Contact sports ruling puts coaches in uproar

Jack and Jill are no longer restricted to running up and down hills together.

In a decision carrying nationwide impact, a federal judge in Ohio ruled last week that girls must be allowed to compete with boys in high school contact sports.

In Plymouth and Canton, high school coaches for both boys' and girls' sports are saying the ruling "is ridiculous."

"I don't think there's a place for women in contact sports," said Dave Schuele, Plymouth-Canton High football coach. "In wrestling, girls competing with boys would be a fiasco."

"I don't think much of it. We're trying to develop a program for girls and we'd like to see that development continue. This doesn't help," said John Sandmann, athletic director for Plymouth-Canton Community schools.

"I can't conceive of it happening," said Tom Moshimer, Salem football

coach. "Football is a man's game. I'd hate to see a 130-pound girl try to compete with some of the 200-pound kids on our football team."

"THE DECISION was obviously made by a judge and not a person with an athletic background."

The most disturbing part, coaches say, is that instead of helping to promote girls' athletics, the ruling threatens its existence.

"There's no doubt the real problem will be when guys go out for girls' teams," said Mike McCauley, Canton

High girls' basketball coach. "If a girl goes out for a football team, the level of competition will take care of the problem. But the girls will lose out when boys start taking over their sports."

"I think there is enough competition in girls' sports. Let's keep them separate."

"I have a feeling that women are cutting their own throats," Schuele said. "If this keeps up, they're going to kill their own program."

THE OHIO LAWSUIT was filed in 1974 by two seventh graders who were barred from joining an all-boys basketball team.

But there is some question whether the ruling affects Michigan high schools. Judge Dunbar Davis of the 35th District Court in Plymouth says the ruling is merely an opinion.

"I don't think the decision has any force unless it is made by an appellate court. This is another case of a judge making the law instead of interpreting it."

"Just because a federal judge made a decision in Ohio doesn't mean we have to follow it," McCauley said. "We can do anything we want here until someone is taken to court."

Coaches for boys' sports, however, are still faced with the prospect of girls trying out for their teams.

"By law, you'd have to give a girl an equal shot at making the team," Schuele said. "But I would more than likely find some way to rid myself of the problem. It's something that you hope doesn't come about."

Schuele said he had a girl try out for his baseball team at Highland Park, but she could not compete and was cut.

"MY QUESTION is why would a girl want to wrestle?" said Dan Chrenko, wrestling coach at Canton High. "In my five years, three girls have asked about wrestling on our team. I had them watch a workout first. Afterwards, they didn't want to come out because it was too hard."

Chrenko said he would let girls try out for the Canton wrestling squad.

Schuele, whose son wrestles for Livonia Bentley, said he would not want his boy to compete against a girl. "I'd be real apprehensive if there were a half-dozen girls on the wrestling team. It's not healthy."

"We've never been faced with this type of threat before," Moshimer said. "It wouldn't surprise me if a girl tried out for our team next fall to get all the publicity."

"If it's a law, I imagine we'll have to go along with it."

4 cops crash, but trio caught

Icy streets Tuesday took their toll on a host of officers and police vehicles involved in a high speed chase of three suspected armed robbers.

Several policemen were injured and five vehicles damaged as officers from five law enforcement agencies pursued three men in a chase that started in Canton Township and ended in Inkster a half hour later.

Officers from Wayne and Inkster finally arrested the trio, charged with robbing a Canton bait shop.

Arrested on two counts—armed robbery and possession of a firearm in commission of a felony—were Carl L. Ladosz, 49, of 7406 Waldo, Detroit; Anthony Mazzio, 38, 8158 Mandalan, Detroit and Robert P. Vincent of Troy.

Wayne County Sheriff Det. Larry Patterson said Mazzio was out on parole for a bank robbery when arrested and also out on \$5,000 bond for a recent armed robbery in Detroit. The other two men arrested were also parolees, Patterson said.

Tuesday morning a man reportedly entered the Hudson Bait Shop, 43271 Ford Road, carrying a minnow bucket. Jeff Fisher, 18, an attendant in the bait store, said the man, who police claim was Ladosz, asked him if he had any perch minnows. Fisher, of Westland, said when he went to get the minnows, two other men entered the store wearing ski masks.

"One of the guys wearing a mask had a .22 pistol pointed at my head and used pretty dirty language telling me to get in the back room and lay down," Fisher said.

FISHER'S HANDS were taped behind his back with heat tape.

"They kept yelling that they wanted the pistols, they wanted the guns," Fisher said.

A 410 pump shotgun was reported stolen, along with a BB-gun, 14 boxes of ammunition, a knife, two fishing poles, \$160 in cash and Fisher's wallet. Fisher described Charles Hudson, owner of the bait shop, as a gun collector.

"I asked them, 'Listen, will you at least leave me my driver's license—take my wallet and anything in the store but leave me my license,'" Fisher said. "That really got the guy with the gun angry. He said 'I'll shoot you about that license,' so I dropped the subject." Minutes after they left, Fisher broke the tape.

All of the stolen goods were recovered when police arrested the trio in a stolen, silver Dodge van.

The first police car to respond to Fisher's call to the Wayne County Sheriff's was Ken Winkler, Canton patrolman. Winkler totalled his patrol car at the Ford-Canton Center intersection when a motorist reportedly blocked the street and was struck by Winkler. The driver, Chris Katros of Canton, was ticketed for blocking the intersection and ignoring an emergency vehicle warning.

Officers from Wayne spotted the van at Venoy, near Michigan, and began the chase. Wayne Ptl. John Colligan hit his head against the windshield when he rammed the van, trying to get the trio to pull over. He suffered minor injuries. A Wayne animal control vehicle was also damaged in the chase and the van struck a parked car while trying to elude police.

The chase came to an abrupt halt when an Inkster patrol car slammed head-on into the van. Inkster Officer John McGruder was treated for a leg injury.

Helping hands, block parents, prepare to keep children safe

If there's one thing that's foremost in the minds of parents throughout western Wayne County suburbs, it's child safety.

Individuals and parent-teacher groups in Westland, Livonia, Redford Township, Garden City, Plymouth and Canton Township are forming block parent and helping hand programs.

These programs are designed with a dual message. They want children and their parents to be safety-conscious and warn potential child molesters to stay away.

"We want strangers to know that this is a community that cares," said Dorothy Miller, a parent who has been organizing a safety program at Patchin Elementary School in the Wayne-Westland District. "We hope

this will deter anyone from coming into our neighborhoods."

The Garden City Parent-Teacher Association participates in a project called a block house program. This is a statewide project, in which volunteer parents in every elementary school area throughout the district display a red sign accented by a black house.

Youngsters in that district are instructed that if they are afraid, lost, or approached by strangers, the house displaying this sign is safe.

As part of its child safety and welfare campaign, Garden City PTA President Della Haydon says members are urging parents to dress their youngsters properly during the winter months.

Many elementary school PTAs in the Wayne-Westland district, which includes part of Canton Township, have organized block parent programs similar to those in Garden City. While Patchin Elementary tried to form one last year, it wasn't until this winter that Mrs. Miller has been able to organize a multi-faceted campaign for child safety in that attendance area.

As part of that campaign, Mrs. Miller's group of parents has contacted Observer Newspapers, requesting cooperation in running the iron-on transfer which appears on the back page of this (A) section.

Since the Patchin group began to organize, Mrs. Miller said she has been approached by PTA members in Livonia and South Lyon. They are cooperating with the Patchin group in

asking both parents and youngsters to wear the iron-on transfers on sweat-shirts and T-shirts to promote awareness of child safety.

Some elementary school students, such as those at Patchin, also view a film on child safety sponsored by the Harry J. Will Funeral Home in Livonia and Redford Township.

The block parent program organized at Patchin divides the school into five attendance areas. Each area has from two to 30 homes participating in the program. There are 500 students at Patchin.

The block parent program at that school also has been the basis for a list of 62 parents forming a system for phoning every child's home in case of an emergency such as bad weather.

"We've had phone fanouts in the past, but this time we're more organized," said Mrs. Miller. The system was tested during bad weather this year when school was dismissed early for the day.

Westland police officers also have worked with the block parents at Patchin, offering them suggestions

Students at Patchin also have designed two bumper stickers, which are being sold in Wayne-Westland and Livonia districts for 50 cents each. Both are orange fluorescent in color. One reads, "My dog eats child molesters." The other reads, "A stranger is danger."

The bumper stickers were chosen in a contest, which was used to involve

Bush appealing his suspension

Suspended Canton patrolman Leonard Bush will appeal his 30-day "defamation of character" suspension at a closed meeting of the Canton Board of Trustees Tuesday night.

His attorney is Peter Bundarin. Bush was suspended for allegedly using obscene language, while off-duty in the Rusty Nail Lounge, to describe Maureen Filarecki.

Bush required six stitches in the head when he was called to a domestic quarrel between Ms. Filarecki and a male acquaintance of hers, Robert Lee Simmers III.

Simmers is charged with striking Ptl. Bush with a police-issue flashlight that other officers claim was taken from Ptl. Kathy Petres. Simmers faces a hearing today on a misdemeanor charge resulting from the incident.

But Ms. Filarecki refused to sign a complaint against Simmers, charging that police aggravated the situation by not letting Simmers drive away.

After the incident, Ms. Filarecki

signed a complaint against Bush stating that the officer directed obscene remarks towards her while in the Rusty Nail, a bar Ms. Filarecki worked at until early last month.

Ironically, Ms. Filarecki was a house guest at Bundarin's until a week after the incident. In fact it was Bundarin who called police to his house when he said he observed Simmers "kicking, punching and spitting" on the 21-year-old Ms. Filarecki.

