Schools want new attendance policy

Getting parents involved in their children's absenteeism while keeping the kids in school is the aim of a newly-proposed attendance policy at Centennial Educational Park.

The proposed policy, expected to be voted on by the Board of Education Aug. 23, is a revision of a 1981-82 school year pilot policy. The revision is a "cleaner procedure," according to Plymouth Salem High School principal Bill Brown.

One major change is the elimination of written notes from the parents of an absent student. The parent would be required to call the office by 3 p.m. on the day the student is absent and no later than 3 p.m. on the day the student returns to school, or the absence will be considered unexcused.

"THE MAIN thrust is to get parents involved," said Brown, who was a revision committee member. "I think the new policy is going to cut down on the (needed) time for teachers. I think it's an accepted fact that most notes aren't

authentic and the phone calls mean getting parents involved with their son or daughter's absenteeism."

Absences from class for reasons of illness, family emergency, family business, or school business are considered excused absences.

After a student's second absence the teacher will notify the student's area coordinator if they are unable to contact the parents by telephone.

After five unexcused absences, the teacher is to complete a referral listing the exact dates the student was absent and file it with the area coordinator's

office. The same action continues with eight and then 10 unexcused absences.

Another change instituted during the pilot policy, and continuing with the proposed revisions, says the student will not be dropped from a class without credit after eight unexcused absences.

Lean times put squeeze on service

The poor economy is pinching funds from non-profit clubs and community groups in Canton.

The case in point is the Canton Country Festival, which allows non-profit groups to sell food and sponsor games. While some booths racked up good earnings, others — especially those serving full meals — suffered a disappointing drop in patronage from past years. The economy is being blamed.

It's important to these groups, because profits from the meals are used for community service projects.

According to festival guidelines, organizations serving a full meal pay a \$150 permit fee, to cover insurance. Concession booths pay a \$50 fee. All groups must kick 20 percent of their earnings back to the festival's till for operating expenses.

THE CANTON Business and Professional Women's Club teamed up with donations from the new Mr. Steak restaurant in Canton to offer a half-pound hamburger, with extras, for \$2.50. With a sale of 540 dinners, the club expects to net \$500-\$700 for its civic fund, said Deborah O'Connor, Canton librarian and first vice-president of the BPW.

"The money is going right back into the community to help a woman gain

Cardinal resigns broadcast position

The 10-year administrative veteran of WSDP will be leaving the station at the end of the month.

Jeff Cardinal has accepted the director of promotions position at a newly-formed Lansing television station, bringing to an end a long career at the high school radio station.

Cardinal, the last of the charter members of the WSDP staff, says he isn't surprised at the station's progress since its start in 1972.

"We set some long-range goals years ago — we are about three-quarters of the way there," the father of two says.

The annual WSDP auctions are just part of the program Cardinal has set up as station coordinator. The auctions, held to raise money for the FM station, have come to be recognized as a community affair.

"The auctions are a very fun activity for the community and (for) us out here."

The first auction, held some three years ago, paid for needed equipment.

"I felt we had gone to the school board for a lot already. They paid for our power increase to 200 watts, that ran over \$10,000.

"Eastern Michigan University picked up the cost for the switch of frequencies (the station is now at 88.1 FM).

"I figured if we could work for the money we could get some equipment we needed," Cardinal says.

When he took over the station there wasn't a budget of any kind.

THE STATION'S advisory board, now a standing school board committee, was another facet of the operation Cardinal help start and keep going.

"The purpose was to give input on what was being done at the station. We asked the community to take part in the long-range planning of WSDP."

Throughout the years, Cardinal's students have gone from high school into positions at college and commercial stations.

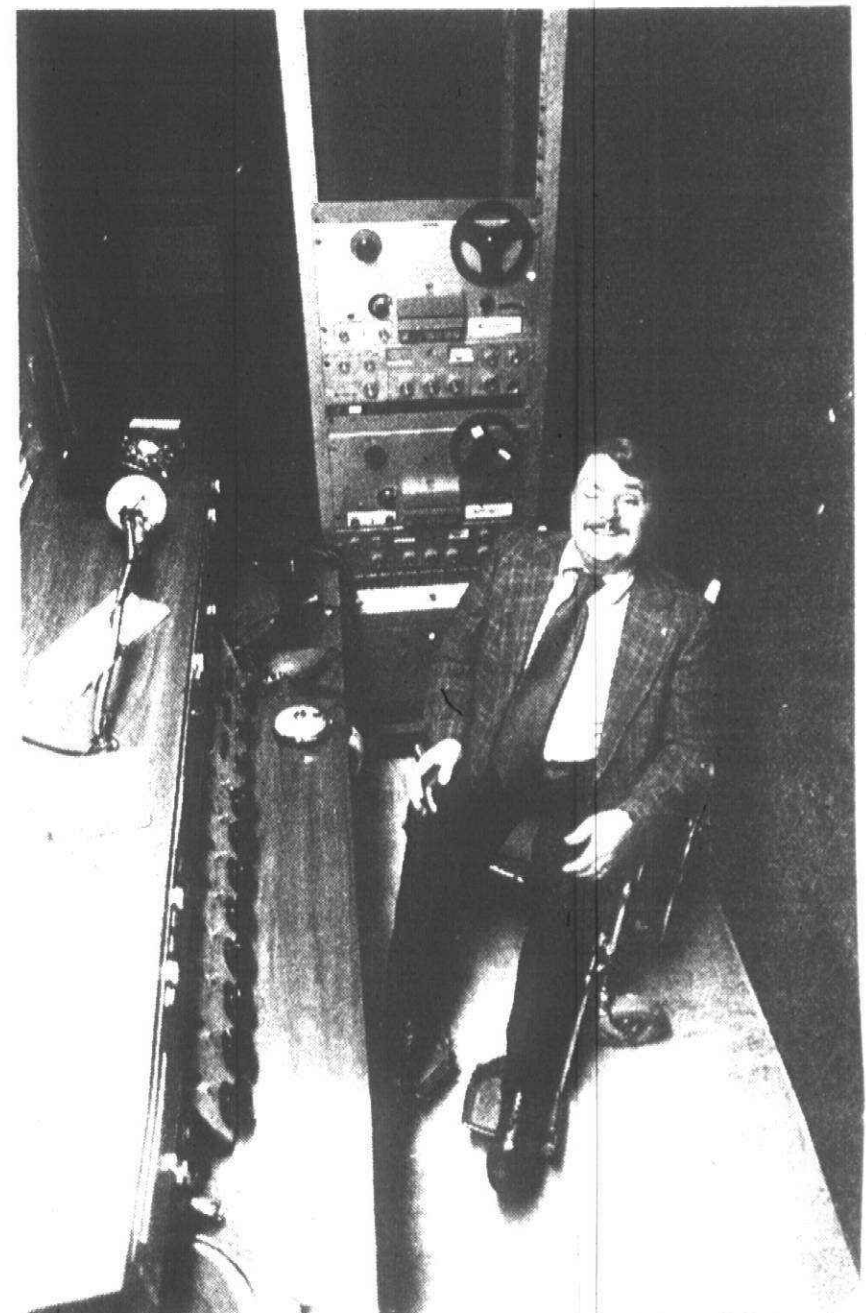
"We offer them a real-life situation here," Cardinal says.

"It's as close as you can get to any real-life radio station. Our students know what they have to do — which gives them a big edge over other kids."

WSDP is one of only 17 licensed high school stations in the state.

"Our students very often can waive college courses — or else do very well in them. I know our program is equivalent to two basic college courses in radio.

Cardinal's new job is with WFSL-Channel 47, a new UHF station in the Lansing market.

Officials unhappy over cable service offer

Should cable viewers served by the same company receive the same services — and at the same rates?

Local officials are upset after learning about a cable franchise proposal from Omnicom of Michigan for Clarkston and Independence Township residents.

They believe those potential Omnicom subscribers are being offered a better basic cable package, for the money, than presently received by Plymouth-Canton-Northville residents.

Omnicom gained the Plymouth-Canton-Northville franchise three years ago.

Company officials say the two cable systems are very different, and in completely different competitive situations.

Initially, Plymouth-Canton-Northville residents paid a regular rate of \$6.95 per month for a basic system and another \$6.95 for additional channel capacity.

Currently, local residents must pay a regular rate of \$7.95 for the basic pack-

age (36 channels, 2-37). They must also pay an additional \$7.95 per month if they want the satellite tier system that expands the number of channels to 52.

That's a total initial (charter) rate of \$13.90 per month and a current rate of \$15.90. Omnicom officials say that if comparisons are made, then initial rates should be compared to what the company is offering to Clarkston-Independence.

If Omnicom lands the Clarkston-Independence franchise, those residents will receive the same 52-channel service (including full satellite service and FM reception) as part of their basic package at \$9.95 per month, according to "Cablevision Facts," a publication produced by Omnicom.

In addition, Clarkston-Independence residents would pay an added \$1.50 per month for the converter box.

Plymouth-Canton-Northville residents get a remote control channel selector with the satellite service, an option not being offered to Clarkston-Independence, according to Omnicom.

The so-called premium channels — Home Box Office, The Movie Channel, Cinemax, Home Theatre Network

(HTN-Plus) and Showtime — all cost extra. Both Showtime and HTN-Plus can only be received through the satellite tier. So subscribers to the cheapest system — that is, the 36-channel basic system — cannot receive two of the five premium channels.

The premium services — HBO, Movie Channel, Cinemax and satellite tier — are \$7.95 a month. Satellite-only customers can also get HTN-Plus for an additional \$2.95 a month and Showtime for \$7.95.

Plymouth-Canton-Northville residents currently don't have FM reception because Omnicom is experiencing equipment and technical difficulties. However, when this FM service is offered, it will cost an additional \$2.50 per month.

PETER NEWELL, Senior Vice President of the Northern Division for Capital Cities Cable, which owns Omnicom, says the two proposals are structured differently.

"You're comparing apples with oranges," Newell said. "It's a competitive situation. It depends on what other

companies are offering to the communities."

Newell said Clarkston residents also will have to pay \$9.95 per month for each additional premium service (HBO, Movie Channel or Cinemax). The total cable package costs more than \$50 per month under each proposal if subscribers request total cable service, he said.

Chuck Miller, head of Canton Township's Cable Advisory Committee, believes the Clarkston plan means an unequal rate structure for the basic service.

"It's apples and oranges when it comes to the rate structure, but it all should be oranges," Miller said. "When you add up their (Clarkston's) basic package, it would be \$18.40 for us."

