Revenue-sharing raise fattens finances

Fiscal year 1980 may wind up rosier than Canton officials originally thought.

Surprise action by the Michigan Legislature and Gov. William Milliken is expected to increase the township's share of state revenue sharing dollars and loosen a tight-fisted operating budget by approximately \$300,000.

For the first time in Canton's history, the township board approved a budget last October which showed a revenue decline from the previous year. The \$3.8 million budget — almost \$350,000 less than the 1979 operating fund —

forced the township board to take a hard-line stance on new hires and capital improvements.

Finance director Mike Gorman said the bulk of the predicted revenue decline was based on advice from the state that Canton would not get \$294,000 in revenue sharing funds which it received in 1979.

LAST WEEK, however, Supervisor Noel Culbert received word that Milliken had approved a special \$5 million allocation of state revenue sharing funds for Canton and other financially-pressed communities.

Based on estimates from State Rep. Robert Law, R-Livonia, and Janet Kintzer of the Michigan Office of Management, Gorman predicts that Canton will receive \$275,000 to \$324,000 as a result of the special allocation.

The special revenue sharing funds will be issued in August to communities which conducted their own population counts since the last federal census was conducted in 1970.

Gorman said township officials will be unable to earmark the special funds until June when the final amount of Canton's allocation is determined. He cautions that Milliken holds the power

to issue an executive order eliminating the special grant.

Gorman added, however, that Ms. Kintzer told officials at last week's convention of the Michigan Township Association that an executive order is unlikely.

The expected state monies will supplement a \$356,000 slice of Michigan revenue-sharing funds which the state has already committed to Canton for 1980.

STATE REVENUE SHARING funds are issued to communities on the basis of population. The grants represent a

municipality's share of state income tax, state sales tax and the single business tax.

But Michigan law requires the state to issue the funds only on the basis of federal censuses, which are conducted during the first year of each decade.

For the last several years, however, Canton and other communities which conducted their own mid-decade head counts have received additional state-revenue sharing funds on the basis of population increases.

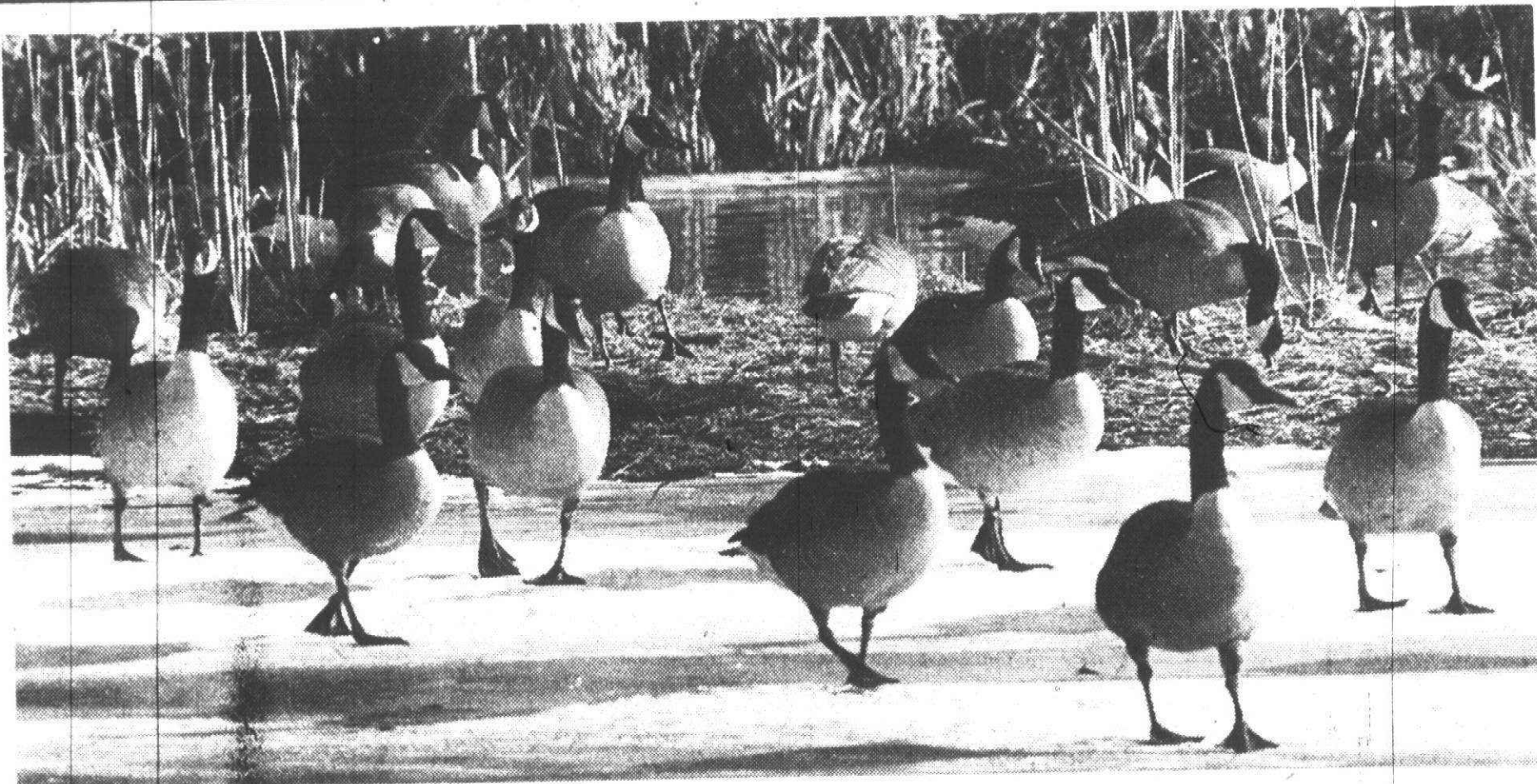
For Canton, which conducted a census in 1975, the practice meant six-digit fattening of township budgets. The

township's population was pegged at 11,000 when the 1970 census was conducted. In 1975, the figure had swollen to 26,000.

According to Supervisor Noel Culbert, state officials had expected Milliken to veto the special allocation this year.

Township officials are certain that the 1980 census will show another substantial increase in Canton's population figures. But Gorman says a movement in the Michigan Legislature to change the revenue-sharing formula could

Names do hurt bus driver finds

The chairwoman of the Plymouth-Canton bus drivers union was suspended without pay Tuesday for using a vulgar term in a discussion with a school district administrator last week.

Alice Horstead, who has worked as a bus driver for four years, was suspended for one day by Walt Bartnick, the district's labor relations chief.

According to a source, Mrs. Horstead called Bartnick "an asshole." Mrs. Horstead admitted she used the expression. But she added the conversation took place during non-working hours. She intends to file a grievance to oppose the suspension, she said.

"Do I think it's fair? No," she said. "Because I was on my own personal time. It was a personal thing between him and me."

The conversation occurred in a hallway at the district's transportation building Friday morning.

It is not known what Mrs. Horstead and Bartnick were discussing at the time. She would not discuss the details of her conversation with Bartnick, but she said it had nothing to do with labor negotiations.

THE CONVERSATION preceded a meeting between Bartnick and union officials. The bus drivers and school district have been negotiating a new contract prior to the expiration last July of the former pact.

Norm Kee, assistant superintendent of personnel, said the suspension was a "disciplinary action" that should remain private.

"When such statements are made in public we feel we ought to let the person know there's displeasure."

Kee said Mrs. Horstead had not broken any special rule. "It's called common courtesy. We can't draw rules for everything."

"We're not trying to moralize and tell people how to talk, but in a school district we're trying to educate our children. It's a little bit different than if you're in a plant or factory."

Asked if it mattered that the incident occurred during non-working hours, Kee said: "That has no great bearing. It's in the schools and in public, and they are still employees of the district."

Grade realignment ruled out, but bond to rise

The school board appears to be close to deciding on a \$20 million bond issue.

In a study session Monday night the board reached a consensus against grade realignment to relieve crowded conditions at the high schools.

The decision against realigning grades is expected to add about \$4.5 million to the bond proposal now under consideration.

Earlier that evening the trustees decided against a \$12.6 million proposal in favor of a \$16 million package in order to upgrade the planned renovations of Central Middle School.

With grade realignment apparently out of the picture, the board probably will now opt for a \$4.5 million classroom addition at the Plymouth Centennial Educational Park as a means of housing some 1,200 high school students.

Whatever package is finally agreed to by the board must be put before voters to approve. A date has not yet officially been set for a special bond election.

THE SCHOOL BOARD already has decided to handle elementary growth by expanding Extended School Year (ESY) and by using portable classroom units in high growth areas.

Growth in the middle school will be absorbed primarily by the rental of Lowell Junior High, on Hix south of Joy, from Livonia Public Schools and with portable classrooms.

That leaves deciding what to do with growth at the high school level as the remaining unresolved major issue.

The latest projections being being used indicate high school population will peak at about 6,000 in 1987-88, according to Superintendent John M.

Hoben. This will result in an increase of about 1,200 beyond the present capacity at the CEP.

Board President Tom Yack repeatedly reminded trustees Monday night that they had to decide what to do with the 1,200 students.

The board earlier had considered handling those 1,200 student students by realigning the grades — moving ninth grade back to the middle school level and sixth grade back to the elementary level.

The realignment would have relieved the crunch at the high schools without having to build new classroom space. The proposal was met by stern opposition, however, from three middle school principals and middle school staffs who argued the re-alignment would destroy the middle school concept in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

In a consensus poll Monday night, Yack and trustees Carol Davis and Flossie Tonda favored realigning the grades. Trustees opposed to re-alignment were Steve Harper, Elaine Kirchgatter, Sylvia Stetz and Richard Arlen.

Last month in a consensus poll the board had supported realignment by a 4-3 split. Arlen's change of position since December was the deciding vote Monday.

Principals speaking against realignment Monday night were: Robert Smith, West Middle; Gerald Elston, Pioneer Middle; and Gus Gorguze, Centennial Middle. Realignment had been supported by the central administration.

Dr. Barbara Bowman, director of elementary education, said she was not aware of any elementary principals who were opposed to the sixth grade moving back to the elementary level.

Deanna Huff, former chairman of a citizens' election committee, noted that in a public opinion survey taken most residents were not strongly opposed to realignment. Most seemed to believe in the survey, she added, that the middle school system could be retained even if the grade structure were changed.

RAY HOEDEL, assistant superintendent for business, gave a report to the board Monday on the impact on the operating budget on the bond proposal which included grade re-alignment.

Included in Hoedel's analysis were the costs of renting, equipping and operating Lowell Junior Lowell Junior High, of equipping and operating five more elementaries on ESY, and for maintaining programs with a re-alignment.

Lowell is expected to cost \$96,000 a year in rental payments, about \$40,000 to equip, and \$300,000 the first year to staff for operation. The operational cost is expected to rise to \$347,000 in 1984-85.

Help for mobile home owners

State bill wins support of tenants

A state bill that would place rent control on Michigan mobile home parks won the support of virtually every mobile home resident who spoke at a hearing on the proposed legislation this week.

Only one person — the owner of a trailer park — objected to the bill at the Monday afternoon hearing in Canton Township hall.

The public hearing was sponsored by State Rep. Tom Brown (D-Westland), a sponsor of the bill, and four other members of the House Committee on Towns and Counties.

Many in the audience of about 80 persons live in Canton trailer parks owned by Sheldon Futernick. The

tenants have complained to the Michigan Mobile Home Commission of excessive rent increases, improper trailer set-ups and a host of other grievances.

"I DON'T SEE how we can survive as mobile home tenants with rights without this bill," said C.J. Marshall, president of the Holiday Estates Mobile Homeowners Association.

House Bill 5247, currently under consideration of the Committee on Towns and Counties, would amend the Mobile Home Commission Act to provide for state control of park rental rates.

The law would require park owners to submit rate structures to the Michigan Mobile Home Commission on Jan.

1 each year along with the reasons for calculating rates. The commission would hold the power to approve or disapprove the rates.

A model rate structure established by the commission would be used at parks on an interim basis until approval of individual park rates was granted.

The bill would also empower municipalities to establish local mobile home councils. The councils would submit recommendations on park licensing, regulations and other matters to the state commission and local governing bodies.

The council would be comprised of a park resident, a park owner, appointees of the municipal police chief, fire

chief and planner, a municipal resident who does not live in a mobile home park, a representative of the municipal governing body, and a representative of the county health department.

"I think it's time for more participation on the local level to assure people that they're being treated fairly," said Brown, chairman of the House Committee on Towns and Counties. "I need not tell you of all the problems we've found to exist with mobile homes."

Brown, whose 37th District includes Canton Township, said a similar bill has been introduced in the Michigan Senate. Like its sister bill in the House, the Senate bill is currently in committee.

MOST PEOPLE who spoke in support of the bill at Monday's hearing made short statements concerning the need for rent control at the parks where they live. They cited a wide range of rental rates within the same park. One woman complained of rents which jumped from \$90 to \$140 a month within two years.

But Dennis Dukes of Belleville, a mobile home park owner, said state rent control would discourage park ownership and development in Michigan. He favored free-enterprise policies which would encourage park development and drive down rents through an increased supply.

"I believe this is an area problem," Dukes said of tenant complaints at Futernick parks. "I don't believe we should impose rent control on the entire state. This bill is heading into an

Canton resident promoted in W-W School District

Marshall Junior High's principal is the new assistant superintendent for employee relations in the Wayne-Westland school district. The board of education made official the appointment of Bill Taylor Monday night.

In his new post, the Canton Township resident will be responsible for negotiating contracts this year with six of the seven unions in the district. His salary will be nearly \$89,000.

Taylor's appointment was approved after the board heard a request from trustee Fred Warmbier to table the move.

Warmbier said the district needed someone with "expertise beyond the normal ability of the educational establishment." He urged the board to "look at the possibility of an outside negotiator who would be unbiased and independent to review union demands."

Warmbier's motion to table failed for lack of support. He later abstained when a vote was taken on Taylor's appointment. The vote was 6-0.

In recommending Taylor's appointment, Superintendent Timothy Dyer described Taylor as being "qualified and well-trained" for the position. Dyer

said that Taylor has worked as a field representative on negotiation teams in the past.

Taylor, 48, joined the district in 1959 as a teacher at Cady Elementary School. Interim assignments included responsibilities as coordinator of state and federal programs and acting director of personnel. Taylor also served as an assistant principal at Elliott and Kettering schools, and as principal at Tinkham before going to Marshall.

He holds bachelor's, master's and educational specialist degrees from Eastern Michigan University.

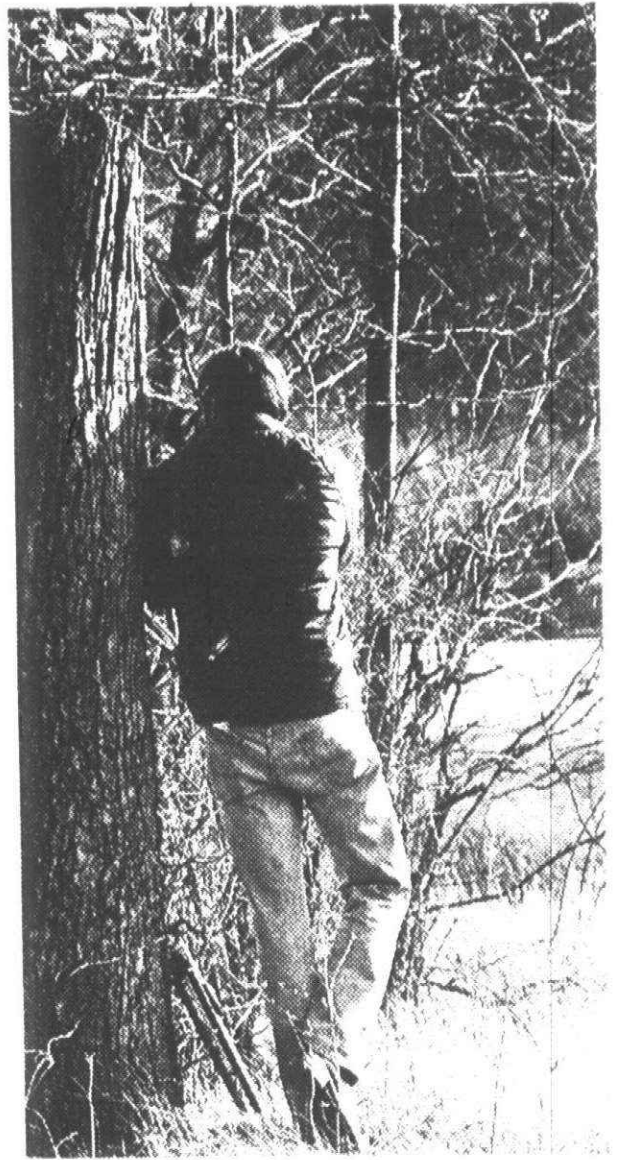

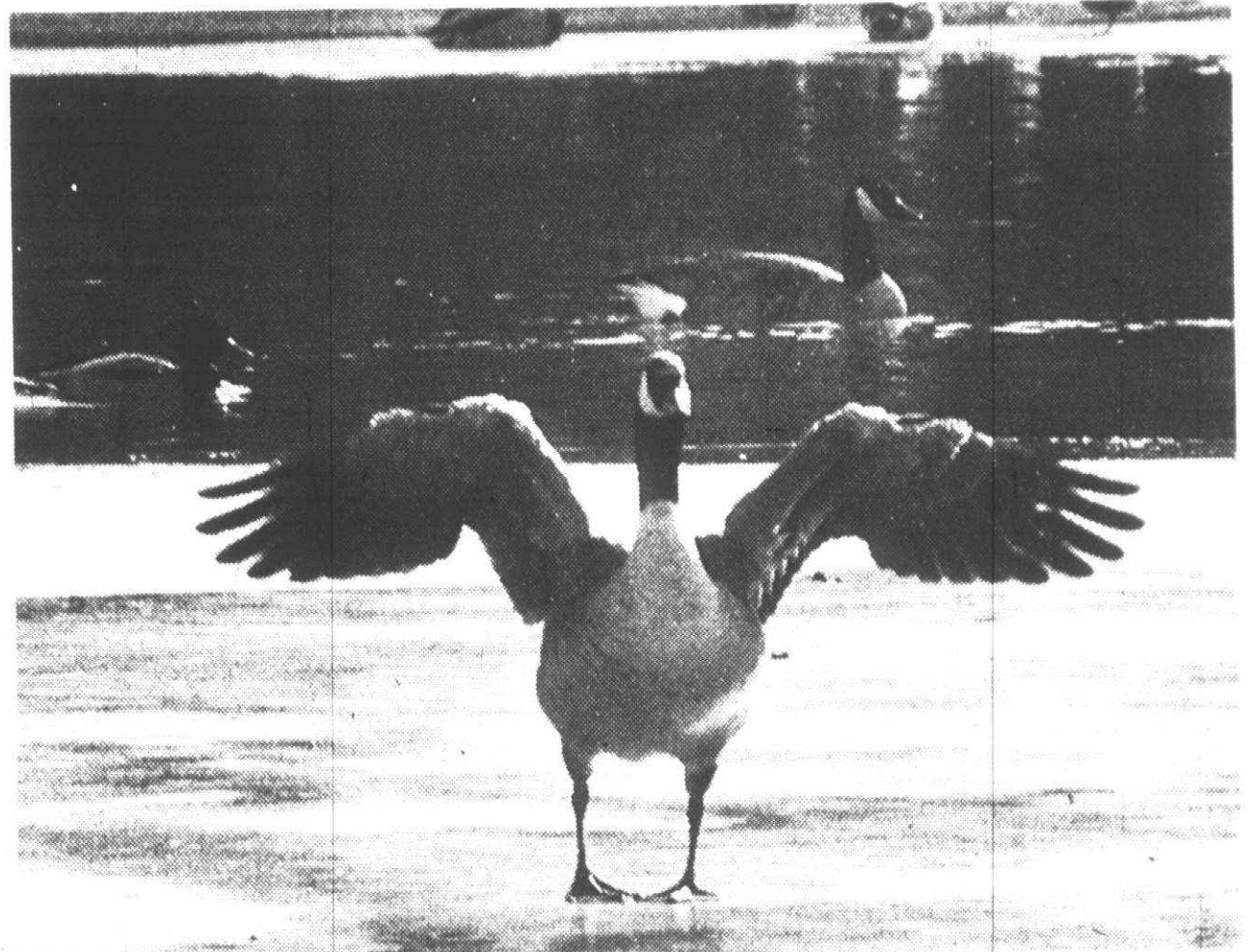


200 honkers halt for lunch

There are some sights that shouldn't be missed. This was one of them. On the north side of Phoenix Lake this week a flock of some 200 dark Canadian geese stopped for a mid-flight feeding. Catching the scene was Doug Olds (top right) of Plymouth who spotted them while driving home.

