Board schedules hearing

Controversy over restaurant liquor resumes

A public hearing on the possibility of rescinding a recommendation to grant the Canton House restaurant a liquor license has been scheduled for Tuesday's regular township board meeting.

The controversial license will be discussed along with site plans for a proposed low-income apartment complex south of Warren and east of Lilley.

Township officials will also consider naming a replacement for former Trustee Lynne Goldsmith who resigned last month in order to move to California.

The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. at the administration building on Canton Center near Proctor.

THE FORMER township board last November recommended to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission (LCC) that a liquor license be granted to Philip Haddad for the restaurant he operates at Ford and Lilley.

But members of the new township board indicated their intention to change the recommendation from approval to denial after an approximate 400 residents signed petitions against granting the license to the restaurant.

Opponents of the Canton House license say the restaurant is not large enough to merit a liquor license. They want township officials to reserve the

community's three remaining liquor licenses for restaurants that would provide a large tax base.

The number of liquor licenses allotted to a community is based on population. Canton is expected to receive additional liquor licenses after the 1980 census is conducted.

Township board members are expected to consider changing their recommendation at Tuesday's meeting following the May decision of Wayne County Circuit Judge James Hathaway to dissolve a court injunction.

The injunction was issued some months ago at the request of Haddad's attorney, Peter Bundarin. The court or-

der prevented township officials from changing its recommendation before the LCC.

Haddad has said that he needs the liquor license to compete with other restaurants and make his business a success.

The former township board voted to recommend approval of Haddad's liquor license application after making a similar decision on another application submitted by the Palace restaurant.

The LCC has already granted a liquor license to the Palace. The commission has taken no action on the Canton House application, however, ac-

cording to township deputy treasurer Maria Falkiewicz.

ALSO ON TUESDAY'S agenda are site plans for a low-income apartment complex near the Pickwick subdivision.

Amurcon Corp. has already won approval from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for federal rent subsidies for the apartment complex it hopes to build near Warren and Lilley.

The proposed project has met stiff opposition from officials and residents. The township planning commission has

recommended denial of Amurcon's site plans.

Township board members are expected to review the applications of 14 residents who have expressed an interest in the trustee seat formerly held by Mrs. Goldsmith.

Applicants for the trustee job are Elizabeth Hamann, Gus Matzo, Robert Padgett, Cheryl Casady, Wilfred Hind, Richard Wolfe, Doug Ritter, Tom Stillings, Diane Neihengen, Robert Schaezel, Jerry Clark Williams, Larry Bowerman, Mary Dingeldey and Steve Larson.

The trustee term expires in November 1980.

Victims of blaze get help

People in the Plymouth-Canton community have a good way of dealing with tragedy. They fight it with kindness.

After a June 28 fire burned the Judy and Alan Prince family out of their Sheldon Road house, area citizens responded with open hearts and wallets in an attempt to ease the burden of the suffering family.

More than clothes and toys were lost in the blaze, however, as smoke from the fire took the life of six-year-old Anthony Prince.

BECAUSE OF the tragic fire, the Princes found themselves in need of the basic things to run a household — clothes, furniture and money. A contribution center was set up at the Geneva Presbyterian Church on Sheldon, and within hours people were calling the church to ask what was needed.

"The response from the community has been fantastic, just beautiful," said Geneva pastor, Margaret Scabich.

"Help has come from the close neighborhoods and from far away."

She said that at first the church just collected phone numbers of those who had something to offer, and after it had been determined exactly what was needed, they called the folks back.

"AT FIRST we were taking in most everything, but the response was so good that the family was well clothed by the week end," said Mrs. Scabich. "And while we are not actually refusing anything, the family at this time is doing very well."

A bank account has been set up for the Princes by the church, and according to the Geneva pastor, many donations have been made.

"I CAN'T say exactly how much has been raised, but there were days when we received over a \$1000," said Mrs. Scabich. Many organizations and individuals have contributed to the Prince cause, the pastor said. A large part of the money raised has come from concerned neighbors who have gone door-to-door asking for money to help the family, said Mrs. Scabich.

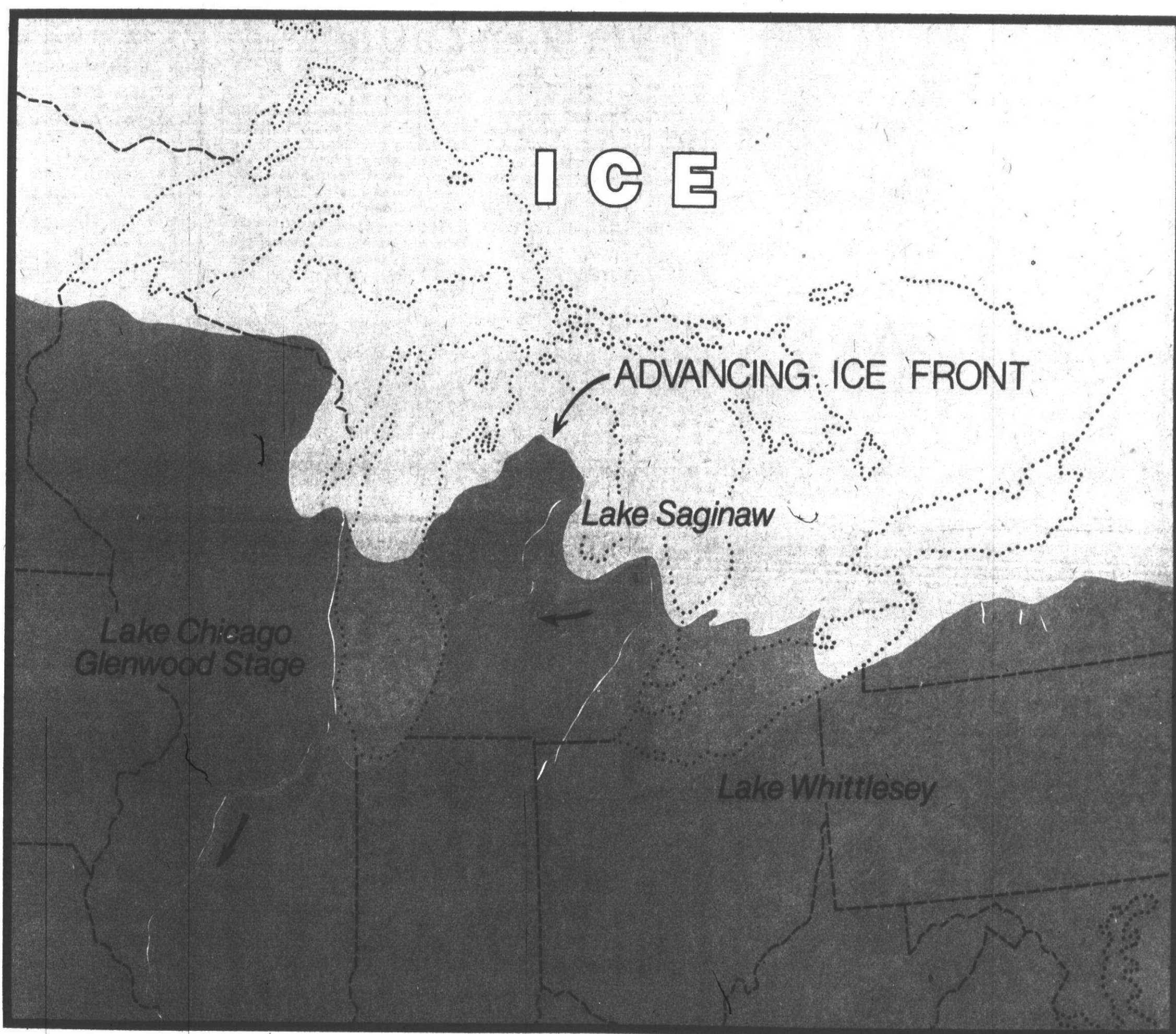
The Prince family, who had to move to South Lyon and live with relatives following the fire, received a big helping hand last week from an area real estate broker.

KEN DIVIDOC of the Century 21 office at 44205 Ford Road in Canton, made it possible for the Prince family to move into a house in the Carriage Hills neighborhood. The Princes will be able to reside in the house for three months rent-free while they pull their lives back together. The move into the home will allow the Prince children to remain in the same schools they attended while living in the Sheldon Road home and to keep their play friends as well.

THE PLYMOUTH Post Office, where Alan Prince works, has also raised a substantial sum of money for the family. A donation drive at the Plymouth Fourth of July parade netted almost \$800 for the Princes. A garage sale has been planned for July 20-21 at 7334 Irongate. People with any saleable items should call 455-5699. All proceeds from the garage sale will go to the Prince family.

The Canton Jaycees also helped the family this week by carting debris from the gutted home to the township

Where we live

This area was lake bottom made by Ice Age glaciers

You can take a journey on a Great Lakes shoreline — and never leave northwestern Wayne County.

You'll need a little imagination and some knowledge of geology.

In your mind, you must turn back the clock 13,000 years. As you cross Livonia, Northville, Plymouth and Canton, you can visualize what things were like back then. And you can learn a few things about modern civilization and property values.

There will be no cave men or Indians to guide you. Humans won't be around until 2,000 years later.

THE WORLD PICTURE looks like this: Ice in the form of glaciers has been covering Canada, the northern United States and northern Europe in waves for about two million years.

In our land there were four advances and retreats of glaciers. The glaciers' center is east of Hudson Bay.

Now, a glacier is part bulldozer, part sponge. It plowed 350 million years worth of Michigan rocks down toward the Ohio River. As it melted, it deposited rocks and gravel it had picked up in

the north country to make our hills and soils of today.

As you begin your trip of 13,000 years ago, the fourth glacial sheet — the Wisconsin — is retreating. It still covers most of Canada and the northern half of Michigan. It will be another 6,000 years before the first remnant of the glacier melts.

Your trip will be cool and moist. The climate will be like modern Canada's above Lake Superior. There's not a lot of vegetation yet — grass in the clearings, such "pioneer" trees as white and black spruce. Inland there may be a few musk ox.

THE AMAZING thing will be a gigantic lake, the forerunner of Lake Erie, that extends entirely over Detroit, Redford Township, Garden City, Westland and all but the northwest corners of Livonia and Canton Township. The southeastern third of Oakland County is also under water.

"Lake Whittlesey" it will be called by geologists of the 20th century.

Our lake of 13,000 years ago consists mainly of melt waters from the retreating glacier. The lake stretches from modern Buffalo, N.Y. to Port Huron and reaches several dozen miles inland over modern Ohio and Michigan.

Lake Whittlesey's shoreline is a gravel ridge 10-15 feet thick. You can stand on it in many parts of Washtenaw, Wayne and Oakland counties today and see almost exactly where its waters lapped. In some spots, however, especially along I-275 and in Southfield, the bulldozer and developer have obscured the old shoreline.

STAND ON EIGHT Mile east of Newburgh Road on Livonia's border, and you can see vividly a lake bottom to the east, a rising shoreline to the west.

Looking south, you see Glen Eden Cemetery. That is significant. Many times on your lakeshore trip, you will see cemeteries on what used to be Lake Whittlesey's beach. The sands and fine gravels are easier to dig in than the coarser gravels inland, and they have better drainage than the clays and sands of the old lake bottom.

The lakeshore runs southwesterly through the intersection of Newburgh and Seven Mile roads. On Six Mile east of I-275 freeway, you can spot the shoreline because a church and a cemetery stand on it.

South of Five Mile, drive along Haggerty Road and notice how it turns from a direct south

to a southwesterly direction. Haggerty is following the old shoreline.

A thought strikes you: Plymouth is on that old shoreline and Northville just inside it; Ann Arbor is on the old shoreline, so are Franklin Village and Birmingham; Rochester is just inside it.

In short, pioneers picked the well-drained gravel shores of old Lake Whittlesey for some of the most desirable town sites in modern Michigan. In the last decade, Schoolcraft College and the two Plymouth high schools were built on the old shore.

WHITE SETTLERS weren't the only persons who favored the Whittlesey shoreline.

Indian trails followed the shore. A thousand years before the white man, a mound building group we call the Hopewell Indians settled along rivers such as the Raisin, Huron and Clinton where they cut the old Whittlesey shoreline.

"The mound builders looked for porous land with good drainage," retired Schoolcraft College geology instructor William (Rocky) Ryan tells you. "They would bury their dead there, in the loess soil."

Ryan's own house in Livonia is on former lake

Driscoll family raises own military corps

"We're just like any other family," she said. But not quite.

What other group of kids as infants were rocked to sleep to the Star Spangled Banner rather than more traditional lullabies?

What other group of brothers and sis-

ters, collectively, looked to General Douglas MacArthur as a childhood hero?

What other group of brothers and sisters created a family affair out of Army life?

If the United States Army awarded Medals of Honor to private citizens who helped beef up Army enlistment — Dorothy and Terrence Driscoll of Plymouth Township would be in the top running.

The Driscolls, parents of five, have seen four of their children join the army. And for the youngest, Patrick, 14, there's still time.

The four eldest are graduates of Plymouth Salem High School. Cadets Kathleen, 21, and Kevin, 23, presently are spending several summer weeks in training at Fort Riley, Kan.

Younger sister Maureen, 19, has spent the summer in basic camp at Fort Knox. Older sister Kelly, 24, spent two years in the Army before marrying her company commander and settling down to raise an infant son, now 19 months old.

KELLY HAD BEEN IN the military police and stationed in Panama when she met her husband, Johnnie.

Both Kevin and Kathleen are studying military leadership at the Army's ROTC advanced camp in Kansas. During the school year, they both attend Eastern Michigan University. Kevin is studying criminal justice and Kathleen is studying political science.