"For the additional \$2 (\$7.95 to \$9.95), the residents of Canton (and Plymouth and Northville) could receive more in the basic package — and it certainly wasn't an option proposed to us."

"Ask any Canton resident who watches cable," Miller added. "We'll fight for the same \$9.95 package as they get since less than 10 percent of

the subscribers in Canton take only the basic service."

Newell said the Plymouth-Canton-Northville system includes extra or different services such as two-way operational capabilities, the institutional channels and more emphasis on local programming and local orientation.

"We have a very sophisticated system in Plymouth compared to the one (offered) in Clarkston," Newell said. "And, again, you get what you pay for. I'm sure Clarkston rates would be higher if they wanted all the other services."

Miller disagrees. He doesn't think Plymouth-Canton-Northville has an elaborate local programming studio or facilities. He also believes the system's services are comparable because local residents have not benefited from two-way capabilities or the institutional channels, as originally promised.

"The complexity of the system, to date, is much the same," Miller said. "The degree of sophistication is not that different out here."

Newell maintains cable service in Plymouth-Canton-Northville will expand depending on the need and demand from residents.

Unexpected guests cause trouble

Dorothy Priebe recently found herself with some unexpected live-in boarders who didn't want to heed her eviction notice.

Priebe, who lives in the Carriage Hills subdivision, Canton, discovered a family of five raccoons living in her chimney. And it was only after a tough struggle that the animals were flushed out.

"We did everything," Priebe said. "We tried noise, music, I mean everything. My daughter held the radio and I went up on the roof to see and they (the raccoons) just yawned at me. I couldn't believe it."

For Bill Bobee, owner of Abbey

Chimney Sweep, who was called to help remove the raccoons, it was a dilemma he doesn't often encounter.

"We don't see these as much as birds and squirrels," Bobee said. "But they are a little bit more fierce."

Bobee was called in after the Canton Animal Controller, John Swalley, couldn't take out the damper in the chimney and get down to remove the critters.

After the damper was removed by Bobee, a cloth soaked in ammonia was dropped in the chimney. The fumes smoked out the mother, but the babies remained and died.

"When the mother came out, she was so big, and she was snarling at the poor animal controller," Priebe said. "They must have been in there for three or

four months. (Swalley) couldn't believe how big they were."

The raccoons are believed to have come from the field behind the house. Other residents in the subdivision have had similar problems, Priebe said.

The raccoons also stored their food in the gutter, plugging up the drain every time it rained.

"It was quite an ordeal," Priebe said. "My neighbors were out there. I probably could have sold popcorn and peanuts it was such a show."

Raccoons and other animals that are not supposed to be in chimneys can be kept out, according to Bobee. A good wire mesh chimney cap should be put on to keep unwanted visitors out. They sell at a number of hardware stores and range from \$12 to \$45, Bobee said.

New VFW hall to open by late fall

Mayflower Post 6695 hopes its new hall will be finished by mid-November. The post decided several months ago to rebuild on the old site, Mill Street near Ann Arbor Road.

The former post home was destroyed by fire earlier this year.

About 75 people attended groundbreaking ceremonies held recently.

The new facility will be 7,752 square feet with a rental hall capacity to handle 300 people. The rental hall also will include kitchen and bar facilities.

There will be a separate coatroom and lobby areas.

The VFW lounge will have a capacity for 140 people and will have a kitchen, bar facilities, separate billiards room and card area.

The facility will also include office areas, storage room, toilets, fire alarm system, and a service court for truck delivery.

The building exterior will be load-bearing textured block of earthen color; bermed landscape materials will be used. The roof will be of structural

steel joist with metal deck.

The structure has been designed to be energy efficient through the use of insulated walls and roofing, wall fabric and finishes, and earth berming.

The hall and lounge will be provided with separate entries.

The hall will be used for VFW activities and will be available for rent for private and community functions.

To finance the hall the VFW Post is selling building bonds in amounts of \$500 each, with an interest rate of 13 percent. Information on the bonds is

available from Ken Fisher, post commander, 453-6144.

The builder is Richmar Construction, of Plymouth and the architect is Tkacz & Associates of Plymouth.

Also involved in the construction is Long and Heating of Northville, plumbing, heating and air conditioning contractor, and Ark Electrical of New Hudson, electrical contractor.

The post has been holding its meetings since the fire in the Northville VFW post home, No. 4012.

Board members sue

Four Wayne-Westland school board members have gone to court to stop a scheduled Sept. 14 recall election.

A hearing on the suit was to have been scheduled for 10 a.m. today before Wayne County Circuit Judge James Kirwan.

Initiating the civil suit are board members Mary Arbour, Donald Rusnock, Kenneth Marshall and Mildred Batterson.

They are suing the Wayne County clerk, County Election Commission and the Westland city clerk in a move to call off the election.

The four board members claim the

election commission and county clerk denied them due process in refusing them to review the estimated 5,300 signatures on the petitions demanding the recall.

The civil suit is the latest development in ongoing controversies which began earlier this year.

The recall petitions were circulated and filed by a citizens' group called Taxpayers United Together (TUT) after months of controversy involving an extension and salary raise for the Wayne-Westland Education Association, which represents nearly 1,000 teachers; a proposed local community college plan which has since been dropped; and the level of teachers' salaries.

The four board members said in the brief filed by their attorney, E. Peter Drolet, the "fact sheet" used by petition circulators contained inaccurate information about the average salary for local teachers to encourage voters to sign the petitions.

The four said the petition circulators violated a state law which prohibits signatures from being obtained through "fraud, deceit or misrepresentation."

In their court brief, the board members said:

"BY PROVIDING false and misleading information on the 'fact sheet' relative to teachers' salaries allegedly authorized by plaintiff school board members in order to obtain signatures, the circulators of the recall petitions violated their own 'certification' on which they attached to and filed" with the county clerk May 6.

out," Plymouth Canton High School principal and committee member Kent Buikema said. "Our statistics don't show any significant difference in attendance (with the pilot policy), but that's not what we set out to do. We set out to keep the kids in school and that's what we did. Our records show that many did get to remain in school and get credit for classes that didn't the previous year."

The administration's responsibility under the proposed policy is to contact the parent when the teacher has been unable to do so after the second unexcused absence. After the fifth unexcused absence, the area coordinator is to have a conference with the student, notify the parent and assign one hour of detention.

Detention requires the student to stay after school in a study hall setting. After eight unexcused absences, the

area coordinator assigns the student to two days of in-school suspension and requires the student to make up a contract, stating his or her intent to attend class.

IN-SCHOOL SUSPENSION has the student remain in a classroom separate from his classes where they stay the entire day except during a 40-minute lunch break. In the suspension setting, the student is required to do the work normally done during a school day.

"We found that the kids hate it (in-school suspension)," Buikema said. "Typically, they do what they have to not to go through it again. We found it works."

Both Buikema and Brown say that

the revised policy will help deter absences and will constantly keep the teachers aware of their students' attendance.

"The difference this year is that with each step, the teacher is getting feedback on the student's absence," Brown said.

Attendance problems can never be solved, but CEP has had an improving record, Brown said.

"We're no different than other high schools," Brown said about attendance problems. "But our attendance is better than many other schools."

CEP's record is between seven and eight percent absent, both excused and unexcused, Brown said.

the skills she needs to get a job," said O'Connor. "We're women helping women."

The Canton BPW, only two years old, is a newcomer to festival participation. But the firefighters' union and the Rotary Club have done better in previous years, for various reasons.

In the past, businesses were better able to donate supplies for dinners, said Harry Harrison of the Canton firefighters' union, which serves a spaghetti dinner at the festival.

Now, more items must be purchased, which gnaws away at the profit for the fund-raiser. Despite a modest \$3.50 ticket price, attendance was down for the dinner this year, said Harrison. They served almost 300 meals.

Harrison was unable to provide a breakdown of earnings from the dinner. The firefighters' union has donated funds to the burn treatment center at University Hospital, Ann Arbor, and to send a terminally-ill girl to Disney World.

ATTENDANCE ALSO dropped for a pancake breakfast put on by the Canton Rotary Club, which supports the Canton Historical Society and other projects.

"We served 667 breakfasts," said Hank Salla, of the Rotary. "We're down

about 50 from last year. I think the economy had something to do with it." The Rotary expects a net profit of about \$350-\$400, said Salla.

Figures were unavailable for the Chamber of Commerce's chicken barbecue. Festival chairwoman Flossie Tonda said more barbecue pits were added this year, but workers often had difficulty keeping up with the demand.

A carry-out booth was closed, in order to devote more energy to the sit-down business, said Tonda. Although some diners had to wait as long as an hour, complaints were few.

One person complained about his dinner not being fully cooked. Another opened his carry-out box, to discover that hasty workers had failed to include the chicken.

THE ECONOMY doesn't seem to have hampered Canton dentist Dr. Jack Falvo's annual fund-raiser for the Muscular Dystrophy Association. Falvo has sponsored a softball tournament during the Canton Country Festival.

Falvo estimates the tournament has yielded \$17,000-\$18,000 totally over the past five years, with this year's total projected at \$3,200.

"It continues to grow," said Falvo. "This is our fifth year. The whole committee is neighbors and friends who enjoy going out there and doing something for charity. It's a lot of fun."

Fire hits Beck Road house

A fire caused an estimated \$25,000 damage to a house on Beck Road south of Ford Road Aug. 9.

The fire started about 12:30 p.m. when a fire under a pan got out of control, said fire department Lt. Kenneth Witt. Smoke damaged the kitchen, back porch and living room, according to a report.

'West Side Story' attracts actors, singers

Like a giant magnet, the call of the theater drew aspiring actors from all over the area to the Wayne-Westland Civic Theatre's "West Side Story" auditions last week.

Mack has been directing shows for 10 years. She directed the Civic Theatre's production of "Godspell" last winter. She also directed "Carnival" for the Wayne Summer Theatre and was co-producer of "Li'l Abner." She was a teacher at Ferndale High School.

Producer is Mary Cobello of Westland who is also handling publicity for the show.

Persons auditioning ranged in ages from 14 to 33. Some were seeking dancing roles, some acting parts and others just wanted to be in the show.

LEANNE HAVERLAND, 16, of Livonia, is a senior at Churchill High School and said this was the first time she had auditioned for a part.

"I took ballet a few years and thought I'd like a dancing part in 'West Side Story,'" she said.

Her mother, Shirley Haverland, has directed shows for the Livonia-Redford Civic Theatre.

Cindy Ciura, 21, off Westland, said she would like a singing role.

A student at Eastern Michigan University, she is in the university's choir.

"I'm really not aiming for any particular role, I just want to be in the show," she said.

