Police fear moped injuries

Canton police are afraid someone is going to get injured or killed because of mix-ups over mopeds and motorcycles.

Mopeds are pedal-propelled motor bikes which travel up to 25 mph. They are enjoying great popularity.

According to police, some people aren't aware of the law or of proper, safe usage when riding mopeds. In addition, some dealers are unwittingly or fraudulently representing small motorcycles as mopeds.

Confusion has heightened since early July, when Gov. William Milliken vetoed a bill that would have relaxed guidelines defining mopeds, said Police Chief Jerry Cox.

The vetoed bill would have raised the maximum allowable speed for mopeds from 25 to 30 mph and eliminate the need for a pedal system.

Cox says some motorcycle dealers are selling small motorcycles as mopeds, and that secretary of state branch offices are improperly registering the vehicles.

The result is that small motorcycles are being driven under less-stringent moped rules.

"Apparently, the secretary of state's office wasn't notified of the veto," Cox said.

"The crux of this issue seems to be that the motorcycle is required to have insurance, a helmet and a driver's license, indicating greater degree of responsibility and accountability. The moped operator requires only a registration and a special restricted license."

THERE HAVE already been three or four accidents involving mopeds in recent weeks, said Cox. He's concerned about a youthful moped driver being injured or killed, or causing an accident.

According to figures from the Michigan State Police, the number of registrations have ballooned from 12,234 as of last July, to 19,580 this June.

The minimum age for moped operation is 15, with written permission from parents, but "we've found them as young as 9, 10 and 11, riding on the (road) shoulder or sidewalk," said Cox. The police department has been ticketing drivers and impounding vehicles in a recent crackdown on improper use of mopeds.

"ALTHOUGH I realize it's a parental responsibility, I'm concerned about kids who don't have any concern about traffic dangers," said Cox.

Cox has been in touch with Eldon Warr, manager of the secretary of state's office in Canton, concerning "erroneous" registration of motorcycles and mopeds, based on the veto.

Warr was away from the office Tuesday and unable to comment. However, an employee in his office denied using wrong guidelines. Teri Thibert, a four-year veteran of the office, said the bill of sale from a dealer determines whether a license is issued for a moped or a motorcycle.

Sometimes the driver tries to mislead on license applications, she added.

"Usually, we can tell from a bill of sale," said Thibert. "We ask if it has operable (movable) pedals. If it has

operable pedals, it's a moped. We're caught in the middle between the dealer and the police."

Cox believes people who had to pay tow and storage fees on impounded mopeds should be reimbursed by the

secretary of state's office. He has written letters to Secretary of State Richard Austin, Attorney General Frank Kelley, the governor's office and state legislators.

So far, there has been no answer on the reimbursement issue.

Mopeds, motorcycles carry different rules

Apparently, there is confusion on regulations for operating mopeds as compared to motorcycles.

A moped has two or three wheels, and a motor of less than 50 cubic centimeters. Top speed is 25 miles per hour.

A moped's pedal system incorporates less than 1.5 brake horsepower. Bikes without pedals which exceed 25 mph are regarded as motorcycles under the law, as are mini-bikes and motor scooters.

Canton police are concerned that the increase in the number of mopeds on the roadways will hamper traffic and cause accidents. Police say many drivers do not know the differences between mopeds and motorcycles.

In some cases, youngsters have been found illegally driving mopeds on sidewalks or along road shoulders, said Canton Police Chief Jerry Cox. Slow-moving mopeds tie up traffic on major roads.

Other communities, including Garden City and Westland, are experienc-

ing similar problems with mopeds.

GUIDELINES ARE more strict for motorcycles than for mopeds. According to the Michigan Motor Vehicle Code:

- The minimum age to operate a moped is 15, with a special moped license from a secretary of state's office. Youths must have their parents' written permission in order to get a license.

- A moped cannot be driven on sidewalks or bicycle trails. It cannot hold up traffic on a roadway.

- Maximum speed for a moped is 25 miles per hour.

- Annual license plates aren't necessary for a moped, but a registration sticker, good for three years, costs \$15.

- While a motorcyclist may carry one additional passenger, only the operator may drive a moped.

- Insurance isn't necessary to operate a moped. It is required for a motorcycle.

- Required equipment on a moped includes brakes on both wheels, head lamp, horn and muffler.

New principal named at Fiegel Elementary

Ron South will be the new principal at Fiegel Elementary School.

South was named principal to replace Ed Kleinsmith, who died of injuries suffered when he was struck by an automobile while jogging.

A long-time administrator in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools, South recently returned to the district from a leave of absence.

The appointment of South as principal at Fiegel was made by Dr. John M. Hoben, superintendent of schools. It is expected the appointment will be confirmed at the Aug. 30 meeting of the

Plymouth-Canton Board of Education.

South has more than 14 years experience in Plymouth-Canton schools, having been an elementary principal at Eriksson, Tanger, Smith and as well as Fiegel previously.

He also was an administrative intern at Farrand Elementary and was a teacher at both Farrand Elementary and at West Middle School.

Most recently he was on a leave of absence from the school district while he was teaching and counseling on career guidance in Germany.

Teen charged in accident

A 17-year-old Plymouth Township woman has been charged with negligent homicide in connection with the July 22 accident involving jogger Ed Kleinsmith.

Sherry M. Snyder of Joy Road stood mute to the charge in 35th District Court Tuesday. An innocent plea was entered for her. Judge Dunbar Davis set personal bond at \$5,000.

She was released pending a Sept. 9 preliminary examination to determine if there is sufficient evidence to bind her over to Wayne County Circuit Court. Negligent homicide is a high misdemeanor which carries a maximum penalty of two years in prison.

Kleinsmith, 46, the former principal of Fiegel Elementary School, was jogging on the north side of Joy Road, west of McClumpha, when a car apparently crossed over the center line of traffic and struck him.

Kleinsmith died Aug. 7 in Oakwood Hospital-Deerborn. He never regained

consciousness after the accident. He suffered fractures of the skull, shoulder and legs.

Police sent Snyder's car to the Michigan State Police Crime Lab for samples of blood, hair and clothing to determine which direction Kleinsmith was running. Snyder was heading east on Joy, according to police reports.

"The medical examiner's office couldn't determine which direction he was hit from (front or behind)," according to Lt. Ralph White.

Traffic officer Robert Henry investigated the accident, the first of four traffic-related deaths in Plymouth during the past month.

Kleinsmith jogged every morning along Joy Road, near his Plymouth Township home, according to family members. He had been with the Plymouth-Canton school system since 1963 as a teacher, assistant principal and principal.

Students break sound barriers

Some 19 children from the western suburbs are speaking and hearing more clearly — thanks to a summer speech program through Oakwood Hospital's outpatient center in Canton.

Lorraine Zaksek, program coordinator, is a Canton resident and speech pathologist in the Canton center's new speech and language department.

For the past eight weeks, Zaksek has been working with children from Plymouth, Canton, Livonia, Westland, Farmington and elsewhere. The summer program, which ends this week, continues treating children who participate in public-school speech programs during the school year.

CANTON RESIDENT Susan Parker says the program has been a tremendous help to her daughter Jamie, 6, a student at Farrand Elementary School. Jamie takes lessons to help produce speech sounds.

"Absolutely (it has helped)," Parker said of the program. "Jamie has learned so much this summer. We're just thrilled with the program."

Zaksek gives Parker "homework" for her to do with Jamie, who has cerebral palsy, a birth defect which impairs muscles and coordination. Getting the parent involved helps the students receive the daily treatment considered important for improvement.

"I work with Jamie on a daily basis for at least two hours each day," Parker said. "Going to speech therapy just two times a week doesn't get the job done."

THE PUBLIC school therapist refers the students to the summer program at Canton Center and supplies the clinic with diagnostic information, according to Zaksek.

"I think we've accomplished many new objectives by continuing the education of public school kids into the summer," Zaksek said. "Many of the kids require continuous stimulation. This continuous stimulation only occurs when the child is helped every day," Zaksek said.

"One advantage that our clinic offers is the parent-child-therapist interaction," she said. "To be effective, it takes more than a few hours a speech with something as habitual as speech. We get the parent to know what to look for and how to correct it."

Parker is so pleased with the results she sees in Jamie that she plans on sending her there year-round.

"We will continue to go there," Parker said. "When you've got a good thing going, it's best to stick with it."

THE CANTON CENTER speech program is an offshoot of the Oakwood Hospital in Dearborn. This is the first year for the summer pro-

gram, but there will be a continuous speech program with individualized care, Zaksek said.

"We are an on-going speech and language department for both children and adults," Zaksek said. "We will probably offer a summer program next year also."

For the individual year-round care, the speech and language department does an evaluation and gives recommendations on how often the student should come in for visits. There is no time length set on the individualized care, which employs various equipment depending on the student's

needs, Zaksek said. Some students work with audio equipment while others work with mirrors to help them form words and letters by seeing how each is done.

There is no age limit on the year-round care and the student can come as long as help is needed, Zaksek said.

Firefighters prepare for Plymouth's waterball contest

Firefighters from Canton, Plymouth, Northville and other nearby communities are busily rehearsing for the third annual Waterball Contest and Muster sponsored by the city of Plymouth Fire Department during the Plymouth Fall Festival.

The waterball contest and muster will be held Sept. 11, on Penniman Avenue in the city.

The muster will include an apparatus pumping contest, hose cart race, and bucket brigade.

The schedule for Saturday, Sept. 11, is: 9-11:30 a.m., apparatus pumping contest; hose cart race and bucket brigade; noon to 12:30 p.m., the apparatus parade; 12:30-4 p.m., the apparatus display; and 1-4 p.m., the water ball contest.

The waterball contest will be held on Penniman Avenue just west of South Main in front of the post office.

The apparatus which will participate in the parade will form at the Plymouth Cultural Center parking lot at 525 Farmer and Theodore. All entries must be in formation before noon to participate.

The apparatus will proceed along a

designated route to the display area in the festival area.

For the waterball contest, the following rules apply in addition to the standard rules:

Only one waterball team of five men will be allowed per fire department; liability release form must be submitted with registration forms prior to the day of the event; registration fee of \$5 for

each men's waterball team must accompany each registration form; a maximum of five women's teams of six women per team will be accepted, with no registration fee required. Any women's team wishing to participate is required to attend at least one waterball practice with the city of Plymouth fire department during August. Information may be obtained by calling Cap-

tain Al Matthews at 453-1234, Ext. 54.

Any team which shows up after 12:30 p.m. will be disqualified from the waterball events.

Trophies will be awarded as follows: men's waterball, first, second and third places; women's waterball, first and second — each member will receive trophy; hose cart race, bucket brigade and engine pumping, first and second.

FitzPatrick calls on Lucas to debate

Republican Wayne County executive nominee Robert E. FitzPatrick has challenged his Democratic opponent, William Lucas, to debate county issues.

"As the county executive race heats up, we will be receiving more and more requests to appear in political debates. I intend to honor all such requests," FitzPatrick said.

"Wayne County citizens are picking a county executive for a four-year term to be the executive administrator of their new county government. They certainly have every right to know the candidates' basic differences and administrative capability, philosophy of government operations, and executive experience," he added.

FitzPatrick, a lifelong Democrat and former four-term chairman of the County Board of Commissioners, was a runaway winner in the Republican primary Aug. 10.

Originally, he had entered the county executive race listed as both a Democrat and Republican. He has said that local government should be a nonpartisan system.

FitzPatrick won a Circuit Court test

to remain on both ballots, but was forced to make a choice when Michigan's Appeals Court reversed the lower court decision. FitzPatrick said he selected the GOP ballot as a matter of political practicality.

