Police report urges full-time local unit

If Canton residents have to bankroll additional law enforcement, it should be for an independent, full-time, full-service police department, according to all four members of the township's police study committee.

Listed by the committee as "one of the least desirable" options open to the township was contracting with Wayne County for the services of the sheriff.

The sheriff now provides the bulk of the township's police patrol. The state police and Canton's reserve department provide additional protection.

The police committee, comprised entirely of professional policemen, arrived at its consensus 10 days ago, before learning of the Michigan Supreme Court's refusal to hear an appeal by seven out-county townships.

The high court's refusal in essence upholds a circuit court ruling that said the townships must pay for road patrol service after June 30.

"We'd have to pay about \$350,000

per patrol car if we entered into a contract with the county for sheriff's road patrol," George Rose told the Observer last week. "The sheriff's contract with Romulus isn't easy to decipher. I think the only way we'd be able to find out how much it would cost Canton to contract with the county would be to sit down and negotiate a contract with them. It doesn't appear to be the way to go."

"For better than a half a million dollars a year, we could put a lot more than two officers on the road," Rose said.

The report states: "The cost of providing a full-time, full-service Canton police department, based on cost estimates available, would probably be somewhere between one and two million dollars." The committee's final report called this "a long range objective."

HIRING A FULL-TIME chief of police is an "immediate necessity in Canton, according to Rose, chairman of the police committee.

"When should it be done?" he asked? "Last week," Rose said a police millage is overdue.

"We looked at the police set-up in the Village of Manchester (near Chelsea) and found a community of 12,000 people looking at a \$200,000 police budget," Rose said. "Here in Canton with over 30,000 people we've got a \$50,000 police budget."

The police committee findings state that employing a full-time police chief can be accomplished with a "minimum of effort."

"The most satisfactory method of securing the services of a highly-skilled police administrator, without becoming involved in the mechanics of selection, would be the utilization of the services of Michigan Municipal League," the committee suggested.

"For a reasonable fee they will examine, conduct oral interviews, and perform all the mechanics of selection after the community has provided them with names to be considered."

Rose, who chaired the police com-

mittee, retired from the Detroit Police Department where he was commander in the Fort-Green precinct. The other three members of the committee also have police experience. Frank McGee is a retired Detroit lieutenant; Paul Meneguzzo, heads the intelligence unit at the Northville State Police post and Robert Pifer is commander at the Northville Michigan State Police post.

THE POLICE CHIEF should report to a three-member committee or commission, according to the study recommendations. Rose said that the supervisor of the township should not sit on the police commission because the supervisor is automatically chief law enforcement officer in the township. Three members of the police commission could be picked from the remaining members of the township board of trustees, Rose said.

Prior practices of having a supervisor as police chief (Robert Greenstein) and an "interim police chief" who held a day job in downtown De-

troit (Carl Silvers) "are not acceptable," Rose said. The present practice where Building Supt. Charley Thompson serves dual duty as day time "director of police" is also frowned upon by Rose. "A man who is police chief must be available almost always on 24-hour call," Rose said last week. "We've got to get ourselves a leader who is a professional policeman and eminently qualified."

Director of police Charley Thompson said recently that he doesn't take his title too seriously. "This is strictly a temporary arrangement," Thomp-

son said recently. "I was asked to take on the extra duty and I did it to help clear up communication problems between the people who are here in the day and the people who are in at night."

Silvers, who was removed as "interim police chief" Jan. 11, is in charge most evenings as commander. He says he is considering applying for the police chief job once it is posted.

Weekend nights Silvers usually patrols in the supervisor's car with two

Judge allows confession

Witness saw suspect in motel

Based on the testimony of an eyewitness, Marvin Earl Williams was bound over for trial to Wayne County Circuit on charges of first degree murder in the hammer slaying of Carolyn Kovacs, a night clerk at the Red Roof Inn in Plymouth Township.

Daniel Boyle, a guest at the motel, identified Williams as the man leaving the manager's office at the motel the morning the young Livonia woman was murdered.

Boyle provided police with the description which led to Williams' arrest. Boyle was the prosecution's main witness Thursday during Williams' preliminary examination in the 35th District Court. Ms. Kovacs was beaten to death with a hammer Feb. 4 while on duty as a night clerk at the motel.

District Judge Dunbar Davis also admitted as evidence Williams' confession to the slaying, despite objections from defense attorney Jay Kalish.

Williams, a Canton resident, will face pre-trial examination March 11. Davis ordered Williams held without bond.

BOYLE TESTIFIED that he received a wake-up call at the motel at 5:30 a.m. Feb. 4.

He then went to the office to see if he owed any phone charges from the night before. He told the court that when he arrived at the office, the girl on duty was dusting a table. She noticed Boyle through the window, and unlocked the door so he could get in.

After checking about additional charges and turning in his key, Boyle said he went to a table in the corner of the office to make tea.

He testified that while making the tea, he heard a woman say in a frightened voice, "Oh, my God, my coat's back there." Boyle said he turned from the table and started walking toward the desk. As he reached the desk, a man came out of the office behind the desk, looking "excited, scared, and surprised."

Boyle stated that when the man saw him, he said, "Go call the police, she (the clerk) fell down and hurt herself." Boyle then said he tried to use the phones behind the desk but could not get an outside line. He then left the motel and went to a gas station across the street and called for help.

Boyle said when he returned to the motel, the office was locked, and the man he talked to was gone. When Assistant County Prosecutor Varsnik Baydarian asked Boyle if that man was in the courtroom, the witness nodded at Williams and said, "That's the man over there."

WHEN WAYNE COUNTY Sheriff Det. Ray Allen, the officer in charge of the case, testified that Williams confessed to being in the office on the morning of Feb. 4, helping Ms. Kovacs "wash walls and paint." He said Williams confessed to knocking

Ms. Kovacs down and hitting her with "what he thought was a hammer" when an argument developed about a marijuana delivery she wanted him to make.

Allen, citing Williams' confession, said that when Williams refused to make the delivery, Ms. Kovacs threatened to expose him to the police for writing bad checks and being a drug dealer. She also threatened to tell Williams' fiancée that he was having an affair with her. At that point, he knocked her down.

However, Allen said police had no evidence to support Williams' claim that she was involved with drugs. A coroner's report on the day of her death said there were no traces of drugs or alcohol in the victim's body.

Before Allen testified about Williams' confession, defense attorney Kalish asked Judge Davis to prohibit its admission as evidence because it was obtained from Williams without an attorney present.

In earlier testimony, Allen had said Williams requested an attorney from the Detroit Police Officer's Association on Feb. 5, the day after his arrest. However, the DPOA declined to provide a lawyer because Williams was no longer employed as a police officer. Allen said Williams was informed of this and was not questioned about the murder until he volunteered to "tell us what we wanted to know."

Williams signed the confession on the morning of Feb. 11, after talking to his mother and girlfriend the night before and a minister that morning, Allen said.

Kalish contended that because Williams had been held without an attorney for six days, the confession could not be considered "voluntary." Davis said he was satisfied that Williams' rights had not been violated and over-ruled the objection.

