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Auditors rap renovation, pension

The Michigan Department of Treasury's special audit report of Canton Township's 1975-76 records cites three instances when former Canton administrators allegedly spent township funds before receiving board approval.

Canton will not be charged for the special audit, according to Walter Wisniewski, deputy state treasurer. Current treasurer Anne Bradley requested the special audit soon after taking office, explaining that she wanted to start her term "with a clean slate."

Neither she nor current Supervisor Harold Stein would comment on the audit findings because further investigation is being done by the Attorney General's staff.

The audit report also cites two changes in the township employee pension fund which allegedly bypassed the required public process for amending a township pension ordinance or local charter pension provision.

Canton doesn't have a pension ordinance. But, state auditors say a pension ordinance should have been adopted 12 years ago by the township board when the Manufacturers Life insurance plan was introduced July 1, 1965. Two amendments made to the pension plan in 1975 should have come up for board approval or discussion, the report states.

Ex-supervisor Robert Greenstein and former treasurer Carl Parsell were among a list of employees who benefitted from the two pension plan amendments, according to the audit report. It allowed them to withdraw 100 per cent of the township's contributions to the pension fund after 20 months in office.

Former treasurer Parsell said Tuesday that the two amendments in question were added to the township's previous insurance policy at his request, not the township board's.

"It was not done in a devious way like that report implies," Parsell said.

The reason for the two amendments, according to Parsell, was that new employees were not included in a pension plan until July 1 each year "which I thought was immoral, if not legal."

"We were about to hire some federally-funded CETA (Comprehensive Employment Training Act) employees at the time," explained Parsell. "Under CETA rules, every employee of the township must be treated equally with equal benefits. If we hired somebody in the month of June, their pension would begin the following month on July 1. But if we hired somebody on July 10, they'd have to wait until the following July 1 to enter the pension program."

"So, what the plan was doing before we caught on, was treating one group differently than the other group."

Parsell said that another pension plan amendment not mentioned in the audit report granted pension privileges to employees under 21 years of age. Those rights were denied in the plan before the 1975 amendments took effect, Parsell said. Last October, the township switched to a John Hancock pension plan.

The treasury department has finished its Canton investigation, said Art Rochon, deputy director of the local audit division. He emphasized the department can not make recommendations about possible prosecution.

TWO FURTHER allegations of impropriety were touched on briefly in special report the report. One concerns an investigation into the 1976 weed cutting and billing procedure and the other revolves around a complaint that Greenstein used township equipment for "personal gain."

Deputy State Treasurer Walter Wisniewski said these two areas of al-

leged wrongdoing are being investigated by the Michigan State Police and John Wilson, a member of the Attorney General's staff.

"I can't comment on the investigation," Wilson said Tuesday. "If I were you, I wouldn't jump to any conclusions on this."

One treasury department official said that aside from the weed cutting and equipment misuse allegations still under investigation, the three in-

stances where money was allegedly spent before township board approval "are commonplace."

"We run into this a lot," said the state treasury official. "The question which will have to be decided by the attorney general's office is whether the expenditure of money was improper, illegal or criminal."

FORMER SUPERVISOR Robert Greenstein said Friday he disagrees with the conclusion reached by state

auditors that money was improperly spent to renovate the rented recreation building, the township hall and the fire-meeting hall, because the projects lacked approval from the township board.

The \$32,951 cost of renovating the recreation building, owned by Charlotte Fisher, was supposed to be reimbursed by a federal Housing and

Ruckus at Rusty Nail over recall petitions

Scotch tape held together four of the eight petitions to recall Canton Supervisor Harold Stein that were handed in to the clerk's office Monday afternoon.

After Canton Clerk John Flodin notarized the dog-eared petitions bearing 117 signatures, Cindy Monks, one of the leaders of a drive to recall Stein, rolled up her sleeve and exhibited a bruise on her elbow.

Mrs. Monks said that the bruise on her elbow, and another one on her hip, were inflicted by Leonard Wasczenski in a politically-motivated assault at 2:40 Sunday afternoon outside the Rusty Nail bar Ford Road, east of Sheldon.

Mrs. Monks said she intends to press assault and battery charges against Wasczenski.

A SHERIFF DEPARTMENT spokesman said Tuesday that Mrs. Monks' request for an assault and battery misdemeanor warrant against Wasczenski has been forwarded to the county prosecutor's office for determination.

By press time, the prosecutor's office had not issued a warrant against the alleged assailant.

Mrs. Monks told Ptl. Charley Spratt that Wasczenski grabbed recall petitions away from her inside the bar and then ran outside where he began ripping them up.

When she tried to retrieve the recall petitions, Mrs. Monks said she was knocked to the ground by Wasczenski.

"We turned up the dimmer switch above us at one of the booths," said Mrs. Monks, "and started looking over the petitions we had just been circulating. 'Somebody in the bar, I think it was Leonard, told us to turn down the light.'"

"He walked over to our table and asked what the petitions were for. I told him they were petitions to recall Harold Stein. First he said, 'Who's Harold Stein,' and then he said he'd like to sign one. The next thing I know he's heading out the door with the recall petitions."

Mrs. Monks said she was in the bar with recall leader, Peter Gabbert, and Karen Bundarin, the wife of Peter Bundarin, an unsuccessful Republican candidate for supervisor.

Mrs. Monks said she had been in the bar for less than half an hour and had been drinking straight tomato juice.

"The waitress had just brought me my usual Virgin Mary."

Russ Johnson, owner of the Rusty Nail, was not in the bar at the time of the reported incident, but said that from talking to a barmaid, he could verify that "something did happen—they're not making the thing up."

According to people who were in the bar at the time, Wasczenski was asked to leave shortly after Spratt took the report.

Gabbert said the recall group did nothing to provoke an incident and said no attempt was made to solicit signatures from the bar patrons.

WASCZENSKI COULD not be reached for comment.

Repeated attempts to call Wasczenski's Canton phone number were met with an operator's message that there was "trouble on the line, call back later."

The Wayne County Sheriff's incident

report lists Wasczenski's current address as 824 Newburgh, Westland, the home of a relative.

The Westland home has an unlisted phone number.

Wasczenski's name was prominent last September when he filed a lawsuit as a Canton resident seeking to stop the township's reserve police force.

Through his lawyer, Noel Culbert, Wasczenski unsuccessfully pleaded that the reserves lacked proper leadership because former police chief Robert Greenstein and Commander Carl Silvers were not hired through civil service testing.

It was also his contention that the reserves were acting in a capacity beyond the founding ideal to use the force for "emergency and special circumstances."

Growth study finished

Canton must adopt a policy to control its mushrooming growth or face a lifestyle marred by inferior schools, roads, recreational programs and municipal services, says the township's Growth Management Committee.

In a majority report released to township officials this week, the committee urged adoption of eight growth management techniques, including a quota system on residential construction and a moratorium on certain kinds of development.

The citizen's committee urged board members to hire a fulltime planner who would oversee enactment of growth controls. Committee members said the township should conduct a random survey of residents to determine their attitudes toward growth management techniques.

A minority report submitted by Conrad and Denise Szydlowski said growth control techniques should not be imposed. Such controls, the Szydlowskis said, would infringe on landowners' property rights.

ALTHOUGH TOWNSHIP board

members listened to the report Tuesday night, neither Supervisor Harold Stein nor committee chairperson Neva Carter expected board members to adopt any of the recommendations at the meeting. The board scheduled a joint meeting with the growth group for 7 p.m. May 17.

Ms. Carter suspects township officials will await results of a federally-funded growth management study before adopting any growth control policy.

According to Stein, the township's planning consultant firm, Wade, Trim & Associates, will probably conduct the \$23,000 study. The planners will study growth problems in Canton and surrounding communities as well as explore growth management techniques best suited to the area.

Stein said Wade, Trim will study the report submitted by the citizens committee once the federally-funded study gets under way.

Final approval is expected any day. "Everything the (citizens) committee has done will be taken up by this study," the supervisor said. "It will kind of strengthen and augment

their findings on growth."

Stein established the Growth Management Committee last February under pressure from a group known as Citizens for Growth Control. Headed by Sue Koch who later joined the Growth Management Committee, the group demanded a moratorium on the issuance of residential building permits.

BUT MRS. CARTER said the majority of committee members approached the growth control matter with an objective point of view.

"A few came to the committee with clearly anti- or pro-growth control attitudes," she said. "The rest of us came in with an open mind. After some study, our attitudes really changed."


The majority report, endorsed by 12 of the committee's 14 members, concludes there is a need to control Canton's mushrooming expansion.

"After a decade of unprecedented growth, this committee contends that the quality of life for the aggregate

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Modular scheduling reformed

Some changes in modular scheduling at the Centennial Educational Park have been adopted for the coming school year.

The changes, recommended by a CEP study committee, were approved 6-0 by the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education Monday night.

The board also voted to add a middle school representative on the CEP study group and asked it to continue evaluating and monitoring programs at the high schools for further recommended changes.

SCHOOL TRUSTEES on the study committee were Richard Arlen and Marcia Borowski.

Mrs. Borowski prefaced the recommendations to the board by noting that the committee had been asked to investigate a lot of ground but was only given one month to come up with suggested changes.

"We couldn't begin to cover as much ground as we were charged with. This is a preliminary report on what can be done now, but there still is much more ground to cover."

Arlen agreed that much was done given the deadlines the committee had. "Personally, I would have liked to see tougher measures taken but the members of the committee were willing to compromise at this time because we are moving in the right direction."

"This will give the administration the opportunity to exercise some direction from the board. If it doesn't, then the board must move in a much more conservative manner—perhaps in removing some of the variety in the present high school curriculum."

E. J. McClendon noted that there was tremendous community support for modular scheduling when it was

first approved. "It didn't just happen but there was, and still is, a lot of community support. I recognize there are some problems, but there are defenders as well as critics of modular scheduling."

Joe Gray, school board president, said he felt the committee's recommendations fell short of what he had expected.

"I have been concerned for the last four to five years about modular scheduling and programs at the CEP. I've talked with so many people who have had disastrous experiences with their children at the park. I'd hate to consider I was part of a program, harmful to many students, which won't be changed."

"I'd like to see all ninth and tenth graders on traditional scheduling. I'll

be interested in following these steps to see how they work. Maybe it's the answer. I hope it is."

Ms. Borowski stressed the short time the committee had to work with and commented that 80 per cent of its work is unfinished. "The committee represents all different views, but we agreed that at this point, this is all that could be done."

Arlen added the committee recognized there were problems with modular scheduling and wanted to do something without destroying the good things modular scheduling offered to students.

The changes will allow ninth and tenth graders to go on modular scheduling only if they have signed permission from parents; a grade point average of 2.5 or better; no apparent

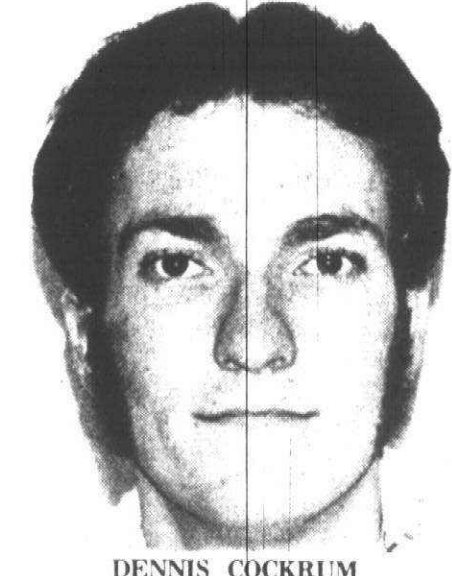
attendance or disciplinary problems; signed permission of at least four teachers who feel the student can handle modular scheduling.

All modular classes will meet at least four hours out of six during each cycle. The mods will have to be in a class situation under the supervision of a teacher.

The committee also asked for a more strict attendance policy with stiff penalties be developed for school year 1977-78 and asked that the school board strongly consider establishing an alternative school for 150 to 200 students for the '77-78 year.

Other members of the committee were Bill Brown, Kent Buikema, Scott Beaman, Dallas Goss, Fred Libbing and Marian West.

Honoring citizens

Two Plymouth Township residents are slated to receive awards next week for their part in helping Michigan State Police solve 48 burglaries in the Plymouth-Canton community.

Jeff Lahr, 14, of Five Mile, and Richard Kopecki, of Five Mile, will be recognized for "initiative and responsible citizenship" during ceremonies May 17 at the State Police post in Northville.

The award ceremony is part of a day-long open house program sponsored by the post to give area residents a chance to get better acquainted with the state police and how they operate.

Also on tap for interested citizens will be guided tours of the entire post, including the crime lab and the district headquarters.

In addition a patrol unit will be on display, along with a bomb squad truck and a helicopter from the aerial division. Officers will be on hand to answer questions and demonstrate the use of equipment.

Although Kopecki was a burglary victim, he and young Lahr furnished police officers with positive identification of the burglars who, police say, were responsible for a series of previously unsolved thefts involving thousands of dollars.

On Aug. 18 of last year, Lahr noticed two men in Kopecki's house. He called Kopecki at work and told him he had visitors explained. Kopecki then left work and came home. By that time, however, the burglars had left his home and were walking down Five Mile. Lahr pointed the pair out, and he and Kopecki followed them to the Plymouth Hilton Hotel.

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Teachers to vote on contract Tuesday

The schedule to ratify a contract with teachers has been postponed for six days.

A meeting scheduled for today (Thursday) by the Plymouth Education Association (PEA) has been canceled with a new ratification meeting scheduled for 4 p.m. Tuesday in the auditorium of Plymouth Salem High.

The snarl in the schedule developed last week when Candi Reece, PEA president, discovered a difference of opinion on how improvements would be paid in the third year of the contract.

