

Woman serving life discusses death penalty

Mary Butler is a slim, attractive, brightly dressed homeowner and mother of four children. She works in the law library of the Women's Division of the Detroit House of Corrections (DeHoCo).

She also is serving a natural life sentence for first degree murder. And she has some very definite opinions about capital punishment.

"The crime of murder is uncivilized and barbaric," she said, "but so is execution. It's legalized murder. You use the law to kill, and the law isn't foolproof."

As an individual who has experienced the legal system in a manner few people do, Ms. Butler's main concern is with the built-in inequities of the system.

Her conversation is full of references to paid police informants, selective enforcement of laws, and lawyers and judges who are on the take.

While she acknowledges there must be punishment for those who violate the rules of society, she feels there must also be an effort to help them. The prison system, she said, does not rehabilitate.

"You have to realize," she commented, "the correction institutions we have now are a big business. They provide jobs and money. But there

are no good programs that really help people get out of jail and stay out."

She said she has seen women come into jail for all sorts of crimes. Some of them complete their sentence and never come back. Others get released and are back a short time later, convicted of another crime. She feels a death sentence overlooks this kind of basic individual difference in attitudes.

"Capital punishment will not change anybody's mentality," she said. "That only comes through education. If people think having a death sentence will stop crime, they are sadly mistaken."

AGAIN AND AGAIN she talked

about having to look at the whole structure of society in order to understand why people commit crimes.

"It's easy to judge when you are comfortable," she said. "But when you are hungry with mouths to feed and no place to stay and no place to go, the thought of being executed isn't going to stop anything, and you can believe that."

"As long as our society is run by money and power, and as long as men lust after them, there's going to be robbing, and stealing, and killing. And sentencing a few people to die won't change any of that."

She emphasized the role poor people play in the judicial system. "We are

victims, too. We are expendable and are scapegoats. We are sacrificed so everyone can keep on with their business."

IN TERMS OF AN answer to the question of how society can protect itself from criminals, she was at a loss.

"Do you know why you can't answer the question of what to do?" she asked. "It's because there is no one answer. Longer jail sentences, capital punishment; they aren't answers. It's just easy to think they are."

"When I lived in Detroit, my house was robbed and broken into more than once, and I was just as afraid as everyone else. But I don't have an answer."

"We have to reorganize everything, and that will take a lot of time. You and I will be dead when it happens. In the meantime we'll have to live with it."

When asked if having a death penalty would have prevented her from committing the crime she was convicted of, she said it would not.

"Sometimes people get into situations where they have no choice," she said. "And that's what happened to me. I had no choice. A lot of people who don't think so could find themselves in my position. I know I can't go back, but maybe I can go forward."

School forum set to settle contract

A town hall-type meeting has been scheduled for Monday to give the public a chance to engage in an open dialogue on the present impasse of negotiations between teachers and the Plymouth Community School District.

The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the cafeteria of Plymouth Canton High School, 8415 Canton Center Road just south of Joy.

School board members will be on hand to answer questions from the audience.

The forum scheduled at Monday night's school board meeting was prompted by a number of questions on contract negotiations during the "citizens suggestions" portion of the agenda.

Because many of the questions were lengthy, the time restraints imposed by a regular meeting made it difficult to supply detailed answers to all questions, commented Trustee Marcia Borowski. She suggested, and the board agreed, that a special town hall-type meeting be arranged so concerns could be aired and answers to questions supplied.

ABOUT 250 PERSONS had packed the cafeteria for Monday's board meeting, many of them teachers who had been picketing in front of Canton High prior to the start of the meeting.

During the citizens suggestions portion of the meeting, a number of residents urged the board to break the impasse on negotiations with teachers, asked why administrators received pay raises and teachers haven't, and wondered why some classes are experiencing a shortage of textbooks.

Betty Hamann of Canton urged the board to negotiate a contract with the PEA before April's election on millage renewal and a bond issue for new construction. "We are fooling ourselves and potentially harming our children if we don't view the lack of a contract at this stage as the time bomb it really is. The teachers have been working six months now without a contract, and that has serious community ramifications."

She said the lack of a contract has caused a sense of resentment against teachers by some and has left parents confused. "Before the last millage election, parents were assured that it

was only a matter of time before a contract agreement would be reached, but now it is said there is no money to meet the teachers' requests.

"But questions are raised when administrators get raises and new administrators are hired. Regardless of the merit of the administrative raises, the money had to come from somewhere. Did it come from the additional 4.75 mills? Did the money for the five new administrators come from the 4.75 mills? Yet we say the teachers (Continued on page 8A)

Sheriffs swayed election: Donahue

Because of a local citizen's complaint, federal investigators may soon conduct an inquiry to determine if members of Wayne County Local 502 illegally used their position as sheriff's deputies to influence the outcome of the Nov. 2 Canton Township election.

Jim Donahue, former co-chairman of the Committee to Re-elect the Greenstein Team, has requested the United States Civil Service Commission (CSC) to conduct the inquiry as part of a two-pronged investigation into the election.

Federal CSC investigators said Tuesday a preliminary inquiry is also under way to determine if Canton trustee Eugene Daley, a lieutenant in the sheriff's department, violated the federal Hatch Act when he ran for office in a partisan election and won.

DONAHUE CHARGES Local 502, which endorsed and contributed \$500 to Supervisor Harold Stein's slate in the election, with "improper use of official authority of influence" in the election, a violation of federal law.

Growth control debated Moratorium denied

Citizens for Growth Control made its presence known to the Canton board Tuesday night by asking the board to deny final approval of a preliminary plat at Cavalier West subdivision.

The growth-control group has demanded that Canton declare a moratorium on approving building permits, believing the township is growing so fast it is nearing its capacity in schools, sewers and roads.

During an engineers' report, given as the meeting stretched into early Wednesday morning, planner Robert Wade said Canton's sewers will be at capacity if the plans presently approved and under consideration are built.

After lengthy discussion, the board unanimously approved the plat.

Stan Bucher, co-chairman of the Citizens for Growth Control, told the board to table all items on the agenda that would allow a builder to continue to develop in Canton.

Dick Lewiston, developer of the Cavalier subdivision, took sharp exception to the idea of a moratorium on new construction.

Lewiston said he thought the growth control group was over-reacting to Canton's growth and didn't believe that the "dire predictions" would be a problem.

"We've developed in towns with faster growth than Canton, such as Troy and Sterling Heights, and those towns did a more than adequate job of housing school children," Lewiston said.

Lewiston became embroiled in a public debate with anti-growth proponent Peter Bundarin during the meeting over the merits, or lack thereof, of so-called growth-control ordinances enacted in other states such as California's Petaluma Plan.

"There has yet been passed no

growth-control ordinance in any community in the United States of America," Lewiston said. "Growth control ordinances such as the Petaluma Plan which have received public notoriety have merely created exceptions to single-family home development."

"What I hear tonight is stoppage rather than planning wisely," Lewiston said. "The people who have recently moved into Canton wish to pull the gang plank. I say that is unfair and unlawful and urge people to learn what's really contained in plans like Petaluma."

Bundarin rose to defend the Petaluma Plan, saying it was indeed a plan that allows a community to control and limit its growth.

"All we're saying is plans like Petaluma—and I'm not saying Petaluma is the answer for Canton—say we do have the right to control our growth," Bundarin answered. "We want orderly, regulated growth."

"Our roads are not up to par. Fire Station No. 2 is opening this spring on a dirt road and will not be able to serve the area it is intended to cover. Ford Road is a two-lane road. When we bring in another 25,000 to 30,000 people what is our sewer capacity? Until there is a well laid-out plan, all we're saying is don't plunge ahead with project approvals."

Lewiston told Bundarin that he didn't believe the problems of municipal expansion are solved "by students of government."

"None of these problems get solved until there is a need to solve them," Lewiston said. "You solve the problems along the way; you solve the problems as they're arising. They are not solved by students of government."

Another person in the audience,

Mrs. Russell Sturtevant, asked Bundarin if he expected to win court settlements that would be brought against the township if any projects are refused because of growth concerns. Besides, she told him, "I don't think you're a very good lawyer."

EACH BOARD member voted to approve the preliminary plat. Even Trustee Robert Myers, who said Tuesday night that he believes there should be a moratorium on any new projects, thought that denial of Cavalier at this stage would be a legal disaster for the township.

"I don't think growth control is achieved by denying good plans," said Schwall. "This developer has performed certain tasks and I believe that final approval serves growth control considerations."

Later in the meeting Bundarin was appointed to a growth-control study committee after board members persuaded him to use his research to help the committee find means of planning the community's growth in a wise manner.

At first Bundarin resisted saying that he didn't feel he could be an unbiased member of the committee.

"You have the right to refuse to serve the township, Peter," said Schwall.

"Since you put it that way, I'll serve," Bundarin said. "If my being on the committee prejudices its impact I don't want to sit on it. But if the board feels that strongly I'll lend my input to the growth study committee."

Sue Koch, the spokesman for Citizens for Growth Control, was also named to the growth study subcommittee which comes under the land use committee jurisdiction.

Daley's job is probed

The United States Civil Service Commission (CSC) is reportedly conducting a "preliminary inquiry" into the election of Canton Township

Trustee Eugene Daley to determine if the official violated provisions of the federal Hatch Act when he ran for township office.

The inquiry is the result of a local resident's complaint.

The Hatch Act prohibits employees of state, county, or municipal agencies to seek public office in a partisan election if their work activity is financed "in whole or in part" by federal funds. Daley works for the Wayne County Sheriff's Department which does receive some federal assistance funds.

CANTON RESIDENT Jim Donahue, former co-chairman of the Committee to Re-elect the Greenstein Team, admits lodging the complaint asking for investigation of Daley's status with the Hatch Act.

Ralph Eddy, trial attorney for the CSC in the Office of General Council, Washington D.C., believes the Hatch Act only applies to those employees whose work activity is "directly funded" by federal grants. If correct, Eddy's interpretation would clear Daley of charges that the trustee violated the Hatch Act.

CSC officials said even if Daley violated the Hatch Act by running for partisan office while working on a job that is partially funded by federal grants, the sheriff's department could possibly retain Daley on its payroll. However, the CSC spokesman said the Hatch Act violation could jeopardize or penalize future federal funds earmarked for the sheriff's department.

Daley's post as trustee would not be affected, according to Eddy. Provisions of the Hatch Act are civil, not criminal, and penalties for violation involve penalties imposed on future funding, and do not involve fines or jail for offenders.

When contacted by the Observer Thursday, Daley said he had no knowl-

edge of an investigation and didn't seem worried about the probe.

"So somebody's trying to bring the 'Hatch Act' down on me, eh?" Daley said. The trustee said he has nothing to hide, and wondered why the inquiry was requested.

"Hell, I don't know what it's all about," he said. "It appears to me that someone is trying to scrape the bottom of the barrel to come up with something against me. Nowadays, everyone is receiving federal funds for something."

Daley said he had no knowledge of the Hatch Act or its provisions, when he ran for the township post.

ALTHOUGH THE HATCH ACT prohibits employees of federally funded agencies to run in a partisan election, the act does not specify what types of federal funds an agency must receive to prohibit its employees from seeking public office.

Interpretations of the act differ. Eddy's interpretation of the act would clear Daley of Donahue's charges.

Frans Heideman, director of the Sheriff Department's executive division, said no federal funds finance activities of the Sheriff's detective bureau at Metropolitan Airport, the division where Daley works.

But Donahue claims that a CSC investigative agent gave him a different interpretation.

"(Lynn) Collins gave me a wholly different story," Donahue maintained. "He said if the Sheriff's Department receives any money for operational expenses, it would involve Daley in the Hatch Act. He said we would have an 'excellent case' against Daley."

Collins, who is overseeing the Daley inquiry, was away from Washington and unavailable for comment.

If Collins' alleged interpretation of

SC tax hike still uncertain

Schoolcraft College trustees Wednesday night deadlocked on when to hold an election to ask for a property tax increase.

At press time, of debate, the board had defeated motions 1 to hold a special election April 2 and 21 to seek the millage increase at the regular June 13 election for school board members and college trustees.

As of 11 p.m., no election date had been agreed upon.

BoArd Treasurer Nancie Blatt, who a week ago appeared to be the fifth (majority) vote in favor of an April 2 election, suddenly switched Wednesday night and abstained. With only four board members favoring April 2, there was no longer a majority.

MRS. BLATT was swayed by arguments that a special election would cost the college district \$60,000, about \$2 a vote or more.

Other trustees, however, argued it would be political suicide to seek a tax increase at the regular June 13 election, when such K-12 districts as Garden City and Plymouth might also be seeking approval of money questions. Experience has shown Schoolcraft's chances of getting a millage passed are slim if K-12 districts are also seeking millages.

Supporting an April 2 vote were board Chairman Paul Y. Kadish and trustees Leroy Bennett, Gerald Cox and Mark McQuesten.

Favoring June 13 were Mrs. Blatt, Vice-chairperson Rosina Raymond and trustee Ron Cowden.

Trustee Arch Vallier, the board's eighth member, was absent. He had previously indicated he favored June 13, which still would have given that date only four votes.

A week earlier, trustees were fairly

solidly in favor of asking voter approval of 0.8 mills (80 cents per \$1,000 of state equalized property valuation).

BECAUSE STATE LAWS governing community college financing have grown complex over the years, Schoolcraft's millage structure sometimes appears to be a maze of different rates. In the simplest terms, this is how the maze untangles:

•The voters have approved 1.77 all-purpose mills (\$1.77 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation), which is used for operating and debt service. The college also levies about one-third of an untaxed mill for debt service. Total rate is currently 2.13 mills.

•If voters approve on April 2, the college will be authorized a voted rate of 2.57 mills. In addition, the board figures it will have to levy some untaxed millage to a total of 3.3 mills by 1981-2.

The 0.8 mills on the ballot would be used to finance existing programs as well as new programs that would go in new buildings. The board would float a \$10 million bond issue for the new buildings.

"In the campaign," said Kadish, "we can be precise—these are the needs." That list of new structures includes:

1977-8: A culinary arts addition, \$545,000.

1979-80: A fine arts building, \$3.85 million.

1980-1: A learning resources center, \$2.2 million.

1980-1: An Applied Sciences addition, \$1.7 million.

1981-2: An addition to the Waterman Campus Center, \$1.24 million.

1981-2: A facility in Canton Township, \$1.25 million.

And Trustee Gerald Cox concluded: "I haven't seen anything new going up at Schoolcraft in the four years I've been here. I say let's go through with it."

Township's against jail

After some initial disagreement, the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees Tuesday joined the City of Plymouth and Northville Township in opposing a proposed state jail at Five Mile and Sheldon roads on the property of the former Wayne County Child Development Center.

In passing the resolution, the board added the suggestions that the land be used by the school district for additional classrooms, or be made available to other educational institutions.

Trustee Frank Millington said he favored the land being used for a jail. "The county has all that land," he said, "and the buildings aren't being used. I think turning them into a jail would be a good idea."

Trustee Richard Gornick differed with Millington, pointing out the buildings would not be left as they were. "It is my understanding the state plans to turn this area into a prison just like the one in Jackson, with barbed-wire fences, towers and the whole bit."

Millington said he was not aware those changes were planned.

Trustee Maurice Breen commented that while everyone talked about the need for more

prisons, nobody was willing to do anything about it.

"Everyone is in favor of increased sentences and stiffer parole laws. But it's easy to be philosophical. We need to take a practical step. Nobody wants a prison in his backyard, but it would be cheaper to build one on county land than somewhere else."

CLERK HELEN RICHARDSON interrupted the discussion to read a letter she had received from Perry M. Johnson, director of the state department of corrections. Johnson argued that because of crowded courts and over-crowded jails, a new site was desperately needed.

