Local plant may close, idling 250 employees

Associated Spring management and union officials are continuing to negotiate this week with the Plymouth Township plant's future at stake.

Officials from Associated's parent company, the Barnes Group Inc., said last month the firm was considering closing the Plymouth Road plant.

Representatives from UAW Local 236 met with company officials Aug. 27 and are scheduled to resume talks tomorrow.

"We said we are considering closing a plant — these discussions will resolve that situation," said John F. Sand, a Barnes spokesman.

Sand declined further comment about the talks. Local 236 officials also refused comment on the possible closing and subsequent negotiations.

A tentative close-down date hasn't been set. Company officials earlier only would say that the closing might occur "in the near future."

"Basically, the company wants to carry off the talks between the two parties," said Sand.

Relocation considerations for the plant's 200 hourly and 50 salaried employees was expected to be among the topics discussed at the meetings.

Associated Spring has another plant in Ann Arbor which isn't scheduled for closing. It's uncertain if the Plymouth employees will be transferred to the Ann Arbor plant.

"Hopefully we'll know more after Tuesday's meeting," said Sand.

BARNES IS considering the closing because "the Plymouth operations have been unprofitable for several years," Sand said.

Associated Spring, which manufactures precision springs for the automobile and aircraft industries, is the fifth-largest taxpayer in Plymouth Township.

The plant's closing would mean a loss of some \$17,500 in township tax revenues and some \$145,000 for the Plymouth-Canton Community School District.

Plymouth Township hasn't received notification of Barnes' intentions, according to Supervisor Maurice Breen.

"Obviously we would prefer they stay where they are and maintain the employment, but it isn't any of our business," Breen said.

"Barnes hasn't indicated there is anything Plymouth Township can do to help them out."

Bank taps Perna for 2nd top spot

Mary Perna never sees stop signs on her personal road to success.

Perna set her sights on becoming a bank manager in the 1950s when it was rare for women to attain such a position.

She reached her goal by becoming a branch manager for a Security Bank and Trust office in Canton in 1974. She took an interest in Canton's growing business community, and became one of the first women to take a strong

leadership role in the Canton Chamber of Commerce.

Recently, Perna was tapped to manage a second Security Bank and Trust branch in Canton, while continuing to manage her original one.

"I never thought of myself being the pioneer type," said Perna, a quietly confident, gracious woman in her late 50s.

"You just do it (the job)," she added. "If you know your job, and you have the ability, you don't get that resistance. You get it, but you overcome it quickly."

WHY THE dual managership?

Canton was a booming, fast-growing community when Security opened an office on Ford Road in 1974 with Perna as manager.

A second Canton branch, which opened on Canton Center Road in 1979, has grown more slowly because of a sluggish economy, say bank officials. When bank officials decided to consolidate the management of the two offices it was a first for the 33-branch Security chain.

"We felt she was quite capable of running two offices," said Edward

Gover, administrative vice-president of branches.

"She is well-accepted (and) has been active in the community," said Gover. "When this (economy) turns around, Canton will be one of the first areas to expand."

PERNA, A Northville resident, always has been interested in moving up the corporate ladder.

A native of Pennsylvania, she earned a bachelor of arts degree from Antioch

State superintendent interviewed

School financing needs diversification

Many suburban school districts are too small to offer high school students top-flight academic programs.

But don't expect the state to force mergers. Phillip Runkel, state superintendent of public instruction, says the state will help local citizens in their search for "creative" solutions.

Consolidation of small districts is just one method, Runkel said. Another is shared transportation. Still another is to have intermediate (county) districts offer top-flight academics in the same way they handle vocational and special education.

By design, Runkel has been a highly visible state superintendent, working on local school crises in Taylor and Westwood. A former superintendent in Utica and Grand Rapids, he carefully avoids giving the appearance that the state is dictating solutions from above.

Dr. Runkel was interviewed for the "Spotlight on News" last weekend by Jim Herrington of WXYZ-TV, Tim Richard of Observer & Eccentric Newspapers and Mike Wovk of the Detroit News. Excerpts:

Q. (Wovk) Across the state, how are voters reacting to millage renewals?

A. This year, believe it or not, we've conducted a poll called Project Outreach, and we feel there's strong support for education in Michigan. Our reading on millage renewals is 92 percent. It's up from last year, and on additional millage it's up from 17 percent to 27 percent.

We worked with school organizations and held a series of workshops in how to communicate with the public. We had some 600 or 700 people attend those workshops — the Michigan Education Assn., the superintendents, the school boards. We think some of that is the result of those workshops.

Even in these economic times, that's a better record than many people feel is out there.

Q. (Wovk) Given these economic problems... why are there teachers strikes?

A. We have 570 districts in Michigan. About 250 districts are up for negotiations (this year), and only about 50 have had successful negotiations. We have had five strikes so far, and two of those are settled.

If you look at the history of teachers strikes,

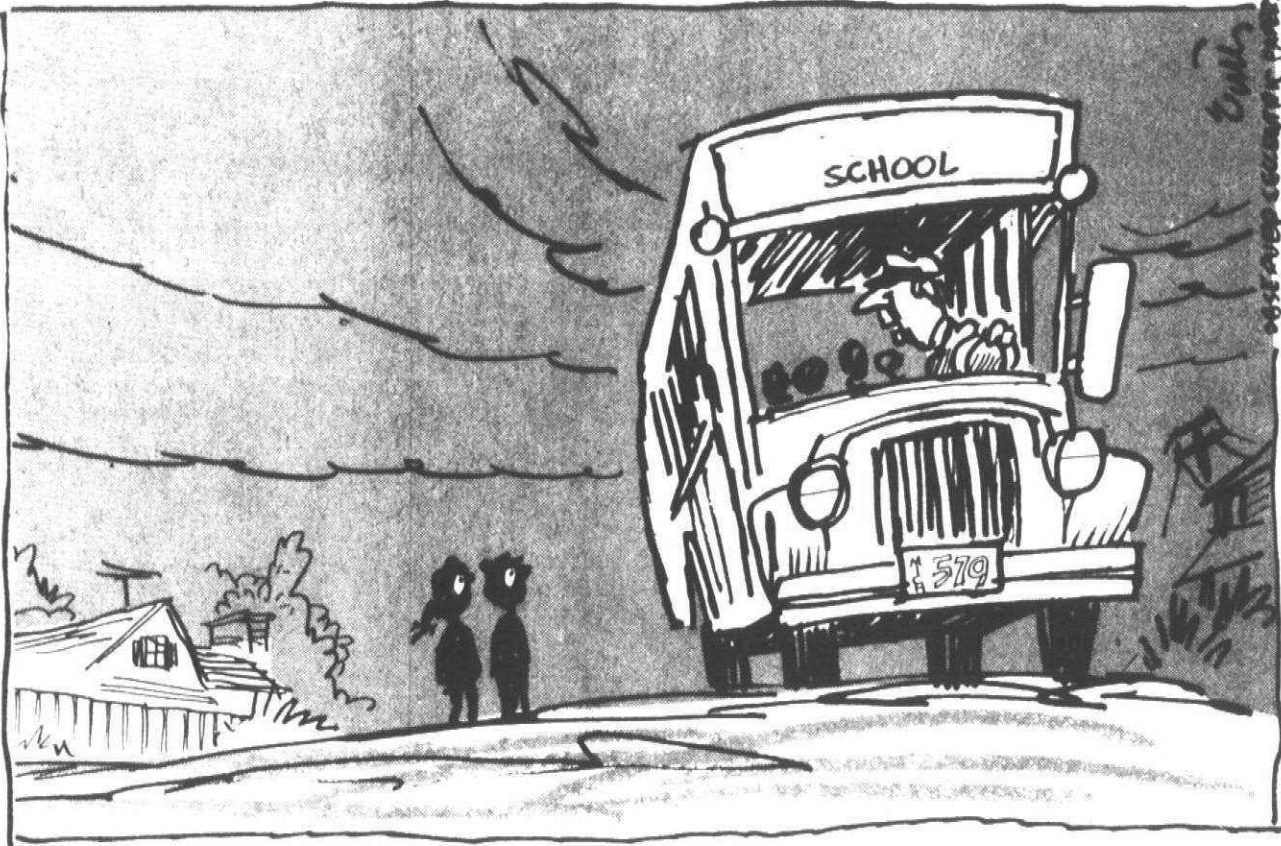

three years ago we had 70, the year after that we had 30, and last year we had 13. We projected someplace around 12 or 15 (this year).

Obviously, collective bargaining is a local issue. Many times we've asked people to go back, and encouraged people to go back, without a contract and consider continuing negotiations. We do not want to see school interrupted.

Q. (Wovk) Some 200,000 auto workers are still laid off, many others are still unemployed, teachers are laid off, and yet we have five teachers strikes.