In discussions with Norman Kee, chief board negotiator, Ms. Reece discovered Kee had a different interpretation on the third-year payout than did the PEA bargaining team.

AT ISSUE was whether salary improvements and cost-of-living allowance (COLA) would be compounded in the third year.

The contract calls for a three per cent raise in the third year and COLA ranging from a minimum four per cent to a maximum of seven per cent.

The PEA understood the settlement to result in a teacher in the third year earning \$200 a week to have the salary improved by three per cent—to \$206 weekly—and then have the COLA applied against the \$206. If COLA were at four per cent, the increased salary of \$206 would then be multiplied by four per cent for a final improvement of \$214.24.

Kee's understanding, though, was that if COLA were four per cent in the third year the \$200 would be raised by a flat seven per cent with the final figure being \$214.

The gap be much wider for teachers at the top end of the scale or if COLA had climbed to seven per cent.

Ms. Reece estimates elimination of compounding would have resulted in teachers at the top of the scale getting \$46 less a year, with teachers at the bottom earning \$13 less that year.

In all, says Derald McKinley, chief negotiator for the PEA, the issue amounted to about \$12,000 to \$21,000 in cash paid out by the school district—depending on how high COLA is in the third year.

McKinley said Tuesday that the PEA team had documents agreed on in negotiations indicated third year improvements would be compounded. "That's the way it was done last year, and that's what we agreed on during current negotiations."

AFTER LEARNING that the personnel office didn't intend to compound the improvements, the PEA bargaining team canceled today's ratification meeting.

Both teams met Friday attempting to resolve the issue, but were unsuccessful. By this time, Kee had left for vacation in North Carolina.

The PEA then appealed to the school board, asking for a clarification of how the improvements would be computed.

The board agreed it wasn't going to get directly involved in negotiations and that the issue would have to be resolved by the two teams.

SUPT. JOHN M. HOBEN agreed to set up a conference call between Kee and Irv Rozian, facilitator.

Tuesday afternoon Hoben, Rozian and PEA members talked with Kee in

North Carolina by conference call. After further discussions, Hoben agreed a misinterpretation had occurred and that the improvements would be compounded in the third year.

McKinley late Tuesday told Hoben he would reschedule a ratification vote and get word out to teachers that the issue had been resolved.

"It was an honest mistake," said McKinley. "We made mistakes during negotiations too, so I understand how these things happen. It was too bad, though, that Kee was out of town. Our teachers were pretty upset about this."

"In fact things were pretty explosive Monday night and Tuesday

Many teachers were ready to close down the whole system. I'm just glad the superintendent got the matter straightened out so we can get on with the business of ratification."

The school board had hoped teachers would ratify May 12 so they could ratify May 15. The revised schedule now calls for teachers to ratify on May 17 and the board on May 23.

The remaining issue needing agreement is the calendar for year-round school, but McKinley said both sides are so close on the calendar that it can probably be wrapped up with one more meeting.

asking for a change of heart, but the principal stood firm.

"I don't object to what Tom's saying," Buikema said, "it's just that I don't like the way the story was written. I feel that some of the examples should be toned down."

"I don't think some of our ninth and 10th graders should be subjected to that material. A lot more would have been lost in public relations than what could have been gained by printing the article."

The students, with Buikema's encouragement, then appealed to the school board, which is presently weighing the issue. "I encouraged them to go over my head and let someone else say no," Buikema said.

In his statement to the board, Morin said, "Prior restraint is unconstitutional and violates the school policy which claims to recognize that freedom of speech is a right of American citizens, including students. I ask you to please keep this point in mind."

O'CALLAGHAN TOLD the board members that "Buikema inappropriately used prior restraint when we came to him for advice. By

imposing censorship, you are, in effect, telling the students to do their homework and earn good grades, but just don't think too much."

The courts have unanimously ruled that censorship of high school publications by school officials is unconstitutional. Should the school board support Buikema's censorship, Morin has threatened to take legal action.

"I can't say what we would do, because the staff hasn't discussed the alternatives yet," Morin said. "But we have contacted the American Civil Liberties Union which said it would support us."

Both Morin and O'Callaghan are seniors and will graduate on June 3.

Morin said the only thing stopping New Media from printing the story, aside from fair play, is that the action could constitute insubordination on the advisor's part. "Ms. Hewett has been great to us and the last thing we want to do is lose her job."

John M. Hoben, school superintendent, said he supported Buikema's decision and that the situation will stand unless the board acts differently. Hoben said he expects the board to arrive at a consensus at Monday's workshop.

citizen has deteriorated and that it may continue to deteriorate until a growth policy is designed, adopted and implemented," the majority report said.

"This committee can find no basis in fact to the argument that unrestrained growth and development is the answer to a better life. We, in fact, contend the opposite effect."

Unless Canton's rapid growth is brought under control, the committee said, road and drainage conditions will worsen, the quality of education will deteriorate and the ability of the police and fire departments to protect the township will be diminished.

After studying growth management techniques used in communities across the country, the committee's majority recommended eight techniques Canton could use to control its spiraling growth.

Techniques recommended by the committee were:

- Increase the minimum lot size from 60 feet to a larger frontage. Larger lot sizes would decrease density and the need for additional services. The committee unanimously endorsed the recommendation.

- Strictly enforce existing building codes and the zoning ordinance. All but one committee member endorsed strict zoning enforcement.

- Impose moratoriums of varying lengths on certain types of developments. All but two committee members endorsed the moratorium as a possible growth management technique.

- Develop a plan for "phased" growth by designating areas that would be developed first, second and so on. The committee endorsed the recommendation by a 12-2 vote.

- Curtailed extension of public utilities and sewers into certain areas, particularly into western Canton. The com-

mittee endorsed the recommendation 11-3.

- Consider public purchase of development rights in present agricultural areas. The theory behind the technique is that in the long run, the cost of preserving agricultural land is cheaper than providing services to developed land. Ten of the committee's members were in favor of the recommendation, two were against it, and two wanted to know the cost before voting.

- Adopt a yearly quota system on issuance of residential building permits. Nine of the 14 committee members endorsed the recommendation.

- Consider purchase of some open-space land for recreational purposes

or as a buffer zone between farms and developed areas. Only half of the committee's members endorsed the recommendation.

In addition, the committee said a fulltime planner sympathetic to the needs for growth control should replace the township's part-time planning consultants. Planning consultants often take a pro-growth attitude, Ms. Carter maintains, since their fee is based on consultations for individual projects.

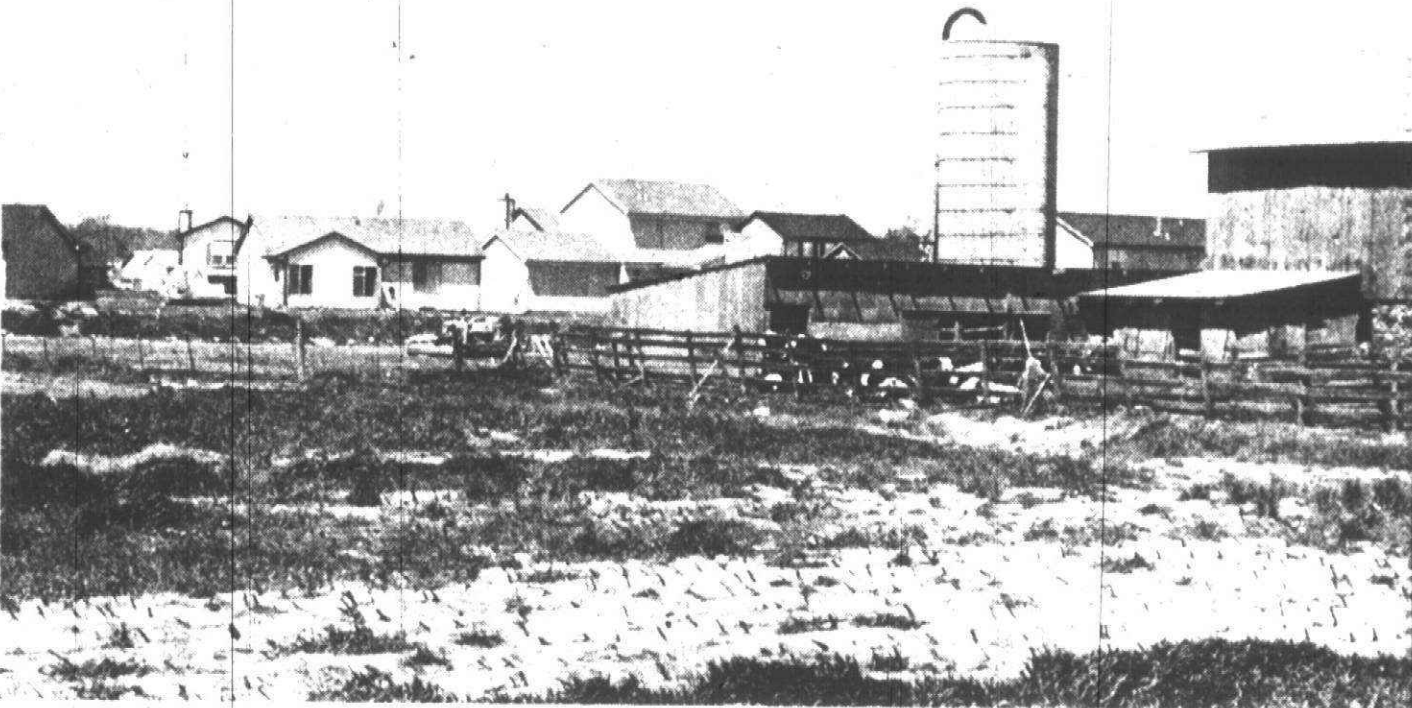
Although an attorney hired by the township offered general advice to committee members, Ms. Carter said the committee was unable to fully explore legal ramifications of the recom-

mendations.

"SZYDLOWSKI SAID he and his wife submitted dissenting reports on the growth control matter, because they believe the best government is one that governs least. A healthy business environment, they say, exists only in the free marketplace."

"The most disgusting aspect of growth control is that it infringes on man's God-given rights," Szydlowski maintained. "The people of this community must not empower their government to infringe on people's property rights."

But other members of the committee favor growth controls as vehemently as Szydlowski opposes them.

Fischer knows his tomatoes, by golly

For most of his 75 years Clarence Fischer has been tilling the soil and caring for the green houses at his homestead at 528 Sheldon Road and today he rightfully can be called "The Tomato King of Wayne County."

Looking over the vast expanse of glass in two acres of greenhouses, Fischer modestly expressed the belief that he now raises more tomatoes than any other farmer this side of Cleveland.

"We set out 17,000 plants in January," he said, "and work with them until the season closes about October."

"I've been away from the farm and the tomatoes only one winter," he chuckled as he picked another "sucker" from one of the young plants.

"Then I went to work at Fords. I didn't stay very long. I told the boss I was born and raised on a farm and I was going back to it."

As he walked along the long rows of tomato plants that reached as high as eight feet, the spry old Tomato King recalled how he came to raising tomatoes exclusively.

"We used to raise flowers, too," said Fischer, "but when the depression came after the war, we couldn't sell flowers. We could sell tomatoes. After all, you can eat them. So I turned to tomatoes as a fulltime job."

"We're constantly working, and my son does a lot of it," he added.

Explaining his program Fischer said the work starts with the sowing of the seed in January. In March the plants are put out in rows in the greenhouse.

"We have to watch them carefully. We water heavy once each week and keep 'dusting' them every day. The dusting is for pollinating. You see,

there are no bees. There is no honey for them, so we do it by hand, moving up and down the rows shaking the buds."

The old gentleman smiled as he continued, "But that is not all of the work. We have to pick them, sort them, and pack them into 10-pound baskets and head for market."

The modern trip to market is not as bad as he recalled the mornings when they drove teams of horses into Eastern Market in Detroit.

"We leave home now about 1.30 a.m. and get to the market and unload by about 3 a.m. That means we don't get home until about 5 a.m. So it is an all night job being a farmer."

One of the peculiar facets of the job is that he never knows what the price will be on the market when he gets there.

"It's better than back in the depression when we used to get 25 cents a basket."

"Costs are going sky high now," Fischer ventured and said that it required the raising of a lot of tomatoes just to pay his gas bill for heating the greenhouse.

Pointing to the 250-horsepower boiler he said several years ago he was urged to change from a coal burner to a gas burner—he was told that it would be cheaper.

"My gas bill for last month was \$4,600 and the month before that it was \$4,700. For the entire year it will run more than the \$30,000 we paid last year."

In spite of all this inflation, Fischer has lived an enjoyable life down on the farm. His wife is still living and he has two boys. One is a partner in the business, while the other doesn't like farming.

"I'll keep going as long as I can," Fischer confided. "I have raised tomatoes for more than half a century. No use stopping now."

Weed cutting program is spelled out by Stein

In response to numerous complaints about Canton's weed cutting and billing procedure, Supervisor Harold Stein is going to give "justifiably" angry residents a chance to get some of their money back.

According to Stein, some taxpayers have protested tax assessments for weed cutting, saying their weeds were never cut or that they were billed for cuttings and clean-ups which never took place.

Under township ordinance, property owners are required to periodically cut noxious weeds on their land. If they do not, the township can hire a private contractor to do it and charge the cost to the owner.

Stein said last year's weed cutting contractor, Van Cleves Weeding Service, claims his billings were correct. But some residents don't think so.

To give those residents the benefit of the doubt, Stein is sending out affidavit forms to township landowners. If they have objections about the weed cutting and cleaning bill, they can fill out the form, have it notarized, and send it back.

Each returned affidavit will be looked at and property owners will be notified of the final decision. And if they still feel justice hasn't been done, Stein said he is considering let-

ting the unsatisfied owners make a personal appeal.