Gornick responded to the letter by saying the state had not planned well. "These demands don't decrease," they increase. There is plenty of cheap land available for the state to build on."

Supervisor Thomas Notebaert said there wasn't a need for another correction institution in the Plymouth-Northville area.

"We already have one prison here. We don't want to become known as the community of prisons."

The vote on the resolution in opposition to the jail was unanimous.

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Board affirms 45-15 expansion next fall

The year-round school schedule is likely to be expanded to four more schools for the next school year.

The Plymouth Board of Education Monday night approved a resolution authorizing the administration to make plans to establish year-round (45-15) schedules at three elementary and one middle school for 1977-78. The resolution passed 6-0 with George Lawton absent.

Under the year-round schedule, instituted as a pilot program at Miller Elementary in Canton, students attend school for nine weeks (45 school days) and then are off for three

weeks.

The impetus for expanding 45-15 to other schools is to meet demands of rising enrollment during the next two years. Educators also point out students retain more between breaks compared to the traditional schedule when students are off for the entire summer.

By using the 45-15 schedule, the school district is able to place 30 per cent more pupils in one building without affecting the student-teacher ratio.

THE EXACT schools which will fol-

low the 45-15 schedule won't be chosen until later when the administration receives more exact enrollment projection data.

The present thinking though, subject to change, is to pair Eriksson and Field elementaries in Canton. One school would follow the 45-15 schedule and the other a traditional schedule. Parents in the attendance area will be given the option of choosing either schedule.

Other schools now proposed to be paired are Isbister and Hulsing, Bird with Smith-Starkweather, and Pioneer Middle with West Middle. In each

case, one school would have 45-15 and the other traditional, with parents being given the option.

Supt. John M. Hoben stressed that the above pairings are only based on preliminary planning and are subject to change once better enrollment information becomes available.

"WE WANT to meet our growth demands with a minimum disruption to the elementary schools," said Hoben.

"A lot of cooperation is needed yet to make expansion of 45-15 a functional program. The names of the schools to go 45-15 aren't named in the board

resolution—we need to take a close look at that. It might not be necessary to go 45-15 at four schools, either.

"But, based on information from Canton and Plymouth townships' planners, we are faced with an additional 1,200 to 1,500 students next year, and if that happens we will have expanded our capacity in our schools."

Trustee E.J. McClendon said he supported expansion of 45-15 scheduling so the board could have some options in meeting the growth immediately facing the school district.

Trustee Marcia Borowski stressed the importance of pairing schools so

parents will have a choice between 45-15 and traditional scheduling.

"The board needs to do all it can to maximize use of present facilities before we begin building additional ones," commented Trustee Richard Arlen.

"We should use what we have now to its maximum potential, which includes 45-15, to get more students into one building. And we might have to expand 45-15 to more than just three or four schools because even if the bond issue is approved there won't be any new buildings opened in the next two years," Arlen said.

W-W officials believe 8 mill vote will pass

Taxpayer approval of an eight-mill renewal proposal on the ballot this Monday is being predicted by administrators and board of education members in the Wayne-Westland School District.

"We're pleased with the reaction we've had so far," said Dennis O'Neill, deputy superintendent for instruction. "A random sampling of registered voters in a phone survey last week showed that 56 per cent would vote 'yes' on the proposal and 30 per cent said they were undecided and

needed more information.

O'Neill added that reports from meetings being held in local schools were good and that another phone survey is being conducted this week.

"Next Monday, if the renewal passes—and I'm sure it will, we won't need another election for the next four years," said Richard Reichard, board president.

"When it is renewed, we will marry all millages together," said Trustee Gerard McGrath. "The next millage renewal will be in 1980 instead of ask-

ing people to vote every year.

"Because we have never asked for an increase in millage in nine years—we have asked only for renewals, we feel pretty certain it (the eight-mill renewal) will pass. The last one passed 3-1."

The eight mills on Monday's ballot expired in December 1976. The millage represents about 10 per cent of the schools operating budget, or \$4 million.

"We're just hoping that the community again supports it," said O'Neill.

Steel fabricating company won't move shop to Canton

Canton Township recently began the process of trying to establish an economic development corporation (EDC) to encourage business development after receiving a letter indicating that a steel fabricating company was interested in locating in Canton.

Wednesday of last week representatives of that company, Ewald Steel, met with Westland officials and reportedly are close to reaching an agreement to settle in Westland, which has already established an EDC-incentive program.

Tom Stevens, Westland's economic development coordinator, confirmed reports that Westland is close to closing the deal with Ewald Steel. The steel company was reportedly searching for a spot in a hurry because its present plant has been sold to another company.

Harold Stein, who hopes to set up an EDC system to provide tax-free revenue bonds for new companies, was in Washington attending the inauguration and unavailable for comment on the new development. But other township officials seemed to feel that plans would continue in Canton to establish an economic development corporation for an industrial park.

Carnovale assumed operational control of the county prosecutor's office, and will act as the prosecuting attorney in the absence of Prosecuting Attorney William L. Cahalan.

Carnovale, 42, has been chief of the prosecutor's criminal division since March 1974. He has been a member of the prosecutor's staff since November 1969.

Carnovale is a native of Geneva, New York. He received his BA from Hobart College, and after service in

the armed forces attended the Detroit College of Law. He was graduated first in his class.

He spent two years on the staff of the Wayne County Prosecutor before leaving to engage in private law practice. After six years of private practice as a criminal defense lawyer, Carnovale rejoined the prosecutor's staff in November 1969. At that time, Cahalan appointed him to be chief of the appellate department.

In 1973, Carnovale's duties were expanded and he became chief of Detroit Recorder's Court trial and appellate departments until his appointment as chief of the criminal division in March 1974.

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Mac travels to tussle

When you first look at him, you wouldn't think that he even weighed 100 pounds and by no stretch of the imagination would you suspect that he is a wrestler.

But Kevin McCormack brought a fine reputation with him as one of the stars of the highly-regarded Catholic Central wrestling team when his family moved to 42660 Saltz in Canton Township from their previous home in Detroit's Rosedale Park.

By a peculiar twist of fate Kevin became a wrestler as a freshman in high school and now has started a family tradition. Two younger McCormack brothers—Dennis and Bryan—are also matmen at Catholic Central. Their father, Tom, has become a booster for the sport that has produced its share of champions over the years.

Kevin never dreamed he would be a member of the wrestling team at Catholic Central when he was invited by Coach Mike Rodriguez to serve as team manager during his freshman year.

"I watched the other guys wrestle," he said, "and it wasn't long before I

tried it myself. I had one or two matches in my freshman year—and then was given a place on the team."

Now a senior, Kevin grappled in 27 matches and has helped his team gain ranking as the No. 2 team in the state—just below the No. 1 ranked Bedford wrestling team of Temperance.

Kevin has wrestled his way to an enviable record for a lad of 17 years. He won second place in the Oakland County Tournament; first in the Kentucky Invitational at Louisville; second in the Ann Arbor-Huron meet; and a disappointing fifth at his home arena in the Catholic Central Invitational last Saturday.

Six of the top 10 ranked teams were represented at the Catholic Central Invitational in what many wrestlers feel was the stiffest competition held this season.

When the meet was over, Bedford was first in the state and Catholic Central was second. A strong wrestling team, CC has been top school in its state class in 1969, '70, '71 and '74.

Kevin hopes to establish a good enough record to wrestle in the state finals this spring. Kevin, whose weight is just under 105, wrestles at the 105-pound weight class and at 112

Both his brothers wrestle in the same weight class but Dennis, a junior, wrestles on the "B" team and Bryan wrestles on the freshman team.

The younger McCormacks haven't challenged their older brother in sanctioned play but there is a healthy rivalry in the family.

Meanwhile Tom McCormack, the father and an engineer at Ford Motor, is a real wrestling booster and his face lights up when he sees any of the boys in action.

"I'm just real proud of them," he says, "and I think they've come a long way."

They also drives a long way to school each day from Canton to Six Mile Road on Detroit northwest side.

Not a talkative lad, Kevin revealed that he was pinned in his first match, but says he learned a great deal in that defeat.

The pride of his family at the moment, it's not surprising that Kevin doesn't intend to follow wrestling as a career. Instead, he plans to enroll in the business administration program at the University of Michigan in the fall. But he'll continue to watch his brothers, Dennis and Bryan, continue the tradition that he started.

A newspaper clipping and a friendly letter to President Jimmy Carter when he was still stumping on the campaign trail won a first-hand view of last week's inauguration ceremonies for Canton residents Mabel Chastain and Tommie McCann.

The Cantonites traveled to Washington D.C. with Congressman Bill Ford's contingent of inaugural viewers, which included township Supervisor Harold Stein and Treasurer Anne Bradley. All members of the congressman's group except Mrs. Chastain and Mrs. McCann were local officials in Ford's 15th District.

Mrs. Chastain, who brought Mrs. McCann to Washington as her guest, attributes her invitation to the inaugural ceremonies to a story which appeared in an Indiana newspaper last October.

The story was "adverse publicity" for the presidential candidate, Mrs. Chastain said.

"So I put it in the mail and said I didn't think it was helping his campaign," she recalled. "I simply ad-

ressed it to Jimmy Carter, Plains, Georgia. In a few weeks, I got a picture postcard back thanking me for the letter and personally signed by Carter."

Mrs. Chastain received another letter two weeks ago—an invitation to the inaugural festivities.

"At first I wasn't even thinking about going," said the resident, who lives on Sheldon Road. "I was just going to hang the invitation on the wall until my neighbor (Mrs. McCann) said she'd liked to go and talked me into going."

Mrs. Chastain contacted Ford's office. When she was unable to book a hotel room for the event, the congressman invited Mrs. Chastain and her neighbor to attend the inaugural festivities as part of his group.

Once in Washington, the neighbors never did see Jimmy Carter in person, but the festive mood of the ceremonies overcame them nevertheless.

"It was just such a warm feeling," Mrs. Chastain recalled. "It was just fascinating, and everyone was so excited."

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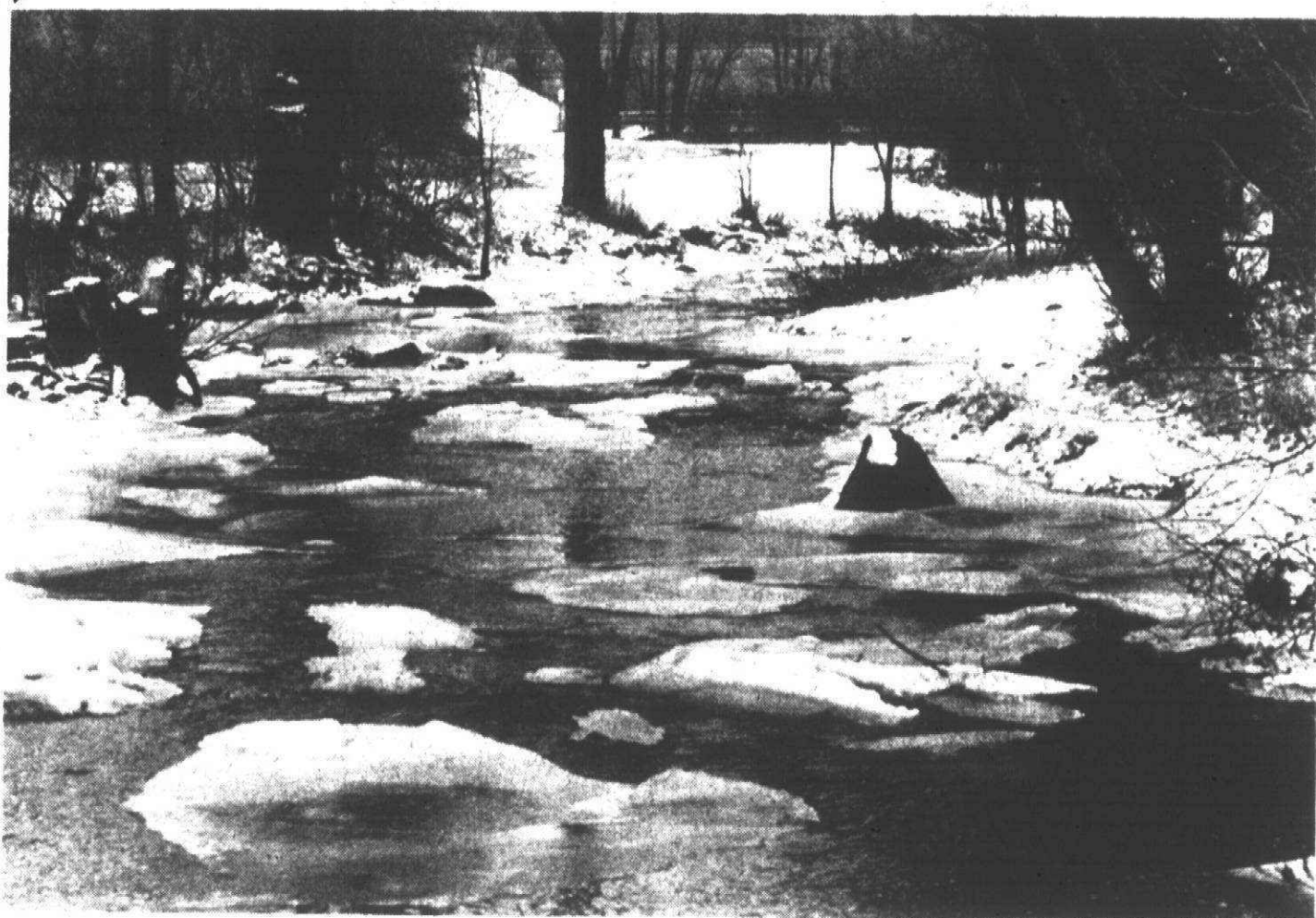

the act is right, federal investigators will have to leaf through the Sheriff Department's financial books and determine which funds are "operational expenses."

Heideman said he has no idea which expenses the federal government would define as "operational." The Sheriff's Department receives some federal funds, he said, "but I can't think of any that are directly for operational purposes."

Heideman said many employees of the Wayne County Sheriff's Department have run for public office in the past. No one has ever charged a violation of the Hatch Act before, he said.

DONAHUE SAID he requested the Daley investigation to determine if the trustee's election was "cricket." The former Greenstein supporter was reluctant to admit his involvement in the matter at first, but later said he decided to "let the whole thing out in the open."

d'I've requested information on this

thing with Daley," he admitted. "It seemed very clear to me there was a violation (of the Hatch Act). We want to know if it's legal for Daley to serve as township trustee. If not, he's in trouble."

Eddy, a member of the federal agency investigating Daley's status, said investigators will first conduct a preliminary inquiry to determine the type of federal funding that the Wayne County Sheriff's Department receives and examine Daley's relationship to federally-funded activities.

If investigators find grounds for continuing the investigation, the CSC will notify Daley of charges against him and schedule a hearing in Canton or a nearby municipality before a federal administrative law judge.

If the judge finds Daley guilty of a Hatch Act violation, he may recommend that the Sheriff's Department fire Daley, Eddy said. If the Sheriff's Department refuses, the county law enforcement agency will be penalized for a sum equalizing twice Daley's annual salary when it receives its next federal grant.

But, according to Eddy, many factors enter into the judge's determination. If an individual unknowingly violates the Hatch Act, the judge may not impose any penalties.

wrongdoing whatsoever. We worked in the election during off-duty hours, and our man (Stein) won.

"This (accusations) smacks to me of sour grapes by the people who lost."

Ahktar denied all of Donahue's accusations except the charge that union members gathered vote tabulations. But, he added, sheriff deputies gathered the vote tabulations when they were off-duty and out of uniform as far as he knows.