Mark Renfrow, 19, of Wayne is a magician, a dancer and makeup artist.

"I'd like the role of Renardo or be one of the Sharks," he said.

This is his fourth year with the civic theater. This year he will be working in the makeup department with the Michigan Opera Theatre.

Terry Crouson, 27, of Westland, is a furniture salesman. He did some acting in high school and worked with the Plymouth, Southfield and Wayne-Westland theater groups.

"I don't know what part I'm aiming for. I can't get a hold on any particular role. Most of the people here are younger than I. I'll be glad to take any part," he said.

THE YOUNGEST to audition was Patti Burgert, 14 of Northville. She has been dancing since she was 4 years old.

"Any part will do," she said, "But mostly I want to dance."

Karen Wilcox, 28, of Canton, would like the role of Maria, one of the lead parts. She took drama at Eastern Michigan University.

"I have two children, 2 and 6 which keeps me pretty busy. But I have wanted to do some theatrical work for some time. I thought this would be my opportunity to realize a desire," she said.

For Bill Hartwig, 17, of Westland, a part in the show would give him the opportunity to do what he likes, best — dance.

A senior at John Glenn High School, he has danced at the Plymouth Fall Festival.

"I just want to dance," he said.

JOHN EASTMAN, 33 of Canton, works for Ford Motor Credit. He was seeking one of the lead roles, that of Tony.

"I was in the last musical this group had. I wanted to act since I was in high school. Finally, about two years ago, I got around to getting into shows," he said.

Choreographer for the production is Mary Jo Cobello, 20, daughter of the producer.

She handled the choreography for the Wayne-Westland Civic Theatre's "Godspell."

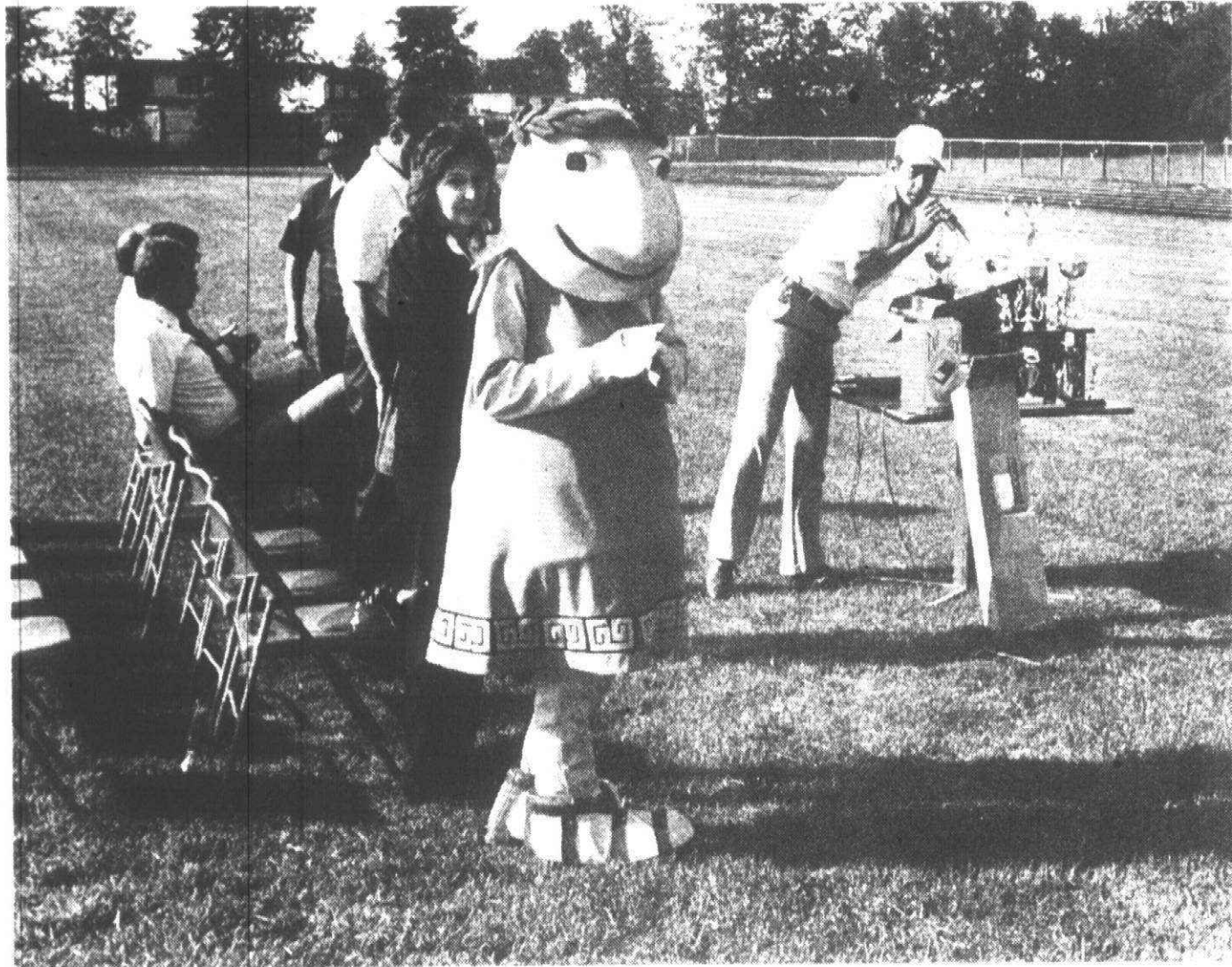
She is majoring in dance at Eastern Michigan University where she is a junior.

When the treatment is completed, pure oxygen may be given to flush the gas out of the patient's system, and he immediately recovers to a fairly alert state of mind.

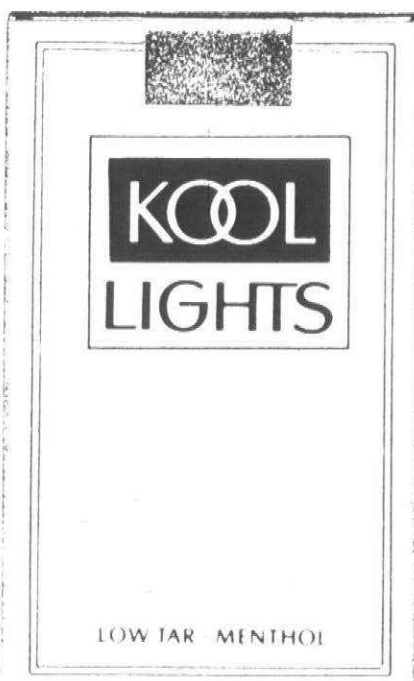

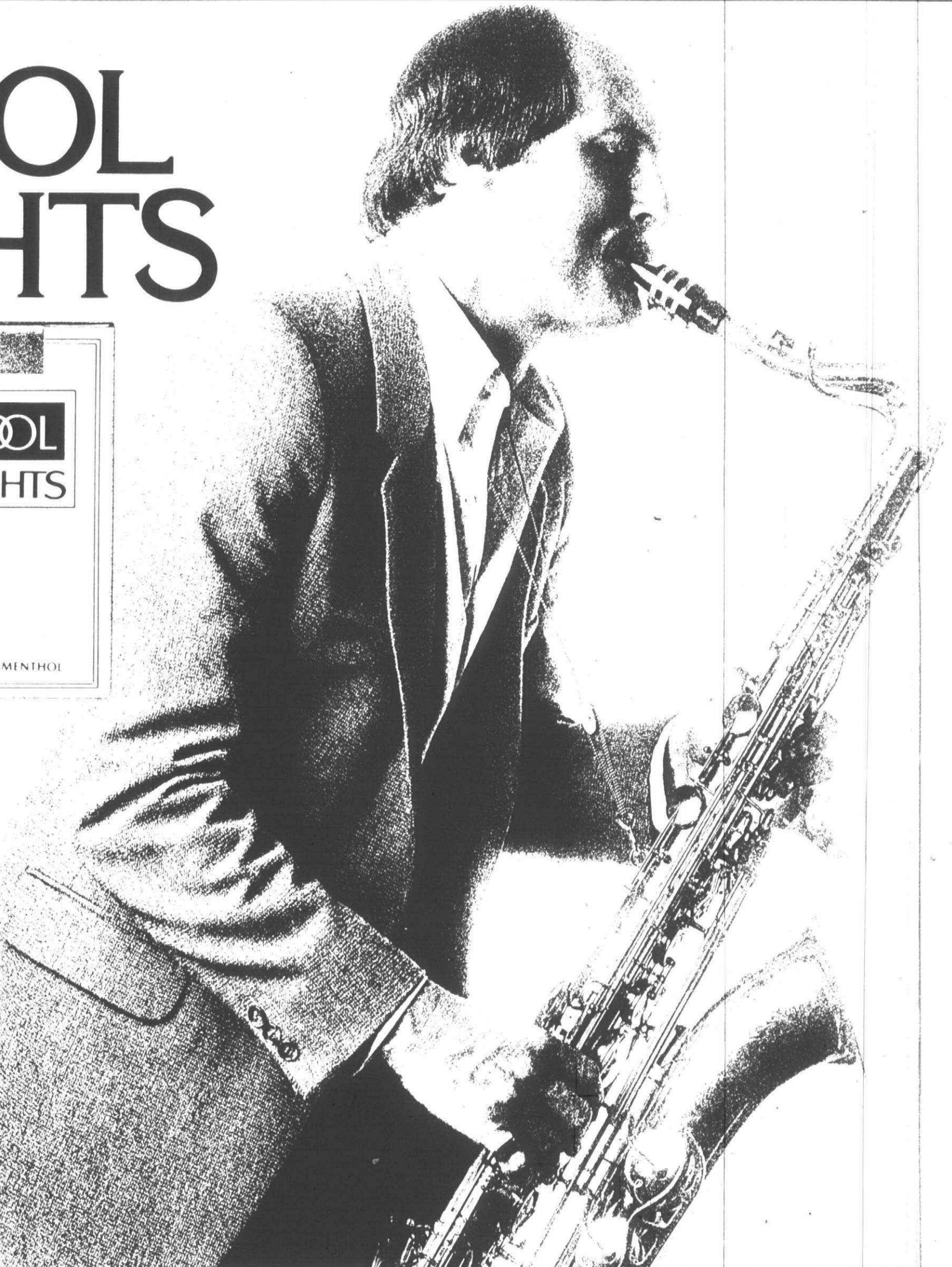

Just when I learn the notes, song is rewritten

I don't understand what's going on at the local gas pumps.