According to Wayne County Naturalist Mary Ellsworth, the warm winter season here has caused some migrating birds to stay a little longer than expected. Geese usually feed on plants and found them within reach because of the lack of snow. She says they probably arrived from such northern regions as the Seely Wildlife Refuge in the Upper Peninsula or Jack Miner's Sanctuary in Ontario.

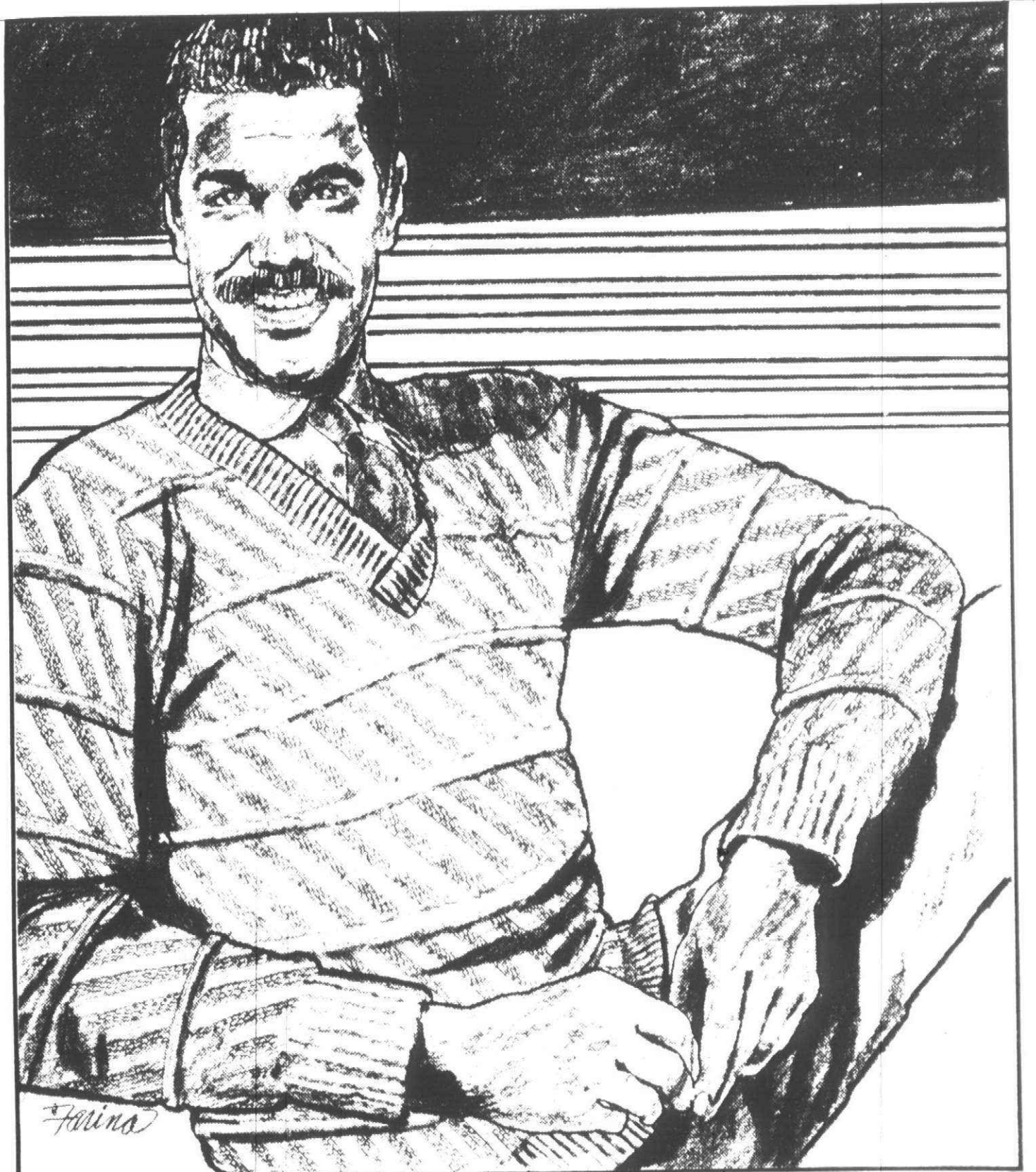
Feathered friends

"Wild birds can be tamed somewhat in some places like Jack Miner's Sanctuary in Ontario," she said. "But they can become vicious especially when nesting. There's a lot of power in their necks and wings."

Attracted to bodies of water, this flock of geese was spotted at Phoenix Lake this week. More than a few travelers along Five Mile and Northville Roads slowed down to view the feathered friends.

Mrs. Ellsworth says these birds have no "definite" flight patterns and may confuse some observers when it appears they are not flying south for the winter like other migrating species.

Plan change may hike bond

Elementaries which might be converted to ESY include Allen, Bird, Farrand, Fiegel and Smith. The cost of air conditioning for each of these buildings ranges from a low of \$95,000 to \$125,000. The added cost to operate a year-round school is \$84,000 per building, said Hoedel.

The cost of equipping middle schools to handle ninth graders, Hoedel said, would include the following expenditures the first year: foreign language labs, \$15,000; library book purchases, \$40,000; typing rooms, \$50,000; textbooks, \$45,000; science lab materials, \$12,500; athletic programs, \$30,000.

The cost of equipping elementaries to handle sixth graders includes: library book purchases, \$30,000; texts, \$36,000; and instrumental music, \$30,000.

If the grades were re-aligned, the impact on the operating budget would be an additional 1.986 mills in 1981-82 if a bond issue wasn't approved and an added 0.96 operating mills that year with passage of a bond issue.

The difference is that some of the equipment purchases and all of the air-conditioning equipment could be financed through a bond sale.

A little more than half the cost of using Lowell Junior High is expected to be made by discontinuing ESY at Pioneer Middle School. Dropping ESY at Pioneer is expected to save \$181,000 in '81-82 with the savings in operating funds reaching \$220,000 in '84-85.

Glen Schroeder, member of the citizens' bond committee, said that overcrowding at the high school is a current problem and should be given top priority by the board. He said the board must either move students out of the CEP through grade re-alignment or build more classrooms.

Some asked whether all ninth graders couldn't be put in the Central Middle building but Yack said it wasn't large enough un-

less it went on ESY, and more money would have to be spent for renovation.

Hoedel told the Observer that the \$8 million renovation proposed for Central will allow some high school students to use the building, but the shift will be such that it will not relieve the current overcrowding at the high schools.

Monday night the board did indicate it wanted to restore some of the programs lost at the CEP when modular scheduling was eliminated because of the population crunch.

That commitment suggests the board is opposed to maintaining the status quo at the CEP, and appears to be a commitment towards a classroom wing.

Ms. Huff said the challenge was to absorb growth and do what can be done to preserve the school system, but yet come up with a plan the community will be willing to pay for.

"We must bring educational and financial considerations together so they meet at the point that the community is willing to pay for. We are in a recession now and I don't think people are willing to pay for educational philosophy."

"I'd rather see a \$13 million package put together and implemented than to see a bond issue voted down and we get nothing."

During the discussion Hoben said it would cost \$10 million in operating and debt financing if the decision was made against re-aligning grades, or a difference of about two mills. Hoedel estimated a difference of about 1.5 mills on the alignment issue alone.

The board still is looking at the possibility of including \$500,000 in the bond issue for purchase of buses to relieve the operating fund.

Also under consideration is seeking voter approval for earmarked millage to be used only for ongoing maintenance of buildings, which also would relieve the operating fund.

The board has dropped from consideration the possibility of renting Webster Elementary from the Livonia district.

Kee also said he was unaware of the details of the conversation. He said other people were present.

"If it's in front of other people, it can't be condoned."

MRS. HORSTEAD worked as an aide with the district before becoming a bus driver four years ago. She has been the chairwoman of the local bus drivers unit for several months.

She said she wasn't surprised when she was served with the one-day suspension Monday night.

"I kind of suspected it when he called me in."

That meeting included Bartnick, Mrs. Horstead, an unnamed

union representative and Bob Houghton, director of the district's transportation department and Mrs. Horstead's immediate supervisor.

Although Houghton attended the meeting, he said he did not know the "foundation" of the suspension.

"This is something I don't think is news," he said. "It's a family problem. This has nothing to do with the public. We're talking about something now that I don't think is anyone's business."

Mrs. Horstead said the incident did not affect contract talks later that day.

"I'm not saying we have never disagreed in the position we're in. But we have a very workable relationship."

"If you want to control something, you should own it," he said.

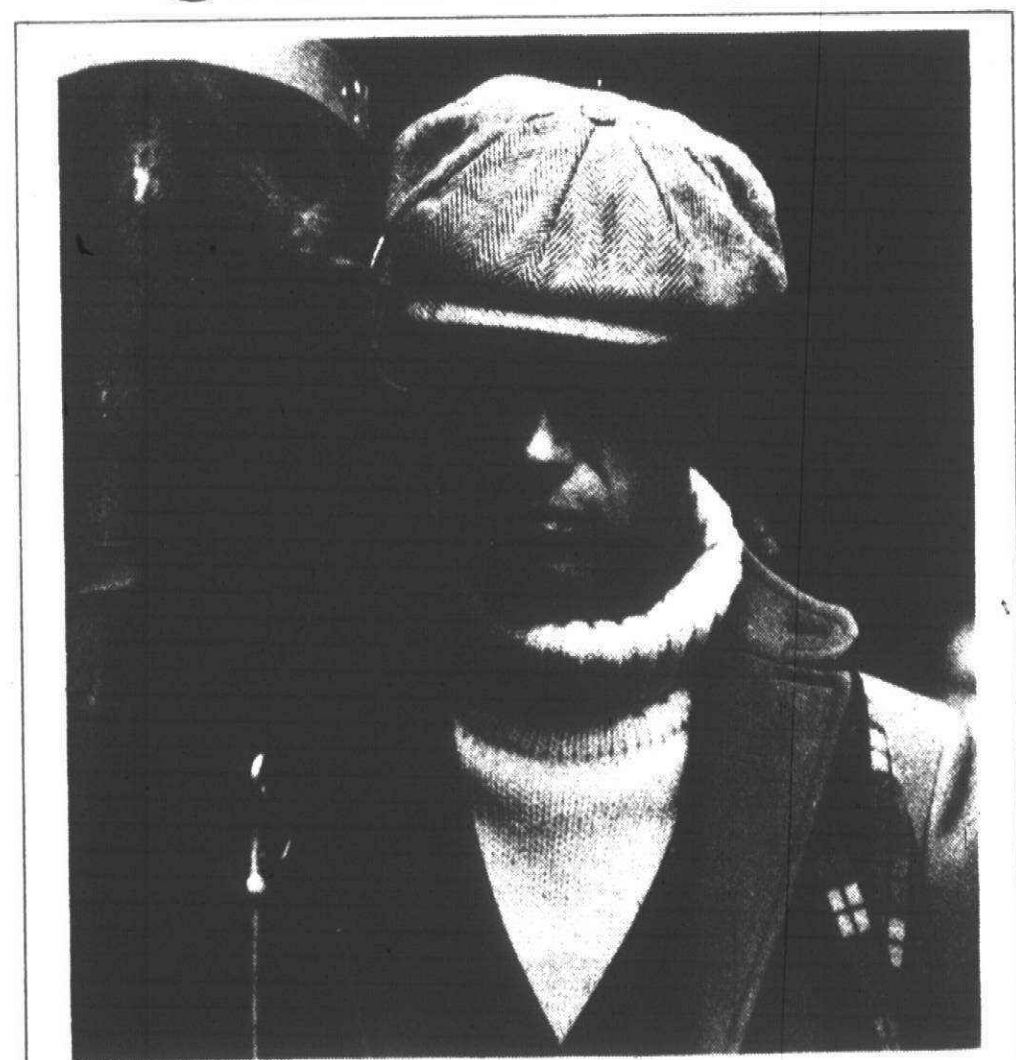
Dukes' comments were greeted with groans and occasional

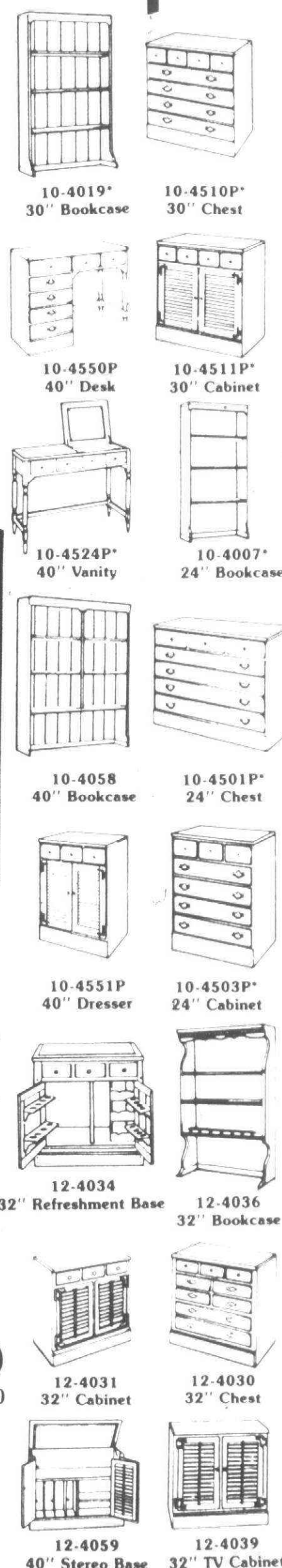

Schraders will emphasize counseling for survivors

The role of the funeral director has undergone many changes in the past few decades. But the most radical may be in the field of education.

"We are going to emphasize grief counselling," said Win Schrader, the third-generation director of the Schrader Funeral Home on Main Street in Plymouth.

"We are going to attempt to increase the education of the families and relatives when these periods of emotional stress strike. We plan to do it by developing libraries and a collection of material and make it available at all times."

The younger Schrader, whose grandfather started the business early in the century, explained that too often the survivors are forced to negotiate and bargain during emotional upsets.

Sometimes hostility is the most paramount emotion, as the survivors attempt to find a scapegoat, sometimes the doctor, for the death of their loved ones.

"To help offset this, courses are being planned for the high schools and colleges dealing with death education."

Schrader hopes families will be educated to the point where they will make all arrangements for funerals in advance, saving a lot of grief, he believes.

While discussing the new program, Schrader reflected on the changing role of the funeral director.

ON HIS OFFICE wall is a picture of one of the first motor hearses. This was a major change from the oldtime glass-sided

hearse in which the casket could be viewed enroute to the burial ground.

"And we've gotten away from the old custom of wearing a high silk hat to lead the procession on the way to the cemetery," Schrader said. "Today we wear dark business clothes, the same as any other business man."

He confided that he is too young to remember the days when the casket was lowered into the grave lined with cotton and flower buds, while the piles of clay were only a few feet away.

Today the casket is placed on rigging above the ground and a synthetic grass cover is placed over the ground that will be used to fill the grave after the services.

Another major change occurred with the opening of funeral parlors. A half century ago, the corpse was laid in a casket and placed in the living room of the home. Services were held there.

The Irish custom included a wake, a special celebration honoring the dead, on the night before the services. These, too, are being forgotten in the modern mood.

Death in a family was marked by the placing of a crepe on the front door of the home. This custom also passed with the advent of the funeral parlor.

A few decades ago the funeral director usually was a partner in a furniture store. It seemed both careers went together.

"I suppose it was only natural," Schrader said. "The furniture dealer had a lot of time to himself. You don't see customers lined up at a furniture store. Meanwhile they were making some furniture and this included caskets. So that partnership was natural."

Schools' joint-warehouse pact saving more than anticipated

The sharing of a warehouse has saved Plymouth-Canton Community Schools more money than originally expected.

Originally the school district expected to save \$44,700 by using the central warehouse of Livonia Public Schools.

Based on use thus far, the school district now expects to save about \$48,000 and could realize a savings of \$50,000 before the year ends.

That claim was made in a status report given by Thomas Rose, purchasing agent, to the school board Monday night.

ROSE EXPLAINED that when plans were made to use the Livonia ware-

house it was estimated that Plymouth-Canton would make purchases of \$200,000.