Bundarin lauds the police conduct at his home and said last week that Ms. Filarecki "doesn't realize the damage she's doing to Leonard Bush, Rusty Johnson (owner of the bar), and the entire Canton Police Department. She thinks she's a celebrity."

John Flodin, township clerk and chairman of the Canton Police Commission, said the township board will hear Bush's appeal because the police commission has "no authority" to rule on employee discipline appeals.

Bush's suspension began Jan. 9.

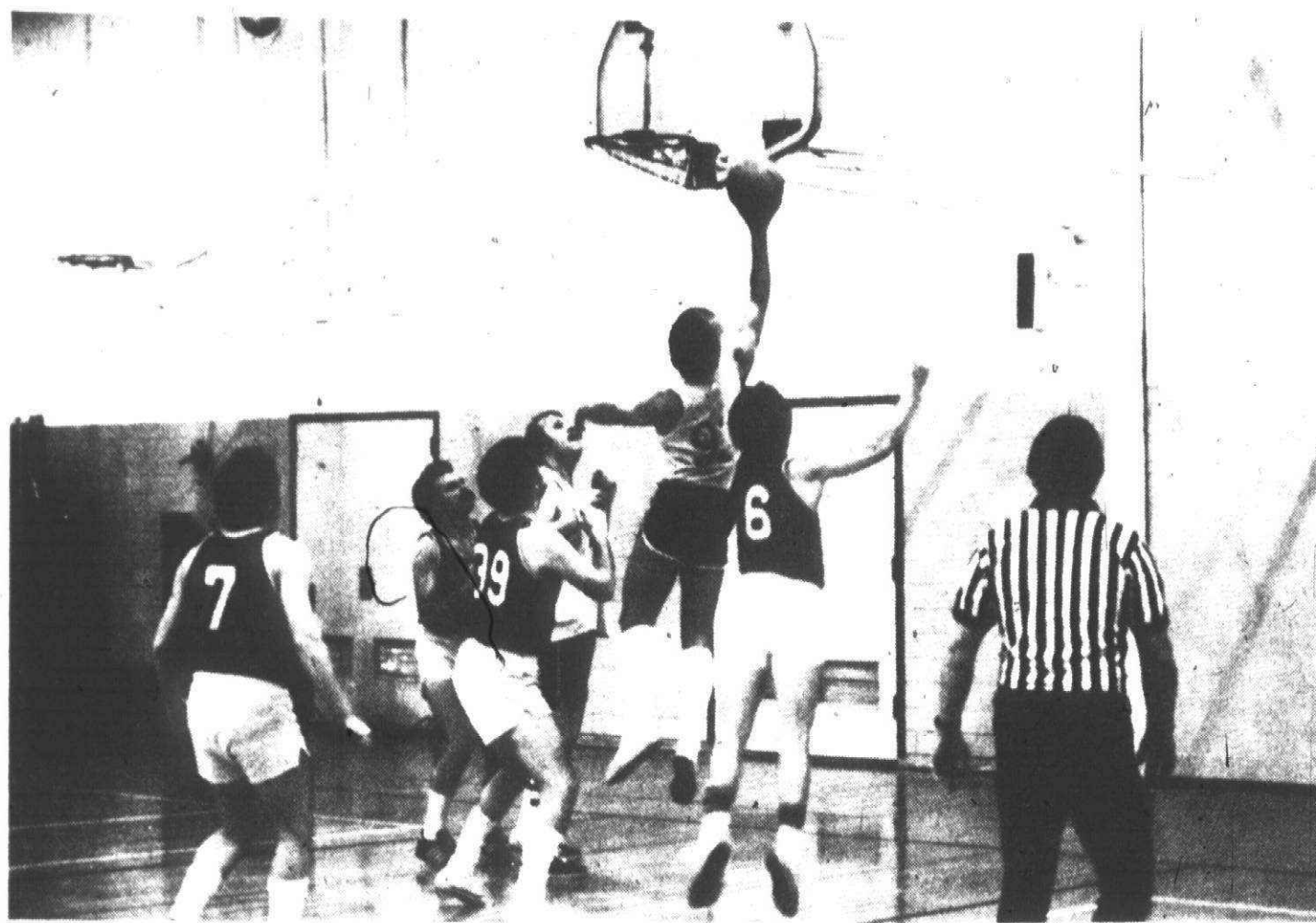

Deadline is here for applications to run golf club

People or corporations interested in managing Canton's newly-acquired Fellows Creek golf course have until 5 p.m. tonight to apply to the township board.

Supervisor Harold Stein has already solicited bids from five businessmen who manage municipal or privately-owned golf courses.

But Stein said he expects the township board will also receive bids from people and corporations that didn't get the special invitation to bid but heard it through "the golf management grapevine."

The management firm that is selected will have to pay Canton Township \$100,000 or 50 per cent of the total green fees (whichever is greater) and keep the rest of the profits from the course and clubhouse. Officials have not yet determined if the management firm will get a fixed fee or percentage.

Along with the contract to manage the golf course, the firm that is selected will also be a lessee of a liquor license at the course. If management changes, the liquor license

remains in the township's hands.

Stein sent invitations to bid to David Ross, president of Hilltop Glen Golf Course. Ross is manager of Plymouth Township's municipal golf course. Other people being asked to bid are John Jawor of Farmington; Don Loomis of Livonia; Jim Vargo, president of Fox Hills Country Club in Salem Township; and Gil Opaleski of S&M Management in Southfield.

Canton Township will pay Fellow Creek's previous owners—Whitney Ballantine and lesser stockholders—\$1 million for the property and buildings. The project will be paid off over a 20-year period and the township's yearly bond obligation is estimated to be \$85,425.

A \$200,000 federal recreation grant will be applied to defray the cost of the course. The township's accountant firm, Seidman and Seidman, said Canton can expect a first year profit of about \$40,000 after the bond payment is made. Any profit, Stein said, will be plowed into the recreation program.

Six vie for school board

Six people have their eyes on the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education seat vacated by George Lawton earlier this month.

Those six are: James D. Walasky, Elizabeth Griffith, Richard A. Ostella, Elaine J. Kirchgatter, Richard A. Smith and R. Richard Hayes.

Mrs. Kirchgatter, Smith, and Hayes, each made an unsuccessful bid for the seat vacated by Marcia Borowski last summer.

The board will interview the three new applicants Jan. 25 in the board offices on Harvey Street beginning at 7:30 p.m.

The new trustee will be announced at a special meeting on Jan. 26 or 27.

WALASKY, OF 4207 Ann Arbor Trail, Plymouth, calls himself a life-time resident of the community. He is employed by the Hoover-NSK Bearing Company and serves as assistant to the secretary-treasurer.

He said the single most important problem facing the school district is money. Next is education quality.

"It seems like we are told all the time that kids aren't getting the education they used to, but the money for the schools keeps going up. I think we have to take a hard look at what we're spending compared to what we're getting." He registered to vote in 1973 and has voted three times since.

MRS. GRIFFITH, of 44741 Erik Pass, Plymouth Township, stated in her letter of application, "My main concern is my desire to see all

children receive an equal and fair education in all grades."

She also said she lives in a "high-growth area and would represent these people and their concerns." She registered to vote in 1973 and has voted in three elections.

OSTELLA, OF 679 Adams Street, Plymouth, has been in the community for 18 months. He holds a Master's degree in Theology from the Westminster Theological Seminary in Philadelphia.

He said he was hesitant to apply for the board seat because of "the weighty and complex problems that must be dealt with studiously." He registered to vote this month.

SMITH, OF 1948 Brookfield Road, Canton, is a lawyer. He and his family have lived in the community for 18 months.

Smith said he decided to submit another application because he wanted to change a few things that he feels detract from the educational quality in the district. Specifically, he mentioned the modular scheduling currently used at Centennial Educational Park.

"I've talked to a number of people and at least one administrator who tell me that people have moved out of this community to avoid modular scheduling."

He also said he was concerned about the lack of openness on the board. "They don't tell us what they are going to do or how they are going to do it. They just ask for millage." He reg-

istered to vote in 1973 and has voted once since.

HAYES, OF 33526 Clare, Plymouth, is the controller of the Burroughs Corporation's Tireman plant. He has lived in Plymouth four years.

In his letter to the board, Hayes stated he was interested in "fiscal responsibility and sound management of educational programs." He and his family recently moved to the Clare address, and he registered to vote in December.

MRS. KIRCHGATTER, lives at 48377 Gyde Road, Canton. She has lived in the school district for over 12 years.

She said that the board faces many critical issues, but her primary concerns are budget, millage, and bond requests.

"I'm interested in all problems in the district," she said. "And I don't have any ax to grind, and I'm not associated with any special interest group." She registered to vote in 1969 and has voted in 13 elections.

students and increase their awareness in the need for being careful.

In Redford Township, students in the South Redford and Redford Union school districts receive a visit from members of the Redford Crime Prevention Bureau.

A program presented by that bureau includes a movie, which demonstrates the difference between "green light people," such as a child's friends, parents and teacher, and other "red light people."

Most elementary schools in the Livonia and Plymouth-Canton districts participate in a Helping Hand program. That program is a volunteer effort designed to provide a child with protection during an emergency situation, such as an accident, sudden ill-

ness, bad weather or being lost, according to Sylvia Stetz, chairwoman of the Plymouth-Canton project.

Volunteer homes participating in the program display a red helping hand symbol in a window. There are about 1,500 such homes in the Plymouth-Canton area in each of the 14 elementary school attendance areas.

"I've had nothing but good reactions," said Sylvia Stetz in assessing the program.