I can recall quite a few years ago, as a new driver, pulling up to the gas pumps and getting \$1 worth of gas.

It didn't take long and I was pulling up to the same pump and asking for \$2 worth of gas.

I never paid any attention to how many gallons went into the tank. All I knew was that \$1 (or \$2) would last me two or three days if I didn't take any long trips.

As I recall all my driving days, I have never pulled up to the pumps and asked for so many gallons of gasoline or for a fill up.

I always purchase gas by the dollars' worth, not by volume.

From personal observation, many people do the same.

In recent years, the industry has tried to confuse us by putting metric measurements on the pumps. It seemed, for awhile, like I was buying liters instead of gallons.

But it really didn't matter. I was getting my \$5 worth, whether it came in gallons, liters or syringes.

Having lived through the gas price wars, the various shortage crises, and metric conversion, I now find myself confused about how much goes into my tank and why.

What confuses me is the new cash discount programs.

In case you haven't been suckered in yet, a number of major gasoline stations are promoting cash sales by offering a discount of four cents per gallon for gas paid for with cash.

We are led to believe that credit card customers pay the full price.

That's an unusual marketing program in itself. For years, credit has been pushed upon the American consumer by anyone wanting to sell anything.

Credit made sales easier and promoted the flow of goods and services from seller to buyer.

Cash sales often were seen as a deterrent to the economy. Sellers espe-

cially liked credit because they could earn interest income as well as income from goods or services sold.

But something has changed and credit is now frowned upon and cash sales are being pushed.

SO A FEW WEEKS ago I pull up to my friendly gas pumper and tell him I want \$10, no-lead.

He pumps gasoline in my tank and gives me 24 cents change.

So apparently the pumper put \$9.76 worth of gasoline in my tank. How much farther could I travel with \$10 than with \$9.76, I wonder?

My impulse is to give the friendly pumper his 24 cents back and insist on

\$10 worth.

He would tell me, of course, that I got the same number of gallons in my tank for \$9.76 as I would have for \$10. But I would have told him I don't buy gasoline by the gallons but by the dollars' worth.

I had wanted \$10 no-lead in my tank, not \$9.76.

But why confuse him just because I'm confused.

Time passed and one day I drove up to my friendly pumper again and asked for \$10 no-lead. He asks me, do I want the discount in my tank or in my pocket?

I tell him, in my tank.

So, I get \$10 no-lead in my tank —

just like I asked.

Now I wonder, did I really get \$10 worth in my tank, or \$10.24 worth or \$9.76 worth?

If I got \$10 worth, then where's the discount.

I get so confused, I'd rather buy with credit and keep it simple.

NOW, in the midst of the confusion, I get information in the mail from the Service Station Dealers Association of Michigan.

The association argues that the discount for cash is an illusion and consumers are being misled.

The dealers point out that Amoco Oil Company, for instance, raised gasoline prices before the cash discount program went into effect.

The result is that Amoco stations throughout metro Detroit are selling gasoline for up to four cents a gallon more than the competing stations that still believe in credit.

The dealers argue that Amoco has imposed a 4 percent fee on its retailers

for the acceptance of Amoco credit cards. The association stresses that Amoco does not have a cash discount program but a credit card charge of 4 percent.

What am I really paying for credit? Should I decide to quit getting confused by paying cash for my gas?

Everytime I fill my tank up with non-cash, no-lead gas, I pay 80 cents for the privilege.

If I fill my tank up 45 times a year using a credit card, I pay \$36 for the privilege, plus 18-22 percent a month on the unpaid balance.

Some other charge card folks charge me yearly fees of \$15 to \$25 for use of their cards.

I don't like that idea, but it sure beats paying \$36 or more. They all charge the same interest rate.

The next time my friendly gas pumper asks me if I want my discount for cash in my tank or in my pocket, I'm going to tell him where to where to put it.

Northville joined Schoolcraft District in 1963

(Part XV)

The year the college was named after Henry Rowe Schoolcraft — 1963 — also saw groundbreaking for the institution's first buildings, an election of trustees, and the addition of Northville to the college district.

And, 1963 was also the first year in which Schoolcraft representatives participated in the area's annual "College Night."

Held in Plymouth High School in October of that year, the conference gave an opportunity to high school students from Plymouth, Livonia, Garden City, Clarenceville, and the two Redfords to get information about admission requirements, costs, housing, scholarships and campus life from representatives of 50 colleges and universities.

In April, two months after the college was renamed, Schoolcraft received a gift of rare books from Hazen E. Kunz, a resident of Livonia. Kunz, who was president of the State Historical Association and an authority on Henry Rowe Schoolcraft, contributed several volumes from his personal library, including two original editions of books written by Mr. Schoolcraft.

One, published in 1821, before publishers discovered short titles, was called "Narrative Journal of Travels from Detroit Northwest Through the Great Chain of American Lakes to the Sources of the Mississippi." It reports on Schoolcraft's discovery of the source of the Mississippi and includes a detailed map of the expedition. The other, published in 1848, was entitled "The Indian in his Wigwam — the Characteristics of the Red Race in America."

GROUND BREAKING ceremonies for the college's first buildings took place at Haggerty and Seven Mile Roads on June 8. The public was invited.

Dr. Ferris N. Crawford, assistant superintendent of public instruction for

the State of Michigan, was guest speaker.

College President Dr. Eric Bradner called the program to order and Harold Fischer, chairman of the board of trustees, introduced special guests.

Jane Moehle, vice chairman of the board, recalls that 150 people, including children, were in attendance. Ken Lindner remembers that some of the cars driven to the site got stuck in the mud.

At the June 10 election, Jane Moehle and Charles B. Kirkpatrick (the incumbents) were re-elected to six-year large terms on the Schoolcraft board. Leroy C. Bennett won the four-year term from a field of 11 candidates.

Returned to office to represent their districts on the Schoolcraft board were Harold Fischer of Plymouth, L. Clarke Oldenburg of Garden City, Paul Mutnick of Clarenceville, and Erwin S. Brown of Livonia. Brown had been appointed to the board when Ward Mc Cain died.

BY A NARROW VOTE, Northville decided to join the college district at this election.

Dr. Gordon Forrer became that community's first trustee on the college board, enlarging its membership to eight. But South Redford, by a big margin, rejected — for the second time — a proposal to join the college district.

Prior to the election, a circular opposing the proposal was distributed from house to house in South Redford. Contending there was no need for a community college, the writer of the unsigned flyer posed the question: "Is this the first step by Livonia to absorb South Redford?"

Scare tactics are an old and firmly established tradition in American politics.

After the 1963 election, all candidates to the Schoolcraft College board were to be elected for six-year terms. Terms ranging from two to six years

were used in the 1963 vote so the terms of office could be staggered.

HARRIET H. SATTIG, with a bachelor of science degree from Syracuse University, a master's from Columbia University, and experience as a faculty member at Syracuse, joined School-

craft in August 1963 as director of nursing education.

This gave Mrs. Sattig a year before the college opened to develop a nursing program, to employ faculty for it, and to establish standards for recruitment.

During the same month, the board named Ed Draugelis of Plymouth to serve as attorney for the college. Meantime, work was progressing on three of the buildings at the campus site. Contracts for construction of the library were not awarded until September.

In August it was announced that State Equalized Valuation (SEV) of the college district had been set at \$562,780,712 and the 1964 tax levy was set at one mill. At its August meeting, the Schoolcraft board authorized the administration to hire ten instructors, the first of 50 who were to be hired to begin work in August 1964.

Although classrooms were not scheduled to open until the fall of 1964, college administrators continued to plan ahead.

As early as October 1963, about 40,000 families in the Schoolcraft district received circulars concerning admission to the college.

The first application for admission was turned in by Richard Gray, 19, of Livonia. Gray, a star baseball player at Livonia Bentley High, was standing at the door of the old Newburgh School, with application and matriculation fees in hand, on the morning the college accepted applications for the first time.

By Nov. 6, 447 applications had been received. Of these, 199 were from Livonia, 129 from Garden City, 57 from Plymouth, 21 from Clarenceville. And 22 were received from non-residents.

In January 1964, Dr. Bradner announced that 905 persons had applied, that catalogs would be available in March, and that 22 of the college's 47 faculty members were under contract.

Sight of yellow corn always is fascinating

The sight of yellow corn always has been fascinating to The Stroller.

From the days of his youth when he lived only a stone's throw from the fields of yellow corn, his mouth has always watered, as the Pennsylvania Dutch say, for a cob of the delicious kernels. And more so at picnic time in the fall.

To him, there was no greater meal than to sit down at the table, take a steaming cob, brush it with melted butter, and then sit and enjoy a feast.

When we were youngsters and Mother had to stretch her funds, we had many a meal of corn on the cob and "red beet" eggs. You don't see the eggs any more, but the corn on the cob is still among the fall favorites.

However, the folks out here in the middle west are not fully acquainted with the various ways in which to prepare the corn. They just boil it or roast it.

What The Stroller likes best is the old-fashioned clam bakes in the east where corn is only one of the many dishes, but it is a different tasting corn — and for a good reason.

The original clam bake was held out in the open, preferably on some one's farm at the edge of town and was an all-day affair.

We'd gather in the morning and dig a large hole in the ground. Then we

filled the hole with wood and covered it with a big steel plate. Then began the interesting task of piling on the food.

We'd start with "Irish" potatoes, then a layer of corn, followed with a layer of chicken that was cut and placed in lace-like bags. This was followed with a row of sweet potatoes, then a layer of cherry stone clams.

And another layer of corn. This pattern was followed until enough food was placed on the iron plate to satisfy the number to be fed. It was then covered with wet burlap.

At about noon the fire was started. For the rest of the day the food that was covered with wet burlap was allowed to simmer in the heat.

All the while the juices from each layer descended to the row below until all the food had the benefit of the tasty juices of fish, chicken, corn, sweet potatoes and clams.

Late in the afternoon the bake was opened and the food was served in water pails with a pound of butter at

each place on the table.

It was a dish to set before the ear. And what a taste. Just imagine an ear of corn, well buttered, having the partial flavoring of clams and the juice from the other varieties that had simmered all day. And eating out in the open made the meal all the more enjoyable.

Those days are gone now. The old-time pit has been replaced by steam kettles the east. And out here in the midwest the clam bake is virtually unknown.

But with it, all The Stroller never has lost his desire for a well-buttered ear of yellow corn.

So don't be surprised if you see him with a cob of the yellow kernels up to his mouth and the butter dripping from his chin at the Rotary Club's chicken barbecue at the Plymouth Fall Festival. He will be reliving the days of his youth when that was his favorite meal. And he'll be wishing he had the steamed clams to go with it.