For the first six months of 1979, Rose said, purchases have totalled \$165,000. Because of the increased number of schools on Extended School Year (ESY) with their year-round ordering pattern, Rose added, the volume could reach \$225,000 by year end.

If the quarter-million dollar volume is reached, then cost savings should exceed \$50,000, Rose said.

Rose added that he expects cost savings will be about \$57,000 in school year 1980-81.

After hearing a report, the school board authorized Rose to negotiate with Livonia Schools to extend the con-

tract for use of its warehouse for another year. The present contract expires July 1, 1980.

Plymouth-Canton closed its central warehouse last year and entered a joint agreement with Livonia because it needed classroom space and couldn't afford to have its own warehouse space.

Because Livonia is a larger school district it also maintains a larger inventory, and places larger orders which result in lower costs of items ordered by Plymouth-Canton teachers.

ROSE POINTED out the district has received an indirect benefit from using the Livonia warehouse.

He said two portable buildings previ-

ously used for warehouse storage here are now in use as adult education classrooms. About half of the old warehouse has been converted to maintenance supplies and equipment storage, said Rose, which has greatly relieved congestion at the maintenance building.

Of the \$47,900 saved in warehouse costs thus far most of the savings, \$34,500, has come from reduced cost of merchandise.

Rose said a survey taken indicates that most school building personnel react favorably to the arrangement with Livonia.

One area which needs attention, he added, is the number of back orders which Rose hopes can be reduced.

High schools maintenance leadership is beefed up

The maintenance supervision has been beefed up at the Plymouth Centennial Educational Park.

Maintenance of the CEP will be the special responsibility of William "Dan" Minghine who was hired by the school board as assistant director of buildings

and grounds for Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

The new position doesn't mean additional expense for the school district, explained Superintendent John M. Hoben, as it is being financed by a rearrangement of maintenance positions at

the high schools.

Operation of the complicated mechanical equipment at the CEP as well as coordination of the large number of personnel needed to maintain the facilities at Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton high schools, Hoben explained,

required a person with engineering training and management experience.

Minghine has been assistant director of buildings and grounds at Children's Hospital of Michigan, and supervisor of buildings and grounds for Allen Park Schools.

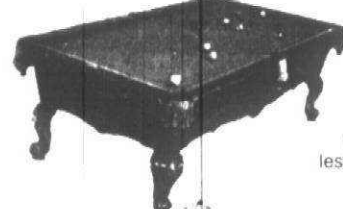

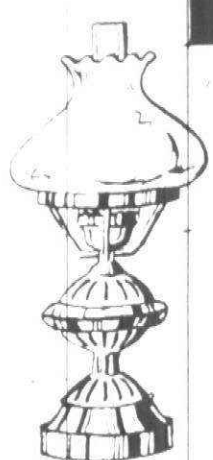

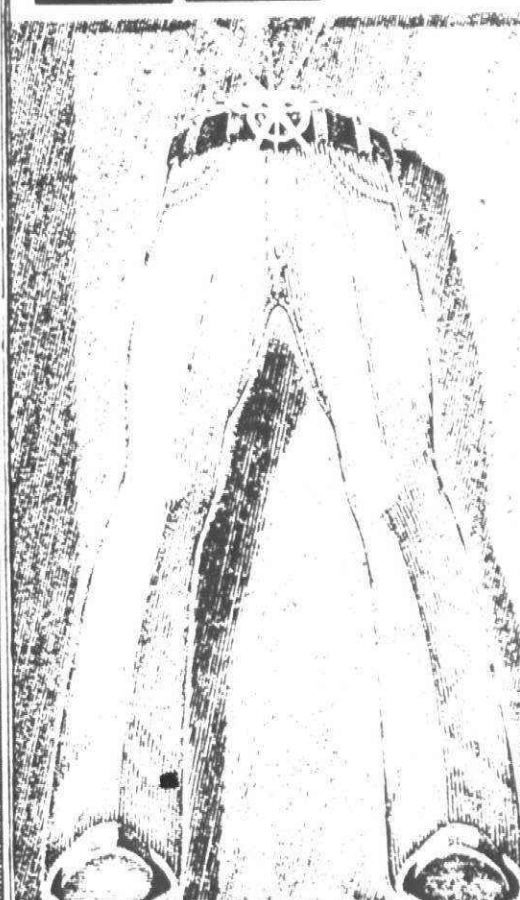

Computer prize snared for office

"I can't wait to get my hands on that system," said an exuberant Justine Gapczynski of Canton Township.

It's only been a week since she won an \$11,800 computer and printer from the Digital Computer Store in the Prudential Town Center Tower 4000 in Southfield and already she's using computer lingo. System. Hands on. Software.

Technically, Mrs. Gapczynski didn't win the computer for herself. The computers sold at the Digital Computer Store aren't the home variety. She won the system for her company — Visual Systems Corp., a computer interfacing firm headquartered in the 3000 Tower of the Town Center.

But don't try to convince Mrs. Gapczynski of that. She figures it's her machine because she'll be using it to make her work more efficient.

Mrs. Gapczynski's entry blank was selected by Digital's local manager, Leonard Zera, from a barrel containing 1,399 entries in the computer give-away contest designed to make businesses aware of the store.

"It was a big shock," said Mrs. Gapczynski. "I came in the store one day and dropped my little entry in the box saying 'I need this computer and I'm going to win this computer.'"

Mrs. Gapczynski works for a firm that sells equipment that allows computers to "talk" to other machines, but she has never used a computer to determine payroll and keep tabs on accounts payable and receivable.

THE DIGITAL CO. of Maynard, Mass., a company which ranked 198th in 1978 on the Fortune 500 list of the largest companies, opened shop in Southfield Nov. 27. The Southfield store is the 13th Digital store in the country. The company is the number one manufacturer of mini-computers in the world.

Zera borrows the slogan of a local department store by calling the place "a one-stop shopping center for the small businessman and professional under one roof."

Along with a computer system ranging from a "sale price" of \$8,995 to the top-of-the-line system of \$13,195, the

store sells "floppy disks" which store information, payroll checks, forms and envelopes used with computer printers, and even static-free mats and carpets to reduce environmental interference with the machines.

It's Zera's contention and Digital's hope that computers are within the range of small businesses which do a lot of mailing or have a large inventory.

One of the first installations by Digital locally, Zera said, is a system sold to Bob's Radiator Repair Shop in Detroit.

"He loaded inventory items into the computer," Zera said. "For the first time in business, (Rich DeSito, shop owner) knows how much money he's got tied up in inventory."

"He ended up taking items that weren't selling out of stock and cut down his inventory space with just that one particular application of the computer."

Zera said the computers come with standard bookkeeping and accounting programs and that modification of the software, or programs, must be done by programmers at Digital or the firm that bought the system.

curb the increased allocation which Canton is expecting next year.

Township officials estimate the current population at 45,000, based on the number of homes built in Canton since the 1975 census.

ALTHOUGH USE of the special funds will not be determined until next summer, Culbert said he would like to

earmark the money for industrial development. He envisions construction of water and sewer lines beneath the 126 township-owned acres near Haggerty and Warren to spur sale of the land to industry.

Culbert commended State Rep. Law for his work on the special allocation which was contained in the Grants and Transfers bill. Law, whose resignation from the Michigan Legislature was expected to take effect on Tuesday, does

not represent Canton Township. But the lawmaker — a member of the House Appropriations Committee — kept Canton officials up-to-date on the status of the bill.

"Canton was in a particularly critical position because its population has quadrupled since 1970," Law said of predictions that the special revenue

sharing allocation would be cut off.

"Their revenue sharing funds were based on the 1970 population figures, and that's what caused the funding population. The community is still required to provide police and fire protection and other services for 45,000 people with funds enough for only 11,000."

Kellogg funds program

The W.K. Kellogg Foundation has granted \$434,095 to Wayne State University for the development of an off-campus degree program for working registered nurses in the Metropolitan Detroit area.

The grant will provide an opportunity for registered nurses in Wayne, Oakland, Macomb and Monroe Counties to achieve their bachelor of science degrees through classes held at hospitals

and community colleges in the area.

The program is aimed at increasing the numbers of professionally-prepared nurses in the area. An estimated 300 nurses are expected to participate in the original program, funded through September 1983, by the Kellogg grant.

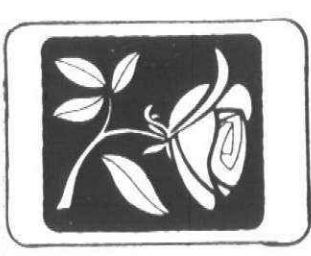

Holiday song ethnic slurs are criticized

A committee will be formed soon to look at the appropriateness of one of the songs used during the holiday season in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

The Plymouth-Canton Board of Education authorized formation of the review committee Monday night after a complaint concerning the song was made by a resident.

Christine Henson of Plymouth objected to a song entitled "A Jingle-Bell Travelogue" performed in the classrooms of Smith Elementary School the week before Christmas.

Mrs. Henson objected to dialect used in the song which she felt made light of ethnic persons and should not be tolerated in the public schools.

THE SONG in question contains Spanish, Viennese, Russian, Oriental dialects and has been used in recent years at Smith and other elementary schools.

Mrs. Henson had asked that the song not be used, and it was withdrawn from a program in the evening for parents, but was sung during the day in various classrooms.

She said the song was "disheartful to anyone from a foreign country living here or who speaks with an accent. We should be teaching the proper words in the proper language — not jibberish like this."

Children should not be taught that it's funny to hear persons with accents, she stressed, but should be encouraged to help such persons learn the English language.

Trustee Carol Davis noted that there is a media committee which reviews books in the library whenever a parent objects to the content. She suggested a similar committee be established to review the appropriateness of this particular song.

The board voted to have a review committee established which then would report back to trustees and Mrs. Henson when a decision is made.

Among the lyrics in the song with Spanish dialect is: "Hin-glai (phonetic spelling of "jingle" as it would be pronounced in Spanish) la bel-la, hing-glai la bel-la, hing-glai ho-lay thee way."

The Viennese portion of the lyrics include, "Ying-'l Pell! Ying-'l Pell! Ying-'l oll der way. Ach vot fun das lssz tzu rride on ein vun-horse o-pen sleigh."

The song in question, written by Ben Allover, has a 1962 copyright with Shawnee Press Inc.

Central Middle staff opposes re-alignment

Editor:
During the current school year there has been a great deal of concern on the part of the professional staff in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools to consider the pros and cons of the problems of the district as it relates to future growth.

There is a need for additional classroom spaces, making the best use of educational dollars in inflation-ridden economic times. There is a need for maintaining quality education in our schools.

There are the inevitable pros and cons that apply to alternatives and choices for proposed solutions to the forementioned problems. These must be ultimately resolved and decided upon by the board of education.

Two very critical current issues which face our schools and the Central Middle School are proposals that:

(1) Deal with the Traditional School Year (TSY) versus the Extended School Year (ESY), and;

(2) The administrative make-up of an intermediate school for early adolescents, the middle school philosophy of a six, seven and eighth grade configuration versus a junior high school philosophy or a seven, eight and ninth grade configuration.

The professional staff at the Central Middle School has been closely involved in these discussions and we do have some very concerned feelings about these issues educationally, economically, and personally.

Very recent developments on the part of one middle school have taken a strong stand on the issue has had a tendency to make it seem that the other middle schools have taken an opposing view. This is not true and we feel it necessary to strongly and publicly go on record to support the middle school philosophy at this time.

This is done in light of these recent discussions and the apparent need to

strongly support what we feel is in the best educational interests of our youngsters. We would like to publicly endorse and support the maintaining of a middle school philosophy and a six, seven and eighth grade configuration.

Also we would support very strongly the continued maintenance of a traditional school year calendar. The debate of the pros and cons of these two issues would consume considerable time and space to defend or oppose and would not justifiably be handled here in this letter.

We feel strongly that educational soundness, feasibility, and needs of the student should be the first prerequisite of any educational configuration, not the financial expedients of the school district.

The Central Middle School professional staff at a recent meeting feels it necessary to take a stand publicly on these important issues. Support the maintaining of a middle school philosophy with a six, seven and eighth grade configuration and a Traditional School Year calendar.

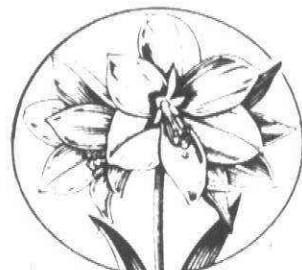

Criticism is justified, but don't halt initiative

Canton Supervisor Noel Culbert has been chastized on several occasions by members of the Township Board because he has written letters without their prior knowledge.

The letters included a missive to Plymouth Township Supervisor Thomas Notebaert suggesting the possibility of a regional police force; and a written proposal to Amtrak, suggesting the company establish a commuter rail stop at Lilley Road.

The letters irked some board members, not because the ideas were entirely off-the-wall, but because the ideas were presented without their approval.

In effect, Culbert has been criticized for showing initiative.

A supervisor's job should involve initiative. In Canton, only the clerk and supervisor hold full-time positions, making them the best candidates to do just the sort of follow-up Culbert has initiated. In both cases, Culbert was well within his realm of responsibility to contact other officials in order to research the feasibility of proposals.

He will then be armed with information about the subject when he presents his idea to the rest of the board for discussion. A supervisor who cannot make a move without the board's approval is a supervisor who can accomplish little.

Culbert might have found, however, that his actions would have been accepted more readily had the previously-mentioned letters not implied he had board backing.

Letters exploring ideas should be written to gather information, not to make commitments. The supervisor was admittedly out of line offering Plymouth Township police protection with the board's approval.

If Culbert claims the township would go along with a regional police force and the board later says it is a bad idea, he serves to make the township look disorganized and foolish in others eyes.

If the supervisor never claims that this idea is

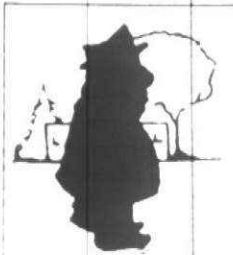
more than an idea he would like more information about, both he and the township save face.

During his year in office, Culbert has not distinguished himself as a leader or an innovator.

His attempts to change that reputation should not be shot down so arbitrarily by others on the board.

One of Culbert's biggest critics of these letters has been Trustee Robert Greenstein, who didn't always let the board know what he was up to during his own term as supervisor. Let Culbert, speaking for himself alone, explore his ideas.

As Trustee Steve Larson said, "The worse risk we run is looking foolish if we change direction."

How was pride in work lost?

Traveling along life's highway, The Stroller likes nothing better than to stop occasionally and chat with folks who have weathered many an economic storm and made a success of their lives.

The famed golfer Walter Hagen used to say, "Take time to stop and smell the roses."

On one of these stops the other day The Stroller happened to be in the office of Leo Schultz, head of the Vico Products Co. in Plymouth, who developed his company from a small corner of his basement to a multi-million dollar business.

During the course of our visit the conversation turned to the growing popularity of foreign cars in the American automobile market.

"It is no surprise to me," Leo said. "They make better cars and they stole the play away from us. The Japanese now have about 22 percent of the world market, and they are still growing."

He leaned back in his chair for a moment, then continued. "You may wonder how this came about, but it is no puzzle to anyone in the mechanical end of the auto industry. The Japanese take more pride in their work than we do. Somewhere along the line the American worker has lost the pride of accomplishment. And it is too bad."

This was a very strong statement. And ever since he heard it The Stroller has been trying to pinpoint the time when American pride was set aside.

He listened again to this man who has been close to the auto industry for quite a while.

"We have only ourselves to blame," he said. "The average man in the shops today is concerned with only two things — watching the clock for quitting time and how much money he is being paid. He has little thought about the quality of his work."

This remark rang a bell with The Stroller. It took him back to the days when he was a toiler in the machine shops of the major plants back home.

In those days the machinist — The Stroller was a qualified journeyman — was given a rough casting and a blue print. It was his duty to produce the finished product regardless of the number of machines that had to be used. If the plan called for holes, the machinist drilled them.

If it meant using a lathe, a lathe was used. And with every move there was a feeling of pride and a great desire to have the final inspection approve the work.

How proud it made a fellow feel when he realized that his work had been approved and was now on the shipping dock ready to be delivered.

Then came a great change in the shops.

It was brought about by what was termed mass production. Under this plan the mechanic no longer took a casting and worked on it to the finish. He did only one part of the job, then turned it over to a fellow worker on a different machine. In fact the job was passed along so often that the finished product couldn't be claimed by anyone.

As a result there passed the pride of accomplishment. No longer could the mechanic say "that was my job" when the final approval was given by the inspectors.

Working just became a form of hustling the job from one person to the other. And this haste along the assembly lines has helped to bring about the loss of pride in workmanship.

This is what Leo Schultz meant when he said that Americans have lost their pride while Japanese pride is on the upswing.

This is what is causing the growing switch to foreign cars and helping to throw American economy out of whack.

You can take the word of a man who has been through the mill for that.

'Why wait? Pass him on the right!'



There's money to be made when Superbowl arrives

Superbowl Sunday is coming up. The greatest media event of the year — the championship game of pro football — will be beamed to more homes in the nation than any other program during the rest of the year.

Superbowl is probably the greatest single tourist attraction of the year, bringing in more dollars to the host community in a short period of time than any other known event, including national political conventions.

As most of you know, Superbowl is coming to the Pontiac Silverdome in January 1982, the first time it will leave the sunbelt and be played in a northern city.

When Superbowl was being promoted for metropolitan Detroit, the committee said it would bring in between \$60-80 million in a five-day period during a slow time for Detroit. The skeptics couldn't believe it.

BUT AS I prepare to go out to Pasadena this week to attend the super-event, let me tell you how much it will cost me, and then you can multiply it by the number of seats in the Silverdome to get some idea of the magnitude of the undertaking.

First, it will cost more than \$500 to fly round-trip to Los Angeles. I won't count this in my figuring because this goes to the airlines and not to the local city. But a portion of it will be used by the airlines to beef up their local staffs to accommodate incoming spectators.

To get a room at a good hotel, I am paying \$134 a night and had to commit for a minimum of four nights, which is \$536.

To get around Los Angeles, I will have to rent a car for at least \$25 a day or \$100 for four days. If I don't rent a car, I'll pay more than half of that in cab fares to and from the airport, to and from the game, and around the city.

If I eat three meals a day, it will cost at least \$25 a day, and if I eat in a fine restaurant, it will probably cost that much just for dinner.

Because I don't intend to spend the four days sitting in my hotel room, I'll probably spend another \$100 on tips, libations, entrance fees to local events, and so forth.

