## **Teacher pay offers are revealed**

The difference between both sides bargaining for a teachers' contract is narrowed down to about four per cent. But the lack of movement since reaching that point has caused a temporary stalemate between the negotiating teams.

In a statement released by the school board Tuesday, trustees reported the situtation in negotiations is "very serious." The same day, Candi Reece, chief negotiator for the teachers, reported that the possibility of a strike was "real."

Although the two sides are officially about 20 per cent apart, based on positions placed on the table, informal talks have reached the point where the disagreement has narrowed down to a gap of four per cent on what the total money improvement will be

Norm Kee, chief negotiator for the school board, reports the hang-up now is whether increment pay increases should be counted in the total salary improvement figures and which formula should be used to compute cost-of-living adjustments. Ms. Reece says cost-of-living isn't really the big issue but that the roadblock is the total amount of money improvements over the next three years.

THE BOARD of Education met in a workshop Monday evening and discussed budget and negotiations for more than four hours. Trustees have agreed to meet as often as necessary to achieve a settlement with the teachers

Regular conferences between Kee and the board have been scheduled. Trustees stress they are backing their negotiating team and will remain in close touch with all its actions

In a statement released Tuesday, the board reported: "We really appreciate that the teachers are working without a contract. Their job security and working conditions are very important to us, too."

The board expressed its deep concern for the welfare and education of students in the Plymouth Community School District and reiterated that the 4.75 additional mills approved by voters Sept. 2 would be spent for learning materials, curriculum improvement, class size, and support services. "We are resolved to reach a fair and equitable settlement as soon as possible

and a teacher at the top of the scale getting about \$1,000 for COLA.

'By applying five per cent to the base salary," explained Kee, "each teacher would get the same amount of increase. But if we applied five per cent to all salary steps it could cost the district up to \$500,000 additional over our base-salary proposal.

Ms. Reece responded: "The district paid us COLA last year at each step of the salary schedule, and it didn't break them. In fact, the district ended up with a surplus of some \$160,000. The proposal of five per cent of base pay would totally destroy the salary schedule over a period of time. Teachers at the bottem of the scale would make out okay, but as you go up the scale you lose buying power. What happens is that the experienced teachers would be punished.

The COLA provision in the present contract calls for teachers to receive twothirds of whatever the increase was in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) during the previous year. This year, for instance, teachers would've gotten two-thirds of 5.2 per cent.

KEE EXPLAINED the board's first offer was a straight four per cent pay hike, plus increments. The argument given then was that the four per cent increase was insufficient to cover cost of living, except for beginning teachers.

On Sept. 2 the board made another offer for two years, a four per cent across the board in 1976-77 and one per cent across the board in 1977-78. In addition, the offer included uncapped COLA against the base salary for the second year.

The district, by state law, must pick up the cost of teachers' pensions by July 1, 1977. Kee, in the Sept. 2 offer, asked the union to include the pension contribution as a pay improvement amounting to five per cent- the amount of extra money which would show up in a teacher's paycheck. The Sept.2 board offer amounted to a 10 per cent improvement over two years. plus uncapped COLA in 1977-78.

Later the board offered a three-year contract with 1978-79 calling for a one per cent across-the-board increase, plus uncapped COLA against the base salary. Kee also made an offer that the board would begin paying half of the pension contribution. 212 per cent, beginning in the second semester of the current school year.

teachers. So most teachers will get increment hikes ranging from 412 to 612 per cent.

KEE NOTED that the two sides are about 20 per cent apart based on the formal offers remaining on the bargaining table. The 20 per cent gap includes increments. an inclusion disputed by the PEA.

"Off the table we are a lot closer, perhaps about three to four per cent apart on a three-year package, based on discussions Monday night with the school board and with the PEA," Kee added. Kee said the last formal board offer was placed on the table Sept. 16 and the PEA's last formal offer was placed on the table about Sept. 22.

The board also has offered to pick up 100 per cent of the cost for dental insurance. Teachers' now pay 45 per cent of the premum

In summing up his position, Kee said: "We have never said we cannot afford what the teachers are asking but that we are seeking what's fair and equitable." MS. REECE COMMENTED: "Norm feels that everything is going lovely, but the table position hasn't moved for three weeks

"It's illegal to strike, we are told. That's fine. So we went back to work without a contract, and ther has been no progress at the table. It's very frustrating. Kee's optimistic, but I'm pessimistic.

"We are seeking a three-year contract to have three years of labor peace in the district. The PEA has asked for COLA of 5.2 per cent the first year plus a three per cent pay improvement. And that's not much to ask considering the administration has received an eight per cent pay hike. The second and third years we are asking for unlimited COLA and a three per cent pay hike across the board. In one of our last discussions, we offered to cap COLA at 10 per cent in the third year

"Not counting increments, the PEA is asking an improvement of 25 per cent over three years while the board's offer amounts to 20 per cent. Our 25 per cent offer was given to them five days ago. under the table. We have made three to four movements now.

"The biggest problem is the total percentage increase, not COLA. THe PEA has done the moving to narrow the gap, and we cannot come down any further- that's why a strike is a real possibility. WE have moved down, and this is it! The board has made no movement in the past two weeks. "The community must get on the board to deal with the issues and pressure it to settle

MS. Reece said the PEA negotiators are now holding individual meetings with groups of teachers to inform them of what is happening with the negotiations. "After that wee will meet with the executive council to determine our next step.

**KEE IN REMARKS** Tuesday morning said a fundamental difference now between the two sides is how to define costof-living adjustments.

The board has offered a formula providing for COLA at five per cent of the base salary (pay for a first-year teacher). The Plymouth Education Association (PEA), says Ms. Reece, wants the five per cent applied against the salaries at each step in the pay schedule.

The difference is that the board would take five per cent of about \$10,000 and offer each of the 650 teachers \$500 for COLA. The PEA position would result in a beginning teacher getting \$500 for COLA

The three-year offer represented a pay improvement of 15 to 16 per cent, Kee explained, plus an additional 12 per cent for increments (automatic pay increases given due to seniority) for a total improvement of about 28 per cent.