Under collective bargaining agreements, unions can engage in political activity when its members are off duty, he noted.

Ahktar said he has talked to Stein only once since the election.

"We did our job," he said of the union's role in the election. "We think the best man was elected for the people of Canton."

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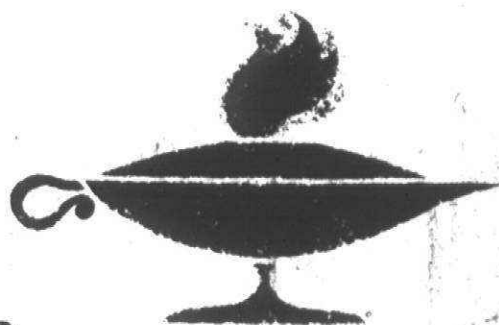
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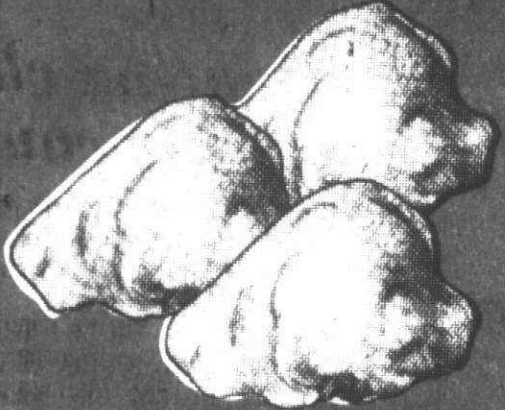
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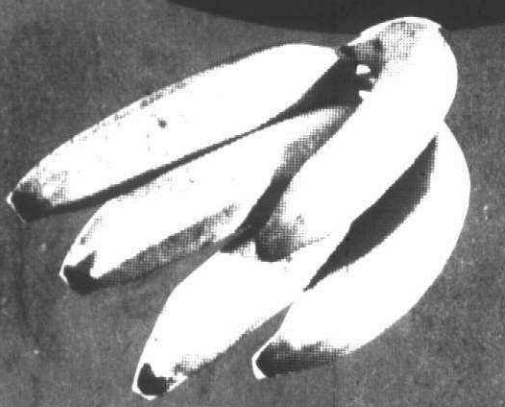
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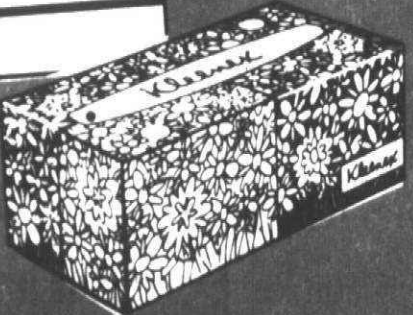
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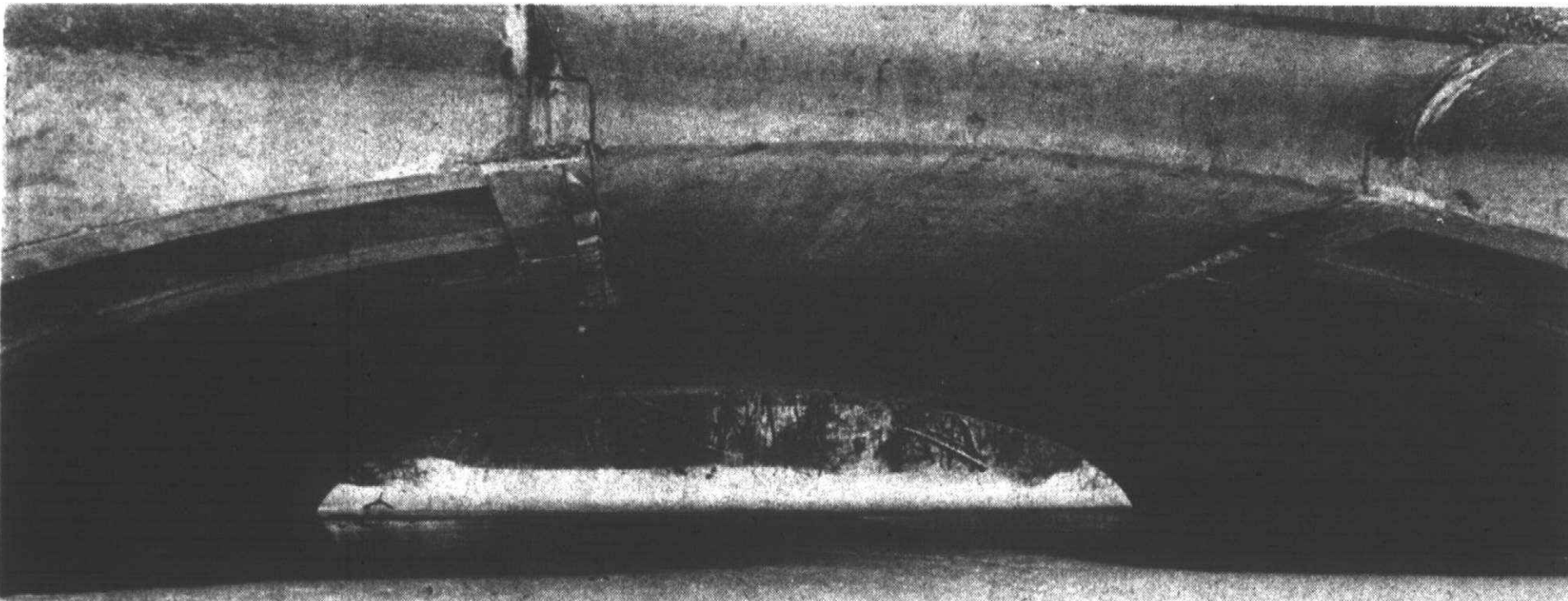
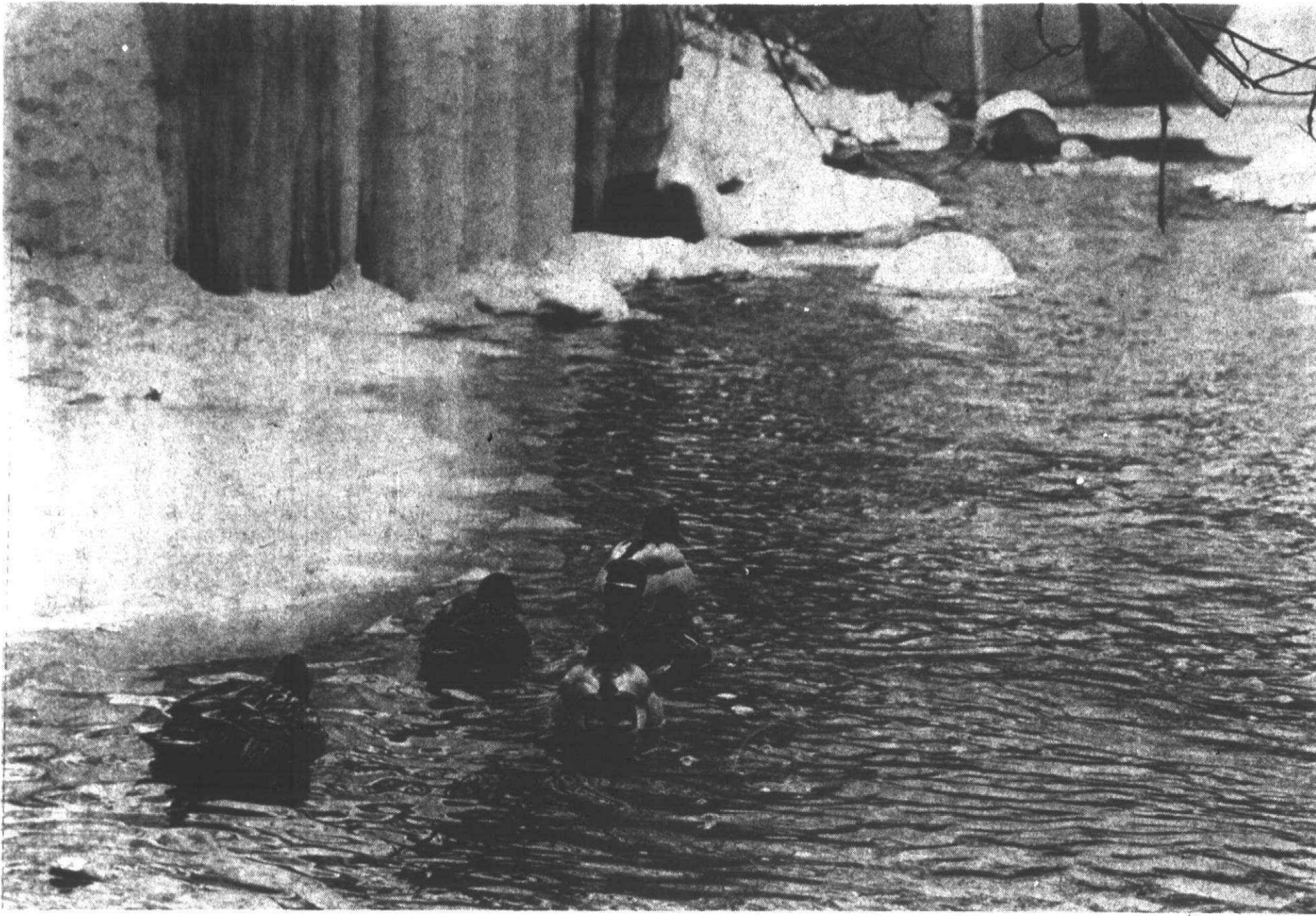
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Daniels Den

A few teachers and the union leadership got more than a little upset by the Jan. 20 Daniels Den, which replied to Plymouth Education Association (PEA) charges that it was being censored by this newspaper.

The Den explained why the Observer insisted on cash in advance for political ads. It also questioned part of the content of a PEA ad on what kinds of pay raises were given to central administrators in Plymouth Community School District.

The ad, as first submitted, attributed to our news columns the percentage pay increases of the administrators. We had reported different percentages, however.

The problem comes down to a matter of incorrect attribution and not mathematical error on the PEA's part.

THE DEN WAS SURE—and so stated—that PEA didn't use "wrong" figures deliberately to mislead the public but felt the problem was a mathematical error.

This should summarize the differences in the figures, and I hope you

won't be confused by it. But if you are, join the crowd.

The Observer on Dec. 16 reported top Plymouth school administrators received pay increases of 17, 25 and 14 per cent.

The PEA ad text, as submitted, used figures of 23, 30 and 19 per cent, respectively. Allowing for rounding off of little decimal points, the PEA reported all figures as five per cent higher than the Observer reported.

THE EXPLANATION is in this paragraph from the PEA ad text:

"The above salary increases from \$6,300 to \$6,825 do not include increased fringe benefits in dental, vision, long term disability and life insurance, . . . and paid state retirement which is five per cent."

What the PEA had done was to include the five per cent retirement benefit in the pay increases. This explains the five per cent differences in our calculations.

But a reading of the PEA's qualifying statement suggested—at least to me—that the percentages didn't include fringes or state-paid retirement.

THE PEA IS NOT off-base in including state retirement in its calculation of the dollar improvements for central administrators.

After all, when the administration reports its offer to the union, it speaks of a 30 per cent improvement over three years. And the improvement includes the five per cent state paid retirement as well as cost of living allowance and annual increments.

So it's entirely justifiable for PEA to add retirement when reporting pay increases of administrators.

Unfortunately, PEA's presentation was unclear because it wasn't immediately apparent—if at all—that PEA had included the state paid retirement benefit of five per cent in its figures.

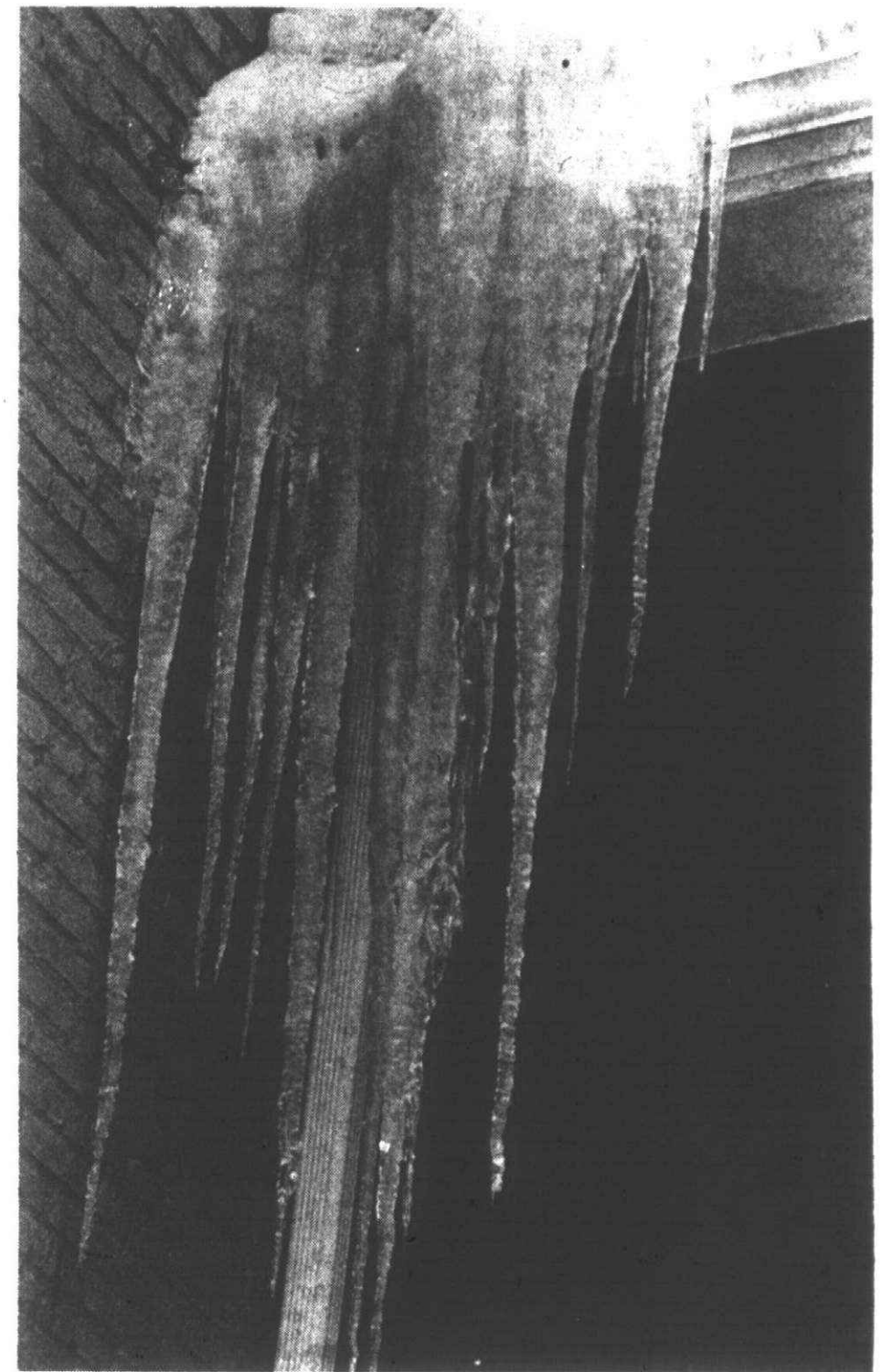
So the Den concedes no mathematical error by PEA. It was all a matter of attribution and a confusing qualifying statement.

I repeat that the Observer in no way attempted to censor PEA. Our advertising rules apply to all candidates and groups with a political point of view to sell.

