Judge rebuffs Poole in his recount try

Unsuccessful trustee candidate James Poole has already announced plans to appeal last Thursday's circuit court ruling denying his request for a recount of the Canton Township absentee ballot precinct.

Poole, an incumbent Republican, lost the Nov. 2 race for one of two trustee seats to Eugene Daley by only 11 votes, according to the certified totals. In a motion for a writ of mandamus, Poole's attorney argued that the heavy volume of hand-checked absentee ballots posed a greater chance for pollworker error.

Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Joseph B. Sullivan denied Poole's request Thursday morning after hearing the arguments posed by Poole's counsel, Peter Bundarin (another un-

successful Republican candidate) and William McIntyre, assistant corporation counsel for Wayne County representing the county board of canvassers.

"I honestly don't even care about winning the election," Poole said Thursday, "but I'll follow this thing up to the state supreme court if necessary for reasons of principle."

There were two major points of contention argued between Bundarin and McIntyre during Thursday's court proceedings. The first point concerned statutory requirements regarding "recountability." The second centered around the fact that 15 pollworkers in precinct 10, the absentee ballot precinct, did not use paper ballots when they themselves voted on the machines used in Precinct 10 to tabulate the totals of the paper ballots.

McINTYRE ARGUED the board of canvassers was correct in denying a recount in Precinct 10 because the recount statute, in his opinion, requires that two tests of the three-part criteria must be met before any precinct can be recounted. Canton's precinct 10 only met one part of the three-part criteria.

The statute states: 1. The ballot box or canister should be sealed with the seal of record affixed election night. This was done. 2. Ballot bags inside the sealed vote canister should also be sealed. (This was not done because, according to Clerk John Flodin, there were more ballots than there was room, and the ballots and bags had to be crammed inside sealed canisters.) 3. The number of voters on the poll book should match the number of absentee ballots. (Because of

the 15 non-paper votes cast by pollworkers, the number of ballots didn't match the poll book in Precinct 10.)

Bundarin argued that the reason for 15 non-paper ballots recorded on the machines in precinct 10 has already been explained. He also claimed that the three-part "recountability" criteria did not apply to absentee ballot precincts such as precinct 10. Bundarin said the criteria section is in the statute only to guard against recounting tampered ballots.

"There was never any question about the integrity or safekeeping of these ballots," Bundarin said.

MEMBERS OF THE BOARD of Canvassers previously stated that there would be no way to recount or reconstruct the vote in Precinct 10 because there would be no way to tell

how the 15 pollworkers voted—which could turn out to be crucial in a race separated by only 11 votes.

But, in court, Bundarin suggested three ways to recount the absentee precinct.

One way, he explained, would be to count just the 1,308 paper absentee ballots and ignore the 15 "improper" votes cast on the machines by pollworkers. A second remedy, according to Bundarin, would be to ask pollworkers if they'd volunteer to vote again and sign under oath that the vote they're re-casting is identical to the vote they cast election day.

The third alternative suggested by Bundarin would be to count all the paper ballots and then add 15 votes to the runner-up's total. If the 15 votes still wouldn't affect Poole's outcome, the issue would be resolved, Bundarin

said. If the 15 votes added on to Poole's paper ballot totals would put him above Daley, then Bundarin suggests that the court schedule a new township election.

Bundarin quoted a 1868 case (Gordon v. Edward Cicott) where the state supreme court judge ruled that voters could waive the right to vote in secrecy and testify in court as to how they voted.

IN HIS SUMMARY judgment denial, Judge Sullivan said the 1868 decision may not be applicable because it came at a time when people were often rewarded for announcing how they voted.

"Sitting at the polls were barrels of rum and a voter could call out who he was voting for and then help himself (Continued on page 4A)

Petition drive seeks to slow building boom

Petitions are already being circulated in Canton Township by a newly-formed group of subdivision dwellers who call themselves "Citizens for Growth Control" and feel that a slowdown in home development is overdue.

Their petition cites "ever-increasing taxes in the community" and calls for "a moratorium of the issuance of family residence building permits" until the board can come up with a satisfactory growth control ordinance.

Spokesperson for the new group is Sue Koch, of 326 Charterhouse Court, in Canton's Brookside Village subdivision.

In addition to circulating petitions, Mrs. Koch is inviting residents to attend a meeting on growth control at the Canton High School cafeteria at 7:30 p.m. Jan. 20.

Mrs. Koch told reporters at a press conference Friday that she decided to start the loose-knit citizen's group when "it looked like nobody else would take the initiative" to demand limits to Canton's burgeoning building rate.

"Some of my neighbors said it was already too late, that we're in the middle of the mess right now," Mrs. Koch said.

"I TALKED to some of the women in this neighborhood, and they're apathetic even though they agree that Canton's growing too fast to support with tax hikes. I didn't agree with their attitude, and I did something."

"It's a cause, if that's the word, and I think it's important enough to fight for. I don't want to hear excuses that growth control is an impossible proposition. All it takes is enough people to work for it and we could be a trendsetter in this area. Other communities could look to us as an example."

Mrs. Koch was a campaign worker in Peter Bundarin's unsuccessful bid for supervisor. But she maintains that people who voted for Supervisor Harold Stein and former supervisor Robert Greenstein have expressed support for her fledgling organization.

"We really have no political affiliation," said Mrs. Koch. "It's friends and neighbors who love it here and don't want to be taxed out of our houses."

School taxes increased an average

of \$200 in 1977 in the neighborhood, Mrs. Koch said.

"Let's control the amount of schools we have to build through our growth ordinance, so we don't end up closing schools like Westland, Livonia and Garden City are doing right now," she said. "Let's not overwhelm the community. That's all we're asking."

Recently John M. Hoben, superintendent of the Plymouth Community School District announced that the school board would need to build at least seven new schools in the Plymouth Township-Canton Township area in the next five years to accommodate new children moving into the area. Mrs. Koch noted that right now Canton has 9,000 lots waiting to be built on and recommends that the township board explore means of restricting building permits.

Her petition suggests that Canton should only issue 500 building permits per year, but Mrs. Koch said Friday that figure is arbitrary.

CANTON BUILDING officials "an-

nounced Dec. 23 that the township had issued 984 permits to that date in 1976—a new record.

"Cut it in half," said Mrs. Koch. "I've heard predictions that Canton may issue 2,000 building permits in 1977. They've hired two new building inspectors. If we can get a growth control ordinance maybe (Chief Building Inspector) Charlie Thompson won't have to work so hard."

Mrs. Koch said she would like to see light, clean industry welcomed and encouraged to settle in Canton to improve its tax base. That development must be spread throughout the township, she said, because the southern business corridor along Michigan Ave. would benefit the Wayne-Westland schools "and do nothing for 90 per cent of the new people who are moving into the Plymouth Community School District."

