerk. She added that buying police protection from the county would cost as much as, or more than, starting a township department.
The board also approved the wording of a ballot proposal asking for one-half mill (50 cents per \$1,000 state equalized evaluation) to finance the construction of a fire station in the western portion of the township. Both millage proposals will appear on the Aug. 3 primary ballot.

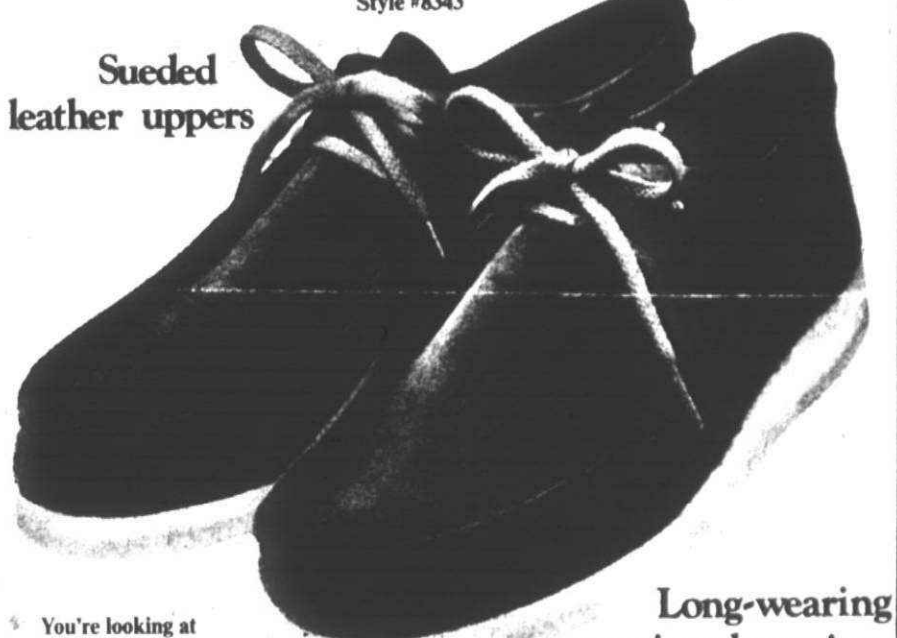

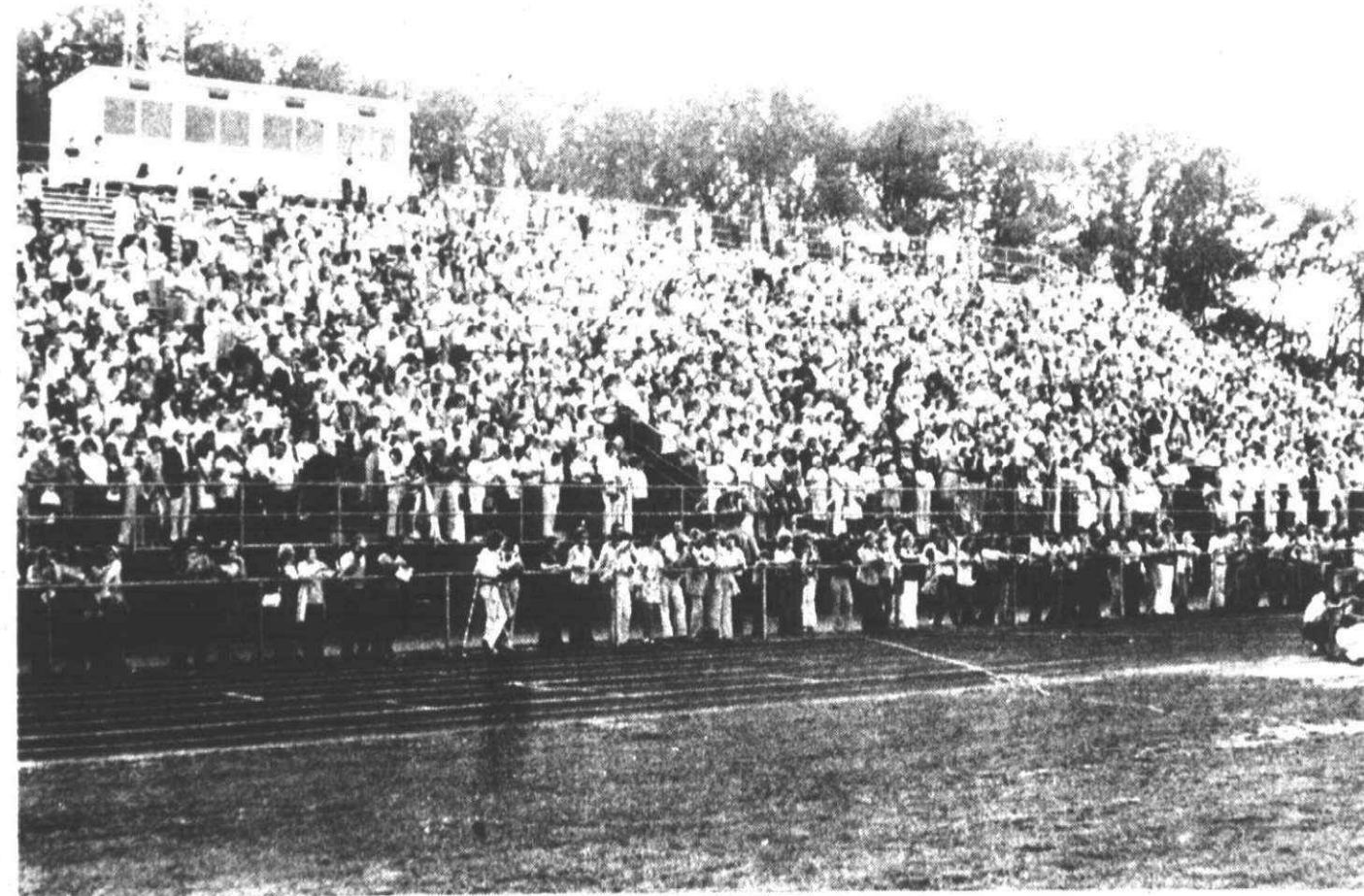

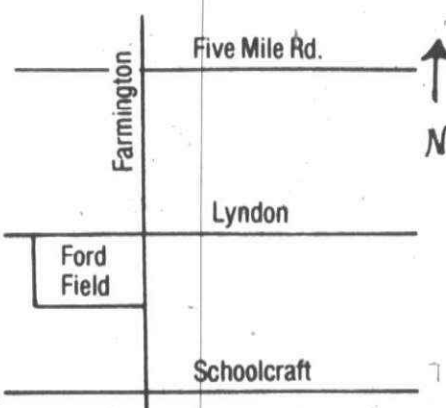

Incumbents McGrath, Pettipren win in W-W

If Wayne-Westland District board winners have their way, district voters can expect a return to the polls in the fall. Both incumbents, Gerard McGrath and Vincent Pettipren, who scored victories over challengers Ron Blackburn and Warren Spurlin, said their main objectives as board members would be the passage of a district bond issue.

The bond issue, which would have provided funds for building renovations, special education and vocational education, was twice defeated by WW voters.

But McGrath and Pettipren, in separate interviews, contended that enough could be trimmed from the next proposal to make it palatable to voters.

The first proposal, defeated in Decem-

ber, was a lump package which also included funds for swimming pools and a new facility as a central administration building.

The second proposal, defeated in March, included no new facilities. The swimming pools, proposed for all of the junior high schools, was listed as a separate ballot item. But both items failed.

"OUR NUMBER one goal should be the passage of a bond issue," McGrath said. "We need so many things that if the people say no pools, then so be it."

"I don't know how much we're going to be able to cut back. And I feel that no matter how much we do cut, if the issue passes, it will be by a 51 to 49 per cent margin."

McGrath said the board has been meeting with a residents committee on the bond issue and there is divided opinion on what portions should be trimmed from the bond proposal.

"One of the things that will probably go is the field house for Wayne Memorial."

"The new proposal probably won't include a new central central administration building," McGrath said.

"I don't necessarily agree with that. It would cost us \$2.5 million to build a new building and \$1.5 (million) to renovate the present facility. In 20 years we're going to be faced with the same problem."

"We have people spread all over the district who should be under one roof," McGrath said the special education and

vocational education facility plans as part of the proposal would be untouched.

McGrath said he would also be pushing for educational facilities for the handicapped.

"We have children coming out of the McGrath Center and nowhere to put them. They have to have someplace to go."

He added the district is finalizing plans to rent the old Wayne recreation building as a workshop facility for students from Norris school.

"I guess every board member has a special interest and mine is the handicapped kids."

PETTIPREN STRESSED the bond issue's importance and said he was criti-

cal of the last proposal's wording on the ballot.

"Our immediate job is to start working on a bone bare bond issue that is clearly stated," Pettipren said.

"I'm going to be pushing for a proposal that will include only the necessary repairs and renovations to bring us up to standard."

"We're going to be looking to this fall, probably the latter part of September for the item to be placed on the ballot."

"I don't see the issue increasing in size. The only things that won't be cut are industrial education, which we need to prepare our students for jobs, and for establishing a needed special education program in our secondary schools."

Pettipren added he would ideally like to go to the voters in early September, but said the districts' negotiations with the teachers might push the election into later in the month.

BOTH WINNERS expressed dismay at the lack of voter turnout in the Monday election.

McGrath collected 1,830 votes to pace the field. Pettipren followed with 1,657. Spurlin collected 1,332 votes and Blackburn, 1,009.

Blackburn and Pettipren ran as a team. They collected the endorsement of the Wayne-Westland Education Association.

The WW Building Administrators Association backed Pettipren and McGrath.

Baldwin will be named new pastor

- A maximum \$8,775 for two persons.
- \$9,825 for three persons.
- \$10,950 for four persons.
- \$11,625 for five persons.
- \$12,300 for six persons.
- \$12,975 for seven persons.
- \$13,725 for eight persons.

Low-income families will only receive grants to bring their houses up to code. Canton building inspector Charlie Thompson, who has already been appointed to the township housing committee, and two other committee members will determine what work should be done.

"This grant money is not for cosmetic purposes," stressed Manore. "It has to do with structural deficiencies—plumbing, electrical wiring, heating, etc."

According to Manore, Wade Trim must complete a township housing study and an environmental assessment of the grant program's impact on the township before dis-

tributing grant application forms to residents.

Canton's federal housing grant represents only a portion of the federal funds received through the 1975 Community Block Grant program. The township has already received \$32,000, which officials used to refurbish the township recreation hall at Michigan and Sheldon.


Township officials this year requested \$78,000 for recreation and plan to request more funds for housing, according to Greenstein. The request for \$78,000 has not yet been approved.

by 3-1 and 2-1 margins in all nine precincts in Plymouth-Canton. Throughout the college district, the millage was defeated in school districts which had local tax issues on the ballot and approved in districts without a local millage request. The Plymouth and Livonia votes were heavily against the millage.

A total of 7,123 residents voted out of some 27,000 registered voters in the Plymouth Community School District—a turnout of 26 per cent. Some 261 voters cast ballots without voting for the Plymouth millage and some 580 didn't vote for the Schoolcraft millage. About 900 who cast ballots didn't vote in the trustee's race or only voted for one candidate instead of two.

Big delegation for Wayne-2nd

The 2d Congressional District used to be known as "Ann Arbor's seat." But to look at the delegates the 2d District is sending to the Republican national convention in August, you'd think upstart Livonia and little Plymouth were in charge.

The 2d District, like the other 18 congressional districts in Michigan, is entitled to three delegates and three alternates. Four of those six persons are from the Wayne County portion of the 2d District.

Republicans picked their 84 national convention delegates and alternates last weekend at Grand Rapids and they will go to the national in August with 55 votes for favorite son Gerald Ford and 29 for conservative Ronald Reagan.

Michigan's delegation will also have the run of the finest hotel in Kansas City, according to state GOP Chairman William McLaughlin, inasmuch as Michigan's candidate is the incumbent president of the United States.

THE 2d DISTRICT'S contribution to the quadrennial conclave will include:

•Harry Greenleaf of Livonia, delegate for Ford. Greenleaf is chairman of the Wayne County portion of the 2d District and a Ford Motor Co. staffer.

•Mark McKelvey, of Plymouth, alternate for Ford. At 22, he's probably the youngest member of the delegation, just as he was Michigan's youngest precinct delegate in 1972 when he was elected the day after his 18th birthday. McKelvey played hockey from his commencement exercises at Michigan State University to pull an upset victory for the alternate post.

•George Kettunen of Livonia, delegate for Reagan. A Ford Motor product designer, Kettunen is a conservative who seems always to survive when the moderate group periodically purges the right wing and remains on good terms.

