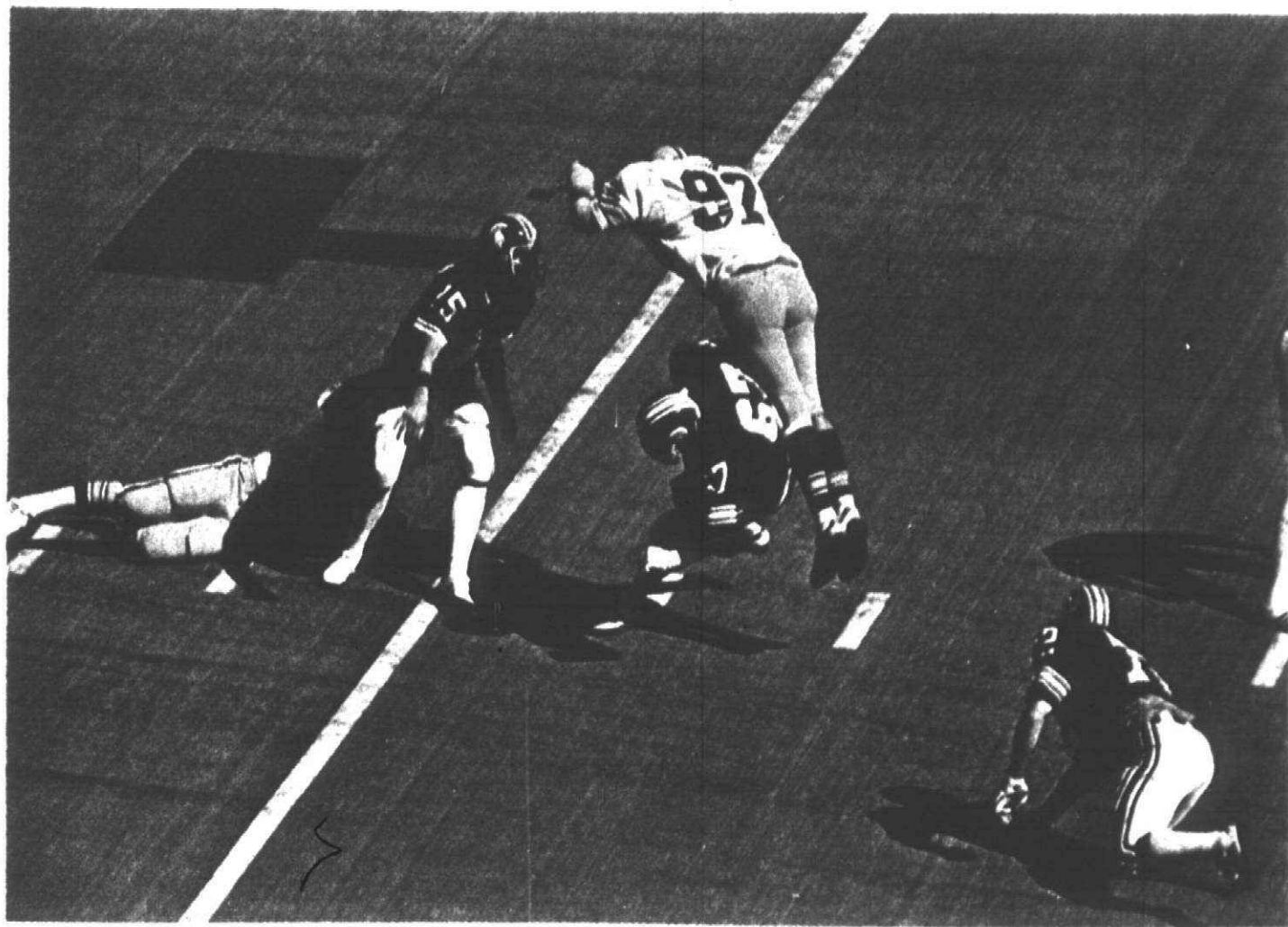




Grudge game

Officials go for Detroit mayor to get main

Canton and Westland officials are scheduled to meet Oct. 1 with Detroit Mayor Coleman Young in an attempt to garner Young's support for the building of a new water main to improve area water pressure.

According to Canton attorney George Ward, the township has "expectations" that Young will order the Detroit Water and Sewer Department to build the long-planned Stark Road Main, a project that will cost about \$2 million.

If Young orders the building of Stark Main (so called because it would run along a portion of Stark Road in Livonia), officials will also need to iron out the question of who will finance the project. Westland and Canton, in meetings with water department representatives, had offered to finance the main. Canton Supervisor Noel Culbert said the offer had been turned down.

The new main and accompanying pumping station are expected to alleviate the problems both communities

have been having with low water pressure.

Canton and Westland were also informed last month by the Michigan Health Department that water line extensions or tap-ins for large water users in either community would not be approved because of the pressure problems.

THE COMMUNITIES have threat-

ened to file a joint lawsuit against the City of Detroit if the main is not built, on the premise that the city is not fulfilling its contractual obligation to provide adequate water.

Culbert said Detroit has not built the main because of a pending lawsuit filed by suburban communities over unilateral sewer rate increases. Neither officials from Young's office nor from the water department would return

calls asking about the status of the main.

According to Culbert, the engineering and preliminary plans for the main were completed two years ago. If Detroit finalized the plans, the Canton supervisor said he would expect construction to begin next spring and be completed by fall.

"Apparently, we won't have to file the lawsuit," Culbert said. "I'm really

happy that there's good news, finally, for Canton."

Westland Mayor Tom Taylor was out of town and unavailable for comment.

Culbert said he believes completion of the main would spur industrial development in Canton.

"That's why we're not getting industry in the township. Developers have said that."

Cops' contract gives big raise

Canton patrol officers will receive a 33 percent pay increase over a three-year period under their first union contract with the township.

The contract increases the officers' former salary of about \$15,000 a year to \$18,205, retroactive to July 1. Salaries will be increased to \$19,115 on Jan. 1; to \$20,550 on July 1, 1980; and to almost \$22,000 on July 1, 1981.

Finance director Mike Gorman says the pay hike brings the salaries of township officers to about the average police wage in the area.

The contract with the Canton Police Officers Association (CPOA) was ratified last week by a 5-2 vote of the township board, with Trustees Robert Greenstein and Carol Bodenmiller dissenting.

The 18-member CPOA voted unanimously to accept the contract two weeks ago.

The agreement, which is retroactive to July 1, gives the officers a 14 percent pay increase the first year, a 12 percent increase during the second year of the contract and a 7 percent increase during the third year.

Officers who were hired before last July 1 will receive a \$1,000 bonus at the time the contract is signed in addition to their retroactive pay.

Officers who are hired in the future will start at about \$16,500 during the first year of the contract, about \$17,000 during the second year and about \$18,000 during the third year of the contract.

Gorman said the contract improves the officers' medical and dental insurance coverage as well as vacation benefits.

The patrol officers, who voted to join the Police Officers Association of Michigan (POAM) last November, have been negotiating for their first contract since March.

HUD expansion given on low-income complex

Lawsuit cools off in court

Forest City, Inc. has agreed to wait until next January for a ruling on its request for court-ordered township board approval of a low-income apartment complex near the Pickwick subdivision.

Canton attorney Dave Berry said the Cleveland-based firm agreed to drop its request for an immediate court order after the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) extended its approval of rent subsidies for the proposed complex until a trial is held.

The trial is scheduled for Jan. 7 before Wayne County Circuit Judge John Kirwan. HUD approval of the complex originally was to expire last Friday.

The township board denied site plans for the complex by a unanimous vote last July on the grounds that the Pickwick PUD (Planned Unit Development) agreement had been violated. Township officials said the zoning of the parcel therefore reverted to single-family residential — the zoning of the land before the 1971 PUD agreement was signed.

Forest City owns the 18-acre parcel south of Warren and east of Lilley which the Southfield-based Amurcon Corp. had proposed to buy. Amurcon proposed building and managing the In-

dependence Square apartment complex.

Amurcon's purchase agreement stipulated, however, that the zoning of the land remain multiple. Forest City attorneys maintained that their firm would suffer "immediate and irreparable injury" if the court does not order approval of Amurcon's site plans.

They maintain that the township board used the alleged violation of the

PUD agreement as an excuse to change the land's zoning and deny the low-income apartment proposal.

According to Berry, Forest City attorneys said they would drop their request for an immediate court order at a hearing held before Judge Kirwan last Friday if HUD granted an extension of its low-income approval.

HUD authorized the extension on Tuesday, and Judge Kirwan cancelled

a second hearing which was originally scheduled for Wednesday.

"I think the whole idea of requesting an immediate writ was to ask HUD for an extension," Berry said. "By filing the suit, they gave HUD a reason to extend."

Residents of Pickwick subdivision have expressed vehement opposition to construction of the proposed low-income apartments near their homes.

Recreation director hired

Robert Dates, part-time recreation program supervisor, has been named to the number-two position in the Canton Parks and Recreation Department.

Dates' appointment to the \$16,000-a-year recreation director post was confirmed by a 5-2 vote of the Canton Township board last week, with Trustees Robert Greenstein and Stephen Larson dissenting.

He will fill the full-time position vacated by former recreation director Brenda Pollack, who resigned more than a year ago.

Ms. Pollack, former head of the department, submitted her resignation

after the township board created the higher position of recreation superintendent. The superintendent slot was filled by Michael Gouin about one year ago.

The recreation director position has not been filled since Ms. Pollack resigned.

Gouin said Dates will hold responsibility for the day-to-day administration of recreational programs, program planning and the training of staff.

Gouin, who holds the \$22,000-a-year superintendent position, is responsible for long-range planning and the administration of the entire department.

Dates, 26, has served as part-time

program supervisor since last April.

He holds bachelor and masters degrees in recreation from Central Michigan University. He served as recreation program director in Fort Jackson, South Carolina for a year and as youth director in Alexandria, La. for a year.

Gouin said Dates' salary is included in the proposed \$179,000 recreation budget that he has requested of the township administration for 1980.

The recreation department has four full-time staffers, three year-round part-timers and a number of seasonal workers.

Short Takes

'No conflict'

Trustee Bob Greenstein, who has backed the bid of Omnicon Corp. for a cable television franchise, admits that the corporation is a client of his brother — attorney Gary Greenstein. Bob Greenstein, who also is an attorney, shares office space with his brother. But Bob insists that his backing of Omnicon over three other cable television firms does not constitute a conflict of interest. "We don't share income, period," Bob said of his business relationship with his brother. "All we do is share rent and a secretary." Bob says he supports Omnicon because that firm already has won tentative approval of the township board for the cable TV franchise. Three other cable TV firms subsequently applied for the township contract. "If there's not anyone way better, why change?" Bob asked.

Trees get saved

Developer Loren Gould has withdrawn his site plan application for a controversial warehouse near the Holiday Park subdivision, according to Canton Planner Jim Kosteva. Some 60 residents who live near the 15-acre parcel vehemently objected to Gould's plan at a Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) meeting last month. The residents said removal of the trees from the site would increase freeway noise heard in the subdivision. The ZBA tabled Gould's request to waive the tree ordinance which requires developers to replace trees that are removed during the course of construction. According to Kosteva, Gould never appeared before the planning commission with his site plan application.

Ghetto dweller?

Supervisor Noel Culbert said he didn't mean it the way it sounded. But during a light moment at last Tuesday's township board meeting, Culbert jokingly referred to the entire area south of Ford Road as "a ghetto." The remark was made after a developer commented that he planned to move to Canton Township. "I live in the ghetto — south of Ford Road," said Culbert, a resident of Stonegate subdivision near Palmer and Lilley. "You wouldn't want to live there." The remark was probably predicated by the observation that property values south of Ford Road used to be lower than those north of the highways. Realtors say that situation is now disappearing.

Task force backs county executive

County executive backers in western Wayne got a boost this week from a special state task force on county government reorganization.

The 15-member group endorsed a reform package that proposes an elected county executive. The reform propos-

als set the stage for a major political battle in ensuing weeks among Detroit, suburban and out-state legislators in Lansing.

Detroit Democrats favor a county manager to head a restructured county government.

Out-county interests have been petitioning most of the year for direct elec-

tion of a county executive, much the same as a strong mayor. In this bloc were board of commissioners Chairman Richard Manning, D-Redford; state Sen. R. Robert Geake, R-Northville; and Rep. Thomas Brown, D-Westland.

THE TASK force recommended 10-4 that a special Charter Commission be elected by county voters next year to write a new county constitution. Three Detroit task force members and one county union representative opposed the recommendations.

Detroit representatives want the commission to have the option of recommending either an elected county

executive or appointed county manager to head a restructured government.

State law, which the task force said should remain unchanged, now only allows a charter commission to recommend a county executive. All government changes recommended by a charter commission are subject to voter approval.

THE TASK force, appointed by Gov. Milliken, Senate Majority Leader William Faust, D-Westland and House Speaker Bobby Crim, D-Davison, said the charter commission should:

- Be elected from the existing 27 county commissioner districts.
- Have authority to recommend that

the county road and drain commissions be abolished.

• Maintain the elected offices of prosecutor, sheriff, treasurer, clerk and register of deeds in a new government.

BUT BEFORE anything is changed, the Michigan Legislature must approve county charter status for Wayne, paving the way for election of a charter commission.

The legislature must also approve expanded authority for the charter group to abolish the road and drain commissions.

The deficit-plagued county, facing

another cash flow crisis in mid-October, isn't expecting any state aid until a county reorganization bill is passed by the Legislature.

Wayne County will end the fiscal year with an \$18.2 million deficit.

Gov. Milliken, who supports a Wayne county executive, has refused new state aid for Wayne County until the legislature amends the County Home Rule Act to allow more comprehensive reforms than are now possible.

The high level task force recommendations will "get the immediate attention of the House and Senate," said Chairman Manning.

But he added, "It's difficult to assess what, if anything, is going to be put on the governor's desk." Manning said it could take up to three months to get a bill to the governor, since Detroit representatives balked at the task force recommendations.

GEAKE SAID the legislature will favor a Wayne county executive for two reasons.

"The governor says he won't sign any other bill, and most legislators favor letting the people decide whether they want a county executive."

Brown added: "The legislature doesn't have to listen to the task force, but I think the majority will."

He emphasized that the bottom line to any charter commission recommendation was the required voter approval.

Even though they recommended it, the western Wayne representatives said they were disappointed that a charter commission would be selected from existing districts, which favor Detroit by a 15-12 margin. They say the 1980 census will show the suburbs have a majority of the population.



Davis denies Jewish bias—but Garber gets case

A Troy attorney won a new court date in 35th District Court after convincing the judge that pretrial publicity about the attorney's conflict with another judge over a religious holiday might prejudice the jury.

The controversy began last week when another 35th District Court judge, Dunbar Davis, refused to change a trial date scheduled for Yom Kippur, a Jewish holy day, at the request of defense attorney Sandor Gelman.

Gelman had agreed to the original date a month ago but requested the change a week later after realizing Yom Kippur fell on Oct. 1. Davis' refusal to postpone the trial angered Gelman and prompted protests by the Anti-Defamation League.

On Wednesday, Davis, the presiding judge of the district court, disqualified

himself and reassigned the case to Judge James Garber without changing the trial date.

Gelman's motion for a new trial, based on pretrial publicity, was granted by Garber last Thursday.

Judge Garber will hear the case Oct. 18. Gelman's case, which involves auto negligence, was remanded from Wayne County Circuit Court to the 35th District Court because of a county backlog.

Gelman said he wasn't "happy with the way things turned out" but the new date was "just fine."

"I've found a lawyer's way of dealing with the situation without really addressing the issue. It means I get to engage in my religious practice and my client gets his day in court."

LAST WEEK Gelman accused Davis of Jewish prejudice when the judge

refused to change the trial date of Oct. 1. Davis denied the charge.

"I don't think there's the least basis for that statement," Davis said. "But you tend to bristle when someone says something like that."

Judge Davis said he disqualified himself not because of a prejudice towards Jews but because "I felt a bit antagonistic toward him (Gelman) for making that statement."

"I have certainly no conscious prejudice against anyone," Davis said. "I never concern myself with whether a lawyer's a Jew or Gentile. They're no different than Indians, blacks or people from my own home state of South Carolina."

