## 6-year-old boy killed in blaze; brother hurt

A Canton Township family, who thrives on love and affection, was dealt a tragic blow early Tuesday morning when fire swept through the upstairs of their home, killing one child and injuring another.

Killed in the fire at 7098 Sheldon Road was Anthony Prince, 6, the son of

Judy and Alan Prince. Suffering severe foot burns was son Bobby, 9.

Canton firemen were called to the Prince residence at 1:30 a.m. Tuesday. Upon arrival, the firemen found the entire family, except Anthony, on the lawn in front of the large brick house. Members of the Prince family told firemen that repeated attempts to rescue the 6-year-old had failed due to extreme heat and overpowering smoke.

Firemen were sent upstairs and a ladder was positioned against the house, near a window in the bedroom where the fire is believed to have started. Anthony was brought out of the house through the bedroom window, and was pronounced dead on arrival at Wayne County General Hospital. According to Canton Fire Chief Melvin Paulun, the Prince child was died of smoke inhalation.

"ALMOST EVERYTIME someone dies in a fire, it is the smoke, not the fire that kills him," said Paulun. "The victim usually inhales smoke, gases and soot and is dead before the actual fire reaches them."

Bobby Prince was listed in fair condition Thursday at Wayne County General Hospital.

Canton fire officials, aided by State Police Fire Marshal Bob Delaney, said that the fire started in the upstairs bedroom. (Continued on page 5A)

## Odd-even water plan OK'd by Canton board

An ordinance passed Tuesday night by the Canton Township board will make it necessary for residents to follow an odd-even lawn watering system.

According to Canton Supervisor Noel Culbert, the ordinance is needed to ease a water pressure problem. He claims the problem stems from the township's source of water, the city of Detroit — a charge the city disputes.

The odd-even system is set up by house addresses. If your street number ends in an even number, then you are to use water for lawn use only on even-numbered days of the week. If your street number ends an odd number, then you are to use the water only on odd-numbered days of the week.

"It is a terrible thing to have to do," said Culbert. "I know it is not popular, but it is the only thing to do at this time." Everybody using water at the same time during a low pressure period makes the situation worse, said Culbert, and a stagger system is needed.

"The city of Detroit is just not giving us the needed pressure," said Culbert. "We have the equipment to meet the needs of our people, but if the pressure is not there, then there is not much we can do."

Culbert said the trouble may be due to Canton's lawsuit filed against the City of Detroit four years ago dealing with water supply. The suit is still pending, and according to Culbert, the

current pressure trouble is being produced on a "retaliatory basis."

"I am sure that that is the problem. We have had trouble with Detroit for the last couple of years," said Culbert. "Our engineers are looking at the matter at this time." Even though the township has added new water mains in the recent past, a new main is needed in the Livonia area to help service Canton as well as other communities, Culbert added.

"The community has said that in effect they will pay for the new main, but for some reason Detroit will not build it," said Culbert.

As far as the current pressure problem, a spokesman for the city of

Detroit's water department said that the water system is working correctly, but that the pressure is low in many communities.

"The weather has been hot and the people are using a lot of water," said Jerry Oakes, a water department supervisor.

"Canton Township is a growing community, in fact, the fastest growing community in the state. Maybe the township's water system is not built up enough."

Whenever a community has trouble with its water pressure or supply the blame is always put on the city of Detroit, Oakes said. He added that the lack of heavy rain in the last few weeks

has put a strain on the pressure at the Detroit plant.

"With no rain, everyone is out watering his lawn all the time, and the water usage is tremendous," said Oakes.

CULBERT said that the continuing problem with the City of Detroit has prompted him to ask Canton engineers to study the feasibility of a water tower for the township.

"A water tower system is a great way to control our water pressure," said Culbert. "The tower is filled up at night at low usage periods and then it acts like a valve to give the community the correct pressure during the day." He was not sure if Canton residents would like a soaring water tower in their community, but said that a tower may be, "the best alternative to Canton's problem."

ONE BUSINESS feeling the water pressure pinch is the Classy Chassis car wash on Canton Center Road, just north of Ford Road.

"We have been having pressure problems for about three weeks," said Jim Stabnau, manager of the car wash. "It

(the pressure) is all right in the morning — we usually have about 40-45 pounds of pressure then — but in the afternoon the pressure drops to 10 pounds and then we are in trouble."

The Classy Chassis has had to close down early because of the pressure trouble, he added.

"We can operate with 20 pounds of pressure, but when it goes down to 8 or 10 pounds, we are done. There is no way to operate a car wash without the water."

Culbert stressed the water use ordinance is like any other township ordinance and that it carries criminal penalties for failure to observe it. Canton police will, for two to three weeks, just remind residents of the ordinance. After that period, officers will issue tickets to violators.

"Also, people with new lawns may water their sod anytime they want for the next two weeks. And new lawns after that will be able to have two weeks to make sure their lawn takes a good hold," Culbert said. "We are sure that the people of Canton will help us and themselves by using the odd-even plan correctly."

## Planner gets raise, but no new staff

Canton Planner James Kosteva got a hefty raise Tuesday night, but his request for more staff in the planning department has been set aside for discussion at a later date.

It was a mixed victory for Kosteva, whose new salary of \$22,810 is now in line with that of other department heads even though some members of the Canton Township Board of Trustees argued that he is not a department head.

The most opposition to Kosteva's nearly \$5,000 raise came from Trustee Robert Greenstein, who first sought to have the subject tabled because Trustee Carol Bodenmiller was not at the Tuesday meeting.

When Greenstein's motion failed, he and Treasurer James Donahue main-

tained that Kosteva should not be given a department head salary because the planner is not actually a department head.

"I think the point needs to be made that Jim (Kosteva) is not now, and never has been, a department head," Donahue said.

"The department head position (for the planning department) was created but is vacant. Since the board created the position, I feel we either need to elevate Jim to Planning Supervisor or hire one," he said.

Township Clerk John Flodin, saying that he didn't see how Kosteva could not be considered a department head since "He's the whole damn department," moved to make Kosteva planning supervisor at the \$22,810 salary.

Greenstein objected, saying that there would have to be testing for the planning supervisor position before Kosteva could be elevated.

The trustee also maintained that it would be cheaper for the township to retain the services of Wade Trim's (a planning consultant firm) Impact program rather than give Kosteva more money or staff.

According to Greenstein, the program would only cost Canton about \$26,000 a year.

Kosteva, however, presented a breakdown of planning department costs, which he said amounted to \$24,538 for a year for 400 hours and attendance at seven meetings a month.

According to the planner, the town-

ship's previous use of Wade Trim amounted to \$82,637 for 33 hours per month and attendance at three meetings.

Greenstein said it was improper for Kosteva to make the comparison because most of the Impact cost had been for special studies, including one on farmland preservation.

Flodin's motion to give Kosteva the raise without changing his title (and compensation time for meetings attended commensurate with department heads) eventually was approved, with Greenstein and Donahue dissenting.

Kosteva's request for additional staff was not discussed at the Tuesday meeting, although Supervisor Noel Culbert said it would be addressed at a future meeting.

### Professing physician

Dr. Sam Lerman, who has recently opened a family practice in Canton, has just been appointed clinical assistant professor of family medicine at Wayne State University. According to Lerman, the appointment will involve instructing medical students at his office. The doctor is on the staff of Harper, Grace and Hutzel hospitals in Detroit, as well as Providence Hospital in Southfield. He has been in practice more than 40 years.

# Hines patrol fund appeal made

The Wayne County Sheriff's Department may know by next week if it has a chance of getting \$200,000 in state money for more facilities in Hines Park.

The department is asking for \$87,000 to renovate its recently opened mini-station at Newburg and Edward Hines Drive in Westland. The mini-station, a former garage owned by the Wayne County Road Commission, is used to detain people arrested for misdemeanors or more serious charges.

The sheriff has also requested \$80,000 for a holding station at Telegraph and Hines Drive.

According to Jim Akhtar, of the sheriff's department, the eastern end of the park is "where most problems are." The sheriff's department opened the mini-station after residents along the 17.5 mile parkway complained that unruly youths were not being controlled. The park's seasonal use runs from April 1 to Oct. 1.

The department has also requested \$20,000 to construct a barn for about 14 horses that have been donated to the department. Most of the donated horses

are Morgans and Quarter horses and are in training for a mounted patrol beat along the rural parkway.

TO ENCOURAGE the state to fund the security facilities, State Reps. Robert Law and Richard Young asked Gov. Milliken's budget director, Gerald Miller, to tour the parkway last Friday.

Although unwilling to make a commitment, Miller said he would make his decision this week.

"The money isn't in the present budget but that doesn't mean a solution can't be found," he said.

"I don't think the request is unreasonable."

Law said Friday he is hopeful the money for Hines will be available through a separate bill to be introduced in Lansing this summer.

He said it appears Miller's office supports the plan, adding that design

and code requirements for the facilities may need to be changed.

A joint conference committee is considering a proposed \$90 million bill, known as the "Christmas tree bill" to help Wayne County with its budget deficit.

The committee may cut the bill \$20 million at the request of Milliken. The county is expected to end the year with a \$19 million deficit.

Funding for the Hines facilities could come from a separate package, however, Law said.

MILLER WAS joined by several Wayne County commissioners in his tour of the park. They included: Mary Dumas, R-Livonia, Kay Beard, D-Inkster, Alex Pilch, D-Dearborn, county board Chairman Richard Manning, D-Redford, William Suzore, D-Lincoln Park and John Korney and Dolores Bennett, both Detroit Democrats.

Wayne County Undersheriff Loren M. Pittman said the meeting with Miller Friday was not conclusive, just "exploratory."

"It's a sincere effort on our part to show him the potential here," Pittman said. "The Wayne County Road Commission has given us the building. We've raised money on our own and we've gotten people to donate horses. Is there anything in the budget to help us out?"

"The mere fact that we can get him (Miller) is a bonus on our part," Akhtar said. "There are very dire times we're in."

Renovation plans for the Newburg station call for a second story holding area for females and a downstairs holding area for men. On the main level, blueprints diagram a visitors waiting area and office.

According to Akhtar, the availability of the Newburg station has cutdown travel time for officers who previously journeyed to the Westland Police Station on Ford or to the eastern mini-station to drop off those arrested in the park's western end.

Tony Nagorsen from WOMC Radio is organizing this year's program at Mettetal Airport, at Joy and Lilley roads.

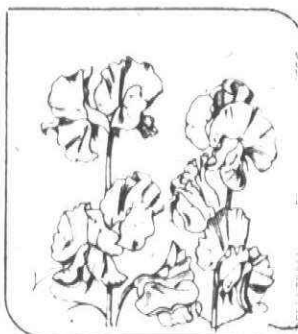
Nagorsen has been with Fly-High since its first year in 1974. He also will be one of the pilots at that airport.

## Youth soccer becomes a reality

Soccer continues to be one of the fastest-growing sports among young athletes.

The major reason, of course, is the expansion from year to year in the little league soccer leagues — such as Great Lakes and Western Suburban.

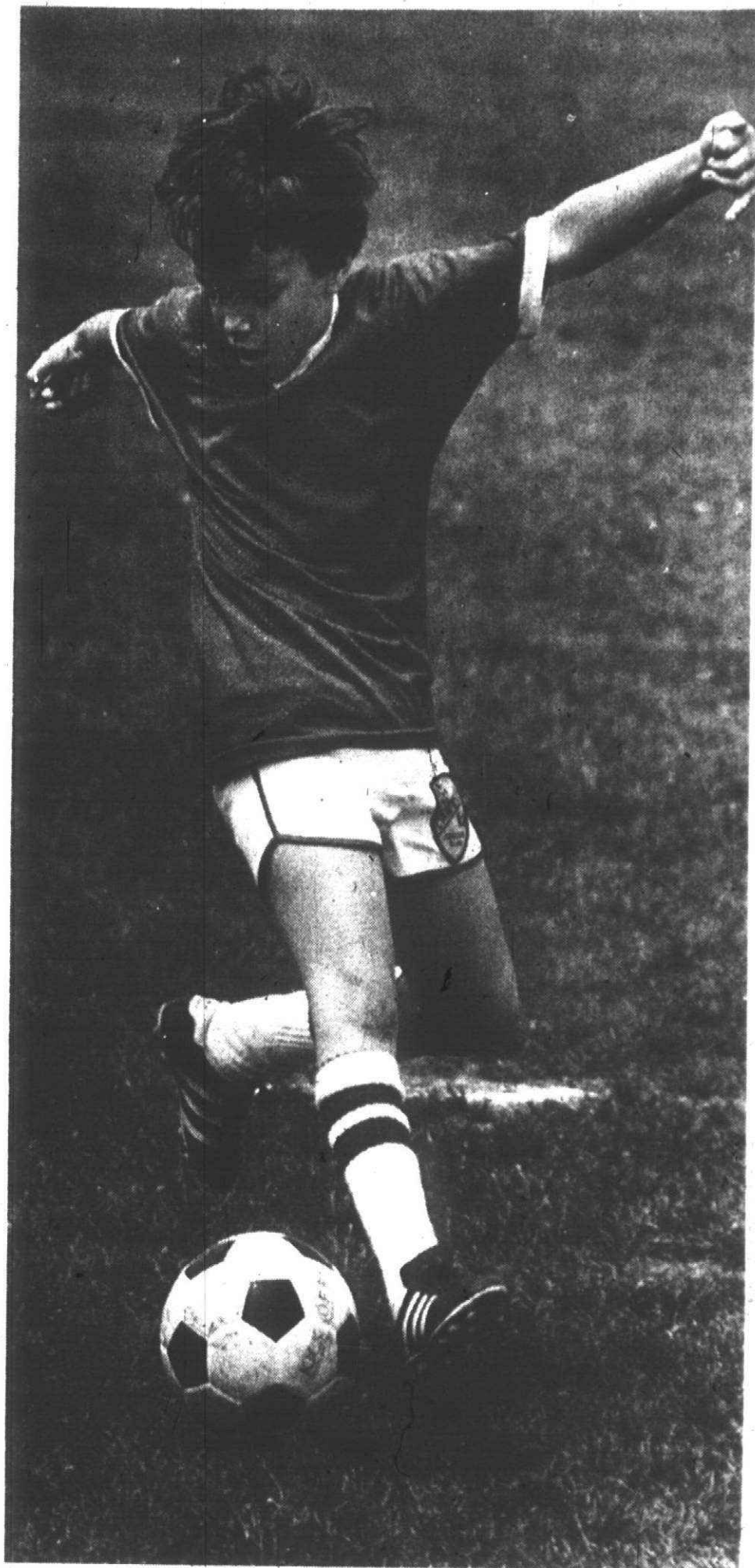
And most knowledgeable soccer persons will agree that the major impetus to the little league soccer program was the arrival of the Detroit Express and Trevor Francis to the Silverdome.