Cancer services available at 'grass roots' level

The American Cancer Society is moving to bring its health message of education, prevention, and treatment closer to home.

To help more people become aware that one in four eventually will have a "cancer-threatening experience," the ACS is decentralizing operations so staff members will be closer to volunteers and patients.

That policy change was initiated more than a year ago. In its newest implementation, ACS representatives are moving into a 135-year-old vacant home near Garden City Osteopathic Hospital.

Working out of the building at 6227 Inkster, between Warren and Ford, will be Susan

Lerch, whose territory is Garden City, Westland, Dearborn, Dearborn Heights, Inkster and Wayne; and Kathy Harrison, who serves Livonia, Plymouth, Northville, Canton, Plymouth Township and Northville Township.

Both formerly had offices in the Eloise complex near Wayne County General Hospital in Westland.

THE NEW ACS HOME is known as the Stewart house because it was owned for many years by a family by the that name.

The move, expected to be completed Thursday, Aug. 19, will make a difference for both volunteers and cancer patients, according to Lerch, Harrison and Lisa Nirider, ACS public relations director.

It allows the staffers to work more closely

with community and educational groups on the society's goals of teaching the public of cancer's danger signals and how to avoid contracting the disease, they noted.

"It will make it easier for the public to get cancer prevention materials and for patients like those at Garden City Hospital to get information and help," Nirider added.

Then there are benefits like cutting travel time and costs and the opportunity to form longer-lasting alliances with volunteers.

Teamwork should improve, said Harrison, as the volunteers and the public "take ownership for cancer control activities within their local community."

Other major benefits noted by the trio would be giving more responsibility and authority to volunteers, increasing fund-raising

through a grass roots level organization, closer community relationships, increased cancer education, service and research, and improved recruitment, training and retention of volunteers.

BEFORE THE decentralization move started in mid-1981, all members of the Detroit region staff worked from an office in Southfield.

Now Lerch and Harrison, each serving territories with about 3,000 volunteers, will be better able to cover their western Wayne County areas.

The Cancer Society has its new quarters rent free and gained use of the house somewhat by accident.

Lerch said she was meeting with adminis-

trators of Garden City Hospital last spring to discuss work of local units of the society.

"I mentioned we were looking for a new location," she said.

"The hospital staff suggested the Stewart House, which had been vacant on and off since the hospital bought it nearly eight years ago."

The two-story house is located on an acre of land directly in front of the 370-bed, three-story hospital.

The ACS staff will use three rooms on the first floor for a reception area, office for Lerch and Harrison, and a room for board of directors meetings.

An open house will be held, probably in mid-September, to let people know of the new office and tour it.

That Algerian gas:

It's due in September . . .

Consumers Power Co.'s largest supplier of natural gas, Trunkline Gas Co., announced Monday that shipments of liquefied natural gas (LNG) from Algeria will commence in September.

But the Algerian supply is of questionable reliability, the Michigan utility added.

Including transportation, the cost of liquefied natural gas at \$7.18 per thou-

sand cubic feet (MCF) "is not out of line with field prices for new gas produced in the United States," a company announcement said.

The result: cost increases for Consumers Power gas customers next winter of less than 10 percent. Consumers Power serves most Detroit suburbs.

"However," said CP Chairman John D. Selby, "the company is deeply concerned that Trunkline has agreed to a

modification of the formula governing the future price of liquefied natural gas (LNG) under this 20-year contract, which is beyond the scope of the arrangements approved by the federal government in 1977 when the LNG project was before it.

"This factor, along with Algeria's failure to live up to its contract, raises serious question as to the country's commitment to the project and the

long-term reliability of this source of gas."

Consequently, in hearings which will be held before the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, Consumers Power intends to oppose the revised pricing arrangements and question the advisability of placing reliance upon Algerian LNG as a dependable long-term source of gas, Selby said.

. . . but MichCon's president wants to keep it out

Robert W. Stewart, chairman and chief executive officer of Michigan Consolidated Gas Co., said that his company would "take every legal action possible to prevent deliveries of Algerian Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG) to its customers."

Responding to an announcement that a Panhandle Eastern Pipeline Co. subsidiary had agreed to a price increase permitting shipment of the LNG, Stewart said that the higher priced Algerian gas was "not needed nor marketable at this time."

Michigan Consolidated serves Detroit and a few suburbs. Most suburbs

buy natural gas from Consumers Power Co.

"OUR CUSTOMERS have been telling us for some time that enough is enough," Stewart said. "We do not want the Algerian supplies, we cannot sell it, and we will oppose taking the gas during Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) hearings on this matter."

Although LNG would account for only about 1 percent of MichCon's total supplies, Stewart nevertheless characterized the Algerian agreement as "typical of the insensitivity which interstate pipeline suppliers have shown for natural gas consumers."

"Unfortunately, there is nothing that can be done about this issue here in Michigan," Stewart said. "This battle must be waged and won in Washington before the FERC and the Congress."

STEWART TESTIFIED last Friday in Washington before a subcommittee of the Energy and Commerce Committee, chaired by Rep. John Dingell, D-Dearborn, on the need to hold down the federally controlled cost of natural gas.

Stewart criticized Panhandle Eastern and its subsidiary, Trunkline LNG Co., for agreeing to a new escalation formula governing the future price of

the Algerian supplies. "Our customers can't afford the original price of \$7.18 per MMBtu — it's priced too high for the market," he said.

Stewart added that MichCon will also be seeking relief through the FERC of any take-or-pay clauses with Panhandle so that the Algerian LNG "cannot be forced upon us and our customers."

"Pipeline companies must become more responsive to the marketplace," Stewart warned. "Distribution companies and consumers are no longer going to take all the risks of higher priced natural gas supplies."

Library peaks in hard times

The present economic condition with its growing list of the unemployed has brought about a vast increase in daily traffic in the Hough-Dunning Library in Plymouth.

No longer is the traffic confined mostly to book lovers who visit to read the available books or glance over the out-of-town newspapers.

The demand for service far exceeds the ordinary day in a public library.

"The men — and some women — eagerly look for the out-of-town newspapers, hoping there will be some signs of help wanted they could provide," Librarian Patricia Thomas explained.

"Outside of the Detroit papers, we carry only those from New York. I wish we could provide more, but what we have does provide interest daily. In many cases, a family has one Detroit paper delivered, and then comes up

here to read the other."

One of the interesting things is the growth in the children's reading classes and the desire of the older people to read up on their occupation with the hope of bettering themselves — if and when they return to work.

"Our children's classes were expected to be smaller when we sent the Canton children to their own library, but we now have 412 in our reading class. That's more than we have had in the past."

The increased traffic has not disturbed the regular readers who come to enjoy the reading room and the comfort of having the best books available.



"We always have had demand for the best books each month and Plymouth has earned the reputation of having a well-read public. But this new influx has proven most interesting to the librarians."

With the economic conditions, fewer and fewer families are taking off on vacations. Instead, it is not uncommon to see a family come here to spend time just reading. It is an outlet for them away from home and out of the torrid temperature.

The class of 412 children, Librarian Thomas pointed out, do not come at one time. The children can come at their leisure — and that makes the program all the more interesting."

She added that it was quite a sight to see entire families visiting the library and spending a few hours reading in the quiet of the reading room.

And the men and women, too, are interesting as they are striving to improve their knowledge of the work they had been doing. This includes math and other subjects of which they have been short.

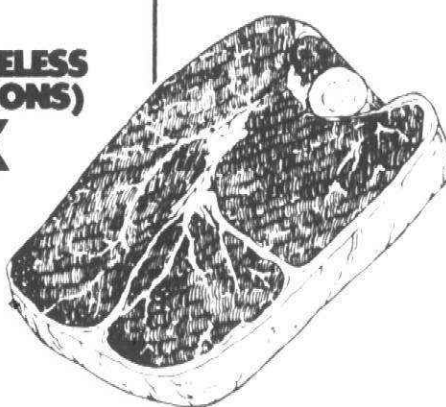

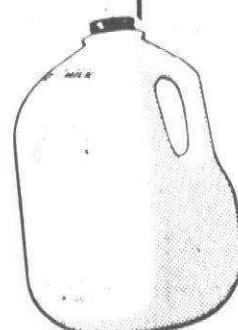

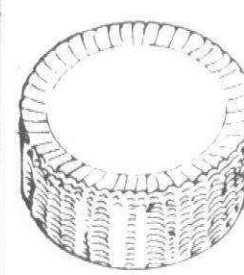

BLUEBERRY BUCKLE
By Mrs. James Hurlbert Jr.

Filling:

¾ cup sugar
¼ cup softened margarine
1 egg
½ cup milk
2 cups sifted flour
2 tsp. baking powder
½ tsp. salt
2 cups canned or fresh blueberries

Cream margarine and sugar together; add egg; beat in milk. Sift together dry ingredients, add to egg mixture, mixing well. Stir in blueberries. Pour mixture into a greased 12-by-8-inch loaf pan. Cover with topping.

Topping:
½ cup sugar
½ cup flour
¼ cup softened margarine
½ tsp. ground cinnamon

Mix together all ingredients, sprinkle over top of blueberry filling. Bake at 375 degrees for 45-50 minutes.

DOUGLASS PUMPKIN CHEESE-CAKE
Restaurant Duglass, Southfield
Crust:
1 cup crushed graham crackers
1 cup ground almonds
1 cup finely chopped walnuts

Combine all ingredients; sprinkle on bottom of a 10-inch springform pan. You may use crust mixture as desired. Just remember to combine equal amounts of each ingredient as listed. Store until needed.

Filling:
3 lbs. (six 8-oz. pkgs.) cream cheese at room temperature
1 cup granulated sugar
4 eggs
1 shot cognac
1 shot dark rum
1½ cup fresh or canned pumpkin puree
1 heaping Tbsp. pumpkin pie spice
4-6 egg whites
½ tsp. cream of tartar
1 cup finely chopped almonds

At high speed of electric mixer, whip cream cheese 10-15 minutes or until very fluffy. While cheese is whipping, add sugar, and four eggs, one at a time, at one minute intervals. Add cognac and rum to taste as desired. Fold in pumpkin and pumpkin pie spices. In a separate mixing bowl, whip egg whites and cream of tartar until very stiff. Fold egg whites into pumpkin and cream cheese mixture along with prepared almonds. Spoon mixture into prepared springform pan. Bake at 300 degrees for 1 hours. Let cool, then chill.