So if you take the hotel bill, food, transportation in the city and miscellaneous, I'll spend a minimum of \$800 without airfare.

THERE ARE MORE than 80,000 seats in the Silverdome which would bring in \$64 million to metropolitan Detroit if all spectators were out-of-towners who spent \$800 each.

I didn't include what the networks would spend in setting up for the game (rumored to be around \$10 million) or what organizations will spend for promotional activities associated with the event. I didn't even include the \$30 for my ticket.

Convention people say this money will be recycled seven times because low-income workers will be hired for additional jobs, such as restaurant and hotel help. And they will immediately re-spend it in the metropolitan area.

The state of Michigan will probably pick up the 4 percent sales and use taxes on most of the money spent without having to educate anyone or increase state services.

Superbowl is a big business. And it will be our business in two years.

No compacts in housing

What the housing industry needs is another George Romney — someone who will denounce the natural gas-guzzling residential dinosaurs of the 1960s and 70s as the American Motors president denounced the gasoline-guzzling autos of the 1950s.

But it won't happen, at least not in the foreseeable future. One gets that strong impression from a friendly get-together with the Builders Association of Southeastern Michigan.

The summary of our depressing conversation:

- New houses will stay large, and young couples will have to stick to apartments or live with parents.

- Housing costs will continue to increase faster than the consumer price index as a whole, with no relief in sight.

- The chief culprit is consumerism and local governments, which respond to voters in existing housing rather than to the needs of persons who would like to buy.

THE CONSUMER price index has risen from a 1967 level of 100 to 223.7 as of September 1979. In that same period, the cost of home ownership had risen to 267, about 43 points ahead of food and 115 points ahead of apparel.

(Interestingly, residential rent was only 178.7 on the scale, 88 points lower than home ownership.)

The reason, builder Herman Frankel of Orchard Lake said, was that so many elements in construction were related to the soaring price of energy — asphalt, pipe, kiln drying.

"I don't believe there's going to be any good news," he said.

"Our consensus," said Otto Binggesser of Bloomfield Hills, president of the association, "is that houses will probably not change very much in size. There will probably be more condominiums and cluster housing in the future."

WHY CAN'T SOMEONE make compact houses the way Romney sold compact cars?

The reason is that the housing industry has a not-so-silent partner that the auto industry doesn't have — local government. Binggesser said communities zone for larger and larger lot sizes. This raises land improvement costs. It's uneconomical to put a compact house on a giant lot, so houses keep getting bigger and bigger.

There's a vicious circle: Once people buy houses in a suburban community, they don't want anything smaller than their house around, so they zone for larger houses in the future.

The result is devastating to younger families. The fruit of this "grass roots government" is that not only do we have racial barriers in this metropolitan area, but we also have age barriers and economic barriers. A "balanced" community is virtually impossible to find.

JAY JANIS, chairman of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, told a congressional committee last fall what the rising cost of housing is doing to Americans:

Only about 15 percent of potential house buyers can meet monthly payments today. Buyers of new housing today must spend 36 percent of their disposable income — twice the proportion they had to spend only 10 years ago.

Irvi Yackness, general counsel of the local builders group, told us much the same story. In the 1980s, buyers will have to spend up to 40 percent of their incomes on housing, he said.

Although the building industry is a giant nationally, it isn't dominated by four or five big firms, the way auto production is. There are thousands of small firms, and collectively they lack the clout to fight local and state "over-regulation."

As long as that state of affairs continues, they say, housing prices will continue to soar.

Tony Skover: referee who deserves fame

Dear Nick:

If I'm not mistaken, nomination time for the Sports Hall of Fame has rolled around again. Has consideration ever been given to honoring an official in this august body?

May I propose a candidate?
He's Anthony T. (Tony) Skover of Farmington Hills.

As you know, Tony is a retired National Football League and Big Ten official. He served 12 years with each organization, to climax 39 years of officiating.

I'm hoping, after you learn more about Tony, you'll recommend to the Hall of Fame board that Tony's name be given a place on the 1980 ballot.

I'D GUESS THAT no Detroiters has so distinguished himself in the field of athletic officiating.

One could say that Tony is a true champion.

Most sports fans know the vital role officials have played in preserving the integrity of the NFL. Never has there been a hint of impropriety.

Field officials of the NFL carry a proud tradition for knowing all the rules and applying them instantly and without favor. No greater example of this could be found than in the personage of Tony Skover.

Let me tell you a little about this man.

He graduated from Northeastern High School as its top scholar/athlete — at age 15 — starring in football, basketball and baseball.

Tony was 17 in 1932 when he joined the University of Detroit's varsity football squad, coached by Gus Dorais. He also played basketball for the Titans, and when he graduated in 1936, Skover was given the school's scholar/athlete award.

Dorais steered Tony to a teaching and coaching job at U-D High School, where he taught French and math, coached baseball and assisted in football. His salary: \$1,200 annually.

TONY MARRIED his high school sweetheart and they had three sons.

In 1942, Tony left teaching to become a financial analyst for Fisher Body. In 1947, he moved to Ford Motor Co. at the invitation of L.D. Crusoe, then executive vice president.

But Tony never left sports, turning to officiating

in both football and basketball — first sandlot, then high school, small college, the Big 10 and then NFL.

An interesting twist in his business career came in 1956 when he was asked to join the Howard T. Keating Associates of Bloomfield Hills. Howard Keating had been one of Skover's athletes at U-D High, and Keating used to tell his coach, "Tony, some day we'll be in business together."

The eight-year association of Keating and Skover which developed was rewarding to both men.

As executive vice president, Skover was "a brilliant administrator, a financial genius," says Keating. Skover would take an idea and work out the financial end, and then Keating would sell it. They teamed on land development projects in Michigan, Florida and Puerto Rico.

IN 1963, SKOVER FORMED his own firm in the Livonia/Farmington Hills area. It now centers on the 375-homesite Meadowbrook Hills and Woods subdivisions, between Eight and Nine Mile roads, Newburgh Road and I-275.

In recent years, he gradually has been disengaging himself from the business, turning over responsibilities to son Phil, a resident of Northville.

Tony is an avid golfer, has played to a one-handicap. His long list of laurels on the links include six Meadowbrook Country Club championships.

Tony and his wife, Ruth, herself a fine athlete, now winter in Deerfield Beach, Fla., where they spend considerable time on the golf courses. Tony will go three rounds a week and practice two other days.

NICK, HERE ARE SOME of Tony's officiating stats:

During 39 years, he called more than 1,000 football games — pro, Big Ten, small college and high school. In one season, he officiated 50 contests.

As a basketball referee for 20 years, Tony in one season whistled 162 games (he kept a record book then), including as many as six in a single day.

While in Big Ten football, Tony well recalls his

first meeting with Woody Hayes. It came during an OSU game, and Woody was ragging Tony over a call. Tony glided up within earshot of Hayes and said, "Don't talk to me. You do the coaching, we'll do the officiating."

Hayes didn't say another word.

Tony found himself asked to call two more OSU games that fall, including the Buckeyes' 13-7 Rose Bowl victory over Oregon State.

In pro ball, the climax came in 1974 when Tony was chosen to work as a field judge in the Super Bowl game in which Miami defeated Washington.

This topped 12 years of travel across the United States to NFL cities, memories of seeing truly great athletes perform and, yes, of being run down by a giant Denver tackle and finishing the game with a broken rib. ("I just had to stop breathing for a couple of periods.")

It also meant being in a crew with three other avid golfers and arriving for assignments in southern cities a day early so there could be golf on Saturday afternoons.

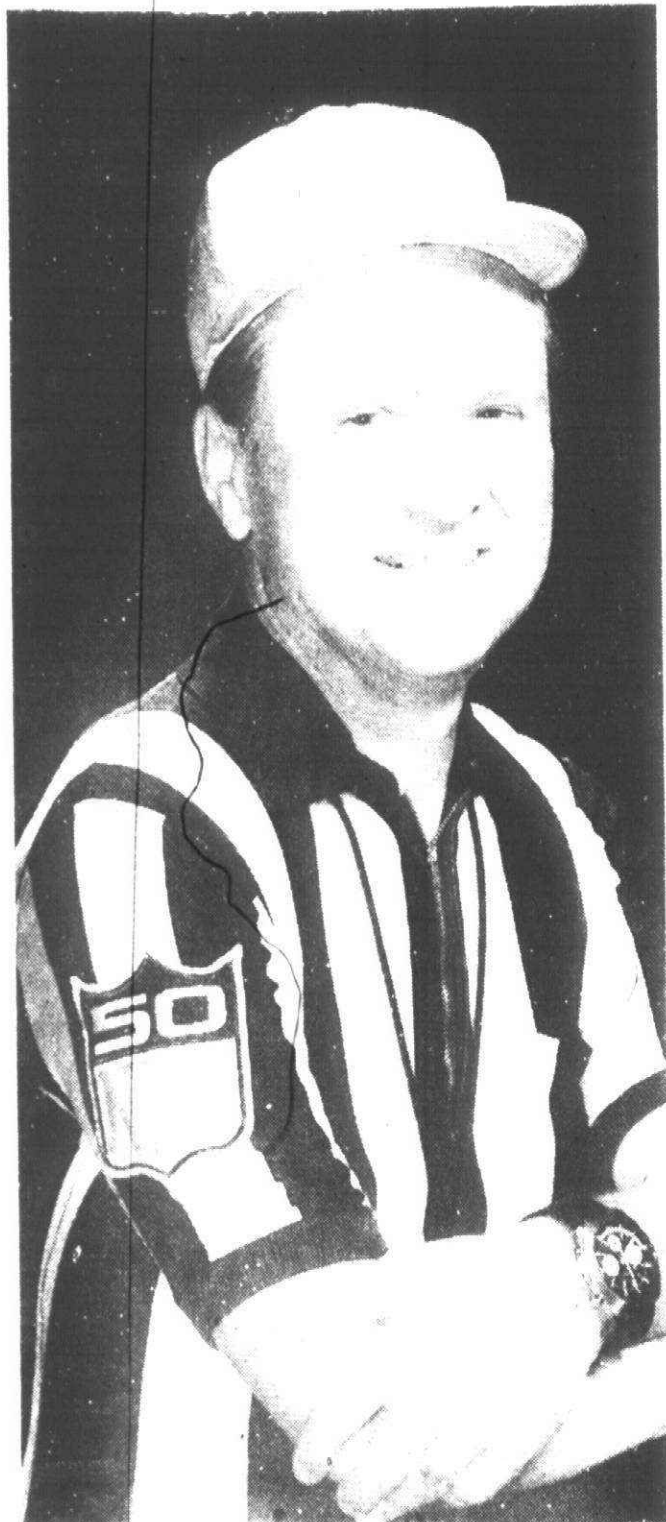
LIKE MILLIONS OF OTHERS, Tony will be watching this Sunday's NFL championship battle between Pittsburgh and Los Angeles. Except that Tony won't be too concerned about what happens with the ball — he'll be watching the officials and judging how they perform. He admits that's the most fun for him.

Since his retirement five years ago from the NFL, he has attended one pro game and one college tilt. The hassle of the crowds is just too much. Tony says he prefers watching on TV.

And he has a ready answer for the people who feel instant replay cameras might well be the answer to possible missed calls by NFL officials. Tony says such a system isn't needed, and it would detract from the sport.

Here's hoping you and your fellow Hall of Fame officials feel that Tony Skover is a worthy candidate.

Rocks dominate mat tournament

Plymouth Salem's wrestling team is really having a year to remember.

The Rocks captured the 10th annual Schoolcraft Invitational last weekend in a breeze with 203½ points. That was well ahead of second-place Dearborn Heights Annapolis' 152. It was coach Ron Krueger's boys fifth tournament championship this season.

In all, 28 teams were vying for the coveted championship of one of the biggest mat tourneys in the state.

Westland John Glenn had the area's next best effort, finishing fifth with 144 points. The Rockets were just eight points out of second, six points behind third place Mt. Clemens (150) and missed nipping fourth-place Belleville by just 1½ points (145½).

Farmington, last year's titlist, placed sixth last weekend. North Farmington finished ninth, West Bloomfield 13th and Farmington Harrison 14th.

Other area teams didn't fare as well. Redford Thurston's 15th place was the best of the rest. Other area finishes were: Plymouth Canton, 18th; Livonia Clarenceville, 19th; Livonia Stevenson, 20th; Garden City West, 21st; Livonia Churchill, 23rd; Redford Union, 25th; Livonia Bentley, 27th and Livonia Franklin, 28th.

Two Canton wrestlers won individual titles and a total of five made it to the finals to pace the Rock championship.

"We scored eight kids," said Salem coach Ron Krueger. "Five of our kids made the finals. When you get that kind of depth, you'll do well in a big tournament. The bigger the tournament, the better I feel we're gonna do."

JIM SCHULTZ was the champion at the 105-pound weight class for Salem. He beat Annapolis' Ron Sullivan in the finals on a 3-2 decision. Jerry Valchine took Salem's other title with a 7-2 decision over Fenton's Jeff Soper at 132 pounds.

Jeff Brown, Jeff Powers and Greg Gattoni took second-place honors for the Rocks.

Brown lost an 8-7 decision to Farmington's John Murphy in the final of the 119-pound weight class. Powers dropped a 6-2 decision to Farmington's Greg Lemanski at 185. Gattoni lasted just 58 seconds in his heavyweight match against Edsel Ford's Dean Ledford before getting pinned.

Other Rock points were provided by Jeff Dunson's fourth-place finish in the 112-pound class, Mark Ross' fourth in the 126 class and Scott Piper's fifth at 155 pounds.

"It was easy for Krueger to explain the Rocks' secret of success. 'We've got some good wrestlers,' he stated. 'We've got a lot of depth. We have nine seniors on the squad.'

"We felt that we could win it. We had faced most of the other schools before." Glenn sent two wrestlers, Pete Bologna and Gary Black, to the finals en route to its strong fifth-place team finish. Both were defeated in title matches.

Bologna lost a 4-2 decision to Annapolis' Al Prusac at 98 pounds and Black finished second by losing a 3-2 decision to Dearborn Edsel Ford's Pat Brackett at 198.

Glenn also received good efforts from Duane Gibbs, who placed third at 145 pounds; Jamie Cockrum, fourth at 138; and David German, fifth at 185.

Deep freeze hurts Canton cagers

Dearborn Fordson took advantage of Plymouth Canton's ice-cold shooting Tuesday night to post a 56-46 non-league basketball victory.

It was the ninth victory in 10 starts for the Tractors, whose only loss this season was to Monroe.

Both teams lit up the rims in the first half as Fordson held a narrow 35-34 halftime lead. The tempo of the game crawled to almost a standstill in the second half.

But it was a combination of Fordson controlling the pace and Canton shooting horribly which led to the 10-point margin of victory for the Tractors.

"We're very pleased to win here," said veteran Fordson coach John McIntyre. "In the first half we looked like we were playing a match-up zone of sorts and they were cutting us up inside."

"In the second half, we went to a 2-3 zone and collapsed in the middle. We wanted to make them take the outside shot. I'm glad they weren't shooting like they can."

The Chiefs developed frostbite in the second half, managing just 12 points.

"We just broke down offensively," said Canton coach Craig Bell, whose team dropped to 3-5 overall. "Our shooters were shooting in their range, but we didn't get any second shots. We wanted to play patient basketball. The ball just didn't get into the offense."

IT SEEMED Fordson capitalized on costly Canton turnovers. The Chiefs came out flat in the second half and never really made a run although staying close.

Canton center Sean Houle, who scored 14 points and grabbed nine rebounds in the first half, was not on the bench at the start of third quarter.

Not feeling up to par, Houle came back to the bench with assistant coach Dave VanWagoner midway through the period.

"He told me he was sick," said Bell simply.

The Chiefs seemed to lose something while Houle was out. Fordson outscored Canton 11-5 in the third period and held the Chiefs scoreless for almost five minutes.

"We may lost something mentally when Sean was out," Bell said.

Canton shot 41 percent from the floor in the first half and ended the game hitting 15 of 47 for 32 percent.

Two of Canton's better shooters, Dave Visser and Scott Adler, enjoyed a rough night from the floor, combining on just one of 15 shots.

"Dave is not scoring but is playing some good games," said the Canton coach. "He doing some things for us in pressure situations, like handling the ball against their press."

"His scoring will come."

Fordson forward Frank Gajor led all scorers with 22 points. He also had 13 rebounds.

Mike Christoff, a 6-foot-4 reserve forward, gave the Tractors a lift scoring 12 points.

"It was by far his best game of his high school career," said McIntyre. "I think he was the difference tonight."

Another factor for the Tractors was guard Jimmy McIntyre, the coach's son. He scored 12 points and made some slick passes in the first quarters against Canton's zone defense.

Brad Westin was a tower of strength for the Chiefs as he scored 17 points,

but managed only two in the second half.

The hot-shooting Gajor had eight points in the first quarter as Fordson led, 17-13.

A basket by Westin with 1:43 to go in the half gave Canton its biggest edge of the night, 30-27. Fordson, however, fought its way back into the lead with its fundamental style of play and never looked back.

Fordson froze the ball during most of the final quarter and maintained its lead. The Tractors were patient and looked for the high-percentage shot.