## Eye on the road & nose by tank

The first time I was in the Traverse City area was as a boy of 9 for a week of fishing with my grandfather, uncle and cousin.

The next time was for an abbreviated honeymoon on Sugarloaf Mountain.

A couple years ago I made an aborted attempt to spend a couple days in Traverse City. We were returning from our annual week of fishing-swimming-sight-seeing in the U.P. and decided to spend a couple days in Traverse City the next week en route home.

But we failed to make motel reservations. We drove through and around town and couldn't find a place with vacancies. Every motel was jammed full.

SO WHEN WE decided to return this year for a few days of relaxation, we made sure we had reservations.

Even then, we were a bit nervous about going because Sunday was our departure day and the reports of Sunday gasoline station closings were growing.

But that fear was unfounded. The good ol' Birch Run turn-off had a couple gasoline stations open with pumps pumping. But I passed it by.

For lunch we drove into Clare to the Hotel Doherty. After lunch I found two stations open — one in town, the other by the expressway.

There also was a gasoline station open on the north side of Harrison, and two or more which I noticed were open as I passed through Grayling.

And in Traverse City there were at least a half a dozen stations open for travelers.

The places I stopped at there were no limits on the amount of gasoline which could be purchased. So there was never any problem getting gas — on the way there, while there, or on the way back.

BUT THE FEAR of a gasoline shortage in the north definitely was evident as I drove through Traverse City.

Motel after motel flashed "vacancy" signs. In fact, I can't remember seeing a "no vacancy" sign anywhere. It was a strange sight, especially for mid-June.

The motel we stayed in had relatively few families, and so the swimming pools were never crowded and there always was prompt service in the dining rooms. Most of the guests were business persons and conventioners (Amway had a shindig going).

When we arrived at the sand dunes, the parking lot was less than one-fourth full. And we met very few tourists on our stops in Leland, Fishtown, Sutton's Bay and Northport.

The north was almost deserted. That made it pleasant for us, of course, but it certainly has a dismal affect on the area's economy. When you add that to the predictions of a poor cherry crop this year, the prospect for the local economy of Traverse City isn't very bright.

While things may get worse before they get better, my experience was that there's no reason to be concerned about gasoline supplies for a trip north. The folks up there are much better off — on gasoline availability, at least — than we are in southeastern Michigan.

And I hope that's the way things stay for awhile. The lure of the walleye is coming on pretty strong, and the first of August will find me heading north again to survey the availability of gasoline between here and Manistique.

So don't worry about vacationing in Traverse City. Just stay out of the U.P. come August.

## Teeth normally will not fall out for people from age 60-70

Dear Dr. DeFrancesco: If one's general health remains good, and if the teeth have been well cared for during the early years, are the chances good that the person will stay healthy when he or she gets older?

T.R.

Yes. Your teeth can remain in good condition throughout the life span if they are properly cared for.

But most people neglect their teeth, and so there is dental deterioration earlier than necessary. Furthermore, most people at one time or another during their lives develop generalized diseases that influence the health of the teeth.

Dear Dr. DeFrancesco: Is it natural for teeth to fall out as people enter their 60s or 70s?

S.P.

Actually, this is not a natural phenomenon. Again, loss of teeth is due either to neglect or to some underlying diseases or disturbance in body function.

Dear Dr. DeFrancesco: Do older people have a tendency to develop dental decay?

T.W.

Yes, because calcium deficiency in the aging is quite common.

Dear Dr. DeFrancesco: How often should older people have their teeth examined?

O.S.

At least twice a year and, of course, whenever they develop symptoms.

Dear Dr. DeFrancesco: Is it dangerous to have teeth X-rayed?

T.W.

No. Recently the dangers of diagnostic X-rays have been grossly exaggerated.

Dear Dr. DeFrancesco: What is the significance of bleeding gums?

R.S.

They may indicate the presence of a local infection in the mouth or may be part of a generalized disorder. Some common causes of bleeding gums are:

- Pyorrhea.
- Trench mouth.
- A loose tooth.
- Injury secondary to strenuous brushing of the teeth.
- Deposits of tartar between the gums and teeth.
- Vitamin deficiencies, especially of vitamins C and K.
- Scurvy.
- Hemophilia, an inherited condition characterized by excessive bleeding.
- Prolonged jaundice.

## Cooler heads emerging in debate on blackmail

Brodhead believes this would drive down the price of oil. We would be freed from the cartel "rip-off."

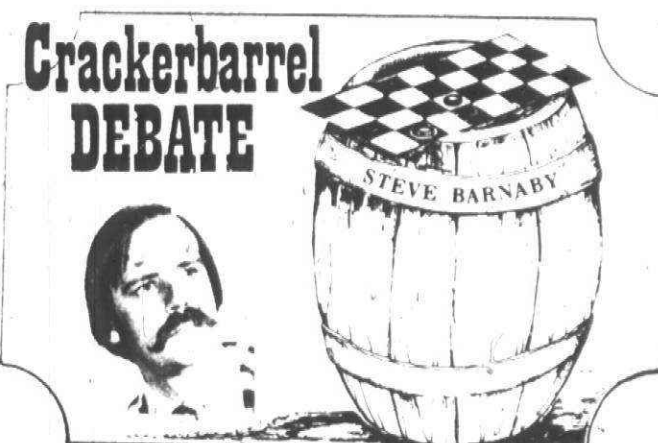
Now, regular readers of this column know that the congressman and I don't always agree on what's best for this country. But in this case, the 17th District representative has my support.

Actually, he is going to need a lot of support to get this bill approved. Opposition will be plentiful, vocal and strong, both politically and monetarily.

More conservative members of Congress will yell that this is a slap against the free enterprise system. That is just a lot of bunk.

One major reason oil prices are so high is that this country is dealing with a cartel which unilaterally establishes prices. No free enterprise in that.

Secondly, we will hear from the oil companies which are more concerned with their pocketbooks than their political philosophy. American oil producers would like to sell their oil at the same prices



as our Arab friends. So they are the last ones to want oil prices to come down.

They endorse taking off controls so American oil prices rise to their "natural level." They want \$15 or \$20 a barrel, whatever the going OPEC price is.

The only thing natural about these kinds of price increases are the oil companies' natural greed.

Still others will whine that this puts the government into the oil business, which really isn't a bad idea anyway. But this bill doesn't do that. So you folks who enjoy holding up the postal system as an example of inept government business practices can stow that argument.

All this bill does is make the government an agent in transferring oil from OPEC to domestic distributors.

This proposal is a sane option, a workable solution which gives this country time to develop its own natural resources without having OPEC put the guns to our heads in the meantime.

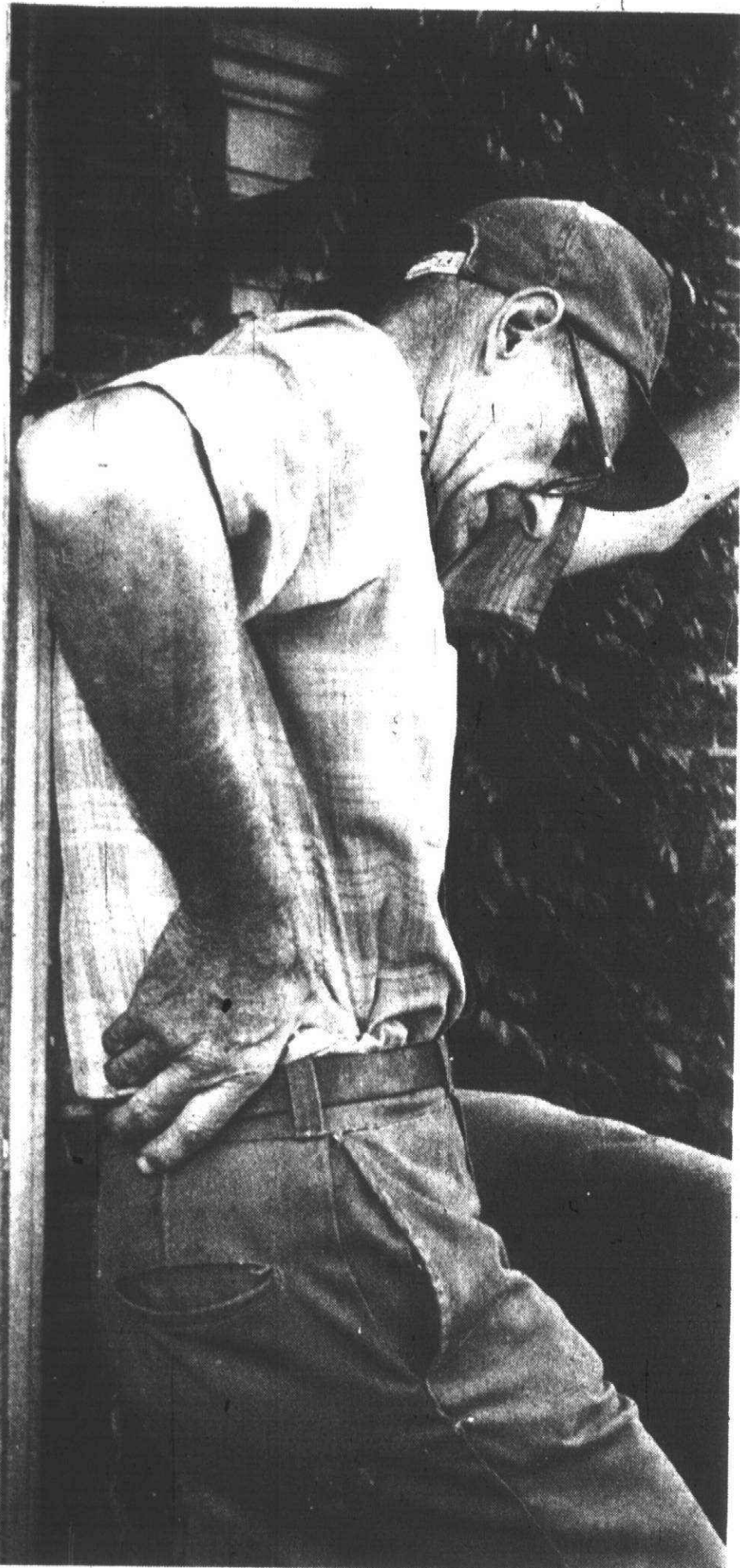

## Brother burned in heroic rescue

room. The cause of the blaze had not been determined at press time.

Chief Paulin said that as far as he could determine, the Prince home was not equipped with a smoke detector device.

"If the house would have been guarded by a smoke detector, then maybe this would not have happened," said Paulin. He added that Canton has an ordinance that requires homes built after 1975 be equipped with such devices.

"What we need is an ordinance in this community that would make it mandatory that all houses have smoke detectors. They do not cost a lot, and we are working to see if we can get a law on the books for older houses."

MRS. PRINCE, contacted at her mother's house in South Lyon, said the family will stay at present. The Prince's had eight children before Tuesday's tragedy. Six of the children, including Anthony, had been adopted by the Princes since 1975. Dennis, 13; Hanh, 12; Len Jr., Judi 11; Bobby, 9; Connie, 7; and Danny, 5 are the sisters and brothers of the late Anthony.

Although the fire took the life of one of the Prince family, the death toll could have been higher. According to Canton fire department records, 9-year-old Bobby Prince displayed bravery and determination when he returned to the upstairs bedrooms and carried out his brother, 4-year-old Danny. Danny, who is paralyzed in both legs and one arm, can not walk without braces and helping devices. Bobby fought smoke and fire to reach and save Danny, but the heroic 9-year-old could not get back in to rescue Anthony.

"After the fire broke out, our main concern was to get everyone out. Bobby brought Danny out, but no one could get back in to get Tony," said Mrs. Prince.

FIRE OFFICIALS estimated damage to the Prince house at \$20,000. The blaze was contained primarily to the two upstairs bedrooms. Inspection of the bedrooms revealed broken windows, a charred ceiling, blackened walls and mounds of smoldering clothes and other personal items. Water dripped down from the upstairs into the living room, and the smell of smoke was every where. Family portraits

lined the walls of the living room, and splinters of wood from the firemen's hatchets littered the entire front half of the house.

The Prince family began to grow to its present size in 1975 when Judy and Alan Prince became involved with a group known as AASK (Aid to Adoption of Special Kids). The Prince's at that time had two children, Len Jr. and Bobby. The purpose of AASK is to find homes for children that are termed "unadoptable."

AASK says that no child is unadoptable, but that it is merely a matter of finding that special family that will accept and love the children.

Apparently the Prince family fit into that category. By 1978 the Prince children numbered eight, including paralyzed Danny and Hanh, both of who were Vietnamese orphans.

