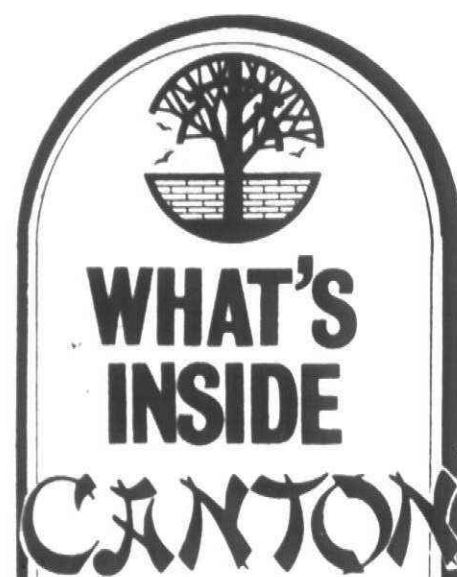

Petitions provoke response:

Another study group?

In response to pressure from a local citizens group, Canton Supervisor Harold Stein has promised to establish a citizen's committee to study the township's rapidly rising population and recommend ways to slow down the township's building boom.

Stein said he decided to "act quickly" on the committee's establishment, after the newly-formed Citizens for Growth Control last week began circulating petitions in favor of growth control.

The group, headed by Canton resident Sue Koch, favors a moratorium on the issuance of residential building permits until an ordinance, limiting the number of building permits issued each year, is formulated and passed.

STEIN SAID THE township-appointed committee—a subcommittee of the existing land use study committee—may study the citizen group's proposal to limit the number of building permits issued as well as other growth control mechanisms.

The five- or six-member committee, the supervisor explained, will research the types of growth controls enacted by other rapidly growing communities and recommend a "Canton solution" to the township board.

In addition, Stein hopes the three school districts in Canton will participate in the growth control study and share the responsibility for dealing with the population boom.

Stein said he has "lots of ideas" to control the township's growth, but declined to disclose them for fear he would influence the committee's research.

"They're going to have to look at everything," Stein said of the committee's still unappointed members. "It's going to be a mammoth task, really."

The supervisor criticized the proposal of the Citizens for Growth Control to impose a moratorium on the issuance of residential building permits. Such actions, he said, would subject Canton to strings of lawsuits with developers.

Stein also criticized other methods proposed to curb the township's population boom, including the Petaluma plan, advocated by the Citizens for Growth Control and defeated Republican supervisor candidate Peter Bundarin in the November campaign. Under the plan, the township would issue a limited number of residential building permits each year.

Stein said the former administration's proposed master land use plan, which reserved most of the land west of Canton Center for agricultural use, didn't confront present problems. The plan, he admitted, would limit the township's population, but only once land in the eastern part of the township is developed.

"But it makes as little sense to greatly limit growth on the west side of Canton as it does to shut down building new homes throughout the township," he maintained. "Both plans have some merit, but neither plan is practical nor enforceable."

ALTHOUGH STEIN said he is willing to establish a committee to study the township's growth, the supervisor said he personally feels the concern of residents over Canton's population boom is premature. He noted the results of a ballot advisory question last spring, in which the majority of residents said the township's eventual population should be around the 100,000 mark.

Canton officials estimate the township's current population at about 32,000.

"We're only a third of the way there," Stein said.

Asked whether he feels the township's population is rising too rapidly, Stein continued, "I don't know. I'm not personally upset by it."

But members of Citizens for Growth Control and at least some members of the Plymouth School Board are upset over Canton's burgeoning population.

The Plymouth School Board has proposed a \$30 million bond issue to finance the construction of seven new schools in Canton and Plymouth Township to accommodate children moving into the school district.

Many Canton residents' tax bills increased an average \$200 this year, mainly because of a 4.75-mill hike in taxes in the Plymouth Community School District. That millage hike was needed, school officials said, partly because of Canton's growth.

MRS. KOCH, who spearheaded establishment of Citizens for Growth Control, said she will submit an application to join the township's study committee.

But her group, she added, will still circulate petitions in favor of a growth control ordinance and hold a meeting on the township's burgeoning growth.

That meeting is scheduled for tonight (Thursday) at 7:30 p.m. in the Plymouth Canton High School cafeteria.

"What can I say," Mrs. Koch said of Stein's plans to establish a study committee on Canton's growth. "I think he's forming a committee to appease us. But I've had too much input and too much response to disband our group."

Stein said he would welcome Mrs. Koch or another member of Citizens for Growth Control on the township's study committee as well as a member of the Plymouth School Board or school district employee.

The three school districts in Canton—Plymouth, Wayne-Westland and Van Buren—should share in the population growth study, Stein said.

"I think it's a joint responsibility," he said. "The idea of growth control is two-fold. Not only does the township have to look at what its ultimate goals would be, but there is another side of the coin—the local school systems."

"The township cannot dictate to the schools how to manage and administer the schools, set policies and request bond issues. Therefore, the township should not dictate to the schools how many children to educate. The ideas of growth control is two-fold and has to be planned for in a two-fold manner."

Stein urged all residents interested in joining the population study committee to submit a resume at township hall. Members of the existing land use study committee will not hold membership on the new committee, he said.

Stein, Bradley at inauguration

Canton Supervisor Harold Stein and Treasurer Anne Bradley are viewing the inauguration of President Jimmy Carter first hand today.

The Canton officials, who received their invitations to the inauguration ceremonies last week, left for Washington Tuesday afternoon as part of Congressman Bill Ford's inaugural group. They are scheduled to return home on Saturday.

Stein tells plan to lure industry

Canton officials are preparing the groundwork for a possible industrial park site that would be financed by tax-exempt revenue bonds and could receive a temporary property tax break.

The project—which is only in the "idea stage" right now—is envisioned and supported by Supervisor Harold Stein. He hopes to attract business and industry to Canton with the benefits provided by the recently-amended Economic Development Corporations Act of 1974.

"I've been in close contact with the City of Westland on the matter of establishing an Economic Development Corporation (EDC)," Stein said recently. "Westland started one to attract the Olympia management. Canton could use the EDC act to attract business, industry and employment."

Chuck Hazen, industrial representative in Michigan Department of Commerce's office of economic expansion, has been invited to explain how the act and corporation is set up at the Feb. 8 meeting of the township board.

"As a municipality, we could issue tax-free revenue bonds to the corporation," Stein said. "If the corporation goes under, the township loses nothing. It sounds like a great act and that's why we're exploring it."

Westland agreed to allow Canton's legal firm, Sempliner, Thomas and Guth, to look at the corporation papers drawn up by its attorney. Canton's attorneys are presently examining the Westland EDC ordinance to see what applies to Canton Township.

arrangement with any person, firm or company for use or sale of the project.

Examples of EDC-approved projects for tax-exempt revenue bonds include waterworks projects, sanitation facilities, convention halls, airports, docks, energy-generating plants, pollution control facilities and industrial parks and stadiums.

Stein's research into the feasibility of establishing an EDC in Canton came after he received a letter from the H.F. Campbell Co. of Detroit, builders of industrial buildings. The letter, which serves as a feeler, was signed by Ernest Maddock, who joined private industry after working as grant coordinator for both Westland and Redford Township.

In the letter, Campbell said an unnamed fabricating company would like to settle in the Joy Road-Hagerty area of Canton if tax-exempt revenue bonds were available as an added incentive.

Canton officials believe that letter serves as an impetus for an EDC corporation that could include a number of business entities such as the fabricating company, in an EDC-controlled industrial park.

A GROUP OF at least three persons must submit a written application—which includes articles of incorporation—in the first step towards establishing an EDC in a municipality.

Next, the municipality must give public announcement of the application and invite others to submit competing applications.

Then there is a public hearing on the application or applications. In Canton's case, the township board may approve one, or none, of the applications to establish an EDC. If the EDC is not incorporated as a public corporation within 90 days after board approval, the local EDC ordinance is invalid.

If incorporated, the supervisor appoints nine members to the board of directors of the EDC, providing those appointees receive board confirmation. According to the act, at

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Kimble joins race for state senator

Raymond Kimble of Plymouth has filed as a Republican candidate to seek the State Senate seat in the 14th District vacated by U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell (R-Plymouth).

Kimble, 44925 North Territorial Road, will be on the ballot for the Feb. 23 primary election for the 14th District which includes Plymouth and Plymouth Township, Livonia, Redford and part of Westland.

"I BELIEVE MANY of the decisions to be made in the future are going to have a large scientific content. If those decisions are to be taken by people without insight, without experience, then the likelihood is they are going to be unwise and unimaginative decisions," says Kimble in announcing his candidacy.

"They will be decisions taken simply on paper and on advice, and without any of the comprehension which you really need if you are going to make a decision about anything."

"I believe my experience in local government as an elected city official, combined with major committee assignments, and as a member of the board of directors on service clubs, contributes in the preparation of me to perform the obligations for leadership as well as responsiveness and accountability."

KIMBLE ISEMPLOYED in the department of natural science at the University of Michigan and is an associate member of the Western Wayne County Board of Realtors.

He attended Flint Junior College, the University of Michigan, and the General Motors Institute of Technology.

Kimble campaigned for Pursell in his successful race for congressman in the 2d District.

"I believe a stable economy and steady jobs are one of the priorities of our society and government," says Kimble. "Diversified employment in Michigan is essential in obtaining this objective."

"I believe our society has a permanent and deep-rooted obligation to its aged and its sick."

"Our penal system should be strengthened and enforced. Education is a major concern striving for excellent quality and high standards. Vocational-technical education should be expanded."



License bureau to close Jan. 28

When the Secretary of State's branch office moves from Penniman Avenue in Plymouth to Northville at the end of the month it will leave behind an empty office space in the heart of the downtown area, but the payroll benefit may remain in Plymouth.

The move will be made with the close of business on Jan. 28, and the six employees now in the office have indicated they will retain their positions in the Northville office.

The departure of the office will have no effect on the city's tax base as the state pays no personal property tax and the office space is rented.

With the move to be made shortly, the question again has been raised: Why is the office being moved from the center of a city that is close to the heavy population, to the outskirts?

The answer given by the Secretary of State is that Oakland County was changing the location of some of its offices and Northville would have been left alone.

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Lawmen take a hard line on capital punishment

Although the constitutional ban on capital punishment in Michigan is more than a century old, there is strong evidence the legislature will re-examine the issue this year.

Since last spring a number of ad hoc citizens' groups have been circulating petitions in support of a constitutional amendment to legalize the death penalty.

If the question is put on a state-wide ballot, each voter will have the opportunity to make an individual choice. However, the issue is a complex one. It is at once philosophical, moral, and legal. And the arguments both for and against run hot and heavy.

In a sample survey of individuals in the field of law enforcement, those involved on a daily basis in the business of crime and punishment, mostly favored granting the state the right to execute, but all emphasized that the right should be exercised only in specific cases.

"I'm definitely in favor of the death penalty for certain crimes,"

said Lt. William Tomczyk, commander of the Michigan State Police region post in Northville. "I'm talking about clear-cut murders and homicides."

"As far as I'm concerned, it would eliminate repeaters. If it kept one repeater from killing a second time, it would be worth it." He said that for other crimes, such as kidnaps or rapes, he would not give blanket support of capital punishment, but felt it should be decided on an individual basis.

"In my mind," he added, "our legal system places too much emphasis on the criminal, and nobody gives a damn about the victim."

WILLIAM RUCKS, director of the Detroit House of Corrections, was less certain about the wisdom of capital punishment. He said that while he supported it, he had many reservations.

"Personally, I don't believe in killing people or in people killing people. And a man is just as dead whether society or another person kills him."

"But still you have the problem of protecting the rights of citizens. In first-degree murder cases, the state should be given the right to execute."

Rucks said that in the past, the state had misused its right to impose the death sentence by enforcing it selectively against minority groups, and he was concerned about it happening again.

"Let's face it," he remarked, "if you are poor, and black, you've got problems. But the only thing I can do is hope the law would treat everyone equally. If not, then everybody has problems."

Plymouth Police Chief Timothy Ford felt the problems of capital punishment deserved consideration. He said people in law enforcement have no special knowledge of how effective the death penalty is in stopping crimes.

"As far as I know," he observed, "every society practices some form of capital punishment and always has, and we still don't know for sure if it deters crime. It's kind of legal murder, but so is war."

"I just don't know. My job is to bring criminals to trial. I'm not convinced the taking of life solves the problem. It may solve the problem for that individual but not for society. Maybe the price of capital punishment is too much to bear."

TWO PLYMOUTH RESIDENTS who work for the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office, saw difficulty in the question, but both said they favored a constitutional amendment to allow capital punishment.

Stephen Boak, chief of operations for the prosecutor's office, indicated his support for the death penalty for specific crimes. "Speaking as a person with nine years in this kind of work, I'm in favor of capital punishment on a limited basis: for kidnappings, and the murder-for-hire type of crime." He added that he would not support the death penalty for crimes of passion.

"My test is, would I be willing to pull the switch myself. If I can answer 'yes,' then I think the law should provide for the penalty."

Patrick Foley, director of the Wayne County Organized Crime Task Force, was unequivocal in his support of capital punishment but only for premeditated murder.

"I'm in favor of it in cases of deliberate, intentional killing," he said. "and I'm in favor of it for three reasons. First, it's a punishment; second, it's a deterrent; and third, it saves limited social resources."

He said sending a person to prison for life entails paying for his maintenance, and it was his feeling the money could be put to use in a more constructive manner.

"I have sent people to prison who have committed 12 murders," he said. "And I would say they are beyond the point of becoming useful, productive citizens. The money we spend on them could be better spent on social programs to prevent crime."

EX-CANTON TOWNSHIP SUPERVISOR and police chief Robert Greenstein, who has had 15 years experience as a trial lawyer, did not feel the death penalty would save the state money, but he still favored it at a "gut level."

"I have been troubled by this issue for many years," he remarked, "and I don't know what is right. I can't argue it logically or factually, but my intuitive reaction is that it is necessary."

"If I knew I was going to pay for a crime with my life, I wouldn't do it. I know there are all kinds of studies which say capital punishment doesn't deter crime. But I can't believe it."