Davis said he refused Gelman's request because it would inconvenience jurors scheduled for that trial and would leave him with "nothing to do for that day — which is a waste of the

taxpayer's money."

"It's just too much trouble to adjourn a jury trial." The situation is less complicated for non-jury trials, he said.

"In non-jury cases it's no problem," Davis said. "I've granted quite liberally there."

"I don't think he (Gelman) believes I am prejudiced" but that Gelman was looking for a way to gain postponement.

"I'm just putting two and two together," Davis added.

GELMAN, however, has not changed his feelings about the judge.

"I believe he's anti-Semitic based on his unreasonable attitudes," Gelman said Thursday after Garber granted the delay.

"With four weeks notice you'd think he could find something else to do on Oct. 1," Gelman said. "That's just incredible."

Gelman said he contacted Judge Davis' office and received a runaround from his clerk. Gelman said she told him "We know when Christmas is..." and then refused to allow him to speak to Davis unless he appeared in person.

After threatening to contact the Michigan Supreme Court's administration office, Gelman said the clerk stated that he could speak to the judge when "he's not busy."

"The man obviously has some hang-ups," he added, referring to Davis' former comments in open court and the media about homosexuals.

Judge Davis' views on homosexuality surfaced last spring following more than 100 arrests involving homosexuals along Interstate-275 and in Hines Park.

Davis, who publicly admitted a bias against homosexuals, disqualified himself from many of the hearings of

those charged with indecent exposure and gross indecency.

JUDGE GARBER, despite Gelman's charges, strongly supports his colleague's integrity and character as a judge.

"It's an unfortunate situation," Garber said. "There are two men of strong principals here. They both seem to be decent people."

Garber said he was sympathetic to both men's arguments.

He said he understood Davis' persistence in holding Gelman to a prearranged trial date. He also said he understood Gelman's original confusion in the exact date of Yom Kippur which falls on different dates each year.

Garber said backlogs are created "primarily" because of adjournments. "That's why you have suits down there that are 6 years old."

Rent hike termed 'revenge' by tenants of mobile home park

Residents of the Holiday Estates mobile home park in Canton have been hit with a substantial lot rental increase, from \$95 per month to \$140.

Sterling Johr, vice president of the Holiday Estates Mobile Home Association, says he believes the increase is the park owner's retaliation for a flurry of lawsuits and complaints levied by residents.

According to Johr, the association has called a meeting from 2 to 5 p.m. Oct. 7 at the Canton recreation center on Geddes Road for residents of all the mobile home parks owned by Sheldon Futurnick.

In addition to Holiday Estates, Futurnick owns the Royal Holiday park in Canton and the Holiday Woods and Holiday West parks in Belleville.

Johr said the 180 members of the Holiday Estates association (the park has 300 lots) have a number of grievances against Futurnick.

"He promised us we could sell the mobile homes and leave them here on the lots, but he's not doing it," Johr said of the park owner. "He promised us a pool and recreation center, but then said he never promised them. The by-laws mention rules for use of a clubhouse, even though there isn't any."

Johr claims a neighbor used to own a dog, but it was poisoned. The neighbor

is still being forced to pay a pet fee even though the animal is dead.

Futurnick could not be reached for comment on the charges.

THE HOLIDAY ESTATES organization has further complaints about Canton Township and State of Michigan officials.

Johr says the group tried to get help from those officials in enforcing its rights, but those efforts have gotten nowhere.

"The whole park is just set up wrong. The lots were designed for mobile homes 12 feet wide by 55 feet long, but he (Futurnick) has been putting 14-foot by 70-foot homes on there. They just can't be set up right on those lots and they fall to pieces," Johr says.

The association vice president says some 20 lawsuits have been filed by individual residents for a variety of problems. He says the rent increase is "much higher" than at other parks in the area.

"A lot of people are on fixed incomes and just can't afford the increase. But what do you do? You can't just stick your mobile home in your back pocket and go somewhere else," Johr said.

Johr added that he and Association President C.J. Marshall would be meeting with other board members to determine how the residents should deal with the rent increases.

A designer loves karate

He breaks bricks for breakfast

Livonia's Arnold Sandubrae is a bit concerned that he's going to sound like a nut. It's easy to see his problem.

Here's a guy who runs an interior design firm. He's got a farm right in the middle of nowhere, so naturally he installed a stop light on it. And last month he won a statue that stands 6-foot-2 — or eight inches taller than he is — for taking second place in the American Okinawan Karate Association competition.

"Some people have coffee in the morning, I break my concrete," he explains.

SANDUBRAE teaches karate in between trips to California to do design

work. The two pursuits — the mild-mannered designing and the tough-as-nails physical combat — sound like they'd make strange bedfellows. But Sandubrae says not.

Karate experts, the Livonia resident maintains, are in fact non-violent people.

"We would be much less apt to punch somebody in the nose than an untrained person. I know I could hurt someone," he says.

"I would prefer to back away from a situation that could hurt somebody."

The art of karate — often thought of as an aggressive form of combat — includes a strict code of discipline that Sandubrae says makes its practitioners the least-threatening folks around.

He says you'll never see him in a bar fight.

"I have no reason to flex my muscles because I'm fully aware of the ability I have," he says. "I don't have to prove it to other people."

HE BECAME interested in the art from a son who was a black belt — the highest level of skill. Another son, Steve, is a student at Stevenson High School in Livonia and has started studying karate as well.

Sandubrae, as do many karate followers, maintains two separate rankings. He is a 4th degree black belt in akta karate, which involves the use of weapons, and a 1st degree black belt in isshinryu karate, which allows only the use of the body.

The two forms use different movements and separate organizations exist for their devotees.

Sandubrae says karate has improved his life both physically and mentally.

"It's been a tremendous positive factor in my life. Mentally, I can control what my day is going to be," he says.

"It gave me exposure to people in all walks of life — a truck driver, a garbage man — people I might not meet living in Livonia. At 46, I'm far from an old person. That's done a lot for me."

To keep in shape, he trains regularly and teaches three days a week.

He gives lessons on his farm in Novi. He refuses to accept payment for the instruction, but asks that students make a donation to the Heart Fund, his favorite charity.

"I believe in karate," he says. "I believe it should be available to all people."

And he hopes that people interested in karate have not soured on the idea because of experiences with unscrupulous commercial karate schools.

"A lot of people signed up and gave their money because they were really interested. They got had," he says.

"There are a lot of good schools, but you have to be careful of where their interest lies."

He suggests two steps for people considering karate lessons:

• "Don't ever sign a contract obligating yourself to a certain amount of money."

• "Go to people interested in karate, whether they have an elaborate school

or just a backyard. The instructor is the person that makes the difference."

SANDUBRAE LEARNED karate from two Detroit area people — Robert White of the Northville Isshinryu Karate Club, and Willie Adams, head of North American Aikido and Karate in Detroit.

Sandubrae now assists teachers for the Northville club, which holds sessions with the help of the Northville Recreation Department. And he holds self-defense classes — mainly for women — again for only a Heart Fund donation.

Persons interested in signing up can call him at his farm in Novi, 349-2363.

Sandubrae says he's done well enough in his design business that he can afford such eccentricities as that stop light on the farm. He used to breed Arabian horses there but gave them up except for one.

"These are things I wanted, and I did 'em. I do things that I enjoy."

He also has a home in Palm Springs, Calif., where he stays on his frequent business trips. The patio there is covered with broken concrete from his morning exercises.

Since he doesn't drink coffee, he has to do something to get moving.

"If I can break six inches of concrete, I say to myself: 'What else can't I do during the day?'"

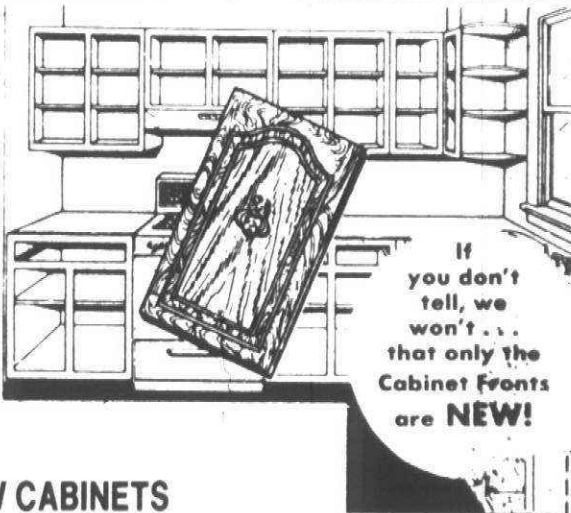

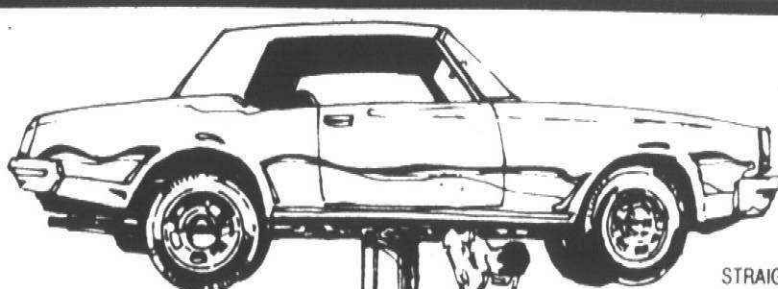

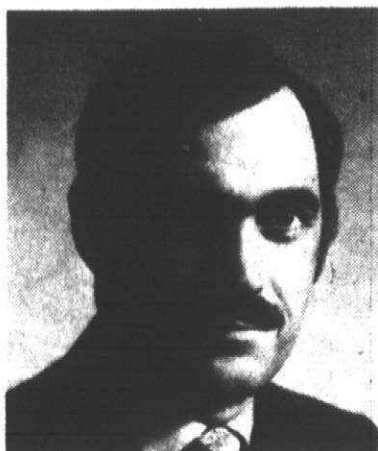

State looks at Oct. 15 as opening date for M-14

Sorry folks, but the M-14 expressway between Plymouth and Ann Arbor will not open until at least October 15 and even that date is optimistic.

"We're looking into the possibility of getting it open by then. But there are still too many things to do," says Warren Cox, senior district engineer for the Michigan Department of Transportation.

Although portions of the highway look ready for traffic, Cox explained that contractors must still finish portions of concrete paving, shoulders, ramps and barriers. Workmen must finish medians, grade and sod the side slopes, put up signs, clean the road and put the yellow and white lines on the concrete.

Further, eager beavers dying to at least take their cars on parts of the road which are finished will be disappointed to know that the department of

transportation will not open any portions of the highway until the entire project is completed.

"You wouldn't want to live on Beck road with 4,000 cars exiting next to your house," Cox said.

M-14 is nearly complete between U.S. 23 and Beck Road.

When the 10-mile stretch of highway connecting U.S. 23 with I-275 is completed, the department of transportation expects most of the traffic which has been using east-west routes such as Eight Mile and Ford Road to use the new expressway. If portions of the expressway opened, much more traffic would be forced onto county roads than they could handle, Cox explained.

"We have learned that detours we set do not capture all the traffic which would normally use the route. The drivers are smart — they'll use the path

of least resistance. And the county road system could not take the traffic," Cox said.

Work first began on M-14 in 1976. When finished, the expressway is expected to cost somewhat less than the \$2 million-per-mile cost for the Jeffries Freeway (I-96) into Detroit.

"I'm not sure of the exact cost per mile," Cox said, "but this is a rural freeway. The Jeffries has more excavating, more bridges and more lighting."

Predictions by some department of transportation spokesmen that the M-14 would be open in September were unduly optimistic, Cox said.

"Whoever said the M-14 would open in September must have been someone hoping to get it open for the Michigan-Notre Dame football game (September 15)," Cox said.

Insurance rates rank high in the suburbs, claims Law

Western Wayne County residents may now be paying among the highest insurance premiums in the state.

That claim was made last week at a town hall meeting in Plymouth by State Rep. Robert Law (R-Livonia, Westland).

Rates for comprehensive and theft coverage appear to be higher than any other community outside Detroit, according to statistics received by Law, and rates for collision and personal injury appear to be among the highest right now.

LAW SAID he has been trying to compile accurate information over the summer months from the insurance industry and from the Insurance Bureau after the Supreme Court ordered the Michigan Legislature to rewrite the no-fault insurance act to make insurance available to all citizens at a "reasonable cost."

"There has been a great deal of misleading and vague information suggesting that rates would increase as much as 30 percent in western Wayne County communities if any essential insurance legislation were passed.

"But I believe that the final form of

the essential insurance bill could stabilize the rates for residents of our communities if passed in a proper form.

"It is a complex issue which is not easily resolved. But I have taken a strong stand against any proposal which would increase rates."

THE TOWN HALL meeting, put on in conjunction with the Lake Point Homeowners Association, was the third in a series of such meetings in Plymouth Township.

Besides Law, the town hall meeting was attended by State Rep. Roy Smith (R-Ann Arbor) whose district includes Plymouth, Plymouth Township Trustees Gerald Law and Maurice Breen, and Carol Davis, trustee, Plymouth-Canton Board of Education.

"I intend to be concerned over the fact that the no-fault concept was sold to the public on the promise that it would stabilize insurance rates," Law said.

"Unfortunately, this has not happened, and I think we must carefully study insurance industry claims that insurance rates will rise because of this legislation.

If the past is any guide it appears

that the insurance industry will raise its rates regardless of any action the Legislature takes.

"At this point, I'm trying to come up with the best method to deal with the essential insurance concept."

Law also said a special legislative committee has this week reached a major agreement with the insurance industry.

REP. SMITH discussed his major "equalization by class" tax legislation recently approved by the House and Senate.

The Smith legislation provides a simplification of the assessment system.

Throughout the state, Smith explained, units of government are not assessing property equally and often one class of property carries the burden of another class.

Smith also announced that he will shortly be initiating a major petition drive to shift property tax now paid by residential and agricultural land to an income tax of less than one percent and to spread commercial and industrial property tax statewide.

"Under the provision of my bill, a homeowner wouldn't have to compare

his home to a factory or a shopping center for assessment purposes," Smith said.

"Homeowners often carry the burden of business and industry, and when my legislation becomes effective that will no longer be the case."

Right turns ease traffic

The Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) is asking all cities, villages and counties to re-examine the need for "No Turn on Red" signs placed at some intersections.

The request is the result of a national study that reveals right turns on red reduce the total number of accidents and save motorists time and fuel.

The study, conducted for the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials, showed that the total number of rear-end collisions, sideswipes, right-angle collisions and vehicles running off the road, decreased an average 12.6-11.9 percent per year, per intersection, after allowing right turns on red.

Parking ticket help is sought

Two bills designed to improve the collection of local parking tickets have been introduced in the Legislature by state Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville.

"Many communities in our state have been plagued by scofflaws who ignore or refuse to pay parking tickets," said Geake, whose district includes Plymouth and Plymouth Township.

"These two bills I have introduced are designed to make it easier for local communities to collect parking fines."

One bill would provide for a default judgment and suspension of a driver's license for a violator's failure to appear in traffic court.

The other is designed to solve the problem of vehicle owners who claim they were not driving the vehicle at the

time the ticket was issued and have no idea who was.

To remedy this problem, Geake proposes to create a "conclusive" presumption that whoever the vehicle is registered to is responsible for where and when the vehicle is parked during the time a violation is to have occurred.

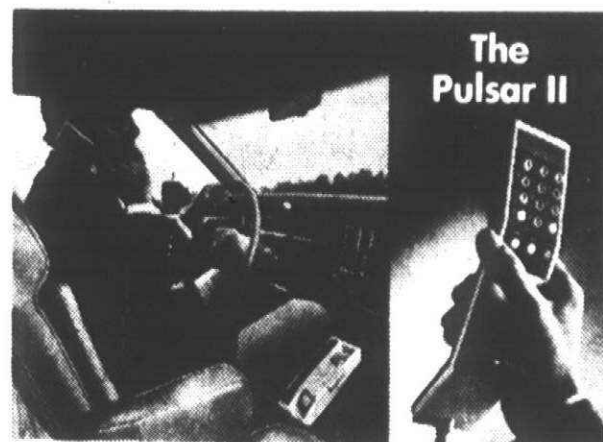
Geake introduced both bills at the request of the Plymouth City Parking Commission. "Plymouth, like many other communities in Michigan, is plagued by violators who refuse to pay their parking tickets, and I think it's about time they were forced to face up to their financial responsibilities in this regard."