•Sally Bennett of Livonia, alternate for Reagan. Mrs. Bennett was a precinct delegate for three terms before relinquishing the post to her husband Robert. Mrs. Bennett was a supervisor at the famed Milliken-Esch telephone center and is on several party committees.

•Betsy Durbin of Ann Arbor, delegate for Ford. She is chairwoman of the district organization.

•Jim Davies of Monroe, alternate for Ford.

THE AT-LARGE portion of the Michigan delegation will also get heavy doses of 2d District talent.

Robert Law, Livonia attorney and candidate for state representative in the 36th House District, will be a delegate for Ford. The honor came because he is chairman of the Michigan Federation of young Republicans.

Sylvia Skrel will be a will be an alternate-at-large for Ford. The political godmother of a generation of local Republican

leaders, Mrs. Skrel is a former Wayne 2d District chairwoman and now a member of the state central committee.

Other 2d District residents going to Kansas City will be Peter B. Fletcher of Ypsilanti, Republican national committeeman and chairman of the State Highway Commission, and Nancy Chase of Ann Arbor, state party vice-chairwoman.

ONE HISTORICAL reason the Young Republican movement flourished in Michigan was the advanced age of the senior party leadership, but Bob Law says it's no longer true.

"I'm surprised at the initiative the party has shown the last couple of years" at bringing in youth, said Law. "But Bill McLaughlin (senior party chairman) would sit down and help me any time I wanted."

As state YR chairman, Law, 33, has come to know many in the movement throughout the nation. He says the Michigan group will be "a working delegation" and his own role at Kansas City will be luring young conservatives from other states away from Reagan. Those contacts will be important if the presidential nomination is to be won by a 10- or 20-vote margin.

When there was talk in party inner cir-

cles of getting ethnic representation in the delegation, Mrs. Skrel leaped to inform them that Law is of Polish ancestry.

KETTUNEN ACHIEVED some distinction by being the only person in about nine northwestern Wayne County communities to run May 18 for precinct delegate pledged to Reagan.

"I'd venture to say half of the 'uncommitted' people are for Reagan," said Kettunen. "Jack Welborn (state Reagan chairman) said we would probably be subject to ridicule or harassment."

"But I got a lot of positive comments like, 'Gee, I admire your guts,' or 'Sisu,' as they say in Finland."

A 16-year veteran of party battles, Kettunen says there was "no back-biting" of him by other party people. In fact, relations between Ford and Reagan supporters run from polite to cordial.

Kettunen met Reagan a year ago when the former California governor spoke in the Raleigh House at a fund-raiser. He found him "a very impressive man."

"They (the Reagan forces) said they'd get in touch with me," Kettunen recalled.

"They didn't. I ran as a Reagan precinct delegate with no outside influence whatsoever."

Wayne-2d Dems fume at slate

In a seven-hour convention Saturday in Ypsilanti High School, second congressional district precinct delegates picked two slates of delegates to the Democratic national convention which will meet in New York July 12 to nominate a presidential candidate.

But Chairman Don Poirier of Monroe says the slate with names approved by spokesmen for Jimmy Carter and Morris Udall will certainly be accredited. The slate got 85-75 approval.

By picking their own second slate, however, angry area Democrats served notice to top-level Carterites, in particular, that they didn't like to be told whom to elect as delegates.

THE SLATE which Poirier expects to be seated includes:

For Carter—Mayor Edward H. McNamara of Livonia and Ethel Howard of Ypsilanti, delegates, and Dave Ettinger of Ann Arbor, alternate.

For Udall—Keith Geiger of Livonia, Eastern Michigan University Prof. Marjorie Lansing of Ann Arbor and former U.S. Rep. Weston E. Vivian of Ann Arbor, delegates; Carol Wallace of Ann Arbor and Livonia businessman Sidney Diamond, alternates.

No one from Monroe County—the third corner of the sprawling district—was picked, another source of irritation.

Michigan will send 133 delegates to New York—100 selected from the 19 congressional districts and 33 at-large to be picked by the Democratic State Central Committee Saturday in Lansing.

GEIGER, 35, is typical of a new breed of Democratic delegate showing up this year, although the others are familiar names in area politics.

Geiger is a former president and still a major political leader in the Michigan Education Association, the union which has organized nearly all suburban school districts and a majority of districts outside.

Most are for U.S. Rep. Morris Udall who has released his delegates to support Carter.

Geiger, on a sabbatical as a Livonia School District math teacher, said leaders of the Democratic Educators Caucus sent letters to MEA leaders all over the state urging their active support of Udall.

"It's fair to say most of the people in (MEA) leadership roles are for Udall," Geiger said. "I've felt all along that of the candidates in the open, he's the best."

"I'VE NEVER BEEN a Democratic precinct delegate. I live in Pat Whitton's precinct," Geiger said. Mrs. Whitton, with strong United Auto Workers connections, is a perennial officeholder in the party.

"I've attended state conventions of both parties, but this is the first year as a delegate."

Despite his commitment to Udall, Geiger is rubbing elbows with the presidential candidates of both parties. He's on the National Education Association screening committee for presidential candidates.

Recently the group visited the White House to interview President Ford. Geiger admits he was "obviously very impressed" to meet the president, although he doesn't share Ford's ideas on collective bargaining or federal funding of education.

It will be a heavy political year for Geiger. He chairs the political action committee of the Livonia Education Association and serves on the PAC of the state group as well as on the executive committee of Livonia Interested Democrats.

In his family, Geiger is a rarity. "I have eight brothers and sisters, and they're all Republicans. I don't think another one ever voted Democratic."

Power petition faltering?

A petition drive to bring Detroit Edison Co. and Consumers Power Co. under state government ownership is faltering for an odd reason.

"We know the signatures are out there," said Public Power coordinator Chuck Wilbur, "but this isn't a test of public support. It's an organizational test."

What Wilbur means is that petition circulators are getting excellent response from voters when they ask for signatures. But the organizational work of recruiting circulators, training them, printing and paying for the petition forms, and collecting the completed petitions is the killing task.

PUBLIC POWER was launched by the Human Rights Party, HRP, whose best known face is Zolton Ferency, was formed by the liberal-to-radical faction of the anti-war Democrats.

HRP later adopted socialism, beginning with the energy utilities, as an official policy. Other organizations joining HRP in Public Power were the Michigan Consumer Alliance and the Black Caucus.

Public Power needs 265,000 signatures to get its proposed constitutional amendment on the November ballot. Those signatures must be filed with the secretary of state by July 6.

"Right now I'd say we are in the 100,000 range," said Wilbur, adding that there are other signatures that have been collected but not returned to his office.

"Personally, we're pessimistic. But I'm not prepared to predict how it will turn out," the Westwood School District librarian said.

Wilbur said that of every 10 persons approached, seven to nine would sign "consistently, whether it was in Detroit or any of the suburbs."

Other circulators had similar success. Jeaneane Havstad of Livonia, a political activist, had constant success in northwestern suburban shopping centers, "and she's particularly good at that. But even people who were the worst at that were successful."

The group wanted to buy space in a Detroit daily newspaper to print its petition form, but ran short of funds and settled for the Royal Oak Tribune instead.

Boston battle

Unions to back Schools get Marv Stempien book bargain

Marvin Stempien, a Democratic candidate for U.S. Representative in the 2d District, has picked up the endorsement of three labor organizations.

The Monroe County AFL-CIO council, which represents 3,000 workers, voted to endorse Stempien at their June 3 meeting. On June 8, the Detroit Building and Trade Construction Trades Council announced their nod to Stempien. The council represents 60,000 workers in the Detroit metropolitan area.

Last May, Stempien received the endorsement of James Rademacher, president of the National Association of Letter Carriers.

Stempien said, "I am certainly pleased that official labor organization endorsements of my candidacy have been made. However, I know from my past efforts as a candidate that I must go to the people on the streets and the doorsteps of the district with my plea for their support in order to gain their trust."

About 5,000 books and 500 audio-visual resource items are being acquired at substantial savings for the three new elementary media centers (libraries) of Plymouth Community School District.

The purchase was made through arrangements developed by Ms. Bertha M. Green, director of libraries for Plymouth Schools, with Livonia School District personnel. The purchase was approved Monday night by the Plymouth Board of Education.

Because Livonia's school population is shrinking, resulting in closing of some schools, both districts had a chance to benefit from Livonia's intent to dispose of the Taft Elementary School's library resources.

After inspection of the collection by Mrs. Kathryn Otto, principal of Hulsing Elementary in Canton, and Ms. Green, the Livonia collection was acquired by Plymouth Schools at the rate of 50 per cent of average book cost and at \$1.30 per item for audio-visual materials.

The savings to the Plymouth district could be as much as \$24,000, according to Ray Hoedell, assistant supt. for business, in comparison with purchase of the same materials at current retail costs. Some \$40,000 was in the capital improvement budget for books and AV items. The items were purchased for \$15,000.

Pierce opposes Pentagon budget boosts

Ed Pierce, Democratic candidate for Congress from the 2d district, has expressed opposition to a record \$106 billion defense budget approved by the House Appropriations Committee.

Pierce charged the committee as well as the Ford administration with "great wastefulness" for not cutting the Pentagon request "more than a token amount."

The candidate made his comments at a meeting in the home of Charles and Thelma Ruckhaber, 11036 Cranston, Livonia, and in later speeches before the Plymouth Kiwanis and at the Mayflower Hotel in Plymouth.

"Of course we need a large enough defense budget to maintain our strength," said Pierce. "But much of this budget, such as the B-1 bomber money, is waste and fat which the Senate already decided should be cut."

"The defense budget used to go down after wars. It is hard for me to understand why it has increased so greatly since we got out of Vietnam, despite detente and our improved relations with the Soviet Union and China."

Pierce said President Gerald Ford "seems so frightened" by the Ronald Reagan challenge that he grants "every excessive demand the Pentagon makes." Pierce said the military budget could stand a great amount of fat trimming and he is the man who is qualified to do the cutting.

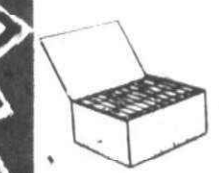

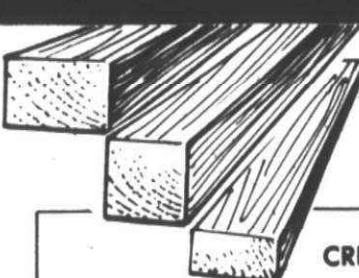

Plymouth's 'iron man' of journalism

The history of journalism in Plymouth would not be complete without a look at Wilson William Edgar—Eddie as he is known to readers of his columns and feature stories in the Observer & Eccentric.

Probably the oldest working newsman in Michigan—certainly one of the best known—Eddie is the most durable journalist the area has ever seen. At age 78, 13 years after most newsmen trade their typewriters for golf clubs, Eddie is still on the job and still collecting writing awards.

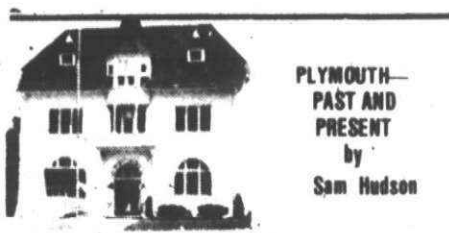
A few years ago, the Observer group won seven prizes in the Michigan Press Association's competition for weekly newspapers.

Three of them went to Eddie, whose column "The Stroller" won first place in the weekly newspaper column class. One of his feature stories took a first and another a second. In the 100-year history of the association, Edgar is the first newsman ever to win three prizes in the same year.

Eddie's newspaper career began in Allentown, Pa., in 1919. Five years later, through a chance meeting with a Michigan poet, Edgar A. Guest, Eddie landed a \$2,500-a-year job as sports writer for the Detroit Free Press. He worked 28 years for the Free Press, part of them as sports editor. His column was called The Second Guess.

In 1924, when he joined the Free Press, Eddie became one of the first sports announcers in Detroit. He was asked to read the sports news by the station manager of the Free Press radio station, WCX, now WJR. For the past 21 years, he has been heard every Friday night, reading the bowling news on Bob Reynolds' evening broadcast on WJR.

While with the Free Press, Eddie was on a team of reporters assigned by editor Malcolm Bingay to cover an American Legion convention in Detroit. Eddie wrote



two columns of a composite story, but asked that his name not be shown on the article; he thought a six-name byline was ridiculous. The article won a Pulitzer Prize. Eddie got no share of the glory or prize money.

"I had no one to blame but myself," he says.

IN 1932, Eddie set up the Golden Gloves program in this area for the Free Press.

Among the first applicants was a tall black youngster named Joe Louis. Eddie virtually managed Louis until John Roxborough became the boxer's professional manager. Eddie was at the ringside in Chicago, in 1937, when Louis won the heavyweight championship.