In terms of cost, Greenstein said the death penalty was not the most economical means of punishment. He said to his knowledge, the average appeal process for a death sentence took somewhere between nine and 12 years, which he felt would be more expensive than providing up-keep for the duration of a jail term.

"We have to pay more attention to the productive members of society," he said. "And although I don't like it, capital punishment may be what we need. If there was a way around it, I'd say 'great'. I just don't think there is."

Plymouth attorney Scott Dodge, however, said that although he saw both sides of the question, he leaned toward opposing it. His primary objection was the structure of the present legal system.

"You can argue that capital punishment is cruel and unusual, and you can argue that it isn't. But all that aside, should we have it in view of the legal system we have?"

"The process of determining guilt is not absolute, and I don't think anybody would want to execute an innocent person. If I had the choice, I would say 'no' to the death penalty."

2 Canton homes get 'Idea' award

Two Canton models, a "southern" colonial and a relatively inexpensive no-basement ranch, have been selected as "1977 idea homes" by the Builders Association of Southeastern Michigan.

The models are among 25 homes chosen in the Detroit metropolitan area by the builders association to kick off the spring building season and preview the Builders Home, Furniture and Flower Show, scheduled from March 19 to 27 at Cobo Hall.

The "idea" homes were chosen to show the potential homebuyer the latest ideas in floor plans and materials in the \$25,000 to \$89,000 price range.

The "Tara," a colonial priced at \$58,990 in Sunflower subdivision, and the "Roanoke," a \$33,490 ranch in Century Farms subdivision, are Canton models bearing the "idea home" tag.

CONSTRUCTED BY Beachum & Roeser Homes Co. and Norm Long Building Co., the "Tara" boasts a 2,360 square-foot floor plan, four bedrooms, a large family room with fireplace and wet bar, a formal dining room, a library and 2½ baths.

Although the model is still in the construction stage, the colonial also will feature a two-story brick front with front portico and pillars.

Dick Roeser, president of Beachum & Roeser Homes, claims the "Tara" is the only colonial in Canton with a two-story brick front. The builder attributes the selection of his model as an "idea home" to the all-brick front, the formal library and the spacious front foyer.

"The home has a touch of southern elegance," he says.

Other features of the center-entrance colonial include an L-shaped staircase, a bay window in the formal dining room, a first-floor laundry room, a 12 x 18 master bedroom suite with private bath and walk-in closet, an 18 x 15 foot family room, and attached garage.

The "Tara" is located on the west side of Canton Center between Warren and Joy on Brunswick Drive. Construction of the house should be complete in about 30 days.

THE "ROANOKE," constructed by Amurcon Corp., is a 1,060 square-foot ranch with basement and family room options.

Salesman Dennis Berar believes the Roanoke was picked as a 1977 "idea home" because of its relatively inexpensive price tag and a kitchen-dining-family room combination.

The combination room, located at the rear of a 17 x 14 foot living room, reserves an 11 x 6 foot area for cooking and a 16 x 11 foot area for dining and other family activities. Space for a washing machine and dryer are hidden in a closet-like enclosure at one end of the combination room.

Buyers can add a separate 13 x 15 family room to the "Roanoke" for an additional \$2,900.

A basement can be constructed for \$3,600. Berar said all buyers who have purchased homes based on the "Roanoke" floor plan have bought the basement option.

The "idea home" is located in Century Farms subdivision off Haggerty south of Cherry Hill.

Concert's theme is child's play

The children immediately make up their minds. These are the ones they want. The parents agree to buy one for each child and everyone is happy except the dolls. As arrangements are made for the dolls to be picked up in the morning, the shop is locked for the day. All the dolls in the shop put their heads together to plan how they can prevent the separation of the two dolls who love each other.

The surprise ending pleases the children in the audience, but not the children in the story.

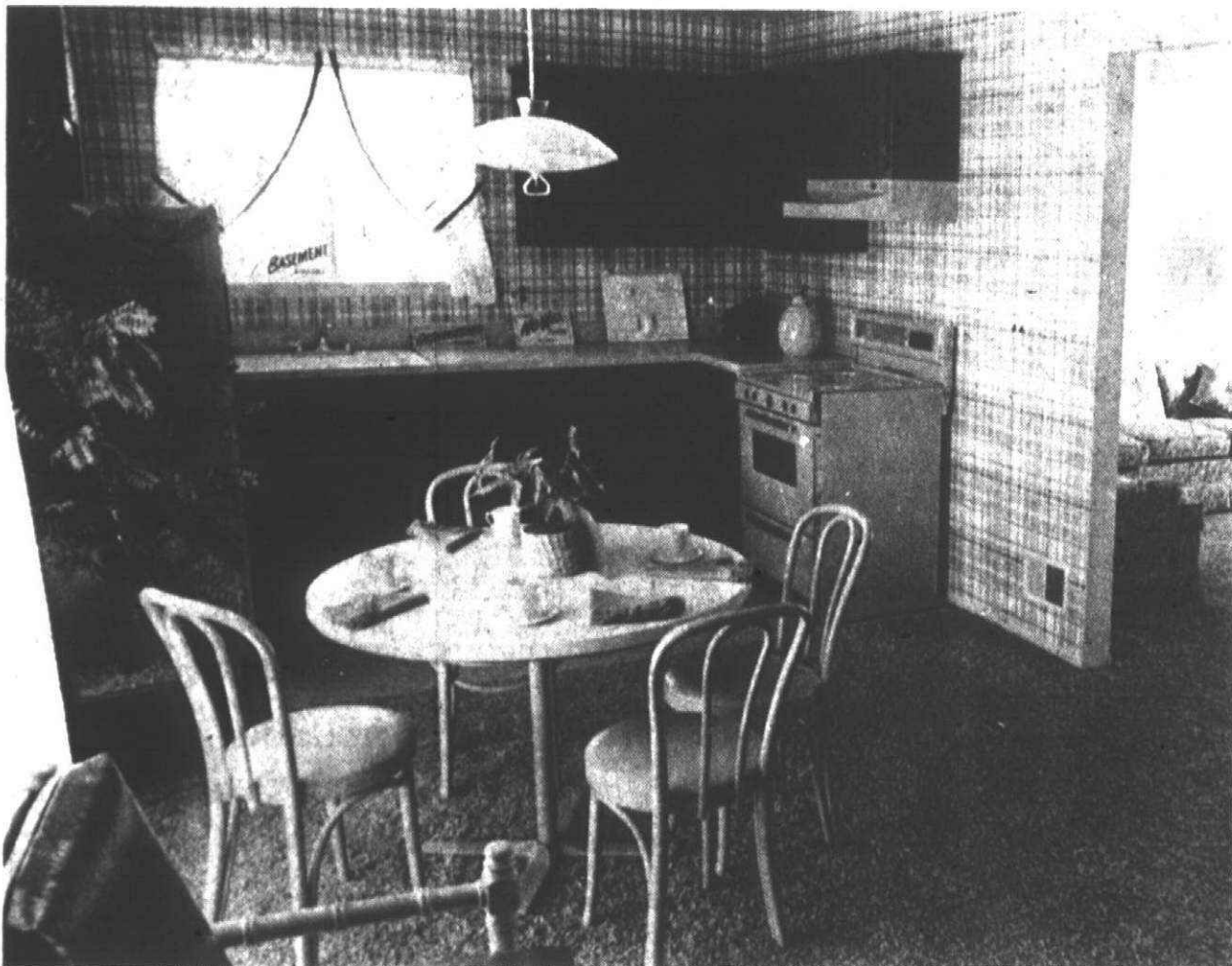

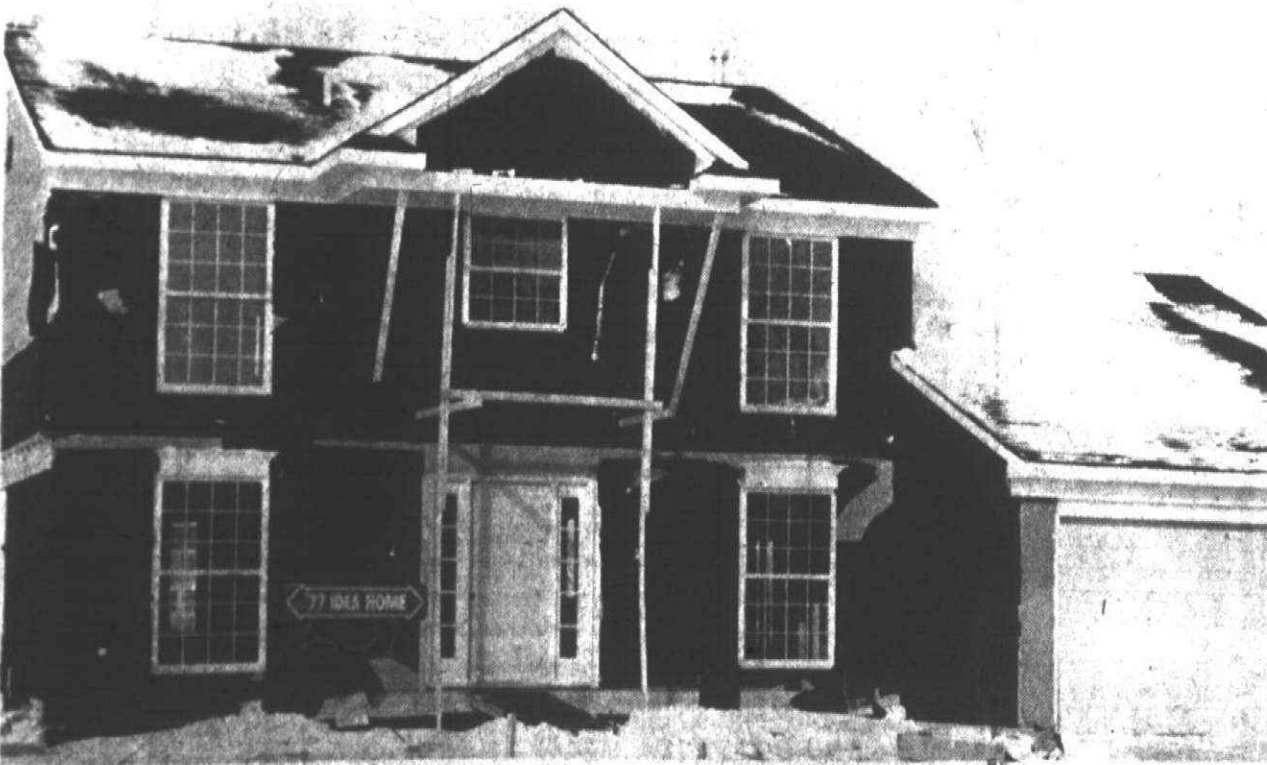
Students kindergarten through Grade 12 are admitted free.

builder's idea due to its all brick front and its image of "southern colonial aristocracy." (Staff photo by Gary Caskey)

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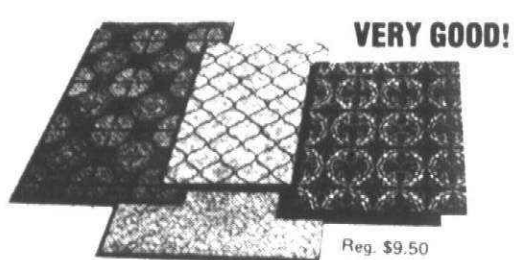
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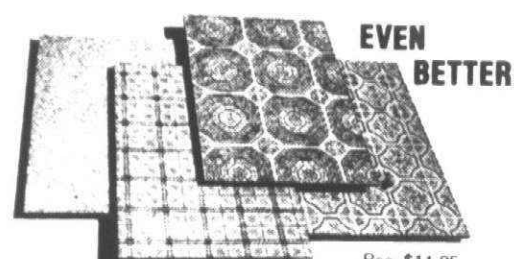
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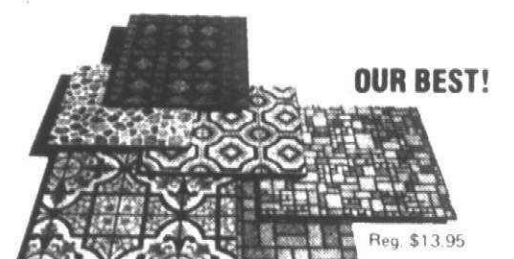
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Readers' forum Community should help in bargaining

At the same time that the number of educational policy issues which are subject to negotiations has expanded, the power to debate and resolve these issues has increasingly shifted to a small number of professionals who are not necessarily accountable to the public itself.

The community should, and must, demand a stronger voice in educational decision-making within the present framework and bargaining process. Inherent in any discussion of community participation is the value judgment that those who will be affected by the decision should participate in the process.

MEANINGFUL participation in the future might mean:

- The board and union would know, before collective bargaining begins, precisely what issues the community groups wish to have on the table.

- The community groups would be given some idea of the priorities the union and board have established for themselves.

- The community groups would be informed of the implication of the possible agreements.

- The community groups should be afforded some concrete way to partici-

pate in the actual negotiation procedures once bargaining has begun.

I realize that these suggestions cannot be implemented this year. They are offered as suggestions for future negotiations. However, it is reasonable to expect that the community be continually informed about the current status of negotiations. The board is bargaining from a position of strength and money is not the only issue. There is, more importantly, an opportunity to make sound educational decisions for children.

It is my hope that good decisions are being made. However, because of the secrecy which has traditionally surrounded the bargaining table, I cannot be sure of that. Can you?

At least two members of the EDC board of directors must "be representative of neighborhood residents" likely to be affected by the activities of the corporation.

No more than three of the people on the board of directors may be a township official or employee.

If the project also requires a citizen's council of nine members in addition to the board of directors, it must be representative of the projects' neighbors. The meetings of both the board of directors and the citizen's council must be open to the public.

At least two more public hearings must be held before any project is started, if there is a citizen's district council.

ACCORDING TO CANTON's Deputy Treasurer Mike Gorman, there are no limits placed on the amount of tax exempt revenue bonds used to finance projects such as industrial parks. But the amount of bonds is supposed to reflect the yearly revenue of the company. All EDC bonds are issued on a yearly basis and any default must be paid for by the company or its mortgage company.