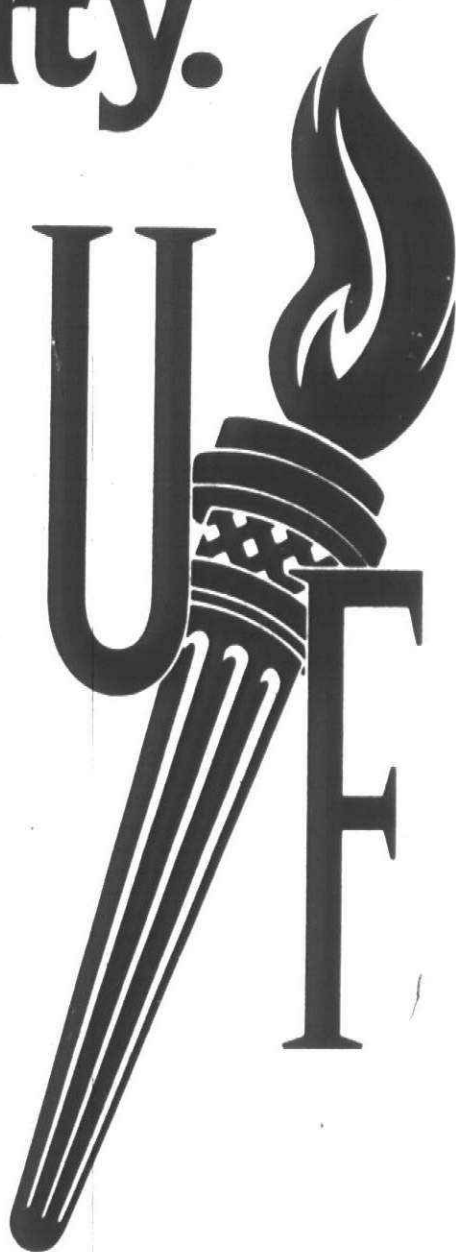

Army denies genetic experiment with flyer

A report leaked last week from questionable sources implicated the U.S. Army in a genetic engineering scheme aimed at developing a Super Chicken.

The word leaked out that the 300th Military Police Command (U.S. Army Reserve), headquartered in Livonia, is exploiting controversial genetic engineering technology to develop a so-called Super Chicken for the fourth annual Chicken Flying Contest in Plymouth on Oct. 7.

AN ARMY SPOKESMAN, when confronted with the report, vehemently denied any such scheme existed.

"We can't understand how those rumors got started," stammered the obviously nervous spokesman, who cannot be identified under the rules of a "deep background" briefing.

Perspiration beaded on his forehead, but that may have been due to the fact that the windows of the un-air conditioned Reserve Center were closed to keep the temperature up to 78 degrees as required by federal energy conservation rules.

"The only reason — the ONLY reason we are calling this beast — I mean little birdie — the 'X' Chicken is to, uh, well, you know, uh, give it a little glamour," the officer hesitated.

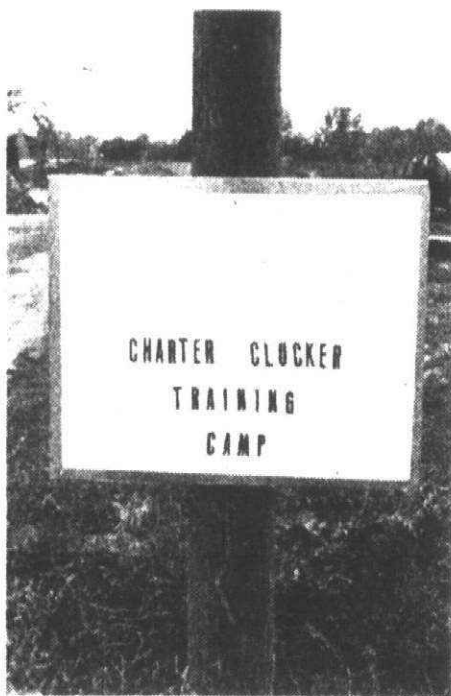
"We figured, uh, maybe a little mystery might, uh, liven things up — give y'all a better show, or something like that."

"It really doesn't have anything to do with 'experimental' or 'X the unknown' or anything like that. There is no secret military research involved here."

When pressed further, the spokesman refused to confirm or deny reports from usually unreliable sources indicating that members of the 300th, disguised as National Guardsmen, had been heard making subtle inquiries about the rules applying to bionic tailfeathers and JATO (jet-assisted take-off) equipment.

The 300th is known to be determined to make up for the humiliating debacles it has experienced in the two preceding chicken races.

Asked if the command's dire warnings that fowls who fail to fly would be



sentenced to face the frying squad, the spokesman declined to make a direct comment.

"Just let me say that the 'X' Chicken will be the ex-chicken if it makes us look bad."

MEANWHILE, the entry from Plymouth Township, previously known as Charter Clucker, has been rechristened "The Hulk."

The Hulk hatched last week and was air-lifted by helicopter to the township's new 33-acre addition to Hilltop Golf Course, where it has gone into training.

The training grounds have now been posted as a "restricted area" and Barb Lynch, chicken sitter and township trustee, has been placed in charge of its "Basic Flight Training" (BFT).

Lynch has contacted the Federal Aeronautics Association to request a ban against low-flying planes within a two-mile radius of Hilltop.

Supervisor Tom Notebaert, however, has said the entire 33 acres cannot be made a restricted area because of on-going sewer construction at the site. Trustee Gerald Law has asked whether construction could be halted, without

danger of bond forfeiture, until training is complete.

Lynch, who is a pilot, plans to instruct the Hulk in slow flights, navigation, holding altitudes plus a crash course on meteorology.

Lynch also has asked for a heavy security patrol from the Wayne County Sheriff.

SPEAKING OF THE SHERIFF, Wayne County Deputy Andy Pruner reports that his entry (X66) has made steady progress despite a number of obstacles.

X66 had been housed with feathered friends in Lake Pointe until an unsuccessful abduction attempt was made by Plymouth Police. Rumor now has it that X66 is living and training in Canada under the protection of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (often referred to by chickens as mounties).

Pruner noted that so far neither the Plymouth Police nor State Police at Northville have answered his challenge to race on Oct. 7. But the following call was intercepted over the police telecommunication network connecting all state police posts in Michigan:

"A call for a statewide chicken hunt by troopers to find the biggest and fastest chicken in the state. State must be not only fast and able to leap tall barns but must have an 'impeccable' background."

Two candidates reportedly have been found. One is a rooster in Copper Harbor and the other was located

roosting in the State House chambers near the speaker's platform.

After the Observer reported Pruner was training X66 on the M-14 freeway it has been observed that the State Police have doubled its patrols on that freeway. (X66 now is training on R-104 in Canada under mounted police security).

MEANWHILE, Chicken Advisor was returned Tuesday afternoon only to be chicken-napped again at about 5 a.m. Friday.

When Chicken Czar Larry Janes arrived in the morning, he found a sombrero on the back room floor and a note, laying next to a chicken feather, which read:

"Speak for yourself — Indian Maiden."

Before police could respond, Janes got a mysterious phone call with the caller repeating the words, "Captain John, Captain John, Captain John."

After recalling that the words "Speak for yourself" were once spoken in history by John Alden, Janes made a trip to the Miles Standish Room of the Mayflower Hotel but could find no sign of Chicken Advisor.

"So I took a walk over to the Box Bar to meditate on the meaning of all this and when I returned Chicken Advisor was back home again."

"Whoever had taken him did take good care of the advisor, though, because he had been given a dish of fresh water. We took a lab test of the con-

tents, though, and found the water had been liberally sprinkled with Wild Turkey whiskey.

"Apparently the culprit thought we wouldn't change the advisor's water between now and Sunday. It's obvious someone is afraid to have Chicken Advisor fly on Sunday."

The Great Chicken Parade will

chick-off at 1 p.m. Sunday from the Cultural Center, will traverse up Theodore to Main, follow Main Street past Kellogg Park and make a right-turn on Ann Arbor Trail so it all can end at Harvey Street, or thereabouts.

Any chicken float which turns left onto Ann Arbor Trail will be disqualified from flying.

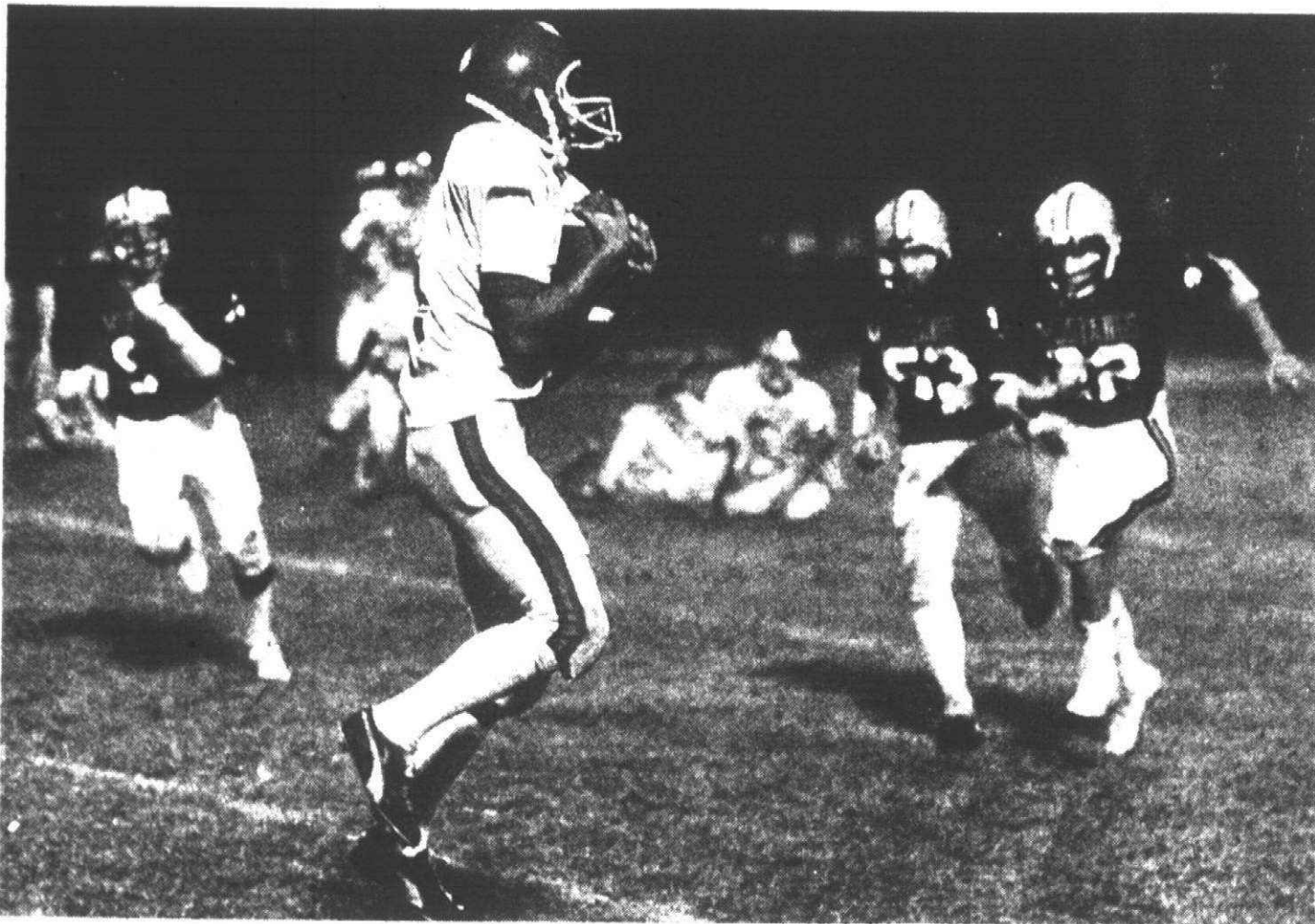

Greer completed eight of 12 passes for 142 yards. Northville outgained Canton in total yardage, 228-7.

"We thought we could exploit their secondary," said first-year Northville coach Dennis Colligan. "We wanted to get our split end out in a one-on-one situation because he (Goehmann) is very outstanding. He has good wheels."

Goehmann, who ran several clever routes, has now caught five touchdown passes in four games.

"I'll take whatever they'll give us," said Colligan. "We try to exploit a weakness."

"WE DIDN'T have bad coverage," said Canton coach Dave Schuele. "We just didn't get the ball. We got beat on the first touchdown but the other two was a case of not going after the ball. All he (Greer) did was pump and go at us."

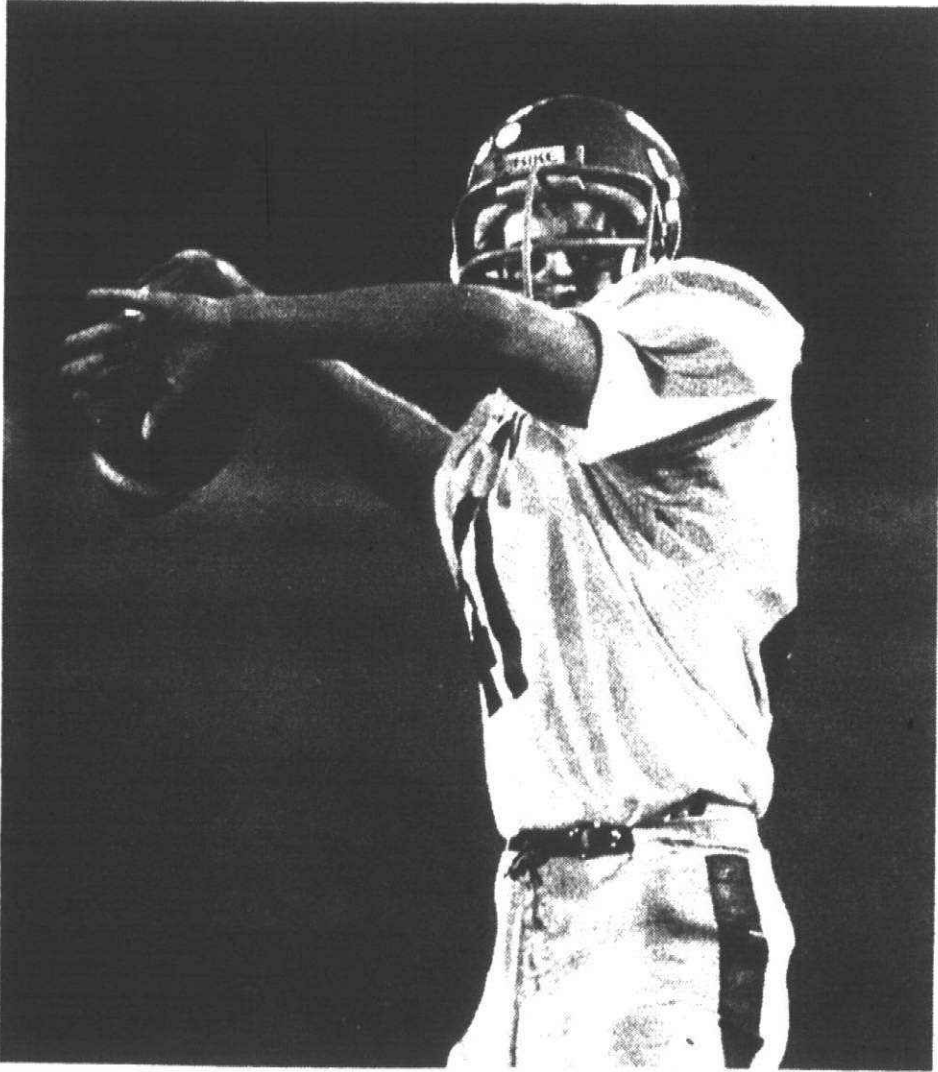
Schuele was disappointed with the number of missed opportunities by the Canton offense. The Chiefs had the ball inside the Northville 10-yard line three times and couldn't score. It seemed the Chiefs would come up with a glaring penalty which would stifle a drive.

At the end of the third quarter, Greer directed his team 66 yards in nine plays capped by Goehmann's comeback grab at 11:30, giving the Mustangs a

Canton got on the scoreboard with 1:26 left in the game when Gray sneaked over from three yards. Canton's Mark LaForest recovered a fumble at the Northville 28 to set up the score.