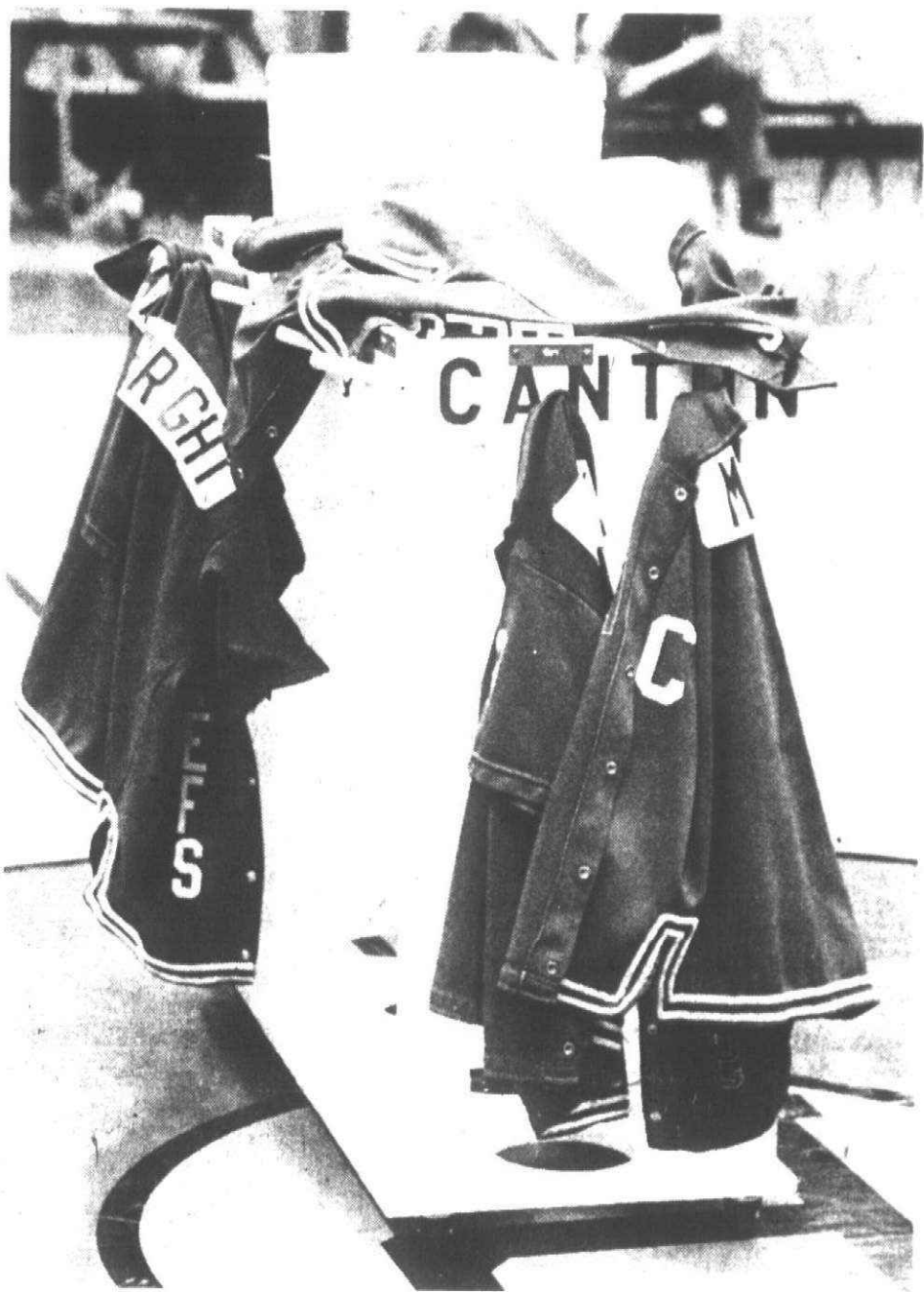

Stein: revoke master plan, focus on sewer's capacity

If Canton Supervisor Harold Stein has his way, the 1976 master land use plan engineered by ex-supervisor Robert Greenstein and township planner Mike Manore, will be discarded.

Stein issued a statement last week suggesting the present plan be declared "null and void since it does not appear that an ordinance giving it effect will be enacted in the near future."

Stein said the master plan conflicts with the existing zoning ordinance and is unworkable because "it does not provide just compensation" for the farmers of the township.

"When the Wayne County Planning Commission adopted the '76 master plan, they said it would only be implemented when just compensation is provided," Stein said. "We must rework the plan, rework the zoning and then talk about establishing a unique plan that suits all the people of Canton."

The master plan, approved by the township planning commission last May, called for "half-urbanization." Most land west of Canton Center would become part of an agriculturally-industrial district for commercial farming. Other kinds of development were to be prohibited unless they were needed in the for commercial farming in the district.

But the plan's intent to tax farmland at its use-value instead of taxing it at market-value—an inflated price pushed upward by land speculation—became impossible when the township failed to adopt a zoning ordinance implementing the plan, Stein said.

According to Greenstein, the only way to get the tax break for western farmers, and make most of the western half of the township a viable farming district was to enact a zoning ordinance that would lock in western town-

ship property as farmland, and not as potentially developable land.

Stein said last week that he objects to the east-west dividing line along Canton Center and urges sensible planning that would not limit growth to either side of the township.

Addressing the people circulating petitions for controlled growth, Stein said that growth can be controlled with strict supervision over sewers.

"The situation with Canton's sewers almost speaks of an automatic growth control situation in Canton," Stein said Friday. "I want to establish a committee that looks at every future development to make sure there is adequate sewer capacity."

Stein said the new committee "would be charged with reviewing every application for a building permit submitted to the building department after the date of the emergency ordinance. It would be the function of this special committee to make certain that sanitary disposal is being properly handled, either through available sewer taps or some adequate pro-

vision for on-site sanitary disposal."

If his idea is adopted by the board, developers who have plans to subdivide an area would notify township officials of their future plans, Stein said, and the developer would be told if there is enough sewer capacity to support his project.

"This committee should be reporting regularly to the board and should also keep a running count of the remaining available taps (in sewer pipes) which should be reported to the board and planning commission on a weekly or monthly basis."

"In part of its function with the assistance of the township engineer, this committee should attempt to establish some standards for sanitary disposal in situations where taps may not be available."

Much of Canton's land is clay-based which provides poor perk for septic tanks. But Stein said it may be possible for developers to dig large septic fields by hauling in sand. He pointed to a subdivision in Brighton, Michigan which features homes with septic fields, instead of sanitary sewers.

SEMTA snubs west county?

Unhappy that western Wayne County has been left out of any major public transportation plans, local state legislators, county commissioners and municipal officials are joining the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority (SEMTA) back at the drawing boards.

"Look at the programs—the 13 alternatives SEMTA is considering," said State Rep. Robert Law (R-Livonia). "No matter how you shuffle and combine them, they leave out western Wayne County."

For starters, said State Rep. Thomas Brown (D-Westland), local leaders and SEMTA should consider express bus service on a loop of three freeways that will be serving the area within a year.

These are the I-96 freeway under construction in the Schoolcraft Road corridor, the M-275 freeway in the Haggerty Road corridor, and I-94.

THE GROUP met for nearly two hours Monday at the urging of Reps. Brown and Law.

Law said SEMTA's recent public

hearing in Westland's City Hall prompted the call to action. The freshman lawmaker said it would be better to propose an alternate public transportation plan, with the help of SEMTA, than to categorically oppose what SEMTA is doing.

"We thought the plans for western Wayne County were lacking," said Brown, "and we want to propose some modification for all of the western suburbs. SEMTA's idea (of a service area) was more to the north (Woodward) and northeast (Griatiot)."

"The freeways of western Wayne County would make ideal express bus routes," said Brown, adding that the western suburbs contain many points that non-residents would want to visit by public transportation.

State Sen. James DeSana (D-Wyandotte) said downriver employers are having problems complying with "affirmative action" hiring programs because blacks can't get there to hold jobs.

"Southern Wayne County is left out of SEMTA plans more than western Wayne County," DeSana said.

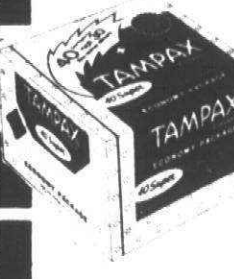

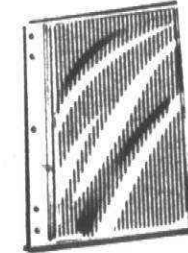

Borrowing rights given to credit untouchables

Credit managers of several major chain department stores say the Equal Credit Opportunity Act, slated to go into effect next month, won't raise prices and or alter past policies, but will create more paper work.

The tougher, more comprehensive federal regulations will replace an earlier set of rules set by the Federal Reserve Board.

The regulations are aimed at ensuring that everyone with the willingness and ability to repay will have equal access to credit. The new law means that credit must be extended in all types of borrowing—from department store charge accounts to home mortgages.