"Teachers don't like to talk about increments," Kee observed. "They (argue that increments were foisted upon them by school boards in the old days before unions. But the district will have to pay out about \$400,000 just for increments which represent an average increase of four per cent for each teacher.

"Teachers at the top of the scale don't get increments, or about 25 per cent of our

### Fears foes will 'try something'

## Greenstein watching over reserves

#### By DARLENE STINSON

Even though Supervisor-Police Chief Robert Greenstein will probably earn official police certification within the seven weeks. Greenstein says he is not seeking the diploma because he wants to be a cop.

Rather, Greenstein says his enrollment in the seven-week police certification program at the Criminal Justice Institute of Detroit (CJI) is designed to ward off possible attacks on the 14 reserve officers enrolled in the program and insure their completion of the course.

"I'm not doing this for personal certification," said a tired Greenstein after completing the first day of classes, which last from 6:45 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. "I'm doing this to make sure Canton gets reasonable police protection.

"I anticipate the same people who screamed we weren't certified will try to keep us from getting certified," he continued. "I'm going to stop it. I'm going to give this township adequate police protection if it costs me everything I got." Greenstein noted repeated criticism of

the police reserves by Harold Stein, the Democratic nominee for the supervisor's post, as well as the unsuccessful court cases which sought to restrain the police department

They scared pepople with the reserves in the election," he said, "and the people didn't know who to believe. The reserves were so slandered, so violently attacked that I felt the only way to protect my men from people who tried to ruin the program was to get them certified."

Township board members recently approved enrollment of a maximum 15 reserves in the CJI program, scheduled for five days a week from Oct. 4 to Nov. 19. The program is entirely funded by federal Law Enforcement Assistance Act (LEAA) funds, directly administered to the CJI by the State of Michigan.

Under CJI rules, any problems with pupils enrolled in the program must be taken up with the officer's police chief. Greenstein points to those rules as the rationale for his enrollment.

"I felt I couldn't send my men downtown without being with them," he explained. "They can't kick anyone out of the program, unless they've done some terrible wrong. They can't convince me something terribly wrong happens if I'm right there

and know it's not true. I can react immediately.

Greenstein believes opponents of the township's reserve police department will "try something" before the program is through

"I'm talking about Stein and (Trustee candidate Eugene) Daley, their supporters, the Sheriff's union and all the other people who've been screaming about the police reserves.

"There are people who feel strongly they'd lose their bread and butter if we get certified." continued Greenstein, referring to talk that Canton should contract for police services with the Wayne County Sheriff's Department, if a suit attempting to force the county to fund Sheriff deputies' services in seven townships fail.

"There are a lot of people in this county

who feel they'll get a lot of money from our and other townships, if they knock us down." Greenstein maintains.

Although Stein, Daley and other members of their slate attacked the reserves in the primary election campaign, they have repeatedly denied charges of political wrongdoing.

greenstein claims numerous persons telephoned the CJI on Monday, the first day Canton reserve officers attended classes. with complaints about the officers' enrollment.

"I have no ambitions of becoming a police officer." stressed Greenstein, who said he would lose his certification within six months of the program's completion, if he is not sworn in as a certified police officer. "I'm too old to go through a police acad-

emy for 25-year-olds. It's miserable for

someone who's almost 40. There's tremendous physical activity, and it's a tremendous strain on me

"But I'm going to do it. I just hope I don't get a heart attack in the process."

Physical activity at the CJI includes push-ups and climbing up and down six flights of stairs, Greenstein said. The supervisor has promised to conduct township business after classes at 3:30 p.m. and work a 16-hour day, when necessary.

"I'm in the program at a great personal cost to me," he said, "but I was elected to

do a job, and, damn it, I'm going to do it. "If I had become supervisor to perpetuate myself in office. I would have done a thousand things differently. I could have been a dear, sweet man and got nothing done.

Greenstein maintains a contract for serv-

## Daley, Stein say they won't interfere

Supervisor-Police Chief Robert Greenstein's comment that opponents of the police reserves will "try something" to discredit the reserves who are going to school for certification was greeted with derision by his named opponents.

Greenstein said this week the reason he was attending the Criminal Justice Institute (CJI) school was that he was worried his reserves would be victimized by "Stein, and Daley, their supporters, the Sheriff's union, and all the other people who've been screaming about the reserves.

Eugene Daley, who is a candidate for Canton trustee and a member of the Wayne County Sheriff's Department, said "if CJI has accepted them, what can I do to stop them from being certified."

Harold Stein said much the same thing: "My opinion of them is immaterial. We said they needed more training and I'm not against something that is for the betterment of the township. But I am against something that isn't budgeted for." Both Stein and Bundarin say they have reservations about the qualifications of the reserves who are in the CJI class.

"Are they physically and mentally suit-

able to send to school to become regularlyemployed police officers of Canton Township?" Stein asked rhetorically. "We have to have some kind of standards set up for the men we send to school, not just the word from the supervisor who nominates these men because he believes they are qualified.

"I am for qualified, professional police protection and fire protection," said Stein. "But we've got to have standards."

CJI openings were not open to everyone in the community, "instead of a hand-picked few. Both Daley and Stein said they are con-

cerned that Greenstein is attempting to set up a full-time Canton police department without putting the matter to a vote from the citizens.

"When these men graduate from CJI, they'll be regularly-employed part-time of-

ficers," Daley explained. "The next thing you know they'll be unionized and they won't be earning \$2.30 an hour."

"Do people want a full time police department in Canton Township?" said Daley. "I keep hearing that people already turned down a police millage here. I never knew of any police millage question appearing on the ballot. There was a safety millage which we voted on, but that didn't specify how much would be spent for what and I think that's the reason it went down. But we never had a millage specifically for police protection.'

Arlen warns of strike

According to Dick Arlen, president of the Faculty Forum and chief negociator, the faculty's strategy committee told the teachers. "Either you're going to have a contract ready to sign by Sunday night or tell the troops we'll have some job action on Monday with signs and picket lines the whole bit

Although the teachers' extended contract expired Wednesday they had agreed to work under the old contract through the end of this week.