"It was the most direct way for me to have the opportunity to debate the Wayne County reform issues," FitzPatrick said.

VA benefits listed for 1981

In Wayne County, Veterans Administration expenditures were \$211.2 million during 1981.

Of this amount, compensation and pension amounted to \$113.7 million.

Expenditures for educational benefits to Vietnam veterans and other training programs in Wayne County amounted to \$21.2 million. Statewide \$67,895,000 was expended.

In Michigan the VA spent \$30 million on insurance and indemnities. Wayne veterans received \$9.4 million. Wayne vets also received \$152,000 in direct home loans.



Trustees rebuffed on recall petitions

Four Wayne-Westland school board officers lost the first round in their fight to have a scheduled Sept. 14 recall election called off.

Round two will start at 2 p.m. today in Wayne County Circuit Court.

Judge John Kirwan ruled at a hearing Monday against the board officers' claim that they were denied due process because the Wayne County and city of Westland clerk failed to allow them to see the recall petitions.

But the county clerk's attorney, William McIntyre, said the four board members never asked to inspect the petitions.

The hearing today will deal with the board members' claim that the petition circulators used "false and misleading" information to gain signatures.

The four board members are Mary Arbour, Mildred Batterson, Kenneth Marshall, and Donald Rusnock.

They are suing the Wayne County and city of Wayne and Westland clerks and the county election commission.

Seeking to remove the board members from office are the Taxpayers United Together, centering their campaign on the board's approval of a teachers' union contract and salary raise.

The group, through its attorney, George Maurer, Jr., was to formally ask by yesterday to be allowed to in-

tervene in the case as a co-defendant.

MAURER TOLD the judge he is "astounded we're in court" and that "it is ridiculous that we're here."

The attorney added that the case "is a mockery of justice to some extent."

Maurer said the four board officials weren't willing to spend the \$600-800 needed to get copies of the recall petitions but a lot more is being spent in having attorneys and others at the court hearing.

On the technical question decided by Judge Kirwan, the four said the clerks from Wayne County and the cities of Wayne and Westland refused to allow them to inspect the petitions, signed by a little more than 5,300 residents.

But the clerk's attorney said the county was never asked to inspect the petitions.

Kirwan added that the city clerks have no authority to "surrender" the petitions to the four board members.

After bloody primary Patterson spurns olive branch

After winning the Republican gubernatorial primary with a slashing, cut-'em-up campaign, Richard Headlee faces the problem of patching up the party into a unit that can elect a team.

Headlee moved quickly to hold out an olive branch to Oakland County Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson, who was third in a three-way battle where no one got more than 34 percent or less than 28.

Would he consider having Patterson on the fall ticket as the attorney general candidate?

"Oh, sure," said the Farmington Hills insurance executive Tuesday night as the election results trickled into the Michigan Inn in Southfield. A pause.

"I'd like to have him change his style on TV ads just a little," he added.

HEADLEE'S REMARK was read to Patterson an hour later at his party in Roma Hall in Bloomfield. Patterson sputtered a split second and then said: "I have one regret — I didn't pour it on more."

The 10-year veteran of the Oakland County prosecutor's office cooled a little and added: "I'll campaign for any Republican nominee who is for less government, less taxes, compared to (Democratic nominee James) Blanchard."

Patterson talked on, then said, "I don't want to close any doors. I'm not bitter. It's premature to make any statement."

Many Republican politicians have

talked to Patterson over the years about taking on Democratic Attorney General Frank Kelley. Patterson might have had the nomination in 1978 but chose instead to stay in a losing primary battle against U.S. Sen. Robert Griffin. He wanted to be a senator instead. He might have been in a position to ask for the attorney general nomination this year, but chose to conduct a nearly fratricidal campaign against Headlee, Lt. Gov. James Brickley and state Sen. Jack Welborn.

HOW BITTER Patterson — and other Republicans — are or aren't may be seen at this weekend's Republican state convention in Grand Rapids.

Since 1970, the gubernatorial nominee has hand-picked his running mate for lieutenant governor, but the other

ballot slots usually have been up for grabs. The unwritten rule is that delegates try to balance the ticket by sections of the state, by race and by gender.

The 1982 GOP convention is pretty much an open book. There are few Republican incumbents to seek re-election.

The state ticket will be rounded out by candidates for secretary of state and attorney general.

One incumbent, state Supreme Court Justice John Fitzgerald, has decided to step down. Two candidates will be nominated — one to replace him and one to take on Justice Blair Moody Jr.

EIGHT PEOPLE will be nominated





for education posts — two each for the State Board of Education and the governing boards of the University of Michigan, Michigan State University and Wayne State University.

Only one Republican presently holds any of those jobs. Paul B. Henry has been on the State Board of Education since he was appointed in 1975 by Gov. Milliken. Henry, 40, is associate professor of political science at Calvin College, Grand Rapids.

Typically GOP conventions feature three or four fights between conservatives and mainstream moderate supporters of Milliken. Under Headlee, the main stream may have shifted to the right. If so, a different brand of state ticket could emerge.

MEANWHILE, the bitterness of the

primary won't fade when the TV set is turned off. The candidates have put their disdain for each other in writing.

The Headlee Headliner: "Take a look at the two sides of Brooks Patterson. . . Patterson says he will take no PAC or special interest money in this campaign. But he has accepted over \$10,000 from one special interest lobbying group."

Community colleges attract broader range of students

Michigan community colleges have changed drastically in the past few years, with more "non-traditional" students studying at the institutions than in previous years.

The high cost of education, as well as the advanced curricula offered, are making closer-to-home community colleges more attractive.

In the 1980-81 academic year, community colleges enrolled over 233,000 students. This represents over 40 percent of the students in Michigan institutions of higher education.

A four-person committee, comprised of representatives from various community colleges across the state, studied the makeup of the state's two-year institutions.

Community colleges emphasize occupational programs and courses as a major component of their functions.

One out of two students is 24 years old or older, compared to one out of five that is 19 years old or younger.

Approximately 76 percent of the students are employed and 54 percent are women. About 16 per-

cent of community college enrollees are members of minority groups.

Displaced employees are also turning to community colleges for retraining. As examples, during 1980-81, 22 community colleges enrolled over 2,200 students and the Trade Readjustment Allowance program.

General education is still the most popular curriculum, with 43 percent of the students enrolled there. The study shows that 26 percent are enrolled in occupational courses while 22 percent are majoring in business.



Robert FitzPatrick

FitzPatrick calls on Lucas to debate

Republican Wayne County executive nominee Robert E. FitzPatrick has challenged his Democratic opponent, William Lucas, to debate county issues.

"As the county executive race heats up, we will be receiving more and more requests to appear in political debates. I intend to honor all such requests," FitzPatrick said.

"Wayne County citizens are picking a county executive for a four-year term to be the executive administrator of their new county government. They certainly have every right to know the candidates' basic differences and administrative capability, philosophy of government operations, and executive experience," he added.

FitzPatrick, a lifelong Democrat and former four-term chairman of the County Board of Commissioners, was a runaway winner in the Republican primary Aug. 10.

Originally, he had entered the county executive race listed as both a Democrat and Republican. He has said that local government should be a nonpartisan system.

FitzPatrick won a Circuit Court test to remain on both ballots, but was forced to make a choice when Michigan's Appeals Court reversed the lower court decision. FitzPatrick said he selected the GOP ballot as a matter of political practicality.

"It was the most direct way for me to have the opportunity to debate the Wayne County reform issues," FitzPatrick said.

Medical claims flow through computer system

With more than 40,000 employees throughout the U.S., processing employee medical insurance claims is a big task at Burroughs Corp.

But the job has been made easier with the initiation of a processing system called BCAS (Burroughs Claims Administration System).

Instead of several regional claims offices from coast to coast, BCAS provides claims processing from a single centralized location at its Federal & Special System Group, Detroit Data Center at 13001 Eckles Road in Plymouth Township.

The center employs about 55 people, many of whom are Plymouth residents, and is managed by Fred Phillips of Plymouth.

The result of the centralized location is greater processing efficiency, simplified record keeping, and cost savings for Burroughs.

BCAS is the product of combined efforts of Burroughs, its System Development Corp. (SDC) subsidiary, and The Travelers Insurance Co.

The system uses Burroughs computer and terminal equipment, claims administration software developed by SDC, and Travelers' claims processing personnel.

Preparations for implementing BCAS took 18 months, and the first phase — service to Burroughs employees in Michigan — went into effect July 1.

By February 1983 the system will extend throughout the U.S. and by the

second quarter of 1983 BCAS will be expanded to handle dental claims as well as medical claims.

BCAS operates on a Burroughs B5900 computer system using Burroughs GEMCOS TP software and data base management software called DMS II.

At present some 12 terminals are in operation. When all phases of the project are completed there will be 18 terminals used to handle the claims.

PHARMACY SUPERVISOR

Jerry S. Vidis, 34, of Canton Township has been appointed pharmacy supervisor in the Eastern Michigan University Health Center by the EMU Board of Regents at its regular monthly meeting in August.

He is a member of the Michigan Society of Hospital Pharmacists and of the Southeastern Michigan Society of Hospital Pharmacists.

At EMU Vidis will procure and dispense pharmaceuticals and assist in the operational activities of the university pharmacy located in Snow Health Center.

He also will counsel students, faculty and staff on the use of prescription and non-prescription medications and will maintain records related to the operation of the pharmacy.

Co-sponsors of the Congress were the National Federation of Independent Business and the Small Business Administration, an agency of the federal government.



Plymouth last stop for state bus tour

Plymouth will be the last stop for 45 tour brokers and bus operators on a six-day familiarization tour through lower Michigan.

The tour began Sunday in Detroit and will end Aug. 28 in Plymouth.

Staying cool without air conditioning

You can stay cool at home without air conditioning — most of the time. Except for the very hottest days, you can keep cool without raising the electric bill by running an air conditioner. Before you decide to buy or use an electric air conditioner, consider these ways to keep cool:

- Insulation in the walls and ceiling conserves heat in the winter, but this same insulation will keep out heat in the summer so the house will stay cooler. A house with dark shingles on the roof absorbs more heat than one with light shingles. So attic insulation is more important to you if your house has a dark roof.

- Leaving storm windows on will reduce the heat coming through the glass. However, you may want to replace a few storm windows with screens on the east and west sides of your house for cross-ventilation. What you lose in window insulation will be made up for what you gain in cross breezes. If you have lots of windows on the west side of your house, leave most of the storm windows on.

- Keep drapes closed during the day to insulate the windows.

- Open windows at night to take advantage of the cool night Michigan air.

- Leave windows and doors closed during the day until the temperature inside is higher than temperature outside and then open the windows.

- Close off rooms that are inclined to be warm: the kitchen, laundry room, or utility room.

- Light bulbs, motors, TV sets and other appliances give off heat. Avoid using them during the hottest part of the day.

- Use the kitchen exhaust fan when cooking, washing clothes, mopping, and a bathroom fan when bathing. These will remove both excessive heat and moisture.

- A room fan on a pedestal circulates air within the room to give a cooling sensation to people in the room. It speeds the evaporation from the skin and evaporation is cooling.

- Window fans exchange air. Such a fan can blow either in or out. If the fan blows out, the cool air will come in through open windows in other rooms. The room with the exhaust fan will not be the coolest.

- In a two-story house, put the window fan in an upstairs window blowing out. Close upstairs windows, open the stairway door if there is one, and open windows and doors in the areas you want to

cool. The cool outside air is sucked into the house downstairs, up the stairs and out the fan, cooling the whole house.

