Reserves' first week without incident...

At the end of one week's existence, the biggest problem facing Canton Township police reserves is semantics.

Members of the controversial Canton Township Police Reserves hope residents will soon be able to mention the force by name without preceding it with the word "controversial."

And Supervisor-Police Chief Robert Greenstein holds a particular disdain for the words "lame duck" when attached to the front of his title and name.

The first night on the street for the reserves was Aug. 11. The force is composed of 24 men and two women who are recent graduates of Schoolcraft College's Reserve Police Training Institute, where they received 100 hours of instruction.

Another class will be starting at Schoolcraft Sept. 2 and Greenstein says Canton residents should contact the township office immediately if they're interested. A written general aptitude test will be given to applicants. If they pass, Greenstein says the applicants will be given an oral review by a board of police personnel.

THE SEVEN-MONTH reserve instruction class is for 3½ hours on Thursday nights at the college. Upon successful completion of the course and board confirmation, the reserve officers were issued a uniform, a badge, patch and .357 magnum.

Greenstein himself is a recent graduate of the school. He rides in one of the command vehicles manned by Carl Silvers,

commander, or Bill Unger, assistant commander.

Also on the force in a teaching capacity is Inkster Ptl. Larry McEwen, who is reportedly teaching the reserves how to keep correct logs and operate the desk efficiently.

"Yeah, we're in business now," said McEwen. "The newspaper made a big joke about how we were waiting for the pants for our uniforms. People figure, here we got a .357 magnum and we don't even have a pair of pants."

Harold Stein, successful Democratic candidate for supervisor in the Aug. 3 primary, vows to take the guns away from the reserves if he is elected in November. Stein has said he favors strictly an "eyes and ears" uniformed patrol.

McEwen thinks most of the criticism of the Canton reserves can be traced to an un-

realistic fear of the word, "magnum."

"You say .357 magnum and all people can think of is 'Magnum Force,' that movie with Clint Eastwood where they shoot and kill the guy after a bullet goes through the car and knocks him 15 feet."

"It's a .357 magnum with .38 ammunition, so what's the big deal?" McEwen said. "A .357 is just a sturdier-built weapon and I understand the township got a good price on them. But that word, magnum scares people."

The question of insurance delayed debut of the reserves only momentarily. Before the reserves went out on the street last Wednesday, Greenstein said they had to wait for an insurance binder to arrive at the township hall.

Fairlane Insurance covers each reserve

officer with \$500,000 personal coverage and \$1 million liability protection for the township, Greenstein said.

Through the first six days, the Canton reserves have made one arrest, according to the police chief-supervisor.

Last Saturday the reserves stopped and ran a check on a "suspicious man" who had a refrigerator and stove in his vehicle. In the check the reserves discovered the man had a revoked license, which carries a mandatory jail sentence, and arrested him. Silvers has discouraged reserves from ticketing or arresting people because a court appearance might interfere with the reserves' day jobs.

LAST WEDNESDAY, the first night the force was out on the street, the Canton reserves responded to a serious injury accident at Sheldon and Michigan.

A number of trouble runs have been made to the Sherwood Trailer Park in the first week, according to Greenstein.

One night the reserves went to break up a group of young persons congregating in a field by the Cavalier North subdivision, east of Sheldon and south of Ford.

"But the real value of the reserves," said Greenstein, "is the public service aspect. We must have done 30 vacation checks last night and we encourage people to give us a call if they're going on vacation for a week or two."

"I tell you the most heartening thing I've seen in the first week is the respect, the happy faces from the people, the waves."

"I haven't got any sour looks from the people I pass in the neighborhoods we patrol."

...Except for one man

While Canton's reserve police force has made its debut almost without incident, for at least one member of the newly created law enforcement agency, it has not been a pleasant experience.

Bill Britcher, a member of the reserve who lives in the Carriage Hills subdivision, was the beneficiary of a free paint job on his house—only it was not one he ordered.

Sometime between Monday at 11 p.m. and 7 a.m. Britcher theorizes someone jumped his backyard fence with a spray can of black paint, and painted "Pig" in one-foot letters on his glass patio door.

An obscenity also involving the word pig was painted in equally large letters on the wooden fence around his backyard.

A third attempt, to paint on the side of the house, was apparently aborted by Britcher's dog, barking in the basement, Britcher speculates. On the side of the house the first letter of the same obscenity appears.

State police are investigating the incident.

Supervisor Robert Greenstein, who oversees the reserve force as township police chief, said it was probably the work of those who have opposed the controversial reserve force from the start.

"FIRST THEY made a political issue of it in the campaign, then they attempted to pressure the board into voting against the reserves, then they called the employers of the reserves trying to pressure them that way."

He gets paint job

"When they failed with that, they moved to this sort of thing."

"It started with lies and distortion and now they're defacing property. This is a direct attack on a police officer and that's about as low as you can go."

Greenstein noted whoever painted the house could have done significant damage to Britcher's property.

"The state police agreed more serious damage could have been done, but evidently the vandal knew the significance between mischief and going to jail for a serious crime."

While the painting surprised Britcher, he said it was not the first attempt to pressure him into quitting the reserves. He said on Monday, Aug. 9, the night before the reserve appointments were made by the township board, he received three threatening obscene phone calls.

"The first one said don't go out on patrol at all or else. The second one said if you go out and ride, your home is going to suffer."

THE THIRD CALL, Britcher said, was obscene, and he was threatened with bodily harm if he participated in the reserves.

Britcher said the calls might have involved different people or one person using different voices—but the calls and the painting have not swayed his commitment

to the reserves, he said.

"There's no way this is going to stop me. I can't even say this has made me feel stronger about the reserves because I felt pretty strong about them all along."

Greenstein and Britcher found the threats even more disturbing because Britcher's phone is unlisted—only the county, the reserve school, the township and Britcher's employer have it.

"We didn't release it and we checked with the school and they haven't released any information to anyone," Greenstein said.

Greenstein said another reservist, assistant ordinance officer Curt Johnson suffered damage to his home, presently under construction and that Carl Silvers, coordinator of the reserve, has had his house under surveillance for several nights.

Silvers said his wife spotted a pickup truck cruising by the house regularly one night and he said neighborhood children saw a man change cars in a nearby school parking lot one evening, then drive by Silver's house, and then change cars and do it again repeatedly.

WHILE SILVERS' name has been prominently mentioned as coordinator of the reserve program, Britcher is unsure how he earned his recognition.

"I've kept pretty quiet about being with the reserves. Other than my next door neighbor, no one around here knew I was with the reserves."

"I didn't really want to become the neighborhood cop."

While Greenstein refused to name who he thought was involved in the harassment, he made it clear he has some ideas.

In an apparent reference to members of the Wayne County Sheriff's Road patrol, he asked, "Who has the most to gain?"

"Who's going to benefit if the reserves are stopped? Their whole campaign was based on the reserves and if the reserves succeed and are accepted, where is that going to leave them?"

The sheriff's union was actively involved in the campaign of Harold Stein, the man who defeated Greenstein in the primary.

Stein favors contracting with the sheriff, if the township loses its court case to get

Farm tax issue remains clouded

While Canton farmers may find they are the beneficiaries of windfall gains from lower taxes this year, it appears any hopes they may have of reduced tax bills in the future are gone with the wind.

The issues of zoning and taxes for farmers has been surrounded by question marks during the administration of Robert Greenstein. His defeat for the Democratic nomination for supervisor in the Aug. 3 primary does little to remove the doubt.

In March, in anticipation of a zoning ordinance to implement a land use plan that would save 5,600 acres for agricultural use, the tax board of review was directed by Greenstein to lower assessments on those lands affected by the agricultural zoning district for 1976.

According to Dick Palmer, a member of the tax board of review, a complex five-step formula was devised to reduce assessments on farmland.

In turn, it was scrapped when board members determined that a straight 40 per cent reduction "came within pennies" of the figures arrived at through the formula.

Greenstein said the board of review would have been asked to lower farm taxes an additional 40 per cent in 1977.

But his defeat in the primary casts a shadow over that possibility and the master land use plan.

Both the candidates now seeking the supervisor's chair have indicated that significant changes will have to be made in the master land use plan.

GREENSTEIN SAID planner Mike Manore has not been directed to complete work on the zoning ordinance.

"All I can say is that when we won the election two years ago, the previous board stopped work on its plan."

"I think we'll have to get direction from the board as to whether or not to complete work on the zoning ordinance."

Greenstein said had he not lost the primary, the portion of the zoning ordinance relating to the agricultural district would have been ready for board action before the end of the year.

Without the zoning ordinance, the master land use plan cannot be implemented. Although Greenstein's defeat probably spells doom for the plan to save sizeable chunks of agricultural acreage, the question of tax breaks for farmers this year remains a question.

"I really don't know what to expect," Palmer said. "I know that the tax board of review's actions are only good for one year."

"I suspect the rolls are fixed this year

and I imagine it would be reasonable to assume that it will go back to the way it was next year."

Greenstein said he too expected the tax reduction would stick for 1976, but that in 1977 taxes on farm property would return to previous higher levels.

"It's not something that could be done continuously. We got away with it this year because we expected to have an ordinance for the agricultural-industrial district."

Greenstein said if the zoning ordinance implementing the land plan were passed, taxes eventually would have decreased from an average of \$60-\$80 an acre to \$15.

PALMER, a member of the dwindling farming community in Canton, said Greenstein's figures were reasonable, but added, "Location has so much to do with the assessed value of the land that it's hard to say what the average tax per acre is."

Although Palmer said March's meeting of the tax board of review was the first wholesale attempt to lower farmland taxes in the township, it was not unprecedented.

He said several farmers in the past had been granted reductions.

"It used to be that the board of review couldn't do much unless it was a case of inability or hardship. Occasionally there were errors and we adjusted them."

"But about four years ago when the land use plan (of the previous administration for full urbanization of the township) came under so much criticism it brought land sales to a standstill."

"THAT GAVE the farmers something to take before the tax board of review. Some lands were adjusted downward."

"But this year, in Mr. Greenstein's view, any land that would revert to agricultural zoning was supposed to receive a reduction in assessed valuation."

Palmer said overall the lowered taxes represented "a significant reduction."

Although Palmer said the reductions were sizeable, Greenstein said the tax board of review's action did not affect the township equalization factor.

He said when the decision was made to lower the assessments, he checked with the county to see if the change would affect the factor for 1976.

"We were told there might be a tenth of a per cent added to the factor, but when we were all done, it turned out there was nothing added," Greenstein said.

As for the future, both Greenstein and Palmer are unsure. "No one knows what will happen," Palmer said. "We'll have to wait and see what the direction the board of review is given by the next administration."

slates show that Greenstein's slate received and spent slightly more in the campaign than the Stein ticket.

The Stein slate spent a total of \$1,980.72, according to its treasurer, Rose Bretzlaff.

They took in a reported \$2,304.91 in receipts, according to the filed financial statement. The biggest contributor was the Wayne County Sheriff's Local 502 which donated \$500 to the Stein slate.

PHILIP DINGLEDAY, former Canton supervisor, was listed as the biggest personal contributor to the Stein slate. Dingleday donated \$200.

One hundred dollar contributors to the Stein slate include UAW Local 375; Woody's Tire Center, 1528 Wayne Road, Westland; Charles and Thelma Hudson and Marion and Theron Palmer. A July 23 rally at the UAW Hall-Local 375 netted \$390.91, according to the campaign treasurer's report.

The Stein slate is composed of Harold Stein, supervisor candidate; Anne Bradley, treasurer candidate; and Eugene E. Daley, trustee candidate. All three Democratic candidates on the Stein slate were successful in the Aug. 3 primary.

The Greenstein slate consists of Robert Greenstein, supervisor candidate; Carl Parsell, treasurer candidate; Gerald Cheske, and Joyce Willis, trustee candidates; and John Flodin, unopposed candidate for clerk.

Flodin was the only person on the slate to win in the primary, put there is talk of a write-in effort for the others.

THE BULK of contribution receipts are not itemized by the Greenstein slate treasurer, John Blumenshine, since \$1,569.50 is listed as having come from the April 30 pancake dinner fund-raiser at the UAW Union Hall, Local 900, 38110 Michigan Ave., in Wayne.

Blumenshine stated in his financial re-

port to the county that a total of \$2,468.21 was spent by the Greenstein slate in the primary race.

Total receipts from contributions amounted to \$2,415.61, Blumenshine stated.

Greenstein's personal financial report states that this total figure includes the \$1,569.50 received at the pancake dinner, \$800 kicked in when each candidate contributed \$200 to the slate's effort, and \$46.11 left over from the 1975 campaign.

The Stein slate reported that it has no debts or unpaid bills.

"To my knowledge \$554.89 is still owed and unpaid," Greenstein stated in his report to the county.

Republican trustee candidate James Poole said in his report that he had spent nothing, owed nothing and received nothing in his campaign. Poole ran unopposed.

Noel Culbert, Democratic candidate for trustee reported \$187.35 spent on the campaign and \$35 in total contribution receipts.

George Hall, Republican candidate for trustee, has not yet submitted his financial report. Republican treasurer candidate Hagbard Berg also has not filed yet.

Independent trustee candidate C. Lynne Goldsmith stated that both her expenses and receipts amounted to \$514.91 during the campaign.

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LWV to urge campaign debate

After completing a busy month helping to inform voters on candidates and issues on the August primary ballot, the Northville, Plymouth, Canton, and Novi League of Women Voters have started a campaign calling for "equal time for issues."

Annalee Mathes, LWV President, announces the local League will participate in a nationwide League drive to bring the two major presidential candidates together in a series of face-to-face debates.

If the candidates agree to participate, this will mark the first time in 16 years that the nation will be offered presidential debates.

THE FIRST STEP in this national drive will be the collection of at least four million signatures calling for the two major party candidates to debate before the November election.

The LWV wants to make it clear to the two major presidential candidates that the public will not settle for tinsel and hoopla at election time, explains Ms. Suhay.

"The League wants solid answers as to what the candidates stand for and how they intend to deal with the nation's problems if elected to the presidency," adds Ms. Mathes. "A petition drive of this magnitude will clearly demonstrate to both major party candidates that presidential debates are a vital part of political accountability."

Each member of this country's 136,000 LWV members will be asked to obtain at least 30 signatures on a petition which states: "We, the people, urge the major party candidates for President to meet in public debate on the issues facing the country."

The slogan being used for the petition drive is "Presidential Debates: Equal Time for the Issues." Once at least four million names have been collected nationally, the League's Education Fund will present the documents to the two candidates.

"This isn't a legal petition form so there will be no need to have signatures and addresses validated," explains Ms. Castrodale. "Each LWV member has a copy of the petition and we expect to have them signed and collected by Sept. 10."

THE LAUNCHING of the equal time for issues campaign immediately follows very busy summer months for the League which also is preparing for the fall with a variety of meetings and areas of study.

Before the Aug. 3 primary, the League conducted candidates nights in Plymouth, Canton, Northville and at Schoolcraft College plus collecting candidates information for the newspapers. League members also collected the primary election results and reported them to the dailies and helped collect vote results for Plymouth Township.

Each local unit will hold meetings in early September to discuss the local programs of study for the 1976-77 calendar. This information then will be presented to the general membership and interested prospective LWV members at a meeting beginning 7:30 p.m. Sept. 22 in Plymouth. State and national LWV information also will be discussed at that meeting.

"Election Laws" is a topic of intense study by the LWV this year. Informational meetings on this subject will be held in October followed by a consensus meeting Oct. 27 in Northville.

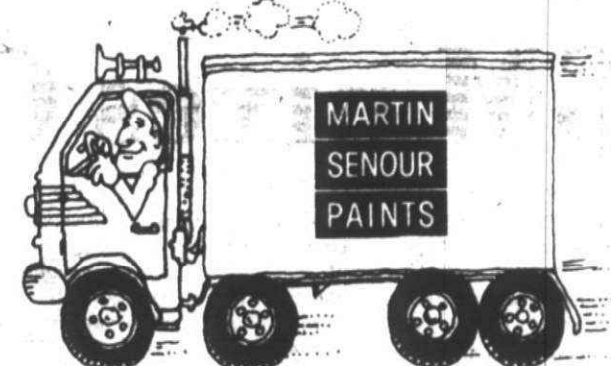
Purpose of the study is to identify the cost of all elements of school district library services and to establish what changes in program are indicated according to user preferences.

The workshop is entitled "Creative Problem Solving for Media Specialists in Times of Adversity."