IN AN EFFORT to prevent the same mix-up again this year, the ordinance department will follow new guidelines.

Kurt Johnson, an assistant ordinance officer, will make a list of all the Canton property which has weeds. Owners will then be notified they have 10 days to cut the weeds.

At the end of the 10-day period, the ordinance officer will tour the township again and cross off the names of owners who have complied with the notice.

Those who have not will have the cutting and cleaning done for them. The day after the cutting, the ordinance officer will check the contractor's work and relay the information to the township treasurer's department.

The treasurer will send out invoices to the property owners, requesting payment within 30 days. This procedure will take place after each cutting.

At the end of the cutting season, all unpaid invoices will be tabulated, and another statement asking for payment will be sent out.

On a 60 foot lot, there might be a \$15 fee for the first cutting and a \$10

administrative fee. The amount would double to \$50 if the cutting fee is not paid by the landowner by the time the next cutting is required. If the job is still ignored, the fee would be tripled to \$150, according to Stein.

"All unpaid invoices will be placed on the tax rolls," Stein said. "There is insufficient time to place them on the current year's taxes so all formal liens (on properties with unpaid invoices) will have to be placed on the following year's taxes."

Stein explained that the lien would be an internal lien.

"We feel that some developers do not wish to pay these bills because they prefer to have them on the tax roll and pay the bill when a closing takes place on a new house. Therefore we recommend that we place an internal lien on properties that have unpaid invoices. This will be done by supplying the building department with a list and no building permits will be issued until the weed cutting charges are paid."

The noxious weed ordinance applies only to parcels or lots which are within or adjacent to a subdivision where 50 per cent of the homes are built or under construction.

Weeds must be cut at least 300 feet back from the adjacent property line.

Athletic workshop

A workshop concerning the physical education curriculum on the elementary level has been set for this Monday night.

The question of retaining seventh grade football and basketball programs in the schools or releasing them to the junior athletic groups will also be discussed at this time.

The workshop takes place after the scheduled public hearing on the 45-15 calendar. The hearing is set for 7:30 p.m. at Plymouth Canton's High School cafeteria.

Increased physical education class time for elementary students was one of the first priorities athletic director John Sandmann told the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education in a report presented at Monday night's meeting.

Present elementary students have one 45-minute physical education class per week. Sandmann said he "strongly recommended that if any physical education staff is added, first priority must be given to the elementary grade level."

Board president Joe Gray said he wanted to see more gym time at the elementary level funded by a cutback in the school's unified studies program.

Sandmann explained that the use of the unified studies program was strictly up to the building principals.

Superintendent John Hoben said that some programs would have to be cut or an addition would have to occur in the budget if the additional gym time was added.

THE PLYMOUTH-CANTON Junior Athletic Association's request to take over the school's seventh grade boys' football and basketball programs was strongly supported by Gray.

"I think it's a good idea for junior athletics to take over this program," Gray said. "It would save the school district money."

Junior athletics has had successful programs for many years and here's an opportunity to use the funds elsewhere."

Board vice-president E.J. McClendon disagreed with Gray, saying it was the school district's obligation to offer these programs to help build friendship and school spirit among students.

He felt that keeping these programs served as strong educational assets to the students.

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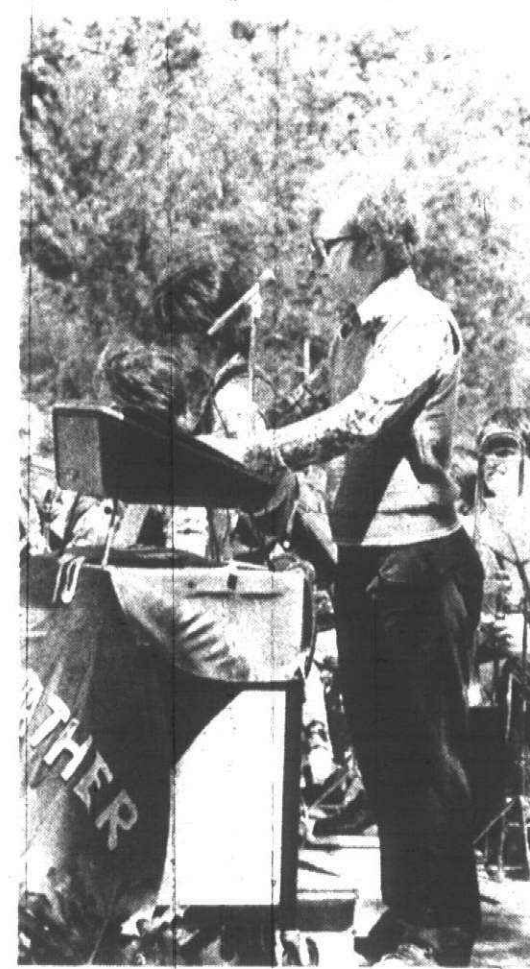

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Random selection plan almost final

Plans to balance student population between both high schools are being refined by the administration of Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

The school board Monday night received a status report on implementation plans for random selection to determine whether individual students attend Plymouth Salem or Plymouth Canton high schools.

The goal is to evenly distribute the high school population between the two buildings, as closely as possible. This will be done by throwing into a computer the names of all students eligible for high school and having the computer randomly assign students.

Use of the computer not only allows a mathematical balance but also is expected to minimize human bias in the assignment process.

EARLIER THE BOARD delayed implementation of random selection by one year by voting to begin the computer assignment of students with this year's seventh graders, instead of with the current eighth graders who'll be attending high school this fall.

The eighth graders already had been assigned counselors and had attended freshmen orientation at the Centennial Educational Park. The school board felt it would be too dis-

ruptive to assign this year's eighth graders by the random process.

After voting to begin random selection with this year's seventh graders, the board then instructed administration to come up with implementation plans and report back.

An initial status report was found unacceptable by the trustees because it didn't place enough reliance on assignment by computer, giving too much leeway to CEP administrators.

Monday night no objections were made by trustees and so the administration is proceeding with the current plans as proposed by a committee of Kent Buikeman, Canton principal, Dave Rodwell, Dave Ode and Jerry Henderson.

SUPT. JOHN M. HOBEN told trustees Monday seventh graders would be assigned to high schools by a computer print-out, with a couple of exceptions.

One exception would be those seventh graders who moved into the school district after the selection had been made. Another would be for students who move out of the district before the draw but returns after and a third exception would be those who move into the district as eighth graders.

Saving lost water

Plymouth Township lost about 128 million gallons of water during the last year, and officials would like to know where it went.

According to Web Kincaid, water and sewer department superintendent, the loss could occur at any number of places in the township water main system.

"There are a lot of small leaks in the pipes, and they leak 24 hours a day every day of the year."

Although the water loss is costing the township about \$64,000 a year—50 cents per thousand gallons—Kincaid maintained that it was not all that unusual.

"We are in what I would call a normal range of loss for a community our size."

However, the board of trustees apparently isn't all that pleased with normality. It wants to find out where the leaks are and get them fixed.

Board members voted unanimously Tuesday to spend \$15,000 to hire the services of The Pitometer Associates, a Chicago-based engineering firm which specializes in locating underground water leaks.

"If they can cut our loss in half," commented Trustee Richard Gornick, "it will more than pay for the cost of their study."

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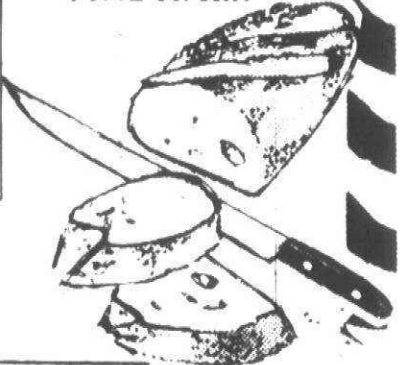
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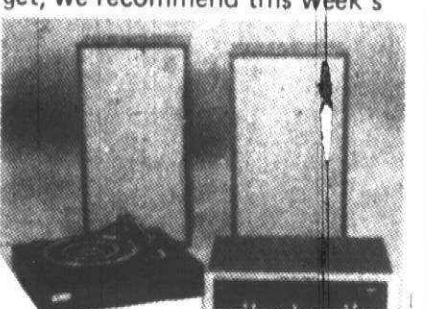

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Schools warn residents growth of homes may become a threat

The school board has publicly its fear that rapid growth in the townships may threaten the quality of education in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

By a vote of 6-0, with trustee George Lawton absent, the school board Monday night adopted a resolution on the harmful impact of growth on education introduced by Tom Yack.

Yack's original resolution stated that the quality of education "would" be threatened by the "uncontrolled" rapid growth in Canton and Plymouth townships. But objectors to the resolution's language by other trustees forced amendments that changed "would" to "may be" and deleted the word "uncontrolled."

A FEW WEEKS ago, Yack had offered a similar resolution. It was tabled because of objections to language from Lawton, Flossie Tonda and E.J. McClendon.

In re-introducing the resolution, Yack said citizens should be told that it is almost impossible to plan adequate programs, facilities and provide staff for quality education when the school district is faced with such rapid growth in enrollment—particularly from Canton Township.

"This board knows it cannot rationally plan for new facilities to meet rapid growth without more cooperation from both townships. I feel these two units of government are on their own course of action of growth because they benefit financially from any increased construction."

"But because of the way the school district receives its revenue any new home which yields more than 1.8 children results in deficit spending for us. We should communicate to the townships our feeling that they have a responsibility we don't feel they are meeting."

McClendon OBJECTED to the wording of the resolution which he felt suggested the school board couldn't handle its responsibilities and implied that the townships were violating good planning standards.

"The quality of life may very well be reduced by such accelerated growth," said McClendon, "but our job is to provide an education for whomever chooses to live here."

"Our role is to inform the units of government of our problems, but I'm not sure we should go beyond that. It's very likely that quality of education will be threatened by rapid growth. But we aren't now in a position to say that as a certainty. If residents are willing to vote for the money needed to keep up with this growth, then quality of education won't suffer. We don't know yet whether voters will pay this price, so it would be better to say quality of education may suffer."

MRS. TONDA said: "I don't feel the townships in any way are responsible for the quality of education. We, as school board members, are responsible for quality of education."

"Whether we can provide quality education depends upon the faith people have in us. If we gain the confidence of voters, and go to them for money, we'll get it. Otherwise, we cannot blame the township units of government because we lack the money to build schools to keep up with growth."

Richard Arlen commented: "This board and the administration, in a large sense, must deal with outside forces such as the other governmental units within the school district which do have an impact on the conditions we must deal with. We have no say over what the townships do but are left to deal with the results of their actions."

"If this growth continues and we have no money, we will be forced into a squeeze, and the quality of education will suffer regardless of what the school board wishes or does."

YACK NOTED he had been to school board workshops in which trustees "bemoaned the growth occurring in Canton. But so far nobody wants to go beyond what has only been rhetoric."

"There are only so many dollars out there, and the schools have had to ask for more tax dollars because of the increasing population. Residents are getting fed up with the tax burden, and the township governments ought to realize that people will begin to say 'no' to money for police and fire also. This is a problem all units must face."

"The townships need to exhaust every avenue available to slow the rate of growth—which they haven't yet done—before they can say they can do nothing."

MARCIA BOROWSKI argued that actions taken by the townships do have serious impact on the school district and the board should make their feelings known.

"A couple weeks ago this board passed a resolution in opposition to a new jail in Northville, which isn't even in our school district. The growth resolution does have a direct impact on us, and the amount of dollars we've to deal with. Why the board doesn't want to deal with this, but did approve the jail resolution, flies in the face of reason."

Mrs. Tonda said the school board should have spoke up three or four years ago when plat requests were coming before Canton Planning Commission for the subdivisions being occupied this year.

"The school board should have spoken up then, not now when it's too late. The school board then was even given copies of site plans, but didn't respond. I don't think you can blame the townships."

Yack agreed it was too late to react to growth that is already here and added he was sorry to hear previous school boards hadn't reacted properly. "But it's not too late to take action now. Canton now has 30,000 people and is projected to grow to a population of 200,000. I don't particularly care about the 200,000 figure. What I object to is the rate of development, not the final number. It is the rate of growth which is creating the problems we have to deal with."

After the resolution was approved, Yack commented: "What this resolution really says is that the school board can only deal with solutions—the problems lie elsewhere, with the hundreds of plattings going through the townships. Hundreds of new homes are being produced in a single night."

"The community should concentrate its efforts on the people who are providing the problem, not on us who are in search of solutions."

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Geake named to senate education unit

State Sen. Robert Geake (R-Northville) has been named to the senate education committee. He promised that he will work on laws relating to teachers' strikes, school districts with declining enrollments and vocational educational programs.

Geake, formerly in the state house for more than four years, was elected to the senate in a special election March 23. He was previously on the house education committee.

The senator, an educational psychologist, also emphasized his commitment to maintaining local control of education.

He said residents have "demonstrated through their high level of interest in their children's education that they deserve a strong voice in how their schools are run. I intend to be on guard to assure that that voice isn't silenced."

Geake also said that his background as a former chairman of the Schoolcraft Collegeboard of trustees will help him reviewing legislation for both kindergarten-through-12th grade and higher education.

The senate earlier abolished its colleges and universities committee and transferred those responsibilities for higher education legislation to the expanded seven-member education committee.

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The Stroller Could lightning strike twice?

Ever since The Stroller was honored by having the large ice rink in Livonia named for him, he has been keeping his fingers crossed every time the dark clouds gather and there is a threat of rain.

As the darkness descends he crosses his fingers and wonders whether there will be much lightning. And if there is he wonders if there is any truth to the old adage that lightning never strikes twice.

The Stroller's fear and wonderment are based on good reasons for it was a flash of lightning years ago that sent his maternal grandfather into a frenzy and caused him to feel that he was jinxed until the day of his death.