But Mrs. Nancie Blatt, member of the college's board of directors and its treasurer said she thinks the faculty would be more comfortable working under a contract and is hopeful for a settlement by the week end

"If it looks like there's movement in negotiations and they are close to a settlement. I would assume that the board would extend the old contract," she said But if it comes to a stalemate 1 would venture to guess that the board would not extend the contract.

Even if the old contract is extended. Arlen said that generally the faculty feels they've waited and stalled too long.

"The way the contract is now, 1 would say that the faculty is not going to work until they get a contract.

A full faculty meeting at 4 p.m. Friday in the Little Theatre on campus will decide the teachers' plan of action for Mondav

"I don't want to take any job action." Arlen said, "but we're not going to duck the issues either

Arlen said the contract negotiations have been witled to six issues, the two major ones being money and class size. He said the teachers want a three year contract with a 5<sup>1</sup><sub>2</sub> per cent wage increase in the first year and a six per cent increase in the second and third years. The board is offering a three per cent increase.

"The faculty will probably be glad to get a five per cent increase," Arlen said. "Five per cent is a pretty reasonable settlement. They (board of directors) say that money is tight but they're not broke and five per cent doesn't cover inflation.

The other major issue is class size. "In the last eight years our full time faculty has only increased from 157 to 163 members. The student population in the last eight years has gone from about 4,000 to almost 8,000 this year, he said.

Arlen added that most college level classes have 30 students, but the faculty is willing to take on 31, except in those classes where equipment limits spaece.

Arlen is also bothered by the board's desire to restrict the number of hours a faculty member can spend on capmus in the third year of the contract.



For instance, you'd never guess while watching Bill Beitner the jeweler and watch-maker, that his greatest leisure time joy is blowing on a trumpet. And he'll\* tell you "I have been doing it since I was four years old.

Beitner gets his greatest delight now when playing with the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra and his eyes light up when he tells you that he has been the soloist on several occassions.

He doesn't know what lured him to the trumpet, but he thinks it started when he was a babe with a desire to play with toys-and he got hold of a horn.

"I just can't remember." he says. "but it was while I was a youngster. How else could it have happened as I was only four years old?

Now 47, he has been playing with the Plymouth Symphony for 30 years and is eagerly awaiting the coming season where again he will play a major role.

continued, "Paul Wagner was the director and now, under the baton of Wayne S. Dunlap. I still get a kick out of the concerts." As he looks back over his musical career Beitner recalls that he has been a soloist on three occasions and his greatest thrill was playing the two-trumpet concerto for the first time in 1966.

As he rolled back the calendar. Bill confessed that he missed the first concert with the Plymouth Symphony in 1947.

"That was the year I started as a jeweler," he said, "and I was at a watchmakers convention in Kansas City at the time. And I was so interested in the watch making that I practiced only two or three times with the orchestra during my first vear

When we went into business for ourselves (his brother Fred is a partner) 1 had more time and have enjoyed taking my place with the group ever since."

During a Fire Prevention Week demonstration at Eriksson Elementary School, a group of boys and girls were asked what they wanted to be when they grew up.

And it didn't take 7-year-old Jimmy Ryan long to decide. "The first thing I want to be when I

grow up is a fireman," said Jimmy. And the second thing?

"The second thing I'd like to be is a policeman, of course," said the youngster. But a group of girls looked puzzled and screwed up their faces when asked if they would like to be a firefighter when they grew up.

"A girl fireman?" said one of the second grade girls who was desperately trying to avoid being tickled by a boy behind her in the line.

Come to think of, it, how many female firefighters are there? Every image we have of firefighters involves men. "Anybody out there play with match-?" "NOOOO!" roared the captive audience.

"Anybody want to see us spray the

## Prime time TV outdraws \$1.7 million budget talk

Television's "Bowling for Dollars" and "Name That Tune" apparently took precedence over Canton's proposed 1977 budget in the minds of most township residents Monday night, when only a handful of residents attended a public hearing on the proposed financial plan.

In sharp contrast to last year's budget hearing, when members of Total Citizens Power and other residents hurled strings of questions at township board members, this' year's hearing was marked by nearly empty board chambers and slow-coming questions from residents who did attend.

The hearing, required by the township's charter, was scheduled to gather residents' feeling on the record \$1.75 million budget, proposed for the fiscal year beginning Jan.

But only nine residents attended Monday's hearing Two were planning commission members. Bart Berg, treasurer candidate on the Republican ticket, and Joyce Willis, a write-in candidate for trustee on the Greenstein slate, were the only candidates for township offices who attended. Board members voted to postpone closing of the public hearing, even after members of the audience no longer had questions or remarks. Board members failed to approve a motion to close the hearing, made about a half-hour after the meeting's start by Supervisor Robert Greenstein, by a 5-2 vote.

After hearing the brief comments and questions of residents, township trustees exchanged brief remarks and adjusted some figures on the proposed budgetary sheet, under study now for more than a month.

With revenues and expenditures balanced at \$1,752,867, the proposed budget marks a five per cent increase over last year's budgetary total of \$1,471,439.

Township officials expect a seven per

e on cent increase in the revenues generated by taxes during the 1977 fiscal year— from the 1976 level of \$920,000 to next year's expected level of more than \$1 million. An increase in population and a five per cent increase in the township's state equalized value account for the expected increase in tax revenues. In addition, township officials are includ-

ing an expected increase in revenues from building and plumbing permits in the proposed 1977 budget.

At the suggestion of Treasurer Carl Parsell, board members Monday added \$60,000 to the revenue figures expected to be generated by building and heating permit fees. The revenue portion of the proposed budget now lists \$130,000 under building permits and \$60,000 under plumbing permits, contrasted to \$70,000 and \$35,000 in last year's budget.

Board members allocated the \$60,000 added to the revenue portion of the proposed budget Monday night among salaries for the police reserves, capital improvement equipment, and a \$4,000 donation to the Plymouth-Canton Junior Athletic Association.

THE \$31,000 ADDED to salaries for the police reserves in the proposed budget brings the total of that itemized expenditure to \$48,000.


The \$25,000 added to capital outlay equipment brings that total to the \$55,000 mark. Township officials added another \$40,000 to land and improvements, bringing that total to \$208,375.

The \$40,000 added to land and improvements was transferred from firemen's salaries, an area where township officials last year budgeted an excess amount.