In addition to the Helping Hand program, Livonia parents are beginning to organize citizen band radio operators to enhance child safety.

Mrs. Miller believes so strongly in the child safety program being developed at Patchin, that she said she is willing to help other parents form block programs at their schools. She may be reached by calling 729-1859.

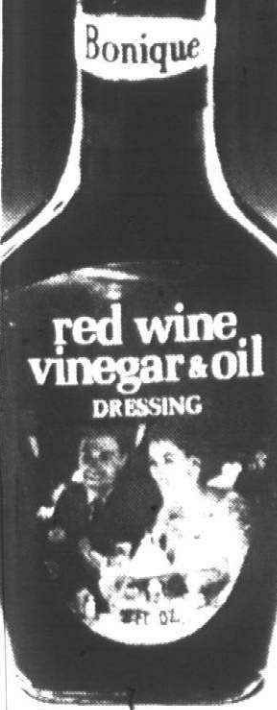

The fear of pregnancy was rampant

The sex education controversy of the last decade has died down. But the subject can still draw emotional responses.

It's touchy, of course, because sex education in school always runs up against individual religious beliefs. That's one reason the state used wisdom when drawing up guidelines for sex education in the classroom. The rules provide a student may be excused if the topic conflicts with personal religious convictions.

Plymouth-Canton Community School District is considering adding to its health education courses a block of instruction on birth control. That won't be done haphazardly. First, an advisory committee, including parents, will be formed to discuss how the subject should be treated and presented in the classrooms at both high schools. Then there will be opportunity for public input.

When and if birth control instruction is offered, parents still will have the option of pulling their children from the classroom.

EVEN WITH THESE safeguards, the subject likely will draw a lot of controversy when it comes time to make decisions.

And from my viewpoint, the controversy isn't just religious. Opposition to giving birth control instruction comes from persons of all faiths. And there are persons of all faiths who support offering birth control instruction in the schools. To me, then, it is an oversimplification to consider birth control instruction only a religious issue. It's broader.

During the period I was an early teen, birth control methods were pretty rudimentary and almost exclusively employed by married adults.

The only "birth control" method used for young singles and teens was a verbal admonishment: "Don't do it or you'll get pregnant."

If you are my age or older, you'll also recall that the verbal admonishment was pretty effective. The basic reason, I believe, pre-marital sex was less prevalent than today was the fear of pregnancy. Teens didn't have access to the pill, and any other methods had to be used clandestinely.

Thus, a lot of us didn't do it for a long time for only one reason—the fear of pregnancy. And this fear was driven very deep into our consciousness by our parents.

MODERN DAY parents are faced with a dilemma.

With the pill and its easy accessibility, the fear of pregnancy is an ineffective reason. Parents no longer can warn: "Don't do it or you'll get pregnant," or "Don't do it or you'll get her pregnant."

Instead, for parents concerned about pre-marital sex, the strategy is to keep the pill away from the single female members of the household. And you have to be subtle about that. You can't say, "Don't take the pill or you'll end up doing it" because, of course, they will. And parents who don't want their daughters engaging in pre-marital sex won't say, "If you do it, take the pill."

The result is that young people do not know much about the pill, and certainly that they don't know much about how to get the pill. If children are kept ignorant, parents can effectively warn: "Don't do it or you'll get pregnant."

Of course, parents who aren't overly concerned about pre-marital sex can allow their children to learn about the pill, how and where to get it and use it. For them there is no dilemma.

Topics for discussion will be the new child pornography law, Juvenile Code revisions in the area of court jurisdiction, guardian neglect or abuse, and status offenders.

Conducting the forum will be State Reps. Robert C. Law and Jack Kirksey, both Republicans from Livonia. Among those participating will be Wayne County Commissioner Mary Dumas, Wayne County Juvenile Judge

James Lacey, and Livonia District Judge James Mies.

How to apply T-shirt iron-on

Instructions: 1) Pre-heat and set iron to wool setting. 2) Place aluminum foil on ironing board so transfer will not go through shirt to board. 3) Slide T-shirt onto board with fabric over foil, chest side up. 4) Lay the iron-on on the shirt, printed side down so that red ink comes into direct contact with shirt. 5) Move iron back and forth across the transfer with firm, even pressure for one minute unless the newspaper turns brown, which may occur in less than a minute. 6) Allow transfer to cool; then peel it off.

Survey indicates support for ESY

A survey conducted by Plymouth-Canton Community Schools suggests a majority of parents support year-round school.

A majority (62 per cent) of the parents responding reported their children like the Extended School Year (ESY) schedule. Almost as many (59 per cent) said their children have learned as much under the year-round plan as they did under the traditional nine-month schedule, with 28 per cent undecided.

The survey was sent out in December by the school administration. Of the 4,758 surveys sent home to parents of students on the ESY calendar, 3,105 or 62 per cent were returned.

THE ESY PLAN divides students into four tracks. Each track attends school for nine weeks (45 days) and then has a three-week vacation (15 days) throughout the year.

Because only three tracks are in school at any one time, the capacity of school buildings is increased by one third.

Changes in parent attitudes toward the 45-15 calendar were clearly toward the positive, reports Florence Beier, administrative assistant for community relations. Parents described their attitudes in August 1977 as 41 per cent positive, 21 per cent negative, and 37 per cent undecided. In December 1977 they were 54 per cent positive, 21 per cent negative, and 23 per cent undecided.

One of the concerns about year-round school, notes Mrs. Beier, has been its effect on family vacations. Only 35 per cent of the ESY parents said they had changed their vacation schedules, and 71 per cent responded that there had been no problems with the vacation scheduling.

The issue of track rotation was posed to parents, with track rotation explained as shifting track A to the B calendar, B to C, C to D, and D to A. Half the parents responding were against track rotation. Only 17 per cent favored rotation and 31 per cent were neutral.

Differences among the responses from parents on the four tracks illustrated that not all calendars have equal appeal, noted Mrs. Beier. Most favorable to rotation were track D parents (31 per cent) and most opposed were track C (68 per cent), who would be shifted to the track D calendar. However, 32 per cent of the track D parents also were opposed to track rotation.

When asked if their children liked school as well under 45-15 as under the traditional schedule, the least positive answers did come from parents of students on track D. The greatest negative response also came from track D parents on all survey questions, including vacation scheduling.

THE NEGATIVE ATTITUDES expressed by parents of students on Track D likely are related to a disrupted schedule around the Christmas holidays, a longer period during the summer months, and scheduled classes during August—a favorite vacation month.

Students on Track D begin their school year Sept. 19, some three weeks later than the other three tracks. They attend nine weeks until Nov. 18 and are then off until Dec. 18. The first class is then held Dec. 12 with the schedule being interrupted on Dec. 23 for the holiday break. Students on track D return after the holidays on Jan. 2 and finish their nine-week swing on Feb. 10.

After a three-week vacation, track D students resume classes on March 6 and continue until April 5 before they are off for another three weeks. Classes resume May 30 and are in session (except for July 4) until July 7 when a two-week break is scheduled. Then classes are in session from July 24 through Aug. 23.

This means track D students are in class longer during the summer than the other three tracks, and are in school more days during the month of August.