One of Eddie's first assignments for the Free Press was to cover the Detroit Tigers. He still holds card number one in the Michigan Baseball Writer's Association. Eddie hasn't missed a Tiger opening game in 51 years. "The last game I saw, it dawned on me that not a soul on either team was born in the days when I watched Ty Cobb and Mickey Cochrane."

Eddie left the Free Press in 1948 to become executive secretary of the Bowling Proprietors of Greater Detroit. For the next 18 years, he was virtually the Judge Landis of bowling in the Detroit area. During that time, he "helped to bring bowling out of the saloons and onto the main corners." He was among the founders of the

Bowling Hall of Fame. He retired from the bowling position in 1966.

Eddie missed the newspaper business. In 1964, he stopped at the Livonia Observer office to see Tommy Thompson, whom he had known when they worked at the Free Press. Myra Chandler, who then ran the Observer, asked Eddie if he would like to write a column for the paper. He jumped at the chance.

WHEN PHILIP POWER bought the Plymouth Mail in 1966, Eddie became its editor, a position he held for the next three years.

For several years after that, he was the group's roving editor and feature writer. He now works at the Plymouth Observer & Eccentric, writing feature articles and his two columns: "In the Pocket" about bowling, and "The Stroller," about anything that comes to his mind.

A day after his 77th birthday in November, 1974, Eddie Edgar was inducted into the Michigan Amateur Hall of Fame, the third time he has been so honored. In 1962, he was named to the Bowling Hall of Fame; in 1971 he was elected to the University of Michigan Media Hall of Fame. Not bad going for a young man who barely got past the eighth grade (he had to work at 13 when his father died) and who insists

that he has never read a book in his life.

Eddie has been writing interviews since he began his career in journalism 53 years ago. His first front-page story, in 1919, was an impromptu interview with William Jennings Bryan, who he met on a railroad station platform. A few weeks later, he managed to obtain a hotel-room interview with another nationally-known politician, Boise Penrose, the GOP boss who made Warren Harding president of the United States.

As a sports writer, Eddie interviewed most of the greats during the Golden Age of sports—Babe Ruth, Ty Cobb, Lou Gehrig, Mickey Cochrane, Joe DiMaggio, Jack Dempsey, Gene Tunney, Gar Wood and many others.

Eddie says his first editor told him how to conduct an interview. "You've got to exercise your power of observation; cultivate a retentive memory; keep your brain in gear at all times; and learn the art of asking questions."

Eddie says he never uses a prepared list of questions; he studies his subject before describing the background and the actions of the person being interviewed. He always tries for human interest leads. He never flashes pencil or paper; "people then start to measure their words."

Church welcomes new ministers

The Rev. Dwayne Lee Kelsey, a native

of Kansas, and the Rev. Frederick C. Vosburg, born in Michigan, will join the present senior minister, the Rev. Samuel F. Stout, on the staff of the church.

Mr. Kelsey will serve as minister of education and Mr. Vosburg will be parish minister.

Mr. Kelsey is a graduate of Asbury College, Wilmore, Ky.; Scarritt College, in Nashville and Methodist Theological School of Ohio.

His professional experience as education assistant, administrator and director of education includes service in Prestonburg, Ky.; Liberal, Kan.; Pennsville, N.J.; Celina, Ohio; Jacksonville, Fla.; and Pontiac.

His wife, Ruth, is a public school educator, and has served as teacher and principal in mission schools under the Board of Home Missions of the Evangelical United Brethren Church.

Mr. Vosburg is a graduate of Taylor University in Upland, Ind., and the Boston School of Theology at Boston University. Albion College conferred the honorary doctor of divinity on him in 1955.

He has served in churches in Royal Oak, Houghton, Marquette, Detroit, Flint and Dearborn. During his career as minister, he has been elected delegate to seven jurisdictional conferences and six general conferences.

His wife, Ruth, is an educator in the Detroit school district.

Following the service, a reception will be held for the ministers and their families.

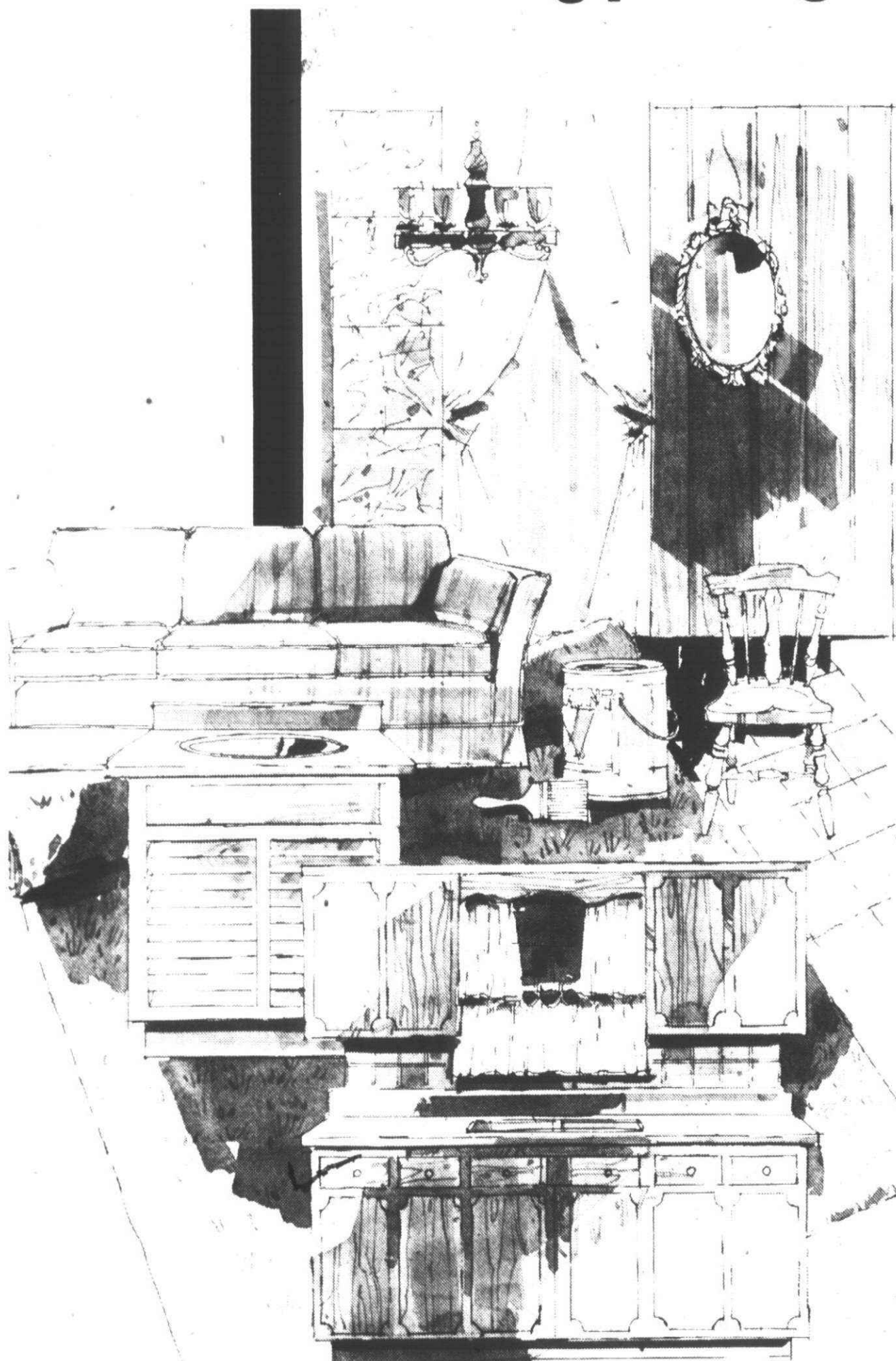

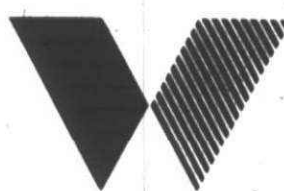

3 Westland Dems land in delegation

The 15th Congressional District delegates to the Democratic national convention reflect Michigan's primary elections where Morris Udall was just one per cent behind Jimmy Carter with George Wallace coming in third.

Elected May 12 in JAW Hall Region 1-E in Taylor, two delegates and one alternate were pledged to Carter, two delegates and two alternates to Udall and one delegate out of two in the entire state—to Wallace.

ONE OF the best known Udall delegates and his alternate are residents of Westland.

Vincent Petitpren, chairman of the 15th District Democratic Party, was recently re-elected trustee in the Wayne-Westland School District.

Petitpren is committed to Udall, but will cast his support to Carter, following Udall's lead.

"It's pretty well defined that Carter will get the nomination at the convention in July," said Petitpren, "probably on the first ballot."

Udall alternate Dorothy Furie, 47,

mother of 11 children, has worked on a number of campaigns, including Sander Levin for governor and George McGovern for president.

An English composition instructor at Wayne County Community College, Mrs. Furie is prepared to back Udall "as far as he lets me."

"I think Udall has been buried by the media, not getting as much exposure as the other candidates."

Mary Washburn, councilwoman from Taylor, has pledged her support to Udall, but will swing to Carter.

A precinct delegate for seven years,

Mrs. Washburn is a member of the Wayne County Democratic Club and the Taylor Democratic Club, and holds an executive position position on the 15th district Democratic committee board.

"This is my first national convention and I am very excited about it even though it seems it may be cut and dried," said Mrs. Washburn.

Frank Ford, the second Udall alternate, is a law student and lives in Dearborn Heights.

WILLIAM THYGERSON, 30, an engineer at Ford Motor Co., was elected as Wallace's delegate from the 15th district.

one of two districts in Michigan that have a Wallace delegate.

It wasn't an easy election as Thygerston explains. Art Cullers, Wallace's state coordinator from Battle Creek, moved into a Ramada Inn in the 15th district and appointed himself as a Wallace delegate.

"The Democratic caucus objected to Culler's self-appointment and elected me over another Wallace supporter from Taylor," said Thygerston.

Thygerston feels Wallace's chances of winning the nomination are greatly reduced, but he hopes he can influence the platform—encouraging the government to think of people as individuals, not as numbers.

The Carter delegation consists of two delegates, S. Richard Marshall, mayor of Taylor, and Grace Hampton of Inkster, inner of the Democrat of the Year award. Alternate is Joseph Katz of Southgate.

Local millages drag down Schoolcraft's proposal

Schoolcraft College officials have some short-range and long-range decisions to make in the wake of vote defeat of a 0.53 mill property tax increase.

The short-range decision is how to cut a budget when a hoped-for \$800,000-plus won't be showing up in tax collections and how to trim building plans.

The long-range decision is whether to go it alone on the ballot and when to ask for the millage again.

Voters Monday gave only 40 per cent support to the proposal, rejecting it 11,002 to 16,443.

IT WAS CRYSTAL clear that the presence of millage requests on three K-12 school district ballots killed the community college's millage proposal. The run-down:

•In Clarenceville, where there was no millage on the ballot, the college proposal got 60 per cent approval, 204 to 125.

•In Northville, which passed a local millage request several months ago, the college request got 57 per cent approval, 963 to 715.

•In Garden City, where a 24-mill local request was rejected by a 2-1 margin, Schoolcraft's request was bombed by nearly a 3-1 margin, 924 to 2,335.

•In Livonia, where a 3.5-mill local proposal passed easily, the Schoolcraft request got only 42 per cent support, 6,609 to 9,010.

•And in Plymouth, where a 4.75-mill proposal lost by a single vote, the college proposal was supported by 35 per cent, 2,204 to 4,050.

THE CONSENSUS at the wake in the college's Waterman Campus Center was that voters were taking care of close-to-home needs first and saying no—at least for now—to the five-district community college.

Board Chairman Paul Kadish had no immediate thoughts on when another proposal would be made to the voters.

The question is whether to set a special election, at which Schoolcraft's "constituency" would loom larger in the totals, or to wait until next round of regular school elections in June 1977, with the risk that other millage requests would be forthcoming from the K-12 districts.

THE ONLY open opposition to Schoolcraft's request had come from a single trustee, Arch Vallier, who spoke of it in a newspaper interview and made no attempt to mount a campaign.

Vallier said it appeared the story did "some good."

Board Vice-chairwoman Rosina Raymond, however, said Vallier's comments only gave some persons who were going to vote against the millage anyway a rationalization for doing so.

The board was scheduled to begin work on the 1976-77 budget last night in an open study session. A public hearing is scheduled for 8 p.m. on June 30 in the board room of the Administration Building.

Meanwhile, the college is scheduled to negotiate a new contract with the Faculty Forum and several other unions.