Halfback Bobby Hamblin, raced 13 yards on a draw play to keep the drive alive.

Canton victimized itself with seven fumbles, two of which it lost. Gray completed five of seven passes for 47 yards.

"This was the best performance by our defense this season," said Colligan. "We have them good field position but we held."

Lynn Herold and Stephanie Colovas of Northville won a tight match against McGlinn and Schipani, 6-4, 7-5.

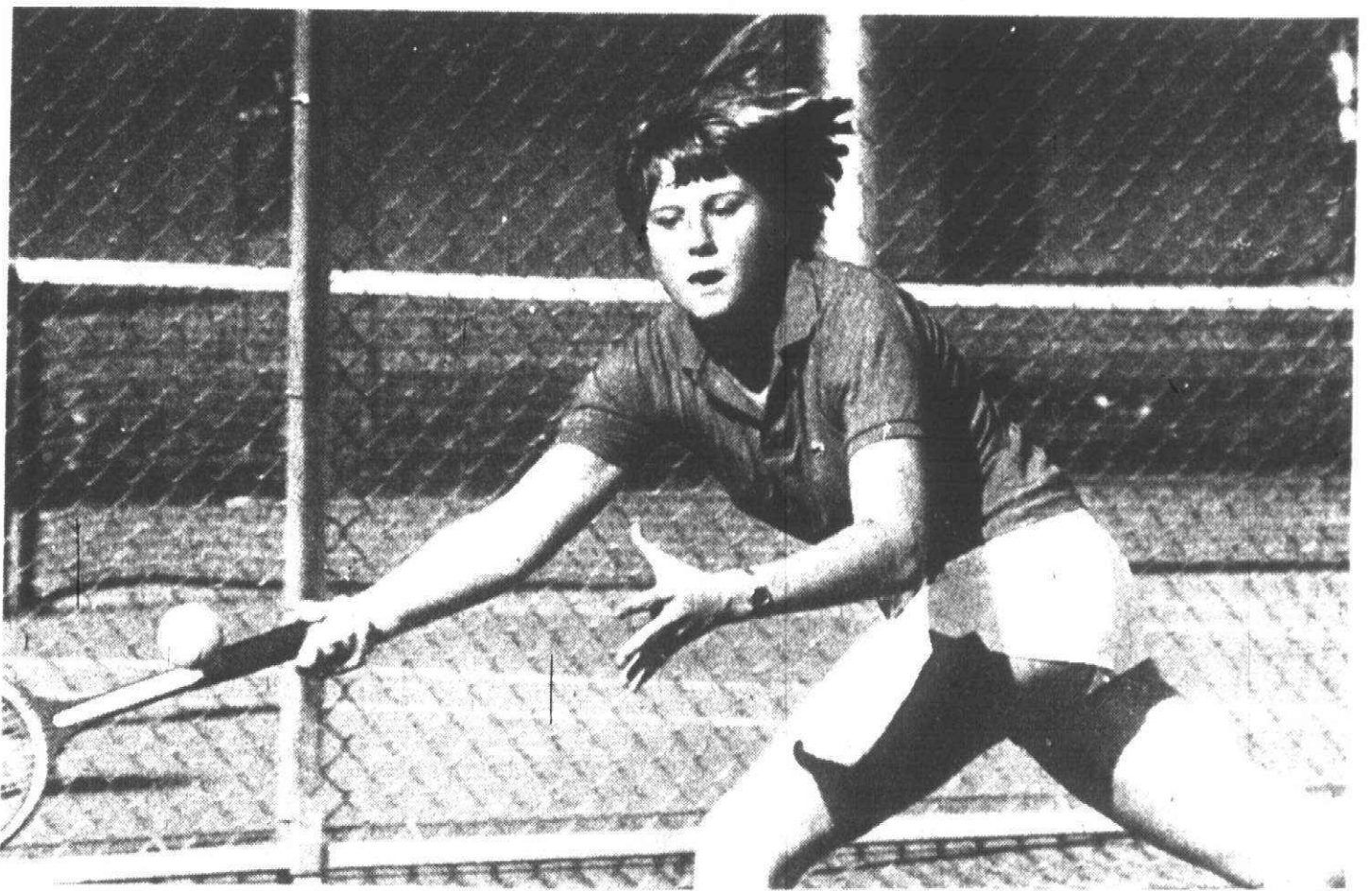

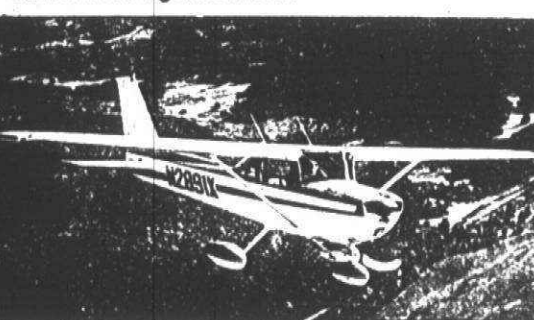

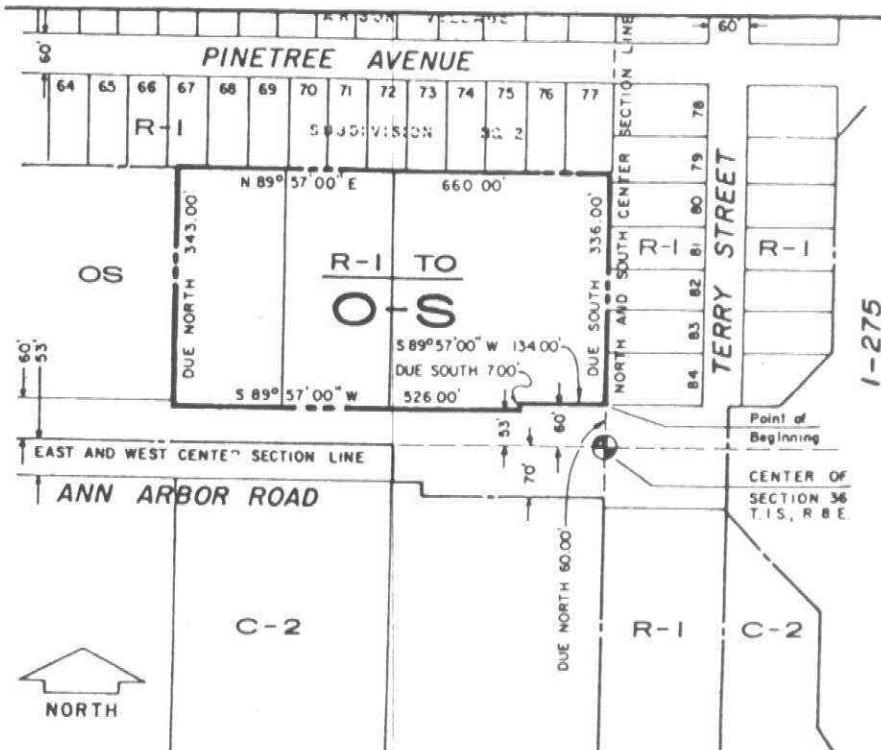

Area players spice UM-MSU battle

The record — 45-21-5 — doesn't tell the entire story. The University of Michigan and Michigan State University have met on the football field 71 times, with the Wolverines holding a commanding edge in victories.

What will happen when the intra-state rivals will clash again 1:30 p.m. Saturday at Spartan Stadium in East Lansing is anybody's guess. And, chances are good that everyone does have a guess or an opinion.

The game itself will be over in about three hours. The high jinks leading up to the game are already underway, not only on the two campuses, but also in offices, factories and bars around the state.

Few are neutral about this game. In fact, even those who don't know a touchdown from a touchback turn into rabid fans. There usually are fans for each team in every family. Some are more rabid than others.

Green-and-white MSU flags are countered by maize-and-blue logos on basketball backboards in suburban driveways.

While Michigan fans have favored Ohio State with their intense dislike in recent years, MSU supporters still seem to focus their potshots on the team from Ann Arbor.

As the recreational vehicles head up I-96 toward East Lansing loaded with Spartan partisans, there can be no doubt about exactly where they stand.

Bumper stickers make their loyalty perfectly clear. "M-Go Blow," reads one. "Some call it Maize, we call it Corn," proclaims another.

Michigan fans, believing themselves to be a little more sophisticated than their MSU counterparts, rarely tire of bringing up the Spartans' "cow college" origin.

MSU coach Darryl Rogers last season referred to Michigan and company as "those arrogant asses." That prompted many Wolverine supporters to

inquire of East Lansing when Michigan State last went to a post-season bowl game.

Michigan State was the first and has been the most recent Big 10 team to defeat a Bo Schembechler-coached squad in a conference game.

THE SPARTANS pulled off a surprising 24-15 victory last year in Ann Arbor.

Michigan had won eight in a row prior to that. Many MSU supporters are quick to point out that the Spartans would have been in the Rose Bowl at the end of last season had they not been on probation.

The Wolverines' biggest win was 119-0 back in 1902, when the opposition was known as the Michigan Agricultural College Aggies. In modern times (after 1930), Michigan's most one-sided triumph was 55-0 in 1947.

State's most convincing win in the series was 34-0 in 1967.

Six of the top 10 single-game crowds

in MSU history have resulted when Michigan was the opposition. At least 76,000 fans will witness the tussle Saturday.

Half the fun will be just getting there — dressing up in one's loyal colors, watching the pretty fall scenery during the ride, stopping at a cider mill and tailgate picnics.

Many former Observer & Eccentric area players toil for the Green-and-White and the Maize-and-Blue.

The MSU program includes Matt Foster, senior, Livonia Churchill, center; Alan Davis, junior, Bloomfield Hills resident, defensive back; and Jon English, freshman, Birmingham Brother Rice, quarterback.

'Security' a misnomer

A new industry is finding a fortune in fear. Not far from where I live, for instance, is a tiny auto parts store. In the time it takes me to buy a tailpipe, the store has a machine that appears to take my picture eight or 10 times, complete with flashbulbs.

The store paid plenty for this machine, but they probably figure they'll have it paid off by the time I buy my eighth or ninth tailpipe. The machine, however, has made sure I won't buy any more tailpipes there.

You don't have to look hard for other examples — beer stores with inch-thick bulletproof glass, gas stations that don't take cash after sundown, grocery stores that take your picture before they'll take your check.

This stuff bothers masses of people, but protects against a select few.

If 200 people buy beer at the corner store every day and it's robbed once a year, then bulletproof glass makes one gunman think twice — and 72,999 other people think they're surrounded by gunmen.

But these things are all chickenfeed compared to the fast track used by the American Society for Industrial Security (ASIS). Last week, it held its 25th annual seminar in the Renaissance Center.

THE ASIS represents businesses, primarily. These businesses have got things they want to keep. Trade secret thefts and labor union organizing were high on the Renaissance Center list of things the ASIS wants to make sure don't happen.

Not that there aren't other, more specialized worries.

Ringling Brothers, Barnum & Bailey Circus World sent a guy, for instance. The Herman Keifer Health Complex also sent a guy.

More understandably, Standard Oil sent several guys. A crowd of Japanese represented IBM. The Puget Sound Power & Light Co. didn't miss the show.

Hardware is a big part of keeping things, and at the seminar they displayed stuff that would make mouths water at a family reunion of the Hatfields and McCoys.

Take Razor Ribbon, a trademark name for stainless steel barbed wire. "The Mean Stuff," as it's called, is stronger than regular barbed wire, and studded with razor blades. Already, a brochure boasts, it's in use "at every type of facility from schools and amusement parks to nuclear power plants and maximum security correctional institutions."

Now, how can you beat stuff that already keeps both Mickey Mouse and Richard Speck in their place? Well, at least two other companies think they can — they produce razor blade-studded wire, too.

TETRADYNE makes armored cars, complete with concealed gunports in the doors and an optional tear gas delivery system. They modify Chevys, Fords, Dodges, Jeeps and Mercedes. One thing you can still count on in America's consumer society is freedom of choice. If you don't like Tetradyne, you can buy your armored car from Armored Vehicle Builders.

You can go to the Counter-Terrorist Driving School in Virginia to learn how to handle these babies.

A company that rents out security guards had a display made prominent by a large sign maintaining that "Industry today faces three major problems: labor disputes, terrorism, theft. Any or all of the above, not necessarily in that order."

Something called the London House Management Consultants, Inc., sells pre-employment tests that are necessary because "one-third of all employees are bad risks."

The companies that make and sell this stuff say the companies that buy and use it have a right to protect what they have, and naturally they're right. But only within limits.

THE RIGHT a company most wants to protect is its right to make money. All companies want to make money — the problem is that only a comparatively few companies have profitable secrets or products valuable enough to the world generally to justify protection of this nature.

Auto parts and beer stores probably don't belong on the list. Probably Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey doesn't, either.

In the interest of protecting companies that may neither need nor deserve protection — but want it anyway, the way you want unnecessary chrome on a car — the rights of millions of individuals are overlooked.

Individual rights certainly take a back seat when any company with the money to buy concealed tear gas delivery systems is allowed to do so.

But let me tell you about something exciting — cameras concealed in clocks . . .

Upon perusal of the card, I discovered that I had become a member of Detroit Rockers Engaged in the Abolition of Disco. "DREAD," the card says, "is Detroit's non-violent anti-disco league. Our aim is to eliminate disco from the face of the earth. As a duly sworn member of DREAD, I am committed to the conditions set forth on the reverse of this card."

To be a member in good standing, I find that one:

- (a) Will never wear platform shoes.
- (b) Will never wear zodiac jewelry.
- (c) Will never listen to disco radio stations or records.
- (d) Silk dresses and three-piece suits are extremely suspect.

This is all very interesting, but whereas I have no great love for disco, I have no overriding ambition to abolish it either. Some of my best friends like disco. Although I cringe to admit it, I have even been inside a disco, although I have never sunk so low as to

take disco dancing lessons.

What bothers me is that the people at WRIF presume overmuch. For all they know, some of the newspaper type people they sent these membership cards to could spend every evening at Oscar's.

They may even have purchased roller skates and neon striped knee socks in order to participate in new wave roller disco.

Maybe Donna Summers gets them right in their leisure suits. I'm also worried that, in this strange battle, the discos might win. Then where will I be?

When they hold trials for all the suspect rock and roll sympathizers, are the judges going to believe me when I say that I didn't join DREAD of my own free will — the card just came in the mail one day? Fat chance. That's what they'll all say.

Oh well. Better DREAD than dead.

Fighting disease takes hard political campaign

Get political.

That was the advice given in John Glenn High School some time ago by Mel Ravitz when he spoke to a group working in behalf of retarded citizens. As a former president of the Detroit Common Council and chairman of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments, Ravitz knows a lot about power and how to get things done in this country.

It was a good suggestion. But it can be applied far beyond the retarded scene. It should also be taken to heart by those making efforts to stamp out various diseases.

TAKE BIRTH defects and cancer. The March of Dimes and American Cancer Society can't go it alone. The fight is beginning to move beyond the labs and into the arena of political and citizen action. If some birth defects are caused by pesticides, herbicides, household chemicals, radiation, pharmaceuticals, narcotics and chemicals like mercury, as March of Dimes literature suggests, then part of the antidote to birth defects will be found in the environment and work place.

The March of Dimes would have to get into a lot of messy fights with industry and government to control the use of these chemicals. Take note, for example, of an announcement of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration of a campaign to reduce the exposure of citizens, especially children, to lead in the seams of certain cans. Evaporated milk and infant formula are in some of the cans involved.

It points out that too much lead can cause kidney and brain damage — and mental retardation. While this is not strictly a birth defect situation, it is close enough for a political arm of the birth defects fight to start yelling. Simple education is not enough. Someone should be grabbed by the throat.

But rather than have the March of Dimes lose popular support for the useful work it does, I would rather see this struggle carried out by a political arm and an aggressive grassroots movement.

CANCER CAN BE CAUSED by such substances as lead, chromium, vinyl chloride, benzene, PCB, chloroform, arsenic, uranium and cadmium, according to the National Institute of Job Safety. Birth defects fighters will be interested to know these materials are also credited with causing mutations. Clearly someone is going to have to intervene in the work place on this problem. In addition people must take action against radiation dangers, and lay it on the line to Congressmen and Senators about environmental hazards.