The charge of censorship was senseless, which the PEA now appreciates.

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City changes priorities on block grant projects

A walkway for Old Village, continuation of a sidewalk ramp program, a farmer's market next to the Penn Theater and a tree trimming project were listed as top priorities by the Plymouth City Commission, which will apply for \$100,000 in federal Community Development funds.

At a public hearing on Monday evening, commissioners acted on recommendations from city officials and residents and came up with an eight-item list of projects to submit to HUD for approval.

Although there will be eight separate projects listed on the 1977-78 application, Mark Wollenweber, city administrator, indicated the first four would use up the available funds.

"If HUD approves our application," he commented, "we could cover the cost of the first three or four projects. We've included the others as alternatives."

The four projects receiving lowest priority are: improvement of Cannon Park on the corner of Starkweather and Farmer Streets; construction of a playground behind Fire Station No. 2 in Old Village; a covered salt storage bin for the city DPW; and a fire train-

ing tower which would be built in the DPW yard.

ACCORDING TO WOLLENWEBER'S rough estimates, the top four projects would cost about \$110,000. He emphasized the individual project estimates were not final.

Sidewalk lighting in Old Village was estimated at \$10,000. To continue the city-wide sidewalk ramp program, for which \$15,000 was granted under last year's development program, an additional \$15,000 would be needed.

The farmer's market would cost about \$78,000, which includes the cost of landscaping, sanitary sewers and engineering fees. The tree trimming project, which would be concentrated in the Old Village area, would cost about \$15,000.

Wollenweber said the final list was agreed upon with an eye toward the kind of projects that would be most likely to receive HUD approval.

The application for the federal block grant will be the third one for the city. Under the 1975-76 Community Development program, Plymouth received \$52,800 for the creation of a housing rehabilitation loan program.

The 1976-77 grant was for \$66,000

which was to be spent on four projects which include: the demolition of the building behind city hall; improvements to Tonquish Creek walkway; sidewalk ramps and a senior citizen's recreation area. Wollenweber said all four of the projects are scheduled for completion during the upcoming construction season.

HOWEVER, THE RESPONSE to the housing rehabilitation loan program has been low. The money has been available since the beginning of September, but there has only been one loan given.

To create more interest in the housing loans, the commission approved giving direct grants to eligible applicants. With the new modification, the city would give those who qualify for the loan the first \$250 of each \$1,000 borrowed. The remaining \$750 would be paid back with the interest adjusted to income.

"We have been at a loss to explain why participation in the home improvement program has been so low," remarked Wollenweber. "We hope this new alteration will provide more incentive for people to apply."

Kadish wants sunset law

Democrat Paul Kadish, state senate candidate, has proposed a sunset law to improve state government efficiency.

The candidate said that the passage of a sunset law would require that every program approved and funded by the legislature would have a life-span of four to six years, after which a review would be made to show a cost-efficiency ratio.

"This ratio would take into account total costs, including administration of the program as well as actual services passed on to the people," Kadish said in a meeting in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Deamud of Redford Township last week.

After the legislature studies a program, it would decide whether to continue and fund it.

"The legislature would have the option of continuing the program, discontinuing it, modifying it or replacing it," the candidate said.

"This is the best method I know of to guarantee that the bureaucrats spend their allotted funds wisely and

efficiently. It will force them to see to it that the maximum dollars possible go to the people who are supposed to receive the services rather than large scale waste in administrative and bureaucratic entanglements."

The senate district includes Livonia, Plymouth, Redford Township and part of Westland.

The special primary of Feb. 23 and general election on March 23 were forced by the resignation of Carl Pursell, who was elected to the 2d Congressional district seat and sworn into office Jan. 4.

Winner of the special election will complete the balance of Pursell's term, which expires Dec. 31, 1978.

Kadish, a Livonia insurance executive and chairman of the Schoolcraft College board of trustees, said that the 14th district "would best be served by having a senator with a broad business background who will work to provide service for people but will also see to it that the services are provided with the least bureaucratic red tape and waste possible."

Dumas knocks legislature

MaryDumas, Republican candidate for a state senate vacancy, has criticized the state legislature for mandating programs without providing the funds to pay for them.

She also said that the legislature has been acting to erode the taxing powers of local communities while at the same time, requiring those communities to take on more programs.

Mrs. Dumas, speaking before the Livonia Rotary Club and Wayne-2d Republican convention recently, said the legislature "doesn't seem to recognize the constitutional taxing limits placed on counties, cities and townships and continues to write and pass bills which place added responsibility and requirements without providing the dollars to carry them out."

"When that happens, the county board of commissioners (of which she is a member) and the city of Livonia frequently have no recourse except to come to (you), the taxpayers, for new monies or eliminate other essential services."

"Our mandated crime control services through the courts, the jail, the prosecutor and other law enforcement departments are consuming more than 50 per cent of our budget," she added.

She said other examples are the failure of the legislature to correct abuses in the state worker's compensation act and the voluntary quit clause in the unemployment compensation bill which has been costly to not only government but also to local businesses.

Another example, Mrs. Dumas said, is the approval of the state single business tax which is "strangling many

small businesses and single proprietorships which have large gross income but a very small profit margin."

The new tax also reduces the local property tax base for local governmental units and delays revenues to the county government which caused cash flow problems and forced the county to sell tax anticipation notes at an interest cost of \$180,000.

"It is imperative that our legislature begin to recognize the impact of what it proposes and enacts on the county, city, school district, local business and individual taxpayer," she added.

"The legislature must either provide the constitutional or statutory means for local governments to improve their tax base, or it must stop writing and passing laws which force local governments to spend more of your tax dollars without providing you more services."

She also cited recent examples of the state requiring barrier-free building changes, changes in laws requiring public funds spent on defense attorneys for attorneys who can't afford a lawyer, and failure to correct abuses in the welfare system.

There will be a special primary Feb. 23 and a special general election March 23 to pick a replacement for Carl Pursell, who was elected 2d District congressman Nov. 2.

Pursell's 14th senate district includes Livonia, Plymouth, Redford Township and part of Westland. Winner of the special ballot will serve the balance of Pursell's term, which expires Dec. 31, 1978.

SHOULD THE LEGISLATURE RAISE THE DRINKING AGE?

Increasing concern among Michigan's school officials, state lawmakers, and the general public about excessive student drinking and alcohol-related auto accidents has prompted speculation that the time has come to restore the twenty-one-year minimum drinking age.

It is regrettable that some eighteen-year-olds have caused this problem which affects all young drinkers. However, there is plenty of reason for concern. State Police statistics are alarming — accidents involving drinking teenage drivers have increased 166 percent for those under eighteen, and by 186.5 percent for drivers between ages eighteen and twenty. Of course, some increase is to be expected over the period when alcoholic beverages were not being legally sold to persons in that age range.

Statistics can be tricky and I recall that Tim Richard, in an editorial some time ago, did a remarkable job of rebutting the drinking age-accident rate correlation. However, experience would seem to indicate that many teenagers lack the maturity, good sense and acceptance of responsibility to consume alcohol at age eighteen.

When I speak to high school senior government classes, the students invariably ask how I stand on

raising the drinking age. When I tell them that I support raising the legal age to consume alcoholic beverages there are many groans and boos. But when I point out that eighteen-year-olds are abusing their privilege by buying beer and other alcoholic beverages for their 17 and 16 year old friends, the student readily admit that it is true.

Soon I will be sending my annual newsletter to each home in the area previewing the new legislative session. There will be a questionnaire on the back page for citizens to fill out and return. The first question will ask what you believe the legal drinking age should be. I will look forward to your replies.

cannot have any of the money from the additional 4.75 mills—is this a double-standard?”

Mrs. Hamann asked the board to set aside its pre-conceived notions and to obtain a settlement before the next election. “And remember, it is not the teachers but our teachers and our children.”

BETTY IRVINE of Plymouth, a teacher in the Livonia School District, said she has been a teacher for more than 20 years and has some real concerns about the upcoming millage renewal and bond vote.

She asked if the board felt a settlement could be reached before the April election. “I would hope so,” responded Board President Joe Gray.

When will the educational community wake up—administrators, teachers and board members—and realize that now is not the time for dispute but for compromise. In the very near future, very few of the voting public will have children in schools and that speaks to the need for more united action among members of the education profession.

Noble Stormont of Arthur, Plymouth, suggested that binding arbitration be used to correct the impasse in bargaining. He also made a number of suggestions to improve communication between residents and the board, including suggestions that the board place itself up on a platform stage and that the public address system be improved so trustees could be heard at meetings; that increased audience participation be allowed; and that minutes printed in the paper include how individual trustees voted.

BETTY LEACH of Stoneycrest, Plymouth Township, pointed out problems where some students lacked adequate texts and asked about where

the money came from for the additional administrative positions.

Mrs. Leach said she ran an informal survey of teachers and found teachers who said they didn't have enough textbooks for their students. “Why aren't teachers aware that there is money available for texts which can be used,” she asked, pointing out that the 4.75 mills approved last fall was intended, among other things, to make sure all students had a sufficient supply of texts.

She referred to cases where textbooks couldn't be obtained until parents learned of the situation and applied pressure on board members, citing as an example her husband who teaches chemistry at Plymouth Salem High. “Why is public pressure necessary to obtain textbooks which were promised in the last millage election?”

In millage brochures given out last fall, it was said the additional tax would buy one administrative intern and one administrator for curriculum. Yet in November you posted three administrators for curriculum, one for controller, and one posting for a labor relations director. Where is the money coming from?”

Trustee Richard Arlen said he regretted so much trouble had to be undertaken to get texts. “I would have been happy to support the teachers and parents if I knew of the situation. After all, an instructor cannot teach without a book. If there is a next time, I'd like the opportunity to get it straightened out.”

LARRY MARKOWITZ of Canton complained about bad acoustics and other physical problems at the new elementary buildings and then urged greater action by the board in getting a settlement with the PEA.

“The administration gets its pay. It's not fair for teachers to have to work without a contract. It looks to me like we didn't start with the masses (teachers) but with a select few.”

Trustee Tom Yack commented that the board has a number of employee

units with which it must negotiate.

“Except for the transportation workers and teachers, all units have settled. And the common denominator for all units is this board with which they must settle. Isn't it amazing that settlements have been reached with almost all units except for the largest unit?”

Elderly get free activity admission

Free admission to school events now is available to all residents of the Plymouth Community School District age 62 and older.

The school board approved the new policy Jan. 10 establishing senior citizen passes.

“To honor senior citizens and encourage their participation in school activities, a senior citizen pass will be presented upon application,” the board resolution read.

The passes now are available at all school buildings in the district or at the administration building, 454 S. Harvey, Plymouth.

The pass admits the recipient free to all school dramatic and musical programs which aren't specifically fundraising events. The pass also

admits senior citizens to regular season home athletic events.

The application form simply asks for name, address, telephone number and date of birth. Proof of age and residency may be requested.

The senior citizen passes are non-transferable, but are lifetime passes and don't expire.

There are no restrictions on use of the passes except for special fundraisers like PTO dinners. District athletic tournaments aren't covered by any local passes. Reserved seats must be handled according to procedures set for each event.

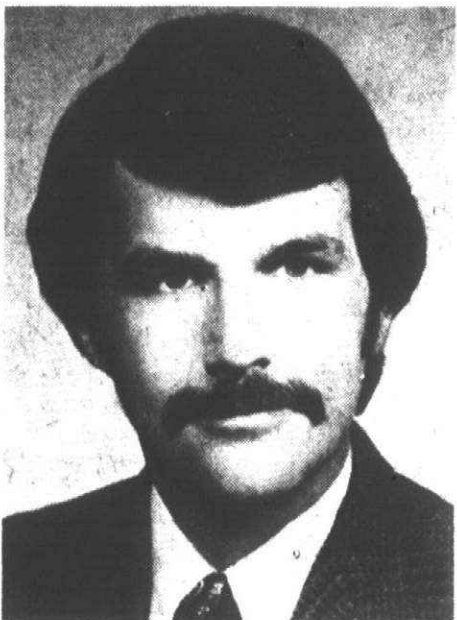
Mrs. Maurer took over her new

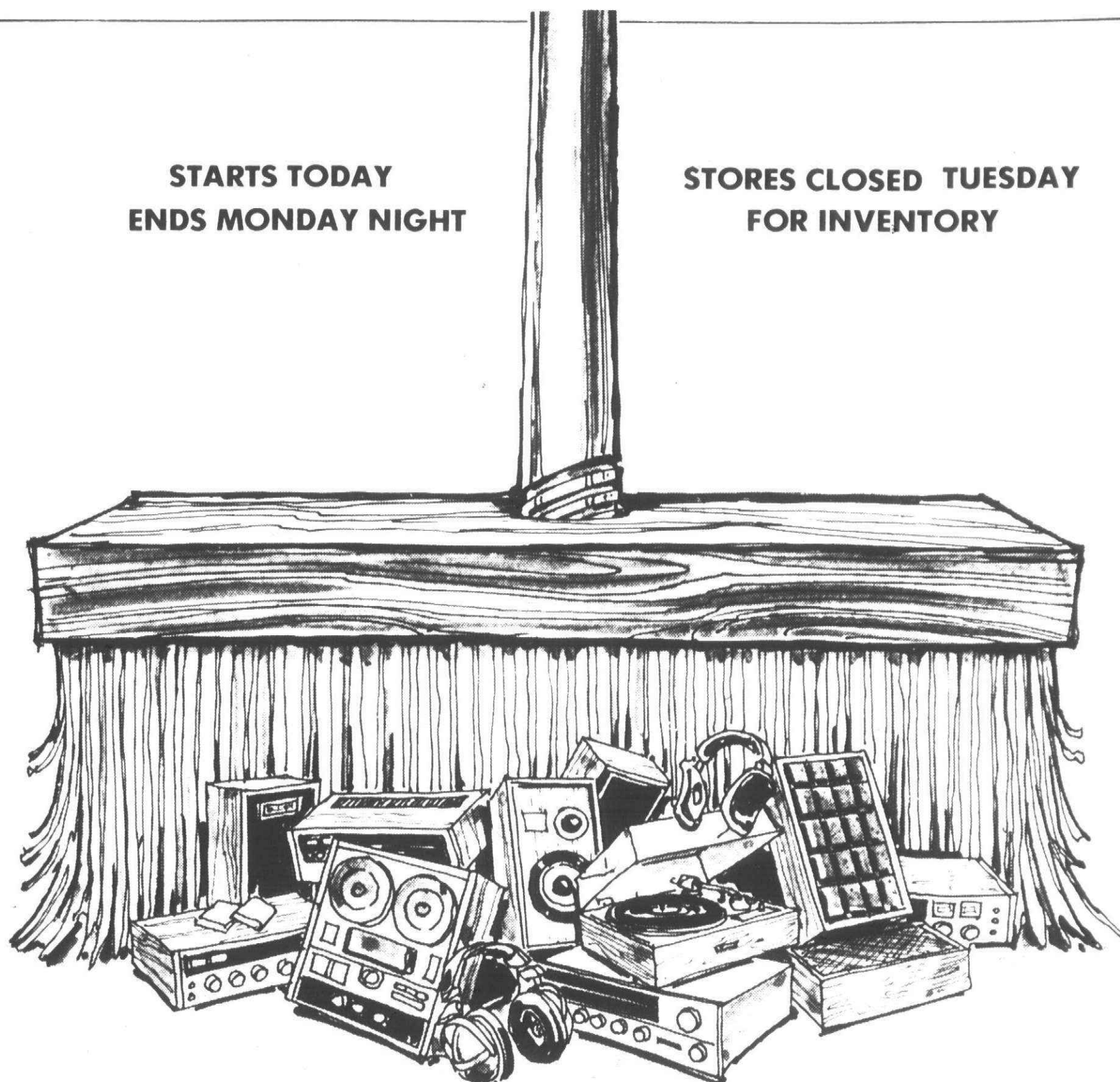

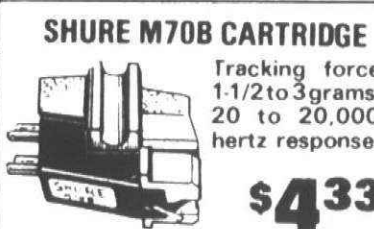

How to entice industry to lessen taxpayers' yoke

Plymouth Township and Canton Township are both walking a tight rope to maintain an attractive residential community, and, at the same time, trying to attract new business.