The college has an enrollment of more than 10,000 and a projected budget in excess of \$9 million.

Regional roundup

ONE VOTE LOSS

A request for 4.75 mills by Plymouth schools failed by one vote in Monday's election. The millage vote had ended in a dead tie, 3,431 votes on each side, when the tally was concluded Monday. Tuesday afternoon the state attorney general's office advised the district that it could open five absentee ballots which had not been counted election day because of questions of whether the applications were technically correct. When the five were opened at 5 p.m., Tuesday, there were three no and two yes votes.

THINK SNOW?

While most people have been complaining about the unseasonable weather as of late, a Westlander was no exception. But his complaint was centered on a snowstorm, not the excessive heat. Paul Newcomer is one of 54 owners of antique cars making a bicentennial tour from Seattle to Philadelphia. The group encountered the snow in Wyoming, forcing them to delay their progress.

LABOR PEACE

The Livonia School District, which a three-day teachers' strike last fall and the threat of another in early April, gained another year of labor peace with the teachers' union Tuesday. The board ratified an extension of the existing two-year contract and the union is expected to approve the one-year extension at a membership meeting Thursday. The extension includes a dental insurance plan and an incentive program to encourage older teachers to take an early retirement.

COACH QUILTS

Redford Union High School Head Football Coach Bob Atkins called it quits. He was a victim of budget cutbacks, he said. Because his assistant coaches were laid off, he felt he could not provide an adequate athletic program and therefore resigned. The Redford Union School District recently curtailed its athletic and counseling programs to save funds.

AMERICANA GALA

Garden City Bicentennial Commission is sponsoring Americana Weekend June 19-20 in the city park at Cherry Hill Road east of Merriman. Activities are planned for persons from eight to 80. The weekend begins with an arts and crafts show and sale Saturday from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. Square dancing, a flower show, pancake breakfast and old-fashioned sing-along also are planned. There is no charge for the festivities which the bicentennial commission hopes to make a tradition in Garden City.

MILLAGE APPROVED

Livonia School District voters reversed themselves Monday and approved a 3½-mill property tax increase by nearly 1,000 votes. An identical millage was rejected by a 61-39 margin just two months ago. The money, the school board said, was needed just to maintain existing programs and services.

DIAL-A-RIDE

Redford has been granted Dial-a-Ride funds for the next year. A variety of federal grants will permit Redford to continue the bus service offered at reduced rates to senior citizens and for 60 cents to other residents.

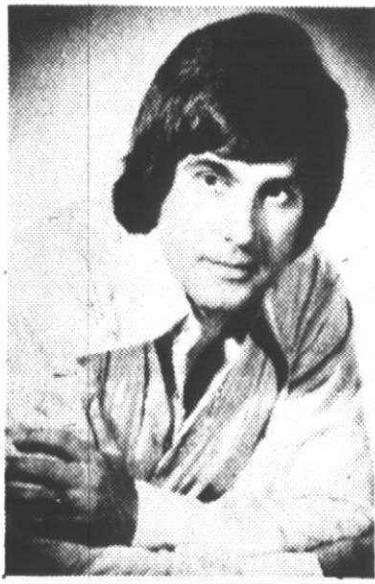

Political pro and novice lead way to Kansas City

Both women are from the Farmington community. Other than that, the two delegates to the Republican national convention couldn't be less alike.

Mary Lou Barth, a prominent party regular, will back President Ford for renomination in August in Kansas City. Halina Frizzelle, a newcomer, is strong for Ronald Reagan.

They were elected last weekend in the 17th Congressional District caucus at the GOP state convention in Grand Rapids. The other district delegate post went to Denny Hammond, district chairman and a resident of northwest Detroit, he supports Ford.

The three alternates from the 17th are John Rutledge of Detroit (Ford), Della Wright of Farmington (Ford) and Joe Burdzinski of Southfield (Reagan). Redford Township got none of the six positions.

MRS. FRIZZELLE is a rarity in GOP politics—a person who ran for precinct delegate committed to Reagan.

Although the former California governor got one-third of the Michigan vote in the May 18 presidential primary, the number of pro-Reagan precinct delegates averaged less than one per community in the suburbs.

"I've been fighting legislation in Lansing for three years," says Mrs. Frizzelle, who opposed a sex education bill, wears a

"Stop ERA" button and belongs to the anti-lib Happiness Of Women organization.

It's extremely rare for a total newcomer in politics to land a national convention seat, but there were so few elected precinct delegates pledged to Reagan that she was a shoo-in. In a bit of organizational confusion, Burdzinski was named delegate and Mrs. Frizzelle alternate in an early caucus, but Burdzinski backed off afterwards because he had been only a write-in candidate for precinct delegate.

"I STILL FEEL like an outcast. I feel I'm on the outside, looking in," said Mrs. Frizzelle as the convention droned on. Convention procedures frankly mystified her.

"I'm interested in Social Security because it's a rip-off. I've been a widow. I worked in a Dodge factory. My first husband died at 44, and my daughter (then 17) collected social security for one year. The 25 years of social security he paid in was gone.

"Stop and think. If we could have put that in a private trust, it would earn interest, and you wouldn't need social security."

She lives now in Farmington with her husband Robert, an experimental machinist. She has worked for a data process training firm and for a credit office but takes care of her home now at her husband's request.

She looked around the convention floor.

"I wasn't a social butterfly. I worked for a living," she said.

MARY LOU BARTH, of Farmington, is also a first-time delegate, but the honor came after 16 years of activity.

A merry-eyed grandmother, she is a descendant of Continental Congressman Charles Carroll, a signer of the Declaration of Independence.

"I don't like to get into women's lib," she said. "I was born liberated. They can go on and on about it."

Her list of party offices reads like a charter: President of the Republican Women's Federation of Michigan, alternate-at-large to the '72 convention, Oakland County executive board president of the Farmington Republican Women's Organization, three terms on the Republican State Central Committee, current vice-chairwoman of the 17th District organization.

She first met Gerald Ford when he was a young congressman from Grand Rapids. Their last encounter was last winter in Florida, when the president conducted a quickie handshaking tour of a beach. "I was in a bathing suit," Mrs. Barth chuckled.

THE BARTHS have lived in the 17th District for 30 years, first in northwest Detroit, the last six years in Farmington.

Husband Philip is a real estate broker and owner of J.L. Mooney Co.

Son Dan has a start in politics at Alma College. Republican politics, naturally.

VA hospitals now provide drivers ed

Allen Park Veterans Administration hospital has been designated to provide driver training for severely disabled veterans and military personnel, according to Albert Zamberlan, director.

Eligible for this special training are veterans and military personnel with service-connected disabilities who receive VA grants for purchase of an automobile or van.

Special authorizations may be extended to other personnel eligible for VA medical care if it is determined to be medically justified by VA standards.

Veterans may apply for the training at the VA regional office in Detroit or at any VA hospital. A member of the armed forces must be referred to VA by an authorized official of his branch of service.

Forty VA hospitals recently were designated driver training centers. Some have cars, with special adaptive equipment for use in the program. Others will be receiving them. Driver training simulators are being evaluated at a few of the centers for possible use at all 40.

Eighteen hospitals have already been providing such training, but Allen Park hospital is one of the 22 new facilities to join in the program.

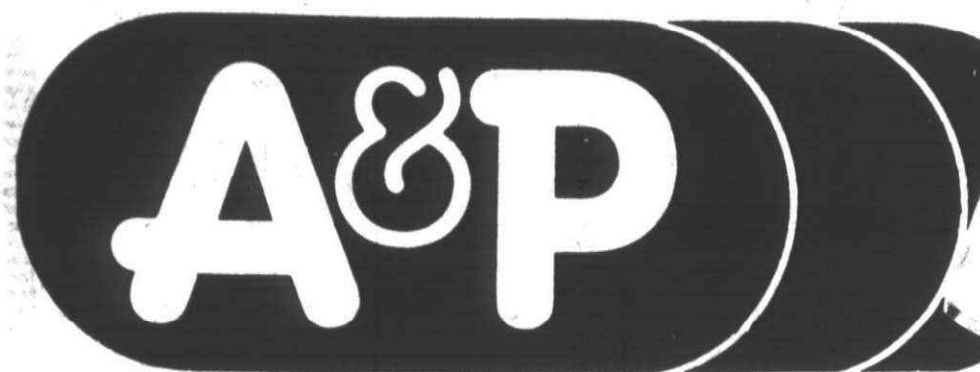

Let's have answers on the reserve police

Sometime before September, the Canton Township board must determine the role and function of the reserve police.

As each day goes by, the issue becomes more clouded, and people are concerned—some even to the point of expressing fear about the auxiliaries.

And with reason—because it seems that, without explanation, the role of the reserve police has been expanded.

As first conceived, the reserves were to function as glorified rent-a-cops, serving as sensory extensions of the Wayne County Sheriff and the state police.

They were to be the eyes and ears of Canton's official law enforcement agencies.

They were to be used mostly for crowd control at school and township functions.

Now it appears the reserves will be patrolling in shifts almost around the clock, armed with high powered pistols and driving pursuit cars.

IS THIS WHAT the people want? Is this what the board wants?

Recently, Trustee Bob Myers and Supervisor Robert Greenstein became engaged in a heated debate about whether reserves would be armed with .357 magnums, very powerful handguns.

That argument served only to muddy the issue.

The questions are: Should they be armed at all? And if so, why?

Those questions, like most others concerning the reserves, cannot be answered until the board makes a definitive statement as to the exact role and purpose of the reserves.

Are they going to serve as a very low paid full-time police force? Or will they be an extension of the regular enforcement agencies, serving as back-up assistance and calling the state police and sheriff at the first sign of serious trouble?

Or will they attempt to deal with criminal activity as soon as they are confronted with it?

Are they, as the name suggests, a reserve force or not?

No one really seems to agree on how extensive the duties of the auxiliaries will be.

ONE THING is clear: Within several months the reserves will be on the street, and the people have a right to know what to expect.

The township administration has drawn up the rules and regulations of the auxiliaries, and we hope that will serve to answer many of the questions. But for the time being, the board should attempt to clarify the matter.

This is not to suggest that the reserves are not a dedicated lot, willing to give their time almost for free to help their fellow residents.

Neither is it an attempt to belittle the many hours of training they will have before they start work.

Nor is it to suggest that they should be put on the street not fully equipped to meet any contingency, although there remains some question as to how much any amount of training can replace actual on-the-street experience.

Until the board arrives at a specific policy statement concerning the auxiliaries, these questions and many others will remain unanswered.

Crowns change hands, but peasants keep quiet

In a certain political system, men hold office until they either die, abdicate or are overthrown for some crime. Insofar as possible, they hand-pick their successors: confirmation is made by committees of three men. The people almost never object. This system is (pick one):

a) the British monarchy;

b) the Soviet Union;

c) Wayne County government.

The answer, of course, is c) Wayne County government.

LOUIS FUNK, treasurer of the aforementioned county, died last week at 73. He had been ordained for the post because he had been deputy to the preceding incumbent, George Stoll, who similarly held onto the post until death.

Mr. Funk's dying act was to attempt to anoint his successor. Mr. Funk filed for renomination in the Aug. 3 Democratic primary, thus scaring off competent opposition. Meanwhile, his deputy, Charles Finley, also filed. At the last possible moment, Mr. Funk withdrew, leaving Finley a clear shot at the crown with only token opposition.

There's a funny procedure for filling vacancies such as the one Mr. Funk's death created. County administration vacancies are filled by committees of three—a judge and a couple of other functionaries whose titles escape me.

IT'S LIKE THAT with most county offices.

James Killeen, the county clerk, picked up the title from another such committee when an incumbent named Sullivan abdicated upon being elected to a judgeship. Sullivan, as I recall, was crowned after the demise of Edgar Branigan.

In the drain office, a man named Youngblood (I forget which one—there are so many Youngbloods) was elected in 1972, at the age of six dozen, whereupon he appointed his son deputy and retired at the end of 1974, in mid-term. The son was duly crowned by the little committee.

That nice Bill Cahalan, the prosecutor, got his title after Sam Olsen abdicated upon winning a judgeship. His predecessors acquired their crowns in similar ways.

The reeve of the shire, or sheriff as we now call that antique office, is Bill Lucas, who was picked by a little committee after the abdication of Roman Gribbs, who was picked by the little committee after the overthrow of the notorious Peter Buback, who was picked by the little committee after the noble Andrew Baird died in office when he was about a million years old.

I oversimplify slightly. The system produces some able rulers, just as the monarchical system sometimes did. Periodically, there are plebiscites at which the peasants of Wayne County confirm the ruler in office. But only a few greybeards in the kingdom can remember when the populace dumped such a duly crowned personage.