The American Cancer Society enjoys support of 85 percent of the American people. It would be too bad to jeopardize this with gut fighting, boycotting products or putting a picketline around a corporate headquarters.

But there is a growing feeling that the cancer struggle must move in new directions. The federally funded National Cancer Institute has come under fire recently for what its own president admitted was its "simplistic" approach in fighting cancer in the laboratory alone.

DONALD KENNEDY as head of the FDA has referred to the government's part in the war on cancer as a "medical Vietnam." Vast amounts of mon-

ey were poured in, but there have been few signs of victory.

The fact that researchers can only tell us that anywhere from 60-90 percent of cancer is environmental reflects the lack of hard research on the subject. In Parade magazine recently Dr. Sidney Wolfe of the Ralph Nader offshoot, the Health Research Group said: "The government estimates that at least 20 percent of cancer is occupational. That's 70,000 to 80,000 cancer deaths each year."

Here are a few news items on cancer and birth defects that indicate the need for citizens action.

- When industries using lead began removing pregnant women from exposure to this substance because of the possibility of fetal damage, the American Cyanamid Co. studied medical literature to unearth all the substances that might affect fetal development. They implicated 30 substances such as lead, mercury and vinyl chloride. Scientists have also begun to consider that fetal difficulty could come from a damaged sperm as well as a damaged egg.

- The General Accounting Office has said that the \$9-billion-a-year cosmetics industry has been found to be using 125 ingredients suspected of causing cancer. About 25 are suspected of causing birth defects.

- The National Cancer Institute says that 17 percent of all environmentally-caused cancers are induced by asbestos.

- Dr. Robert Harris of the Environmental Defense Fund has a list of 15 chemicals used as fabric finishers, many of which are involved in the permappress process in clothing. He says that they contain either mutagenic or carcinogenic properties.

- A White House task force this year called for reducing the exposure of Americans to man-made radiation, particularly x-rays. It said half the public's exposure to radiation is from natural causes. But nearly 90 percent of the rest is from medical and dental x-rays and radioactive material used for treatment and diagnosis.

A Public Citizen Health Group study found that x-ray machines used in 28 National Cancer Institute mammography clinics showed a wide range of radiations doses emitted. Could this be true of the rest of the nation's x-rays?

Surely it is time to start getting tough. Products must be banned, toxic wastes must be monitored and not abandoned indiscriminately, unions and companies must join to produce a safer workplace. X-ray machines must be better regulated. Trucks, trains and ships carrying toxic substances must be routed away from heavily populated areas.

It won't be easy to make such basic changes in American life. First we need citizen awareness. Next grass roots political muscle.

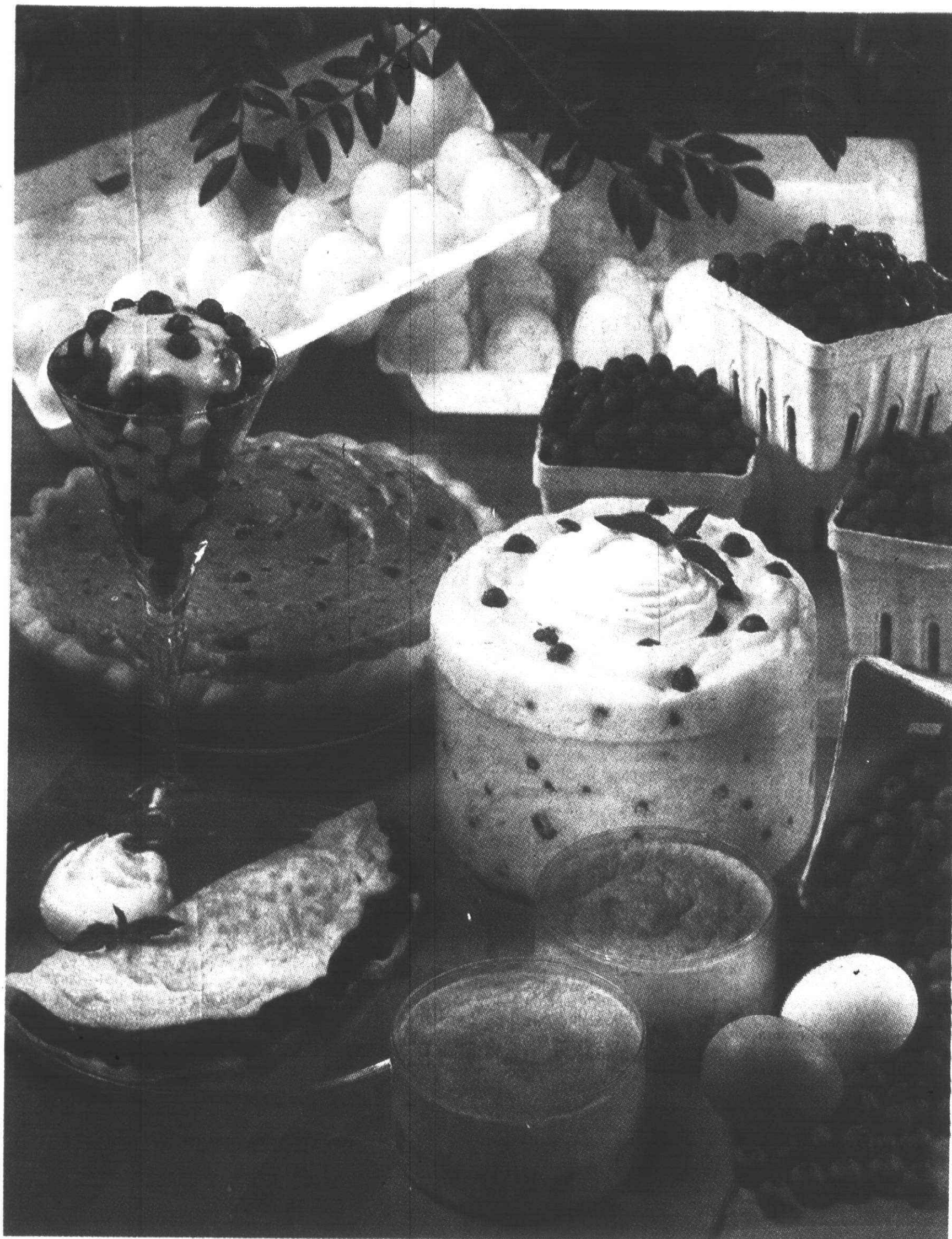

Eggs, blueberries star

Mark Twain once suggested that you put all your eggs in one basket — and then watch the basket.

If it's a blueberry basket that the eggs are going into, you can be sure it will bear watching. Otherwise, the delicious treats that are made with eggs and blueberries will disappear right before your eyes.

"Who can help loving the land that has taught us 685 ways to dress eggs?" Irish wit Thomas Moore wrote in the 19th century. And who cannot admire the generations of American homemakers who have created a seemingly endless repertoire of blueberry dishes since the early 17th century?

The Pilgrims were introduced to this native berry by the friendly Indians who greeted the Mayflower pioneers. As a matter of fact, dried blueberries helped keep the Pilgrims alive during that first harsh winter.

Try the recipes given here. They make up into eggs-traordinary blueberry treats. Surely one or another will fit into your life style. Maybe all of them.

BLUEBERRY SPONGE CUSTARD

1 c. fresh blueberries
 1/2 c. sugar
 3 T. flour
 3 eggs, separated
 1 c. milk
 3 T. lemon juice
 2 T. butter, melted
 1/4 t. salt
 1/4 t. cream of tartar

Divide blueberries among 6 (6 oz. each) custard cups. In mixing bowl combine sugar and flour. Blend in milk, egg yolks, lemon juice, butter and salt. In large mixing bowl beat egg whites and cream of tartar until stiff but not dry, just until whites no longer slip when bowl is tilted. Gently fold yolk mixture into egg whites. Pour into custard cups over blueberries. Set cups in 13x9x2 baking pan. Pour very hot water into the pan to within 1/4 inch of top of custard mixture. Bake in pre-heated 350-degree oven until cake tester inserted near center comes out clean, 30-35 minutes. Immediately remove cups from water. Cool at least 5 minutes before serving or cool completely.

BLUEBERRY OMELET

2 eggs
 2 T. water
 1/4 t. salt
 1/4 to 1 T. butter
 1/2 c. fresh blueberries or blueberry sauce (see below)
 dash pepper

Mix eggs, water, salt and pepper with fork. Heat butter in 8-inch omelet pan or fry pan over medium-high heat until just hot enough to sizzle a drop of water. Pour in egg mixture. Mixture should set at edges at once. With pancake turner turned over, carefully push cooked portions at edges toward center so uncooked portions flow to bottom. Tilt pan as necessary so uncooked eggs can flow. Slide pan rapidly back and forth over heat to keep mixture in motion and sliding freely.

While top is still moist and creamy-looking, fill with warm blueberries. With pancake turner fold in half or roll, turning out on to plate with a quick flip of the wrist.

BLUEBERRY CHIFFON PIE

1 pint fresh blueberries
 1/2 c. sugar, divided
 1 envelope, unflavored gelatin
 1/2 c. milk
 4 eggs, separated
 1 T. lemon juice
 1 t. grated lemon rind
 1/4 t. cream of tartar
 1 (9-inch) pie shell, baked
 Blueberries, optional
 Whipped cream, optional

Measure one cup blueberries into blender container. Blend just until mashed, 10-15 seconds. Set aside. In saucepan stir together 1/4 cup sugar and gelatin. Blend in milk and let stand 1 minute. Stir in mashed blueberries, egg yolks, lemon juice and rind. Cook and stir over low heat until bubbly, about 5 minutes. Chill, stirring occasionally, until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from a spoon, 45-60 minutes. In large mixing bowl beat egg whites and cream of tartar at high speed until foamy. Add remaining 1/4 cup sugar, 1 tablespoonful at a time, beating constantly until sugar is dissolved (rub just a bit of beaten egg whites between thumb and forefinger to feel if sugar is dissolved), and whites are glossy and stand in soft peaks. Fold in chilled blueberry mixture and remaining whole berries. Pile mixture into pie shell. Chill until firm, at least 3 hours. Garnish with whipped cream and additional blueberries, if desired.

BLUEBERRY EGGNOG

1 egg
 1/4 c. cold milk
 1/4 c. blueberries
 1 T. honey

Combine all ingredients in blender and blend until smooth.

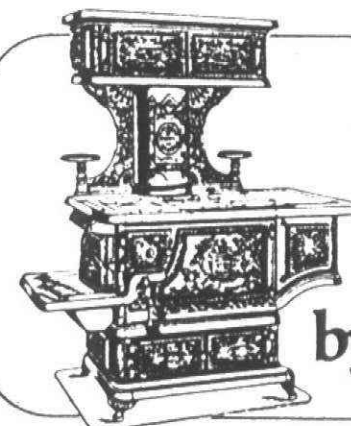
BLUEBERRY YOGURT SOUFFLE

6 to 8 servings

1/2 c. sugar, divided
 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
 1/2 c. cold water
 6 eggs separated
 1 carton (8 oz.) lemon flavored yogurt
 1/2 t. cream of tartar
 1 c. whipping cream
 1 pint fresh blueberries

Butter bottom and sides of 1 1/2-quart souffle dish. Sprinkle lightly with sugar. Make 4-inch band of triple-thickness aluminum foil long enough to go around dish and overlap 2 inches. Lightly butter one side of band and sprinkle with sugar. Wrap around outside of dish with sugared side in. Tie with string or fasten with tape. Collar should extend 2 inches above rim of dish. In saucepan stir together 1/4 cup sugar and gelatin. Blend in water and let stand 1 minute. Cook and stir over low heat until gelatin dissolves, about 3 minutes. Remove from heat and let stand 5 minutes. Blend in egg yolks. Cook and stir over low heat 2-3 minutes longer. Remove from heat. Blend in yogurt. Chill, stirring occasionally, until mixture mounds slightly when dropped from a spoon, about 25-30 minutes. In large mixing bowl, beat egg whites and cream of tartar at high speed until foamy. Add remaining sugar, 1 tablespoonful at a time, beating constantly until sugar is dissolved and whites are glossy and stand in soft peaks. Whip cream until stiff. Gently but thoroughly fold yolk mixture and whipped cream into egg whites. Fold in blueberries, reserving few for garnish. Carefully pour into prepared dish. Arrange reserved berries over top. Chill until set, several hours or overnight. Carefully remove foil band before serving.

NOTE: Dry-pack frozen blueberries can be used when fresh blueberries are not available in all recipes given here.

Friends, relatives, places, events come back with a haunting clarity. It is like the total recall that some melodies evoke of old times and old loves.

For cooking is an expression of love. Whether it is the bride's first concave birthday cake for her new husband, or a great-grandmother's last batch of currant tarts for her family, the intangible ingredient is love.

And when grown men become misty-eyed recalling their mother's or grandmother's cooking, it's not the taste alone. The memories are flavored by the warmth, caring and pride that went into the preparation.

But to get away from being maudlin, there probably are a good many loving parents who couldn't cook a memorable meal if they tried. They will be remembered for their wit, their understanding, their fine minds.

And some day their grandchildren will reminisce (misty-eyed, of course) about a Stouffer's soufflé.

Peppers add relish to meat

BAZAAR TIME is coming, and I am always fascinated by those little jars of homemade jams, jellies, pickles and relishes the women concoct for their pantry booth.

Over the years, reputations have been built on these specialties. For one woman, it was watermelon rind pickles that were her claim to fame. Another's mustard sauce for meat was eagerly awaited from one year to the next.

Last weekend, our hostess opened a jar of her first batch of pepper jelly. It turned out to be the perfect complement to the meat course.

Peppers are now in good supply and will be until the frost "gets" the locally grown supply. The pepper jelly would be a great seller at a preholiday bazaar. Norma makes two kinds — one with commercial thickening and one without. The thickened one is much sweeter, but both are delicious. She said some people mix the red and green sweet peppers but she makes separate batches — all red, or all green.

PEPPER JELLY (SWEET)

2 c. ground sweet peppers
 4 c. granulated sugar
 1 c. vinegar
 1 c. liquid from peppers with water added to make one cup.
 1/4 c. lemon juice
 1 bottle Certo.

Grind peppers and drain off liquid, which should be saved. Put peppers, sugar, vinegar and pepper liquid plus water in saucepan and heat to boiling point. Stir constantly. Remove from heat and let stand for 15 minutes. Reheat to boiling point; add lemon juice and Certo; boil for two minutes.

Remove from heat; skim; stir for five minutes. Fill sterilized jars and seal.

PEPPER RELISH (TART)

12 red or green sweet peppers
 1 1/2 lb. sugar
 1 pt. vinegar

Chop or put peppers through food chopper. Sprinkle one tablespoon of salt over chopped peppers and let stand for three or four hours. Pour off liquid; add sugar and vinegar. Cook until thick. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.

Ever see a maiden's blush

The apple harvest is on with its weekend trips to orchards and cider mills — truly one of Michigan's finest seasons.

A good apple pie can be heavenly. A poor apple pie can be as appetizing as cardboard and library paste.

Grandmother Watson's family was proud of her apple pies. It was said they were the first to go at church suppers. Maybe it had something to do with the apples.

In memory, I can place every tree in grandmother's orchard. First of the season were the Red Astrakhans and the Yellow Harvest apples. Then came the Yellow Transparents that bore every other year and made the best apple sauce because they cooked to an almost fluffy consistency.

Up on the hill was the Maiden's Blush — marvelous for apple pies. And there were the Tolman Sweets for apple dumplings and baked apples. Later on the Northern Spies, Russets, Greenings, Pippins and Baldwins were packed away for winter munching and cooking. Remember the Kings with their fat stems and almost yellow pulp? I haven't seen one in years.

When the orchard was planted, about 1875, those now popular and perfect Delicious were completely ignored. And no one missed them. Maybe they hadn't been developed at that time.

Modern houses aren't built for the preservation of barrels of crisp apples — modern basements are too well heated. And whatever became of the Russets, the Pippins and the Tolman Sweets? Has anyone seen a Maiden's Blush lately?