A. Not all of those strikes are about money. There are many concessions in Michigan school districts this year. Some school districts do have resources. You have to look at the individual school district.

Q. (Richard) You were saying (in a news release) you thought there would be fewer strikes this year. Instead there are about the same —

A. That's true. We were hopeful there'd be about 12 strikes, and we may be a little off in that, but what has happened is the number of districts negotiating this year are the same number which had a larger number of strikes two years ago.

The other issue is that it's very difficult to finalize your contract because there isn't a state aid bill yet. They (boards) don't know what the appropriation is. We have to face an executive order cut. We don't know how that will be cut (because the House Appropriations Committee rejected Gov. Milliken's first proposal). So a lot of pieces of the pie aren't there.

Q. (Herrington) You mentioned the governor's executive order cut — \$72 million (to K-12 schools). What will that do to how many schools and how badly?

A. I would think there would be less (than the \$72 million proposed by Milliken) cut out. What we did when we heard of this executive order, we surveyed through the intermediate school districts, and we have about 60 school districts with payroll problems almost immediately.

Road funds
dwindling, - state

More than 100 miles of state highways will not be resurfaced or otherwise improved this year as they have been in previous years.

Beams supporting the decks of many highway bridges will not be painted for rust protection.

Dozens of miles of highway shoulders will not be improved on schedule.

Low-cost projects to improve traffic flow by building passing and turning lanes have been set aside indefinitely.

THOSE ARE some results of a major cutback this year in the Michigan Department of Transportation's highway improvement program.

All such work is paid for with state motor vehicle fuel and weight tax revenues. It is not eligible for the federal aid allocated for highway construction, said G.J. McCarthy, the department's deputy director for highways.

"In most years, we have spent from \$40 million to \$50 million on such projects," he said.

"This year, our income has declined to the point that we have only \$10 million available, and very little of that can be spent for resurfacing

and similar work. The bulk of it will go for emergency repairs, several million dollars in court awards against the department in accident suits and payment of assessments for local drainage improvements involving state highways."

HIGHWAYS WHICH are not resurfaced and repaired as they begin to deteriorate eventually require reconstruction, at a much higher cost, McCarthy said.

"It's the old story of pay now, or pay much more later," he said. "What we can do for \$50,000 to \$60,000 a mile now will cost three to five times as much if the work is put off for four or five years."

Transportation funds have been steadily falling for more than 2½ years, reducing income for state highways, county roads, city streets and state-supported bus and rail programs. Highway travel increased slightly last year, but the continuing trend toward lighter-weight, more fuel-efficient autos has lowered the take from state fuel and weight (license plate) taxes.

"It's a nationwide problem," said McCarthy. "Every highway system in the country is suffering the same results."

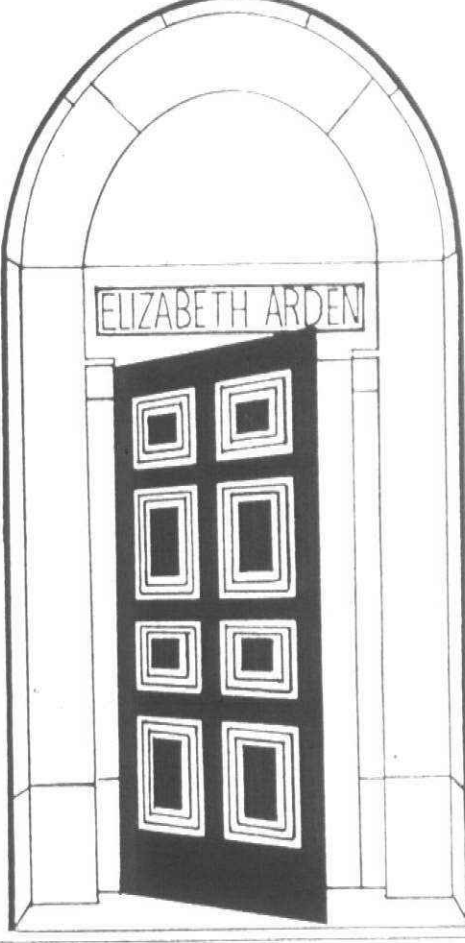

Federal deficits must be reduced to help housing, Realtors claim

This is the second of a three-part series. Observer & Eccentric editors — Ron Garbinski, Kathy Moran and Dennis O'Connor — recently hosted a joint interview with four leading real estate brokers — Mel Durbin of the Durbin Co., Bob Gavey of the Chamberlain Companies, Steve Pew of Max Broock Inc. and Dick Weir of Weir, Manuel, Snyder and Ranke. Their views follow.

IS THERE any question of sticker shock on the price of houses?

WEIR: There has been in the past, and I suspect there are some houses out there that are overpriced.

DURBIN: A lot of the sellers are still living in 1979 and when they price their house at the figure they want, they think if they wait long enough it will sell. Those days actually have passed. Shooting for the high dollar and waiting it out and figuring that the market will grow into their price will no longer happen. The person who is selling is pricing his house very, very closely to the market. Those are the houses, coupled with seller-supplied financing, that are selling. And they do sell readily. It is the people who are living in the past who aren't selling either on financing and/or price of the property.

What do you think of President Ronald Reagan and his fiscal policy?

WEIR: I think both state and federal budgets are out of control and spending way beyond what is projected. For example, one popular program that is part of Reagan's safety net — it's a necessary program so we don't have starvation in the country — (is) the food stamp program. At one time that was debated in Congress, passed and made a law. The projected expenditures were to be possibly \$4 billion a year, but today I can't seem to remember what the latest cost for food stamps per year is — possibly \$17 billion, 18 or \$20 billion per year. That's just an example. There is program after program of social contracts that the federal government has made for the people with the legislation that has passed calling for a particular program with certain expenditures that has ended up 10, 20, 25 years later costing five, 10 and 20 times what was projected by Congress at the time they passed the law. These have all added, one after another, "topsy-turvy," to the point where we just spent ourselves into the poorhouse. And we are continuing to do it today. That's what the basic problem is — we are spending more money than we are making. Reagan is absolutely right. He had to do something taxwise because we had the top, most able part of our populace paying tax rates of up to 70 percent of everything they earned. It can't go on if we are going to get those people to make investments that will create new jobs. The government did discover that new jobs did come as a result of activities by the so-called "private sector," not as a result of government activity. The only way they were going to get the activity they needed, in the long run, is when a large number of people are gainfully employed and paying taxes rather than taking in income from the government in the form of a subsidy.

Isn't an inflationary economy better for your business?

WEIR: Yes, it is, but only in the short run. Wait until you retire and you are on a fixed income. If inflation keeps up at 15 percent, you won't think that's very thrilling at all. It's easy for the American public to spend now and let the future take care of itself. It won't work.

GAVEY: I like what Dick has to say about that. I think he is right. I think we have to pay the price now. It is true, an inflationary market is better for our business in the short term. It is actually better for the people who are selling and going to another market. They are making a lot of inflationary dollars on real estate that they bought at a lesser price. In the long term, stabilized interest rates at a reasonable rate of inflation is better for us and is better for the general public. We all have a built-in prejudice in the real estate market. For years and years it increased at the rate of 4 to 5 percent. It then rapidly increased, prior to three years ago, doubling every five years.

WEIR: Back 30 years ago, when someone would come to town to buy a house, they would occasionally ask, "How long do I have to live in it to pay a commission to sell it?" We would tell them the have to stay there four or five years to earn 6 percent. That's the way it was. The budget wasn't just "leap-frogging." That was better for people in the long run. When they did retire with whatever they had put aside for their old age, it would continue to buy something.

GAVEY: From 1974 to 1979 it (housing) was no longer just a shelter — it was an investment with a lot of high-dollar profits.

WEIR: The growing intelligence was to (go) out on a limb (because) you could get anyone to loan to you and it would be smart. And it wasn't very smart. Now the limb is being sawed off. The guys out on the end of the limb are in trouble.

GAVEY: There are a lot of economists who now say that it is an economic fact that housing is not an investment any more simply because the interest rates are higher than what you could make on a house because the price is going down. Is housing an investment?

DURBIN: I don't know if the correct term is "economists are saying that." Authors of books are saying that. Whether, in truth, they are economists, I don't know. I can honestly say that I recall a single economist saying that.

PEW: Let's start with one basic premise. Housing is a necessity. If you want to talk about buying other than your necessities, such as an apartment building, office building and so forth, then yes, I suppose the hot money is going elsewhere. What the four of us are primarily dealing with, in the community in which we serve, is the person's basic shelter — the necessity. It's just been a damn good investment since (President) Johnson and the Gulf of Tonkin. Now there isn't any war to keep the inflation fires going so it isn't the great investment that it used to be, but it still is better than living in a tent.