IN A ONE-PARTY county where a machine

takes care of the primaries, there is no chance for a member of another faith to win such an office in November and no chance for anyone but a nobleman (a member of the machine) to win a primary.

Some incendiary radicals are contemplating change. They plot a new system where a "county executive" fully visible to the populace, would be elected openly. They dream of a meaningful inscribed tablet called a "county home rule" law that would do away with the farcical elections of clerks, treasurers and shire-reeves.

Those who admired Louis Funk's style of politics may make memorial donations to his favorite charity. All the rest may wish to donate to the campaigns of county commission candidates who will institute a county executive system and to legislative candidates who will write a workable home rule law.

Now don't you wish you had voted?

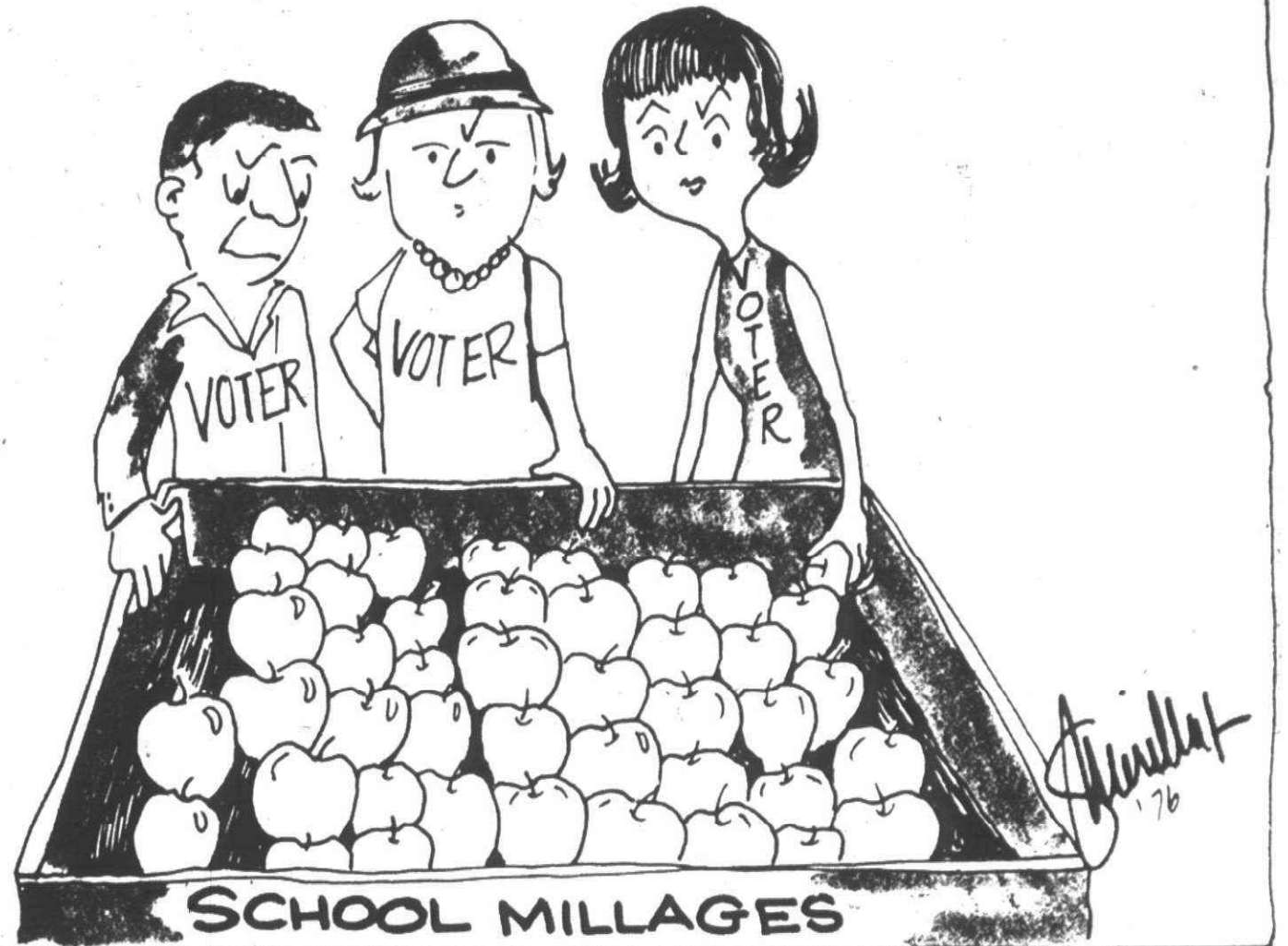
The cliché that every vote counts rang with deadly clarity Monday. About midnight, when the unofficial votes were tallied, the Plymouth School District millage question ended up in a dead heat—3,431 votes in favor and 3,431 votes against.

We already have heard cries of regret from residents who didn't make it to the polls. There doubtless will be a number of readers who wish today they had made it to the balloting booth Monday. In every election, each vote counts. In close elections, especially a tie, this fact becomes dramatically obvious—almost an understatement.

THE MOST unfortunate aftermath of the tie vote is that no matter how it is resolved, 3,431 voters will be upset with the results.

Among the 3,431 on either side, large numbers will suggest that the results were rigged, that there was hanky-panky, and the election was "stolen."

Voters pick and choose

Local school elections are usually the best weathervane of public opinion, and Monday's voting throughout the metropolitan Detroit suburbs was no exception.

Some results and then some conclusions.

All 16 suburban school districts which had millage renewals on their ballots saw them succeed. Conclusion is that local voters are comfortable about supporting their local schools at past levels of taxation.

Thirty-one millage increases were voted on: 15 passed and 16 failed. Conclusion is that voters were prepared to pick and choose among tax increases, according as local needs and conditions varied.

THE TWO BIGGEST requests for additional millage—8.3 mills in Royal Oak and six mills in Lake Shore—were passed. Obviously, voters in these districts concluded that failure to pass the increased millage would have left their school systems in a state of collapse. This they were not prepared to accept, and so they voted yes.

The three smallest millage increases on the ballot—0.53 mills for Schoolcraft Community College, 0.5 in Van Buren and one mill in Lake Shore—all failed. Equally obviously, voters in these districts felt that the millages requested were not centrally important in the future health of the educational program they were to have supported. Weighing the comparatively small educational benefit against the comparatively small increase in taxes, voters chose to keep their money.

Of the 26 intermediate-sized millage increase questions on the Monday ballot, voters split evenly, approving 13 and turning down 13.

Locally, voters in Avondale, Birmingham, Livonia, Southfield, West Bloomfield and Walled Lake school districts passed the requested increases, several doing it the second time around. In these communities, school officials were successful in pointing out that cost inflation and cuts in state aid made increased local school taxes a necessity if class size, hours and educational programs were to be preserved.

The local school districts where millage increases were rejected—Farmington, Plymouth and Garden City—all have particular problems which helped deafen the ears of voters to the millage appeal.

The Farmington school board couldn't get together on what would be cut if the millage failed. Plymouth has been embroiled in a fight over a football coach's resignation, among other things. Garden City—historically a staunch supporter of its local school system—has been a fractured community ever since a bitter teachers strike in 1975.

THE RESULTS of Monday's voting tend to lend support for the argument that teacher strikes are counter-productive when local taxpayers are asked to ante up after the settlement.

Garden City, Plymouth and Livonia all experienced strikes within the past two years. Voters in the Livonia district turned down the millage increase the first time around, and voters in the other two both rejected millage increases Monday.

Last fall, both Farmington and Southfield districts went right to the start of school before working out settlements with their teachers. Farmington's request for millage lost, and Southfield's won only narrowly after an ill-advised attempt by property owners to put out an anonymous leaflet against the millage back fired.

THE FAILURE of voters in the district supporting Schoolcraft College—Livonia, Plymouth, Garden City, Clarenceville and Northville—was particularly disappointing to college officials.

Schoolcraft has been doing an excellent job lifting the sights of local residents, and officials there hoped the 0.53 mill issue would pass on the grounds that it was small compared to increases asked by K-12 districts.

But what happened is that the Schoolcraft millage failed in those K-12 districts which had a local millage on the ballot and passed where no local taxes were at issue. The millage elections brought out the "no" voters.

OVER ALL, the pattern is encouraging to those of us who feel that quality of education in our local school is important to the quality of our life.

Last year, you may recall, the taxpayer revolt was in white heat. No millage increases were passed, and even some renewals were defeated.

This year, voters were independent-minded, basing their votes on local needs. What they seem to be saying is:

"Yes, let's support our local schools and keep educational quality reasonably high. But we will not dig into our pocketbooks where there does not seem to be full justification."

That's a sensible attitude.

But these "conspiracy" thoughts don't give prop-

Better late than never

The news was welcome indeed that the Wayne County Road Commission has approved a full traffic signal for Sheldon and Hanford Roads—the intersection involving the death of a young boy in an accident whose results could have been much worse because of the number of school children there when it occurred.

The road commission had been requested on many occasions to provide a signal for the intersection, but always had statistics which argued against a light at this time. Statistics, though, seem much less impressive when someone is killed.

And so the road commission should be commended for its quick action after the fatality and shamed for its inability to act before the accident.

This accident may not have been prevented if a light had been present. However, the speed of traffic along Sheldon during daytime hours should have been sufficient to justify a signal light to slow down traffic. There is special justification when the intersection is a crossing place for a large number of elementary children. But let's be positive and thank the county for what it has done and hope for more positive action in the future.

er recognition to the integrity of the election process. There are too many safeguards against a "rigged" election. The chances of fraud are remote.

The best thing for each of us to do, before drawing any conclusions, is to wait for the pieces to be put together on what has happened. There are lots of innuendoes and rumors, but we need to wait for the best facts when they become available.

Ask yourself this question: If the millage had won or lost by 1,000 votes, would you have entertained any doubts about the integrity of the election process? Your answer, logically, should be the same for a close election.

A narrow outcome doesn't change the ability of election workers and balloting machines to count accurately. The only difference is that a close vote makes it easier to suspect the outcome on an emotional basis. But we should desire to be rational.

ONE CALLER suggested, half in jest, that the election should have been declared "no contest" because 75 per cent of the electorate didn't participate.

The fact that only about one-fourth of the eligible residents bothered to vote should be greeted with more alarm than the tied results. Instead, attention will be focused on some 7,000 persons who voted and not the 20,000 who stayed home.

The impact of Monday's election will be felt more by the 7,000-plus who did vote. That's human nature. But it should weigh heavily on 20,000 registered voters whose votes could have counted but didn't.

Carter's labor views cleared

As a former member of the UAW and as a current member of the ASFME Local 25, AFL-CIO, I feel it my duty to clarify Governor Jimmy Carter's positions as they concern labor.

Carter's stand on Right to Work legislation: On Jan. 29, 1971, Carter wrote to Reed Larson of the National Right to Work Committee: "I stated during my campaign that I was not in favor of doing away with the Right to Work Law, and it is a position I still maintain." More recently: "My position now is the same as in 1970 when I was running for governor. . . ." He now states, I am told, although after much searching I cannot find his latest position in writing and therefore cannot quote him, that he would sign a repeal of the Right to Work laws.

Carter's stand on tax reform: He favors reform of personal taxes, although he does not state how. He states that he feels we

should restructure corporate taxes of companies which move out of the U.S., but again he does not state how he might accomplish this.

On energy conservation, Carter proposes the raising of rates of utilities to discourage usage, but he makes no mention of the multinational corporations or energy monopolies. On aid to cities, he will restructure federal funds, but does not state how. On social issues, there also is no mention in his position papers which I received at his 2nd Congressional District office. Likewise there is no mention of civil liberties, Senate Bill 1, consumer issues.

On restructuring bureaucracy, Carter states he will decrease the number of federal agencies by 1,700 but cannot mention one agency he would abolish. He also states an intention of creating a new cabinet post by separating education from health and welfare.

People can see transit improvements--Bianco

"After all this 'grantsmanship,' people are finally seeing some physical improvements."

Joe Bianco breaks into a rare grin as he talks about the \$25 million in new, air-conditioned buses with bright orange "SEMTA" markings, the first bus shelters suburbia has ever seen and new bus terminals that are going up.

Bianco is chairman of SEMTA, the South-eastern Michigan Transportation Authority. Since 1967 he has been deep in the often tedious report writing, bill drafting, committee work, wheeling and cajoling that it takes to translate plans into a system that transports people.

BUT FOR BIANCO, 39, of Bloomfield Hills, the planning is still far from over. He's seeking a new three-year term on SEMTA as an appointee of the South-eastern Michigan Council of Governments. He wants to see a rapid transit system built too.

Bianco gets turned on by the fact that SEMTA is taking over the Grand Trunk Railway commuter service from Detroit to Pontiac, rebuilding old cars and adding service.