- Try living in the lower levels of your house. If you have a basement, take advantage of it. When the temperature is way too high on the second floor and too high on the first floor, it is usually livable in the basement. A dehumidifier will keep out the soggy and allow you to keep furniture in an otherwise damp basement.

- An attic fan is located in the ceiling to the attic and blows from the house to the attic. Besides sucking in the cool air through open windows, the fan will force the hot air in the attic out through the louvers. This will remove the hot blanket of air that can make upstairs rooms warm.

- Michigan's night air is usually cool, so a good fan system can be very effective in cooling a house.

- The power of a fan is measured in cubic feet per minute (cfm). To find the size you need, calculate the volume of the space to be cooled (length times width times height). Divide the volume by 1.5. The fan power should be larger than this number.







Historic shuttle

Church tours turn back clock

ELEVEN YEARS AGO, the Detroit Historical Society initiated a series of historical church bus tours with two purposes in mind.

One was to remind Detroiters of the importance of preserving the buildings as visible history. The second was to acquaint residents with the contributions these institutions have made in the development of the religious and cultural life of the city. It was also hoped that the program would lend a bit of financial help to the churches when it is badly needed.

Almost instant recognition for the program came by way of a brightly colored — almost garish in tone — school bus, which the society tagged as its "Historymobile."

THROUGH THE YEARS, the bus has become a familiar sight in downtown Detroit, precariously winding in and out of inner-city side streets — and always filled with curious passengers who seemed to be having a lot of fun while gazing out of the bus windows at the passing cityscape.

In almost no time at all, the society's idea of touring historical areas — homes as well as churches — grew so in popularity that today it is one of the busiest of the

many programs offered to the public.

Then a funny thing happened on the way to the bus.

Suburbanites also discovered that it was great way to learn about Detroit's early history. For many of them, it was a natural curiosity since many of their own roots were tied to those very churches, many of which have fallen on hard times when parishioners left the city for the suburbs.

One of those groups to rediscover Detroit was the Livonia Public Schools' Community Education Services department. On Aug. 2, as part of the CES Family Field Trip series, 47 Livonians and other area residents toured five historic Detroit churches for a history lesson steeped in stained glass, wood and stone and peppered with such architectural terms like clerestory windows, and barrel and groin vaulting.

LUNCHEON AT ONE of the churches on the tour is part of the outing.


In all, there are 30 churches participating in the program, which began at the suggestion of museum member Lucy Hamilton. She is still a tour guide with the program, along with museum colleague Bobby Emmons.

The tours are conducted the first Monday of each month. Price is \$7 for non-members and \$5.50 for society members. Reservations — which are a must — can be made by calling the Detroit Historical Museum offices at 833-7934.



Unemployment

Tax bill passage could increase benefits for many

If Congress approves President Ronald Reagan's \$98.3 billion tax proposal complete with the unemployment benefit extension package, thousands of Michigan residents could get more money.

About 39 percent of people in the state collecting unemployment checks during 1981 exhausted their benefits.

"We'd get an increase claim load of about 6,000, if it's approved," said Gloria Hardiman, director of the Royal Oak office of the Michigan Employment Security Commission.

Throughout Michigan, 35-40 percent of the people whose unemployment benefits were ended would resume receiving payments if the proposed 10-week extension is granted, said Isadore Stein, state chief of unemployment research and federal reports.

Under the present unemployment system, people who worked at least 35 weeks are entitled to maximum benefits of 26 weekly payments, which is about 70 percent of their regular salary.

Auto plants remain closed

United States automobile production is languishing at relatively low levels again this week as automakers convert plants to 1983 model car production.

Ward's Automotive Reports said low sales are prolonging this mid-summer sojourn. General Motors Corp. has extended changeover downtime at eight of its assembly plants in an attempt to deplete unsold vehicle inventory, and Volkswagen of America Inc. has likewise seized the opportunity of model changeover to reduce its vehicle stock.

Production this week stands at an estimated 69,654 cars, down 9 percent from last week's 76,175 units, but a full 22 percent below production of the

same week in 1981, when automakers began accelerating production as they completed changeovers.

In addition to the GM plants on extended model changeover, one additional GM, two Ford Motor Co. and two Chrysler Corp. plants are closed this week for changeover. Ford has idled two plants this week for inventory control and its Dearborn plant is down for the first of two weeks to correct "production problems."

Additionally, GM's Bowling Green, Ky., plant is still idled by strike. Volkswagen's car and truck lines are down for extended changeovers.

tension is approved or how many people would be eligible," she said.

Predicting whether the tax package will pass is difficult, said U.S. Sen. Don Riegle. But he is sure the unemployment provisions will come before the legislators in some form.

"Unemployment benefit extensions

are clearly needed, but the president's bill is using it as a form of blackmail. It says if you don't approve the tax hikes, you don't get the unemployment extensions," Riegle said.

"In every previous recession, there has always been extensions for unemployment benefits. If we defeat the tax bill, we're going to offer unemployment extensions on another piece of legislation, and we have the votes to pass it alone."

ABOUT 25,000 Oakland County residents pass through the doors of Royal Oak's unemployment office monthly. There is also an unemployment office in Pontiac serving the northern part of the county. Statistics were unavailable at Wayne MESC offices.

Figures for the end of June indicate that 13.3 percent of the unemployed Oakland County residents (60,775) are collecting unemployment benefits.

In Wayne County, the June statistics show that 154,625 people, or 14.5 percent of the unemployed people in the county, are collecting benefits.

The number of recipients is high now because many auto workers are laid off while plants are shut down for model changeover.



Headlee death threats reported

Just one day after winning the Republican primary, gubernatorial candidate Richard Headlee's life was threatened in a series of phone calls received by the police.

The Farmington Hills Police Department took the calls shortly after 1 a.m. Thursday. The calls continued for about 15 minutes, according to Farmington Hills Police Chief John Nichols.

"The caller indicated that Headlee was going to die and he had 'X' minutes to live," Nichols said. "The caller said he or she had a 9mm pistol and that he or she intended to shoot Headlee. The

voice sounded either juvenile or female and the caller apparently was the same one each time."

"On the last call, he or she indicated he or she had just shot Headlee, and by this time we had already dispatched a patrol car to the Headlee residence to make sure nothing had, in fact, happened," Nichols added.

Nichols said the patrolmen stayed at the Headlee residence the rest of the night.

"We certainly don't discount threats of this nature but it is not uncommon for people seeking political office to receive various threats."

"MR. HEADLEE did not ask for further police protection, as I am sure he

realizes we do not have the manpower to do this, but we have started making periodic checks of the residence," Nichols said.

At Alexander Hamilton Life Insurance Company in Farmington Hills, where Headlee is president, security has been stepped up according to Vern Lunn, vice president for corporate services.

"We have just upped our normal security precautions around here," Lunn said.

"We have around-the-clock security people here and we are just being doubly careful who we let enter the building," Lunn added.

At the Headlee for Governor cam-

paign headquarters at Northland Towers in Southfield, no new security has been added to that already present in the building, according to Bob Bao, communications assistant for the campaign.

"We have not made any security precautions at the campaign office. We have the normal building security here at the Northland Towers and we have not added any of our own," Bao said.

"To our knowledge, there have been no other threats made against Mr. Headlee other than those received by the Farmington Hills Police on Thursday morning," Bao added.

As of Monday afternoon, Headlee had not been available for comment.

No-campaign candidate surprises all — wins easily

William Ryan, the Democratic nominee for county commissioner from the 10th District, admittedly did not campaign for the nomination he won in last week's primary election.

Ryan, 51, a drive-in theater manager for 30 years and an unknown in local political circles, said he couldn't campaign — he was laid up in a hospital for several weeks due to an aorta by-pass operation, his second in six years.

As a consequence, Ryan, who has never run for office before, said he

didn't do any of the things that candidates usually do — pass out literature, put up signs or attend candidates night meetings for debate with other candidates.

He even failed to return a questionnaire from the League of Women Voters for inclusion in a newspaper and didn't respond to questions from Civic Searchlight, a nonpartisan civic organization which rates political candidates.

Despite all this, Ryan — the apparent beneficiary of a politically popular name — defeated his primary opponent 2-1.

Also surprised was Barry Sherman, the Livonia police officer who waged a strong but unsuccessful battle against incumbent county commissioner Mary Dumas for the Republican nomination.

"I was shocked; I'm still shocked," said Sherman of the Democratic outcome. "Roesler had a very visible campaign going, and then, whammo." "Walt and I saw each other that (election) night, and when he left, around 7:30 p.m., I thought for sure he'd win," recalled Sherman. "I ran into him a lot out there and he did all those things you're supposed to do in a campaign — attend the public forums, put out signs and literature, attend interviews, seek endorsements."

"I guess it's just a sad commentary on how some people vote, especially since he (Roesler) lost by so much," Sherman said.

MOST LOCAL observers conclude that Ryan won because of his Irish surname.

One of the better known William Ryans is William A. Ryan, D-Detroit, a member of the state House since 1958 and speaker of the House since 1969. Another leading Ryan is state Supreme Court Justice James Ryan.

As might be expected, Ryan's legal adviser, Albert E. Conn, a Southfield attorney, attributed the victory to Ryan being a "very popular person" who "by virtue of his occupation" meets and is familiar with many people.

Asked if name recognition was a major factor in his candidate's nomination, Conn said:

"I would like not to believe so. People should be given more credit to distinguish between him and a representative in Lansing."

"I would attribute it to the fact that people were glad to see him seek some office and are ready for a change."

Ryan will be on the November general election ballot against the incumbent commissioner Dumas and faces an uphill battle at best. Dumas is seeking her sixth term in an area generally considered Republican.

ROESLER, WHO was upset by the Ryan victory, responded tersely to questions about the race. "I didn't even pay any attention to the primary so I

can't answer any of your questions," he said, before hanging up the telephone.

Ryan said he had not mapped out his campaign strategy for the general election campaign. He said he would be meeting with his campaign staff for that purpose.

WSDP has expanded outreach under Cardinal

JEFF CARDINAL will be missed by many in the Plymouth-Canton community when he leaves for a new career in television.

Cardinal has been coordinator of the student radio station (WSDP-FM) since it began 10 years ago.

Cardinal has grown up with the radio station, it seems, and the station certainly has grown up with Cardinal at the helm.

In the early days of student broadcasting, the idea of a high-school student radio station was a novelty. In fact, high-school broadcasting still is a novelty for many school districts throughout Michigan.

Plymouth-Canton, fortunately, had some solid adult leadership behind the student radio station when it began in 1972. And Jeff Cardinal was one of those leaders who helped shape the station's future.

Cardinal believed that broadcasting was a learning experience, and he helped make WSDP an inte-

gral part of the educational curriculum at the Centennial Educational Park (CEP).

Beyond the emphasis on learning, Cardinal and others also have helped develop WSDP into a first-rate student radio center.

Under Cardinal's guidance, the radio station has expanded its hours of broadcasting, its coverage area and its programming to offer the community a wide selection of broadcasting.

WSDP always has had a loyal following of listeners because it has been the only outlet for home high-school basketball and football games and for tournament action.

In recent years, though, the station has increased its audience with musical and dramatic specials intermixed with its coverage of CEP and community activities.

Under a Cardinal's coaxing, WSDP also grew

away from being solely a student learning laboratory and moved toward becoming a community institution.

An advisory committee was organized to allow members of the community to participate in long-range planning for WSDP.

And when the school district began having financial problems, WSDP organized an on-air auction as a fund-raiser. The auction became a community affair drawing together the student broadcasters and members of the community.

Cardinal also became active in the educational broadcasting associations and helped Plymouth-Canton develop professional standing in the field. Through his work with the student broadcasting association, Cardinal has kept in touch with the other 16 high-school radio stations in Michigan and has kept Plymouth-Canton part of that network.