GAVEY: We are not only selling housing as a necessity. We are selling the amenities of a neighborhood. We are selling a lifestyle. We are selling a community that is, no doubt, the finest community (Oakland County) in Michigan if not the country. It is not just bricks and sticks. It is the whole gamut from the tremendous school system to the community, the trees, everything. Where it goes from there is up to the individual.

DURBIN: I catch myself once in awhile talking about the "sticker shock." When I first started selling in Birmingham, we had the homes right in this neighborhood. They were \$11,000-\$13,000. I compare them to prices now to near \$100,000. I think, gee, the prices of homes have really gone up. Compare the physical homes. The \$11,000 to \$13,000 was a 900-square-foot box with no garage on a 50-foot lot, no family room, one bath, if you were lucky a bath and a half, and if you were real lucky you finished off the attic. Those were the \$13,000 houses that they want \$60,000 for now. If you compare that type of home to what we are talking about now, which is a four-bedroom, 2½ bath colonial with a family room and an attached garage, you are really not comparing the same product.

PEW: You are comparing 900-1,000 square feet to 18,000-22,000 square feet. You have three times the house plus the inflation factor.

DURBIN: It really isn't that gross an exaggeration than it was back in the old days.

'Right now this is a buyer's market and the houses are a bargain. The fact of the matter is they are off in the neighborhood of 20 percent from where they were the first part of 1979. That's when the market peaked. By the time you got into 1980, '81 and now halfway '82, you are off on a house you would have had to pay \$100,000 for then you can probably buy today for \$80,000 and you can get it for 11 percent. That's a benefit to the public. It is a reduction in inflation.'

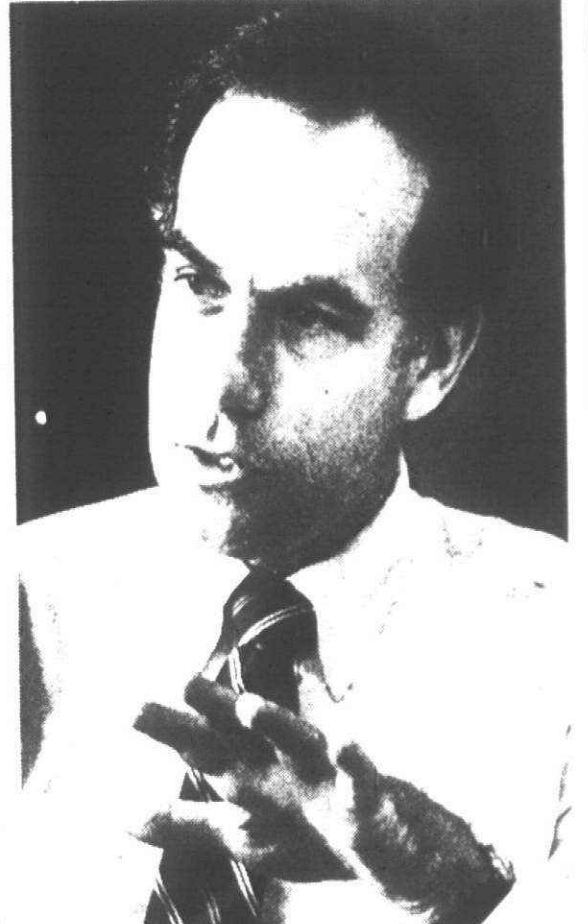

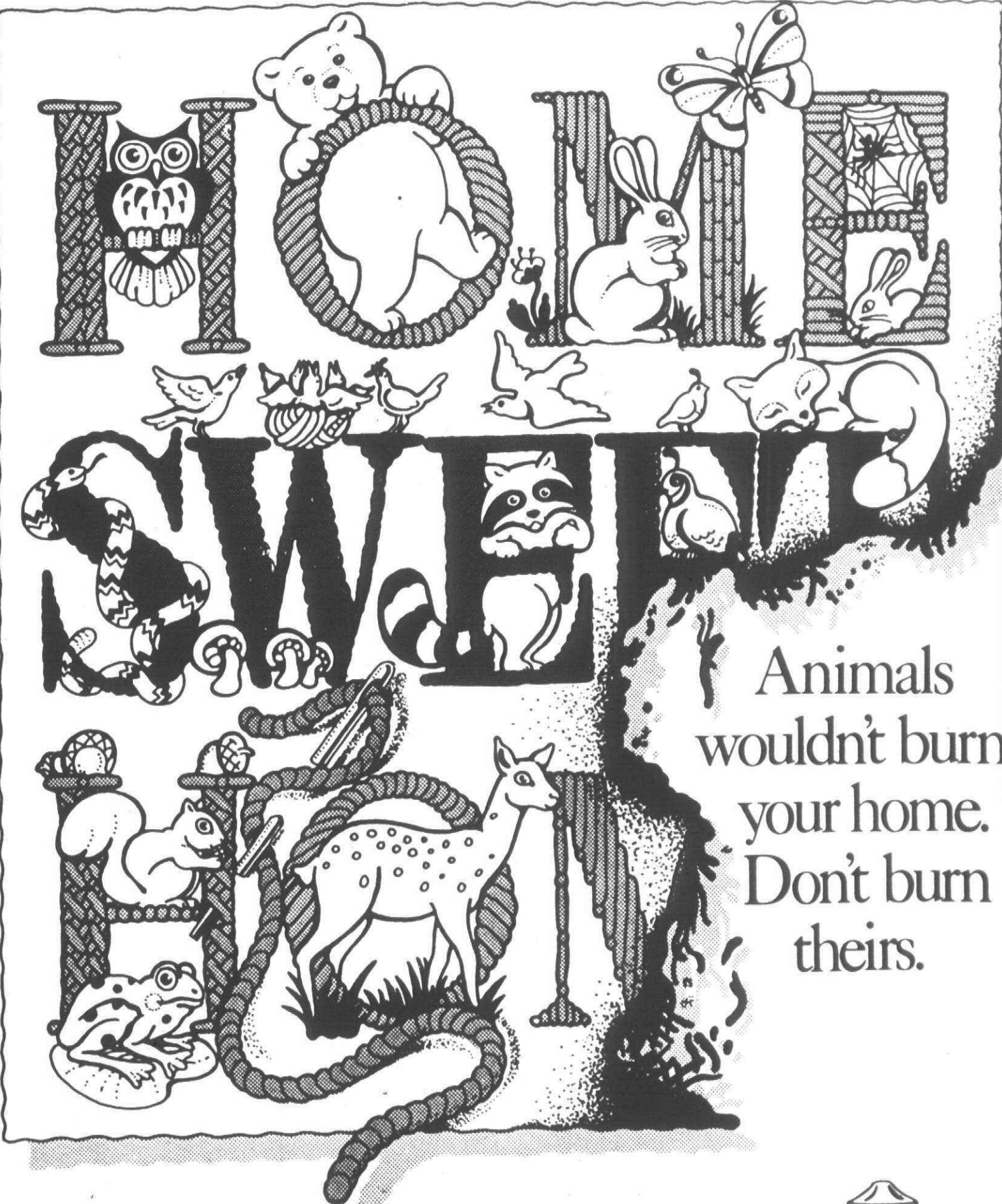


GAVEY: 'It is true, an inflationary market is better for our business in the short term. It is actually better for the people who are selling and going to another market. In the long term, stabilized interest rates at a reasonable rate of inflation is better.'

WEIR: 'The growing intelligence was to go as far out on a limb as you could get anyone to leverage you and it would be smart. It was not smart. Now the limb is being sawed off. The guys out on the end of the limb are in trouble.'



PEW: 'Volcker is maintaining his independence and I think that is absolutely essential. Some people are saying 'Bring him under the administrative branch.' We are really in trouble if that happens.'

Donation brings carillon to college tower

(Part XVIII)

In September, 1964, when I became a trustee at Schoolcraft Community College, the other board members were Harold Fischer, chairman; Jane Moehle, vice chairman; Paul Mutnick, secretary; Clarke Oldenburg, treasurer; Leroy C. Bennett, a Livonia school teacher; Erwin S. Brown, a financial analyst at Ford Motor Co.; and Dr. Gordon R. Forrer, a psychiatrist.

Shortly after I joined the board, Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Kehrle of Plymouth presented the college with 87 shares of National Bank of Detroit stock, valued at \$6,500. The donation was for the express purpose of purchasing a carillon for the college tower, a landmark adjacent to the administration building.

The carillon was to join four bells already in the tower. From 19th-century schoolhouses, the bells had been donated to the college by its four sponsors: the school systems of Clarenceville, Garden City, Livonia, and Plymouth. In January 1966, a fifth school bell was

added to the collection, representing Northville.