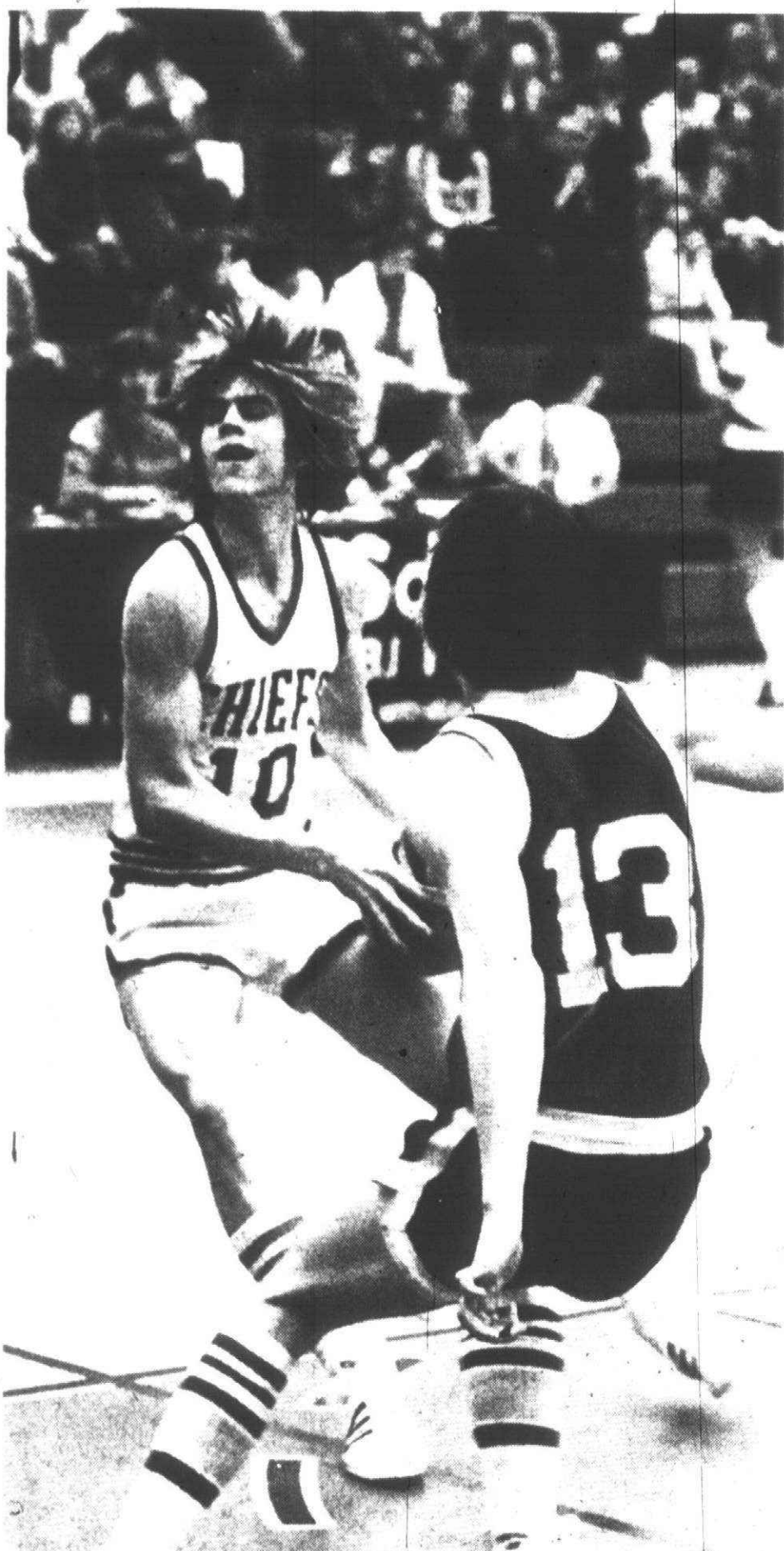

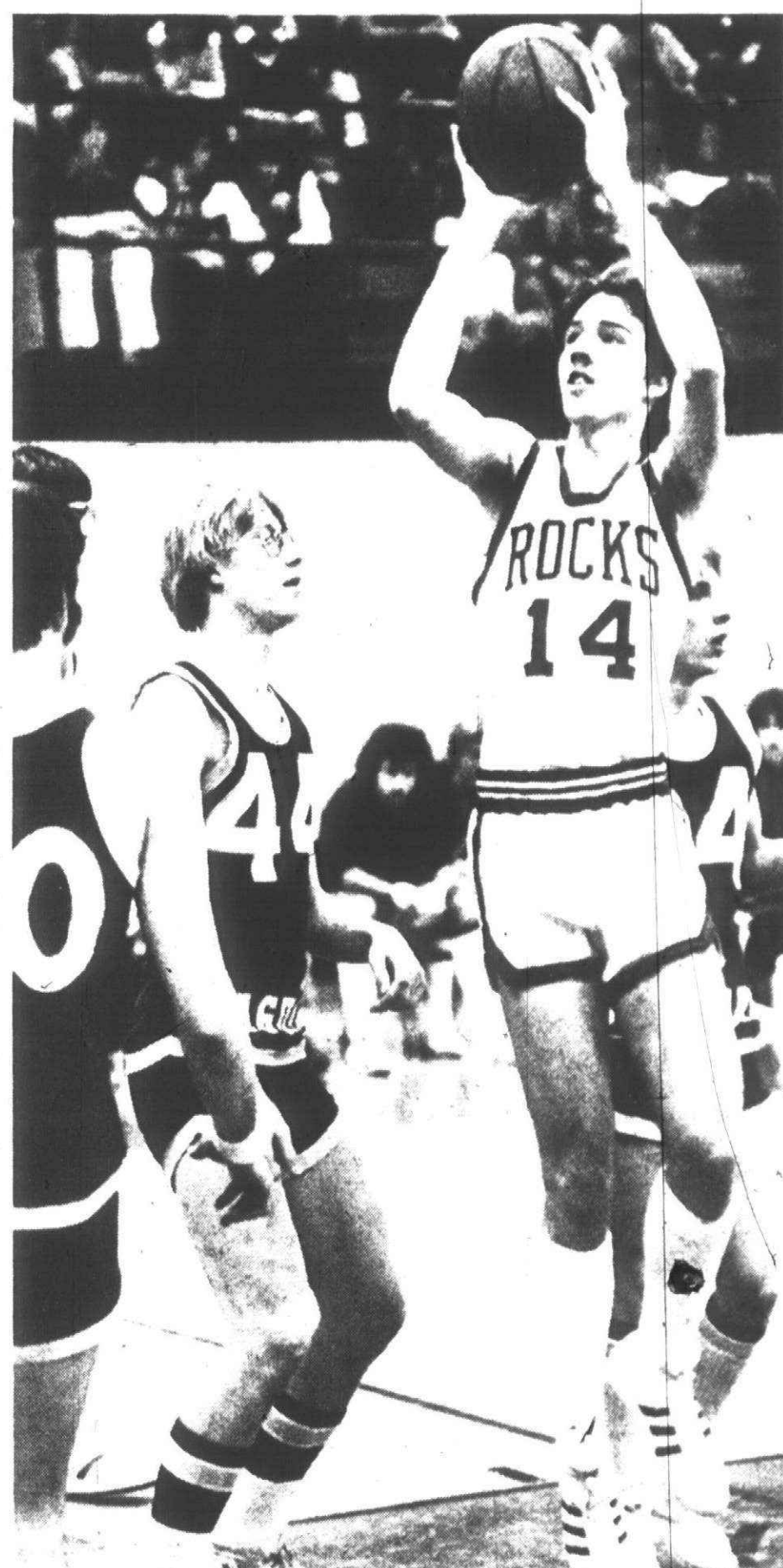

Steve Gray with 157.85 points. John Gray, injured during a dive last Tuesday, suffered only minor scrapes and bruises and is expected to return sometime next week.

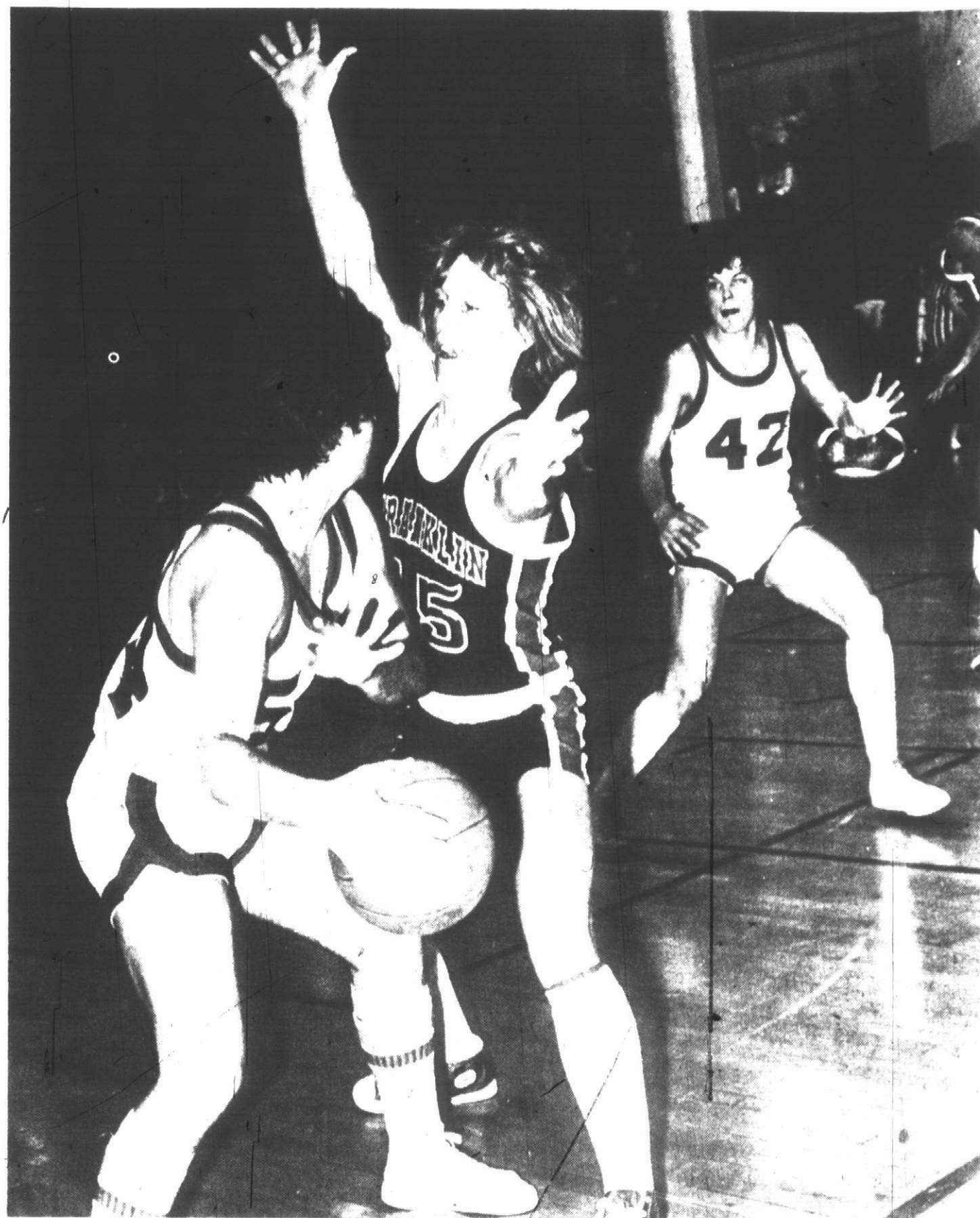
Senior tri-captain Wood won the 100-yard butterfly in :57.4. Tanner and Paul Ardnowski followed in second and third, respectively.

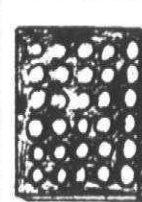

Delicate story in 'Lacemaker'

At the end of "The Lacemaker" the meaning of the title, which initially seems so puzzling, is revealed. At that moment, we are in a sense given a new perspective of the film. It is well worth the wait.