IT ALL on the day that he was having his greatest thrill and it put a damper on his celebration of being named commander of the Grand Army Post back home.

Known to all his friends, relatives and members of the veterans groups as "The Colonel," he liked to strut his stuff. Nothing pleased him better than to put on his old blue suit, his fedora hat (the mark of the Union Army) and walk downtown or to take part in any sort of celebration where he could attract attention.

Then came the word that the government was going to erect a monument to the memory of those who served with the Union Army and it was to be erected in the old cemetery on the hill.

It was the first such monument to be erected in America and no one was prouder of that fact than The Colonel, who was never at a loss to tell you the sad tales of the rigors of war and how he and his companions suffered

through the three days at the Battle of Gettysburg.

His pride took another leap when he learned that the names of company—the 375th Regiment—were to be chiseled in the marble, there to stay for years to come.

He couldn't wait to see his name on the monument. No one ever paid more visits to a cemetery than he did. He watched every move as the shaft of marble pointed toward the sky.

And the day he saw his name, Frank H. Wilson, cut in the stone he reached a point of ecstasy. If the monument was designed to honor the old soldiers the reason was justified when the old gent saw his name and told all and sundry about it.

The other old soldiers, as we young folks called them, took the honor in stride. But not "The Colonel." He strutted and never missed a chance to tell folks about the honor. Better yet, he often escorted them to the cemetery to show them what the government thought of him—they had his name in stone.

More than once he took The Stroller over on the hill and asked him to sit there, just to look at it.

Then came the year that he was named commander of the post, an honor only slightly below that of having his name carved in stone.

No one ever carried the role of commander with more pride as he headed the Memorial Day parades and other small town activities.

It so happens that in our cemetery back home the old soldiers were given a plot of their own. Not only were

there a sufficient number of graves set aside for them, but there was a chapel erected in the center, high on the hill overlooking the town.

During the Colonel's tenure as commander he decreed that no old soldier would be laid to rest without a service in the chapel and the commander would be in charge.

He was setting up another opportunity to show his authority. Then came the day of the first burial after his edict. He invited the entire family to see him conduct the services.

Everything went according to the script and The Colonel really was doing a great job. Then Mother Nature stepped in.

Just as the services were concluded one of those hasty electrical storms came up. The winds came. Lightning flashed. The rain came down in torrents.

Then came a boom of thunder and a lightning flash with a piercing sound. There was a loud crack and it seemed so close.

It was. It struck the monument. And where do you suppose was the area of the greatest damage?

Yes, it hit the monument and the big crack it left in the stone was right through The Colonel's name. And the crack is still there today.

It was the first time any member of the family had his name on a monument and it was struck by lightning. And now that The Stroller's name is emblazoned on an ice rink, he can't help keeping his fingers crossed at every sign of lightning.

He's hoping that lightning doesn't strike twice.



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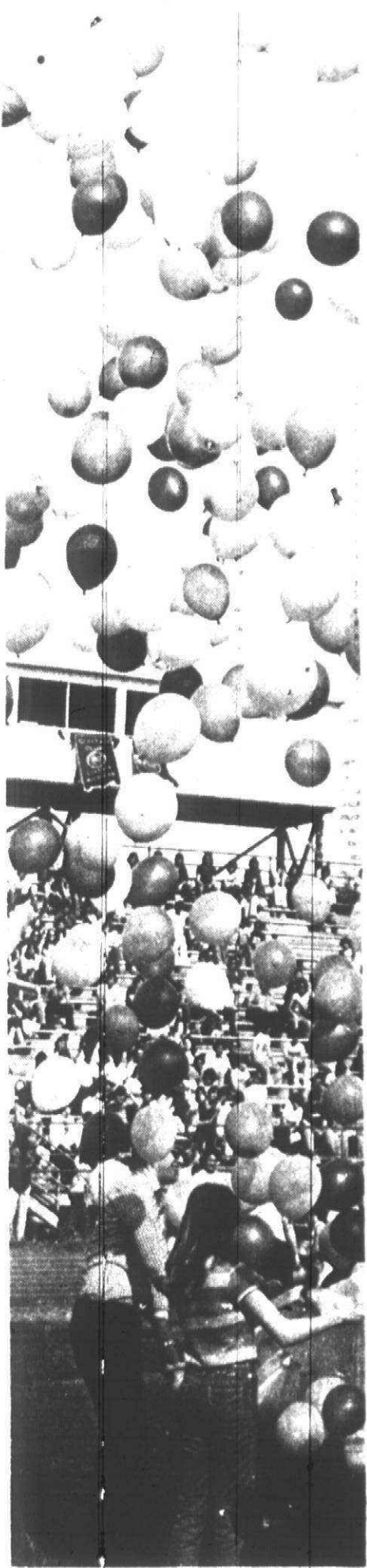
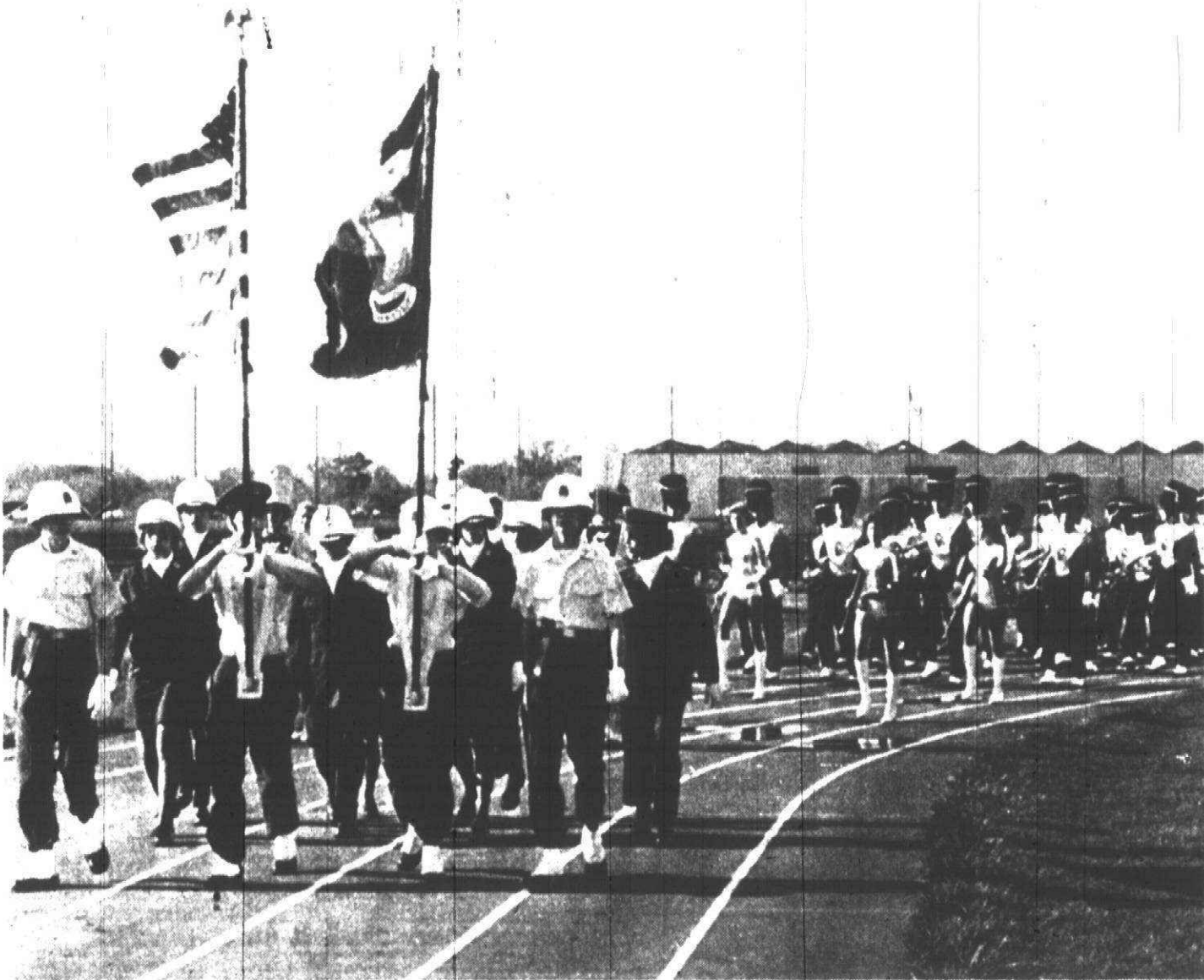
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Special Olympics- 'Let me win, but if I can't, let me be brave in the attempt'

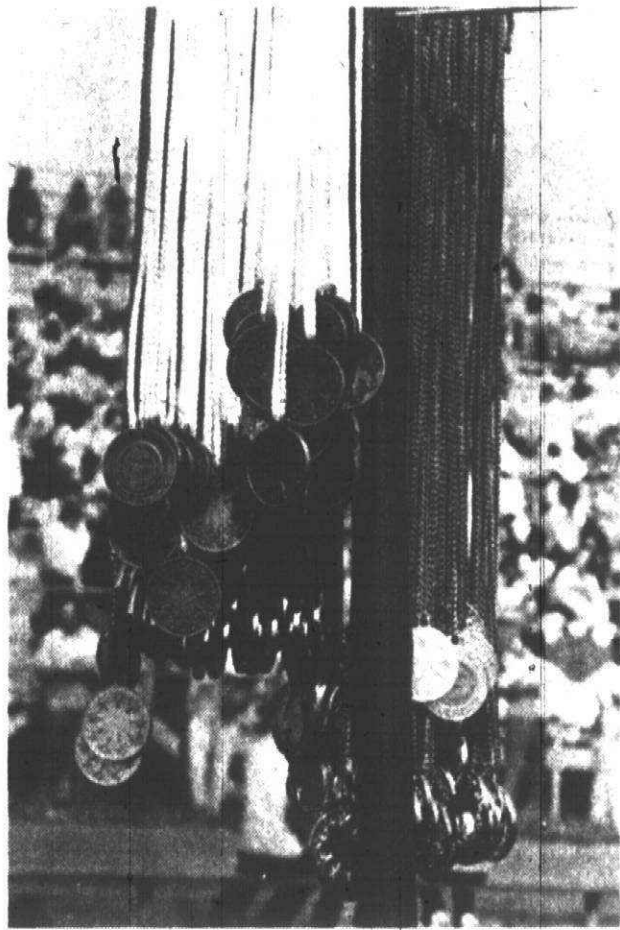

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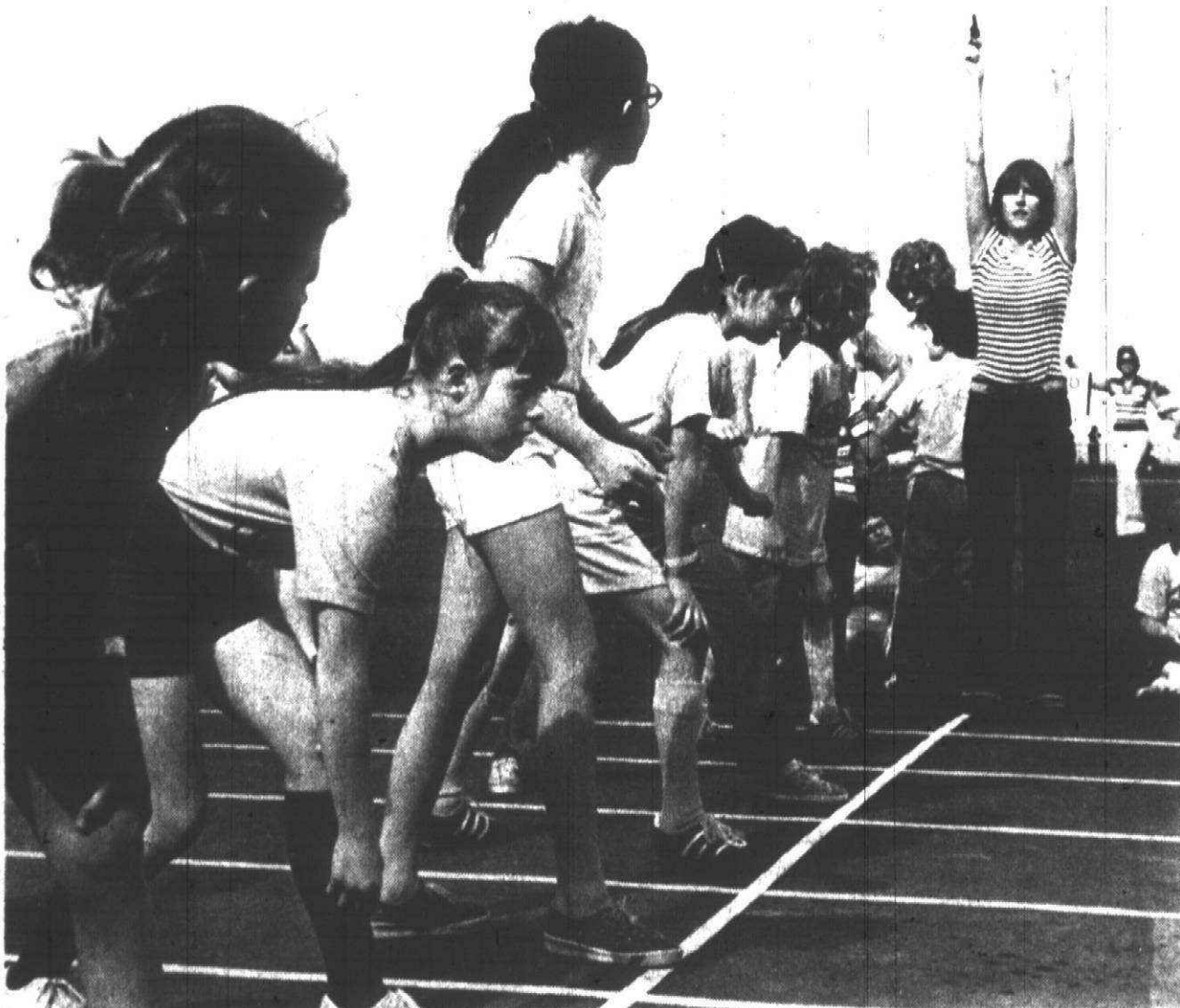

School census form

By state law, the Plymouth-Canton Community School District must make a count of every child who lives in the district. The accounting must include information detailing the name, age, and address of every handicapped person under 26 years of age. The school count must be done in May so that the compulsory attendance laws are enforced in the

case of each school-aged child. To participate in the census, parents should fill out the above coupon listing every child not presently attending public school in the district or not receiving special education services through the system. SEMTA opts for 'light rail'

In one of the major compromises of Michigan politics, the board of the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority Tuesday pointed the way for rapid transit for the next generation or more.