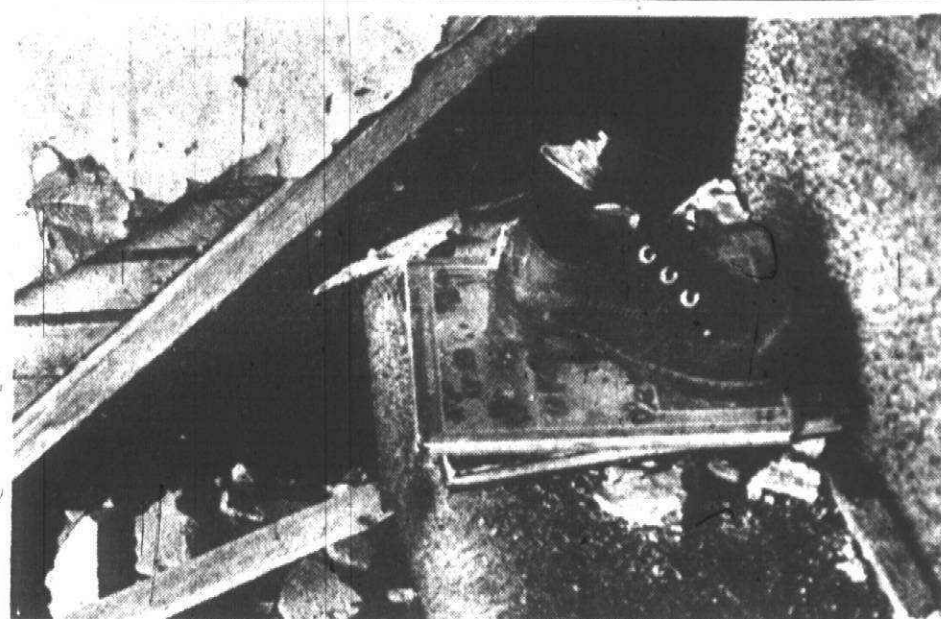
THE GENEVA Presbyterian Church, of which the Princes are members, has been listed as headquarters for co-ordinating any fund raising or contribution drive for the Prince family.

A spokesman for the Geneva church said that they are trying to determine just what the Princes will need. The church can be contacted at 459-0013 to find out what clothing or furniture is needed. Church personnel will be taking phone numbers of people who have services or items to contribute.

Workers at the Plymouth Post Office, where Alan Prince is employed, are taking up a collection among themselves for the Prince family.

Ron Rash, supervisor of delivery and collection at the Plymouth post office, said that Prince, "is the nicest guy you would ever want to meet." Rash added that Prince was a good employee and had even felt compelled to call in at work Thursday morning even after his wife had already done so for him.

"He is a very conscientious employee," said Rash. "If we find out that the Prince family is in need of more assistance, then we will get it for them."

# Suburbs lose round 2 in park patrol battle

For the second time in a month, commissioners from Detroit blocked Wayne County board approval of a lease to operate a sheriff's mini-station in suburban Edward Hines Park.

But the action won't close the station, near Newburgh Lake in the Westland area of the parkway. The Wayne County Road Commission, which owns the building, has no plans to withdraw the lease offer, a spokesman said Friday.

Board of Commissioners Chairman Richard Manning, D-Redford, said the station would remain open without a lease, as it has for the past three weeks.

Manning said he would bring the issue before the board again on July 12. Sheriff William Lucas is seeking \$200,000 in state money to make the mini-station permanent and perhaps open two more in the park (see accompanying story).

APPROVAL OF a three-year lease

with the Wayne County Road Commission at \$1 a year fell one vote short of board approval last week. The road commission owns the mini-station, which was quickly put in operation last month after residents along Hines Drive complained of unruly youths in the park.

The mini-station, a former road commission storage facility, is used to detain those arrested in the park. The sheriff's department says it needs the mini-station to keep more deputies patrolling the park.

Manning said the road commission wants a lease agreement with the county board because it wants to avoid liability for any accidents that may occur at the mini-station. He said the sheriff's department could not enter into a lease without board approval.

THE MINI-STATION was supported by 13 commissioners — eight suburban and five from Detroit.

Six Detroit commissioners abstained and two voted against the mini-station. The lease needed 14 votes for approval.

Three suburban commissioners, who likely would have voted for the mini-station, didn't attend last week's meeting.

Manning said the Detroit opposition was a "political move" and may mean some Detroit commissioners want two counties, "a Detroit county and a suburban county." "I read that between the lines," he added.

Manning said Detroit commissioners were showing no concern with the problems of out-county commissioners.

COMMISSIONER WILLIAM Joyner,

D-Plymouth, said the vote was "a slap in the face" and "underscores the fact that the county board can't function."

Commissioner Mary Dumas, R-Livonia, said the vote was "anti-western Wayne County."

county were never answered. "It's like having no right to ask how much it costs," she said.

Manning said the mini-station would not cost the county "any new money."

But Robinson insisted the shifting of sheriff's patrols and the extra paper work to process tickets would eventually cost the county more money.

## S'craft adopts budget with only modest cuts

The Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees has put its seal of approval on a \$12.8 million budget for fiscal 1979-1980, which began July 1.

More than \$11.8 million will be spent to operate the college. The remaining \$1 million is for debt retirement, major maintenance work on the Haggerty Road campus and special equipment purchases.

The budget, which expires June 30, 1980, was unanimously approved.

The Schoolcraft property tax levy of \$2.06 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation will provide \$4.1 million for college operations and \$675,000 for debt retirement. It is virtually unchanged.

A western Wayne County resident with a \$50,000 house (\$25,000 equalized value), would pay \$51.50 in taxes for Schoolcraft this year. The Schoolcraft district includes the Plymouth-Canton, Northville, Livonia, Clarenceville and Garden City K-12 school districts.

More than \$4.9 million in state aid is expected during this budget year. Student tuition and fees will provide \$2.6 million in budget revenue.

WHILE THERE are no instruction cuts, eight positions in other departments were removed from the budget.

All but one was cut in the past year through layoffs or attrition. They include one administrator, two secretary-clerks, one custodian, a security officer and two supervisors in the physical plant and maintenance department.

The college's cultural and public affairs events in the next year will likely be reduced due to budget cuts.

Schoolcraft will have the same number of full-time faculty (about 160) as last year, but won't guarantee that the

same number of part-time faculty will return.

Personnel salaries and fringe benefits comprise 80 percent of the budget, according to W. Kenneth Lindner, vice president for business. The college plans to spend \$6.9 million on instruction this budget year, \$280,000 more than during 1978-79.

The physical plant (operations and maintenance) budget of \$1.6 million is slightly reduced and the \$1.1 million to be spent on student affairs represents a \$44,000 increase.

BECAUSE OF two voter rejections of proposed tax increases this year, the college's major maintenance and special equipment purchase budgets have been reduced.

Lindner said \$540,000 is needed to replace equipment and make new acquisitions, noting \$124,686 is all that's budgeted.

For several years, the board has tried to allocate \$250,000 each for major maintenance and special equipment.

The major portion (\$85,470) of the \$148,000 special equipment budget is for a Six Mile access road that won't be connecting to the campus.

The college must build the road because of a land exchange agreement made in the early 1970s with Trinity Baptist Church. The church is building a nursing home north of Six Mile and west of I-275 which may be completed in February.

College officials said the land swap was made under the assumption the college would expand and need land for a campus access road. But tax increase defeats and an enrollment expected to remain stable make college expansion at the southeast corner of its property unlikely.

The board has authorized bids to be

taken on the 950 foot road that will extend north from Six Mile. The college must extend the road if the church builds proposed senior citizens housing north of the nursing home.

## Dr. Homes is selected

Dr. Michael J. Homes of Plymouth has been selected as a member of the Institute for Development of Educational Activities, Inc. (IDEA) Academy of Fellows — the educational affiliate of the Charles F. Kettering Foundation of Dayton.

Dr. Homes, assistant superintendent for instruction for Plymouth-Canton Community Schools, has been chosen as one of 650 outstanding American educators to receive this honor and will participate in a week-long seminar to be held at the Colorado College, Colorado Springs, this month.

During the week a faculty of nationally prominent educational leaders will address the fellows and meet with them in small groups for the purpose of coping with issues and problems of education in the '80s.

The Academy of Fellows is the oldest, continuing inservice program for school administrators in the nation. The program has provided inservice training for more than 6,000 participants from North America and overseas.

## Court legislation could save money

Local communities no longer will have to pay jurors' fees in cases assigned them by Wayne County Circuit Court, if a bill passed by the Michigan House of Representatives becomes law.

Sponsored by State Rep. Robert C. Law, R-Livonia, the bill requires Wayne County to pay for the fees.

The measure is an amendment to Public Act 330 which authorizes the circuit court to assign by lot up to 200 cases per judge per year to local district courts.

"When the act was passed last year," explained Law, "it was meant to alleviate the substantial backlog of cases in the Wayne County courts."

"But because there was no provision

for picking up the cost of the jurors' fees, the law in fact shifted the burden of paying for this backlog to the district courts in our community.

"The financial implications of this act are staggering. In Westland alone, an additional 200 circuit court cases would increase taxpayers' cost 36 times. The \$5,000 originally budgeted for witness fees would not make a dent in the \$180,000 needed to cover the increased caseload."

LATE LAST YEAR Law directed the House Fiscal Agency to conduct an immediate investigation of the costs of assigning circuit court cases to local district courts.

## NORTHVILLE TOWNSHIP HOUSING REHABILITATION PROGRAM TO THE RESIDENTS OF NORTHVILLE TOWNSHIP

Northville Township is participating in a housing rehabilitation grant program with the cooperation of Wayne County. Housing rehabilitation and repair grants are available to eligible homeowners who are interested in making needed repairs and in improving their homes.

Under a federally funded Home Improvement Program approved by the Township Board, direct grants will be given to homeowners for repair, electrical or plumbing installation or other improvements needed now or in the near future to bring the home up to code. Expansion or room additions will be available to large families showing a need for increased space.

Applications are now being taken by the Township's Housing Grant Administrator at the Township offices, 41600 Six Mile Road. Only Northville Township residents who own and live in their homes in one of the designated areas are eligible. This includes residents buying their homes on land contracts or mortgages.

A homeowner may receive up to \$4,000 to cover the cost of needed repairs and additional improvements if it is determined that the latter will be needed in the foreseeable future.

The purpose of the program is to provide an opportunity for home improvements to people who cannot otherwise meet minimum housing standards and it is hoped that senior citizens and others on limited, fixed incomes will take advantage of this opportunity.