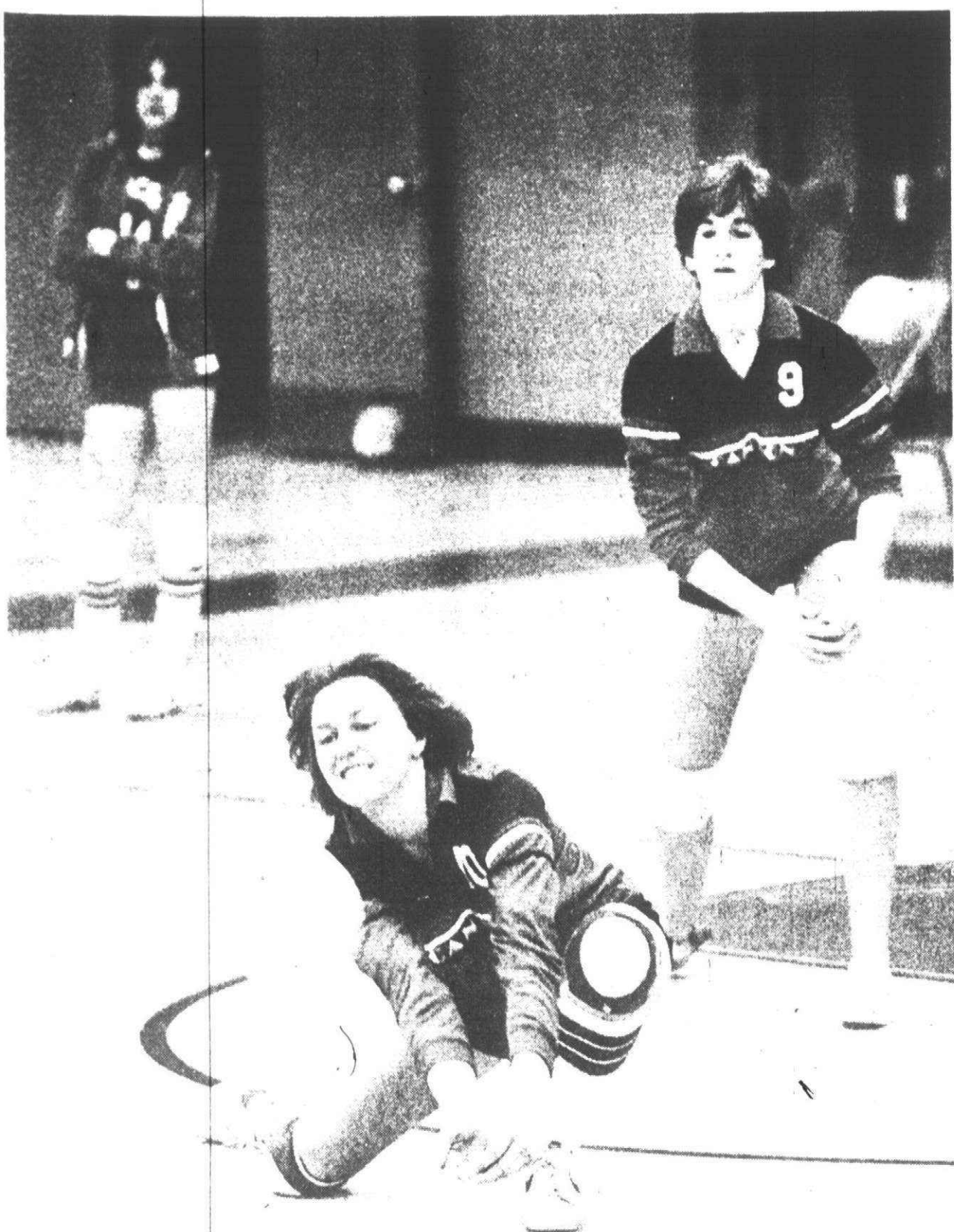

Blue Jay coach impressed Hall mauls Southfield '5' for 38

It would be tempting to write that Tuesday, Livonia Stevenson brought the Dave Hall One-Man Basketball Team in to face the Southfield Blue Jays.

But it wouldn't be the truth. Sure, Hall was the dominant force in the game, and he did lead the Spartans to a 78-72 win while scoring 38 points. But he got a lot of help from a supporting cast that included two double figure scorers. Tom Finn scored 15 and Evan Lyall scored 13.

And Hall wasn't the game's only star. Vince Bean had 17 for Southfield, and Byron Greer and Dave Sucher had 16 each.

But Hall was the dominant player, and he did come through with 12 points in the third quarter when his team needed them.

"Hall, golly, he's phenomenal," said Southfield coach Greg Sliwka. "He's a fine, fine basketball player. I think he's every bit as good as (Catholic Central's All-State candidate) Barry Spencer — I've seen them both now. He handled the ball, he did it all, played good 'D', rebounded — a fine athlete."

Despite Hall's heroics — and the final score — Southfield was in the game up until the final 22 seconds. Trailing 75-66 with 57 seconds left — and with Bean and Jay Hosley on the bench after fouling out — the Blue Jays went to work.

Darryl Darden got it started with a field goal. Darden then came back with a steal and a turnaround jumper to make it 75-70 at 0:36. Southfield got the ball back on a Stevenson charging foul, and Byron Greer hit to pull the Jays to within three points with 24 seconds left.

But John Piper fouled out at 0:22. He was the third Jay player to foul out in the game. Stevenson's Tom Van Wagoner and Tom Finn both capitalized on Southfield's foul trouble, converting free throws to make the final 78-72.

SOUTHFIELD HAD ITS chances earlier in the fourth quarter. The Jays started the final stanza trailing by two, 57-55, but Southfield started throwing the ball away.

"We weren't concentrating," said Sliwka. "I don't know what it was. I tried to keep fresh people in there."

Southfield's fourth-quarter performance contrasted sharply with its second quarter, when the Blue Jays came back from a 24-16 deficit to take a 40-37 halftime lead.

"We were hitting the boards," explained Sliwka, "getting it up and hitting the high percentage shot on the transition. We played a real fine second quarter, but we were real sluggish the beginning of the second half."

"I think both Vince and John and Jay — all three of them — were in foul trouble. I think they were a little too conscious of that. They were a little too conservative."

"We're too small," he continued, "to play a big team like that, that conservatively. You got to go after them."

The two teams traded baskets in the third quarter, neither squad building any kind of advantage. Southfield had its last lead of the game at 1:16 when Piper hit a 15-footer, making the score 55-53.

But Hall decided to put on a little show to end the quarter. First the 6-foot-4 center brought the ball the length of the court and scored on a jumpshot from the key at 0:58. Hall then gave Stevenson the lead with a 15-footer to close out the period.

Southfield is now 4-3 overall. The Blue Jays are at Berkley on Friday in a Southeastern Michigan Association showdown.

When parents request a visit from St. Nicholas (for a fee), he is transported to the home the day before Christmas. Feminists flock to hear Steinem

Surrounded by women in their "Dress for Success" best, feminist Gloria Steinem reaffirmed that the sisterhood is powerful.

Visiting the area to boost the Women's Justice Center of Detroit and her own Ms. magazine, she had choice words for everyone from George Romney — "the Ayatollah of Michigan" — to Pat Boone, "the white Wonder Bread Ayatollah."

The Women's Justice Center received the financial benefits from the dinner at Plymouth's Hillside Inn Friday night to culminate a day-long visit.

The magazine received considerable attention in Ms. Steinem's talk.

She told the capacity audience the magazine started in the early 1970s with the help of Warner Communications, "who made the public relations gesture in return for 25 percent of the company."

Now the largest feminist publication in the country, Ms. has a circulation of more than 3 million and has become part of the Ms. Foundation for Education and Communications.

"We wanted it to be a woman-controlled magazine," Ms. Steinem said in describing the early days with Ms. "It was a fluke that we got started."

"We started out the adventure saying with great defiance that it would last forever and with the conviction that it would last six months."

MS. STEINEM, still sporting the long, streaked hair and aviator glasses that have become her trademark, told her predominantly female audience that versions of Ms. have been started throughout the world.

She added that the original is fast approaching its "turnaround point (the

point at which a new publication becomes profitable)."

According to Ms. Steinem, the new decade will bring changes not only in the magazine, but in women as well.

"Ms. has redefined sexuality, violence, work and art (crafts were pastimes for women and natives) and we have begun to feel a long-term commitment with each other," Ms. Steinem said.

"We have at least realized what's wrong — now we can move into the '80s for a solution."

The feminist leader said she believes women become more radical as they grow older. "I expect to see an army of

grey-haired women take over the world." And, although she said women made many strides forward during the '70s, their fight is far from over.

"The tactics in the '80s have to be much more imaginative. We must work inside and outside the system in order to surround our goal."

The magazine, which has been given a redesigned format as of last month's issue, will be reflecting the new concerns.

Ms. Steinem said the editorial staff was considering an issue entitled, "Is God Against Women?" which would deal with patriarchal religion.

Other issues in the future are to

focus on women in traditional female jobs, such as clerical employees. Women in these types of traditional jobs, dubbed "pink collar workers" by Ms. Steinem, "have to be emphasized."

In answer to a member of the audience's suggestion that Ms. do more articles on feminist homemakers, Ms. Steinem said she "sometimes feel like a sitting dog being told to sit."

She said she has always supported the homemaker and the feminist goal to give that status respect and economic security.

Passage of the Equal Rights Amendment remains a top priority at Ms. "It has to be a bottom line issue," she said. We just can't support anyone (as a political candidate) who is not for the ERA and reproductive freedom."

Ms. Steinem's comments drew enthusiastic applause from the audience of Detroit and suburban women.

At one point the speaker noted the "Free Lenore Romney" buttons worn by many of her listeners and then alluded to George Romney's recent statement. He had called many backers of ERA "moral perverts."

"We are going to change the whole world," Ms. Steinem said. "George Romney hasn't got the faintest idea how radical we can be."

DAN MURRAY as Ben Silverman, is making his first appearance with the guild.

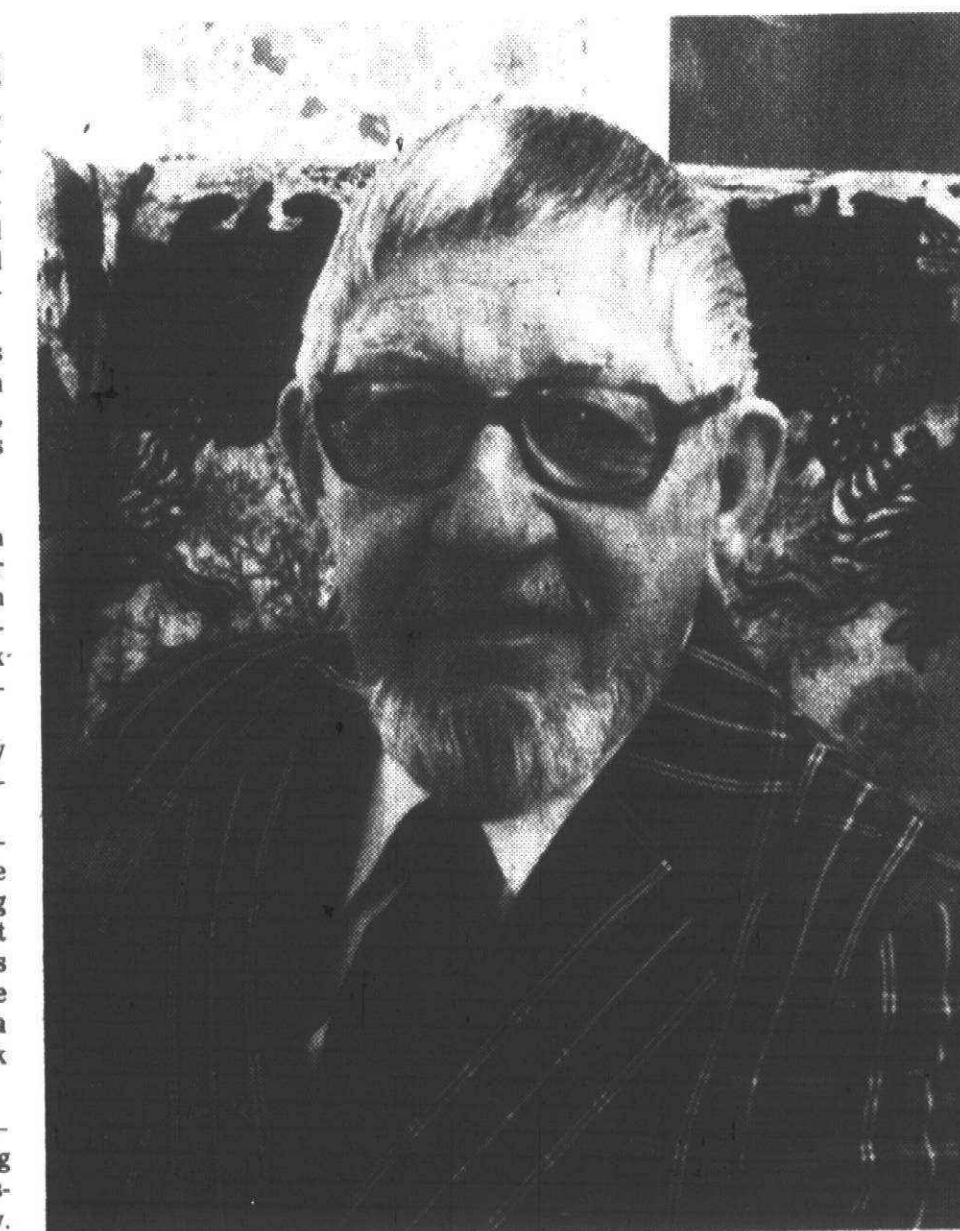
He earned his bachelor's degree in advertising at Michigan State University. He writes commercials and supervises the production of print and radio work.

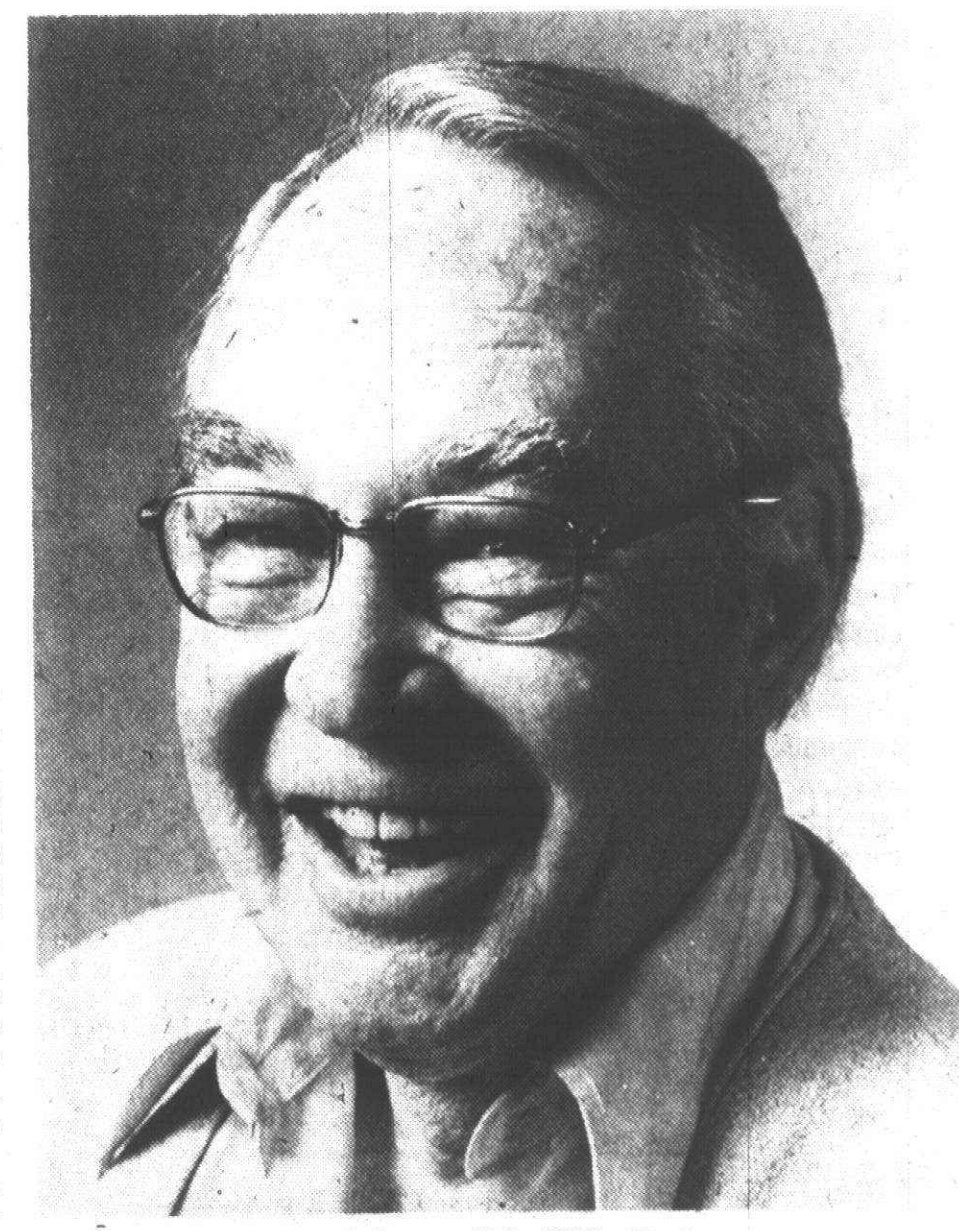
Chuck Miller, who plays the TV director, began acting in high school and college. His early roles were in musicals, "Camelot," "Carousel," and others.