The way is light rail.

By a 9-4 vote, the SEMTA board indicated its "preference" so that General Manager Larry Salci and his staff can prepare a formal application to the federal government on a program that will ultimately cost \$1.3 billion in current dollars.

By picking option I, the SEMTA board said it wanted to build light rail

(streetcar-type) lines in the Woodward corridor from downtown to Sixteen Mile and in the Gratiot corridor from downtown to Fifteen Mile.

Also on the docket are commuter rail in the Michigan Avenue corridor and express buses in 10 major metropolitan area corridors—Fort, Mound, Telegraph, Southfield, Plymouth, I-696, Eight Mile, Big Beaver, Schoolcraft-Davison and Warren.

DETROIT MAYOR Coleman Young, who hatched and promoted a heavy rail subway plan, compromised by accepting the light rail plan, and all five of Detroit's SEMTA members backed it as well.

A suburban member who asked not to be quoted by name said: "The mayor and (aide William) Cilluffo backed off heavy rail. He saw the need to make it a regional system—to his credit."

The SEMTA member referred to the fact that Young's heavy rail plan would have been built in Detroit only—to Eight Mile in the Woodward corridor and to Connor in the Gratiot corridor—at least in its early stages. Suburban spokesmen vehemently opposed a Detroit-only plan.

Among the nine supporting votes were: Joseph P. Bianco Jr., of Bloomfield Hills; Beverly McAninch, Plymouth city commissioner; J.A. (Art) Mullen, Grosse Pointe businessman and James Grannan, Macomb County resident and outspoken suburban member of the board.

SIGNIFICANTLY, the four "no" votes were geographically scattered: Julie Evans of Birmingham, Marilyn Thayer of Ann Arbor, Tommy Tomlinson of Macomb County and Dwight Havens of Grosse Pointe.

Mrs. Evans in recent weeks had sharply shifted her position in favor of the heavy rail option, arguing it was the only one which would have enough economic impact to rescue Detroit.

In this regard, she wound up more strongly in favor of heavy rail than even Mayor Young.

Havens, a suburban Wayne County resident who heads the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce, didn't explain his vote.

Mrs. Thayer, a land use planning expert and one of SEMTA's most knowledgeable members, voted against the light rail option for a far different rea-

son. "For a couple billion dollars, we're going to get two or three percent of all the trips in the region," she said.

Tomlinson supported the light rail plan but insisted on including in any application for federal funds the so-called "Tri-County Plan" that was heavily lobbied by the Oakland County Road Commission.

Tomlinson's motion to include the Oakland road group's plan failed to get a second from the other dozen board members, and so it was never discussed.

Missing was the board's newest member, Henry M. Hogan, publisher of Observer & Eccentric Newspapers. Hogan was in Boston to speak to a press convention, an engagement he had made a year ago.

The 15th seat is vacant. Gov. William G. Milliken is to appoint a person from one of the four outlying counties in the seven-county region.

ECONOMICS was the chief non-political reason the board picked the light rail alternative. The other three were: All-bus plus commuter rail in the Michigan corridor; heavy rail; and the "null" alternative, simply letting the present system expand normally.

The prevailing view is that Detroit is in serious trouble, and that trouble will spread like cancer to the suburbs unless the region gets a program that not only transports people but provides plenty of construction and operations jobs.

Salci, the Troy resident who became general manager earlier this year, said his staff could not recommend any of the 16 alternatives it studied "on technical grounds alone." He asked for policy guidance from the SEMTA board because, "We cannot weigh the economic factor in any quantifiable way."

By most criteria, the light rail package ranked ahead of the other three in the economic impact it would have on the region, according to a SEMTA staff study. Light rail was No. 1 in its private investment potential, impact on direct and indirect sales, impact on household incomes, and impact on employment in general; it ranked second in impact on operating employment.

Heavy rail ranked second in every category but operating employment, where it was third.

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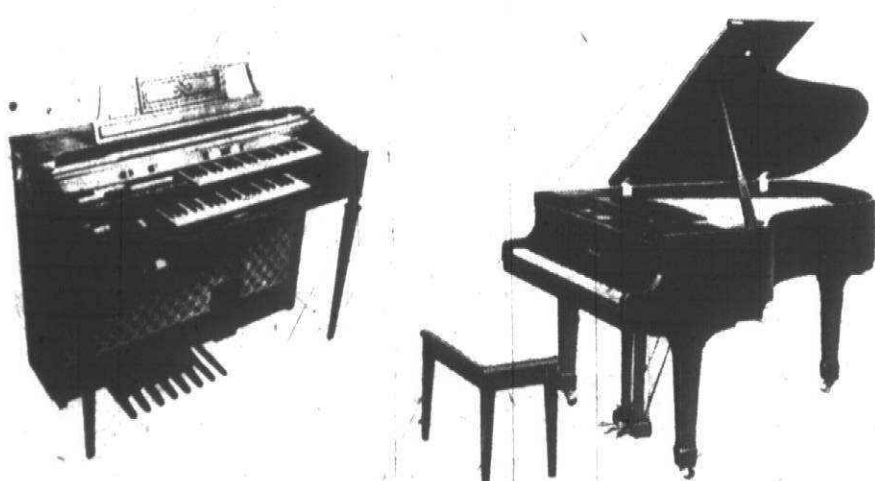

Observer Newspapers and the Northville Record are assisting the two league chapters with arrangements.

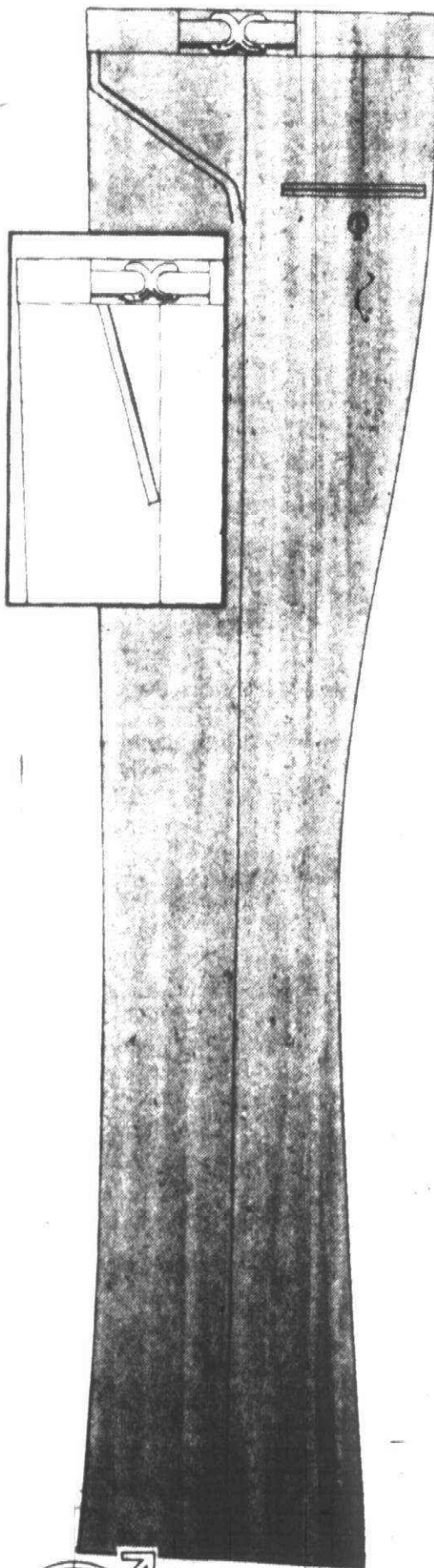

Censoring New Media sets a poor precedent

The handling of the censorship case brought before the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education this week raises some serious questions concerning the education of journalism students at the Centennial Educational Park (CEP).

The debate over whether the Plymouth Canton high school newspaper, New Media, should publish an editorial condemning pornography is a classic one which has been surfacing in school districts across the nation.

The question, simply put, is whether high school students must leave their First Amendment rights (freedom of the press) at the school house gates. The courts have usually ruled that censorship by school officials is unconstitutional.

ON ONE SIDE, students are fighting for their rights to express thoughts freely, without prior restraint. On the other side, school officials argue that students are not yet responsible enough to handle First Amendment freedom.

The students have a valid argument. In a period when illiteracy rates among young people are soaring, students need to be encouraged to communicate in print. To learn the basic responsibility imposed on all journalists by the First Amendment, students must experience First Amendment freedom.

Furthermore, censorship teaches students to confine their efforts to the bland and non-controversial. This makes their publications dull, while it restricts coverage to high school proms.

The National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP) questions "whether students are socially and intellectually mature enough to accept responsibility for their utterances." Its bulletin also states "that exercise of First Amendment rights must have reasonable limits, and that

the ultimate determination must rest with the school board and its staff, not the federal courts."

IF SCHOOL BOARDS were to have the final say, as the NASSP suggests, then in most cases censorship decisions would be supported, thus harming the education of high school journalists.

We believe the Plymouth-Canton school board should overrule Canton principal Kent Buikema's censorship of the editorial, "Would You Want To Make Love To Your Shoe?," on the grounds that irreparable harm would be done to the journalism program at CEP.

By supporting prior restraint, the school board would set a precedent in this community that is offensive to the U.S. Constitution.

Censorship of the article also would violate the bylaws of the 1976-77 Plymouth CEP student handbook, which says: "Since the school recognizes that freedom of speech is a right of American citizens, including students, it follows that a student may express his personal opinions whether in the context of a class or general discussion, or an editorial in a student publication."

While the concern for the appropriateness of the editorial's content for some high school students must be recognized, the damage done by education by censorship would far exceed any difficulties a youngster might encounter if it was published.

The school board also must act quickly in its decision. By putting the issue off Monday night, the board cannot make a decision until its next meeting, May 23, three days prior to the newspaper's deadline for the school's final issue.

By delaying its decision beyond the next meeting, the school board would, in effect, be censoring the story because it would never see print.

Would you want to make love to your shoe?

(The following editorial, which has been censored from publication in New Media, the student newspaper at Plymouth Canton High, has a message which ought to be heard. The Observer prints it here for our readers because we feel the writer's viewpoint has sufficient "social redeeming value" to warrant publication. The editorial will receive an honorable mention in a contest for high school journalists, and the comments of judge follows).

After seeing a picture of a naked girl sensually licking another naked girl's high heel shoe, I wondered if new gimmicks were being tested for the art of shoeshining. But the nature of this magazine was pornographic, and with so many different pornographic magazines available to persons at least 18 years of age, the competition is strong. In order to increase sales, new ideas are always being thought up. Each one is cruder and more offensive than the next.

I don't mind an exposed breast or a bare bottom. But in a race for crudeness, pornography, with an eye for detail and completeness, makes one think of dissection time in biology.

For "men's magazines," models are no longer limited to buxom young ladies. Now they include 10-year-old girls and 70-year-old grandmothers. Nor are they limited to male-female relationships. Any kind of sexual activity is encouraged, including homosexuality, bisexuality, and masturbation.

MANY PROCLAIM the virtues of sex-with-violence through whips, chains, clubs, and hand to hand combat.

Some include pictures similar to the one I found illustrating that sex is no longer limited to other people or yourself, but includes "lewd" activities with inanimate objects. Who would want to have a sexual relationship with a filing cabinet or a table lamp? I suppose it does have one advantage. No one has ever become pregnant from a table lamp.

The only new gimmick left for pornographic magazines is the use of animals. Dogs, ponies, horses and goats have been in use in pornographic films for years. A girl or two stars in such films with the animals performing sexual acts. Most people would think twice before imitating such acts.

Vibrators, massagers, full-size motorized sex dolls, contraceptives, and a wide variety of sex toys are advertised in pornographic magazines. Some carry classified swingers' ads which carry messages of horny people looking for other horny people. Such ads read: "Shy but easy female with two willing young daughters seeking intelligent, well-built male with a passion for unusual practices."

SOME PEOPLE WOULD argue that "It's only obscene if you think it's obscene. And besides, no

one is forcing you to look at it."

I agree. Pornography does not shock or disgust me. It surprises me and makes me wonder why it is so popular. The people who make all the money producing the lower forms of pornography (animals, little girls) disgust me because they take advantage of young girls and unknowing animals.

Like many other vices in society, pornography thrives because it is in demand. This stems from a problem with society. Sex has always been in the back drawer, under the covers, behind closed doors, in whispered conversations, in back seats of cars and under the counter. It has been a terrible taboo for so long that people leap at the chance to see a little skin. Add the commercialization for the most possible profit and you have an overflowing pot of steaming flesh.

THE ONLY SOLUTION I can see is through a change in our attitudes of sex. Sex should be respected and appreciated for its own sake. It should represent people's love for one another instead of dollar signs.

