Social Services may cut aid to family living in a tent

Two weeks ago, Joe and Elsie Pierce lost their rented home when a suspicious fire consumed it. Now the couple may lose their twice-a-month check for \$321.50 from the Michigan Department of Social Services.

John Igrisan, district manager of Social Services, said that unless the couple files for a fair hearing with the

agency, they have received their last government assistance check. Agency department heads are apparently disturbed about published comments from Pierce appearing in local and Detroit newspapers. If it's true that Pierce is disabled and unable to work, Igrisan said, he should not be receiving Aid for Dependent Children

of Unemployed Fathers (AFDC), but either supplemental security income or disability income from the Social Security Administration.

Pierce claims he is unable to work because he has iritis, an inflammation of the eye, and suffers loss of breath from heart trouble.

"As far as our record goes, he's physically able to work," Igrisan said.

He said Pierce "has been known to the department" since 1969.

STATEMENTS attributed to Pierce in newspaper articles, such as charging for pony rides and receiving a pension, caused the agency to cancel all payments until a hearing is held to determine if eligibility requirements have been violated.

"On Oct. 11 his case is closed with this department unless he files for a rehearing," Igrisan said. "If he doesn't file, he's got his last check from us."

In a Detroit newspaper article, Pierce reportedly said the fire started while he and his sons were running a pony ride concession at the Wayne County Sheriff's Fair. Pierce now says his sons were running the exhibit to pick up spending money used to feed the horses boarded at the farm. But the Social Services manager says it may represent unreported income earned by Pierce.

"He's going to have to prove some things to us," Igrisan said. "In the paper he said he had a pension. If so, how much and for how long, and where is he getting it from?"

"If he asks for a fair hearing we

Recall fight financed heavily by developers

Some of the biggest contributors to the campaign to fight the recall movement this summer were out-of-town landowners and builders who operate in Canton Township.

Following campaign filing requirements, Supervisor Harold Stein, Treasurer Anne Bradley and Trustee Gene Daley have filed detailed lists of contributors to the anti-recall effort. The other side—the pro-recall forces—have not submitted a list of campaign contributors or expenses incurred in the recall effort.

In the final post-election report filed with the Wayne County Election Commission, the Citizen's Committee for Harold Stein reported that a total of \$2,320 was collected and \$1,305.83 was spent in defeating the recall.

Treasurer Bradley reports that she received \$250 in campaign donations and Trustee Daley reports he took in a total of \$125 to fight his recall.

If the money collected is any indication, Daley barely missed being recalled by 15 votes; Bradley was 66 votes shy of recall and Stein had the best margin with 109 more votes of confidence than recall votes.

LYNN LABELL, who headed up the Bradley-Daley recall, said she doesn't know if the recall forces have to file a financial statement. Campaign law states that any committee collecting more than \$200 must file a report of campaign contributions and expenses. If more than \$500 is collected, the list of contributors and expenses must be itemized.

Peter Gabbert, who headed the first-announced recall—against Stein only—said his group "received zero contributions" and ran off about \$20 worth of pro-recall literature "at a quickie printer."

"I wish to hell we did get contributions, it might've been the difference," He said that although both recall camps planned on a united effort, both groups went their separate ways.

"LaBell's group is basically Democratic and we're Republicans. We helped them out with their petitions but we wanted to oust the king, we wanted the quarterback off the team. They wanted the whole team out of there."

"I really don't know how much we collected," said Ms. LaBell. "You'll have to talk to our treasurer, Dee Bashor. The way we understood the law as long as you didn't collect \$500, you didn't have to file a form with the county."

"We didn't even have a name for our committee. I guess we just informally called ourselves 'People for Recall.' But if the county wants me to file a statement, I'll probably do just that. I'll have to do some checking with the people who worked on this."

Ms. LaBell said she's glad to be out of the political spotlight. "I'm getting the housework done for a change. I cut the grass on Saturdays instead of circulating petitions."

Ms. LaBell said her group held no fundraising events, as the Stein Slate fund did.

She doubts the pro-recall forces took in or spent more than \$200.

THE LARGEST CONTRIBUTOR to Stein's anti-recall coffers was the United Democratic Club of Canton (UDCC), a group headed by George Bradley, husband of the township treasurer.

Contributors of \$100 or more to Stein include the Stein Slate—\$126; Stanley Worth of Southfield—\$125; Doris Wilson, Asa Wilson and Joan Wilson DeSplender—\$100 from each (the Wilsons own land adjacent to the township hall site); Earl Rafferty of Plymouth—\$136; Stanley Wolak of Chelsea—\$100; landowner Ralph Burch of Canton—\$100; the 15th District Democratic Party—\$100; and builder Mark Dembs—\$100.

Other contributions came from Ed Boutros of Troy—\$50 (Boutros manages Canton's Harvard Square shopping center); Albert Feuring of Southfield—\$50; Howard Binkow of Farmington Hills—\$24; Aubrey Ettenheimer of Farmington Hills—\$68 (both Binkow and Ettenheimer are executives in the Republic Development Co.); Willis Dolen of Wayne—\$100; Ira and Margaret Dickey of Canton—\$50; and John and Janet Swalley of Canton—\$25.

Stein's committee filed two reports with the county—one 12 days before the election and another after the election.

DALEY RECEIVED a reported \$25 from Boutros and \$100 from the 15th District Democrats.

Bradley said she received \$25 from Boutros, \$25 from William and Florence Gilmore and \$100 from the 15th District Democratic Party.

Chamber makes push

Loosen sign restrictions

Canton business people will lobby for a more lenient sign ordinance in the township at tonight's planning commission meeting.

Free-standing ground business signs, now banned in Canton, will be permitted if a proposed revised sign ordinance is adopted. But business people want more concessions.

Bruce Phillips, architect of the existing strict sign law, said he decided to allow "low-profile" ground signs in the revised sign ordinance after hearing numerous complaints from the business community.

Independent businesses would be allowed to build a sign up to 6 feet high and 32 square feet under the proposed revised ordinance.

"It was put in at my suggestion," said Phillips, the township ordinance officer. "I think a low-profile sign meets business desires and it will satisfy the resident's aesthetic desires."

Frank McMurray, chamber vice-president, says the business community isn't opposed to controls on signs and landscaping but feels it has been denied a voice on a matter which has "a profound effect on business visibility."

The existing sign ordinance is being reviewed by the planning commission in an attempt to clear up confusing and contradictory legal language in it. This year's citizen sign and term committee concluded that the aesthetic purpose of the existing ordinance should be preserved but felt "a carefully structured document easily read and interpreted by legal and lay persons" was needed.

THE NEW PROPOSED sign law would require that a sign be set back two-thirds of the distance required for the building setback. McMurray argues that an establishment such as the Super Bowl would have to place a sign too far back from the road to do any good under the proposed ordinance.

One Canton business, Palace Fine Food, would like legal permission to construct a tall sign that could be seen from the I-275 expressway, Phillips said.

"We have no provision allowing that type of sign at all."

In the revised sign ordinance, shopping centers with six or more stores would be allowed one main free-standing ground sign up to 150 square feet in size, no higher than the height of the shopping center. Any signs already built would be allowed to stay under the grandfather clause, but could not be changed or moved without following the new requirements.

Flashing or moving signs would continue to be prohibited under the new ordinance. Lighted business signs

would have to be turned off between 11 a.m. and 7 p.m. if the business is not open, if the ordinance is approved as it

stands. McMurray said some chamber members oppose this, saying that a lighted sign improves night security.