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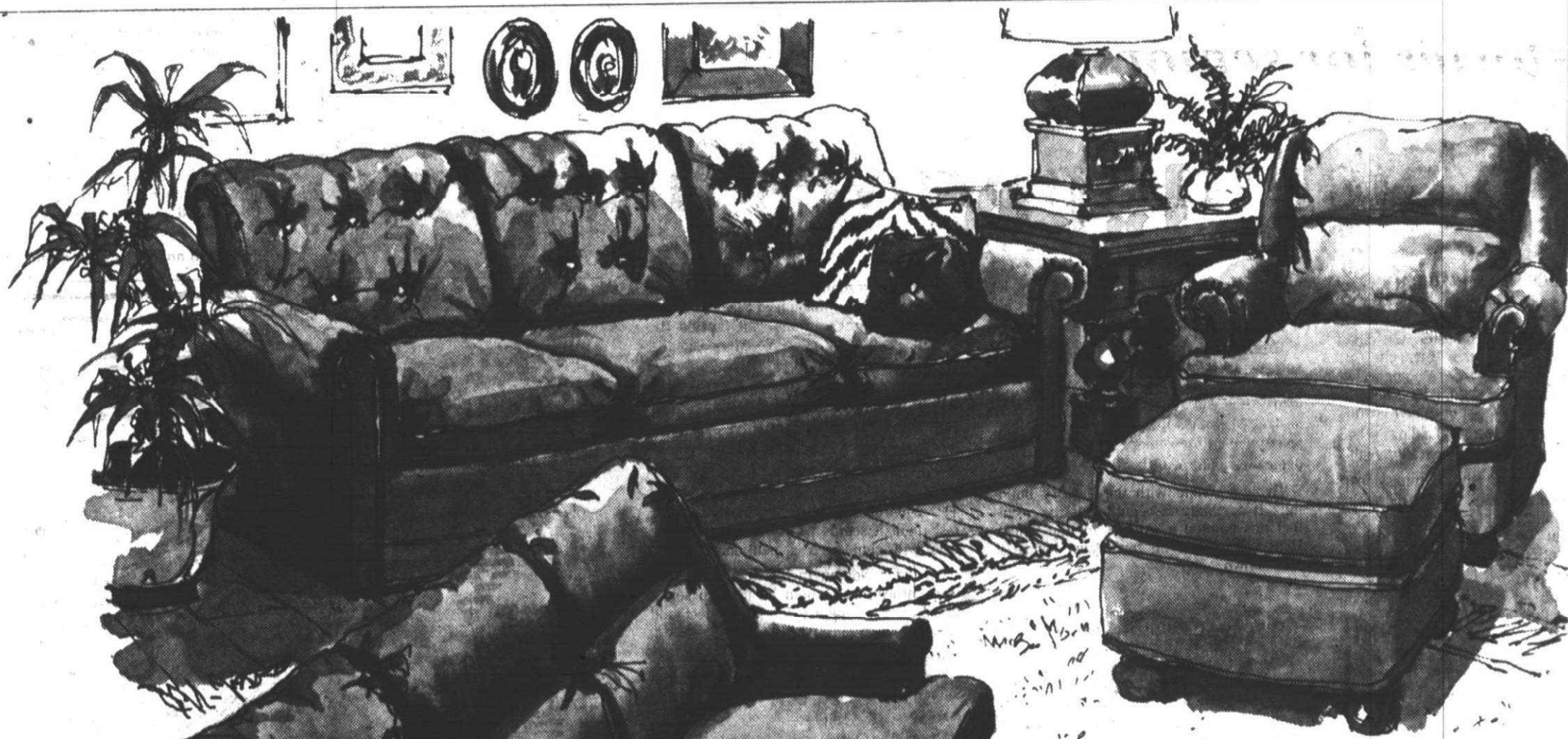
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GM nixes Cadillac dealership for Canton

Don Massey obtained the zoning Tuesday night he needs to relocate his Cadillac dealership to a site at I-275 and Ann Arbor Road in Plymouth Township. But feelings remain mixed among members of the township board on whether an auto dealership is the best use for that site.

The rezoning from mid-rise to commercial was approved by trustees by a narrow 3-2 vote. Richard Gornick and Gerald Burke voted against the measure with Supervisor J.D. McLaren and Trustee Russell Ash absent.

Gornick agreed with the advice of planner Norman Dietrich that an auto dealership, no matter how prestigious, was not the best use for a major entry point to the community. Dietrich felt that a more intensive use, such as a motel or hotel, would be more suitable.

WHILE MAKING a presentation to the board, architect Floyd Cosmi repeated Massey's earlier assurances that he planned to develop both the Plymouth Township and Canton site into auto dealerships.

Cosmi reported, though, the Plymouth Township site at the expressway was considered to be the prime location for the Cadillac dealership. That decision, Cosmi noted, was made by General Motors, and Massey concurred with that recommendation.

The planning commission recommended approval of Massey's rezoning request subject to the advice of the planning consultant. Dietrich said he felt mid-rise was the best zoning for the site but he had reservations about an auto dealership as the best use.

Cosmi says the drawings for the facility

to house a Cadillac operation meets General Motors' criteria. The showroom will feature a skylight to provide natural light to display the cars and reflective light as an energy-saver, Cosmi noted. "Under our timetable, we hope to begin construction this fall."

GORNICK POINTED out approval of a conditional use was required as well as the rezoning vote.

"I'm concerned about a new car dealer on Ann Arbor Road," Gornick said. "We are already deluged with car dealers on Plymouth Road and I'm not sure I want a dealership at the Ann Arbor Road entry to Plymouth Township."

Dietrich said the site, at the interchange of an expressway and state trunkline, is an ideal location for a mid-rise of about nine

stories for a motel or hotel.

"There are other spots in the township where mid-rise wouldn't be appropriate, but it is here and we should save it for mid-rise. A car dealership itself is not an appropriate image for an entry point into the community. Also there is not enough area on this particular site for a dealership as they will need more space to store autos someplace."

Clerk Helen Richardson commented the remarks about use of the site were pertinent but the decision to be made by the board was whether to rezone. A vote on conditional use, and then on a site plan, will follow and then it will be up to Massey to show he can fit the dealership onto the size of the site, she added.

BURKE OBSERVED rezoning the Massey piece to commercial would destroy

plans the township has for property across the street on the north side of Ann Arbor Road.

Frank Millington, trustee, said he was opposed to government subsidized mid-rise development because it results in little financial return to the school district and township.

"We once were ready to change the zoning on the Massey site from residential to commercial when we had the prospect of a Ramada Inn locating here," Gornick commented, "but the plans never materialized. Now we seem to be ready to change the zoning again because another use is proposed."

Mrs. Richardson added: "We have gone backward and forward on this particular piece of property. It's been rezoned three or four times and I'd like to see something definite happen to this parcel. I under-

stand Massey has purchased this site from Bud Gould and retains ownership."

Millington made the motion to approve the rezoning and was supported by Treasurer Joe West. Millington said the Massey Cadillac dealership was a prestigious business in the Plymouth community which should remain and would provide better revenue for the schools and township than mid-rise.

Massey is now located at Main Street and Ann Arbor Road in the City of Plymouth but has outgrown that site. Massey's architect Tuesday night said Massey will develop the Canton property but not as a Cadillac dealership. "General Motors wants the Cadillac dealership on the Plymouth Township site and it was General Motors which was against the Canton site."

W-W selects new trustee

The newest voice on the Wayne-Westland Board of Education will belong to Stephen Kelley, but the new trustee joins the board under a cloud of Wayne-Westland Education Association objections.

At a special Aug. 16 meeting, trustee Agnes Greene moved that Kelley, a Westland resident, be appointed to fill the post left vacant by trustee William White's resignation. All trustees present (board vice president Thomas Barrett was absent) voted unanimously in favor of the motion.

BUT IN THE MIDST of congratulations as Kelley stepped up to join the board, W-WEA Executive Director Hugh Ryan rose to protest. "The Wayne-Westland Education Association believes it has the obligation to speak out against the manner in which the board has conducted itself in selecting a replacement for recently resigned trustee Bill White," Ryan said.

"Our concerns are not in any way directed toward the individual selected by the board, Mr. Stephen Kelley, nor are our comments intended to denigrate him," he continued. "We have no reason whatsoever to question his integrity or capabilities. In fact, we know very little about him, either positive or negative. However, that is the very issue. The public knows little about him."

Ryan also objected to what he called secret interviews of candidates conducted by the board and because no other candidates' names were revealed to the public. "The board's crassness and disregard for the public was most evident in its public action of offering only one nomination then voting unanimously to select Mr. Kelley without one word of debate or discussion," he said.

ROBERT REICHARD, board president, quickly defended the trustees' decision. "It's a hard job to select somebody," he said. Reichard added, "I have been a member

of the board during three such elections and I don't recall a big to-do about anyone we selected. We're not going to cow-tow to anybody. We had a list of 10 solid candidates and everyone was considered. This was no wash job."

Ryan replied, "I don't want to engage in debate, but the public has a right to know what's going on."

Reichard answered, "We don't owe the public any apology for who we selected. It's our bed of thorns if Mr. Kelley doesn't work out."

OTHER TRUSTEES added their support to Reichard. Trustee Fred Warmber said, "Mr. Kelley wasn't my first choice of candidate, but I like his background and he is my first choice now."

Trustee Gerald McGrath added, "In the last election people who objected to a behind-closed-doors policy only got 50 percent of their candidates elected. In fact, this is the first time we ever went through the formal process of interviewing candidates."

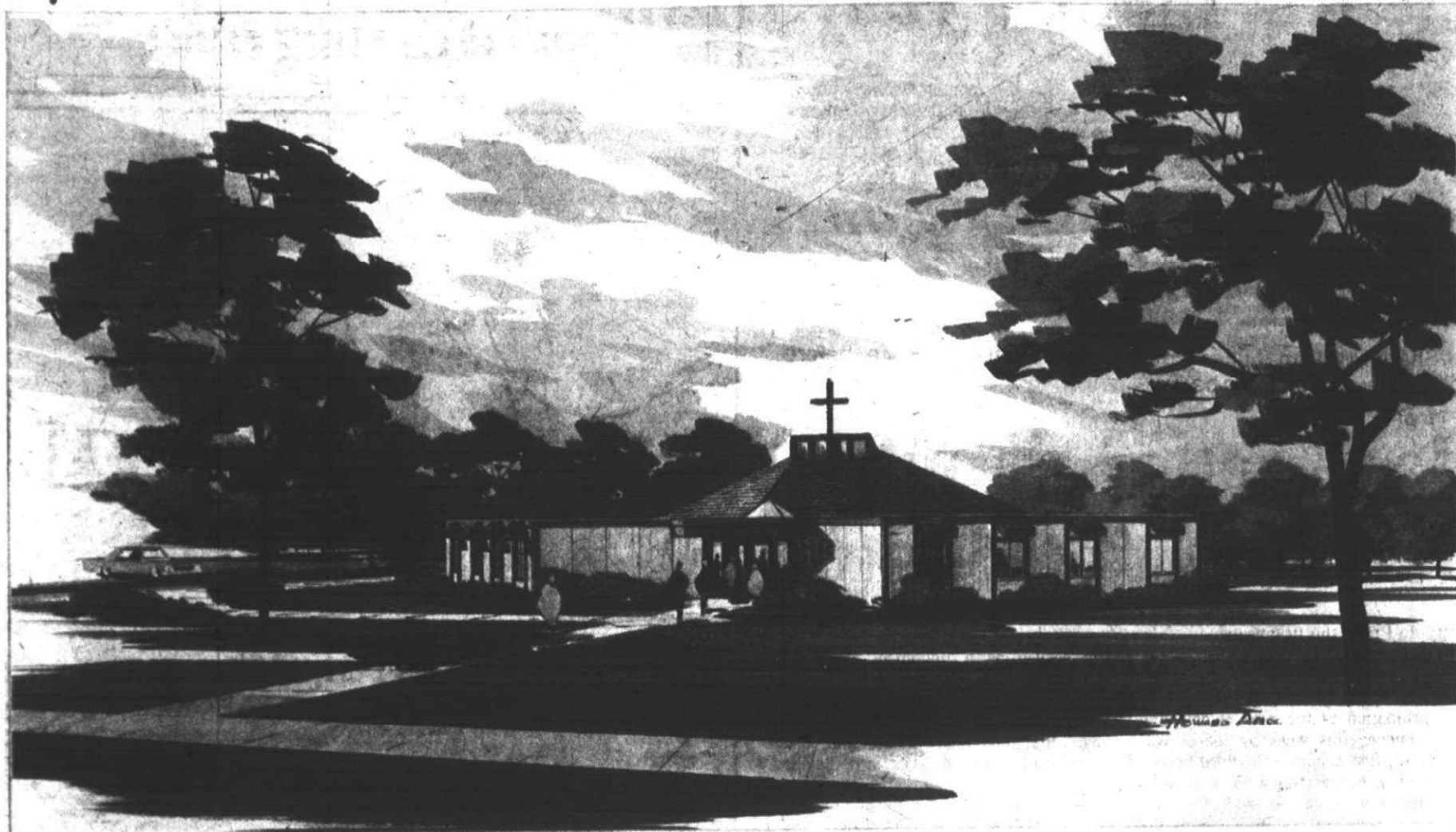
Superintendent of Schools Timothy Dyer's comment on the controversy was directed to Kelley. "You'll even come to like Mr. Ryan quite a bit. He's a great guy," Dyer said.

THE BOARD'S newest member seems to hold no resentment about W-WEA objections surrounding his appointment. "I appreciate their sincerity," Kelley said.

The trustee added that his main concern was to "help maintain and possibly improve what I consider a fine school district."

Whether he will seek re-election when his term expires on July 1, 1977 depends on his personal evaluation of his effectiveness as a trustee.

"I have attempted to be active in the community since we moved here three years ago. I have been involved in supporting millage, cub scouts and my church. And since I have children in school, I feel it is my obligation to give something back," Kelley said after his appointment.

11 stories for seniors

Plymouth approves high-rise

Despite an attempt by City Commissioner Jack Moehle to filibuster the night away, at 12:30 a.m., the Plymouth City Commission approved the rezoning of 2.3 acres of land at Union and Pennington to multiple residential for a proposed 11-story senior citizen apartment building scheduled for the heart of downtown Plymouth.

The vote was 5-2, with Commissioners Bev McAninch and Jack Moehle dissenting on the rezoning, the consideration of a Planned Unit Development, and also on the consideration of tax abatement for the project.

Moehle said he still has a lot of unanswered questions about the \$5 million project and saw "no hurry" involved. McAninch said she voted against the rezoning because she feels the city commission has not assessed the impact of "at least 200 additional senior citizens."

Elaborating on her statement that such a project would create "a vertical ghetto," McAninch said "We're making a terrible mistake if we feel we can just file them (senior citizens) away."

PROBABLY THE most enthusiastic supporter of the project is Mayor Joseph Bida, who says the downtown area is dying and calls the Forest City Dillon development "a real shot in the arm."

"I've stated publicly to the newspapers that I don't give a damn how high the building is as long as it does the job," said Bida.

Bida said the city commissioners pledged to work for senior citizen concerns when they campaigned and added that this is the last opportunity they might have to do something.

Bickering occasionally cropped up between board members late Monday night. McAninch sparred with Bida and Norbert Kattermann needed Moehle.

Much of the commission meeting was spent arguing about the ground rules for the amount of time people in the audience for the public hearing could speak. It was decided that citizens in the overflowing chambers could speak for three minutes, and be allowed a three minute rebuttal after everyone else had a chance to speak.

ROGER WRIGHT, of Citizens for Open and Responsible Planning (CGRP), was the first person to speak in the public hearing. Wright, the only member of the planning commission to vote against rezoning, reiterated his contention that the senior citizen apartment would be double the density allowed under city code for multiple residential construction.

Wright accused the city commission of only considering one developer's plan (Forest City Dillon) and then employing "spot zoning" to fit the project.

"We can have a showplace senior citizen project in Plymouth," said Wright. "But this is not it."

When Wright's three-minute speech was up, the "anti-high rise contingent" clapped loudly.

Robert Simmons, of 770 Deer, a senior citizen and 40-year resident of Plymouth,

told the crowd and commission why he came to the meeting to express support for the senior citizen apartment building.

"I have sold my home in Plymouth after an accident and an illness," Simmons said. "I've saved my money through the years. But you'd be surprised at how that nest egg can disappear. I'm looking for an apartment in the senior citizen building—a place we can afford."

"What's wrong with the 11-story building? It certainly is beautiful as the architect has painted it. And as for the Wilcox House, it should be torn down before it falls down."

THE WILCOX HOUSE, owned by Jack Wilcox, sits on the site of the proposed apartment building. Wilcox himself has no intention of trying to preserve the 73-year old house, but some members of the community have formed an alliance to save it. Wilcox says his wish is that Forest City Dillon name the high rise "Wilcox House" to provide a link with the past.

Frank Stoma spoke up at the public hearing to say he would like to see the Wilcox House preserved.

"I bought in Plymouth because of the old, aesthetic beauty found here," said Stoma of Church Street. "I moved away from the strife and problems plaguing cities. . . . Don't let this beautiful New Orleans-style home go down."

"You'd rip out something right in the heart, something right in the core of the city," Stoma said. "You'd be taking from the community something great and grand and raping it. The senior citizen project doesn't have to be right there, point blank."