Another person voicing concern over Canton's growth is Hoben, the superintendent of Plymouth schools. But he said Friday that while he supports

Mrs. Koch's crusade he isn't as optimistic. The prospect of developers taking the township to court to test growth control limitations worries him, he said.

TOM YACK, a member of the school board and a Canton resident, said he also supports Mrs. Koch's idea, and thinks the Canton Township board could use some citizen prodding to investigate growth control alternatives.

Yack called a recent meeting between the township board and the school board "essentially fruitless."

"I pushed for the meeting," Yack said. "(Supervisor) Stein is spending a great deal of time looking at police and land use planning. I think one of his study groups should talk about growth control."

"We gave the Canton board members all the gory statistics about the projected growth rate. I'm looking for some action by them to investigate alternatives available to them to slow

Icy walks peril mail carriers

The abundance of snow dumped recently on the Plymouth-Canton area is a concern to many persons, but none more than John A. Mulligan. Serving as Plymouth's postmaster since 1965, Mulligan says the white stuff has replaced biting dogs as the mail carrier's anathema.

Dogs can be stifled by mace, but chemists have yet to invent a substance to conquer snow, sleet and icy pavement. And the postal office isn't receiving much cooperation from area residents.

"Everytime it snows I worry about the safety of my employees," Mulligan said. "The list of injuries is climbing each year and it frightens me."

The Penniman St. office is responsible for delivering mail to Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Canton. About 17 of Mulligan's 42 routes are done afoot—where most injuries occur. Climbing snow- and ice-covered porch steps account for a number of falls.

OTHER DANGERS carriers face include attempting to scale old, long narrow porches; trying to tightrope between parked cars and snow embankments; and walking around corners.

So far this year, five injuries have been reported, ranging from muscle pulls to knee sprains. Last year was one of the worst ever when 10 injuries were reported in a five-week period. (Two a month is considered normal). Head bumps, elbow lacerations, hip bruises, thumb sprains and back problems were among the injuries reported last year.

"When one of our workers takes a fall and gets hurt, the injury is multifold," Mulligan said. "Not only do we have to find a replacement and pay for missed time, but the injured person sometimes never fully recuperates."

"Sore shoulders, bum knees and muscle pulls are common ailments that people never fully recover from. And when someone returns to work, walking all day with a mailbag is sure to aggravate it."

The worst incident occurred on Dec. 28, 1974 on Ann St. in Plymouth, when a 26-year-old carrier from Ann Arbor slipped and fell on snow covered steps after delivering a package.

THE POSTMAN was knocked unconscious and rushed to the hospital where he was treated for torn tendons in the right shoulder, a head bump and lower back injuries.

The mailman was unable to return to work for a full year and was later deemed permanently disabled for a desk job. He is presently collecting retirement disability compensation.

One remedy to the situation would be to crack down on homeowners who fail to have their walks cleared, Mulligan suggested. Only the city of Plymouth has a written ordinance requiring sidewalks be shoveled within 24 hours of a snowfall. In Plymouth Township and Canton, the chore is often neglected.

"The post office's only recourse is to stop delivery," Mulligan said. "If a homeowner refuses to shovel his sidewalk, we'll hold the mail for them to come pick up."

Mulligan's worries aren't confined to walking routes, because a majority of his workers drive trucks. "A heavy snowfall gives our drivers fits," the postmaster said. "The trucks are light and have a tough time getting through snow. And when snowplows bury roadside mailboxes, the job is nearly impossible."

"OUR REGULATIONS don't allow drivers to leave their trucks. Many customers are outraged by this, but we have little choice. For safety's sake, we don't want our carriers mounting and dismounting slippery truck steps and our budget can't afford the time. We only allot one minute per box and getting in and out of the truck would slow things tremendously."

Mulligan credited a light, dry snow for the success the post office enjoyed during the recent storm that dumped seven inches of snow on the Plymouth-Canton area.

The post office managed to deliver 80-90 per cent of its mail the day of the storm. One worker, Avery Penney of Plymouth, delivered mail to every customer on his route.

"I saw the condition of Avery's route and there's no way he could have got to everyone without getting out of the truck," Mulligan said. "He had the desire to deliver all his mail—some even at his own risk. I think that's quite a tribute to him."

Of all the adverse conditions, ice worries Mulligan most. Thursday night's forecast for freezing rain gave me a scare," he said. "Ice accounts for more slips and falls than anything else."

THE GOVERNMENT provided safety equipment for postal workers' boots a while ago, but the effort proved futile. Workers snapped the metal slugs to the bottom of their shoes, but

they did little to solve the problem.

Postal carriers have been informed by their national association that they can file independent lawsuits against property owners. But Mulligan said none have been initiated by his staff during his 12-year tenure as postmaster.

Nevertheless, falls remain a serious problem for carriers. Mulligan has a file cabinet stuffed with accident reports, which don't include the many

slips that go unreported and unnoticed.

Canton carrier Jim Sullivan of Milford said he suffered seven falls last winter and two already this year. Although they were minor, all could have been serious, he said.

Mulligan said that every winter he gets a few transfer requests for Phoenix or Miami. He doesn't dare honor them however, for fear his whole crew will migrate south to avoid Plymouth and Canton walks.

Canton's cops lose schooling request

The new Canton Police Officers Association (CPOA) won a procedural nicety Monday night but lost a strategic request which would have increased the number of certified police officers employed by the township.

First, the board voted to officially recognize the existence of the CPOA by a 6-1 vote.

The lone voice of dissent on recognition was Trustee Robert Myers who said recognizing a myriad of groups isn't a function of the Canton board.

"I don't think any organization has the right to come to a township board and ask for official recognition," Myers said. "Recognition comes with deeds."

Myers, who is president of the Michigan Mobile Home Owners Association, said he never asked township board recognition for his organization. He also noted the previous board's denial of the Total Citizen Power organization's request for official recognition.

Carrie Young, was in the audience Monday night and asked Myers why he recognized the ladies' auxiliary bake sale. Myers said a bake sale salute wasn't the same as formally recognizing an organization such as the CPOA.

Before voting to recognize the CPOA, Lynne Goldsmith asked the CPOA's vice-president, Robert van

Lith, if the CPOA would stay non-political in elections.

"You weren't non-political in the last one," she said.

Van Lith replied: "We're interested in being police officers, not politicians. We'll leave that to board members."

THE CPOA ALSO asked board members if they would agree to reserve up to eight spots in the Sept. 31 class at the Criminal Justice Institute for Canton reserve officers who want to improve their training and boost their position to that of a part-time certified police officer.