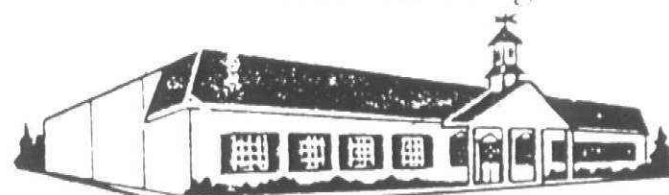

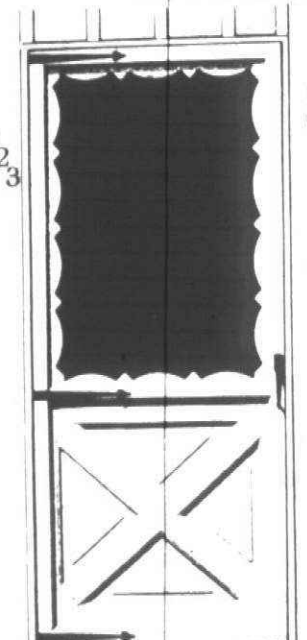

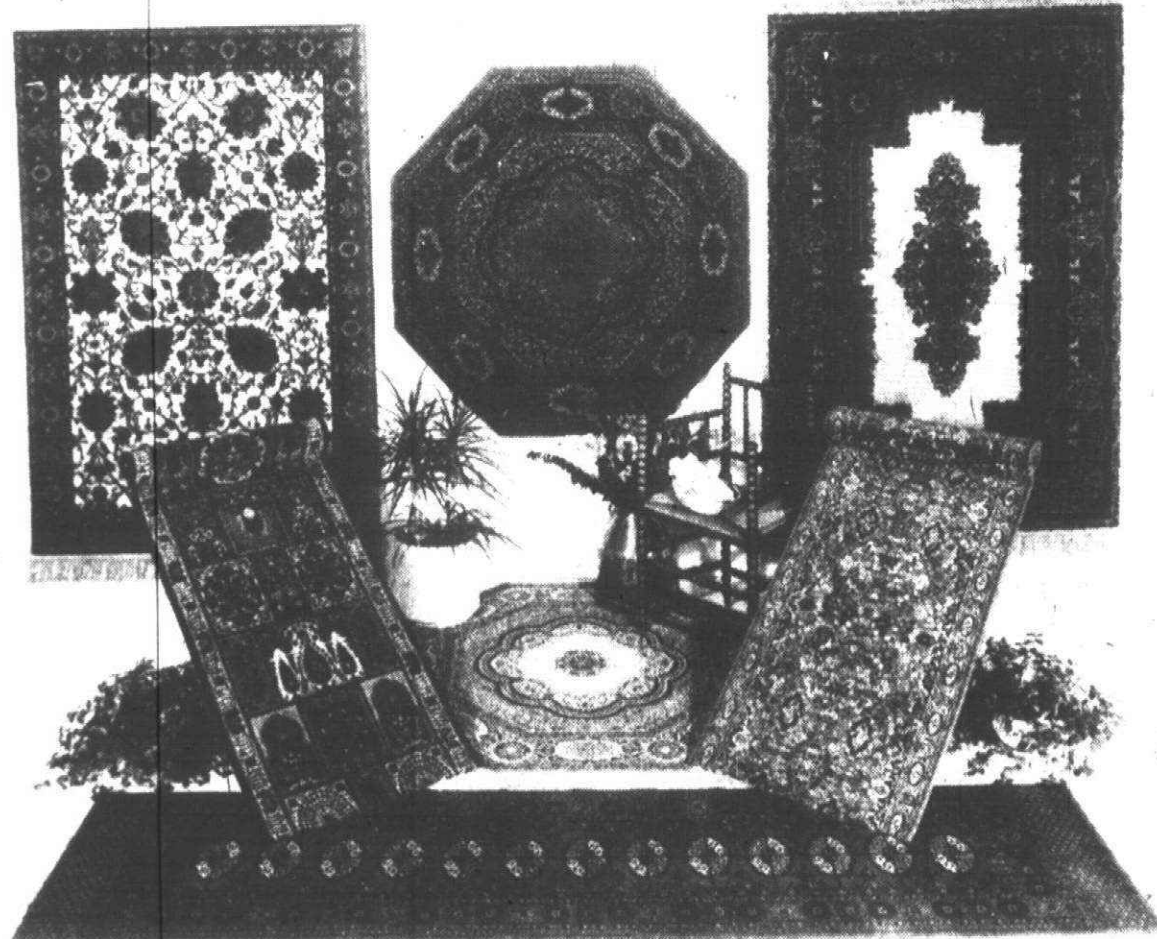

The Fasching celebration actually begins in November — on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. At that time a prince and princess are chosen in each community and the royal couple and their escort visit local clubs and are greeted with great ceremony.

Activities slow down over the Christmas season and resume after the first day of the new year. Festivities reach their peak during the three days before Ash Wednesday. They culminate Tuesday night, or fassnacht.

Everyone wears a costume to the fassnacht ball. At midnight they unmask. Those who wish to remain masked, know they must leave before the stroke of midnight.

IN SOME COMMUNITIES a person in a clown costume is placed in a coffin and carried out to mark the end of the celebration.

National costumes never are worn to fasching parties.

Those attending the party in the Cultural Center are not required to wear costumes but a majority of the celebrants do. The imaginative dress adds to the color and enjoyment of the evening. There is a grand march and prizes for the best costumes are awarded as well as other prizes.

Talbert opens lecture series

Columnist Bob Talbert will lead off on Friday, Jan. 25, a new lecture series developed by the Livonia Family Y to push fitness in public awareness.

The lectures, to be held at 8 p.m. in the auditorium of Livonia's new city hall, also will bring in nationally-known mainstreaming expert Grace Reynolds on Feb. 29, assistant coach Eddie Colquhoun of the Detroit Express soccer team on March 28 and Dr. Joseph Arends, expert in the prevention of heart disease, on April 25.

"This is a community service to provide information on the various aspects of physical fitness," said Bonnie Martin, Family Y fitness specialist who is arranging the series.

"We're trying," added Shirley Ritter, head of the Y fitness program, "to educate people into becoming health-conscious as a means of preventing medical problems."

Tickets are \$2 for each lecture or \$6 for the series, with a rate of \$1.50 and \$5 for senior citizens. Advance sales are at the Family Y, 14255 Stark, the city hall, 33000 Civic Center Drive, and at Sportventure of Plymouth, 550 Forest in Westchester Square.

There will be sales at the door if room permits.

SERIES OPENER Talbert was described by Ms. Martin as one who "recognizes the need to change life's priorities."

"He's always saying he's going to get into fitness," she said of the Detroit Free Press column writer.

"But he is a man who has had to make major decisions — he hasn't conquered his weight problem but he has conquered alcoholism. He's thinking about priorities, and he can get other people thinking about how they can rearrange their lives to be healthier."

Grace Reynolds is head of the handicapped section for the U.S. President's Council for Physical Fitness.

"She's probably the top person in the country in the area of mainstreaming — the mingling of the handicapped and the rest of the population," said Ms. Martin.

She added that the speaker travels around the country conducting conferences on new laws requiring education opportunities and enabling facilities for the handicapped.

"We all need to be more aware of what is happening in this field and how it affects us," Ms. Martin added. "Many people don't understand what mainstreaming is, and this is an opportunity to learn."

Coach Colquhoun, she said, will present a program that should interest many of the young athletes involved in the teams competing under Y auspices.

"Soccer is a sport enthusiastically endorsed by the YMCA," Ms. Martin stated, "because it's a game which can be enjoyed by kids at all age levels and skill levels."

"It's a cardiovascular game, which means it requires exertion and extends capacities, but it also is a game which does not require that much skill."

She called Dr. Arends one of the few doctors who practices preventive instead of crisis-oriented medicine and has long been an exponent of the benefits of regular running.

"He'll come in the spring," she said, "when people will be thinking of getting their running shoes out of the closet to enjoy the warmer weather."

The physician, who runs in marathons and runs with his family, points out both through his practice and in many public appearances that coronary heart disease is the top killer of men over 30 and is a menace to growing numbers of women.

Both Ms. Martin and Mrs. Ritter expressed appreciation for the cooperation of the city of Livonia in making available the new auditorium.

"It can be difficult making commitments when you are not sure of building schedules," Mrs. Ritter said, "but we've had good support."

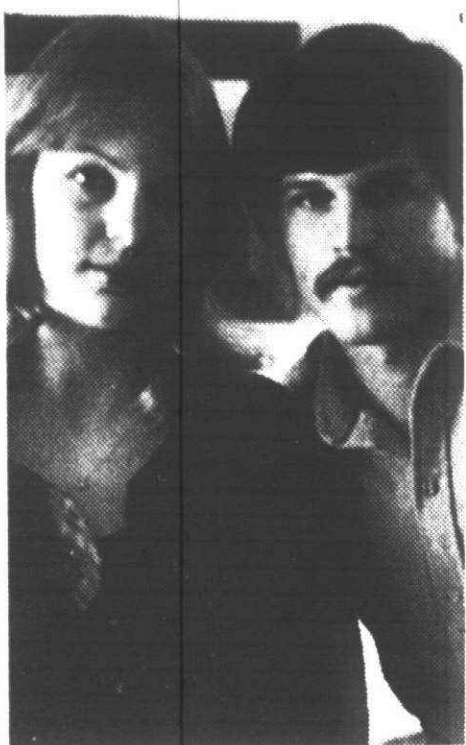

Dick Wilson remembers Meadow Brook Hall

(Dick Wilson has many friends in this area who got to know him during his years as vice president and general manager of the Detroit Race Course and Wolverine in Livonia.)

"I was never overwhelmed by living in Meadow Brook Hall. I thought that was the way everybody lived."

Dick (Richard) Wilson, the adopted son of John and Matilda Dodge Wilson, soon learned differently. However, he still maintains his love for his childhood home.

"My greatest joy at Christmas time is seeing Meadow Brook all decorated. I really think it is a unique house and should be enjoyed for generations. Lowell Ecklund and Margaret Twyman have done a terrific job running Meadow Brook," he said.

ADOPTED BY the Wilsons at Chicago's famed Cradle adoption agency when he was 1½ years old, the youngster was joined by an adopted sister, Barbara, a year later. Both children were adopted, Wilson said, at the urging of Frances Dodge, Mrs. Wilson's daughter by automotive pioneer John Dodge, her first husband.

"Barbara is now living in Scottsdale, Ariz.," her brother said. "She has five children." Wilson is the father of four children by his first marriage. They are Larry, 28, with whom he will start the L & R Plumbing Co., in January, and Barbara, 26, named for his sister, Linda, 24, and Patti, 20. All are now living in Florida.

"At the age of 50, I'm starting a new decade in life," he said. "I became a grandfather two months ago and I'm starting a new career with my granddaughter's father, my son Larry."

Frances Dodge was 17 and her brother, Danny, was about 14 when Dick was taken into the Wilson home, he said. The four youngsters got along well, Wilson noted, despite the age difference.

"I remember Danny putting me in a car and racing around the driveway at

Meadow Brook and telling me 'hang on tight, Dick,'" he said.

Wilson describes Danny as a brilliant man who formed a diesel company before his death on his honeymoon.

"MOTHER WAS never the same after Danny's death," he said. "His casket was displayed on the stair landing and his funeral was held on Meadow Brook grounds. There were 28 days of mourning for him. His bedroom was padlocked for 10 years after his death, after which I was moved into it."

"Frances had her doll house and Barbara and I had ours, too," Dick said. "It was what is now the starter's shack on the university golf course. We played there a lot since we had nobody else to play with."

Watched over by governesses, the children took riding lessons at a young age. "Frances always loved horses," Dick said, "and with her own funds from the Dodge estate supported her own stable."

In later years, Wilson said, Frances owned a horse farm in Lexington, Ky. She and her second husband, Frederick Van Lennep, also purchased the Detroit Race Course in Livonia.

"I HAVE MANY Christmas memories," Dick stated. "I remember Frances and her first husband, Jim Johnson, pulling up to Meadow Brook on Christmas morning with a horse and sleigh full of bags of gifts."

"I can also remember having Christmas dinner at the big table in the hall's dining room. There was a big sleigh in the center of the table with three strings attached for each child. After each course, we children would pull a string and find a gift on the end."

Mrs. Wilson was very active in the Salvation Army and the Denby Home for Orphans on Detroit's west side, Wilson said. "We would go to the orphanage on Christmas Eve and watch a play put on by the children and have cookies and milk. Mother would always take gifts for the 60 or 70 kids."

Returning home, he recalled that the

family decorated the ceiling high balsam tree in the "right corner" of the living room.

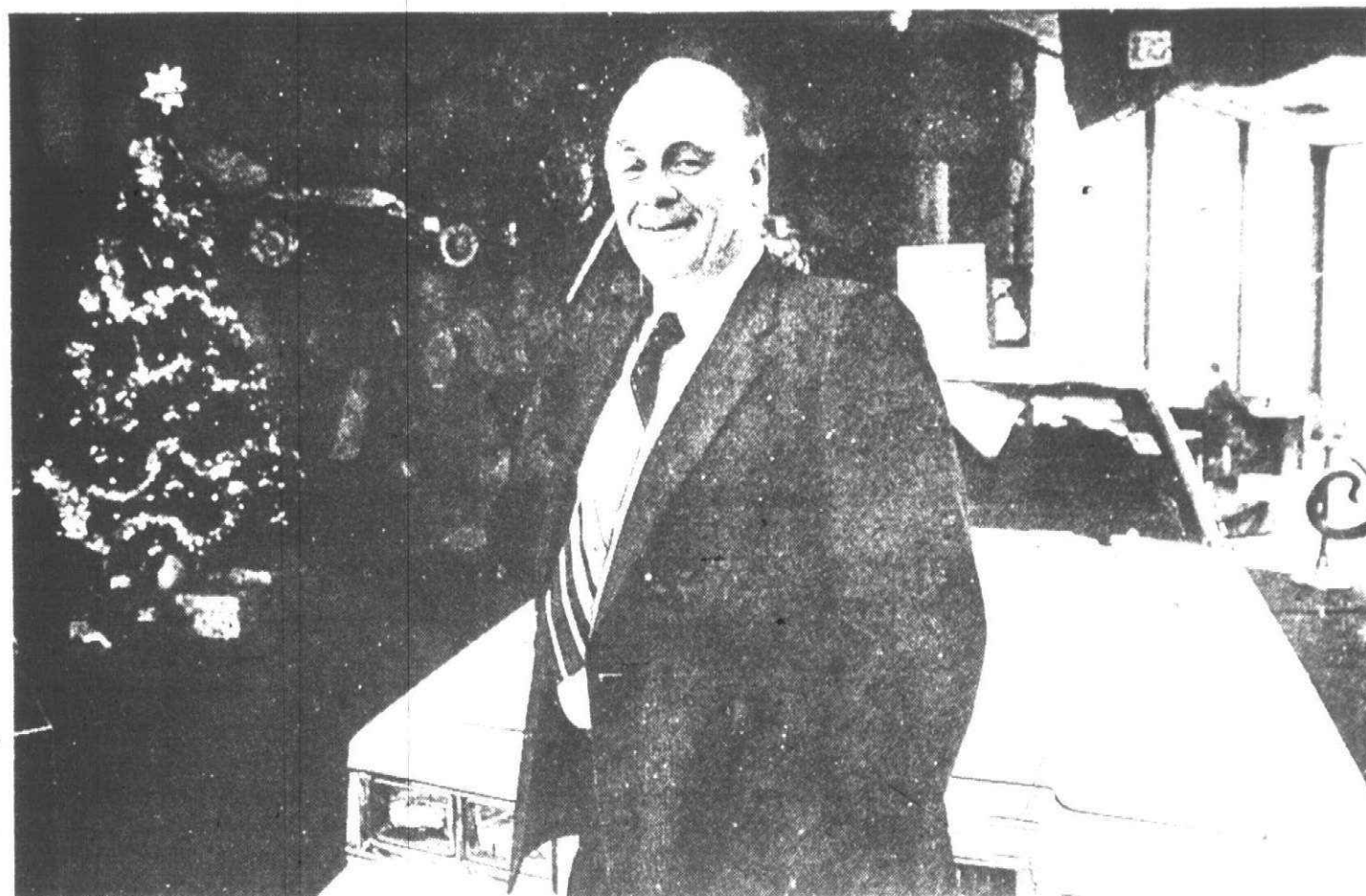
"THE TREE ALWAYS touched the ceiling," he said. "Mother would stay up until four or five in the morning wrapping gifts. She also addressed by herself the 1,500 Christmas cards the family sent out each year. We were never allowed to go to the third floor where the wrapping took place."

Wilson also remembers going with his sister Barbara to downtown Hudson's to buy Christmas gifts for all the farm's employees. They were accompanied by a governess, of course.

As a child, Wilson attended Brookside School for four years, then Vaughan School for the fifth to eighth grades. He remembers the Wilson's eight-door station wagon chauffeuring the Vaughan football team to the school games. Later he graduated from Culver Military Academy in 1947, then went to Connecticut Westland College for two years. He returned to Michigan to complete a degree in agricultural economics at Michigan State University in 1951.

"I was to manage the Meadow Brook farm," he stated, "but married a girl of whom my parents disapproved. So I set out on my own."

SINCE THEN HE has held several different positions. A couple of years ago, he explained, he moved to Florida with his second wife, Jane, where he bought into a printing business. But, "I became so lonesome for Michigan we came home."

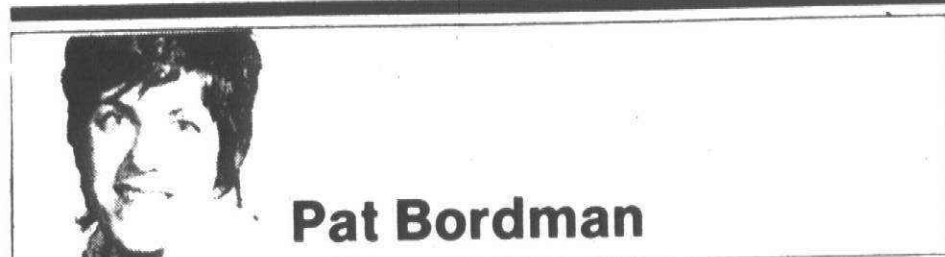

Ting go the strings on this simple toy

"It's music to my ears," we say. Or we talk of music to soothe the savage breast. We sing "I've got rhythm," and we refer to "looney tunes." In nearly every culture and every society, music holds a central role. Whether for religious purposes, relaxation or to impart social mores, music has been and is an essential ingredient in transmitting society's happenings and personal feelings.

Children are right in there when it comes to being music-minded. And of course they love the littlest pocket-sized versions of the adult world. So with an ear ping they can carry their musical inclination with them wherever they go. A soda bottle top, the kind that comes off with a can opener, and a small rubber band are the only equipment needed to make this stringed instrument.

Simply wrap the rubber band around the grooves of the bottle top several times. When you hold the ping to the ear with one hand you can strum the rubber band with the other for your own brand of music.

What would Yehudi Menuhin say? Will the rest of the symphony accept this pint-sized soundmaker? Does it rate a solo, or will an entire section of ear pings be singled out?

Who cares? The fun is in the smallest of secret sounds that will delight the inner rhythm of childhood.

Pastor musician joins in new team ministry

The installation of the Rev. Martin Seltz as assistant pastor at Faith Lutheran Church of Livonia this week makes official an unusual team ministry.

Pastor Seltz has since Dec. 1 been organist and choir director as well as head of Christian education at Faith, the church that looks like an ark and is located at 30000 Five Mile.

He has the musical and theological training for the job, with master's degrees in theology from Seminex Lutheran Seminary in St. Louis and in music from the University of Minnesota.

But he also is sharing other pastoral responsibilities with the rest of Faith's staff, The Rev. Roger Schleeth, senior minister, and the Rev. Paul Jaster.

"Our approach is a team effort," said the newest member of the team. "I'm responsible for the music, but we share the work in education as well as preaching and visiting and youth work."

"Week by week we figure out where we need to concentrate our efforts. We don't worry about stepping into the other's territory."

PASTOR SELTZ came to Faith church when a director of music and a director of Christian education both were needed, and he neatly fits the slot there.

This sort of position, however, wasn't exactly what he had envisioned when he completed theological training and then decided that he wanted a degree in the church music that had been his sideline throughout college days.

"I guess I was thinking of work in a smaller church," he said. "One that

couldn't quite justify a second pastor but could combine that position with that of musical director."