NOTICE OF HEARING ON MICHIGAN PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION PROPOSAL RELATING TO CONSERVATION OF NATURAL GAS

The Michigan Public Service Commission (Commission) in its Order and Notice of Hearing dated December 22, 1976 in Case No. U-5272 initiated proceedings to elicit evidence and comments on a proposal by its Staff for the installation by gas utilities of ceiling insulation, flue restrictors, and other furnace attachment devices in the homes of residential customers for the purpose of inducing energy conservation.

A public hearing in this matter is scheduled to commence at 9:00 a.m. on March 1 and continue on March 2, 1977, in the Commission's offices in the Mercantile Building, 6545 Mercantile Way, Lansing, Michigan.

Any interested person or organization shall be permitted to participate as a party in the proceeding. All persons and organizations, other than the regulated gas utilities, that desire to participate in these proceedings shall, on or before February 11, 1977, file with the Commission a notice of their intent to participate in the hearing.

The proceedings herein shall be conducted in the manner of a legislative inquiry and statements, though made under oath, shall not be subject to cross-examination. The Administrative Law Judge and the Staff shall, however, be permitted to pose questions to clarify the positions of the various witnesses.

The Commission believes that increased conservation of gas in the State of Michigan is particularly necessary, and that the Commission should encourage the conservation of natural gas and, if possible, assist in increasing the supply of natural gas for the benefit of present as well as potential customers of Michigan gas utilities, the State, and the nation. The proceedings are for the purpose of obtaining a thorough analysis and assessment of the Staff proposal under which gas utilities regulated by the Commission would contract to have minimum levels of insulation, flue restrictors, furnace modifications or other cost-effective devices designed to promote the conservation of natural gas installed in the residences of customers desiring to participate in the program. As proposed, the utilities would be allowed to place the cost of labor and materials in their rate base so as to earn a return on their investment.

The Staff estimates that the installation of ceiling insulation and furnace devices in all Michigan residences currently served with natural gas will produce gas savings of 80 billion cubic feet per year at an annual cost of \$117 million. The average cost increase of the conservation program to Michigan customers is estimated to be 13¢ per Mcf. However, it is anticipated that the cost of the program would be more than offset by the savings resulting from a

reduction in consumption. The Staff proposal indicates that although rates would have to increase slightly to cover the cost of the program, customers could realize an actual savings, because of a reduction in consumption, in the amount of \$40 to \$80 annually.

The Commission ordered all regulated gas utilities to appear and present evidence which analyzes and assesses the proposal outlined in the Order and Notice and to file a written summary of their oral presentation at the conclusion of their testimony. Further, the Commission requested that the evidence presented at the hearing in this matter shall relate to:

1. The question of whether the proposal is an effective manner by which to achieve the desired objectives.
2. The costs and problems associated with the implementation of the proposal.
3. The revenue impact on the company if the proposal is adopted and implemented.
4. The amount of increase, if any, in the cost of natural gas to the customers of the particular utility which may occur after the implementation of the program.
5. The question of which rate class or classes should absorb any possible costs which arise out of the implementation of the program.
6. Any amendments to the proposal or alternative methods of achieving the same objectives.

Subsequent to the conclusion of the hearings, parties may file briefs in which the party analyzes or comments upon any evidence presented at the hearings in this matter. Such briefs shall be submitted to the Commission on or before March 25, 1977.

Jurisdiction is pursuant to 1909 PA 300, as amended, MCLA 462.2 et seq; 1919 PA 419, as amended, MCLA 460.51 et seq; 1939 PA 3, as amended, MCLA 460.1 et seq; 1969 PA 306, as amended, MCLA 24.201 et seq; and the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, 1954 Administrative Code, Supplement No. 54, R 460.11 et seq.

At Dance Unlimited

How dance helps physical skills

Anne Minniberg Wagman and Renee Spock, two experts in the fields of dance and ballet, are suffering from a lack of identity in the Plymouth area.

The twosome have been situated in the area for nine months, but their studio, Dance Unlimited, on 757 W. Ann Arbor Trail is gradually making the long uphill climb to stardom and success.

Entering its fifth semester of classes this month, Dance Unlimited boasts a current enrollment of 70, up from the first semester total of 15 but far from capacity.

Both Ms. Wagman and Ms. Shock are deep in experience in ballet, fitness, jazz, tap, theatre arts and creative movement. Adult ballet and theatre arts have been the most popular classes since the studio opened in May.

THE IDEA to begin operation in Plymouth was hampered by the opening of two dance studios the same time Dance Unlimited got the ball rolling and the untimely illness of one of its teachers.

What makes Dance Unlimited different from the typical studio, however, is that it offers a variety of courses beside dance and ballet. Also, the owners are working to sponsor community programs and get involved in local affairs.

"We want the studio to become a community-oriented place, not strictly a commercial account," Ms. Wagman said. "We don't know if Plymouth citizens are leery about newcomers or what, but we're going to try to get involved in the community."

Adding movement oriented curriculum to nursery schools and conditioning classes through community centers and the Plymouth schools are programs currently in the making that will hopefully bring Dance Unlimited closer to Plymouthites.

Ms. Wagman has dedicated much of her time working with athletes, the el-

derly and the handicapped on muscle movement and exercise. While not a physical therapist, she is a movement analyst and has worked physical wonders for many clients.

BO RATHER, former wide receiver for the University of Michigan and currently playing for the Chicago Bears, was suffering from back problems and lacked flexibility in his body. Rather was trained in such a fashion that his muscles were strengthened, but not flexible.

So Ms. Wagman designed a program to strengthen specific muscle sets to correct body alignment to alleviate stress due to general inflexibility.

Rather and Ms. Wagman worked on implementing movement techniques on the field to increase speed and efficiency in play. Rather is maintaining this program and is presently symptom free.

He was quoted as saying the training was beneficial to him in avoiding injury, increasing mental awareness of his body and upgrading his performance on the field.

Dance Unlimited will offer a similar program for area youngsters preparing for summer and school sports with Rather teaching some classes.

Other programs Ms. Wagman introduced to the area were physical education for the elderly, which relies on progressing at each individual's pace. "Persons who never thought they could do a sit-up are doing them every morning now," Ms. Wagman said.

"But many old persons are afraid of themselves—that the exercise program is above their heads and they won't be able to take it. There are other problems too, like cold weather and lack of transportation, which keeps them confined to the home."

"But we're working with the community to get them a ride here and started on some form of conditioning," Ms. Wagman vowed.

Workman's comp law is vetoed by governor

One suburban Democrat crossed party lines as the Michigan House of Representatives passed, 58 to 45, a bill to require employers to pay the cost of administering the workers compensation fund.

Gov. William G. Milliken subsequently vetoed the measure, SB 1259, saying he would accept nothing less than comprehensive reform of the state's workers compensation system.

Rep. Thomas Brown (D-Westland) was one of seven Democrats (the others were from outstate) who joined Republicans in a vain attempt to halt the labor-supported bill last Dec. 9.

BACKING IT were Democratic Reps. John Bennett of Redford, Joe Forbes of Oak Park, William Keith of Garden City, John Markes of Livonia, and Sal Rocca of Madison Heights.

Opposed were Brown and Republi-

can Reps. W.V. Brotherton of Farmington, James Defenbaugh of Bloomfield, Richard Fessler of Union Lake, Robert Geake of Northville, Ruth McNamee of Birmingham and Roy Smith of Ypsilanti.

The senate had passed it in June.

THE BILL would have levied a fee on insurance companies writing workers compensation policies. The levy would equal two per cent of the total benefits paid out by the insurance company in the previous year.

The additional funds would have been used to increase the staff of the workers compensation bureau and reduce a two-year backlog of cases.

At present, the bureau is operated from the state general fund.

Workers compensation has been the subject of a year-long debate which will continue into the 1977 session of legislature.

Pursell's climb up political ladder

While the eyes of the nation were centered on Washington for the inauguration of Jimmy Carter as the 39th president, there was a transition taking place right in our own midst that filled The Stroller with a sense of a pride.

There was no fanfare or bluster with the local transition. It was just a changing of the signs on a building in the heart of Livonia that caused the warm feeling in spite of the cold. For years The Stroller has been driving past the intersection of Five Mile and Farmington Roads in Livonia and paying little attention to the sign on the little red brick building. It happened to be the office of former Congressman Marvin Esch. And while The Stroller had a first name acquaintance with him, he seldom saw him, and he took the place for granted.

But when the sign was changed to carry the name of Carl Pursell, Plymouth Republican, and called at-

tention to the fact that this was now his office, it was a different matter.

You see, The Stroller has watched the new congressman grow in stature and there is nothing more satisfying than to watch a young man climb the ladder of success and still retain the common touch.

As The Stroller looked at the new sign he couldn't help recalling the day, some years ago, when he came to Plymouth to start a new chapter in his journalistic career.

He hadn't been at his new desk very long before he had a caller. It was Carl Pursell, then a real estate salesman who also was serving as the president of the chamber of commerce. He very nonchalantly introduced himself and offered any help he could to make The Stroller feel at home.

At that moment a strong friendship was built. And there was scarcely a day that Carl didn't drop in for a few words or invite The Stroller across

the street for a cup of coffee.

In his role as the chamber president he continually pointed out the things that he would like to see accomplished in the city, and the help that he would like offered.

"The chamber should serve the people," he often stated, and he was trying to figure out ways to boost the business life of the city and help its citizens.

He often moaned over the lack of such things as appliance stores and other activities that would attract people to the downtown area.

And The Stroller never will forget the Christmas season when there seemed to be a lack of interest in downtown decorations and the traditional lighting of a Christmas tree.

He did more than moan. He went to work. And on that Christmas Eve he garnered a few dozen persons, along with a choir from his church and we had a jovial celebration in the park—even in the frigid temperature.

Then, one morning, he, quite surprisingly, announced he was going to seek a seat on the Wayne County Commission. He said he made the decision because it would give him an opportunity to do more good for more people.

It is history now that he won the seat. And he made his presence known in a hurry. One of the first jobs he tackled was an attempt to

have the Rouge River cleaned as it wended its way from Walled Lake through Plymouth. He took The Stroller along for company one morning just to convince him that it was a big job that needed doing.

The county commission couldn't hold him and he revealed that he was going to run for the State Senate. It was a surprise move, but he defeated the incumbent. Not only that, he gained rank as the best of the young senators. With his eyes fixed on ecology he again returned to the Rouge and the three lakes in the area—Newburgh, Wilcox and Phoenix. The evidence of his work now is seen in the fishing docks and the plan to have the lakes dredged for boating.

This along with his program for waste materials stood him apart. He was a young man growing up in one of the most difficult settings—the political world.

"I'm going to try for Congress," he told The Stroller long before the official announcement was made.

"Aren't you trying to climb too fast?" The Stroller asked.

"You've got to strike while the iron is hot," came the answer.

Carl has grown up politically and it has been a real treat to watch him.

He may be only a freshman congressman but Washington will soon know that he is there.

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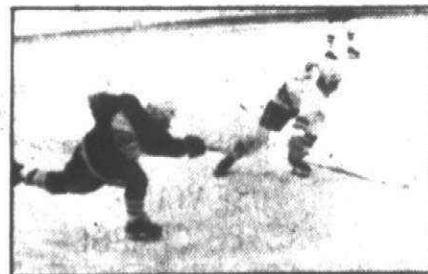
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At home in the House

Pursell given major committee assignments

Freshman U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell, (R-Plymouth) sworn into office Jan. 4, was picked by party leaders to be the ranking freshman on both of his committees, education and labor, and science and technology.

Pursell said the assignments give him a major boost in the "ancient house seniority ladder and puts me in a distinctly advantageous position to pursue legislative and district-assistance goals in my first term."

Pursell, winner by a 344-vote margin over Democrat Ed Pierce Nov. 2, said the designations also put him in an excellent position to quickly move up to ranking minority member of a subcommittee, a rarity he said for a freshman.

On the education and labor committee, Pursell was given top ranking among three GOP freshmen. There are 13 minority seats on the committee.

He said his position on the science and technology committee will be even stronger, ranked first out of five freshmen, who are among 12 Republicans on the committee.

Pursell said a major reorganization of the committee is under way as some of the functions of the phased-

out joint committee on atomic energy may be assumed by the house committee.

The new congressman said the top ranking positions will have an important benefit for his 2d District constituents.

"It will be a major aid in providing the effective representation I've promised the district," Pursell said, "and indicates I've had some success already in demonstrating I can make a significant contribution in the congress."

"Job development and expanded federal assistance to locally-controlled schools are my top priorities on the education and labor committee and I believe you'll see positive action in both areas from this congress."

Pursell said the first priority for the science and technology committee should be to conclude the 1977 budget authorization for the energy research and development administration, which was delayed in the past session.

The representative added he was into his new offices in Washington without delay after being sworn in.

To avoid delays in letter writing until his official stationery is supplied, Pursell said he will use envelopes left over from his political campaign.

Jane Moehle picks treasurer

Jane K. Moehle, a Republican candidate for the 14th District Senate seat, announced Monday night to the Plymouth Business and Professional Women's Club that Elizabeth Holmes of Plymouth will serve as treasurer of her campaign committee.

Mrs. Holmes of Ross Street was the Plymouth Township treasurer for 21 years, retiring in 1974 to have more time for her family and for some traveling. Mrs. Holmes also is treasurer for the BPW Club in Plymouth.

Mrs. Moehle was introduced to the BPW membership by Mrs. Perry Richwine, president. She outlined her concerns as being the same as those of the BPW because they are "People" oriented: inflation, taxation, financing education and the need for more citizen participation in government.

She described herself as an informed citizen with an extensive background in education—dedicated to community colleges because they opened doors of opportunity for old and young alike, providing the best hope for training and retraining people for jobs and self-sufficiency.

To become a candidate for senator, Mrs. Moehle took a leave of absence from the Michigan Department of Education where she is director of community college affairs.