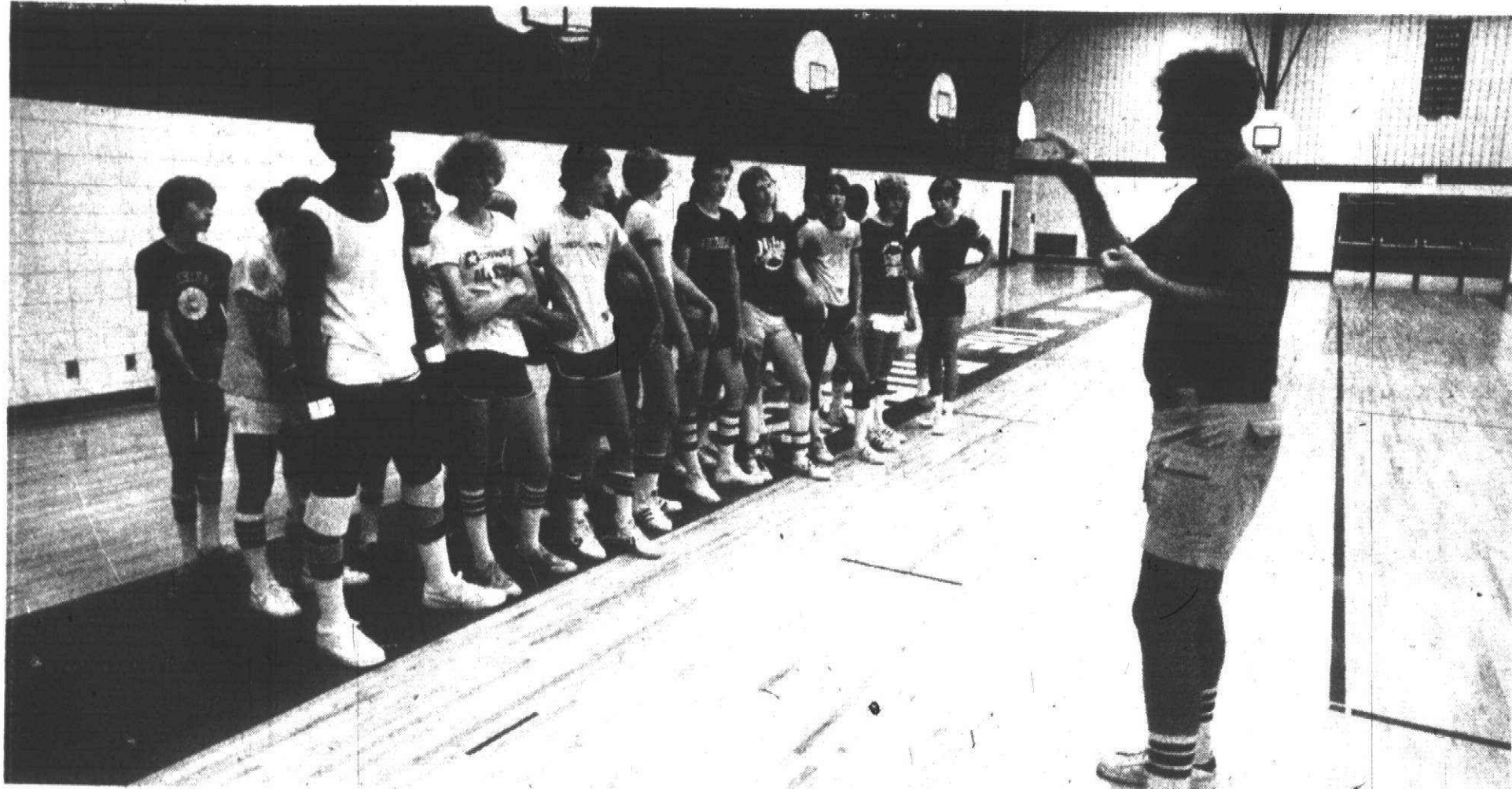

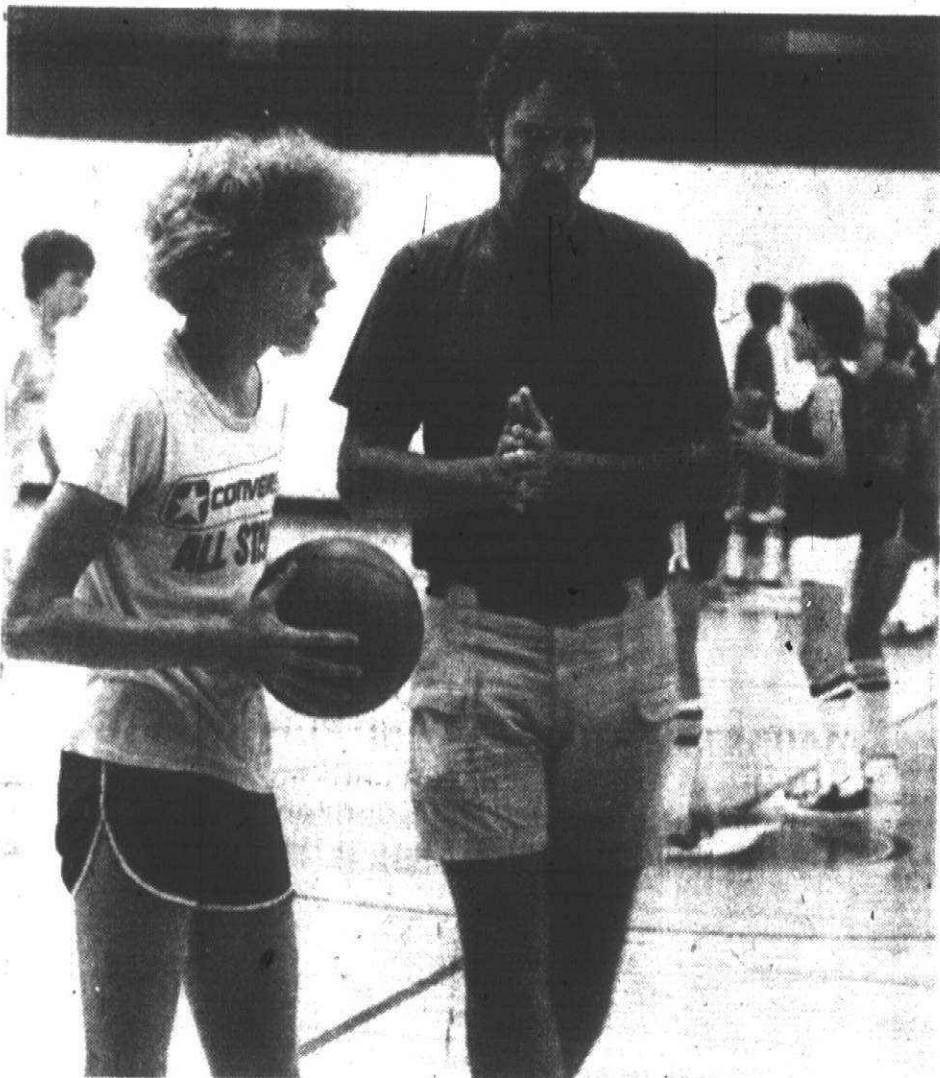

There are some 28 teams in the Plymouth-Canton Junior Baseball League. The season ends July 31.

"It's adequate enough," Schols said. "We'll be able to play now and I don't foresee any problems in canceling. I just hope now that vandalism doesn't strike out hard against us. Believe me, I don't know what thrill someone gets out of that."

The league uses three playfields at the park and lights at two of them were either partially or completely out. Schols and other parents previously expressed frustration with the board's slow action on the subject which he claimed was raised last May.

TOWNSHIP SUPERVISOR Thomas Notebaert just presented bids on repairing the lighting situation to the board last Tuesday.

But rather than wait for the start of the entire project, involving replacement of light bulbs and lenses, an interim plan was approved. Board members agreed to rearrange existing light bulbs to areas of greatest need.

Asked why there was a delay in receiving bids, Notebaert said: "We didn't realize just how much damage was done, and it's not easy to get contractors to bid because they are busy with other projects."

One bid was submitted by Jack's Floodlighting Service at \$8,399, but delivery on glass lenses was not expected for another three weeks. The other bid for \$4,544 was submitted by Hubbs Electric Inc. with another three-four week wait for supplies. No official action was taken on awarding the entire project to one company.

Safety was the main concern of parents and little league officials who worried of injuries due to poor visibility at two of the three diamonds.

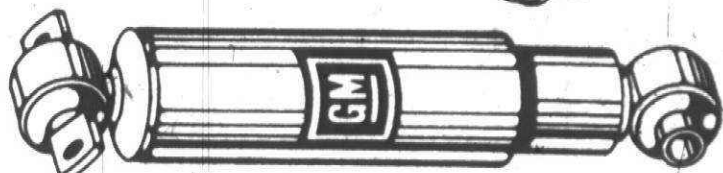

In the near future the referee or umpire may become part of the endangered species list.

The average fan might not know it, but sports officials are almost as hard to find as gasoline.

There is an acute problem finding officials for recreation-type leagues. The pay is not good and the harassment at times is frightening. Some competition exists at the high school level, at least among the more qualified crew of referees.

During the recent high school baseball and softball season, it was common to see just one official show up.

"We had problems in baseball but that was because of rescheduling games the weather," said Livonia Stevenson-athletic director Roger Frayer. "This was the worst weather I've seen in 10 years."

In his first year as athletic director, Frayer learned he could find more officials for 4 p.m. games rather than 3:30 p.m.

"A lot of guys don't get off work until 3:30 p.m.," said Frayer. "Next season I've scheduled more games at 4 p.m. because of the availability."

Frayer believes there is strong competition for varsity officials in football and basketball.

"A lot of guys call me looking for game," Frayer said, "and I try to call people who I feel are good officials."

"It's really hard trying to find volleyball officials. They are in great demand. I've had them come in from as Troy."

Frayer said it's sometimes hard locating competent officials for soccer and junior varsity games.

"I go through an association in soccer out of Royal Oak," he said.

The Stevenson athletic director for sees a shortage in five years of officials.

# No respect anymore Officials become a scarce breed

"There is going to be a lack of good officials in the future," he said. "A multitude of good, young officials are not coming in."

Paul Sincok, assistant director of the Plymouth Parks and Recreation Department goes through the Westland Athletic Officials Association when hiring summer baseball and softball umpires.

"I think they're great," Sincok said. "Normally there is not a problem with them. They are always on time."

For a slow-pitch softball, umpires earn around \$10 per game. The WAOA has a crew of female umpires who officiate men's games.

"They do a good job," said Sincok. "A lot of times they are better."

The Plymouth Parks and Recreation Department hires its own umpires for the modified pitch league.

"There are more things happening in modified," said the assistant director. "It's a different pitch and the rules are not the same as slow-pitch. More complaining goes on because of the pitcher."

"There's a fine line between a legal and illegal pitch."

Paul Kinder, a veteran official in three sports whose job it is to hire senior umpires this summer for the Livonia Parks and Recreation Department, said there is a parallel between the state of economy and umpiring.

"If the economy is good, you'll see a shortage of umpires," said Kinder. "If a guy can get overtime at his regular job, he'll stay away from working part time as an umpire."

"He feels the harassment is not worth it. Right now we do not have enough qualified (experienced) umpires this summer."

Kinder said it's hard to find good young umpires.

"There are a number of reasons for it," he said. "Some have tried it on a Little League-type level and have left with a bad taste in their mouth. Some have had a bad experience while playing and don't want the same hassle."

"You have to blame coaches and frustrated jocks for part of the problem. A lot of coaches, especially on the

little league level, don't know the rules. "A lot of times if there's a problem, you can settle it man to man. But that rarely happens."

Kinder said the situation will get worse in the next few years. A way to correct some of the problems is to hold meetings and clinics for officials.

"You have to blame society for the problem," Kinder said. "There just isn't any respect for officials today. If you please 50 percent of the people you're doing a good job."

Kinder said that high school officiating is the most enjoyable.

"I have less problems in high school than I do in college," he said. "There seems to be more hassles on the college level because a coach's job is at stake."

"Basketball officiating is the toughest. I've never had any real problems in football. In baseball, the biggest concern is consistency in calling balls and strikes."

During the summer, officials are paid \$12 per game in a Connie Mack League baseball game. The high school's pay \$20 per game.

# PGA sets North Course plans

# Amateur Sports Hall moves to Fair Coliseum

By W.W. EDGAR

The Michigan Amateur Sports Hall of Fame that was designated by the state legislature last year as the official body in the state to honor its amateur athletes, now has an official home.

Working with the Department of Natural Resources which has taken over the operation and rehabilitation of the State Fair Grounds, the Hall of Fame has promised its cooperation in the rejuvenation in return for the use of The Coliseum as its official home.

The offer came from the state officials and the Michigan Amateur Sports Group, which immediately started work on a program that will have the "home" establishments when the work on the Coliseum is completed within the next 18 months.

To the present time, the Michigan Sports Hall of Fame that was organized by Larry Weis four years ago, has been scouring the area in the hope of finding a location that would do justice not only to the Hall but to the athletes themselves.

Under the present plan considerable thought is being given to the use of the interior wall of the lobby and the hallway around the show ring to hang the engraved plaques. In the preliminary study, William Upina, acting general manager of Expo 79, now running the Fair Grounds operation, pointed out that the area could accommodate the Hall's requirements for the next 40 years.

In that time the entire interior could be covered in one of the finest tributes

ever paid to athletes in the state.

Since the time of its organization to pay tribute to those athletes who have been partially forgotten in the loud hurrahs over the professionals, it has developed working relations with 42 amateur athletic organizations in the state.

Because of the large number of amateurs who have carried Michigan's colors in all sorts of events including the Olympic Games, the Hall of Fame sponsors two induction ceremonies each year. One of these is held in the

spring and another in the fall.

Aside from its local committees the Sports Hall of Fame also has three working commissioners in the out-state areas, who always are on the lookout for those amateurs deserving of prestigious honor.

In this manner the entire state is covered and the area of competition ranges from softball to track and field, swimming, and all the other events that attract those who compete for fun.

Under the plan for the rejuvenation of the Fair Grounds the state will

spend \$8 million as a starter. This will be spent for the most part on the Coliseum. Later all the other buildings, including the garden stand, will be razed and the entire area converted into a major recreation center for year-round use.

It is to this program that the Michigan Amateur Sports Hall of Fame has offered its full support. When completed, the project should be on a par with that offered some years ago when Detroit sought the Olympic Games.

Course will be used during the PGA tournament, as it was in 1972, for a parking lot.

The North Course was built in 1919, and in its first incarnation was a public golf course owned by Oakland Hills. It was called North Hills then and went by that name until 1969. In that year, the clubhouse was torn down, a bridge was built over Maple Road to connect the courses, and it was turned into a private golf course.

It was also redesigned in the same year by none other than Robert Trent Jones, the man responsible for "The Beast" across the street.

The North Course, in its present life, is a relatively short par-70. According to Ted Woehrl, golf course superintendent at Oakland Hills, the course from the back tees is every bit as difficult as its sister course.

Jones designed the course with tight targets and plenty of bunkers. In

addition, there is one water hole on the front nine, and four water holes — the 13th, 14th, 15th and 16th — on the back nine.

Woehrl said that there is room for 14,000 cars on the North Course, but he expects only 10,000 cars to park there on any given day.

Such a crush of cars will, said Woehrl, "trample the grass down after a couple of rains it turns green again."

If it rains during the tournament, "you get

ruts," said Woehrl. It rained in 1972 during the tournament and it was several weeks before the course was put back into playable condition.

"Either way," said Woehrl, "it's going to look bad. It's a sacrifice you have to make."

Not all of the members at Oakland Hills are pleased about making the sacrifice. Woehrl said, "A lot of the members don't see the merit of using the North Course for parking, but it sure makes a nice tournament when you can."

## Hold your sides when you laugh at 'The In-Laws'

Don't buy popcorn or goodies before taking your seat to see "The In-Laws" (PG). You'll want to have your hands free for holding your sides. "The In-Laws" is a rare, hilarious creation, a paradox, because it manages to be both antic and restrained at the same time.

Peter Falk and Alan Arkin, the principals of the title, are a marvelously matched comic pair. They are individually funny and doubly funny together.

Arthur Hiller, the director, has fit it all together to show them off to best advantage. Arkin is a conservative, successful dentist about to marry off his only daughter, but he is filled with doubts because the groom's father has never made an in-the-flesh appearance. He seems to be involved in some vague sort of international enterprise which limits his social engagements.

WHEN THE FATHER-IN-LAWS meet for the first time at a dinner only a few days before the wedding, Arkin's worst fears are confirmed. Falk's a crazy person who astounds the dinner party with his eyewitness account of giant tsetse flies carrying off children, bursts into tears after toasting the engaged couple, then calmly insists on using the basement telephone for a business call.