Kevin had gotten a head start at his career goals when he traveled to Frankfurt, Germany where he attended, and later graduated from, American military school.

"He had played soldier since he was a little boy and was anxious to go over there," his mother recalls.

He now looks to a career in military intelligence while his sister, Kathleen, has expressed interest in the Army's signal corps.

The youngest female child, Maureen, is a '78 graduate of Plymouth Salem and spent four years as a school cheerleader. She now majors in dance at Eastern Michigan.

Asked how her children became interested in this way of life, Mrs. Driscoll admits "I think I might have had a lot to do with it."

"I always felt every young American owes their country something. "You need a little adventure before you set-

tle in. The Army offers a lot of benefits a lot of kids don't know about. I much rather see them doing what they're doing instead of demonstrating against the draft."

MR. AND MRS. DRISCOLL also spent two years in the Army. They met in 1952 during the Korean Conflict at Fort Rickie, Md., where she was stationed in the Army's signal corps. Mrs. Driscoll now works at J.L. Hudson's as a clerk and her husband is a self-em-

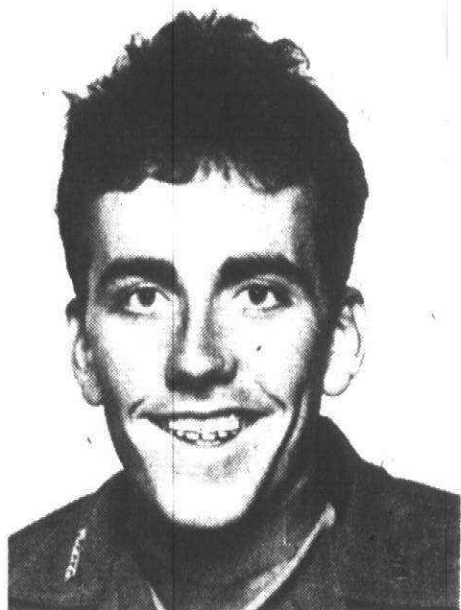
ployed plumber.

About noticed changes in their children since beginning Army training, she has observed they've "done a lot of growing up since they've left high school. It's too soon to say about Maureen, but Kathleen is much more motivated than ever before. Of course, they've all matured."

She adds the physical activity promoted in Army life has caused both Kathleen and Kevin some weight loss, about 35 lbs. and 40 lbs. respectively.

Don't be alarmed by 'terrorist attack'

If, on July 15, you're driving by the Plymouth Child Development Center in Northville and spot a man in the distance who's dressed in jungle greens and a face mask — don't be alarmed. It's just a mock terrorist attack.

This word of warning comes from the Wayne County Sheriff's Department, where plans are under way for an extensive four-day exercise aimed

at protecting high ranking officials from assassination.

Sgt. Ray Megge is director of "POP — Protection of a Principal," which is the training program that now begins its eighth year in Wayne County. The program will run July 12-15 and involves some 60 sheriffs and police officers from around the nation.

The training involves simulating terrorist attacks, roof-top snippings and motorcade ambushes. The center's grounds, located north of Five Mile Road, at Sheldon Road, will be the location of the alarming — but harmless activity. Beginning 9 p.m. Saturday, July 14 to 4 p.m. Sunday, July 15, some 5,000 rounds of blank ammunition and 10 lbs. of (real) explosives will be released. Explosions and gunfire noises are expected to be heard in the surrounding area although the actual training drill is blocked to the public.

"Some people driving by have gotten a little upset," Megge said about previous years. "Needless to say."

The training focuses on protecting foreign dignitaries and top United States executives who have been targeted by groups such as the Palestinian Liberation Army.

Police training has been stepped up because of the upcoming presidential election, the Republican National Convention in Detroit, as well as the United State's involvement in peace talks between Egypt and Isreal, Megge says.

Local economy fares well despite gloomy talk

Despite warnings from Washington that a recession looms on the horizon, area merchants say that it has been "business as usual" for the first half of 1979.

In a spot check of local businesses, the only indication that things are not what they could be is from Hines-Park Lincoln Mercury, 40601 E. Ann Arbor Road in Plymouth.

Hines-Park, which sells cars in all sizes, stakes its claim on the big, flashy Mercurys and Lincolns. The top of the line Mark V sells for \$16,000 and averages 17 miles to the gallon.

But according to sales manager Jim Seavitt, it is not the low mileage that

has been scaring off would-be Lincoln buyers but the uncertainty of gasoline.

"The person who buys a Mark V is not really concerned about the price of gas," said Seavitt. "What they care about is if they will be able to purchase gas — that's all."

"The large cars are just not selling," said Seavitt. "What we and the manufacturer are doing is trying to make the big cars attractive to buy. Someone can come in here and just about write his own ticket when dealing with one of our more expensive, larger cars."

While the big car market is falling off, the sale of the smaller sized automobiles is on the rise, said Seavitt.

"The smaller, better mileage cars are selling, but in a business like ours, those sales do not offset the decline in the bigger car sales."

Seavitt added that if it was not for this year's problem of getting gas at filling stations, his dealership would have probably set sales records.

BUILDING IN THE Canton area has remained steady, a check of May building receipts revealed. There were 215 permits issued during May, and Gary Barnett, deputy building official, said that is about normal.

"It is just a trace off of the average, but not really enough to notice," said

Barnett. "May is a big month for building, and the 215 figure is about right. People start to build in March and carry on into August, and while I thought it would slow down, it has not."

If reports from Meijer Thrifty Acres on Ford Road in Canton are any indication of the state of the local economy, then it can only be described as healthy.

Brian Michmerhuizen, manager of the store, said that his branch of Meijer's is doing well.

"We have been doing very good, but, then again, we always have done good," he said.

"Something to remember, though, is that this area is growing at a very rapid rate. It gets bigger and bigger, therefore we realize a tremendous amount of business."

REGARDLESS OF what people buy or where they shop, the bottom line of their purchases usually deal with a

bank. The use of plastic money (charge cards) has greatly increased the buying potential of many people, along with making it easier.

Bob Purdy, manager of the Canton branch of the National Bank of Detroit, 45345 Ford Road, said that the misuse of credit has gotten many people into trouble.

"While I would not call it a trend, we have a lot of people coming in and asking for consolidation loans," said Purdy.

He explained that the consolidation loan is one which lets a person combine all his unsecured debts in one lump sum. If a person has five or six outstanding charge card debts, said Purdy, that person could borrow from the bank and pay the debts off, thus owing just the bank one monthly note.

Purdy added that to receive a consolidation loan from his bank, the people must give up all their credit cards that got them into the trouble.

"The consolidation loan is not a credit counseling service, but just another of the loan services we offer," said Purdy.

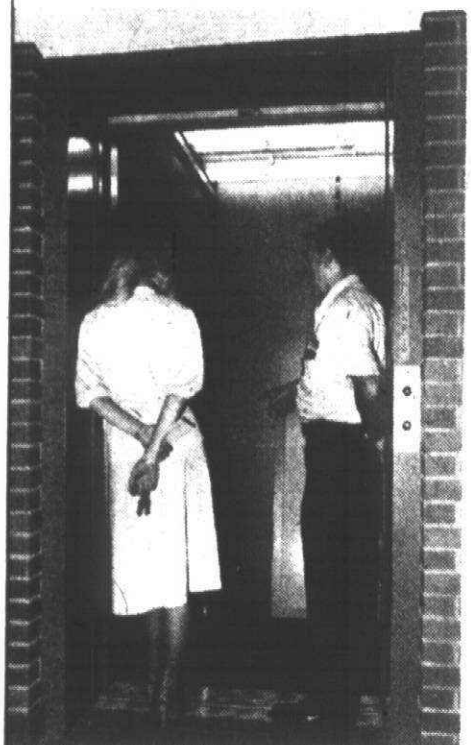
Purdy said that it is good practice for persons in financial trouble to let their bank know as soon as possible.

"We encourage people in trouble to call us first thing, and then we can get a jump on the problem and maybe minimize the situation," said Purdy.

Other banking business for the first half of 1979 was about the same as past years, according to Purdy. He said that there was an increase in automobile loans and seasonal building loans.

"Car loans are up, as people are buying the high-mileage cars in fear of the gasoline shortages," said Purdy. "And we have the usual summer building going on, which requires a bank loan. But at this time, I can not say that people are acting any differently in light of the poor economic predictions."

Elevator traps Culberts



Supervisor Noel Culbert and his family wanted to be home lighting sparklers.

But instead, they spent 1½ hours of their July Fourth in a stalled elevator at deserted township hall.

Culbert, who described the entrapment with his wife and two children as "a little frightening," finally managed to escape by prying open the elevator door and squeezing through a one-foot opening at the bottom of the elevator that led to the administration building's first floor.

The supervisor said he envisioned all sorts of dangers before jumping out of the elevator which had stalled between the first and second floors.

His biggest worry was the fear he might swing beneath the elevator into the open shaft and fall 20 feet to a pipe-studded basement floor.

Ted Vinal of Otis Elevator Co. tells Nancy Longwell, Supervisor Noel Culbert's secretary, that a burned-out fuse caused the breakdown of the elevator that trapped Culbert's family on July Fourth.

ON THURSDAY MORNING, Ted Vinal of the Otis Elevator Co. pinned the blame for the breakdown on a burned-out fuse.

But Culbert, who said he lost sleep Wednesday night because of the experi-

ence, is worried that the elevator will stall again.

He has pledged to install a telephone or hookup to the fire department alarm system in the elevator to prevent another night-time entrapment.

"Small committees meet on the third floor of this building a lot at night. Someone could be trapped in that elevator until morning."

Culbert admits he thought this may happen to him. With the supervisor were his wife, Chris, and their two children, aged 1 and 9.

"At the time, there was absolutely no one around," Culbert said. "It was really an exciting Fourth of July."

Culbert had gone to township hall at about 9 p.m. to pick up some papers. His family had hoped to hurry home to light Fourth of July sparklers.

WHEN THE ELEVATOR stalled, Culbert said he searched for a trap door in the compartment's ceiling. But instead of finding an escape hatch, Culbert said he brushed a fluorescent light bulb which blew up in his face.

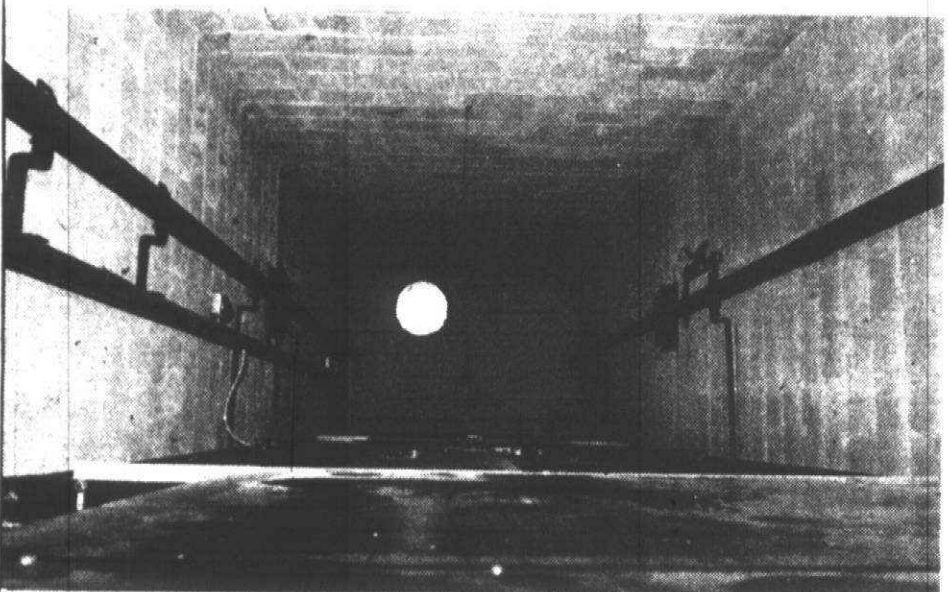
With glass littering the elevator floor, the supervisor managed to trip open the door leading to the administration building's first floor. The first-floor hallway was visible through a three-inch opening at the bottom of the elevator.

The Culberts began throwing items at a hallway fire alarm hoping to elicit fire personnel of their predicament.

When that failed, the family began jumping on the elevator floor. Culbert said the opening at the bottom of the elevator eventually increased to about 12 inches.

The supervisor then managed to squeeze out of the compartment. But as far as Culbert was concerned, plans for Fourth of July sparklers had already gone up in smoke.

"I was wound up," the supervisor said Thursday morning. "I couldn't even go to sleep."

Drunk arrests set record

The Canton Police force, which last year was comprised entirely of rookies, seems to have set a record of sorts by making 88 arrests last month for drunk driving.

That figure may not demand much attention by itself. However, the Canton Police only arrested 80 people for drunk driving in all of 1978.

Lt. Larry Stewart of the Canton police said a big reason for the dramatic increase in drunk driving arrests is due to the officers' extra year of on-duty experience.

"The main reason for the increase, I think, is that our officers are better able to spot the drunk driver," Stewart said.

"That one year of experience is a lot, and the officer is more in tune to spotting a drunk than they were last year."

"Now when an officer sees a car leave the road for a moment and go onto the shoulder, he is better able to determine what the problem is."

That experience, combined with breath testing equipment, added to the higher total statistics, Stewart said.

The new Canton police station on Geddes near Sheldon is equipped with a jail, a small photo lab and a Law Enforcement Information Network (LEIN) computer that pulls information from a pool in Lansing.

Within a few minutes, LEIN can provide an officer with information about a person, including warrants and revoked licenses.