As with many changes in society, this change would have to begin with proper education. In schools, sex education should not simply consist of ovaries and sperm cells. It must teach the appreciation, importance and proper use of sex.

Because many parents and schools fail to even talk of this, people believe a lot of misleading information. This inaccurate information gives many people problems and frustrations which may then find an outlet in so-called "perverse" ways like pornography.

Until we realize the proper attitudes, we can expect to see the exploitation of naked little girls, German shepherds, and high heeled shoes.

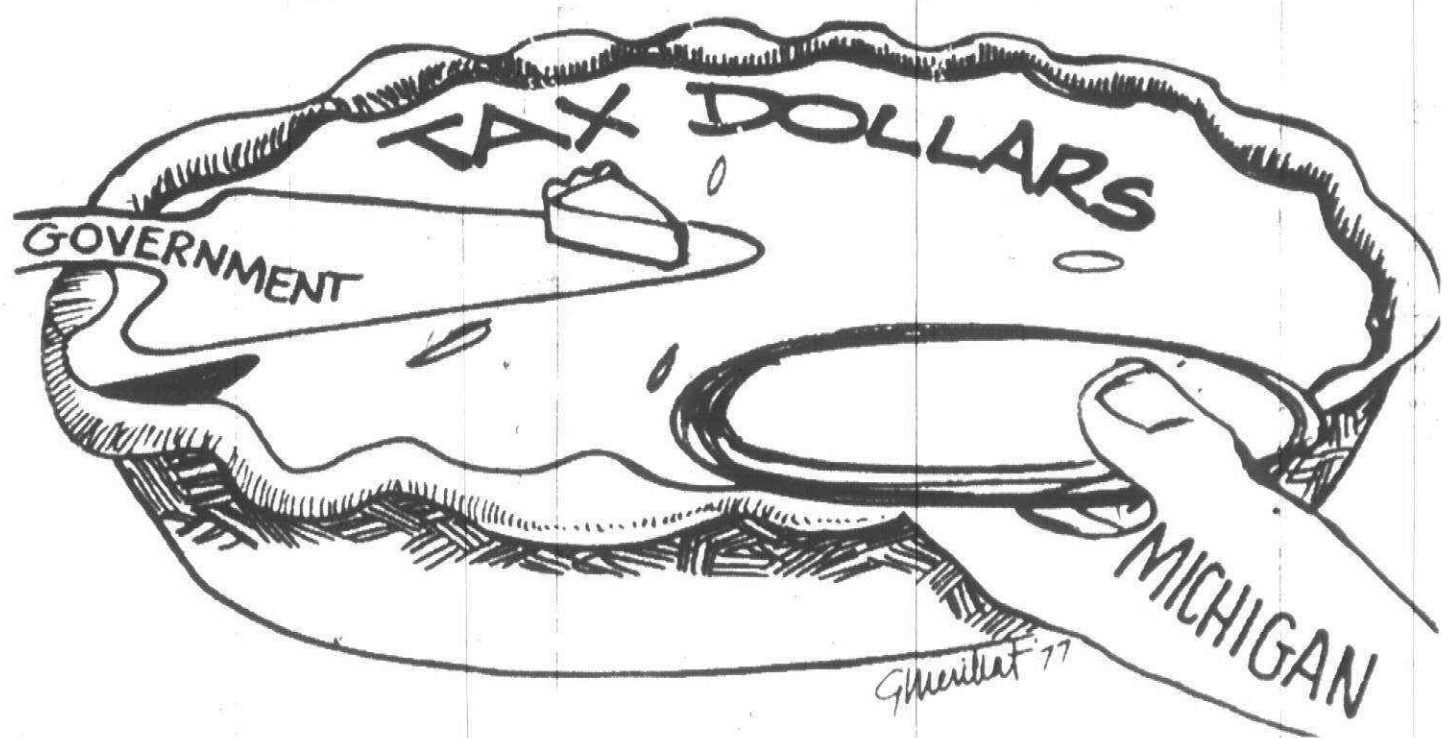
Tim Richard, editorial director for Observer Newspapers, awarded the above editorial an honorable mention in competition for high school newspapers conducted by Schoolcraft College. His remarks as judge follow:

"The work was censored by the principal. It's a highly intelligent discourse on porno that seeks neither to exploit the subject (as do Lou Gordon and 'Billy Jack' movies) nor to pontificate. Reading it each time, I was reminded of the very skillful short novel, 'A Family Party,' in which the narrator takes you to the outer limits of good taste but manages to return to earth in an entirely satisfying fashion.

"I can't get over the literary skill. It's probably too good for a high school paper which is why the writer is in trouble. I happen to think there's no subject which can't be discussed in the media if it's handled with the right 'touch.' The same subject in the hands of a less skilled writer might have turned out disastrously.

"The article's weakness, which kept it from being a prize-winner, was that it failed to zero in more precisely on the 'local angle'—the curriculum, the texts, the course outline."

Michigan could use some old-fashioned Capitol clout

It came out buried in one of the endless stream of news stories about the state's plan to take over the Wayne County Child Development Center in Northville and turn it into a prison. Some 600 acres of land on that site had been set aside previously as a place to locate the proposed federal Solar Energy Research Institute (SERI).

Well, as things turned out, the feds decided to locate SERI in Colorado, leaving a lot of folks in Michigan very upset.

For months, a strong coalition of labor, industry, Republicans and Democrats had worked to develop a substantial presentation for Michigan.

They figured that if SERI would locate here, it would pour millions of dollars into the state's economy, as well as broaden our manufacturing base with a big research operation.

And they figured that with Michigan's own Jerry Ford in the White House, the home state would get the kind of help Lyndon Johnson showered on Texas while he was president.

It didn't happen. President Carter's administration made the actual decision, although the scuttlebutt in Washington had it that the Ford people themselves didn't press too hard for Michigan when they had the chance.

IN ANY EVENT, musing about 600 acres in the suburbs that "might have been" the SERI lab got me to thinking that our state is still really getting the shaft from the federal government.

Back in 1970 when Sander Levin was first running for governor, he made quite a splash charging that Michigan was last on the list of 50 states receiving federal money. The argument, then as now, is that people in Michigan send a whole lot of tax money down to Washington because personal incomes in our state are relatively high. But when it comes to getting those dollars back, Michigan is on the short end of the stick.

Latest report I saw showed Michigan is still around 10th in the nation sending tax dollars to the federal government but only 47th in getting those dollars back.

This is so even while the federal government's own rules require that the goodies be doled out to states with high unemployment—of which Michigan is the leading example.

JUST WHY MICHIGAN has such a poor record in getting money back from Washington is not clear.

Michigan's delegation to Congress, although man-for-man easily as highly qualified and with as much seniority as those of other states, has traditionally taken as "issues" approach to politics.

For example, when Phil Hart was our senator, he was widely regarded as "the conscience of the Senate." But he didn't really make his No. 1 priority putting the muscle on the feds to get help for Michigan.

Neither, for that matter, has Sen. Robert Griffin, even with his close relationship to Jerry Ford when he was president. The last senator who really pushed Michigan's dollars-and-cents interests was Patrick McNamara, who died in 1966.

I don't think that rectifying a clear and present abuse of the way federal money is doled out conflicts in any way with the kind of issue concerns we have come to expect from Michigan politicians.

And I do think the only way for Michigan to get a better shake from Washington is through our own representatives right there.

I have done some investigating concerning the present bowling establishment (Super Bowl) and have found the only reason they are expanding is because they will have to compete with the new bowling establishment going up at the corner of Hix and Ford Road (Fiesta Lanes). They had originally planned to expand

when Canton had grown in the future. I also might add that Super Bowl is still not able to fill every day. As the warm weather approaches, the Super Bowl will find it difficult to increase what they have now as people will want to take advantage of the weather.

I believe it was Mr. Richard Mooradian who suggested that perhaps some people are trying to have a monopoly when it comes to bowling establishments. This is not so. What I'm concerned about is the fact that Canton may not be able to support two

bowling establishments.

WE ARE A population of approximately 30,000 people. When you consider the bowling lanes we now have, plus what Aspen Lanes will have, I find it difficult to believe they can both survive.

When Mr. Ed Hochstein mentioned the six bowling establishments in Dearborn, he neglected to mention that Dearborn has a population of about 104,000 people, not to mention the factories in Dearborn. I would like to add that the six establishments he talks about are very old and not too

As I received more information on this subject, I have learned that AMF, one of the major suppliers for bowling businesses, has stated "after examining the facts, it would seem at present, and for some time to come, that another bowling center in Canton would be impractical."

While it is true the investment Hochstein talks about will bring the township approximately \$75,000 a year in taxes, I still feel our responsibility as citizens of Canton is to support the present bowling establishment.

Schools adding insult to injury

In the U.S. News and World Report's Jan. 27, 1975 issue, the U.S. Commissioner of Education T.H. Bell stated, "What the present controversy

comes down to, I believe, is a growing concern on the part of parents that they have lost control over their children's education and, therefore, their children's future.

"Parents have the ultimate responsibility for the upbringing of their children and their desires should take precedence. The school's authority ends where it infringes on this parental right."

Perhaps our administrators and educators are not aware of this fact. We parents are the taxpayers who elect school board members to abide by the will of the people. We do not need puppets on strings manipulated by the superintendent.

In the fall of 1975, the board was presented with a survey of some 3,700 Plymouth-Canton School District households. Sixty-two percent supported eliminating modular scheduling and even more backed a return to traditional scheduling.

What kind of an administration do we have when the superintendent turns himself off to the cries of the parents? Looking through old newspaper articles, you can find that parents have been dissatisfied with the CEP as far back as 1975 and perhaps even further back than that.

Study after study takes place, but lack of student control, discipline and the problems of absenteeism are still on the rise. The administration seems unable to resolve existing problems but adds insult to injury by creating new ones, such as the 45-15 extended school year and open classrooms.

I feel members of the administration are infringing on the civil and equal rights of parents when they set themselves up as judge and jury to determine (policy). The school system becomes more system than school.

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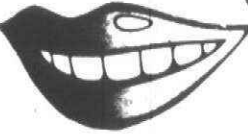
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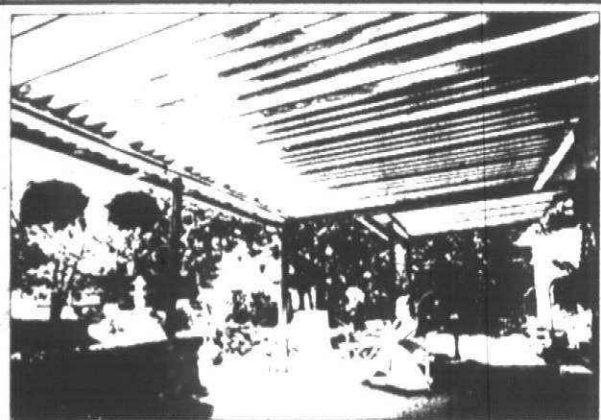


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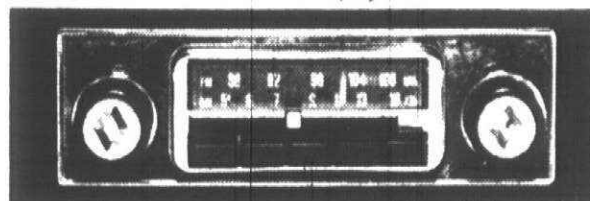
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S'craft candidates queried on \$\$\$ cuts

What will you do if, on June 13, voters turn down the 0.8 mill property tax increase?

That was the question put to candidates for the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees. Five candidates and the son of a sixth spoke Wednesday at a meeting of Livonia Inter-ested Democrats.

RICHARD HAYWARD, executive in Freedland Structural Steel Co. of Livonia, said, "We'd have to curtail certain programs. The college has never worked with a deficit."

"But we shouldn't come back to the voters every three months. If the community knew the need, I don't see how they could go against it."

Hayward, 48, of Livonia, is making his second bid for the Schoolcraft board. Saturday he was awarded a degree at Madonna College after dropping out of college 27 years ago.

JACK BOLOGNA, management consultant from Plymouth, said the public should "vote on it again" but didn't put a time frame on when another election should be held.

"We need to communicate the exact need of what it will be used for. You have to give value and then the customer will buy. We have to evangelize the public."

Bologna, 48, is president of Odium Associates. A lawyer, he had a long career in the federal government—Internal Revenue Service, Food and Drug Administration and the late Sen. Philip Hart's anti-trust subcommittee—before entering business.

HARRY GREENLEAF, Ford Motor Co. executive from Livonia, said the board "will have to balance the budget," admitting "that could be a hard decision."

He pointed out that even if the millage is approved, "we wouldn't spend all 0.8 mills next year."

Greenleaf, 40, is an engineer and is in personal at Ford headquarters. In other comments, the district Republican chairman emphatically endorsed the fine arts facility that part of the \$10 million bond issue the board is planning to sell.

KARL SJOGREN, a cost accountant at Ford, said "the immediate effect will be on tuition."

"We would have to look at why the millage failed. Then at some time, the trustee has to stop being a salesman for the college and be a representative of the people. We could also put it (the millage question) on the ballot

by itself" rather than at a trustees election when K-12 school district issues are also on the ballot.

Sjogren (pronounced Shur-gren), 23, a resident of the Clarenceville School District, is a former Schoolcraft Student Senate president who went on to earn a master of business administration degree at Michigan State. He is a former Democratic precinct delegate.

ROSINA RAYMOND'S son, Eldon, said, "My mother was one in 1960 who went out and sold one mill because we could build a great community college for one mill at the time." Raymond said the political reality is that "communities are willing to spend only a few of their extra dollars on a college."