One store executive interviewed said his only fear was that the regulations might make creditors over-cautious in their lending policies.

He said that some companies might refuse to extend credit to more persons with borderline credit ratings to reduce the chances of being charged with discrimination.

Under the act, everyone applying for credit March 23 or after, will be equally eligible, regardless of color,

age (19 and up) or whether paid by an employer or by welfare.

The new regulations ban discrimination on the basis of marital status, color, race, sex, religion or age. Present regulations only bar credit discrimination on the basis of sex or marital status.

Expected to benefit most from the act are 19 and 20-year-old buyers. It will also stop discrimination against elderly borrowers.

Under the regulations, elderly are defined as 62 or older. Lenders who use a "point system" to determine credit eligibility must give elderly applicants the best age score.

Consumers also will be given the right to know why a credit application is rejected or is withdrawn or offered on terms much different from those sought by the customer.

The regulations dictate that a creditor can't just issue a general statement that the applicant didn't meet loan requirements.

A person believing he was discriminated against also will have the right to sue for actual damages and up to \$10,000 in punitive damages.

Should adverse action be taken against an applicant, lenders must tell

the customer why it was taken or inform him of his right to know why.

The law also states that a creditor's policy may be found to be discriminatory if it has the effect of excluding from credit the elderly, women, minorities or welfare recipients.

James W. Mayes, group credit manager for Sears, said it wouldn't change his company's policy.

"It's really nothing new to us. We have for some time looked at each applicant for credit on their own individual merits."

Mayes said Sears strictly abides by the new rulings. The mean change, he added, is increased paper work.

Vincent Jordon, assistant credit manager for Crowley's, said the regulation will mean that "we will have to be more alert that we are not operating in error."

"We have been operating under the regulations on our own for several years."

"Actually, all it becomes is a matter of more paper work for all creditors and lenders."

Ann Wolf of the Kresge public relations department said the regulations won't increase Kresge's prices but agreed it will increase paper work.

"All our Kresge and Kmart stores honor the major credit cards. We discontinued our own credit card some time ago."

"As far as we are concerned, any one with a credit card recognized by our company can have credit. There is no discrimination."

Al Bidwell of the Montgomery Ward central credit office said his company is well aware of its obligations in granting credit.

"There are a lot of legal intricacies in the regulations, however, Ward's has never denied any person credit because of age, sex or color."

J. L. Hudson Co.'s manager of credit administration, R. Matheson, said the regulations won't have any big effect on Hudson's policy.

"We have always provided credit for those who have the ability and willingness to pay."

"It will require more paper work in that we will now be reporting both names of a married couple for credit history when an account is shared or if the couple requests it."

Five elementaries could go year-round

The school board will be asked tonight to approve year-round scheduling at five elementary schools in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

The year-round (45-15) schedule has been in effect for two years now at Miller Elementary in Canton. The administration is recommending that 45-15 scheduling be used for the 1977-78 school year at Field, Eriksson and

Hulsing elementaries in Canton and at Isbister Elementary in Plymouth Township.

The school board meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the cafeteria of Plymouth Canton High, 8415 Canton Center Road.

The board also will be asked to appoint a director of finance, and approve a student selection procedure

designed to balance enrollment between Plymouth Canton and Plymouth Salem high schools.

UNDER 45-15, students attend school for nine weeks (45 school days) and are then on vacation for three weeks.

The school district is expanding the year-round schedule to accommodate student enrollment growth until new

buildings can be constructed. Supt. John M. Hoben expects year-round scheduling will have to be relied upon even once new schools are built because of future enrollment demands.

The administration was considering year-round schooling at Bird Elementary next year but now recommends Isbister instead. "It was felt that the Isbister school has the two largest potential growth areas in the corridor between Warren and Joy roads," said Hoben. "In addition, it has the Sunflower and Trailwood III subdivisions. It was felt that consideration should be given to the boundary committee to relieve some of the overload at Gallimore by realigning the total Sunflower population to the Isbister attendance area."

For the schools with 45-15 scheduling, except for Miller, parents will be given options of sending their children to a paired school without year-round scheduling. Miller wouldn't be included because it has been on a 45-15 year for two years and parents already have exercised options.

Hoben suggests to the board that options be granted on the following basis: that no guarantee would exist

that options could extend beyond the current year; and, that transportation would be provided in all areas except for Miller.

The option schools would be assigned as follows: Field to Fiegel; Eriksson to Allen; Miller to Gallimore (as now done); Hulsing to Tanger; and Isbister to Starkweather.

THE BOARD will be asked to approve a random selection procedure to balance student populations between Salem and Canton high schools.

If approved, the phased-in program would begin with this year's eighth graders when they enter the ninth grade next fall. Hoben says it would take about four years to reach equal distribution at the two high schools.

Besides approving the hiring of a director of finance, the board also will be asked to approve the assignment of Mrs. Lolita Bukema as principal of Tanger Elementary School.

The board also will be asked to adopt a program for talented and gifted students and budget \$30,000 for its implementation. The program places emphasis on dealing with the academically talented student grades kindergarten through eight.

Citizens press board

Establish a literacy level

At the urging of citizens, the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools are presently working hard to establish minimum competency standards for students graduating from high school.

One of six goals outlined by the school board at the outset of the 1976-77 school year was to study ways to implement minimum competency requirements, according to Supt. John Hoben.

"At present, a high school diploma in the state of Michigan represents nothing more than fulfilling a time requirement," Hoben said. "No differentiation is made between the student who does superior work and the one who just gets by."

Pressure is building in the state legislature and from concerned taxpayers that public schools require minimum competency standards.

Two school systems have been sued for "educational malpractice" by students who claimed they were so illiterate that they were unable to read their high school diplomas.

One of the suits was thrown out of a California court several years ago and the other is pending in Long Island, N.Y.

land plans for ideas that might benefit Wayne County suburbs.

COUNTY BOARD Chairman John Barr (D-Dearborn Heights) suggested a concerted effort asking for a specific hearing with SEMTA.

SEMTA board members are doing what they call an "alternatives analysis" of 13 different combinations of transit rolling stock—heavy rail (including subway), light rail (streetcar-type), express bus and people movers—before selecting the blend that will best suit the tri-county area.

Public attention has been dominated by alternatives calling for heavy rail in the Woodward and Gratiot corridors within Detroit's city limits. Speakers at suburban public hearings have been largely hostile or indifferent to these plans and asked, in effect, "What's in it for us?"

Brown, who voted against the 1976 SEMTA reorganization and funding bill, said western Wayne legislators should continue to do so until they see SEMTA making plans that will benefit their constituents.

In this Brown was joined by Rep. Edward Mahalak (D-Romulus), who charged SEMTA was doing little for Romulus, Belleville, Sumpter and Van Buren.

Attending the meeting were representatives from the City of Livonia, City of Plymouth, City of Westland and Canton Township.

"SETTING THIS kind of minimum standard is gaining more popularity in this day of accountability. In a time when education is costing so much, the public is demanding more—and rightly so," Hoben said.

"Taxpayers want results and to achieve that we must have some means to measure the success of an educational system."

Although high school principals Bill Brown and Kent Buikema have been placed in charge of developing such a program and are expected to produce a report before Sept. 1, Hoben said the school board is interested in extending competency requirements to the middle and elementary school levels.

"Placing minimum competency standards at the high school level

isn't enough," Hoben said. "It's too late to start helping a student in his senior year. We're looking into instituting these requirements where a competency problem can be rectified—at the middle and elementary schools."

Testing student competency levels at each grade and providing special education classes are two techniques Hoben said were possibilities for implementing such a program.

"I think, without question, a minimum competency requirement would help insure that a student graduating with a high school diploma, possesses certain skills."

Presently, there is no guarantee that a high school graduate will be able to read or write.

two-man cars also on the street. A certified officer always is in a patrol car with a reserve, he said. Monday through Thursday nights, there are two two-man cars on the road with a sergeant usually riding in the supervisor's car. Two one-man cars start patrolling at approximately 11 a.m. Saturday and Sunday mornings.

Police Commander Silvers said the most encouraging news in the police committee's report is the recommendation that Canton start its own police department.