Township officials also added an itemized line in the proposed budget for an assistant director of the township's recreation department, but left the salary for the additional employee blank.

Deputy Treasurer Mike Gorman said township officials could transfer some funds from the capital outlay account to cover the assistant director's salary.



Anyone who has lived in the Plymouth area longer than 24 hours has undoubtedly been delayed at a train track; and although delays are aggravating for everyone, they have serious implications for fire and police vehicles.

To discuss the problem of traffic blockage at railroad crossings, fire chiefs from the City of Plymouth. Plymouth Township and Canton met Wednesday with two officials of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway. Also in attendance were Trooper David Sass, community service officer of the Michigan State Police, and District Judge Dunbar Davis. Both Sass and Davis were there in an unofficial capacity.

The informal gathering was held at the behest of the fire chiefs, who wanted to express their concern that train-crossing blockage poses a continuing threat to providing their communities with fast. efficient emergency vehicle service.

CITY FIRE Chief George Scheonneman said that he thought the trains had become longer and beside that, they seemed to be moving slower than in past years. He indicated that it was because of the poor condition of the track bed.

Lawrence Judd, Plymouth trainmaster. responded by saying that as a long-time city resident, he was well aware of the difficulty caused by trains in general and specifically in the case of police and fire vehicles.

However, he said that repairs of existing tracks and track beds had been under way for some time, and that \$500,000 had been allocated to continue a repair and maintenance program. But, he said, the age and condition of the tracks were not the only factors in slow train speed.

of installing electric warning boards in each fire station. These would be hooked up to train terminals and would show if a given train crossing was blocked.

The chiefs felt that this advance warning system would be of help to them in planning their responses to emergency calls.

Robert Stachurski, terminal trainmaster of Detroit, pointed out that two communities in the metropolitan area, Romulus and Wayne, had installed such systems several years ago and that there were pros and cons to such an undertaking.

"Don't forget," he said, "the warning lights will tell you if a track is in use, but they won't tell you the speed of the train or the direction it is moving. You could conceivably plan your route to avoid the train and instead run right into it.

**Bradley** 

"We've been pretty agreeable to solutions. It's just that what might be junk to someone else might be useable to us." Phillips said he felt vindicated by the

six-month adjournment, especially in light of criticism that the blight ordinance was "selectively enforced."

"Bradley wanted the whole case dismissed saying that there was no blight,' Phillips said. "We said we were willing to let the judge decide that. The decision from the judge is that he would not dismiss the case and told Bradley that he had some cleaning up to do."

Phillips said that he would go back and inspect the Bradleys' property before the six-week extension is over.



## **Township to apply** for new hall funding

#### By PAT TOUHEY

City and township requirements, like clothes, go in and out of fashion. Since congress overrode President Ford's veto and appropriated funds under the Public Works Act of 1976, new municipal government buildings have become very popular. The Plymouth Township Board of Trustees held a special meeting and public hearing Tuesday to discuss proposed plans for a new township hall and fire station

complex In anticipation of applying for federal funds the board commissioned the architectural firm of Cummins and Barnard. Inc. of Ann Arbor to draw up plans and cost estimates

Robert Carrigan, representing the firm, made a presentation to the board detailing site location and estimated expenditures.

The location for the complex is a small triangle of land bordered by Ann Arbor Trail, Powell Road and Beck Road, just south of Hilltop Golf Course.

IN HIS REMARKS to the board Carrigan said that the new buildings were con-

temporary in design. "We planned these structures with an eye on the residential nature of the area; I have no doubt that architecturally we will be good neighbors with both present and future development he stated

One of the unique characteristics of the township hall design, according to Carrigan, is that while the structure would look like a one-story building, it would actually have two above-ground-level floors and a basement

We felt that the issue of aesthetics was best served by keeping the building close to the ground," he said

WHEN CARRIGAN finished explaining the fine points of the plans, he asked if there were questions or comments from the board members or the audience.

Trustee Russell Ash said that as far as he could tell from the drawings, the building looked too modernistic. "It seems to me that the buildings will look square and box-like," he commented. "They appear to be very cold and without character.

Trustee Richard Gornick addressed himself to Ash's comments by pointing out that a number of architectural styles had been considered, but that this one had

been chosen because of cost and practicality

"There are numerous types of design that could have been used," he said, "But most of them would have put the cost quite a bit higher; also there are advantages in regard to fuel usage and lighting in this design

Carrigan also spoke to Ash's objections by saying that the structures had been designed with the goal of "geting the maximum amount of use from the space avail-

A TOWNSHIP resident in the audience asked if there were plans for a police station in the complex.

Norman Dietrich, township planning consultant, who worked with Carrigan in developing the plans, said that there was both building and parking space available in the event that the township got a police department

Carrigan estimated that the complex would cost \$1.5 million.

When the township completes the application and submits the site and building plans, it will be one of an estimated 5,000 small communities in the midwest area competing for funding.

•HB 5463, which passed 85-11, would require an annual audit by an outside auditor (Detroit's own auditing staff now performs this function). It requires the board to hold a public hearing at least 150 days before a proposed rate increase could take effect and a two-thirds vote of the ninemember board to approve a rate increase. giving the suburban members a veto. •HB 5465, which passed 86-9, creates a

new nine-member water board. The mayor of Detroit would have five appointments, and an "assembly" of customers would appoint four. The assembly would be made up of all cities, townships and villages that purchase Detroit water. Voting strength would be one vote per 10,000 population.



HOW GOV. William Milliken will react is unknown, but his treasury departmentwhich deals closely with local governments-is opposed to one important feature of the bill, the one requiring a twothirds vote to approve a rate increase.

'The provision which requires that any rate increase be approved by two-thirds of the board could create grave difficulties for the department and the city (of Detroit). Under the Revenue Bond Act, the authority to set rates for services furnished by a city department for which bonds have been sold rests with the governing body of the city-in this case, the Common Council of Detroit."

## **Pursell-Pierce** debate issues

#### By LEONARD POGER

Ed Pierce, Democratic candidate for congress, said that his campaign is based on economic justice with everyone getting decent medical care, housing, education, and nuitrition.