From the first he decided: "Public transportation was difficult, challenging, untouchable. This is where I could concentrate."

"I GREW UP in northeast Pennsylvania, right in the heart of the coal country. In the '50s it was a terribly depressed area—25 per cent unemployment was the norm. I recognized the fallacies of a one-industry town."

The biggest scholarship he could find was to General Motors Institute, where he studied engineering and finance.

"When I took my master's in economics at Georgetown University, I worked on causes of economic development. Some summers I worked at the State Department on designing what we called the 'economic infrastructure' for developing countries."

"It became clearer to me what transportation systems meant, not only to developing countries, but to already developed, urban areas."

"WHEN I CAME back to Detroit in 1964, I worked for the national accounting firm of Touche Ross. I got to travel in western Europe and all over the United States."

"There were lessons... metro Detroit is years and years behind in transit systems."

"Touche Ross did some of the audits and accounting for Grand Trunk and some of the bus companies in the region. As I got to be privy to financial operations, it became clear to me that public transportation was moving quickly to the state of bankruptcy."

In the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce, Bianco worked on a committee that recommended the law setting up SEMTA. Gov. George Romney signed the enabling legislation... Act 204, in 1967.

THAT YEAR was significant in another, more depressing way.

"I'm a lieutenant commander in the Coast Guard Reserve," Bianco said. "I was on active duty two weeks during the Detroit riots. Patrolling the river front, standing on the bridge in front of Cobo Hall and watching the city burn. I almost cried."

"The day I left the ship, I got a call from Joe Hudson (the retailer) and Kent Mathewson (president of Metropolitan Fund) asking me to take part in formation of the urban coalition that became New Detroit Inc. For six months I served as executive vice president."

"We saw the results of Detroit and Watts, and one of the points of feedback was lack of adequate transportation services—job accessibility. Twenty-eight per cent of the households in Detroit had no access to an auto!"

Bianco was appointed to the first SEMTA board and became chairman last year.

IN PRIVATE LIFE, Bianco is a vice president of Loeb, Rhoades & Co. in Detroit. The investment banking and brokerage firm claims 90 per cent of his time.

Two days a month, however, there are SEMTA board and committee meetings. There are dinner meetings with legisla-

tors, county commissioners, council people, not only on the political aspects of SEMTA but on its future service.

Homework involves studying transit systems and budgets—\$40.6 million for operations, \$70 million in applications for capital grants.

THE BIG BREAKTHROUGH came three years ago when the state allocated a half-cent of the gasoline tax for public transportation.

It meant a virtual revolution in bus service. "SEMTA has put 14 small bus programs into effect from Monroe to Birmingham," said Bianco. "and in fiscal '77, we're going to install three more dial-a-ride systems."

"In addition to that, we're going to set up seven more small bus programs, essentially to serve the elderly and handicapped in each of the seven counties of SEMTA's authority."

"We've got 300 new bus shelters, the first the suburbs have ever seen. Within the next month, we'll have a \$2 million terminal in Macomb County that replaces a 60-year-old facility. In July we'll be opening up the new Oakland terminal, a \$2.5 million facility that replaces one about 50 years old."

"And we have approval for a new \$2 million terminal in western Wayne County."

Internally, the SEMTA board has wrestled with building a management structure that exploded from eight staff persons three years ago to 80 central staff and 450 operating employees today.

THERE ARE frustrations, he admits. Chief is the "continual haggling" with the City of Detroit over merging its department of transportation (D-DOT) into SEMTA. The D-DOT union chief has been able to delay all capital grants for three to six months, Bianco said.

While the U.S. Department of Transportation won't say so publicly, it wants SEMTA to absorb D-DOT before it will finance a rapid transit program here. Those negotiations have been extremely difficult, in Bianco's view: "The city's constant position is that they always want a little bit more than we can offer."

Meanwhile, however, SEMTA has been able to acquire the failing or failed suburban bus companies without the kinds of lawsuits other metropolitan areas have experienced.

YOU MIGHT EXPECT Bianco to be a hard-sell guy with a touch of the Machiavellian prince about him. Instead he has an air of ascetic efficiency.

He has solid contacts in both parties. He was once a campaign manager for Republican U.S. Sen. Robert Griffin, and his renomination to SEMTA has the solid backing of Democrat Alexander C. Perinoff, chairman of the Oakland County Board of Commissioners.

Bianco sometimes thinks about turning over the SEMTA reins to others and playing more golf or selling more stocks and bonds.

But the public transportation field provides too much excitement.

Safety tips for bikers

Don't forget to watch for cars turning right on a red light when crossing on a green signal, cautioned the association.

Above all, traffic laws apply to bikers as well as motorists. Always ride with traffic and not against it. The best way to ride is single file and as far to the right as possible.

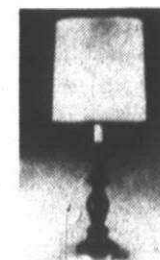

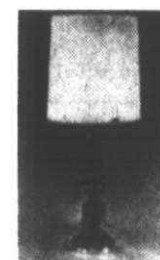

Family Y camps offer varied experiences

A camping assortment that includes fun for the entire family is being offered through the Livonia Family Y this summer.

The program includes a day camp on the Y's Stark Road grounds, a day camp a bus ride away, resident camp in two locations, and family camping.

All are being coordinated at the Livonia Y this summer through Mike Kenyon, community program director.

Jubilee Day Camp is the close-to-home offering. It will have four sessions, July 6-16, July 19-29, Aug. 2-12 and Aug. 16-26, and each will have a separate theme, including movie making, youth theater, art extravaganza and vaudeville.

Daily activities, running from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., also will include swimming, crafts, games, sports, archery, tennis, trampoline and field trips.

The camp is open to children 6-11 years of age.

The staff will include Melinda Berriman, an elementary school teacher; Jan Smith, an Albion College graduate; and Les Lazarus, an Oakland Community College student. Russ Vogel will lead the dramatics work.

The camp costs \$40 for the nine-day session, and bus transportation is open to

campers living in Livonia for \$5 per family per session.

"We're trying on this one to keep the fee low and make it as convenient as possible so we can involve as many children as possible," Kenyon said.

FAR OAKS DAY CAMP offers an experience a little farther from home.

In this program, buses will take boys and girls 7-12 years of age to Camp Ohiesya, near Holly, for a program that will be shared by several branches of the Detroit Metropolitan YMCA.

All three periods, June 28 to July 8, July 12-22, and July 26 to Aug. 5, will include horseback riding, swim instruction, rowing, canoeing, fishing, archery, arts and crafts, nature study and games.

Along with their swim suit and towels, campers will take a sack lunch each day and milk will be provided. The bus will leave the Family Y at 9 a.m. each day, returning at 4 p.m.

The cost in that program for nine days is \$75.

RESIDENT CAMP is offered in two places, Ohiesya and Nissokone, near Osceola.

Boys and girls 8-10 may go to Ohiesya Aug. 8-14 or Aug. 15-21 for an \$86 fee that includes meals, a full program and medical insurance, with parents providing transportation to and from camp.

Nissokone will have two two-week sessions, June 26 to July 10, and July 10-24, and five one-week programs between June 26 and July 31.

The cost is \$190 for the longer sessions and \$100 for the shorter, and all include a full camp program of sailing, horseback riding, water skiing, tennis, swimming, archery, photography, drama, rowing, crafts and nature lore.

The first sessions FAMILY WEEKEND camping is available at both Ohiesya and Nissokone for recreational vehicles and tent-trailers.

Electric hook-ups are provided in both lakefront and shaded areas. Families interested in more information can call the Livonia Family Y camp office, 261-2161.

Several special camps will be part of the general program.

One, for Girl Scouts, will run three hours a day from Aug. 23-27 and will include instruction on canoeing safety, water safety and lifesaving. Shirley Ritter, assistant physical education director for the Family Y, will direct the program. The cost is \$10.

Pastor's travel report

Dr. Hess sees tension, peace hope in Mideast

Tension in the Mideast right now seems as great as at any time Dr. Bartlett L. Hess, world-traveling clergyman, can remember, yet he also thinks prospects for

peace there are greater than in recent years.

Dr. Hess, senior minister of Ward United Presbyterian Church of Livonia, made his assessment after he and his wife, Margaret, returned from leading a group of travelers from this area into Egypt, Luxor, Jordan, Israel, Turkey and Greece.

"I saw more upset and unrest in Israel this time," he said, "especially in the old city section of Jerusalem."

"You do have to remember, though, that any violence that occurs there gets more publicized, just because it's so cramped there and so much watched by the rest of the world."

"When a bomb goes off in Jerusalem, the whole world knows about it."

Despite the tension, there is a hopeful note, said this minister who has made seven trips to the Holy Land in travels that have taken him 19 times across the Atlantic and three times across the Pacific. (One trip around the world in there, he explained.)

"THE CONFLICT in Lebanon now," he said, "is tending to defuse the situation in Israel because it has caused a split among the Arabs."

"Syria, by occupying Lebanon, is coming up on the other side from the Palestinian Liberation Organization, and this means some loss of support for the Palestinian Arabs."

The battle in Lebanon, he added, is between Christian rightists and Muslim extremists, and Syria is coming in to defend the Christians.

A second factor, Dr. Hess said, is that in Israel there is greater sensitivity to the

needs of the Arabs on the West Bank.

"The fact that Israel was under such pressure during the war of 1973, as opposed to the clear-cut victory of six years earlier, means that more groups in Israel are willing to talk about peace," he explained.

"I do see hope for peace."

DR. AND MRS. HESS led a group of 53 travelers, including contingents from the Bible class Margaret Hess teaches in Birmingham and a Schoolcraft College archaeology class. There also were some from the Ward congregation.

He also noted that there a great deal of pro-American feeling in Egypt, apparently since the Nixon-Kissinger visit there. "When they find out you are American there is an immediate welcome," he said.

DR. AND MRS. HESS wound up their own journey by continuing on to Dubrovnik, Yugoslavia, after completing the three-week tour.

He described as "fabulous" that area of mountains, sea and an old city that is "in the best condition of any medieval city."

"While we were there," he added, "Tito celebrated his 84th birthday, and there is much speculation as to what will happen when he dies."

"People talk of freedom, and they are very proud their country does not have the same repression you find in other Communist states."

When are Dr. and Mrs. Hess likely to return to Israel?

"Probably in a year or so," he said. "I can't stay away—there's always something new to see."

"And the country itself changes so much. It's amazing the way they continue to progress."

