## Royce Smith is sewer chief

Wayne County Commissioner Royce Smith (D-Belleville), got a new job Thursday when the county board of public works selected him to take the top administrative slot in the department of public works.

Smith, who has represented Plymouth, Canton and Westland on the county board of commissioners for the last six years, will leave his \$16,000-a-year commissioner's seat to take the \$35,000-a-year administrative job Jan. 9.

The appointment came as no surprise. Smith told the Observer earlier this month that he was "actively campaigning for the post," and that he felt his chances of getting it were "good."

Smith said he was pleased with the board's decision and that his first responsibility would be to make sure the western Wayne County communities get a fair shake where "super sewer" is concerned.

One of Smith's main responsibilities in the new slot will be to take charge of the Huron Valley Sewer—"super sewer," which, if completed, will provide sewer service for western Wayne County.

**THE MASSIVE** sewer project has been the cause of some heated political in-fighting between certain communities and the county.

Under the leadership of Canton Township Supervisor Harold Stein, 17 municipalities, including Plymouth Township, joined together in the Huron Valley Authority which was formed in an attempt to take control of the sewer away from the county.

The out-lying communities were angry over the fact that the board of public works, which has control of the project, did not have anyone from western Wayne County among its members.

Local officials were afraid they would have nothing to say about how the sewer was run and what kind of rates were levied against the taxpayers.

While he was seeking the job, Smith

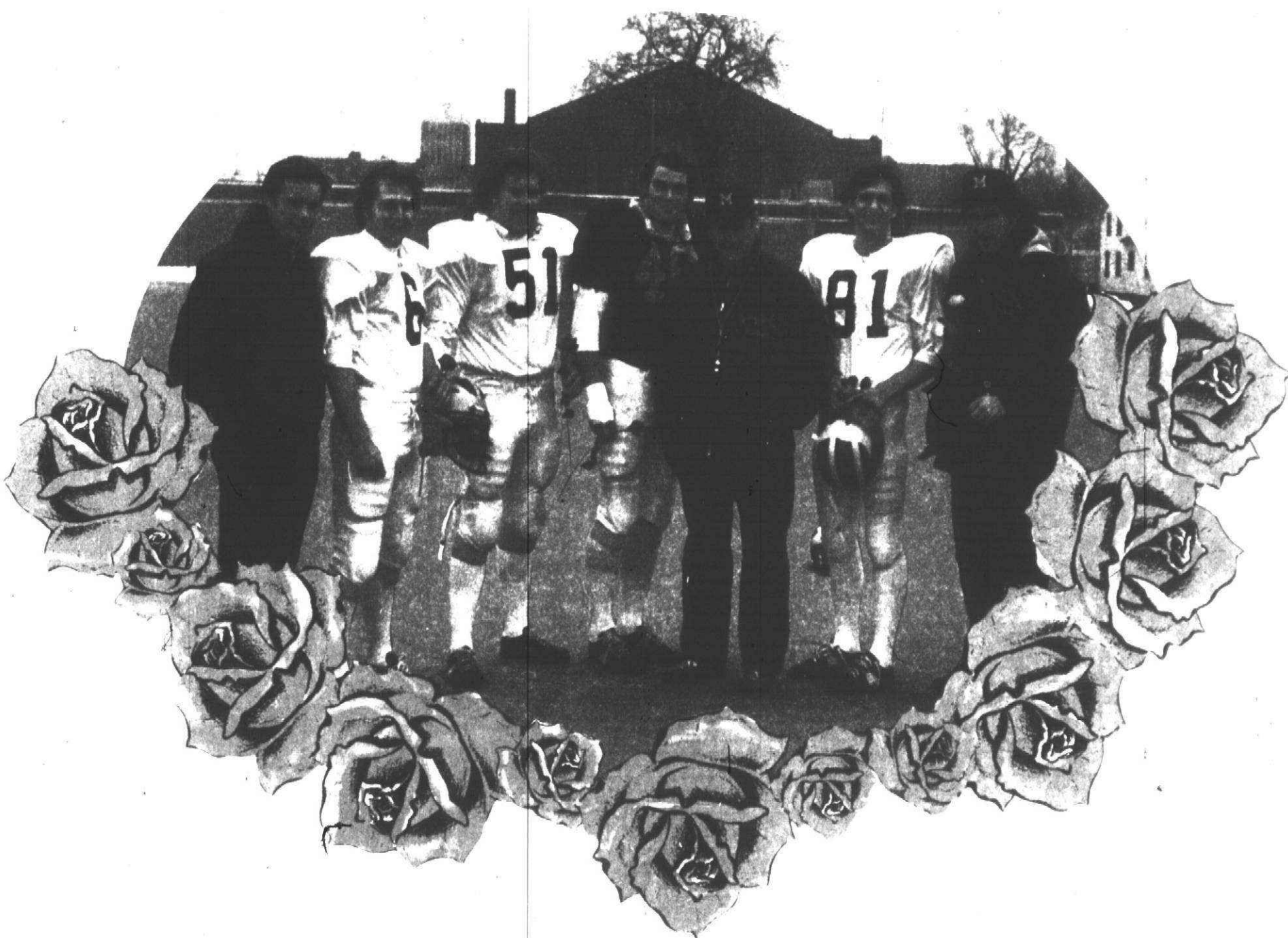
said he would try to "sweetheart" the dissident municipalities back over to the county's side of the fence.

In discussing his appointment, Smith restated his commitment to the western section of the county. "This is the first time since the sewer project has been in existence that a western Wayne County man has been given a top administrative post. I think that's a good sign." In fact, Smith said, the municipalities that formed the authority did him a favor. If it wasn't for them pulling out of the project, he said, he probably wouldn't have been given the job.

Other than using his hometown political influence to woo local officials, Smith said he hasn't formed any detailed goals or plans for his new department.

"I didn't want to count my chickens before they were hatched. So, to be perfectly frank, I haven't really given it a whole lot of thought."

Smith said county attorneys were researching whether it will be necessary to hold a special election to replace him on the board of commissioners. If it is not, the commission will appoint a replacement to serve the remainder of his unexpired term.

## Dentist is pulling for sewer line

All Dr. Louis Spanberger wanted for

Christmas was a new sewer system. The Christmas wish was a bit too unwieldy for Santa to grant, but it appears the Canton Township dentist will get his wish nonetheless.

Spanberger, who owns and operates a dentist office on the north side of Ford Road between the Harvard Square Shopping Center and Morton-Taylor, has been wondering what he can do the last few weeks to save his dental practice from being closed by health officials.

The overburdened septic system on the dentist's property cannot handle the sewage from the medical practice, a spokesman for the Wayne County Health Department told Spanberger some weeks ago.