Sign law validated by judge

Judge James Garber of the 35th District Court has upheld the validity of Canton's strict sign ordinance at a time when township officials are considering enactment of a more lenient sign law.

Garber struck down the argument of Canton businessman Gary Roberts that the current law is invalid because procedural errors were made when it was adopted in March 1975.

Roberts, who owns Canton Vac & Sew on Ford Road, has been ticketed on four occasions for attaching a cloth to a van and parking the vehicle in front of his store.

Township ordinance officers claim the cloth is a banner which violates the sign law.

Roberts' attorney, Peter Bundarin, claimed that the entire sign ordinance was invalid because the township board failed to refer the law back to the planning commission before adopting the ordinance.

A state zoning statute requires township boards to send zoning ordinances back to planning commissions when changes have been made in proposed laws.

Township officials admit that the 1975 law was not sent to the planning commission for reconsideration after changes were made.

But Garber ruled that changes in the ordinance adopted by the township board did not create "a new entity." He said most of the changes were grammatical or additions of new paragraphs.

"It was the original proposal with some grammatical changes and independent additions which the township board attempted to act upon," Garber said in last Monday's decision.

Roberts said he may decide to appeal Garber's ruling.

The current sign law has raised the wrath of the business community by prohibiting freestanding ground signs.

The proposed sign ordinance would allow freestanding signs of a limited area. Township board members have indicated that they may approve a law which would allow freestanding signs of 18 square feet with synthetic materials and 25 square feet with natural materials.

That's a Canton record. Can you imagine, 18 in one day?"

One of the first activities will be to honor outgoing Trustee Joe Gray by presenting him with a lifetime pass to all school district activities.

Then, Tom Yack and Sylvia Stetz will be sworn in as trustees. Yack has been re-elected and Ms. Stetz is a new member of the board, filling Gray's position.

During the organizational meeting, the board also is expected to name the auditing firm and legal firms for the school district, and set the time and place for regular meetings.

This year's officers include: Yack, president; Richard Arlen, vice president; Flossie Tonda, secretary; and Steve Harper, treasurer. Other trustees are Carol Davis and Elaine Kirchgatter.

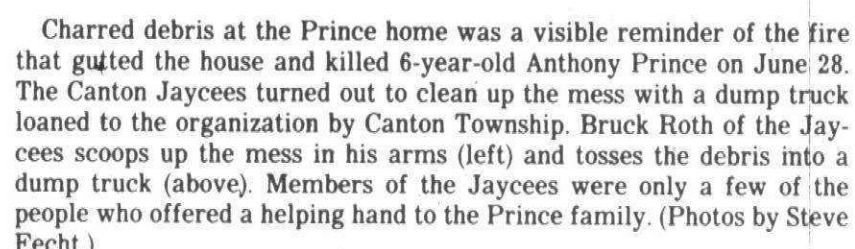

Studies show...

What you have to realize is that you are comparing yourself with several 18-year-old college freshmen and/or a gaggle of white rats. I can't see that I have all that much in common with either of them. Maybe college students and white rats can't take things in stride that I can, and vice-versa.

They even report on studies that haven't been done yet! This morning I was thrilled to read of a University of Oregon scientist who has been given over \$55,000 by the government to determine if there is a correlation between human exposure to radio waves and the incidence of cancer.

The director of the study is quoted as saying, "Chances of our finding a specific relationship right now are relatively slim, but they do exist. Can't join gasoline boycott, but...

I am one of those die-hards who does not believe in gasoline shortages.

I didn't believe in the gasoline shortage in 1973 and I don't believe in the current shortage.

Just by driving around, I understand that many gasoline stations don't have enough to sell — of certain types (like no-lead) on certain days. So consumers are faced with a shortage, but only because the gasoline isn't available at the stations.

I always have been and remain suspicious that the major oil companies have on hand sufficient supplies to meet current demand for gasoline. The only reason for the alleged shortage is to create panic buying and force prices up. So I refuse to panic, and refuse to believe.

PROBABLY FOR THAT reason my eyes picked up when reading an unsigned letter which came across my desk, which began:

"If you believe there is a real gasoline shortage instead of a shortage created by the oil companies, this is not for you, so toss it away."

"However, if you believe this entire situation was contrived by the oil companies to create a false shortage and to drive up the cost of gasoline unnecessarily, this letter should be of interest to you."

That was enough of a teaser to make me finish reading. But reading it didn't particularly promote the cause of the unknown author. The author was promoting a boycott of Shell gasoline stations — "To Hell With Shell" effective July 1. I don't buy Shell anyhow.

The letter was sent by a Plymouth woman whose husband picked it up at his place of work. The letter also reportedly had made the rounds among Ford Motor Co. workers.

A reason given for picking on Shell is that it was the first company to ration gasoline to its dealers. That claim recalls a story told by another Plymouth resident whose friend, the owner of a Shell station on the east side, was ordered to close his place down on Sunday even though he had a more than adequate supply of gasoline on hand.

Another reason given for boycotting Shell is because it is foreign-owned and

it wouldn't be patriotic to boycott American-owned stations. I'm not sure that makes much sense from an economic standpoint, given the global perspective of American oil companies, but it sure made my duty easier with AMOCO left off the target list.

ANYWAY, THE nameless writer of the letter (who signs, "A Friend") goes on to say:

"Perhaps you remember back in 1973 when gasoline was 35 cents a gallon and suddenly in order to get to work you had to sit in a line for 30 minutes in order to buy 10 gallons, because of a shortage? Suddenly, the price went to 55 cents a gallon and we were virtually swimming in gasoline." (Was it only six years ago when gasoline was 35 cents a gallon? Must have been a gas war.)

"Remember in 1977 when all of the coffee beans froze and coffee went to \$5 a pound and 40 cents a cup? For once, the people quite buying it and now, suddenly, it is \$1.65 a pound but still 40 cents a cup. Why? Because people will pay 40 cents a cup but not \$5 a pound."

"Now, no one in the world understands the first law of economics better than a major oil company: 'Charge what the traffic will bear.' They know if they create a large enough 'shortage,' as long as we have a buck, we'll pay it for gas."

After detailing the specifics of the boycott, the writer concludes: "And, my friend, there is nothing in the world that will get a major oil company's attention quicker than a drop in their excess profits."

GASOLINE, of course, is not the only commodity going up in price.

Everything you might want to buy, or have to buy, is going up in price — houses, land, automobiles, meat, produce, staples, clothing, shoes, insurance, taxes, utilities, entertainment.

What bothers me about the increases in gasoline prices, though, is the oil companies' blatant appeal to patriotism. "Be ecology-minded, cut down on gasoline, save America's resources for future Americans, etc., etc."

I am not moved by such patriotic appeals, of course, because neither the

oil companies nor the government have been able to convince me the oil shortage is real.

But it grinds me that the oil companies want me to patriotically reduce my consumption while paying more per gallon for the gasoline I do buy. While I don't begrudge oil companies a profit, I can't feel good about paying their higher prices and watching my excess income being reduced at a much greater rate than their's.

If there really is a shortage in crude oil, then there is less oil available now than in the past for refining into gasoline. If that's so, then the refineries should be producing less gasoline which should result in a major reduction in annual operating expenses. And if that's so, then the lower operating costs should allow the major oil companies to charge the same price per gallon for gasoline, or to lower prices, and still maintain the same profit level as last year.

Likewise the operating expenses should be lower at the individual service stations which now don't have to pay for labor on Sundays or after 5 p.m. when they are closed. Although allocations are being cut, they are either at the same level or 10 per cent higher than at the same time in 1978.

So you are not hurting economically when you sell the same number of gallons in any given month in a shorter period of time with less labor expense.

So if the individual stations or the refineries don't need to charge more to maintain the same level of profits, what is the need for the increase in gasoline prices?

Supposedly because supply is low and pricing is an effective rationing mechanism. I won't repeat arguments made in an earlier column about the inequities of price rationing. That's another argument entirely.

But the arguments to justify the price increases comes down to an alleged shortage of supplies. Yet the federal government has been unable, or unwilling, to come up with the hard cold figures establishing the claim that current supplies are inadequate to meet current demand.

Too bad I don't put Shell in my gas tank. Then I could join the boycott this month.

About the rock

It was a beastly hot July afternoon when Lord Mayor Frank Chapman and his party arrived from Plymouth, England, to help celebrate the centennial celebration in Plymouth, Michigan.

The group that included Aldermen Harold Pattinson, Alderman Harold King, and Town Clerk Stuart Lloyd Jones, had been given a riotous reception at City Hall and now were sitting in their suite at the Mayflower to relax — just a bit.

Then, as he looked out of the window and down Main Street, Alderman Pattinson turned to The Stroller and remarked, "Isn't it a bit odd that we would be over here helping you folks to celebrate your victory after beating us in the Revolutionary war?"

It did seem a bit odd. But that statement, and the friendly spirit in which it was said, planted the seed of a friendship between the two cities that will reach another peak this July Fourth with the dedication of a historical marker at the "bit of rock" taken from the dock in which the Mayflower sailed in 1620.

The dedication will give the rock a place in the records of the state of Michigan along with all the other outstanding sites in Michigan history — and forge another link in the bond of real friendship that has existed over the years.

THE STORY behind the presentation of the "bit of rock" is one of the most interesting — and unusual — in the city of Plymouth's annals and it all started with a rather humorous remark one evening during a commission meeting.

It was back in 1967 — the year of Plymouth's Centennial — and Mayor James Houk was asking for suggestions to help make the celebration one long to be remembered.

At that point some one suggested that there were 17 cities in America named Plymouth and it might be well to invite the 17 mayors as our guests. Then, from the audience, came a voice, saying, "Why not shoot for the jackpot? Invite the Mayor of Plymouth, England."

The remark was followed by a chuckle. But the invitations were sent, and it is an oddity that he was the only Plymouth mayor to attend.

While they didn't make much of it at the time, Lord Mayor Chapman and his group had come over to Plymouth, Mass. to extend an invitation to attend the 350th anniversary of the sailing of the Mayflower and had Plymouth, Mich., only as a stop-over on the trip.

HOWEVER THEY were given anything but a royal reception in Massachusetts and cut their stay short to come to Plymouth, Mich.

Their arrival here was like a holiday,

with a gathering of several hundred at City Hall, and immediately they paid the first tribute by announcing that Plymouth, Mich., was now a real sister city.

The delegation spent the better part of a week here and at the civic dinner Lord Mayor Chapman pulled the "coup" by presenting the bit of rock that now rests encased in glass in the wall between City Hall and the Dunning-Hough Library.

How the stone got here, no one knows. But it was hidden under the table at the civic dinner and its presentation was both a surprise and a shock.

In return the British delegation was presented with four locust trees that are now thriving on the lawn of the government building in Plymouth, England, and a point of interest to all persons from Michigan who visit the English city.

Little did anyone think on the night of the civic dinner that the "bit of rock" would some day have a hallowed place in the historical records of the state. But that honor will be given officially when the marker is dedicated on July Fourth.

And it will forever stand as a symbol of the remark Alderman Pattinson made on his arrival here 12 years ago when he said, "Isn't it odd that we should be over here helping to celebrate the victory over us in the Revolutionary war?"

"Computers fascinate me," she said. "I had once thought about going into drama, but computers are more practical. I enjoy the work. I like puzzles and that's what computers are."

Lambert's forensics career started back at Plymouth-Canton High School, where she was a state finalist for two consecutive years in "serious interpretation." She also participated in some high school dramatic productions.

The EMU junior admits the national contest brought a sense of awe. There were 150-400 people competing in several categories. In addition to her winning categories, she joined in "prose interpretation," "poetry interpretation" and a second contest in "dramatic duo."

"I DON'T THINK people can imagine what it is until they've been there. It shocked the heck out of me when I was a freshman, and it scared the heck out of me this year. I bit my fingernails down to the bone just because I was worried about nationals."

Forensic teamwork instills pride and confidence, she said.

"When I first came to Eastern I commuted. I didn't feel it was any different than high school until I got involved with the forensics team. I got involved and felt the unity of the team as a whole. It's given me a sense of belonging."