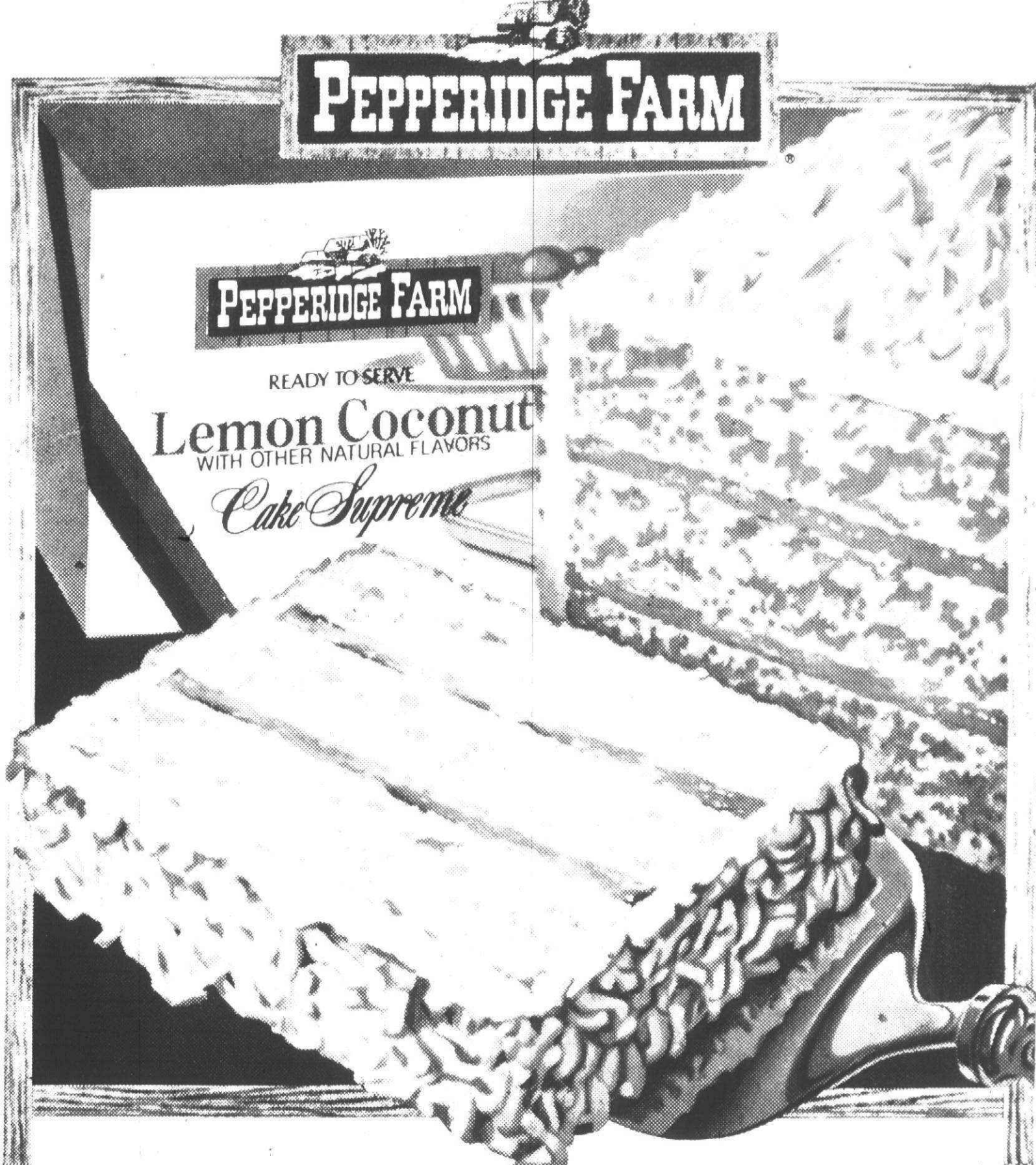

A grave trend unearthed

Personalized epitaphs on the rise

If you were looking for some of the latest fashions, it's very doubtful that you would visit an area cemetery and look at the cold, gray stones and grave markers.

Yet that's exactly where you will find them.

The old-fashioned stones bearing the age old "Rest In Peace," "At Rest" and the other somber thoughts are now giving way to what are being called "personalized stones." And the result is most surprising.

Among the latest fashions is to have the hobby of the departed etched out on the stone. For instance, if the person who has been called to his final reward was a hunter, a hunting scene is now being offered. It will serve as the background for the other data that is common on tombstones.

Likewise, if he or she was a traveler, the stone would depict a moun-

tain scene or some outstanding view of the country's best tour attractions.

"The personalized stone is just coming into its own," Mike Allen, owner of the Allen Monument Works in Northville, explained. "It started almost a decade ago and now is being used more and more."

The new styling is going far beyond picturing the hobbies and travels. It also depicts scenes from real life.

One of the finest examples of the trend was shown by the family of Mary Evans, who operated a bakery in one of the neighboring communities. When she passed away last year, the family insisted that the Evans Home Baking venture be produced on the stone. And that's how it reads in the cemetery.

"I had another case not long ago," Allen commented, "when I was asked to cut the picture of a banjo player on the stone because the departed was well known in country music down in Nashville."

THERE WAS ANOTHER teacher who had taught in a one-room schoolhouse for years. Her survivors wanted all the world to remember that. They had a picture of the schoolhouse cut into the stone.

One of the oddest came from a nearby community when the family of a boy who had been killed on a hunting trip wanted the picture of a gun and a simple statement "Gone Hunting."

Among the most elaborate Allen has done was for the Sheraton family. The departed was a great lover of cats. She had six of them. They are all on the tombstone in Howell.

Much of the new fashions can be traced back almost a decade when

Allen hit upon the scheme of recycling tombstones. Under this plan the face of the tombstone would be removed by means of a chain saw and carbon. Once the new flat surface was ready, they would place rubber over it and cut new words by use of a stencil.

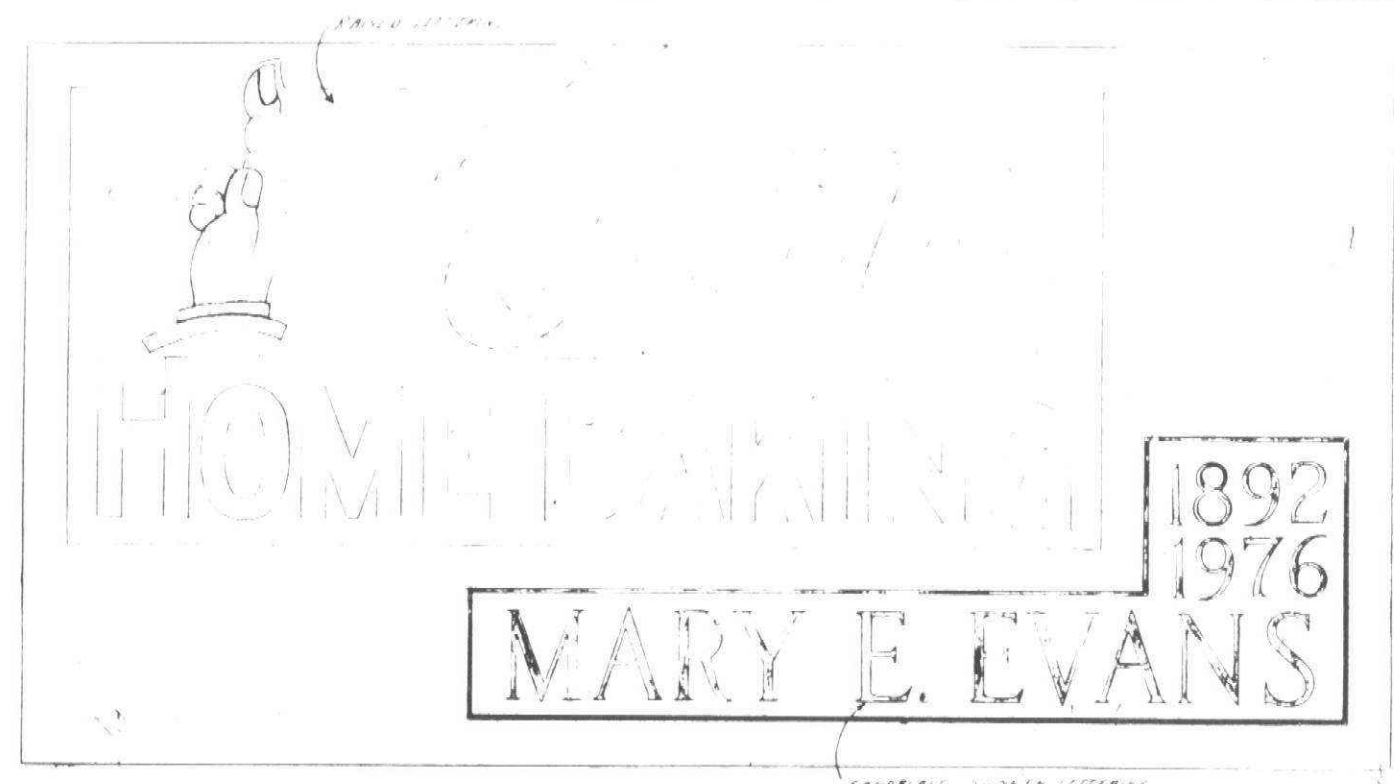
"Once we started cutting new letters," Allen commented, "we got the idea of personalized stones. This is the result."

He was the first to recycle tombstones and now is the first with the personalized stones.

But even the somber business of manufacturing markers to pay tribute to the departed is not without a few smiles along the way.

"Would you believe that I have changed the tombstone of a woman in this vicinity four times. She has been married that often and with each marriage she came in to have the name changed."

Yes, even our cemeteries are now being caught up in fashion changes.

Longtime resident dies

Venita Adams, a longtime resident of Plymouth, was buried Friday in her hometown in Riverside Cemetery.

Funeral services for Mrs. Adams, 96, were held in Schrader Funeral Home with the Rev. Samuel F. Stout of the First United Methodist Church of Plymouth officiating. She died Sept. 30 in St. Petersburg, Fla.

Because Mrs. Adams felt her roots were in Plymouth, she never sold her home on Joy Street in the City. Because of the climate, though, she built a small home in Florida 24 years ago. She had just spent three weeks in Plymouth recently, visiting her cousins Norma Cassidy and Edna Taylor, and a close friend, Irene Shaw.

Both of her parents had belonged to Plymouth pioneer families. Her mother, Frank Libby Baker, was born in 1854 on the 80-acre fruit farm on the corner of Beck and N. Territorial Roads.

Mrs. Adams' father, John Adams—brother of Dan Adams—was of the Westfall and Adams families. Their father was one of Plymouth's earliest inn-keepers. The Plymouth Historical Museum has a picture of their old hotel on the northwest corner of Main Street and Ann Arbor Trail with the Adams name at the top of the building. A stage coach and horses stand in shown in the front of the inn, waiting for passengers and mail.

Mrs. Adams' father, in knee breeches and barefooted, is the little boy in the foreground of that picture. Mrs. Adams was born in 1881.

People's attitudes about handicapped improving

Richard Stone thinks people have changed their attitudes about the handicapped a great deal in the last year, but they still have a long way to go.