On receipt of the grant from the Kehrles, the college trustees authorized the purchase of three carillon bells from John Taylor and Company, bell founders and carillon builders of Loughborough, England. Delivery was expected in three months. Due to a series of mishaps, however, the carillon was not installed until much later.

AFTER THEIR FIRST trip over the Atlantic, the bells could not land in New York because of a dock strike. They were sent back to Britain. When they finally arrived at the college in Livonia and were uncrated, one of the bells was cracked. It had to be returned to England, where it was recast.

For that reason, two of the bells in the tower are dated 1964 and one, 1965. The carillon bells, which ring on the quarter hours and on the hour, in a sequence requested by the college authorities, finally joined the symbolic, non-ringing, school bells in the spire-

like structure on Friday, Nov. 19, 1965.

IN JANUARY 1965, the board gave President Dr. Eric Bradner authority to hire up to 37 additional instructors. With the staff of 48 then on the payroll, the college would have a full-time faculty of 85 for the start of the 1965-66 term. More than 1,000 incoming freshman students were expected that year.

An evening class that attracted a record number of enrollees in 1965 was the horse-care and farm-management course. This class, which extended for 16 weeks, included instruction in feeding, horse shoeing, breeding, horsemanship, training horses, farm management and common ailments and dis-

eases. It was under the direction of Dr. Andrew Kalmus, a veterinarian who had his practice in Plymouth for a short time. The course eventually was discontinued, a casualty of the continuing urbanization of the area.

The first Schoolcraft student to achieve a record of straight As in the opening semester was a mother of four from Plymouth. Marilyn Wright topped the first Dean's Honor Roll at the college in January 1965. She told a reporter she planned to finish two years at Schoolcraft, then transfer to the University of Michigan to major in journalism with the thought of devoting her spare time to creative writing. I have

been unable to locate her to determine whether she achieved her goal.

ON MARCH 11, 1965, Schoolcraft officials knew they were on the right track when the college was granted accreditation by the Michigan Commission on College Accreditation.

Bradner hailed the news as a significant step in the development of the college, noting that accreditation permitted not only easy transfer to credits within the state, but also outside the state.

He told a reporter the administration hoped for affirmative action by the commission, but was a bit hesitant about making application after only one semester. Preliminary studies for an attempt at accreditation by the North Central Association of Colleges already were under way, he added.

DURING MARCH, 1965, Marvin Gans, Schoolcraft's athletic director, who put together the first men's basketball team ever to represent the college, was notified that the institution

was accepted for membership in the Michigan Community Junior College Athletic Commission. This enabled Schoolcraft to compete on a regular schedule basis with other two-year colleges in the state.

Although it had received its first students in August 1964, the college was not dedicated until late in April 1965. The ceremonies included a procession of the faculty in academic dress and a speech by Dr. Ferris Crawford, executive secretary of the Michigan Commission on College Accreditation. Crawford helped to establish 15 community colleges in the state since 1951.

June 14, 1965 was election day. I served on the Schoolcraft board of trustees since September 1964, to fill the at-large vacancy created when Charles Kirkpatrick resigned because he was transferred out of the college district.

Now, I had to stand for election for the seat I held for nine months, and I was faced with strong competition from a Livonia resident.

I'll be sure and get around to it first thing tomorrow . . . unless something better comes up.

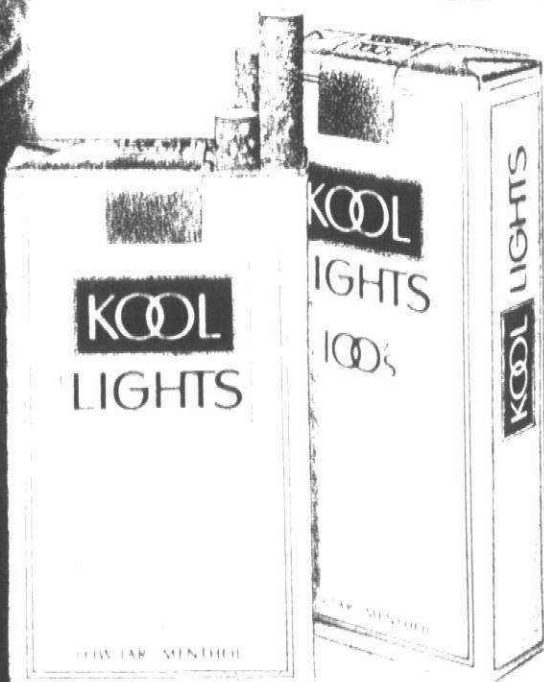

I know I share the feelings of those officials in the Plymouth-Canton area also. It would be a great waste of public funds to conduct this project as proposed.

As suggested by Cates, the principal problem is the widening of the channel downstream. This could be done for considerably less than the \$7.3 million proposed.

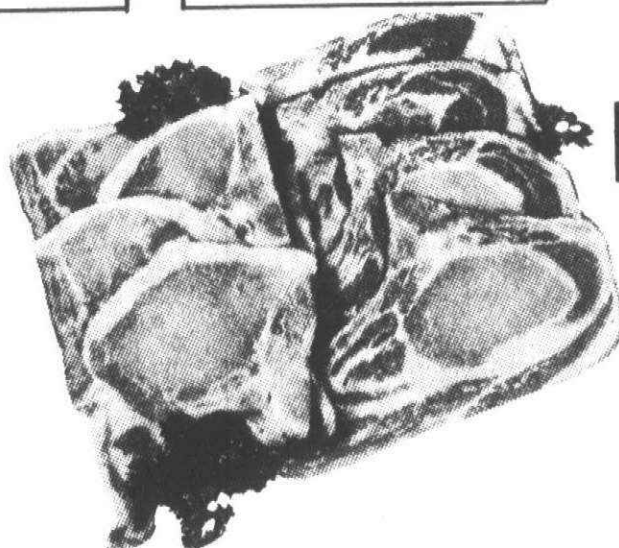

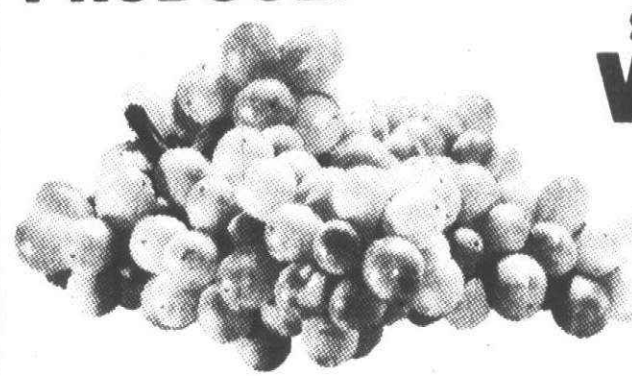

POCKET SANDWICHES

12 slices cooked ham, honey-style loaf, peppered loaf or barbecue loaf
1/2 cup yogurt
1/2 cup shredded zucchini
1/4 cup finely chopped radishes
1/4 tsp. sugar
1/4 tsp. dill weed
2 loaves pita bread, cut in half cross-wise
1 cup shredded lettuce
8 1/4-inch thick slices tomatoes

Combine yogurt, zucchini, radishes, sugar and dill weed. Cover tightly and refrigerate 2-4 hours or overnight. To make sandwiches, enlarge pockets in pita bread when necessary. Fold lunch-eon meats in half diagonally; place three slices in each pocket. Place 1/4 cup shredded lettuce and two tomato slices in each pocket. Spoon sauce over vegetables. Serves four.

APPLE SPICE MUFFINS

1 pkg. (18 1/2 oz.) spice cake mix
1 can (20 oz.) apple pie filling
1 1/2 cups wheat bran cereal morsels
3/4 cup chopped nuts
2 eggs
1/2 cup oil
3/4 cup buttermilk

In large mixer bowl, combine all ingredients at low speed just until completely mixed, stirring bottom of bowl once or twice. Batter can also be mixed by hand or with hand-held portable mixer.

If not baking immediately, refrigerate batter up to 10 days.

In regular oven: Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Fill lightly oiled muffin pans 3/4 full with batter. Bake for 25 minutes or until done. Makes 2 1/2 dozen 2 1/2-inch diameter muffins.

In microwave oven: Line microwave-safe muffin ring with paper cupcake liners. Or insert paper liners into low custard cups or cut-off foam cups. Fill halfway with batter.

Arrange muffins in circle in oven. Set microwave on high, rotating muffins after 1/2 the time, until nearly dry on top. (Moist spots will dry on standing.)

Microwave times: 1 muffin, 25-45 seconds; 2 muffins, 3/4-1 1/2 minutes; 4 muffins, 1 1/2-2 1/2 minutes; 6 muffins, 2 1/2-4 minutes.