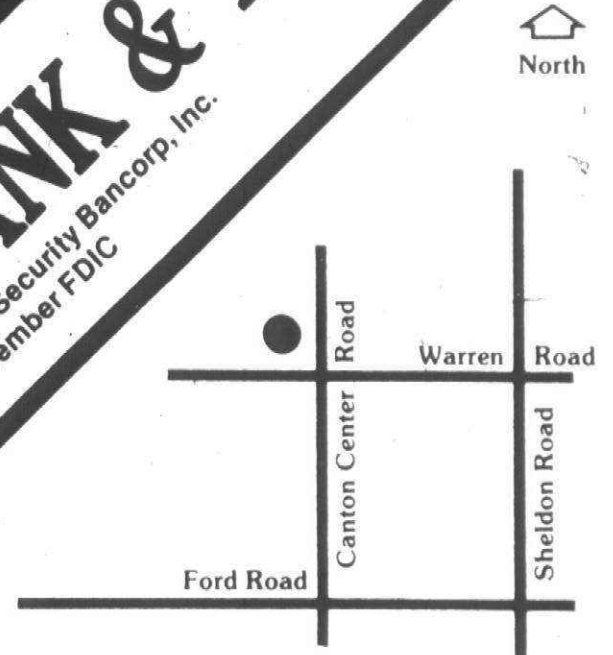

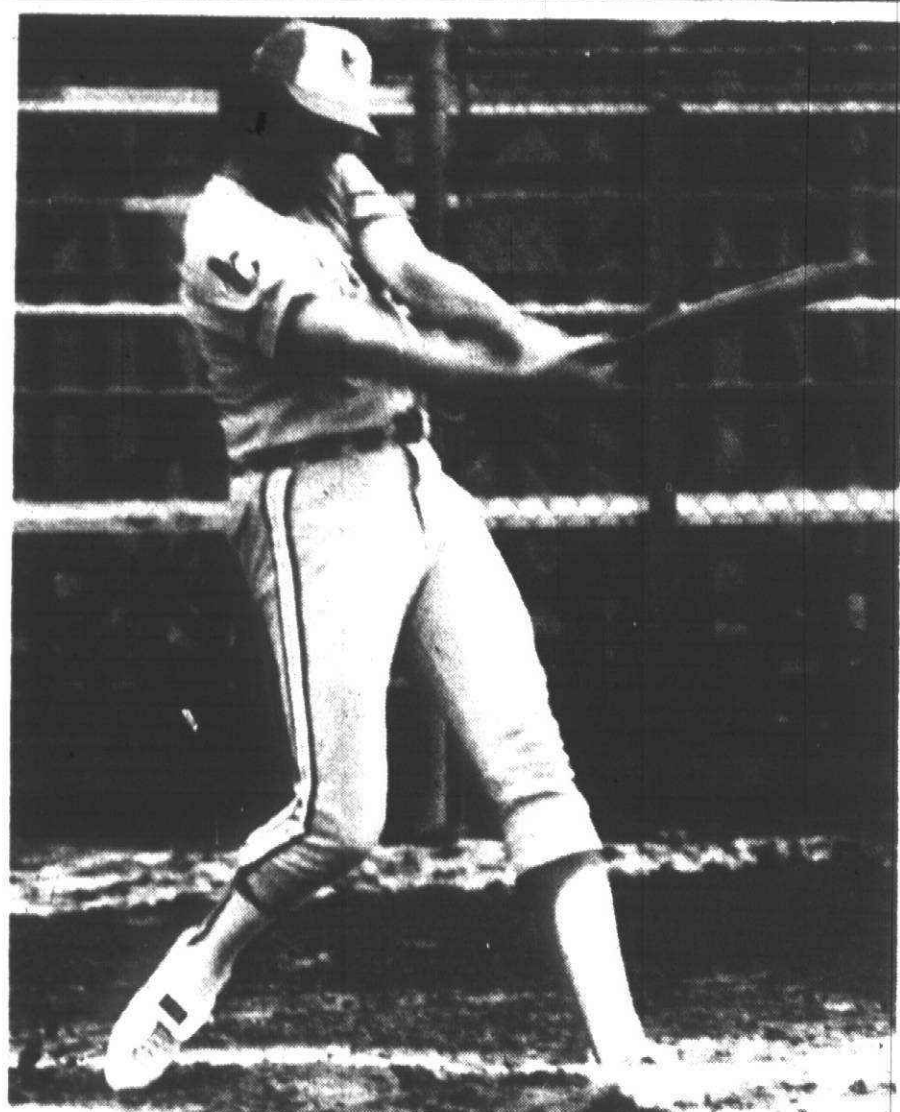

Consistent play is Govin's trademark

It always tough trying to defend a title.

Just ask Mike Gouin, a member of the world champion Detroit Caesars professional softball team.

Caesars is after its third straight professional crown. Because of numerous injuries to key players such as Gouin, a superintendent of the Canton Township Parks and Recreation Department, Caesars has struggled the first half of the season, trailing Milwaukee in the Midwest Division of the American Professional Softball League.

Gouin, one of the original Caesars' players dating back to their amateur days, has been fighting a groin injury most of the season.

The injury has limited his mobility. He has been shifted from his normal right-centerfield spot to the infield, where he's been playing third and first base.

"I've been trying to get into the infield, but not this way," laughed Gouin, one of the mainstays of the world champs. He was the third leading hitter last season behind Ron Ford and Mike Nye as he batted .605.

"We have a good team as last year but we've had a disasterous start," said the affable Gouin. "We didn't have any indoor workouts and that hurt us. We've gained some momentum now (21-17 as of July 6) and first place is not out of reach."

"The biggest factor is all the injuries. We lost one or two and got psychologically down."

The slow start has also contributed to a drop in attendance for Caesars' games at East Detroit Memorial Field. The average crowd was around 5,000 last year as compared with 2,500 this season.

"There are a number of factors involved," he said. "We haven't had good weather, and not having any former Tigers out there may be the reason."

Caesars remedied that situation recently by resigning Jim Northrup and inking Mickey Stanley to his first contract. The two players demonstrated their drawing power in their first appearance when 7,239 fans showed up for last Wednesday's doubleheader against Fort Wayne.

"Having those two guys will definitely help. A lot of people came out there for the first time. Whether they come back or not, we'll just have to wait and see."

Gouin said it takes time to become an effective slow-pitch player.

"I think Stanley and Northrup can adjust, but it takes time. They haven't been playing that long," Gouin said.

"The biggest thing about hitting is getting your whole body into it. You have to swing the bat harder and get good leverage. The wrists aren't involved unless you're Ron Ford. He's so strong," said Gouin.

Gouin swings a hefty bat and is known more for his consistency. He also has the ability to hit the long ball.

A NATIVE OF WAYNE, Gouin started playing slow pitch when he was 16 years old. He played baseball and basketball for four years at Eastern Michigan University.

Gouin joined Caesars when the team had amateur standing in 1968. Caesars won the world amateur crown in 1970.

"That team was probably the best I've ever been on," he said. "We were a little stronger defensively."

Now 36, Gouin was glad when Caesars got into the professional ranks.

"I'm getting up in years and pro softball was the best thing that ever could have happened."

"It gave us exposure and I think people enjoy it. Traveling to those weekend tournaments was getting to be a grind. Playing professional gives me more time for my job."

A few rule changes have been adopted this year to create more interest for the spectator and more balance in the league.

"It's still a power hitters' game but we score 15-20 runs now instead of 40," Gouin added.

With fences less than 315 feet away, a restricted flight ball is used now. That means less homers. The bases have been moved to 70 feet and many of Caesars' opponents such as Cincinnati and Pittsburgh have lengthened its fences beyond 330-foot mark.

"I think they did that because of us," Gouin said. "I think a lot of the rule changes make sense although I like the 60-foot bases better. It's eliminated the inside-the-park homers and some of the action at second base."

Gouin said he has "two or three more years left" in professional softball.

"If pro softball folded I don't think I'd go back down and play in the amateur leagues. That would be it."

Gouin took over as director of the Parks and Recreation Department in Canton Township last September after spending nine years as an assistant in Wayne.

"I enjoy my job in Canton. I took it as a challenge. Canton is going to be a large community and we're trying to develop good programs in the summer and winter."

Spitz comes home Jaycee champ

119 finish race

Plymouth Canton varsity track coach Mike Spitz crossed the finish line first in the third annual Plymouth Jaycees Five-Mile Run held Wednesday.

Of the 129 runners who competed in the race, 119 finished the course which started at Northville Downs and ended on the corner of Mill Street and Starkweather in Plymouth's Old Village.

The 26-year-old Spitz finished the five miles in 25:37. He eclipsed last year's record by 10.0. He was forced to withdraw from last year's race because of a knee injury.

An avid runner, Spitz placed second in the 1977 race.

Mike Guzman, 21, followed closely behind Spitz in the 40 and under category. He posted a clocking of 29:12.

Seventeen women participated in the race and the top placer was 19-year-old Kathy Weyand who recorded a time of 32:02. She was 12th overall among all runners.

Other high finishers among the women included Cindy, 33, third place, 36:39; Cheri Leveille, 19, fourth, 38:32; Mary Mazurek, 45, fifth, 41:35.

THE OVER 40 victor was David Stoller. The 41-year-old runner was seventh overall as he posted an outstanding time of 31:07.

Behind Stoller in the 40 and over class were Robert Randall, 47, second-place, time unavailable, 36th overall; Phillip Settles, 47, third, 39:22; Richard Bayerl, 44, fourth, 79th overall; David

Crockett, 57, fifth, 89th overall.

Crockett was the oldest competitor to run in the five-mile event. The youngest male competitor was 10-year-old Brad Cooksey who posted a time of 50:52.

Wendt is a 1978 graduate of Livonia Stevenson High.

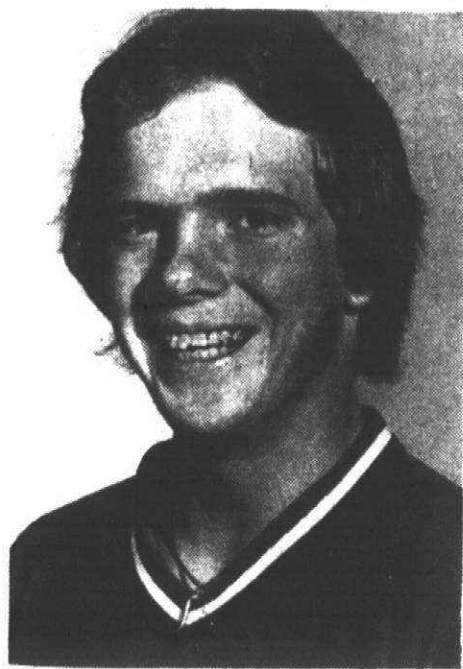
He played this spring for Oakland Community College and is playing this summer for Griffin Sports Shop in the Livonia Adray Baseball League.

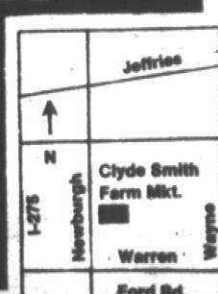

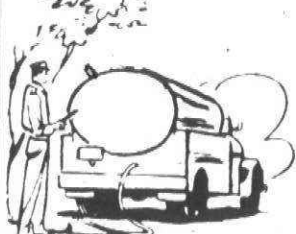

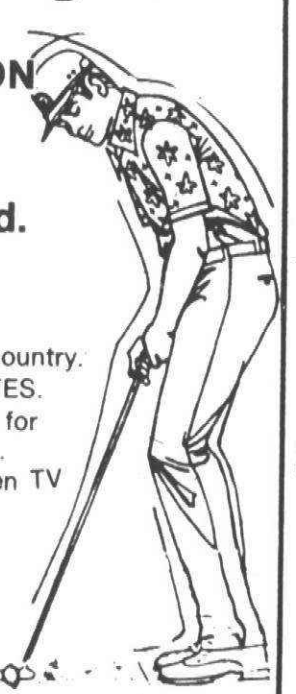

Downtown Detroit is not the only place experiencing a renaissance of sorts.

If you've been over to Central Middle School lately, an old athletic stomping ground has been given new life. The spirit of the old Plymouth football field has been revived through the efforts of the Central Maintenance Department of the Plymouth-Canton School District and the Plymouth-Canton Junior Football League.

A once barren, dust-bowl type field has been sodded. The three-day project, estimated at \$3,000, was completed Saturday as members of the Junior Football League and the Central Maintenance staff laid down 5,000 yards of sod. The field was recrowned for the best possible drainage, and new water lines have been put in to help keep it green.

Last fall, the field was literally unsafe for the little leaguers to use. The facility was also unsafe for spectators. Missing and broken boards were scattered throughout the bleachers.

A burned down concession stand was unavailable for use.

On a recent trip to the facility, I saw that the grass was green, the bleachers

intact and the snack shack refurbished.

"We've had volunteers out here laying down the sod and everything has been real cooperative," said Denny Timmerman, a member of the board of directors of the Junior League.

"WE'LL DO anything to help maintain it," Timmerman said. "I'm really happy with the situation. I never thought this would happen."

A few months back, members of the Junior Football League complained about the safety and deteriorating conditions of the old Plymouth facility.

Members of the board met with school officials to discuss the problems surrounding the area. Central Middle School Principal Gustav Gorgis had notions of padlocking the field. Vandalism and lack of maintenance had turned the facility into non-use.

"Money and teamwork have helped," said Ron Glass, grounds coordinator for the Central Maintenance Department. "I hope the Junior League will continue to work with us. The field here has more potential than the Centennial Education Park at Canton."

"We can hold a lot of activities here. Within the next two years we're going

to try to fix up the track, the baseball fields and the press box."

It would cost an estimated \$30,000 to overhaul the seats with aluminum along with repairing the press box. No decision has been made on this matter.

"As long as we have the money and supplies we can maintain this facility," Timmerman said.

Central Middle has potential for the

future. The field some day may be used for high school soccer, taking the burden away from the CEP football field.

"THE BIG thing is security," Timmerman said. "We have to maintain the field and make sure it's not vandalized like in the past."

"I can be completely satisfied with this place. We had several meetings

with school officials and this is the best solution."

I like to think the Junior League members put the heat on school hierarchy. The recent millage hike passage also had something to do with it. It was an intolerable condition which had to be corrected.

It should have happened a long time ago. It was almost beyond the point of

no return. I'm glad to see sod out there instead of seed. Anyway, how can you plant grass in the middle of July?

Contrary to what Thursday's Observer said, it's sod out there. I was informed previously that the plan was to seed the field.

That was not the case.

Rookie finds pro tour is no picnic

Golf is a thinking person's game.

If you don't think so, just listen to Barbara Mizrahe, who is currently in her first full season on the Ladies Professional Golf Association tour.

"Golf is a constant challenge — it never lets up," she said. "You're always faced with a pressure-packed situation. What's fantastic is that people always want to improve and in golf, they can."

Mizrahe, 29, was born and grew up in Indonesia, a series of 3,000 islands between Australia and the Philippines. Approximately 121 million people live there. Mizrahe said there are only 20 golf courses in the entire country.