Glaze:
Whipped cream
¾-oz. bar of white chocolate
1 Tbsp. walnut oil
Water
Fresh strawberries
Brandy

To garnish cheesecake, dip a tablespoon into boiling water; then immediately run spoon into whipped cream, spooning out "egg-shaped" mounds. Place whipped cream mounds on border of cheese cake. Place white chocolate and walnuts in the microwave on low setting for 1-2 minutes, stirring frequently, until chocolate is melted. (You may also melt chocolate and oil in the top of a double boiler, if desired.) Top each whipped cream mound with a mound of white chocolate, using a tablespoon. Decorate with fresh strawberries that have been washed in brandy. Yields one 10-inch cheesecake.

RED SNAPPER
Lebanese Style
Heide Stein

2 lbs. red snapper fillet
Salt and pepper to taste
2-3 cups olive oil
4 Tbsp. melted butter
½ cup sliced almonds
Tahini Sauce

Cut red snapper into 2-inch pieces. Sprinkle fish with salt, chill for two hours. Sprinkle fish with pepper; deep-fry in hot oil. Place fish in baking pan and brush with melted butter, sprinkle with almonds. Broil for three minutes or until golden brown. Serve with tahini sauce.

Tahini Sauce

½ cup water
2 Tbsp. Tahini Sauce
2 Tbsp. lemon juice
1 clove crushed garlic
Chopped parsley

Blend water, tahini sauce, lemon juice and garlic; sprinkle in parsley. Serve over fish. Yields four servings.

They pioneered antique mart 20 years ago

The Plymouth Symphony League antique mart will mark an anniversary when it opens at noon Friday, Sept. 10 for a three-day run in the Plymouth Cultural Center. It was 20 years ago that the first antique show was planned in conjunction with the Plymouth Fall Festival.

That first effort was a resounding success and over the years the mart has continued its record as the league's single largest fund-raiser. As a fall festival project, it ranks right behind the

Rotary Club Chicken Barbecue and the Community Arts Council Artist and Craftsman Show as the third highest moneymaker.

The cast of antique mart planners has changed, but its aspirations remain the same: To produce the best small antique show in the state.

What they lacked in quantity, they would make up for in quality. The league could not compete with 100-dealer shows. They would have to compensate with select and varied antiques.

JOANNE HULCE chaired the first

show. Looking back, it seems something of a miracle.

She enlisted the help of fellow-members of the Antique Club and the Symphony League. Among them were Peg Jenkins, Geneva Guenther, Phyllis van Antwerp, Dorothy Wood, Jean Schultheiss and Jane Moehle. They had weeks rather than months to plan the show.

The late Clydie Meyer, antique dealer who lived on Canton Center Road, was recruited to sign up dealers. "Clydie's" standards were high and the first

mart had 23 outstanding dealers and collectors.

They had flyers printed, made posters and booth signs, sewed calico skirts for the hostesses and ticket takers, decorated not only the Grange Hall and the Community Building but hung attractive signs and figures in the trees in Kellogg Park.

The mart opened as scheduled in the two buildings on Union Street and antiques flocked to the show.

PHYLLIS VAN Antwerp chaired the mart the next year, and Jane Moehle took over the third year. Heavy, old

pieces of furniture had to be hauled upstairs at the Grange Hall and downstairs at the Community Hall. Each show had its major and minor crises. The over-flowing toilet in the Community Building was a recurring nuisance.

Ruby Morrison's The Red Sled was one of the original dealers who will be back this year. Pauline Work will return for the 17th year with her lovely antique jewelry, glass and silver. The Iron Eagle is another long-time dealer who made the move from the Grange Hall to the new quarters in the Cultural Center.

Symphony League members booth-sat for dealers when they needed a break and delivered dinners from service club meals served in Kellogg Park.

It was early summer of 1962 that Wayne Dunlap, former conductor of the Plymouth Symphony, suggested to Joanne Hulce that an antique mart would be a fine adjunct to the fall festival. Since that time, proceeds from the mart have helped keep the orchestra playing.

THE MART was housed in the two building on Union Street until 1973. The Plymouth Cultural Center on Farmer Street at Theodore had been completed in 1972 and the mart moved to that location the following fall.

For the first time, the mart was under one roof with plenty of free parking available.

Members of the Plymouth Grange had space in their hall to serve meals downstairs and initiate a crafts show in the upper level. The Community Building on the corner of Union and Church streets was torn down and the property paved for a parking lot.

Members of the Symphony League prepared food for the dealers, instead of carrying festival meals from Kellogg Park. Visitors continued to visit the mart in increasing numbers.

22 antique dealers selected for show

Sharon Davy and Helen Merrill are co-chairing the Symphony League's 20th annual antique mart. More than 150 league members contribute their time and talents to the show which will be Sept. 10-12 in the Plymouth Cultural Center.

Barb Brewer, head of the dealer selection committee, has been assisted by Cindy Merrifield and Maret Garard. Twenty dealers have accepted invita-

tions to participate as well as two auxiliary dealers. They will bring a wide variety of antiques and collectibles:

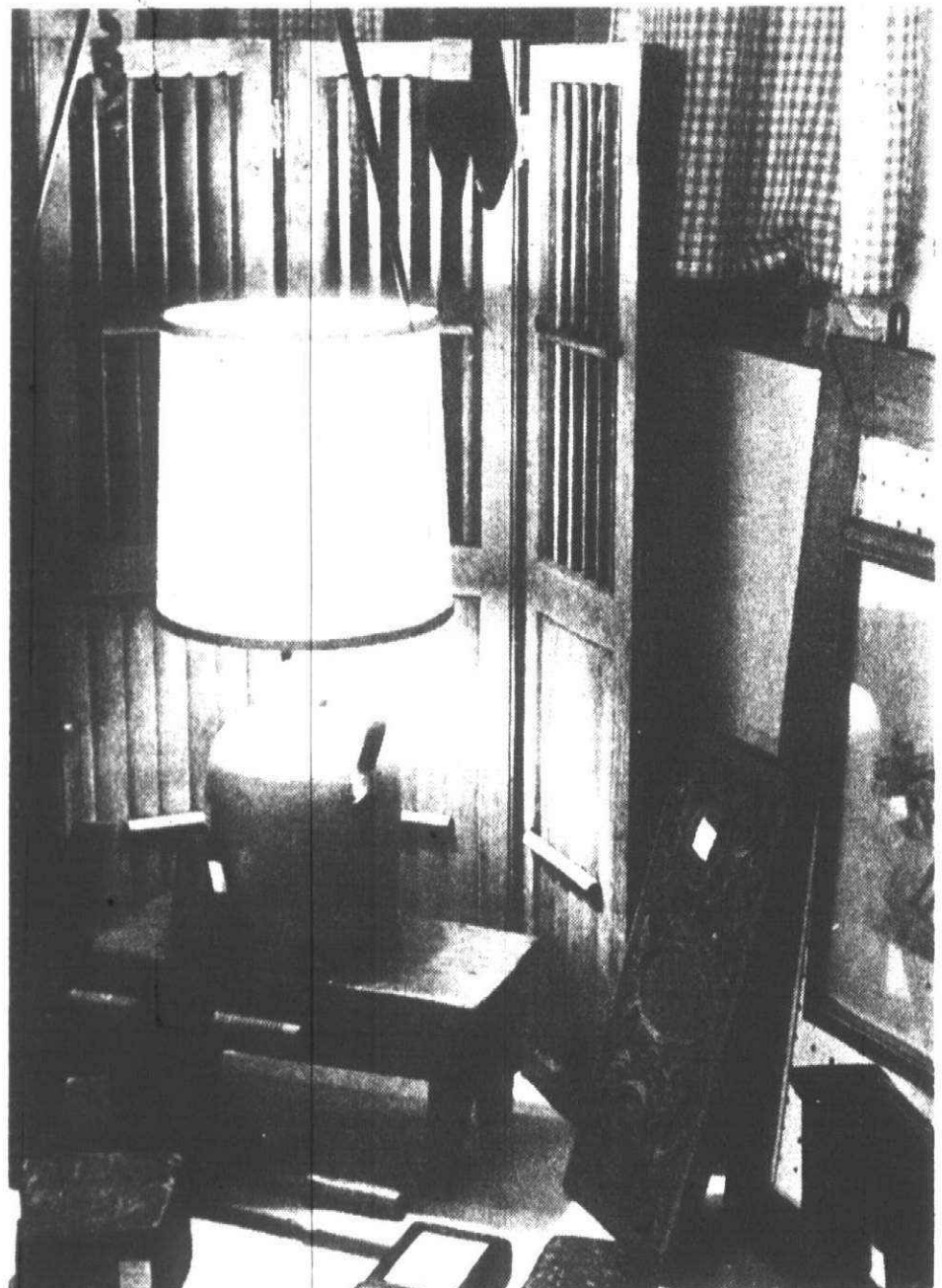



Cerebral palsy athlete achieves high standards

Kent Anderson is a world-class athlete. His voice rings with pride when he tells you, "It's not every day that Livonia has a world record-holder."

He has problems, sure. Despite being the best in his event on this globe, few people have heard of him. In fact, few Americans understand or appreciate his sport.

So he tells them — over and over again. A journalism major at Central Michigan University, the 23-year-old Livonian is well aware of the power of the press and the recognition it could bring athletes in his sport.

"It's a pain in the butt to educate people, but it has to be done," he says.

WHAT ANDERSON does not consider a problem is the wheelchair he's confined to.

It's from that wheelchair that Ander-

son won three gold medals and a bronze in the Cerebral Palsy World Games in Greve, Denmark, last month.

Anderson's golds came in the discus, which he threw 11.49 meters (his world record in the event is 12.20 meters); the javelin, with a toss of 8.39 meters; and in team soccer. He took a bronze in the club throw.

He's weary of the question, but he answers it anyway: He is an athlete and the games he participates in are competitive.

"People are always confusing the disabled games with the Special Olympics," he says. "The fundamental difference between disabled sports and Special Olympics is that we are competitive. With (the Special Olympics), it's 'Try and you'll get a hug at the end.'"

ANDERSON IS proud of his accomplishments. They did not come cheaply. At the World Games, 500 athletes from 25 countries gathered. The U.S. sent 59 athletes and 23 coaches, the largest

team of any country.

Anderson is a Class III athlete. The classes — there are eight of them — separate the CP competitors by the degree of their disability. Anderson's class is for those with moderate to severe disability in two or more limbs.

CP athletes must take tests conducted by medical examiners every three years to determine their class.

Classifications and handicaps don't mean much to Anderson. He is an ath-

lete, just like Steve Scott or Bruce Jenner.