That's for starters. Arkin gets fished into aiding Falk in his zany schemes and the comedy broadens but remains punctuated with considerable wit.

The pair's behavior and absurd adventures bear some resemblance to the early Woody Allen comedies. Falk is the smooth-talking, though irrational leader; Arkin is your everyday, ethically-wavering coward who somehow gets drawn into situations he can't handle and manages to survive by the skin of his teeth (well, he is a dentist).

Trying to terminate their activities — just because they stole a few engravings from the U.S. Mint — are gangland hit men, federal agents and a crazy Central American dictator.

The dictator-general, whose palace is off United Fruit Boulevard, is a singularly manic character colorfully defined by Richard Libertini. While the general and his guests dine, a chorus of armed troops entertains them with a rendition of Joyce Kilmer's "Trees." That gives you some idea of the wacky scope of this comedy and why it brings to mind Woody Allen.

AS TO FALK'S BUSINESS pursuits, well he might be a crook or a CIA agent or a looney who thinks he's one or the other, or he might be all of these.

There is still some question about him at the end, but there is no doubt about "The In-Laws." Relatively very funny.

## Behind the fireworks

# Lighting the sky takes some work

Planning a fireworks display is something like orchestrating a full-fledged opera, according to Arthur Wright, J.L. Hudson special events director and the man in charge of the Freedom Festival fireworks.

"The whole show is looked at from a sense of color and sound and novelties. The way you put these together creates different kinds of shows," he said. "We try to vary the moods."

"You try to create some highs and lows, some louds and softs, some brights and not-so-brights — otherwise it gets monotonous," Wright said. "Even 40 minutes of bang-bang-bang can be boring, unless you vary it with sound and color and combinations." All those factors are meticulously charted.

"Color spreads, bursts of all-gold or all-red, are plotted," the Troy resident said. "I also chart for sound."

Not all fireworks fizzle, whistle or pop. "A lot of them just poof. There's a definite let-down in the show if for a long period there is no sound. Poof, poof, poof gets to be old hat after about half an hour."

Timing is also important, he said, and the shells are fired faster as time goes on.

"We start with a nice, easy-pace and build up with time to the crescendo which is the finale. With all that sound and color, there's so much excitement you feel like the world is coming to an end or something," Wright's face mirrors the expression of a youngster viewing his first fireworks display, when describing the show he has coordinated for 21 years.

Stroh's Brewery co-sponsors the pyrotechnic display.

WRIGHT'S JOB begins in January with programming and placing orders six months in advance. "Many of the shells are from Japan, Italy, China, Germany and South America," he said. "You have to allow time for them to get here by boat."

Companies don't stockpile fireworks, they are made only on order. James Sorgi, owner of American Fireworks Co., makes most of the shells for the Detroit show. But Wright said he is always on the lookout for spectacular, unusual and safe foreign fireworks.

"Many countries have their own specialties," he said. Techniques, passed from father to son, are "developed and refined, almost like fine rugs, to the point where the techniques are jealously-guarded secrets."

Each fireworks shell is handmade. "It lasts only a few seconds," Wright said, "but every star you see up there is laboriously hand-packed so that when it explodes, you would see a perfect ball in the sky."

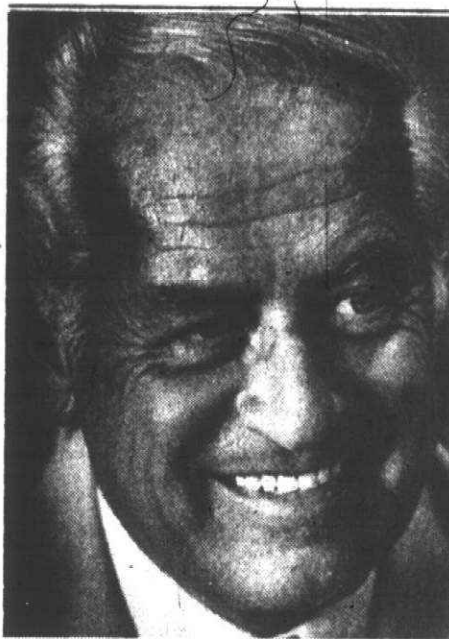
"They're real works of art," he said. "You have to admire them when you see it."

Ranging in size from four to 12 inches in diameter, each shell explodes in a sphere of up to three city blocks across, Wright said.

"Each one of those shells (when exploded) is as big across as the tallest office building downtown." Those larger shells cost several thousand dollars apiece, he said. "In each flight, there could be dozens of those shells," but he declined to discuss the cost of the entire display.

"But the easiest half of the show is the fireworks themselves," Wright added. "The most difficult part is the mechanics of staging the shows."

The coast guard, Army engineers, police and fire departments in Detroit and Windsor and riverfront festival committees must be contacted. Because



the river is blocked during the fireworks, shipping companies must be alerted 60 days in advance.

THE FIREWORKS ARE shot off from three floating stations. Arranging to hire the necessary barges keeps Wright biting his nails right up until the last minute, he said.

"It's usually two weeks ahead before I can be reasonably — and that's only reasonably — sure how many I can get." Barge owners are reluctant to promise the ships far in advance, hoping to get a more profitable hauling job for the same time.

"They're not glamorous in any sense to look at but those barges cost from \$10,000-\$250,000 to rent," Wright said. Occasionally, Wright has found himself short a few barges at the last minute. Then he takes a scavenging trip along the waterfront.

"I've had to look up and down the river for a barge like we needed. Then I'd go knock on doors and ask when the barges were free."

One such ship was loaded with machine parts for St. Louis. But it wasn't due to leave until after the fireworks. "The stevedores worked all night to unload it. We used it and then it was reloaded immediately and took off for St. Louis a few hours after."

Twenty-six workers are needed to put on the show. Three men fire the shells as the rest load, clear and reload the mortars. "If sparks were left in the mortars, the next shell would prematurely ignite," Wright said.

No one has ever been hurt at the annual fireworks, he said. Extensive precautions are the main reason. "There just can't be too many safety factors," he said.

SOME YEARS, WRIGHT is on the main barge during the show. "It's important that all the people involved in designing the show know what's going on out there."

But, from the barge, a viewer does not get the full effect of the show. Shells are encased in paper bags. The propelling charge sends the shell about 600 feet into the sky, Wright said. But that charge and the bag covers only go about 50 feet of the way.

"There is a continual rain of brown paper bags and burning sparks around the barge." Clouds of smoke surround the barges as the shells are set off, obscuring the view, Wright said. "Also, there's 1,000 feet between the barges, so you can't see both sides."

So Wright stands on shore some years, watching the display from different vantage points. He follows the show's progress on paper and in the air.

"I listen to the reaction of the crowd," he said. "This is how we determine pretty much what people like, so we can design the next show with better guidelines."

Adults tend to prefer the blossoming color spreads, he said. "Children like the novelties." Wright has his own favorites, of course.

"Because I know the romance of hand-packing, it's probably the chrysanthemums. They're the biggest shells we fire and the most perfect."

Wright said he sometimes overhears more than oohs and ahs, while listening to crowd reactions. "I pick up comments from parents: 'Can you imagine somebody being paid to do this?'"

Most watchers underestimate the complication involved in preparing the huge display, he said. "Most people don't realize how much goes into it. They think it's just a matter of going out and lighting a few fuses."

Wright enjoys the fireworks, but with a few reservations.

"I certainly look forward to it, but my most relished moment is when it's over and has been done safely and been a good show," he said. "I feel the release of a lot of pressure."

Safety worries are always in the back of his mind, he admitted. "There's an anxiety you can't ignore. You can say it doesn't bother you, but don't believe it."

These shows were recorded a few years ago and will have the same group of loonies except for John Cleese. Cleese, at the time, was working on his own series, "Fawlty Towers," which was seen last year on Channel 56.

The new "Monty Python" series differs slightly in that each program starts out with a theme which — although the Python humor remains as insane and surreal as ever — is followed through to its ultimate, inconclusive conclusion.

In the first new episode a plumber/narrator describes the Golden Age of Ballooning and how it began with the first ascent by the Montgolfier Brothers at Ancey. This is followed by Chris Quinn shopping at the great store, with gases and viruses in the basement and fresh air on the 10th floor.

The second program again shows the customer at the great store as he manages to select the ant he wants. However, to his dismay, he realizes that his

ant is short two legs and has a false feeler. In another episode, Hamlet undergoes psychoanalysis.

"Monty Python," over the past few years, has consistently been among the top rated programs on public television stations. According to ratings published in the Chicago Tribune, "Monty Python" is attracting the youngest audience of any prime time public TV program. Its popularity is reported to be greatest with viewers in the 15-24 age group.

The title of the series means absolutely nothing. The show was created in 1969 by Michael Palin, Eric Idle, Terry Jones, John Cleese and Graham Chapman, all graduates of Oxford or Cambridge. The other member is Terry Gilliam, an American cartoonist who provides the animated sequences.

The result of these collective efforts has been called silly, insane, uneven, tasteless, inspired, hilarious or completely without redeeming value. One thing is for sure; it's different. As one critic said, "Television may have finally devised the electronic equivalent of the hash brownie."

## Art exhibit opening in U-M galleries

An exhibition of some 50 paintings and drawings by Brighton artist Paul Zenian will open July 5 at the Rackham Galleries on the University of Michigan campus. The show runs through July 25.

A University of Michigan art graduate, Zenian has been an art faculty member at Washtenaw Community College since 1968.

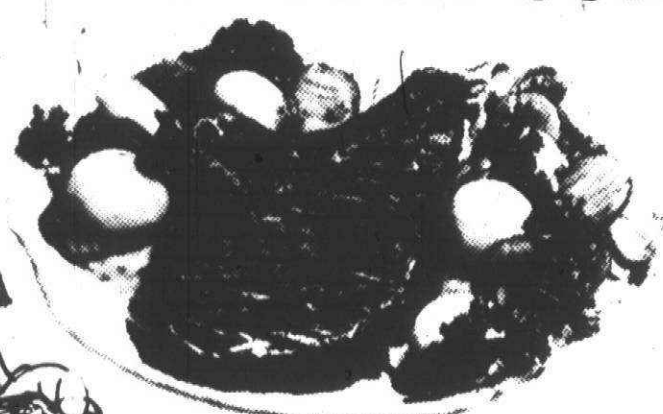

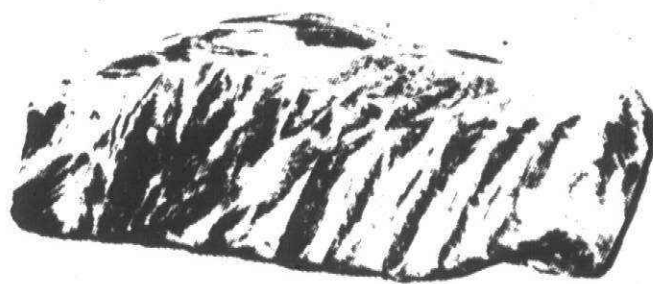

The Doves have a wide circle of friends in Plymouth whom they met when they used to visit Phyllis and Tom Kelly who lived next door to the Bowens on Penniman Avenue.

They spent their last three days in London and while there, called Jerry B. and Kathy Fischer, former Plymouth residents. Jerry is in England for Ford

Motor Co. and they live in a charming old stone house in the country. Their nearest neighbor is a mile away.

Kathy told Gladys that their house has five bedrooms and no closets. Their children, David and Erica, enjoy their English school and both are involved in music — one on piano and the other on recorder. Jerry B. and Kathy said they appreciate the slower pace of life in rural England.

GLADYS' RESPONSE to how they spent their time with the Doves was, "We spent a lot of time eating."

She explained: "We started out the days with a tray in our room, tea or coffee in bed. This is really a nice way to start the day. It gives you an opportunity to talk and plan your day."

First item on arising was breakfast. With that out of the way, at about 11 a.m., it was time for the British snack time called elevenses.

"Quite often their friends would come over for elevenses or we would be invited to someone's home for elevenses. There would be tea or sherry and little cakes or biscuits," said Gladys.

Lunch was served at about 12:30. "Harry bakes all their bread and for lunch we'd have sandwiches of thinly sliced bread — it was delicious — and perhaps thinly sliced cold roast beef."

Tea time was 4 p.m. with Madge's delectable tarts and tea.

"Everyone has a tea cart and tea was always beautifully served. And everyone has stack tables. The Doves have three sets in their living room and they are used for tea. The rest of the time they are used for flowers or plants and are such good-looking pieces of furniture."

DRINKS WERE served before supper.

At 7 p.m., they sat down to a full dinner. "And there was always a snack about 11, cheese, crackers and tea, before we went to bed."

"Neal and I both gained weight but the Doves and all their friends were so slim and trim," said Gladys.

The Doves took them sight-seeing and among the places they visited was the cathedral at Rippon where Gladys' father had sung in the boys choir when he was a youngster.

Their only unpleasant experience during their sojourn in England occurred when they arrived in London on their way home.

They had made reservations in a bed and breakfast establishment. They had paid one night's lodging (\$22) in advance. They had received confirmation of their reservation on very impressive notepaper.

They took the train for the 200-mile trip from Leeds to London and when their taxi driver finally found the address of their lodging, he suggested they had made a mistake. But there was no doubt about it, this was their destination.

A young man took them up three long flights of stairs to their room.

"There was a cot, a small bed with a sagging mattress and one straight chair. The young man had not offered to assist with our luggage and we had to stop and rest at each landing."

"We had to put our luggage on the beds because there was no room for it on the floor in that tiny room. There was a wash basin in one corner and he told us the toilet and shower were on the next floor."

NEAL ANNOUNCED immediately that he wasn't going to sleep in that room. So, at 3:30 P.M., they started to search for other accommodations.