She took up the game when she was 15-years-old. Mizrahe's mother was ill at the time and had been instructed by a doctor to do a lot of walking. Since the Mizrahes lived near one of the few courses in Indonesia, she figured she might as well do so while playing golf.

Mizrahe accompanied her mother and eventually started playing herself.

The entire family emigrated to the United States eight years ago and settled in Los Angeles. That is where Mizrahe began to sharpen her game, which she freely admits never came easy to her.

"There is so much room for improvement," she said. "I may be trying to rush it. I'm driven that way. Sometimes, I'm forcing it. It's very gratifying to be able to improve."

Mizrahe is a firm believer in positive thinking and personal motivation. That kind of attitude may be the difference between shooting consistently well and scrambling around once the mechanics of the sport are mastered.

Mizrahe said that it takes a balance between having the physical tools to compete, which includes a grounding in the basics, and the correct frame of mind to succeed.

"You can't do one without the other,"

she said. "If you don't have the material, you play scared. It takes more than the perfect swing. The mechanical part is very important, but then it takes guts. You have to fight to play."

Mizrahe has earned a reputation of being one of the hardest if not the hardest worker on the LPGA tour. "I put in quantity (of practice) and my game has taken on a qualitative change," she said. "You can't just work on it, though — you have to work on it right. It's a slow process."

"I'm a believer in what we can do as human beings," Mizrahe continued. "When people want to make up their mind to be a loser, they will. There are too many excuses not to play well."

"I don't want to use any excuses as long as I can go out there and execute the ball well," she said. "I never hear winners complain, only people who are frustrated."

Mizrahe said she plays against only the course when competing in a tournament. "There are too many girls out there for me to be worrying about them," she said. "I play and execute each shot to the best of my ability."

"The golf course doesn't care how you feel or how you play. It's a monster, like (Ben) Hogan said. As long as you battle the golf course, you can't have a bad game. As long as you put everything into each shot, you can't have a slump. A slump is a state of mind," said Mizrahe.

Bill Shaw, also a golf professional and Mizrahe's spouse, follows her around the course during a tournament and occasionally caddies for her. That might make some people nervous, but not Mizrahe.

"He's a very positive asset to me," she said. "If you have one fan who believes in you, somebody who knows what you're going through — really knows — it helps."

Mizrahe, an excellent conversation-alist who seems to have come to grips

with life on the women's golf tour and life in general, has several other interesting observations.

"Any time you shoot for the stars, what happens is that you can come down hard. Sometimes, it's really scary to go into something. What you might find out could be very disappointing."

"This game can be very humbling."

"You get to the point (in golf) where the body can only do so much, but I'm a big believer in getting the swing down first."

"I don't look at it (being on pro golf tour) as glamorous, but as something I know how to do well. Everyone should do what they do best. For me, it's golf."

"People do lump us together. They see the top five or 10 players and forget there are 140 of us out there scrambling. People didn't put us out there. We did it by free choice. So, people (spectators) don't owe us anything and we owe them everything."

"I don't want pars given to me. I hope I never forget where I came from. When something is hard to get, you don't forget unless you're really flaky."

"I miss my family very much. It upsets them more than me when I miss the cut. Once, when I missed the cut I came home and they were all crying. I can't imagine what will happen when I win."

Mizrahe had earned \$3,338.34 in 14 tour events prior to Lady Stroh's II last weekend in Dearborn. "I want to play as long as I can produce, put out scores which are part of the LPGA thing," she said. "Scores I can be proud of."

Kermit the Frog, Muppet friends should tickle you

You have to love a frog who won't cause wars. That's Kermit, star of "The Muppet Movie" (G). The whole gang — Kermit the Frog, Fozzie Bear, Miss Piggy — appear along with more than a dozen live performers who make cameo appearances.

However, none of the latter outshines any of creator Jim Henson's colorful muppet characters. With their rare combination of innocence and sophistication, pratfalls and parody, they possess a universal appeal that transcends boundaries of age and nationality.

Low puns and sight gags proliferate, but they are peppered with doses of sly humor to tickle the funny bones of older muppet admirers. An early demonstration of this occurs when Dom DeLuise, a Hollywood agent lost while paddling around in a swamp, says to Kermit, "I've lost my sense of direction," and Kermit replies, "Have you tried Hare Krishna?"

THERE'S A BIT of everything in this film; it's practically an anthology for movie buffs who will detect references to a variety of both innovative and stock movie situations from "High Noon" to "Close Encounters."

There is even a lyrical episode in which the lovestruck couple, Kermit and Miss Piggy, are shown gambling about in a series of images that recalls every montage of frolicking young lovers we've seen since Tony Richardson directed such a sequence in "Tom Jones."

The story itself falls somewhat between the Beatles' shenanigans and the Crosby-Hope "road" pictures. Kermit is on his way to Hollywood to become a star. On route, he falls in love, acquires a number of companions and encounters one very dastardly enemy, Dr. Hopper (Charles Durning).

Hopper owns a chain of fast food restaurants specializing in frog legs. He wants Kermit for commercials, but the frog would rather croak. Well, actually, he'd rather get to Hollywood and sign a "standard rich and famous contract."

KERMIT NEEDS all the support of his muppet chums to evade Hopper and, for that matter, most of the other humans he meets. Among them are Mel Brooks as a mad Nazi scientist who says he always sleeps well at night when he knows he's "caused a little pain in the afternoon," and Steve Martin as a sneering waiter in lederhosen.

Lest the audience go on a laughing jag, there are some surprisingly turgid musical numbers by Paul Williams, who also appears briefly in the film, and Kenny Ascher. If the idea was to lull everyone to sleep, it works.

Aside from these literally show-stopping tunes, "The Muppet Movie" is, as one character said before the blast, "dynamite."

Wash, brush, flush — water use on film

It was like a scene at Universal Studios Monday when David Sims made his acting debut in the bathroom and Concern Inc. launched its first environmental film series.

A two-man film crew from Rochester, N.Y., recorded every move the 16-year-old Sims made during a grueling 12 hour session — all for a three-minute film designed to make viewers aware of how often they use water.

Entitled "Water Water Everywhere," the film traces Sims' movements as he gets out of bed, takes a shower, brushes his teeth, flushes the toilet, makes some orange juice and washes his car.

The camera clicked, lights glowed and occasionally the fuses blew as the sequences were shot over and over to assure that lighting was perfect, backgrounds were sharp and the Southfield star looked his best.

The water sequence is one of three "trigger films" being shot in Bloomfield Township, Southfield and Rochester this week to be used in discussions of environmental issues.

Trigger films are designed to spur discussions. The short movies have been the dream of volunteer environmentalists in Concern Inc., a Troy-based ecology education group.

Fundraising for the films began several years ago, but hopes for producing them faded as the \$5,000 raised was determined to be only half the amount needed for the first of three series.

When young film makers Tim Cal-

lahan, 23, and Alec McCallum, 22, learned of Concern's plight, they agreed to make the films within the \$5,000 budget to help advance the environmental cause.

"WE'VE WANTED TO do this for years," said Grace Gluskin, executive director of Concern whose home in Bloomfield Township provided the setting for much of the water film. "There are virtually no good films available on ecology. Most of the ones that have been made are loaded with statistics

and have become easily dated.

"These films are technically easier to make and their audience is virtually limitless.

"There are no rights or wrongs in the films and there will be no rights or wrongs in the discussion guides which will be written to go along with the films. We just want the films to be believable and to get people talking."

To keep costs within budget, the "stars" are all Concern volunteers and the settings are in local homes. Sims, a junior at Southfield-Lathrup High

School who aspires to be an actor, has the good fortune of being Mrs. Gluskin's nephew. "I just got lucky, I was in the right place at the right time," he laughed.

Crowded into a corner of the bathroom, Sims brushed his teeth for the 12th time before — finally — the scene was acceptable to the crew. "I thought this was going to be one, two, three and done," he sighed.

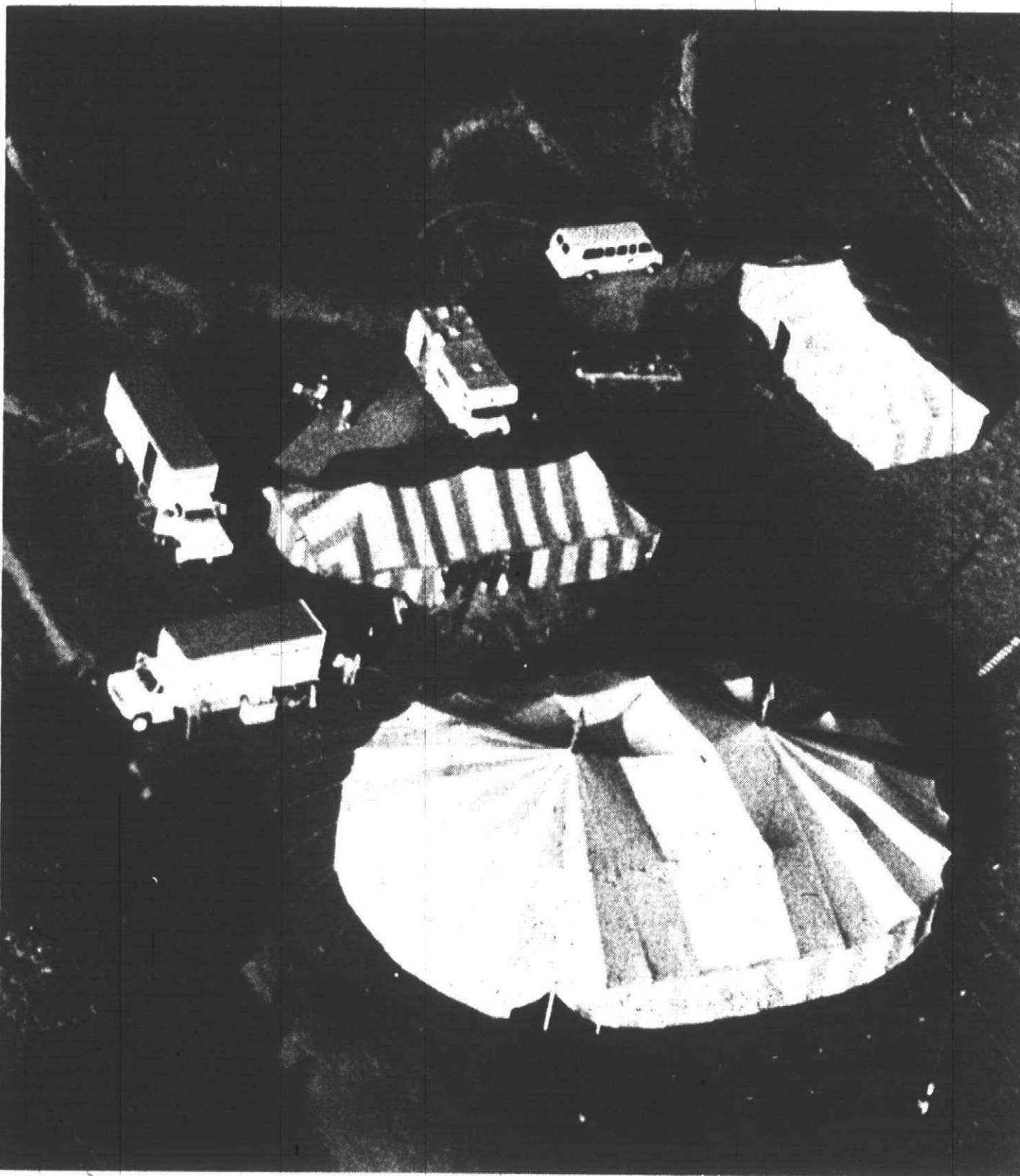

Her descriptions of the land and its people and her humorous observations make for fascinating reading.