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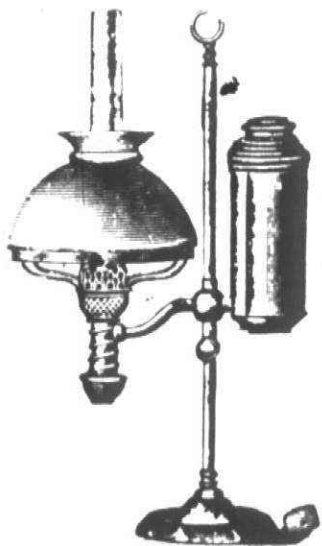
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Choralaires perform

Hearing's Monday on grant projects

A public hearing will be held Monday night to discuss proposed projects in the city of Plymouth for the third-year of the Community Development Act program.

The city expects \$100,000 in CDA funds and the commission is considering four projects being recommended by the administration.

The hearing will begin at 7:30 p.m. Jan. 24 in the commission chambers at city hall. Also to be discussed will be the proposed capital improvement program recommended by the planning commission.

THE FUNDS, administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), are to be used to benefit low and moderate-income persons or to prevent urban decay and blight.

The funds for the first two years of the CDA programs have been designated by the city to be used in a revolving loan program for eligible residents to use for low interest (0 to 5 per cent) loans to remodel homes not up to building code.

Among the recommendations from the administration for the \$100,000 the city expects to receive are: walkway lighting for Old Village, \$10,000; a farmer's market on city-owned property adjacent to the Penn Theater, \$78,000; a covered salt storage bin for the DPW, \$30,000; and a firefighters' training tower, \$10,000.

City Mgr. Fred Yockey is proposing that the city-owned alley next to the Penn be paved and a market canopy be installed along with public restroom facilities.

THE COMMISSION also will dis-

cuss capital improvement proposals suggested by the planning commission for the period from 1977 through 1982.

Planning commissioners working on the suggested proposals were Sharon Andrews, Dave Pugh, and Eldon Martin. The proposals suggests projects which could or should be done, but the list isn't meant to suggest that all projects are intended to be completed by 1982.

Among the projects suggested are: city hall expansion; a railroad underpass on Main Street; a citywide tree trimming program; park beautification; improvements to Tonquish Creek Manor; purchase of an aerial ladder truck; sidewalk ramp construction; tree planting program; parking lot improvements.

Also: lighting of Massey Field, shuffleboard, outdoor tennis and racquetball courts, and a city swimming pool; daylight lighting program to provide night illumination equal to daylight levels; a crack sealing program; library expansion; traffic lights; close off Penniman to enlarge Kellogg Park; a mini-bus for senior citizens; a lake recreation site for city residents; signs announcing location of public parking lots; and a trolley line around the CBD and to Old Village.

AT MONDAY'S meeting, the city commission also voted to cancel its Feb. 22 meeting as it is one day before the State Senate primary election and the day before the legislative conference of the Michigan Municipal League which some commissioners will attend.

The Feb. 22 meeting will be held instead Monday, Feb. 28.

Nichols brothers tour Europe

It is four months since Jessie and I came to Aix-en-Provence, 20 miles north of Marseilles and 100 miles west of the Italian border. We live in a two-room apartment in a private villa a few minutes from the center of town. We attend classes in French at the local university. Our weekends are occupied with bus trips to Nice, Monaco, Arles, Avignon, Nîmes, Orange, and other points of interest in Provence.

ON THURSDAY, Jan. 6, not long after we returned to Aix on Christmas vacation in Barcelona, Spain, we had our first visitors from the United States—two young men from Plymouth. On the morning they arrived, Jessie was attending classes in the 18th century mansion which now serves as the home of the Institute of French Studies for Foreign Students of the University of Aix-Marseille. I was at home, conjugating French verbs. Our doorbell buzzed. It was our landlady, "Bonjour, monsieur," she said, animatedly. "A la porte, pour vous, il ya deux jeunes hommes avec des grosses sacs."

The "grosse sacs" turned out to be huge backpacks. The "deux jeunes hommes" were Sam and Randy, Nichols, residents of Plymouth and recent graduates of

Plymouth High School. They are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Carol Nichols of Brentwood in LakePointe. Their father is principal of Bird Elementary School of the Plymouth Community School District.

Sam introduced himself, then his brother. I had never met them, but Jessie told me that Sam was a former student in her art classes at Plymouth High. He had written that he might drop in on us on his way through France.

Sam, age 20, graduated from Plymouth High in 1975. He has attended three semesters at the University of Michigan, Randy, 23, graduated from Plymouth High in 1972 and is a senior at Eastern Michigan University where he is majoring in fine arts.

I SHOWED THEM IN, put the kettle on tout de suite, and told them to make themselves comfortable. Their expressions of relief when they disentangled themselves from the heavy packs, and sank into chairs, was quite apparent. They had been on a train from Luxembourg to Marseilles to Aix all night and were finding it difficult to keep their eyes open.

Shortly after, Jessie arrived with one of her classmates in tow—a tall, attractive blonde girl from Winnipeg, Canada. The boys were suddenly less dormant. Tongues never stopped as Jessie busied herself at the stove, preparing lunch.

Soup was soon on the table, the rest of the repast was simmering on the range, and the five of us pitched in while the conversation continued. Sam and Randy didn't have to be encouraged to eat. We got their story as the meal progressed.

IGNORING THE ADVICE of Horace Greeley, the Nichols brothers are heading east. They arrived in Luxembourg on Jan. 4 and are on their way to Italy, Greece, Turkey and beyond.

Aix-en-Provence was a detour, primarily to see us and to visit with Sam's friend, Paul Haar, Paul, a U-M graduate, now is studying at the University of Aix-Marseille.

By coincidence, Jessie and I met him for the first time at a Thanksgiving Day party in Aix sponsored by a group of American girls nostalgic for turkey and the trimmings. At that time, we discovered that Sam Nichols is a mutual acquaintance.

After lunch, what Sam and Randy needed most was sleep. We took them to an expensive but clean hotel where we had spent our first two nights in Aix. They lost no time in hitting the sack.

Next day, Paul Haar took them bowling. They enjoyed the exercise, but tall, bushy-haired Sam said the alleys were in poor condition. "Some American could come over here and make a lot of money installing some good bowling lanes," he exclaimed.

Haar also took them to a movie where Sam had a chance to try out the French he learned at U-M. Later, they were entertained by a Moroccan friend of Paul's. He treated them to some pastries he had brought back to Aix from his Christmas vacation in North Africa.

They also visited Le Grand Marche, the Provencal open-air market at Place des Prescheurs in front of the Palais de Justice. It is said to be one of the most interesting in France. Directly across the

street from it is the Marche Aux Pucés (Flea Market) where you can buy anything from kitchen utensils to finely-bound books, African carvings, goldfish, canaries, swords, and World War I helmets.

ON SATURDAY, JAN. 8, the day before they shoved off for Italy, they came to see us again. They said they were both impressed by what they had seen of Aix-en-Provence.

"This is really quite a place," said Randy, stroking his beard. "I've never seen such unusual hills."

"I'd like to visit here again, on our way back," said Sam, adjusting the red bandana he wore on his head. He had lost his hat somewhere in Aix.

Since both have some knowledge of art, we decided to take them up Avenue Paul Cezanne to the atelier (studio) the artist used when he painted in Aix. It still contains the great impressionist's personal objects, belongings, and mementos.

On the way from our apartment to the atelier, we passed the recently constructed Beaux Arts building whose modern design has not pleased all Aixois. Some feel that it isn't in keeping with the 15th century Pavillon Vendome, adjacent to it. The Pavillon Vendome, once occupied by a duke who became a cardinal, is considered to be an outstanding example of Provencal decorative art.

We also passed the 18th century hotel which houses the Baths of Sextius—the thermal baths established by the Roman Consul Sextius in 122 B.C. People who

have circulatory disorders come to the hotel to take "the cure" in the establishment's 93.2 F. water.

In the nearby hotel grounds, I showed Sam and Randy the 14th century fortification tower which formed part of the protective wall of the City of Aix-en-Provence during the Hundred Years War.

AFTER VISITING Cezanne's atelier, Randy showed particular interest in Montagne Ste. Victoire, the impressive limestone peak which dominates the local landscape. He said he would like to take some photos of the mountain, so we walked higher up Avenue Paul Cezanne.

Finally, we came to a knoll where apartment houses didn't obscure our view, and there it was—Ste. Victoire, the massive, jagged ridge of bleached rock which Cezanne never tired of painting. The 55-foot tall Cross of Provence, built on top of the mountain, stood out vividly in the brilliant afternoon sun.

Located about 10 miles from Aix, Ste. Victoire or "The Holy Victory Mountain," is so named because of a Roman victory achieved at its foot. It was there that the Roman general Marius met and defeated an invading horde of Teutons in 102 B.C. In memory of the achievement, some Provencal families still call one of their sons Marius.

After Randy shot his photos, we walked down the hill to Cathedrale St. Saver, known for its delicately-columned Romanesque cloisters.

It also is known for its 5th century Roman font, its 14th century Flemish tapestries, and a tiptych called "The Burning Bush" painted in the 15th century by Nicolas Froment.

COMING OUT of the cloisters, we strolled down Rue Gaston Sabota, past the Institute where we attend classes, to the Clock Tower—the landmark next to the Hotel de Ville. The base of this tower formed the entranceway to the military post the Romans established here in 122 B.C.

After a brief look at the Hotel de Ville (city hall), we said goodbye to Sam and Randy.

"We've got some shopping to do before we shove off," said Randy. "For one thing, I've got to find a new hat."

They headed for Monoprix, the modern department store on Cours Mirabeau, the main thoroughfare in Aix. Next morning, they had to be in Marseille at 5 a.m. to catch a train for Italy. From there, they will go by boat to Greece where they will visit Athens. Then they will push on to Turkey, and perhaps further east. They expect to be back in Plymouth in about four months.

"Bon voyage!" we called after them as they walked away. "Wish we were going with you."

Strange—no matter how exotic the place is where you are, you always envy those who are heading for some place you have never been.

GOVERNOR STRESSES JOBS, WELFARE REFORM, ANTI-CRIME MEASURES

The 79th Legislature opened this past week with two days of impressive ceremony which included the Governor's annual State of the State message.

Following these two ceremonial days, we recessed for a week to allow for the appointment and organization of committees. Bills are already being introduced and once the committees are organized, they will begin considering and reporting out much of this early legislation.

One of the speeches was Governor Milliken's annual State of the State address during which he outlined his priorities for the coming year.

About a fourth of the Governor's message was devoted to proposals to improve Michigan's business climate and create new employment.

To help the economy, the Governor proposed a transportation program, urban revival efforts, development of outstate Michigan, giving businesses a tax break for creating jobs, a youth employment program and a number of housing and construction programs.

I am using this week to study the Governor's economic proposals in detail and I'm confident that we will see some legislation introduced soon to implement them.

The Governor also incorporated the House Republican Caucus position on implementing tough anti-crime proposals. He listed a number which should have top priority and I certainly agree.

Along with crime, the Governor had some harsh words about welfare abuse. He said Michigan has had enough welfare abuse by receivers, providers and a few employees who have taken advantage of their positions to siphon off illegal gains for themselves.

providers of health care to pad their bills or knowingly provided unneeded services.

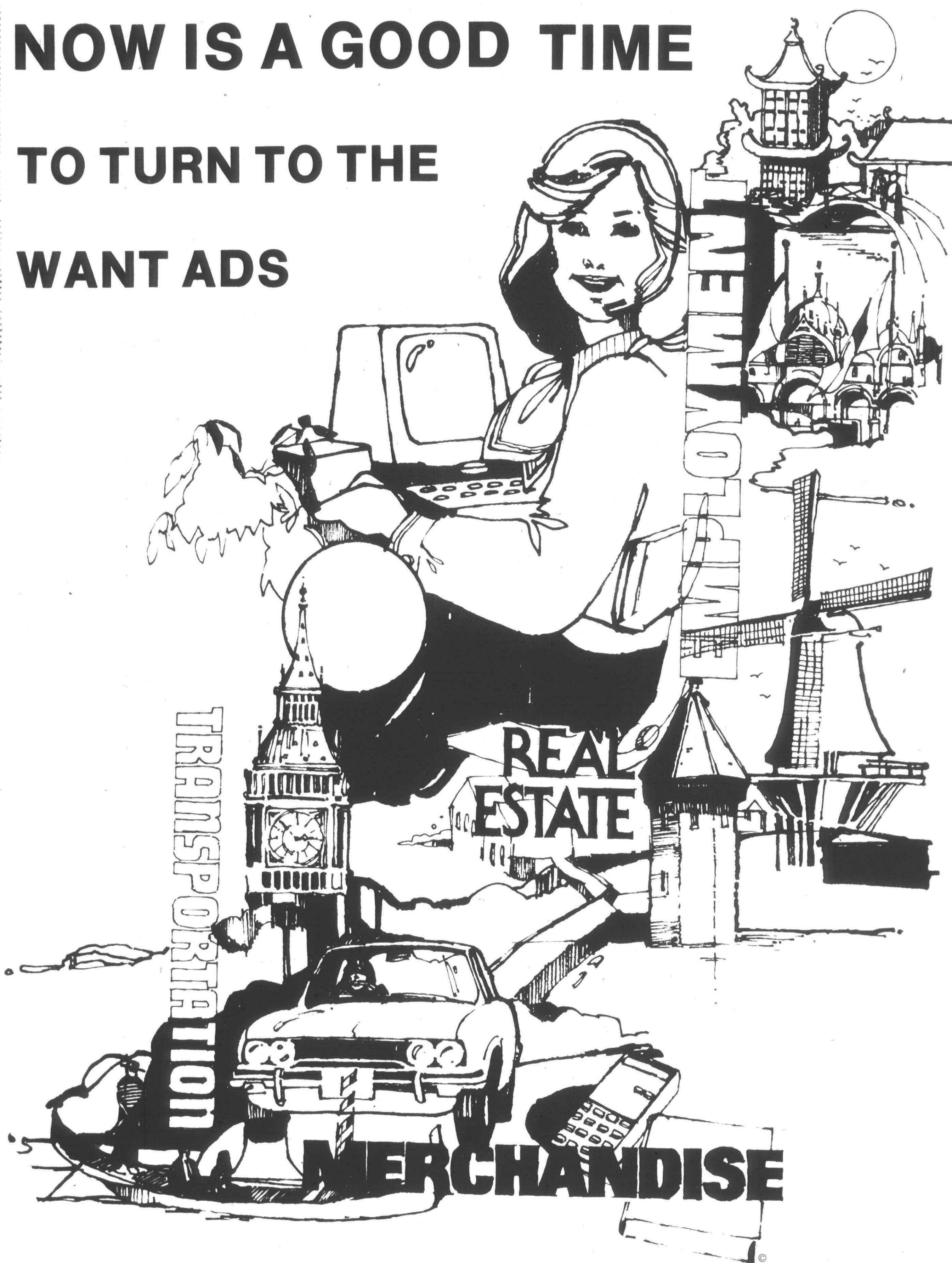
Overall the State of the State message was an optimistic one that outlined an ambitious program for the legislature. I hope we can be successful in accomplishing many of these legislative goals during the next few years.