The Canton dentist was given three choices—install an entirely new and expensive septic system, convince the township to install sewers on the north side of Ford or get out of the Ford Road facility.

**SPANBERGER'S PROBLEMS** started some time ago when the chair-side sinks in the house he has converted into a dentist's office began to gurgle and back up.

An excavating company called in to

repair the problem placed the blame on a faulty sewer pump. But, in the process of digging up the septic field, excavators found that the field was saturated and called in the health department.

The county inspectors discovered that the system, built to serve a residential house, was inadequate to serve a dental practice. To compound Spanberger's problems, public health sanitarian Don Turnbull expressed doubts whether the clay soil in the back of the dentist's office could handle an "adequate" septic system.

"It's a very difficult situation, and there's no easy answer," Turnbull said last week. "The system isn't causing a public health problem right now, but let's just say the potential for a serious health problem does exist if something isn't done."

To help Spanberger save his Canton dental practice, township engineer consultant Dale Townsend last week presented Canton board members with a proposal to construct sanitary sewers along a 2,000-foot strip of land on the south side of Ford between Harvard Square and Morton-Taylor.

The sewage system would cost about \$82,000. Canton Clerk John Flodin said the township would pay \$32 a front foot for the system—or about \$64,000. Owners of the eight parcels in the strip would pay \$9 a front foot or a combined total of \$18,000.

**ALTHOUGH TOWNSHIP BOARD** members appeared willing to accept Townsend's sewer proposal, Spanberger's problems weren't over yet.

Owners of at least 80 per cent of the land fronting on Ford Road must go along with Townsend's proposal.

"But I can't see how anyone would be dumb enough to object," Spanberger said early last Thursday afternoon. "Getting a sewer in would raise everyone's property values tremendously."

Two hours later, the owner of the largest parcel in the strip, Norman Newman, called township Clerk Flodin to say he'd be willing to pay for the sewer installation. Newman's land has a 900-foot frontage on Ford Road, while Spanberger's has a 165-foot frontage.

## 2 hurt in bar brawl

## Five cops collar man in fracas

Nothing against Lawrence "Larry" Adams, but Garden City police say that when the 6-foot, 185-pound Adams decides he's not going anywhere, he means it.

Adams, 34, of 8611 Holly Drive, Canton Township, was held following arraignment on felonious assault charges in the Garden City lock-up late last week in lieu of \$1,000 bond.

The charges stem from an incident early Thursday morning at The Lion and The Sword, a nightclub on Ford Road in Garden City. Witnesses say Adams was drinking quietly at the bar at about 1:50 a.m. when either five or six Garden City police officers arrived in response to a tip. They attempted to arrest Adams, who was wanted on three minor traffic warrants.

**CHRIS JEZEWSKI**, owner of the bar, said, "(The police) were very polite and all. They said to him, 'Come on, Larry, you're under arrest,' and he said, 'Do you have a warrant?'"

"They said, 'We've got three of them, Larry.'"

"So he told them, 'I'm not leaving 'til I finish my drink,' and they said, 'We're not waiting.'"

"A helluva struggle ensued," is the way Garden City Det. Lt. Bill Duncan describes events that followed.

Duncan, who said, "We've had dealings with (Adams) before," when asked why five police officers—witnesses say there were six—were dispatched for a minor traffic warrant, said both Adams and a police officer were treated and released at Wayne County General Hospital for injuries suffered in a fracas that accompanied police attempts to arrest Adams.

Adams was charged with felonious assault for allegedly hitting a Garden City police officer on the temple with a cocktail glass. Another police officer had his pants ripped off in the struggle.

Bar owner Jezewski said, "Larry, well, he's not what you'd call a regular customer, but he comes in once or twice a month. He never causes any trouble."

Duncan, however, said Adams became "surly" when police attempted to take him into custody on three traffic warrants, two of them from Garden City and one originating in Livingston County.

"Other people in the bar tried to convince the guy to go along peacefully," said Duncan. "But he wouldn't listen."

### Road projects approved

## Haggerty slated for widening

Western-Wayne County will be the focus of a number of extensive surface road improvements in 1978 and '79.

The Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) and the county Board of Road Commissioners have approved \$3.35 million in widening and reconstruction projects on Joy, Haggerty and Six Mile. Approval is pending on one other western-Wayne County project, but road commission officials expect no problems in gaining the necessary go-ahead.

The projects will be financed by county and federal funds with some local municipality contributions. The county money, according to officials, will be raised through a \$6 million bond issue which is expected to go through early next year.

The largest project involves a stretch of Six Mile Road from I-96 to Levan, which will be widened and reconstructed at a cost of \$1.7 million.

The road widening is expected to boost development in the area.

Six Mile Road has already been widened to four and five lanes through Livonia up to Levan Road. The widening west of Levan will ease access to the area slated for the development of Laurel Park.

Also, two stretches of Haggerty Road on the Livonia-Northville border will be widened and reconstructed. The mile-long stretch between Five and Six Mile Roads will be rebuilt as will a half-mile section of Haggerty from Seven Mile north.

The road commission has also approved the widening and reconstruction of Joy Road between Middle Belt and Merriman Roads.

According to Louis Sugo, a spokesman for the road commission, the western Wayne County projects are only a part of 50 to 60 road improvement projects the commission will be undertaking in the coming years.

Most of those projects, he said, will be financed primarily by federal funds.

Most recently, the 42-year-old West has been doing private engineering consulting. However, he was the city engineer for Westland for four years. He also served as the city engineer and head of the department of public works in Ypsilanti.

In addition, West spent five years as a civil engineer with the Michigan State Department of Highways.

He is a graduate of the University of Illinois, Yockey said.

Since Alan Gove, the former engineer, resigned last September, Norbert Drobot, an engineering aid in the department, has been handling the duties of the city engineer.

West's salary will be \$27,000 per year.

"Somewhere in the haze I can see the start of a much needed double-deck parking area. The double deck should be a great help as the city has no other room for parking."