"MY PEOPLE WERE a little anxious waiting for the committee's report to come out," Silvers said. "Now, there's a load off our shoulders. We agree with their recommendation about an independent police department. Each community should have control of its own destiny," Silvers said.

"Sure, there are the state police and the sheriff's department, but the head man in the state police sits in Lansing and the head man of the county sheriff's department sits in Detroit."

"We've got a growing community and a need for two patrols round-the-clock and maybe two extra officers during peak hours."

SUPERVISOR HAROLD STEIN is pleased with the investigative work done by his police committee, but doesn't think the township board is obligated to follow the recommendations of the police committee.

"I agree that our first priority is hiring an efficient chief of police," Stein said.

While Silvers thinks the police department should go full-time before June 30, the date the sheriff's road patrol funding expires, Stein said there is no hurry.

"Let's go at this thing gradually," Stein said. "I still say the crime

threat has been exploited. I don't feel an emergency exists just because the sheriff's road patrol may be taken away."

"My personal feeling is that the sheriff's will continue to be funded beyond June 30," Stein said. "But we have more state police patrolling the community than ever before and they have the largest post in the area with the most comprehensive crime lab in the state."

"Plus, the back-up facilities of the sheriff's will still be available. So, the supreme court decision (to uphold the road patrol funding cutoff) has nothing to do with us. It doesn't mean a damn thing."

Political lessons are learned late

Editor:

Oh, Mr. Greenstein, you could definitely have taken some political lessons from your successor, Mr. Stein.

During the Public Forum section of the board meetings you should have done as Mr. Stein does—let the people come up and voice their complaints, demanding answers to the township's actions (or inactions), then have them be seated again and call on the next resident complainer—never answering the first complaint.

Mr. Greenstein, you always had to explain the circumstances—you always felt you should answer to the people—you should have been like Mr. Stein—he answers to no one, particularly the people.

Further, in the Public Forum (which is supposed to be 30 minutes), if other residents wish to voice their opinions and the Public Forum time has run out—you should have followed Mr. Stein's example—abruptly end the forum and go right into the remainder of the agenda. You, Mr. Greenstein, felt it necessary to listen to every resident first—even if it meant extending the time of the forum to over an hour.

Lesson 2. Never practice "the buck stops here." Again, like Mr. Stein's profound example, you set up middlemen—such as Mr. Silvers or Mr. Thompson—or middle-departments or organizations, such as CETA, so that when a township action displeases the people of Canton, you can easily "pass the buck" to your middle sources. Although the initiating instructions have come from you—the implementing source (the middle source) is the one that takes the public flak—easy! Mr. Greenstein, you always made it clear that if there

were any problems, you were solely responsible. Now, is that any way to be a politician?

Lesson 3. Never follow the advice of qualified, township-paid consultants or official agencies—just submit to the guidance of fellow political confidants and inept attorneys. Like Mr. Stein, you should never heed the counsel given by the Michigan Township Association (even though they are the legal and information center for all townships).

Also, Mr. Stein has found it much easier to go to a local attorney for "certain" legal opinions—so approved by the board and used for as many years as one cares to remember—Note: experience in the simple does not make one experienced in the difficult. But, with proper guidance from you—and maybe a reminder of who the payee and payer are—you get the legal opinion you want. Be sure, however, not to get a second legal opinion from attorneys experienced in large municipalities—even though they are also approved by the township, such as Travis, Nayer, Warren and Burgoyne (or whatever their names are).

For development and other areas in need of advice, you follow suit and head for the guidance of confidants as Mr. Stein carefully listens to his political cronies in Wayne. Mr. Greenstein, you should have known better than to want something better and different for Canton—man is a creature of habit—we follow others' examples, even if it means more development, higher taxes, no schools, etc.

Mr. Greenstein, you just weren't a politician as is Mr. Stein. Too bad for Canton!

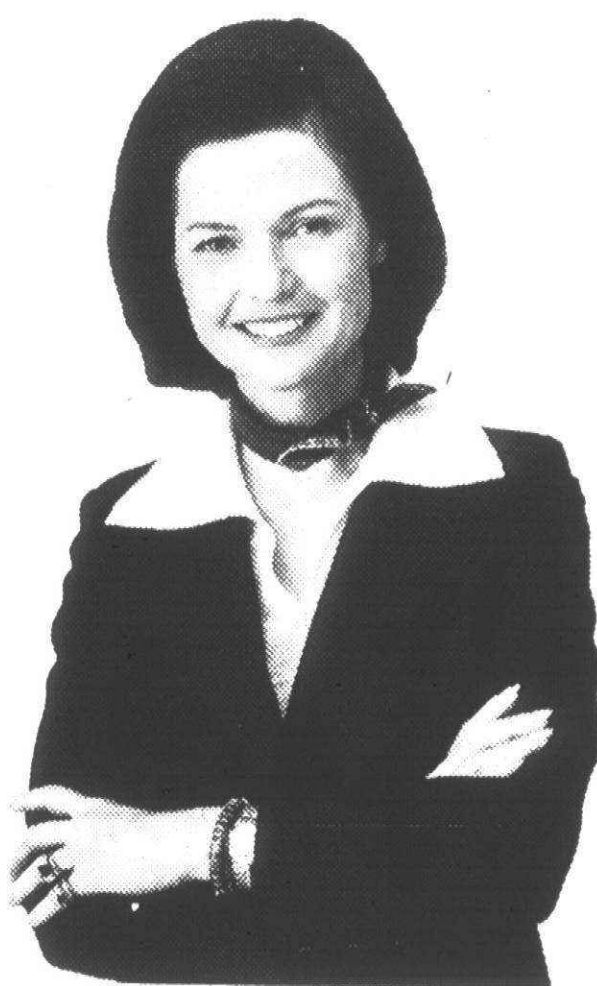
Nancy Dickerson, prominent national correspondent, reports for Detroit Edison:

"The lessons of two hard winters will help us all weather future emergencies."

Twice in less than a year, severe weather has caused interruptions and disruptions in electric service in Southeastern Michigan. It could happen again—with another ice storm, another spell of sub-normal temperatures or an extreme summer heat wave. It could also happen any time there isn't enough power to go around. We can't control the weather but Detroit Edison has developed programs and procedures to cope with nature's extremes and minimize the discomfort and inconvenience to its customers.

The worst ice storm in history.
March 1 marks the anniversary of the worst ice storm in Michigan's history. One out of every five families in Southeastern Michigan was affected directly by interrupted electric service. Damage to Detroit Edison equipment was disastrous and succeeding storms compounded repair problems. Over 1,000 poles and a million feet of wire had to be replaced. Nearly one-fifth of Detroit Edison's entire electric distribution system had to be restored or rebuilt. More than 5,000 Detroit Edison employees, contractors and crews from other utilities worked around the clock to get service back to normal.

Now a record-breaking cold spell.
This year on January 11 and again on January 17, severe cold and icing conditions put some of Detroit Edison's critical power plant equipment out of service. In past emergencies, Detroit Edison has been able to buy power from neighboring utilities. But during the coldest January on record, with accompanying high demands for electricity, there was little power to spare anywhere. Success training popularity gains

You've heard the claims before. "Do . . . and you will find fame, fortune, and happiness." And while John Czubaj of Plymouth doesn't promise miracles, he does claim that anyone who takes his Dale Carnegie Course will be pleased with the changes they see in themselves.

Czubaj—pronounced Shoe-by—has taught three Carnegie courses in the Plymouth area and will start a fourth on March 3 at 7:30 in the Plymouth Hilton Hotel. The class will meet one night a week for four hours for 14 weeks.

"People think about going to a class at night, and they figure they will be too tired," said Czubaj. "But I've had people get so excited by what goes on that they can't sleep when they get home."

He takes pains to point out that students don't sit around during the class while he talks. "People learn by doing, not by listening. They will not get any lectures from me. They're working and doing."

THE MAIN GOAL of Carnegie training is to overcome fear and develop self-confidence. Czubaj maintains that "general fear" is what cripples people emotionally and prevents them from accomplishing all they are capable of.