Normally, one does not expect a literary or theatrical work to introduce a new theme at the end. The device works here because, in retrospect, one can recognize that this theme always was present, even if not clearly discernible.

The effect is to render greater aesthetic and emotional appeal. "The Lacemaker" is a movie which grows on one. The persistence of vision we exercise in the movie theater is replaced by persistence of feeling as we leave.



ISABELLE HUPPERT

Largely responsible for these lingering feelings is Isabelle Huppert, a gifted young French actress who plays the leading role of Beatrice, called Pomme by her friends. Ms. Huppert has a marvelously captivating face, somewhere between radiant angel and freckled pixie. Her demure appearance, intense silences and long stares engage our attention and challenge our understanding to fathom her character.

BEATRICE IS a gentle, quiet girl, eager to please and thoughtful of others. She lives with her mother and works as an assistant in a beauty shop where someday she hopes to be a stylist.

Beatrice and her older and worldlier friend Marylene (Florence Giorgetti) take their vacation together at a resort on the Normandy Coast. Marylene soon picks up a stray American and moves in with him, thus leaving Beatrice to fend for herself.

In scene after scene, we see her alone, self-contained and uncomplaining. She eats ice cream by herself at an outdoor cafe, strolls the beaches amid the crowds, listens to the radio in her room while through the walls she hears the noises of active couples.

One day she meets Francois (Yves Beneyton), a young university student who is also a loner. Their awkward, self-conscious friendship blossoms into love.

When they return to Paris, Beatrice and Francois set up housekeeping together. He attends the Sorbonne and she continues to work at the beauty shop. At first they both seem idyllically happy.

BEATRICE HAS an ingenuousness and natural intelligence that ingratiate her wherever she goes (like a "Billy Budd" of emotional honesty). Francois, however, worries about her position among his intellectual friends. She reads, she asks intelligent questions, which he cannot always answer, yet he becomes critical of her. How can she be content to work in a beauty shop? he asks. Why doesn't she want to better herself? he persists. It's as if her contentment is an attack on his academic strivings.

To Beatrice, as sensitive as she is loving, the effects of his criticism and dissatisfaction are devastating. Yet, the fractured love affair is tragic for Francois too. He is trapped in a conflict between his true feelings for her and his middle-class expectations. Moreover, his own lack of social experience places him at a level where he tends to label people rather than to perceive them.

"The Lacemaker" is a graceful and absorbing movie from Swiss director Claude Goretta. In French with English subtitles, it is rated R because of some nudity.

Private 'Enterprise' seeks to bring space to masses

You don't have to go to the moon or into outer space to enjoy the spectacular advances from space technology.

William Green, a technical communications person for the Rockwell International Corporation, said recently that current space technology is aimed at making it cheaper to go into earth orbit and making that ability work for people on earth.

"Already we can inventory crops from space and will be able to spot disease in forestry or crops," he said. "Today no hurricane can form anywhere on the earth without being detected. We're opening up a whole new era when earth orbit can be used to help mankind."

Green came to the area to speak about the implications of the present space program. An Illinois native, he has lived in California for 17 years.

An engineer by training, he has been involved in space since the Apollo program in 1963. He was trained in the Air Force during the Korean War and said he has "simply grown with the space program" which he calls "fantastic."

Currently Green is on a tour of a series of cities where he speaks about the space and its implications for today.

"BASICALLY I speak a great deal about what we're doing with the space shuttle transportation system," he said. "This summer, of course, we flew a craft off the top of a 747 aircraft. With that we proved that you can take a space craft and release it, fly it and land it on a runway."

"That would be comparable to the last few minutes of an actual space flight with no engines. It was very successful and proved out fine."

Green, said that was called the "Enterprise" mission and that is now undergoing modification.

"In March, it will go to Huntsville, Ala. and we'll mate it with an external tank for the first time," he explained. "What we'll do is set it on its tail and three large engines will be placed in the tail. The propellants will be in the tank in the belly and that will give it the thrust."

Green said 1978 is scheduled to be a year of static firing tests of the engines.

Much of the current planning and engineering is designed to make the space program economically feasible.

"The cut in the NASA budget has meant compromising and as a result the space craft is now fully reusable. Twenty-seven miles up in space the solid rocket boosters will separate from the craft but they'll be recovered and reused."

"THE LARGE external tank is the

only thing that is not reusable because it will burn up on reentry into the earth's atmosphere. The craft will go on into earth orbit."

The space craft will be able to carry seven people. Four will be crew and three passengers.

"The commander and the pilot will be astronauts as in the past," he said and there will be a mission specialist and a mission handling specialist. The other three will probably be scientists or technicians."

Green said the atmosphere in the space craft will be exactly like that on earth so that space suits will not be required.

"Anyone will be able to fly in it if they are in good health," he said.

Rockwell's space craft is designed to carry a large satellite or other cargo up to 65,000 pounds. "It can carry a large 60 foot satellite," he said.

"Today if a satellite booster fails, it's a million dollar loss but we'll be carrying these satellites right up into space and can even replace one in space either with an astronaut doing it or by use of the manipulator arm in the space craft."

According to Green, space technologists proved they could do repair work in space in 1973 when the solar shield on a space craft didn't work and astronauts did the necessary repairs.

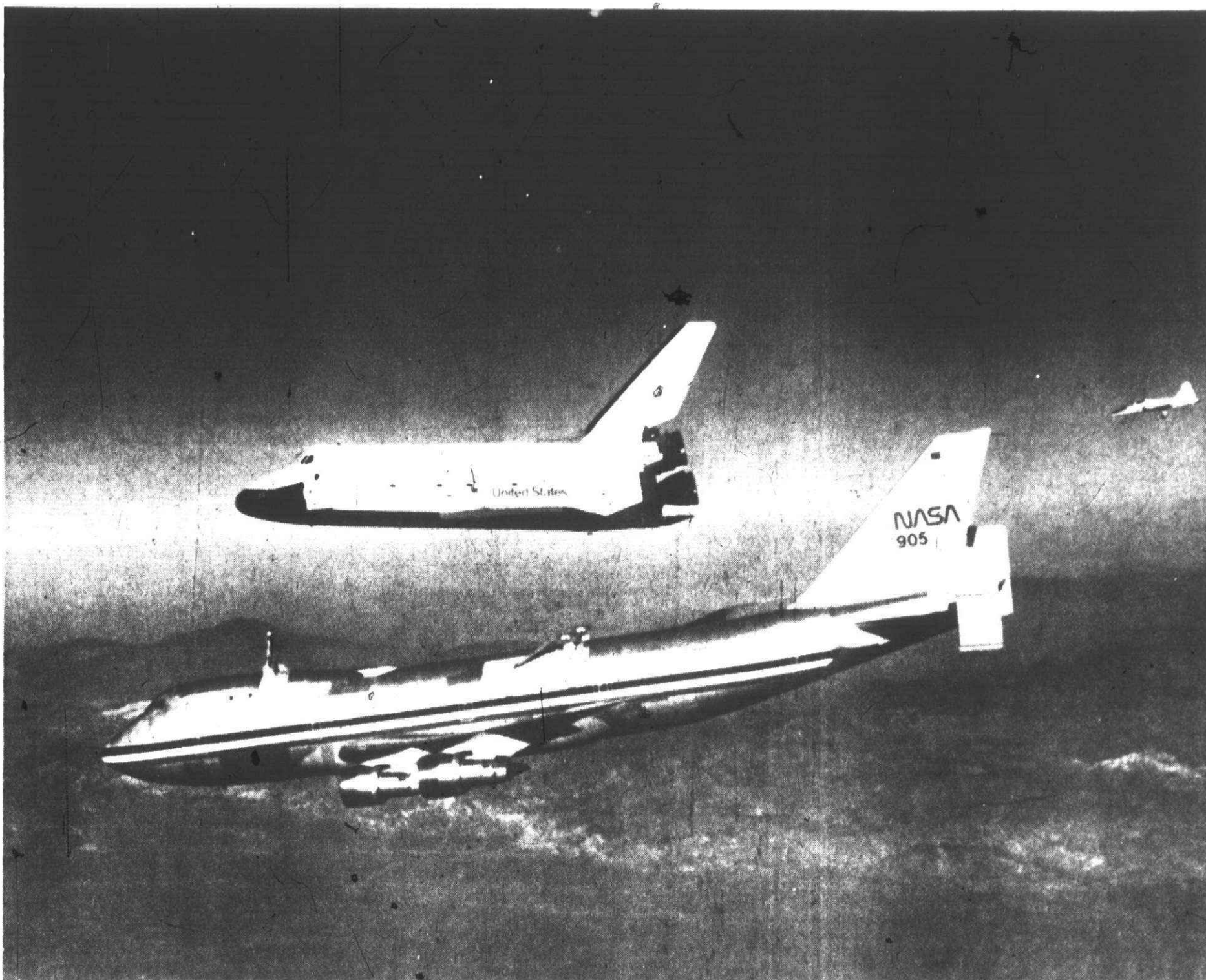
NASA is planning a seven day mission for the space shuttle but the craft actually will have the capacity to stay up for 30 days, Green stated.

"THIS CRAFT will operate from 100 to 600 miles from earth and is not meant to be sent to another planet," he said. "It will be used to boost things into earth orbit."