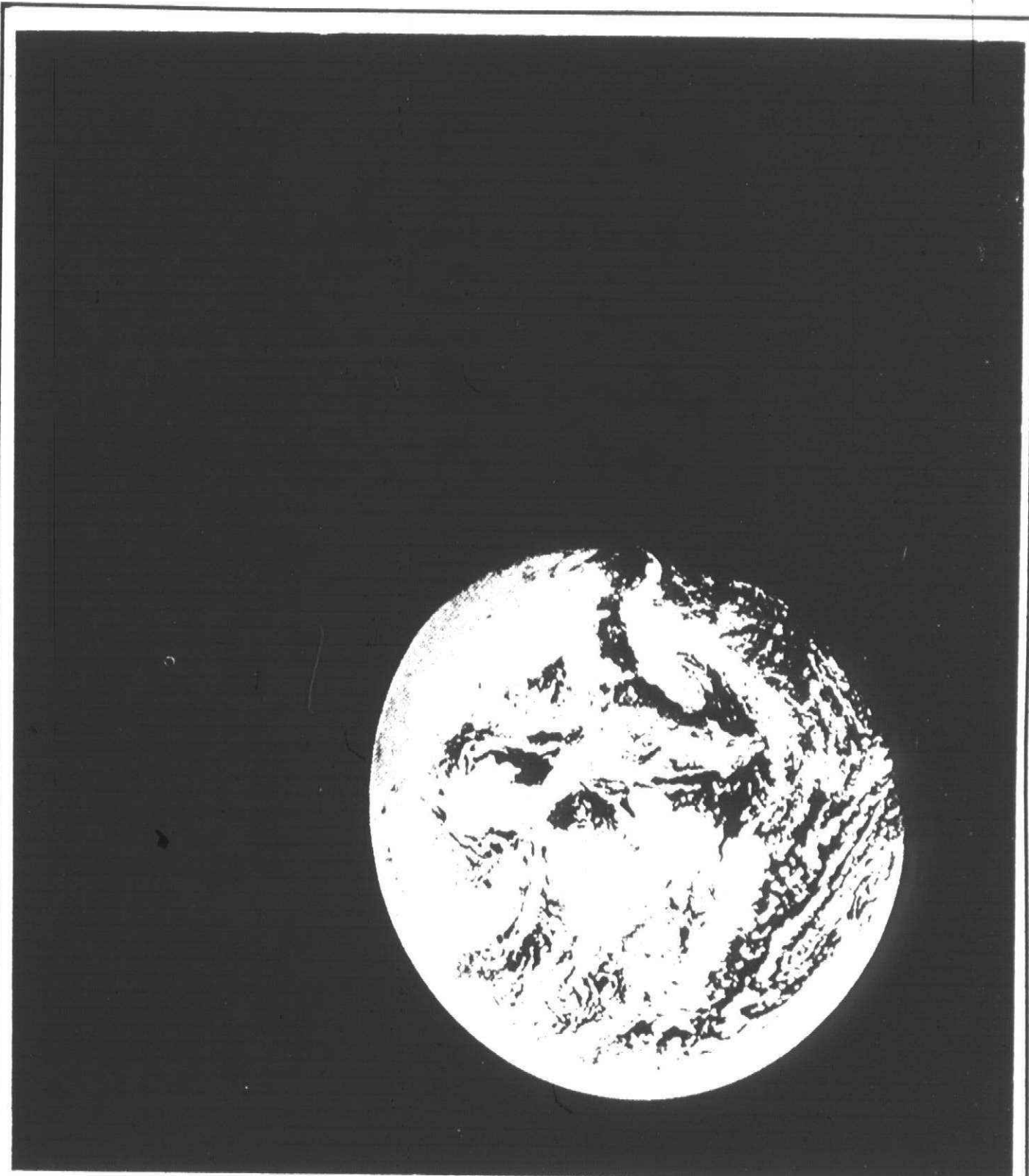
"And," he said with a half smile, "if 1978 is to be the year I expect it to be they may dust off the plans for the loop road and really make the downtown area a thriving commercial center."

# Storage complex going in on Joy near Lilley

Two Plymouth developers, James Jabara and Austin Lynch, received permission last week to erect six buildings totalling 77,212 square feet. One of the buildings will house 10 light industrial tenants and the other five will be rented as "mini-storage" units to residents. Almost 400 units will be built.

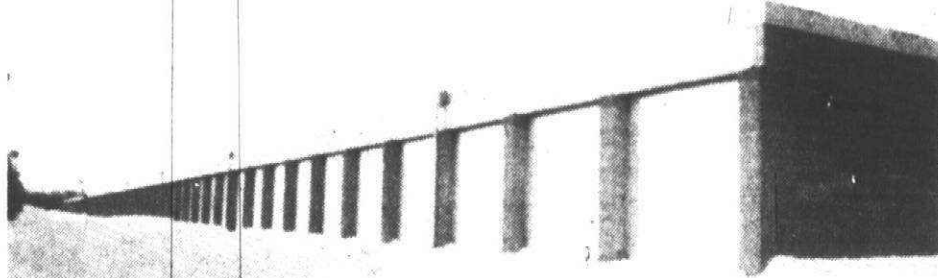
Lynch, who said he formed the partnership with Jabara less than a month ago, plans to break ground on "Storage Unlimited" Jan. 2 or 3 and open up in "early spring."

"We've already got an ad in the Yel-

low Pages under Ell Jay Properties," Lynch explained.

The complex will be built on Joy, east of Lilley, across the street from an identical light industrial office complex. "We're even the same blueprints," Lynch said. Lynch owns and operates the Plymouth Township operation.

Ell-Jay Properties will begin taking space reservations the last week of January. Lynch said he expects the commercial tenants to be "small business who don't want to work out of their garage" and local business

people looking for "peak time storage at low rental rates." And the residential users will store "boats, recreational vehicles, and storage of personal items between moving into a new home."

There will be a manager on the site 24 hours and people who rent a unit have 24-hour access to their storage compartment. The buildings will be made of cement block with a Flexicore concrete roof. The developers also have an option to buy five adjacent acres on the south side of Joy Road.

# Library donors can get tax breaks

A fundraising brochure for the Canton Library fund is making the rounds in the township area.

Under state law, contributors are allowed a credit against their state income tax equal to 50 per cent of their gift to a public library. A couple filing a joint return can be allowed a maximum credit of \$800.

For example, as Supervisor Harold Stein points out, if a couple with a joint income of \$20,000 donated \$300 to the library, they could deduct \$150 from their state income tax and \$54 from their federal income tax.

Credits for corporations are also

allowed. Corporations can deduct up to 50 per cent of the contribution from its tax, providing it does not exceed 10 per cent of the tax liability or \$5,000, whichever is less.

Stein has approached Canton's service clubs this year, asking them to help his fundraising campaign. The Canton Jaycees planned a basketball game last Dec. 15 against a local radio station which was cancelled by the deejays at the last minute. But the Jaycees will reschedule the library benefit sometime in January or February.

"Many people have already

expressed interest in donating to the fund," Stein said. "hopefully, this tax break will generate even more interest."

Stein will be meeting with a group of citizens who belong to the Canton Library Committee to discuss putting a library millage on the ballot.

Stein considers a library one of his major goals in 1978.

"Many people who live in the outlying areas have to drive seven to 13 miles to the Plymouth library," Stein said. "That's not meeting the needs of the community."

## In new state map

## New skyline and ethnic festivals featured

Detroit's skyline and the state's ethnic festivals will be featured in the Official Transportation Map which the state will begin distributing free in mid-January.