There was no public telephone there so they left the building in search of one. They were across the street from a park which was completely surrounded by bed and breakfast places. An hour later after walking and making several calls, they had not found a place to stay.

Finally they took a taxi, and heading back to the railway station, they found a room in a hotel. Another taxi trip to collect their luggage and they were in their room in a fine old hotel.

long awaited venture got under way very early the morning of June 15. Everyone had to be at Allen School on Haggerty Road with their gear by 6:30 a.m. The Trailways bus pulled out of the parking half an hour later.

There were 26 scouts, three leaders — Romaine Kling, Carol Theard and Mary Lou Johnson — Bob Theard and Frank Kling, Karen Dybash and four children.

There was one heart-sick scout who was too sick to go; there was one leader's husband, Doug Johnson, who was too sick to care whether or not he was being left behind.

The bus arrived at Mammoth Cave at 5 p.m., in time for everyone to find their cabins at their motel and unpack before dinner.

THEY WERE up at 7 a.m. Saturday morning and after breakfast at the

motel were off for a half-day tour of the caves. They had lunch in Snowball dining room in the cave and had a boat tour.

The half-day tour takes about four hours and they walked about four miles. The cave extends 300 feet below ground level and they descended 700 steps at one point.

Moss and fern grew near the mouth of the cave but there was no vegetation beyond. The only life the scouts saw within the cave was a packrat with his hoard of cigarette butts and used flash cubes. There were cave crickets, bleached white and colorless from their underground existence.

Some of the group thought they saw a bat but their ranger guide doubted this.

The scouts were expecting to see more stalactites and stalagmites. The ranger explained that they were found in caverns which are wet; caves are dry.

The state of Kentucky provides the underground lighting system for the caves and there are restrooms about every 1 1/2 miles. The guide switches on the lighting for each section of the tour and turns the just-visited area off.

IT WAS DURING a cave tour that they met a group of Boy Scouts from Illinois. The scouts leaders invited the the Plymouth group to visit their camp that evening.

They accepted and COLU girl scouts were delighted.

The troop was given a formal welcome by the uniformed boy scouts. The boys provided entertainment — skits and songs — and a camp fire. The girls reciprocated with skits of their own and shared some of their songs.

The unexpected party was frosting on the cake as far as the girls were concerned.

They were up at 7 a.m. Sunday and after breakfast went on the half-day cave tour.

They were due to board their bus for the trip home at 1 p.m. The girls had fed peanuts to the pet raccoons near their cabins. They had shopped for souvenirs for themselves and members of their families. Each had been allowed to take along \$10 for spending money.

The leaders were especially pleased with the compliments they received about their troop. Waitresses, rangers and hostesses praised the behavior of the scouts.

The words "best-behaved," "followed all the rules" and "so polite in the dining room" were music to the leaders' ears.

THERE WERE no accidents, no illness and no squabbles.

"It was just the most successful trip we've ever had," said Mary Lou Johnson. "All the arrangements were as anticipated or even better. It was just super."

The troop had been planning and earning money for the trip for a long time. They had sold Girl Scout calendars and Girl Scout cookies. They had garage and bake sales.

In preparation for the trip, they had gathered and shared information about caves. Bill Micol, a local spelunker, shared his collection of specimens gathered during his years of exploring caves.

Their spelunker badges may be "homemade" but that is what makes them special in scouting circles.

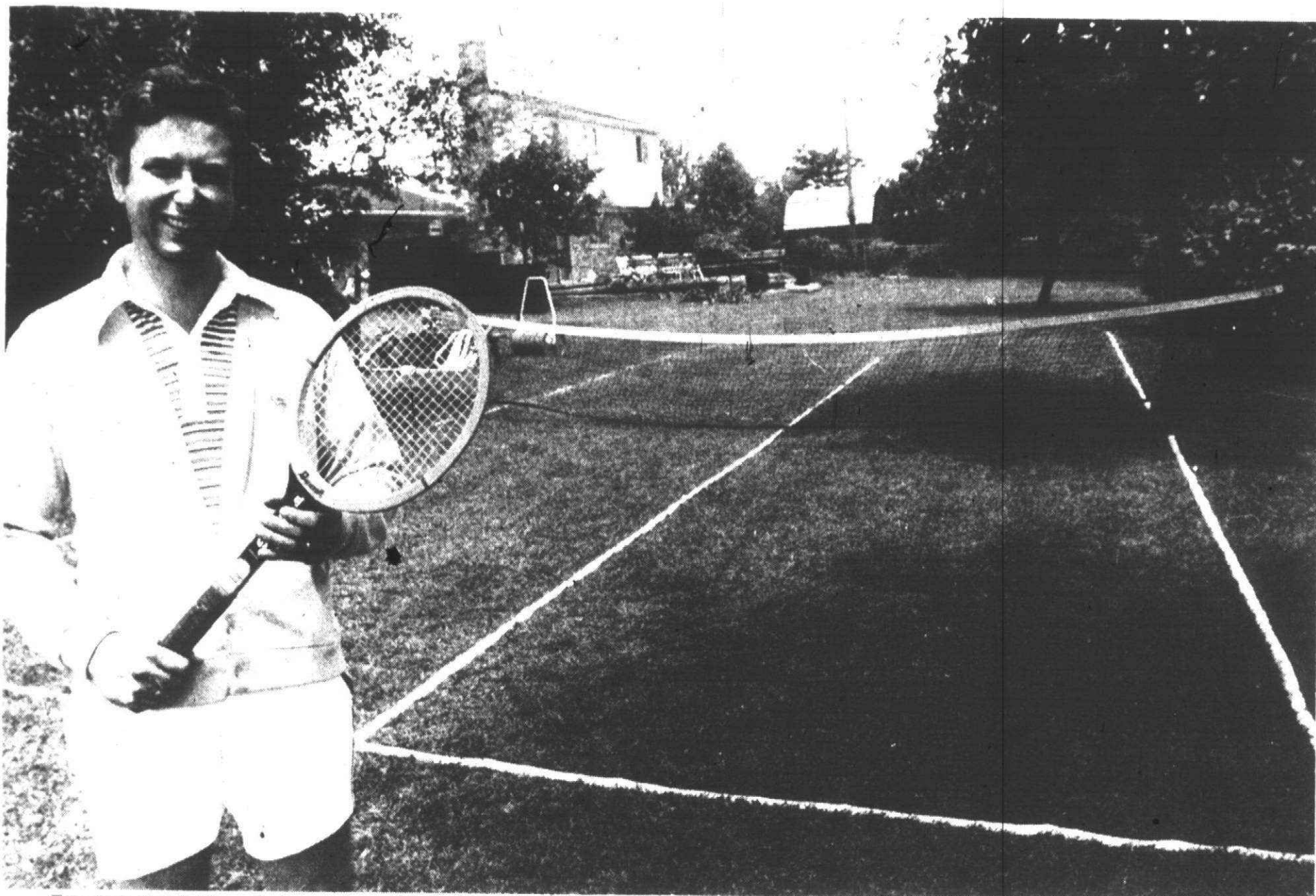

## Tennis buff promotes home courts

By SHERRY KAHAN

Robert Mazzola has a plan. He wants to bring tennis from the parks and clubs and put it in backyards. Like the folks at Forest Hills and Wimbledon, he favors lawn tennis. And he likes to play it barefoot.

What this Livonian is planning to do is build backyard lawn tennis courts at a price considerably lower than the cost of constructing cement or asphalt courts.

His technique will be to remove the

sod from the portion of the lawn that will be used as the court, and grade and compact the dirt underneath. The customer has two choices after that. He can have Mazzola serve up Kentucky blue grass turf, or he can have his own sod returned.

The sod will also be compacted so the customer will get a better bounce for his buck. Chalk stripes can be used, or boundary stripes can be installed with special backlines which give off an audible click when hit by a ball. This will help players avoid unseemly argu-

ments about whether or not the ball landed on the line.

A net and posts are required for the game, and they will be supplied, along with a roller to keep things smooth.

"WE ARE TALKING in the area of \$2,500 to \$3,000, depending on what has to be done," says Mazzola, a business planner for Ford Motor Co. He feels this price compares favorably with asphalt or concrete courts which start at about \$10,000.

"If asphalt buckles or the concrete cracks, it is difficult to repair," he noted. "If the grass wears out, the solution is to replace it with sod which costs \$1-\$2 a square yard."

He thinks grass should be kept about 1½ inches high so that the ball will bounce. "You get a low skip in lawn tennis, making it a faster game than tennis on clay or asphalt," he said.

However, the grass outside the court should remain long, so as to slow down the ball, and keep it from rolling into the neighbor's swimming pool. With the ball less likely to bounce away, high

fences are not essential, which also cuts the cost.

The court needs about one inch of water a week and it should be rolled once a week, or as necessary. The lawn should also be fertilized.

MAZZOLA HAS TURNED his backyard into a pilot project. However, because he was unwilling to chop down nearby trees to allow equipment to remove his sod, he feels it is not as nearly as compacted or as satisfactory a court as those he hopes to build.

While the ball bounces low and sometimes irrationally, Mazzola says it is still possible to return it and play a game. Players will probably need time to adapt to a different kind of game.

Four court sizes are available. The one for regulation doubles is 36 by 78 feet; for regulation singles, 27 by 78 feet. A special court is 24 by 72 feet and a mini court is 18 by 60 feet. Additional space is needed around courts of all sizes.

## CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH, WAYNE COUNTY, MICHIGAN ORDINANCE NO. LIX

### SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE TO PROTECT THE PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENT; TO PROVIDE FOR THE CONTROL AND REGULATION OF SOLID WASTES AND SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL SERVICES; TO PRESCRIBE THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS UPON WHICH LICENSES MAY BE GRANTED, SUSPENDED OR REVOKED OF SOLID WASTE HAULERS; TO REQUIRE LICENSE FEES AND BONDS; TO PRESCRIBE THE POWERS AND DUTIES OF TOWNSHIP OFFICIALS IN ADMINISTERING THE ORDINANCE AND TO PRESCRIBE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF ORDINANCE PROVISIONS.

#### THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

PART I. PURPOSE. The Township Board of Trustees of the Charter Township of Plymouth pursuant to Act No. 359, Public Acts of 1947, as amended, and Act No. 641, Public Acts of 1978, for the purpose of protecting the public health and environment, providing for the control and regulation of solid wastes and solid waste disposal services prescribing the terms and conditions upon which licenses may be granted, suspended or revoked of solid waste haulers, requiring license fees and bonds, prescribing the powers and duties of Township officials in the administration of this Ordinance, and prescribing penalties for violations of this Ordinance adopts this Solid Waste Disposal Ordinance, as set forth in Part II, hereunder.

#### PART II. Ordinance No. LIX, shall be, and hereby is, adopted, as follows:

Section 1. This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the Charter Township of Plymouth "Solid Waste Disposal Ordinance".

Section 2. The following words and phrases shall have the meanings ascribed to them in the interpretation of this Ordinance:

A. "Applicant" means an individual, sole proprietorship, partnership, corporation, or association.

B. "Ashes" means the residue from the burning of wood, coal, coke, refuse, wastewater sludge, or other combustible materials.

C. "Garbage" means rejected food wastes including waste accumulation of animal, fruit, or vegetable matter used or intended for food or that attends the preparation, use, cooking, dealing in, or storing of meat, fish, fowl, fruit, or vegetable.

D. "Person" means an individual, sole proprietorship, partnership, association, or corporation, public or private, organized or existing under the laws of this state or any other state, including a federal corporation.

E. "Township" means the Charter Township of Plymouth.

F. "Rubbish" means nonputrescible solid waste, excluding ashes, consisting of both combustible and noncombustible waste, including paper, cardboard, metal containers, yard clippings, wood, glass, bedding, crockery, demolished building materials, or litter of any kind that may be a detriment to the public health and safety.

G. "Solid waste" means garbage, rubbish, ashes, incinerator ash, incinerator residue, street cleanings, municipal and industrial waste, animal waste, but does not include human body waste, liquid or other waste regulated by statute, ferrous or nonferrous scrap directed to a scrap metal processor or to a reuser of ferrous or nonferrous products.

H. "Solid waste hauler" means a person which owns or operates a solid waste transporting unit.

I. "Solid waste transporting unit" means a container which may be an integral part of a truck or other piece of equipment used for the transportation of solid waste.

Section 3. All solid waste shall be collected from persons or property within the Township only by a person licensed as a solid waste hauler by the Township.

Section 4. No person who is a resident of the Township or who owns, possesses, controls, supervises or occupies land within the Township shall cause or permit any solid waste to be collected from such person or person's premises by any person other than a solid waste hauler licensed by the Township.

Section 5. No solid waste shall be collected from persons or property within a residential zoning use district of the Township between the hours of 11:00 P.M. of one day and of 5:00 A.M. of the next succeeding day unless the Township Supervisor has issued written authorization for such collection after having duly considered the means and location of such collection and determined no offensive noise or nuisance will be occasioned adjacent residences.

Section 6. Every person who owns, possesses, controls, supervises or occupies private property shall be responsible for placing and keeping solid waste arising from the use or occupation of such property in receptacles designed and constructed for such purpose and which prevent the emission of odors and the broadcasting of pieces. Further, such receptacles shall be impervious to weather, safe from destruction by animals and hygienic; provided, plastic bags with a thickness not less than one and one-half (1.5) millimeters shall be deemed to meet the requirements of this sentence.

A. Rubbish that is larger than can be conveniently contained in receptacles shall be securely tied in compact bundles not to exceed 65 pounds in weight and placed in a location convenient for collection. Parts of trees shall not exceed 3 feet in length nor shall they exceed 10 inches in diameter.

B. Solid waste resulting from the operation of commercial, industrial or other business enterprise may be placed and kept in commercial receptacles of a size and construction to facilitate pick-up by a licensed solid waste hauler. Such commercial receptacles shall be constructed of substantial metal, shall be water tight and shall have tight fitting covers.