In the area of crime control, I am personally interested in the passage of more mandatory minimum sentencing bills similar to the law we passed last year which sets a required two year additional jail term for anyone using a handgun while committing a felony.

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Tax needed despite revenue hike

A 5.36 per cent increase in revenue is anticipated for Schoolcraft College during the 1977-78 fiscal year.

The administration presented the board of trustees this projection during the school board's Jan. 12 monthly study session. The figure is based on the existing voted property tax millage. The estimate does not reflect the increase that would result from a favorable tally in next April's millage vote.

Schoolcraft Manager of Business Services Fred Peterson termed the figures "a conservative estimate."

The proposed source of finance was prepared in December in compliance with the state fiscal agency, the Per-

sonal Budget Educational System (PBES).

LAST YEAR'S total revenue was \$9,753,645; the coming projected total will be \$10,276,800. The revenue is derived from five sources: taxes, general student fees, state appropriation, federal grants and other income.

Last year's figures and the proposed 1977 figures are similar when broken down. Local property taxes show a 7.9 per cent increase from \$3,149,313 to \$3,400,000.

General student fees show a nine per cent increase from \$2,442,940 to \$2,678,000. State appropriation will rise four per cent from \$3,894,739 to \$4,050,800. Federal grants will drop 31 per cent from \$143,153 to \$100,000.

Other funds are expected to drop from \$53,500 to \$48,000.

PRESIDENT C. NELSON Grote requested board action to raise the revenue 3.75 per cent by adding \$400,000.

The Special maintenance fund would receive \$250,000 and the remaining \$150,000 would go to the equipment budget. These funds would generate from student tuition and would increase tuition by 15 per cent of the projected new figure.

"We do not have an effective fire alarm system," said Dr. Grote. "In 1971 we were appropriated additional funds for our special maintenance fund. The time has come again to put our attention there."

Board member Leroy Bennett agreed. "We not only need this; it is criminal if we don't do it. These buildings need fire protection."

Dr. Grote justified raising tuition by telling the board that Schoolcraft's tuition for in-district students was as low as any community college in the state. He said that tuition for non-district students was the highest in the state, in some cases higher than four-year schools.

"Tuition and fees at Schoolcraft have not kept up with the recent trend in tax revenue," said Dr. Grote. "Our non-district (higher) tuition is simply not competitive."

SC provides GC campus

The Schoolcraft Instructional Center at Garden City was formerly Florence Elementary School, and it now occupies the former Harrison School. The college has owned a Garden City site since July 1973.

The Harrison center has been in operation since the 1976 fall semester, and the building houses day and evening classes. It also offers counseling, admissions, registration services, testing and special events.

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Schoolcraft classrooms

Schoolcraft College instructs students at two large campus buildings.

The Applied Science building, completed in 1973, contains 67,000 square feet of floor space and houses laboratories, shops, and classrooms for instruction in accounting, automotive, biomedical technology, business, civil technology, data processing, drafting, electronics, health careers, hydraulics, manufacturing and welding.

The Liberal Arts building contains 38 classrooms and a small theater. Like the Applied Science building, its original construction was financed with the assistance of federal funds and was completed in 1968; its new south wing was completed in 1973.

Jail or educational use: which should be chosen?

The state correctional department is considering using for a prison the former Wayne County Child Development Center site in neighboring Northville Township.

Northville officials are organizing a campaign to persuade the state not to locate a prison at the site and are enlisting the support of governmental and civic leaders in the Plymouth-Canton community.

The campaign appears to be two-fold: to stop what is seen as a negative use (jail) of the property, and to urge that the site be used for a positive purpose. The alternate use most talked about is an educational facility to be operated jointly by Schoolcraft College and Wayne State University.

THE EFFORT is worthy of serious consideration from officials and citizens in Plymouth-Canton, particularly if the approach will continue to be to seek alternatives for positive use of the land.

But it first ought to be stated that there is nothing wrong, or inherently negative, in using property for prisons. Jail facilities must be located somewhere, as long as society (us) has the need to place law-breakers in detention centers. The problem which always occurs is that we all recognize the need for jails but nobody wants one nearby.

From the state's standpoint, the site in Northville Township isn't located close to any heavy residential concentration. The site is favorable in that it is generally isolated from where people live.

Another factor to keep in mind, in maintaining perspective, is that the Detroit House of Corrections (DeHoCo) has been located in this vicinity for years without causing any serious problems for Plymouth-Canton-Northville residents. There

have been "jail breaks" and walk-aways, but not the type of incidents serious enough to disrupt our lives.

BUT JUST BECAUSE the site is suitable for a prison facility doesn't automatically mean a jail is the best use for the site.

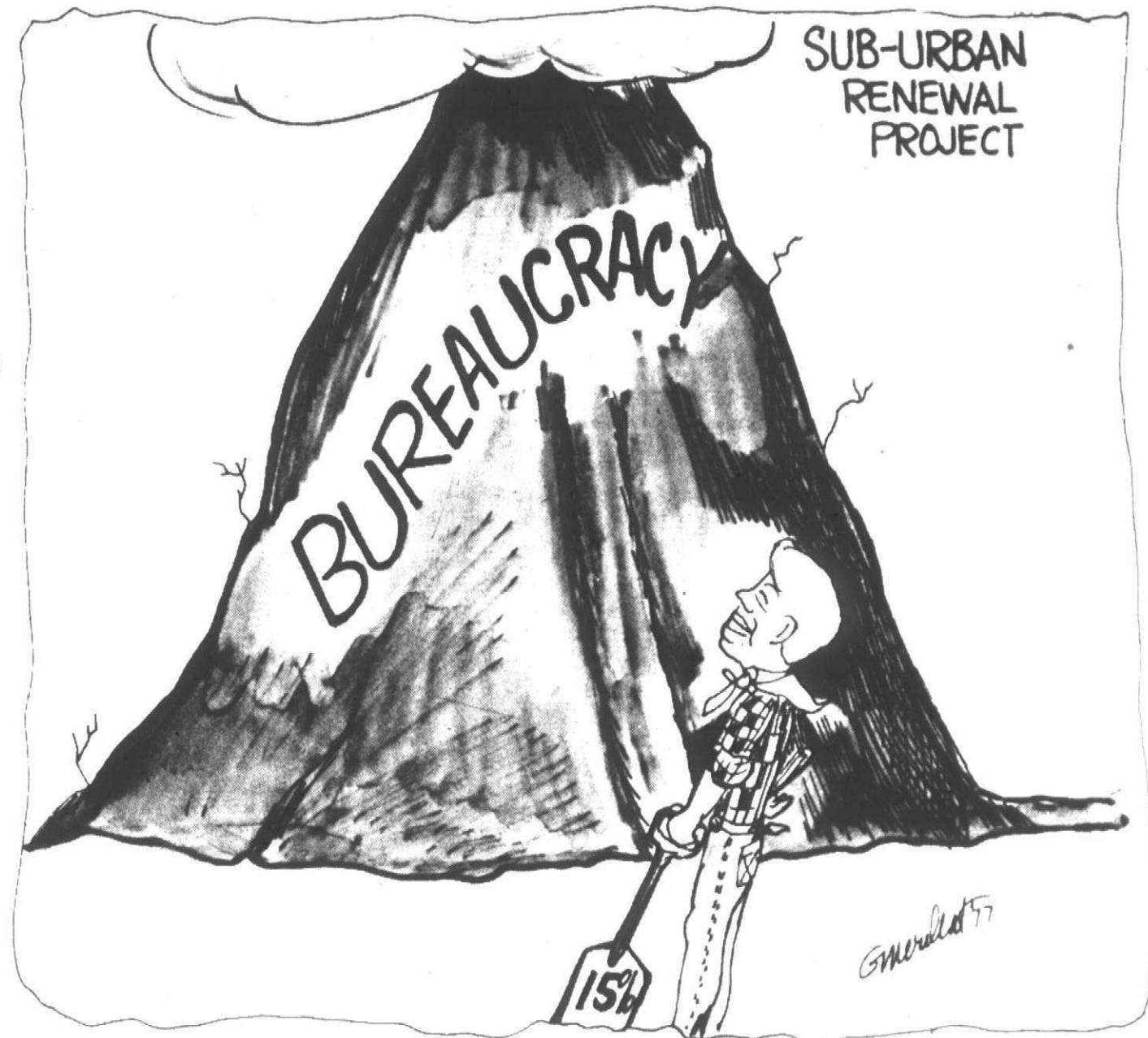
Part of the site presently is being used by the Northville Township Police Department. Schoolcraft and WSU, in the past, jointly have expressed interest in the buildings and site.

New Morning School of Plymouth, an alternate private school for youngsters from elementary to middle school age, also has expressed interest in one of the unused buildings.

The point which the state must recognize is that there are other good, adequate uses for the facility which need to be carefully explored before a decision is made. Communities surrounding the site deserve to be heard, if for no other reason than geographical proximity. Likewise, institutions which could benefit from the site and serve the public by use of facilities there, also should be given an opportunity to present their case so priorities can be set.

Hopefully, the state understands that current opinions of opposition coming from the community aren't a blanket condemnation of jails in general. The community isn't saying "no jail here under any circumstance" but is suggesting that there are better options available for the site.

The message is more of a "we would like" than a "we don't want." And with that type of approach being taken locally, the state ought to respond with a similar responsible reaction and not decide to locate a jail just because land is available.



A bureaucrat who can cut could be new kind of hero

Dear President Carter,

Congratulations on your inauguration.

Out here in the suburbs of Detroit, we understand that you've got an awful heavy agenda just now. Oil; appointments for jobs; inflation and unemployment; the Soviets; the Chinese; the Arabs and the Israelis; the B-1 bomber, the defense budget and the strategic arms talks.

In all of this, Mr. President, please do not forget what you said during the campaign about the bureaucracy in Washington. You said it was "horrible, bloated, confused," and we listened.

We believed you during the campaign, and a lot of us voted for you because of that one concern.

OUT HERE in the suburbs where we're trying to make sense out of our own crazy patchwork of local/county/regional/state government structure. We remember that one of the things you want to do is reorganize the federal government. You've told us you want to reduce the number of confused and overlapping units, to streamline and make coherent the responsibilities of departments.

We think that's a nifty idea, and we wish you luck.

BUT WHILE you are thinking about how to reshape the organization of the government, Mr. President, please remember that out here in the suburbs we are trying to lead a reasonable life and pay our tax bills that seem to do nothing but go up.

So while you're thinking "reorganize," you might also think about cutting down the size and the cost of government and increasing its efficiency.

We realize that's tough to do, because whenever you try to cut a department or a program, you get lots of flack from the political and economic and social interests it serves. In addition, you get all kinds of bureaucratic resistance, which is subtle, slow, determined and terribly difficult to overcome.

In that regard, any suburban housewife who's facing a swollen budget and limited income on which to run the household can give you some very practical advice: Hold down expenses, cut costs, and very shortly you'll find there are better and more effective and cheaper ways of doing things.

IN THE CASE of the federal government, there's a simple and practical way of implement-

ing this common sense principle: Cut the number of people.

Why not, for example, cut say 15 per cent of the total number of federal employees, doing so in such a way as to eliminate equally across all departments and all levels of bureaucratic grade. You might even try to offer early retirement to the older, tired out and less imaginative bureaucrats.

Having done that, you'll find some interesting things beginning to happen.

The bureaucracy will find ways of eliminating 15 per cent of the things it does now, which might be just a fine way of phasing out a lot of programs that don't make much sense any more or never did.

2. The bureaucracy will find ways of getting done with 15 per cent less people the same amount of work.

NOTICE, please, Mr. President, what has happened by this point.

Instead of the bureaucracy resisting with all its strength and staying power, a proposal from the outside (i.e. your office) to cut a given program or department, the problem of surviving with 15 per cent less people is now internalized within the civil service.

This means that the guy who previously was thought by his colleagues to be a maverick because he wanted to cut some program now becomes a hero. It means that the bureaucrat who actually comes up with an idea about how to get the work out with fewer people might now have a shot at a promotion.

It's a common sense approach, Mr. President, but that's just what you pledged to us during the campaign.

Union sues

Police image tarnished

Few persons appreciate or understand a policeman's contribution to society.

Even in suburban communities, policemen risk their lives continually trying to protect the lives and property of the citizens.

Every time they stop a speeder, they are taking the chance that that person might be an armed felon in a stolen car ready to take on all comers.

Historically, policemen were not well paid. They were given a good retirement program, and they traded that security for lower pay.

Recently the compensation for police officers has improved dramatically. So much so that community policemen are now paid at a rate higher than our well-trained career State Police officers. Many place this increase on the fact that more and more police departments are being organized by unions.

Under the adage that "you get what you pay for," if we want more professional police protection, we should be prepared to pay reasonable compensation for this increased professionalism. However, whenever unions get in the picture negotiating for their members' wants, somewhere along the line services to the public seem to lose importance.

A recent example happened in Birmingham. The union representing the police officers sued the City of Birmingham to prevent the city from using voluntary police officers to help regulate traffic during the traditional Halloween parade.

THE UNION'S POSITION was that by using the city's unpaid volunteers, full time professional policemen were being deprived of overtime.

Birmingham Police Auxiliary has a long history of helping that community.

We all know that there are highs and lows in the need for police protection, and the purpose of the auxiliary was to supplement police protection at those times when more police were needed, avoiding a full-time force that was large enough for emergencies but larger than necessary to meet general needs.