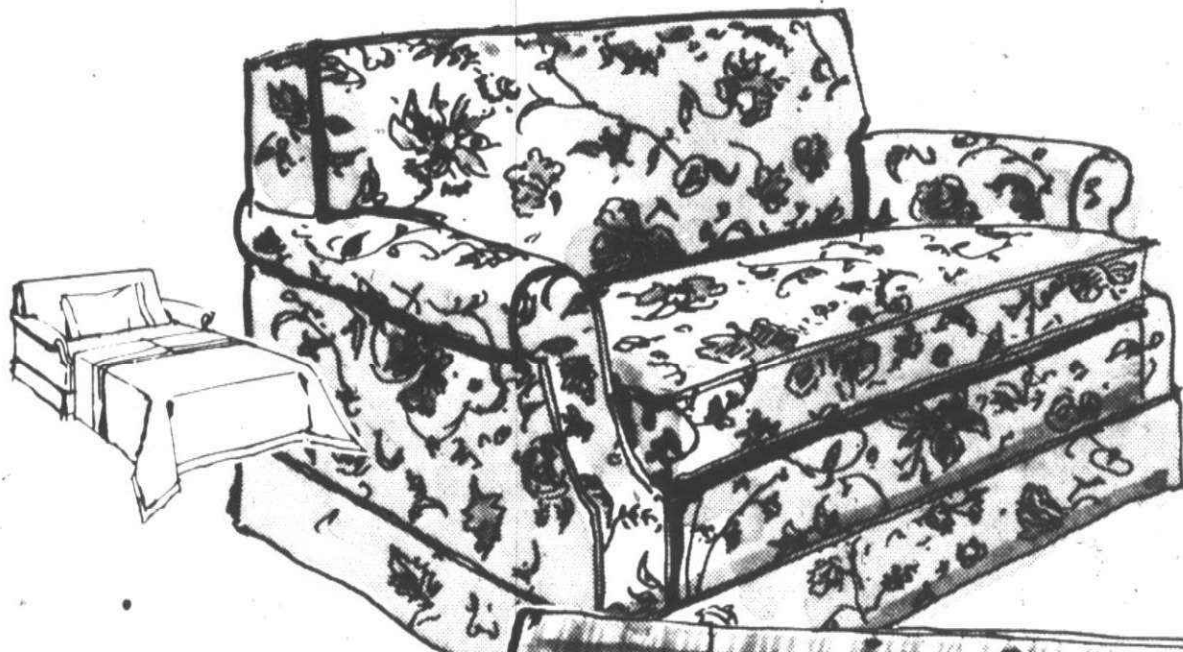

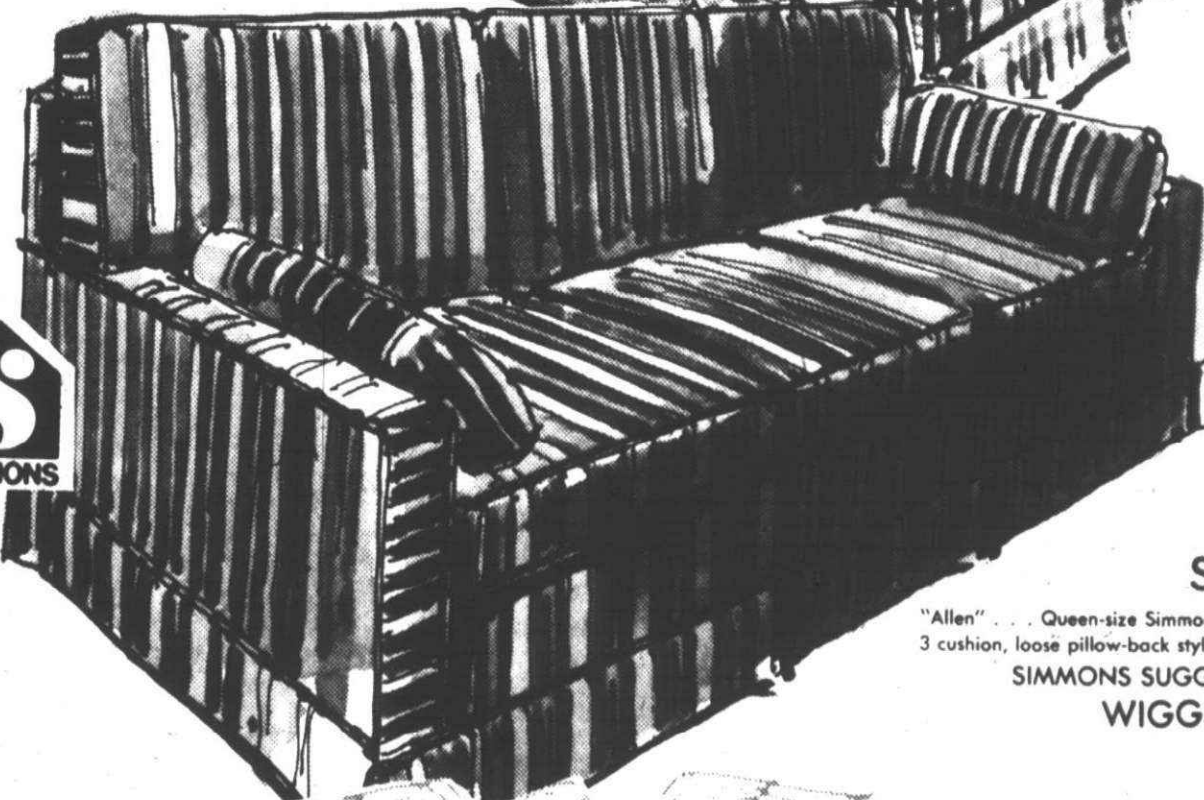

Work after retirement theme for conference

Principal morning speaker is Dr. Harold L. Sheppard of Washington, a former member of Wayne's faculty and director of a Ford Foundation study on ways to increase the labor force participation of older people.

SC readies evaluation for Title IX

Schoolcraft College is preparing its first self-evaluation report in compliance with Title IX, the regulation which prohibits sex discrimination.

Student Affairs Vice-president Edward V. McNally said the report under preparation by the various divisions of the college is to be completed by the third week in July. McNally is Schoolcraft's coordinator for Title IX adherence.

The self-evaluation becomes a detailed written account of the College's efforts against discrimination of students or employees because of their sex, McNally said, and added:

"We'll have to include a copy of it whenever we apply for Federal funding. It will also be on record should HEW (the department of Health, Education and Welfare) decide to check on us."

THE SELF-STUDY is another step in Schoolcraft's efforts towards full compliance with provisions of Title IX. One of the earliest actions taken was Mr. McNally's appointment as coordinator by President C. Nelson Grote in September, 1975.

At that time the college head said he viewed compliance here as more of a continuing rather than an implementing action. He noted the college's long-standing policy prohibited discrimination on the basis of sex as well as race, creed, color or national origin and added that it has since been expanded to cover age as well.

A second major action was the adopting and publishing of complaint procedures in March, 1976. They provide a guide for and insure review for students and employees who feel their rights under Title IX have been denied.

THE PROCEDURES establish that the coordinator is the first level for resolving any complaints.

If a solution is not reached at this level, a six-member committee, three male and three female, are appointed from all segments of the college. They are designated by the president, who also names an ex-officio chairperson, receives the committee's report and makes a final determination.

Copies of the president's official decision are made available to all interested parties.

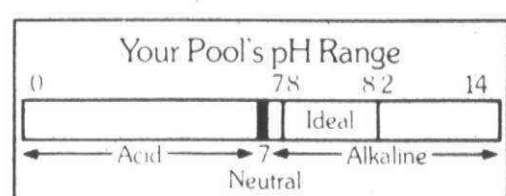

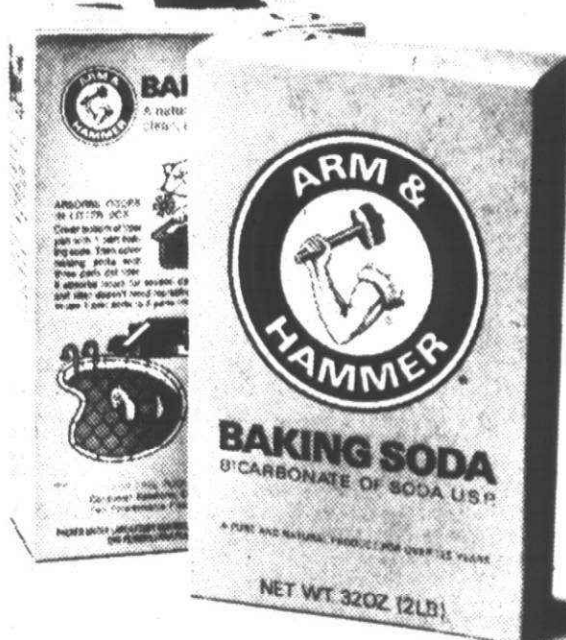
How to estimate your pool's capacity

The average swimming pool contains approximately 20,000 gallons. However, an accurate record of the pool's water capacity in gallons is necessary since this measurement is often used to calculate amounts of chemicals for treating the pool water. The following formulas can be used to approximate the total gallons of water a pool will hold.

Versatility marks all-area girls' track and field team

Girls' track and field competition has emerged as a major spring sport in the area over the last couple years. Excellent seasons were had this campaign especially by Redford Bishop Borgess, Catholic League titlist, and Westland John Glenn, Northwest Suburban League champion.

Several individuals from area squads turned in tremendous efforts during the year. Because the following girls paced their respective events in the final Observer & Eccentric ranking of the year, they have earned positions on the all-O&E girls' track team.

ANN CWIK, Redford Bishop Borgess, hurdles, Cwik, a versatile performer, sat atop the hurdles' listing virtually the entire spring. Her best time of the season was 14.8 seconds.

The sophomore captain of the squad, she lettered both last year and this season. She earned more points than any other girl on the team in 1976.

"She can do almost anything," said Borgess coach John Dunn.

"She is pretty determined and has good concentration."

SHARON DREYER, Livonia Bentley, 440-yard run. Hard work enabled Dreyer to lower her quarter-mile time to an excellent 58 seconds by the end of the year. Dreyer also played on the Bulldogs' volleyball and girls' basketball teams. Carrying a 3.9 grade average, she plans to attend Central Michigan University.

"She's the greatest athlete I ever coached," said Bentley's Bev Dale. "She's very coachable and works 10 times harder than anyone else on the team."

MARGARET CHRISTNER, Livonia Franklin, shot put. A senior and a three-year track participant, Christner's best toss of the eight-pound shot was 37 feet seven inches.

She won the regional shot put title this season. Christner holds Franklin records in the discus and as a member of the 440-yard relay team.

"She's a very dedicated athlete," said coach Richard Braun. "She's a very intense competitor who looks forward to track all year long."

SUE JARVIS, Ladywood, 880-yard run and mile run. Although only a sophomore, Jarvis holds school records in the 440, the 880, the mile and the two-mile runs. Her best efforts in the 880 and the mile this spring were 2:21.7 and 5:17.2, respectively.

"She has natural athletic talent," said Ladywood assistant coach Ray Holm. He added that she has a tendency to work too hard and must be restrained. Jarvis carries a B+ average in the classroom.

CINDY MELLAS, Garden City East, long jump. Voted the most valuable member of the team, Mellas set school records during the year in the long jump, the hurdles and the 220-yard dash. Her best long jump was 17 feet 7 1/4 inches.

Even though she was ill 2 1/2 weeks of the season, the junior still earned 180 points to lead the Panthers. East coach Linda Frysienger called Mellas "probably the best overall athlete I've coached."

KATHY MCDUGALL, Westland John Glenn, 220-yard dash. A very strong sprint-

er, McDougall, with a best clocking of 25.5 seconds, easily topped the listing for the 220-yard dash.

"She has good, long legs for track," said Glenn coach Cheryl Caughey. "and was entered in three or four events every meet." McDougall was also a member of the area's best 440- and 880-yard relay crews.

CAROLYN BOOTH, Livonia Stevenson, high jump. A member of the track team all three years at Stevenson, Booth's best leap of the 1976 campaign was five feet three inches.

The senior was also entered in the open 440 and the mile relay for the Spartans. Booth also played basketball.

"She's an outstanding student, too," said Stevenson coach Liz Embree. "She's just a super kid."

JULIE VOYLES, Livonia Stevenson, two-mile run. Running cross country with the boys last fall apparently paid off for Voyles this spring. The sophomore was the area's best by far with a premier showing of 11:37.3.

Coach Embree, who calls Voyles "my little running machine," said Julie can run everything from the quarter mile up.

"As a sophomore coming in, she's the best distance runner here," Embree stated.

CHRIS WANDYG, Redford Thurston, discus. A senior, Wandyg won Northwest Suburban League titles this year in both the discus and the shot put. Her best effort in the former was 109 feet seven inches.

One of the Eagles' track captains, Wandyg also played basketball and volleyball for Thurston. She qualified for the state finals in both the discus and the shot put.

"She's an all-around athlete with a super attitude," said Thurston coach Steve Boyak.

KAREN SCHMIDT, Livonia Stevenson, 100-yard dash. Only a sophomore, Schmidt tied the school record in the 100 this year with a time of 11.3 seconds. She also participated in the 440- and the 880-yard relays, anchoring both.

"She's an outstanding prospect," Embree said. "I expect her to break the (100) record."

KAREN BOHLAND, TINA HARMON, CHERYL MCKETTRICK and ANN CWIK, Redford Bishop Borgess, mile relay. The quartet was used almost every meet, with its best effort being 4:04.3. Bohland, a sophomore, also ran in the open 440- and 880-yard runs.

Harmon, a utility runner, was described by Coach Dunn as the best discus thrower on the team. The junior also competed on Borgess' 880-yard relay team.

McKettrick, who Dunn said "has run everything" for the Spartans, was only a freshman.

KATHY LEHMAN, CHERYL WILLIAMS, KATHY MCDUGALL and KAREN MCDUGALL, Westland John Glenn, 440-yard relay. These four Rockets teamed for a best time of 50.7 seconds in the sprint relay, more than a full second faster than their closest area rival.

Lehman competed in the 440 relay last year as a sophomore and ran in the state meet earlier this month. She leads off the relay, said Coach Caughey, because she has a quick start.

Williams, who opened the season as a sprinter in the individual events, stepped into a relay slot when another Rocket sustained an injury. An active participant in field events too, Williams was described as "a strong upcoming runner" by her coach.

Karen McDougall competed in four events every dual meet for Glenn over her three-year running career. A senior, she has been offered a full athletic scholarship by Eastern Michigan University.

"She's probably the most outstanding athlete I've ever coached," Caughey said.

DEBBIE EVERLEY, CHERYL WILLIAMS, KATHY LEHMAN and KATHY MCDUGALL, Westland John Glenn, 880-yard relay. This foursome spearheaded the area listing by a two-second margin with a time of 1:44.0.