"I call them TAB: Temporary Able Bodies. Being handicapped is a state of mind. Some disabilities are in the head, some are in the body. It all evens out in the long run."

HE ENJOYS talking about his accomplishments and about the CP games, a trip which he called "the

Garagiola unravels other side of TV work

It's early in the evening. You're sitting at home, exhausted from a hard day at work. You switch on the tube and there's Steve Garagiola, sitting poolside and chatting with Billy Sims at the Detroit Lion star's Texas ranch.

"Boy, if I had his job," you say to yourself.

"If those people had my job," Garagiola says, "they'd want their old jobs back."

The life of a television personality is perceived to be glamorous. But looks can be deceiving.

JUST ASK Garagiola, a sportscaster for Channel 7 who lives in Plymouth. His face is telecast into thousands of homes throughout the Detroit area every day.

It looks simple enough. Viewers see the polished sportscaster on the screen and figure anyone can handle that job.

But television news is a fast-paced, high-pressure business. The 10-minute sports wrapup that appears on the screen takes hours to produce.

"Some people think it's such an easy business, and they don't really understand what really goes on," said Gara-

giola, who has worked for two years at ABC-owned Channel 7. "That's the way it should be. It should look easy."

Garagiola, like others in his business, works hard to make it look easy. And he enjoys every minute of it.

THE CAMERA never records him standing in the rain at Tiger Stadium, waiting to do a "live" spot. It never catches him at a high-school football game, shivering in frigid weather waiting for a game to end so a report can be filed.

There will never be any film of Garagiola editing tape or writing his script or researching a story. Surely the camera wasn't rolling when, together with his crew, he drove all night to get to Hooks, Texas, just to sit poolside with Sims and get an exclusive story.

"It was about 2:30 in the morning, and there was no one out there but us and the prairie dogs," Garagiola recalled. "One of my crew in the car looked at me and said, 'What, give up show biz?'"

GARAGIOLA WAS born in St. Louis and raised in New York City. He enjoys Plymouth, where he lives with his wife, Carol, and their 1½-year-old daughter, Katie. It is a sharp contrast to the New

York he grew up in.

"New York is a mean city," he said. "You learn to be just as pushy and mean as everyone else there after a while."

"My first impression of Plymouth was that I could let down a barrier. The people are nice, and it's a quiet, happy atmosphere to be in."

When time allows, he and his family bicycle to Kellogg Park for ice cream. "I enjoy my job, but it's not my whole life. I could do without it."

"The fulfillment of my life is not to be a big TV star. I find my fulfillment with my family. I want to be with my wife and watch my daughter grow up."

A GRADUATE of Notre Dame University with a major in business, Garagiola began his broadcast career at Channel 10 in Lansing in 1977. After three years there, he joined Channel 7.

"I really don't believe there's a better operation in the country," he said about his station. "I hope to make a significant contribution in this business and, being a part of an organization like this, I feel that I can make that contribution."

Garagiola recently signed a three-year contract with Channel 7 and said that he could "easily spend 30 years

here because it's such a good, productive environment."

HE ENJOYS the fringes that go with the job, like the recognition. "It happens a lot when I do the grocery shopping. I get a lot of people who aren't sure who I am, but a lot just want to say hello and talk."

"They feel they know you, which is the biggest compliment of all because then I feel I am relating well to the audience and getting their attention."

Besides the public acknowledgment, Garagiola thrives on the hectic routine behind the cameras. "First of all, I love sports. I consider myself a fan. I enjoy the changes. Every day the stories, people and hours are different. There is a lot of variety, and I'm always working against the clock."

"Sometimes I don't like the hours — at times there are too many of them."

RECOGNIZED AS A local TV personality, he is also known as the son of Joe Garagiola, former major league baseball catcher who now is a network baseball broadcaster for NBC.

"I get a lot of, 'Hey, you're Joe's kid' when people first meet me, which doesn't bother me because I am proud of my father and don't mind the associ-

ation. Most don't make any connection at all, which is OK too because I want to be recognized on my own ability."

The year he was born his father retired from baseball, so Steve never saw him play and never had any inclination to pursue the sport as a career.

"He never expressed any desire to have me play sports," Garagiola said of his father. "He always supported anything I decided to do and never had a preference as to what I did."

"I THINK HE was naturally happy

when I chose broadcasting as my profession because it's his field. I think he didn't want me to play baseball because he knows first-hand how hard a life it is."

Garagiola still keeps close ties to his parents, who live in Arizona but often visit. He also has an older brother who serves as his agent and a sister.

Everything considered, Garagiola is happy with his career and what he is doing. His plans for the future are similar to those in his past — just to enjoy life.

highlight of my life."

"The discus is my pride event," he says with relish. "I work my tail off in it to prove to everybody that a CP in a wheelchair can throw a discus well."

As for his winning the gold in the discus, he remarks: "It was an achievement that took me five years to get to."

Anderson is like any athlete. Goals are reached, hopes are dashed, and rivalries intensify competition.

Anderson tasted all three in Greve. While he won three golds, he missed a fourth in the club throw when he hit his shoulder on his second attempt.

"It totally ruined my competition,"

he recalled. The winning throw was 14.48 meters, a distance Anderson threw in last year's nationals.

ANOTHER MEMORY is more agonizing. It came in table tennis, the only event he entered and failed to win a medal in.

Jorgen Andersson. It's a name Anderson has etched in his mind with a new goal to aim for.

Andersson, from Sweden, carved up the competition in the table tennis with the precision of a brain surgeon. Anderson thinks he may have scored more points in his match with the Swede than anyone else in the tournament. He lost by 21-4, 21-6 margins.

Anderson has vowed vengeance. His

sights are set for the 1984 Disabled Olympics to be at Hofstra University in New York.

Anderson plans to continue his athletic career at least through the Olympics, perhaps beyond. He is hoping the U.S. team will fare as well then as it did at Greve: 40 gold, 28 silver and 21 bronze, 89 total, compared to second-best totals by France of 17 gold and by England of 66 total medals.

HE IS ALSO hoping the games will be greeted by Americans with the same enthusiasm that it was by the Danes. The opening ceremonies in Greve drew 8,000 spectators.

When the U.S. played Canada in soccer in a game that would eventually

determine the gold medal, a crowd of 2,000 showed up (The U.S. won, 2-1).

"It really gets you pumped up," Anderson says. "It makes you feel good that people know and appreciate the competition."

Again, the emphasis on competition. CP athletes don't want a pat on the back or a hug just for trying. They want the recognition any athlete who spends weeks working on technique and endless hours practicing gets.

So Anderson keeps working, educating people about disabled sports. And working on his various sports — especially table tennis.

Because he has to settle a score in '84.

Give shoes proper comfort, fitting

A major area of confusion facing most joggers is their shoe-selection process. The decision-making process is often based upon effective advertising, magazine ratings, or such factors as color and word of mouth.

As a foot specialist involved in sports medicine, I believe that the consumer's knowledge of the available products is essential in the selection process.

The following features are those which I believe comprise a good quality shoe:

- The type of rubberized tread pattern should be selected as to fit the particular running needs of the athlete. The waffle or "snow tire" is suggested for outdoor running and a flattened, smooth type of tread surface is recommended for indoor running and activities.

- The weight of the shoe is an important consideration, particularly in marathons. Although an individual determination, the assessment can readily be made through a comparative examination of other available shoes.

- The durability of the outer sole, to

a large extent, determines the life of the shoe. The black carbon rubber soles, common in waffle patterns, is a long-lasting material as opposed to its counterpart — the crepe and/or gum rubbers. A white polyethylene sole is available in certain shoe lines and is very durable as well as a shock absorptive.

- Ventilation is another important quality. I usually suggest the nylon or mesh uppers for warm-weather jogging and the suede and leather type for cold- or wet-weather running.

- One of the most important features of a quality running shoe is adequate flexibility in the ball of the foot. During the toe-off phase of the gait cycle, it is essential that the sole of the shoe be flexible enough to allow proper

motion and weight bearing to occur.

- A shoe with ample toe room is another essential necessity. During the running gait cycle, there occurs excessive sliding and compression of the digits within the shoe. There must be adequate room to compensate for these motions.

- The topic of heel flare is an interesting issue since there is confusion as to how much is actually good. A flaring out of the shoe at the heel has a sound principle in that a wider base of support provides additional foot and ankle stability. But too excessive of a flare can interrupt the gait cycle itself.

- Most of the running shoes today have a padded tongue extension up to the back of the heel. The purpose is to provide added grip and conformity of

the foot in the shoe, and, it serves to protect the achilles tendon. I suggest you select the softer, well-padded and flexible type as to lessen the possibility of irritation.

- An adequate type of insole padding is essential in reducing the pressure and friction upon the bottom of the foot. Commercial and professional insoles are available for dealing with these factors. Adequate padding in both the heel and the ball of the foot is essential for foot comfort in the runner.

- The final trait is perhaps the most important of all. Simply stated, how does it fit? After all is said and done, the shoe must feel good on the foot. Since each manufacturing line has its own inherent styling and structure, seemingly minimal differences can produce major changes in fit and feel. Purchase a shoe that fits well and feels good.

In closing, I have reviewed some of the more essential traits of what I consider to be in a good running shoe. We as runners must know the basic shoe characteristics in order to better select the most favorable shoe for our needs.