In addition, it gave the city citizen participation, which helped many private citizens understand the needs and problems of police protection within the community.

By taking court action against the use of services by the volunteers, the policemen's greatest supporters in the community, police union members are doing themselves a great disservice because they need citizen support for police projects.

When police unions take a position that services to the community should be decreased—which could happen in this instance—because the city couldn't afford to pay for all the police protection it was getting for free so that the police in turn wind up with more money in their pockets, their image as professionals becomes tarnished and the desire by the community to support their projects lessens.

Historically, by law, public employees were not

permitted to become members of unions because the public was afraid that in the desire to achieve benefits for their members, unions would end up interfering with public service.

WITH THE GAINS that police officers have made since they have become unionized, it is unfair to say that unions have not been a good thing for public employees' benefits.

However, if unions take the position that for their own personal benefit they will limit public service, there will be a cry from the public to go back to the more historical role and deprive public employees of the opportunity to band together and bargain collectively.

The key words to whether there should be unions for public employees are "reasonableness" and "responsibility."

If citizens are to have respect for the law, they must respect the enforcers of the law. If the enforcers of the law do something to tarnish their professional image, this can only reduce respect for the law.

A good idea to shorten state ballot

Somewhere in the fine print of Gov. William G. Milliken's state of the state message is a proposal that could be a major electoral reform—if the Michigan Legislature and the voters have sense enough to pass it.

It's a proposal that the governor appoint appeals-level judges, the state board of education and the governing boards of the University of Michigan, Michigan State University and Wayne State University.

First, the legislature would have to put the question on the ballot. Then the people would have to approve a constitutional amendment.

Many constitutional amendments are proposed every year, by petition circulators and legislators, but few ever get to a vote. This is one that deserves to make it all the way.

ONE REASON is that the ballot needs shortening.

A survey by Observer & Eccentric news staffers found that vast numbers of voters used absentee ballots to avoid standing in long lines during the presidential election.

To be sure, some had legitimate excuses—ill-

ness, infirmity, absence from town on vacations or business. But by comparing the percentages of persons voting by absentee in the May presidential primary and the August general primary, one could tell that voters were flocking to the absentee paper ballots to beat long lines at the polls.

Among city and township clerks, the most often mentioned reform to reduce those long lines was a shorter ballot. Sure, the law says each voter is allowed two minutes in the booth, and it actually takes only a minute or less to vote if you know for whom you're voting. But in practice, voters take four to six minutes as they dawdle over long lists of candidates for education posts (eight jobs, two to nine persons seeking each); one full-term State Supreme Court justice; two supreme court vacancies; a court of appeals job or two; long lists of circuit, probate and district court jobs, and those county functionaries.

ASK THE AVERAGE voter to name the candidates voted for, and he or she will come up with a mere fraction. It's plain we are voting for too many candidates for too many jobs, and if we make intelligent decisions, it's more by accident than sound judgment.

Michigan's 1835 constitution called for election of only the governor, lieutenant governor, and the legislators. The two administrators and the state senators were elected in odd-numbered years so

that public attention wasn't diverted by the elections for the president and Congress.

"The Constitution of 1835 has been lauded by political scientists, and it has been claimed by some that it was the best constitution Michigan has ever had," wrote the late Willis F. Dunbar in his landmark "Michigan: A History of the Wolverine State."

Unfortunately, when Michigan's 1850 constitution was written, the writers were afflicted by notions of electing every post possible. Thus our long ballot developed. The 1908 and 1964 constitutions were essentially rewrites of the 1850 constitution.

When the University of Michigan was established, the idea was that it would operate a number of branches across the state, much like the University of California does today. But in the financial panic of the late 1830s, all branches were closed or branch plans cancelled except for the main campus in Ann Arbor. Then, as the state added universities, we got into the bad habit of electing too many boards of trustees.

THE TIME HAS come to call a halt to this long ballot nonsense.

People don't know for whom they're voting. Some good people are still being elected to those offices, but a frightening number are hacks with a personal axe to grind.

Meanwhile, as the ballot grows longer and longer, more and more folks are using the absentee ballot, which is marked on paper, which leads to errors in the counting process and which defeats the purpose of machine ballot technology.

If Milliken is serious about shortening the ballot, a lot of local clerks, political scientists, thinking voters, and this editor are behind him.

Our soul's not for sale

Came across an interesting account in the Jan. 6 edition of the PEA Hotline—the newsletter sent to all faculty members by the union for teachers in the Plymouth Community School District.

The account is of interest because the PEA writer, or maybe the PEA itself, seems to believe the Observer would sell its soul for advertising revenue.

The PEA fails to realize that the Observer has standards which advertisers must meet—a basic one being truth. The PEA also fails to realize that newspapers can be held liable for false claims made by an advertiser which results in libel.

THE PARTICULAR advertisement referred to above is one paid for by the PEA to reveal salary raises granted members of the central administration.

This newspaper's concern at the time was that the advertisement attributed us as the source of the information, but yet contained percentage increases which were inaccurate and which we did not publish.

Another factor the PEA doesn't understand is that the Observer, as a matter of regular policy, requires advance payment for any political advertisement before it is accepted.

The PEA newsletter account accused the Observer of attempted censorship because of alleged "deliberate" delays in accepting the advertisement, and alleges that we tried to censor by insisting on cash in advance.

And when we dared to question the accuracy of information in the advertisement, the PEA leadership suggested it was none of our business—that we should run the advertisement as it was and let the chips fall on the PEA alone.

THE PHRASE which caught my eye was that the factual accuracy of the advertisement was "none of our business" because the PEA was "liable," not the newspaper.

First, in libel law, a newspaper will usually be named co-defendant in a libel action and made to pay damages if the courts determine an actual libel occurred in any advertisement. That is but one reason why we screen advertisements carefully and reserve the right to reject outright or to insist

on change before acceptance.

But there is another factor of greater importance which explains why we make it our business what appears in the Observer—be it in our news columns or advertising columns. It does make a difference to us, regardless of whether it makes a difference to the PEA, whether the public is misled on purported statements of fact.

Above and beyond legal obligations, the Observer has a self-imposed standard of responsible journalism which makes it our business to check out factual statements which we know to be incorrect. While we cannot always determine truth, we have an obligation to pursue truth and certainly have definite responsibility when we have personal knowledge that what is claimed to be isn't so.

In the case of the PEA, the figures in question probably resulted from a mathematical error. I really don't believe that the PEA leadership deliberately wanted to place wrong pay hike percentages in the advertisements to mislead readers.

But we were in a position to know

that the percentages in the advertisement were inaccurate. We had a responsibility to inform the PEA of the discrepancy and suggest revision.

THE OTHER PROBLEMS alluded to arise because the PEA apparently wasn't aware that we require cash in advance for political advertisements.

That's a policy applied to any candidate for office or to any group with a political message to sell. The reason for the delay in acceptance is that a month before the December request, another PEA representative asked for an advertisement and was told of the cash-in-advance requirement. The PEA officer answered that the requirement was unacceptable and the advertisement would be placed in another newspaper. That suggestion was taken at face value and the PEA wasn't pursued by us any further.

The advertisement in question did finally appear, but there was some "hassle" (to quote the PEA) before it was accepted. The lesson for the PEA or for anyone else who may not know is—our soul is not for sale.

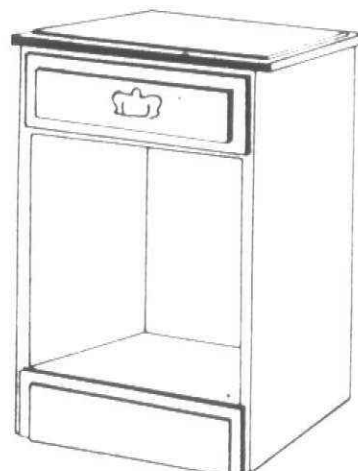

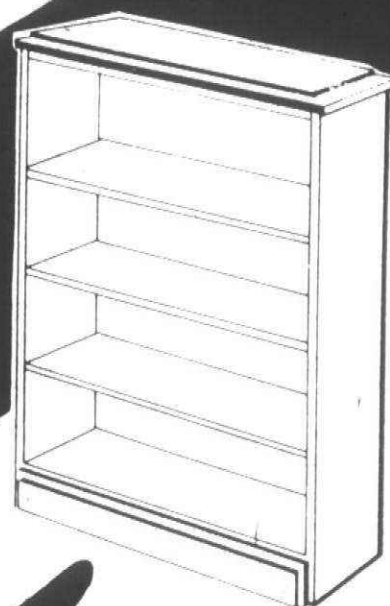

Jambo from Kenya

Bob and Melissa Catlett are on their way home after spending Christmas with their families for the first time in 13 years.

By the time they return to the farm by way of Ireland, Switzerland, and Egypt, their holiday visit will have involved a journey of more than 22,000 miles.

"Home" is a little farm on the edge of the Rift Valley in Kenya, East Africa.

"There's a warm spring there, a stream and a small lake," said Catlett.

"The valley is 90 miles wide there and we have a marvelous view. It's a beautiful panorama."

He said the Rift started in Iran, went through the Red Sea, Ethiopia and East Africa, all the way down to South Africa.

AS THEY REPAKED before leaving, they were having second thoughts about the stopovers planned for the return trip. They were anxious to get home.

"And we're so tired," they agreed. They had arrived in Eugene, Ore., in time to spend Christmas with his

sister Kitty, her husband David Piercy, and their children Andy and Vincent. It was a meeting of the clan with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Catlett of Plymouth joining the group.

Back in Plymouth, with only one day left before their plane took off, they were beginning to react to the traveling and the busy pace.

Their's had been a Peace Corps romance. Melissa is from Cleveland and they met in Nazareth, Ethiopia, where Bob was teaching university extension.

Bob is associate director of the Adult Studies Center of the University of Nairobi. The university is in Kikuyu, a town 13 miles from Nairobi, the capital of Kenya.

"The work is very interesting," he said. "I do the planning and then the evaluating."

Persons trained in the adult education center are similar to our extension service representatives. They go out to the small communities and teach family planning, education and health.

"It is aimed at home and family health."

Do they teach birth control? "Not directly," was the answer. "If they see undernourished children, they direct the parent to the clinic hos-

pital. There they will receive medical aid and birth control information."

BOB CATLETT'S enthusiasm for Kenya and its people gives the impression the east African country would do well to hire him as a PR man for its tourist bureau.

"Kenya is one of the most secure countries in the world," he said. "The political climate is good. People are safe. The wildlife is the most incredible and the scenery is beautiful."

The main crops are maize, sweet potatoes, white potatoes and beans. Then there are the cash crops—coffee, tea and dairy products.

"The best tea in the world is grown in Kenya. There is an abundance of dairy products—good butter and a fine selection of cheeses. The best steak is \$1 a pound. The best ground beef is 50 cents a pound."

"Their imports are not restricted so the shops have a fine variety of merchandise."

He said peanuts—they call them ground nuts—are grown in west Africa. So yes, peanut butter is available in Kenya.

Nairobi is 6,000 feet above sea level. The ground rises to 8,000 feet at the escarpment on the edge of the Rift. Here the land is fertile and the population the densest.

"It takes me 30 minutes to drive to work. The driving is pleasant, no traffic problems or hazards—no ulcers. One in a while, there's a stalled truck on the road but that's it."

"The road from Kikuyu is two-lane asphalt. The last 2½ miles to the farm is a dirt road, a little tricky when it's raining."

Taken as a whole, he said, it was a most pleasant drive.

THEN THERE ARE the people. There are more than 40 tribes. The eight big tribes average about 500,000 members each.

"We've experienced regionalism in the United States," explained Bob. "Somehow regionalism gets mixed up with ethnic feeling. In Kenya, the government has handled this very well."

"The people are interested in foreigners—they want to learn. And they themselves are interesting."

Not far from their farm, the Catletts can visit the Masai and see them dancing.

In enumerating the joys of life in Kenya, Bob encouraged everyone to come and see for themselves the people and "how they celebrate life."

He added that visitors would be welcomed with a warm "jambo" which is hello in Swahili.

Energy-saving house has decorator touch

The new four-columned colonial on Beacon Hill just off Ann Arbor Trail has features which will appeal to both sexes. In fact, builder John Casey admits his head is still whirling from the experience of having an interior decorator on the job before the actual building of the house is completed.

It has been a first for Casey, one of four builders on the last phase of Bud Gould's Beacon Hill estates.

It also is a first for Gary Beglinger of Gary B. Interiors who says the whole project has been so exciting "I wake up at 4 a.m. thinking about it. It's getting to the point where I can't sleep."

She said she usually is called in when a house is completed. "And I hear all the things the owner is unhappy about."

"As a homemaker and mother first, I hope to eliminate the problems before they happen."

"It's a matter of listening to the consumer instead of the builder and the banker," Casey added.

FROM A CONSTRUCTION standpoint, Casey is enthused about the results of low energy planning.

The heating bill for the month of December was less than \$40 for the roomy four-bedroom house.

"And that was with the windows

open half the time and workmen going in and out," added Casey.

Secret of the fuel saving is insulation. The extra thickness of the walls is noticeable at the windows.

Once the 2x4 studding was installed, an inch-thick layer of Dow insulated foam board was put in place on the outer side. Between the studs, a 3½-inch layer of Owens-Corning insulation was added.

A layer of Visqueen covered the insulation before the ¾-inch drywall was installed. The brick on the outside is 3½ inches thick.

Ceilings received the same three-fold insulation and the windows are two-layered thermopane with wood sashes.

"And the mullions are between the panes for easy cleaning," Ms. Beglinger was quick to add.

Casey said both Dow Chemical and Owens-Corning are very interested in the house and want to use it in their advertising.

Casey believes they have cut fuel bills in half.

GARY B.'S TOUCH is in evidence throughout the house.

The large foyer has a gracefully curved stairway. The banister was handmade on the job—layers of wood glued together and bent to the shape of the curve.

The floor will be ceramic tile,

brown and white, and the wallpaper will have a silky quality.

"No matter where you look, from one room to another, the colors will flow. It will all be coordinated," said Ms. Beglinger.