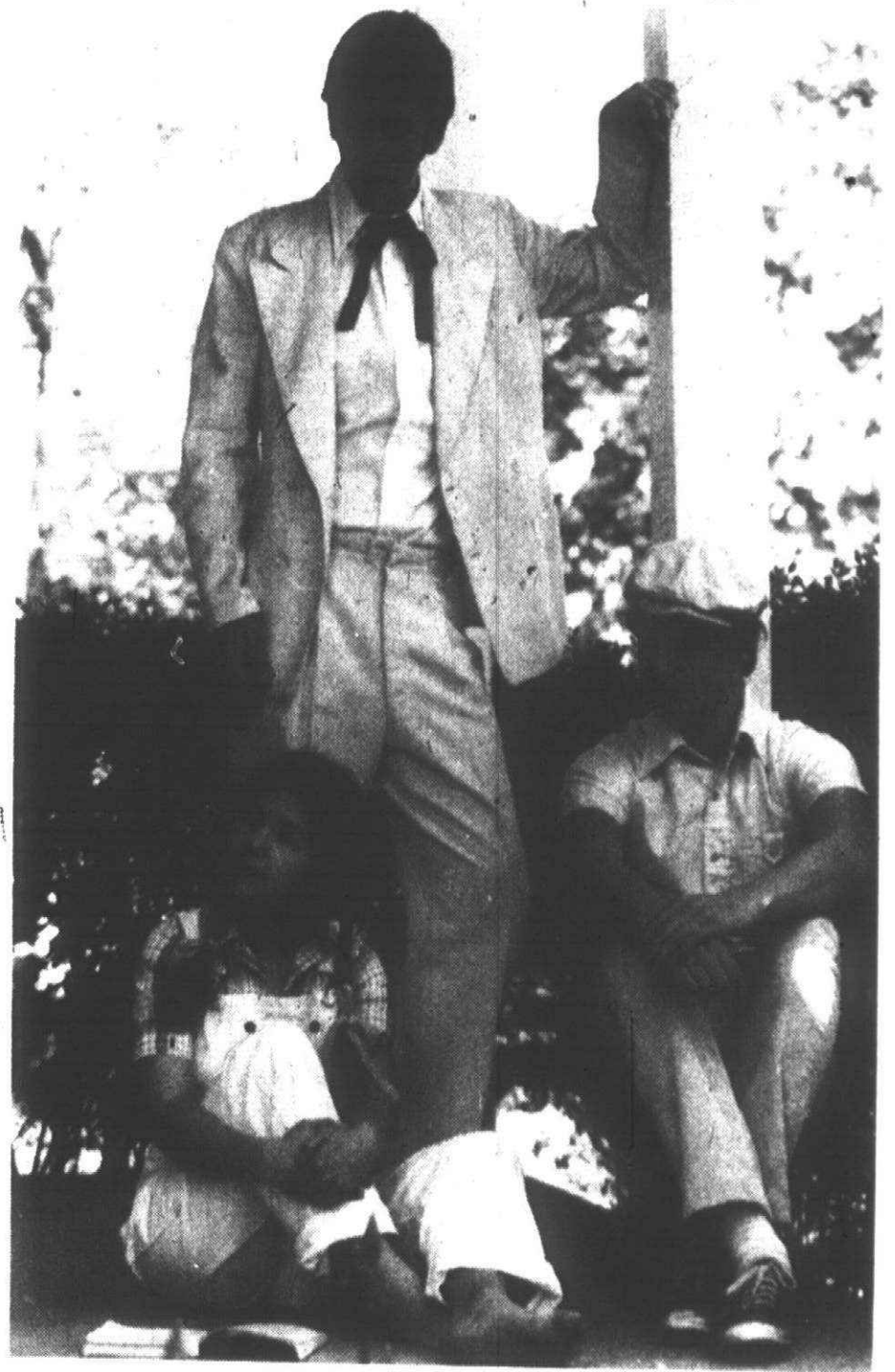

They keep books talking for the blind

Helping the blind "read" books is a team effort. First a talking book must be created by someone like Loretta Sangeorzan or Elinor Davis of Redford Township. This is done by reading a book aloud into a tape recorder.

Once the cassette or record is completed and ready to be used, the Library for the Blind at the Wayne Oakland Library Federation goes into action. It provides listening machines for the blind and then sends them the books they request.

The federal government also has a role in this effort to keep the blind in touch with their world. It pays for the equipment they use and allows the records and tapes to travel through the

mail free to and from the homes of the blind.

And don't forget volunteers like John and Mary Husak of Plymouth. They are also an important part of this team effort. He tinkers with broken tape recorders and other machines, bringing them back to life so that taxpayers don't have to pay the cost of new ones or expensive repairs. His wife regularly picks up the tape recorders and recording machines that need fixing, and brings them home.

AS A RETIREE from the Bell Telephone Co., Mrs. Husak is a member of the Wolverine Chapter of Telephone Pioneers, whose members do this kind of volunteer work all over the country.

"This program helps me to keep up with things," said Doris Lawrence of Livonia, who is blind and likes to follow her favorite magazine with her ears. She is especially fond of *Reader's Digest* and the *National Geographic*.

"I like travel material and to find out what our government is doing," she stated. "I like the jokes in *Reader's Digest* as well as anyone."

Mrs. Lawrence pointed out that numerous catalogs are sent to help her make selections. The catalogs are then read to her by a member of the family. "I don't pick books too often," she said. "I don't have enough time. I prefer the magazines. They will send me anything I want."

There are 3,000 subscribers to this

service in Wayne County, according to Deborah O'Connor, former Plymouth librarian who now works for the Library for the Blind. About 94 per cent of the fiction and non-fiction talking books are provided by the federal government and recorded in Washington.

BUT LET'S SAY a request for a book on welding or machine repair comes in from someone certified as having a reading disability. They too are eligible for this service. If such a talking book is not available, then a call goes out from the Library for the Blind to the Redford Township Public Library.

Mrs. Sangeorzan got the assignment to read onto tapes the books on welding and machine repair.

"I have found if you can be someone's eyes, you are helping," she said. "You read as you would for yourself, except faster. You have to be careful to follow the punctuation, so you'll read it correctly."

Sometimes she'll find a book such as the life of Ray Charles a little earthy but she reads on, turning off the material but watching what she is doing. She has found this work rewarding ever since she read aloud in college to a friend who was losing her sight.

"**I LOVE DOING IT,**" reported Elinor Davis, who lives in Presbyterian Village. She added that she and Cecilia Zalewski, head librarian, often laugh about the contents of some of the books she reads aloud. But she finds her work with Dr. Solomon's Diet book something she enjoys.

On the days she reads, Mrs. Davis usually reads about two to four hours at a time. She also reads in the medical center of Presbyterian Village one day a week, with another day given to those whose eyesight has failed.

Still she seems to find time to continue her involvement with books. She does book reviews for church groups. Two of her current favorites are "Upstairs at the White House" and "Sadie Shapiro's Knitting Book."

The latter is "very funny" she said. It involves a somewhat common experience as it takes place in a Jewish home for senior citizens.

ELIGIBLE TO PARTICIPATE in the talking book program are people who are legally blind. That means vision in the better eye is 20-200 or less, or the widest diameter of visual field is no greater than 20 degrees.

Also eligible are those whose vision is corrected, but who still can't see well enough to read standard print. A physical limitation that keeps a person from handling books or turning pages also makes that person eligible. So does being certified by a doctor as having a reading disability due to an organic dysfunction.

The play's title comes from a lesson Atticus teaches his children when he gives them air rifles for Christmas gifts. He reminds them that it would be wrong to kill a mockingbird which sings beautiful songs and does no harm.

THE TENT TROUPE is beginning its 10th season. During its nine years, it has visited more than 132 cities and towns in Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, North Carolina, New York, Vermont, New Hampshire, Maine, New

Jersey, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Kentucky, Tennessee and Ohio. This will be the group's first visit to Michigan.

There have been 376 performances before more than 88,000 persons. The troupe is one of a variety of ministries offered by young people through Saint Luke Lutheran Church in Silver Spring, Md. It has received nationwide recognition in magazine and newspaper articles and has been the subject of several television specials.

The community of young people and adults travels as a family. They prepare their own meals, erect and strike more than one ton of canvas for their miniature city.

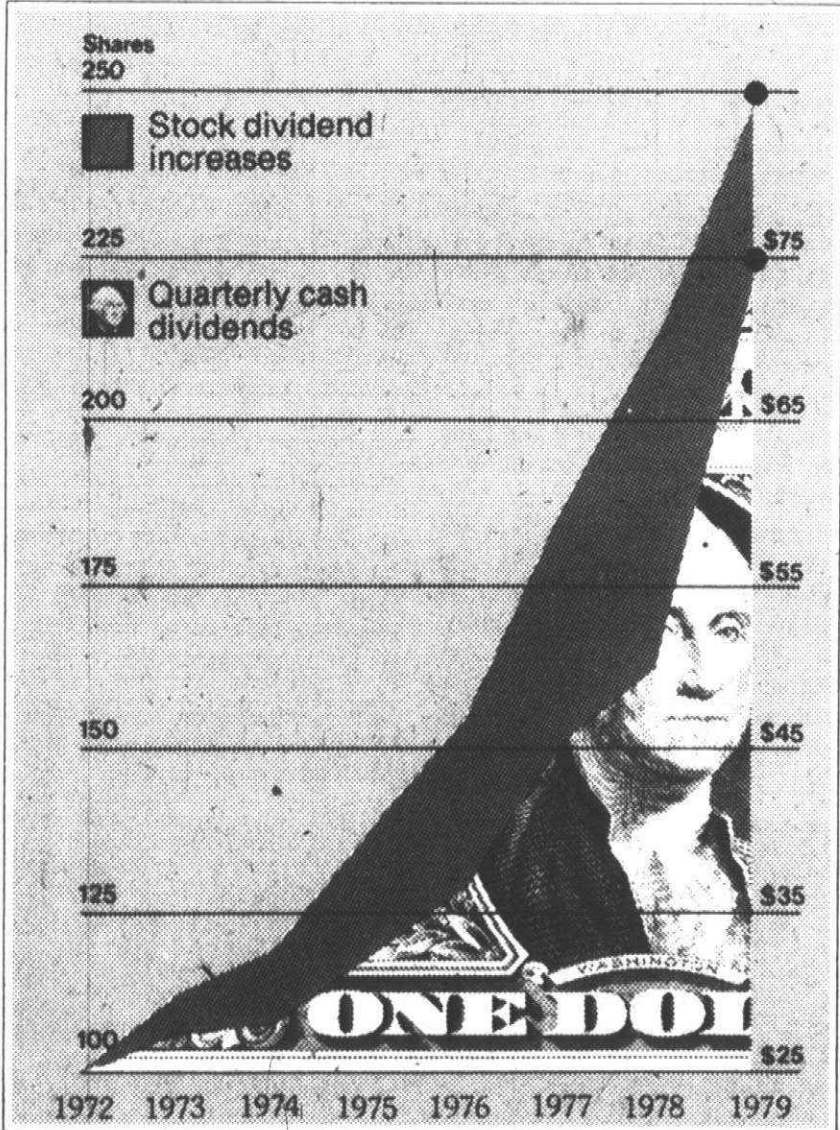

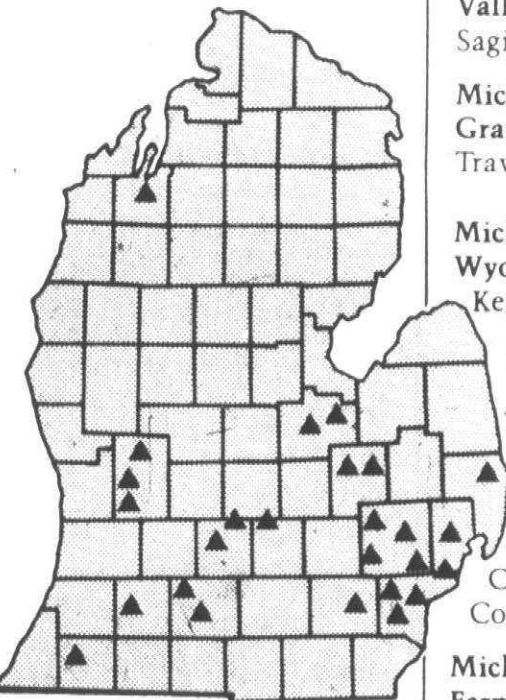

Preliminary approval to form four new state-chartered banks has been received from the Financial Institutions Bureau of the State of Michigan. They are Michigan Bank-Northwest in Petoskey, Michigan Bank-Midland, Michigan Bank-Livingston in Brighton, and Michigan Bank-South Metro in Lincoln Park, a southwest suburb of Detroit. The Corporation hopes to have final approval to open the four new banks by fall. An application is also pending to affiliate with the \$36 million Litchfield State Savings Bank in Hillsdale County.

Imagination is encouraged at summer drama workshops

The wonderful world of imagination and mime is being explored this summer by young people enrolled in the drama workshops offered by the Plymouth Community Arts Council.

Sixth to 10th graders in Nola Lutey's group at Pioneer Middle School are involved in creative drama.

Mrs. Lutey defined the goals of the summer sessions: To encourage interpretation of ideas in terms of movement; to foster spontaneity and imaginative powers through improvisation; to develop voice projection; and to practice using inner resources through concentration in imaginative play-acting.

"We're really having fun," said Julie Sparling. "We'll be able to use what we have learned in school plays or in getting an idea across to anyone."

They broke into small groups to

demonstrate mime skits. There was a dramatic scene in which one of the girls was wounded and collapsed in agony. Two stretcher bearers appeared to carry her off and minister to her.

A couple portrayed a toy store incident in which a limp doll is wound up and begins to move in a stiff manner. The whole group formed a mock parade — with flag carrier, buglers and drummers.

Scripts were handed out and parts assigned. Soon they were a group of shipwrecked survivors, planning a new life on a desolate shore.

The workshop is sponsored by the PCAC in conjunction with the Young People's Theater of Ann Arbor. Openings now are available for the production workshop which will begin July 23 and run through Aug. 17. Classes will be from 10 a.m. to noon Mondays,

Wednesdays and Thursdays in Smith Elementary School.

Instructor will be Erica Pelz, choreographer and actress. Students will prepare scenes from Shakespeare's "A Midsummer Night's Dream" for performance at the end of session.

All costumes, sets and makeup will be done by class members. They will concentrate on courtly movement and English accents. For more information and to register, call the arts council office, 455-5260. Openings will be limited to students in grades 6-10.

JAN QUICK had a group of third to fifth graders in the gymnasium at Pioneer.

The younger children were as enthusiastic as the older students. They were busy acting out nursery rhymes.

The three blind mice put on blind-

folds and attached black crepe paper tails with cellophane tape. The farmer's wife dug into a carton and found her carving knife, a cardboard weapon covered with shining aluminum foil.

The children offstage began to sing "Three Blind Mice" and the chase began on stage. The mice scurried around and the farmer's wife, Laura Adams, relentlessly whacked at their tails. Only one needed an assist from its owner to become unstuck.

A second session for the third to fifth graders will begin July 23. Children can be registered by calling the PCAC office.

Classes are funded in part by the Michigan Council for the Arts and Xerox Corp. The PCAC is helping subsidize the local classes. Fee for the classes is \$39 but scholarships are available.

Dedication of the rock seen as symbolizing love of roots

Charles V. Hagler, president of the Michigan Historical Commission, paid tribute to Plymouth while dedicating the historic marker on the lawn between city hall and the Dunning-Hough Library.