Stone, a Plymouth resident, has just been re-appointed to the Michigan Commission on Employment of the Handicapped, an advisory group selected by the governor.

Is barrier-free law too strict?

The Barrier Free Design Law aimed at providing equal access for handicapped persons needs to be amended to make it less restrictive on businessmen and builders, State Sen. R. Robert Geake reported to a Plymouth audience Friday.

Geake (R-Northville), whose 14th Senate District includes Plymouth, spoke to a joint meeting of the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce and Rotary Club of Plymouth at noon Friday in the Mayflower Meeting House.

Geake is urging the Senate to approve amendments he has co-sponsored to make the legislation less restrictive. The bill now is before the state affairs committee of the Senate.

PASSAGE OF THE measure is needed, he stressed, "to meet the needs of both the handicapped and employers in Michigan."

The Barrier Free Design Law, passed in 1974, was designed to assure equal access and facilities for the handicapped in public buildings but has been criticized by some for its inflexibility.

"No doubt, the law has produced some very good results," said Geake. "There certainly are many more facilities available available to the handicapped now than prior to its enactment."

"Unfortunately, it also is proving to have some very bad results. We have learned, for example, that the law is simply being too stringently enforced—to an almost ludicrous extent in some cases. It is also turning out to be costly and, as a consequence, is creating a deterrent to business expansion in our state."

Geake noted the main problem with the law involves requirements for existing buildings which are undergoing remodeling or expansion.

"We simply cannot go on allowing rigid requirements to hamper our efforts to encourage employers to hire more workers by making it too costly for them to remodel or do so. And, we cannot go on discouraging, in effect, service industries from expanding their facilities and contributing to the growth of our state's economy."

GEAKE'S AMENDMENT would ease the remodeling requirements for existing buildings.

To earn his living, Stone works in the employment office of Michigan Bell Telephone Company. His job fits in nicely with his volunteer duties on the commission.

"I was asked to take the commission seat several years ago when Bell started a major program to hire the handicapped," he said. "It was a pioneering effort on the company's part, and I had a personal interest."

Although the commission has no legal authority, it does advise matters concerning the handicapped.

It also throws its weight behind programs and legal efforts which will bring handicapped people into the mainstream of society.

SINCE FIRST joining the commission, Stone said, he has had a chance to put his ideas about hiring the handicapped to work—both at Michigan Bell and at other companies.

Part of his duties consist of attending seminars at business around the state and telling other employers what he knows about handicapped people as workers.

"I'm lucky that Bell lets me attend the other companies as part of my job. It allows me to tell others what our experiences have been and answer some of the more common questions."

Stone said one of his most difficult tasks is getting employers to make distinctions among the handicapped rather than lumping them all together.

"In a lot of people's minds, when you mention handicapped, they think of the most severe cases. They don't understand that the definition can include alcoholics, ex-drug users and any number of other people with some kind of disability. Many employers psych themselves out before they give the handicapped a chance."

Stone said he tries to get employers past their bad images and to stop them from worrying about the problems that might occur by putting stress on positive experiences he has had and been informed of.

But in order for any company to have a good handicapped employment program, he feels, there has to be a commitment from the top down.

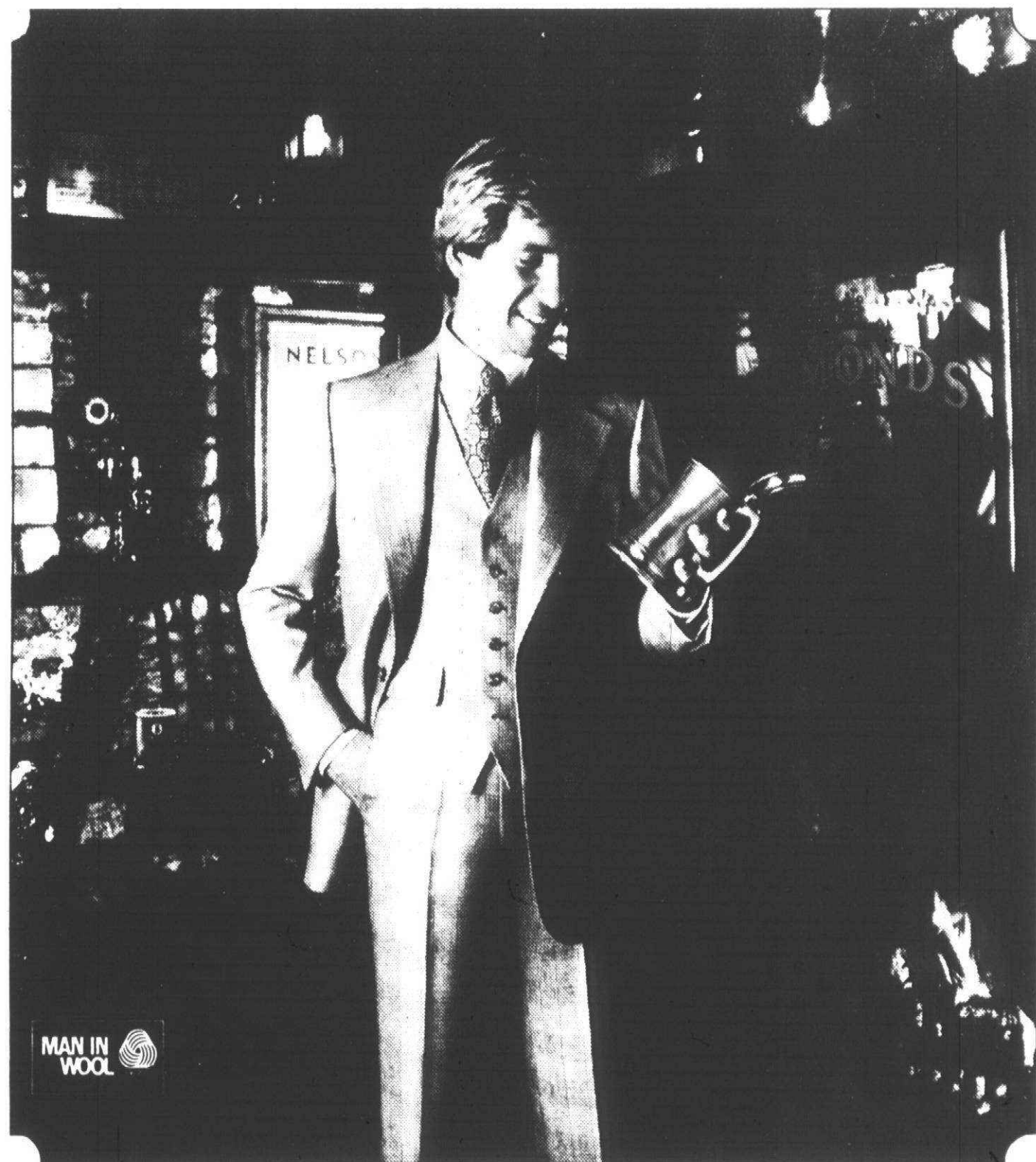
"There is just no way that one person can keep a program active. The upper level management has to set the tone and style and be the example for those who work under them."

In areas other than employment, Stone said, the commission has been able to make a good deal of progress in the years he has been on it.

"We have seen a lot of good things happen, particularly at the legislative level. The commission is interested making transportation available to the handicapped, more adequate housing open to them, along with more comprehensive civil rights."

"You might say that this year has been the year of the handicapped, and I feel good about what's been done. But we still have a lot to do."

Schools brace for budget, censorship talk

An operating budget balanced at \$25½ million will be presented for final adoption to the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education at tonight's (Monday) meeting.

The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Little Theater of Plymouth-Canton High School, 8415 Canton Center Road just south of Joy Road.

The school board also is expected to take final action on a policy to censor school newspapers, to take action on a resolution concerning lack of sidewalks in residential subdivisions, and to hire a coordinator for the talented and gifted education program.

During the early portion of the meeting, trustees will hear a presentation from the secretarial association which is negotiating a contract for secretaries in the individual school buildings. Trustees also may take action on raising the compensation paid to members of the school board.

PUBLIC HEARINGS have been held on operating budget, with the most recent one being Oct. 5.

To come up with a balanced budget, the following cuts have been made from the original budget document: instructional supplies, \$110,000; utilities, \$40,000; special education, \$25,000; insurance, \$20,000; athletics, \$10,000; the PEPSII management-by-objectives program, \$10,000; and \$5,000 from the following—warehouse, talented and gifted program, transportation, adult education, and legal services.

DISPOSITION OF land owned by the school district also will be discussed tonight.

The district owns a 15-acre site for a future school on Powell Road in Canton. Because an expected subdivision at Cherry Hill and Canton Center Roads hasn't developed, the administration now believes the site may be less valuable for a future school.

Canton Supervisor Harold Stein has contacted school officials about the possibility of buying the 15 acres or acquiring it by trading another site the township owns which might be suitable for a school.

Canton now owns 60 acres to the east of the school district's 15 acres, and has options on 20 acres on the west side.

The administration also will ask the board for direction on whether to dispose of a sites on Barchester and Proctor Road.

Also coming before the board is a proposal to swap parcels with Richard Lewiston in Sunflower Subdivision, Canton, to allow for construction of a public walkway once a school is built for elementary pupils in that subdivision.

A REPRESENTATIVE of the Plymouth Canton High student newspaper, The New Media, will be addressing the board about the proposed censorship policy.