The living room is a "green in the brown family" which flows into the dining room.

"The chair rail was her idea," said Casey. "And the crown molding. We always paint it the same color as the walls, we never do it like that."

The kitchen with its breakfast room is spacious. Samples of craftsman wallpapers and drapery fabrics on the kitchen counterrevealed the decorator's meaning of coordination.

The pantry opens off the kitchen and the powder room, already papered in brown and off-white, is just outside the kitchen.

A painter was at work on the beams for the 30-foot family room.

The fireplace wall is entirely brick with a hearth the full width of the room.

"That's Chicago brick," said Casey, doubtfully. "It's cheap brick, but that's what she wanted."

"It's exactly right," Gary reassured him. "I like it because it looks like Indian corn."

The room will be papered, both ceiling and walls, between the beams.

There is a small wet bar off the family room and the back hallway is covered with "kid-proof" paper.

ALTHOUGH THERE IS a full basement, the laundry room is on the first floor, just off the back hallway.

Milk chocolate carpeting will cover the stairs and the living and dining rooms. The upstairs hallway will have white carpeting.

The second floor has many ideas novel to the builder.

There are double doors opening into the master bedroom. Casey had a running commentary of "Look-what-she-dids." He pointed out the crown molding, the rack in the closet to accommodate 42 pairs of shoes, the espresso tile in the bathrooms and the tiled step-up to the tub in one of the bathrooms.

"The white carpet will extend into what I consider the little girl's room," said Gary.

And in a bathroom, "This is going to be gorgeous with double vanities and chocolate brown and white paper."

"Here's another thing she made me do," said the builder, pointing to shoe rack in the boy's closet. "Room for 18 pairs of shoes."

The decorator was not perturbed. "The walls and the carpet will be beige and the beige carpet will extend into fourth bedroom which I see as sort of an upstairs sitting room."

"It can be used for a guest room, or for the son or daughter who is away at school when they are home. Or if someone wants a quiet place to watch television."

"I always picture families in a house. I can see five people in this house without losing their privacy. They wouldn't be bumping into each other."

THE HOUSE WILL be a model home and at present the sales office is in the library. Later it will be moved to the 2½-car garage.

The Carrier clock thermostat has not yet been installed. Casey considers this another another energy-saver. It will automatically lower the thermostat at a set time every night and turn it up again before the family gets up in the morning.

"They say it gives a 10 per cent reduction in the fuel bill," he said.

People have been walking through the house already. Even when the decorating is complete, they do not intend to furnish it.

Vandalism in model homes has been high, and they believe prospective buyers can more easily picture

their own furniture in an empty house. Also, the house will sell itself, not the fancy furnishings.

"I believe this is the Grosse Pointe

The Mothers March on Birth Defects begins today and continues through the 27th. This week your neighbors will be marching door to door collecting for the March of Dimes to help children like our own Debbie Ott of N. Umberland Drive here in Canton who is the 1977 poster child for the Metropolitan Detroit area.

Debbie is the two-and-a-half-year-old daughter of Don and Kathy Ott. She was born with spina bifida more commonly referred to as open spine, which is a malformation of the central nervous system. The defective spinal cord means undeveloped nerve fibers causing brain impulses to short circuit, resulting in weakness or even total paralysis of the legs.

Fortunately Debbie is not totally paralyzed and is learning to walk with the help of braces and a walker. She has had her walker only for a couple of weeks and moves about her home happily. Some day she will learn to walk with crutches with the proper help.

Mrs. Ott is now concerned that her daughter may not receive the help she needs. The Plymouth School District provides a teacher and occupational therapist who comes to her home. "What we really need is a physical therapist to help these children. Debbie is now at a crucial age. She's already behind in learning to walk. We need someone to teach us how to help her use her braces and walker properly," says Kathy.

One of the services the March of Dimes supports is the Spina Bifida Association of Michigan, a parent organization.

Parents meet once a month at Children's Hospital to discuss their common problems. Another valuable purpose is to provide information regarding medical, social and therapeutic aspects of spina bifida. They provide parents of newborn spina bifida children someone to identify with.

Debbie is a very lovable little girl. She is charming, warm and talkative. Being the poster child she has attended many fund raising events for the March of Dimes including a meeting in Detroit Mayor Coleman Young's office to kick off the campaign. Her mom said that she's become so accustomed to all the fanfare that whenever someone comes up to her she automatically puts out her hand to have it shook.

Her sister Jennifer, five, a kindergarten at Miller Elementary is becoming used to her sister's new fame. To think that only ten years ago Debbie would not have survived is a real tribute to the March of Dimes research projects.

The March of Dimes goals for all children with birth defects can be included in what the Spina Bifida Association says about their goals for the future, "To increase public awareness and concern; to help our children obtain a better education and work training; to help them remain socially and emotionally well-adjusted; and to help them be contributing members of the community. To stimulate greater interest in research to find the cause and prevention of this birth defect. To help our children reach their full potential through medical, surgical, therapeutic and educational aspects, for they may be handicapped physically, but never in spirit."

THIS IS THE first year that Canton's march will be separate from Plymouth's. Sandy Ritter of Ryegate is chairwoman for the township. She has a very healthy five-year-old daughter and helps the March of Dimes every year so that children like Debbie can have the same opportunities that her own daughter has.

"This being our first year," says Sandy, "we haven't really started any big fund raisers yet. Maybe next year I'll have more time to organize something special for Canton."

The captains in the area, the women responsible for collecting the money that the hundreds of marchers will receive are, Judy Miller of Gyde Road, Dianne Evans of Ravenwood Drive, Judy Krugler of Thornwood Drive, Kathy Barr of Sturbridge Drive, Lynne Goldsmith of Bannockburn Ct., Roberta Abbott of Foxthorn Drive, Carol Kaczmarek of Holly Drive, Sandi Dodson of Carriage Hill Drive, and Joy Westerkamp of Mantion Ave.

Canisters will be placed in local shopping centers by the Jayettes. This campaign will run until the end of February.

Sandy called Sue Roth, president of the Jayettes for help with the drive and Sue and other members were at her home the next day picking up the canisters and information to help out, which says a lot for the super ladies in Canton.

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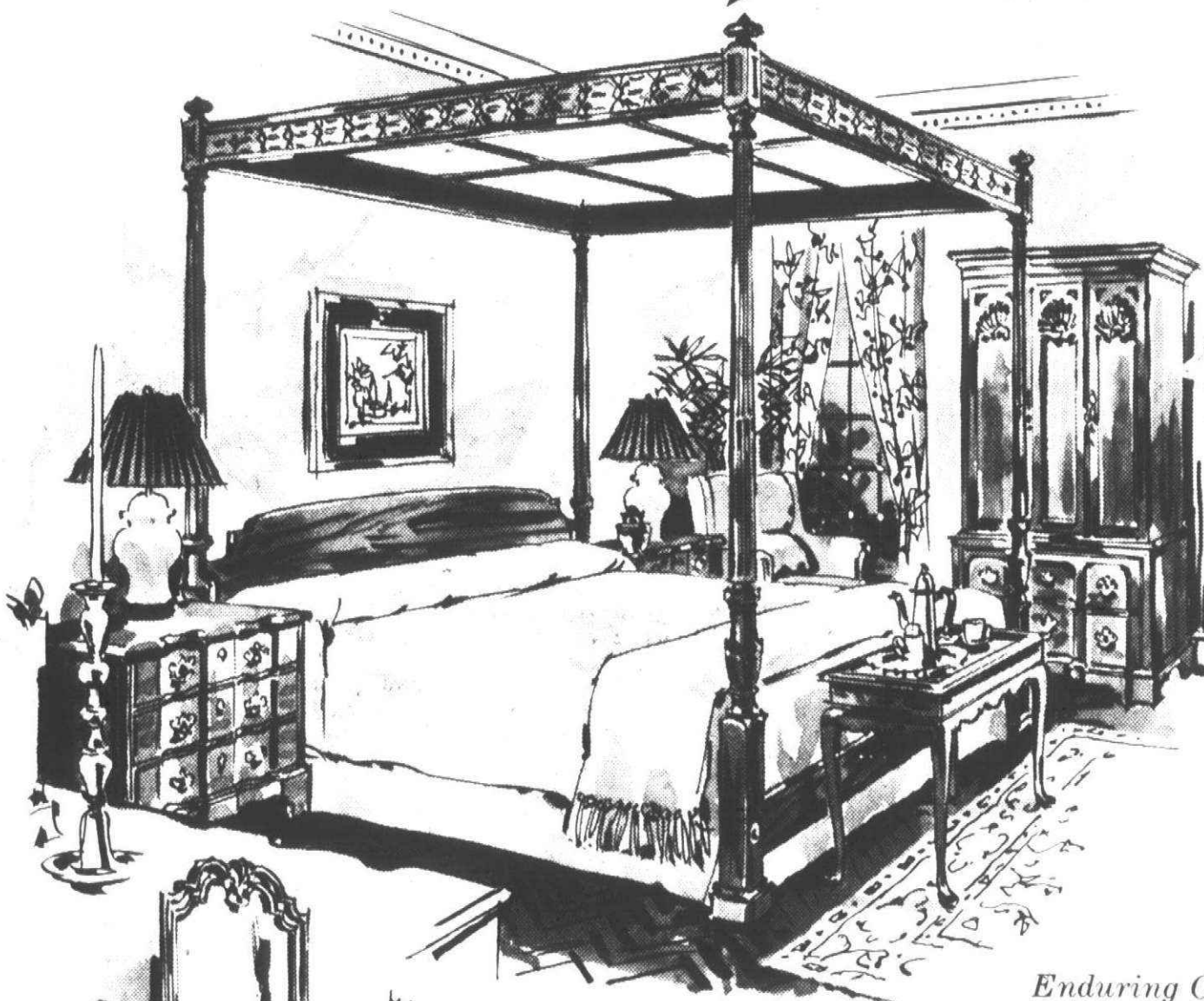





A motion was made by Schwall and supported by Bradley and unanimously carried that the following amendment to the Zoning Ordinance be introduced, tabled and published.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND
THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE
CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON,
BEING ORDINANCE NUMBER _____

The Charter Township of Canton, Wayne County, Michigan, ORDAINS

SECTION I

Section 20.01, entitled Creation of a Board of Zoning Appeals of the zoning ordinance of the Charter Township of Canton, Wayne County, Michigan, entitled:

AN ORDINANCE to regulate and restrict the use of land and buildings by dividing the Charter Township of Canton into districts; defining certain terms used therein; imposing regulations, prohibitions and restrictions governing the erection, construction of structures and buildings to be used for business, industry, residence, social, and specified purposes; the use of lands; regulating and limiting the height and bulk of buildings and other structures; regulating and limiting lot occupancy and the size of yards and other open spaces; regulating and limiting the density of population; limiting congestion upon the public streets by providing for the off-street parking and loading of vehicles; providing the gradual elimination of non-conforming uses of land, buildings and structures; establishing the boundaries of districts; creating a Board of Zoning Appeals; defining and limiting the powers and duties of said Board; and setting standards to guide actions of said Board and providing the means of enforcing said Ordinance and providing penalties for violation of this Ordinance

is hereby repealed.

SECTION II

A new section of the said Ordinance to be known as Section 20.01, Creation of a Board of Zoning Appeals, is hereby adopted and shall read as follows:

The Board of Zoning Appeals shall consist of five (5) members to be appointed by the Township Board, the first member of which shall be a member of the Township Planning Commission. The remaining members of the Board of Appeals shall be selected from the electors of the Township residing outside incorporated cities and villages. The members selected shall be representative of the population distribution and of the various interests present in the Township. One member may be a member of the Township Board. An elected officer of the Township shall not serve as chairman of the Board of Appeals. An employee or contractor of the Township Board may not serve as a member or employee of the Board of Appeals. Members of the Board of Appeals shall be removable by the Township Board for non-performance of duty or misconduct in office upon written charges and after public hearing. A member shall disqualify himself from a vote in which he has a conflict of interest and failure to so disqualify himself shall constitute misconduct in office.

The term of each member shall be for three (3) years, except that of the members first appointed, two (2) shall serve for two (2) years and the remaining members for three (3) years. A successor shall be appointed not more than one month after the term of the preceding member has expired. All vacancies for unexpired terms shall be filled for the remainder of the term.

The Board of Appeals shall not conduct business unless a majority of the members of the Board are present.

SECTION III

This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its adoption by the Township Board

Madonna opens full day care facility Jan. 31

A new day care center will be opened by the Felician Sisters Jan. 31, bringing to three the number of early childhood development facilities on their property at the western end of the Madonna College campus, 36800 Schoolcraft, Livonia.

The Angela Marie Day Care Center, to be under the direction of Sister Mary DePaul, will expand the capabilities of the nursery service and offer for the first time the possibility of child care for a full day.

Sister DePaul said there have been requests, many of them from members of the staffs of Madonna and St. Mary Hospital as well as Madonna students with young children, for a suitable facility where children could stay all day.

Only half days are available in the Maria Nursery and the Montessori Center of Our Lady, currently operating at the site.

The Angela Marie Day Care Center is licensed to care for 30 youngsters between the ages of 2½ and six, Mondays through Fridays from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Designed to accomodate the needs of working parents, who are unable to spend time with children during their formative years on a full-time basis, the program will be aimed at supplementing parental care rather than substituting for it, Sister DePaul said.

THE NEW DIRECTOR explained that there will be some differences in the program of the center because it extends the early educational development of the child over a longer period of time.

Its aim also will be to provide an environment with learning experiences that simulate as closely as possible the youngster's natural growth and development within the family and among his peers.

The center, she went on, will be equipped to meet young needs from a physical, emotional, intellectual, spiritual and social standpoint, taking into consideration the fact that children advance in all these categories at an individual pace.

Some school readiness will be in the program, as well as opportunities for self-motivation, social development and coordination.

Children already enrolled in half-day sessions at the Montessori Center and the Maria Nursery may register for the new day care center, the director said.

Registration for others will be 14 and 7-9 p.m. Wednesday and Thursday, Jan. 19 and 20.

Interested parents also may call Sister DePaul at 427-5980 or 427-3300.