C. Solid waste resulting from the usual routine of housekeeping and residential living may be placed and kept in portable receptacles of substantial metal or plastic construction with handles and a tight fitting cover. Plastic bags of sufficient thickness to meet the purposes of this Section 6 may be used in place of metal or plastic portable receptacles for such domestic solid waste. No single receptacle or bag shall weigh more than 65 pounds when filled.

D. In the case of a building housing more than two families, the receptacles shall be provided by the owner of the premises and shall be commercial receptacles.

Section 7. Every person who owns, possesses, controls, supervises or occupies private property in the Township shall cause all solid waste to be collected from such property at least once each week. Every such person shall limit the time when receptacles are placed on public property or private property beyond the front line of any resi-

dence to the period of 6:00 P.M. on the day prior to the regularly scheduled solid waste collection day and twelve hours following the act of collection by the licensed solid waste hauler.

Section 8. All solid waste haulers collecting solid waste from persons or property within the Township shall be required to have a duly issued and in effect license pursuant to the following procedure:

A. The Township Clerk and the office of the Township Clerk shall administer the issuance of the license.

B. Each license shall be effective for a term expiring on the 31st day of December next following the date of issuance, unless earlier suspended or revoked.

C. The fee for a solid waste hauler license shall be \$25.00 plus \$5.00 for each solid waste transporting unit owned or utilized by the licensed waste hauler. Each additional solid waste transporting unit placed in service after a new or renewal application has been filed shall be notified to the Township Clerk and accompanied by the aforesaid unit fee before the Clerk may issue the decal.

D. A license shall be issued to the waste hauler applicant and a decal for each waste transporting unit of the applicant. The license shall be displayed at the licensee's principal place of business and produced for inspection by any representative of the Township or customer upon request to the licensee. The decal shall be permanently affixed to and maintained upon the waste transporting unit in a clearly visible location.

E. A license shall not be granted to an applicant unless the applicant submits an application in a form and containing such information concerning the identity, experience, officers and employees, equipment, economic integrity and pertinent facts of the applicant as the Township Clerk may from time to time require for the purpose of determining whether the applicant meets all of the requirements of a solid waste hauler and the solid waste transporting units established by the Director of the Department of Natural Resources pursuant to Act No. 641, P.A. 1978, and rules promulgated pursuant to Act No. 306, P.A. 1969, as amended, all of which detailed technical regulations are adopted by reference and incorporated herein by such reference.

F. The solid waste transporting unit shall be inspected in accordance with procedures established by the Clerk to determine that the solid waste hauler has in operation only units which are proper, hygienic and not contributory to litter. The Clerk may accept as complying with this Ordinance, any solid waste transporting unit which has been inspected and approved by the Director of the Department of Natural Resources pursuant to Act No. 641, P.A. 1978, and the rules promulgated pursuant to Act No. 306, P.A. 1969, as amended, all of which detailed regulations are adopted by reference and incorporated herein by such reference, for the period of the effectiveness of such approval.

G. The solid waste hauler licensee shall obtain and keep in full force and effect insurance to protect the public against risk of loss from liability, including damage to property and injury to person, in a sum of not less than \$100,000.00 per occurrence caused by the actions or operations of the licensee, its officers, employees and agents.

H. If the applicant meets the requirements of this Ordinance, meets the requirements and rules promulgated pursuant to Act No. 641, P.A. 1978 and pays the applicable fees, then the Clerk shall issue a license to the applicant and for each acceptable solid waste transporting unit.

I. No solid waste hauler licensee shall require a customer to deposit or prepay collection charges for a period in advance greater than three calendar months.

J. No solid waste hauler licensee shall collect from residential customers less frequently than weekly (legal holidays, strikes and Acts of God excluded).

K. No solid waste hauler licensee shall dispose of collected solid waste other than by means of licensed solid waste transporting units and at disposal areas or facilities licensed pursuant to Act No. 641, P.A. 1978.

L. The Supervisor of the Charter Township of Plymouth shall have the authority to designate from time to time the streets and highways upon which the solid waste hauler licensee may transport solid waste transporting units.

M. The Supervisor shall have the authority to designate a particular property or condition as a public health hazard due to solid waste generation, accumulation or storage and upon notice to a solid waste hauler licensee the Supervisor may require such licensee to cooperate and assist in the collection of solid waste for the purpose of reducing or eliminating the public health hazard; provided, the Charter Township of Plymouth shall pay the reasonable and customary charges of such licensee related to providing required collection, and the Township shall be entitled to receive full reimbursement of such charges from the person who owns, possesses, controls, supervises, or occupies the aforesaid particular property.

N. Upon a written complaint setting forth the reasons for suspension or revocation of a license filed by the Supervisor with the Clerk, the Clerk shall call a meeting of the Board of Trustees with notice to the licensee and in order to consider the complaint and conduct a hearing thereon. Upon a finding by a majority of the members of the Board of Trustees present at said hearing of a violation of the provisions of this Ordinance, the license may be suspended or revoked.

Section 9. Any person violating any provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined an amount not exceeding \$100.00 or imprisonment for 90 days, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.

PART III. If any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections, sentences, clauses and phrases of this Ordinance, or the Ordinance as an entirety, it being the legislative intent that this Ordinance shall stand notwithstanding the invalidity of any such section, sentence, clause or phrase.

PART IV. This Ordinance is declared to be, and is, an emergency ordinance.

PART V. This Ordinance shall be effective immediately upon publication on July 2, 1979, save that a penalty for the violation of any provision thereof shall not take effect until August 2, 1979.

PART VI. Pursuant to Section 764.9c, MCLA, a police officer or a Constable of the Charter Township of Plymouth upon reasonable cause to believe a person has committed an offense under this Ordinance, may issue and serve an appearance ticket upon such person.

PART VII. This Ordinance was adopted by the Township Board of Trustees at a regular meeting duly called and held on June 26, 1979, and this Ordinance was ordered to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.

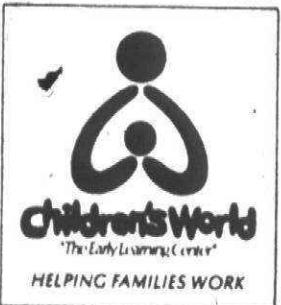

# Twin chairmen, Mao & Hua, presence is always felt

Everywhere we went there were always twin photos of Chairman Mao and Chairman Hua, hung side by side, high on the wall.

The one place tourists are always taken to shop is the Friendship Store, where a large, high banner boasts, "We have friends all over the world."

Merchandise available for sale included jade, ivory, silks, cashmere, china, pottery with the most beautiful glazes, cloisonne jewelry, carved lacquer, agate, hand embroidery, paintings, and onion-flavored peanut brittle.

PROBABLY THE highlight of our tour was our visit to a commune, where two rice crops are produced yearly.

There were 7,083 households with a total of 30,790 persons. Eighty percent of the land is planted in raspberries, rice or peanuts, but the other 20 percent is devoted to cash crops of fruits or pigs, which are handled independently by members so inclined.

It was a "dogs" life for the people before liberation," according to the spokesman. "People had no regular job then and had to go to a nearby village and do odd jobs to live."

"After liberation, water conservation projects of three reservoirs and 15 water-storage ponds were built, so that annual rice output has risen dramatically. With five irrigations stations, rice can now be planted where it was not possible before."

Living standards are vastly improved, and they no longer suffer from periodic famine.

"Workers go to the fields on two wheels, instead of on foot," he added. Now, all children can attend school, and 98 percent do so. If children can

pass the state exam after eight years of school, the state pays for their advanced education.

Touring through the commune hospital, which provides 41 beds for in-patient care, I noted a pile of tree branches on the floor under the bed of one of the patients. My inquiry revealed that they would be boiled in water to make Chinese medicine.

The hospital was termed "very basic," according to the English female M.D.'s with our tour group. The surgery rooms was not being used, so we witnessed no operation being performed under acupuncture.

We also were allowed to visit a typical small farmhouse, which was very functional and without much embellishment. The family had a young cat, but there were no dogs — they are not allowed, because "dogs bite people."

AT LUNCHTIME we were taken to an outdoor communal wash-up with two wash basins of water, one cake of soap and a small stack of wash cloths, but not enough to go around, so we had to share.

As we sat down for our meal, chilled bottles of orange pop and a pile of forks had already been set out. We ate our way through platters of eggs, chicken, duck, meatballs and vegetables, sliced long greenbeans, and beef with vegetables.

The elderly Chinese gentleman seated beside me began by slurping his soup, burped with gusto, then with much lip-smacking, tongue-clucking

and other assorted mouth-noises managed to indicate that he was thoroughly enjoying his meal. As I strove to maintain a straight face, I didn't dare look at him.

I had been actively campaigning for a chance to see the Giant Pandas at the local zoo, and on the return trip from the commune, our bus did stop at the zoo. It was a beastly hot day, and two large blocks of ice had been provided inside the panda house, which very effectively kept the pair indoors. We could see them sitting atop their ice blocks, and they would not be coaxed out.

I had always thought of pandas as being cute and cuddly-small; not so — they're big as bears. But it was quite a thrill to see them in the flesh.

The guide finally lured us all away from the panda house with the promise of a cold drink, which turned out to be a "red bean popsicle" with a nut-like texture and probably more nutritious than the sugared ones that American children consume.

THE LAST EVENING we were taken to a "fancy restaurant" for dinner, which was an unbelievable 18-course extravaganza, including a roast suckling pig with special glaze at every table.

The meal was so elaborate that I could get positively lyrical over its description, but with so much to report, I will refrain. But this interesting item: the Japanese girl seated beside me at dinner was so taken with the attractive

little cloisonne ashtray on the table, that she yielded to impulse, and slipped it into her handbag.

She was not unobserved, however, and when she rose to leave, she was stopped and quietly ordered to return it. No doubt this caused her a most painful loss of "face," but it's interesting that the Chinese handled it that way, when she might have been thrown in jail.

The quality of honesty has been so ingrained in the Chinese people, that for years there were no locks on hotel doors. But this is not always true of all tourists, so door locks and keys are now more generally provided.

As a matter of fact, it's almost impossible to throw anything away in China, because discards, as well as gratuities are invariably returned.

The last morning, as we boarded the bus to depart, after our luggage had al-

ready been stowed aboard, there was a long delay, as we sat and waited, while, unbeknownst to us, our rooms were being checked for forgotten belongings.

Finally a hotel employee emerged bearing a wire hanger, from which hung a pair of men's trousers, which were duly returned to the forgetful guest. Only then were we able to be on our way.

New as tourism to China, a few of the expected conveniences are not yet provided. Color film in all sizes is not readily available, nor are finished color-slides, which tourists often prefer to buy, offered for sale.

ANYONE WISHING TO visit China must join a tour group before being issued a visa.

One just does not wander around totally on his own for several days or weeks. It wouldn't be allowed. However,

the only thing we had done apart from the official tour was to walk from the hotel to a city department store where the locals do their shopping.

There were no obstacles put in our way and, done without the aid of a guide, which we were allowed to do, it was a memorable "extra." Starting out with a hand-drawn map, (essential to have because the streets are marked only in Chinese) we counted off so many blocks in one direction, turned left and walked several blocks further.

We were met with friendly smiles all along the route and found our greetings returned. Several children even greeted us in English, as they seemed to sense that we were Americans. It's surprising what one can do to communicate across the language gap by drawing pictures and using gestures when those are the only tools available to work with.

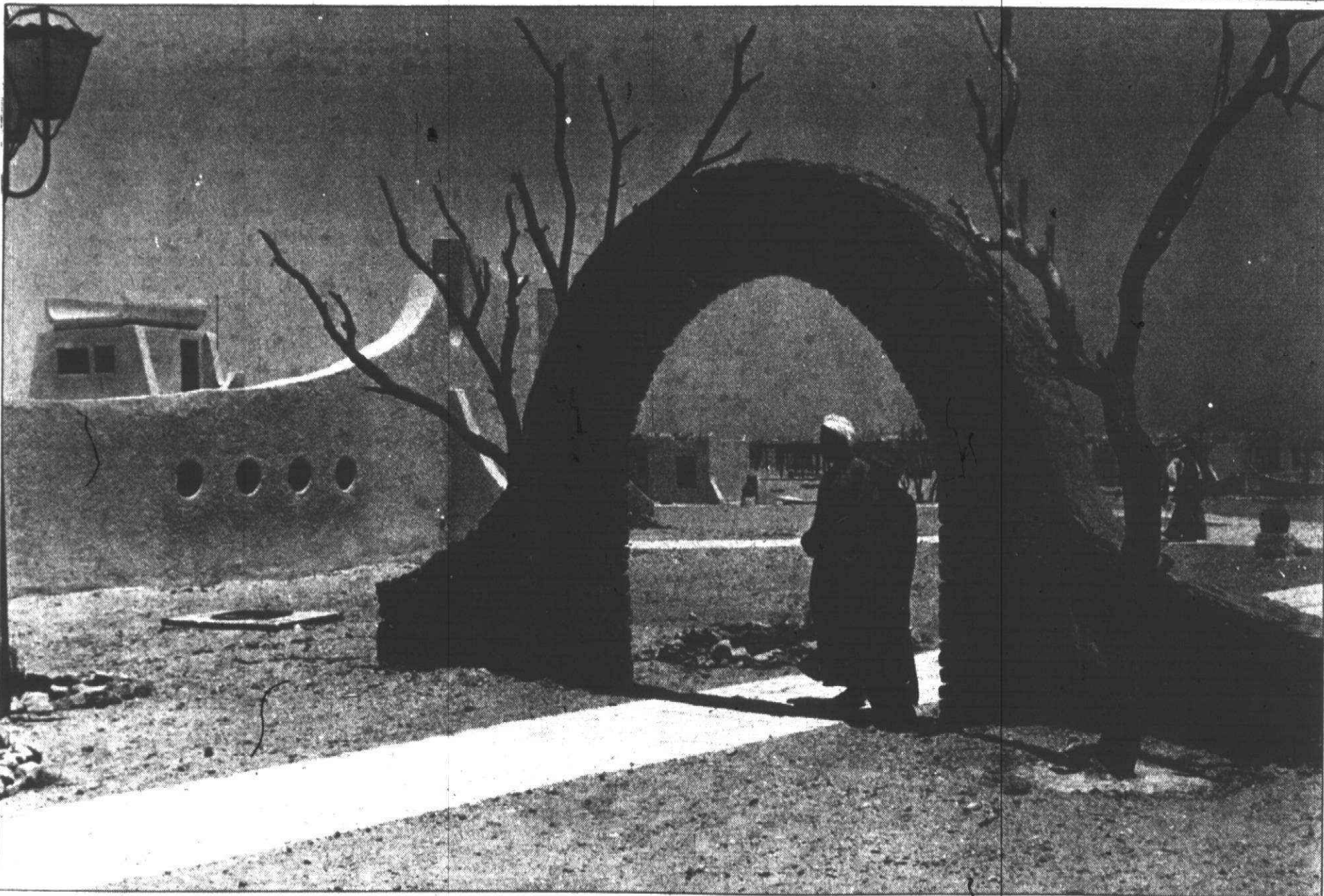

## Red goes Med

### New-wave resort

HURGHADA, Egypt — A deep blue sea washes a golden sand beach. But this is the Red Sea, not the Caribbean, and the sand beach flows for a desolate 100 miles to the horizon.