APPLE DUMPLINGS

2 c. sifted pastry flour
 1/2 t. salt
 4 t. baking powder
 1 T. sugar
 1/2 c. shortening
 1/2 c. milk
 6 medium apples
 Brown sugar and cinnamon

Mix and sift flour, salt, baking powder and sugar. Cut in shortening. Add milk to make a soft biscuit dough. Roll to one quarter inch thickness. Cut dough into six squares. Place cored and pared apples in center of each. Fill the cavity of each apple with a mixture of brown sugar and cinnamon. Draw dough up around apples. Moisten to seal top then pierce dough with fork. Place in a greased baking dish and bake in 375-degree oven until apples are tender, about 40 minutes. Serve warm with cream and sugar or with custard sauce.

Elayne Stulberg, the happy cooker, is new columnist

As a child, Elayne Stulberg never followed her mother around the kitchen, studying culinary form, begging to help.

The Observer & Eccentric's new food columnist got into cooking only after she was married, and dinner guests at her West Bloomfield home clamored for her recipes.

"My mother was a career woman. The last place she wanted to be was the was in the kitchen. I used to plead for

dinner dates," Mrs. Stulberg jokes.

During her first year of marriage to dentist David Stulberg she rarely went near a stove. Then "my husband started bringing me every cookbook he could get his hands on."

Determined to stay home as her five children were growing up, Mrs. Stulberg "started fiddling around in the kitchen. When you have three little ones in diapers, you have to have a more creative outlet than the trips to the diaper pail," she laughs.

As she tried out various recipes, she

added "a little of this and a little of that. I didn't know how good I was until I gave a dinner party," she says. Friends wanted her recipes. They wanted to watch her cook.

Her reputation as a cook and food writer, lecturer and teacher grew from there.

MRS. STULBERG'S COLUMN, titled after her cookbook "The Happy Cooker," will cover all facets of food — from seasonal recipes to dining out.

She believes the Observer & Eccentric's new food section is being launched at a time when women are feeling free to return to the kitchen in the wake of women's liberation.

"People stopped cooking for awhile," she says. "They took company out to eat. Now it seems they are turning back into their homes as in olden times."

Although the rising cost of food, services and fuel has something to do with it, Mrs. Stulberg thinks it would have happened anyway.

"Women basically love cooking," she says. "They feel very creative about it."

Her cooking classes include "even elderly women who want a new slant."

LIKE ORDINARY COOKS, Mrs. Stulberg acknowledges, "I never know until that morning what I'm going to make for dinner."

Cooking skills can be acquired, she says, but the distinction between good and great cooks "is probably something

inside. Eye appeal is almost as important as taste," she adds.

The happy cooker believes the most important ingredient to fine cooking is "love of good food. And I love good food."

She spurns fast food restaurants, saying "I'd rather starve than eat something I don't like."

Mrs. Stulberg is currently at work on a second cookbook, featuring recipes from around the world. Her first book was devoted to gourmet dishes for weight-conscious people.

It seems only days ago that youngsters were happily chanting, "School's out, school's out. Teacher let the monkeys out."

Where did the summer go? After approximately 2½ months of relaxed schedules, respite from chaffering youngsters hither and yonder, simplified get-me-out-of-the-kitchen warm weather meals, five children's constant trekking to the refrigerator for "snacks" and "something cold to drink," and my sun-up to sun-down job as bad mouth arbitrator and fight referee — it has finally come to a close.

Our children are now back at their respective schools composing the standard fall essay on "How I Spent My Summer." My youngsters will probably sum up the entire vacation by answering — "listening to Mother yell!"

As for me, after bidding the children a fond (?) farewell that first day of school, I could hardly contain my eagerness at the prospect of spending several luxurious hours doing as I wished. However, after a few hours of solitude, I found the quiet maddening. After better than 80 days of living with a mental check list of plans to activate on day-one of school, sans children, I wound up staying home.

Instead of pursuing any of my eagerly anticipated interests, I spent several hours baking cookies for my noisemakers' late day homecoming.

Amidst shrieks of "We're home" and "I'm starving," interspersed with "What smells so good?" came squeals of delight as they whiffed the spicy aroma of fresh oven baked cookies deliciously scenting the entire house while waiting on cooling racks to greet them.

Their enthusiastic ooohs and aahhhs as they devoured them were almost enough to erase

thoughts of our enforced togetherness during the past 80 days.

The arrival of this season brings with it the desire to employ some heavier and heartier food preparation than most of us practiced during the warm summer months. And my first step in that direction is usually in the form of baking. After all, what arouses greater gratification from youngsters upon their return from school than golden brown cookies still warm and fragrant from the oven?

Any homemaker desirous of an image builder with youngsters should try the "assorted cookie routine" on them. And since most cookies are exceptionally simple to make, it is one of the first items the kitchen novice should attempt. Also, what better promotes closeness and aids open communication between parent and child than the joy of baking together?

Keep the freezer and cookie jar full of these recipes. The delectable bits of love from you to your family bring an indescribable joy and leaves, in its wake, memories to treasure.

BIRDNEST COOKIES

Cream ½ cup butter with ¼ cup brown sugar. Add 1 beaten egg yolk (reserve white). Blend in 1 cup sifted flour. Roll dough into small round balls, using ½ tsp. per cookie. Beat egg white slightly and dip cookie into it and then into 1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts. Indent center with spoon tip or finger and set on greased cookie sheet about 1 to 1½ inches apart.

Bake in preheated 350-degree oven for 8 minutes. Remove, press centers again and spoon approximately ¼ tsp. strawberry jam into centers. Add 1 chocolate chip to jam center of each cookie. Return to oven for an additional 10 minutes. Makes 2 dozen. Freezes beautifully.

SNOW BALLS

Cream 1 cup butter (or margarine). Add 4 tbsp. powdered sugar, 1 tsp. rum, 2 cups sifted flour and 1 cup chopped pecans. Set on ungreased baking sheet, approximately 1 inch apart and bake in pre-heated 350-degree oven for 15 minutes. While still warm (but not immediately from oven or they will crack) gently drop into a bag of powdered sugar. Makes 6 dozen. Freezes beautifully.

KICHLACH

Sift together 1½ cups enriched flour, 2 tbsp. sugar and ¼ tsp. salt. Make a well in the center of dough. Add 3 medium eggs, beating until all is formed into a smooth ball.

Lightly grease a cookie sheet and drop from teaspoon 1 inch apart. Bake in preheated 325-degree oven for 20 minutes or until lightly browned at edges. Makes 3 dozen.

COOKIE CRUNCH

Sift together 1½ cups flour, ½ tsp. baking soda and 1 tsp. salt. Cream ½ cup butter (or margarine), ½ cup brown sugar and ¼ cup granulated sugar until light and fluffy. Beat in 1 egg and 1 tsp. vanilla to butter-cream mixture. Add flour mixture to cream mixture, blending thoroughly. Stir in ¼ cup chopped almonds and ¼ cup chocolate chips. Drop by teaspoon ungreased baking sheet. Bake in 375-degree oven for 10 minutes. Makes 5 dozen.

BUTTERSCOTCH COOKIES

Sift together 4 cups flour, 1 tsp. baking soda, 1

tsp. cream of tartar and a pinch of salt. Cream 1 cup butter (or margarine), 2 cups brown sugar firmly packed until light and fluffy. Beat 2 eggs and 1½ tsp. vanilla. Add dry ingredients and ¾ cups coarsely chopped peanuts.

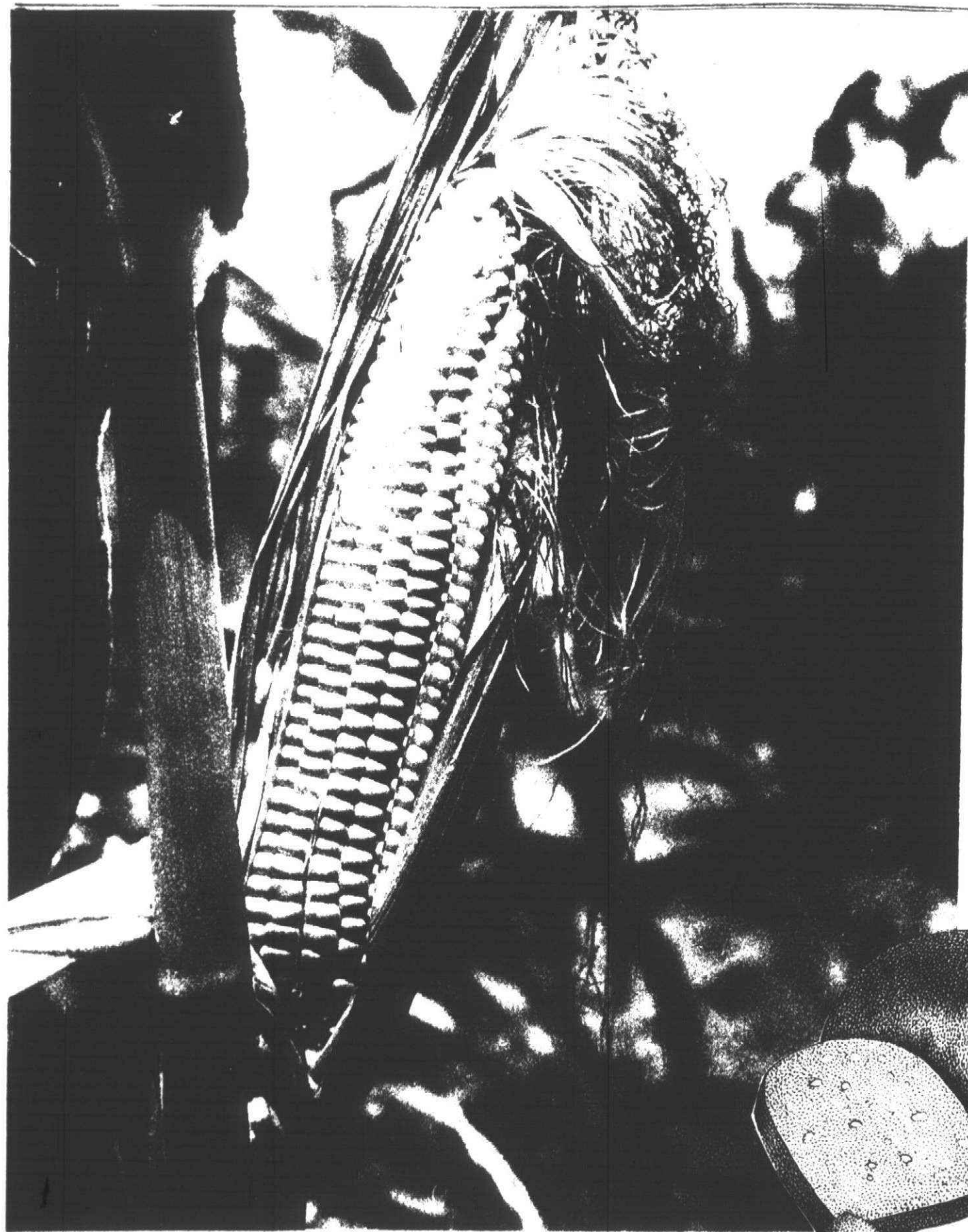
Shape into rolls. Wrap each in plastic wrap and chill until very firm. Slice thin and bake in preheated 400-degree oven 7-9 minutes. Makes approximately 6 dozen, 2-inch cookies.

FABULOUS BUTTER COOKIES

Cream ½ lb. butter with 1 cup brown sugar, which has been sifted. Add 2 egg yolks (reserve whites), 1 tsp. vanilla and 2½ cups sifted flour and mix all well. Roll in small balls (approximately ½ tsp. per cookie) and place on ungreased cookie sheet 2 inches apart. Lightly stir egg white to slightly frothy stage. Dip a fork into egg white and gently press tines onto cookie to flatten and make lined pattern. Repeat procedure for each cookie. Place nut or maraschino in center of each. Bake in preheated 325-degree oven for 20 minutes. Makes 6 dozen. Freezes beautifully.

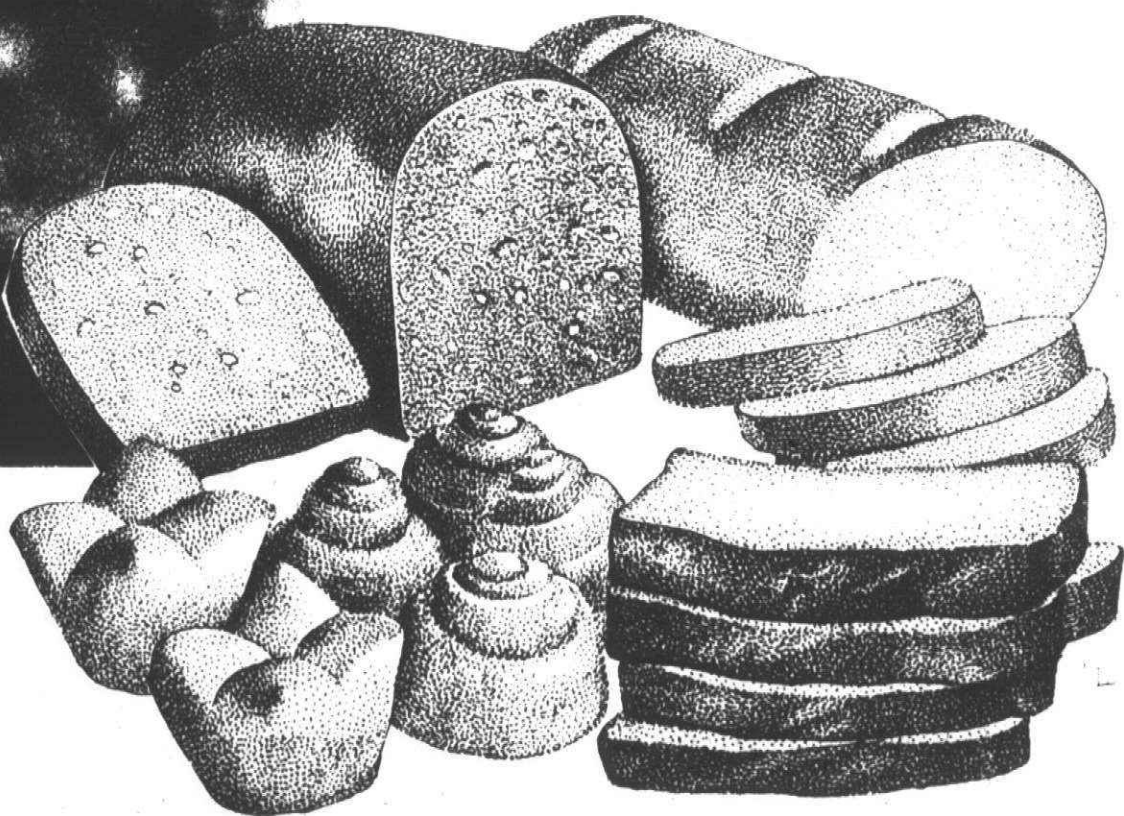

"I came across Julia Child's first book, Mastering the Art of French Cooking. The recipes intrigued me. I bought the book and it soon became my bible."