"People are afraid, and they don't even know they are afraid of. They fear others, and they fear themselves. They fear rejection, failure and the unknown. Once they get beyond the fear, they are amazed at what is possible."

Czubaj said that while there is no magic formula for success, there are specific techniques that people can use to help them change. During the class, students will learn to make presentations in front of groups, improve their memory, and develop more sensitivity.

"The results are very satisfying. People who have taken the course have changed jobs, gotten promotions, and developed better relationships with their friends and family."

The cost of the course is \$395, and Czubaj is so confident that it's worth the money, he offers a full refund to anyone who completes the course and is not satisfied. He says in the three years he has worked for Carnegie no one has asked for their money back.

He said that one of the things he has noticed about people in his years of teaching is that they have difficulty expressing what they like about other people. It's much easier to find fault. "All our lives we are told what is wrong with us, and we do the same thing to those around us. It's so much easier to get along with people if you don't criticize, condemn, or complain. You just have to find a positive way of telling others how you feel."

CZUBAJ GRADUATED from Central Michigan University in 1969. After graduation, he went to work for the Office of Economic Opportunity, and at 23 became the firm's youngest executive-director of a four-county area near Mount Pleasant.

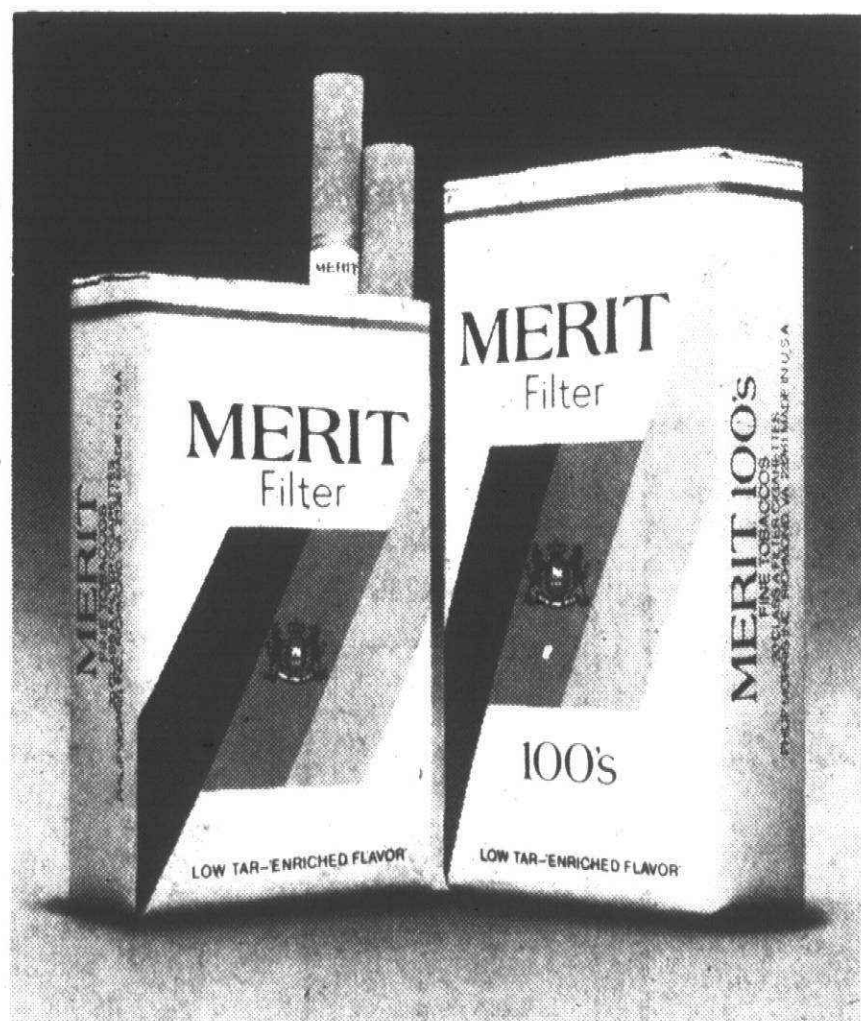

Senate primary report

Plymouth 'loses' with low turnout

With the general election less than a month away, the campaign already has started for the 14th State Senate District.

Robert Geake (R-Northville) and Patrick McDonald (D-Redford) will square off against each other and Hector McGregor of Redford, candidate for the American Independent Party (AIP) on the March 23 ballot.

Geake and McDonald won impressive 2-1 victories in Wednesday's party primaries. On that evening, in a victory statement, Geake challenged his Democratic opponent to a debate on the issues before the public throughout the district, which includes Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Northville, Livonia, Redford and part of Westland.

On Friday, Geake announced he wouldn't clutter the environment with large outdoor campaign signs and urged McDonald to take the same action.

GEAKE WON EASILY in the party

run-off despite two Republican challengers—Jane Moehle of Plymouth and Mary Dumas of Livonia—expected to make the race much tighter.

But Geake swept the vote in Livonia, Dumas' hometown, and easily out-distanced other Republicans in Redford Township. Only in the Plymouth area did other Republicans fare well against Geake, a state representative first elected to the House in 1972.

In the City of Plymouth, Mrs. Moehle led with 499 votes followed by Plymouth Mayor Joe Bida with 115 votes and Geake with 111. Mrs. Dumas had 28 votes in Plymouth and Ray Kimble of Plymouth Township gathered 11 votes.

In Plymouth Township, Mrs. Moehle led with 513 votes followed by Geake with 182, Bida, 76, Dumas, 38, and Kimble, 23 votes.

Geake's victory margin in Livonia was 4,339 to 677 for Dumas and 429 for Moehle. In Redford, Geake ran up 642 votes against 284 for Dumas, 158 for Moehle, and 114 for Kimble.

McDONALD, armed with UAW support and the backing of Livonia Mayor Ed McNamara, almost beat out Livonian Paul Kadish in his hometown.

Kadish earned 1,114 votes in Livonia squeaking by McDonald with 1,019. McDonald took his hometown of Redford with 4,305 votes compared to Kadish's 474. McDonald gained 61 votes and Kadish 53 in the City of Plymouth while Plymouth Township Democrats split their vote with 85 to Kadish and 57 to McDonald.

Mrs. Josephine Hunsinger, former state representative who recently moved into the City of Plymouth, got 50 votes in Plymouth Township and 25 in Plymouth.

GEAKE SAYS HE "will be more than happy to participate in a number of debates with the Democratic nominee throughout the district to better clarify the issues and our respective qualifications."

He said the 2-1 victory was about what he expected. "Although I am disappointed by the low turnout, with a larger turnout there probably would have been the same results proportionately."

"I look forward to a high-level campaign in the general election based on the issues which are so important to the people of our district."

In a letter sent Friday to his oppo-

nent, Geake called the use of large outdoor campaign signs detrimental to the appearance of the communities in the district. "I hope my opponent will join with me in abandoning the fruitless practice of cluttering our neighborhoods with these obtrusive signs. I think they serve no useful purpose and I don't intend to use them."

"In every campaign, we see thousands of dollars wasted in these outdoor signs—dollars which I believe can be put to better use in mail and media advertisements which report our stands on major state issues to the voters."

McDonald could not be reached for comment Friday, as he was attending a meeting all day of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments as a delegate representing Redford.

The voter turnout was 10 per cent in Plymouth Township and 15 per cent in the City of Plymouth. District-wide, 10 per cent of the registered voters actually went to the polls Wednesday.

"The turnout was disgusting," commented Helen Richardson, Plymouth Township Clerk. "Picking a state senator is very important, yet 90 per cent of our residents didn't even bother to vote. But whoever is elected will hear a lot of complaints from voters about how things aren't right in the state. I would like, of course, to see a much better turnout March 23 but based on Wednesday's turnout I have no reason to be encouraged."

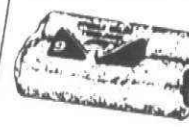

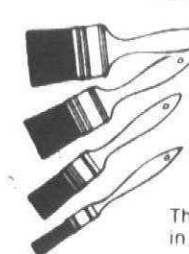

Countless persons of all ages whose lives touched his, and others who never knew him, owe Cohen a debt of gratitude for his dedication to youth and his belief in the young as builders of a better tomorrow.