His Republican opponent, Carl Pursell, said that he is opposed to increased federal intervention in the lives of individuals and wants more control returned to local governments

Those were the major differences in the 2d Congressional District candidates who debates federal budgets, abortion legislation, aid to education, military spending and their past records before an estimated 40 persons at Schoolcraft Community College's Waterman Center.

The debate of 90 minutes was sponsored by the college's student senate.

PURSELL claimed that Pierce's proposed programs would be too expensive for taxpayers to afford.

But Pierce replied that he supports a pay-as-you-go basis and that his programs aren't as expensive as his opponent claims.

One example of the conflict between the candidates is a proposed national health insurance program which Pierce supports and Pursell opposes.

Pierce, an Ann Arbor family doctor, disputed the \$118 billion cost of a national insurance plan, saving that the increase would be only \$20-30 billion more than what is now being spent.

He added that he has never advocated a budget deficit to support the plan. Pierce said he backs a pay-as-you-go plan that would provide adequate medical care and avoid persons going broke finan-

cially He pointed out that his plan would include cost controls.

In the past 11 years, Blue Shield has raised its rates 252 per cent for hospital fees while Blue Cross has boosted its medical charges 150 per cent.

Pursell said that the health insurance issue "is a good example of where we differ" and said that he opposes federal government interference in our lives.

The candidate, a state senator in his sec ond term, said he prefers a health maintenance program with cost controls operated by private groups, not the government.

The second s

ALTHOUGH the two agreed on most other issues, they offered a contrast on which would be the most effective congressman.

Pursell said that he has a long record of accomplishments and a positive record in the state senate, where he opposed a \$800,000 bond subsidy of Pontiac Stadium and supported more state support of public schools

He also worked for bicycle paths in western Wayne County and new fishing docks in the same region.

He wrote the state's resource recovery act which encourages recycling of solid waste materials.

Pierce, a former Ann Arbor city councilman, opened the Summit Medical Center in that city to provide medical care for low-income persons

On abortion, both oppose a U.S. Constitutional amendment prohibiting abortions.

They also agreed that the federal government should initiate zero-based budgeted to require agencies and departments to justify their existence on a regular basis. One college official asked "Can Detroit be saved?" and what the candidates would

do in congress to help Detroit. "Detroit has to be saved," Pierce said. "We're pooling our misery in one area and many want to build a wall around it and

let it rot. But people must expand their horizons and "if the core of the apple rots, then the tissue is destroyed.

"The problem isn't a black or white one-it's both of ours.

Pursell said he supported constructive programs for Detroit as a senator and added that officials on all governmental levels must back rehabilitation programs for Detroit.

He stressed that monies should be used for improved housing, education, and transportation and not for Pontiac Stadium subsidies and laws allowing gambling in Detroit.

On defense spending, both candidates said they opposed the proposed B-1 bomber and said that priorities should be changed to improve social and human programs.

PIERCE SAID he would cut the defense budget by having our European allies and Japan share more of the military costs of their own defense while Pursell said that foreign aid expenditures should be cut to finance social programs.

Pursell said that the "fat" should be cut out of the Pentagon'sbudget.

During the discussion on priorities and responsible spending. Pursell criticized Pierce for advocating expensive programs. Pierce answered that he favors 'budget surpluses when the economy is healthy and deficits when the economy is down. The surpluses should be 'used to reduce budget deficits and "saved for a rainy dav

## **Cop certification: yea** Write-in attempt: nay

It's a lot like the beginning of those dreadful good news-bad news jokes.

12A(C)

The good news is Canton Township is finally sending some 14 of their reserves to the Criminal Justice Institute for certified police training so they'll be trained for the full spectrum of police procedure.

Police certification is something the Observer has pleaded for in the past.

The bad news of the week is that the Greenstein team has decided to attempt to run a sticker write-in campaign comprised of the four people on the slate who were defeated in the primary election.

We applaud the former and deplore the latter.

Supervisor-Police Chief Robert Greenstein is in the unique position of being a police chief who is going to school to become a cop. Greenstein continually claims the police reserve controversy is a paper tiger manufactured by his political foes to drive him out of office.

We disagree. In fact, one of the few encouraging things to come out of the police hassle is that the people of Canton want to take an active voice in shaping a fledgling police department. Enough people made enough noise that Greenstein finally enrolled many of the police reserves in a federally-funded police training course.

At the end of the seven week class, Canton will have adequately-trained policemen who can supervise the reserve officers of the department by riding in the same cars.

One of the unanswered questions is what Greenstein's future role in the police department will be. It is unlikely, that either Harold Stein or Peter Bundarin would keep Greenstein on as police chief. But this week Greenstein says Stein or Bundarin will not have to make that decision because he will be re-elected on his write-in attempt and he will remain as police chief. Recognizing the "possibility" of defeat in the race for supervisor, Greenstein says Stein or Bundarin would have to fire him to remove him from the post of police chief.

It strikes us that his remarks show a consistent disregard for cooperation from Greenstein. Canton's political front has been marked by crippling dissension and division. We can only see this atmosphere being inflamed by the announcement that four people who were defeated in the primary will muddy the political waters with a write-in.

The League of Women Voters has a policy that allows only certified candidates whose names appear on the ballot to speak at LWV Meet the Candidate programs. This policy will apply to the Oct. 20 debate at 7:30 p.m. in Miller Elementary School in Canton.

This newspaper has sent questionnaires to all the candidates-certified and write-in alike-to help the voters decide which candidates reflect their philosophy of local goverment. But the fact that we will recognize the existence of the writein camp and report their positions on the issues does not mean that we endorsed the write-in attempt, despite the fact that we endorsed Greenstein in his primary bid.

Granted, the write-in process is an important guarantee and privilege of the American election system. Greenstein's argument that a 35 per cent voter turnout in the primary did not constitute a true representation of the voter's wishes smacks of sour grapes. In the primary, we believe that the voters of Canton spoke very clearly and the message was that they were not pleased with the Greenstein administration.

## Why our paper got back its old-fashioned name

#### What's in a name?

If you're a newspaper and your name has been Observer & Eccentric, that's not an easy question

In the case of this paper, the Observer & Eccentric name came about as a result of a merger back in 1974 between Observer Newspapers and a company which published the Eccentric Newspapers.