Everley, a junior transfer from Saline, anchored the crew. She contributed to school records in the 880 and the mile relays. She also competed in the long jump and the high jump.

"She was a big reason why Rocket relay teams never lost in a dual meet, Caughey stated.

Bleriot XI on display

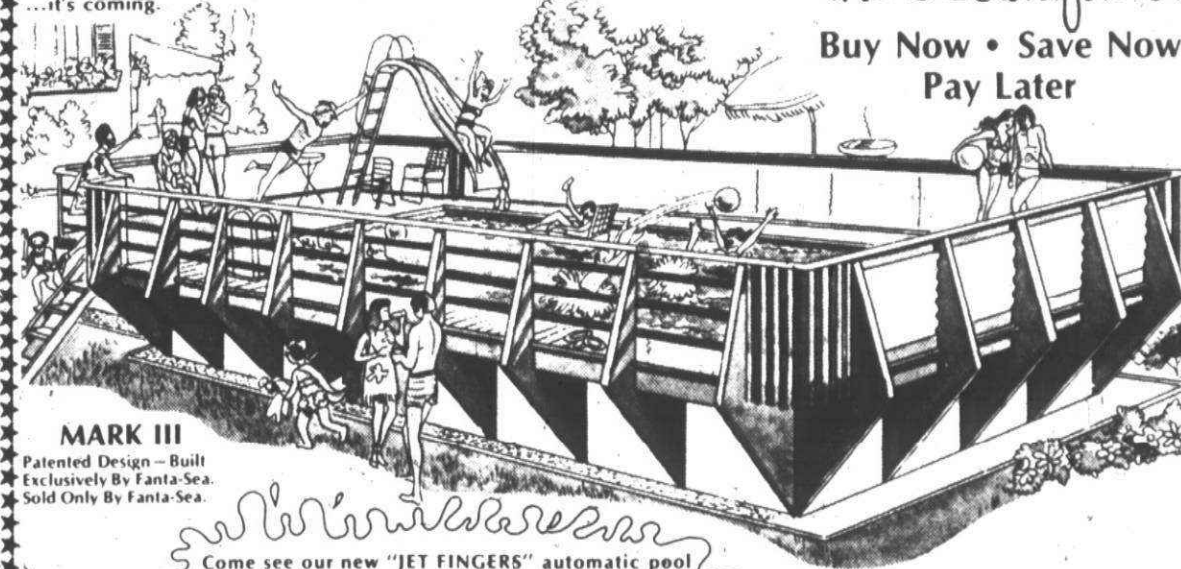

Wolverine schedules big Lottery Mile

It's Lottery Week through next Wednesday night at Wolverine Harness Raceway with nightly giveaways plus the big Lottery Mile on the last race June 23. In all, more than \$36,000 in prizes will be awarded to fans entering the contest through the purchase of "Michigan Landmarks" instant tickets.

Persons attending the races at Wolverine tonight (June 17) through next Wednesday (June 23), will receive a contest entry coupon with each \$1 Landmarks ticket purchased at the track.

Nightly drawings, Thursday through Tuesday, will determine five winners receiving: 1,000 Landmarks tickets; 750 tickets; two \$500 shopping sprees; and a fifth prize of 500 tickets.

All coupons remain eligible for the final night Lottery Mile when 10 coupons will be drawn with each contestant then drawing for a post position in the last race on Wednesday night's card.

The order of finish of the horses in that race will determine the prize winners of a 1976 Mustang; Volare; Chevette; 2,000 Landmarks tickets; and 1,000 tickets to each of the last six finishers.

Introduced last September, the Lottery Mile resulted in a mid-week record crowd and mutual handle figure at Wolverine. It marked the first time in the history of the Michigan Lottery that racehorses had been connected with the selection of lottery bonus prize winners.

The opening of Lottery Week tonight accents one of the best races on this week's Grand Circuit tour at Wolverine.

The three-year-old colt trotters, the horses that will be pointing for the Hambletonian (harness racing's Kentucky Derby) this fall, will race in two divisions, each worth \$23,250.

The first division will feature highly touted Nevele Thunder, the winter book fa-

vorite to win the Hambletonian. Nevele Thunder, owned by Charles Slutsky of New York and driven and trained by Hall of Famer Stanley Dancer, was beaten only once in his two-year-old campaign and won his only start of this year at Vernon Downs in a season record time of 2:00 3/5.

Nevele Thunder is such a standout that Wolverine officials were forced to stage his division as a non-betting race between the fifth and sixth races.

Wolverine had a bad experience last year with the "big shooter" gamblers who follow the Grand Circuit from track to track, betting hundreds of thousands of dollars to show on heavy favorites.

In one race last year, a gambler bet \$70,000 to show on Tarport Hap which won easily. The man collected his legal minimum of \$2,200 to show, costing the track some \$17,000 to balance the "minus" show pool for the legal payoff.

The second division should find Bill Haughton's Steve Lobell the favorite. He is coming off a strong third-place finish to Nevele Thunder in New York earlier this month. Steve Lobell was beaten two lengths while closing strongly.

Three-year-old pacing fillies will go to the post in the \$20,000 Matron Stake tomorrow (Friday) night on the last evening of Grand Circuit week.

Thirteen fillies have been entered and all are expected to start. Post time for the first race Friday night is 8:15 p.m.

17th District Dems elect 5 delegates

The suburbs are sending two teachers and a liberal businessman as part of their delegation to the Democratic national convention in July.

A 17th Congressional District convention Saturday at Mercy College elected these five delegates and three alternates:

•For Jimmy Carter—Maxine Berman of Southfield and Matthew McCusker of Detroit, delegates; Gerald A. Freedman of Farmington Hills, alternate.

•For Morris Udall—Rosemary K. Reid of Southfield, Frank H. Bosak Jr. of Redford Township and Theresa Crayton of Detroit, delegates; Marian McCracken of Farmington and Robert A. Neaton of Detroit, alternates.

MS. BERMAN, 30, was 17th District coordinator for Carter.

"I've belonged to Democratic clubs before," said the Oak Park High School English teacher, "but I've not been so active until this year."

"I started looking over candidates in January and got in at the beginning of February."

Leaders of the Michigan Education Association, parent organization of most suburban teachers unions, sent local leaders letters urging their active support of Rep. Udall because of the federal aid to education issue. Ms. Berman didn't get a letter.

She concedes the former Georgia governor fared poorly in the affluent suburbs of Southfield, Farmington and Birmingham. "Some of the Jackson vote perhaps shifted to Udall, and Carter was not in the state very much. Typical Udall areas are upper-middle class liberal areas."

A sometime freelance writer, Ms. Berman had a satirical article published in Saturday Review a few years ago.

BOSAK, 33, was a McGovern coordinator four years ago and, as Udall coordinator in the 17th, sighed: "It appears Jimmy Carter has it sewed up."

But Bosak was surprised how well Udall did in his home territory of Redford Township. "You could have bowled me over with a feather when we won 3-2. I didn't think Redford would be good Udall territory because it had been Wallace territory in '72."

Bosak was proud that the 17th gave Udall his biggest margin of any congressional district in Michigan.

With the presidential nomination all but clinched by Carter, Bosak is looking forward to writing the party platform when the national convention gathers in New

York's Madison Square Gardens.

Bosak is in the insurance and fidelity bond business. A member of the forces opposing recall of five township board members, he is a candidate for township trustee in the August primary. Bosak is on the boards of the 17th District organization and the Redford Boosters Club.

MRS. REID, another Udall delegate, is chairwoman of the Southfield Democratic Club.

She is a member of the Michigan Education Association's women's caucus and the League of Women Voters.

Freedman, a Carter alternate, is an attorney who lives in Farmington Hills. His long list of political credits includes membership on the Democratic State Central Committee as well as Americans for Democratic Action, the American Civil Liberties Union and Common Cause.

Ms. McCracken, a Udall alternate from Farmington, is a teacher who is active in the Farmington Democratic Club, the MEA women's caucus, National Organization for Women and the Farmington Political Action Council.

She has actively campaigned for incumbent U.S. Rep. William Brodhead and for Donald Riegle for the U.S. Senate.

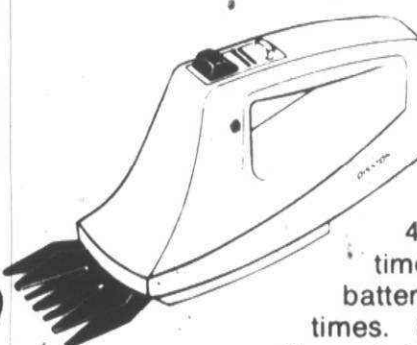

Original musical should snow young viewers

"This is my rehearsal hair-do," explained Betty Aberlin, who arrived at the Music Hall office looking startlingly unlike her glossy promotional photo where she has cascades of hair, a vibrant face and big smile.
Her hair was swept up and back for comfort in the auditorium downstairs, where the cast was rehearsing "SummerSnow," in which she plays the lead.
Ms. Aberlin had a level gaze with deep blue eyes and a direct, relaxed manner — despite the long, steady hours of rehearsal since June 1. This was the second week of rehearsal, just one week away from the opening.
"SummerSnow" won't have an opening night but an opening day, since it is a musical for children. Two performances are slated each day, at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m., through June 27. The show lasts one hour.
BUT IT SHOULD be a dazzling hour. An original musical for children,

the \$100,000 production will have its world premiere at the Music Hall Center for the Performing Arts in Detroit.
Miss Aberlin has the lead role, playing a girl named Betty who gets mad at two playmates when they leave her out of their badminton game and freezes them in a summer snow.
Getting snow to fall in the summer isn't easy, unless you have a witch. "She's this scary," said Ms. Aberlin, holding two fingers very close together.
The not-so-scary witch gives Betty a spell, which she chants, and before you know it, snow.
Technical director Tom Bryant explained later that the snow will actually be shredded plastic, hung in a bag overhead. "It just flutters down," he said. Sometimes you can sweep up the snow and re-use it, he told me, in answer to my question.
OTHER SPECIAL effects will include a trolley in which the actors arrive in a big-city park setting. The en-

tire stage floor will be grass. A gazebo in disarray is the witch's home. In some scenes, the park turns into part of a classroom.
Miss Aberlin said the theme of the play is "that good people sometimes do bad things. There's a song called 'Good People Do Bad Things' that they sing to comfort me. Everyone gets angry and knows what feeling left out is like."
"SummerSnow" is a musical for children of all ages, particularly 3 to 11, and for adults. "The program will be a coloring book. We wanted to make it fun for kids," Ms. Aberlin said.
She heads the professional cast which also includes Francois Clemmons, as one of the two friends. Ms. Aberlin and Clemmons both appear regularly on the popular children's television program "Mister Rogers' Neighborhood."
It was the show, starring Fred Rogers, which prompted "SummerSnow." One of the features has been a week-

long impromptu planning of an opera presentation on Fridays. Manuel L. Levine, managing director of the Music Hall, suggested adapting one of the operas into a children's musical.
ROGERS TURNED over his opera about two children who freeze their parents, to one of his writers, Betsy Nadis, and the plot became a girl who freezes her friends instead, and "SummerSnow."
"Mister Rogers' Neighborhood" is seen on Channel 56 in metropolitan Detroit, each weekday at 11:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. Ms. Aberlin said she plays two characters, Lady Aberlin in a make-believe neighborhood and Betty, a "kind of big sister," in Rogers' "real neighborhood" on the show.
Seven Detroit area performers are appearing in the premiere attraction "SummerSnow."

How to predict if rain will fall

- Sheep with their backs to the wind.
- Gulls flying inland.
- Fishscale clouds meant rain within 24 hours.
- A rooster crowing at night.

If the rooster crows when he goes to bed, He's sure to wake up with a wet head.

- Mosquitos flying in a swarm.
- The sun rising red.

Red at night
The sailors delight;
But red in the morning,
'Tis the sailors' warning.

This old piece of weather wisdom comes from St. Matthew 16:23:

He answered and said unto the, When it is evening, ye say It will be fair weather; for the sky is red.

And in the morning, it will be foul weather today, for the sky is red and lowering.

• A ring around the moon means a storm is on its way. The number of stars inside the ring will tell you how many days will pass before the rains come.

- The lumping of table salt.
- The warping of a braided rug.
- Dead branches falling when there is no wind.
- The unusual creaking of chairs.

GRANDMA ALSO could predict rain by feeling it in her bones. She used to say that if it rained on Monday, rain would fall at least three days that week, and Friday was always the fairest or foulest day of the week.

Rain on the first day of the month always means at least 20 days of rain that month.

If a crescent moon rides on its back with its horns up, it is said to be a "moon that holds water" and one can expect good weather. But when it tips so that one horn is higher than the other, the water spills out and you can look for rain.