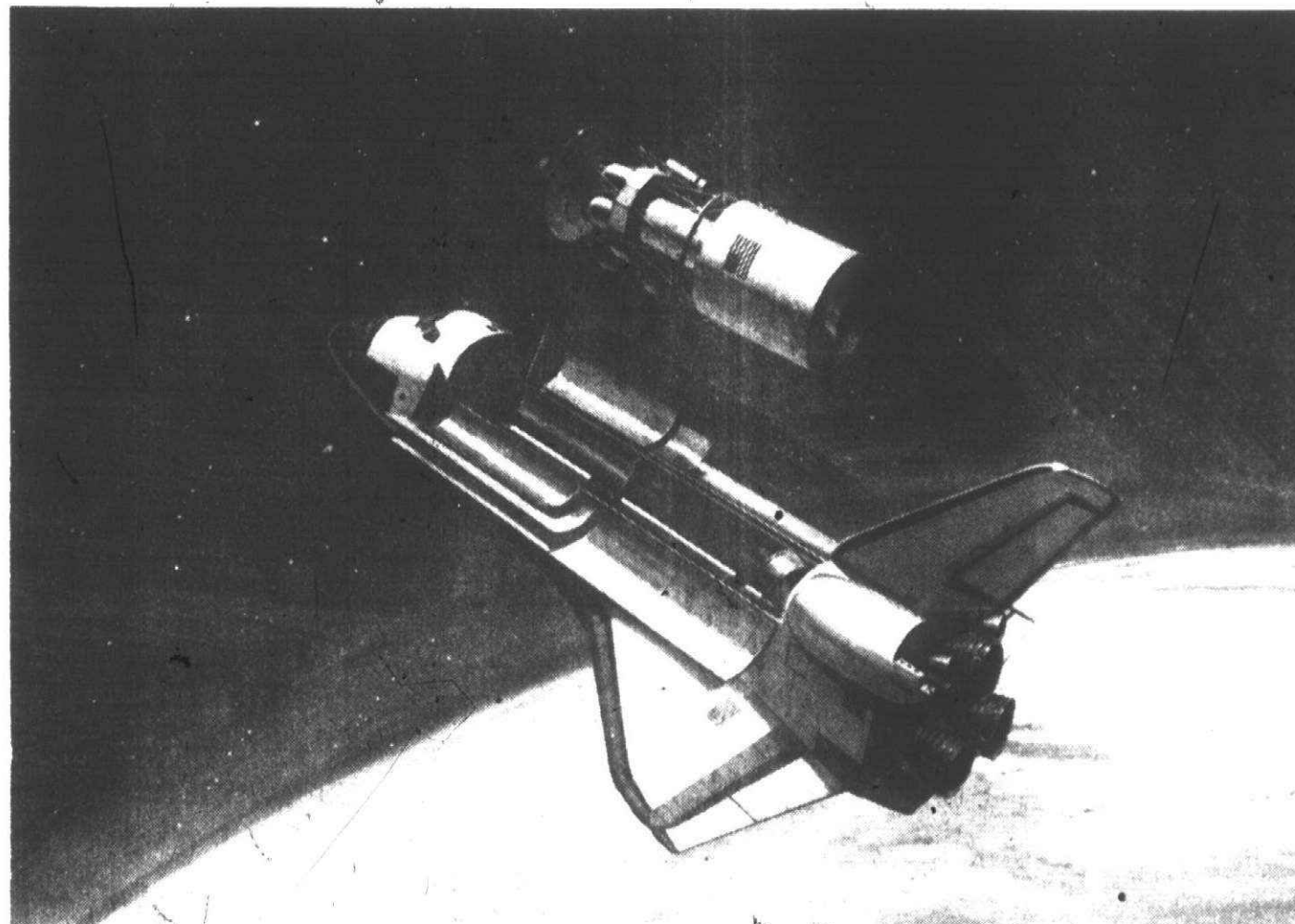
Made primarily of aluminum, the craft uses a thermo-protective system that is applied to the superstructure. It will not burn, char or break.

"And this new craft can be used for about 100 missions," he said. "It will enter space like a rocket, then fly like a jetliner so that we can control the speed."

He said the first flight into space is

planned for the second quarter of 1979, and that six flights are scheduled into 1980.

"On the seventh flight, NASA will consider the space shuttle operational," he said. He added that will be eight years after Rockwell's initial contract with the government to develop it.

Green explained that more than 10,000 people are employed in the space shuttle project but that 52 percent of the work is sub-contracted throughout the nation.

"There are 13 companies in the Detroit area that are involved and almost every city of some size has something to do with it," he said. "A

consortium of 11 European nations is building a space lab to fit into the cargo bay of the craft."

Green said the potential for helping mankind has not even begun to be tapped.

"In 1975 the Apollo and Soyuz missions both took kidney cells up into space in order to extract uric acid, the only known substance that can dissolve blood clots," he said.

"THE RESULTING substance was much purer than can be manufactured on earth and this is only the beginning. In zero gravity we can do many things we can't do on earth."

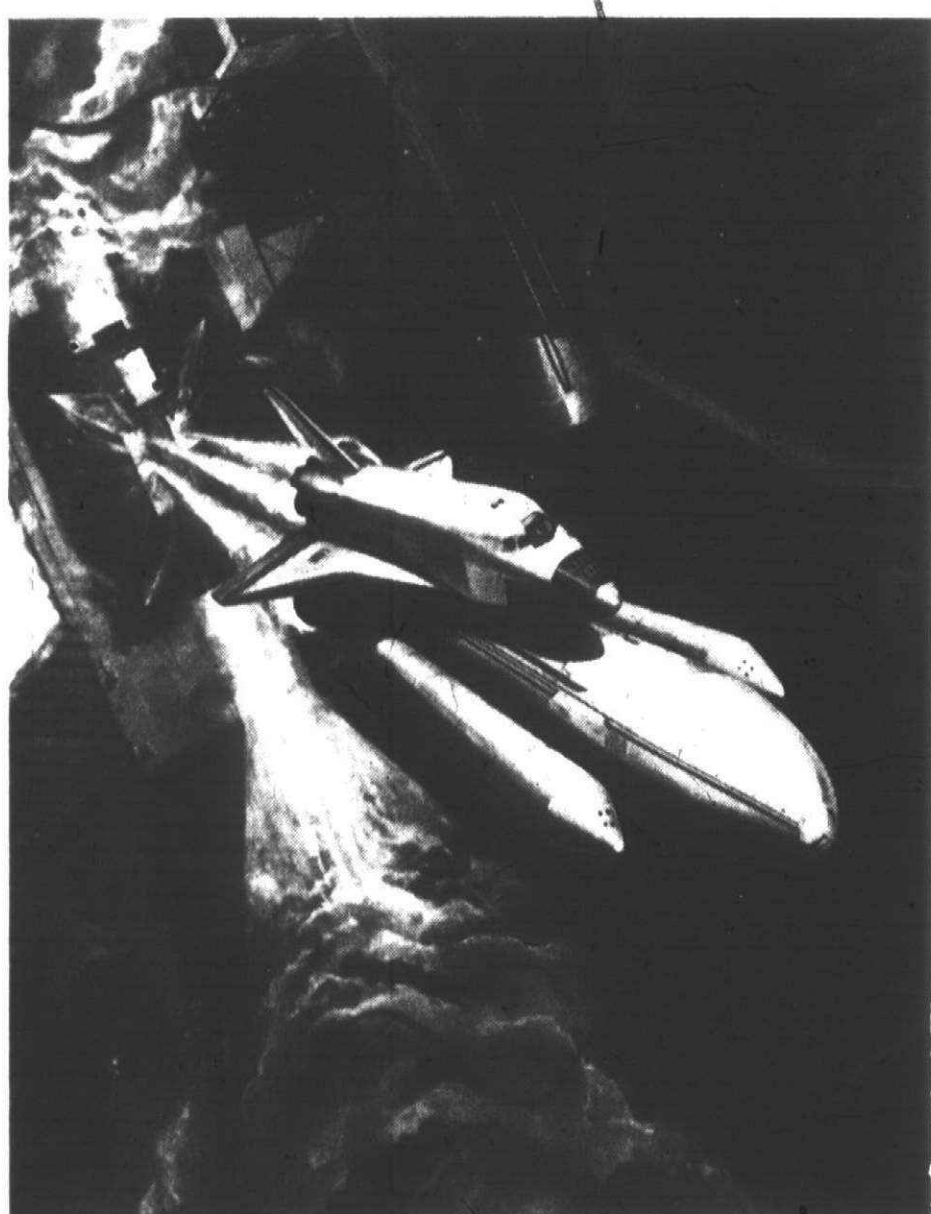
Current research will undoubtedly

lower the cost of putting communication satellites up on earth as well as manufacturing items in zero gravity.