Towards the end of the agenda, the board is expected to give final approval to a new censorship policy which provides for a review panel and specified appeals procedure on any questionable materials to be published.

Trustees also will be discussing a change in board pay to allow \$35 per meeting at a maximum of 52 meetings per year. The change is being proposed because of a change in the state school code.

The proposed policy on board pay doesn't actually mention the \$35 per meeting payment, but states trustees will be paid based on the maximum allowed by state school code.

THE CANTON CHAMBER of Commerce has appointed Harold Fischer and Clifford McClumpha to represent the township in talks with Plymouth Community Fund officials about Canton's possible entry into the fund.

Chamber officials in Canton would like to see the dental and optical programs at the Plymouth-Canton high schools, presently offered by the PCF to Plymouth students only, extended to Canton students.

One month ago, Canton Township board members voted unanimously to notify the United Foundation that Canton wished to be released as a member community. The reason, according to Harold Stein, township supervisor, is that UF money isn't coming back to the community.

If the Plymouth Community Fund decides to reject Canton's offer, the township will set up its own community fund, Stein said.

School secretaries still steaming

Angered and frustrated after six months of fruitless bargaining, members of the Plymouth Secretarial Association (PSA) are threatening to take their gripes directly to the board of education tonight (Monday).

The PSA represents about 65 school secretaries throughout the Plymouth-Canton district. According to Louise Gates, president, the association is fed up with the administrations stalling tactics. The secretaries have been working without a contract since June.

"We are going before the board to see if we can hurry up the contract settlement and to let the board know how we feel," she said.

Mrs. Gates said that there has been

no progress in the bargaining talks, and the association and the school board negotiator are "farther apart than ever."

"We would like to know just how long this can go on. We meet at least once a week and we're worse off than when we started."

The major dispute revolves around wages, she said. But other issues are dental coverage, and cost of living adjustments.

WALTER BARTNICK, a new negotiator hired by the district to deal with non-teaching staff, acknowledges that the situation is far from good.

"We are at a standstill," he said,

"but I'm optimistic. I've never seen a contract yet that didn't get settled eventually."

Mrs. Gates, however, does not share the bright outlook. "We don't have a dental plan, and the custodians and bus drivers have had one for some time."

"The board was supposed to give us a retroactive pay raise for 1976, and it still hasn't been done. The other workers all get cost of living, and we think we should."

"We don't want to be unreasonable, but we don't want to be paid below everyone else."

Bartnick brushed aside Mrs. Gates's

complaints. He said the secretaries' salaries were in line with other districts.

"I've researched this and checked into what surrounding school districts are paying their secretaries. And we are competitive. We're not the highest and we're not the lowest. But we are competitive."

He also said that comparing one bargaining unit against another didn't impress him. "Every bargaining group has different needs at different times. I can't negotiate with secretaries and talk about custodians and bus drivers. We have our proposal on the table and we'll have to work with it."

Canton's entry in PCF weighed

Residents looking forward to the Plymouth Community Fund taking Canton Township under its wing are in for a bit of a delay.

That's the word from L.D. Evans, president of the PCF board of directors, who said a decision probably will not be announced until the current fundraising drive is over.

The board of directors is scheduled to discuss the issue at its monthly meeting at 8 p.m. Thursday at the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce building on Wing Street.

"There are a lot of questions that remain to be answered," Evans said. "We're taking a long look at the ramifications of joining with Canton rather than going into this thing blindly."

Some of the things Evans said the Plymouth Community Fund will look into concerning the acquisition of Canton are:

- Needs and activities of the people in Canton.
- Types of problems in Canton a community fund would want to direct itself to.

*An estimate of the amount of dollars Canton would bring in.

could clarify some things as to his eligibility. How about the horses, how about the pension? These are things that jeopardize his assistance."

EARLIER THAT day, Pierce was loading clothes donated by the Salvation Army into the family station wagon. He said the family has decided to move to a farmhouse on five acres in Standish.

"Some colored guy read the Free Press article and offered to let us use the place if we get it fixed up," Pierce said. "I come from that area (near Bay City) so I don't mind, but the rest of the family doesn't want to live there. But, for the time being it looks

like that's where we'll live. I'm leaving the horses with a friend in South Lyon until we get set up there."

While Pierce was talking, his 15-year-old son, Tommy, was riding a horse on the grassy median along Michigan Avenue. Junior high administrators talked to Pierce last week about not sending his son Tommy to school.

Bruce Phillips, Canton ordinance officer, says he'll believe the Pierces are moving when he sees it. Two attempts to place the family in motels for temporary shelter were turned down by the family. An inner-city motel was too dangerous, Pierce said, and a Dearborn motel offered for one weekend was too small.

The Stroller: Labor's pendulum

Every time he picks up one of the public prints and reads that some group is threatening to strike unless its demands for more wages, shorter hours or additional fringe benefits are granted. The Stroller shudders to think how far the labor pendulum has swung during his entrance into the workaday world.

He was stunned several weeks ago when the garbage collectors in Detroit were granted a raise that boosted them above \$8 an hour plus fringes. But the crowning point came this week when the teachers in a neighboring community complained that a six-hour day was too long with only a 15-minute break.

AS HE POURED OVER these words, The Stroller couldn't help recalling that in his younger days he worked 13 hours a night in the steel works and got only a half-hour break for lunch. And those nights, as he remembers them, were long and weary.

But when garbage collectors can demand—and get—more than \$8 an hour, plus fringes, it seems that the labor pendulum has swung as far to the right as it was to the left years ago.

It so happened that when The Stroller learned of the \$8 rate for garbage collectors, he was in the company of a young general manager of a modern plant.

"What do you suppose that will do to our skilled employees? When unskilled labor can collect wages like that it is a

cinch that our skilled labor will demand more, and we can't afford it. That's why there is so much unrest today."

It seems almost unbelievable, but when The Stroller joined the labor force as a young high school dropout he became an apprentice in the machine shop of a large cement company and earned 55 cents a day. That's 5½ cents an hour! And every payday he drew an envelope containing \$7.60 for two week's work.

Even in his fourth and final year as an apprentice, The Stroller was paid only \$1 a day. Out of that he had to pay car fare from home to the plant and return and carry his lunch, too.

In those days, a half century ago, the going rate for machinists was 22½ cents an hour and 25 cents an hour if you worked the long night shift. As he elected to work on the night shift, he drew \$16.25 a week. And that was tops.

Then came his first taste of "big" money. One of his uncles was working in the Bethlehem Steel shops and making what he called "good" money. Each morning as he returned from work he stopped in to visit. And each morning he begged The Stroller to go down to the steel works and get in on the "big" money.

FINALLY, one morning he said, "I told them at the plant that you would be down today. So don't disappoint them!"

That afternoon The Stroller hired himself to the steel works and was stunned when the top man informed

him, "We are not hiring machinists. We are hiring machine hands. If you'd like to try, you can select any machine you want."

The Stroller selected a 24-inch motor lathe, and was breathless when he was taken out into the shop. It was seven stories tall and one mile long.

The superintendent stood by while The Stroller placed a piece of metal into the jaws of the lathe. Next he picked up a cutting tool that needed sharpening. When he asked the location of the grindstone, the superintendent took him over to a big wheel. But no sooner had The Stroller starting sharpening the tool than he was stopped and told to return to the office. His heart sank. He thought he had failed.

"When I saw you start to sharpen the tool," the superintendent said, "I knew you were not a novice. So, when can you come to work?"

Told that it could be next night, The Stroller then asked: "How much money will I get?"

"The rate will be on your time card when you check in," the big boss answered.

Anxiously awaiting the next night, The Stroller got the real surprise when he took the new time card out of the rack and read "Grade A, 48 cents an hour, plus piece work, plus bonus."

Imagine that! With the piece work and bonus he was a member of the top wage flight—and earning close to \$40 a week. He was among the elite.