Three million copies of the 1978-9 map have been printed.

The maps were unveiled with great ceremony last week by the State Highway Commission and officials of the Detroit Plaza Hotel.

In a significant departure from past practice, the commission dropped a box with the state's vital statistics (population, area, date admission to the Union, etc.) and replaced it with a plug for "the stunning new" Renaissance Center and "a 73-story hotel."

CHAIRMAN Peter B. Fletcher said the map "will help to spread the word that Detroit is a vital and interesting city—the heart of one of the nation's great metropolitan areas."

The map, known since 1975 as a transportation map rather than a "highway map," also:

- Designates state park and recreation area campgrounds but not national forest campgrounds. (Conversely, the National Forest Service maps list only federal facilities and not state facilities. Campers will again need two maps.) This practice will be considered for 1980-1, when the map will be enlarged.

- Shows, in its metro area closeup, such four-year public colleges as the University of Michigan, Eastern Michigan University, Wayne State University and Oakland University as well as the Jesuit-run University of Detroit—but not the state-run UM-Dearborn.

- Misspells the skyline feature as "Rennaisance" Center. The word has a single-n and a double-s.

- Fails to show, on the first million copies, the Village of Barton Hills, located across the Huron River from Ann Arbor. Fletcher said this mistake was caught one-third of the way through the printing and corrected. The explanation: The type fell off a plastic overlay.

- For the first time, shows an aerial photo of the State Capitol Complex in Lansing with labels that identify state

buildings and the departments housed in them.

NEVERTHELESS, state officials are proud of their effort to combine clarity, information and promotion of the state.

Tom Shawver, the public information chief, who suggested a photo of Ren-Cen for the cover, said the staff studies maps from all 50 states to get ideas on improvements.

The map contains 1,200 changes and additions from the 1976-7 version, most notably the new I-275 and I-96 freeways.

As a transportation map, it shows not only freeways and roads, but airports, Amtrak rail passenger lines and depots, intercity bus terminals, domestic and international seaports, and passenger and auto ferry routes.

The promotional section of the map, located below the city maps on the back side, contains 14 color photos of ethnic festivals—eight from Detroit and six from out-state, including the Frankenmuth Bavarianfest, Holland's Tuliptime, Greenville's Danish Festival, Alma's Highland games, Hancock's Finn Fest and Gaylord's Alpenfest.

THE PHOTO of Gov. William G. Milliken is larger this year. In the 1976-77 map, his picture was 2 by 2 1/4 inches. The new map has a 3 by 3 1/2 inch photo of the governor and his wife Helen.

The 1973 and 1975 maps had cover photos of unidentified highway scenes. With the 1976-77 map, however, the map took on an historical theme—Fort Mackinac

on the cover and Greenfield Village on the metro side.

Cost of printing is a bit more than \$250,000, or 8.4 cents per copy. Low bidder was Michigan Lithographing Co. of Grand Rapids.

The map may not be sold. Starting the second week in January, it may be obtained at the department's district offices (the closest is in Southfield), state travel

information centers, district DNR offices, chambers of commerce, many local government offices and regional tourist associations (there's one in the State Plaza Building in Detroit).

# 'Turning Point' contrasts lives

In the past decade there has been a terrific surge of interest in the dance. After audiences throughout the country see "The Turning Point" (PG), the interest could turn into an obsession. Balletomania will rush to the barre and "plies" will be a household word.

"The Turning Point" is an astonishingly good film: Astonishing because it combines a bygone feeling for emotional binges with a contemporary mood that avoids sentimentalizing and moralizing, astonishing because it avoids the old Hollywood reverence for an "arty" subject and treats ballet with both honesty and passion.

Deedee (Shirley MacLaine) and Emma (Anne Bancroft) are two friends who meet annually when the American Ballet Company makes its one-night stand in the Oklahoma city where Deedee and her family live. Deedee had been a dancer but she gave it up for marriage and children. Emma devoted herself to her career and became a prima ballerina.

Once they both had been contenders for the role that eventually made Emma a star. But, as Deedee sourly puts it, she got pregnant and Emma got 19 curtain calls.

AT MIDDLE AGE, they are prompted to think about options and what might have been. Deedee envies the excitement and glamor of Emma's life. Emma, her career coming to a close, would like security and marriage.

When Deedee's talented daughter Emilia (Leslie Browne) is invited to join the company for the summer in New York, Deedee goes along as chaperone. Emilia's budding career seems to be a replay of Deedee's youthful aspirations and of the choices that must be made.

Emma bestows her attention on Emilia, coaching her and taking her under her wing. The new proximity of Emma and Deedee and their "competing" roles in Emilia's life cause old doubts and antagonisms to surface.

In the movie's most dramatically explosive scene, Emma and Deedee finally confront each other. Bitchy remarks lead to hitting and kicking until they collapse in an emotional catharsis; tears turn to laughter and they end up clinging to each other in friendship.

Sometimes the story and the balletics seem to get in each other's way. Just as we get involved with one, the other comes along. Yet, each is excellent, if too brief. At least, our appetites are whetted, and we're left with a desire for more.

DIRECTOR HERBERT ROSS, a former choreographer, and associate producer Nora Kaye, a former prima ballerina with the American Ballet Theatre, have given gritty authenticity to the world of the dance company. The rarefied atmosphere of the classic performance is balanced against the daily drudgery, the perspiration, the bleeding feet.

The dancing of Mikhail Baryshnikov and Leslie Browne provide soaring, beautiful moments. It's worth the price of admission just to watch Baryshnikov's gravity-defying leaps and perfect control.

As Yuri, the tutu-chasing male star of the company, his dialogue is simple and minimal. Browne, as Emma's daughter, plays a more pivotal character. Unfortunately, with her squeaky voice and immobile features, her acting doesn't measure up to her dancing.

Martha Scott is wonderfully entertaining as the grasping, scheming general manager who keeps the company afloat; Alexandra Danilova is a warm and crusty grande dame who coaches the young dancers; and Tom Skerritt is restrained and sympathetic as Emma's husband.

MacLaine and Bancroft, however, have the meatiest, juiciest roles, and they make the most of them. Each gives a terrific performance which complements and counterpoints the other. Bancroft is svelte, proud and arrogant. MacLaine, in contrast, looks frumpy, is unsure of herself and whiney.

"The Turning Point" is admirable for not attempting to idealize or popularize the characters. From television, one might surmise that female friendships and concerns hinge on two neighbors discussing detergents or household odors. Bless producer and director Herbert Ross for showing us otherwise.

**PETE'S DRAGON (G).** Combination of animation and live action in Disney adventure about desperate boy helped by friendly dragon. Helen Reddy and Mickey Rooney featured.