After my colleague, Hank Hogan, and I got through working out the details of the merger agreement, we were faced with the very real prob-

marketing package. We want to be simple, local. old-fashioned.

Tell your high school son or daughter to study the nasty campaign being waged by the beer and pop industries to defeat proposal A on the Nov. 2 ballot. Most students study propaganda measures in one literature course or another, and the group fighting the proposal to ban throwaway containers is using every classic propaganda trick in the book.

The group calls itself Committee Against Forced Deposits, which sounds like a civic group in the American tradition. In truth, the businesses who make money on the bottles and cans which end up as litter on our roadsides are putting up \$750,000 for the effort.

One classic propaganda trick is to ignore the law. The litter lobby did this by printing up a miltion yellow tags to stick on beer and pop containers. The state, however, has forbidden political advertising where alcoholic beverages are sold.

THE NASTY yellow tags say you pay "a big tax" on a six-pack of beer. How much is big? That's what is known in propaganda circles as a glittering generality

The second sentence carefully slides in the word "deposit." The trick is to get you to think of tax and deposit as somewhat the same thing.

They're not the same thing, of course. You pay a tax and never see the money again. When you pay a deposit, however, you get your money back. Because tax is a word that angers most folks, the litter lobby tries to confuse casual readers by equating deposit with tax. That's guilt by association.

Dirty, huh? But there's much more.


THE STICKER says, "Don't let them slap you . . . " That word "them" was selected very carefully by the advertising agency, Anthony M. Franco. Inc., to conjure ugly images in your mind of some kind of enemy. It's a demagogic technique to get you to hate some vague, sinister power trying to do evil to you.

In truth, "them" is led by the Michigan United Conservation Clubs aided by a long list stellar organizations-League of Women Voters, Federated Garden Clubs, environmental groups and the like.

And how do you like that verb "slap"? "Don't let them slap you." Rank, raw, reeking propaganda

LOADED WORDS, glittering generalities, guilt by association. The list of propaganda tricks is imposing, for a sticker that measures only four by five inches.

There are other tricks-zany statistics that equate a gum wrapper with a shattered bottle, whoppers about how prices will soar, and on and



The litter lobby printed a million of these to plaster on pop and beer cartons.

Now, there are those who might suggest we're indulging in a little propaganda ourself by labelling this group the litter lobby, and there's an element of truth to the observation.

But go into any shopping center parking lot, look along any roadside, examine any picnic site and ask yourself: "What should we call this group that's making money from selling throwaway bottles and cans? Are they really a Committee Against Forced Deposits? Or are they really a litter lobby?

We say they're the litter lobby, we say they're indulging in propaganda, and we hope Michigan voters will pass proposal A on Nov. 2 and ban throwaways from our environment.

lem of deciding what to call the resulting newspapers.

We talked with the people who at that time who were our resident marketing geniuses, and in the firmest possible terms they said, "We don't care what you call the papers, but you must call them by the same name regardless of where they are circulated. Otherwise, you'll lose any broad marketing advantage.

WELL, we thought about that for a while. The "Eccentric Observer" came quickly to mind, but we turned it down for the same reasons that we rejected the "Observant Eccentric.

Then we couldn't come to agreement on whether it ought to be the "Eccentric & Observer" or the "Observer & Eccentric.

Since it really was immaterial which version we picked (although there was a view that "Eccentric & Observer" would wind up as "Eccentric Observer" in the public mind, especially after a particularly surly editorial) we decided on a highly scientific method of advanced managerial problem-solving.

We flipped a coin.

The result was "Observer & Eccentric."

#### UNTIL NOW.

As you may have noticed, effective with this past Monday's edition, we have gone back to the simple, old fashioned, single-barreled name for our newspaper.

Why?

Simple. We are in business to publish local papers, relevant to the needs of people in each individual community we serve. We are not in business to produce newspapers as a broad, general

Hence, we decided to go back to the old name for our paper, which is what people in town have been calling it anyway ever since the merger.

We think it'll be easier for everybody. After all. who wants to use all 12 syllables in "Birmingham-Bloomfield Observer & Eccentric"?

WHILE I'm at it, you might be interested in knowing the origin of the "Eccentric" part of our newspapers, which (so far as I know) is a unique name in American journalism

The Eccentric was first published in May. 1878. by two distinguished citizens of Birmingham. Almeron Whitehead and George H. Mitchell Like Hank Hogan and myself after our merger, they could not decide what to call their new newspaper

As it turned out, both men were members of a bachelor's club in Birmingham modeled after the famous club in Jules Verne's novel. 80 Days Around The World. That club was called "The Eccentrics Club." and they decided to name their newspaper after their club.

The paper was renamed "The Birmingham Eccentric" one year later and remained with that name until 1970, when U.S. Postal Service regulations forced a return to "The Eccentric.

As a name for a newspaper. "The Observer" is more common but, in Michigan at least, of older heritage. The first newspaper published in Michigan was put out by Father Gabriel Richard. The first edition came off the press in Detroit on Thursday, August 31, 1809. It was called "Michigan Essay: Or. The Impartial Observer.

So, whether it's Eccentric or Observer, our history is long and our task clear: to publish the best local newspapers we can. And we expect to be doing that for a long time to come.

IT IS NOT EASY to identify what a national Democrat or Republican really stands for, except in vague terms such as being for the common. man or espousing "government that governs least, governs best" (a Republican slogan coined by Democrat Thomas Jefferson).

If you live in New England, it's easy to tell the players. If you are a white Anglo-Saxon Protestant, you are surely a Republican. If you are an Irish Catholic, regardless of your position in life you are probably a Democrat.

If you live in the south and are part of the establishment, you are most likely a Democrat. The common man in the south most likely votes Republican.

These two regions offer the most confusion because the conservatives are Democrats in the South and Republicans in New England.

MICHIGAN IS pretty well divided between what your role in business happens to be, since organized labor took over the Democratic Party as an experiment in politics. The Michigan Legislature. while controlled by the Democratic Party, is mostly non-partisan except in labor or election legislation.

The United States has been blessed with a twoparty system. Blessed, not because of political philøsophy, but because we are not plagued with many small splinter political groups that force coalitions in other nations. One party or the other controls the various houses of legislative bodies and the executive branch.