As a result of the emphasis on learning and the

hands-on experience offered by WSDP, a number of CEP graduates have gone on to broadcasting jobs at major universities and at commercial stations in Michigan and throughout the U.S. WSDP has been a strong career-oriented learning lab.

It would be wrong to give Cardinal sole credit for the advances WSDP has made. Others have worked with Cardinal to help bring the broadcasting program along. But Cardinal has offered continuity and has kept his hands on the program over the past 10 years.

Cardinal's leadership and influence will be missed. He is moving to Lansing to take a job as promotion director for a new public television station there. We wish Jeff Cardinal well in his new job and thank him for the many contributions made since 1972 to the community and to many student broadcasters at the CEP. We will remain indebted for an excellent job at WSDP.

Eliminate the \$100 candidates

WHILE THE primary election was still being muddled, the discussion began about changing the state election laws governing the use of public funds by gubernatorial candidates.

At least one candidate thinks the present spending limit for a gubernatorial candidate — \$1.2 million for the primary and the same for the general — is too low. Others think that the gubernatorial candidates should have to raise more money than the present \$50,000 from private contributions before becoming eligible for matching public funds.

Whatever the merits of these changes, the state Legislature would do well to also consider changing the present election laws which allow candidates for state, county and local offices to become candidates by merely filing a \$100 fee. This easy standard allows for the most inane of candidacies and contributes to public disrespect for elections.

Candidates for the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives become candidates by securing a certain number of signatures on nominating petitions — 1 percent of the total that the secretary of state candidate of the same party received in the last such election. Candidates for township office must also file nominating petitions — 1 percent of the number of votes the secretary of state candidate received in their township.

YET THE Republican and Democratic candidates for state, county and many local offices need only file a \$100 filing fee to become a candidate whose name must be placed on the primary ballot.

The law also allows candidacy by filing nominating petitions with signatures — again 1 percent of the secretary of state's vote, etc. Some candidates wishing to have a mailing list of supporters and to get a public campaign going do actually collect signatures.

Most, however, take the far easier route of paying the \$100 fee. This absurdly low fee often leads to election-time gambits which cheapen and make



tawdry the democratic process. It is particularly evident in county elections, and this primary election provided another example. In the race for the Wayne County Executive nomination, there were 10 candidates on the ballot for the Democratic nomination and six for the Republican nomination.

AN OPINION was expressed by one camp that several of the Democratic candidates were persuaded to enter the race. The theory is that the addition of their names would make the ballot confusing and that voters would be apt to vote for the most familiar name. The theory sounds plausible if you look at the ballot. Of the 10 Democrats, only three had even the slightest hope of winning. Six of the candidates conducted what amounted to no campaign at all.

Who, for example, was Buck Rogers, one of the candidates who paid the \$100 filing fee? Others who paid \$100 were Anthony Jaworski, Casimir Senkowski, Arthur Sumeracki and Charles Youngblood. Were they in the race because they thought they were serious candidates, or did they become "name" candidates to draw votes from other candidates?

The idea of putting a host of "names" on a particular ballot is not new. It is almost axiomatic among some political practitioners. If Smith is the favorite, find a candidate or candidates whose name sounds like Smith, pay the filing charges and hope


that the voters will get confused.

If you want to drain Polish votes from a candidate who might get them, find some Polish candidates. If you want to split the black vote, get two or three blacks to become candidates. If you want to drain the Irish vote, round up some Kelleys, O'Haras or O'Neills. Find anyone with a name which sounds like the name of the candidate you want to draw votes from.

WHILE IT may be smart politics, it certainly is a demeaning of the electoral system. It would be far better to require candidates to show that they have some kind of support by securing a certain number of signatures.

Some will argue that the filing fee is more democratic, it affords everyone the opportunity to run for and be elected to public office. Nonsense. Anyone who wishes to be elected to office must prove to the public that he/she is, or appears, worthy of that office. The would-be candidate can begin that process by proving to a small number of voters that he/she is worthy enough to have someone sign a nominating petition on his/her behalf.

Perhaps in some instances the amount of petitions needed is too high. But that is another matter which the legislature should look at as it deliberates how soon it can eliminate \$100 filing-fee candidates.



Compromise is vanishing from politics

COMPROMISE has become a dirty word in Michigan politics. And that attitude is making it more difficult for us to solve our stifling economic problems.

Those who attempt to compromise pay the ultimate political price — defeat at the polls.

Just ask Ed McNamara, William Fitzgerald, Doug Ross or Dana Wilson. All, in one way or another, were penalized by voters last Tuesday for skillfully plying their trade.

Certainly, political pundits will examine and cross examine last week's results and come up with several shades of gray. But the true color of this year's political painting shows that Michigan's political scene is becoming more and more polarized — conservative right vs. entrenched left.

IT'S IDEOLOGICAL warfare at its most traditional.

McNamara has guided Livonia through an incredible period of growth. Recreational facilities have been built, senior citizen housing constructed, transportation developed under his leadership. All was done through compromise.

Fitzgerald, a gubernatorial hopeful, and Wilson, a state Senate candidate, were verbally pilloried by Democratic party ideologues for being pro-business — the ultimate sin within the labor-dominated party.

INSTEAD, LABOR got its way. It demanded that Jim Blanchard and Jack Faxon be nominated, and that's just what happened. So much for the fallacy that the labor unions in this state don't have any political clout left.

Ross suffered the same fate. One of the most adroit Lansing legislators, he quickly learned that effective legislation could be passed if compromise was utilized. He became suspect among the Democratic Party faithful.

Sander Levin, like Blanchard and Faxon, unquestioning "labor supporter at any cost," was hand-picked for the 17th Congressional job. He got it.

The political right is just as fixed in its resolve. No compromise allowed — not even a hint of compromise or you're out.

Just ask Lt. Gov. Jim Brickley, who is soon to be unemployed. Political sages who insisted he had the gubernatorial nomination in the bag missed the point.

BRICKLEY was Bill Milliken's handpicked boy. Milliken is a master at political progress through compromise. The conservative Republican militants were having none of that.

Richard Headlee, messenger of the conservative gospel, is the GOP gubernatorial standard bearer.

Our political system only is effective if we elect those to office who know how to compromise. The last thing Michigan needs is unquestioning, non-thinking, led-by-the-nose political leadership.

How ridiculous to throw such talented persons out on the street. It's a wasteful impulse for which we shall pay for many years to come.

And as she walked into the autumn of her career, she left behind many fond memories of the days when the hospital was little more than a dream.



In a few minutes, The Stroller was on his way up the long driveway to the motherhouse and shortly found himself seated with Sister Columbine and Sister Mary Calasantia, her assistant.

After the usual pleasantries, Sister Columbine took The Stroller by surprise when she said, "We would like to have you serve as chairman of the hospital board."

STUNNED FOR an instant, The Stroller countered, "Sister, someone must have given you a bum steer. I am a Protestant and a Mason, and I intend to die that way. So I don't think you would want me chairman of a Catholic institution."

Both sisters just smiled. Then Sister Columbine added, "We know who you are, and that's why we invited you to meet with us."



She went on to explain that she had studied the situation and felt her biggest problem was to prove to the residents of the area that this hospital would be for everyone.

"Sister, you just got yourself a chairman," said The Stroller, a slight tear running down his cheek. Though stunned, he recognized it as one of the greatest compliments of his life.

IN HIS NEW ROLE, The Stroller was to represent the Felician Sisters occasionally at various meetings. This, too, was a surprise, but it resulted in many fond memories the likes of which seldom come into a person's life.

One such occasion came the day Sister Columbine called and informed him that Henry Ford II would like to see them later in the afternoon. She asked The Stroller to be on hand.

This was quite an experience, but a golden memory. When called upon by the Ford Motor Co. directors, Sister Columbine rose, unfurled the blueprints of the proposed hospital and explained every room, nut and bolt of the project.

When she finished, Ford, with a broad smile, said, "Sister, if I ever need a plant superintendent, I know where to get one."

It was a high compliment, and it brought the desired results in the building of the hospital.

ON ANOTHER occasion, after the hospital was opened, The Stroller was walking through the halls one afternoon when a patient beckoned him. When he entered the room, the patient pointed out the window.

Sister Columbine was walking across the lawn to chat with the man mowing the lawn.

"Does she fix lawnmowers, too?" the patient asked.

This, too, was a compliment, for no one was better equipped to supervise the hospital.

And now that she is going into a sort of semi-retirement as administrative consultant, The Stroller can't resist wishing her well and thanking her for giving him one of the grandest compliments of his life.

TVA turns from flood control to saving energy

The American instinct for independence and self-sufficiency is alive — at least, that is what the Tennessee Valley Authority is banking on.

Nowhere in the 1982 World's Fair at Knoxville, Tenn., is the effort to encourage energy independence more evident than at the TVA pavilion, called The Valley Adventure.

While other exhibits show the need for weaning consumers from their "fueled" diets, TVA gets down to the specifics of how to do it.

THE PAVILION itself is an example of energy frugality.

Two river barges, which normally navigate the valley waterways transporting heavy construction equipment to TVA project sites, have been specially outfitted from TVA inventories for the exhibit.

Moored on the Tennessee River at the south end of the fair site, the barges are cooled naturally by river breezes and ceiling fans. As an added touch, one barge carries a roof-mounted panel of photovoltaic cells. The cells generate electricity directly from sunlight, allowing the exhibit to be partially self-sufficient in electrical usage.

Inside, the displays bear a strong "we can do it" flavor. Appealing graphics and walk-through model reveal the story of a partnership between TVA and the people of the valley region. It is a tale of success in land reclamation, flood control and economic development.

Now, nearly 50 years after its formation, the partnership confronts a new problem — dwindling energy supplies. The answer: Conservation and renewable energy applications are high on the list.

TVA SHOWS some possibilities with a display of homemade and commercial devices, including a solar wall collector, a breadbox water heater, and wood-framed greenhouse.

Many gadgets are simple energy-savers that can be built with off-the-shelf materials and are well within the capabilities of most do-it-yourselfers. Best of all, free construction and installation plans are available.

This strong appeal for energy independence might surprise those who look upon TVA as a big "daddy" dispensing bountiful favors in the form of cheap electric rates to multiple users. The facts, as they relate to energy production, are otherwise.

Most TVA programs — flood control, navigational and recreational development — are financed primarily by congressional appropriations and have been since TVA was created as a federal agency in 1933.

THE ELECTRIC power production program is different. Here, TVA is required to be financially self-supporting.

Because 45 percent of TVA consumers heat their homes with electricity (compared to 16 percent nationally), the utility is concerned about supply and also the need to avoid building expensive new generating plants. In response, TVA has decided to encourage innovation and belt-tightening throughout the system.


More than 100 TVA-designed and constructed solar homes, bearing medium-to-low price tags, will be available to consumers over the next few years. Each house is expected to save from 2,400 to 7,300 kilowatt hours of electricity annually.

Additionally, customers wishing to tap into the sun in their existing homes are encouraged with the help of low- or no-interest loans for solar domestic water heaters and wood-burning stoves.

In the area of conservation, free home energy audits are offered, along with loans for weatherization materials and heat-pump purchases.

TVA IS looking at its own operations, too. Energy audits of all TVA buildings are being conducted, and a total of 67 solar systems has been authorized.

New funds available
for small businesses

New funds will soon be available to small businesses with establishment of the Detroit Metropolitan Small Business Investment Corp. (SBIC).

Small firms in Wayne, Oakland, Macomb, Monroe and St. Clair counties may be eligible.