This request was denied by a 4-3 vote of the board. Voting to deny the schooling were trustees Brian Schwall, Eugene Daley and Lynne Goldsmith and Treasurer Anne Bradley. Voting to send the reserves to CJI were Trustee Myers, Clerk John Flodin and the last person to vote, Supervisor Harold Stein.

Van Lith made a third request of the board Monday night when he asked that the present police study committee include a representative from the CPOA membership. Van Lith noted that all 30 officers in the reserve and certified police officer ranks belong to the CPOA.

Members of the board told van Lith that his third request would be considered by the board at a later date.

Wilcox blasts CORP for secrecy

As a result of an incident at its last meeting, CORP has affirmed its stand on open meetings, regardless of a person's motive for attending.

The incident occurred at last Wednesday's regular monthly meeting of Citizens for Open and Responsible Planning (CORP) held in the home of William McAninch of Sheldon Road in Plymouth.

Jack Wilcox says he was denied attendance at the meeting unless he'd agree to swear to secrecy to CORP activities, and was asked by McAninch to leave when he declined to be gagged.

McAninch said it was a misunderstanding—that he never asked Wilcox to leave but had made an error by asking why Wilcox wanted to attend the meeting.

McAninch was censored by CORP members for his questioning of Wilcox and instructed to write a letter of apology, which he wrote and dropped in the mail Friday morning.

"I didn't ask Wilcox to leave, but I did question his purpose in attending. I was wrong to do that and I'm sorry. My actions were strictly those of an individual and in no way reflect the policies or attitudes of CORP."

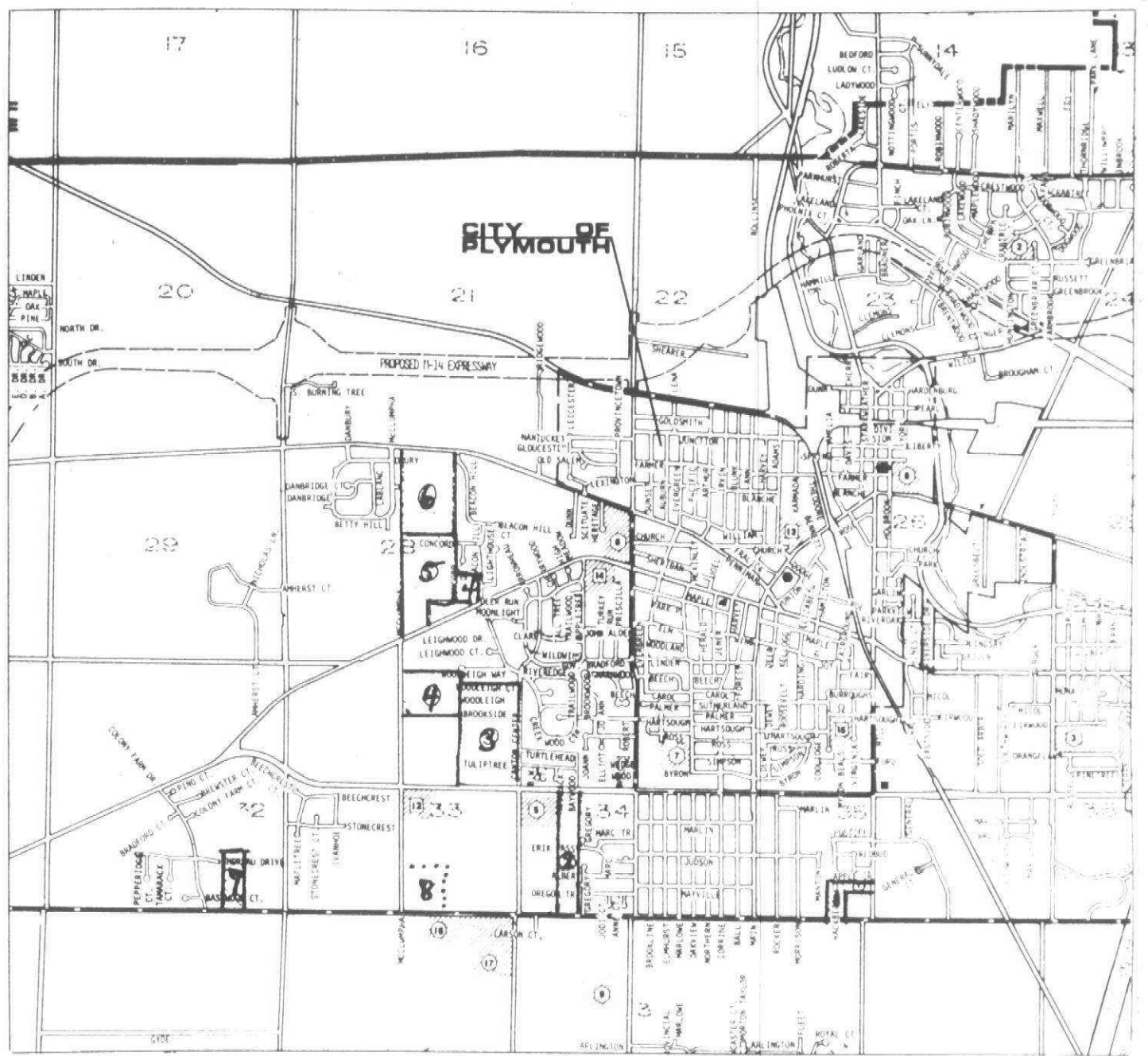
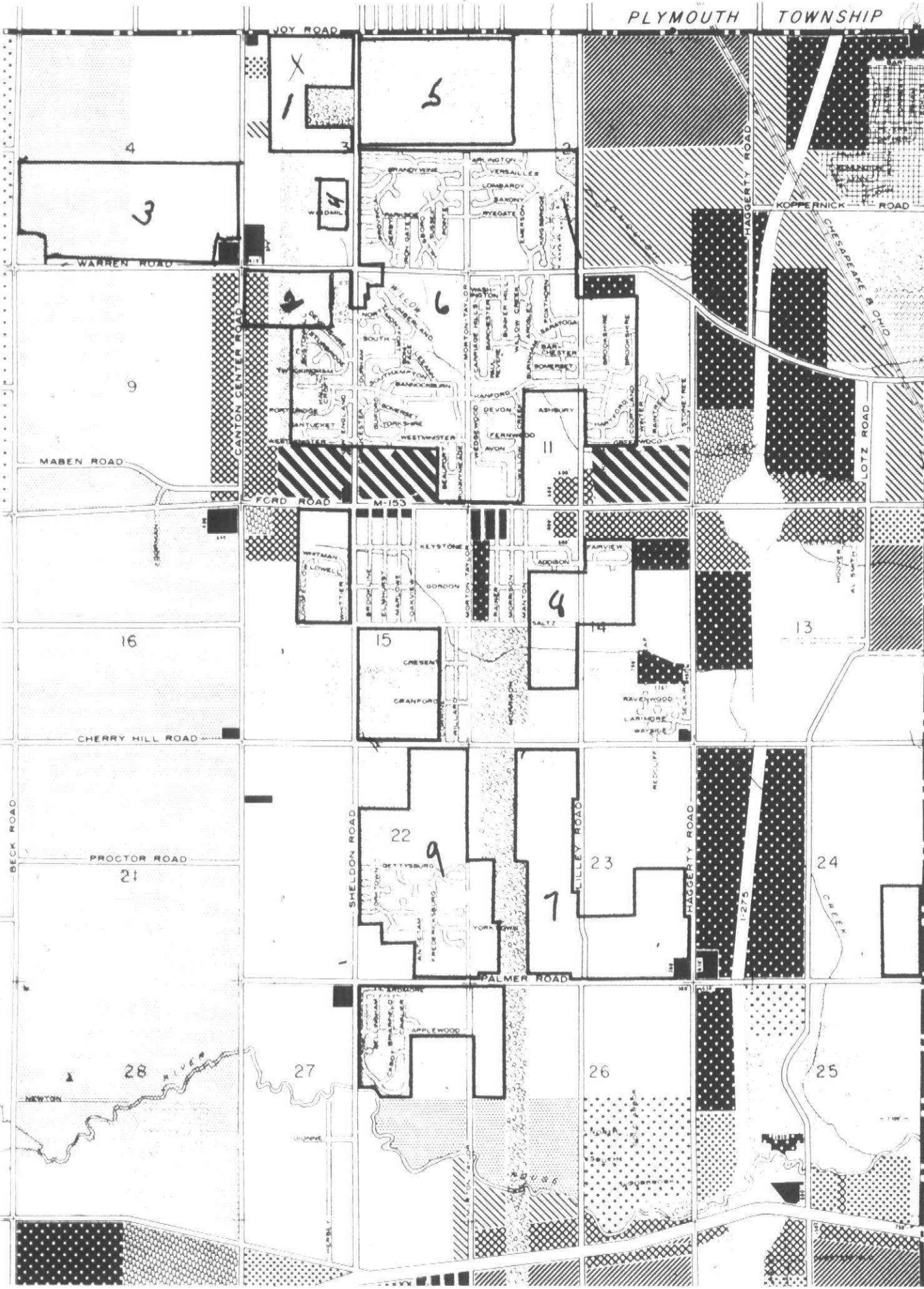