**SATURDAY NIGHT FEVER (R).** John Travolta (of Koter's Sweathogs) is the main man in film with plenty of disco action.

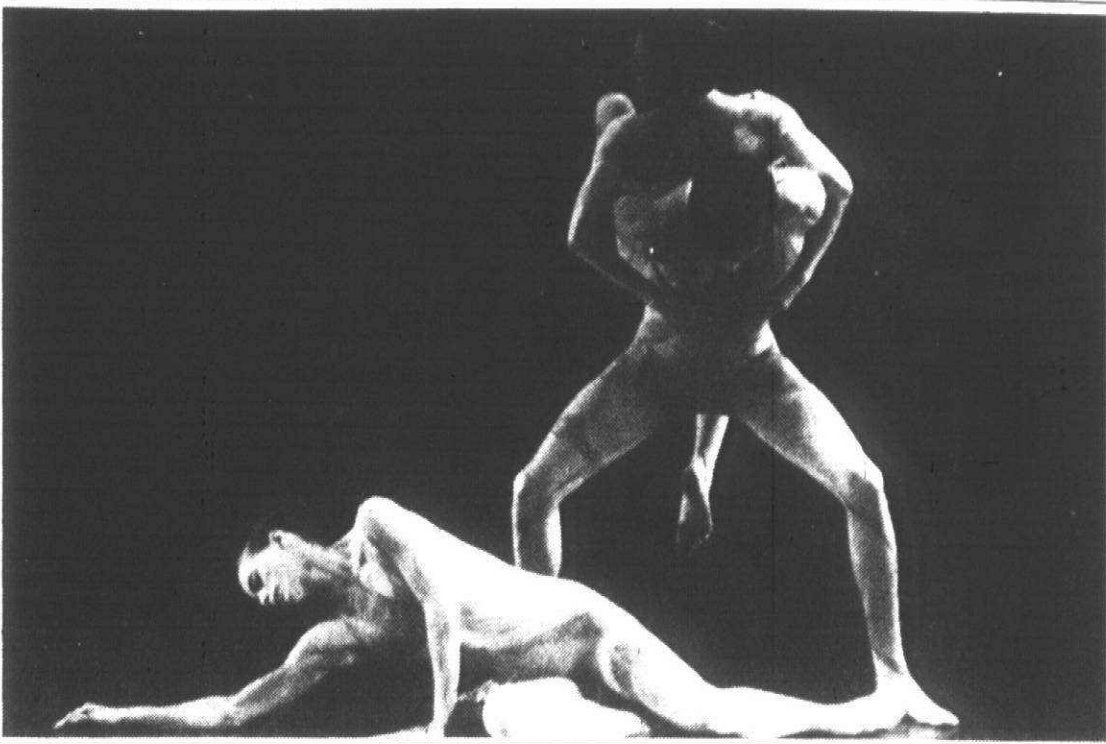
THE GROUP has performed throughout the Detroit area and toured throughout Michigan. They also have performed with the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and on television.

## Cranbrook exhibits woodcuts

The vivid, mysterious world of California artist Carol Summers will travel to Cranbrook Academy of Art Museum in the exhibition "Carol Summers Woodcuts," through Feb. 19.

Organized by The Brooklyn Museum, New York, the exhibition includes 143 of Summers' colorful, powerful woodcuts, which have been described as having an "iconographic freedom, a language of forms and colors that address both the eye and the spirit."

In a color catalog available at the Academy Museum for \$6, Gene Baro (consultative curator of prints and drawings, The Brooklyn Museum) writes: "The simplicity and undisguised manual quality of woodcutting, the sense in the rubbing technique of a direct human enterprise, makes even more mysterious the impact of these luminous images that seem metaphors of a border country between the imagined and the real."

In one sense, Summers' prints are landscapes, Baro continues, "but in another, . . . the mountains and skies are mountains and skies as sensation only. We confront them as feeling."

Now Living in Santa Cruz, Summers has taught at various institutions from Hunter College to San Francisco Art Institute. He has exhibited one-man shows extensively in this country and in Italy.

Summers' work is in many important museum collections in this country and Europe, including Victoria and Albert Museum, London; Museum of Modern Art and Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York; Detroit Institute of Arts; Bibliotheque Nationale, Paris; Library of Congress, Washington, D.C.

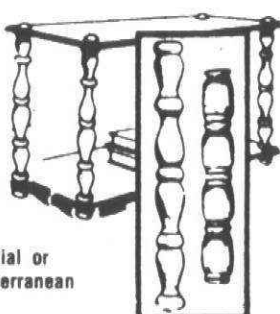

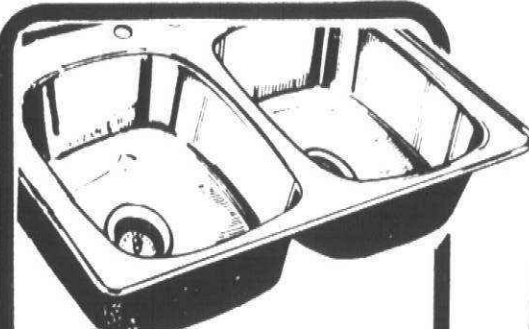

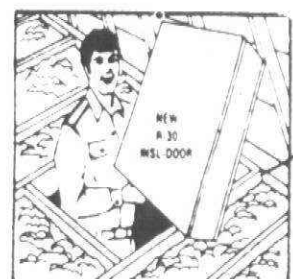

McCauley, a graduate of Livonia Bentley High School and Michigan State University, started the Canton girls program five years ago.

This season was his finest record-wise with the Chiefs, finishing with a perfect 19-0 regular season record before losing in the district finals to state-runner-up Detroit Mumford. He

had the only unbeaten team in Observ-erland.

McCauley teaches social studies at Canton High School.

Ladywood's Kavanaugh worked well with his talented team this season, finishing with a 20-5 overall record which included a third-place finish in the tough Catholic League playoffs.

Three of Ladywood's losses this year were to Farmington Mercy High School, the Class "A" state champions.

The Chiefs, however, trailed the entire second half as Bentley scored the first seven points of the third quarter to take a 25-22 lead.