SBIC is a privately owned and operated investment company which has been licensed by the Small Business Administration to provide equity capital or long-term loans to small firms. It also provides management assistance to the companies it finances.

The average investment in any one company is anticipated by Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce officials to be under \$50,000 with a maximum investment per company of \$100,000.

Details are available by calling John Steiner or Ruby Jones at the chamber office at 964-4000.

AS SBIC funds are loaned out or invested, it can borrow additional funds from government or government-guaranteed sources equal to four times its paid-in capital, which means a possible total of \$2.5 million of new investment funds for area small businesses.

Interest will be charged on loans or profits will flow back to the SBIC to be put back into the investment cycle.

Presently the SBIC doesn't plan to invest in new companies, but in established businesses which need to become more profitable.



Bruce came from Edenton, N.C., and Jeffrey from Green Bay, Wisc., to serve as groomsmen at their brother's wedding. Brother-in-law Tom performed the marriage ceremony.

On Sunday, he christened Justin Henry, son of Bruce and Kimberly Johnson. The first grandchild in the clan was born June 17 in Edenton.

Nancy's cohorts at the Paper Parade let her have a few days off to recuperate. After all, the fourth wedding in the family and the baptism of the first grandchild isn't an everyday occurrence.

NEWS OF ALVIN and Bit Folger comes by a rather circuitous route.

Joan Wehmeyer, whose husband Mark is a Plymouth city commissioner, dropped off a clipping from the business section of a Tennessee newspaper. Joan had gotten the clipping from Elise Murphy who now lives near San Antonio. She and her husband, Jack, longtime Plymouth residents, moved to their Texas retirement home last fall.

So, by way of Texas comes word of the Folgers, former residents, who now live in Smyrna, Tenn.

Elizabeth (Bit) Folger chaired the Area Bicentennial Committee for Plymouth and Canton back in 1976. Because she is an American history buff, it is not surprising to learn that Bit is a volunteer research associate at the Hermitage.

The article in The Tennessean gives an update on the Folger family. Their daughter is studying special education at Vanderbilt's Peabody College for teachers; a son, who graduated from Yale is a staff scientist for the Solar Energy Research Institute; and a son who graduated from Harvard, works with American Airlines in Dallas. They also have a 2-year-old grandson.

AFTER 33 YEARS with Ford Motor Co., Alvin Folger joined Nissan Motor Manufacturing Corp. U.S.A. as vice president of engineering for the proposed plant in Tennessee. It was his job to coordinate the building of the most complex and most automated motor vehicle manufacturing plant in the world. It represents an investment of \$500 million.

Ground was broken in February 1981, and the first truck is expected to roll off the assembly line in August 1983. The line will feature robots and other state-of-the-art equipment.

As director of plant engineering for Ford, Alvin had started new plants in Argentina, Mexico, Canada and several U.S. cities. Questions directed at him during the "Executive Spotlight" interview in The Tennessean had to do with the problem and progress of the Smyrna plant.

Beginning the Nissan plant was a new experience. When he built a new Ford plant, he started out with a trained group of experts. In Smyrna, he started from scratch. In spite of daily crises, the plant is right on schedule. Alvin put in many 14-hour days to accomplish this. He also recruited some of his former Ford associates to work on the project.

One of them, Albert Heindryckx, will return to Plymouth with his wife, Annette, when the plant is completed. It would be nice to have have the Folgers back, too.

Young suburban farmers go to the fair

The 4-H clubbers are home from the fair with a whole new assortment of trophies and rosettes.

They had baked, preserved, stitched and crafted for the annual Wayne County Fair at Belleville. Although the majority of the local 4-H Club members do not live on farms, they raised lambs, calves, rabbits, bees, goats, geese, ducks and chickens.

Some shed tears when their "pets" became livestock as they were auctioned off at the end of the show. And the parents who took the time to calculate the cost of feeding the stock were ready to shed a few tears for the farmers who depend on raising sheep and poultry for their livelihood.

Lafrenda Fitzgerald of Penniman Avenue in Plymouth has been leader of the Town and Country 4-H group for several years. She says that experience does not lessen the grief of the auction block for some youngsters. Year after year, they will be red-eyed after the sale of a calf they have raised. Two years ago, one of her children raised a goat for the fair. When it turned out to

be a "meat" goat, she rescued it from the auction when the situation became emotional. It was later sold for a pet, which made everyone happy.

Todd Ehrhart of Canton, whose children are now 4-Hers, still remembers his feelings when his first steer was auctioned at the fair.

SHANNON Fitzgerald, 15, and her brother Scott, 13, did not become emotionally involved with their lambs. The Tonquish Creek Garden branch of the Woman's National Farm and Garden Association sponsored their sheep-raising project. The club bought the two Suffolk lambs for the Fitzgeralds.

Born in January, the lambs weighed 40 pounds each when they got them at the end of April. Shannon and Scott were responsible for feeding and watering the lambs. They exercised them to generate meat and muscle. They also were responsible for trying to keep them from eating all the flowers and trees in their yard.

The lambs are weighed when the club members first get them. Two or

three weeks before the fair, there is a step-up in activity. The sheep are taken to the Wayne County Extension center to be sheared. Training begins — teaching the sheep to walk quietly beside them and how to place their feet when they stand.

Before the show, they are given a bath with Woolite, their coat is trimmed, and their hooves polished with black shoe polish.

"**SHEEP ARE NOT** very smart," was Shannon's comment. "We didn't name them, but we called them a lot of names."

Her mother said that somehow, when they get to the fair, the sheep behave better than expected. "There is a transformation. It may be the new surroundings."

By showtime, one lamb weighed 124 pounds and the other 107 pounds. They sold for \$91, which is more than open market price. However, the 4-H club members are guaranteed at least \$1 per pound.

From this total sale price, the members repay their sponsors — \$80 per lamb. Subtract the more than \$50 for

corn, grain and feed, and it is not a profitable enterprise, financially. But it has been a learning experience.

4-H Club winners

Members of local 4-H clubs were winners at the fair in Belleville.

The Wayne County Shepherds winners were:

• Elizabeth Campbell — grand champion pen of lambs, reserve grand champion market lamb, senior showmanship, first market lamb, first lemon pie, first buckeye chocolate candy, first jam, first prose writing, first original weaving, first freezing fruit.

• Douglas Campbell — First pen of lambs, first market lamb, first ewe lamb, first sculpture, first clay slab, first weaving, first vegetables, first vegetables, first jam.

• Jill Kirchgatter — first vegetables, first specimen vegetables, first Christmas ornament, first sour cream coffee cake. Reserve grand champion ewe lamb, first market lamb, and first market pen of lambs.







What's your problem?
Counseling not a 1-way street

Quite frequently, Plymouth Family Service counselors receive calls from referral sources - doctors, lawyers, clergymen, school principals and others to whom someone in trouble has turned.

The referral usually is made because a situation has reached the point where the source feels that help from a mental health professional is indicated.

For instance, a youngster is getting into progressively more trouble. The next step might well be a brush with the police or the juvenile court. The school realizes that there is something seriously wrong with the youngster's home life, and urges the parents to call Family Service for an appointment even though the parents are reluctant to do so.

Or a physician realizes that his patient's constant exhaustion and headaches have no physical basis. However, she has said that she is not getting along with her husband, and her marriage is thoroughly miserable. So the doctor tells her about Family Service and then calls the agency to let the counselor know that one of his patients will be making an appointment.

MOST OFTEN, these referrals work out well. The problems have become so painful and difficult that the people involved are prepared to take the difficult step of asking for outside help. They have come to understand that asking for help is not a sign of weakness but of strength.

However, there are times when the parents of the youngster will not come in, or will come once and then not come again.

There are couples who seem to fight interminably, but who can't bring themselves to do anything, including asking for professional help.

The referral source, or the couple's friends or relatives, just cannot understand why anyone should be willing to tolerate what to them seems like a completely intolerable situation indefinitely.

"These people are obviously miserable, so why don't they do something?" they may ask.

There may be several reasons why people who clearly seem to need help cannot accept it. One of those reasons may be that they are perhaps not as miserable as they might appear to the outsider.

There are couples who have been fighting for years, and who would miss their established patterns if peace suddenly broke out. And then there are others who underneath it all, realize that "doing something" about a problem means that they themselves must change.

OFTEN THEY find the prospect of change itself is more uncomfortable than their present problems. So when they see that a family counselor will not make their marriage partner or their recalcitrant child be or act differently, they don't come back for more counseling.

Sometimes, when the situation has really gotten out of hand sufficiently to be threatening, they come back and try to find ways of solving the problem.

Counseling is not a one-way street. The counseling process requires a basic desire to change an unhappy situation by finding new ways of solving it, and making difficult changes in one's way of handling problems and relating to people.

Often it's a fear of this kind of change that keeps people from doing something about their troubles.

Intern brings feminine dimension to Faith

In a world where leadership roles have been assumed by men for the past 1,900 years, Cherylne Purdy is making her mark.

Purdy, articulate, soft-spoken and quick to laugh, was installed Sunday as intern on the ministerial staff of Livonia's Faith Lutheran Church. Her appointment is for a full year, and she will be ministering, teaching and working toward a master of divinity degree.

Eventually, she hopes to be called to a ministry in a Lutheran church, and that would lead to ordination.

But she realizes her sex could get in the way.

"Women have always been teachers, deaconesses," she said, "but as for leadership roles, it's still a new concept and people are still struggling with whether women belong in the role of pastor and whether scripture allows it."

AT 35, PURDY has gone through plenty of soul-searching and has decided the ministry, even though discouraging for women, is what she wants.

"I've struggled with the reasons behind why I am in the ministry and why women should become involved," she said, punctuating her conversation with gestures and frequent smiles.

"I believe women have sharing, loving gifts, and that we can bring other dimensions into the ministry, and that we can minister together, both male and female."

"It also struck me there can be models of male and females working together. And working together, we can do a lot better job."

As intern, Purdy will divide her time between getting a new preschool program off the ground and presiding at church services. A master's degree in early childhood education and a bachelor of science in education, Purdy feels, helped her in being asked to come to Faith Lutheran.

"The fact that they called me in (as intern) makes me feel very good about being here," she said.

BEING ELECTED an elder by a Lutheran congregation three years ago was one factor behind her decision to become a minister, she said. But her career choice was inspired by several events.

"My dad is a pastor and I am the oldest of seven, so I was able to learn a lot from him," she said. She added that while teaching at Greenfield Peace Lutheran School in Detroit, she was offered a teaching position with Head Start, but turned it down.

"That helped me to sort through and

forced me to consider what I wanted to do with my life," Purdy said. "It helped me make the decision about staying in the church and wanting to have women have a voice in the Lutheran church."

She began classes at Christ Seminary — Seminix in St. Louis, Mo., the summer of 1980. She expects to complete a four-year program in three.

Her husband, Ron, teaches at Detroit Urban Lutheran School. She is receiving an educational stipend for her work at Faith, but she also is paying to work there since her internship is a course for credit.

THE INVITATION extended by the Livonia church came after its senior pastor, the Rev. Roger Schleef, was called by a New York church in January.

The Rev. Martin A. Seltz, who shares administration of Faith Church with the Rev. Paul E. Jaster, noted that the congregation is entering its 30th year and "we decided to undertake a rather extensive self-study into what we need for our lives — where the congregation stands, where its going."

"We're in kind of a transition phase," Seltz said. "Cherylne's being here is a way of helping us through our transition."

Seltz said he feels it is "a bonus to us" that Cherylne is a woman seeking a ministry.

"We feel this situation is very helpful to us to learn about the role of women in the ministry," he went on. "We're looking forward to the chance to learn about the gifts a woman brings to the ministry."