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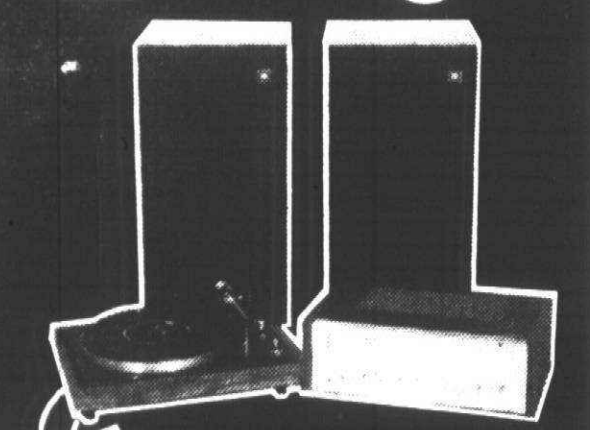
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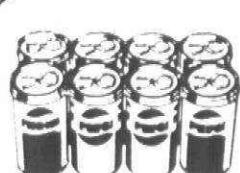
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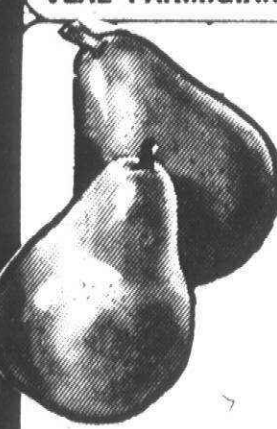
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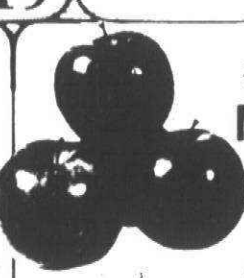
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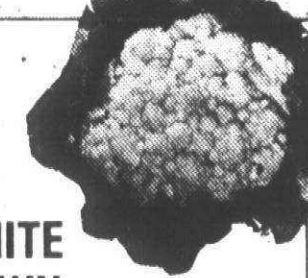
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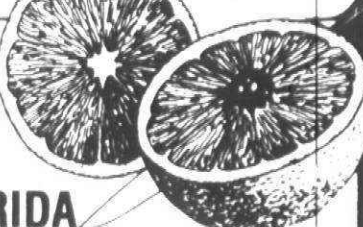
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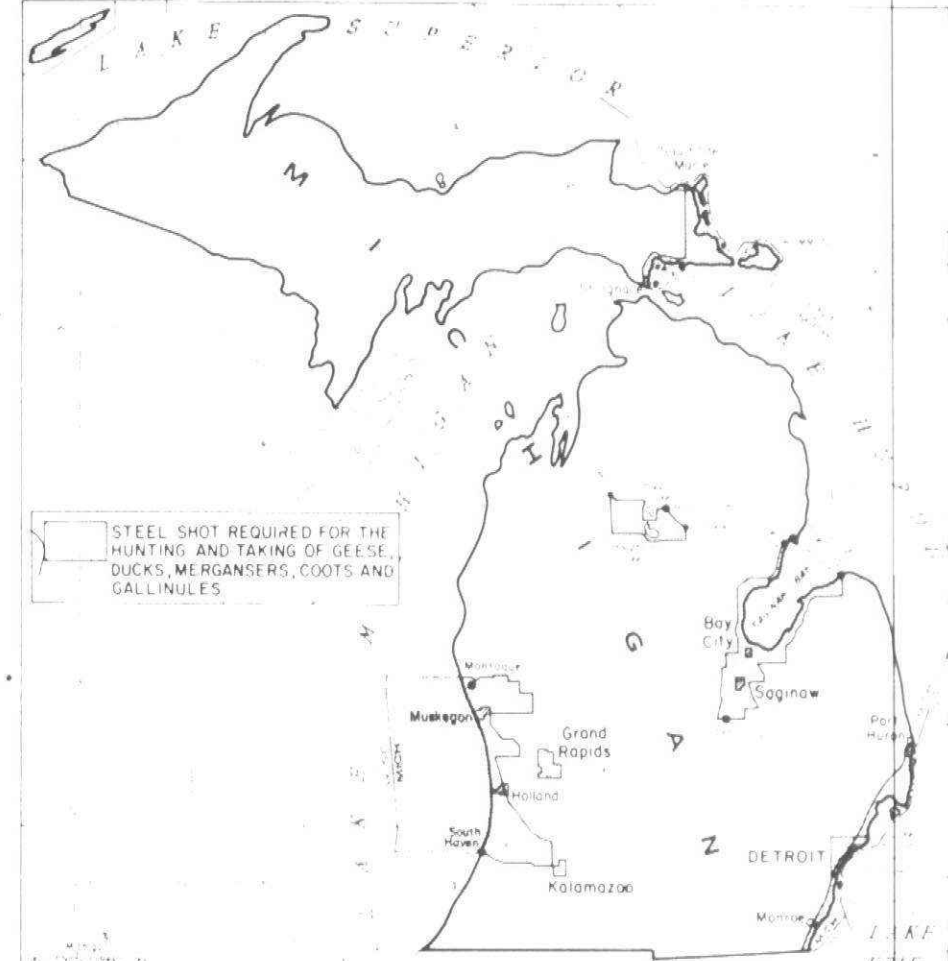
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Death at dusk's fate of season

Now that school has started, drivers are looking out for kids playing at dusk.

But there's another kind of traffic accident that occurs frequently at dusk in October through December—hitting deer.

And don't assume, because you live in the metropolitan area, that it only happens out in the boondocks.

Last year, says the state Department of Natural Resources, Wayne County recorded 16 car-deer accidents in which one person was killed and five injured, and Oakland County recorded 83 accidents with no human deaths but eight persons injured.

Altogether, Michigan recorded more than 14,000 traffic accidents involving deer last year with two human deaths and 862 injuries.

You'll never guess which counties recorded the most accidents involving deer, so I'll tell you: Kent (Grand Rapids), 543; Jackson, 501; Montcalm, 487; and Calhoun (Battle Creek), 485. All but Montcalm are metropolitan counties. All are in the southern half of the state.

"If you see a deer standing alongside the road," said David H. Jenkins, DNR wildlife division chief, "assume it will do the worst possible thing because it probably will. And the worst possible thing is jumping right through your windshield."

He adds, "When you see a deer, it is more than likely there are two or three more there. When you see one deer, assume there are more."

DUCK AND GOOSE hunters are required to use new steel shot in several Great Lakes flyways (see map), but the subject is still one of great controversy.

The state DNR has surveyed retail outlets and has found steel shot available. My duck hunting friend, C.O. Jones, did his own checking and found it's also expensive.

Steel shot runs \$8 to \$9 per box of 25 shells, some 40 or 50 per cent more than lead shot, C.O. adds. "I haven't found steel shot in 25 lb. bags for you reloaders. And once you roll your own hunters find the shot, we may still have difficulty obtaining loading data that will make our shots pattern, but not gouge our shotgun barrels."



Outdoors

HEAVY RAINS in recent weeks are producing superb mushroom crops, which present both an opportunity and a hazard.

"There are excellent eating varieties available," said Bill Mullendore, DNR staffer and avid mushroomer. "Trouble is, there are also many doubtful and downright poisonous varieties in many of the same places. It takes some knowledge and discrimination to select the right kinds."

Get a guide book, he advised, or consult an expert.

Two years ago, when southern Michigan had a similar wet fall and wild mushrooms sprouted in profusion, there were several poisoning deaths and many more cases of serious illness among persons who didn't know their mushrooms.

AN "ARCHEOLOGICAL Dig" is scheduled at the Oakwoods Metropark nature center near Flat Rock next Sunday, Oct. 16 from 12 noon to 4 p.m.

Park naturalists will demonstrate archeological procedures in a scientifically conducted dig in the park. Visitors may participate, so wear old clothes and shoes.

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DON'T BE AFRAID TO FACE THE TRUTH

Poor readers at Schoolcraft avoiding help

Some 500 students admitted to Schoolcraft College this year have identifiable reading problems. Yet, college officials, have discovered that only a handful will avail themselves of the school's reading center.

The center gives problem readers a chance to improve their skills. But a lack of space, manpower, money and the school's open admissions policy have limited the program's success.

"We have our share of problems here at Schoolcraft," said Earl Manery, coordinator of the reading program.

The college specifies no mandatory entrance requirements, even in the case of a student who has an identifiable reading problem. Instead, it is policy to have college counselors advise such students to make use of the reading center.

Manery said about 10 students may come down to center at the beginning of each term, but only three or four "stick it out."

"It's the old story," said Larry Ordowski, director of Liberal Arts: "You can lead a horse to water, but you can't make him drink."

Even though the reading center's doors are always open, and students get help free of charge, several hundred students who have problems refuse to go for help.

"There is still a stigma associated with being part of a remedial program," Ordowski said.

WHILE THE CENTER tries to offer students with problems as much individual attention as possible, it also offers "two skills-sharpening courses for the general campus population. Sixty-four students, not necessarily those included in the group of 500 with problems, are enrolled in a study skills course and 70 are taking a speed reading course offered by the program.

The study skills course, according to Manery, is "geared toward getting a kid through college." It emphasizes test-taking, note-taking and reading for content.

"The motivated student, the one who wants to succeed later on," according to Ordowski, is the target for the course.

Ordowski feels that the college has a limited obligation to prod enrollment in its remedial reading program. "As long as we have a program available, and it is published and advertised, the job is being done," Ordowski said.

MANERY DISAGREED. He said he preferred the "West Coast philosophy," referring to the State of California's approach to higher education.

Public community colleges and four-year colleges there have an open door policy, but they set requirements and standards for their students.

Ordowski feels, however, that the college already sets reasonable standards. SC courses require a "satisfactory high school background or basic

English with a minimum grade of 'C,'" he said. He did not specify what a "satisfactory high school background" was, however.

A panel commissioned by the College Entrance Examination Board and the Educational Testing Service, in a study of reasons behind an alarming drop in the level of entrance test scores, found that 11th-grade texts are being written at ninth- and tenth-grade levels.

EVEN IF STUDENTS who have ignored the reading center's opportunities changed their minds, the problem wouldn't end, say Manery and instructor Dumont (Rusty) Hixson. They cannot handle any more clients.

"With a two-man staff, we have more students than we can handle," Ordowski said. With a two-man staff, the program has had to rely

on audio-visual equipment, self-testing materials and a minimum of personal instruction.

"There's such a variety and diversity of levels and needs," Ordowski said, "The only way to multiply your efforts is with the hardware. You can only do so much, because you're spread so thin."

Manery said the reading center needed another \$40,000 and more space to do an adequate job. The center is presently spread through three classrooms, one of which is reserved for lectures.

HE COMPARED Schoolcraft's facilities to those of other community colleges across the state. "We're a matchbox compared to a battleship."