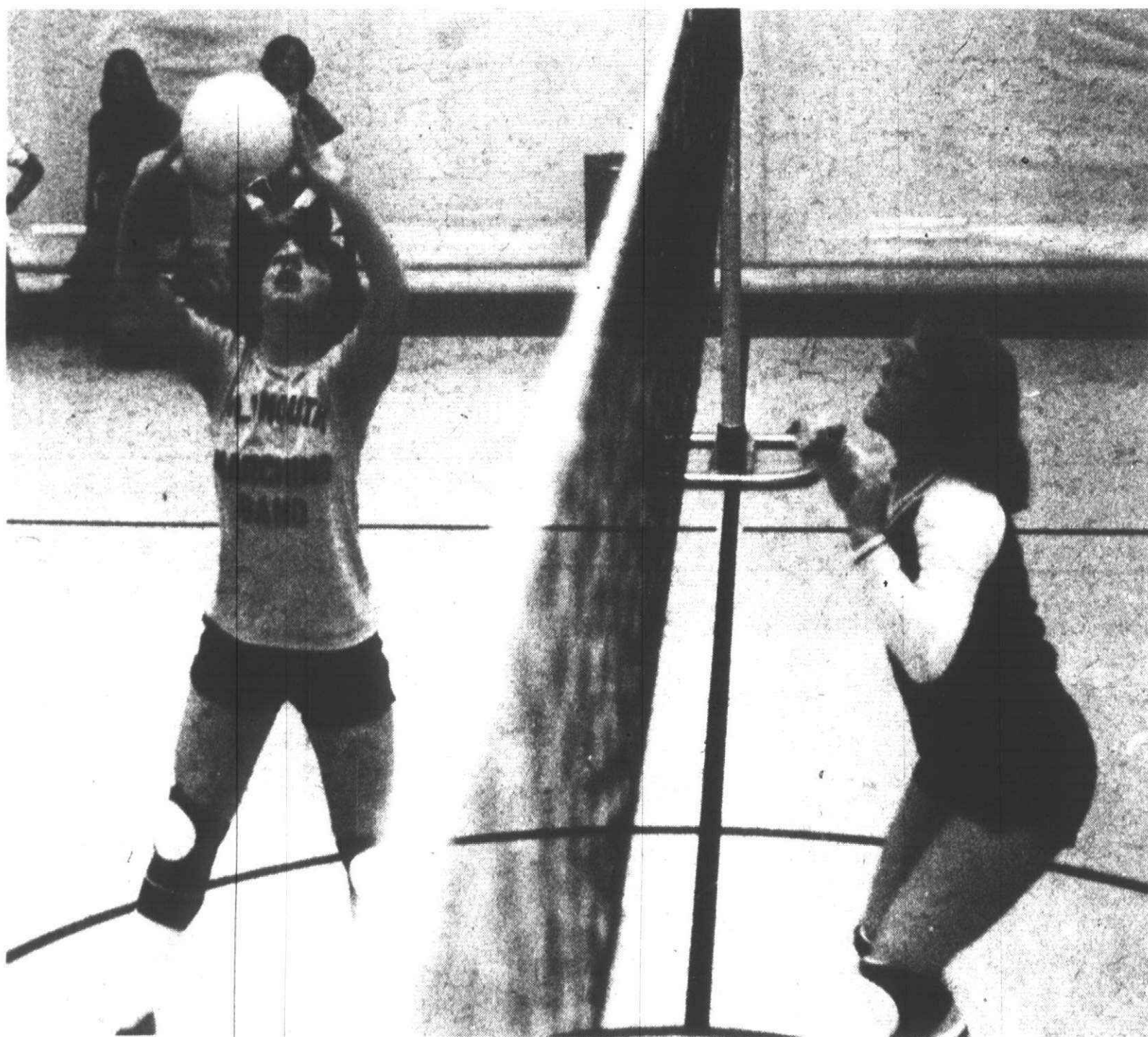
The Bulldogs kept the lead until late in the fourth quarter when a technical

# Memories are sweet at past Rose Bowl games

The ghost of "Old Man" Yost will be hovering over the Rose Bowl when Bo Schembechler leads the maize and blue on to the field on New Years Day to battle Washington for the roses.

It was just 75 years ago that Yost took the Wolverines out to Pasadena to meet Stanford in the first of the Rose Bowl series, and it is only fitting that Michigan should be there for the 75th anniversary. But the Big Ten co-champions will have little chance of equaling the performance of Yost's squad on that memorable day when the Wolverines won, 49-0.

And thereby hangs one of the best stories told in the long history of the Rose Bowl. In 1947, Fritz Crisler, the Michigan coach took his magicians out to do battle with Stanford for the roses. And all the maize and blue magicians did was triumph 49-0.

As the teams were walking off the field, so the story goes, one of the Stanford followers who evidently had

too much laughing juice during the game, walked over to Crisler and, pointing his finger, mumbled "You haven't improved a G—D—bit."

Michigan has sent teams to the Rose Bowl a half dozen times, but none of the teams played under the conditions of Yost's squad.

In those days of Willie Heston, Germany Schultz, Neil Snow and the other stalwarts, the players played both ways. And, inasmuch as Michigan was short of funds, Yost had only 15 men in uniform. But what they lacked in numbers they more than made up in power.

While many great teams have gone to the Rose Bowl over the years, Yost's 1902 winners still attract more attention than the others in the history of the Rose Bowl games.

The Rose Bowl is filled with football lore—the performances of the heroes and the "goats."

It was at the Rose Bowl that Brick Mueller, of California, was credited

with throwing a 60-yard pass in 1920 to upset Ohio State. For years it was carried in the record book as the longest pass in history.

Finally, one of the west coast sport writers decided to measure it himself. He did and found that the pass carried only 53 yards. And it is the only time that the Rose Bowl records have been changed years after the game was played.

It was in the Rose Bowl in 1929 that Roy Reigels, the California center, picked up a fumble and ran the wrong way for more than half the length of the field, before one of his team mates got him and prevented him from scoring for the rivals.

Yes, the Rose Bowl has had its share of heroes and goats and some of the greatest moments in football history came in the battle for the roses.

Michigan has had its share of dramatic chapters in Bowl history. While "old Man" Yost started it all, the Wolverines of recent years have added

some dramatic chapters.

It was on the day of the Rose Bowl game seven years ago that Head Coach Bo Schembechler was laid low with a heart attack and few people knew it until game time when he didn't appear on the field with the team. The Wolverines tried hard to "win" one for Bo that afternoon. But fate was against them.

On another occasion, just a few years ago, they seemed headed for victory in the late minutes when Jim Plunkett, now with the San Diego Chargers in the National Football League, completed five passes in a row—right down the middle of the field—to scuttle Michigan's hopes.

It will be a determined coaching staff and team that takes the field this New Year's Day. First, the Wolverines want to make amends for the three defeats they suffered in recent years.

Second, they want to knock down the old criticism of Schembechler that he can't win the "big one."

Federal law prohibits the payment of an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) time deposit prior to maturity and before the depositor is age 59 1/2, except due to death or disability, unless three months interest is forfeited and interest on the amount withdrawn is reduced to the regular savings rate. Under certain conditions, early withdrawal before age 59 1/2 could result in federal excise taxes.

# THE FEINGOLD DIET

## Dramatic benefits noted for hyperactive children

In the years to come Alan Kramer, 6, and Glen Jurick, 8½, both of Livonia, may look back on the day they started the Feingold diet as one of the most important in their lives.