The arrangement at Faith, however, gives him the opportunity for what he considers a new approach to church music and a church choir.

"I want to use the pastoral approach to the ministry of music," he said. "You see people involved in church choirs and so often they represent a social group of people who help with the services."

"But they also are people who have spiritual needs. If you can make good music and also grow together, you have achieved a lot."

MARTIN SELTZ began his theological education at Concordia College of St. Paul and then went to Concordia Senior College at Fort Wayne before at-

tending Seminex, graduating in 1977.

"I always had some kind of part-time music position," he said, "and took some music classes along the way. Then I went on to get the degree in music."

"As I progressed, I considered teaching, but became convinced that congregational ministry was the spot in which I could offer the most."

Arriving at Faith late in 1979, he plunged quickly into Christmas music for an adult choir, a youth choir, a handbell choir and a brass choir, so there was little time to think about installation until the new year arrived.

That service took place last Sunday and the Faith congregation also gave a reception to welcome officially the new pastor and his wife and daughter.

The Seltz family will make their home in Livonia.

Family worth to be stressed

Families are Michigan's most important asset.

"The quality of families in large measure determines the social and economic quality of our society," said Doris Wetters, director of the Family Living Education Program of the Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service. "Through the family's contributions to family members and to the community are often overlooked, the family is one of our most durable institutions."

To help build public awareness of family worth, MSU Extension programs will focus on the theme "Families Make the Difference" in 1980.

Home economists at each county Cooperative Extension Service office will provide information that supports families, their strengths and their importance.

ONE WAY that families make the difference is in the education of children.

Research shows that informal education provided by families has more effect on the development of children than does formal education.

The importance of families as eco-

nomic units will also be stressed in 1980. Lois Lund, dean of the MSU College of Human Ecology, says that if family systems operated as market economies, few of us could afford our current living standards.

Though times change, family structures help the individual survive the stresses of social change.

Beatrice Paolucci, MSU professor of family ecology, holds the family can do this better than any other institution.

"No matter what societal changes occur in the future, family resilience will enable individuals to survive and thrive," Ms. Paolucci said.

"Among the many assets families have, these are their more important contributions," Wetters said. "We must recognize families for their worth and, more importantly, provide them support in their continued contributions to society."

Persons interested in learning about trends in family living, the strengths of families and family's contributions to the community may contact their local MSU Cooperative Extension Service office for more information about programs and materials that support families and how they make the difference.

Your Jan. 3 editorial on a mandatory state auto exhaust inspection and maintenance program (I/M) was timely and informative in view of the impending consideration of such legislation by the Michigan Legislature.

Unfortunately, your editorial failed to recognize other important facts which should be considered in the development of a policy whether such an I/M program should be statewide or restricted to southeast Michigan.

These additional facts are:
• Other Michigan cities such as Muskegon, Grand Rapids, Lansing, Flint and Essexville experience ozone levels as great or greater than much of southeast Michigan.

• Ozone is not emitted from auto exhaust tailpipes or factory chimneys, but is formed in the atmosphere by the interaction of hydrocarbons and oxides of nitrogen gases (under the influence of sunlight).

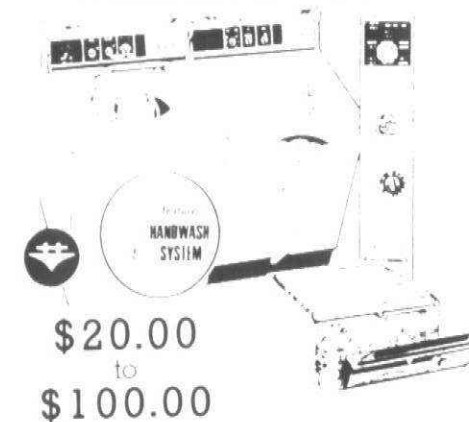

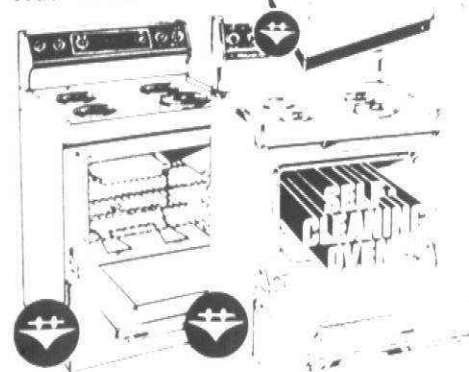

How to save on trains while traveling in France

By SAM HUDSON

The writer, local historian and author of "Plymouth Past & Present," is wintering in southern France. This column is another in a series of how senior citizens, or others, can travel through Europe on a limited budget.

In France, a carte Vermeil (Red card), which a senior citizen can buy at any railroad station, entitles the bearer to a 50 percent reduction in train fares. Train service on the continent is excellent, and the card represents a major saving in transportation.

The card costs only \$8.50 and is good for a year. In a couple of train trips from Nice to Cannes, and a train ride we took to nearby Italy, we more than recovered the cost of our cards a few days after we bought them.

It was a toss-up whether we would rent an apartment in Nice or Cannes. Both are attractive. We chose Cannes because it is the smaller of the two. We reasoned that an apartment in a quiet neighborhood would be closer to the center of things in Cannes than would be the case in bustling Nice.

In addition, the college in Cannes, where I will begin to study French next week, is more accessible than the Uni-

versity at Nice, high on a hill overlooking the city. Much as I like to walk I couldn't see myself trudging up that steep hill every morning.

IT TOOK LESS than an hour to find an attractive apartment in Cannes. A chance meeting with an elderly French woman who had lived, and taught French, in San Francisco was providential.

We met her in a tourist bureau. Almost every railroad station in Europe has a tourist bureau nearby. When we got off the train we headed for the one in Cannes.

The woman, who happened to enter the bureau while we were there, heard us talking and spoke to us in English. When we told her we were looking for an apartment, she told us a friend of hers had an apartment to rent for a few

months. She gave us the name and address of the real estate agent. His office was within walking distance.

We told the agent we were looking for a place "tres tranquille." Three years ago we had to move from an apartment in Aix-en-Provence because the noise of traffic, especially motorcycles and motor bikes, kept us awake at night.

The apartment we had been directed to was in a noisy neighborhood, the agent told us. But he had another he could show us. The owner was also on vacation for about three months.

We liked the apartment and have been living on Avenue la Baronne since December 11.

Our apartment is on the third floor of a modern six-story building about one mile from the Mediterranean. We have a living room and bedroom, both of which open to private balconies; kitchen; bathroom with tub; and a separate

toilet. Completely furnished, including dishes, kitchen utensils, a clothes rack and clothes pins, the rent is \$360 a month, including heat, gas and electricity.

OUR FRONT balcony, facing east, gets the morning sun. It overlooks a small canal, or stream, that flows downhill to the bay. Our back balcony overlooks the athletic field of an elementary school.

The building is well-situated on a quiet street that runs between Rue Carnot and Boulevard de la Republique, two of Cannes' main arteries. We are within reasonable walking distance of the center of town.

That includes LaCroisette, the impressive promenade at the beach front; Rue D'Antibes, home of the expensive shops; the old and new ports where yachts from many countries are anchored; the flower market and three

other markets that sell produce and clothing; and the popular Rue Meynadier, the narrow, picturesque street lined with shops that sell at bargain prices.

We were fortunate to arrive here early in December. The winter season begins in January and hotel rooms and apartments will be harder to find.

It is during the summer vacation period, however, that Cannes is full of people flocking to the beaches. Unlike the stony beaches at Nice, those at Cannes are sandy.

An Englishman and his wife, who have lived in Cannes for 33 years, told us that it is almost impossible to find a parking place, "or even to drive from A to B" at the height of the summer season.

I didn't tell him about our parking problems in Michigan.

With trumpets blaring, he gets a degree

Frank Di Blasi as a kid in northwest Detroit was helping a friend learn to play trumpet.

The friend's mother didn't want to hear the noise around the house, so the two would practice in a nearby cemetery by propping up sheet music against tombstones.

Years later, in World War II, the friend was in a company sent to France for the Battle of Normandy. Everyone in the company was killed in battle except the trumpet player.

He was the only member of the company not sent on the mission. It seems the army needed a bugler in England.

Di BLASI, conductor of the Oakway Symphony, recalled that one the other day as he was thinking about his recital this weekend to complete his master's degree from Eastern Michigan University.

The free concert is at 4 p.m. Saturday in Ward United Presbyterian Church, Farmington Road at Six Mile in Livonia.

The interesting aspect of the recital — for trumpet fans, at least — is that Di Blasi will be performing on four trumpets of varying sizes and pitch.

He'll be using a B-flat trumpet, the most commonly used; a C, which is pitched to a piano; a shorter D, used in baroque compositions; and an E-flat, which can hit very high notes.

"You go for a note and it isn't there," Di Blasi says of the E-flat trumpet. "It's up here."

On the program are Buxtehude's Fanfare and Chorus, using three trumpets and an organ; Purcell's Trumpet Voluntary; Haydn's Trumpet Concerto, using the E-flat trumpet, with the Oakway Chamber Orchestra; and "The Trumpet Shall Sound," from Handel's "Messiah" with bassist Len Newton and a brass quintet of Oakway players.

Concluding the program will be two contemporary selections — the Concertino for Trumpet and Piano by Danish composer Rasmussen, and Frackenpohl's Quintet for Brass.

Di Blasi will play trumpet in each of the works.

The performance is being dedicated to Charles Lemon, Di Blasi's next-door neighbor and a member of Ward Presbyterian, who was killed five months ago in a car accident.

THE STRONG BREATHING needed for heavy trumpet work, not to mention the strain on one's lip, makes for certain physical limitations on the performer.

"You gotta know where to give and take," Di Blasi explains.

He admits to partaking of the joys of an occasional good cigar, for instance, but he'd be doomed by any heavy smoking. And trying to play on a full stomach doesn't work too well either; it spoils breathing.

Oh, yes. There's one other problem.

"I never eat spaghetti before a performance," Di Blasi says. "The tomato puckers my lip."

Stage 'family' makes show a big success

From world champions to community theater groups, "we are family" echoes from the bleachers to the balconies.

But, then, only a winning group is a family. If nine players don't blend to play as a team, they lose, enter stage right, Detroit Tigers.

So it is with a theater group. Individuals make for great actors but lousy plays.

If you see to see a good play, catch the Plymouth Theater Guild's production of Neil Simon's "The Sunshine Boys."

TAKEN FROM the days of vaudeville, "The Sunshine Boys" is about a comedy team, Lewis and Clark, who for 46 years did their burlesque schtick from coast to coast.

When Lewis voluntarily retires, forcing Clark to follow suit, a feud develops. After 11 years of not talking to each other, they reluctantly agree to reunite for one last performance.

"The Sunshine Boys" is really about old age and the love two old stagehands have for each other.

John Roberts plays Willie Clark, the dethroned half of the team. A veteran performer, Roberts has a long line of credits, dating back to early radio when he did a variety of roles in weekly dramatizations for WWJ and WJBK.

"It's hard to retire and stop doing the things you've done your whole life," Robert says. "It's even harder when you're forced into it. The problem is that creativeness doesn't retire."

The play has two loveable old men caught between the ravages of time and the desire to perform one last joke.

"It's funny. The high for me is the performing — and so it is for Willie. What's life if there isn't a laugh now and then?" Roberts asks.

"You see, I'm just like my character. I retired and I didn't want to slow down. Theater is that chance for me to keep moving, to keep expanding my mind."

Science fiction fans gathering

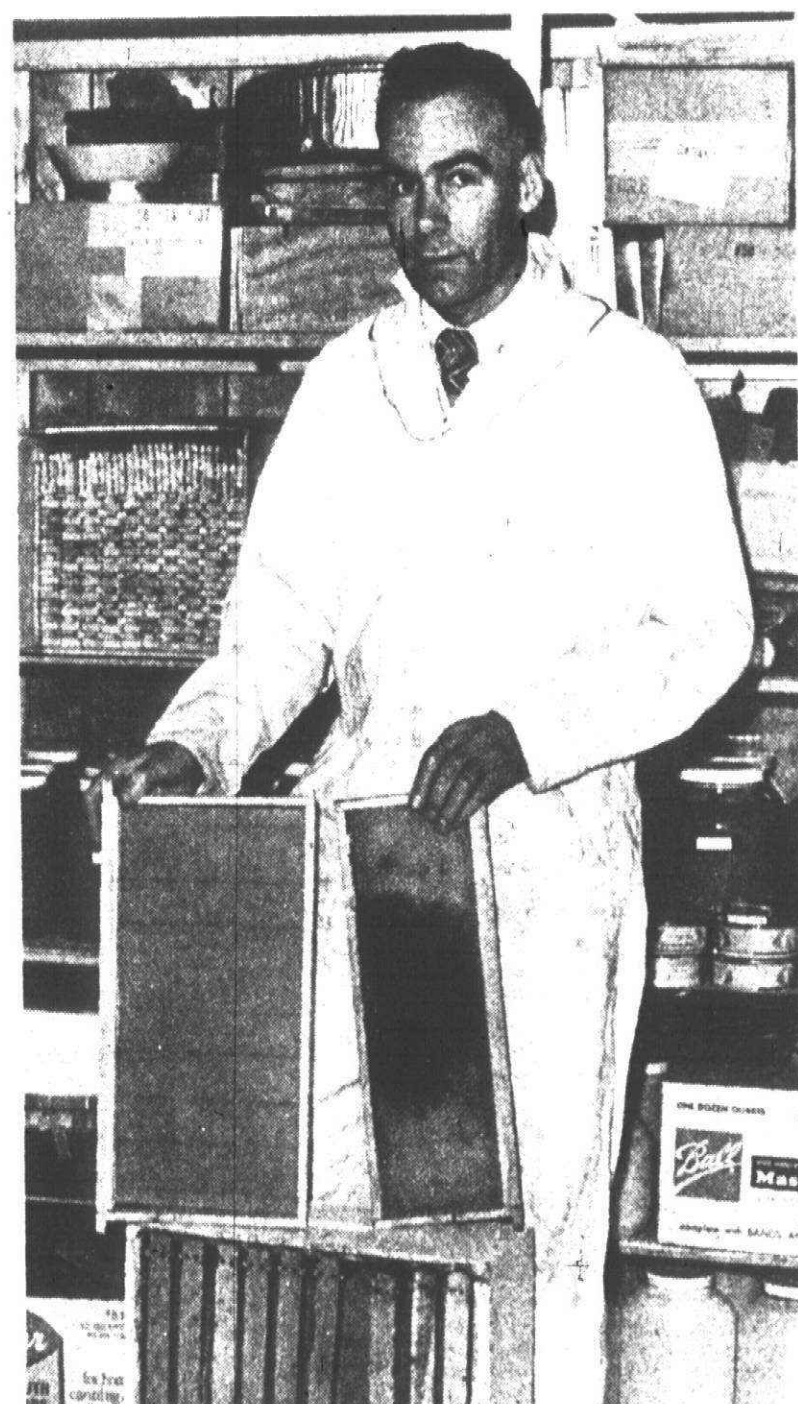
You may think Plymouth is on the edge of the county map. But for ConFusion fans, it's out of this world.

The sting

Nation's beekeepers swarming into town

Fritz Sanders is all abuzz over next week's big convention in Dearborn. It's expected to be just a honey of a time.

Sanders' hobby, you see, is beekeeping. And both hobbyists and commercial apiarists will be swarming into town from throughout the country for their annual convention at the Hyatt Regency Hotel.

The meeting, running Jan. 21-25, includes exhibits of honey, beeswax and equipment, a seminar for beginners, various speakers and, of course, the crowning of the American Honey Queen.

Registration is \$10 per person for all events, except meals. Various educational sessions will discuss how to deal with the adulteration of honey, diseases and nutrition, desensitizing honeybees from stings, soybean pollination and the like.

The film "Killer Bees: Fact or Fantasy?" will run at 1 p.m. Tuesday. Dr. Robert Byberg of Cranbrook will lead a seminar for beginning beekeepers 1-5 p.m. next Wednesday, explaining how to start a colony, buy equipment and deal with it all.

All honey included in displays and judging will be auctioned at 5 p.m. Thursday.

Registration is open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily; the exhibits are open to 6 p.m.

SANDERS, WHO maintains two hives in his backyard in Livonia, three in Westland and two at Schoolcraft College, got hooked on the hobby in 1976 when he was helping a friend clear out a hive in his yard.

"It becomes such a natural thing after awhile," he says. "It seems odd because people don't know much about bees."

"You look back a hundred years or so and everybody was doing it."

For him, the benefits of beekeeping are both in the fascination of the hobby and in the usefulness of it.

"In today's economy, if we eradicate honeybees, we would have famine," he says.

On the hobby side, Sanders, an engineer at Volkswagen, gets to study nature at work and uses his other hobbies of photography, woodworking and metalworking. He's constructed his own extractor, which uses centrifugal force to separate the honey from the combs.

ALL THIS is not without problems, though.

Sanders figures he gets stung around 10 times a year or so. But he doesn't worry about it.

"They leave you alone unless you don't leave them alone," he explains.

"I don't like to disturb them more than necessary."

His neighbors have mixed feelings

about all the little buggers. One of them got the city to take him to court a couple years back in an attempt to get rid of the hives. Sanders won the case.

But another neighbor, who has a cherry tree in his yard, is just delighted. He's been getting bumper crops of cherries, thanks to the bees pollinating the flowers.

"People think bees are just good for getting stung," Sanders says.

Honey, he says, is much healthier than plain white sugar. His family uses it instead of sugar and goes through about 70 pounds a year.

"A lot of people are lacking nutrition. Well, there's the perfect food for you."

He suggests beekeeping is a perfect hobby for retirees. It can be done in a yard and the honey makes for great eating.

SANDERS FIGURES he's invested maybe \$400 in equipment for his seven hives. Queen bees — one per hive — are sold through the mail for \$6-7. A used hive, including a small swarm, goes for \$50.

But then it's a hobby. Sanders knows all about worker bees (females who can't reproduce) and drones (non-stinging males who die from mating).

He can show you a honeycomb in which the worker bees are making room for a queen bee she gets more space than the others.

He'll tell you about the workers selecting an egg to become a new queen bee if the old one dies.



On Dearborn campus A coffeehouse that won't say no

Every Wednesday night on the University of Michigan-Dearborn campus, the student center takes a jump back in time and transforms itself into the Hinge coffeehouse.

If you have visions of goateed beatniks sitting around in turtle-neck sweaters snapping their fingers, though, you're going a bit too far back.