One woman in the audience pooh-poohed the developer's promise to integrate the high rise with the existing downtown district and city park. She told the commission "it's a hard thing to hide a hippopotamus."

THE AUDIENCE seemed split equally between those who favor the project and those who oppose it.

After the rezoning was approved, Penny Wright of CORP announced that she would be taking names in the hall outside the commission room of people who wished to circulate referendum petitions.

Later in the week she said CORP will not attempt to veto the project unless they can come up with an alternative design for a senior citizen development on the Wilcox site.

"If we go for a referendum we'll need 500 signatures," said Ms. Wright. "After last night it seems we have enough people who will sign such a petition."

An older woman in the audience asked what procedure would be used to select which seniors qualify for the project and when applications are due.

Battling an abscessed tooth and some adverse opinions, Bernard Harr, regional development manager for Forest City Dillon answered the woman.

He said a management team committee composed of Plymouth residents and company officials, would "judge on merit, looking for a fair solution."

"I, for one, wouldn't want to sit as God over these people," Harr said. "The worst thing we can do is dangle hope. When the time comes that applications are wanted, it will be announced publicly to everybody. You must understand that it's a most difficult problem because of the critical need for senior housing. In Southfield, for example, we had 197 units open and 1900 applicants."

SOME 30 PER cent of the federally-subsidized units must be reserved for "very low income" according to Section Eight, Housing and Urban Development, guidelines. "Very low income" is defined as \$6,400 a year or less for people 62 and older.

The remaining units are offered to "moderate level" income seniors. This category permits a single senior to earn up to \$10,200 and a senior couple can earn as much as \$11,700.

Yearly rent is 25 per cent of a senior's annual income in most cases.

Akhtar said he heard a lawsuit was going to be filed "by some concerned citizens asking for an injunction to stop the reserves from continuing."

Foust, not Greenstein correct in CAC controversy

Editor:

In his customary style, Bob Greenstein has conveniently massaged the truth in the recent Canton Citizens Advisory Council dispute with Brian Foust. Greenstein would have us believe this involves no more than a personality conflict between himself and Mr. Foust.

And for the nonbelievers, Greenstein has had current CAC Chairman Tom Quinn parrot a denial of Mr. Foust's accusations of Greenstein's lack of cooperation over CAC appointments. Unfortunately in his denial and affirmation of Greenstein, Quinn neglects to mention he was not even a member of the CAC until February.

While I was chairman of the CAC in December, I personally hand-delivered to

Greenstein, with the agreement of the CAC, names which he could never quite manage to place on the agenda.

I had Greenstein accuse me of "trying to stack the CAC with business people" and pitch one of his customary temper tantrums.

Subsequently, I asked several trustees if they had received a copy of the letter. I had purposely stressed from the CAC guidelines that we were "reporting back to the entire township board" because Bob Greenstein has "interpreted" board" as meaning "Bob" too many times.

Soon afterwards, Greenstein, also true to form, started playing political football with the Canton fire millage. In the en-

suing nauseating scrimmage, I became solely concerned with making certain Greenstein, via a political patsy, did not postpone the desperately needed fire millage until August so he could claim some political points for its passage—or he didn't ask for more money than needed so he could later maneuver to somehow tie the fire monies which now come from the general fund to the millage freeing those monies in order that he and his cronies could fund a few more pet projects or hire a few more friends.

But the focal point of the Greenstein-Foust controversy should not be Greenstein's lack of respect for the truth and consequent avoidance of tape recorders. For the controversy vividly demonstrates the harsh reality of Canton preached according to Bob Greenstein—especially for those who choose to ignore the gospel.

When I first met Brian Foust last September, he was a politically naive resident, an average citizen with a commitment to making Canton Township an

above-average place to live. Today he is a disillusioned man who has learned for Bob Greenstein there can only be one way—his way.

But Canton cannot afford to lose interested residents like Brian Foust. And with Greenstein's defeat, we have the opportunity to mark a new trend in Canton politics.

We must foster a government in which diverse philosophies will be represented—in which any and all issues will be tested

on their merits rather than sanctified by the name of the man proposed them—a government which openly welcomes all citizens without first extracting a pledge of allegiance.

Canton politics do not have to be vicious. Personally, I am optimistic for the future because voters cast a ballot against selling Canton's soul to Bob Greenstein—because clearly that is the only price he would have accepted for his service.

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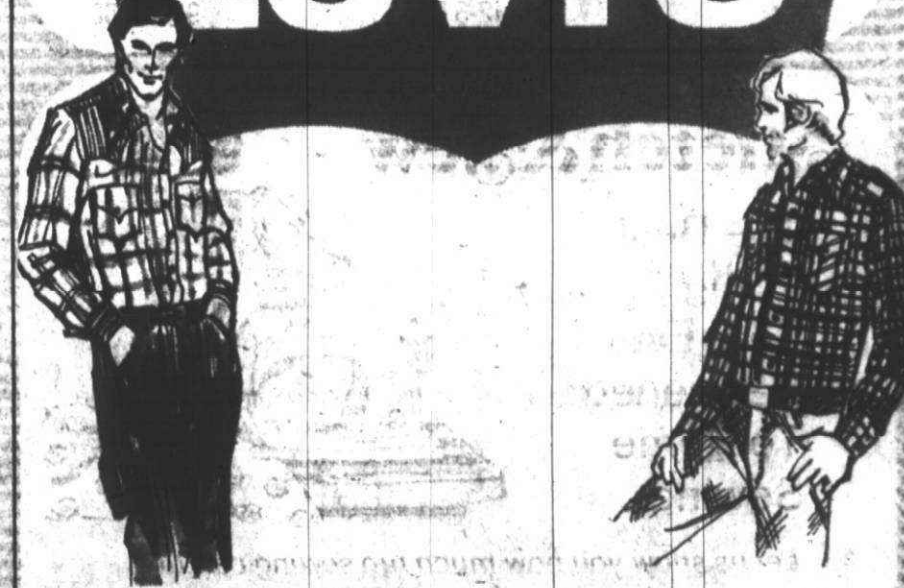
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

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Nomination struggle cuts delegates fun and games

Mary Lou Barth ordered breakfast sent to her room in Kansas City's Crown Center Hotel at 7 a.m. Tuesday. She cancelled her appointment at the hotel beauty salon and at the same time realized there would be no swimming for her that day. Nor would she be able to accept any of the invitations offered by the city's residents to see Kansas City sites.

She is a member of the Ford team, a resident of Farmington and a delegate to the Republican national convention from the 17th Congressional District.

Her breakfast was eaten while she read literature—from Reagan propaganda, from officials—that had been dropped at her door following her return to her room Monday night.

HER ROOM OVERLOOKS the NBC facilities, set up on the marquee of the hotel, and she says she gets a kick out of watching John Chancellor and David Brinkley going through their paces in person and on her TV at the same time.

Mrs. Barth was one of nine who were called to a strategy meeting at 9 that morning by her group leader. Immediately afterward, about 11 a.m., the entire Ford contingent met in yet another strategy session with the aim of out-manuevering the Reagan forces.

"It's a matter of sticking together," she said. "If we don't do that, we're lost."

The two closed door sessions in the Ford camp came up with one concrete idea. This stemmed from the fact that, to a per-

son, they were all shanting over the fact that Reagan T-shirts are being worn all over their hotel.

"I feel that's embarrassing to the President," Mrs. Barth said.

TO COUNTER this, a Kansas City Ford car dealer was contacted, and 55 white blazers—bearing the Ford name—were ordered with the promise of delivery by five that afternoon.

The old expression "quick bite" can be taken very literally for the time allotted for lunch. Ordering any meal here is not easy, particularly in the hotel. More often than not, it's a hurry-up-and-wait experience.

But restaurant prices are moderate, compared to those in Southfield, Lathrup, Redford Township, Farmington and Farmington Hills, the communities Mary Lou Barth represents.

At 2 p.m. Mrs. Barth was seated with the entire Michigan delegation to hear reports from the platform, credentials permanent organization, and rules and order committees.

DENNY HAMMOND, 17th District chairman, is serving on the credentials and gave its report.

ERA and abortion remain the two issues nobody can get together on, but Mrs. Barth didn't have to go to Kansas City to find that out.

She was an officer in the State Federation of Republican Women's Clubs in 1971 when the subject of the Equal Rights Amendment was first brought to that body, and the split in her own backyard

was as wide then as it is in Kansas City today.

Back in her room at 3:30 p.m. for a press conference, she finds more literature at her door and inside, some on the bed.

"How did this get here?" she asked no one in particular. "What's this Reagan stuff doing here? I know my roommate hasn't been here all day. Are those people bribing the maids now to get this stuff in our rooms?"

The press conference reveals that the other day she had gotten a personal letter from Ford asking her to list five persons she would like to see considered for vice-president.

Her responses were Sen. Howard Baker and John Connally predicated on an informal survey she did in Oakland County.

"I'm sure I talked to at least 80 people on that subject, and those were the two names that kept coming up over and over again," she said.

"THESE ARE THE people I'm representing," she continued. "On every issue, I vote to represent them."

In the ensuing discussion of names, locales, and how to choose the vice president, Mrs. Barth says, "Oh, I wish Barbara Jordan was on our side. We sure could use her." (Rep. Jordan stirred delegates at the Democratic national convention with her speech.)

She is adamant in her belief Ford will win the nomination, but predicted the Tuesday evening session will be long and drawn out. There will be a lot of debate. If all goes smooth, you canbet that something is very wrong."

Fletcher's win is no surprise to our delegates

Fletcher, whose opponent was Byron Crosse of Kalamazoo, retains the position he won last year after the resignation of Creighton Holden.

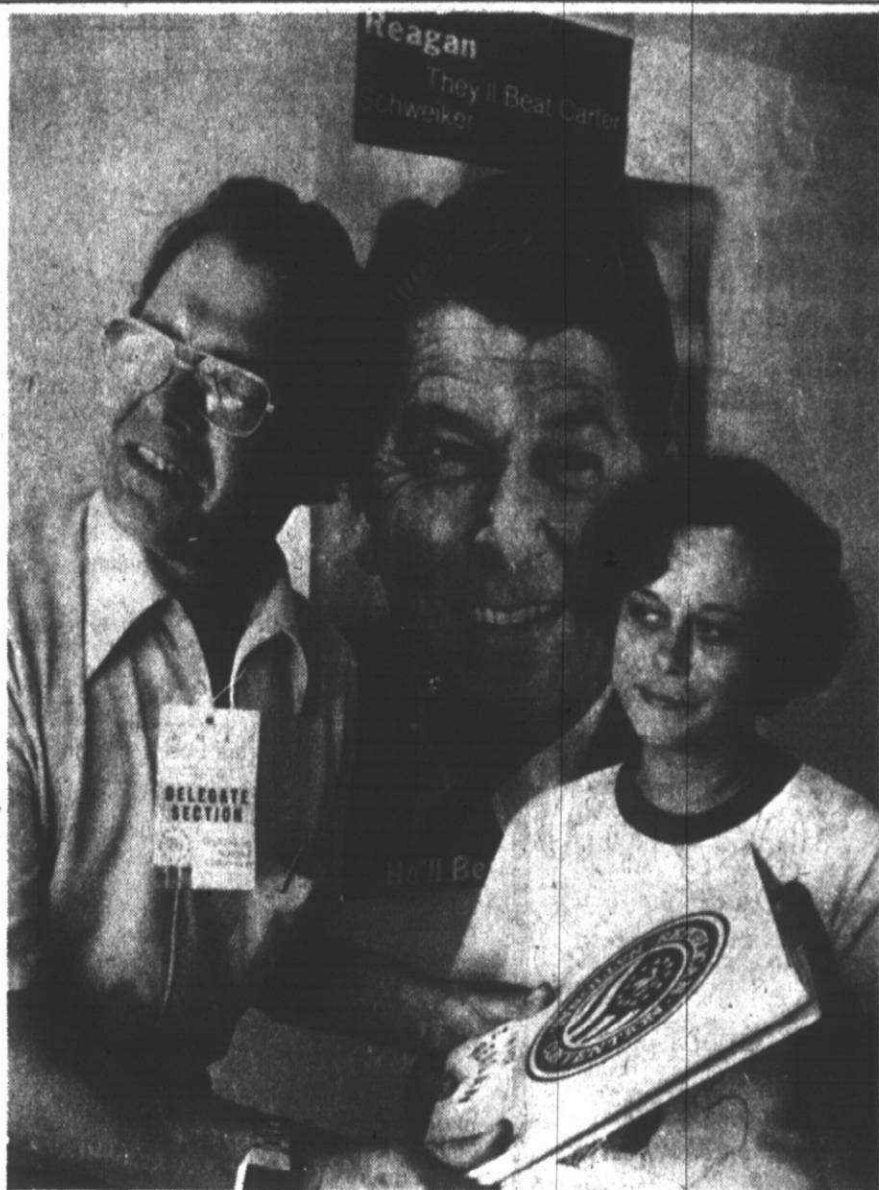

"I voted my conscience," said Law, chairman of the Michigan Federation of Young Republicans, "but the question was put by the Reagan people, and nobody is surprised at how anyone voted."

BOTH DELEGATES believe that similar votes and similar splits were going on in hotels all over town among delegations which were meeting prior to the Sunday afternoon arrival of both President Ford and Ronald Reagan.

Kettunen said the only exception to the consistent vote would be on the platform issues of the Equal Rights Amendment and abortion. "Then it is a very personal, emotional issue," he said.



George Kettunen of Livonia and Shiely Arnold of Southfield are delegates at the Republican convention.

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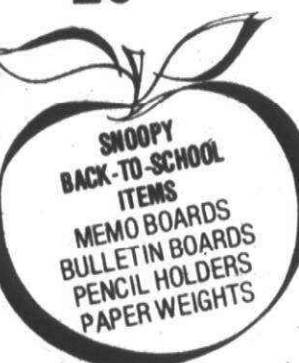
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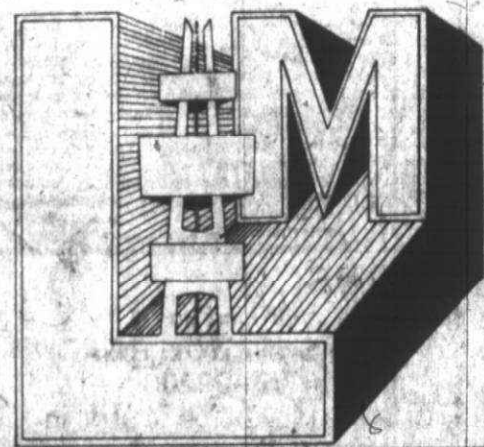
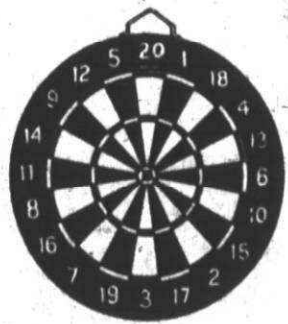

Most graduates enter a college

A survey taken of 1975 graduates of the Centennial Educational Park (CEP) indicates that more than half are now enrolled in a university, two-year college, or trade school.

The survey of local graduates was conducted last spring by members of the Student Service Center under the direction of co-directors Ms. Carla Garbin and Nic Cooper.

Some 487 graduates of 1975 were contacted by phone, or about 67 per cent of the graduating class of the CEP. Class members were asked to respond to six questions.

The first question was: "Are you presently enrolled in a post high school training program?" Some 59 per cent answered yes. This included 21½ per cent enrolled in a two-year college, 31 per cent in a four-year program, and 6½ per cent in other programs such as beauty schools or trade schools. Besides the 59 per cent, another 15½ per cent said they planned to enroll in a post high school program in the near future.

THE SECOND question asked if they were currently employed.

Some 77 per cent of the respondents answered they were employed and of this number, 61½ per cent were employed full-time.

The third question asked what type of career the class member would like to train for. Although the answers were quite varied, the most frequent answer given was "a career in business."

THE MARITAL status of the respondent was the fourth question and nine per cent indicated they were either married or about to be.

The next question asked if the class member felt high school had adequately prepared them for what they were presently doing. Some 66 per cent answered yes.

The sixth question was: "If you had to start high school training all over again, would you enroll in a traditional school or one which was using a modular schedule?" Almost 19 per cent stated they would enroll in a traditional program, about 74 per cent preferred a modular program, and seven per cent said that they'd prefer something other than a modular or traditional program—presumably some kind of combination of the two.

"The survey will be conducted each year to provide the administration and the counselors with feedback on the high school program," explains Kent A. Buikema, principal of Plymouth Canton High.

"The career choices and comments by students relative to their preparedness will prove especially helpful. The survey entailed many hours of work by the Student Service Center staff and the administration is appreciative of the fine job performed by this group."

Even explained that the yearbook will cost \$2 more this year to pay for some of the extra pages, color printing and special effects.