Both were hyperactive children, meaning they had frequent spells of aggression and crying, a miniscule attention span, and a life of perpetual motion.

Since such behavior can only produce poor study habits, few friends and possibly even juvenile delinquency, going on the diet was crucial to them. It also had a salutary effect on their families, which until then had to put up with a couple of children extremely difficult to live with.

When the boys' hyperactivity symptoms vanished, everyone heaved a sigh of relief.

Some of the women attending the lecture on nutrition by Dr. Sheldon Brenner, a pediatrician who specializes in diet, expressed the opinion that putting the family on the Feingold diet would be very troublesome and time-consuming.

**BUT WHILE** it took Alan's mother, Marilyn Kramer, three hours to shop the first time by the Feingold method, she was delighted with the results. In fact, both she and Diane Jurick, Glen's mother, were so excited about the changes in their sons that they soon began investing further chunks of time to organize the Feingold Parent Association to get the word to others in the area.

The group now meets on a monthly basis, with its next gathering at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 18, in Garfield Elementary School, 10218 Arthur, Livonia. The school is south of Plymouth Road, between Wayne and Levan.

The reason Mrs. Kramer's shopping took so long was, that instead of merely checking out prices she now had to read the fine print listing ingredients on each package.

Dr. Ben Feingold, the California pediatrician-allergist who created the diet, banned artificial coloring and coloring as well as preservatives from the food eaten by hyperactive children. This is because they contain salicylates, which Dr. Feingold has determined to be the cause of hyperactivity.

He also turned thumbs down on meats like hot dogs, ham, sausage and lunch meat which contain nitrates or nitrites with salicylates.

While not outlawed by Dr. Feingold, sugar also was eliminated by the two families because they saw that without it the boys were less active.

"I still shop in the grocery store," said Mrs. Kramer, "but I also go to health food stores. We buy sausage, bacon and lunch meat from an Ann Arbor farmer who makes it without nitrates or nitrites."

**A HASSLE?** Sure, but wait until you see how Alan and Glen were acting before Feingold.

Alan's pre-school teachers were upset about his aggressive behavior, and the fact he was always racing around when supposed to be doing something else.

"Glen's hyperactivity was so great he was a constant discipline problem in school," said Mrs. Jurick. "So we put him on Ritalin for a year. It controlled him at school, but wore off around the house. He ran around a lot, had crying spells and got into fights with his peer group."

"He had difficulty sleeping. He would get up frequently at night. In the morning we'd see the projects he'd started all over the house."

"Within two weeks of starting the Feingold diet, we began noticing that he was a lot calmer, that he could handle his emotions better and had fewer temper tantrums."

"He was more cooperative and affectionate and more accepting of discipline. His jerky bodily motions settled down, and he slept at night."

"After a month and a half we took him off Ritalin and he has done very well. His report card shows a big improvement and he responds to direction."

"Ritalin had made him so quiet, it masked his personality. After going off it, his personality became more apparent and he began participating as a normal child would."

**MRS. JURICK FEELS** that a child's good self-image is formed at an early age by people who tell him he's a good person, and by having personal success.

"The hyperactive child is constantly being punished," she remarked. "Someone is always angry with him. If the pattern continues the child has no positive feelings about himself. So he begins doing things that are bad because of feelings of anger and lack of love."

She added that Glen is very aware now that he must stay on his diet.

"He is willing to be cooperative because he feels better. Last Halloween he ate candy and the symptoms returned."

"The next day he had a terrible time in school. He was running around and was very hard to handle. He got into one difficulty after another and came home with a ripped shirt. It took about two weeks for him to settle down."

**WHEN MRS. KRAMER** heard about the Feingold diet on TV, it dawned on her that she was feeding Alan all the things the diet frowned upon.

"So I discussed it with my husband and daughter and they said they were willing to try anything," she commented. "It is essential for the whole family to go on the diet. It makes it easier for the child to adhere to it."

"I had to go to the cupboards and

clean out all the 'illegal' things. Then I went shopping for three hours."

After about three weeks she and her children went shopping together. As they were leaving Alan came up to his mother with gum he wanted to buy. Mrs. Kramer told him no, it had artificial coloring. He "nonchalantly" took it back without a question.

"My daughter looked at me and said, 'The diet's working,'" she said. "Before that he would have screamed and cried and carried on if he couldn't get what he wanted. After the diet he was able to listen to rules and adhere to them for the first time."

**THE EFFECT OF ALL THIS** on the Kramer family?

"It meant everybody was getting along better," explained Mrs. Kramer. "It wasn't such a hassle to get things done, to get Alan to do what he was supposed to do, things like chores and getting dressed."

She added that once they also excluded sugar, there was "total tranquility."

She is against Ritalin as an answer to hyperactivity because it masks behavior.

"It doesn't give the child a chance to develop self-control," she stated. "Then when he's taken off Ritalin, he finds he has no self-control because he never needed to have it."

## Stuff your child if you want him to grow up fat

"We expect our children to be hungry when we want to eat," observed Dr. Sheldon Brenner of Pediatric Associates of Farmington. "We expect them to eat what we eat, and all of it. If we don't feel like eating, we don't. But we tell our children they have to eat everything on their plates."

Speaking at a meeting in Clay Elementary School, Livonia, the West

Bloomfield pediatrician stressed that stuffing a child is a rotten way to start him on the way to a healthy life.

"We make too much of the eating habits of children," he indicated. "We spend so much time on it, we don't have time to establish a good relationship with them or to teach them important things."

Be relaxed, he urged those attending a meeting sponsored by the Livonia Council of Early Childhood Services in

cooperation with the Women's Resource Center of Schoolcraft College. Eating should be a pleasant experience.

"Everyone projects his own feelings onto how a child should be fed," he said. "In the past, infant feeding was based on the family situation and ethnic customs rather than good nutritional knowledge. The fattest baby was the greatest, and mothers would compare the amount of food their children ingested."

**THE TIME TO START** training a child to eat properly is when he is born, said Dr. Brenner. Too many people thrust a bottle or a piece of candy at the child who is upset, so frustration becomes associated with eating.

"In adults the most common reaction to frustration is eating," he continued. "Anxiety should not be rewarded with food. Nor should parents use food as a threat. Eating should be pleasurable for a baby, his time to be in contact with mom."

He then brought up the matter of the child who eats listlessly at supper, and later in the evening is plied with ice cream and snacks by his parents to make them feel better.

"The child quickly learns to hold out for ice cream and snacks," the physician stated, adding that hassling over cleaning the plate can also cause problems.

"Food can become the mechanism through which a child will show his hostility toward his parents," he noted. "If he doesn't want to eat at one meal, he'll eat at the next. I've never seen a healthy child willing to starve himself."