The Hinge features folk, blues, jazz, bluegrass and even the occasional comedian or mime. The Hinge recently held its first theatrical production — three one-act plays given by the school's theater department.

But the mainstay is folk music.

"A lot of people think 'folk' means some guy singing about the British Isles. That's just a small part of it," says Tom Berry, assistant coordinator of the coffeehouse.

THE HINGE started 10 years ago in the Fair Lane

Conference Center, the former home of Henry Ford which is now part of the UM-D campus, and has since moved to what's called the Recreation and Organization Center.

Run by students during the school year (through April), the Hinge is operated under the auspices of the Office of Student Life.

What Berry thinks is the misconception about folk music could be one of the reasons why the Hinge has such small audiences. There are seats for 500 but the average audience is around 70 people — nowhere near capacity.

The atmosphere is pleasant, reminiscent of coffeehouses in Ann Arbor (where many of the acts are gathered). There are soft cushions and couches for lounging and candlelit tables for those who prefer sitting upright.

Admission is \$1.75, including coffee, tea and doughnuts. For information on future acts, call UM-D's Office of Student Life at 593-5390.

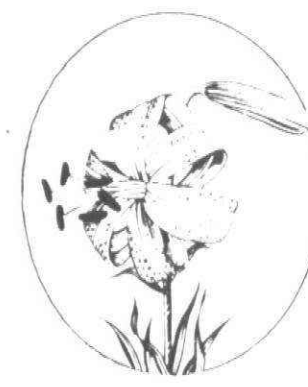

tips from the Air Force Survival School

You and two companions are on the second day of a four-day cross-country ski trip. You are traveling in an area generally above the tree line and are making good time.

Suddenly, a drastic change in the weather occurs. The temperature is 15 degrees, the wind is blowing at 10 mph and is increasing, and it is starting to snow. It is imperative that you get shelter as soon as possible.

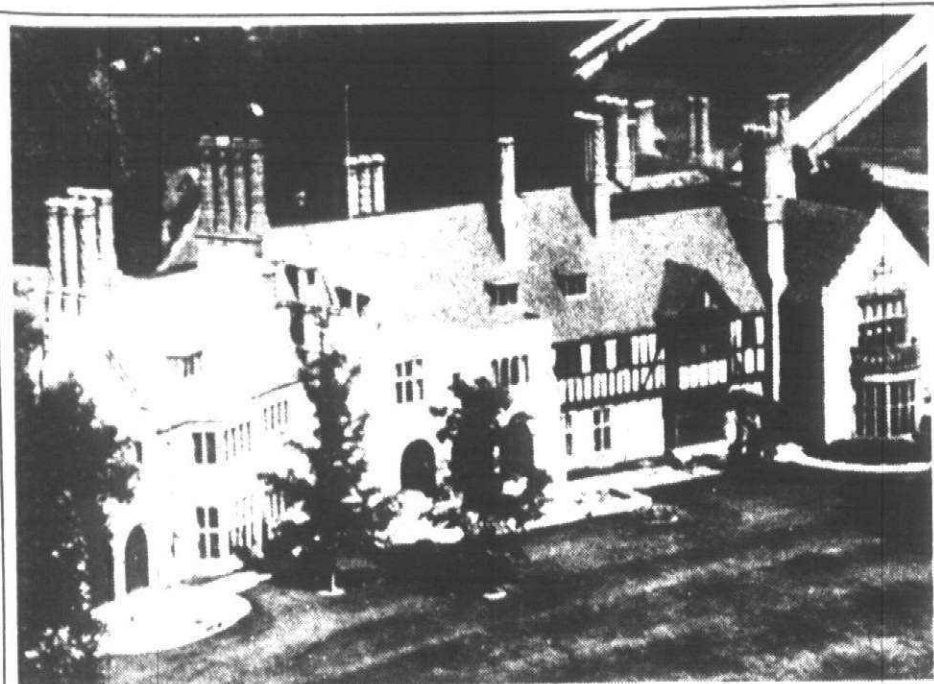
WOULD YOU . . .

- Begin digging a snow cave?
- Start collecting available materials for the construction of a lean-to?
- Continue traveling until you find a good wind break?
- Move down into the tree line and locate a downed tree and burrow under it?

TO SURVIVE . . .

In all emergency situations, such as storms, where shelter is mandatory to survive, a person is wise to utilize what is available.

In the situation described, alternative A is the best selection. Considering your location above the tree line and the prevailing conditions, a shelter that would provide maximum retention of body heat is needed. A snow cave, with three people working on it, can be constructed in a manner of minutes — at least to a point where you are shielded from the elements. Once inside, you can expand the shelter to suit your desires.



Meadow Brook Hall has display of clothing

Beginning this weekend, a Sunday drive to Meadow Brook Hall will provide two historic attractions for the price of one.

A collection of vintage designer clothes that span almost 50 years of American fashion will be displayed in the ballroom of the historic mansion on the campus of Oakland University in Rochester.

On display are dozens of outfits from the Wilson Collection, fashions created for the Alfred Wilson and John Dodge families during the first half of this century. The display is open to all guests touring Meadow Brook Hall.

The hall itself was a magnificent dream that became a reality when Alfred and Matilda Wilson completed their \$4 million home in 1929.

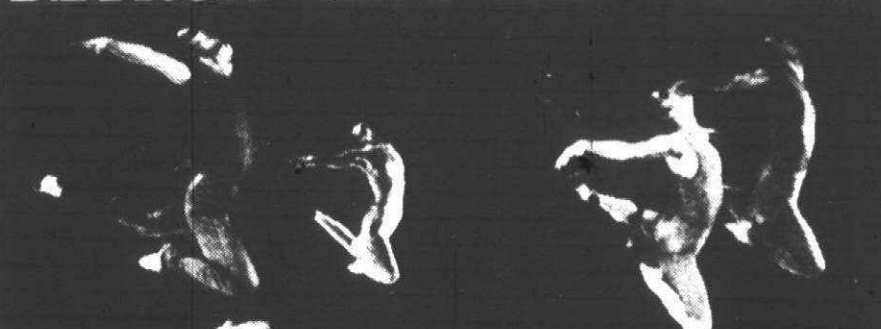

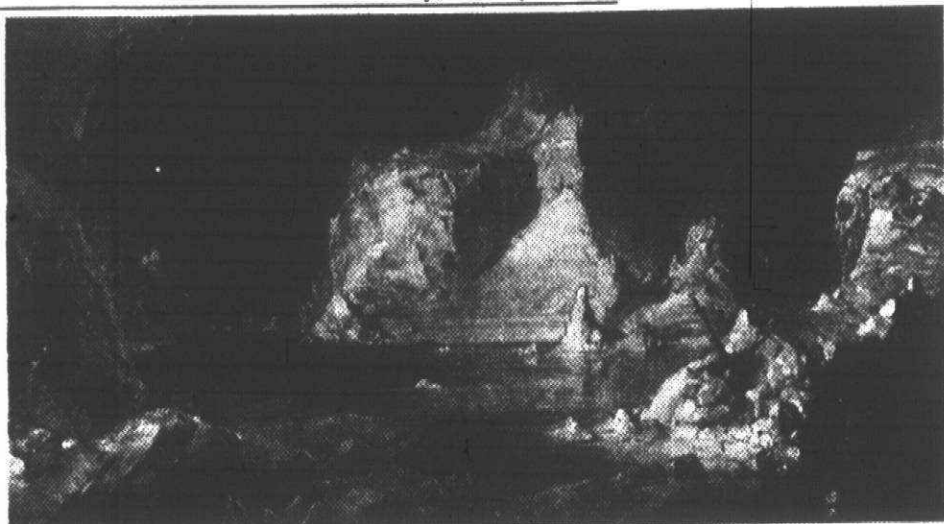

Church painting on the block

The eyes of the art world were riveted on New York City last October when a painting, "The Icebergs" by Frederick E. Church, brought an unprecedented \$2.5 million plus the 10 percent charge now added to items sold at auction.

This is the highest price ever paid for an American painting and the third highest ever paid for any painting. The 8-by-13 foot oil, painted by Church in 1861, was purchased by LaMarre Hunt and given to the Dallas Museum.

The painting's whereabouts had been a mystery for over 100 years until it was found on the wall of a reform school in Manchester, England.

Even then, art collectors were unaware that Church earlier had done a small oil, 10-by-19, of the same scene, which belonged to Church's great grandson, a Birmingham, Mich. resident.

This smaller version of "The Icebergs" will be included in an auction starting at 11 a.m. Saturday by Stalker and Boos in their National Auction Gallery. The auction will include many paintings — works by Utrillo, Duran, Chagall, Schreyer and Raffaelli, among others.

The gallery is on the lower level of the Great American Mall, 280 N. Woodward, two blocks north of Maple in downtown Birmingham. Admission to the auction is free.

A COMPLETE WORK rather than a study,

Church did the small painting in 1859.

David Huntington of the University of Michigan faculty, an authority on Church, has authenticated the painting.

Frank Boos, smiling, said, "It's a totally unknown work of art, even David Huntington didn't know about it... it's never been out of the family."

Boos said that as soon as the news about the small iceberg painting spread across the country, frantic calls from Dallas began coming in. Would the discovery of this painting downgrade the value of the larger one?

"My reaction was that it enhanced the value," Boos said. "Now, with the smaller painting, we can show the changes in the artist's thinking from the standpoint of history — that's very important."

The iceberg which occupies the center background in both paintings is essentially the same in both. Chunks of ice floating in the water in front and at one side are slightly modified in the large later work.

One important element, a shipwreck, is different in each. In the small one, it is in the right corner foreground, half buried in the ice with the mast still clearly seen like a tilted cross on an untended grave.

But in the water just right of center, there's a dim shadow of the same ship, indicating the artist had placed it there, possibly caught on an outcropping of ice, and later changed his mind.

Band on stage in Farmington

Dr. William D. Revelli, director emeritus of University of Michigan Bands, will conduct the Farmington Community Band at 3 p.m. Sunday in Harrison High School's auditorium.

General admission is \$2 for adults, \$1 for students and seniors, or \$5 for a family. The school is at 29995 12 Mile Rd.

"Dr. Revelli is not only a band conductor par excellence, he is a man of discipline and good humor," said Katie Lipski, spokesman for the band. "He

expects 150 percent from band members in everything they do."

Revelli came to U-M in 1935 and developed a marching band considered unique throughout the world. Under his leadership, that band was first to develop a half-time show from an original manuscript score.

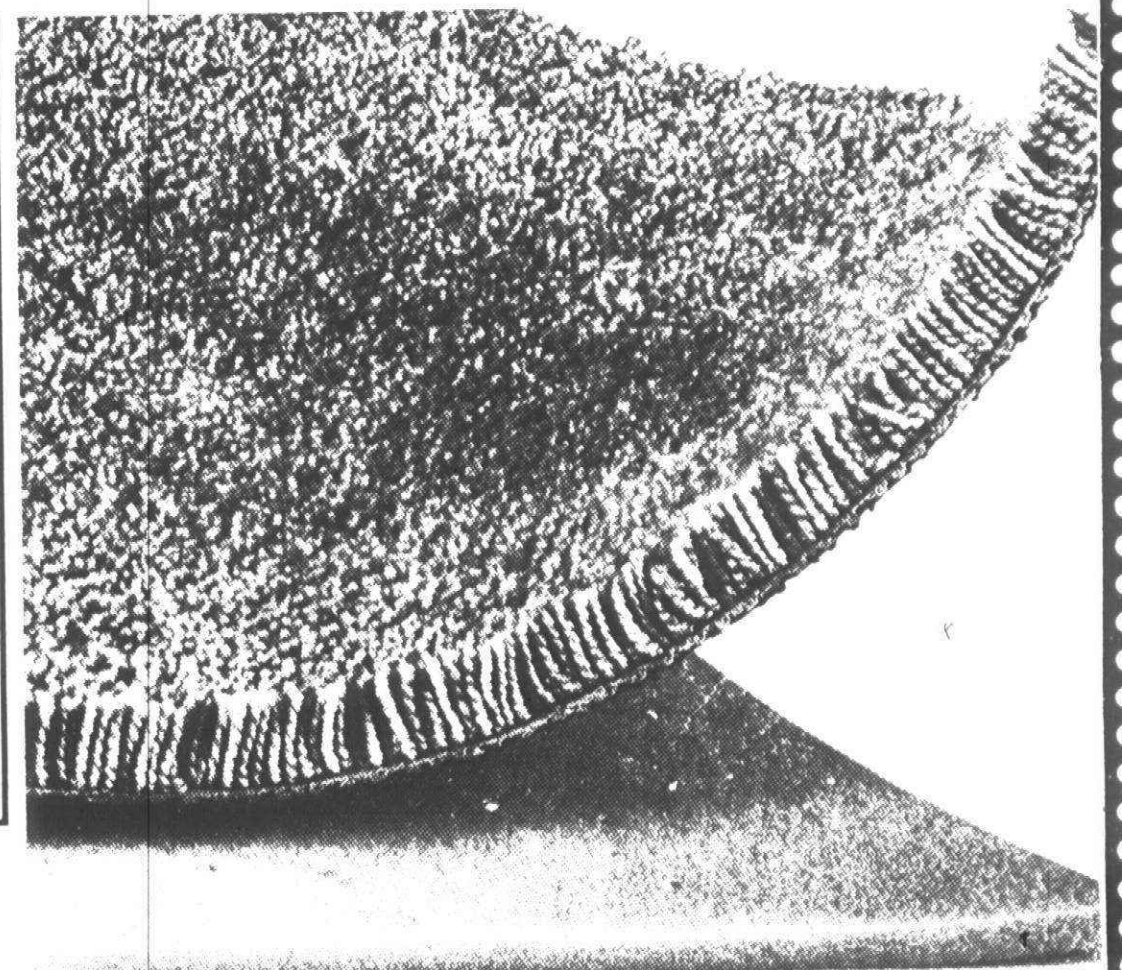
While director of Bands at U-M, Revelli took the school's symphony band to nine countries. This tour concluded with a concert in New York's Carnegie Hall.

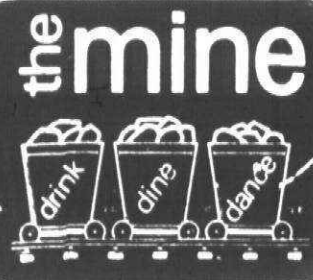

Ancient Nigerian artifacts in DIA exhibition

"Treasures of Ancient Nigeria: Legacy of 2,000 Years" opens Jan. 17 at the Detroit Institute of Arts.

One hundred objects, including rare Benin bronze plaques and the earliest art discovered in Nigeria by recent archaeology, represent a time span which predates the Golden Age of Greece and the birth of Christ.

Funding for the U.S. tour has come from grants by the National Endowment for the Arts, Mobil, and the Founders Society Detroit Institute of Arts. It is also supported by a Federal Indemnity from the Federal Council on the Arts and Humanities.

The loan, acknowledged by the host museums as unprecedented, is the largest ever made to America by an African country. Its availability to Detroit audiences coincides with construction of a new wing to the Nigerian Museum in the capital city of Lagos.

Two works in the show, a pair of bronze leopards, royal

symbols of Nigeria's Kingdom of Benin, are valued in excess of \$1 million each.

A fragment of what is believed to be the first representation of an elephant in Black African art is also in the show.

OTHER PRIZE PIECES are bronze castings of a queen from Ife (1,200-1,500 A.D.) and the "Great Image" of the Queen Mother of Benin. Both display sophisticated techniques which African Art historians say rival the best work done by Western Renaissance artists.

Organized by Michael Kan, deputy director and curator of African, Oceanic and New World Cultures at the Detroit Institute of Arts, and Dr. Ekpo Eyo, director of the Nigerian Federal Department of Antiquities, the exhibition will acquaint Americans with the media used by African artisans over the centuries — bronze, terra cotta,

ivory and stone. It will also illustrate the cultural continuum of the Nigerian artistic tradition as now defined by archaeologists and art historians.

The exhibition includes works from the earliest known Nigerian tradition, the Nok culture (500 B.C. to 200 A.D.); representative objects from Igbo-Ukwu, a site in south-east Nigeria (which dates to the mid-9th century A.D.); and the court art of the city-states of Ife (1,200-1,500 A.D.) and Benin (1400-1897 A.D.).

Also included are ancient sculpture of the Yoruba people. As heirs to an artistic tradition that began with Nok and is closely associated with Ife and Benin, the Yoruba, one of the modern Nigerian peoples, form a continuous link between ancient traditions and modern times.

"Treasures of Ancient Nigeria" will be in Detroit through March 16.

AS THE TWO old-timers in the play meet for their first rehearsal in 11 years, all the frustration and effects of time become obvious. Expectedly, a verbal fight develops as the two hammer out their differences.

As expected with Neil Simon, the method is comedy, in this case sprinkled with arithmetic joints, senile logic and slipping memories.

For Rik Kureth, who plays Al Lewis, the part poses special problems.

"We're actors playing actors," he says. "Timing is everything and we must play a vaudeville gag like we've done it 12,000 times before — perfect."

As with most plays of this caliber, only people with the credentials of Roberts and Kureth need apply. Kureth, like Roberts, started his career in radio.

"For one thing, they won't have to do a lot of makeup on us," he says. "We're both old enough to remember the traveling burlesque shows. We saw them as young men; now we get the chance to be one of them."

"In a play like this, where the timing is so overwhelmingly important, you realize the need for a tight cast. My job is to make John look good, and so it is for him to help me. It gets so you're not acting for the audience. You're acting for each other."

"And when you're really on and the jokes are flying, one-liner after another, you realize why people like the theater."

IT'S RARE that a community theater has such talent stockpiled, but then this is just the start of the Plymouth group.

Hidden away in the depths of the cast, Martin Keasal plays the patient in the final sketch. A longtime theater participant, he is by trade an engineer.

His stage accomplishments include designing the massive fly space and mechanical rigging for both the Lincoln Art Center in New York City and the Kennedy Center in Washington.

And there's Kirsten Moomey, a rookie among professionals but a source of great inspiration. In her role as assistant director, she is learning her future craft.

Her father is a professional actor. She came here from Chicago to enroll in a program for hearing impaired children at Madonna College.

"I love theater," she says. "Back in Chicago, we developed a script adapted for the hearing impaired. With sign language and dance, we were able to do 'Sound of Music.'"



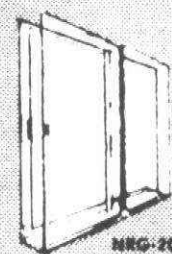