PEACH REFRESHER

2 cups sliced peeled peaches (about 5)
2 cups water
3/4 cup (3 scoops) lemonade mix
1 bottle (28 oz.) ginger ale, chilled

Place peaches, water and drink mix in blender container. Cover and blend on high speed until smooth, about 1 minute. Pour into nonmetal pitcher and chill. Just before serving, stir in ginger



ale. Serve over ice and garnish with additional peach slices, if desired. Makes about 9 cups or 9 servings.

Renaissance-style food is served, and there are ongoing plays. Tickets are available at the gate, and the shows run daily from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Center gives overnight care

There's special relief for special parents

"It's a godsend," said Linda Toomer.

Really, it's a one-story structure nestled close to the woods on Marquette, just west of John Glenn High School in Westland.

But to Toomer and others who, like her, have charge of a developmentally disabled person, the Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy Respite Center offers priceless aid in the form of rest and renewal.

Parents of developmentally disabled adults and children use its facilities when there are problems or stress in their lives.

They can leave their charges in the pleasant surroundings of the respite center, the only one of its kind in this area.

BEFORE THIS building was completed in 1979, there were few places to harbor these handicapped persons if their parents become ill or if there were a death or a problem in the family.

There were few solutions to parental exhaustion. "Every parent needs to be rejuvenated before they suffer burnout," said Toomer, a Westland parent raising an autistic child whom she has begun to bring to the center.

Nor was there much help for parents in desperate need of a vacation.

"We once had someone come as a guest who was 22 years old," said Cheryl Betz, resident manager. "The whole family came along to do the intake."

The facility is available for Plymouth-Canton area families with developmentally disabled people.

"The rest of the children in the family were in their early 20s. It was the first time the family would be away from their developmentally disabled person. They were going on all the little one-day vacation outings like Boblo and the zoo that most families take for granted."

"Up until that time there was no one else to care for the young man."

Another family had not had a vacation in 30 years.

"THE IDEA IN mental health today is to keep people in the community," said Betz, 24, a 1976 graduate of Garden City West High School. "But if you tell parents to keep the child at home, then you need someone to help them care for him during stressful situations."

To the Westland facility come the developmentally disabled of all ages and from all over Wayne County. First they complete the intake procedure of the Northwest Guidance Clinic in Garden City.

The respite center can handle 16 at a time. Adults and children are housed in separate quarters for eating and living. Each individual is allowed to stay as many as 30 days in a year. The staff sees that the guests do those activities they are capable of. Some go on field trips and picnics, to bowling alleys and movie theaters.

Those who are able make their own beds, fold their own clothes, help make lunch and do household chores.

"They enjoy that," said shift leader Ruth Torok of Westland. "We don't want to do things for them and make them less independent. We also work on dressing and eating skills."

"They are not here for training," said Betz. She earned a bachelor's degree at University of Michigan-Dearborn and is working on a master's degree in social work at Wayne State University.

"We try to keep them functioning at their present level. But if we see little things we could help with, we do it. We stress independence."

ELVIRA MASI of Dearborn brings her 38-year-old son Rick to the center because he says he has such a good time.

"If my son tells me that, I believe him," she said. "I'm relieved there is some place he wants to go. He'd prefer to be at the center."

"There is beautiful communication between him and the people. I went to Europe for three weeks and knew he was in good hands."

"It's the best thing that every happened. There are parents who need a rest. My son is in a wheelchair. He needs total 24-hour care."

"A lot of us are getting older, so the center is a great help. When I have to get up with him at night, I often don't get back to sleep for two to three hours."

Linda Toomer, a single parent who works full time, said her son Jason, 11, requires little sleep but considerable attention.

"Until two years ago, I had no place to leave him overnight," she said. Now she leaves him at the center two nights a month and gets the chance to go shopping or use the time to herself in some other way.

"I can do what I like on those days. It is so special to me."

"I have a full night's sleep without worrying about Jason. The rest of my life is completely controlled by factors that evolve around an autistic child."

"They have worked with him on eating at a table with other children," she said.

THE BUILDING has a half-acre back yard with a slide, sandbox, water tub and barbecue pit. It is the result of an effort by the federal government during the Carter administration to stimulate the economy, said Dr. Ray Rafford, executive director.

"We learned a local municipality could apply for a grant to put up a building," said Rafford, also assistant superintendent for school realtions in the Wayne-Westland district.

"So we brainstormed what the community might need. We knew there was a need in many communities, not just ours, for a place where parents could leave their handicapped child or adult during a crisis or when they needed a break."

Involved in the early planning was Marge Mitchell, special education supervisor of the Wayne-Westland district. Today she is supervisor of the center.

"The building was not easy to develop," she said. "There was no model to pattern it after. We had to learn about staffing and budgeting as we began to operate."

THE BUILDING was built with a grant from the U.S. Department of Commerce. Wayne-Westland officials then asked the Detroit-Wayne County Community Mental Health Board in Detroit, if it would pay the new center's operating costs.

The state-financed agency agreed. As a result, Rafford said, "It doesn't cost the school district anything to operate."

While the center gets donations from service groups, the mental health board pays the vast majority of its expenses. The school district, however, is in charge of operating it.

Rates for care are based on ability to pay as determined by the Northwest Guidance Clinic.

"There has never been anyone denied service because they can't pay," said Betz.

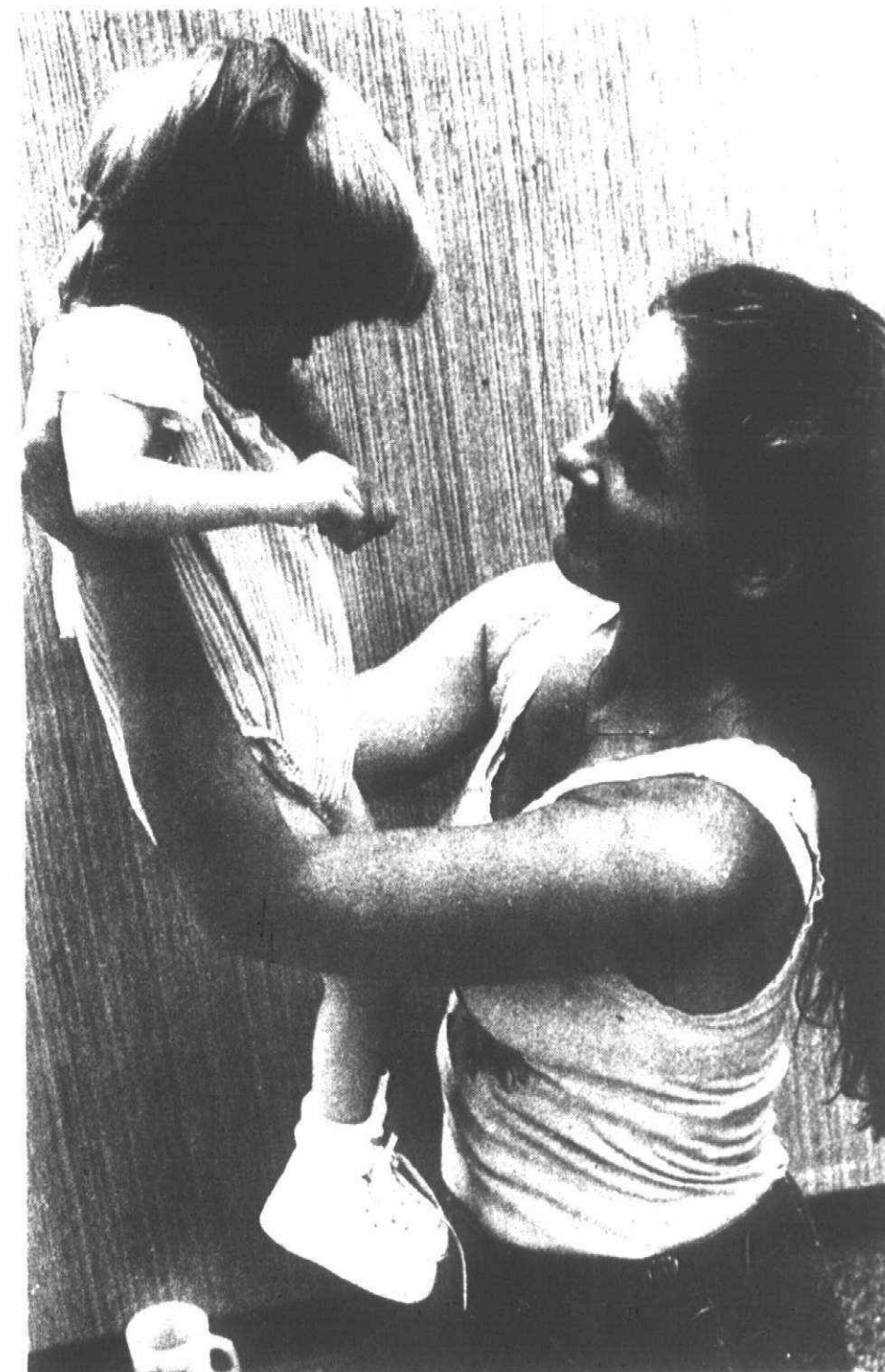
The public should be aware of what parents of the retarded go through in raising their children, Torok said.