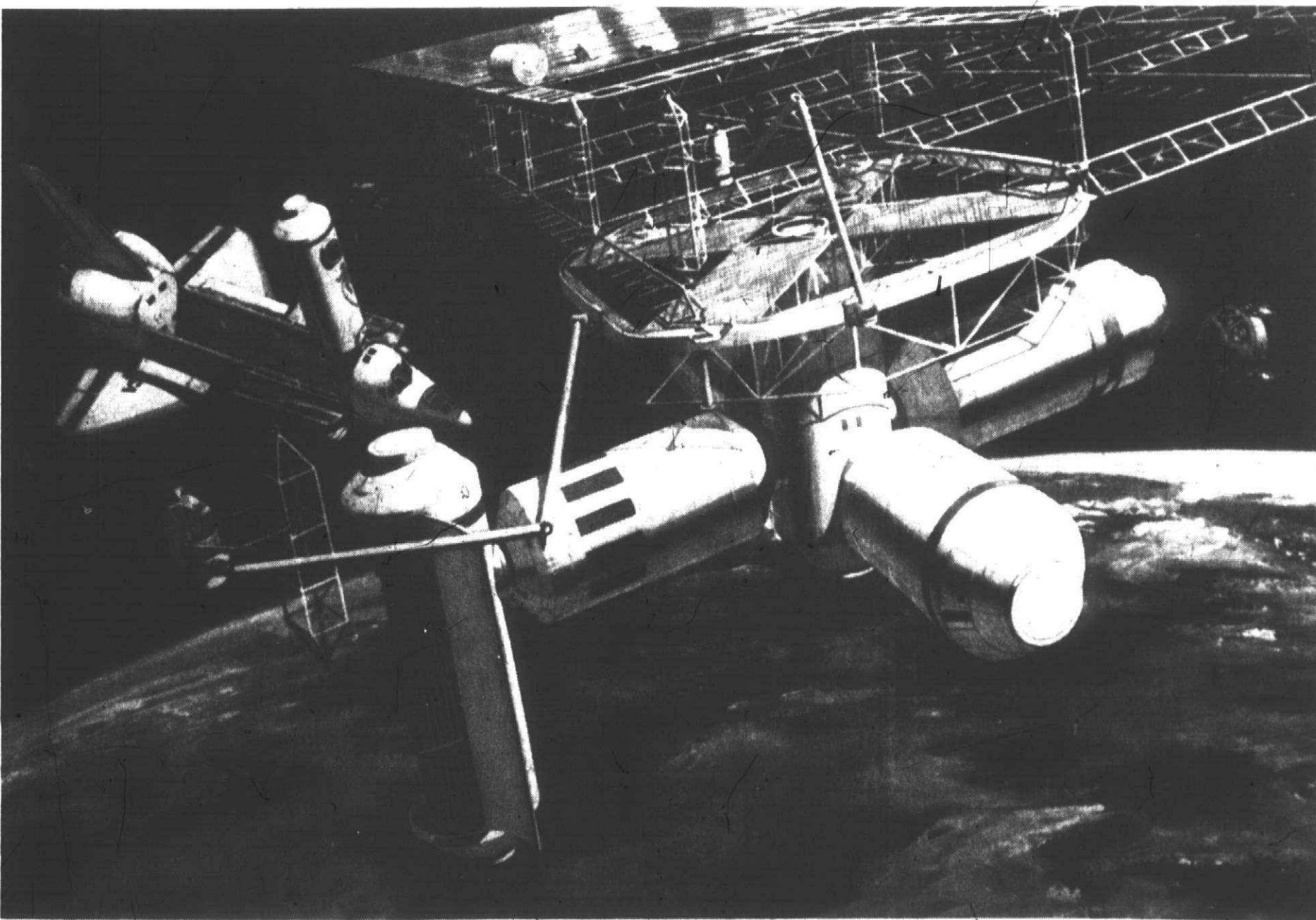
"It costs \$40 to 50 million to put up a communications satellite and it will stay up four or five years," he said.

"Now we'll be able to put up four or five satellites in one mission. The communication satellites are built by private industry and they reimburse NASA for putting them up, so the taxpayers pay nothing."

America's space program, born in the spirit of competition, seems now to be headed toward comprehensive advances of a practical nature which can benefit mankind.

Parking and budget squeeze major city problems—Turner

The major problems facing the City of Plymouth in 1978 are the need for a parking structure and for a resolution of the economic squeeze facing municipal government.

That was the key message in a state-of-the-city address given by Mayor Thomas Turner to the Rotary Club of Plymouth noon Friday.

Another continuing challenge, the mayor added, will be to meet the need of the city's elderly residents for housing, transportation, health services, and leisure activities.

IN SUMMARIZING problems and progress of 1977, Turner stressed it was important to realize "the City of Plymouth is no longer a small self-contained island in the center of the great western Wayne County sea; it is now the center of a rapidly expanding suburban complex with a population of about 75,000.

"Change is inevitable and judging from the changes made in the Plymouth business district over the past 10 years, I think we would all agree that our city is more attractive and healthier because of them.

"We must recognize that the rapid increase in our residential values in recent years is in no small measure attributable to the existence of a unique and attractive downtown area. Without viable local business establishments and such civic attractions as the Fall Festival, and more recently the ever-popular chicken flying contest, Plymouth would be nothing more than any other suburban bedroom community.

"As we all know, Plymouth has become one of the most desirable and prestigious residential communities in the Detroit area. This reputation has not come because we have a preponderance of palatial homes such as exist in Grosse Pointe or Bloomfield Hills, but rather as a result of the proximity of residential property to desirable—and in many instances unique—business establishments, and the existence of an old-time community spirit which manifests itself in the

form of parades, festivals, concerts, and so forth."

AMONG THE HIGHLIGHTS of 1977, Turner noted the following:

•Investment by private individuals in upgrading and expanding Plymouth's industrial, commercial and residential properties.

•The issuing of building permits totalling \$2.2 million in value—an increase of almost 50 per cent from 1976.

•New businesses opening, such as 11 Penniman Avenue shops, five in the new Harvey Street facility, three in the new Forest Street complex, the Gourmet Gallery, and modernization to Famous Men's Wear.

•Expansion in the Old Village area with several new businesses being launched, and existing shops investing in major improvements.

•Major renovation of Holly's Steak and Four, a new sandwich shop and barbershop on Main Street, a new multiple unit rental facility on Ann Arbor Trail and two new restaurants—Carl's on Main Street and Arthur Treacher's on Ann Arbor Road.

•Public investment of about \$86,000 for new paving projects, street reconstruction and crack sealing, approval of an upgrading of central parking lot, installation of pedestrian ramps, purchase of a new fire engine.

•Improvements in Old Village financed by a Community Development Act grant included renovation of Cannon Park, construction of a new garden square park, installation of new decorative lighting, increased parking, and construction of a new playground area.

•Establishment of a Municipal Parking Commission to monitor the operation of the city parking system.

•Initiation of programs for senior citizens, including: scenic walkway along Tonquish Creek; low-cost hot lunch program; and rental subsidies for 35 senior and low-income residents.

In commenting on the Blue Ribbon Study Committee on Aging report, Turner noted there were a number of

good recommendations on transportation, nutrition, recreation and other aspects of senior life.

"Unfortunately, with regard to housing, the report deals only with alternative concepts. No specific physical plans have been identified which means that we are still unable to offer any tangible reassurance to our senior citizens with critical housing needs."

THE NEW YEAR will bring more of the same in most areas, reported Turner, but there will be major problems facing the city.

A major space shortage exists in city hall, Turner said, resulting in inefficient operations for the district court, police and fire departments. The immediate problem, he said, is federal funds aren't available now for the improvements. "Although it doesn't appear feasible to attempt to fund the \$750,000 required for this expansion without federal assistance, we must seek means of relieving this overcrowded condition within the near future."

To expand the commercial taxbase, Turner stressed, a solution must be found to parking problems in the downtown area—particularly in the southwest quadrant. "I believe that the physical solution will have to be the construction of a multiple level structure in order to conserve limited commercial frontage, but the major hang-up continues to be development of an acceptable financing plan."

By the end of the current fiscal year, predicted the mayor, the city commission probably will have to decide whether to raise taxes or reduce the level of municipal services. "The city is incurring the same economic increases as are other businesses in such areas as personal costs, utilities and insurance, which as you know have escalated rapidly during the past few years."

"What is the answer to the city's economic squeeze? Inasmuch as we are landlocked and essentially fully developed, there is little opportunity for expanding our SEV (taxbase)—

unless a solution to the parking problem is forthcoming.

"Because inflation shows no sign of abating, our only long-term solution appears to be a reduction in city services or a more efficient means of providing these services. Obviously, the latter is easier said than done."

"I have said on previous occasions and I continue to believe that the only real solution to the city's economic dilemma lies in some form of unification with Plymouth Township and it is my intention to fully explore all possibilities in this regard during the coming year."

During the question-answer period, Turner responded to an inquiry about the city's attempts to annex parts of Plymouth Township. "There are annexation petitions on file with the State Boundary Commission, but we are not aggressively doing anything with them now."

"It is my hope that during the coming year we can set aside the differences in our community over annexation and decide if we can be unified in some fashion—be it consolidation, annexation, or by some third form—and get on with it."

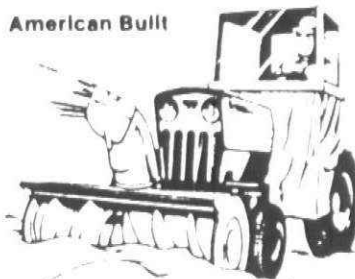

Pollution meeting

A major air pollution control planning program may be in the winds for the metropolitan area.

The program will be kicked off Friday, Feb. 2 when the State Department of Highways and Transportation holds a public meeting in Detroit.

It will explain "the need for local involvement in a federally ordered planning effort for air quality maintenance," according to a department announcement.

The session will be begin at 9:30 a.m. in the the Student Conference Center of Mercy College, Outer Drive at Southfield.

ONE AGENCY eyeing the situation is the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments. SEMCOG is the seven-county region's designated planning agency under the federal Clean Waters Act of 1972, a \$5.1 million task.

"There are lots of parallels to the Clean Waters Act," said SEMCOG spokesman Roger Lennert.

In theory, air pollution regulations could make great impacts on people's lives, SEMCOG officials say. They could be as specific as disallowing vehicles in downtowns or requiring the staggering of work hours. They don't suggest, however, that it will happen here.

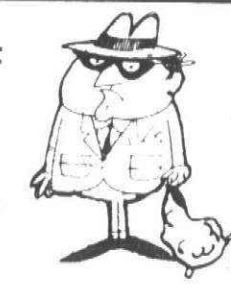
Two questions in SEMCOG's collective mind are: Who will be the designated planning agent for air pollution planning? And how much federal funding will there be?