Even though many reading center staff and funding problems may be traced to the failure of two millage proposals, Manery said the program

has not received as much administrative backing as he would like.

"Philosophical difference are the greatest," he said. He said he was not fond of the open admissions policy, the college's lack of requirements and standards and a policy requiring the service center to conform to classroom load requirements to obtain funding.

He added that he did not like having to depend so heavily on "educational hardware."

"I'm flat against tape and TV. The relationship between the student and teacher is so important. When you lose that, you lose a lot in education," he said.

Ordowski, however, said he thought the program had received "more support from the top all the way down."

"I think we're moving steadily down the road."

'Valentino' bio tells lurid story

"Valentino" (R) is a bizarre movie. Difficult to classify in any category but odd. It is not a romance, not an accurate biography of the legendary lover of the silent screen, and not a historical piece that keeps people and events in perspective.

Rather, in typically outrageous Ken Russell fashion (Russell directed "The Music Lovers" and "Tommy" as well as the award winning "Women in Love"), the film focuses on the titillating and sensational aspects of Valentino's life and the lurid exploits of the movie colony to which he belonged.

Rudolf Nureyev as Valentino is a mixed blessing. He is exciting to watch—every movement, gesture and facial expression. He certainly adds lustre to the character of Valentino who began his career as a "dime-a-dance" partner for unscorted ladies.

But when he speaks, that's something else. Attempting to convey an Italian-American accent with a Russian accent smacks of parody. Similarly, the necessarily exaggerated acting style required in recreating scenes from silent movies contains a comic element that undermines serious intent.

THE STORY of Valentino's life is told in flashback segments by the women who knew him. As one might anticipate, the recollections give ample screen time to Valentino, the dark, smoldering lover.

Carol Kane plays his first wife, a bimbo who went from waitress to movie star in one year. Leslie Caron appears as the perverse silent screen star Nazimova, who tapped Rudy to play opposite her in "Camille." Michelle Phillips is alternately moody, vampish and hysterical as his second wife Natasha Rambova.

Russell exploits both the Valentino legend and its antithesis. The eroticism is there, but its nature, whether homo or heterosexual, is questioned repeatedly.

Valentino is shown dominated by Natasha (who is a lesbian or bisexual) and constantly defending his honor against a continuing barrage of insults about his manhood.

One of the most grotesque scenes occurs when Rudy challenges a newspaper reporter to a fight because of the reporter's mockery. The lean, sinuous Valentino/Nureyev waits in the ring wearing boxing shorts while formally dressed men and women dance around the arena. His opponent, about 70 pounds heavier, shows up in a suit and tie.

RUSSELL HAS a good feel for capturing crowd scenes. He reveals the meanness and hostility of the fight crowd with the same deftness that he shows the adulation of the crowds of women outside Valentino's home and the frenzied crowds of mourners filing past his bier.

The entire movie with its overdecorated sets, garish costumes and emphasis on perverse events is deliberately stagey and theatrical, as the film idol's life might have been.

Ken Russell is a director who revels in the fantastic and provokes extreme reactions. His "Valentino" is not definitive biography, but hyper-biography, the story of a person's life interpreted as a series of emotional highs.

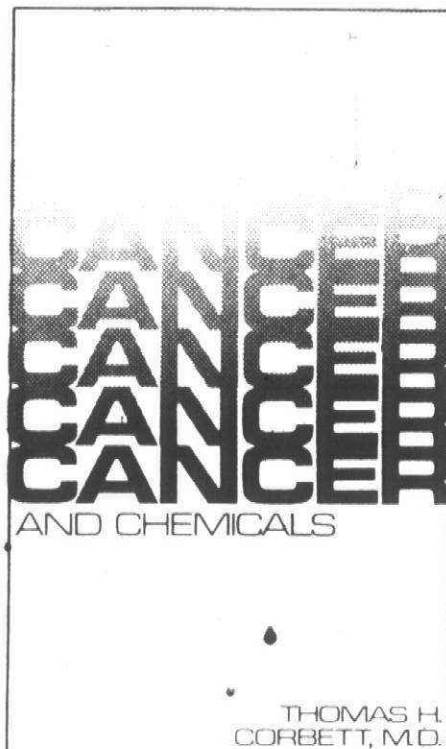
A Westland doc puts the knock on America's killer compounds

If you seek polluted peninsulas, look about you.

That is not quite Michigan's motto, but if the state continues on its chemical-strewn way, it may someday be the slogan we see on official state seals.

Our fish are tainted, our cows are sick, our air is often a grotesque shade of brown, and the evidence is that chemicals are killing us, according to a Westland doctor who has penned an informative but depressing book on the way the devilish compounds have eaten their way into our lives. "CANCER AND CHEMICALS," by Dr. Thomas H. Corbett, a staff physician at Wayne County General, tells the sad tale of how one of our nation's most hideous diseases—cancer—is caused by the massive numbers of chemicals we have devised to do things like make our bread stay fresher and our grass grow greener.

"The Big C," as Big C survivor John Wayne called it, wipes out nearly a half million Americans each year.



Currently, over a million persons are undergoing cancer treatment. Average medical bills for cancer patients hover around \$12,000.

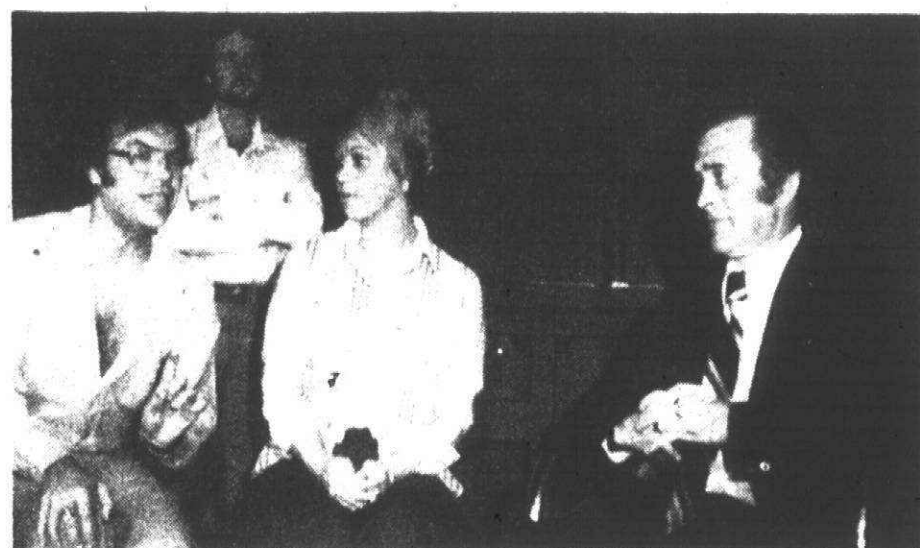

And, when it comes to cancer, white-frocked lab sleuths are finding additional proof each day that chemicals with names like urethane and polyvinyl chloride are the culprits. In fact, scientists now believe up to 80 per cent of all cancer is caused by chemicals, and approximately 25,000 new chemicals are invented each year. WHERE ARE THESE CHEMICALS? Everywhere, Dr. Corbett details how most of the things we do in our daily lives, from eating breakfast to sipping coffee at work to working itself (especially work itself), is bringing us that much closer to the grave.

Dr. Corbett brings excellent credentials to his book. Viewers of the recent PBS documentary on the Michigan PBB disaster will remember him as the soft-spoken doctor who tried to warn authorities before it was too late. Nobody listened.

Also scary is the fact that PBB takes up only one chapter in the book.

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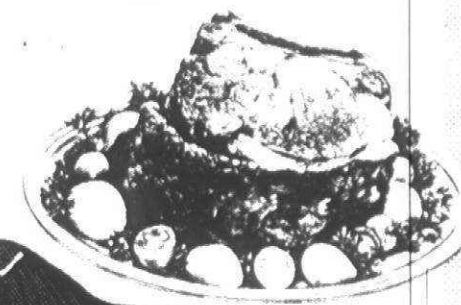
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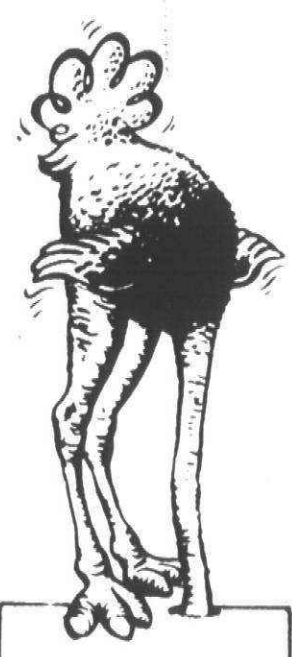
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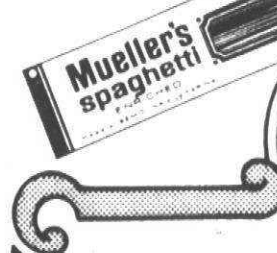
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Coach urges split of the CEP Band

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An idea from citizen to 'keep zoning honest'

The Butchers, Bakers and Candlestick makers have asked for suggestions regarding alternative uses for the property on the corner of Wing, Forest, and Harvey.

Alternatives have been suggested, but were either ignored or disregarded—such as a proposal for a new B-4 zoning. Well, I have a suggestion that would benefit all concerned parties. But first, let us review some recent events.