Mrs. Raymond, currently vice-chairwoman, is seeking a second six-year term on the board. She is a part-time instructor at Wayne State University and was strongly in favor of putting the millage question on the June 13 ballot so that it would become an issue among candidates.

LEN WOZNIAK, salesman for a data processing firm, said, "I would not be for expanding the college," a reference to the \$10 million bond issue plans that would have to be dropped if the operating millage fails.

"The next step would be a tuition increase," he said.

Wozniak, 35, a former Livonia Jaycees president, is making his first bid for office, although he has been a Republican Party worker. His other remarks emphasized careers counseling—notably nursing (perhaps being oversold) and data processing. "If I had 12 expert people in data processing, I could put them to work tomorrow."

MISSING from the session were Michael Cicchella, executive director of the Livonia Family Y; George Graviola, Livonia resident; Laura Toy, Livonia youth commission official; and Mrs. Raymond.

The nine candidates are seeking three seats on the Schoolcraft board. Mrs. Raymond is the only incumbent; trustees Leroy Bennett and Arch Vallier are retiring.

Meanwhile, the millage steering committee is putting together plans for a speakers bureau to explain the millage proposal and bond issue. Speakers can be obtained by calling the college president's office at 591-6400.

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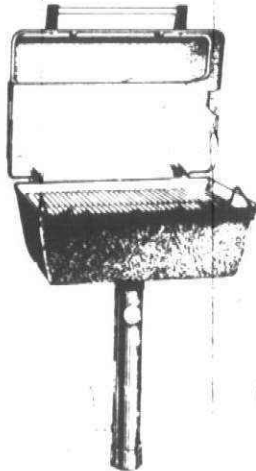
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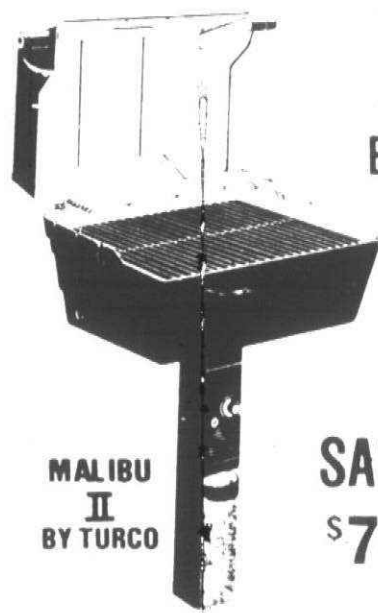
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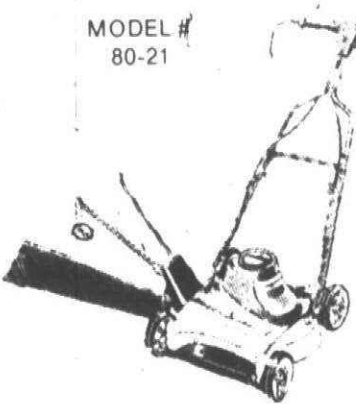
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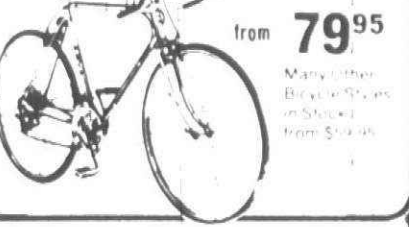


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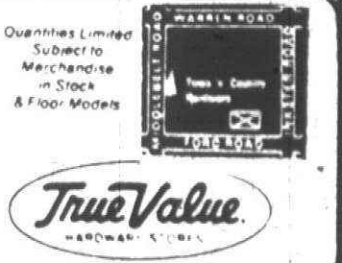
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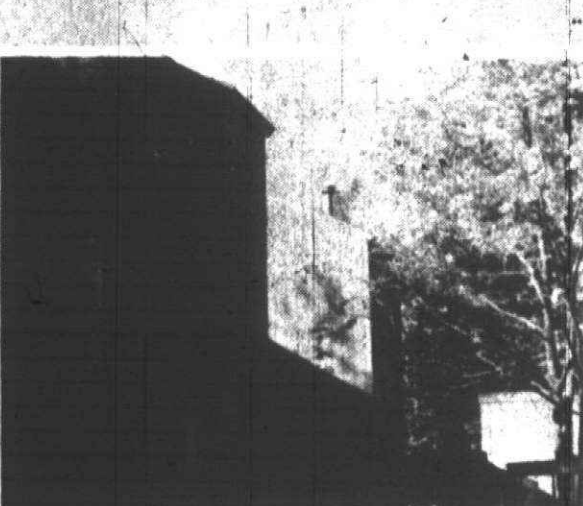
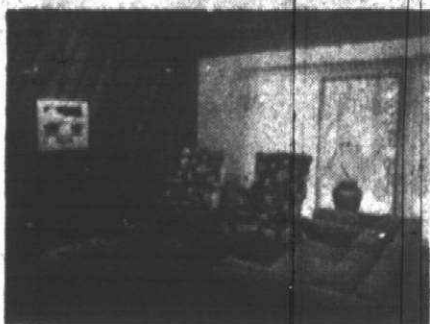
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AS HAROLD GUENTHER said, "There is something about atmosphere at Starkweather that makes it special."

The aroma of yeast bread is not uncommon in the houses of La Leche League members.

The public will be able to share the taste treat when members of the Plymouth-Northville La Leche League offer their baked wares for sale Saturday from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the entrance of the Kroger Supermarket, Sheldon at Ford roads, Canton.

Veteran league leader and breadmaker Charlene Frellick of Northville has chosen three of her favorite bread recipes as staples for the sales. Members will be working this week baking these breads and other baked goods.

Many of the recipes will be from the cookbook, "Mothers in the Kitchen," the official La Leche League collection of member recipes from all over the nation and the world. The book also will be for sale Saturday.

La Leche, which is the Spanish word for milk, is a non-profit organization which offers free breast-feeding counseling for mothers and expectant mothers.

Proceeds from the baked goods sales will be used to help offset costs of training sessions of its nonpaid leaders.

Leaders also will be on hand Saturday to provide information for those interested in breast-feeding.

STONE GROUND WHEAT BREAD
(makes four loaves)

- 4 c. very warm water
- 1/2 c. brown sugar
- 4 t. salt
- 1 stick butter
- 4 c. whole wheat flour
- 2 eggs
- 2 packages yeast
- 10-12 c. unbleached white flour

Melt butter in hot water in large bowl. Add brown sugar, salt and whole wheat flour. Add yeast and four cups unbleached white flour. Mix in eggs. Add enough flour to make pliable and elastic. Place in an oiled bowl and turn dough over so that oil

is spread evenly over dough. Cover and let rise one hour.

Turn out and knead 10 minutes. Shape into four loaves and let rise until double in bulk, two hours or more. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes. Start bread in cool oven.

OATMEAL BREAD
(makes three loaves)

- 4 c. boiling water
- 3 c. rolled oats
- 7 1/2-8 c. unbleached white flour

- 2 packages yeast
- 2 T salt
- 4 T oil
- 1/2 c. molasses

Pour boiling water over oatmeal in a large bowl and cool. Stir in two cups flour and the yeast. Allow to rise uncovered until double in bulk. Punch down and work in salt, oil, molasses and enough flour to make a stiff dough. Turn out on a board and knead, adding flour as needed to

make a firm, pliable dough—about 10 minutes.

Divide the dough into three equal pieces and form into loaves. Place in greased pans and let rise uncovered until double in bulk, two hours or more. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 to 60 minutes.

CINNAMON-RAISIN BREAD
(makes three loaves)

- 2 c. milk
- 1 stick butter
- 1/4 c. sugar
- 3 t. salt
- 2 packages yeast
- 2 eggs
- 6-7 c. unbleached white flour

- 2 c. raisins
- 1 1/2 t. cinnamon

Combine milk, butter, sugar, salt and cinnamon in a saucepan. Heat until the butter melts; then cool until lukewarm. Add four cups of flour and yeast. Mix well. Beat in eggs and raisins. Stir in additional flour until dough is too hard to mix by hand; then turn onto board and knead in remaining flour. Let rise one hour.

Punch down the dough and knead about 10 minutes. Divide into three loaves and let rise until doubled—two hours or more.

Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes.

New people are moving to Canton every day. They come from Westland, Detroit, Dearborn or as far away as California and New York.

Getting acquainted with the facilities that a new area has to offer is a real task for anyone. One thing people with children ask about immediately is medical services. Where's the nearest hospital? Where can I find a family doctor?

I came across a service offered for children at a cost everyone will appreciate.

Northwest Screening Clinic in Northville Township is off Sheldon Road between Five and Six Mile roads. This is a free clinic for residents of Wayne County up to 21 years of age.

The clinic is run by the Public Health Nursing staff. The screening takes one to two hours and includes testing of hearing, vision, development, height, weight, temperature, pulse, respiration and blood pressure. They also take a blood test for anemia and a diabetes.

The nurses can give immunizations. If any abnormalities are found, the child is referred to a physician.

For children entering school for the first time, a medical form is required. The staff is qualified to handle these forms. However, they cannot fill out the forms for sports activities.

They do not diagnose. This is a screening process. Included on the staff is a hearing and vision technician and a lab technician.

The clinic is open the second and

fourth Tuesday of each month. Appointments must be made in advance by calling the health department, 729-2211.

They will send you any necessary information, including directions to the clinic. They also will answer any further questions.

Ch. 56 auction nets record-breaking total

"The merchants' response to our auction call was wonderful," said auction manager Hiney Friedman. "And we'd also like to thank our thousands of volunteers whose ongoing efforts insured our success."

Couple's view of Club Med

Nude bathing, simple accommodations, fantastic food, cosmopolitan people—that's what we heard about Club Méditerranée's Fort Royal on Guadeloupe. As a fairly conservative couple in our 30s, we were intrigued as well as somewhat apprehensive.

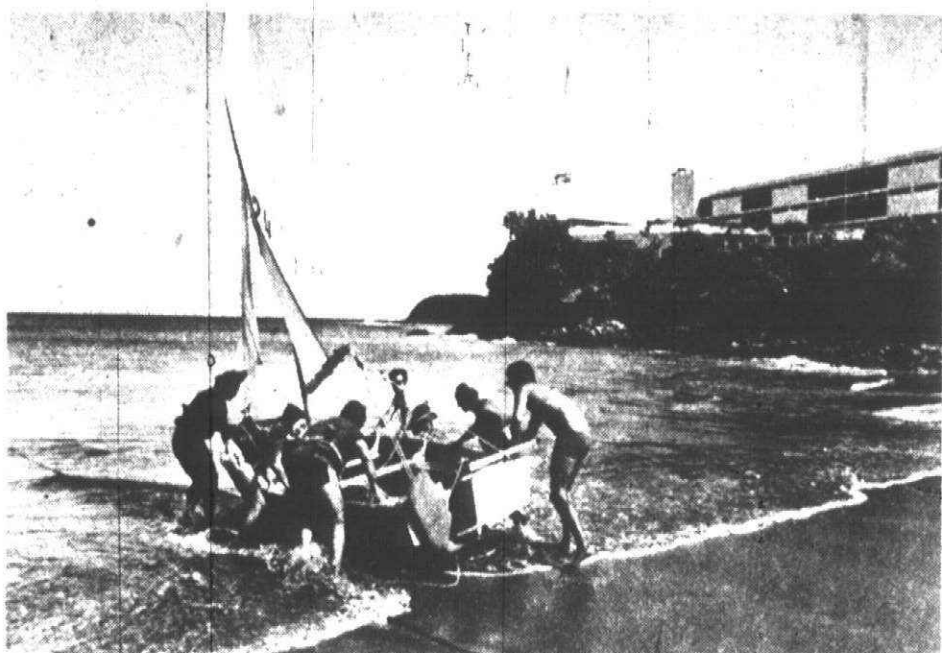
And, since we were leaving three children home with a sitter, we weren't interested in sharing every waking moment with other people's children, though we knew Fort Royal ran a "mini club."

As it turned out, only a handful of children were there during the first week in March, although vacation weeks, we were told, it fills up with youngsters.

ACCOMMODATIONS—first, Singles and couples without children are housed in simple bungalows built into the hillside or overlooking the ocean—possibly the most romantic place we've ever stayed.

Families and others who choose can stay at the more traditional hotel—the scene of dinner and evening activities.

Daytime activities range from nude bathing at the far end of the beach to yoga, water skiing or tennis—with each skill (except the bathing) taught by a trained instructor or "GO."



Late afternoon sailing is a favorite activity at Fort Royal.

Pick-up games of bocci ball, volleyball, water polo and basketball are on-going. Archery and tennis tournaments are held each week, and one day is set aside as a sports day with the club divided into two teams for competition.

No pressure is on anyone to participate. For many, the day consists of walking the beach, playing backgammon, or lying in the sand listening to recorded concerts played twice

daily, after lunch and at sunset. **MEALS HIGHLIGHT** everyone's day.

It is difficult to choose among the fresh fruits, cheeses, yogurt-filled crepes, brioche, croissant or standard ham and eggs offered each morning.

Lunch is spectacular with nearly 100 hot and cold dishes ranging from grilled lamb chops, shish kebab and native hot vegetables to cold meats, salads, fresh fruits and a wide assortment of pastries.

Eight around the table for dinner could bring you face to face with a woman doctor from London, Ont., a computer specialist from Montreal, a model from Germany, a newly married couple from Cincinnati or sports-loving grandparents out of New York.

EACH EVENING the Fort Royal staff presents entertainment: From a musical review to a French farce to a limbo artist and native steel band.

A live band is featured early evening. After midnight the discotheque operates—if you can stay awake to enjoy it.

Although bathing suits and shorts are all you see during the day, by evening there is more diversity. Blue jeans, short skirts, pants and long dresses are all worn, depending on your mood. For men, there are no ties or sport jackets, even on a so-called dress-up night.