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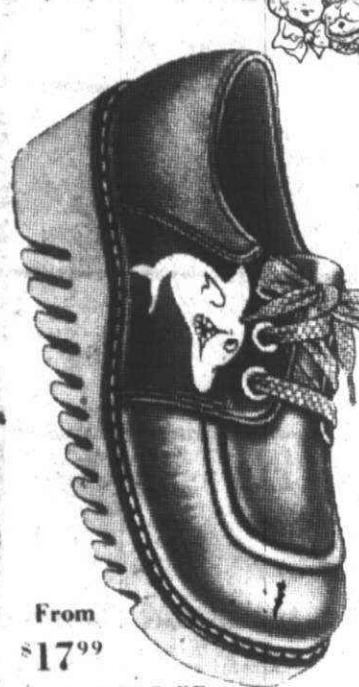
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When west coasters got control of Evans

(Part III)

Northville, Mich., was among the places that received an SOS from Edward S. Evans and Linton Wells as they began the last leg of their round-the-world venture. When Evans and Wells arrived in Victoria, B.C., after crossing the Pacific by boat, they learned that the plane that was to take them from Seattle to New York was downed in Chicago. Among those they frantically wired for assistance was Eddie Stinson, the World War I flight instructor whose plant at Northville built passenger planes for airlines. Stinson did his best to accommodate them, but it was the Army Air Service which finally got them to New York on July 14, 1926.

IF ALL, they had covered 20,000 miles at a cost of \$32,000, and had made use of almost all forms of transportation—including boat, train, automobile, plane and, in Yokohama, a rickshaw.

After touching home plate at the World building, they were whisked to New York's City Hall for greetings by dapper Jimmy Walker. Also on hand was John Henry Meers, the theatrical producer whose 13-year old globe-circling record they broke by seven days, six hours, 58 minutes and 55 seconds.

Part of Evans' motivation in participating in the global trip could have been the desire for recognition. Although he had what one interviewer called "a great lust for dignity," he also knew the value of personal publicity in furthering his business interests.

Toward the end of his career, he had on his payroll at the Fullerton Avenue plant, Wilma Soss, the flamboyant publicity woman who later came to the attention of American business as the gadfly who asked embarrassing questions at annual meetings of publicly-held companies throughout the U.S.

WHEN WORLD WAR II ended, a vacant plant on Eckles Road, between Plymouth Road and Schoolcraft in Plymouth Township just over the Livonia border, came to Evans' attention.

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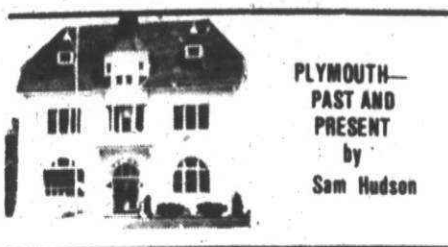

Built by the British government during the Lend-Lease days, it had been used by Kelsey-Hayes to produce 50-caliber machine guns for Britain and the U.S. during the war. In 1945, it was the property of the U.S. government from whom Colonel Evans acquired the plant and its 115 acres which were located on a spur line of the C&O Railroad. He then moved Evans Products Company from its Fullerton Avenue plant in Detroit to the newer and larger facility here.

But the affluent Grosse Pointe was never to become part of the Plymouth scene. In 1945, when company sales had reached \$18 million, Evans was interviewed by Allen Raymond for a five-page article to appear in the *Saturday Evening Post*. Entitled "Apostle of Profit," it was on the newstands on Sept. 15, but Evans never saw it. He died, at age 66, nine days before the issue was published. His sons always felt that he worked himself to death.

PRIOR TO THE Colonel's death, Edward S. Jr. and Robert B., the twin sons, had joined him in running the company which was now listed on the "Big Board."

After his father died, Edward was elected president of the company. It was Ed, as a 20-year-old, who had laid the groundwork for his father's round-the-world jaunt. Sent ahead to clear red tape, young Evans found his trip was even more exciting than he had anticipated. "On my way through Russia on the Trans-Siberian Railroad," he recalled, "I was locked up in jail for five days because my visa was not legal. I thought I would never get out."

Ed's twin, Robert, an ardent sportsman and winner of many trophies in speed boating and gliding, was vice-president of Evans Products Company. The sons continued the pattern of diversification set by their colorful father, and the company prospered. They re-entered the plywood field in Oregon, added bicycles to the products made at Plymouth, acquired the Haselitte Corporation in Grand Rapids, and built the company to a point where it made *Fortune's* list of the top 500 industrial companies in the nation.

During this time, Plymouth was the company headquarters, and the community benefited from the firm's continued growth and increasing payrolls. Then, in 1961, a decision was made which ultimately led to the removal of company headquarters from Plymouth to Portland, Ore.—and perhaps even to the recent announcement that the local plant is being closed.

That decision was to acquire, by giving Evans stock, a small plywood manufacturing and distributing firm headquartered in Aberdeen, Wash. When the transaction was consummated, the principal owner of the Aberdeen firm owned more of Evans Product Company stock than the brothers did, and they lost control of the company.

Ed Evans, Jr., who now lives on his farm in Virginia, is still a member of the board of directors of Evans Products Com-

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pany. Bob Evans went on his own, acquiring and building up a number of companies, culminating with his acquisition of a large block of stock of American Motors Corporation, of which he was chairman of the board in 1966.

MONFORD A. ORLOFF, who became chairman and chief executive officer of Evans Products Company, maintains company headquarters in Portland, Ore.

The company, whose annual sales in 1973 topped the billion dollar mark, manufactures and distributes building materials, pre-cut homes, and transportation equipment. It operates retail stores selling a broad range of building materials. It owns a lease fleet of almost 25,000 rail cars and 1,700 truck trailers and has about 240 retail stores. The company now has about 12,300 employees, minus the 175 recently dropped from the Plymouth payroll.

It remains for me to add that I have more than a passing interest in the story of Evans Products Company. For 17 years, up to 1968, I was the company's director of advertising with offices in the Plymouth plant.

Gnaul, an Oakland County road commis-sioner, is floor leader for the Reagan fac-tion of the Michigan delegation this week, making sure the Reagan people are where they are supposed to be in the event of an emergency vote.

The job is almost invariably given to one of the party's working veterans because "it's so easy to get lost in the shuffle and just lose the whole ball game," Gnaul said.

AS ADAMANT in their votes as the two factions are now, there doesn't seem to be any doubt in anyone's mind that they will pull together once the nominee is picked.

There was some evidence of this in Kem-per Arena Monday morning. Someone pointed out that the only delegation in the hall which distinguished themselves from the crowd were those from Hawaii be-cause they all wore leis.

That was not altogether true. All the Michigan delegates were wearing "Esch" buttons, supporting U.S. Rep. Marvin Esch for the his senate bid.

Kansas City is comfortable for reporter

As we stood under the Crown Center Ho-tel marquee waiting transportation to Kem-per Arena Monday morning, we saw cab after cab filled with persons on their way to Ramada Inn East.

Many wore press badges. Then a chartered bus marked "White House Press Corps" stopped under the marquee, and about 10 persons got out and asked for cabs to the same motel.

Meanwhile, only a handful were doubling up in the cabs headed for the convention's opening session.

A QUICK CHECK into the tote bag hand-ed out by the Kansas City Republican Women's Club revealed that the Mis-sissippi delegation—the one with the bulk

of the uncommitted votes—was staying at Ramada Inn East.

The bag is my instant information pack-et, telling me what is going on, when and where.

This burlap tote bag, decorated with an elephant and filled with a half-dozen pieces of informational literature and as many invitations, is but one of the many courtesies the press has been afforded at the convention.

If you don't make connections or get the information you need, it isn't because the hotel, the host delegation or the Michigan headquarters isn't trying.

TELEPHONE OPERATORS go out of their ways to take messages and get names spelled right.

Paging anybody for anything is prompt and often.

The Michigan headquarters bulletin board is open to anyone who wants to use it.

Hotel security is heavy, but persons stopped in any area are invited to use the house phone. On one occasion, a friendly Michigan face from the headquarters came personally to usher this reporter from one area to another.

One of the most prestigious gifts to the press this week was a badge. I've worn it since I've received it. It means nothing of-ficial at all. A small bar that says "Press" is connected with a grosgrain ribbon to a brass plate saying "Republican National Convention 1976."

It was pinned on this reporter by Mike Miller, of the National Republican Press Department, when he handed me my cre-dentials and another batch of information pamphlets.

"If you run into trouble, call," he said. His statement set the tone for the entire week.

Canton Township — it's been an education

Canton has been an interesting, exciting, frustrating assignment for a reporter and editor over the past year and a half.

It has not been easy to cover thoroughly and to the satisfaction of our readers.

It has been difficult to sit through the yelling, the eight-hour meetings, the nonsense—just as it has been hard to report about Canton accurately.

Just when you think you have a handle on the situation, it changes, and you find you don't.

The truth—that gray area between conflicting statements, charges and countercharges—has been elusive.

In particular, the Aug. 3 primary election—replete with dirty tricks, claims and angry attacks—was a rough assignment and difficult to write about with any degree of confidence.

The real facts probably won't surface for some time, if at all, and I leave the hard task of discovering who was behind all the nastiness to my successor.

I hope November is calmer.

BUT DESPITE the recent ugliness, on the eve of departing from Canton, I can look back on my tenure here only as an enjoyable experience.

Canton is an exciting community suffering tremendous growing pains.

It is an interesting concoction, a mix of the old and the new, a sprinkle of the different with its farming traditions and its sudden rush into suburbanization.

Young suburbanites, lifelong residents and farmers make it an unusual place to cover these days.

It is a pretty community with a bright future. One only need look at the numbers of people moving to Canton as evidence.

There are big challenges ahead for its leaders and residents—critical decisions to be made that will shape not only the social and cultural complexion of the community, but also the physical makeup for years to come.

While I won't be around to watch the changes—and there will be many—I hope the community is satisfied with the choices it makes. And I hope that through some method, a vestige of the rural flavor that once dominated this township will be retained.

FOR MYSELF at least, Canton has been an education in many ways that college could not provide—politics, local government, land use planning and, most of all, people—people from all segments of the community who helped me on stories, gave me leads, a pat on the back or, often as not, a boot in the pants.

My ears still ring from the responses of some readers who didn't like an editorial or thought I misjudged a story.

And I confess that some of the criticism was earned. It was part of the education.

To the friends I made, to the sources who helped me, and to the many people who treated me so courteously making my job easier, I extend my sincere thanks.

To those with whom I differed, to those whom I may have offended, and to those who offended me, I suggest the world would be a boring place without our differences.

I hope all who helped me in the past year and a half will be equally courteous to my successors in the years to come. And to the community as a whole, I hope the decisions you make in the next few years will be the right ones.

It's been a pleasure.

Vote shows suburbs' attitude hardens

I have been writing this column regularly for nearly 10 years now, and never have I seen relations between the suburbs and Detroit grimmer.

After many years of sweat and toil by countless men and women of good will, both in the suburbs and in the core city, people are simply beginning to lose hope.

Lose hope that the streets of Detroit can ever be made safe for ordinary citizens, black and white. Lose hope that the schools of Detroit can ever clamber back from poverty and start to give children the kind of education they need. Lose hope that business will ever consider Detroit safe enough to locate in and thereby provide jobs to the thousands of men and women who are out of work.

Lose hope, in short, that the city of Detroit can ever become once again a real city.



Observation Point

THIS OBSERVATION is not prompted by Sunday night's riot at Cobo Hall or by the Detroit police department's clear inability to cope with the situation. The events of Sunday were just one more shocking symptom of the city's deterioration.

Businessmen who live here in the suburbs who have stores in Detroit are beginning to figure out how they can bail out without too much financial loss. Families which had been accustomed to going down to the Art Institute regularly are turning elsewhere for their leisure.

Corporations which have had their headquarters in Detroit for years are beginning to relocate in the suburbs. Crowley, Milner recently announced its move to Troy, and several other large companies are in the middle of their own agonizing decisions to move.

Men and women who have lived in the suburbs and worked in Detroit for years and years are beginning to look for other jobs. A friend of mine who has worked at the City-County Building for some time put it this way: "For years, I went downtown without giving it another thought. But in the past two months, it's become a real jungle. You get hassled just walking in the streets in broad daylight, and my wife's beginning to get nervous."

PERHAPS the most illuminating hard data on the state of mind in the suburbs and in Detroit is provided by the vote count in the recent primary election.

One of the races contested was for the U.S. Senate; Richard Austin, a black man, the Secretary

of State, and one of the most decent people in Michigan public life was defeated in his attempt to win the Democratic Party's nomination. Just how he lost is fascinating.

In the city of Detroit, Austin won nearly 90 per cent of the black vote, according to members of his campaign staff. In the suburbs, if he got 10 per cent of the votes he was lucky. In outstate precincts, where suburb-city problems are not acute, Austin picked up 35 to 50 per cent of the vote.

Remember, in looking at these statistics, that Austin was one of the best known men in the state, with a very high approval rating for the job he has done as Secretary of State. And remember, further, that he won overwhelmingly in his two previous tries for office. In 1970, Austin carried largely suburban and white Oakland County by 55 per cent; four years later, Austin the incumbent swept Oakland County by 68 per cent.

But two weeks ago, Dick Austin got five per cent of the vote in Birmingham, seven per cent in Plymouth Township and Rochester, nine per cent in Livonia, and six per cent in Farmington.

Dick Austin did not collapse as a politician in just four years solely because of unfavorable publicity about gifts from his branch managers. He collapsed as a politician precisely in those suburbs which gave him majority votes in years past.

Why? Because people in the suburbs are simply fed up with the problems of Detroit and because Dick Austin, like many people in Detroit, is black.

THAT IS a terrible conclusion to reach, but I fear no other is available. The voting statistics are irrefutable.

What all this means for the future is by no means certain. I suspect that what will probably happen is that the suburbs will simply turn their back on Detroit and its problems until—and only until—the authorities in the core city can get their crime problems under control.

Indeed, the only issue I can think of that in any way could bring the interests of Detroit and the suburbs together is that of crime. Until that is done, Eight Mile really will be a wall.

State Police play tricks with young driver figures

I want to give you an idea of the kinds of nasty statistical games the Michigan Department of State Police is playing with young drivers, but first consider these games of logic:

Half the married people are women. But women are involved in 100 per cent of the divorces.

Less than half the people in Detroit are white. But whites are involved in 100 per cent of the interracial incidents.

Both statements are true but fantastically misleading. Now consider this model of two automobile collisions:

In collision No. 1, drivers A and B are involved. In collision No. 2, drivers C and D are involved. Driver A is age 20, B is 30, C is 40 and D is 50.

Conclusion: Drivers of age 20 are only one-quarter of the driving population but are involved in one-half of the collisions.

WHOA! you say, and you'd be correct. There is a trick being played, and it's the word "involved." It takes two persons to make a divorce, two or more races to make an interracial incident, and two or more cars to make a collision.

So now consider what the Department of State Police is doing in its recently published "Michigan Traffic Accident Facts" for 1975:

"Significantly, driver age group 15-24 represents 25.8 per cent of the total licensed drivers in Michigan. However, they account for a disproportionate number of all accidents at 36.4 per cent and an involvement of 40.8 per cent in all fatal accidents."

You can see right through that one, of course. The trick is that word "involvement."

HERE'S ANOTHER State Police trick that is just plain statistically invalid:

A chart labelled "Drinking drivers in per cent of all drivers involved in accidents" is aimed at the 18-20 age group. It shows that in 1972 drinking drivers in the 18-20 age group constituted 8.7 per cent of all drivers involved in accidents. In 1975 drinkers in the 18-20 group were 12.7 per cent of the drivers involved in accidents.

The State Police conclusion: Drinking drivers in the 18-20 age group increased their involvement in accidents by 45.9 per cent in just three years!

It's an apples-oranges comparison. What the State Police did was compare the 8.7 per cent figure to the 12.7 figure. But you can't do that because these are percentages of different bases.

The comparison would be fair if exactly the same number of accidents occurred in 1975 as in 1972. In fact, however, the number declined.

Young drivers are made to look far worse than they really are.

THIS KIND of statistical trickery aimed at young people isn't new for the State Police.

They once came up with figures showing a fantastic increase in drunk driving arrests among young people from 1971, when the legal drinking age was 21, to 1972, when it was lowered to 18.

What the tricksters failed to point out was 1) the legal definition of drunk driving was lowered at almost exactly the same time, 2) state and local police began selective enforcement of the drunk driving law in 1972, being super-watchful for young drivers, and 3) the figures showed only arrests and not convictions.

It's pretty clear what's going on: There's a campaign on to raise the legal drinking age in Michigan. The misleading and even false statistics issued by the State Police will be used to feed that campaign.

Young people had better study their math just as intensely as they study driving when they return to school in fall or else the cops are going to convict them politically on a bum rap.

3 bills needed to correct pension abuse in Capitol

Inflation usually hits hardest the people on a fixed income. Retired people who have planned their investments to provide for a satisfactory standard of living for the rest of their lives are eaten alive when the cost of living goes up.