GOV. WILLIAM G. Milliken has assigned the Highways-Transportation Department responsibility of managing local transportation planning efforts regarding clean air standards. The standards are set in the 1977 federal Clean Air Act.

The law requires local governments to designate specific agencies or groups to be responsible for planning, implementing and enforcing measures to achieve nation air standards.

The Plymouth Symphony Orchestra's Sunday afternoon concert is programmed to appeal to all members of the family, from preschoolers to great-grandparents.

Since the first family concert was conceived in 1952, the January event has been a first exposure to the symphony for many youngsters.

Young people and seasoned music lovers will enjoy the French horn artistry of the father-son team—Louis Stout Sr. and Jr., the young violists from the Suzuki Association of Plymouth, and trumpeter Arthur E. (Skip) Larson.

Concert time is 4 p.m. Jan. 29 in Plymouth Salem High School auditorium, Joy Road at Canton Center Road. Tickets can be purchased at the door the day of the concert or in advance at: Arnoldt Williams Music Inc., Ford and Canton Center Roads; Audette Office Supply, Ann Arbor Road at Sheldon; Beitner Jewelry on Ann Arbor Trail; Plymouth Book World in Forest Place Mall; and Heides Florist, Ann Arbor Trail at Harvey.

LOUIS STOUT SR. is a longtime member of the Plymouth Symphony. He is professor of music at the University of Michigan.

He has recorded extensively with the Chicago Symphony, commercially for TV ads, for Station WUOM in Ann Arbor, and has done many Educational Television shows.

His latest is a full color show, "The Horn, from the Forest to the Concert Hall." Stout had traveled more than 50,000 miles presenting "The Horn" as a lecture-demonstration. With his assistants, Louis Stout Jr., Deborah Tomchak and Jennifer Burch, they discuss and perform on more than 40 horns from Stout's private collection, one of the finest in the world. They have performed at the International Horn Congress.

Stout has soloed with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Kansas City

Philharmonic, New Orleans Symphony, Radio City Music Hall, Sigmund Romberg Orchestra, North Carolina Symphony, Virginia Symphony, Toledo Symphony, and in Michigan, the Plymouth, Flint, Ann Arbor, Jackson and Saginaw symphonies.

LOUIS STOUT JR. is a teaching fellow at the University of Michigan and is horn instructor at Heidelberg College in Ohio.

He has performed as solo horn in Flint and Saginaw, also as hornist in Plymouth, Ann Arbor and Jackson. He is a member of the Toledo Symphony.

He performed as solo horn in the Air Force Academy Band for four years. He made his first TV show, "A House of Music," with other members of the Stout family when he was in seventh grade.

Father and son will perform Concerto No. 5 for Two Horns and Orchestra by Rosetti at Sunday's family concert.

The Suzuki Violins will join the orchestra for Handel's Bourée, and Suzuki's Allegro and Twinkle Variations.

The Plymouth Suzuki Association was founded six years ago and has grown to include more than 30 students ranging in age from 4 to 10. Each child has a private and a group lesson each week. These are reinforced by daily home instruction from a parent, also trained in the program, and recordings of all the repertoire studied.

Shinichi Suzuki, founder of the method, is a well-known Japanese educator and violinist. He believes music should be taught to young children as the mother language is taught. On the premise that all children have natural ability, through aural and physical training in family and group lessons, the child will learn to play the violin and appreciate music.

It is hoped that the excellence needed to play the violin will extend to other areas of the child's life, thereby developing a better person. The

Suttle is conductor and musical director of the Eastern Michigan University Orchestra. He is a lecturer in music, double bass performance at the

University of Michigan. He earned his master's degree in conducting, and bachelor of music in double bass performance degrees from the U-M.

Originally from Livonia, he now lives in Ann Arbor.

Sunday's program will begin with Mozart's "The Magic Flute," followed by McBride's "Pumpkin Eater's Little Fugue," the Suzuki numbers, and Larson's trumpet solo, "Concerto for Trumpet and Orchestra," by Hummel.

The Stouts' performance will be after intermission. "Peacock Vari-

Baby-sitting service during the concert will be provided by a Girl Scout troop. Free transportation for senior citizens is available. The bus leaves Tonquish Creek Manor on Sheridan at 3:15 p.m.

The concert is made possible in part by the state of Michigan through an operational grant from the Michigan Council for the Arts.

Basic care provided by home aides

Adeline Laforet and Charlotte Fulton know there are many people living at home and needing some nursing care—yet not judged ill enough to qualify for the skilled nursing covered by Medicare.

They also have a notion that are many women in this area who could be trained to do such work and would find it rewarding on a full-time or part-time basis.

What they'd like to do is bring together these two segments of the suburban population.

Registered nurses who operate AMC Health Care-One, Inc. of Southfield, Ms. Laforet and Ms. Fulton hope in the near future to launch a training class in western Wayne County so they would be able to fill the calls for help they receive in this area.

Ms. Laforet explained that when patients are released from the hospital but need further nursing care, their

families usually work with the hospital's home care staff and are referred to a service which provides skilled nursing. The Visiting Nurses Association is the best known such agency.

"The services these agencies provide is covered by Medicare," she added. "But the coverage is only for the time of acute need, and usually it is limited to eight hours a day."

WHEN LONGER service or around-the-clock service is desired and can be afforded, the AMC agency can provide it for a fee of \$5 an hour. That is, it can do so when there are women available who can be trained as aides to give basic, as opposed to skilled, care.

"But we've advertised for years and can't seem to attract this kind of person," said Ms. Laforet, the firm's president and director of professional services.

"We provide training programs,

supervision, continuing education and the advantage of flexible hours. We can match the care needed with the person who needs work."

The firm will start a new training series in Southfield Jan. 23 and would like to plan another soon in this area, offers 45 hours of work on how to give basic home care.

Nurse supervisors are in charge.

"They teach trainees how to help a patient use a walker, how to get an older person into bed or into a chair, how to help an incapacitated person take a shower," she said.

Training in nursing homes also is part of the program so that more skills can be covered. Ms. Laforet said students "learn things like handling a diabetic's diet."

TRAINEES AMC would like to see in its programs are those who are mature, responsible, eager to learn

and give and have of good judgement.

"We require mature persons who have managed a home, and generally they don't need other qualifications to begin with," Ms. Laforet pointed out. Prospective aides do need to have a car at their disposal.

Once trained, they usually are in demand for steady work, but they can choose how many hours they want to work and can refuse a specific job if they wish. Patient needs range from "live-in" help to short house calls to change a catheter, give a man-a-shave or assist with a bath.

Sometimes aides are needed to provide a break for the family member who cares for the ill person.

"Some people can cope if they can just get out once a week to shop or visit the beauty salon," Ms. Laforet said.

MOST HOME AIDES find the work

most fulfilling and "get involved with the whole family," according to Ms. Fulton, vice-president and director of administrative services.

The company would like to place workers in the areas where they live, the women said, but they've run into a problem finding people to train in the western suburbs.

Of the current roster of some 1200 nurses and trained aides, many are from the Detroit area and do not like to travel as far as Livonia and Plymouth.

"We're sure there are many people there who would find this ideal work," concluded Ms. Laforet. "We'd like to meet them."

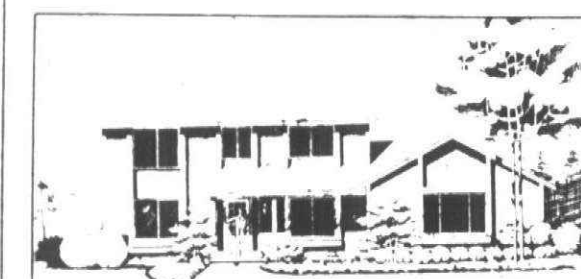

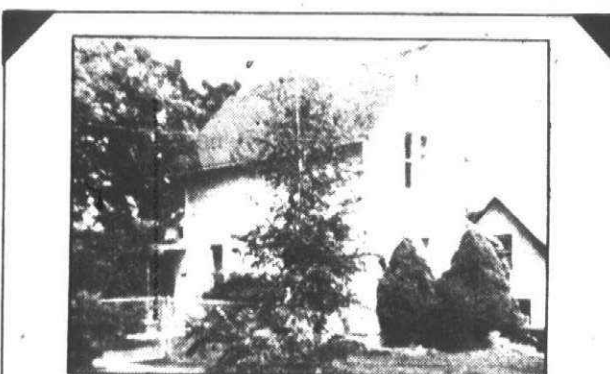

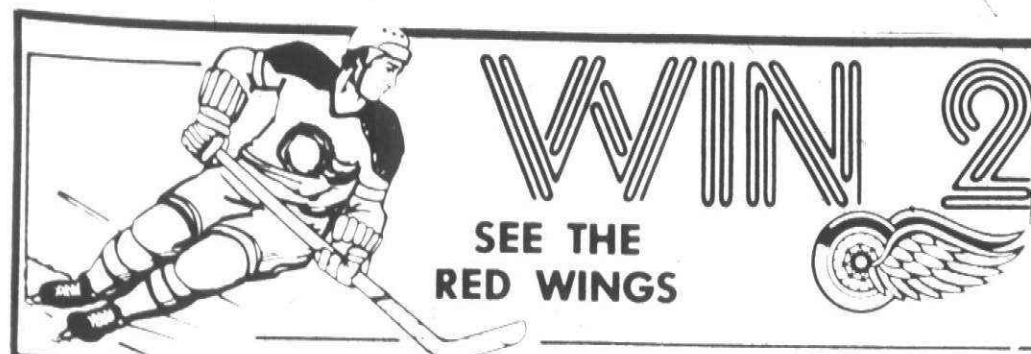