Ralph Lorenz was turned down on his request for a city financed parking structure where he would lease "air rights" for a motel. Lorenz lost out on his attempt to contribute a viable asset to the community.

The Dartmore Development Project, which is proposed for nearby property, has created a heated controversy on whether our zoning laws are being violated.

One area where we all seem to agree is the fact that his property needs to be developed.

It seems that the West Brothers property has not actually been sold, but is a contingent deal. So perhaps there is an investor or investors who would be willing to develop this property in a different manner. A three-story motel could be designed in such a way that it would fit the current zoning laws regardless of interpretation. It would provide a larger tax base for the city, it would be a viable business venture for investors, it would bring more business to the downtown area, and aesthetically conform to the surrounding area.

This is only a suggestion from a member of the citizens' group known as "Keep Zoning Honest."

Wilson PTA: Mrs. Alice Belanger, Wilson PTA president, read a statement requesting that, if Wilson School is closed, certain provisions be implemented involving student safety. PTA properties, etc.

Minutes: The minutes and synopsis of the special meeting of September 6, 1977, were approved as written, with Mr. Pridgeon abstaining.

Career Center: Resolution by Hierta and Akey to approve the Career Center final drawings, Phase II, and, further that the administration be authorized to secure bids for this project. Ayes: Akey, Davis, Hierta, Pridgeon, Scarr, Strom, Withers. Nays: None.

Recommended School Closings: The Board received an administrative recommendation to consider closing Wilson and Jackson elementary schools effective September, 1978. (Mr. Davis left the meeting at 9 p.m. due to a business commitment.) After discussion, the Board approved a procedure to begin communications with the school communities. It was stressed that this authorization does not mean that the Board has made a decision relative to the closing of schools. It is simply authorization to begin the communication process.

Task Force: Mr. Scarr noted that the Citizens Task Force on Declining Enrollment planned to hold a closed session on September 22 and he questioned this action. A majority of the Board agreed with Mr. Scarr's concerns, and it was agreed that the Board President will call the chairman of the Task Force and express the Board's feelings relative to this matter.

Board Hearing: 1) In reply to Mr. Scarr, Dr. Garver said he had requested the Community Education Services Director to investigate a matter relative to the fact that a Little League team was denied the use of a high school football field. 2) Mr. Scarr noted that Donald Tavarozzi has accepted an elementary principalship in another school district and he publicly thanked Mr. Tavarozzi for the years of service he has given to the former Nankin Mills District and to the Livonia School District. 3) Mr. Withers said he had received a suggestion that signs be posted in school parking lots and playgrounds that they are closed at 10 p.m. 4) In reply to Mr. Withers, Dr. Garver stated the Board will receive a report relative to a change in schedule at Lincoln. 5) Mr. Akey asked if all special education programs could be housed at one location. Dr. Garver replied that the Mandatory Special Education Law greatly reduces a school district's ability to centralize special education services, since these programs must be disbursed throughout a district. 6) Following Mrs. Strom's report on her attendance at a MAISL meeting, the Board asked that a letter be sent to State legislators urging them to support the inclusion of the amendments to S B 714 (unemployment compensation). 7) At the request of Mr. Akey, the Board was updated regarding maternity leave case. It was also noted that there is pending federal legislation affecting this situation. The Board asked that a letter be sent to our congressmen and the two Michigan senators apprising them of the impact on this district if the legislation is passed. 8) Mr. Pridgeon noted that the Board will probably hold its budget hearing the second meeting in October.

Adjournment: President Pridgeon adjourned the meeting at 10:14 p.m.

Rocks show Trenton who's the best in the west, 19-7

Home field advantage. What home field advantage?

Close game between two even teams. What close game between two even teams?

There was absolutely nothing close about the big Suburban Eight League televised game which saw the Plymouth Salem Rocks win the battle of the unbeaters with a thoroughly convincing 19-7 victory over Trenton Friday night on the Trojans field.

This win not only bolstered Salem's claim to fame in the state rankings with its spotless 5-0 record at the midway point of the season, but it also earned an outright first-place standing in the Sub 8 race—thanks to the help supplied by pesky Redford Union.

Redford Union tripped Dearborn, ranked third in the state, 19-14 Friday, to leave the Rocks alone and the still unbeaten squad in the conference race.

"I think we can definitely consider ourselves the favorite in the Sub-8 after this victory," said a jubilant Salem head coach Tom Moshimer.

THE ROCKS wasted little time showing the near sellout crowd which team would take control, scoring 12 first-quarter points on their second and third possessions of the game.

The score remained 12-0 at halftime, although Trenton's ball control offense dominated most of the second quarter action.

The Trojans tried to make things interesting on their first possession of the second half, moving into the Rocks' end zone at the beginning of the third quarter to tighten the score to 12-7.

But the Rocks came back strong on their very next possession and reassured everyone which team was the boss, scoring on a long drive of their own to maintain the comfortable two touchdown margin.

"I was kind of disappointed with our

second quarter letdown," Moshimer said. "We had a chance to bury them early but they came back with the third quarter touchdown and were all charged up."

WSDP-FM, the Plymouth-Canton schools' student-operated radio station, is back on the air, but at a new frequency—88.1 on the dial.


Sports action for boys' football and girls' basketball begins this week with live coverage of all Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton home games.

Non-traditional job? It's the one with top pay

"What would you say is a non-traditional job?" Janet Good asked the roomful of women at Schoolcraft College.

Manpower, dirt, grease, heavy lifting were some of the criteria mentioned in response to her question. "I define a non-traditional job as one that pays more than \$10 an hour. How many of you here make more than \$10 an hour?" she asked.

The room was silent. Ms. Good, an equal employment opportunity specialist for the Michigan Employment Security Council, presented her lecture entitled "What in the Work World is Going on?" at Schoolcraft College's recent International Women's Decade Festival. Her well-attended presentation was evidence that women are concerned with their present employment situation.

"What keeps us out? We keep ourselves out," Ms. Good emphasized. "We don't think we can do it because we're programmed right from the beginning. Women are still making only about 50 per cent of what men make."

How women are referred to has a direct effect on how they are treated, according to Ms. Good. "How they call us is how they see us," she explained.

Calling us 'ladies,' 'girls,' 'broad,' gives the person a chance to make a judgment."

BECOMING ACTIVELY involved in their own future is essential for women, says Ms. Good. "Some women make things happen, some watch things happen, and some don't even care what's happening." "You must actively pursue what you're after," she added.

Ms. Good concluded her speech by saying, "We are in low skilled, low paying jobs and are traditionally programmed to stay in this position. There's nothing wrong with being a secretary, but that's not where the money is."

The program was turned over to Brenda Njiwaji, an economic analyst for the MESC. "The economic situation for women is worsening, and unless something is done, this will not change. There are laws in the books, but they aren't being effectively enforced."

Ms. Njiwaji claims employees have preconceived notions about what are considered women's jobs. "Occupational segregation breaks down to 70 per cent of women who are in 'women's jobs' and 70 per cent of men who are in 'men's jobs'. Women get 30-40 per cent lower pay for the same education and background.

UNEMPLOYMENT is always high for women regardless of the state of the economy," Ms. Njiwaji said. "Women are crowded into employment categories."

"There are three basic things that can be done. You must increase your awareness about occupations that exist and feel free to get into jobs that are considered men's jobs."

"You must develop a set of comprehensive career plans for yourself. Know what your desires are and match these desires to what's available. Your plan for implementing your goals should include increasing your confidence and developing a clear idea of what you want to project to a prospective employer. You want him to know you're a person who knows what she wants."

"The third thing is to attack collectively. Get together and join interest groups. These can wield a lot of power in getting laws enforced."

Another way to get into the occupation you want is to contact the Michigan Occupational Information System, she said. Through this system it is possible to find out what a job is about, training needed, wages, related occupational training and the occupational outlook for that particular job.

"There are health and science technical areas that require as little as two years of college," said Ms. Njiwaji.

"Most of these pay as much as college degree jobs."

APPRENTICESHIPS were also stressed by Ms. Njiwaji. "These are great because you get classroom and on-the-job training," she said. "The programs usually last from three to five years, and you are paid for your experience and as you learn. Jobs such as die setters, electricians and photographers are available through this program, and most start at \$13,000 and up."

Military training programs are also something to look into, according to Ms. Njiwaji. "Combat areas are the only ones women aren't allowed in," she said. "You get room and board as well as experience, not to mention veteran's benefits."

"The image of women in the military is rapidly changing. There are many jobs in the health field, such as survival technicians and training programs in hospitals and community colleges."

Ms. Good explained women are making great strides in the tool and die making field, formerly considered a man's domain. "The first woman in history to be employed as a tool and die maker began work in the Buick plant in Flint in August. We are making great progress, but it's up to you. You must aggressively pursue what you're after."

How to manage it

Nobody has enough time

"Everybody has the same problem," believes home economist Johnne Criner. "There are only 24 hours in a day."

Speaking to a classroom full of women at the Schoolcraft College Women's Festival, Ms. Criner of the Michigan State University cooperative extension service in Wayne County, described how women could plan and utilize their time more effectively.

"There are four steps we must go through," Ms. Criner said. "First, we must admit we waste time, discover the time wasters, work to omit them, and eventually have more time to do the things we want to do."

"It sounds easy, doesn't it?" she asked.

She then went on to explain that working to omit the time wasters such as television, phone conversations, and morning coffee klatches, is not an easy task.