He admitted there is a generation gap on the subject of urging food on children. "I've had grandparents of my patients call and tell me 'you're starving that child.'"

**PHYSICIAN WHO COUNSELS**

overweight children, Dr. Brenner emphasized the need of exercise for youngsters.

"Being overweight is not usually glandular or hormonal," he declared. "It means an individual is consuming more calories than are burned up."

With his overweight patients he stresses behavior modification, or possibly food modification.

"I stress eating behavior," he explained. "I show them the times they eat out of anxiety. I have them write down what they eat. They are always surprised at how much it is."

"I tell them they can eat what they want if they will burn off 500 more calories. Then they find out how much exercise is needed to burn it off."

Dr. Brenner treats the whole family along with its obese child. "If they are not willing to take fats out of the house, they're punishing their children," he contended. "With food, it's out of sight, out of mind."

Fat kids are often rejected by their peers, so they eat more and more, and withdraw more and more, he said.

"I'd like to see special gym classes with exercises designed to burn off the calories for fat kids, where they wouldn't have to compete with the other kids. Their whole treatment could be centered around school."

Some fat children tend to blame all their problems on their size and have fantasies about how great it would be if they were thin.

"I CAN'T SAY to them that if they lose weight their life will change," Dr. Brenner said. "I try to help them learn to respect themselves, and I try to get them motivated."

Dr. Brenner is encouraged by the fact that young people are learning much more about nutrition today than ever before, but believes that wide dissemination of information on the subject still has a long way to go.

"Nutrition is not taught in medical

schools," he said. "Until recently physicians were way behind in learning about nutrition."

He felt that interest in nutrition is one of the reasons that more college graduates are breastfeeding their babies than ever before.

Not only is this good nutritionally, but it reduces anxiety about the amount the baby eats. "Most breasts are not calibrated in ounces," he laughed.

"So most mothers don't know how much the child has eaten. I keep getting calls from mothers who say the baby drank four ounces from the bottle at the last feeding and only two ounces now."

He indicated that this was an over-reaction.

The main benefits of breast milk are that it gives the infant natural immunities, as well as fewer intestinal disorders and infectious diseases than is commonly seen in the newborn.

"It is also cheaper," added the doc-

tor. "The food is always there and at the proper temperature. In most cases it is the best way to feed an infant."

Breast milk is 50 per cent fat and ingested at a time when infant nutrition requirement are greatest in the area of fat. This fat is needed for the maturation of the nervous system.

**DR. BRENNER COUNSELS** parents not to start babies too early on solid foods. "They add a lot of calories and increase the number of fat cells," he said. "I'm against giving solid food to babies before four to six months. Studies have shown that adding solid food doesn't make infants sleep through the night."

"I like them to stay away from carbohydrates. In addition, until recently baby food was high in salt and had preservatives. I prefer that they go on table foods because the junior foods are a ripoff."

He advised parents to hang loose about what foods are eaten and when to start.

## Research supports Feingold diet

Artificial food dyes "impair and disrupt" the behavior of some children, according to data developed by teams of researchers at the University of Pittsburgh school of medicine.

The findings, announced by the Feingold Association of the U.S., support part of the thesis advanced by California pediatric allergist Dr. Ben Feingold. He claims food chemicals are largely to blame for the post-World War II phenomenon known as hyperactivity.

Researchers, led by Drs. C. Keith Connors and Charles Goyette, set out

over two years ago to show that Feingold's contention was wrong.

To their surprise, they found the initial results of their research strongly suggested that a diet free of artificial flavors and colors reduced apparent hyperactivity of some children.

Connors and Goyette, however, cited a need for further investigation into the subject.

As a result of the initial finding, the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare funded a second \$228,000 study involving about 80 children.

The bride's parents are Howard and Kay Karstetter of Fountain Valley, Calif.

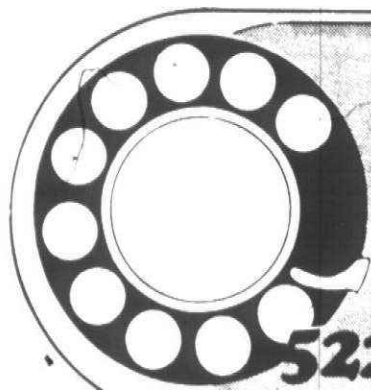

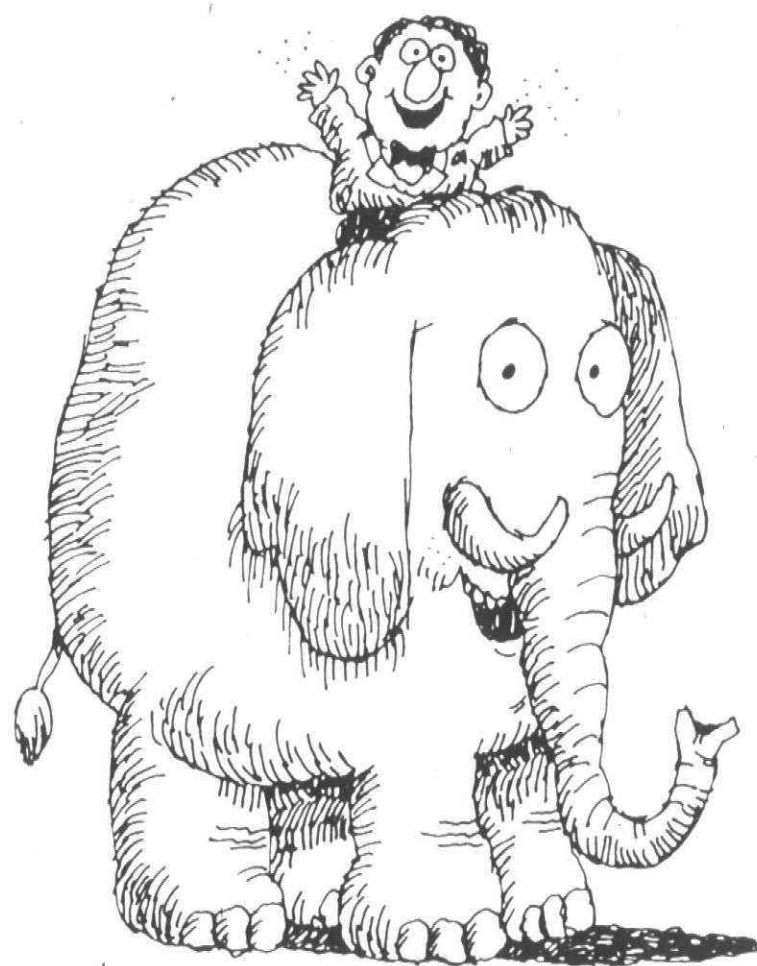