Township officials detail growth seen in 3 years

The population explosion which hit the Plymouth-Canton area some time ago is accelerating at a pace which is expected to pour more than 24,000 persons into the community within the next three years.

That's the opinion of officials in both Plymouth and Canton townships where 12 subdivisions now are in the development stage. These segments contain 5,691 building lots—all for single-family homes. These are subdivisions which have been approved and are in some stage of development.

Along with them there are several other large areas now being eyed by the developers, but no plans have as yet been submitted to the Canton officials.

IN THE SURVEY taken this week, it was found there are more than a half dozen subdivisions in Plymouth Township now in development. They contain 655 single-family home sites.

Just how big the explosion will be can be ascertained by using a Detroit

Edison Co. formula which calls for 3.9 persons per home. This would mean that the 665 new homes in Plymouth Township would generate a population increase of 2,693 persons in the next three years.

The figures are even higher in Canton where the Edison formula shows a potential population increase of 22,194 within the next three years.

Using the formula of planning officials of 0.8 school-age children per home, there will be 572 more school children in Plymouth Township between now and 1980. In Canton the potential increase in students will be 4,553.

If officials are correct in their predictions, there will be a population increase of 24,787 in Plymouth and Canton townships with an increase of 5,125 school-age children.

What will this mean to the school district?

CURRENTLY THE school district averages about 27 pupils in each elementary classroom and 23 classrooms per elementary building.

Using these standards, growth in Plymouth Township will require 21 additional classrooms or the equivalent of one additional school building.

The Canton area will require about 168 additional classrooms or the equivalent of seven new school buildings. If the year-round schedule were used at all new schools in Canton, however, about five new schools would be required.

For Plymouth-Canton, the need would be 189 additional classrooms and eight new schools—or seven new buildings if all were to be on a year-round schedule which increases use of classroom space by one-third.

"THE WAY things are moving," remarks Bud Gould, Plymouth Township developer, "the Plymouth Township subs will be sold out within the next three years. Maybe sooner."

The same opinion was expressed by Tom Notebaert, Plymouth Township supervisor. "I think these subs will be closed out easily in the three years. And the amazing thing is that these homes are selling at a minimum of \$60,000."

Alternatives weighed

\$30 million bond issue called economical plan

A \$30 million bond issue to accommodate an estimated three-year growth of 3,400 students in the Plymouth Community School District appears to be the most efficient solution.

At least that's the opinion of the Plymouth Board of Education after a discussion workshop Tuesday night.

Supt. John M. Hoben conferred with the school board on available options to combat the growth problem. Recent reports estimate 4,100 single-family homes in the school district will be completed by fall 1979, accounting for at least a 3,400 student increase.

Hoben told the board that no alternative outside of a bond issue would eliminate overcrowded schools.

Among the alternatives considered were employing year-round (45-15) schedules, implementing a 7 a.m.-7 p.m. school day at the high schools, adding portable buildings to existing sites, shifting the ninth grade to the middle school level and busing students to other schools with open seats.

The problem with year-round scheduling is it would force the board to spend monies for the installation of air conditioning units and extend teacher contracts for the summer months.

PURPOSE OF the workshop was to discuss a recommended amount for the bond issue. After examining \$15, \$25 or \$30 million bond issue, the board appears to be leaning toward the top dollar figure.

The argument for a \$30 million loan is that the debt retirement millage would only be an additional 1.26 mills, compared to 1.08 mills for a \$25 million bond and 1 mill for a \$15 million bond.

First time approval by voters of a \$30 million bond also would save the school district money on interest and investment rates, says Hoben, which are sure to skyrocket one year from now.

CONVINCED THAT \$30 million would be the best route available, the board suggested committing itself to managing a hard-sell, door-to-door campaign to inform voters of the necessity to pass the bond issue.

The board agreed it is crucial that the bond issue pass on April 23—its first attempt—and not after two or three defeats.

"We can't sit back and expect the bond issue to

pass on the third try," board member Marcia Borowski said. "We're going to have to get out three and four times a week and convince the voters why they should approve it."

"We just can't depend on them reading the newspapers. We have to give it to them first hand."

THE PROPOSED \$30 million bond issue provides for seven new buildings; five elementaries and two middle schools. It also will fund repairs and improvements for every building in the school district.