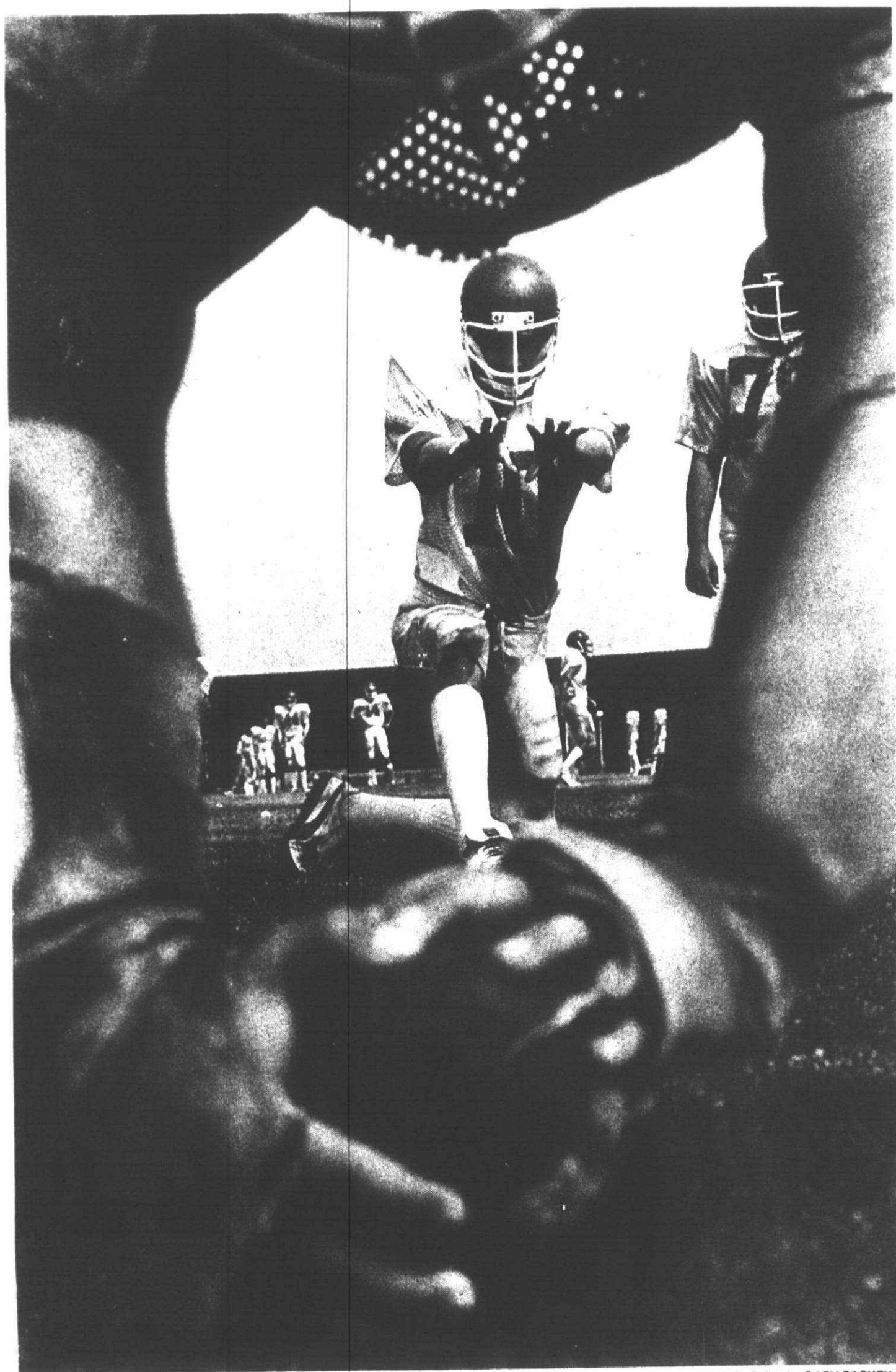

Chief gridders talented, but double-duty a problem

Could this be the year Plymouth Canton's football fortunes finally blossom? With 11 starters back, filling 17 of the 22 positions, the possibility is more than remote.

Much more. "This is the best talent, position by position, we've had in my three years here," Chief coach Richard Barr said. "The kids are confident, and I'm optimistic."

"We're bigger overall and stronger, and at each position we have kids with talent who should be playing there." It hasn't been easy for Barr thus far at Canton. His team improved in 1981, from 1-8 the previous season to 2-7. This year the Chiefs have a solid shot at breaking the .500 barrier. Perhaps more than that.

"I FEEL WE can play with anybody," Barr remarked. "If we can just win the close ones, we can break .500. We've been in every game but one in the last two years."

That one was a 44-0 shellacking suffered against Farmington Harrison last season. There won't be any replays like that this year.

Barr, and his players, are confident the Chiefs can move the ball, both in the air and on the ground. Pat Murphy (6-3, 186), who started several games at quarterback last year, returns for his senior season.

He'll have a big target to throw to: junior tight end Bob Wasczenski (6-3, 205). Wasczenski got lots of playing time as a sophomore and is expected to contribute heavily to Canton's offense this year.

There are other receivers with experience, too. Senior Ron Rienas (6-1, 170) is a split end and senior Matt Santilli (5-9, 155) is the slotback.

IN THE BACKFIELD, Mike Perrot (6-foot, 185), a senior, returns at fullback and Chuck Davis (6-foot, 185), also a senior, is back at tailback.

Seniors John Cruse (6-1, 205) and Dave Gerish (6-1, 175) are the tackles and Dan Schacht (6-1, 185) and Rich Roman (5-10, 175) are the guards. Senior Don Page (5-11, 195) and junior Kevin Barstow (5-10, 168) will share the center spot.

Barr called his offensive backfield "adequate — quick but no outstanding speed. We're going to pass, and we hope the pass will open up the run."

But if there is a weakness in the Canton hopes, it's lack of adequate depth. As many as eight players could go both ways.

"We don't want it that way," Barr said. "But that's just the way it is right now."

DEFENSIVELY, "the majority has started at their positions," Barr said. Meaning that the Chiefs' defense should be an effective unit.

The secondary is strong, with four experienced players returning. Santilli and Davis, who share the captain's duties with Schacht, will play the corners. Rienas is stationed at one safety, with Murphy and junior Jim Burczyk (5-11, 175) splitting time at the other.

Handling the linebacking chores are Wasczenski, Perrot and Dave Szary (5-8, 155), a junior. The four down linemen are Gerish and Page at the tackles, with four players — junior Rodney Williams (6-foot, 200), junior Paul Fletcher (6-3, 205), Schacht and senior Tim Trainor (6-1, 170) — rotating at defensive end.

Wasczenski is expected to do the punting and Santilli the placekicking. Barr rated both as adequate in their specialties.

THE CHIEFS will operate out of a 4-3 alignment, but plan on changing it constantly. "I don't like to stay in the same defense two plays in a row," Barr said.

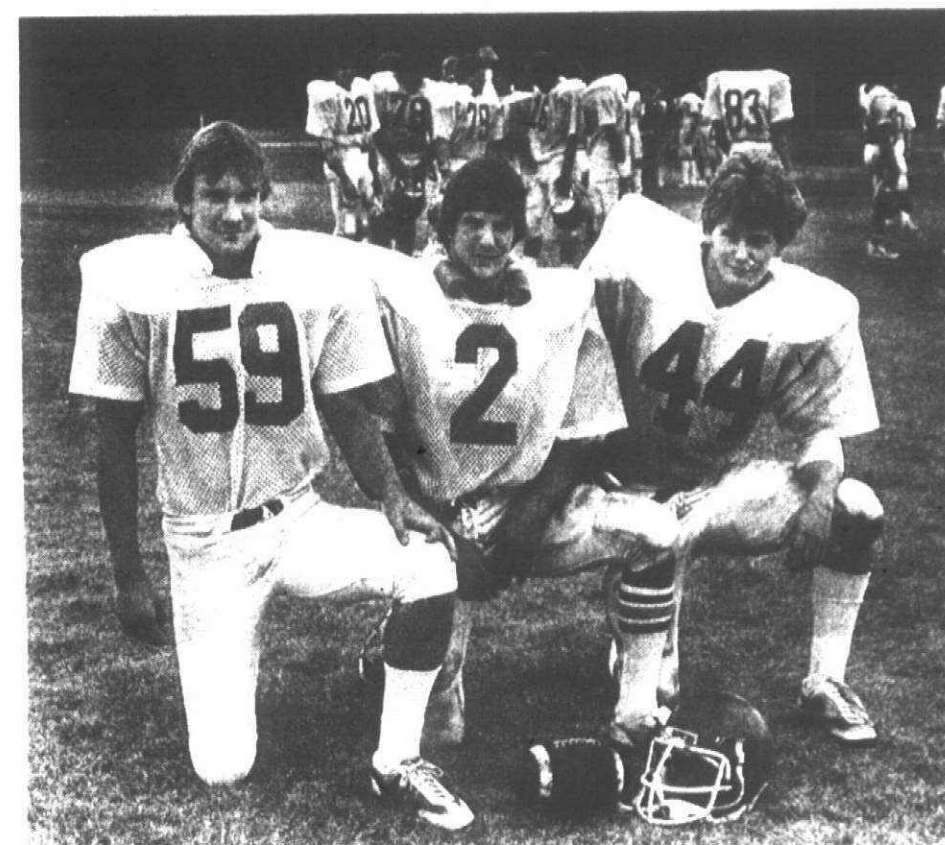
Canton's foes this season are the same as last, but the league is new: the Western Lakes Athletic Association (WLAA). The Chiefs are members of the five-team Western Division, and their rivals were all members of the now-defunct Western Six League.