Hagler had much to say about Plymouth residents' appreciation of their roots and their work for the betterment of the community.

Standing next to the marker on the lawn on July Fourth, he said:

"I bring you greetings from Gov. Milliken and Secretary of State Richard Austin, under whose leadership the Michigan Historical Commission and

Michigan History Division operate.

"The Michigan Historical Marker Program, initiated in 1955, has in its 24-year history designated and marked 635 sites as important to the history and character of specific cities, or regions of the state, or of Michigan as a whole.

"Every aspect of Michigan's past is touched in varying degrees: Places of importance to its Indian tribes for 1,000 years; the French settlement and the British takeover; the area as part of the Northwest Territory prior to statehood; and, of course, the years since 1837 — busy with the influx of settlers

and the development of our present economic, social, intellectual and political enterprises.

"The Michigan History Division endeavors to locate further sites worthy of recognition and designation as historical places.

"Today, it is my pleasure to be with you here in Plymouth to mark the site of the rock taken from the dock from which the Mayflower sailed from Plymouth, England, with an official state informational marker to commemorate the symbolic role that Plymouth has played in the history and

economic life of our country and this city.

"To quote Justice G. Mennen Williams, 'I certainly think that people who do not recognize their history are not only cutting off their root but withering away their future.'

"Let me congratulate the people of this city who appreciate their roots and continue to work for the betterment of their community and future generations.

"The individuals and organizations who have banded together to make this event possible are to be commended for their leadership and caring about the community's past history and future generations.

The informational marker we are dedicating today will remind future generations of the symbolic role that the Plymouth Rock has played in the lives of past generations in England and the United States and the hope that it holds for tomorrow.

"You should be proud of your heritage and the fact that so many of you are here today to commemorate this gift of friendship from your English roots should be an inspiration to other communities.

"This marker will serve as a reminder of the existing friendship and historical role that Plymouth has played in England, in Massachusetts, and in Michigan.

"It is with great pleasure that I dedicate this Michigan Historical Marker on behalf of the Michigan Historical Commission and the Department of State History Division.

"May the Plymouths of this world prosper and continue to serve their descendants for another 359 years."

A message from England

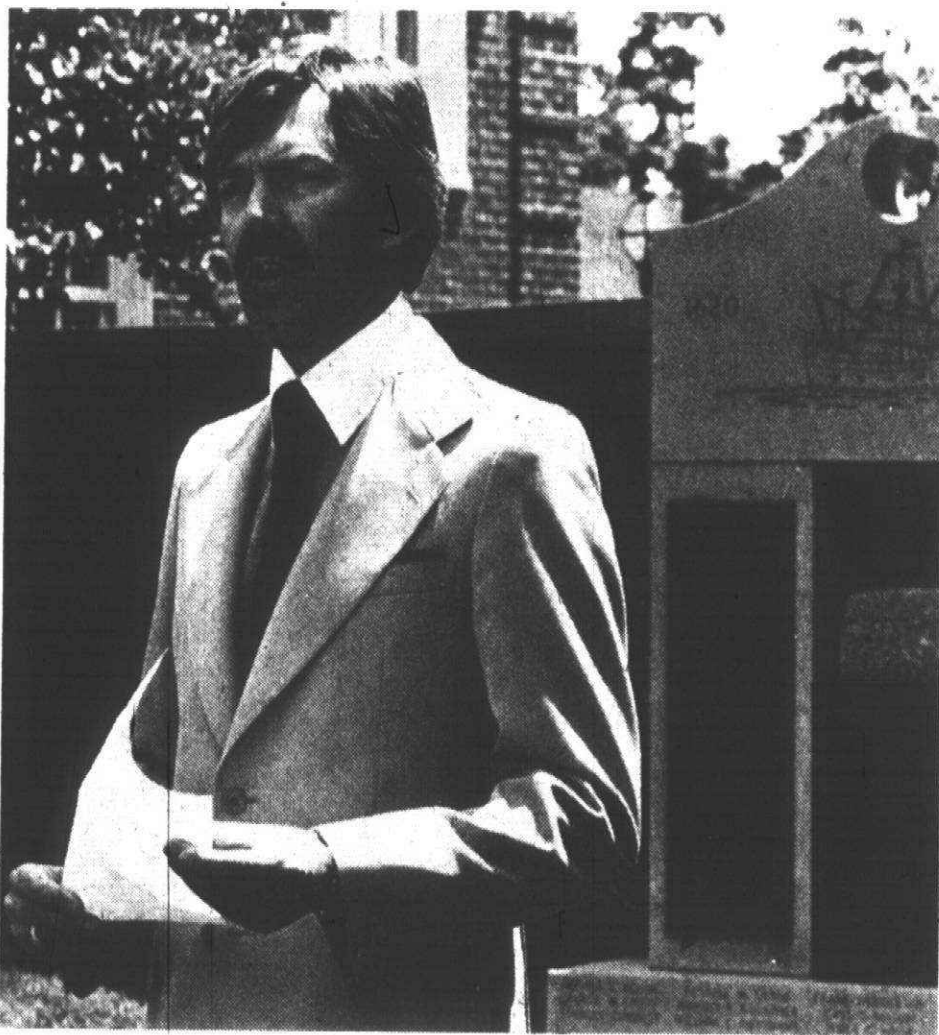

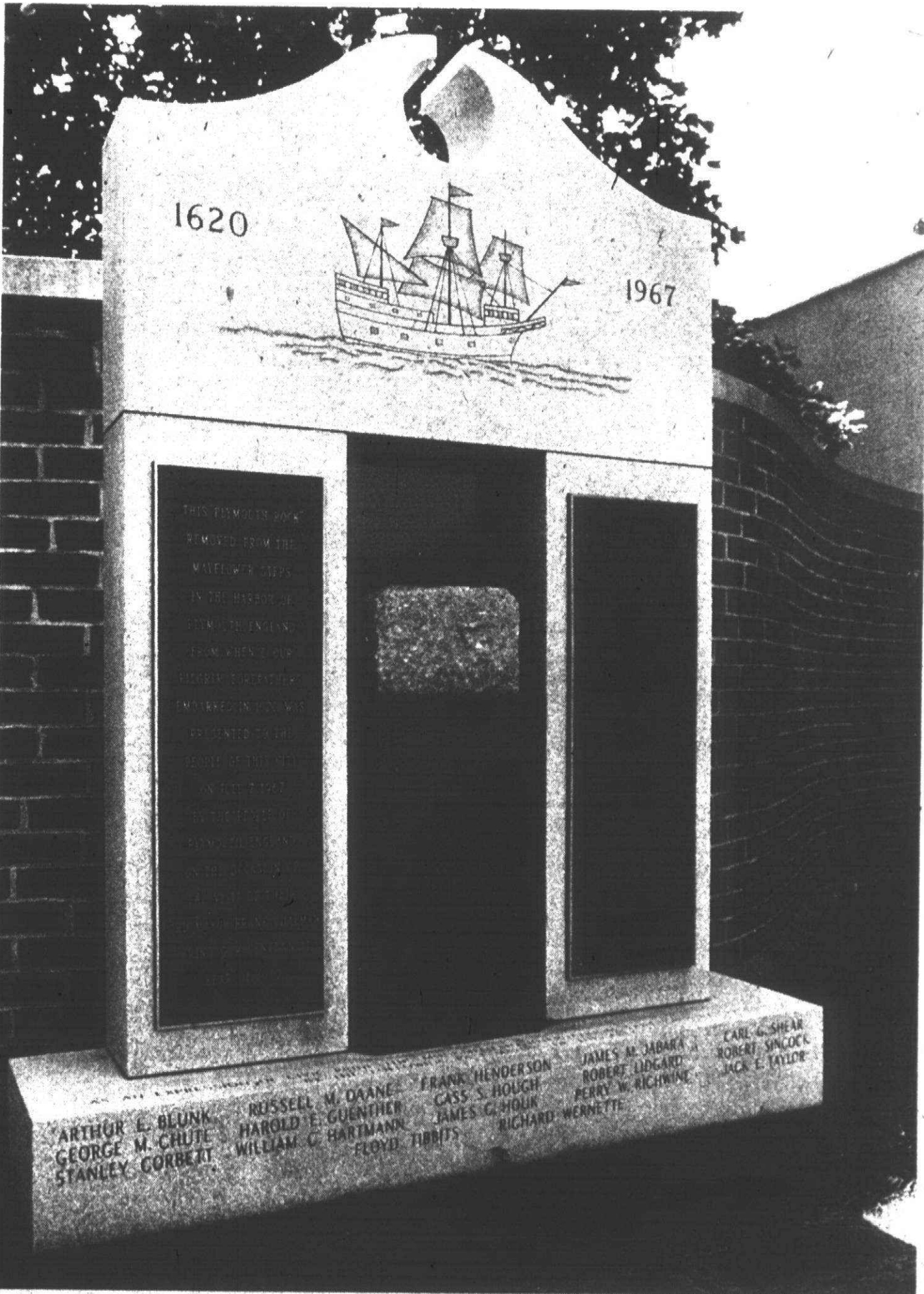

After 3 months study School board develops goals

After three months of study and discussion the school board has developed a list of objectives for Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

The school board held numerous workshop meetings on board objectives during the months of April, May and June.

The objectives identified by the board are as follows:

ADMINISTRATIVE MANAGEMENT

- If increases in class size continue as a result of growth in the district, emphasis will be directed toward controlling class size at grade levels K, 1 and 2.
- Solicit cooperation from Plymouth Congress of Administrators, the bargaining group for principals and other middle-administrators, in the development of an administrative transfer plan which includes time restraints, recognition, and utilization of managerial and curricular skills by Jan. 1, 1980.
- Establish minimum educational requirements in the management skills area for prospective management personnel by Sept. 1, 1979.

INSTRUCTIONAL MANAGEMENT

- The teaching of reading in the content areas in the secondary schools will be examined over the three-year period of 1979-82. Means of examination will be developed and submitted to the superintendent by Oct. 15, 1979. Examination will be instituted during the 1979-80 school year, with a first report to be submitted to the superintendent by Dec. 1, 1980.
- As a minimum, course goals will be completed in the K-12 academic areas of mathematics and science by Aug. 30, 1980.
- During the 1979-80 school year the Goal-Based Program Evaluation Model will be implemented in at least one area where course goals have been validated. The outcome of the application of the evaluation model will be reported to the superintendent by Aug. 30, 1980.
- Given implementation of a district-wide testing program, an empirical data base will be established for identifying student achievement and performance in language arts (reading, spelling, usage) and mathematics (concepts and computation) by July 1, 1980.
- Each building staff, under the direction and supervision of the principal, will annually establish and communicate to parents and students an outline of basic instructional goals for students by grade level and subject area by Sept. 15 of each year.
- The communication will be part of an annually-published document, such as a handbook. The outline of basic instructional goals shall be based on established district-wide goals as they are in effect. Where course goals have not been completed, appropriate statements will be developed for review and approval by the division of instruction.
- A two-year study of procedures of reporting to parents, K-12, will be initiated by Oct. 1, 1979. Specific recommendations to unify the process of reporting to parents will be submitted to the superintendent by July 1981 to be placed in effect at the outset of the 1981-82 school year.
- The highlights of a strategic plan for instruction over the next three years (1979-82) will be submitted to the superintendent by Jan. 1, 1980.

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

Establish zero base budgeting inservice for administrators with pilot program to be completed for the 1980-81 budget year. The inservice is to take place by Dec. 1, 1979, and the pilot program is to be completed by March 1, 1980.

OPERATIONAL MANAGEMENT

By March 1, 1980 a long-range plan (three years) for the expenditure of capital outlay monies will be developed for all buildings and units in the district. Building plans will be incorporated as part of a district-wide capital outlay plan. Included in each plan will be identification of needs for maintenance projects, equipment repair and equipment replacement.

RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

Define functions and establish a planning office, including a model for dealing with critical issues and priorities management by September 1979. Included should be enrollment projections, boundary definitions, millage considerations (bond and operations, and budgeting).

PR AND COMMUNITY RELATIONS

- Evaluate internal and external communication activities by Dec. 1, 1979. Update and begin implementation of plan to involve board, staff, parents, and students in a two-way communication program to increase understanding and support of the school district by Feb. 1, 1980.
- By September 1979 each building principal

will be responsible for a monthly newsletter to parents. The newsletter will include district news provided by central administration and an opportunity for parents to comment.

- Coordinate through the office of community relations a program of surveys, interviews, and community meetings to gather client opinions and attitudes related to the objectives of the board of education and administration. This information will be used to evaluate programs, develop public relations and informational activities, and set objectives for the next year. The resources of outside agencies may be used to improve the validity and thoroughness of this program. Semi-annual written reports will be submitted as to the accomplishment of this goal.

- By Aug. 1, 1979, the format will be developed for describing all major divisions and departments within the school district. Descriptions will be related to board policies and include: a mission statement; a description of activities carried; realm of responsibility; and the process used for communication. Final descriptions will be completed by Feb. 1, 1980.

Getting away from it all on next to nothing

By IRIS SANDERSON JONES

Two subjects dominated the mail that arrived on this travel writer's desk this month. The first is a long list of summer events planned for tourists all over the country. The second is the fuel crisis and how to overcome it so that you can participate in those events.

The tourist industry is one of the major victims of the fuel crisis. Some tourist facilities in Michigan report up to a 50 percent dropoff in the tourist trade over the July 4 holiday weekend. Most blame the fear of fuel shortages, which kept would-be travelers home, or close to home.

Since tourism is among the top three industries in the United States, tourist bureaus throughout the country are trying to assure travelers there is enough fuel to satisfy their needs.