Can you really build a tourist resort on the edge of the Eastern Desert, in a land so barren that water must be hauled from a single nearby well or piped hundreds of miles from the Nile?

When I arrived at this new resort, I was cynical. The sign that read "Welcome to Paradise" was backed by a desert that only a camel could love.

When I left, I had a different view about deserts. The Eastern Desert never lost its barren look, but it has advantages after all.

It literally never rains here. The sun is hot but dry, and the average summer temperature is 70-90 F. It is sun hat and suntan lotion weather in the noon-day sun.

The tourist trade hasn't discovered it yet, so the people who live in the nearby desert village are curious and friendly. There is nothing but disco and authentic bedouin dance entertainment to distract you from the eating and drinking and playing that are at the heart of resort life.

Best of all, there is the Red Sea, described by marine experts as the last unpolluted sea in the world. It has an underwater smorgasbord for snorkeling, scuba diving and above-or-underwater photography.

**WHERE IS HURGHADA?** If you think of Egypt as a square 600 miles long and wide, with a green river valley called the Nile cutting it in half north to south, the Eastern Desert covers most of the land from the Nile to the Suez Canal and the Red Sea.

It is a 45-minute flight or a seven-hour drive southeast from Cairo, or a four-hour drive east from Luxor, to Hurgahada. The Egyptian government is encouraging public and private investment here, as well as on the Mediterranean coast near Alexandria, as part of its effort to add 27,000 hotel rooms and double the tourist trade by 1983.

There are no antiquities here, although the desert sand had filled in the swimming pool of this resort hotel when it was abandoned during construction because of the Mideast war.

No battles have been fought here, but it has been an extensive military zone. Even now you must put cameras away and go through security to check in at the army-run Hurgahada airport.

The hotel opened as the Hurgahada Sheraton this month. A second resort, run on the Club Med principle, opens one mile to the south next fall.

The Hurgahada Sheraton is built on the courtyard theme, with rooms built like stacked circular bracelets around an open atrium. Tourists use the hotel as a homestead, eating, drinking, dancing and socializing inside the hotel or on the terraces and beaches. The only place to go, except by bus to the nearby village, is out to sea.

Phase two of the hotel includes an international diving center, but the main occupation at sea right now is fishing.

AS THE MOTORBOAT moves across the sea at dawn, the low desert

landscape makes a golden ring around the water. The low hills of Hurgahada are behind us and the sawtoothed sandstone mountains of the Eastern Desert are misted in blue against the western horizon.

To the east is Saudi Arabia. To the northeast, the Sinai has just been transferred back from Israel to Egypt.

Tourists are sitting in fishing chairs at the back of the boat and on the short upper deck, all of them eating breakfast that has been served in lunch boxes.

"My daddy wouldn't have called that fishing" said a voice that was clearly from Mississippi. Below on the fantain aft, an Egyptian deckhand baits a rod that makes the only skyline against the capped blue sea.

The hotel staff assured us that we need only drop our lines overboard and we could "haul in a fish every three or four minutes." The tourists have lines overboard on all sides, but we catch nothing but the reef. The young Egyptian deckhand with the same line and bait, but a lifetime of experience, pulls in a small red fish, called bongos, every few minutes until they are piled against the bulkhead.

On another boat, fisherman have hauled in a 25 km nagell and a 10 km twina fish.

**THE NEARBY VILLAGE** of Hurgahada is one of the main sources of fish in Egypt.

On the village beach, where boats are towed in for repair, another sign of war remains. Smuggled boats, their owners now in jail, rot on the beach.

The village includes a large mosque, and a small shopping area where you can buy authentic bedouin goods. A few blocks away, in the small market street, villagers sell melons, potatoes and huge seashells on either side of a dusty road. This is the Egypt of the ancient desert, with only a few T-shirts and polyester slacks to remind you that it is 1979.

Women robed in black carry pots on their heads and men herd goats down the street. Children follow you, saying, "Hello! American? Welcome? What's your name?"

Tourists are the center of attention here. This is the frontier of tourism. The people are used to soldiers of every kind, now, but they are still curious about tourists from across the sea.

**A SHORT DISTANCE** south of the town and the hotel is the G.M. Magawish Hurgahada Tourist Village being built by MIRT Travel, a public-private Egyptian travel organization which is the main organizing force for travel in Egypt.

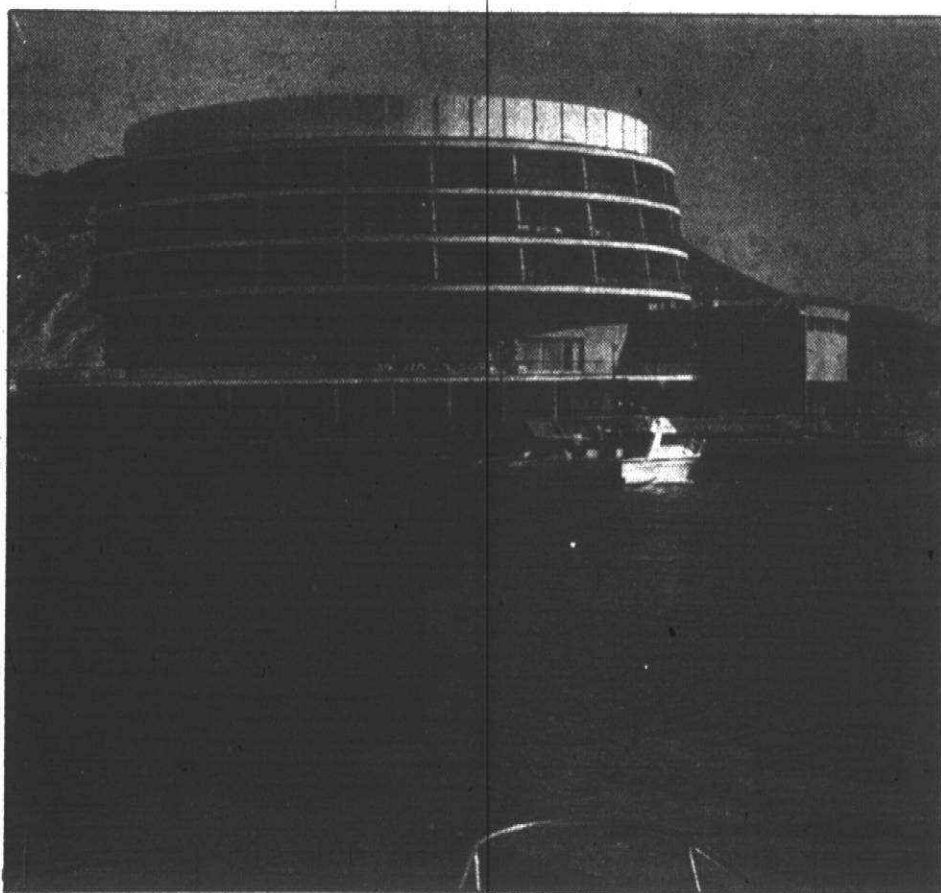
More than 200 bungalows are scattered across the desert landscape around a central clubhouse by the sea. For most of the year, Club Med will run this resort on the bikini-and-fun principle of other Club Med resorts.

Land and water sports facilities will be available, as well as dining room, bar and discotheque.

The village is expected to attract large numbers of young European travelers eager for guaranteed sun in the middle of dreary European winters.

It's a long way from the stone-and-hieroglyphics Egypt that most people come here to see, but it is a definite travel adventure for anyone content to live with sand, seas and first-class cooking.

### Some teary eyes, some sad goodbyes

**QENA, Egypt** — As we drive away from this desert city, the young student is waving politely from the town square outside the bus. He no doubt is confused by the shine in my eyes. Why should I get all choked up because a bunch of kids want to shake hands with a stranger?

I've only been in town half an hour, on my way from the Nile to the mountains of the Eastern Desert. My destination is the Red Sea.

All the pictures I carry away in my head from Qena are about hands. Men wave their hands from the steps of an ancient building on the square. A young boy with a big grin waves both hands from the back of a burro, where he is making his friends laugh with his antics. He wants his picture taken and uses all the international kid tricks to attract attention.

There are people scattered around the square, in front of the mosque, lined up at a shop door and gathered around the place where they make pottery. Women go by without raising their eyes but the men and children stare.

**FEW TOURISTS GET** this far off the beaten track. The Arabs in most places are curious and friendly. Only in the most well-known tourist sites like the pyramids and the Valley of the Kings do they push beads in your face or ask for money.

One small child here pushed his small hand forward tentatively and said "baksheesh," the eastern word for "give me money" but his elders scolded him.

That outstretched hand was one more hand of Qena. I grabbed it playfully and circled the palm with my fingertip, singing "All Around the Mulberry Bush."

It was a sensation and soon every small child in town wanted to play "Pop Goes the Weasel."

There was another hand, unseen, that made me jump. I did not expect to get pinched by a teenager in a long Arab robe in a desert town. But the main story of the hands began with the serious young man, perhaps 15 years old, in a pair of slacks and a brown knit shirt. His arms were full of school books, when he stopped in front of me.

"Good morning," he said.

"Good morning."

"Are you American?"

"Yes. You speak English!"

"A little. I learn in school. Where are you from in America?"

"I'm from Detroit," I said. He looked puzzled so I started to talk about living in the city where they make cars. Detroit was as foreign to him as Qena was to me. A crowd of children gathered around us.

**SUDDENLY THE BUS** horn sounded our departure. "Goodbye," I said, shaking his hand. He shook hands solemnly and that's when it happened.

A small hand shot into the circle. It was so low the owner couldn't have been more than 6 or 7 years old. "Goodbye!" he said. I shook his hand, too.

"Goodbye, goodbye, goodbye."

Hands shot out on all sides. I waded through them to the bus, shaking their multiple outstretched hands with both of mine and saying "goodbye, goodbye" as I walked.

# If you don't use gas, you can save money

The best way to save gasoline is to not use it.

Tuning your engine helps. Keeping your tires properly inflated helps. Driving a small car helps. Driving sensibly helps.

But if you don't drive those miles, you won't be using gasoline. And you will be saving money.

Planning and consolidating trips is akin to not driving because you are getting the maximum use from the miles you drive. Why drive to two grocery stores to save 40 cents if you will burn 40 cents in gasoline? In some compact cars, a mile costs seven cents, just in gasoline.

To get an idea of what it costs to drive a mile, divide the current cost of the type of gasoline you buy by the miles-per-gallon you are getting. Then round the cost up a penny.

This takes into account the poorer gas mileage for short trips, but totally ignores the other costs such as wear on tires, car insurance and

depreciation of the car. The government allows 18 cents per mile, taking into account these other expenses.

Is it cheaper to drive to the bank than to cash your check by mail? If you are getting 15 miles per gallon and your bank is more than one mile from your home or normal driving route, you are ahead banking by mail.

If you can save \$1 on a pizza from a pizzeria seven miles from home, you are better off not "saving" that dollar.

Driving two miles to a utility office is an obvious way to waste gasoline — and money as well, assuming you get fewer than 38 miles per gallon.

In addition to saving gasoline, you can save a nice sum by selling an unused second (or third) car. Insurance costs a minimum of \$2 a week in this area. You may be paying \$7 a week or more for insurance on a car. Is having an additional car worth that constant drain on your wallet?

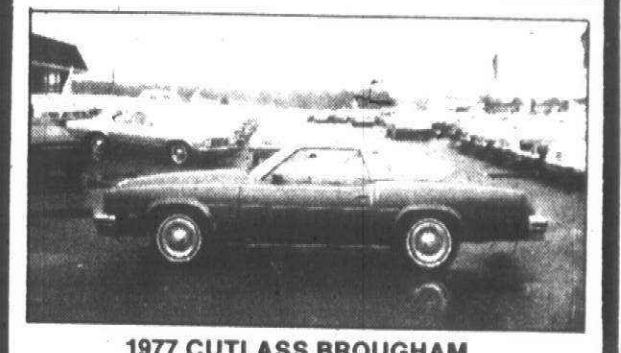