But isn't it time for a country such as ours to shuck off political party names that really don't mean anything any more and reform the political process with groups based on political philosophy instead of how one's father voted?

Shouldn't we have a Labor Party, or a Conservative Party and a Liberal Party, so that when a person runs for national office, the voters understand what he or she will be voting for when the lawmaker arrives in Washington.

This would be a great undertaking, and certainly those controlling the existing parties would fight it. But it certainly would make voting easier for everyone.



I make provisions for the hyperkinetic children in my class. I try to plan enriching activities for the gifted. I make special games for the perceptually handicapped; I meet with parents and counsel them as would a social worker; I work on committees to improve our curriculum; I take graduate classes to improve my teaching. I do all this very willingly- without complaint, even gladly.

All I ask is that I get the respect I deserve. I don't appreciate being forced into acting like the guy on the assembly line at Ford. Let him walk the picket line-I want

to beg for a living wage? Am I supposed to eat and pay rent on my professionalism? Do I have to go against all that I believe in so that I can make at least as much as the custodians in this system? Yes. I am very tired tonight, but I'm also angered and sickened by your statements. I'd like you to compare the tone of your editorial to the article about the picketers



for the UAW. Just where do your priorities lie? You will gladly pay the extra \$400-\$600 for a new Ford this year, but the teachers of your children don't deserve even that much

My only hope is that your opinion does not represent the majority of Plymouthites. Doesn't anybody care about me and my fellow teachers? Can everyone really expect so much of me, but be so unwilling to support my efforts?



closed his and his wife's financial records for the past five years.

Pursell, in the senate for six years, and his wife, a Livonia school teacher, earned \$37,054 last year, of which all but \$800 was from their salaries

Pursell also disclosed that he and his wife have paid about 21 per cent of their income for federal, state, and local taxes. He also supplied copies of his Internal Revenue Service returns for the past five

years. Pursell said that most of his personal worth is tied up in his Plymouth home and six acres of land, estimated at about \$120,000.

There is an outstanding mortgage of \$50,000 on the house and property, he said.

PURSELL SAID he supplied his financial summary to Common Cause, a public interest group, and assumed that it would make the information available to the public because it had his permission to release the financial record.

But the senator said there was an apparent misunderstanding because Common Cause didn't release the information.

"My finances have always been a matter of public record and I have no hesitancy in having them studied by the media or any interested party," Pursell said.

"I have also included my wife's salary in this report. While her salary as a school teacher is an open record, she has developed that career herself and I can't see any logical connection between that and my campaign for congress.

"However, to prevent any illogical suggestion that I'm not willing to make a full disclosure. Peggy has agreed to allow her financial data to be included in my report.

### **Percy plans** campaign stop for Pursell

State Sen. Carl Pursell, Republican candidate for congress, will receive a campaign boost from U.S. Sen. Charles Percy (R-Illinois) this afternoon.



## Camp Fire Girls repay community for PCF aid

Crouched over a wooden workbench beneath an overhead light, Plymouth resident Mark Norfleet carefully applies varnish to a violin.

Selecting a tool from a box of gouges, he carefully forms the graceful curves of violin's scrolls or carefully curves the thin ribs of a would-be instrument around a molding form.

At 20, Mark is beginning a career seldom considered nowadays as a lifelong trade— a career in the tradition of the old Italian violinmaker.

"I like making things like this," said the 1974 graduate of Plymouth Salem High, as he proudly stroked the smooth varnish of one of his creations. "You sometimes end up working 12 to 14 hours a day, but as long as you enjoy it, that's fine."

A former student at the International School of Violinmaking in Cremona, Italy, the city where Antonio Stradivari and other masters perfected the violinmaking art, Norfleet recently returned to his hometown to establish a basement workshop in his parents' home on William.

There, Norfleet hopes to establish a reputation as a violinmaker and, hopefully, launch a career creating and repairing the stringed instrument.

"I CAN COME down here and do exactly what I want— make something that sounds and looks like a good violin," explained Norfleet, a stringed bass player with the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra. "I'm just going to continue making instruments, build up a reputation and try to make a living."

Although all of Norfleet's income so far has come from repair work on members of the stringed instrument family, he has created four violins and a viola de gamba— the Renaissance predecessor of the modern instrument.

Two of the instruments, created under the auspices of the Italian school, became

property of the institution upon completion. A third violin, Norfleet recalled, crashed to the school's courtyard from a clothesline, where it was hung to dry.

"It really didn't bother me that much," confessed Norfleet, writing off the broken violin as an accident. "It wasn't all that bad, but it wasn't fantastic either."

He has higher ambitions for the violin and viola de gamba created in his basement workshop which he hopes will some day be purchased.

"This, I just felt like making," said Norfleet, as he plucked the thick-ribbed viola de gamba from a clothesline in his basement. "It's played like a cello, and it really intrigued me. There's still some demand for it for Renaissance music."

**HE BEGINS** the three-week task of creating a violin by bending the thin ribs or sides of the would-be instrument with heat and gluing them to removable blocks, attached to a molded form of the instrument.

The neck and scroll of the instrument are hand-carved from a large block of wood, while the front and back are gouged and shaped from thick sheets of willow, maple or spruce. The instrument is carefully glued together, and the purfling (a delicate, wooden outline along the edges of the instrument) is inlaid.

The instrument is varnished, and the finishing hardware— strings, chinrest, pegs and bridge— are attached.

Then comes the exciting part— testing the instrument's sound.

"I play them a little after they're finished," said Norfleet, who admits his ability on the violin is limited to such tunes as "Mary Had a Little Lamb." "I try to see what they sound like until I can get a friend who plays.

"The arching and thickness of the wood determines sound and quality of tone. So does the varnish, grain and type of wood that's used."

NORFLEET ADMITTED violinmaking is more difficult than it sounds.

"Some people find it incredibly difficult. "Some people at the school couldn't visualize a scroll coming out of that block of wood."

Norfleet said many of the new violins sold today are mass produced on an assembly line.

"It started out with one person making all the scrolls and another making all the ribs. In Europe and Japan, many of the instruments are made on machines."