Some dos and don'ts when traveling abroad

First the DON'Ts: •Avoid discussing politics; don't criticize the host country and don't brag about the achievements at home (just as you shouldn't be too hard with what you feel is wrong about the United States).

•Money (U.S. traveler's checks and cash) should be exchanged only at state-authorized banks and stores. You do a disservice to your friends or relatives and you violate the law if you do otherwise.

•Don't take photographs where a sign prohibits picture taking (railroad stations, bridges, factories).

•Don't travel without confirmed (and usually prepaid) reservations.

•If you want to read, take magazines (apolitical ones) and paperbacks, no hard covers, no bibles or other religious books.

•Don't expect people to be very talkative about their problems.

Now the DOs:

•If asked at the border, declare all money you possess (cash and trav-

eler's checks) because this will be the maximum amount you will be able to take out upon departure.

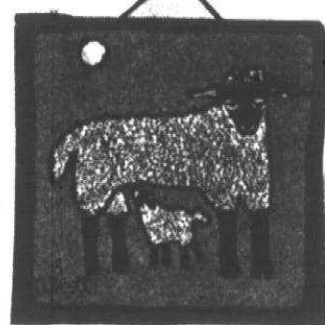
•Keep all receipts for money exchanged at authorized places to be able to prove the difference between the money brought in and taken out of the country you were visiting.

•Make sure about visa and money exchange regulations, which vary from one country to another. The consulates of each country or a knowledgeable travel agent will be able to advise you.

•Persons who are not yet American citizens (legally admitted aliens) will have to travel with a "Re-entry Permit" but in this case American authorities will not be in a position to assist them as they do U.S. citizens.

•You may take along small gifts (in noncommercial quantities, a notion defined only by common sense): ballpoint pens, double-edge razor blades, nylons, cosmetics are welcome but should be used with authorities only as a courtesy, not as a bribe.

Victory string runs to 10

Gutsy Canton stays on winning trail

Even when they seem like they're beaten, the Chiefs come alive and find some way to win a baseball game.

That's the way things have been going for Plymouth Canton in the past weeks as its victory streak increased to 10 games Monday afternoon with a come-from-behind 5-4 extra-inning win over Walled Lake Western.

This Western Six League victory, coupled with a Saturday afternoon doubleheader sweep over Brother Rice, raised the Chiefs' amazing record to 12-1 for the season—not including yesterday's conference battle with Waterford Mott.

"But you have to admire our kids—they play with guts."

Mark Perkins picked up his fifth vic-

tory without a defeat in going all nine innings. He struck out five and walked five.

Canton's eight-hit attack was led by shortstop Scott Collins who connected for three hits.

John Young and Britton knocked home Canton first two runs in the first and second innings as the Chiefs grabbed a 2-0 lead.

But Western came back with two runs in the third and single tallies in the fourth and fifth to take the lead.

IT WAS the same kind of story against non-league opponent Brother Rice in the second game of a Saturday doubleheader.

After Doug Smith shutout Rice 5-0 with a six-hitter in the first contest,

the Chiefs had to battle back again to pull out a 5-4 11-inning victory in the nightcap.

Reserve catcher Jeff Campbell was the hitting hero in this contest when he ended the game in the bottom of the 11th, blasting a 2-1 pitch over the leftfield fence for a solo home run.

Crissey was proud of his team's second-game performance.

"Our kids could have packed it up and settled for a split but they didn't quit."

Rice tied the score at 3-3 in the top half of the seventh inning to send the game into extra innings. Rice then went ahead with a run in the tenth, but the Chiefs came back in the bottom half of the inning as Steve Morman tripled home Collins to send the game to the 11th stanza.

Morman started on the mound and hurled the first six and two-thirds innings. Perkins came into relief in the seventh and worked through the tenth, pitching three and one-third innings. During that short stint, Perkins struck out six batters.

Sophomore Brian James came in and pitched the 11th inning for the Chiefs and sent down Rice in order. He was the recipient of the victory.

Rock batters blow chances

The four-game win streak of the Plymouth Salem baseball team ended Tuesday afternoon when the Rocks fell to Allen Park, 6-4, at the Jaguars' field.

It was a sad way to open the second-round of Suburban Eight League play, as the second-place Rocks saw their record slip to 5-3 in the conference and 7-8 overall.

Gilles took over the volleyball program three years ago. His squads finished second in the league in his first two years before winning the school's first crown in this sport last month.

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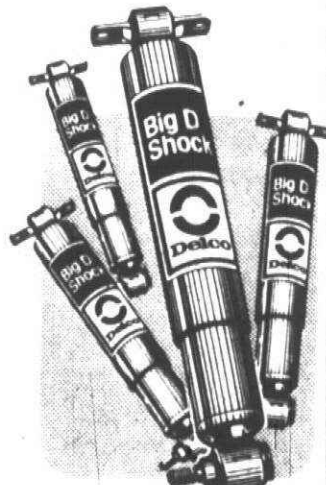
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Churchill wins relays Salem thinclads place 6th

A balanced scoring attack—16 points in the field events and 15 in the running portion of the meet—enabled Livonia Churchill to narrowly edge Livonia Stevenson last weekend and win the seventh annual Observerland Track and Field Relays.

The Chargers collected 31 points. Stevenson, 29, Redford Union, 25, Livonia Franklin, 19, and Farmington, 18, to round out the top five finishers. Sixteen teams competed.

Churchill's field-betting performance at Observerland was its second in as many years. The Chargers also won the title outright in 1974 and tied with Stevenson in 1973.

Although Churchill was heavily favored going into the meet, it had to battle adversity to claim the championship.

The Chargers were disqualified in the shuttle hurdle relay because a runner started his leg of the race before his predecessor had finished. The disqualification negated a four-point second-place finish.

And Vic DeFlorio, one of the premier quarter milers in the state, turned his ankle after running in the sprint medley relay and was unable to compete in the mile relay.

Consequently, the Chargers did not place in the mile relay.

Churchill, however, thanks to a solid showing in the field events and by winning the first two running events, piled up enough points to stave off Stevenson's challenge.

Even though Stevenson led Churchill 29-28 with only to pole vault to be completed, the Chargers were virtually assured of the championship because the Spartans had no vaulters remaining in competition while Churchill had all three.

When the Chargers finished third in the vault, the title was theirs.

"I told our kids we'd have to get points in the field events," said Churchill coach Fred Price, "and I think they did an exceptional job there."

The Chargers won the shot put and discus, placed third in the pole vault, fourth in the high jump and fifth in the long jump.

Price also said that he was surprised that his 880-yard relay team was able to edge Stevenson's for the gold medal.

"In our 880 relay, we had every kid run their best so far this season on that kind of track (cinder)," said Price. "That was the best performance of the day."

"All four kids (Mark Scarrantino,

Austin Ryan, Steve Coleman and Delorio) just ran their hearts out."

Four new meet records were set during the day-long program.

The Churchill trio of Issa Khoury, Dave Kietly and Mark Dewitt combined for a distance of 402 feet 11 inches in the discus.

The quartet of Sean Palmer, Vic Wietecha, Paul LaChance and Tobin Jones, also from Churchill, set a new mark of 18:17.8 in the four-mile relay.

Bob Babits, Paul Babits and Tony Raines collectively cleared 38 feet in the pole vault and Don Garoff, Scott Bicknell and Mike Petsch totalled 18 feet two inches in the high jump.

"We were only six points out of first place and four out of second so I was very pleased with the way our boys performed," said RU coach John MacKenzie. "We got everything we could."

Stevenson coach Paul Holmberg also said he was generally pleased with his team's effort.

"I think our distance kids did exceptionally well, especially Bill Wilkin," said Holmberg. "He had a 4:28 split in the four-mile relay and then came back in the distance medley with a 4:29 mile."

"There wasn't any distance kid at the meet who had two races as outstanding as that," the Stevenson coach said.

"Churchill overcame two big things (disqualification and injury) and still won, so I think that showed they had power," Holmberg said.

Price went even further in his assessment. "This is the most balanced, most powerful team I have ever had."

All told, six teams won at least one event at the relays—Churchill, Stevenson, RU, Garden City West, North Farmington and Plymouth Salem.

Two months ago the Observer sports section announced that the Plymouth-Canton community was chosen to host national Mickey Mantle and Sandy Koufax baseball tournaments.

These tournaments will be played during the first weekend in August as 22 teams from all over the midwestern and eastern parts of the country come to town.

I was invited to an organizational meeting last Thursday night there township, city and school officials were present to listen to the proposals of the tournament directors.

All three government municipalities, the City of Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Canton Township, have been asked to donate about \$250 of food for refreshment stands plus some additional funds for making banners to welcome the guests.

The schools have been asked to help maintain the three baseball dia-

monds—which is something of a first if it ever gets done.

The tourney directors have permission to put scoreboards on all three fields, add dugouts to the Central facility, and in general, help make each diamond look like Tiger Stadium.

Now one might wonder why this community is being asked to shell out some money to make baseball field look so extravagant for a tournament when the city, township and school funds could go elsewhere.

The tournament committee is going first class with this activity and they admit it.

But the small donations this community gives to the tourney will pay off in the long run.

I feel its very important that this tourney is run in a first-class manner for the possibility of it becoming an annual event would help this community in a strong economic way.

I can remember accompanying the Canton baseball team on one of its Cincinnati spring training trips three years ago.

On that trip, I remember spending \$50 for food and another \$20 for souvenirs during the five-day excursion.

Now just imagine 22 teams, with 15 players, and a parent to match, on each squad. That means close to 600 people will visit Plymouth-Canton.

Multiply that number by \$50 spending money for each person during the four-day weekend. Now you're talking at least \$30,000 put back into the community's stores, shops and restaurants.

And this doesn't even count the hotel expenses that will be shared by the Plymouth Hilton and Mayflower.

So don't be discouraged if the local municipalities and schools are donating funds for three baseball diamonds, refreshments and banners.

In the long run, it's for the good of the community.

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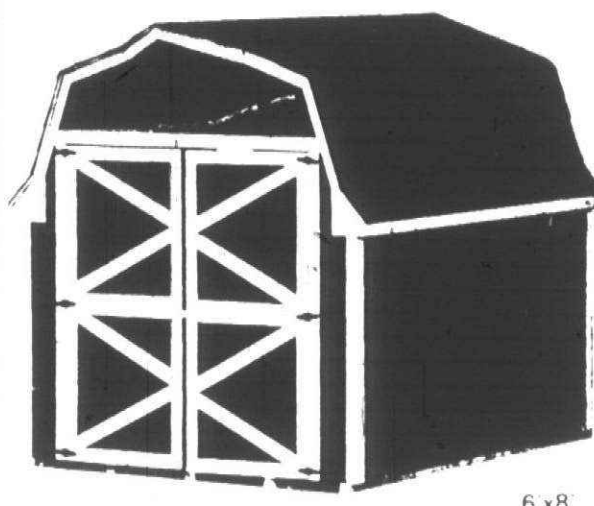
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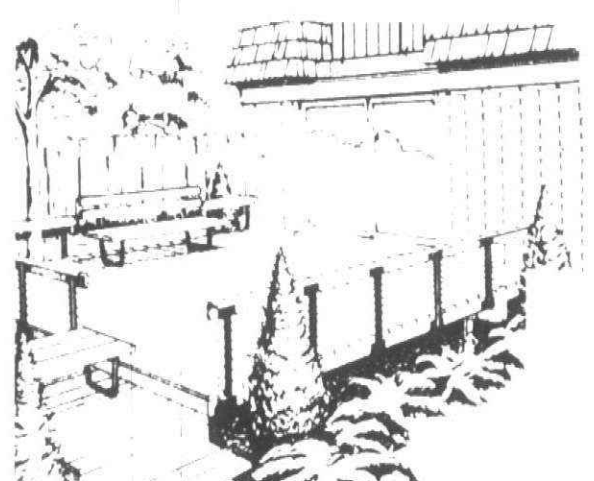
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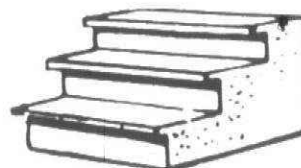
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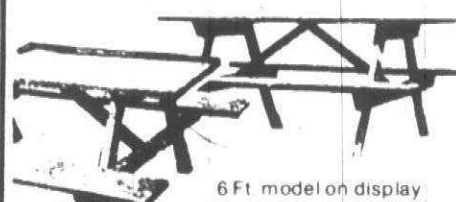
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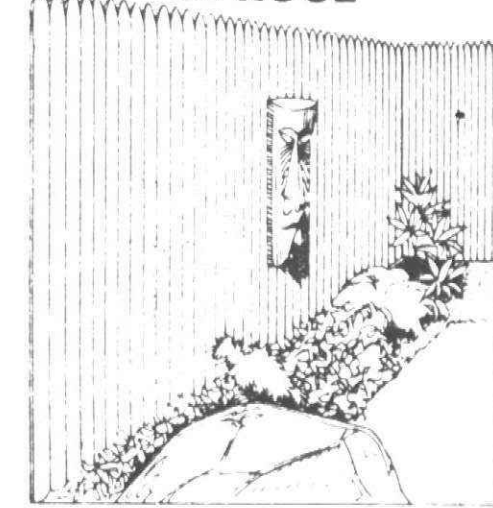
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Rock girls win tri-meet

Schipani scored from third base on a wild pitch to tie the score.

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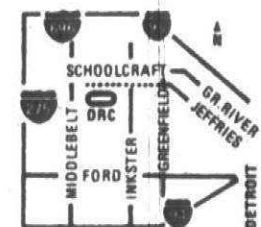
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Salem golfers whip Canton