So Barr isn't unfamiliar with the opposition. "You never want to rule out Harrison," the Canton coach said, rating the favorites. "And Walled Lake Western has that (Paul) Imms coming back. He was tough to stop last year."

"I just hope everyone has lost people, (because) we've got some coming back. I figure we've got as good a shot as anyone."

The key to success for Canton is obvious: "We have to stay away from injuries," Barr said. "If we lose two or three key players..."

He didn't have to finish. The optimistic Canton outlook, the best for the Chiefs in years, could turn quickly sour with a rash of injuries.

Rocks as solid as ever Two-deep Salem in title hunt

Plymouth Salem coach Tom Moshimer downplays his team's role as favorite in the chase for the first-ever Western Lakes Activities Association (WLAA) football championship.

"I don't know how we can be the favorite," Moshimer protested. "Livonia Stevenson hasn't lost a title in five or six years. We were 5-4 last year."

But Stevenson won those titles while playing in the Inter-Lakes League, which last year dwindled to four teams. Salem, meanwhile, battled teams like Dearborn Edsel Ford, Trenton, Belle-

ville and Dearborn in the Suburban Eight.

Examine the Rock roster and it will be easy to figure why they're one of the choices to win the WLAA's Lakes Division.

SALEM'S TEAM can be described in one word: Depth. The Rocks are two deep at every position and most of those players have varsity experience.

The depth starts at quarterback. Pete Steyaert (6-foot, 180) and Dave Haut (6-foot, 175) are both seniors, are both good passers, and are both capable of running the offense. And both will play.

"I wouldn't hesitate to use either one," Moshimer said. "I believe if you have two good athletes at one position, you should play them both."

That is what the Salem coach plans to do at nearly every position. Four players — Mickey Madsen (5-9, 150), Ken Harmon (6-foot, 170), Jeff Arnold (5-10, 160) and Dave Bunch (5-9, 175) — will share the two halfback spots. Madsen is a senior, the others are juniors.

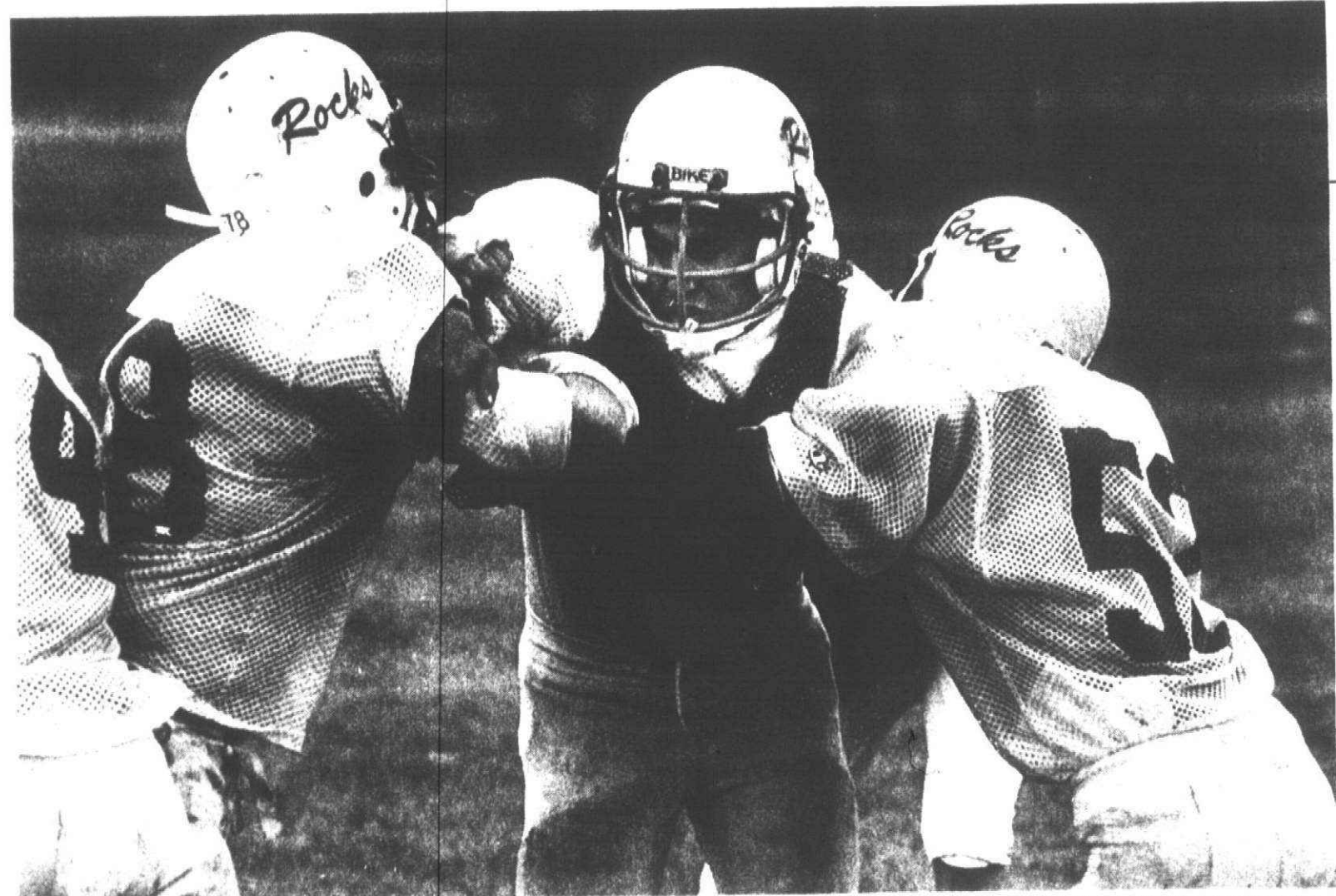
Junior Scott Jurek (6-1, 200) and senior Jim Sinclair (6-foot, 195) will both play fullback.

THE RECEIVING corps is led by senior tight end Dave Houle (6-4, 210),

who Moshimer calls "a major college prospect". Senior Tom Schmidt (5-10, 155) is slated to start at split end and senior Matt Broderick (6-foot, 185) will see action at both the split and tight receiver posts.

Six Rocks will rotate in four of the line positions. Mike Moshimer (6-1, 200), a senior, and Chris Hymes (6-foot, 210), a junior, are guards. Tom Walkley (6-foot, 195), a senior, and Dave Slavin (6-foot, 210), a senior, are the tackles. Seniors Ron Calhoun (6-foot, 190) and Bill Skinner (5-11, 180) will rotate at both positions.

Senior Keith Urban (6-3, 210) is slated to play center. Urban and Slavin are team co-captains.

The offense will again center around the familiar run-oriented option, but Moshimer added that the forward pass could be a more frequently used weapon because "the quarterbacks are better passers, coupled with better receivers. We didn't graduate anybody (from the receiving corps)."

THE DEFENSE is nearly as solid, with the possible exception of the backfield. "We're not as deep there, maybe," Moshimer said.

Arnold and Madsen will share one cornerback spot and Mark Tindall (5-10, 170) will handle the other. Haut is set to play free safety, depending on how much action he sees at quarterback. Broderick starts at strong safety.

The defensive linemen include Walkley at nose guard, Calhoun and Hymes at tackle and Jurek at one defensive end spot. Houle and Urban will rotate at the other defensive end position.

Pressuring the starting linemen are the Stanton brothers, Mark (5-7, 160) and Dan (5-9, 155). "They're small, but quick and are real hitters," Moshimer said. "They have lots of character."