Cohen, 62, of Bloomfield Hills, died Feb. 23 after suffering a heart attack. His death came as a shock to city officials as well as patrons and performers who considered the Raven one of the country's finest folk music clubs and its owner a legend.

Cohen gave a first start to numerous young entertainers who are now nationally known. The Raven booked top performers like Joni Mitchell, Josh White Jr., Chuck Mitchell, Buffo the clown, Chad Mitchell, Professor Irwin Corey, Pat Paulson, Odetta, and Gamble Rogers.

The Raven catered to customers from 16 to 76 but Cohen filled an entertainment gap mainly for teenagers and young adults. He urged acceptance of teens and treated them with respect.

"It seems some adults find a certain joy or self-satisfaction in condemning our teenagers today, seeing only the bad and overlooking the good," he said.

"WE FEEL teens are being exposed to the fine arts in our gallery, a definite contributing factor in American culture. They're treated as adults at the Raven whether they come to eat or be entertained by folk-singers. Teenagers behave accordingly."

Cohen believed teens needed a pat on the back and shouldn't be condemned for the acts of a few. He was offended when youths were looked upon by merchants as delinquents instead of worthwhile individuals and architects of the future.

Cohen was born in Toronto and was a linotype operator for 25 years. He served in the Royal Air Force during World War II and moved to Detroit in 1945.

He opened his first Raven in 1960 as an art gallery in Detroit and founded a woodwind quintet and string quartet to provide chamber music for customers once a week.

He enjoyed living with the arts. Forced to move from Detroit because of the John C. Lodge Freeway in 1964, Cohen relocated in Birmingham. The Raven gradually shifted its emphasis from art to folk music. The gallery moved to Southfield 13 years ago.

Cohen was buried Sunday. Funeral services were in Hebrew Benevolent Society, Oak Park. Surviving are his wife, Catherine; a son, Sanford; a daughter, Mrs. Howard (Brenda) Rosenberg; his parents, Koppel and Lena Cohen of Toronto and a brother, Louis Cohen of Toronto.

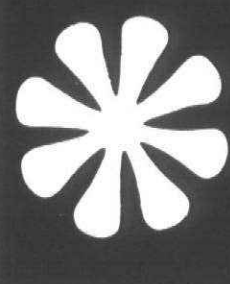

Possible Plymouth cage battle stays in Southfield

Any hopes of a possible Salem-Canton district match-up being played in Plymouth Thursday night, were dashed last week when tournament director Fred Goldberg and Plymouth athletic director John Sandmann decided to keep the local rivalry in Southfield.

Both men feared that completing the switch could potentially harm the structure of the Michigan high school basketball tournament.

"By changing sites a whole can of worms could be opened," Sandmann said. "I don't want to do anything to change the format of the state tournament. If we brought the game here then other high schools would want to follow in our footsteps."

"As nice as it (bringing the game to Plymouth) would be, I think Goldberg has a very valid point."

The opportunity to transfer gymnasium sites occurred when Salem and Canton were placed in the same bracket of the Southfield High School district. The winner of Tuesday night's Salem-Northville encounter meets Canton, which drew a first round bye, in one semifinal game Thursday night.

The Rocks are heavily favored to defeat a mediocre Northville team, forcing an all-Plymouth semifinal. With the thought of both teams and a large contingent of Plymouth fans traveling to Southfield, The Observer contacted Allen Bush, director of the Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA).

"THE TOURNAMENT director can play games where he sees fit," Bush said. "But if he had some reasons to move the site, then he would have to clear it with this office."

"I wouldn't want to categorically say yes or no, but I'm not enthused about it just because two teams from the same city want to play at home. But if the tournament director had other reasons, I would be interested in listening to them."

Although both Goldberg and Sandmann were reluctant to press for the

site change, bringing the Salem-Canton rivalry to Plymouth poses some definite advantages.

The seating capacity at Salem High exceeds that of Southfield's gym by approximately 700 seats. With the likelihood of a sellout enhanced by the Plymouth location, increased gate receipts would result in financial

gains for everyone involved—Plymouth, Southfield and the MHSAA.

Switching courts would enable more Plymouth fans to view the game with far more convenience. Also, with an energy shortage, preventing hundreds of spectators from making the 50-mile round trip would produce a considerable savings.

At the urging of The Observer, both Goldberg and Sandmann contacted Bush's office in Lansing. The MHSAA, however, was not convinced of the proposal offered by the two men. Thus the decision to maintain the game's original site.

"THE ONLY TIME I remember this type of thing occurring was due to poor weather conditions," Bush said. "It's also common in the upper peninsula where schools are located 180 miles apart, but even that's

planned ahead of time."

Surprisingly, Salem head coach Fred Thomann was against bringing the possible showdown to the community. Canton coach Casey Cavell was indifferent about any change.

Despite the decision, there is hope that Plymouth will host postseason play sometime in the near future. "We've held district and regional tournaments in the past, but haven't pursued them recently because of the condition of the floor," Sandmann said.

Moisture bubbles popping up on the tartan floor in the Salem gym have created undesirable playing conditions in the past three years. With the opening of Canton's Phase III facility next year, this condition will improve.

"I think there's a definite possibility of Plymouth getting postseason tournaments again," Sandmann said. Maybe next year.

3-game skid ends

Rocks demolish pitiful Allen Park

It wasn't textbook basketball, but who cares when the good guys win?

Plymouth Salem wound up its regular schedule with a 66-36 multi-dimensional romp over Allen Park before a big turnout of home town followers Friday night, thus breaking the tension that had grown during three straight losses.

Multi-dimensional? Well, let's consider.

It sends the Rocks into the state tournament with an impressive 15-4 record, but better yet Salem may be the only school in the state which has won the championship of its league—one of Michigan's toughest—four successive seasons.

In the Suburban Eight the Rocks were 11-2, followed by Dearborn (9-4), Belleville (9-5), Trenton (8-6), Livonia Bentley (7-6), Edsel Ford (6-8), Redford Union (4-9) and Allen Park (0-14).

That's right, Allen Park went winless in the league and the Jaguars were just what the doctor ordered as

a tonic to instill new enthusiasm and momentum into coach Fred Thomann's Rocks.

IT WAS PARENTS' NIGHT Friday in the Salem gym and every mom and pop in the house had to be bursting with pride whether son or daughter was ball player, cheerleader, Rockette, statistician, water boy or usher. It was that sort of fun occasion, and, oh, yes, Allen Park helped by scoring only four points in the first quarter and but six in the second.

Every senior was in the starting Salem lineup—Capt. Chris deBear, Bruce Gerish, Pat McKendry and Kevin Roose. Those four might have whipped Allen Park by themselves, but Thomann would have been assessed technical fouls from here to breakfast had he not started a fifth man, so he chose Tom Ellinghausen, a junior who is the team's leading scorer and rebounder.