Gaining an intern helped to fill a void that losing a pastor created within the structure of the ministering organization at Faith Lutheran. As Seltz puts it:

"I feel very much we still have that team approach with ministry here, as well as Cherylne being in the teaching role."

SELTZ NOTED the Faith congrega-

tion is well aware its new intern represents a minority.

"Out of 400 pastors in the English Synod, of which we are a part, only five or six are women," he said.

Although the English Synod allows women as pastors, the synod used to be a part of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, which never ordained women as pastors, Seltz explained.

"We've only been in existence for five years as a separate body. But our people are still coming from the Missouri Synod history."

Despite the beliefs of the two synods being opposites, Seltz says Faith Lutheran's congregation has been receptive and open-minded.

"It's just amazing that we've heard only positive things like, 'I'm not used to it, but I'm really excited to see a woman is here,'" he said. "It's exciting to hear and it's very supportive to get this."

THE FAITH STAFF considers "it's very appropriate for a woman to be in ministry," Seltz said. The only obstacles he sees are "theological and historical."

"The situation is that for 1900 years women have not been allowed in ministering," said Seltz. Because of this long history of an all-male clergy, it's going to be a difficult adjustment for many.

Purdy has known already the sting of non-acceptance.

"At times, rejection is painful," she said. "But I believe God has given us all gifts, and when people have come to me and told me I am sinning, I have to remember when Jesus came to us on earth and had theological discussions with women, and I think about those gifts we all have."

"I consider that I have been in the ministry all these years, and I consider what's happening now just enlarges my ministry."

A native Detroit and mother of two, Purdy will keep taking classes at St. John Seminary in Plymouth and

correspondence courses from Seminex while she serves her internship.

Courses scheduled this fall are Prophets and Pauline Letters (the epistles of Paul) and Kerygma ("learning to speak to the public about everything we've learned.")

Purdy says her hope for the future would be to do that which she feels she has been called to do.

"The best use of the gifts I have been given would be to get a call where I could teach and work as an associate minister," she said.



Death penalty question asks why we punish

When Frank J. Coppola went to the electric chair in Richmond, Va., on Aug. 10, the proponents of the death penalty cheered their cause.

Opponents were saddened and enraged.

Neither reaction was surprising, considering that there are few issues which elicit the pitch of emotion that goes into the question of whether the death penalty should be used as a means of punishing major crimes.


The issue is far more than academic, in that come November we will decide at the polls whether capital punishment should be used in the state of Michigan.

The question is not an easy one, since those of us who decide the issue are not in an easy place. We are tired of crime and often rightly fear for the safety of ourselves and our loved ones. Fear is never an easy place to be in and it almost always clouds whatever objectivity we might bring to an issue.

If we are to see beyond that fear and dare to approach this charged question from a moral perspective, there are certain questions that need to be addressed.

AT A MOST basic level is the question of why we punish at all.

In principle, we hold that punishment is meant to

reform the offender. In practice, we often bring different motivation to our punishment practices. The death penalty may stop the executed criminal from repeating his crime, but it can hardly be said to reform.

It may be argued that if the punishment is harsh enough it will serve to deter others from committing the same crime.

This also may true in principle, but practice is again another matter. The evidence simply does not support the contention that threat of a death penalty serves to diminish serious crime.

It is true that a certain order has been maintained in places that have resorted to the death penalty. But it is also true that some states in the nation have experienced more serious crime at those

times when capital punishment was in force that when it was not.

Delaware is one such case in point. That state abolished the death penalty in 1958 and restored it in 1961. Studies show that the percentage of people convicted of murder has been higher when capital punishment was in than when it was out.

THE CONTENTION that the death penalty will bring about a drop in violent crime such as murder also ignores the psychic make-up of the would-be killer.

For one thing, most murders are shown to be crimes of passion which do not allow the murderer either the time or the objectivity to assess before the fact the possible consequences of his actions. Rage is hardly open to reason.

Another reality that cannot be ignored is that people with more money can afford better lawyers, leaving us with a situation in which the life or death of the convicted person may well depend upon the financial status of the accused. Such a situation runs in the face of the warning given by the U.S. Supreme Court when it opened the door for states to reinstitute the death penalty. It admonished that such punishment be administered with an even hand.



Judy Collins tries to provide a show both energetic, mellow

Peppy singer-songwriter Steve Goodman was slated to open the show for Judy Collins on Friday night at Meadow Brook Music Festival on the Oakland University campus near Rochester.

It would have been an enjoyable and complementary combination. Goodman is an energetic performer, while Collins is usually more mellow and laidback. But due to hospitalization for a serious illness, Goodman was unable to appear.

Collins apparently believed the audience was entitled to two different types of performers and attempted to fill the bill by herself.

She made the two parts of her show different in both style and mood. Dur-

ing the first half of the concert, she looked uncomfortable pacing about the stage belting out songs that did not require such energetic treatment.

SHE PROBABLY would have been more at ease sitting upon a stool, but she seemed determined to convey this sense of energy.

Collins opened the show with "City of New Orleans," Goodman's big hit.

No longer sporting peasant clothing, Collins was dressed in a glamorous full-length white gown.

She proved herself to be a song stylist at Baldwin Pavilion, not only inter-

preting other artists' songs but her own as well.

Her rendition of "Both Sides Now," though enjoyable, was nothing like the recording that brought her fame in the '60s. While the lyrics were the same, her freeform interpretation of the melody contrasted with the simplicity of the recorded version.

Collins' powerful voice seemed strained at times, but that did not stop her from giving her all to every song.

She is currently on the road to promote her latest album, "Times of Our Lives." She sang several tunes from the album, including the infectious "It's Gonna Be One of Those Nights," which is already receiving airplay.

In addition to her own songs, Collins performed a strong rendition of "The Rose," then sang an amusing lament about being a "Junk Food Junkie."

SHE DELIGHTED in singing about Ding Dongs, Pringle's, Twinkies and other junk foods, especially since just moments earlier she had consumed something not so pleasant.

"I just had the singer's nightmare," she told the crowd. "Swallowing a bug at a summer concert. Yuck!"

She concluded the first half of the show with "Send in the Clowns," her big hit from the '70s.

Collins was dressed in an elegant black gown for the second half of the concert. She was more reserved as she played the piano while singing a string of beautiful tunes.

"This is where my mother prefers to see me," Collins told the audience, and it seemed that it was her preference too. She seemed more relaxed during this half of the show as she poured herself into her music.

Among her repertoire was "My Father," a moving song she wrote for her father.

IN ADDITION, Collins sang a beautiful rendition of "Memory" from the London musical "Cats." The variety of ranges that this song offers was the perfect showcase for Collins' own amazing vocal range.

She concluded the show with a powerful version "Over the Rainbow," which she dedicated to Steve Goodman.

Both films offer strong indictments of the oxymoronic notion of military justice, yet "Glory" must be considered the superior film simply because of when it was made. Those happy days of the Eisenhower years rarely were blemished by a pacifist, anti-war, anti-class film such as Kubrick's. "Around the world in 80 Days" or "The King and I" were more than standard. The post-Watergate '70s, however, are dotted with such revisionist views of world history and cinema history and cinema history. Aussie imports "Morant" and "Galipoli" took long-overdue looks at war,

As in the original, "Airport '77" is chock-full of characters designed to represent a cross section of the American filmgoing public but here the emphasis seems to be on the oldtimers. James Stewart, Olivia de Havilland and Joseph Cotten star, alongside the aging Jack Lemmon and Lee Grant. Rating: \$1.50.

"Destination Tokyo" (1943), in two parts at 1 p.m. Tuesday and

Pinot Noir isn't industry problem

It has been some three and a half years since this column addressed itself wholly to the topic of California Pinot Noir. At that time it was generally considered to be the wine problem-child of the industry.

No more.

While there has been no overnight transformation during any portion of this interval, it is becoming increasingly apparent that more and more winemakers are making better Pinot Noirs than in the past. Perhaps more important, fewer of them are making bad ones. Not so long ago it was almost too certain that the average Pinot Noir would not be at all satisfactory. Gradually, the scales are shifting.

Generally the winemakers seem to be learning how to handle this most difficult grape. (It should be noted that it is equally hard to handle in Burgundy and that the result is a great many inferior Burgundies are issued each year regardless of the almost classic mystique of this area.)

GOOD TO GREAT growing regions are being found in various microclimates throughout the states. There seems to be no one large area that is especially good and even today many of the state's 10,000 acres are misplaced.

The three exceptions to this are beginning to be acknowledged: the Carneros region of southern Napa-Sonoma, the Santa Cruz Mountains and the Edna Valley of Southern San Luis Obispo.

Many of the fine Pinot Noirs of today come from these three regions.

These areas are small. Broad, country appellations are not dependable. There is no large region where Pinot Noirs are totally dependable, unlike Napa with its Cabernet Sauvignon, Sonoma with its Zinfandel and Livermore with its Sauvignon Blanc.

Following are excellent Pinot Noirs of recent issue that should be readily available on local shelves. These judgments are made in part on the basis of personal tasting as well as reviews in the literature.

Acacia Winery: New in the state are three 1979 issues, all expensive and all worth the cost. A Carneros area feature.

Calera Wine Co.: Again, three distinct issues and costing even more than Acacia, but many consider its efforts the best.

Carneros Creek Winery: Its 1977 was one of the two best I've ever tasted. Worth checking out with more recent issues.

Chalone Vineyard: Always one of the best, perhaps the most Burgundian in

style of any of them.

Cecil DeLoach Vineyards: New in the state, good wine at a fair price.

Hacienda Wine Cellars: Each year they seem to get better.

Iron Horse Vineyards: Also new; lots of promise from cool, cool western Sonoma. Good value.

Kenwood Vineyards "Jack London."

the 1977 was great, the 1978 less so. Kenwood is a very classy red wine producer in general.

Navarro Winery: From northwestern Mendocino, a fine winery with a fine product. Good value.

Parducci Wine Cellars "Cellarmasters": dependable and elegant.

St. Francis Vineyards: New to our state, it is also new to the industry. Quickly gaining a reputation for Pinot Noir and Merlot.

Santa Cruz Mountain Vineyard: The 1977 was deeply memorable. We will soon have (summer or fall) a subsequent issue that will certainly be good. Ken Burnap does not make less than fine wine, ever.

Villa Mt. Eden: '76-'78 were all excellent issues. Good value. (Avoid the 1979 when released, however.)

• PLANNING THE BACK GAME

Back games have always had a fascination for me — not just because the difference between winning and being gammoned may be reduced to a single roll of the dice, but because these positions induce me to ask myself what I am trying to do.

In the diagrammed position, white rolls 6-3. Before reaching for his man on the black 12 point, white should determine his objectives, starting with the most basic: Am I trying to win or should I play to avoid being gammoned? In this situation, the inclination to go for the win would be justified since there is no line of play to substantially reduce the chances of being gammoned.

White has available to him three primary options — to hit black off his 10 point and make his 4 point; to make his 4 point without hitting; or to try to recycle some of his men by hitting with the three and playing his six from the 8 point to the 2 point.

The first choice seems the least likely of success, since white would have to escape four men from behind a five-point prime while containing a single opponent with a four-point board. This line of play leaves open the grisly scenario of black entering white's board in time to either escape or make his own 3 point as soon as it is abandoned.


White's other alternatives involve playing a back game — maintaining a back position in black's home table until black is forced to leave a man open, to hit and then to build a prime in front of the man who was hit. It is important that white keep the two points in black's home table, as he then will have two men aiming for the shot when it comes and hence be a small favorite to hit. It is absolutely necessary that white maintain his ability to build in front of the man to be hit. If white has to wait so long for the shot that in the meantime he has broken his own 6 and 5 points, then even hitting is unlikely to result in a win. Timing, that all-important element in back games, means simply that your men are so placed that even though you have to wait for the

shot, you are still in a position to build a blockade in front of the man you will hit. Some of the indications of poor timing are having men on the 2 and 3 point while you have a higher-numbered point yet to make, and having men on your 1 point.