But this is not true of all retired people. If you happen to be under a federal government pension—that is, a retired member of Congress, a retired federal civil service employee or retired military person—Congress has put you in a different position.

The ordinary employee pays slightly less than six per cent as his contribution to social security. His employer also pays a similar amount on income up to \$15,600.

When you work for the federal government, you put in seven per cent of your salary into retirement annuities. Federal employees are not covered by social security.

THE KICKER is that the federal employee pension plans are indexed for inflation. When the consumer price index rises three per cent or more, federal pensions are increased. But there is a special add-on bonus of one per cent given to federal retirees when the index rises three per cent or more.

What this means is that a retiree receives a four per cent increase—not three per cent—when the consumer price index goes up three per cent.

In other words, the more inflation we have, the better off federal retirees are.

An example is that since 1969, the consumer price index has risen 50 per cent.

During this period, federal retirement annuities have been increased 10 times, increasing 63 per

cent. This means that federal retirees are in a position to improve their lifestyles 26 per cent faster at the expense of the American taxpayer.

THE SEVEN PER cent they pay toward their retirement annuities does not adequately fund their pensions. The comptroller general has told Congress that the estimated normal cost of these pensions is at least 28.74 per cent of pay.

Congress has passed a pension reform act for private industry. If we are going to have any fiscal responsibility, there must be a pension reform act for the public sector.

Public officials should not profit from increased inflation, particularly since many of these same public officials have contributed toward the inflation.

To correct the one per cent kicker abuse requires three separate acts of Congress, because the pay bills for civil servants, congressmen, military and foreign service personnel are all treated separately.

There are bills before Congress to correct this abuse. Obviously, because the pension of the congressmen themselves is involved, they will be in no rush to correct this inequity unless they are reminded by the people that it is time for a change.

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Regional roundup

MAYOR VOWS FIGHT

Mayor Edward McNamara of Livonia has vowed that he would refuse to accept federal Housing and Community Development Act funds if the government insists that the city allow low-income family housing in the community. The Detroit area and Chicago regional offices of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development have recommended that Livonia's application for nearly \$600,000 be rejected. The money would be primarily used for rehabilitation of neighborhoods with high percentages of low-income families.

THE STING

An American team of dart-throwers defeated a British team during a match that

occurred last week via a transcontinental telephone connection. The match, won by a team of Redford and Livonia residents, took place in the Ranch Bar, Redford.

NEW TOWNSHIP HALL?

Plymouth Township hopes to be one of the early applicants for federal funds available under the new jobs bill passed over President Ford's veto. The township hopes to take advantage of the 100 per cent funding provision to construct a new township hall, which has stayed in the taking stage for 15 years for lack of local funds.

NEW BOARD MEMBER

The Wayne-Westland School District Board of Education selected Stephen Kelly as its new member, filling the vacancy

left by the resignation of William White. If the board had not made the appointment at Monday's meeting, the Wayne County Intermediate School District would have filled the vacancy.

HOUSING FOR ELDERLY

In one of the longest meetings in recent history, the Plymouth City Commission faced a large turnout of residents with mixed opinions about an 11-story apartment building for senior citizens in the heart of downtown Plymouth. After more than five hours debate, the commission voted 5-2 to approve the rezoning, site plan and first reading of a tax abatement grant for the project.

CLOSING PACE

The Livonia Board of Education may speed up its pace of closing elementary schools because of declining student enrollments. The board Monday announced the second of two closings: to be effective at the end of the current school year, and said it will discuss within the next month a third elementary. Livonia has been losing 1,900 students a year for the past four years.

GANGS?

A group of Redford residents Monday complained to the Redford Township Board, that their neighborhood was being threatened by a gang of youths, ages 12-17. The homeowners, located in the W. Chicago and Telegraph area, called for an earlier curfew ordinance. They said the youths killed animals and vandalized cars and homes.

GIANT YARD SALE

Garage sales have been growing in popularity over the past few years but perhaps the sale of past sales occurred recently when a dozen families combined their efforts and items for a giant project in the yard of a townhouse complex.

Earlier benefits may create jobs

Michigan's high unemployment rate continues to be a source of worry to the state's legislators.

Rep. John Bennett (D-Redford) thinks he may have a solution to the problem, and he has even written President Gerald Ford to tell him about it.

Bennett's solution, according to the letter, is simple: If the age requirement for Social Security benefits is lowered to 60, workers would be encouraged to retire sooner, opening up jobs for a new crop of unemployed young people.

"Within the last month 20 Michigan State University graduates have asked me about jobs," Bennett says. "It makes me feel so inadequate."

In HIS LETTER to the president, Bennett stated: "Over the past two years the unemployment rate in Michigan has exceeded 10 per cent and it is depressing to know that about 25 per cent of our young people cannot find jobs. New technology in machines and computers has eliminated a lot of industrial jobs which has helped to create the higher than average unemployment rate in Michigan."

"Under normal circumstances, Michigan needs to place about 190,000 new workers each year. Close to 90,000 jobs are vacated each year due to retirement or death, leaving a net of better than 100,000 workers for whom jobs must be found."

Bennett's letter added allowing workers to retire at age 60 with full Social Security benefits would create employment for an additional 50,000 workers each year in Michigan and more than one million new jobs throughout the country.

THE LETTER, which was sent to U.S. Senators Philip Hart and Robert Griffin and to all Michigan U.S. congressmen, as well as the president, received mixed responses.

"The president sent my letter to the Social Security administration and the office's reply to me was a bunch of double talk."

"Well, my suggestion might put a strain on the Social Security Administration," Bennett says, "but it would put people back to work."

Other responses to the letter have been more rewarding.

"U.S. Rep. William Brodhead told me he plans to have an actuarial cost analysis study done in Washington that would weigh the cost to the Social Security Administration against the cost of unemployment."

"And Rep. Brodhead may introduce an amendment in Congress that would lower the age for social security benefits to 60," Bennett adds.

Sen. Hart and U.S. Rep. William Ford (D-Taylor) replied they thought the idea had merit, according to Bennett.

"I suspect that if we put 50,000 people back to work in Michigan it might offset the cost of social security enough for us to come out ahead," Bennett adds.

"A pension is not enough to put food on the table. But if you retire at 60 and get both your pension and social security, you can make ends meet. Opponents of this proposal have stated that it is too costly. My reply to them is that maintaining the unemployed on the welfare rolls is much more costly."

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3 new sniffers join ranks of state police

Three new tracking dogs have been trained to give the Michigan State Police some canine capability in smelling searches for illegal narcotics and bombs.

Two of the dogs have been trained to find caches of narcotics and the other has a specialty of hunting illegal bombs or similar devices.

One of the narcotic finders, "Captain," and the bomb locator, "Ivan," are assigned to the Ypsilanti post under the handership of Trooper Roger Simpson, 24.

The other narcotic finder, "Shane," is based at the new state police academy in southwest Lansing and is handled by Sgt. Leonard Hankins, 49, supervisor of the tracking unit who has been associated with this activity since 1961.

Simpson is a new handler and is the first

state police handler to have custody of two tracking dogs at the same time. Counting Hankins and Simpson, the department has 20 handlers who handle the 21 dogs.

This is the first time that the state police tracking unit has employed a dog other than a German shepherd. "Ivan," the bomb hunter, is a golden retriever.

The narcotics dogs were trained in their specialty with the use of samples of heroin, hash, marijuana and cocaine. The bomb finder was trained in sniffing out six different types of explosives. Training lasted about three months and was done at airports in Detroit and Lansing and in buildings where the dogs would most likely be hunting.

The new specialty dogs will be used not only by state police but also by other agencies requesting their services.

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German club seeks members

The German-American Club of Plymouth is seeking new members from the area.

Prospective members do not have to be of German descent. The club is open to all those interested in German culture. All meetings and functions are conducted in English.

The 35-member group meets the third Thursday of every month in the card room of the Plymouth Cultural Center. The monthly meeting features a cultural event, program, business meeting and social hour.

Goodfellows and a uniform to the Plymouth Fire and Drum Corps.

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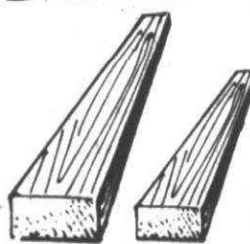
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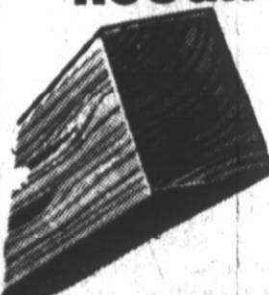
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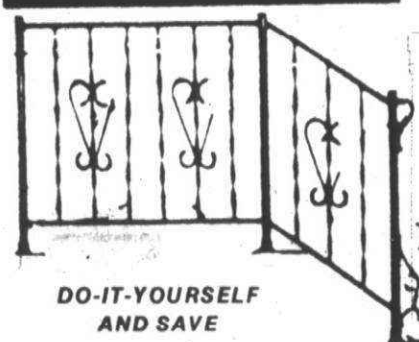
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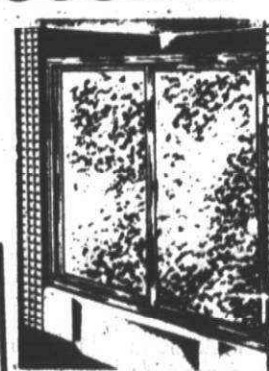


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Livonia LWV joins national drive to get presidential debates

"If the candidates agree to participate, this will mark the first time in 16 years that the nation was offered presidential debates," said Marilyn Grove, president of the Livonia league, which will join other LWV units and other organizations across the country in a drive to collect at least four million signatures.

"We want answers as to what the candidates stand for and how they intend to deal with the nation's problems if elected to the presidency," continued Mrs. Grove.

To spark the drive, which will continue through Sept. 11, Livonia league members will ask for signatures at the Livonia Mall

from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 28.

Residents are invited to secure petitions from Mrs. Grove to circulate in their neighborhoods. Write her at 19158 Osmus, Livonia 48152.

Petitions already have been distributed for circulation to nine leaders of area organizations including George Kettunen of the Livonia Republican Club and John McDonald of Livonia Interested Democrats.

Others who have received petitions are Barbara Johnson of the Democratic Party for Wayne County, Mrs. David Glover of the Livonia Republican Woman's Club and Laura Toy of Livonia Democratic Women's Caucus.

Also included were Trudy Pinto of the American Association of University Women, Ray Lech of the Livonia Chamber of Commerce, Chet Prokop, representing

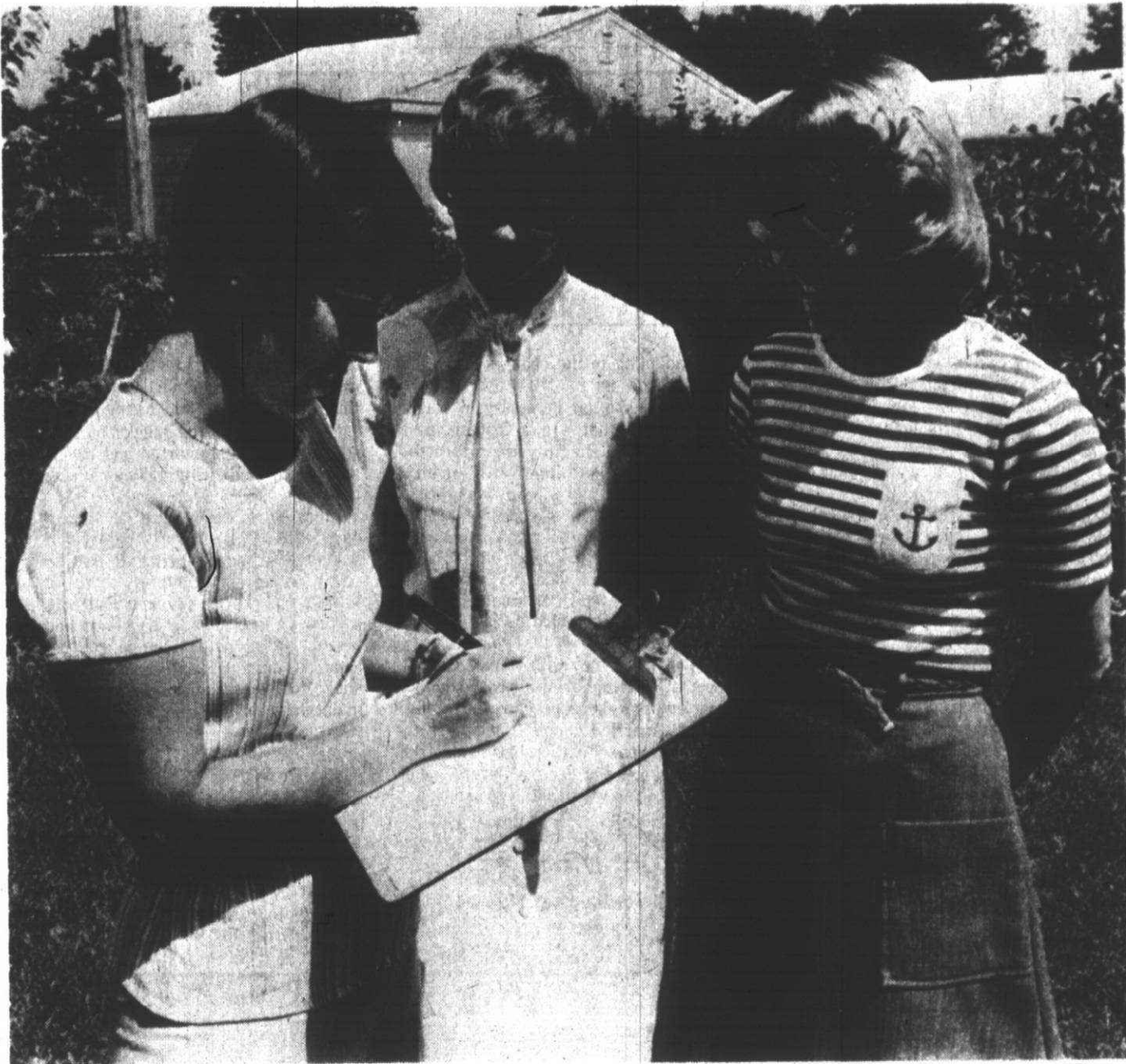
Livonia Jaycees and Jane Hopper of Business and Professional Women's Club.

Each of the country's 136,000 league members will be asked to obtain at least 30 signatures on a petition stating: "We, the people, urge the major party candidates for President to meet in public debate on the issues facing the country."

Once the signatures have been collected nationally, the League of Women Voters Education Fund will present the documents to the two candidates.

Mrs. Grove said presidential debates "offer an excellent way to assure that the public has access to candidates' views and to solid information on their approach to national issues."

Debates will make sure that issues, not images, are stressed so that voters can elect the most qualified person to the presidency.

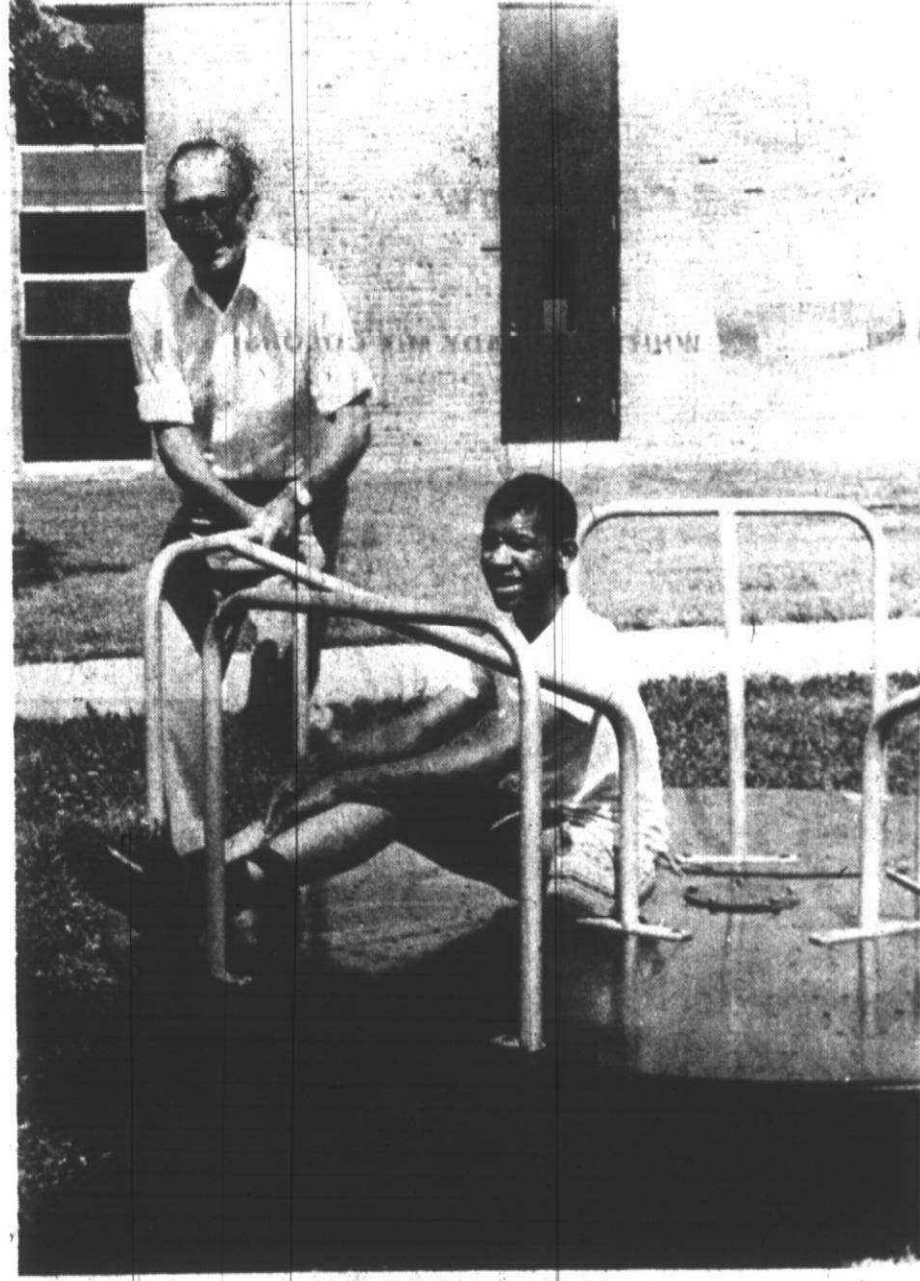

Foster grandparents find out they're needed

"Helping a child fulfill a need to be needed."