SISTER DEPAUL said the center would accept enrollment for half days as well as full and on a daily as well as a weekly basis.

Hot lunches, mid-morning and mid-afternoon snacks will be served, and arrival times may be adjusted whenever necessary upon arrangement at the time of registration.

The fee for the Angela Marie center will be \$35 per week or \$7 per day. This is slightly higher than the Maria nursery, but the two will be brought into line in the near future. The Montessori Center operates on a tuition basis.

The director is a graduate of Madonna College and did graduate work at Wayne State University.

She taught kindergarten and primary grades for nearly 20 years and has served as a camp counselor for pre-schoolers.

In recent assignments, she has served as principal at St. Edith Catholic School in the parish and at St. Hyacinth school in Detroit.

She is an active member of the Livonia Council for Early Childhood Services.

The Angela Marie center is the fourth child care institution for the Felician Sisters. Besides those in Livonia, the order operates St. Joseph Child Care Center in Jackson.

Slight rise in food prices expected

Consumers will spend only slightly more at the retail food counter in 1977 than they did last year; price hikes are expected, on the whole, to be less than the general inflation rate.

"A general increase of three per cent in grocery prices and an increase of four per cent on food eaten away from home in 1977 over 1976," is predicted by Dr. John N. Ferris, Michigan State University economist. Predicated on the expectation that per capita consumer incomes will increase eight to nine per cent during the new year, the percentage of disposable income spent on food—about 17 per cent in 1976—will be even less in 1977.

"Inflation will continue in 1977 at about a five per cent pace and we assume marketing spreads will increase in a similar fashion," Ferris said. "With substantially lower pork prices and higher beef prices, meat prices in total will increase very little above 1976 levels. Retail prices on poultry will be higher and eggs will be lower than in 1976. We would expect retail prices on most other major food items to increase on the order of about five per cent in 1977 over 1976."

The Bureau of Labor Statistics shows that the All Food Price Index (AFPI) rise was about three per cent last year. The AFPI does conceal

some divergent movements in the farm and marketing component parts of food prices, Ferris said. Farm prices have been declining while marketing spreads (differences between farm and retail prices) have increased. In the third quarter of 1976, the farm value of a "typical food market basket" was 10 per cent less than the year before while the marketing spread was up six per cent. When added together, the retail cost was down slightly from the year before, Ferris explained.

The market basket contains the average quantities of domestically farm-originated food products bought

annually per household in 1960 and 1961 by consumers. The computations are made by the USDA.

"The six per cent increase in marketing spread is close to the rate of inflation—a typical pattern," Ferris said. Marketing spreads usually are closely correlated with the general price level, he added, because the food industry is reasonably competitive and profit levels are in line with similar types of business.

Inflation has been more pronounced on food eaten away from home than on food purchased at grocery stores, he stated.

There is no fee.

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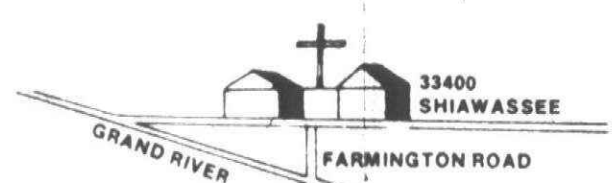

Village church hosts workshops

Cardinal John Dearden, Archbishop of Detroit, has proposed a decentralization plan which calls for the reassignment of the four assistant bishops of the Archdiocese of Detroit.

The plan calls for assignment of the bishops to one of four vicariate groupings in the Archdiocese, each living and working with the priests and people of the area in an effort to provide increased spiritual leadership and improved communication.

There are 339 parishes and missions in the archdiocese, which serves approximately 1.5 million Catholics living in Wayne, Oakland, Macomb, Monroe, Lapeer, and St. Clair counties.

These parishes are now grouped into 28 clusters of parishes called vicariates. Under the Cardinal's plan, these vicariates would be put into four groupings of six or seven vicari-

ates each. How the vicariates will be grouped and the specific assignments of the bishops have not yet been determined.

THE CARDINAL'S plan is part of a growing tendency in the church toward increased pastoral ministry for bishops. Cardinal Dearden emphasized that drawing the vicariates into the four groupings would continue the positive developments of the vicariates and have a unifying effect.

There is no set timetable for the implementation of the plan, although it is expected to be in effect by May 1, or July 1 at the latest. Cardinal Dearden has initiated a series of consultations, inviting the priests of the archdiocese to offer their comments and suggestions before the plan is finalized.

Davey group seeks songbirds

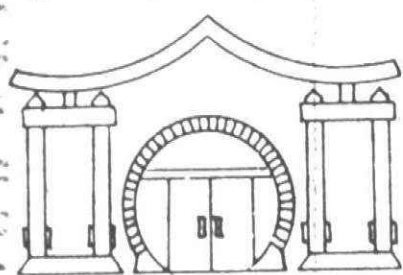

Redford Union to exit Suburban-8

By DOUG FUNKE

Redford Union, associated with the Suburban Eight League since the loop was formed in the 1930s as the Suburban Six-B League, will sever its ties with that conference and become the sixth member of the Northwest Suburban League.

Howard Kraft, long-time athletic director at RU, said that while details remain to be worked out between principals and athletic directors of both conferences in the weeks ahead, RU will make the switch.

Kraft speculated that the change probably will not be made until after the fall sports season during the 1978-79 school year.

"There isn't any doubt that we're going to move," Kraft said. "Officially, they (NWS) have accepted us."

Kraft cited increasing transportation costs as the factor behind the decision to relocate in a conference con-

taining more area schools.

"Trenton and Belleville are 30 miles away," Kraft said of two of the Sub Eight schools. "Financially, this can't go on."

Other Sub-8 schools are Allen Park, Dearborn, Dearborn Edsel Ford, Livonia Bentley and Plymouth Salem.

Kraft emphasized that the waiting period before formally joining the NWS League will enable RU to honor its scheduling commitments through then. "We don't want to hurt anyone," Kraft repeatedly noted.

While Sub-8 members will likely be unhappy at RU's decision and resulting scheduling problems with an odd number of members, NWS officials will likely be pleased, since a scheduling problem will be solved for them.

"We've been trying to find another school since Oak Park dropped out (1974-75 school year)," said George

Lovich, athletic director at Livonia Franklin.

The NWS League presently consists of Franklin, North Farmington, Westland John Glenn, Garden City East and Redford Thurston, all considerably closer to RU than most Sub-8 schools.

George Fefles, athletic director at Livonia Bentley, said that while he is sorry that RU is leaving the Sub Eight, he has assurances that RU and Bentley will continue to meet in a

non-league capacity in all sports.

"Basically, I guess their enrollment is going down and geographically, I guess they're better off in the alignment they're going into," Fefles continued.

"We'll probably be looking for an eighth team (for the Sub-8)," Fefles said. "We would not pursue anyone. They would have to come to us."

Fefles added that he does not expect Bentley to change conferences at this time.

John Sandmann, athletic director at Plymouth Salem, also indicated that Salem would probably remain in the Sub-8, at least for the time being.

"As of right now, our plans are probably to stay in," Sandmann said. "I have no immediate plans to make any recommendations to do otherwise."

"Our relations in the Sub-8 have been good and I personally think it's a

Plymouth Canton girls' volleyball team registered its first league victory, beating Waterford Mott Monday night in two games, 16-14, 15-13.

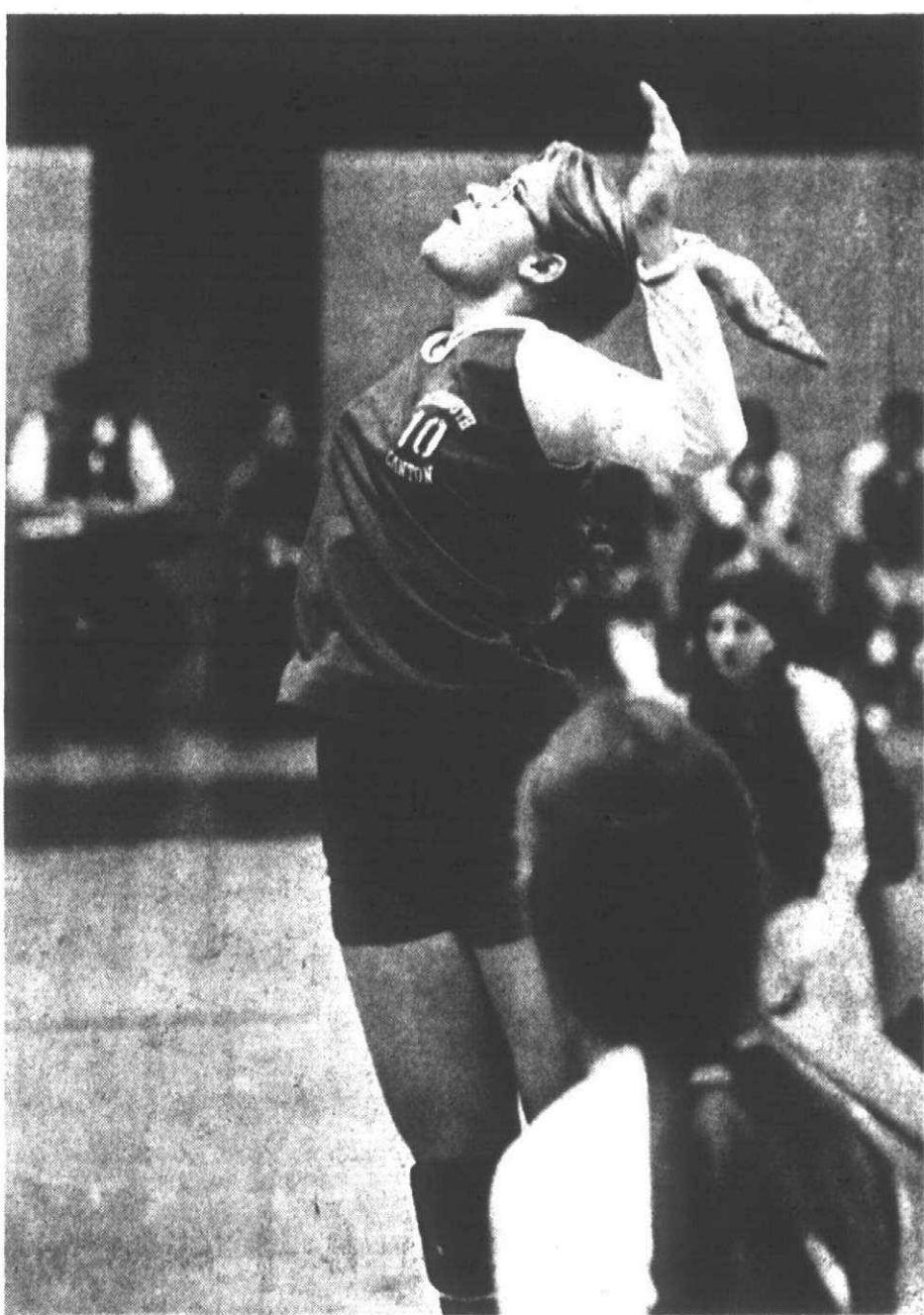
Canton was able to win the first game after an overtime period. When the clock ran out, the Chiefs were ahead, 14-13. But in order to win, a team must have a two-point advantage.

It always has been said that rolling a perfect game was the peak of a bowler's ability. But this isn't so if you look at the records.

Checking with Tom McKay, executive secretary of the Greater Detroit Bowling Association, it was learned that only 14 perfect games have been recorded since the season opened in September. This is below the total of other years. But when it comes to 299 games, only seven have been reported.

All of which leads one to believe that a 299 is much more of a rarity than a perfect game.

AL BRASS experienced one of those moments that come to few bowlers when he took his regular turn in the Wonderland Classic Tuesday night.

Bowling with the ExuCel products team he opened with a 185, jumped to 213 and then strung up 11 strikes in a row in his third game.

But here Lady Luck frowned on him when he left up the No. 4 pin on a solid hit and had to settle for 299 and a 697 series.

Only a few lanes away, Joe Charron had much the same experience—only a few frames earlier—and settled for a 289.

The Ryder Ranger team, first-half champion, rolled the high series of the night with a 3146.

It was a different story in the senior house league. Here George Bashara, son of the owner, fashioned a 728 series.

It's the halfway point of the Plymouth Salem basketball season and who would have thought that the Rocks would have a perfect 10-0 record at this time. Not me.

This was supposed to be, and is, a rebuilding year. I figured Salem would be around 5-5 at this point. Even coach Fred Thomann admitted after the Christmas tournament that he figured on losing two of his first five games.

And yet, the Rocks keep that winning tradition—a tradition that has been instilled by Thomann and his program.

I am one that believes the fate of a team winning or losing depends on the talent of a club, and not the coaching. But in this case, I have to give Thomann the credit for Salem's successes.

Thomann and I have not seen eye-to-eye on many things over the past two years but I have to give credit where credit is due.

DURING THE ERAS of the Agardys and the Ellinghausens I always felt that these big men were the secret behind Salem's record breaking seasons.

But this year, I give credit to Thomann for the job he's done with a team that doesn't have a big man. Thomann has taught his players to have the pride that goes with the winning teams of the past. And this pride

reflects in the way the Rocks play.

And it hasn't been easy for Thomann. He has had to adjust his methods of coaching and his style of play because he lacks a big man.

He told me last year, when the 1975-76 team was state-ranked and undefeated, that next year's group would be just as good. I didn't believe him then and I didn't believe it at the beginning of the season. But Thomann's results are in from of you—he's 10-0 at mid-season.

NOW THE QUESTION is whether or not this Rock squad belongs in the state-ratings this year. Salem has been on the honorable mention lists but not in the top ten.

I think it's still a little premature to call Salem a state-ranked team. True, the record is spotless, but most of its tough games have been at home where the Rocks have lost only once in the last 34 games.

Salem has a tough second-half of the season that includes Bentley, Belleville, Dearborn, Dearborn Edsel Ford, Redford Union, Dearborn Fordson and Allen Park all on the road. That's seven different gyms in the last 10 regular season games.

The Rocks still have to prove that they can win on the road. If they can win five for six of these tough away tests, then they deserve a state-ranking.