Their rapid increases in population have not been matched by an equal surge in commerce and industry. Homewoners are already feeling the brunt of the tax-base burden.

Part of the reason for the reluctance of business is the swollen prices set by speculative owners of business-zoned land. Another obstacle has been citizen opposition to businesses located near residential areas.

A PROMISING incentive and possible solution to improving the tax base is the formation of an Economic Development Corporation (EDC) which provides for federal assistance to companies committing themselves to a community.

Public Act 338 allows any municipality to issue revenue bonds, exempt from federal taxes, to encourage a business, or a number of businesses, to build or expand in the community. If it's desired, a community also can give the business a temporary tax break as further enticement.

This broad business incentive package enables residents to play an active role in shaping the kind of future they desire.

Residents must be represented on the board of directors of the EDC, and can provide direction via the project's citizens' district council.

People who might live in the area of land being considered a project site can provide direction by speaking out at public hearings required before any project is approved by the township board.

CANTON SUPERVISOR Harold Stein has gone on record as a firm believer in EDC business-incentive programs. He is preparing the groundwork to establish an EDC in Canton with hopes of

establishing an EDC-controlled industrial park.

But the possibilities are broad under the act and should be explored fully. Sewage and water improvements are two examples of EDC-approved projects in which there is no limit on the size of bond issues.

ONE OF THE PROBLEMS Plymouth Township has encountered in trying to find new tenants to occupy the former Evans factory has been the outdated sewer and water system at the plant location.

Canton has had similar problems in trying to lure industry to the southern business corridor along Michigan Avenue. Water pressure is so low that industry can't operate effectively.

An EDC sewer and water improvement project could be the answer to tight funds in both townships.

The EDC is the only piece of legislation in Michigan that provides incentives for commercial development as well as industrial development. So, in Canton, the talk about establishing zoning for office buildings along I-275 could become a reality under an EDC.

But the time for setting up an EDC is now. Communities who have been quick in doing so are already reaping the benefits.

Westland has already established an EDC which hopes to attract industry as well as the Detroit Red Wings. In fact, a Detroit fabricating company contacted Canton saying it was interested in settling there if EDC incentives were provided. Since there is no EDC in Canton yet, the firm, (Ewald Steel) is reportedly ready to sign a pact with Westland.

The EDC program deserves a close look if people are serious about not wanting to repeat the mistakes of our fully-developed neighbors and guarantee that the tax base goes beyond that of a "bedroom community."

Ron figured he had made history, of a sort: As superintendent of Livonia School District, he had negotiated a labor contract with a cost of living adjustment (COLA) in it. So far as he or anyone else knew, it was the first public employees labor contract in these parts with a COLA clause.

Now, in those days, Ron Upton (now retired) was something of a sacred cow, and so I didn't tell him what I really felt about his new contract. Besides, he was a lovable, bubbly personality, and it would have been a shame to spoil his day by telling him he had made a disastrous blunder.

WHAT MAKES THIS recollection timely is that in recent weeks we have been treated to two strikes by public employees in which COLA was the issue, one in Oakland and one in Wayne counties. Both times management held firm, and the union failed to get unlimited COLAs.

In Oakland County, members of Local 1998 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFL-CIO) settled with the administration after a 2½-week strike. County Executive Daniel T. Murphy not only refused to agree to COLA, he had even refused to negotiate it.

To be sure, Murphy paid a price for this victory. The price was a wage adjustment a little bit higher than the county's final offer in bargaining. The union figured it did better than it would have done without a strike, so its majority is apparently satisfied.

The City of Livonia took a strike by Local 192 of the same union, which hit the bricks for a little more than a week.

The Livonia union wanted unlimited COLA and finally settled for a COLA of 26 cents an hour (about four per cent for lowest rated workers) plus a two per cent pay boost.

THE PROBLEM, from the point of view of local government, is that revenues can't be increased by a price hike, the way an auto company can increase them.

The biggest single source of local government funding is the property tax. If valuations are rising in your jurisdiction, you can afford some kind of increase in costs. Otherwise, you're in impossible trouble that can't be cured without layoffs.

COLA is tied to the so-called consumer price index produced by the federal government. It's based on the living expenses of an urban family of four under certain kinds of housing conditions and with certain habits.

It is one of many price indexes which abound in our economy—others being the wholesale price index, commodity indexes, stock prices and so on.

Real estate valuations don't necessarily increase at exactly the same rate as consumer prices. And so, to tie government spending on employees' wages to one index while your revenues

are tied to real estate valuations is to court disaster.

IN AN ERA OF double-digit inflation of the consumer price index, then, it is not surprising that two top administrators—Oakland's Murphy and Livonia's Mayor Ed McNamara—would take a strike rather than give into a demand for unlimited cost of living adjustments.

It's not surprising they would yield a bit on money issues for which they can budget in order to avoid the grim uncertainty of wages tied automatically to the consumer price index.

Had Murphy and McNamara given in, there is a real possibility Oakland County and the City of Livonia would have had to resort to layoffs in some future year in order to give senior employees cost-of-living pay increases. The effect would be for senior employees to continue drawing growing paychecks while the junior employees are thrown to the wolves. One would think the younger employees would wake up and quit striking for unlimited COLAs.

What gov't. costs per unit

One of the big suburban stories that broke this week was that Wayne County General Hospital may be closed.

Wayne County Commission Chairman John Barr released the threat at a press conference on Monday, during which he announced the formation of a task force to study the future of the big hospital, located in Westland.

Barr cited as a cause for the study a report prepared by the Detroit Area Hospital Council, which listed 13 ways that the county could relieve the financial strain of running the hospital. "The commissioners have done a pitiful job in running a major health-care facility," Barr added.

A major part of Barr's argument is that per patient costs at Wayne General run \$330 daily, while the county could purchase the same services from Harper and Grace hospitals in Detroit for \$179 per day.

THE INTERESTING thing about all this is that, for the first time in a long while, we see a spokesman for a government unit actually talking in terms that try to express the cost to the taxpayers of a unit of service. In this case, the cost to Wayne County taxpayers for one day of care for a patient at Wayne General is \$330, whereas the same services could be bought from other hospitals for \$179.

This is at odds with the way government bureaucrats and politicians usually talk about the cost of government. They always talk about how many total dollars are in the budget, never about how much government costs per unit of service.

For example, the new 1977-1978 budget for the state of Michigan unveiled Monday by Gov. Milliken is \$3.8 billion. Oakland County's budget for fiscal 1976 was \$60,358,347. The City of Livonia says its annual budget is around \$13.7 million, not counting the water and sewer funds.

Now, I certainly can't get my head around \$60 million or \$3.8 billion, not to mention the \$13.7 million for Livonia, and except for some big bank presidents or the chairman of GM, I don't think anyone else can either.

Not only that, but these big budget numbers are always expressed in the aggregate. They don't say just how much it costs to run the government per unit of service.

Livonia doesn't say just how much it costs the taxpayers per pothole repaired. Oakland County doesn't say how much it costs for the Road Commission to plow one mile of snow-covered road. The State of Michigan doesn't say just how much it costs to keep one prisoner at Jackson for a year.

THE RELUCTANCE of government units to express their budgets in costs per amount of service is all the more curious when this practice is com-

pared with the way businesses and families do their budgeting.

Most businesses express their costs per unit of output: It costs GM, for example, \$2,500 to make a Chevy; it costs this newspaper around 14 cents in newsprint for one newspaper; it costs a law firm \$25 per hour to have a lawyer on the staff.

Without knowing these numbers, it is plainly impossible for any business to run itself effectively. If GM could get a Chevy manufactured for a lot less than \$2,500 by subcontracting the job to Chrysler, it might save a lot of money by doing so. If a law firm can't get at least \$25 per hour in billings for its lawyers, it will have to make some changes. And so forth.

Similarly, most families I know of (and that includes my own) set up their budgets in costs per unit. So much per month for rent, so much for utilities, so much per week for food, and five or six bucks a week for entertainment. Again, it's not a case there pa says to ma at the beginning of the year that the family's got \$16,800 to spend for the year and lets it go at that. Instead, they break down that \$16,800 into monthly and weekly expenses per unit of service or goods that they intend to buy.

PERSONALLY I believe there is a whole lot of money wasted by our government, whether at the local, state or federal level. I also believe the costs governments pay per unit of service are in many cases absurdly high—Wayne County General Hospital being a useful current example.

And I'm absolutely convinced that one reason this is so is that governments either do not or cannot express their costs per unit of service so the taxpayers can get a clear idea of just how much government service is costing them.

For example, if the City of Livonia discovered that it costs \$750 per pothole to repair the city streets, just how long would the outraged taxpayers of the city let that kind of waste go on?

That's why I'm so interested in John Barr and how he is tackling the problem of Wayne County General Hospital. If it costs nearly twice as much per patient day to treat people in Wayne County General than elsewhere, what possible excuse is there for keeping the facility going?

Keep it up, John. You're on to a good thing!

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The Stroller

Is baseball doomed?

One of the joys of strolling along the journalistic trail is the surprises a fellow gets along the way.

For instance, the other evening The Stroller was a guest of the Detroit Tigers at the annual get-together at the Detroit Athletic Club.

As he entered the large hospitality room, John Fetzer, owner of the Tigers, spotted him and remarked, "Well, here comes the old war horse. Now the party is official."

Turning to The Stroller, he asked, "How many years is this?"

When told that, God willing, The Stroller would attend his 54th consecutive opening game in April, he just shook his head and commented, "You sure go back a long way, and you must have seen many changes."

This remark prompted the question, "How do things look this year?" Then came the surprise.

WITHOUT A moment's hesitation the Tiger owner confided that the grand old game of baseball, long called the national pastime, was in trouble and may soon be fighting for its very life.

"We have three teams in our own league," the Tiger owner said, "that are in real financial trouble and frankly, I don't know how they are going to open the season."

"Are things that bad?" The Stroller asked.

"Yes sir. Take the case of Cleveland," the Tiger owner revealed. "The club owes the banks \$6 million and it isn't drawing very well. Min-

nesota is another club in trouble and being controlled by the banks. The same is true of the Texas Rangers. So, I really don't know what the season will bring."

The ease with which the Tiger owner spoke was a real surprise. He usually is very quiet and leaves the talking to others. But in this chat with The Stroller he was eager to have the situation told.

It is no secret what is causing the dark outlook, according to the top Tiger. It is the high prices being paid on the open market for players, plus the fabulous salaries now being paid under contract.

When some of these clubs, he pointed out, pay \$2 and \$3 million to a player it takes an awful lot of spectators to pay the bill. It matters little that the salaries are paid on a delayed basis—the salary expense is still there.

"I don't know how these clubs are going to make it," Fetzer went on, "and it wouldn't be surprising to hear of some of them filing for bankruptcy."

AS HE spoke, another odd chapter was breaking that could be very harmful to the game. It came when Denny McLain, the former Tiger right hander, won his suit for workman's compensation.

Denny was awarded \$31,000 for injuries he claimed he suffered to his arm while hurling the Tigers to the pennant in 1968.

Just imagine what that means. From now on, every player who suffers any sort of an injury can file a claim and collect. This puts an added burden on the club treasury that must be passed along to the fans.

"It is a lot different now than it was in your day when covering the Tigers," Fetzer said.

It sure is. The Stroller well remembers when the late Frank J. Navin owned the Tigers and ruled the roost at Michigan and Trumbull from an office that was divided with old-fashioned chicken wire. Navin was one of the shrewdest owners of all time, but the one player who always got the best of him was Harry Heilmann, the three-time batting champion back in the '20s.

Harry used to spend the off-season in California, but made it a point to come back to Detroit for the holidays. On each visit he would drop into the Tiger office. Before he left he always would ask, "Mr. Navin, are the contracts ready?"

Navin would open his desk drawer and pull out a contract that had just come from the printers. Heilmann would take it, never look at it, except to locate the line for his signature.

Then he'd sign it and say, "Put the figures in some day when you have time." With that he would leave. He always got a rise.

When told of Heilmann's visits and his unconcern about the salary figures, Fetzer smiled and shook his head. "You bet things were different in those days. There are no Heilmanns around today."

And because of the great change and the trend to high salaries and the prices placed on the heads of the players that are offered on open market, baseball is now on the edge of the cliff.

And, as Fetzer confided, "it may fall off."

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Lunch prices raised

The prices for school lunches have been raised by five cents for students and 10 cents for adults to avoid an operating deficit in the lunch fund this year.

The increase was approved 6-0 by the Plymouth Board of Education Monday night.

Supt. John M. Hoben told trustees that the lunch program has generated

at \$20,700 deficit for the first 72 days of operation this school year.

The fund ended up with a surplus of about \$46,000 last June, he added, but even with the price increase the lunch deficit will be about \$30,000 by year's end. With the surplus funds, though, the lunch account will be in the red by about \$16,500.

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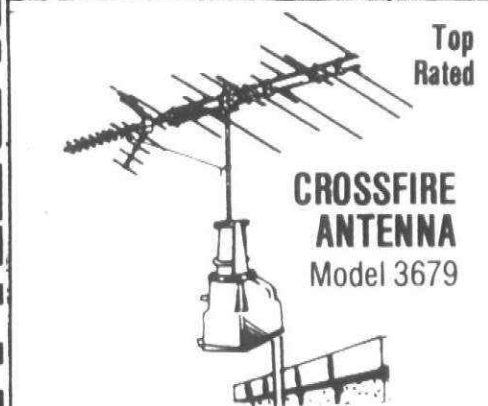
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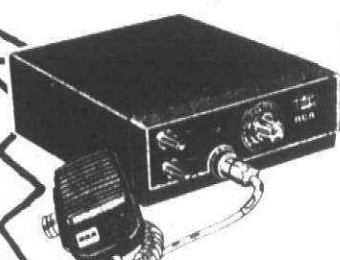


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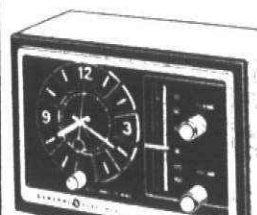
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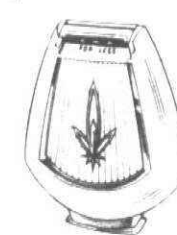

Ever try to ski blindfolded?

For Cheryl and Chris Petersen, that was part of their training to become guides for blind skiers. The purpose was to discover firsthand what it was like to be dependent on someone else, and the need to have complete confidence in your guide.

When the Petersens moved to their new house on Wedgewood in Canton Township four years ago, one of their first thoughts was to locate the nearest ski slopes.

They had been skiing for years. They met when they were attending the same ski class at Mt. Chalet near Cleveland. Before they moved to Canton, they had been ski instructors in Ohio.

THEY READ a newspaper article about the need for guides in a program for blind skiers at Pine Knob. They volunteered.

After four years, the Petersens agree, "The guides have as much fun as the skiers."

They are getting ready for a meet Feb. 5-6 in which blind skiers from the Midwest will compete at Pine Knob.