So white's problem in playing 6-3 is how to make the most of a poorly timed back game. By hitting and leaving four loose men (the third option), white would be hoping to be hit back and then either not come in for a couple rolls or come in with a three and then jump into black's outer table with a six. Though not very likely, this line would probably be best. We could be guaranteed that black would hit the man on our 2 point or even better, come in with double twos, hitting on both the 2 and 4 points. However, if black fails to hit on the 2 point, or worse yet fails to enter at all, white's chances border between slim and none. So before committing himself to such drastic action, white should try to envision what is likely to happen in the next few rolls if he just makes his 4 point without hitting.

Since the average roll in backgammon will advance you approximately eight spaces, it is likely that black will be able to maintain his position for three rolls without leaving a shot. It is possible that white will be able to survive for two more rolls. Therefore, although white seems to be one roll ahead of himself, any combination of large numbers for black and small numbers for white over the next couple rolls might well prove sufficient for white to get a "winning" double shot. Oddly, just making the 4 point without hitting gives white his best chance to avoid getting gammoned because by the time white is forced to abandon one of his points in black's home table, black will have brought in some of his extra builders from the 7 and 8 points and probably even "killed" two or three men on his own 1 point.

Though white's timing would be much better if he had an extra man back, it is too late in the game to attempt to correct the timing by being hit and recycling forward men into the opponent's home table. A far-sighted



player with the white pieces might have foreseen the prospects of this position arising at an earlier stage when recycling would have been more appropriate.

In this situation, the compromise play of making the 4 point without hitting offers white his best chances of winning the game while minimizing his chances of getting gammoned.

Marathon baseball tourneys won in Ace fashion

THAT SET UP Sunday's marathon. The first game started at 8 a.m. and it was 10:30 p.m. before the last inning of the last game was played.
Franklin Village was Ace's first victim by a 20-6 score. Goleniak went five-for-five, Balog and McCarthy each had two-run homers and a single and

Cashero collected a triple and two singles to knock in four runs.
Ace met Monroe a half-hour later and came away with a 12-3 win, behind three-run blasts by Browne and McCarthy and a great defensive play in the outfield by Mark Hobbs.
Plymouth Dairy King fared no better than Monroe, falling by an identical 12-3 margin. Browne's four hits, one a two-run homer, and Tim Dowd's two

singles paced the winners.
GOLENIAK KEPT Ace alive in the next contest, breaking a 9-9 tie in the bottom of the sixth with a one-out double that scored Dowd, who had doubled before him, with the winning run. Dowd had four hits in the game, Mike Howard had two hits, and Browne, McCarthy and Preskin each belted homers.

Westland wins Series

A baseball team known as Wayne-Ford Civic League put Westland on the map Saturday by winning the National Amateur Baseball Federation (NABF) Junior World Series at Canton High School.

Coach Jerry Pitcher's squad outlasted host Canton and four other teams from across the country to win the double-elimination event for 15- and 16-year-olds.

Wayne-Ford clipped four straight opponents en route to the crown, culminating in a crushing 12-1 victory over the Liberty Road Runners of Baltimore, Md., in the finals.

"Everything fell into place," said Pitcher. "I knew we had the talent during the season. It just came together in the tournament."

Wayne-Ford posted only a 13-7 record in the Little Caesars Amateur Baseball Federation but came alive once the tournament action began.

LED BY CATCHER Carlo Bonifero, the tournament's MVP, Wayne-Ford jumped out to a big lead and never looked back in its win over Baltimore.

Bonifero's two-run double ignited a four-run first inning as Wayne-Ford won comfortably, allowing Pitcher to substitute freely at the end of the game.

Ken Farmer, Keith Riling, Bonifero, John Chmielewski and John Dillon each had two hits in the rout.

Mike Krauss, acquired by Westland from Garden City for the tournament, was the winning pitcher. Dan Gabriele of Union Lake finished to gain the save.

Dillon earned the win as Westland opened play with a 4-3 triumph over the Bayside (N.Y.) Yankees.

Canton, which entered the tournament with a sparkling 17-3 mark, also won its first-round test, edging Valley Sports of Louisville, Ky., 2-1.

Both teams then advanced in the second round as Chris Semik hurled Wayne-Ford to a 9-2 win. Canton, meanwhile, sent Bayside home, 7-2.

THAT SET UP a showdown between the Canton Elks and Wayne-Ford. In the only meeting between the two teams during the regular season, Civic won, 6-4.
Canton jumped out to a 5-0 lead in

the first inning as Tim Michalik doubled in two runs with Bob Wasczenski and Tim Collins also adding RBI doubles.

Westland rallied for four runs in the third and then exploded for five runs in the fifth as Canton's mound corps went to pieces.

Bob Foust's double tied the game at 5. Don Wolfe, Farmer and Chmielewski added RBI singles during the outburst.

The Elks got two runs back in the sixth on a Michalik's double, scoring


Mark Bennett and Johnny Longridge.

Young GM fights 'old problem'

Here's a good question for the mentally-quick Metropolitan-area sports fanatic:

Who's the youngest general manager on the Detroit professional sports scene?

Nope, it's not Jimmy Devellano, the new headmaster of the Detroit Red Wings. It's certainly not the Tigers' shrewd Jim Campbell, the Lions' tight-fisted Russ Thomas nor the spunky Jack McCloskey of the Pistons.

It's none other than Robert Brown. That's B-R-O-W-N, just like the Crayola color.

Brown is 27 years old. He is directly responsible for operations of the Detroit Softball City organization — the Motor City's entry in the United Professional Softball League.

While Devellano, Campbell, et al are primarily concerned about salaries and finances, Brown's job is a little different. His arduous task is to promote professional softball — an old problem for a young GM.

On the surface that would seem like a rather simple job, especially in a city like Detroit where slow-pitch games appear to be more common than unemployed auto workers.

But, Softball City, a team sponsored by the owners of the 16-diamond softball complex near the State Fairgrounds, has averaged just under 2,000 fans per game. The best game for attendance was against Kentucky June 26 when 3400 customers turned out.

BROWN IS NOT complaining, but he's not quite satisfied with those figures.

Why is such a popular participant sport hurting for fans?

A check of the history of pro softball in Detroit reveals some interesting sidelights.

First, three different teams have

represented the city since professional softball was initiated in 1976.

The Detroit Caesars — by far the most successful and most popular — was started by pizza magnate Mike Ilitch, the new owner of the Detroit Red Wings hockey club.

The Caesars, led by such identifiable stars as Mike Nye, Ronnie Ford and Tex Collins, won two straight world championships in the late American Professional Slo-pitch Softball League. Some insiders claim the Caesars were so dominant that the league was forced to fold because of a lack of competition.

The Caesars then begot the Detroit Auto Kings of the North American Softball League. Both the Caesars and Auto Kings played their home games at East Detroit's Memorial Field.

The Auto Kings, without Nye and Ford, weren't as successful as the Caesars and folded after the 1980 season.

ALTHOUGH THERE was a professional league last year, Detroit was not represented. This year, the Softball City team was launched.

Thus, there were three professional softball teams in six years. It's hard to follow such constant franchise turn-overs enthusiastically.

Other theories surrounding the apparent apathy towards professional slow-pitch are the absence of charismatic players like Nye and Ford; the move to Softball City from East Detroit; bad scheduling; minor-league type atmosphere; and potential customers who would rather play than watch.

Brown, who formerly held jobs as publicity director for the Caesars, commissioner of the NASL and executive director of the top amateur league in the country, has his own reasons for the sparse attendance this year at Softball City's home games.

"Mike Ilitch is a well-known guy... a first-class operator in whatever he does," said Brown, a former student manager for University of Michigan football coach Bo Schembechler. "He provided the best team pro softball has ever had."

"He had the rapport with the league and the players right away. He did an outstanding job, and everything you do afterwards will suffer by comparison."

"I still think the interest in pro softball is there. I'm not exceptionally happy with attendance. But, we're trying to sell (softball) for a third time."

"We've really been hurt by a poor schedule. We've played the least amount of home games of anyone in the league. Our home games have been spaced out... we're here for one weekend, then gone for a couple weekends. It's difficult to maintain continuity with a schedule like that."

Michigan Mile tension mounts

It seems to be a never-ending battle — youthful talent vs. the experienced master.

That rivalry will be the highlight of the \$150,000-plus Michigan Mile Saturday at Detroit Race Course in Livonia.

The state's premier thoroughbred racing event of the year pits the legendary Bill Shoemaker against young phenom Jack Kaenal.

Shoemaker's accomplishments are awesome. Since 1949, Shoemaker, who is 51 today, has ridden more than 8,165 winners. The veteran jockey has been in the saddle for such horses as Spec-

tacular Bid, Forego, Damascus and Round Table.

His victory total includes three wins in the Kentucky Derby, two in the Preakness and five at the Belmont Stakes.

BUT SHOEMAKER has gone against Kaenal just twice and failed to beat him either time. Kaenal sprung into prominence by riding Aloma's Ruler to victory in the Preakness last May. Kaenal was only 16 at the time and one of the rider's he bested was Shoemaker, who was aboard the favored Linkage.

The two met again at a race in the east two weeks later and again Kaenal's horse topped Shoemaker's.

On Saturday, Kaenal will be riding Lejoli, which he rode to a second-place finish in the Jim Dandy Stakes at Saratoga last week. The only horse to beat Lejoli was Conquistador Cielo, which was syndicated for a world-record \$36.4 million for future breeding.

JUST WHAT MOUNT Shoemaker will be aboard will be determined during the official drawing of entries today. Shoemaker will also handle three

other assignments during the day.

Kaenal, now 17, has never ridden in the Michigan Mile before. This will be Shoemaker's second trip to DRC; 14 years ago, he rode the favored Damascus to a second-place finish. This will also be Shoemaker's last racing trip to Detroit.

Besides Lejoli, other big-name horses may be on hand at the race, including Gato Del Sol, winner of last year's Kentucky Derby, and Bal Bay, an entry trained by Detroit's Gary Goldberg.

Post time for the showcase race is approximately 5 p.m.

Skaters sparkle at Sports Fest

Kristan Lowery and Chip Rossbach sat in the stands Monday afternoon at the Detroit Skating Club in Bloomfield Hills.

Kristan, wearing a colorful, two-tone dress, and Chip, dressed in more casual attire, reminisced as they watched a group of youngsters skate through various skill tests.

"We had to go through the same tests a few years ago," said Rossbach. "I know how they feel right now."

Lowery, 17, and Rossbach, 19, finished fourth in the Senior Dance Division at the recent National Sports Festival in Indianapolis. That's quite an accomplishment for a team classified in the junior division.

"We weren't even expecting to be invited (to the sports festival), so it was quite a thrill for us just to be there," said Lowery, who lives in Bloomfield Hills. "It was a big step for us as a team."

"Even if we placed last it wouldn't

have been any big thing. Just for us to be there was an experience," she said. "And for the USFSA (United States Figure Skating Association) to invite us was nice. It was like we were worthy of being an Olympic-caliber team."

LOWERY AND Rossbach normally perform three-minute programs in junior competitions, but at the National Sports Festival their program had to be one minute longer.

"That's the first time we ever had a four-minute performance," said Rossbach. "It was the best performance we ever skated. Everything just went really well for us. It was such a high for us."