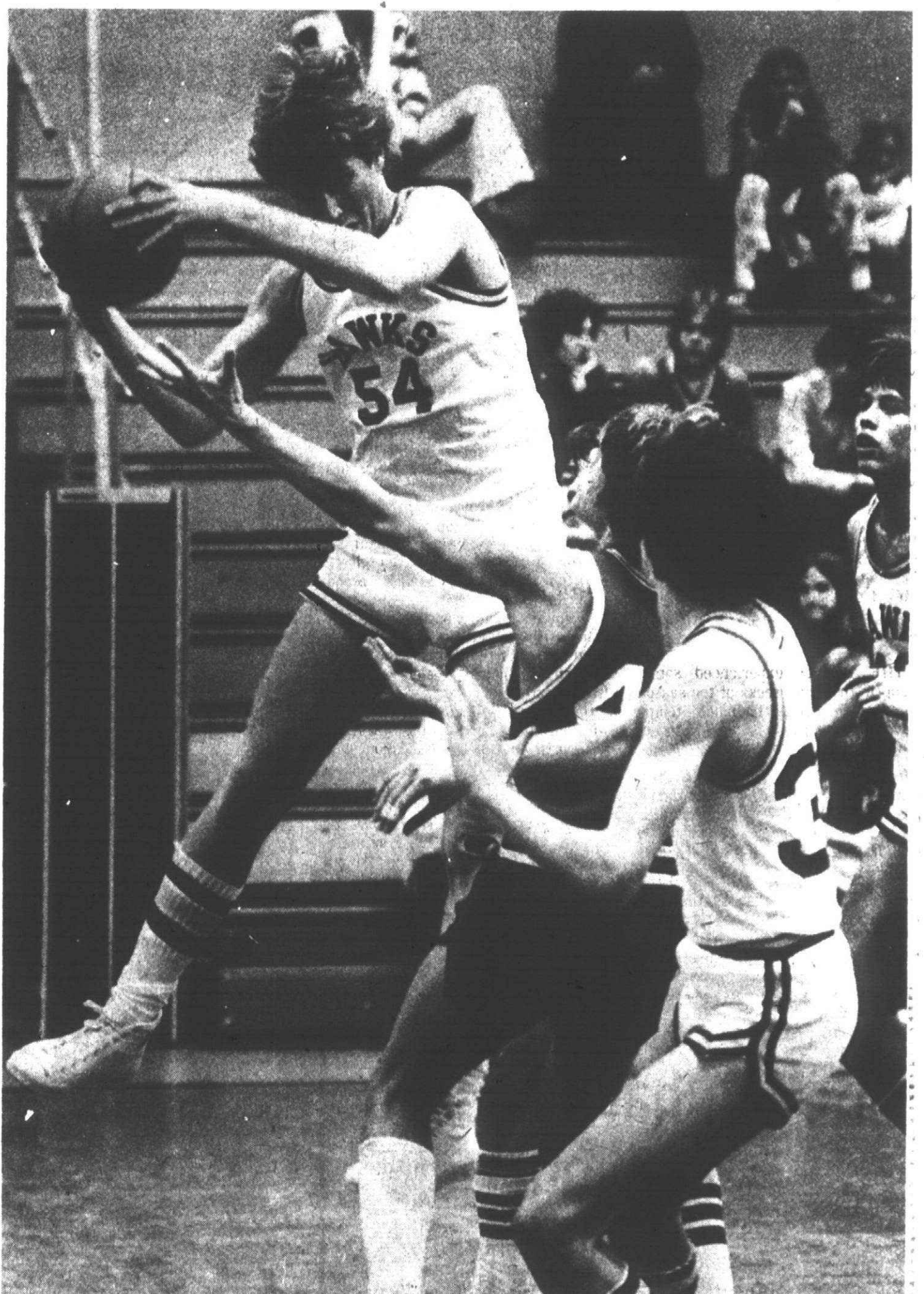
It was 11-4 for Plymouth when Thomann began substituting after the first quarter and at halftime it was 25-10.

Then, for the first time all evening, Thomann put his regular starting unit of deBear, Ellinghausen, Gerish, Doug Agnew and Rich Hewlett together for a third quarter workout and they immediately rolled off 22 points.

Thirteen men played, 11 scored—with Ellinghausen tops at 21—and when the glee had subsided a bit, Thomann ordered the squad to report for its first Saturday scrimmage of the year, promising an all-out 90-minute drill "to get into a tournament frame of mind." The test of how it pans out will come against Northville in the first round Tuesday night.

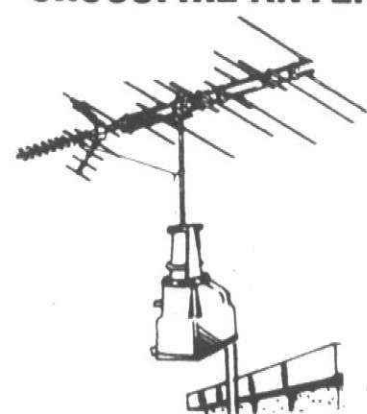

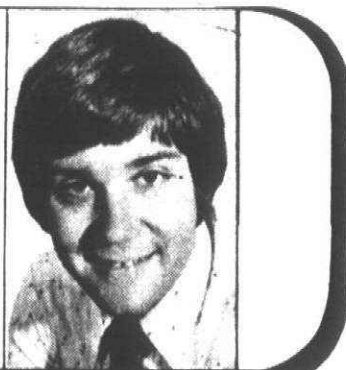
Side Street won its final game of the season with a 90-62 whitewashing

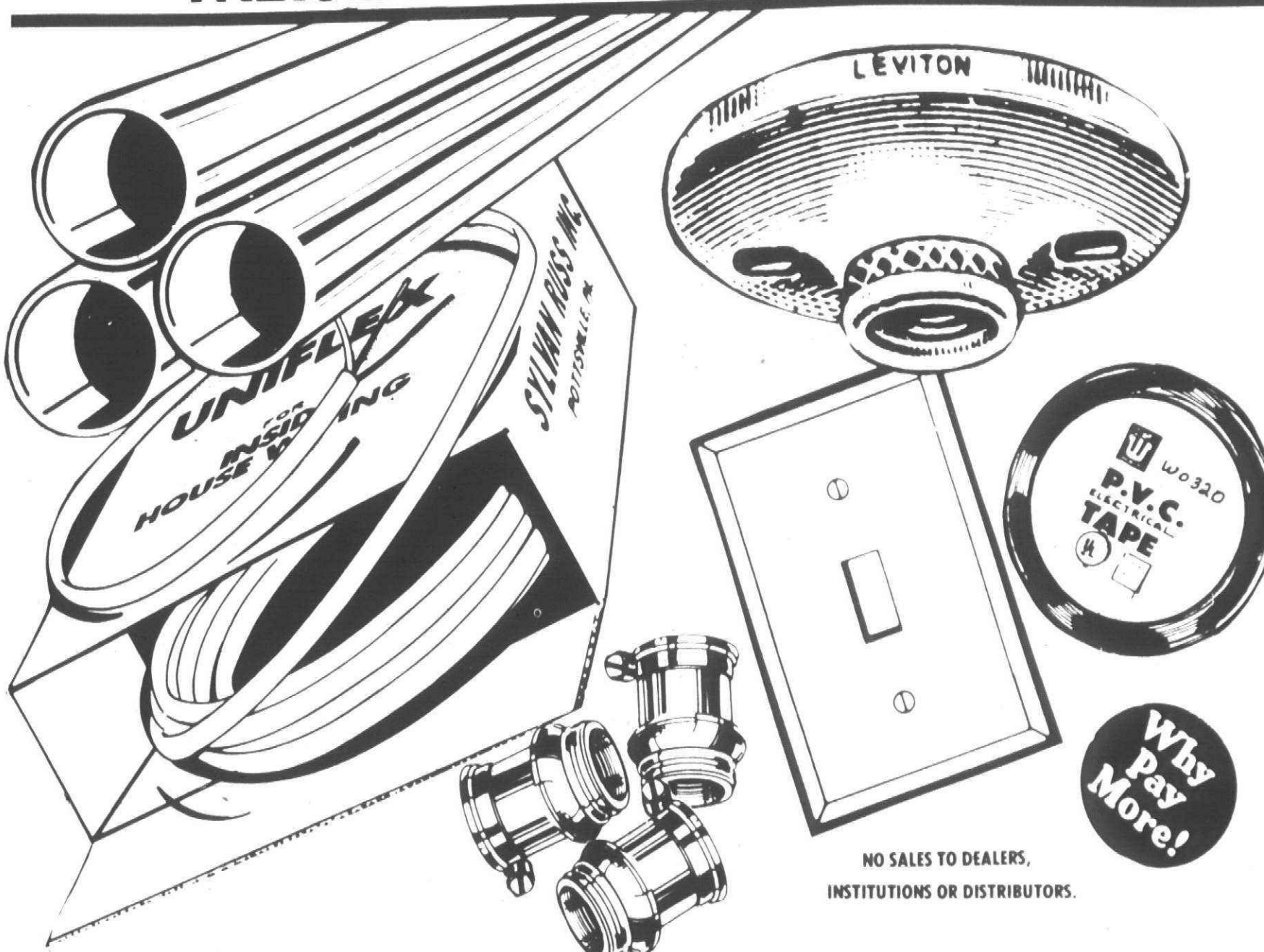

Chief cagers crunch Rocks

The indicated season is completed.