That's how Mrs. Dorothy Teeter, 72, of Plymouth, describes the Foster Grandparents program.

Some 49 local senior citizens, not content to sit in a rocking chair reflecting on past achievements, work at the Plymouth Center for Human Development giving love and individual attention to the physically and mentally handicapped youngsters who are their assigned "grandchildren."

The Plymouth program is part of the Detroit Foster Grandparents program, sponsored by Catholic Social Services of Wayne County. Religious affiliation, however, has no bearing on participation.

To be eligible for the program, applicants must be 60 years or older, in reasonably good health and have a desire and willingness to work with these children. It is limited to persons with a maximum annual income of \$2878. In exchange for their 20-hour work week, Foster Grandparents receive a non-taxable stipend of \$1.60 per hour.

Greta Dopheide, 60, of Westland, likes the program because, "it gives you a chance to get out, and you become interested in the children." She has been a Foster Grandparent for six years.

Dorothy Smith, supervisor of the Plymouth program, said Foster Grandparents fill a real need, providing compan-

ionship and attention to children who, for the most part, do not have visitors.

Clearly, working with physically and mentally handicapped children requires patience, determination and understanding.

All Foster Grandparents are trained, and regular refresher meetings are held. But most draw heavily on their own personal experience as parents and grandparents in working with the children.

"Mostly, we follow our own instincts," said Mrs. Teeter. Both a mother and a grandmother, Mrs. Teeter has been a Foster Grandparent for six years.

THE CENTER follows a two-fold program of teaching and training the children, combined with a loving, one-to-one relationship with the grandparents.

"We try to motivate the children with personal attention," said Joe Rytel, 75, of Livonia.

He is a foster grandfather to two 13-year-old boys, both retarded. One boy is able to walk, the other cannot.

Grandparents customarily devote complete attention to one child at a time. A typical day at the center might include taking a walk around the spacious grounds, playing a game of basketball, working on a puzzle or having a picnic.

Time is also set aside for nurturing a loving, caring relationship. There is plenty of rocking, cuddling, and crooning.

Rytel tries to treat his children as normally as possible, to overlook the fact that many of the children are retarded.

"Children respond to interest," he emphasized.

INEVITABLY, the grandparents and the children become close.

"When you're away, you wonder how they're doing and become anxious to get back to them," said Mrs. Dopheide.

Sometimes the children are waiting in the doorway for their foster grandparents to arrive, Rytel said, and "when you walk in the door they give you a big smile."

Jamiella is a four-year-old sickle cell anemia victim. Because of her illness she

can't walk, but she breaks into a grin and gives a wiggling bounce when her grandmother enters the room.

"They thrive on attention," said Mrs. Teeter.

Mixed with the happiness, though is frustration.

Progress is measured in small victories. A sign of recognition, a new word learned or a few, faltering steps taken, give encouragement.

"You must have determination," Mrs. Dopheide explained.

March of Dimes sets bikeathon

MRS. TEETER FEELS challenged by a withdrawn, 10-year-old child, an orphan who bangs her head on the floor and pulls her hair.

She's trying to teach her foster granddaughter to understand and to follow simple directions.

"I can see improvements," she said.

SEVEN-YEAR-OLD Kathy, with a crippled arm and leg, was skinny and unhappy when Mrs. Dopheide became her foster grandmother. She cried all the time and wouldn't let anyone touch her arm.

Patiently, over a period of time, Mrs. Dopheide began to win Kathy's trust. Now the child permits her foster grandmother to massage her arm, and by dangling a string of brightly colored balls she has gotten Kathy to hold them and even to shake them a little.

"I hope someday she'll walk," says Mrs. Dopheide.

Joe Rytel admits he was skeptical when he became a Foster Grandfather eight years ago. But he has become a believer.

"They love us and we love them," he said. "Besides, it keeps us young."

ALL ROUTES will be patrolled and any rider with bike trouble will be returned to the starting point.

There is no way of knowing how long it will take an individual to complete the Bikeathon. However, if participants agree on a certain time or place to be met, all facilities at all parks will be open.

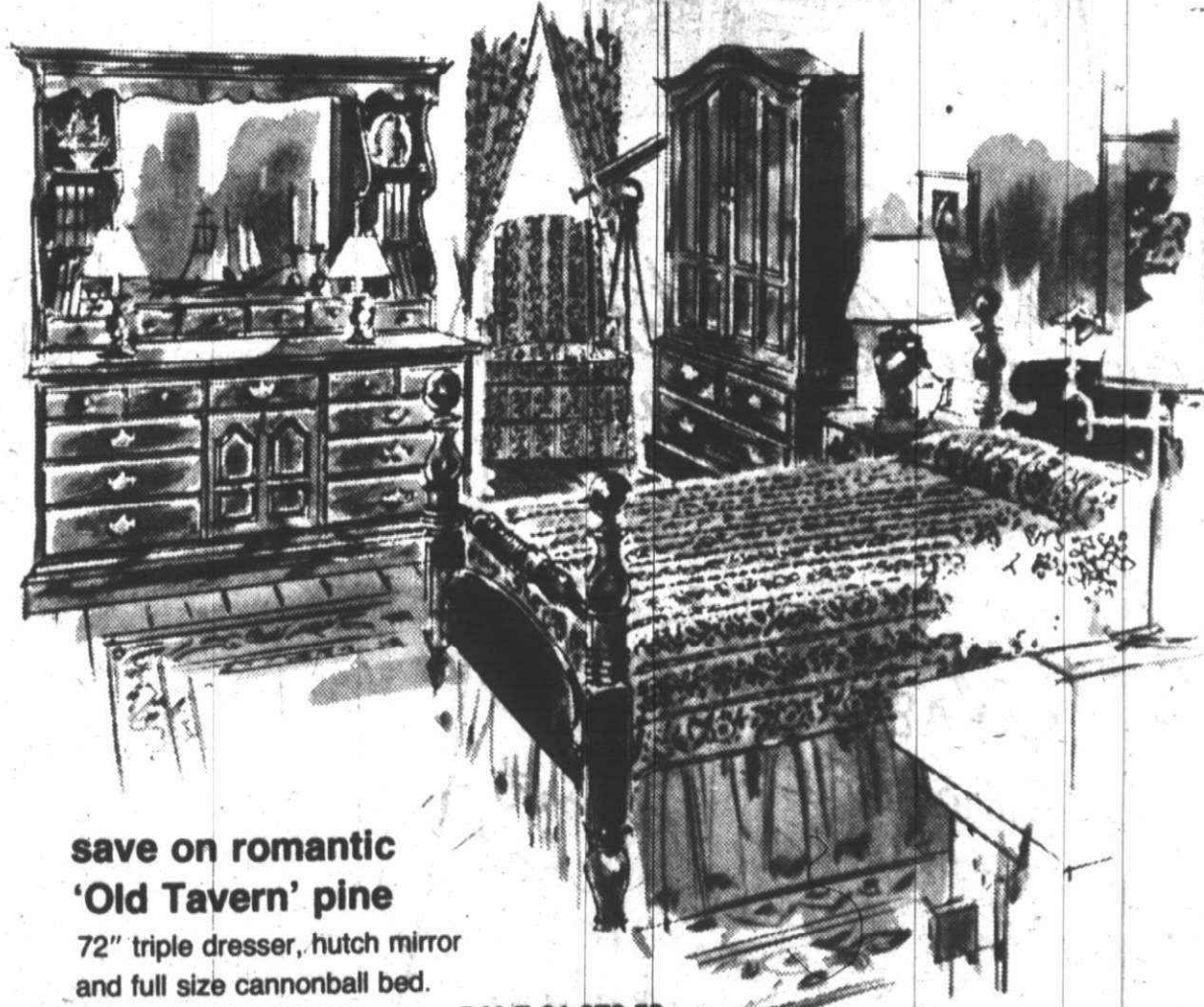

It is Charlie Henon, a feisty octogenarian with racing sheet in hand, holding forth at Detroit Race Course in Livonia.

A resident of the Allan Dee Wayne Residential Center, he was reveling in his role as a prime resource on betting, horses and jockeys during a visit of center residents to the track.

"I always pick by the rider," he claimed, advising his friends to lay their money on Gay Fashion in the first.

The horse proved to be a loser. However, Henon, a former DRC groom until he retired a year ago at 85, didn't do too badly on his overall predictions, picking three winners out of nine. In a different summer sport, that would give him a .333 batting average.

TV cameras and reporters were on hand for the visit of the Allan Dee group, giving the seniors the warm reassurance that they were still in the swim and proving that even though a person is over 80 he can still kick up his heels at the race track.

SEEING WHAT was expected of him, Henon hammed it up for the media, having the time of his life. Having been a singer many years ago at the Derby Bar near the track, he burst into an old-time song which lamented: "I'm afraid to go to bed at night because I'm afraid I'll lose you."

He hugged Mrs. Irene Edward, assistant administrator at Allan Dee, chuckling to everyone: "The only thing between her and me is her husband."

Nostalgic about his life around horses, he said simply, "I loved it."

He continued, "I did it all over again. It's exciting."

He entered the field 56 years ago as a driver of harness horses, and remembered, "There was no part about it I didn't

like, except maybe the time a horse stepped on me when I went down during a race," adding, "I still have a horseshoe print on my back."

HE THINKS the people at DRC are wonderful.

"And you've got to love the animals," he added. "They make your life. I've known all the jockeys. I put some of them up on their first horse ever. I won a lot of money at the track. I lost a lot too, but they don't owe me anything."

Classy Brandy and Blue Wayne were my all-time favorites. I won a lot of money with them."

Looking around at his new friends he concluded, "It does me a lot of good to be here and explain it all to these people."

Mrs. Angela Roberts, one of the seniors in the group, declared, "We ought to call the horses Charlie picks. Charlie's Choice."

She has loved horses since she grew up on a farm in Dearborn, and once went on a trip to the horse country around Lexington, Ky. with a group of seniors to see how they raised thoroughbreds.

"We were all excited about the outing," she said. "I like to be active. I was active with Muscular Dystrophy for years and did church work all my life."

"IT WAS JEFF RICE'S first try at trying to win money from the horses. A World War I veteran, having served with the Red Arrow group in the 32nd Division, he said, "I pick according to what Charlie says."

Patrick Skelly, who is but a few hours from his 76th birthday, felt just as confident as Henon in his ability in picking winners.

"I can pick a good horse," he maintained. "I can also pick women. I'm a leg watcher, but nowadays with slacks I can't tell if they're bowlegged or not. There are lots of girls to see here."

Looking jaunty in black and white shoes, sports jacket and blue pants, Skelly was for 28 years a member of the bartenders union.

"Want me to buy you a drink, dear?" he asked Jean McCullough. "I want to see if there's anyone there I know."

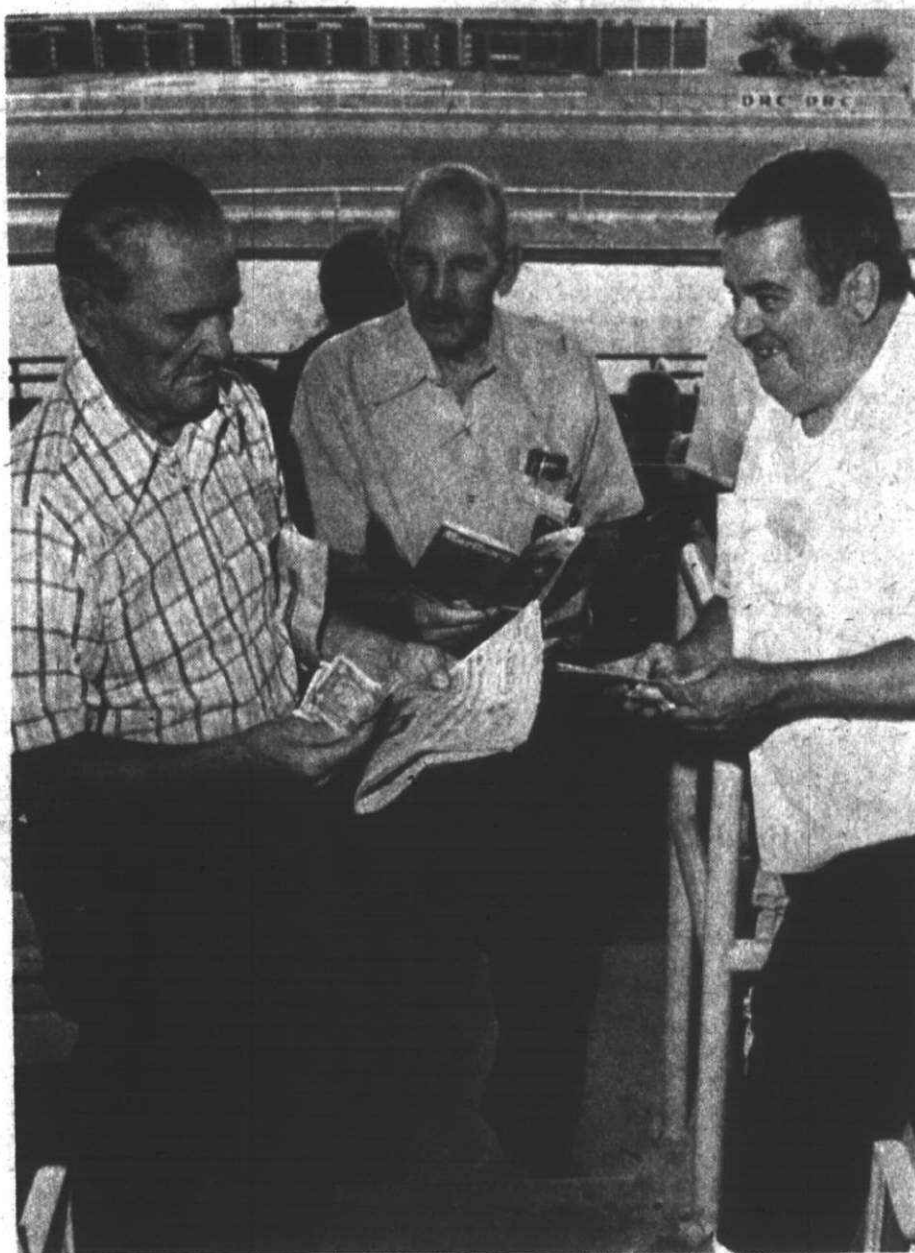
Before she left Mrs. McCullough pointed out that tomorrow bowling was on the agenda. "And after that a trip to Bob-Lo," she smiled.