"At first you have to spend a lot of time planning exactly what you're going to do, and when you're going to do it," she said. "For a while it will

take longer to accomplish something than it does now." "But hang in there," she said. "It will work out in the long run."

MS. CRINER suggested that each woman discover what her own time wasters are by keeping a time log of everything she does for one week, hour by hour.

Then she can begin working to omit them. First she must set goals for herself and learn to make priorities.

"You must decide your goals," she said. "Maybe you like to take a walk in the woods or paint."

"If doing that for some hours each week will make you a happier, more contented person that should be your goal, and you must try to save enough time to do it."

She did caution that the time you save may only add up to minutes each day. "But, a few minutes each day can add up to hours in any one week."

Ms. Criner also stressed that a housewife is not a housekeeper, but a housemanager.

"Try using some of the techniques business people use when you run your

house, she suggested. "After all, you really are running a business." "Try taking personal phone calls only during delegated times of the day, say 2-4 p.m.," she said. "Many business people do that at the office and it works."

ALSO IN KEEPING with business techniques, she suggested, "Decide which of the jobs you are doing can be delegated to another member of the family."

"You know a mentally retarded person with a seven-year-old intelligence can be taught to completely support himself," she continued.

"The point is that there are a lot of things a 7-year-old can do that mothers are not making them do. There is no reason why your 7-year-old can't learn to make his or her own bed or lunch."

"Even if doing that makes you feel like you're not fulfilling your duties as a mother?" asked one of the mothers in the room.

"Remember," Ms. Criner replied, "you are training and developing your children to become adults, and that is not going to happen when they become 18 if you don't start training them when they are young."

She also suggested that the women make a list of the things they have to do each day and then assign a priority to each of those.

"If the dishes being done is what is important to you, then give that a high priority," she suggested.

WHEN THE TALK got down to specific tasks some of the audience also offered suggestions that worked for them as housewives.

One Westland woman suggested that a wife find out what it is about the house, unmade beds or dirty dishes, that bothers her husband most. Then, make sure that if nothing else gets done, at least that does.

Another mother, Delores Mielke of Plymouth, said, "Divide your child's toys up into a few groups so that he or she only has a certain amount to play with each day."

"I found when the kids were younger that if they only had a few toys and different ones to play with each day, it made my picking up tasks a lot easier," she concluded.

Ms. Criner brought the discussion back to more general topics when she suggested that setting priorities and "sticking to them" was most important.

"Remember, you have set some goals for yourself, and you want to be able to accomplish those goals," she said.

"So, if someone tries to interrupt you when you are doing an A-1 priority, by dropping by for a cup of coffee, ask yourself this question: What is the best way I can use my time right now?"

"When you answer that question you will know how to handle an interruption."

'Health care today isn't set up to fit the individual'

Being an informed consumer from a health care standpoint means getting more and better information from your physician, right?

Not necessarily, say two who are involved in the Feminist Health Center of Detroit. It also means having better understanding of the role of the hospital, and the drug and medical equipment salesmen and the insurance companies in the total health care picture.

"There are some very sensitive doctors out there," center representative Camilla Cracchiolo told the workshop she conducted with Julie Schneider during the Schoolcraft College Women's Festival.

"But sometimes when they try to be more helpful in addressing the needs of women they get harassment from the local medical society, or they might be in difficulty with the hospital where they are on the staff."

The visitors from the center, located at 15251 W. Eight Mile in Detroit, pointed out a number of factors they said contribute to the need for women to be better informed about their bodies and how they are treated.

Among these they included: •Physicians and surgeons are trained to treat diseases and abnormalities, but a large percentage of the women patients are visiting them in connection with normal conditions, like pregnancy and childbirth.

•Patients in hospitals have little control over what happens to them there.

•For many physicians, information on medical developments since they finished medical school comes largely from drug companies' salesmen and literature, and these often do not point up risks involved.

•Health insurance plans are designed to fit the needs of the physician and hospital rather than the consumer, the patient.

THE FEMINIST CENTER, said Ms. Cracchiolo, is designed to help women learn more about their own bodies and begin to have some control over the way they are treated.

"This kind of center started in California," said Ms. Cracchiolo, "and the woman who organized the first one had been employed by a doctor."

"It hit her one day that she had never seen her own cervix, so she took home a speculum (instrument used by physicians for examining the cervix) and used a flashlight and mirror to examine it."

That led to her bringing together a group of women for the purpose of self-examination, the workshop leader said. That in turn helped the women to be able to recognize variations within the normal condition, and then they started studying old medical journals and folklore to learn of possible remedies.

One that turned up, said Ms. Cracchiolo, was the use of yogurt to clear up a vaginal infection caught early. Another natural remedy for infection they mentioned was garlic.

"Women tried these and they seemed to work," she added.

ONE WORKSHOP participant was interested but sceptical.

"You are telling me there are reasons why I should not trust doctors," she said. "But why should I trust you, I hate using my body as a guinea pig. Do you have credentials?"

Ms. Cracchiolo took the question seriously.

"We are not back-to-nature freaks," she said, "and we know these remedies are not for every woman and there are conditions that need the most sophisticated of equipment."

"But we talk about them in the context of how we have to get health care today. We do not say all doctors are wrong. What we do say is that the system of health care in this country is not set up in the interests of the individual patient."

Ms. Cracchiolo said the Feminist Health Center offers series of workshops designed to help women understand their bodies and to improve medical consumerism.

Auto tips

It'll only get worse

By PATRICK KELLY

Since all winter driving problems cannot be avoided the best rule is to plan ahead and be prepared. Don't wait until cold weather arrives.

Now is the time to have your car checked and tuned so that it will run efficiently and reduce the chances of a roadside breakdown in the dead of winter.

Make sure the following vital systems are checked:

• **Battery:** Make sure it will stand up to the extra power required for cold weather starts. Keep the battery and terminals clean. Keep the battery fully charged. Also, have your voltage regulator checked.

• **Ignition system:** Check the condition of the ignition wires and distributor cap. A cracked cap or faulty wires can result in engine down out when it snows or when slush is thrown onto your car and into the engine compartment. A tune-up before cold weather sets in should reveal ignition problems if they exist.

• **Heating and cooling system:** Have the antifreeze in your radiator checked. If there is a leak in your radiator or hoses are deteriorating, have them repaired or replaced before adding antifreeze. Test your heater and defroster (if you haven't already) to make sure they are functioning properly. If they aren't putting out enough heat, have your thermostat and heater checked. Also check your intake vents and remove any debris or other matter that can plug them up.

• **Exhaust system:** Leakage from an exhaust system into a vehicle interior is always dangerous. It is even more dangerous in the winter when most drivers keep all the windows and vents shut. Have the entire exhaust system checked and the components replaced as necessary. Even if the exhaust system is in good shape, it's a good idea to drive with at least one window open.

• **Windshield wipers and washer:** Check functioning of wipers and condition of blades. Replace blades that streak the windshield. Keep the windshield washer reservoir filled with a washer antifreeze solution.

• **Tires:** Mount your winter snow tires and keep them properly inflated. Air pressure should be checked at least once every two weeks. When the tread depth reaches 2/32ds of an inch, replace the tire.

• **Chains:** If you prefer to use chains, inspect your chains and make sure they are serviceable. Check the condition of the cross chains and replace broken links or those that are almost worn through.

Don't wait until the last minute to load your trunk with those items you'll need to combat snow or ice. Put the following items in your trunk so that they'll be readily available when you need them:

Also put these items in your glove compartment: A flashlight, an ice scraper, a brush to remove snow from the car (under seat if too long), extra fuses, and a rag to clean lights and the inside of the windows.

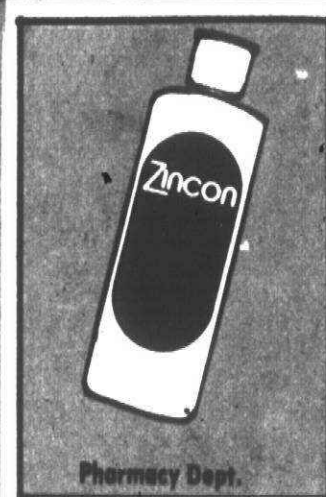
If your original prescription called for a specific brand name medication, we'll continue to refill it with that brand name drug until you tell us to replace it with the equivalent generic drug. In some cases, we'll call your doctor to make sure he concurs with the generic drug interchange.

It may happen that the generic version has a different appearance than the brand you've been taking. Our pharmacists usually will point this out to you when you pick up the refill. Keep in mind that only the appearance is different. The generic drug is just as safe and effective as the original brand name drug.

WHAT ARE GENERIC DRUGS?

A generic drug, by law, is the exact chemical equivalent of a brand name drug. The only difference is that a brand name drug has a specific name registered with the Patent Office and usually costs more. For example, Bayer is a brand name. Aspirin is the generic name.

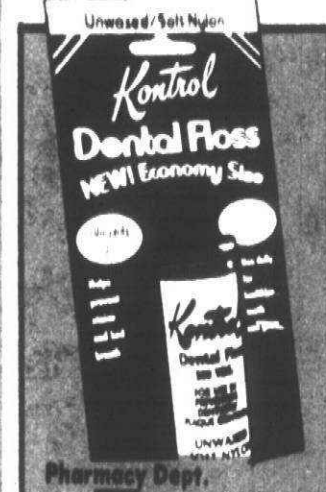