Two elements working against the board's efforts to get the bond issue passed will be the high taxes homeowners feel they must already pay and the unsettled teachers' contract.

In an attempt to better understand voter opinions, two separate surveys were proposed by the board. Members are interested in gathering data to assist them in future planning.

The board must act quickly, Hoben warned. There are only two weeks left to draft a bond proposal to be added to the April 23 ballot.

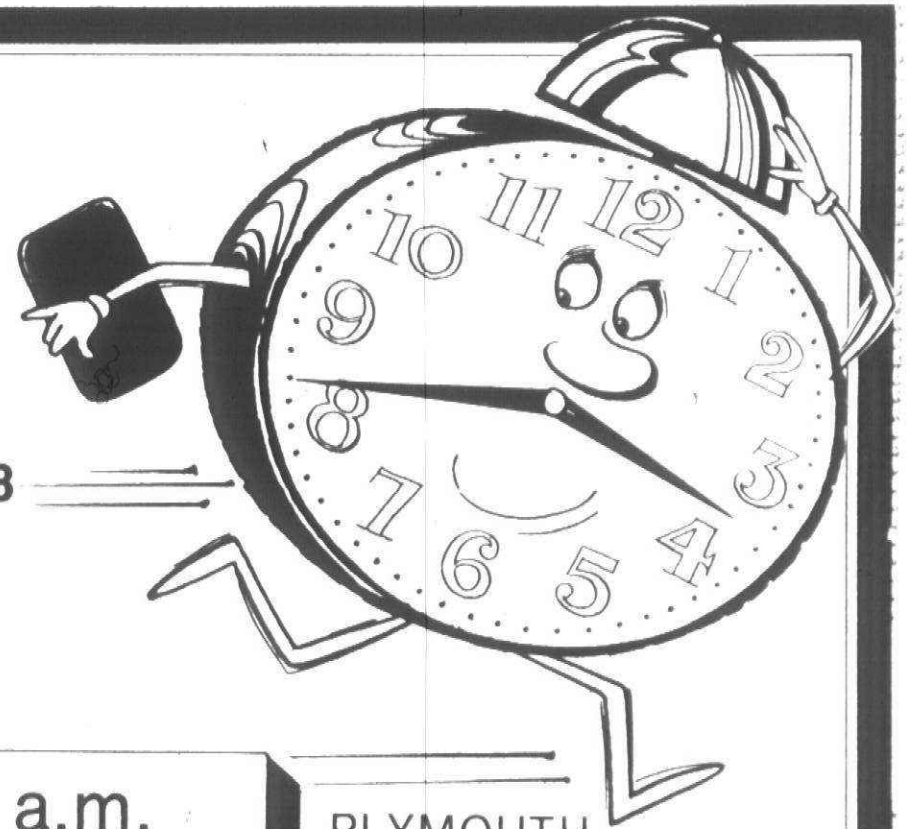

to a swig off a barrel of rum—or be given a cigar if he made the right choice," Sullivan said. "It was a time when it was thought people could declare their vote publicly. I don't think that would be permissible in this day."

During the course of the hearing Sullivan asked McIntyre what the canvassers would have done if the ballot bags had been properly sealed, satis-

fying two of the three-part criteria.

How would the canvassers have ruled then, Sullivan asked, and how would they be able to reconstruct the precinct with 15 untraceable, non-paper ballots complicating matters?

McIntyre explained that the statute was "one of the most poorly written statutes I've ever seen" and said he could not speculate as to what decision the board of canvassers would have made.

However, outside the courtroom McIntyre indicated that because there is no provision in the statute which outlines a procedure for an instance where machine votes are mixed with paper absentee ballots, he believes the canvassers still would have had to deny the recount.

"The board of canvassers can only do what is covered in the election statutes and only if those things are in done in accordance with the statute," McIntyre said.

growth. I'm looking for it, but I don't see it from the Stein administration. I try to work within the system. I figured I'd give them a chance. But I didn't detect any willingness from Harold (Stein) or any of his people on the board to look into growth control."

Harold Stein is attending the Michigan Townships Association in Grand

Rapids with township officials Anne Bradley, John Flodin, Robert Myers and Lynne Goldsmith and could not be reached for comment.

Trustee Brian Schwall, who was at the joint meeting between the schools and Canton, said Yack "misread" the attitude of Canton's board of trustees.

"I support the idea of growth control," Schwall said. "Yes, we have a

problem. I'm very concerned for my own kids and for the township. I'd hate to see us playing Monopoly with the township, where you roll the dice, land on Park Place and build there. But I think Yack's assessment is a little extreme."

Schwall said he thinks the land use study group may enlighten the growth issue through its study of how to retain agricultural land.

Padgett, a computer scheduling supervisor at Ford Motor Co. and a 1976 graduate of Wayne State University with a bachelor's degree in business administration, will replace Flossie Tonda, whose term expired on Dec. 31.

Richard Kirchgatter, 38, of 48377 Gyde, was appointed to fill the unexpired term of former planning commission member Tom Timbario, who resigned. Kirchgatter, a veterinarian at the Parkway Veterinarian Clinic at 5750 N. Canton Center, is a member of the Canton Advisory Committee and former president of the Plymouth

Symphony Society. His term on the planning commission expires Dec. 31, 1978.

With the new appointments, just two members of the planning commission are residents of the township's eastern half. Only Schwall and planning commission member Joyce Willis live east of Canton Center Road.

Township Trustee Lynne Goldsmith questioned the concentration of western Canton residents on the planning commission and cast the one dissenting vote against Padgett's appointment. Other appointments to the planning commission were unanimously approved.

Fire reports jump as population rises

Members of the Canton Fire Department were kept busier than ever during 1976, as fires and rushed trips to hospital emergency rooms rose in proportion to the township's growing population.

Firefighters battled a record number of residential, commercial, car and trash fires during 1976, while a record number of heart attack and traffic accident victims were rushed to nearby hospitals in fire department vehicles.

According to a year-end report released by fire chief Mel Paulun, department members fought a total 498 fires during 1976—80 more than the preceding year. The department conducted 867 rescue runs during 1976 compared to 712 during 1975.

Captain Vern Rorabacher called the increase "moderate" and attributed the rise in fires and rescue runs to the township's growing population.

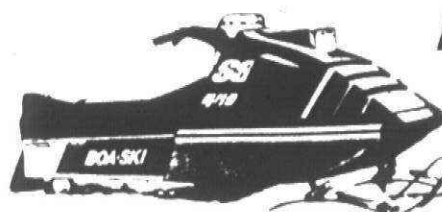
While fires were reported from all areas of the township, Rorabacher said a majority of rescue runs involved victims of traffic accidents on Ford Road, Michigan and Cherry Hill.