"There will be 20 gates on the slalom course," said Petersen. "Anybody is welcome to come out and watch. A cheering section is always welcome."

Cheryl and Chris head for Pine Knob early Sunday mornings. By 9 a.m. their group has assembled. The skiers range in age from 10 to 50. There are about 20 of them and each has a guide.

"We start at 9 and ski until 1 p.m.," said Chris. "After four hours a skier gets tired and tends to fall down."

In the beginning, guide and skier start out one on each end of a 10-foot bamboo pole.

"Both hold on," said Chris, "with the pole faced straight downhill." They make their first turns, using the pole. Once off the pole, the guides tell their partners when to turn and which way. "You direct them to the left or right," said Petersen. "They have to have confidence that you will keep them out of trouble."

THE GUIDES SAID others cause more problems on the slopes than the blind skiers.

Both guides and skiers wear bright pink-orange fluorescent vests provided by members of the Moose Lodge.

"The color catches the eye quickly," said Chris, "and usually people keep their distance."

He said, "I've never been in contact with a blind skier who was the least bit hesitant."

"They're incredible," said Cheryl. "I don't believe any sport would stop them because of fear."

Petersen said he found they learned faster than sighted people.

"Probably because they get more personal attention. But, they can't look over there and pick up bad habits. As a result, they pick up only what you tell them."

"It is a lecture—not a demonstration."

GUIDES AND SKIERS are looking forward to the competition.

"The first year we sent eight skiers to the regionals. We won six of eight prizes in races and runoffs. They were amazed."

The prizes included trips to Aspen for the skier and guide.

There will be practice sessions on Feb. 5 for contestants who will come from Wisconsin, Illinois and southwestern Michigan. There will be 11 entrants from the Pine Knob group.

Events are divided into four classes: junior, senior, partial and total. "Some can see shadows but are legally blind," Petersen explained. There will be prizes for the most improved and best two out of three on the downhill runs.

They expect at least 33 skiers to take part.

The official program begins at 9:30 a.m. Sunday, Feb. 6.

"WHEN IT STARTED, we didn't have much to go on," said Petersen.

Eventually, the Pine Knob group merged with the Blind Skiing Foundation.

He credited Barb Delpiere who heads the program at Pine Knob with contributing to its success.

Guide clinics were established at Pine Knob. A majority of the guides are from the Rochester area but some are from Lansing as well as the metropolitan Detroit area.

Rental equipment is provided. "Ron Brown and the ski school have helped, and we've good support from Pine Knob and the Moose Lodge."

"We have enjoyed being in the program," said Cheryl Petersen.

Her husband added, "There's a large number of people out there on the slopes on Sunday and the guides have to be especially aware. But we really have a ball."

'Friends' shares the awful aloneness

When one of your children dies, no one can really understand except another parent who has experienced the same kind of loss.

That's what the Society of Compassionate Friends is all about, and it's the reason the organization is so vital a part of the lives for some of its local members.

The group meets the second Tuesday of every month in the Southfield Civic Center's parks and recreation building, drawing bereaved parents from across the metropolitan area.

To each of those who attend regularly, there is continuing help for a hurt that never goes away and the opportunity to give support to others who need it.

"Driving home after the first meeting I attended, I felt as though a great weight had been taken off my shoulders," said Shirley Spaunburg of Livonia, now secretary of the group.

Her 16-year-old son had been killed in a roof cave-in in December of 1973. She said she had found the loss all but overwhelming.

"Then my sister-in-law called and asked, rather cautiously, if I'd be interested in this new group she had read about," she related.

"I drove over, not knowing just what to expect, but the support I found has kept me going back."

"I still need that support, but now I also feel that I'm in a position to help others."

THAT KIND OF SUPPORT also has been felt by Joan O'Beirne of Livonia and Beverly Anderson of Redford Township, both of whom lost teen-aged daughters when reckless drivers hit them as they rode bicycles.

Mrs. Anderson said she was "absolutely despondent and nothing but nerves" when a friend sent her a notice about the organization.

"At first everyone was dear and helpful," she said, remembering the dark days of the fall of 1973 after her

oldest daughter, Kim Dudek, lost her life.

"So at first I didn't have time to think. But after that I was really in bad shape. You can't imagine the help it was to realize that someone was there who could really understand."

It was "awful aloneness after all the pushing to get through the funeral" that Mrs. O'Beirne remembered.

But it was five or six months after the October, 1974, death of her daughter, Colleen, that she had a letter from in the Compassionate Friends group, by then well established.

"The first meeting after the letter came I wasn't able to go," she remembered, "so my husband went. He told me it was a most helpful experience, and we've been attending regularly ever since."

"The greatest thing was the idea that there's someone to talk to, someone who will let you talk as much as you want and will understand."

THE NEED TO TALK and the way the group meets the need were described by Mrs. Spaunburg and Mrs. Anderson.

"After a while you don't want to bore your friends and relatives," the former said, "but there's still that great need to talk."

Mrs. Anderson added: "Everything comes out at those meetings—it's like talking to a psychiatrist, only better, because these people have been there."

In fact, the women mentioned, several speakers in the various helping fields have come to the meetings.

They have brought needed encouragement, the three agreed, but, as Mrs. Anderson pointed out, "they all tell us they learn from us."

The meetings are not depressing, they agreed. "Newcomers will weep, as we all did, and sometimes we cry with them," Mrs. Anderson stated.

"But the bond we have with each other is irreplaceable," added Mrs. Spaunburg.

THE SOCIETY of Compassionate Friends was organized in November, 1973, by two Southfield residents, Herb Waze and Sid Cold.

It was modeled on a similar group founded in Coventry, England, in 1969, by the Rev. Simon Stephen as the result of a meeting of bereaved parents.

The society offered "friendship and understanding to any person, irrespective of color, creed or station, who finds himself or herself heartbroken and socially isolated by the death of a dearly-loved child."

By 1972 there were some 40 chapters in England, and a story in Time magazine started their being organized in this country.

The Detroit area group, after trying meetings in a number of locations, now is back in centrally-located Southfield. Branches have been organized in Lansing and Ann Arbor, but at this point there is no disposition on the part of the closely-knit group to divide.

TALK AT MEETINGS encompasses all sorts of topics, the women said, like strains on marriage and religious faith, the problems that may come up with other children in the family and the tendency to "think of the dead child as perfect."

Some members are like Mrs. O'Beirne, who found that "in a time of stress you go to religion."

But then there are those like Mrs. Anderson, who said:

"I turned away. I'm a devout Catholic, but when Kim died I turned on God—he really had struck out for me because my first husband had died and then I lost my daughter."

"I don't feel that way now, but I can listen with understanding to those who do."

She added that the group also had helped her face her tendency to be overprotective of three other children.

"They've been patient with me," she said, "but I know they will get resentful if I don't manage to let go a bit, and at the meetings I'm getting help in doing that."

THE WOMEN who had been through the searing experience had a bit of advice for friends and relatives who have lost children.

"Don't be afraid to mention the child's name," said Mrs. Spaunburg. "If you sense they want to talk, let them. For many, this is the best thing you can do."

"And don't assume that after a certain amount of time has elapsed the bereaved parent will be over the grief. You can't put a time limit on it—really, it never goes away."

Mrs. Anderson added that no one should be judgemental about anyone else's method of coping with grief.

"You should do what you think best if you're in that situation," she said.

"I won't change a thing in my daughter's room—her purse is still hanging on the bedpost."

"Many others want to get things out of sight. But everyone has to deal with it in her own way. Nothing is wrong."

For them, the best thing that was done was passing on the word of the Society of Compassionate Friends. Anyone wanting to do that for others could drop a note to P.O. Joan O'Beirne put it this way:

"There must be a lot of people out there who desperately need this. We'd like to find them, because we can help."

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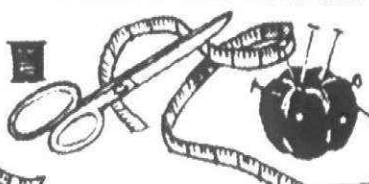
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YFU offers aid for stranded students

Youth for Understanding, the largest international student exchange organization in the United States in terms of student numbers, has announced that it will supply free return transportation for up to 25 U.S. students stranded in Brazil after the collapse of another student exchange organization.

Commenting on the offer to provide free return transportation, Youth for Understanding Executive Director Philip Yasinski said his organization would be "very pleased to be able to help those unfortunate students and their families by utilizing Youth for Understanding's resources and experience."

The students, participants in an unrelated exchange program, were unable to return to the United States when the sponsoring organization indicated financial insolvency.

YOUTH FOR UNDERSTANDING contacted the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Cultural Affairs, offering to make available space on Youth for Understanding flights from Brazil to Detroit.

The State Department then cabled U.S. Consulates in Rio de Janeiro, Sao Paulo, and Recife, and the American Embassy in Brasilia, instructing them to contact the stranded U.S. students and direct them to Youth for Understanding's National Organization in Brazil for free transportation home.

The return flights are scheduled to arrive in Detroit late in January. "We are trying to do everything possible to help these students," said Yasinski. "In the true spirit of inter-

national student exchange, our staff and field people will try to render aid to students who cannot get it through their now-defunct program, as well as by transporting students home from Brazil at no cost to them. Wherever possible in the U.S. and overseas, we will act constructively to alleviate the damage done.

"The benefits of international student exchange are immense, and we feel strongly that they should not be harmed by irresponsibility in any sector of international student exchange activities," he said.

SINCE ITS INCEPTION in 1951, Youth for Understanding has exchanged more than 50,000 students worldwide. This year, more than 6,000 students will participate in Youth for Understanding programs.

Youth for Understanding receives a U.S. Department of State grant for its activities, and enjoys the highest rating possible from the National Information Bureau (NIB), the major organization which evaluates the programs and financial soundness of philanthropic organizations.

Under the auspices of Youth for Understanding, students aged 14 through 18 from the United States can participate in either the eight-week summer program or the year program, which includes secondary-school attendance overseas.

International students, aged 14 through 18, come to the United States from 24 countries in Europe, Latin America, Africa, and the Far East, and live with American families while attending school in the United States.

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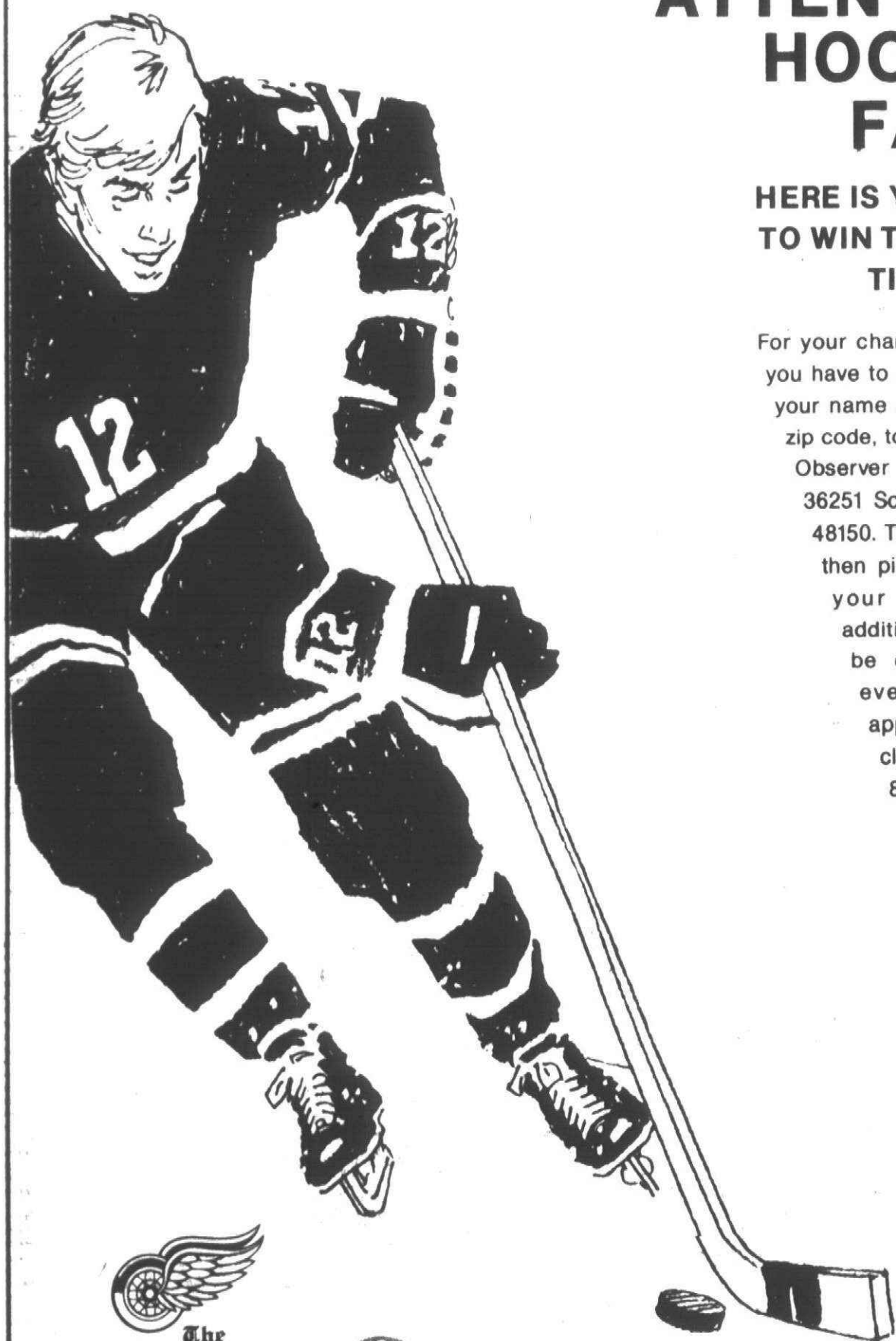
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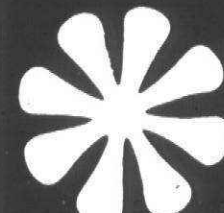
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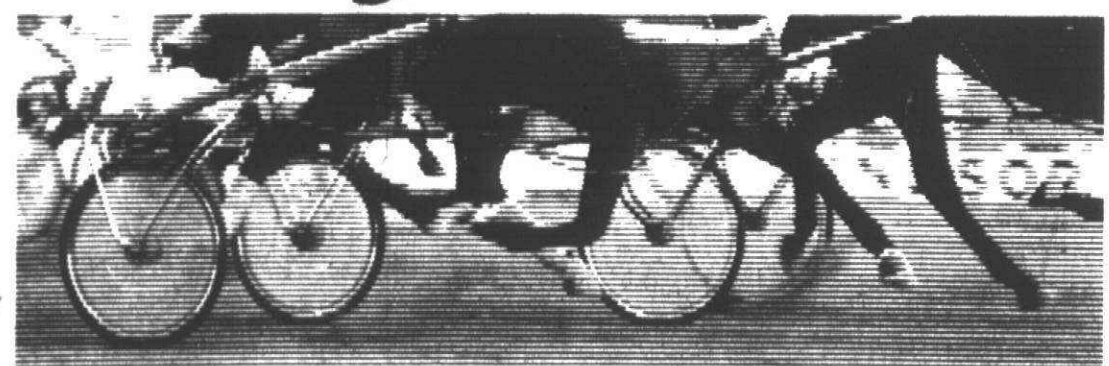

Renaissance for DIA Italian wing

Ten galleries newly-designed to display its collection of historic Italian art have been opened to the public by the Detroit Institute of Arts.

With works from the 13th through 18th centuries, the new Italian Wing, in the main building, will display 150 paintings, 50 sculptures and decorative pieces acquired since the museum was founded in 1885. The Art Institute's Italian collection is the third largest outside Europe.