"It's picking up now, though," added Norfleet, referring to the art of handcrafting violins. "Most of the makers are young, just starting out or quite a bit older. There's really no one in between."

The son of Ronald and Carol Norfleet, he first became interested in violin making and repair, when he attended the Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp near Muskegon as a string bass player six years ago.

His teacher at the camp. Norfleet recalled, repaired instruments and captured his interest. That interest culminated in a 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-year apprenticeship at a violin repair shop in Ann Arbor, where he first became interested in violinmaking.

"I JUST LIKED being able to repair them," he said. "Most people can't do much with their instruments besides putting on a string."

Norfleet's interest in violinmaking snowballed, taking him to Italy and, finally, to his own violin workshop in a basement on William.

Someday, Norfleet hopes to create cellos and his own instrument, the string bass. Estimating the price of wood for a bass at \$600 to \$800, he admitted that day may be a long way off.

In the meantime, repairing instruments and creating the smaller members of the stringed instrument family should adequately fill his time.

"I just like doing making instruments." Norfleet summed up.

Judy Clement, Nancy Houser and Margaret Hanna talked themselves out of their jobs.

They informed their Camp Fire Girls last spring that, from now on, having passed from Adventure to Discovery Level, they would plan their own meetings and activities.

"We told them we leaders would be available to advise, chauffeur or chaperone," said Mrs Clement. "But the responsibility for conducting meetings passes to them. This is the way Camp Fire programs are designed throughout the country."

But the leaders were not prepared for the girls' first order of business: They pooled their money for corsages and treated the three to a pizza dinner. Cheryl Hauser, 12, explained, "We just

wanted to let them know how great we think they are."

THE SENTIMENT IS MUTUAL. Mrs. Clement organized her beginning level Bluebird group seven years ago when her daughter Teri was in first grade. Mrs. Houser and Mrs. Hanna have been assistants for several years.

Camp Fire Girls share many of the same ideals and objectives as the Girl scouts, but tend to have smaller groups (or troops) of about eight to 12 members. The same leaders usually stay with the troup from year to year.

While scouts earn badges, Camp Fire Girls earn beads—different colors for creative arts, science, business skills, homemaking, citizenship, camping and service to others.

The brightly colored patches on their vests signify council-wide activities in which they have been involved

THE PLYMOUTH COMMUNITY Fund supports area Camp Fire Girls and supplements dollars the girls earn yearly by selling candy for the Detroit area Counci. Contributins to the PFC can be mailed to Box 356, Plymouth. Local residents are reminded to designate their gift be returned to Plymouth if they give through an employer outside the city.

The PFC's investment to the Camp Fire Girls is returned many times over in their services to the community.

Mrs. Clement's group, for example, has assembled multi-media kits for the Red Cross, assisted at the Elk's Christmas bazaar, made tray favors for the residents of area nursing homes, and conducted about 22 second grade Bluebirds on their first camping trip.

The group led by Carilyn Fernandez "adopted" a grandmother, Miss Nancy Arbuckle, who resides in the Allen Dee Nursing Home in Wayne. They have made gifts for her. held birthday parties in her honor, and brought her to meetings and other special events.

"EACH OF THE GIRLS writes to her every day," said Mrs. Fernandez. "They feel very close to her. They wanted to take her on a camping trip but she is in her 90s and the doctor would not permit it."

Camping remains a favorite part of the Camp Fire program. The Detroit Area Council, of which Plymouth is a member, owns Camp Withana with facilities ranging from fully equipped cabins to primitive shelters.

"I took four Bluebirds camping the first year," said Mrs. Clement. "We stayed in the cabins with stoves and refrigerators, lights, heat and flushing toilets.

"Then each year, we'd rough it a little more. We'd stay in the unheated cabins; then we'd eliminate kitchen facilities and cook all our meals outdoors. Then we moved up the trail where there is only a bare shelter and a biffy...."

A biffy? "Every Camp Fire Girl knows what it is. It's a Bathroom In The Forest For You!"

This year the discovery group will begin tent camping. They plan a series of weekend trips each year, in all seasons. One year they took advantage of an unexpected snowfall by tobogganing all afternoon on plastic garbage bags.

## Music Hall to feature Grappelli's jazz Oct. 14

Carnegie Hall, "Ratso's" nightclub in Chicago and the UCLA campus have had little in common until this year when they were bound together as three of the stops made by legendary jazz violinist Stepane Grappelli, who at 68 is, surprisingly, making his first coast-to-coast tour of America.

Detroit area residents will have a oneconcert-only chance to "discover" this white-haired Parisian phenomenon when he and the Diz Disley Trio bring their show to the Music Hall-at 8:30 p.m. Oct.

"Legendary" isn't used lightly here since Grappelli's international fame goes back to the early '30s in Paris when he and that irascible gypsy hippie, guitarist Django Reinhardt, formed the original. Quintet of the Hot Club ("le jazz 'ot" in the now illegal "Franglais").

That was more than 40 years ago and yet, last year, Grappelli was invited to go on tour with the very up-to-date The Grateful Dead. In a like manner, his recording collaborators have ranged from the classical Yehudí Menuhin to the acid rock Pink Floyd show.

HIS RECORDINGS also include his rock version of "Peter and the Wolf," as well as a huge legacy of recordings for the jazz buff.

In his Music Hall show, Grappelli will use mostly old jazz standards such as "Tea for Two." "Limehouse Blues" and "Sweet Georgia Brown" as the basis for his improvisations, but he will also sprinkle the evening with current hits such as "Killing Me Softly with His Song."

Further coloring the program will be solos by his accompanying guitarists, England's Diz Disley and Burma-born Ike Issacs, and even an unusual treatment of "Satin Doll" by 22-year-old Chicagoan, Brian Torff, on his (non-electric) double bass.

For jazz insiders, there are several hidden tributes in the program. Grappelli al-

He is a legend, a virtuoso and the new sensation of 1976 America.





"If we play a super game, we have a chance to beat them (Harrison), "Schuele said. "But we've got to get rid of the 105 yards in penalties we committeed against Mott


When anyone talks about the success Harrison has had so far this year, the name Mike Bowden pops into the conversa-