The majority of bad traffic accidents occur during dry weather, he said, when drivers tend to speed. More fires occur during the first cold snaps in autumn before residents have examined their furnaces.

Adult ed classes offer 'something different'

Haven't had the time to become involved in transactional analysis? Don't feel left out. The trend is shifting away from TA to assertiveness training. You can learn how to assert yourself without being aggressive. Ever spend an evening with a medium and receive a message from the other side? What do you know about body language? What do the colors you wear say about your personality? Ever wonder about the unleashed power in that 90 per cent of your brain that scientists claim you are not using?

AMONG THE ADULT education courses offered by the Plymouth schools is Do Something Different, an exposure to many new concepts, arts and activities. speak on astrology. Fonteneau has earned the reputation of being the top personality on the teaching staff. He is not only a teacher—he has a sense of humor. He lends a light touch to his subject, and using astrology as a base, explains how to get along with others. Fonteneau is lecturer and entertainer and his class is one of the most popular of the group. **THIRD IN THE** series, Feb. 17, will be Body Language which will prove one's body and facial gestures indicate meanings more clearly than words. Susie Durkin of Canton Township will head the Human Potential Workshop March 3. She serves on the staff of the Women's Research Center at Schoolcraft College. The workshop is aimed at helping the students discover and use the strength in their personalities. Glenn takes Plymouth tourney

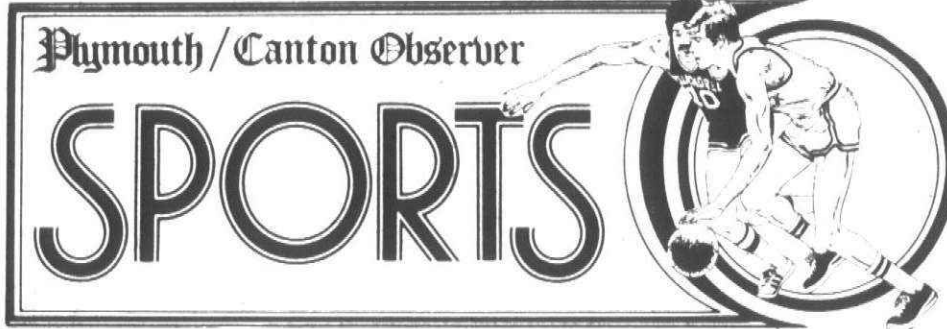

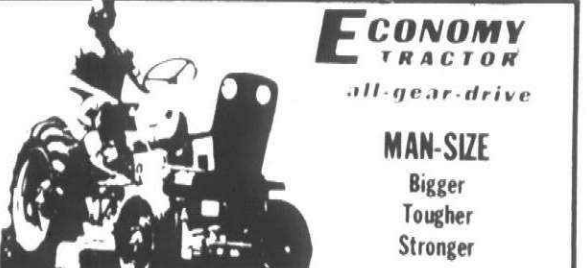

Bentley loses; Salem holds 2-game lead

Rocks beat Ford for 10th in a row

A decisive second quarter in which Plymouth Salem ran away and hid from Dearborn Edsel Ford gave the Rocks their 10th successive basketball victory Friday night. The win also permitted them to stretch their Suburban Eight lead to two full games.

Critics throughout Michigan still refuse to believe the unbeaten Rocks are as good as their 10-0 record indicates. This was supposed to be a rebuilding year for Coach Fred Tho-

mann following the graduation of all-stater Jim Ellinghausen, and that the Rocks would be a serious contender for a fourth straight Sub 8 title was considered a far-fetched dream.

Yet halfway through the 20-game regular schedule here sits Salem, unscarred but unranked, and with only four seniors included on the varsity squad of 13 players. They are starters Chris DeBear and Bruce Gerish, plus reserves Kevin Roose and Pat McKendry.

Six of the Rocks' 10 victories have

been on their home floor, and on that court Salem now has won 34 of its last 35 contests. The real test will come in the remaining weeks of the season when seven of the remaining 10 pre-tournament games will be played away from home.

IT TOOK a while for the Rocks to warm up to the task at hand Friday and they didn't begin to pull away from the Thunderbirds until after Edsel had knotted the score at 12-all with three minutes left in the opening period.

A final scoring flurry by DeBear, Tom Ellinghausen and Gerish shot the Rocks into an 18-14 lead at the quar-

ter, and then in the second period the club ran wild.

With the scoreboard showing Salem on top, 20-18, the Rocks hit one of their patented hot streaks and ran off 16 straight points before Edsel Ford could find the hoop again.

Mike Christie hit from the key to make it 22-18 two minutes into the period. Ellinghausen scored on a jumper from the left corner, John Broderick dumped in a two-pointer, Christie followed from the right corner, Broderick made good on a pair of free throws, Doug Agnew stormed to two successive buckets, and Christie capitalized on a feed from Broderick that

lit up a 36-18 tally on the board.

Kevin Byrne, the Thunderbirds' 6-4 center who had scored only two points in the first half, found the range, and with major help from 6-2 Andy Sitariski the Birds outscored Salem in the final eight minutes, 25-15.

"We tried to low-key this game after the tough, emotional battles with Bentley and Belleville, and we almost played it too low," Thomann admitted.