Lowery, whose parents are both teaching professionals at the Detroit Skating Club, and Rossbach have been partners for just 14 months. As a team, they already have accomplished more than they did in their entire previous careers.

Last season, Lowery and Rossbach finished third at the National Junior Finals also held at Indianapolis. Partic-

ipating at the National Sports Festival last month was the highlight of their young career.

"We knew each other as friends before we got together as a team," said Lowery. "And our parents are pros. Skating is kind of gossip, and my parents found out that Chip was breaking up with his partner. So we got together as soon as we could."

"We get along pretty good. We constantly see each other . . . and we do everything together. We sit down and listen to music for hours. We skate together, and sometimes we even shop together."

ROSSBACH, who is from Cleveland Heights but now spends most of his time with the Lowery family, agreed with his partner.

"If you don't get along with your partner, you're not going to skate well," he said. "You can only fake it to a certain point."

Ice dancing is a little different than pairs or individual skating.

Skaters are free to do most anything

in individual skating, and, in pairs, the couples are allowed to throw each other and skate apart as often as they like.

In dance, the partners only can leave each other's hands to change direction. "In dance, you have to express the music — it's like ballroom on ice," said Lowery. "We're never allowed to let go of each other for extended periods of time. We express the music better (than most teams), and I think it's because we have a good chemistry."

Lowery admits their main goal is to participate in the Olympics.

"We worked and worked when we found out at the end of March that we were going to the sports festival," she said. "It (the sports festival) was a good chance for all the athletes to get together in an Olympic surrounding."

"Our long-term goal," said Rossbach, a former hockey player, "is to be in the Olympics in 1988. Most of the top dancers in the Olympics are in their mid-20s, and that's how old we'd be about that time. It just seems like dancers have a longer life."

THAT IS WHY tournaments are so popular. Every summer, players of all ages compete in tournaments around southeastern Michigan. There are enough tournaments for a player to enter once a week throughout the summer. These tournaments range from novice to college-level players.

When playing in a tournament, a person must be ready mentally as well as

physically. I've seen many good players fall apart mentally to a less formidable opponent.

To be ready mentally, you have to keep a positive mental attitude. Never think that your shots may go out. Get a mental picture of all your shots going in deep and down the middle.

Never get visibly upset on the court. By swearing and throwing your racket, you will not only defeat yourself mentally, but you will be giving your opponent the added advantage of seeing you fall apart.

IT'S NATURAL to be a little nervous before a match. Some people have trouble sleeping the night before a big

match. This usually comes from a lack of confidence. The more a person plays in tournaments, the less nervous he is before each match.

Many people get "psyched out" before a match. When a person believes, for one reason or another, he is going to lose, he does.

It might be because his opponent has two rackets and "looks" more like a tournament player. After looking at those two rackets the opposing player is carting around, he says to himself, "Gee, this guy must be a better player than I am." He beats himself before walking onto the court.

BEFORE ENTERING a match, make sure to watch for your opponent's weaknesses. Too many players worry about grooming their own strokes instead of looking at their opponent's strokes for weaknesses.

A player should warm up for about a half-hour before playing in a match. Usually, tournaments allow only a 10-minute warm-up.

"And, I think there was a nucleus of fans in East Detroit, but I found out the west side was unhappy (about traveling across town to the east side). Softball City is a more central location for everyone."

"THE PEOPLE at Softball City have been very cooperative. But, because the field isn't set apart (from the others), you lose a little atmosphere. When you have other games going on around you, it seems to take away a little bit."

Brown thinks the answer may be a separate softball stadium.

"The key to pro softball is having your own facility. That's the only way you'll be able to generate enough revenue," said Brown. "It's (the stadium) got to be better than your own recreational facility."

"You have to have the image that you're a cut above regular softball," he said. "People still regard it as a recreational sport; that's why you have to have something different. A facility is most important."

At any rate, the Softball City team is ready for another run at the world slow-pitch championship of the United States.

Softball City has qualified for the playoffs and will play a best 3-of-5 first-round Eastern Division series starting Aug. 27 against Philadelphia. Softball City's first two games will be played in East Detroit because the regular home site is closed during the week of the Michigan State Fair.

The winner of that series will play Eastern Division regular-season champion Cleveland for the division title on Labor Day weekend. Finally, the Eastern Division winner will play the Western Division

winner for the UPSL world championship in a best-of-nine series starting Sept. 10.

Sea turtles

Animals from the dinosaur age are loved by researchers

Seas turtles are not cuddly. On land they look awkward. When female turtles heave up onto a beach to dig a nest and lay a clutch of eggs, their laborious effort causes them to sigh, and tears can be seen in their eyes.

Yet to those who study these ungainly survivors of the age of the dinosaurs, these reptiles whose continued existence is in doubt, sea turtles are an object of love.

"I am hooked on them body and soul," says Derek Green, after studying sea turtles for seven years in the Galapagos Islands.

"Here's a living dinosaur in a way," says Jim Sternbert, research associate with the Sea Turtle Rescue Fund. "These things have seen the dinosaurs come and go, and they're still around. Imagine what we can learn from them."

"Even if I were a poet, I don't think I could explain it," says John G. Frazier, a National Zoological Park research associate. "You're sitting on a beach in darkness, and this animal that doesn't look like it belongs to this era comes out and does something which you know is primeval. I'm awe-struck."

BUT THE SURVIVAL of seas turtles is far from certain. Some turtle populations are slaughtered for their food value or their shells. Others drown in fishermen's nets. The beaches where they nest are destroyed by development.

All species of sea turtles are listed under either the U.S. Endangered Species Act or under the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species. The listings make any trade in turtles or turtle products illegal in this country.

Though researchers have been hard at work studying these animals, mysteries remain.

For example, scientists have known for years that sea turtles travel great distances, as far as several thousands of miles, between nesting seasons. Yet many females tend to return to the same beaches, sometimes to almost the same spot, time after time.

What is the homing mechanism that leads them there? Scientists have several theories, but nothing conclusive.


RESEARCH in recent years, including work by Derek Green in the Galapagos Islands, partly supported by the National Geographic Society, has suggested that some turtle populations don't migrate at all but instead reside in one area.

Most turtle research has been conducted on nesting beaches. But Green worked in the waters around the Galapagos where green turtles feed, studying males as well as females. He captured many turtles time after time, while others he had tagged were turning up in Costa Rica and Peru.

Green also made another potentially major finding: Turtles in the wild grow at a far slower rate than had been thought, based on evidence from turtles raised in captivity.

Measuring turtle shells, he found that it would take turtles more than 50 years to reach maturity, not 8-12, as had been estimated before.

"That means your problem of managing the population becomes much, much greater," says Frazier.

ier, who supports Green's findings with other recent data. "If a turtle takes 50 years to reach maturity, you have an investment to guard for 50 years before it begins to reproduce and increase its numbers again."

Frazier has done research at a Mexican slaughterhouse, part of a fishery where nearly 2 million Olive Ridleys have been killed since the late 1960s.

He has assembled a new research team, with funding from the National Geographic Society and others, to conduct a comprehensive study of turtles there with an eye toward helping Mexican authorities determining what rate of killing, if any, should be allowed.

Among the things he wants to learn is whether growth layers in turtles' bones can be used to determine their age, as the rings of a tree help determine its age.

"We have no way of setting up demographic studies until we can determine a turtle's age," Frazier says. "And until we have in-depth demographic studies, we can't manage the population."

BUT HE has been frustrated because the Mexican government has not permitted him to do the work. The slaughterhouse is partly owned and operated by the Mexican government.

Many people, such as shrimp fishermen who are annoyed when turtles turn up in their nets or beachgoers who happen upon an area where turtles are digging their nests, may think that the sizable numbers of turtles indicate a population revival.

But Sternberg of the Sea Turtle Rescue Fund disagrees. "Because we have a good-sized population is not

to say that it's safe," he says. "Turtles have been around a number of millions of years. It would be ironic if they were to disappear within the next 10 years."

Indians are on the warpath in Xenia's summer night's air

IT WAS HARD for me to believe, when I visited Xenia, Ohio, in early June, that the story of "Blue Jacket" would actually be performed in the woods 18 miles from Dayton on opening night, June 18.

The bulldozers were still roaring across the hills and they hadn't yet finished building the great rocky outcrop that would be the centerpiece of the set beside Caesar's Creek.

They did open, although they were laying sod the night before, and Blue Jacket rides his horse across the Shawnee Indian encampment every night now, in this newest American outdoor drama.

OUTDOOR THEATER is an entirely different experience from that found on either the movie screen or the indoor stage. Here the "stage" is the real world, with sets buried into the ground and the audience taking the role of "bystanders of history."

There are 60 outdoor theaters in the United States, five of them in Ohio. "Tecumseh" has been living and dying nightly at Sugarloaf Mountain Amphitheater for several years near Chillicothe, which is also the site of the drama "Shenandoah"; "Trumpet in the Land" plays at Schoenbrunn Amphitheater in New Philadelphia; "The Living Word" and "The House of the Lord" play at Cambridge and Kirtland, respectively.

Xenia is the newest, and it has a newsworthy twist. Along with the sights and sounds that accompany the story of a white man kidnapped by the Indians, the producers have added subsonic 15-hertz sound to the theme song, "Death Rider." You can't hear the sound, but you can feel it shaking you in your seat.

The drama here at Caesar's Ford was the dream of a first-grade school teacher called Dotty Martin, who "didn't know it couldn't be done" when she helped to establish First Frontier Inc. here in 1976. She wanted to preserve a story that was played out in real life 200 years ago here six miles from the little town.

THE STORY is about two young boys kidnapped by the Shawnees in 1779. One boy agreed to go quietly if his brother was released.

The Shawnees called their captive Blue Jacket because he wore a blue linsey-woolsey shirt. Blue Jacket became the first white man to gain the rank of War Chief of the Shawnee Nation. In time, he killed his own brother in battle.

The story of Blue Jacket, intertwined with the story of a runaway slave who was also raised as an Indian, is played out in Caesar's Ford

Park, on the site of the old Shawnee settlement, every night except Monday through Sept. 5 and will reopen next summer.

From your amphitheater seat you can see the swift stream where the tribe once rode. The reconstruction of an army fort moves in and out on its hydraulic mechanism and is burned down every night.

Producer Tally Sessions from South Carolina was an experienced outdoor drama producer when he arrived here in 1981. He was involved with Horn in the West, in Boone, N.C., and with Young Washington, in Uniontown, Pa.

SESSIONS WORKS with a cast of 60 professional actors from all over the United States, and 13 horses. Pinkney Mikell, who plays the title role as Blue Jacket, is an equity actor from New York City.

His experience includes roles in soap operas such as "Guiding Light" and "As the World Turns"; he played the title role of Tecumseh in Chillicothe for two years. The company has been lucky; they weren't rained out during their first eight weeks.

That doesn't mean that there haven't been problems. The flaming arrows sometimes land 50 feet from the fort they are supposed to set afire. When the 50 muzzle-loading guns don't work quite right, somebody has to rush in with a stabbing knife to make the war scenes convincing.

And sometimes, the horses get the hiccups. One memorable night, as Shawnee Chief Cornstalk began his war speech, his horse started hiccuping under him, bumping him out of his saddle with every hiccup.

THE SHOW went on.

And it will go on every night at 8 p.m. Take Interstate 75 to the Dayton exit at Highway 35, drive 18 miles east through the town of Xenia to Jasper Road, where the theater signs will take you the rest of the way.

Reservations are suggested but probably not absolutely required except on Saturday. Adults \$7; Children, 12 and under, \$5. Friday and Saturday, one dollar cheaper on weekdays and Sunday.

Nostalgia returns, in an elegant new form