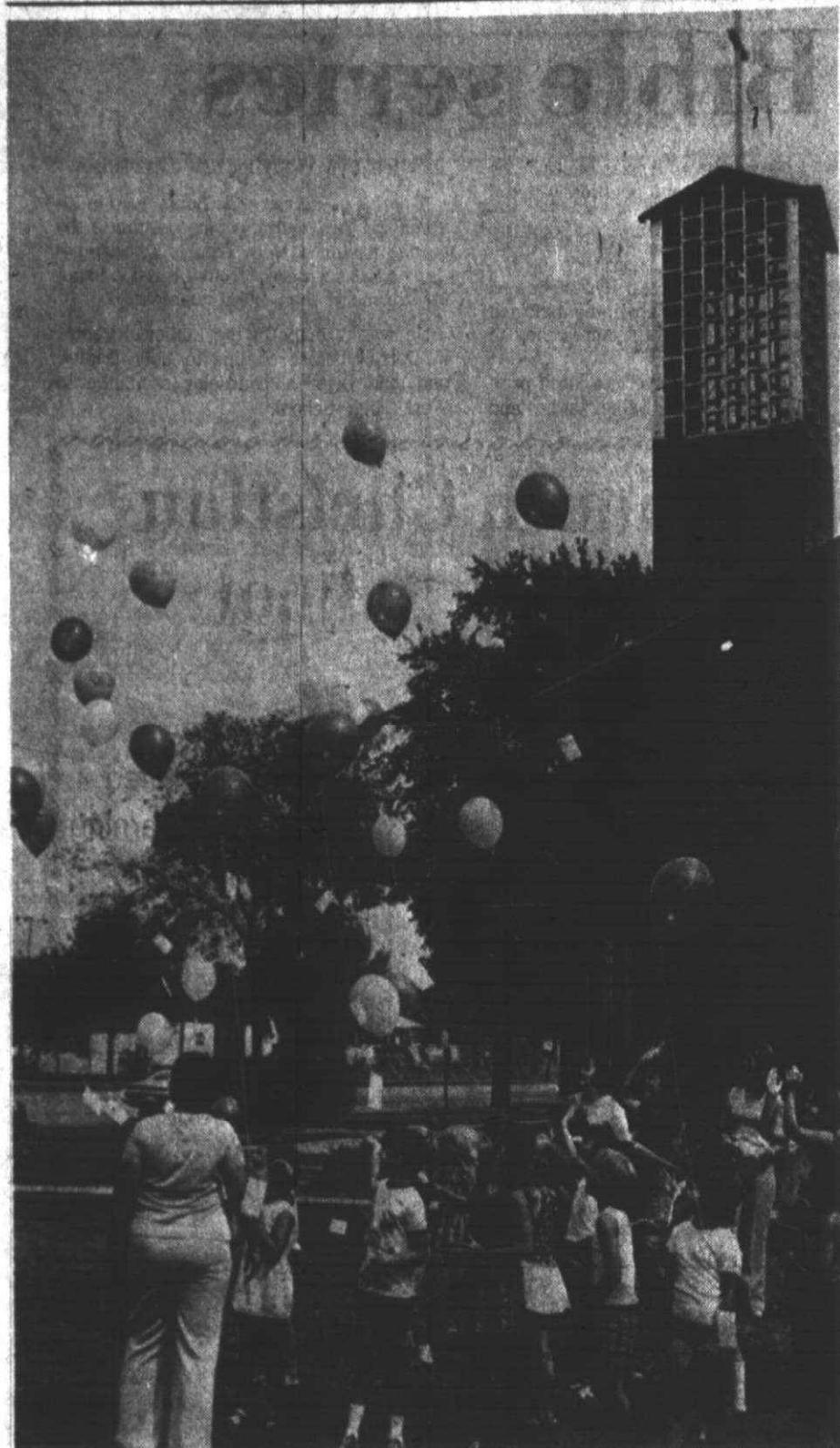

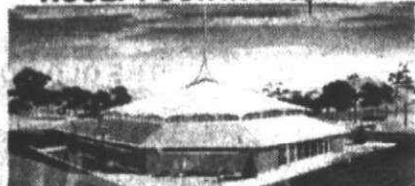

Mr. Balke will preach his farewell sermon in a special service at 10:30 a.m. Sunday, Aug. 22, in Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, where he has served since 1967.

The next day he and his family will head for Madison, Wis., where he will become director of the Bethel Bible Series, a program of biblical study and instruction that for 15 years has been expanding throughout this country and in several foreign nations.

"I see this new work as a great challenge," said Mr. Balke, who has had close connection with the program since he first took its training five years ago.

"In our own congregation, about 100 people have become involved with it during that time," he added. "The kind of testimony they give, what they say about how the study has changed their lives, is most impressive."

THE BETHEL SERIES, Mr. Balke explained, is a Bible study program developed by Dr. Harley Swigum, pastor of the Bethel Lutheran Church of Madison.

"It involves intensive study of both the Old and New Testaments," he went on.

"First, a congregation sends its pastor to Madison for a two-week summer training program. When he returns to his

church, he trains teachers for two years, one spent on each testament.

"Then each of these teachers, in turn, conducts a similar course for classes drawn from congregation members."

"It's quite an intensive thing, because it asks the pastor to commit four years to the program, and there's a two-year commitment for the lay people."

IN HIS NEW work, Mr. Balke will be conducting the leadership training programs and doing considerable traveling around the country explaining the program and interesting new congregations in it.

"I'll also be developing some new features to the program," he said. In addition, he will be working closely with Dr. Swigum, who now heads the Adult Christian Education Foundation, organized to manage the Bible series, and will help run the Yahara Center at Madison where the training classes are held.

"They are bringing me in now to learn the operation of the whole organization before Dr. Swigum retires," the local pastor said.

HE DESCRIBED the Bible study in the Bethel series as the kind that is adaptable to a wide variety of religious belief, whether liberal or conservative.

"It teaches the basic concepts of the Bible and gives people an overview so that they see it as an integrated work and not just a lot of separate parts," he stated.

"The program is designed so that each

congregation can give its own interpretation. You could teach Bethel around a belief in seven-day creation or evolutionary creation—that part is for the church to put in."

It is being used now by congregations in Korea, Japan and New Zealand as well as this country, Mr. Balke said.

"And, while it was developed within the Lutheran Church, it's definitely not a Lutheran thing," he added. "Many denominations have found it most valuable."

THE PASTOR said directors of the foundation had approached him on the job a year ago because he has considerable training in adult education as well as five years of working with Bethel.

"I turned it down then," he said, adding that the reasons were closely connected with his congregation's role in the developing split within the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod over a doctrinal dispute.

During the year that followed, Holy Trinity became the first of three Livonia congregations in the synod to leave its Michigan District and join the more liberal English District.

Its members now are faced with a decision on whether to affiliate with the newly-formed English Synod, which moved this summer to sever its connection with the Missouri Synod.

That decision will be made in November, Mr. Balke added, and the congregation making it will have the leadership of the Rev. James Spilos, a graduate of the Lutheran Seminar in Exile (Semex), who was installed early in 1976 as assistant pastor.

"I think the biggest part of the dispute took place this summer," said Mr. Balke, "and the congregation now has an assistant pastor to fill in, so when the Bethel people asked me recently to reconsider, I decided it was work I would really like and it was now or never."

"But I have to say I'll miss being in the thick of this doctrinal question which I consider most important."

ALSO LOOKING forward to a challenging new situation are members of the Balke family, his wife, Marilyn, their sons Bill and Bob, who will enter the 10th and ninth grades, and daughter Ann, ready to start junior high.

"They've all been active in a lot of projects in Livonia," Mr. Balke said, "and

they feel they ready for new experiences."

A native of Detroit, Mr. Balke lived in Livonia for two years before becoming the second pastor of Holy Trinity, a congregation he has seen grow from a mission handful to more than 1,000 members.

He was director of the Lutheran Center in Detroit before coming to Holy Trinity, and had been a counselor at Lutheran West High School.

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Diabetic kids learn at camp how to live with their illness

A summer camp with an accelerated schedule of activities geared for a fast burn-up of sugar draws about 70 Michigan youngsters to each of its five sessions programmed for young diabetics.

Camp Midicha, located in Columbiaville, northeast of Flint, can be best described as a summer workshop for youngsters to learn how to cope with giving themselves shots, testing their urine, planning their own meals, and meeting new friends who also suffer from the malady.

Kathy Mesenbring, the 19-year-old daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Victor Mesenbring of Farmington, who works as a counselor in Camp Midicha this summer, summed up the biggest benefit of the camp for the campers when she said, "I'm not a diabetic. I'm a minority here."

This is a turn-around for the kids who are always in the minority; for the kids who might be the only one in their class or on the block who have this problem.

Kathy, who has done a lot of social work with the Girl Scouts, is thinking of going into some kind of social work through her classes at Valparaiso University, and got her summer job through a doctor in Prince of Peace Lutheran Church congregation.

But even on the staff, she is a minority. Camp director Don Donigan said diabetics get first crack at the summer job openings in the camp.

"Probably three-fourths of the staff are diabetic and that includes the doctors, the kitchen help, the maintenance men; people who can emphasize with these youngsters, who know what it's all about," he said.

THE YOUNGSTERS are well aware of their problem, and the medical aspects they are learning to cope with.

We met Ed Solomon, a Southfield youth who gave us his age as "nine and three quarters" when he was returning from the archery range and didn't catch up with him again until we spotted him with a group on a horseback riding stint.

But he told us that he and his sister and a couple of friends had given a carnival this spring in his yard at 17055 George Washington which raised \$177 for diabetes research. Now he's learning about chemical changes in his body, and when to raise or lower his insulin injections.

For the first time since the camp has been in operation, the staff is getting ready to receive diabetics who are as young as six years, "as a pilot program, to see how it goes," Donigan said.

Lisa Sarah, who just finished first grade in Livonia's Randolph Elementary School, will be one of the littlest campers during that session, brought through her teacher Char Kolin.

Mrs. Kolin uses her summers to work as arts and crafts director for Camp Midicha, while her husband Paul serves as senior counselor.

Her role at the camp puts her "on call" every morning, afternoon and evening. Her well-equipped cottage receives campers who come in groups for a scheduled activity; then may choose to return during a free time to finish something they've started.

When we met her, she was juggling her time helping youngsters finish up sand candles, macrame pieces, beaded necklaces and tie dying.

EVEN SO, free time is not all that free. We met Karen Wilkinson, a student at Farmington's East Junior High School, learning to embroidery her blue jeans in free time.

And Darthia Hansen, 11, from Rochester's Northhill School, choosing to spend her free time on a kick ball field.

But many of the youngsters were back to their cabins working on a camp newspaper, or putting together a booth their group was preparing for Casino Night. Or getting costumes ready for Circus Day. Or learning a script for Skit Night. Or were on a committee for Christmas in July. Or were involved in an upcoming Water Follies. Or dreaming up gag prizes for the campers' version of "Let's Make a Deal."

Through it all, campers are stopped in their tracks to check their urine four times a day, a sharp reminder that diabetes is emerging as one of the nation's most serious public health problems, and is now

the number-three killer of Americans.

The discovery of insulin 40 years ago lulled the public into a sense of compacency but did not slow down the disease. At least five million Americans suffer from the condition now and authorities estimate there is yet another five million sufferers undetected.

The American Diabetes Association-Michigan Affiliate, Inc. sponsors and operates Camp Midicha. It is a voluntary health agency concerned with the detection, care and education of diabetics in the state, located at 6131 West Outer Drive, in Detroit.

'Reverse discrimination' denied by labor law expert

Some critics maintain that the current practice of preferential hiring of women and minorities is a form of "reverse discrimination," but a University of Michigan legal scholar says the measure is both legal and necessary to resolve today's social ills.

Theodore U. St. Antoine, specialist in labor law and dean of UM law school, said in a recent speech that there is little doubt the government's "affirmative action" programs—requiring minority hiring "goals" or "quotas" among institutions or businesses receiving government contracts—have

led to "race-based and sex-based hiring in industry and education."

But St. Antoine argued that, considering the social implications of continued widespread employment discrimination, affirmative action should not be held in violation of the constitution of 1964 civil rights legislation prohibiting discrimination in employment.

"AFTER A DECADE of federally enforced nondiscrimination in employment, minorities are still twice as likely as whites not to have jobs," St. Antoine pointed out.

"Minorities continue to occupy a disproportionately low percentage of the more attractive positions. The employment situation of women in relation to white males is similarly bleak."

"If we are to secure genuine equality of opportunity for the races and the sexes in the job market," said St. Antoine, "something more is plainly needed than the mere prohibition of positive acts of discrimination."

St. Antoine made these points in a recent address at Tulane University Law School in New Orleans.

He said he believes "if preferential treatment is a needed step toward a more fully integrated work force and toward genuine equality of employment opportunity, then no constitutional barriers should stand in the way."

He noted that while the constitution has been described as "color blind," the constitution itself "says no such thing." All it requires, he said, is "the equal protection of the laws."

REFERRING to the possible constitutional challenge that affirmative ac-

tion fosters unequal treatment, St. Antoine said, for example, that "the black who is preferred as a teacher or a pipefitter, or the woman who is preferred as an engineer or a police officer, is not being favored as an individual."

"It merely so happens," he went on, "that at this moment in history, such persons are endowed with qualities that must be distributed throughout a wide range of positions in industry and the professions if we are to solve two of our most pressing social problems."

St. Antoine acknowledged that "such an approach is profoundly at odds with our cherished traditions of individual merit and group neutrality." But, he said, "I believe it accords with the realities of the 1970s."

"Deliberate race- or sex-based preferences are dangerous medicine, justified only by the gravest circumstances, and they must not be allowed to become habit-forming," he said. But at the present time, they "remain our one best hope," he added.

Scouts offer leader skills

Report from 4C

Children's needs now getting more attention

Current legislation and several new state programs and agencies are focusing more on the needs of children, according to Susan Brook, executive coordinator for the Michigan Community Coordinated Child Care (4C) Council.

She spoke recently on "Current Legislation Affecting Michigan Children and Their Families," at Michigan State University's College Week, sponsored by the Cooperative Extension Service.

"The 4C Council advocates the comprehensive delivery services of children," said Ms. Brook. "It is made up of representatives from public and private agencies. It is a public information and referral group and anyone can join the council."

"The purpose is to make sure Michigan citizens have an input into policy decisions that affect children and their families."

AFTER A STUDY of Michigan's programs for children, the Office of Juvenile Justice Services was formed. This office is formulating a statewide plan for uniformed services for juveniles, delinquent and neglected. It will also administer the child care funds.

The child care study committee is currently investigating the needs and problems of children. The committee is looking into adoption, child abuse, neglect, family planning, public schools, juvenile code, high risk infants, and more.

Current legislation affecting children includes pending House Bill 4751, which would create an office of family and child advocacy. This office would speak up for the child in court cases.

There is no central place where you can get answers about laws affecting children. The bill would establish such a place.

The legislature passed a new child abuse law which expands the number of people who must report an abuse or neglect case. The law also states that suspect cases do not have to be reported to the police until after the Department of Social Services can look into the matter. An amendment has been introduced which, if passed, would require that all suspect cases be reported immediately to the police.

"WHEN PUBLIC ACT 198 was passed in 1971, it gave Michigan the most comprehensive special education program in the country," noted Ms. Brook. "This act says that the state must provide special education training or care to any handicapped person, age zero to 25. Most other states begin their special education programs for schoolaged children and end when the child reaches the age of majority."

The act also requires that the parents be involved in the decision about what special

Education is basis for hiring, prof says

A woman's education, not just her sex, causes "discrimination" in hiring, says a Michigan State University management professor.

"If women do not possess the educational credentials deemed necessary for careers in management," reporter Dr. Henry Tosi, "then their exclusion should come as no surprise."

For example, liberal arts degrees, whether held by women or men, are not as preferred for entry level managerial jobs as are those with majors in accounting, marketing, and management, he explained.

Tosi's conclusions are based on a study which he conducted with Dr. Patricia Renwick of the University of California, Irvine.

Eighty UC graduate students in administration, 64 male and 16 female, rated bogus resumes on suitability for two managerial positions as part of a class assignment. Many of the students were employed full-time, and about 39 per cent were single, 54 per cent were married, and seven per cent were divorced.

APPLICANT SEX, marital status, undergraduate major and graduate degree were systematically varied to yield 100 different resumes. The resumes were divided into 10 sets, each evaluated by eight students.

"The results indicate that all factors are important," Tosi said.

He added, however, that the experience of the job applicant, particularly field of specialization and graduate degree, plays a more influential role in these decisions than do personal characteristics such as sex or marital status.

"Overall, the most desirable job candidate was a married male with two children," Tosi notes. "He had an undergraduate major in business administration and an MBA."

The next suitable applicant was a single woman with an MBA and an undergraduate major in industrial sociology.

A divorced male was considered least suitable, with a single woman close behind. Both candidates had undergraduate majors in history and M.S. degrees in administration.

"IF SEX is the only background information given about a candidate," Tosi said, "evaluators rely on stereotypical notions about the educational backgrounds of males and females."

education programs the child will receive.

In 1974, the federal government passed the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act. It states that public school records of a child must be made available to the parents upon request.

"This act is so new that many parents are not even aware they can have access

to their children's records," she observed.

Another new act many people are not aware of is Public Act 296 of 1974. Among the provisions of this new adoption law, is an adoption subsidy for parents adopting children who are normally hard to place.

"For example, if adults adopt a child requiring medical care, they can get an adop-

tion subsidy to help pay for medical costs," she added.

A CONTROVERSIAL piece of legislation is pending House Bill 4704. If passed, one aspect of the bill would amend the Juvenile Code so that the probate court would no longer have jurisdiction over status offenses.

Status offenses are those acts which would not be considered a crime if committed by an adult (running away from home, playing hooky, etc.).