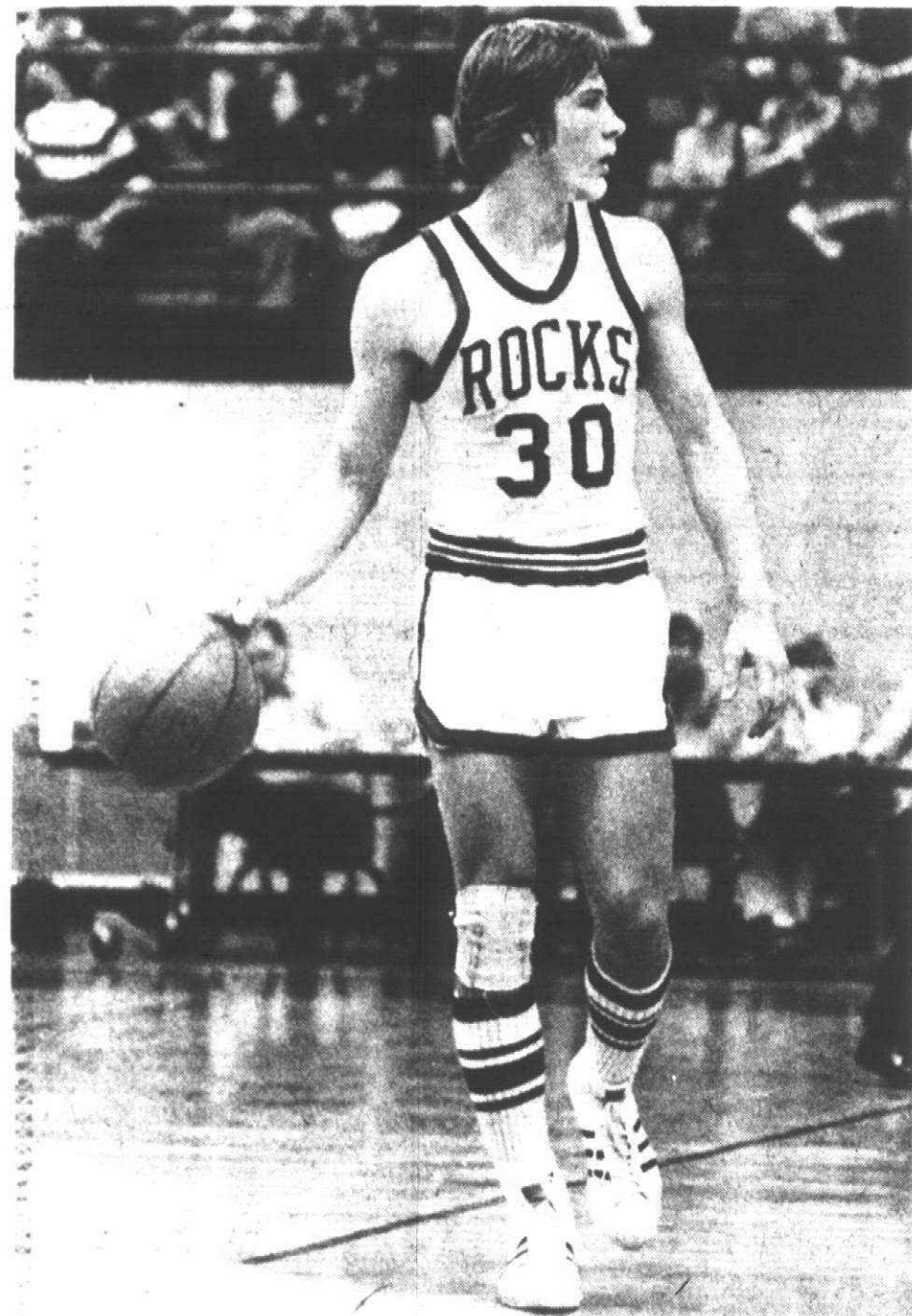
Edsel Ford chopped the count to 57-50 with a little more than three minutes to go, and from then on the worried Rocks couldn't buy a bucket. All

Not to be forgotten is Bob Cline who won the 200-yard freestyle in his first attempt in competition in the event with a time of 2:00.7.

The 200-yard medley relay quartet of Mark Retting, Richard Flynn, Steve Wood and Dave Smith stroked their way to victory in 1:56.9.

"We only took five first places in the meet, but we experimented

with our personnel. By using people in different events it's going to give us much more lateral movement. Thus, teams will not be able to pin us down in weak areas," said Faunce.

Libraries outdated; they're media centers

Think about libraries for a minute. What comes to mind? Dark rows of books, subdued voices, and "Silence Please" signs on the walls? It's anything but that at Plymouth Centennial Educational Park.

The libraries there are brightly colored and well-lighted, and the book stacks are arranged to invite browsing. A few conversations are carried on in a normal tone of voice.

"You'd have to scratch pretty hard to find a little pussy-footed character shuffling around in here," said Bea Green, director of libraries for the Plymouth school district. "In fact, we have trouble with some of the teachers who are too rigid about keeping kids quiet."

According to Ms. Green, who has been a librarian for 35 years, school libraries have gone through some changes. Even the word "library" is a little out of date. Media center is a more acceptable reference.

In addition to the 24,000 books in the high school libraries, there are also slides, tapes, film strips, microfiche and microfilm. And Ms. Green said that with money available from a federal grant, another \$1.5 million worth of books and audio-visual equipment was purchased.

"For teaching purposes, audio-visual aides are great," commented Ms. Green. "But I don't think it's wise to depend on them too much. Reading is basic to everything."

The list of services provided to the schools by the library staff takes up three type-written pages and includes everything from selecting equipment to repairing books.

"We even repair audio-visual machinery now," Ms. Green remarked. Before, if a projector broke down we had to send it out, which was costly and time consuming."

ALTHOUGH HER OFFICE is in Canton High School, Ms. Green is responsible for coordinating and overseeing the activities of all the libraries in the entire district.

"We have a professional and diversified staff," she said. "And I'm quite

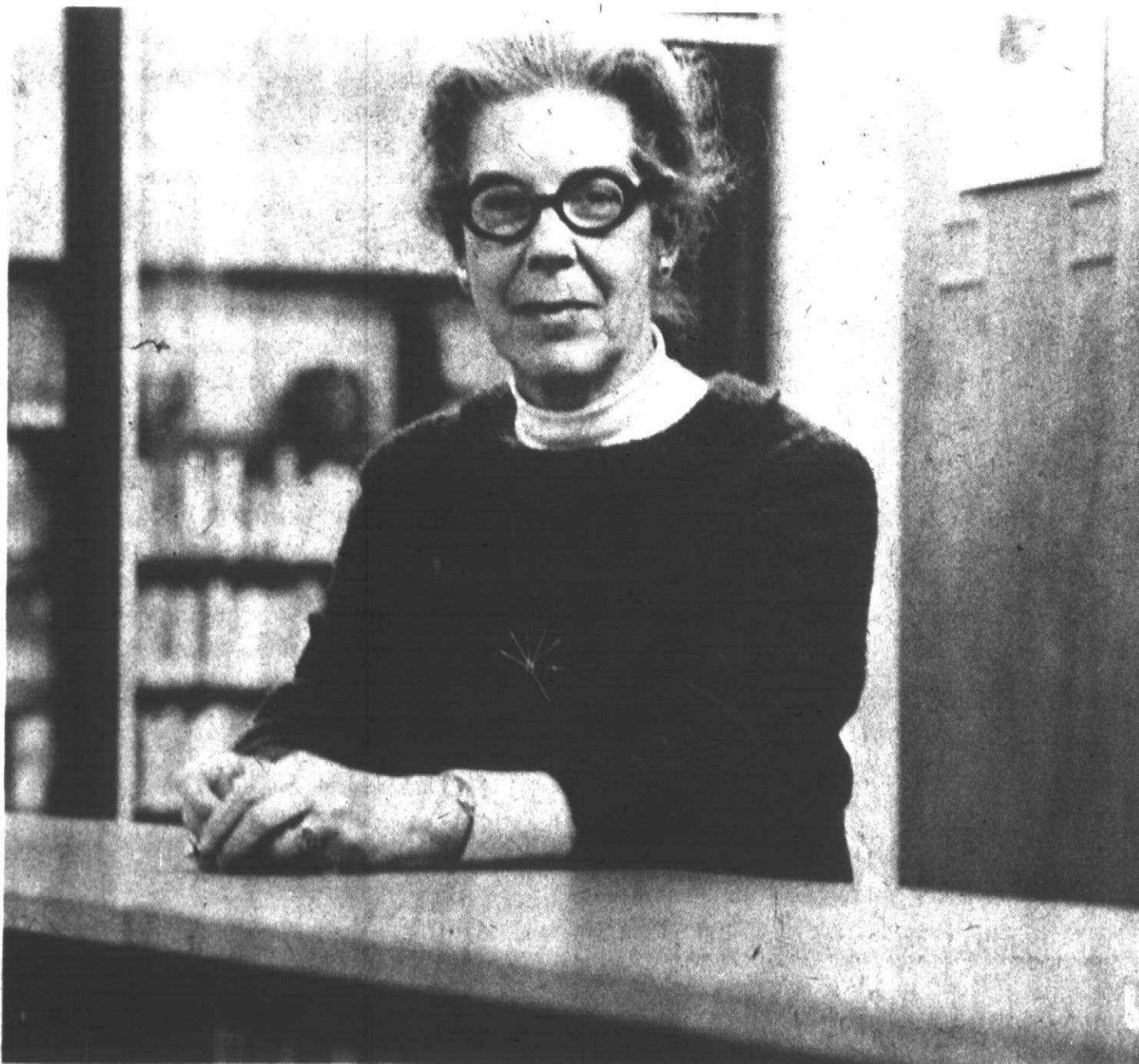
proud of the job it does. I'm of the opinion that a librarian's first responsibility is teaching, and we provide instruction on every level."