Here is a potpourri of events from around the country, and nearby sections of Canada, along with any information we've received about the fuel situation and how to deal with it.

CANADA HAS NO fuel shortage. That's the word from Canadian tourist officials, who are afraid that you will stay home even if this international neighbor can fill your tank.

The Canadian dollar fluctuates from 15 to 20 percent less than the American dollar, so you can add that much to the value of your money when you cross the border.

Travel experts always advise you to change your money at a bank rather than at commercial establishments, but Ontario has a better idea. Ontario Travel Information Centers at Windsor, Niagara Falls, Sault Ste. Marie and Hill Island will offer a currency exchange service guaranteed to be within

2 percent of what the bank offers.

Ontario also wants to send you a booklet that explains how travelers from outside the province can get a rebate on provincial retail sales tax paid on items bought in Ontario.

Send for "Provincial Sales Tax Rebates for Visitors to Ontario," at the Ministry of Industry and Tourism, Suite 607, 195 Dufferin St., London, Ontario N6A 1K7.

What's going on in Canada? The city of London just started a double-decker tour bus service for the summer. VIA Rail has converted its dining rooms into non-smoking areas, with smoking permitted in adjacent lounges.

A new Coastal Hiking Trail has been opened and is the prime attraction at the new Pukaskwa National Park along the north shore of Lake Superior. Edmonton is warming up for Klondike Days July 18-22 and, further west, the British Columbia fishermen have started the 12th annual World Salmon Fishing Championships, active through Sept. 3.

Montreal is taking reservations for World Cup Two, Aug. 24-26, planned to bring world athletes together at this midpoint between the 1976 Montreal Olympics and the 1980 Moscow Olympics. More than 400 athletes are expected to compete under the International Amateur Athletic Association.

The Montreal International Marathon follows Aug. 26 and 27, with Olympic champions participating from several countries.

For information on Canadian events, contact the Canadian Government Office of Tourism in Detroit.

IF YOU WOULD go south, both Louisiana and Texas have sent word about the gas situation there. South Central

Louisiana has established a program called "Gas-O-Line," through which travelers can call a special number for immediate gas information. The number is 1-504-343-6739.

Gas-O-Line will tell you what service stations are open in the area where you will travel. It's a seven-day, 24-hour service, fed by a mobile radio system and covers, for example, all the main routes into Baton Rouge.

The Louisiana Association of Tourist Bureaus has a list of phone numbers for up-to-date fuel information around the state: there is 24-hour service for Shreveport (226-9227), Ruston (251-0018), Monroe (383-9533), Lafayette (232-3808) and daytime service at Natchitoches (353-8072) — all at area code 318.

At area code 504, there is daytime weekday service at New Orleans (522-8772) and Houma (876-6500). Alexandria and Lake Charles aren't listed because they say they don't have a fuel problem anyway.

Corpus Christi, Tex., says that 53 percent of their stations are open Sunday and they'll send you a list if you want it. Write to Bob Conwell at the Corpus Christi Convention and Tourist Bureau, Corpus Christi, Tex.

He supplies local hotels with weekly reports on the fuel situation and how to cope with it there.

LOCAL TOURIST bureaus throughout the country are eager to hear from you and fill you in on the fuel situation. In the meantime, here are some things to plan for when you get there.

Callaway Gardens in Georgia has its 21st annual Masters Water Ski Tournament July 14-15. And Georgia wants to give you advance notice of a "hang gliding event of international proportions" at Lookout Mountain Oct. 13-16 and Oct. 18-21. It's sponsored by the Hang Gliding Association at Air Space Flight Park in New England, Ga.

Florida has the sixth annual World Delta Glider Championship at Cypress Gardens July 14-22, as well as fishy

events like the Shark Rodeo in Pensacola on the same date and the Billfishing Tournament in Port Canaveral July 21.

The Stars Hall of Fame in Orlando added a big Superman exhibit to its wax museum at the start of this month.

And Texas invites you to make advance reservations in San Antonio for the Texas Folklife Festival at the Institute of Texan Cultures, one of the nation's unique museums.

IF YOU ARE going east, we don't hear much good news about fuel, but you should know about the Hill Cumorah Pageant sponsored by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Palmyra, N.Y., July 27, 28, 31 and Aug. 1-4. The outdoor pageant is played by 600 volunteer actors on 25 stages.

Maryland has a new directory of accommodations. Write: Tourism, c/o Mianna Jopp, Annapolis, Md. 21401. Baltimore, celebrating its 250th birthday this summer, has its own wind-jammer cruise, the Western Union, that leaves Mondays at 10 a.m. for a six-day schooner sail around Chesapeake Bay.

WEST? Wisconsin has some interesting ideas, like renting a burro at Blackhawk Ridge, 25 miles northwest of Madison, for a trip around the 600-acre recreation region.

If you are going to the Upper Peninsula, adjoining areas of Wisconsin host a variety of events. Write Wisconsin Northwoods Regions, Box 659, Department C, Rhinelander, Wis. 54501.

The Wisconsin Northwoods Council will give you the updated gasoline picture if you call 1-715-369-2330.

They are celebrating the Will Rogers Centennial all year in Oklahoma. A new outdoor drama called "The Life and Times of Mark Twain" is showing in Hannibal, Mo., and the \$5 million Mid-America Center Museum has just opened in Hot Springs, Ark.

IF YOU'D RATHER stay in Michigan, here are some things to write for. Michigan Council for the Arts has a list of arts and crafts fairs and festivals, available at 1200 Sixth Avenue, Detroit 48226.

A tin foil folly?

CHARLES de GAULLE AIRPORT, Paris — This is one of the airports where photographers and X-ray machines have warred, and the X-rays have won.

You have read the small signs in airports that say X-ray equipment probably will not damage film. You have probably also read articles exploring the truth of this statement.

I travel regularly with professional travel photographers and I have never met one who would willingly allow film to go through one of these X-ray machines.

The consensus is that one exposure may or may not damage film but that several exposures will fog it. It is easy to go through four or five such security inspections in a single trip.

IN THE UNITED STATES, the Civil Aeronautics Board requires that security personnel hand-check luggage if requested. I personally carry my film inside a plastic bag, which I place inside my camera bag. When I approach security I lift out the clear bag of film and let the rest go through.

Security guards in Paris and Rome will not hand-check luggage, nor have I met anyone who has been able to circumvent their rule. The security guards will not even discuss the matter.

Insult to injury, the dose of X-rays given by their machines is unmonitored and often very strong, so there is no way to tell how much damage is being done.

People who travel for a living are as interested as anyone else in avoiding trouble on a plane, but this rule makes professional travel photographers livid.

What happened here this morning doubles the anger. This is an airport that makes you think you are playing a bit part in "Star Wars." Long-angled escalators go through sidelit tunnels to a sign that reads "Satelites 1, 2, 3, 4;" they point to other escalators moving off in every direction.

We were changing planes and had no need to leave the immediate area, but we had an hour to kill so we naively stepped on an escalator to look around. There was no question of leaving the international area; the escalator led to the duty-free store.

Once we set foot on the moving platform, however, our fate was sealed. The only way back was through a security check. They refused to hand check photographic equipment. A professional refused to put his film through.

They took him to the chief of airport police who told him that he had no choice. So he watched helplessly while 100 rolls of film rolled through an X-ray machine because security personnel wouldn't check it by hand.

Solution? One proposal was to carry film in a lead foil bag in your camera bag to cut down the exposure. It would set off the machine and then they might hand check it.

If you have any other solutions, I'd like to hear them.

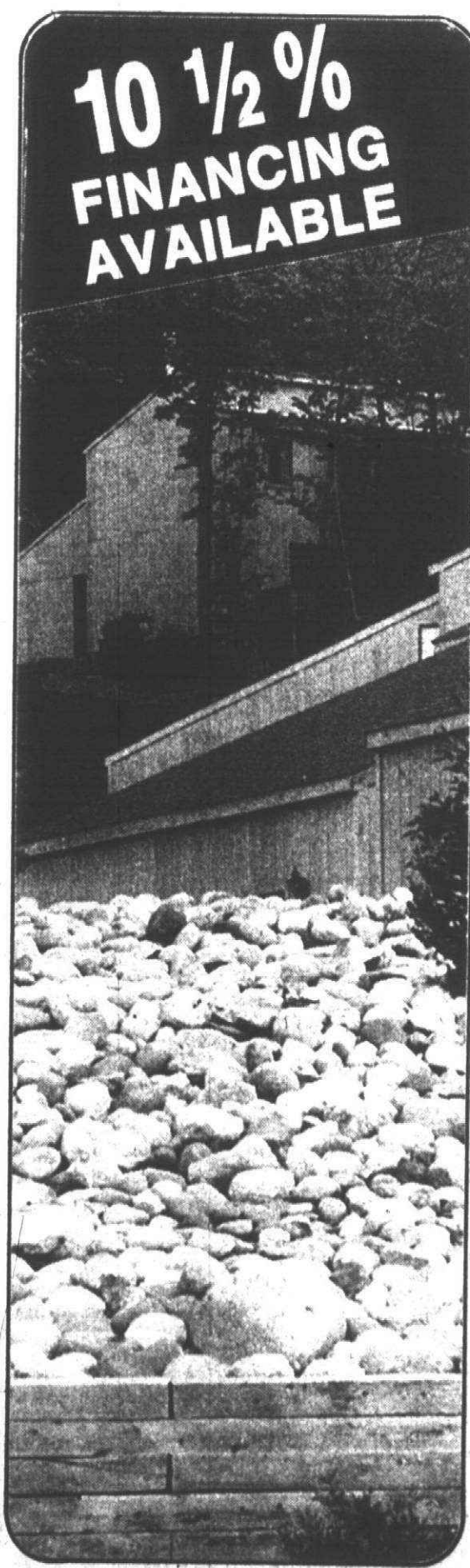

Soviet-style law

From tsar to equanimity

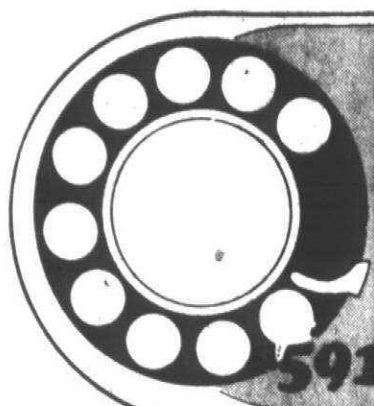
The struggle for law in the Soviet Union has not yet been finally won, but at least Soviet lawyers have achieved a basic recognition of their legitimate social function and an area within which to operate as professionals, reports George Dana Cameron III, professor of business law at The University of Michigan.

In his new book, "The Soviet Lawyer and His System" (210 pages, \$9), Cameron notes that "it has only been recently that Soviet lawyers have been regarded as anything more than a necessary evil, to be tolerated until the eventual achievement of the Commu-

nist millennium."

The study of the Soviet legal system is published by the Division of Research, U-M Graduate School of Business Administration, as part of its Michigan International Business Studies.

Cameron provides historical context for his evaluation with a survey of pre-revolutionary law and the tsarist legal institutions, the denigration of the lawyer under Marxist-Leninist influence, the final effects of the Bolshevik Revolution, and the significant changes in Soviet legal institutions accomplished since 1917.

V-8s biting the dust

The cowboy's sad farewell to his faithful horse, "Goodbye, old Paint," may seem to be applied by motorists to their trusty V-8s.

The familiar engine with its two slanting rows of cylinders can't cure its drinking habit. Higher gasoline prices and the government's emphasis on fuel conservation have brought the eight-cylinder power plant to the end of the trail.

General Motors plans to produce no more V-8s after 1983. In that year, only the Corvette will have an eight-cylinder engine.

The V-8 has been around for 70 years. But the big engine didn't become popular until the 1930s, and demand peaked during the last two decades.

The first automobiles of the 1890s were one-cylinder affairs that were eclipsed within a few years by cars with more powerful multi-cylinder engines.

In 1902, Locomobile set the pattern for future autos by producing the first American car to feature a water-cooled, four-cylinder engine placed in front of the driver.

Five years later, Edward R. Hewitt mounted two banks of cylinders at an angle atop a single crankcase and the V-8 was born.

The Hewitt was a good car, but it was so expen-

sive that only a few were produced. It was cheaper to build in-line engines with four or six cylinders in a row.

Yet the horsepower race had just begun. In 1914, Cadillac successfully marketed a car with a V-8 engine. The next year, three other manufacturers offered eight-cylinder engines, and Packard introduced its 12-cylinder "Twin Six."

Adding cylinders was not the only way to get more power from an engine, however. Higher compression and shorter piston strokes increased revolutions, power and stress on long crankshafts.

High-speed engines doomed the "straight eights." By 1916, 18 auto companies built cars with V-8 engines, whose shorter crankshafts vibrated less.

They included Cadillacs and Oldsmobiles, as well as such forgotten makes as the Abbott, Briscoe, Cole, King, Peerless, Monarch and Standard. V-8s powered the luxurious tourers and chauffeured limousines of the rich.

Then, in 1932, Ford brought out the first low-priced car with a V-8 engine, a feat made possible by innovations in foundry techniques that permitted casting the entire engine block and crankcase as a single unit.

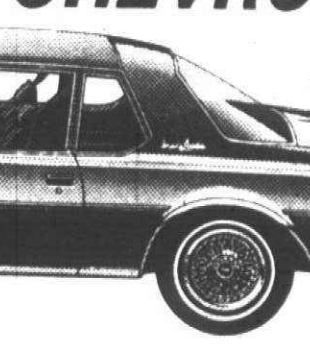