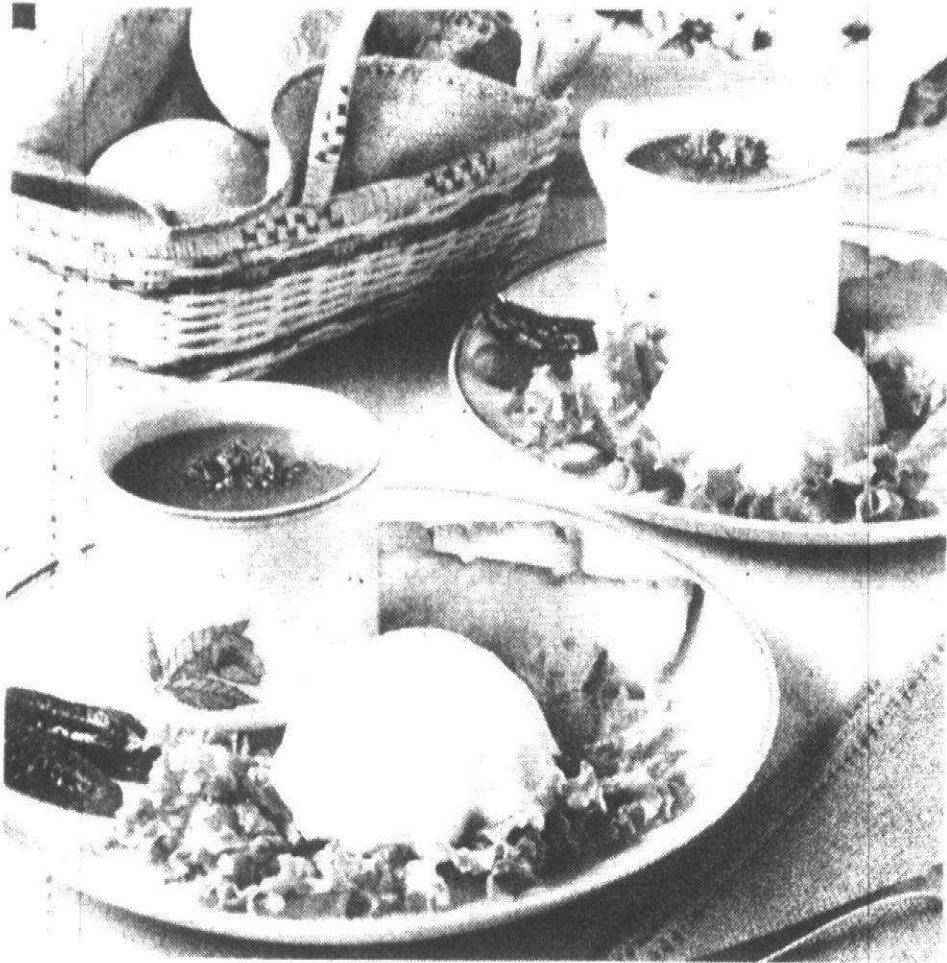
She remembers starting out with veal dishes and "various kinds of sauces. My first dessert was Black Forest cherry torte. Then I moved on to stuffed mushrooms."

Ms. Byrd says she has no special philosophies about preparing foods. "Sometimes spending a whole afternoon in the kitchen is just the thing. Other times, I'd rather put something together in five minutes."

"Living in the Detroit area is ideal for people who want to cook ethnic foods. There are so many ethnic restaurants that you know how it's supposed to turn out before you do it."

There's only one recurring flavor that pops up in her dishes, said Ms. Byrd. "I was born in South Carolina and sometimes the southern flavor is there."



Sunset salad

- 1 can (8 oz.) crushed pineapple in juice
- 1 package (3 oz.) lemon flavor gelatin
- 1/2 t. salt
- 1-1/2 c. crushed ice
- 1 T. lemon juice or vinegar
- 1 c. grated carrot

Drain pineapple, reserving juice. Add water to juice to make 3/4 cup and bring to a boil. Combine measured liquid, gelatin and salt in electric blender container. Cover and blend at low speed until gelatin is dissolved, about 1 minute. Add ice and lemon juice, cover and blend at high speed until ice is melted. Add pineapple and carrots and pour into a 4-cup mold or individual molds. Chill until firm, about 1 hour. Unmold. Serve with crisp lettuce, if desired. Makes 4 cups or 8 servings.

Cauliflower does well in Michigan

Mark Twain once said cauliflower was nothing more than cabbage with a college education. If this is true, Michigan's cauliflower growers "graduated" three million pounds in 1978 to maintain a sixth place rank in the U.S., according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Predictions are good for this year's harvest, primarily in Allegan, Macomb, St. Clair, Oceana, and Bay coun-

ties. Harvest usually begins in August and continues to November.

Cauliflower is excellent raw, cooked and combined with your favorite cheese sauce or topped with buttered bread crumbs and grated Parmesan cheese. Enjoy cauliflower sauteed in butter with almonds or try deep fried cauliflower dipped in batter and served with hollandaise sauce.

The Chinese believe in the man in the moon — and that's not all. They say a beautiful young woman, a rabbit and a three-legged toad also live there. All these moon beings play a part in their happy celebration when the Chinese combine the birthday of the moon with a Thanksgiving feast in the annual Harvest Moon Festival.

Byrd's Kitchen

Just for fun, and for a quick 10 points, what is the difference between beef tenderloin and hamburger? About \$4 a pound, you might say.

Good answer; but more than the cost. Imagine a setting where each might be served. Odds are you will think of the tenderloin in an elegant setting, perhaps with candlelight sparkling on crystal, china and silver.

Now the hamburger. What setting comes to mind immediately? The local burger-and-fries joint, eating from paper plates on the patio; or maybe just a low-cost meal.

Notice the difference. A not-so-subtle material element has crept into the kitchen. The rich eat the prime — and expensive — cuts. Ordinary folks eat the hamburger.

SIMILARLY, in the vegetable section, cabbage has traditionally been less costly than lettuce, so coleslaw seems to have gained an undeserved reputation as a poor relative to tossed salad. We all know cabbage is peasant food.

And, those chicken and other fast-food outfits that serve coleslaw in little plastic or paper cups have done little to enhance its reputation.

It does not seem unreasonable to me that even a hungry diner, faced with such packaging, would consider the food inside not worth bothering about.

Coleslaw should sue.

There is little chance that coleslaw will completely replace tossed salad as the number one raw green vegetable accompaniment to American dinners.

However, the following two recipes should help move coleslaw back into its rightful place as a strong contender.

SWEET AND SOUR COLESLAW

- 4 c. grated cabbage
- 1/2 green pepper, chopped
- 1/2 red pepper, chopped (optional)
- 1 onion, minced
- 1 c. sugar
- 1 c. vinegar
- 1/2 c. salad oil
- 1/2 c. water
- 1 t. salt

Combine and stir together all ingredients. Let stand for six hours. One carrot may be substituted for the red pepper. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

CABBAGE SALAD

Slice across the cabbage half (makes narrow strips) until you have 3 cups. Combine 2 tablespoons salad oil or olive oil, 1 tablespoon cider vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon sugar, 1/8 teaspoon salt or salt to taste, dash of coarse grind black pepper, and 2 tablespoons finely chopped onion. Pour over cabbage and marinate one hour. Garnish with chopped parsley. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Cookbook review

'this can't be healthy, ...because i like it!

Enticing grandchildren to eat what's good for them can be one of the most difficult tasks a grandparent can face.

That's why I was delighted when a book of recipes that takes the "junk out of snack foods" crossed my desk.

The cookbook is entitled "This can't be healthy — I like it." It is the product of Concern Inc., Detroit Branch, One Northfield Plaza, Troy, 49098. Copies are available by sending \$3.95 plus 16

cents tax and 60 cents postage to that address.

The recipes come from volunteers, and proceeds from the sale will be used to benefit Concern's environmental education program. The book is printed on recycled paper, and at 74 pages, it's a nice size.

ONE OF the book's premises is that kids will eat the snacks they help make themselves. Older children can, of course, do it all themselves.

The recipes allow you to whip up

such goodies as instant applesauce, carrot crunch or carrot biscuits and our own granola bars.

For a lunch try pizzas made with whole wheat baskets, topped off with vanilla pudding or blender ice cream. For a gardening experience, you even can grow your own alfalfa sprouts; the book includes a seed packet.

Between lunches, snack on "fruit leathers."

To make your own leather, you need two cups of fruit of your choice, perhaps apples at this time of the year.

Wash the fruit, but do not peel; remove seeds or pits. Cut into small pieces and puree in blender with enough water to make two cups puree. Season to taste with spices and add honey to sweeten.

Line a cookie sheet with wax paper that has been oiled on both sides; spread the puree evenly about 1/2 inch thick and dry in a low oven (150-180 degrees) overnight.

In the morning, while still warm, turn out the leather, peel off the paper and put on fresh wax paper. Roll and store in cool dry place.

Harvest Moon shrimp

dancing and good foods. The Chinese favor festival dishes prepared in round shapes to honor the moon.

Moon-shaped shrimp medallions are complemented by the flavor of sauteed Chinese cabbage (bok choy) or celery cabbage.

PAN FRIED SHRIMP MEDALLIONS WITH CHINESE CABBAGE (8-10 servings)

- 1 lb. Chinese or celery cabbage
- 1 lb. shrimp
- 3 1/2 c. water chestnuts, minced

- 1 slice fresh ginger root, minced
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 t. cornstarch
- 1/2 t. salt
- Dash pepper
- 1/4 c. cooking oil
- 2 T. cooking oil

Cut cabbage stems into half inch sections and blanch. Tear leaves into bite-size pieces.

Shell, devein and mince cooked shrimp. Combine shrimp, water chestnuts, green onion and ginger root. Mix in beaten egg. Add cornstarch, salt and pepper. Form mixture into small

cakes, about 1/2 inch thick and 1 1/2 inches in diameter. Chill, covered, about one hour.

Heat 1/4 cup oil in a large skillet. Fry shrimp cakes over medium heat until golden brown on both sides. remove and drain on paper towels. Keep warm.

Add remaining oil to skillet and heat. Add cabbage stems and leaves and cook, stirring, until leaves are wilted and stems are tender crisp. Serve at once with shrimp medallions.



Seasoned tomatoes

- 3 T. seasoned butter
- 1 small green pepper, cut into rings
- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 6 small tomatoes, cut into wedges (about 1 1/4 cups)

Melt seasoned butter in skillet. Add green pepper and onion and saute until just tender, about 4 minutes. Add tomato wedges; cook and stir gently for about 2 minutes. Makes 3 cups or 6 servings.

SEASONED BUTTER: Stir one envelope cheese garlic, old fashioned French, Italian or garlic salad dressing mix into 1/4 cup softened butter or margarine. Store covered in refrigerator.

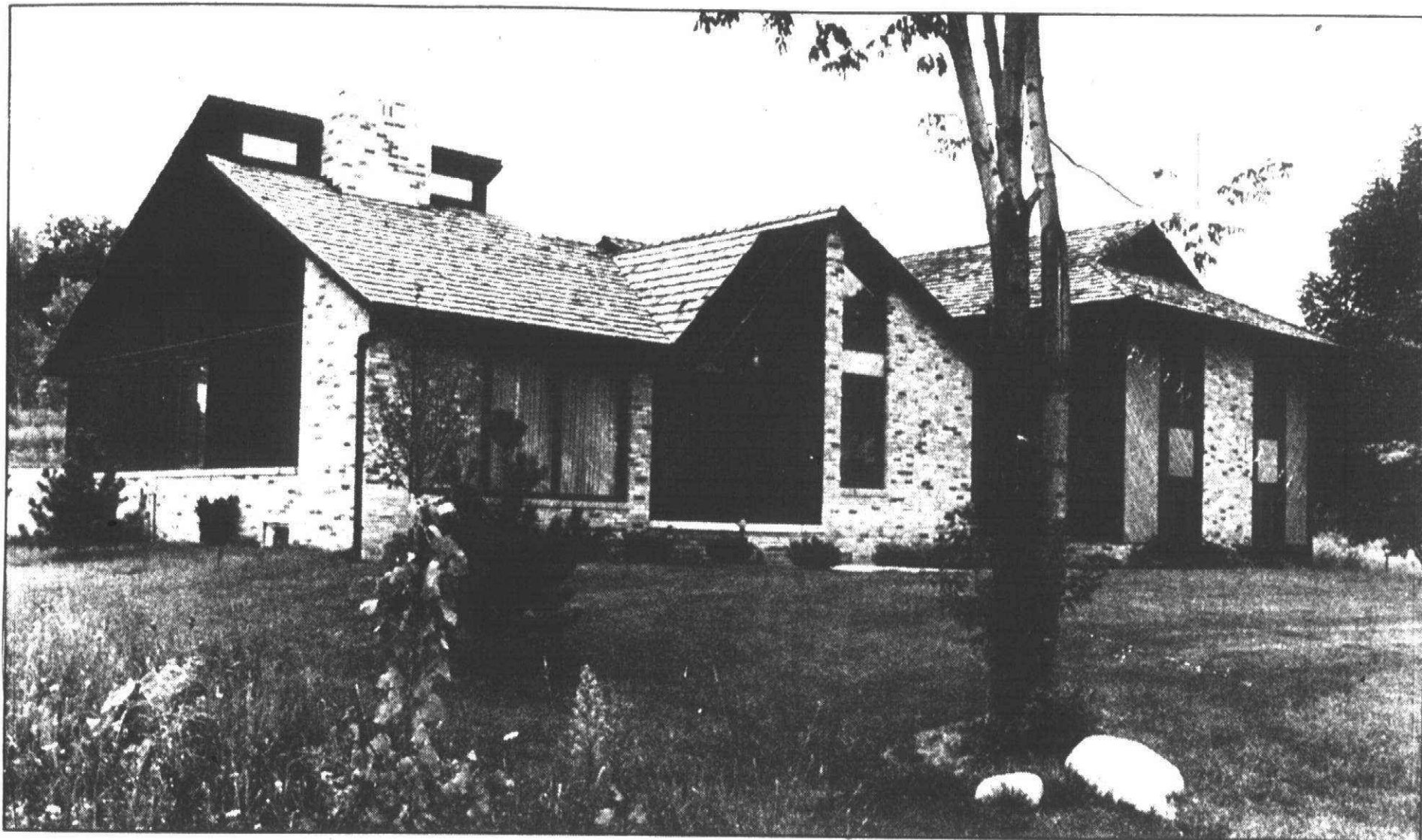
"A person can't spend all her time playing bridge or on the golf course," said Helen. "And I have been to Plymouth, Mass., so many times, I decided to put it all together."

He prefers to build his own houses

Mary Sullivan of Plymouth Township has one drawer in her kitchen "with not much in it."

She has it despite the fact that she is not a newlywed without that vital array of cooking essentials that grows in kitchens. She's been married long enough to have three grandchildren.

Her recipe for having what most of the rest of us only dream of lies in having a husband who enjoys building houses. It could be called his hobby.

Her hobby is sewing . . . when she's not helping build houses.

THEIR NEW HOUSE on Northampton is the sixth that Floyd Sullivan has built for his wife and family.

Four were in Indiana, which is where the Sullivans come from, and where members of Sullivan's family were in the construction business. He had some experience in the business when he was in high school.

Sullivan is a sales representative for Ford Motor Co., and when they were moved to Michigan, they settled in Northville. In 1974, they decided it would be a good idea to build another house. They chose a location near their present home, on Colony Farms, and lived there until March when they moved into their present dwelling.

In building both Plymouth Township houses, Sullivan was assisted by his son, who recently has gone into the construction business in Denver, Colo.

Their three daughters are married

and live in Cincinnati, Cleveland and Wilmington, Del., so the Sullivans share the new house with only a very large German shepherd named Shadow. With 2,500 square feet of living space, they've a lot of room for the grandchildren.

IN AN AREA STEEPED in colonials, the modern design of the tri-level attracts attention from passersby.

There's a lot of wood, both inside and out, and Sullivan did all the woodwork himself with an assist in staining from Mrs. Sullivan. Larry Lizzet of Milford drew up the architectural plans for the house.

On the outside of the house is brick, reversed batten rough-sawn plywood and diagonal spruce. Inside, there is a lot of white pine which has been stained a little darker than oak.

The 3½-car garage is Sullivan's pride and joy because it has plenty of room for tools and all the things that either grow in garages or follow men home to garages.

Although large, it is unobtrusive because it's at the side of the house and is screened from the road by trees.

Inside the house, emphasis is modern. Long windows in most of the rooms to bring in the colors of the outdoors.

A two-way fireplace highlights the formal living room and the family room. The cathedral ceiling, which peaks at the fireplace, is of plaster in the living room and wood in the family room. The latter also has two skylights.

And there really is a pit for conversation. It's in the family room and has

a rail around it, steps leading down and built-in benches.

The formal dining room soon will boast two stained glass windows.

BESIDES HAVING cupboard space to spare, the kitchen has Jennair cooking equipment, including a stove with Corning glass tops, and a grill in the center; a microwave oven and a regular oven; and an extra-large refrigerator-freezer.

There's a cooking island, which Mrs. Sullivan loves. It even boasts its own built-in mixing-blending system.

Other systems in the house provide central vacuuming and music.

The three bathrooms boast polished gold fixtures, and the washer and dryer are right outside the doors of the three bedrooms. They're in a closet with special lighting and fans.

The whole house has been so well insulated that Sullivan says his heating bills are about a third of those of his neighbors.

Still to be completed is the basement. "That will keep me busy all winter," Sullivan said. In it will be a huge gameroom and possibly a bedroom or two.

The Sullivans both say this will not be their final venture in house building. They may not decide to build another in Plymouth, but "Michigan winters are too cold to retire in," they say.