Besides teaching kids how to find their way around the stacks and how to use the reference material, individual librarians teach classes in such things as plant care, renaissance art, and cooking.

"After all these years, I still love it," she stated, "and I don't think we have one person on the staff who would rather be doing anything else."

'Ryder' opens controversy at Meadow Brook

Terence Kilburn, Meadow Brook Theater's artistic director, sat down last week over coffee to discuss the theater's newest play, "When You Comin' Back Red Ryder?" and the controversy it's generated.

Laced with strong language and mild violence, the likes of which, some say, has never been heard or seen on Meadow Brook's stage before, the play's caused some patrons to walk out in protest.

Kilburn believes, though, that the brutality and obscenity are warranted within the context of the play. He says playwright Mark Medoff's intent was to explore the roots of violence in American society through the sadistic character Teddy and his unwilling victims in the setting of a tacky south-western diner.

Despite what some critics have said, Kilburn denies that the production really represents a new direction for Meadow Brook. "I've always tried to incorporate variety in our programming," he says. "And in recent years critics and patrons alike have urged us to present more unconventional, contemporary plays."

As a matter of fact, Red Ryder isn't the first modern play that's prompted some members of the Meadow Brook audience to exit, he notes. Last year's abstract "Under Milkwood" by Dylan Thomas was an example, minus the violence and the obscenity.

Red Ryder isn't the kind of play some people might "like" in the sense that they might "like" a gulp of soda pop. The characters are unattractive; Teddy, for example, to most eyes has no redeeming qualities, beyond a keen intelligence. Red Ryder, the incongruously named teenager of the 1950's thrust into the world of the late 1960's, wears a veneer of machismo over a bumbling, cowardly exterior. Angel, perhaps the easiest character to empathize with, is gentle and caring, but without hopes, ambitions or prospects.

As Kilburn points out, though, there's more to theater than making the acquaintance of characters one might like to invite to a dinner party. "Sometimes the plays that we don't like," he says, "are the ones that are the most stimulating."

Beyond a handful of patrons walking out on some performances, audience response to Red Ryder has been favorable, overall, Kilburn says.

"I like to go out among the members of the audience and listen to their comments as they leave at the end of a play. After some plays, you'll hear them make one remark about the play, then their conversations turn to, say, the latest sale at the shopping center."

"After Red Ryder, though, all they

talk about is the play. I think that's good. It's made them think."

ONE ASPECT OF audience response to the play has puzzled Kilburn. "We expected our matinee audience—made up mostly of older women—to be the ones that objected most vehemently to the play. But none of them have walked out. In fact, many come backstage to congratulate the actors."

Though the critics have been unanimous about the actors' virtuosity, many have been divided about the play itself. Some have lauded it as a glimpse of new horizons at Meadow Brook; others have denounced it as not being serious enough.

Kilburn agrees that the play is different from anything presented at the theater since he took over as its creative spirit in 1970, but doesn't see it as really revolutionary. "We try to include at least one contemporary play a season. But then, we try to include a little of everything, and the best of its kind and in the best production."

"Red Ryder has been accepted well in other parts of the country. It's received awards, and had quite a long run in Los Angeles."

In view of Kilburn's opinion that Red Ryder isn't that radical, how does he feel about charges from some local critics that it's Meadow Brook's duty to present newer, more experimental plays?

He says he listens carefully, but remembers that any attempt at innovation must be balanced against box office receipts. For among all the country's regional theaters, Meadow Brook relies most on its own drawing power, least on subsidy, to keep afloat.

IRONICALLY, he says, the main reason Meadow Brook finds it difficult to get government and foundation grants is the same reason critics give as to why the theater should venture into new areas—it's association, albeit financially minimal, with Oakland University.

In its infancy, Meadow Brook, too, subscribed to that view, with near-disastrous financial results. "When I took over as artistic director," says Kilburn, "the theater was almost bankrupt. Since, we've had to develop our popularity before we could try anything different. For while, we didn't even do any Shakespeare because the audience had been saturated. And we still haven't done any Chekhov for the same reason."

With advance season ticket sales growing yearly, Kilburn is optimistic that the day approaches when Meadow Brook will be able to try more adventurous plays more often. He's got a dream along these lines.

'Petrified Forest' opens at Detroit Repertory

"Petrified Forest," the gangster play that made Humphrey Bogart famous, has opened at the Detroit Repertory Theatre and runs until March 6.

"Petrified Forest" tells the story of the notorious Duke Mantee gang who rendezvous at a small isolated cafe located in one of the desert mesas of Arizona. Duke Mantee and his gang hold the occupants

hostage while they wait for Duke's girlfriend and the rest of the gang to come.

However, Duke's girlfriend is captured, and she informs the authorities of his whereabouts. The play reaches a climax when the sheriff and the American Legionnaires surround the cafe and Duke makes a dramatic escape.

Tickets for the Detroit Repertory

Theatre production of "Petrified Forest" may be purchased at all Hudson's stores or at the repertory box office.

Ticket prices range from \$2 to \$5. Performances run every Thursday through Sunday.