The new wing will be a major showcase among the museum's 101 galleries.

Featured in this collection are the four paintings from the Eleanor Clay Ford bequest to the museum: "The Annunciation" (ca. 1435) by Fra Angelico; "Madonna and Child with Cherubim" (1460) by Benozzo Gozzoli; principal painter to the Medici family during the time of Cosimo I; "The Madonna and Child" (1495) by Perugino,

close in style to the early works of Raphael, his most famous pupil; and "Portrait of Andrea Navagero" (1515) by Titian.

The 10-gallery exhibit, in chronological order, begins with Early Christian and Gothic works, paintings from the 13th, 14th, and early 15th centuries, the High Renaissance, the Baroque era, and climaxes in the Grand Gallery with late 17th and 18th century masterpieces.

The exhibit will be permanently displayed during regular museum hours, 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Wednesday, Thursday, Saturday, Sunday, 1-9 p.m. Beginning Feb. 2, museum hours will change to 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Wednesdays through Sundays. Tours of the new installation for organized groups of 10 or more may be arranged by advance appointment through DIA's Education Department.

Stirring and optimistic 'Rocky'

The premise of "Rocky" (PG) is wildly unbelievable: an unknown, 30-year-old club boxer gets a shot at the world heavyweight championship. Yet this is the kind of sentimental saga that everyone loves.

"Rocky" is a movie that harbors a treasury of myths: The success story myth, the gentle giant myth, the ugly duckling myth. To paraphrase a song, it's cornier than Kansas in August. It's also a wonderfully stirring and optimistic movie.

The performances are convincing, and the story develops with increasing momentum. Given this one-two punch, it's not difficult to suspend belief and empathize with the dreams and despair of Rocky.

Rocky is the American Dream, urban version, 1970s. He's "Joe" without the prejudices, Horatio Alger without the materialism. Rocky is a romantic idealist; he walks unscathed through the seamy ghettos, the sweaty gyms. He loves animals; finds beauty in a shy, awkward girl; tries to straighten out a brassy teenager, and is genuinely humble.

SYLVESTER STALLONE plays Rocky in such an uncanny, natural way, it's almost no surprise to discover that he literally created the character. Stallone wrote the script, but it's his own interpretation and physical presence that make Rocky unforgettable.

He combines the massive build and bulging muscles of a heavyweight with a poetic Roman face. He looks like one of Picasso's classical figures of the 1920s.

It's difficult to assess Stallone's performance, or rather his acting ability, because the actor and the character seem inseparable. His performance as Rocky is excellent—the way he walks, the pacing of his speech, the host of individual mannerisms he uses—all combine to flesh out the character and make him believable.

Is Stallone a one-role actor? Can he play anything else other than a plodding gentle giant? We'll have to wait for future movie roles to find out.

Regardless of what that answer might be, Stallone as Rocky is the most engaging character to appear on the screen in the past year.

Gene Cameron of Westland thought the complete reading gave him a better understanding of the Bible.

"My wife and I had read the New Testament before," he said, "but this was the first time through. When you teach Sunday School, you read a lot of the stories a lot of times, but this gives a different view."

"It unfolds a lot better," For Tressie Baer of Detroit, it was the third reading.

"I don't know that I understand it all, not by a long shot," she said, "but it's been a big help."

Eileen and Dwight Sachau, also Detroiters, shared a Bible and read in shifts.

Work views change with generations

People have changed in the way they view their work and corporations are changing in the way they view their workers, in the view of a personnel executive from Plymouth.

James Francek, now coordinator of the alcohol and drug abuse program at the Ford Motor Co., brought ideas on "Changing Concepts of Work" to the Help Everyone Help People (HELP) series at St. Edith Catholic Church of Livonia.

"Our children don't look at work in the same way we did," Francek said.

"This isn't necessarily bad; just different."

Tracing the changing views, he began with the biblical suggestion that work is punishment, as noted in the story of Adam and Eve and their banishment from the Garden of Eden.

"People used to be much closer to their jobs when more of them worked the land," he continued. "There was a sense of responsibility and working with nature that is missing now."

There also was a closer identification with parents' work and more sense of accomplishment, Francek pointed out.

"The kid in 1935, before this tremendous changeover from the rural to the urban concentrations of population, did not have to ask what his father did," the speaker went on. "Often he helped him do it."

"AND HE KNEW how important his own chores were. If he was supposed to feed the calf and shirked his job, the calf would start hollering in the middle of the night and his father would do a bit of hollering too."

"You had immediate feedback, reinforced by someone in authority. Today it's not so immediate, and he doesn't see so clearly the results of bad work."

Another change he pointed out is represented, he said, "in the foreman who's been working his backside off for years dealing with the kid who isn't much interested in his job."

"It used to be that work was totally integrated into the pattern of life," Francek said. "If you didn't work, you didn't survive."

"Now work seems to have become a right. Welfare and other governmental supports make it possible to survive without it. That means you

have more options about how you work."

"And the view of work becomes not so much an integral part of life as something to get away from."

FRANCEK SAID his present work represents the beginnings on the part of industry to recognize that changing concepts affect workers and lead to different kinds of problems.

Substance abuse, including alcoholism, he said, represent "our failure to teach our children to cope with life."

"Employers are beginning to see that in today's world there are a lot of pressures on people and helping them resolve them is not paternalistic. It is of direct benefit to the employer," Francek said.

He said the kind of program he is trying to bring about at Ford is aimed at identifying problems when they first start appearing instead of waiting for them to get more serious.

"We're beginning to get a handle on this," he stated, "and I think really good things are going to be happening in industry in this line in the next few years."

THE SPEAKER emphasized to parents present that they should stop thinking about alcohol as "the safe drug."

"We should give as much response to alcohol as to marijuana," he stated, "and I'm certainly going to teach my children about the dangers in alcohol."

And although Francek saw today's social system as bringing to many a lowering of "the value of work," he suggested there is a way parents can replace this.

"We should help our children understand that the motivation for good work should be brought into the idea of giving something back to society," he said.

"In an organization where a spirit of special dedication is required and where work implies a great amount of sacrifice for a cause, changing leadership is necessary, important, and valuable. It is my reflection and absolute conviction that what I am doing at this time will devolve to the future benefit of the Orchard Lake schools."

"The Orchard Lake schools, since their founding in 1885, have always tried to respond to the needs of their constituencies: the church, the United States, Poland," he said. "In recent years, especially after Vatican II, these needs have expanded, changed in emphasis, demanded more extensive participation of greater numbers in the planning, discussion, support, and implementation of new ideas and new programs."

The 51-year-old educator carried the Orchard Lake schools through the period of post-Vatican II

reform and expanded the activities and services of the schools through the establishment of three new services—the center for Polish studies and culture, the Polish-American liturgical center, and the center for pastoral studies. He also expanded significantly the public relations and fund-raising efforts of

the schools during his years of leadership. "As I leave these responsibilities, I feel a heavy but sweet burden of gratitude to the many countless individuals who cooperated with me and supported me in all that I did or tried to do," he commented after his resignation was accepted by Cardinal John Dear-

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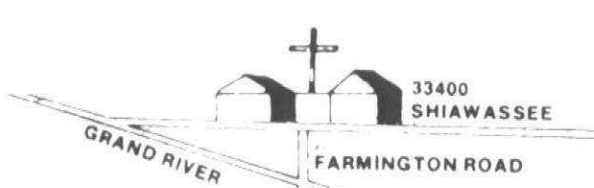

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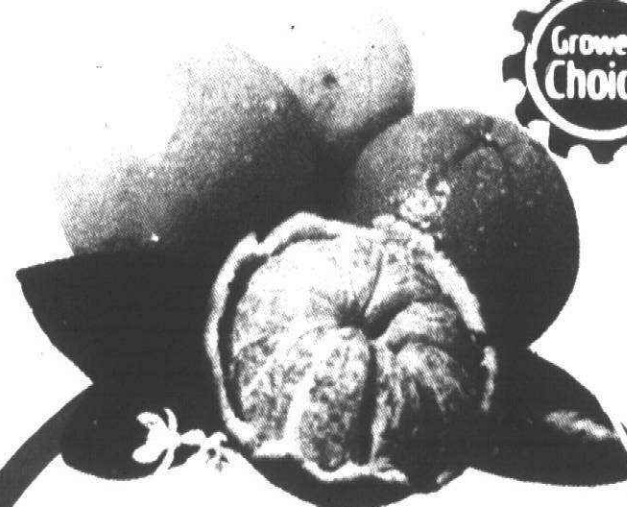
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Fordson scars Rocks' unblemished record

A three-man offense wasn't enough for Plymouth Salem Tuesday night, and that perfect basketball record which the Rocks had nursed so stungly through 11 games faded into history in the Dearborn Fordson gym, 68-61.

As a non-league contest, the game had no bearing on Salem's role as front-runner in the Suburban Eight, where the Rocks are seeking their fourth straight title, but their pride suffered a mighty jolt.

Now it will be back to league wars

Friday night when the Rocks invade Dearborn High, an overtime victim when the Pioneers played at Plymouth several weeks ago.

Coach Fred Thomann minced no words as to the importance of this test when he said, "Now we'll find what we're made of. It takes a champion to bounce back after a loss like this, but these kids can do it."

For the sake of the record, Salem hasn't lost back-to-back varsity basketball games since December of 1973. In fact, since that time the Rocks have played to a habit-forming 70 victories in 77 starts. Only one of those

defeats came at home, and the loss to Fordson was the sixth on the road over that span.

ALL OF PLYMOUTH'S fire power against the Tractors was concentrated in Tom Ellinghausen, Bruce Gerish and Rich Hewlett. Together they hit on 23 of their 38 shots from the floor (a .605 average) for 55 of the 61 points.

The rest of the Rocks could manage to find the hoop for only two baskets in 16 tries. Ellinghausen wound up with 26 points, Gerish 15 and Hewlett 14.

Fordson also came up with three scorers in double figures with Tom Dudek getting 24 points, Bill Cibulka 21 and Bob Perri 12. However, as a team Fordson outshot Salem from the floor decisively, canning 32 field goals to 25 for the Rocks.

Furthermore, Fordson's persistent penetration through Salem's defense gave Dudek and Cibulka in particular many an easy layup as the Rocks were outscored in all except one period—the third.

AFTER TRAILING, 34-28, at half-time, Salem came on strong in the

third stanza and for a while it looked as though they could pull another one out of the fire.

Hewlett and Gerish scored early in the period, and then Gerish added another to cut Fordson's lead to 38-36. Doug Agnew came through with a tying bucket after a beautiful double feed that went from Hewlett to Gerish and then to Agnew, and Hewlett put the Rocks in front, 40-38, with a long jumper with 3:52 left.

Ellinghausen got Plymouth's next three points, but when the Tractors stormed back to take a 44-43 bulge it gave them a lead they never relin-

quished. From there to the wire their margin was 24-18 and as a safety measure they stalled out most of the last two minutes to protect their upset. Salem is now 11-1 for the season; Fordson is 9-3.

Surprising Chiefs upset Bentley

Plymouth Canton won perhaps the biggest basketball game in the school's short four-year history when it handled the Livonia Bentley Bulldogs a 63-59 upset victory Tuesday night at the Plymouth gym.

The Chiefs overcame an outstanding 28-point performance by 6-6 German foreign exchange student Flo Homm for the non-league victory. The triumph was the sixth for Canton in 13 tries, it will once again try to reach the 500 mark with a home game against Walled Lake Western tomorrow night. Bentley, members of the Suburban Eight League, saw its record drop to 10-3 for the season.

The tables started turning in the Chiefs' favor in the last three minutes of the third quarter when they erased a 44-38 Bulldog lead with 10 straight unanswered points to finish the quarter. The end of that spree came on a last second shot by Randy Rienas who

grabbed a partially blocked attempt and shoved the ball into the basket from 10 feet away. Earlier in the game, Rienas ended the first quarter with an amazing 60 foot jumper at the buzzer that swished the nets to give the Chiefs an early 15-10 lead. Rienas finished the game with 17 points.

CANTON MAINTAINED its lead throughout the final period of play, but not without the help of some great individual efforts.

Sophomore guard Butch King scored seven of his team-high 18 points in the final quarter as he hit three key outside jumpers that stymied Bentley's zone defense.

Captain Rob Mandie finished an excellent floor game with four clutch free throws in the final minute of play which iced the game. Mandie finished the night with 14 points.

Most importantly, senior Mike Ley was brought in cold from the bench for a three-minute stint in the closing minutes and responded with two defen-

sive blocks which proved to be an intimidating factor for the Bulldogs' catchup efforts.

The closest Bentley ever came in that final period was 59-56 with 1:34 remaining in the game.

"We played the most complete and most controlled game of the year," said Canton coach Casey Cavell. "We had some bad shots but I'm not complaining. We knew we had to shoot to win."

"They (the players) played real

well and I'm proud of them. And to come back after getting beat from a big team like Harrison—that shows a lot of class."

ON THE OTHER side of the locker room, Bentley coach Larry Jackson wasn't as merry as he lectured his squad for almost a half an hour after the game.

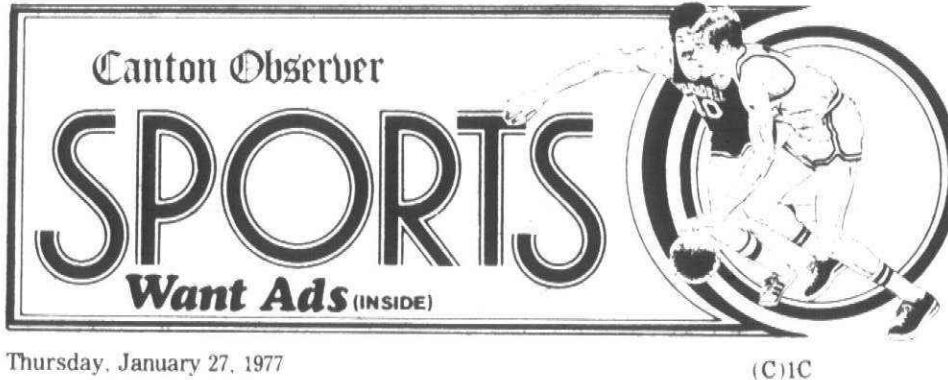
"We didn't come ready to play and we didn't play with intensity," said the angered Jackson. "The key to the game was our lack of intensity. It was

probably because they (Canton) were not in our league."