Eva McAllister will celebrate her 90th birthday Tuesday, Oct. 2 when 30 members of her family will meet at the Mayflower Hotel for dinner.

Seated in her attractive apartment in Northville Forest on Five Mile Road, she anticipated the party and looked back on her 47 years in the Plymouth community.

"I don't get out much but when I do go uptown, I hardly recognize the place."

When she and her husband moved to Plymouth from Clare, Mich. in 1932, their six sons ranged in age from 14-2 years. "The boys" are Jack of Plymouth, Roy of Lima, Ohio; Bill of Plymouth; Bruce of Florida; Jim of St. Louis, Mo.; and Elton of Plymouth.

Her husband, William, had worked for the State Highway Department in

Clare. He managed a Standard Oil station here.

EVA FAIST and William McAllister were born in Fairhaven Township in Huron County. Nearest town in the thumb community was Sebawing. Both taught school in one- and two-room school houses before they were married in 1915 in the home of the bride's parents.

"I taught for six years and my top salary was \$60 a month," said Mrs. McAllister. "But a dollar went a lot further then."

The McAllisters soon got into the swing of Plymouth life. They joined the Presbyterian Church and she sang in the choir there for 18 years. "I sang whatever they needed," she said, "contralto or soprano."

She joined the Woman's Club of Plymouth in 1932 and sang in their glee

club. She is now an honorary member.

"The last time I went, I knew only five members. They all were young women."

SHE ALSO sang at funerals for both Fred and Bud Schrader. They had funerals from the homes then and there was no accompaniment.

"I sang all the old hymns. The favorites were 'Abide with Me,' 'Nearer My God to Thee,' and 'Rock of Ages.' Hazel Moon and I used to sing duets for just about everything that was going on in Plymouth. Edna, the organist at the Methodist Church, accompanied us."

She added that in those days, everyone bought their groceries at Pettengills on Main Street.

"And with all I had to do, there was always a clean shirt for each of the boys and the meals were always on the

table on time. I was active in my home and I planned everything pretty well."

She worked as a volunteer at Northville State Hospital for 15 years.

SHE HAS BEEN a Detroit Tiger fan for as long as she can remember. Now failing eyesight prevents her reading fine print, "but I use my magnifying glass. And I watch television. I don't know how we got along without it."

"My husband loved to play golf. I guess you could say I was a golf widow. And all the boys but one play golf."

Eva and William McAllister celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1965. "We had a party at the Hilton — Thunderbird Inn it was then."

Her husband died the next year. She has 17 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

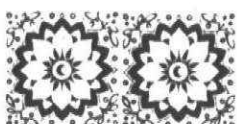

To Banff and beyond

Exploring nature's wildlife alleyways

Most travelers enjoy the well-known tourist attractions. In the Canadian Rockies, that means Banff, Lake Louise, Jasper and the glorious mountains in between.

Few American travelers realize that western Canada has a different geographical layout than the western United States, and that the mountains continue through 600 miles and three separate ranges to the Pacific.

That 600 miles includes mountain lodges, national parks, a town with its own Loch Ness monster, a gold rush ghost town, and a canyon so deep and wild that tourists once hired local people to drive them through it.

IF YOU LIKE glamor in the wilderness, start at Lake Louise where the faded elegance of the Chateau Lake Louise keeps constant watch over the mountain lake you have often seen in photographs.

If you want to see this wilderness as the explorers saw it, go another 22 miles along Highway 1 to the original Lake Louise, now called Emerald Lake, where the Emerald Lake Chalet and cottages look out over equal splendor.

The Canadian Pacific Railway brought train loads of people by rail and sled to this log cabin chalet at the turn of the century. It is one of several rustic hotels on jeweled lakes in the area.

You can sit on the veranda and watch mountains mirrored in the water at sunset, or fish the lake for splake, a cross between speckled trout and lake trout.

If verandas are not your pace, there is a horse corral across a small wooden bridge, maps to help you climb the peaks to Takakkaw Falls, and trails around the wing of water behind the hotel.

NATURAL BRIDGE, where the Kicking Horse River funnels furiously under a natural stone bridge, is on the way back to Highway 1 from Emerald Lake. Downstream at the salt lick, a family of moose will ignore you as they feed 20 feet off the road.

This is the country of moose and elk, but most of all, it is bear country. Here, summer workers wear bells on their shoes to let the bears know they are coming.

You could see bear anywhere along the Trans-Canada Highway from Banff National Park and Yoho National Park to Glacier National Park and the Rogers Pass. Men died trying to build a railroad line through that pass for 150 years after surveyors first saw it. They still occasionally close Rogers Pass when the snowslides are heavy.

Down-mountain, at Sicomous or Salmon Arm, you can choose between driving west through the Fraser Canyon or south through the Okanagan Valley to Vancouver. An interesting compromise is to detour through the Okanagan to Kelowna and then cut back 50 miles to cow country near Kamloops.

THE OKANAGAN is one of several long valleys running north and south between the Rockies and the sea. It's 90-mile-long, two-mile-wide lake runs past fruit orchards and vineyards and is the home of Ogoogo, a well-documented but unphotographed sea monster.

The Ogoogo is generally described as being "about 60 feet long, with a body like a serpent, three bumps along its length and a head like a sheep." The Indians made sacrifices to it before the white man came. Prospectors, doctors and drunks have seen it for 100 years; it is now an industry in the valley second only to fruit and wine.

A drive out of Kelowna passes the graves of the old Indian Chief

Pantherhead and his wife, Hummingbird, buried on a hill above a concrete floating bridge.

Drive on through Penticton and down the Hope-Princeton Highway to Vancouver, or retrace 50 miles to Kamloops to where drivers still tangle with cowboys and their cows on the highway. Fifty miles beyond Kamloops, at Cache Creek, a highway turns north to Barkerville, a gold mining ghost town that once was the largest city north of San Francisco.

MOST TRAFFIC TURNS south at Cache Creek to the Fraser Canyon, where the Thompson and Fraser Rivers join forces in a rush through Hell's Gate towards the sea.

When Simon Fraser made the first white man's voyage down this river canyon in 1808, he wrote, "We had to venture where no human being should go."

The present highway, high on the rocks above the great gorge, was once a fur brigade trail, a gold rush wagon trail and a gravel road where nervous

travelers hired local drivers to chauffeur them through until after World War II.

At Hell's Gate, where the mighty Fraser River is only 110 feet wide and 90 feet deep at low water, 34 million gallons a minute squeeze through the gap and millions of salmon struggle through the current to go upstream to spawn.

The salmon had as much trouble going upstream as Simon Fraser had going down until the government built massive fish ladders to help the fish along the 600 miles to the spawning grounds. There is now a cable car that rides 500 feet above the boiling river, giving tourists a view that even the explorers didn't see.

The first town west of the canyon is understandably called Hope. Here you follow the river through the lush delta country of the Fraser Valley to Vancouver and the sea. Vancouver is a world you recognize once again, in a polished setting where every street goes uphill to mountain peaks or downhill to the sea.

How the professionals keep on top of info

We may be one of the smaller planets in the solar system, but it takes a constant flow of information to keep us up-to-date about world travel trends. Have you ever wondered how a travel agent, or some other member of the travel industry, keeps informed about new hotels in Katmandu or new cruises on the Red Sea?

Familiarization trips are one way around the problem. These are fast, informative trips through a specific area. Every travel agent takes them.

Another way is through workshops given by national tourist bureaus and their associates in other tourist-related professions.

Last week, the Israel Government Tourist Office sent travel professionals from Israel to this area for an evening co-hosted by El Al Israel Airlines. Their goal was to distribute information to travel professionals here, so that more Detroit-area travelers will visit Israel.

The co-hosts of this reception were Ami Spektor of the Southfield office of El Al and Amnon Linn of Chicago, the Midwest director of the Israel Tourist Office. Spektor likes to say that Israel is so small the mapmakers must write the name on the Mediterranean Sea.

THE KEY WORDS AT the gathering were Israel and Egypt. The travel industry, here and in the Mideast, is eager to market the two countries as one package. That, however, depends on a vital air link between Cairo and Tel Aviv, which is still uncertain.

One link that has already been established between Israel and Egypt is a new cruise operation involving the Red Sea. Keppel Tours is selling space on a Greek ship, called Melody, which does a week-long cruise that includes Haifa, Alexander, Hurghada, Elath and a number of other Israeli-Egyptian stops. You can take the cruise in either direction, north or south through the Suez Canal and the Red Sea.

That's the kind of travel information that helps a travel agent give you the most current information about an area. Resources at this particular reception even included Israelis from hotel, transportation and tour companies, all of them eager to share information about their country.

Despite this informational resource, some travel agents still may not have the best or most current information on an area. In that case, I recommend you go directly to the national tourist office of the country that interests you, which is usually in either New York or Chicago. Telephone numbers can be found quickly by dialing the long-distance information operator for the city involved.

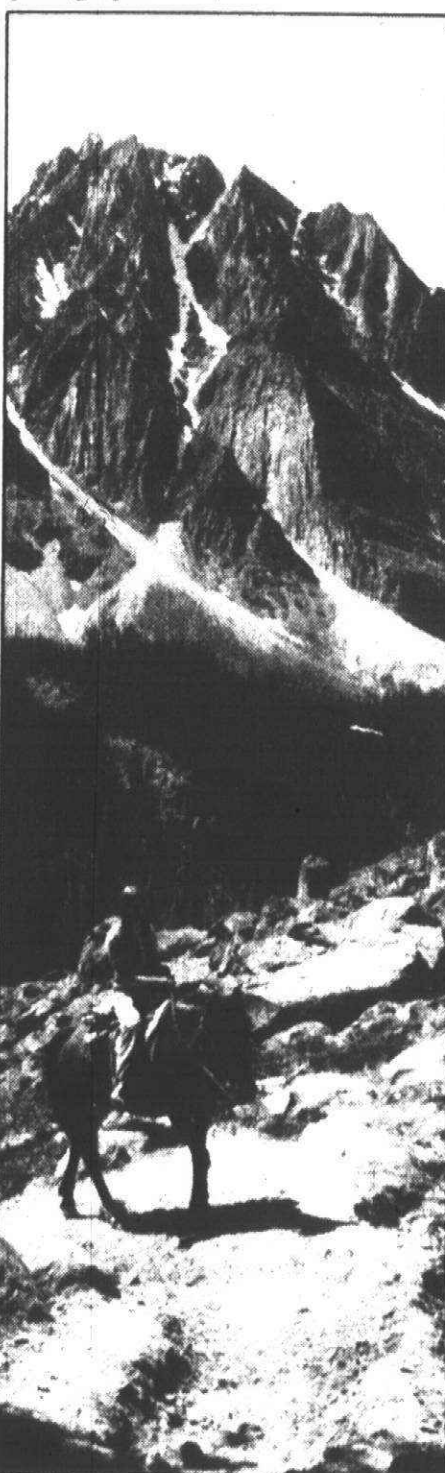

Guerrilla comedy produces laughter in 'Life of Brian'

If you were scared out of your sneakers by the summer's crop of film terror, relax. The fall and winter releases promise a wider range of entertainment with a goodly number of dramas and comedies, as well as disaster movies, space adventure, romance, sports stories, a musical and, of course, chillers.

Probably the zaniest movie, certainly the most irreverent, is one which just opened, "Monte Python's Life of Brian." It's a look at the gospels as interpreted by guerrilla comedy.

Other funny flicks, all scheduled for December openings, are Steven Spielberg's "1941," featuring John Belushi in a story about the Great Los Angeles Air Raid of early World War II, and "The Jerk," in which Steve Martin stars in a Horatio Alger tale directed by Carl Reiner. In marked contrast to the above, Art Carney, George Burns and Lee Strasberg comprise a trio of feisty seniors in the wry comedy, "Going in Style."

Finally, Peter Sellers and Shirley MacLaine are paired in "Being There," based on Jerzy Kosinski's wildly satirical novel of politics and culture.

OTHER FILMS mine the serio-comic and romantic vein. Julie Andrews is the live-in girlfriend abandoned by Dudley Moore in "10," as he searches for the perfect young beauty, the perfect "10."

Sean Connery finds romance and adventure during the revolution in "Cuba," while World War II provides the backdrop for the love affairs of GIs and English girls in "Yanks."

Youngsters create the interest in "Rich Kids," a movie about a couple of intelligent 12-year-olds coping with their parents' divorces.

"Time after Time," which opened at area theaters Friday, combines social comment, sci-fi and suspense in Nicholas Meyer's ingenious story of Jack the Ripper pursued by H. G. Wells in contemporary San Francisco after both fly off in Wells' time machine.

Serious dramas include "The Electric Horseman," in which Jane Fonda plays a TV reporter and Robert Redford is a down-and-out cowboy pitching a breakfast cereal. Al Pacino is a young criminal lawyer troubled by his conscience and the judicial system in "And Justice For All." Dustin Hoffman and Meryl Streep headline "Kramer vs. Kramer," the story of a woman who leaves her family in order to find herself.

THE DRAMATIC blockbuster of this fall and the most hyped film is Francis Ford Coppola's "Apocalypse Now," which will open Oct. 17. Coppola's vision of the Vietnam war is seen in terms of Joseph Conrad's exploration of the dark forces of human nature in "Heart of Darkness."

Other biggies include two space adventures. In "The Black Hole," Anthony Perkins, Yvette Mimieux and Joseph Bottoms are among the crew of a space ship which encounters another craft — commanded by Maximilian Schell — being pulled into the gravitational storm of a black hole. It's the most expensive film ever produced by Disney with enormous attention lavished on detail, design and special effects.

Another sci-fi adventure and one long awaited by millions of trekkies is "Star Trek." Most of the original cast is reunited on the starship Enterprise, which is called upon to halt an alien force that has destroyed Klingon cruisers and is heading into Federation space at warp seven.

Sci-fi of the disaster genre is represented by "Meteor," where the hunk of metal from outer space threatens to destroy planet Earth. A sturdy cast, including Sean Connery (a busy actor), faces the danger.

Several chillers, sports films and just one musical round out the roster. The musical is "The Rose," starring Bette Midler as a rock singer who acts and sounds like Janis Joplin but, they say, is not J.

Battery-powered car moves one step closer

Another step toward a mass-produced electric automobile for city use was made this week. General Motors announced the development of a zinc-nickel oxide battery that can store up to 2½ times as much energy as a conventional lead-acid battery.

The zinc-nickel oxide battery was displayed in a Chevette, which had the back seat replaced with batteries.

Although the zinc-nickel oxide battery has been around for 80 years, it has not been practical for use in a passenger automobile. Battery life has been too short because automobile batteries would have to be recharged almost every day.

"What our people have done is make major progress in improving components in the battery, so that the plates in it do not deteriorate and lose capacity and power after relatively few recharges," said E.M. Estes, GM president.

The first mass-produced electric vehicle will be either a small car for urban and commuter use or a delivery van for use in the city.

"Whichever it is, it will be a specially designed, specific-purpose vehicle for relatively short trips and for use within certain local areas," Estes said. The electric vehicle will have a top speed of 50 miles per hour, a range of 100 miles and a battery life of 30,000 miles, he said.

Electric cars are not being designed to operate long distances. They are being designed to make the most of two advantages:

Electrically powered cars and trucks create no

local pollution, which is especially important in dense urban areas.

Electrically powered vehicles do not require petroleum fuels. They operate on the power produced at an electric utility power station or, perhaps in the future, at a home power station.

"The electric vehicle will help take some of the pressure off petroleum only if we generate electricity with coal, nuclear power or hydropower. If we're going to generate electricity with petroleum, electric vehicles won't help with the country's energy problems."

Although the new battery system offers advantages, an electric vehicle can not be judged by the same standards as the long developed internal combustion powered car, he said.

"You can't really compare the cost of operating a gasoline car vs the cost of operating an electric by just measuring the electricity and the gasoline that go into them."

"In the case of the electric, you also have to figure the cost of the batteries, because at some point, they — unlike your conventional automobile engine — will have to be replaced well before the vehicle" is no longer usable, he said.

"Right now, when we look at the cost of operating an electric car with zinc-nickel oxide batteries, it comes out higher than, say, a gasoline-powered Chevette. But by the time we're ready to bring electrics to market, we hope they will be competitive on both initial purchase and operating costs."