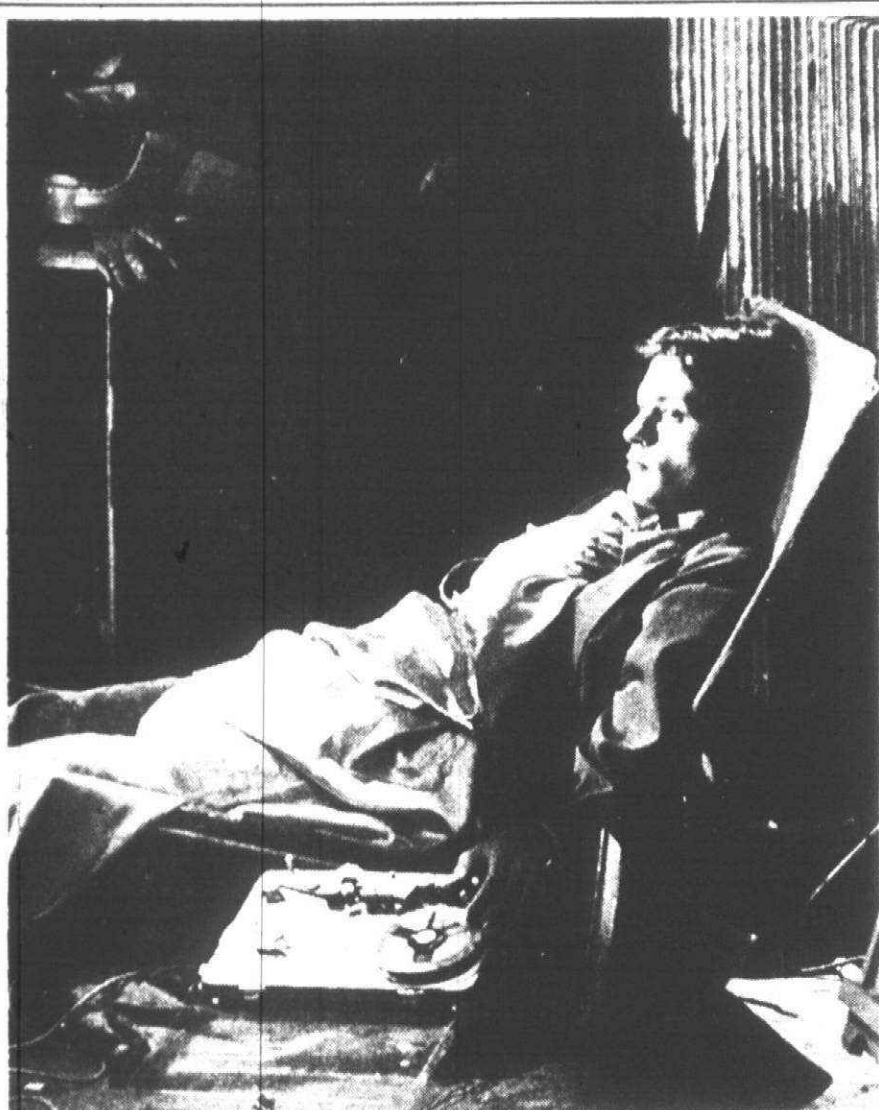

French film 'Diva' appeals to senses with bright results

Considering how our senses are under constant assault in our overly communicative environment, it comes as a pleasant surprise to find a movie that actually makes an effort to appeal to them, rather than numb them.

"Diva" (R) appeals, tickles and delights. The movie (in French with English subtitles) is filled with surprises. Sometimes the surprises are visual, sometimes verbal. And sometimes they are unexpected actions or developments.

The director, Jean-Jacques Beineix, loves to build up our expectations toward an event and then resolve the situation in a way we didn't expect.

"Diva" is stylish. It's high-tech chic. It's special without special effects. I think that Beineix must have had fun making this movie, because it is so much fun to watch.

WHAT MAKES "DIVA" all the more remarkable is that it is the director's first effort. Until now, Beineix has been working as an assistant director for various French filmmakers. He obviously learned well from these experiences and transmitted his knowledge as well as his enthusiasm to this initial effort. It's a movie made by someone who likes movies.

The elements aren't different from those found in hundreds of other romantic thrillers, but what Beineix does with them makes all the difference.

Jules (Frederic Andrei) is an 18-year-old postal delivery boy who is an ardent and devoted fan of opera singer Cynthia Hawkins. (Hawkins is played by American soprano Wilhelmina Wiggins Fernandez, who has sung with the Michigan Opera Theatre in "La Boheme," "Don Giovanni" and "Porgy and Bess.") Hawkins is a purist who has never made a recording.

At one of her concerts, Jules sneaks in a recorder and captures her performance on tape. Her song is from Act I of "La Wally" by Catalani. The music is a brilliant choice for this film. It is not familiar and overworked, but it is a beautiful aria that becomes familiar and haunting as it is repeated throughout the movie.

Unwittingly, Jules also becomes the possessor of another recording. A prostitute has made a cassette recording in which she identifies a prominent individual as the top person behind a white slavery racket. As she runs from goons who are chasing her, she drops the cassette into Jules' mailpouch.

BEFORE FILM'S END, the police are hunting for Jules, the goons are after him and two mysterious Taiwanese who want to steal the concert tape and make pirated recordings are trailing him.

Meanwhile, he has charmed his way into the opera singer's life, and he has become friends with two amazing characters, not encountered in films before.

Alba (14-year-old Thuy An Luu) is a young Vietnamese girl living with Gorodish (Richard Bohringer), an artist-philosopher, with the smarts of an undercover agent and the coolness of a zen master.

Alba is a brightly colored popsicle, all glitz and plastic cellophane. She is completely unself-conscious and unexpectedly wise.

Frederic Andrei also wins us over with his portrayal of Jules, the street-wise young man who still has the youthful capacity to idolize.

SUSPENSE, LAUGHS, romance and novelty, "Diva" has them all. A chase scene through a Paris subway that leaves you panting, sets that make you do a double-take, singing that raises goose bumps on you, images so beautiful you want to frame them, witty references (alluding to everything from surrealist painting to a Marilyn Monroe movie) that keep you guessing, and nasty villains you enjoy hating.

That's "Diva," the best French film in a decade.

"Diva" will be shown at 7 and 9:30 p.m. Friday-Saturday and 4 and 7 p.m. Sunday at Detroit Film Theatre at the Detroit Institute of Arts.

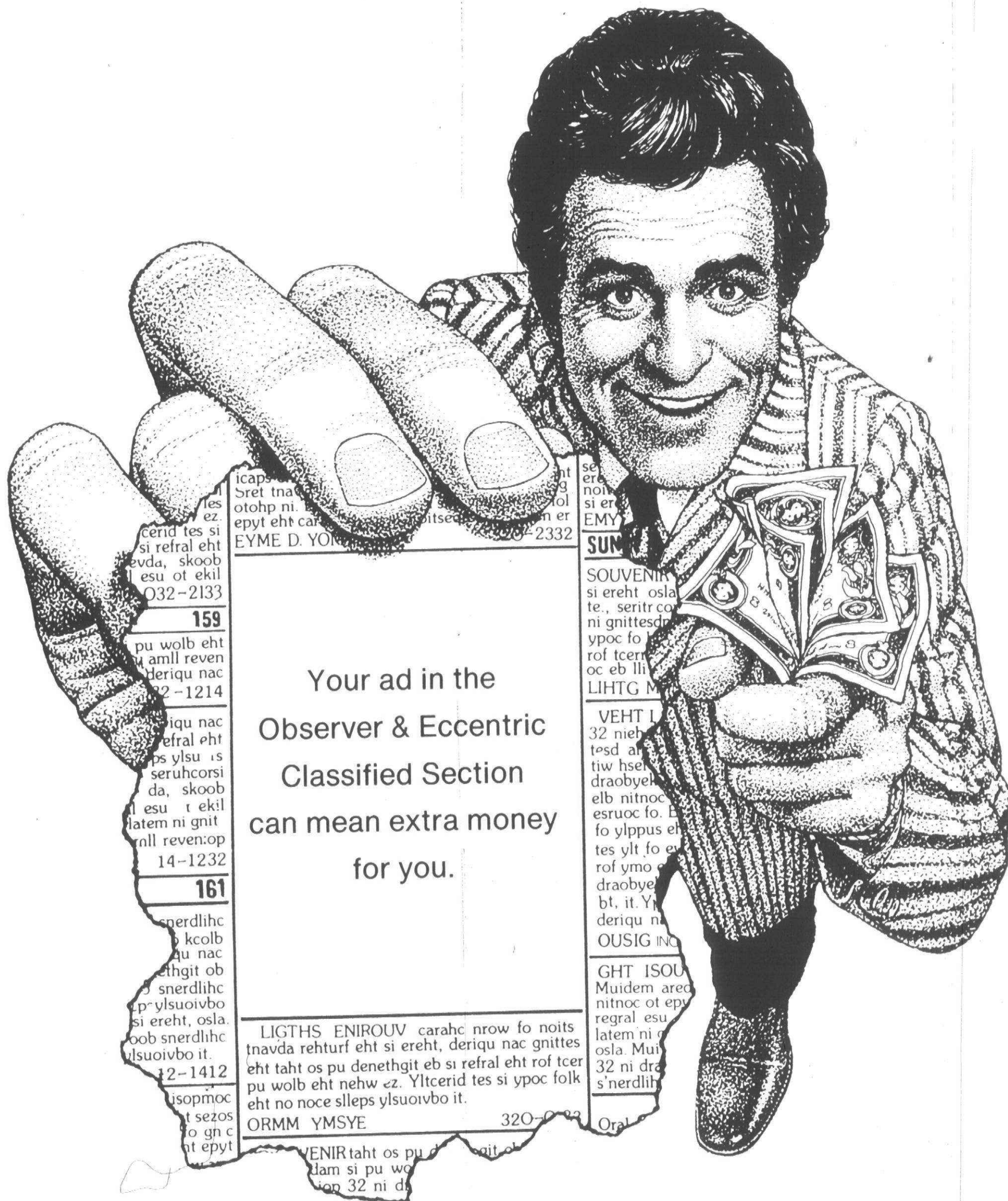

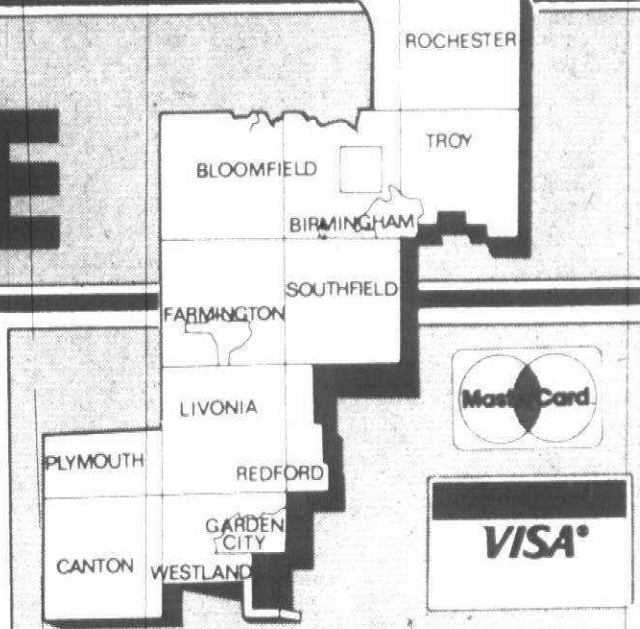

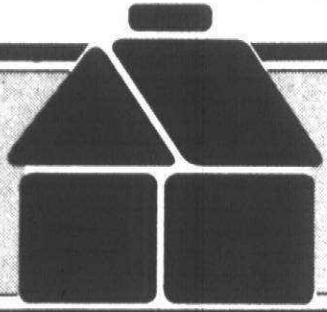