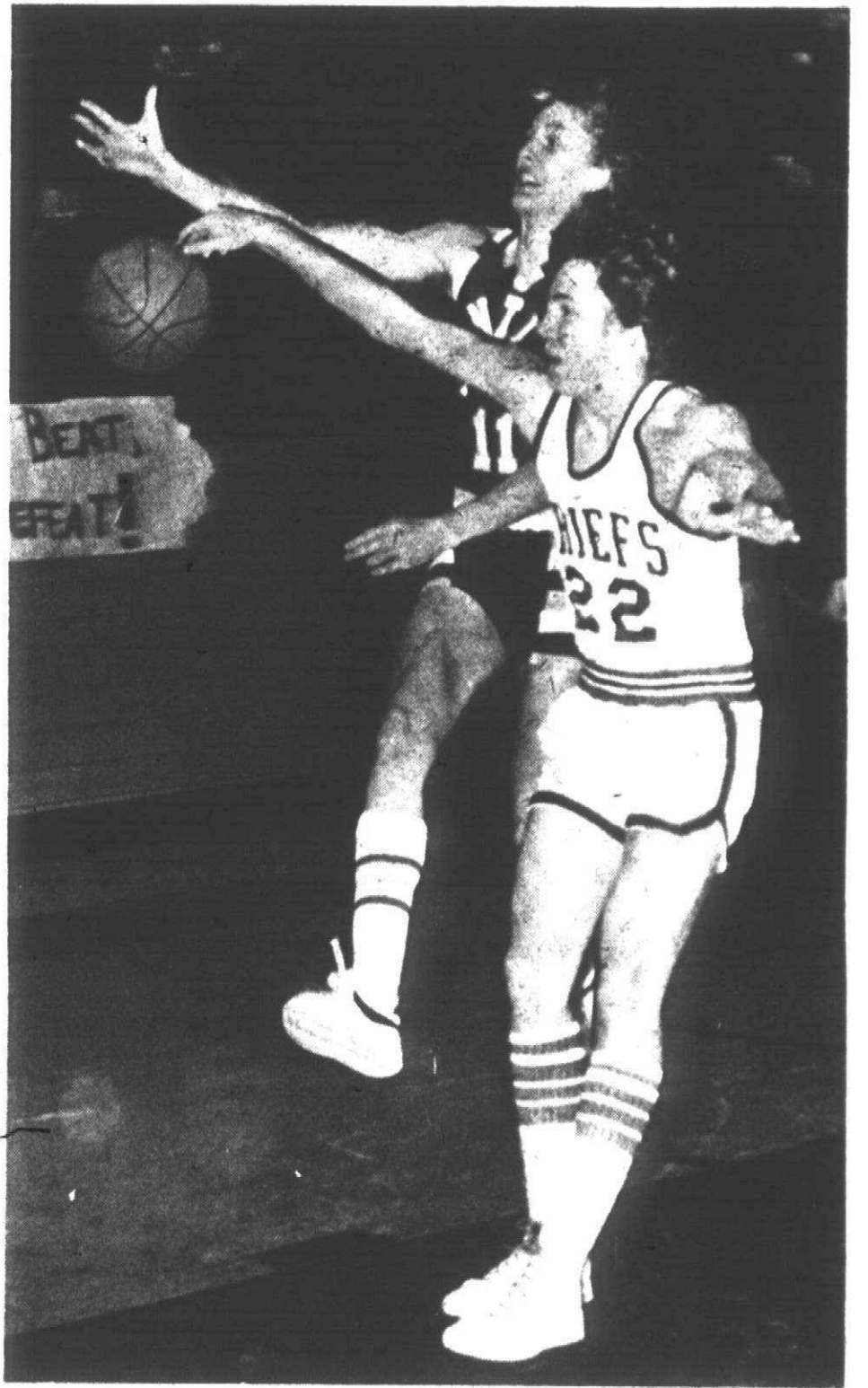
Bentley's Homm put on a magnificent show for the Plymouth fans who failed to see him in action last month when he missed the game with Plymouth Salem because of an ankle injury.

Homm hit most of his field goals from the outside with field goals from 20 feet away and beyond Canton's zone. He also knocked in eight of 10 free throws.

Rampaging Rock wrestlers destroy Ypsilanti, Western

The rampage of the Plymouth Salem wrestling team continued Tuesday night with a triangular meet victory over host Ypsilanti 37-20 and Walled Lake Western 47-16.

The double victory raised the Rocks overall record to 10-3-1 for the year. Salem takes its 4-1 Suburban Eight League mark into action against

Freshman Mark Ross followed Viperman with a 1-07 pin of a Western opponent and a 7-1 decision over his Ypsilanti competition. Steve Ernst was his usual self at 114 with a 1-31 pin and a 15-0 major decision.

BUT THE REAL key to the Rocks' victories at Ypsilanti was the perform-

ances of reserve wrestlers who were forced to fill the gaps because of injuries or sickness.

Rob Leist was the biggest surprise of young wrestlers replacing Dave Wilkens who was sick and responded with two victories.

"We were very pleased with the way things went in the triangular," Salem coach Ron Krueger said. "We had to make changes again but our younger kids wrestled and did a good job."

Heavyweight Dave Champion pinned his Western opponent Bob Blair at 5-45 and tied Ypsilanti's Mike William 2-2. William is a highly-rated grappler who won the Schoolcraft Invitational last month.

The eight team points that Champion earned on this night made him the all-time Rock record holder for most team points by a wrestler.

The old record was held by Carl Schultz last year with 156. Champion now has 166 with the state tournament still to come.

"I think Champion has a good chance of placing in the state meet now," Krueger said after the tie with William.

"The team played pretty well, just not well enough," commented Salem coach Brian Gilles. "In the first game we couldn't adjust to Stevenson's

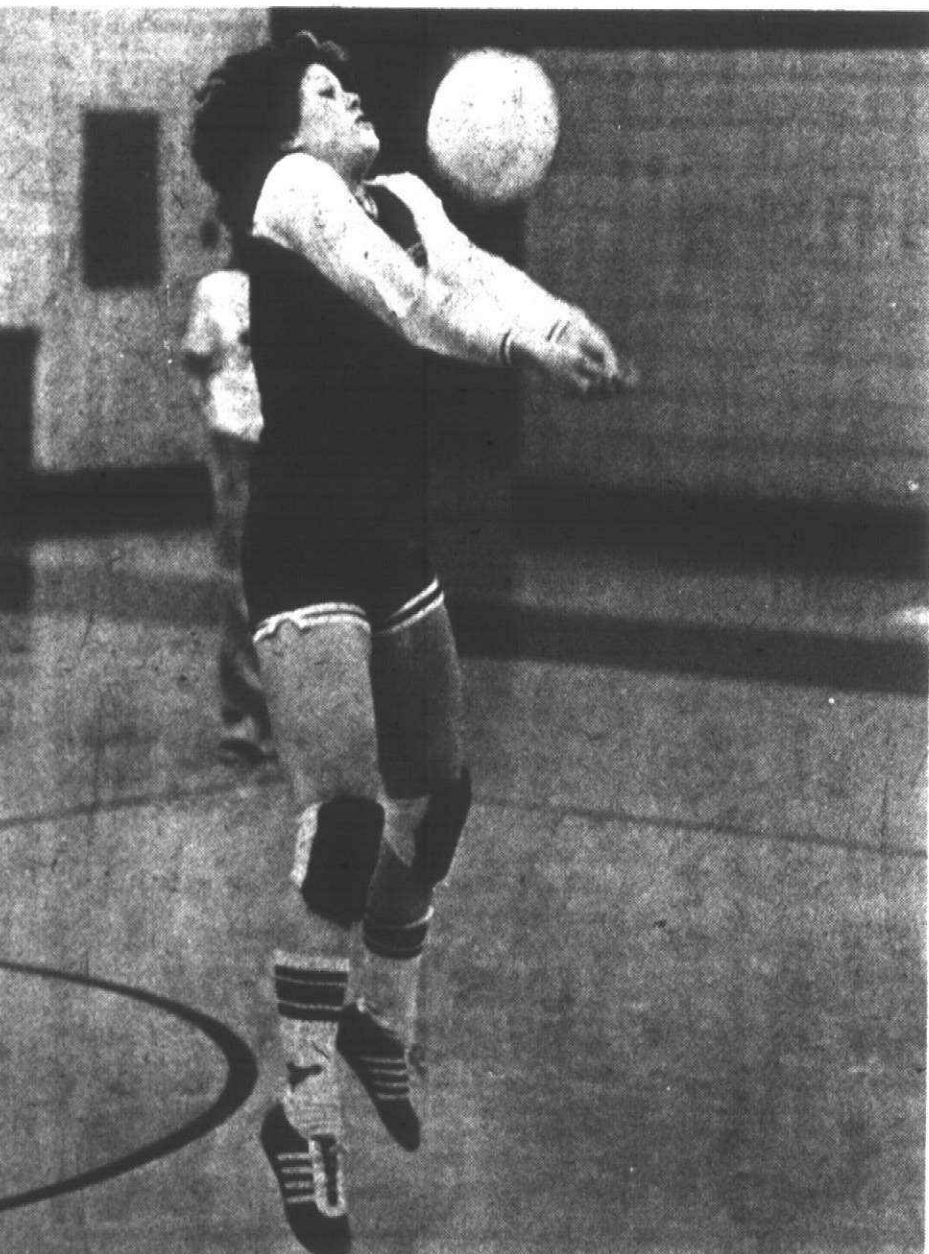
short hits. We were playing more in the back court than in front and middle court."

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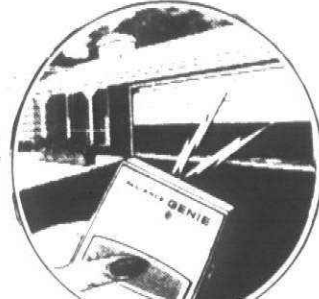
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In Farmington Invitational Salem grapplers place 3d

Time for leagues to shift

The Observer reported the departure of Redford Union from the Suburban Eight League in last week's section. I hope this decision from the Redford Union School District will begin a total realignment of the area's high school leagues.

Redford Union is moving to the Northwest Suburban League which means easier travel for its squads and its fans. What a great idea.

Put yourself, the Plymouth fan, in the position of following your team on the road.

Now be honest, do you really like traveling to Trenton for a Salem contest or Waterford Mott for a Canton battle?

When Redford Union was a member of the initial Suburban Six—B League some 40 years ago, not many high schools were in this area. The travel from one school to another was inevitable because no schools were built close together.

But as the suburbs grew, high schools began to pop up all over and the geographic areas between schools lessened. But the Suburban Six (now Eight) remained in tact.

WHEN PLYMOUTH CANTON first joined the new Western Six League it was forced to play with schools from Waterford and Walled Lake. This was because all these schools were also relatively new at the time and got together to form the young conference. Northville is the only "old" member of the Western-Six, which includes all Class A teams. Northville was a Class B school until a few years ago.

The solution to the problem is a total realignment of leagues in the western suburbs. This idea has been attempted for the past 20 years but no formal action has ever been taken.

Last year, the Observer uncovered a story about the possibility which was discussed at a Livonia School Board

meeting. But after that, everything seemed to stop and no action took place.

Hopefully Redford Union's actions will prompt all the schools in the western suburbs to get together and unanimously vote for realignment of the leagues.

THIS IS THE only sensible thing to do!

Not only is it economically feasible but it will also spur fan interest and create great high school rivalries.

And there would no longer be those horrible trips to Waterford or Trenton!

Can you imagine different conferences set up with the likes of only Plymouth, Livonia, Redford, Garden City and Westland teams competing in conference play? This would be perfect.

If a major realignment is not possible, I strongly recommend that Plymouth Salem and Livonia Bentley follow in the tracks of Redford Union, Salem and Bentley should join the Northwest Suburban League with the likes of schools from Garden City, Westland, Livonia, Redford and Farmington. This would make an eight-team conference.

Why do you think that Salem's first non-league football game of the 1977 season was changed to Livonia Franklin, a Northwest Suburban League school?

The previous season openers saw Salem play Bloomfield Hills Andover and Franklin battle Midland Dow. Now how many fans would want to travel to Midland or Bloomfield when they could stay in their own backyards?

As for Canton, I'd like it to try to find another league as well. But I don't know if this is possible without a major shift in schools.

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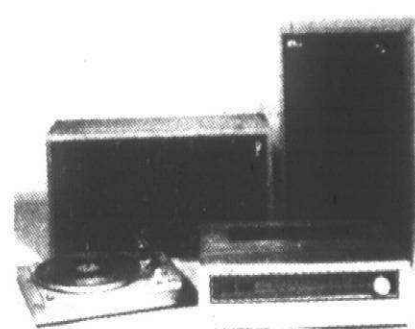
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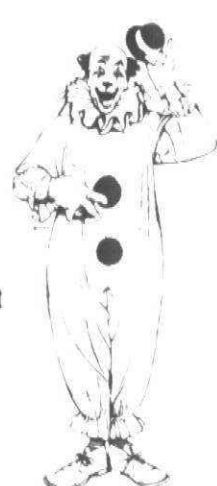
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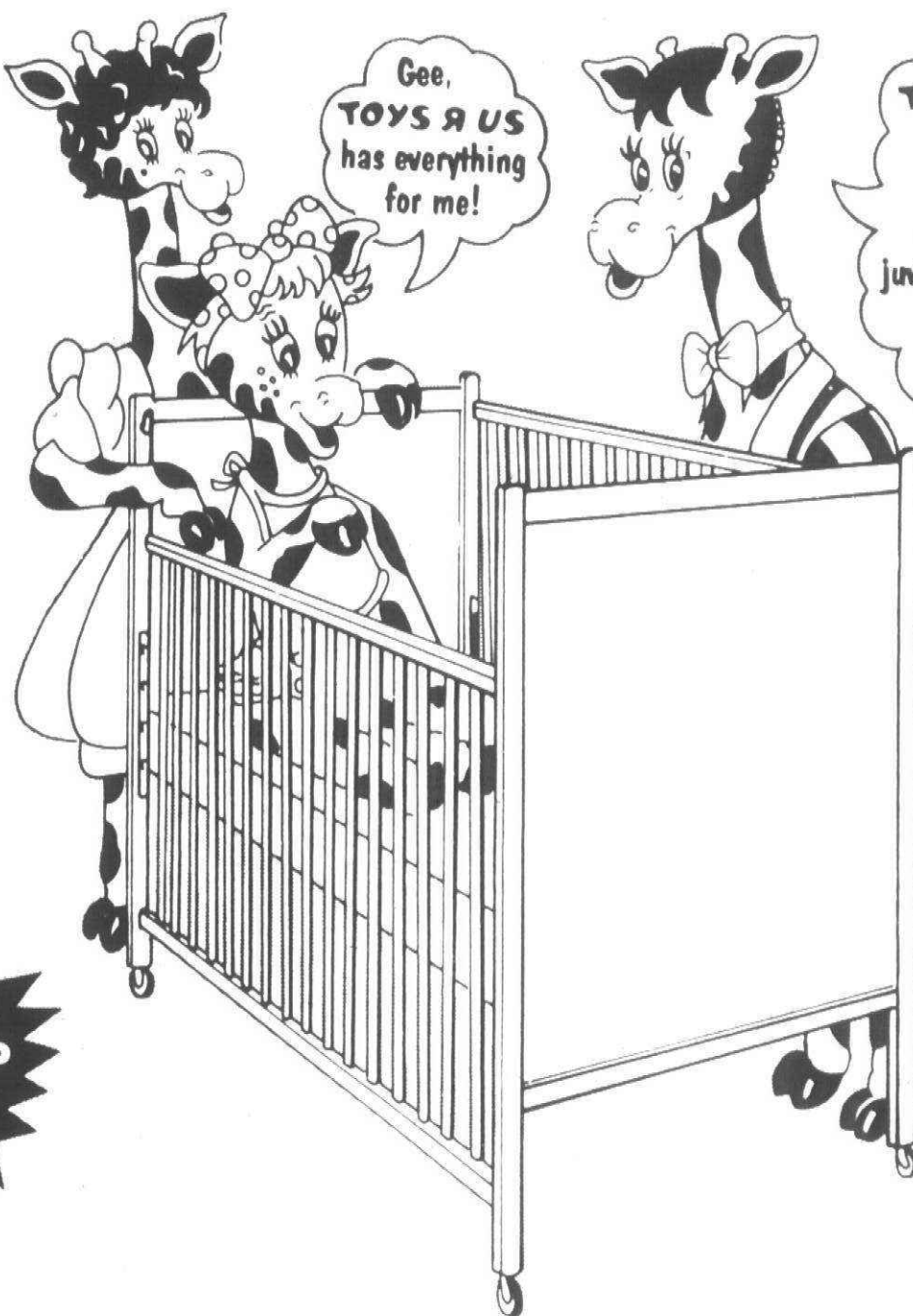