Many of the probate judges do not think status offenses should be taken away from their jurisdiction. So they helped write

House Bill 6034, which would also amend the Juvenile Code, but would leave status offenders under their jurisdiction.

"The House Judiciary Committee is currently looking into both bills," said Ms. Brook. "They hope to blend the best of both bills and come up with a substitute one in the fall."

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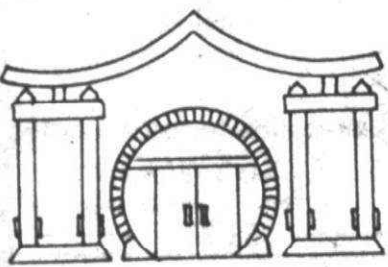
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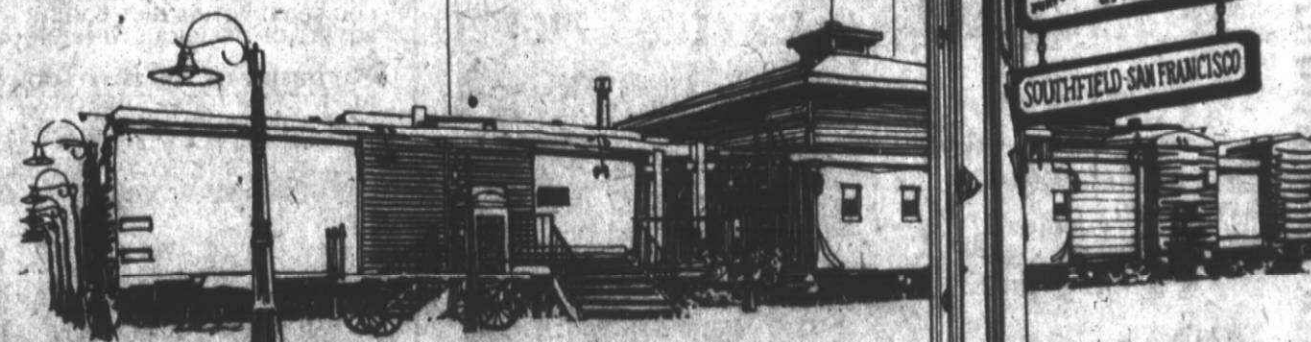


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A diamond at Livonia's Ford Field has been raked and smoothed and a low spot near the bench at lower left has been filled. Only the foul lines and the batter's box remained to be

Condition of area baseball diamonds sparks comments

Livonia's Ford Field, Rotary Park and the new Bicentennial Park all have one thing in common. When a baseball game is played at those fields, an occasional ground ball will take a bad hop and even hit some players in the face.

"We were scrimmaging Adray Photo," explained John Colley, Redford Adray manager who coaches in the Livonia Adray League. "In the warm-ups, their first baseman was hit right in the nose by a ground ball and their third baseman was almost hit in the head."

Colley said that he feels the high school fields in the area are in better shape than the recreation fields because the high school coaches have more knowledge about how to take care of a diamond.

Roger Frayer, coach at Livonia Churchill and a manager in the Livonia Connie Mack League, also feels that one of the problems with recreation fields is that workers do not add the fine touches that could make a good playing surface a great one.

"The fields are dragged and raked every day that a game is scheduled," Frayer said, complimenting Livonia's Forestry Dept.

"However, the key to keeping a good field is water and know-how," the veteran coach continued. "I think that Ford Field should be watered every day because they have the facilities to do that."

"Ford Field has been better this year than in the past," Frayer noted in his evaluation. "Rotary Park—Wow! It needs a lot of work, but the Parks and Recreation Commission has taken a step in the right direction by evaluating all of the diamonds."

Fred Crissey, Plymouth Canton coach and manager of a Connie Mack team, agrees with Frayer and Colley that the workers who maintain the fields should have more knowledge about how to do it.

"I think it would be a good program if they could get the players who play on these fields the job of maintaining them," said Crissey. "Of course, they would have to be paid the standard rate the recreation workers get."

Gary Beyrand, who competed this summer in both the Adray and the Connie Mack Leagues, has had first-hand experience on most of the diamonds in the area.

"Most of the fields are tough to play on," he said. "From what I have heard, the city does not have enough money to hire more workers. But I don't think they need more workers. Maybe someone could be hired to show the workers a better way to get the fields in condition to play."

Frayer offers a suggestion to keep Ford Field the area's premier baseball facility.

"Bicentennial is supposed to get lights at one of the diamonds. That could cut down on play at Ford Field. All of the Livonia Class E games could be played there (at Bicentennial), with the Connie Mack and the Adray games at Ford Field."

Frayer said that if his suggestion were followed, the area around third base at Ford Field would not have a rough spot which produces a lot of bad hops as it does now. The present situation exists because the younger Class E third basemen play on the grass, while the older players position themselves behind the bag on the dirt.

Frayer, though, in his suggestion, makes a good case in defense of municipal recreation departments and their care of diamonds. The fact is, as baseball grows more and more popular every season, more and more games must be scheduled on the existing fields to accommodate the demand.

Naturally, more games will lead to more wear and tear.

Ford Field was in excellent condition last weekend in preparation for an All-American Amateur Baseball Association regional tournament, but Colley was not happy.

"The field was watered every day and they even painted the fences red, but I feel that the field should have looked good all year round and not just for the visitors."

"Ford Field could be the showcase baseball field in the area," Colley added. "The residents of Livonia pay taxes and they deserve the field to be in great shape at all times."

Frayer stated that the city should not worry about making so many new fields, but should rather concentrate on maintaining and improving the fields it already has.

Crissey made the point that in Plymouth, all of the hardball diamonds were taken care of by the leagues and not by the recreation department.

"We do not give high school fields help," said Chuck Skene, of the Plymouth Parks and Recreation Dept. "They (maintenance people) are financed by private groups to work on the diamonds. We have a two-man crew that does the work on all of Plymouth's softball diamonds."

The Livonia Forestry Division, which works on the city fields, was unavailable for comment.

Expansion in '77

Fox Hills club is thriving

One of the strongest sports comebacks seen in the Plymouth area this year has been that of a golf club rather than an individual athlete.

The Fox Hills Country Club on North Territorial, which many believed to be on the verge of extinction in the early '70s, not only is thriving under fantastic patronage but foresees continued expansion in 1977.

Al and Estelle Dul of Dearborn Heights,

who bought the 247-acre Fox Hills layout two years ago, have sold their Shady Hollow Golf Club in Romulus this year to devote full time to restoration of Fox Hills facilities. In immediate charge of club operations is their daughter, Sandy Matyja.

Approximately 40 men's and women's leagues have provided the nucleus of action over the 6,400-yard, par 72 layout this season, open scheduling filling what gaps remained.

Established in 1921, Fox Hills operated privately for many years as the Plymouth Country Club. The course went public in the '60s, but deterioration of club house and pool eventually led to the closing of those facilities and use of the course also fell into decline.

In 1975, Dul management followed up their purchase by grooming the golf course into a well-manicured test that offers fairways watered by a pumping system from Fox Hills' own spring-fed lake. They also turned to the planning board to map a remodeling program for the 10,800-square-foot clubhouse.

When Fox Hills reopened this spring, the grill and lounge area had been completed, and a fleet of 50 electric carts was added for golfers. By 1977 the complete clubhouse remodeling project will be finished, and it is expected that the long dormant Olympic size swimming pool also will be back in use.

The old log cabin which was the club's original headquarters more than a half century ago is still there and is being used as a banquet facility. For special parties the new lounge area also can accommodate up to 100 persons. A third banquet room will be included in the clubhouse when finished.

The tournament featured 60 teams, each a champion in its own right from various leagues and communities statewide.

At Whispering Willows

O&E golfers face test

What kind of challenge will Whispering Willows Golf Course present to linkswomen and linksmen next month during the eighth annual Observer & Eccentric Open Golf Tournament?

Judging from scores recorded in competition last year, a pretty stiff challenge.

Dave Wall topped the championship flight in 1975 with an actual total of 147 for the two-day, four-round—five strokes over par. Winners of the other three flights produced even higher scores.

"Whispering Willows is not a lengthy course," said Gary Whitener, club pro and tournament director. "The premium is not on length but on accuracy and the ability to use all the clubs in the bag—irons off the tee and the three-wood on the fairway."

The course, owned and maintained by the City of Livonia, plays to par-71 at 6,265 yards. It is at Eight Mile and Newburgh roads.

The holes on the course are as varied as the clubs in one's bag. Some fairways are wide open and others are narrow. Water comes into play on several holes. Accuracy is generally preferred to distance.

Golfers should not be deceived as to the apparent ease of the course by the first hole—a 460-yard par five with a wide fairway and an inviting, expansive green.

That test is merely a confidence builder, for things get extremely sticky at the second hole.

A narrow chute lines a tree-studded fairway 337 yards downhill to the pin. The fairway is approximately 30 yards wide, with nothing but trouble for a distance hitter with a slight hook or slice.

The same situation exists on number 11, which runs parallel to the second hole. Golfers are further confounded on the 11th by a pond three-quarters of the way from the tee to the green on the 390-yard test.

Whitener described the 11th as the most difficult par four on the course. "It's a pretty hole, but so tough. Both men and women hate playing it."

Competitors will not have a chance for a breather on the 12th, the longest par four on the course at 435 yards. Whitener suggested that the 11-12 combination is the toughest section of the course.

The 14th, a 205-yard par three, is an uphill trek with a narrow fairway, a large tree to the left of the green and traps both to the right and the left of the putting surface.

Club selection, always crucial, may be difficult, especially if the wind is blowing toward the tee. Whitener said that 14 is the most challenging par three on the course.

Golfers will face other tricky holes—a green built like a mound on 13, a fairway that narrows to a creek in funnel-like fashion on 18 and a 485-yard monster with fairway bunkers on seven.

Whispering Willows is not only the kind of course on which it is easy for the novice to get in trouble early and flounder most of the round.

It is also the type on which a fairly steady player can lose strokes little by little to par then wonder what happened at the end.

In addition to the toughies, which make up most of the course, there are several holes in which pars and birdies are distinct possibilities.

The first hole is a good example and so too are eight, a 170-yard par three, and 16, a 125-yard par-three. By the time the competitors reach those par threes, patience and steadiness will be the keys to success.

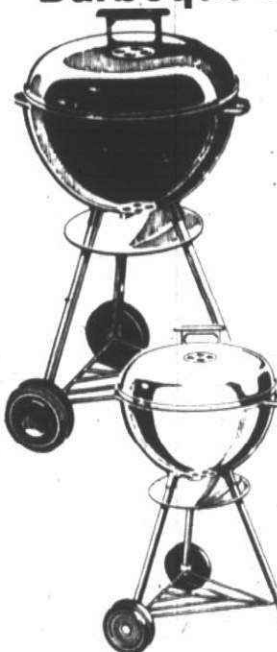

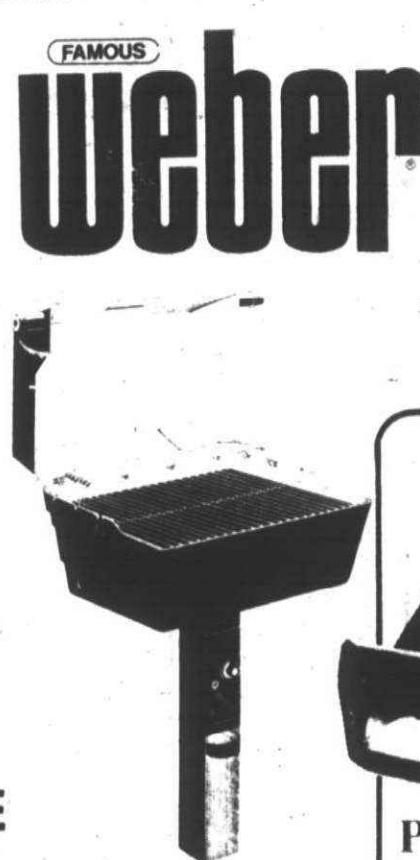
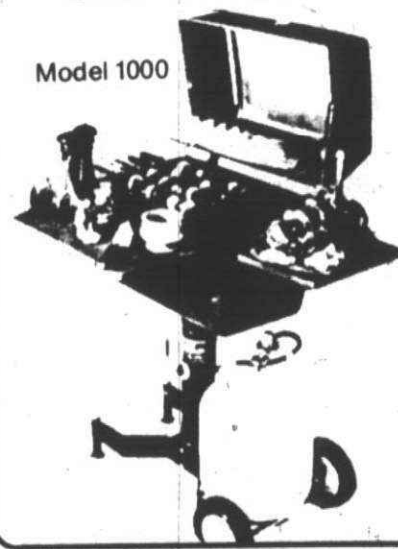

Michigan Mile slated Saturday

The \$100,000 Michigan Mile, the premier thoroughbred racing event in the state, will be staged for the 28th year Saturday (Aug. 21) at the Detroit Race Course in Livonia.

The 35 nominees for the race have been weighted by racing secretary Frank Grand Jr., with Forego, two-time Horse of the Year, receiving top weight of 136 pounds. Forego, however, has done all of his racing in New York and is not expected to alter that pattern.

Foolish Pleasure, the 1975 Kentucky Derby winner, was given the next high weight of 128 pounds, but is expected to keep commitments in the East.

Royal Gint, thoroughbred racing's newest millionaire, was assigned 124 pounds and will definitely be at the starting post Saturday, barring any unforeseen circumstances.

With his most recent win in the Salvatore Mile at Monmouth Park last week, the six-year-old gelding, sired by Round Table, has earned \$1,004,815 to become only the 19th horse in the history of the sport to reach the million-dollar plateau.

Jack VanBerg, the leading trainer at DRC, has nominated five of his horses for the Mile. They are Shiny Sun, assigned 114 pounds, Joachim, 111, Almost Grown, 109, Pondelli, 107, and Bay Streak, 107.

The most likely to actually race is Almost Grown, a four-year-old colt recently purchased by VanBerg for a \$50,000-plus sales tag.

Of local high hope for the race is Brustigert, owned by T.F. Devereux and trained

by son, Pat. Brustigert, a six-year-old sired by Semi-Pro, has won two consecutive \$15,000 handicaps this meet at DRC.

Brustigert worked 3/4 of a mile Monday and turned in a time of 1:02.2, the best clocking of the morning.

"He's going so good now, that I just have to run him in the big race," said trainer Devereux. "My dad and I won the Mile with Greatest (1955) and finished second with Royal Harmony (1971) and I'd just like to win one more for dad."

It remains to be seen if Brustigert's potential measures up to the proven standards of some of the stakes winners that are likely to start in the Mile. Two of them, Sharp Gary, assigned 118 pounds, and Brilliant Sandy, given the same weight, are consistent stakes performers.

Sharp Gary is a five-year-old gelding sired by 1961 Kentucky Derby winner Carry Back. Sharp Gary won \$176,431 in 1975 and this year to date, has bankrolled \$93,361. Local riding star Sam Maple is likely to be aboard Sharp Gary.

Brilliant Sandy is a four-year-old Canadian-bred colt sired by 1963 Michigan Mile winner Crimson Satan. Brilliant Sandy has started nine times this year, all in Canada, and has won four of those outings, including a victory in the Maturity Stakes at Woodbine in Toronto.

Lloyd Duffy is his regular rider. Gates open at 11 a.m. Saturday for the 10-race card at DRC. The Michigan Mile is carded as the ninth race. First post time is 2 p.m.

At the moment, Al, who has managed Mont Carlo for years, is president of the Bowling Proprietors Association of Greater Detroit, and Bill operates Bel-Aire Lanes in Farmington.

Mengert, Fortuna roll to golf victory

Al Mengert, golf pro at Oakland Hills Country Club in Birmingham, and his assistant Tom Fortuna set a tournament record with a 17-under-par 127 to win the Professional-Assistant Golf Championship held at the Birmingham Country Club, Aug. 16.

It was the second year in a row that Mengert and Fortuna have won the two-round, best-ball tournament and the second consecutive year that they have not gone over par on any hole. Their 17-under-par score broke the record they set last year of 13 under and earned them \$400 apiece.

The only time Mengert and Fortuna were in danger of recording a bogey was on the 165-yard, par-three seventh hole. After Fortuna had already bogied, Mengert hit his tee shot into a bunker. However, Mengert blasted out of the sand and then sank a 12-foot putt to save par. Mengert, over the course of the tournament, hit for 11 birdies and one eagle, while Fortuna had eight birdies.

This was the eighth team championship

for Mengert in his career to go along with his 32 individual state championships.

THE TEAM OF Gary Rosely and D.A. Weisbring both of Red Run Golf Club, collected the \$350-per-man second place prize with their 13-under 131.

John Molenda and Glenn Hall from the Krollwood Country Club in West Bloomfield, shot a 135 to place them in a tie for fourth place, earning them \$216.66 each.

John Williams and Steve Groves, the pros at the Orchard Lake Country Club, just finished in the money with a 139, putting them in a tie for 13th which was rewarded with a check for \$67.50 apiece.