The Plymouth Canton freshman basketball team, under rookie coach Dave VanWagoner, completed a perfect 13-0 season with a 57-52 victory over its friendly rivals from Plymouth Salem Friday afternoon.

"It was lucky number 13," said VanWagoner. "I'm so proud of these kids. I really didn't do much. The kids were just fantastic."

"We've had a great year and I wish it wouldn't end."

The Rocks, coached by Pat Cunningham, finished the year with a respectable 9-3 record, losing twice to the Chiefs.

But the Salem ninth graders did something in the first half that no team was able to do all season. The

Rocks forced Canton to play catch up for the first time this year by posting a 12-6 first quarter lead and a nine-point halftime margin, 31-22.

"I just told the kids to take it easy," VanWagoner said. "In the second half, we started playing like we were capable of doing."

The Chiefs pulled within three, 41-38, with a 16-10 third quarter advantage and went ahead for good in the final period.

Canton's Dave Vissar led all scorers with 23 points including a sparkling nine-for-nine at the free-throw line. Dan McGinn added 13 and Steve Eddy chipped in seven.

Jim Anderson paced the Rocks with 14 points. Brian Kelliher pumped in 12. Bob Jarvis followed in nine and Mitch Symonds added seven.

Canton spikers split 2 matches

The Plymouth Canton volleyball team met up with Farmington Harrison last Thursday and Livonia Churchill on Wednesday. Canton split the matches with a two-game victory over Harrison, 15-13 and 15-3, but losing to Churchill in two straight, 15-8 and 13-11.

"We played well in both matches, just not good enough against Churchill," said Canton coach Cyndi Burnstein.

"Harrison kept us moving and kept us guessing as to what kind of plays they were going to make. They hit a lot of spikes from the back court but we were able to return them with a little more power."

Against Churchill, the Chiefs' main problem was that they couldn't get their bumps into the front row, making the second hit all the more difficult for the setter.

With Canton's loss to Churchill, it put the Chiefs in third place in the Western Six Conference after Churchill and Canton had been tied for second behind Northville.

Canton JVs also split their matches last week, winning from Harrison 12-14, 15-11, 15-6, and losing to Churchill by scores of 15-6 and 15-4.

Canton plays tonight (Monday) at home against Redford Thurston starting with the JV match at 7 p.m., followed by the varsity competition at 8 p.m.

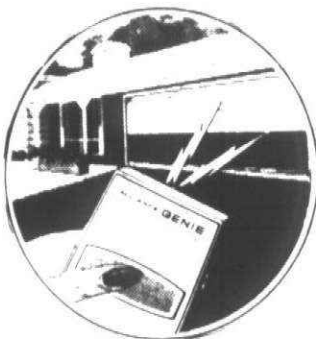

One has to look no further than the current standings of the top leagues in the area. You'll find Mary Mohacs, the Livonia teacher, leading the Ladies Major League with a 190 average.

Her collection sparkles

Some odd and unusual things can happen to a person while attending antique shows or conventions of collectors.

One of the finest examples is Mrs. Will Egly of Plymouth who now has a collection of more than 200 toothpick holders—of all things—and is hoping to build her collection even higher.

"I got the urge some time ago while visiting an antique show," she said, explaining her start in developing a hobby.

"I always have loved cut glass and so does my husband (who is an engineer at Ford's), and I wanted to get involved in something that wasn't too expensive. Toothpick holders seemed to be about the best thing available."

As she spoke the pleasant Plymouth housewife sat in a cozy little room looking at shelves filled with toothpick holders of all shapes, colors and sizes.

The most eye-catching of the lot was a toothpick holder in the form of a baby grand piano. It stood about four inches tall and about four inches in length, accompanied by a small piano bench made of cut glass.

"Because my husband is so fond of cut glass, the fellows at Ford made this for his mother. When she died I got it for my display."

WITH A BROAD smile, she selected six holders from the shelf and sat them on a table.

"These are my latest collections."

she said, "and I got them last Sunday at a show in Jackson."

Asked if her husband helped her select them she chuckled: "He is not so fond of going to antique shows. So I went with a girl friend, and we had a grand time."

Mrs. Egly explained that she is a member of the National Toothpick Holder Collectors Society that was organized two years ago by Judy Knauer of Fairfax, Virginia and that she attended the first convention last year in Cambridge, Ohio.

"There were about 150 collectors in attendance and when we have our next convention in August at the Dearborn Inn the attendance should surpass that."

"You meet the nicest people among the collectors. I hope I never lose my interest in the holders or in my collection."

She confided that the membership of the society is spreading and that she has met collectors from as far west as Arizona.

As she spoke, she turned to another holder and explained that it was her smallest—a bronze holder about the size of a one-inch cube.

ADMITTING THAT she had no idea of the worth of her collection, Mrs. Egly confided that some of the holders have been known to bring as much as \$1,000 on the market. This was far more than her costliest which she said was "about \$95."

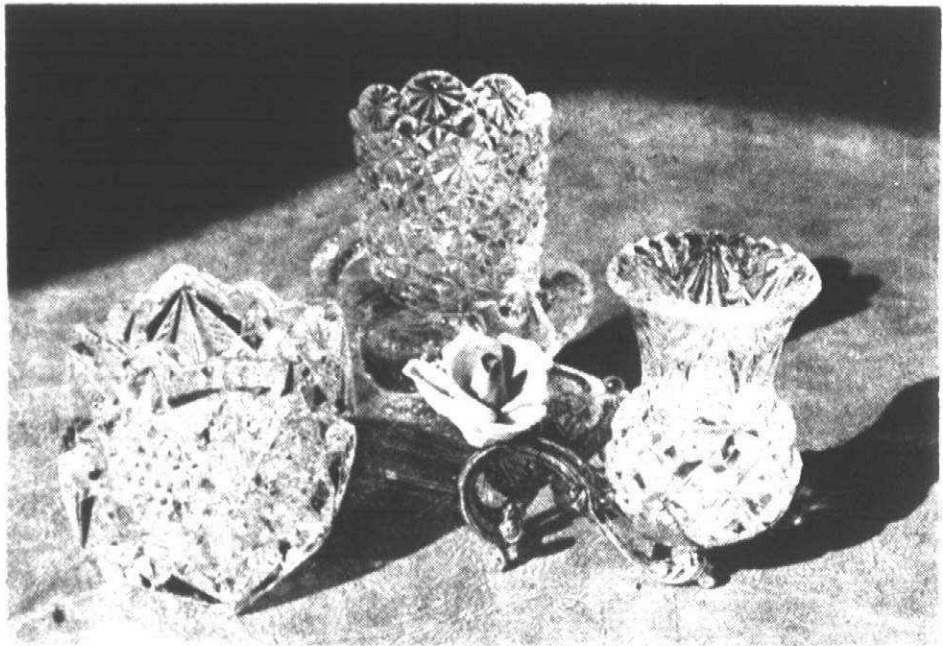
Though nothing was mentioned that

there was a time when toothpick holders were quite the thing at the biggest society dinners, and in our better homes, she did admit a fondness for each one of her collection.

While her husband confided that the toothpick holders were selected "because they were the cheapest," Mrs. Egly said the real reason for selecting them was their size.

"I couldn't collect antique furniture because we have no place to put it. It is the same with many other things. But, as you can see, I have 200 holders on the shelves in this small room—and we aren't crowded."

As she placed her choice holders back on the shelves, she couldn't hold back a chuckle as she said, "It all started because I enjoyed going to antique shows."

The Jeffery Co., which built the Rambler, became Nash Motors in 1916 and in 1937 Nash-Kelvinator. Hudson joined with Nash-Kelvinator in 1974 to form AMC. Jeep Corp. was added in 1970.