Slavin and Sinclair are slated to start at linebacker, with Harmon also getting in some playing time.

EVEN THE KICKING units have depth. Madsen, Harmon and Slavin are all capable punters and Madsen and Sinclair are adequate placekickers.

The schedule "is rocky," Moshimer said, starting with the opener against North Farmington. Salem meets Plymouth Canton for the first time ever in its second game.

Moshimer isn't worried about Canton yet. "We're pointing to North Farmington first," he said. As well he should. North is the defending Northwest Suburban League co-champion and a perennial football power.

But so is Salem. The WLAA playoffs are still a ways off, but it's not hard to envision the Rocks rolling to the top berth.

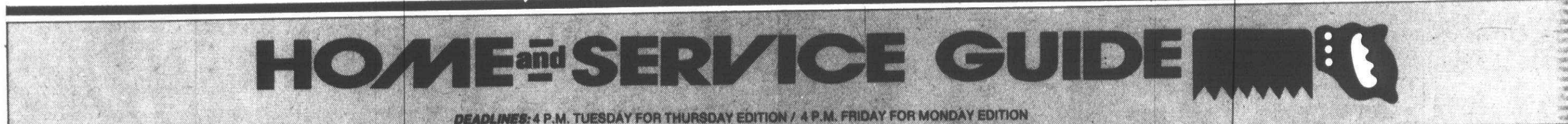

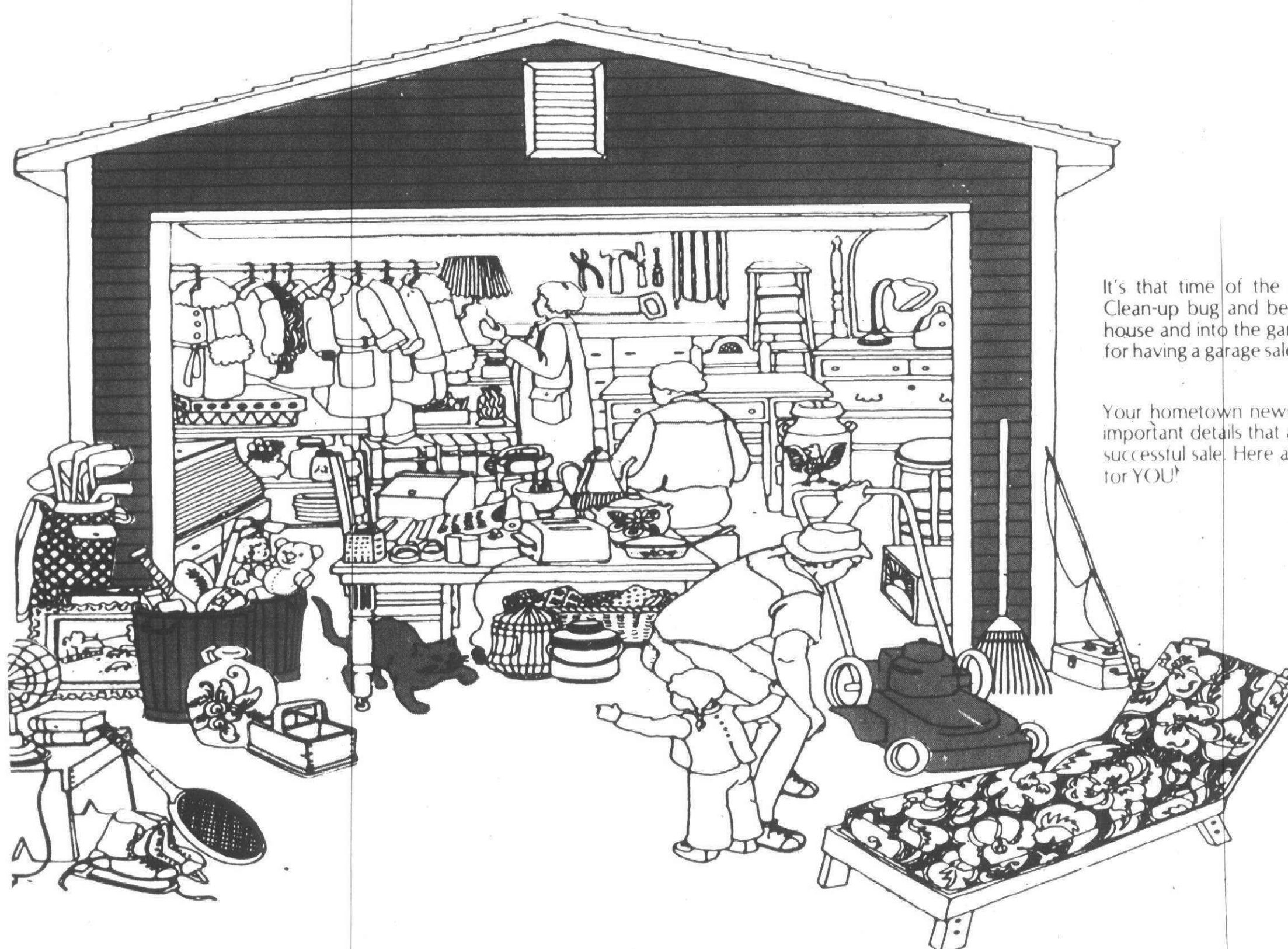

Let's team up for a successful garage sale



It's that time of the year again when you get that Clean-up bug and begin tossing unwanted items out of the house and into the garage. Into the garage! What a good idea for having a garage sale since they're out there anyway!"

Your hometown newspaper can help you to organize some important details that are necessary in having a profitable and successful sale. Here are a few timely tips we've put together for YOU!

WHAT TO SELL:

Anything that still has usability and some value is a good garage sale item. Search both high and low, you'd be surprised at how many articles you will have; old furniture, toys, musical instruments, sewing machines, garden tools and the like.

ADVERTISING:

Obviously the best way to advertise your sales is in the Observer & Eccentric classified advertising section. These ads are read avidly by people looking for bargains. Your ad can be fairly short and still effective by listing the most appealing items separately and then grouping others in categories, such as furniture, clothes, toys, antiques, etc. Of course you will want to place signs in and around the neighborhood – possibly in schools, supermarkets, beauty shops, etc.

PRICING:

Start by listing all items by category on an inventory sheet.

Antiques for example, should be listed separately from other items. Clothing should be priced at approximately one-eighth the original cost. Any clothing ten to fifteen years old may have nostalgic appeal and can be priced slightly higher. It might even be placed in the antiques category.

Electrical appliances that work should bring one-fourth the original cost. Most prices on articles will be influenced by their condition.

You might want to try color coding your items for easy price recognition.

DOUBLE SALE

Many people have found it worthwhile to combine their garage sale with that of a friend or neighbor. This saves money on costs of advertising and provides a helpful hand in arranging items, pricing them, dealing with customers, besides providing welcome companionship.

Don't forget to keep separate inventories and different price color coding. Another advantage is a more impressive array of merchandise.

LENGTH OF SALE:

The most productive sales are those that run at least three days. Tests have revealed that Thursday is the best day to advertise, the logical start of a sale would be Friday. This gives you the entire weekend in which to conduct your business.

After a day or two the word will get around and supplement your advertising efforts.

When the most attractive items are gone, you may wish to reconsider and change prices on those articles which have been slow to move.

SETTING UP YOUR SALE

A few days before your sale go to the bank and get plenty of small bills and various size coins. Set up a headquarters table, here you will keep your change, your adding machine, your inventory lists. Always have someone in attendance. You may want to set up a hat and coat rack and a mirror for use by those who may want to try on garments. Arrange sale items in neat rows and allow plenty of walking room between displays.

"Without people care, something is going to have a premature failure."

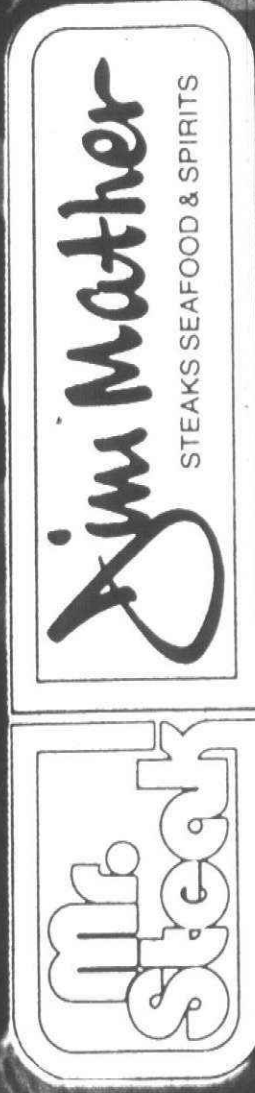

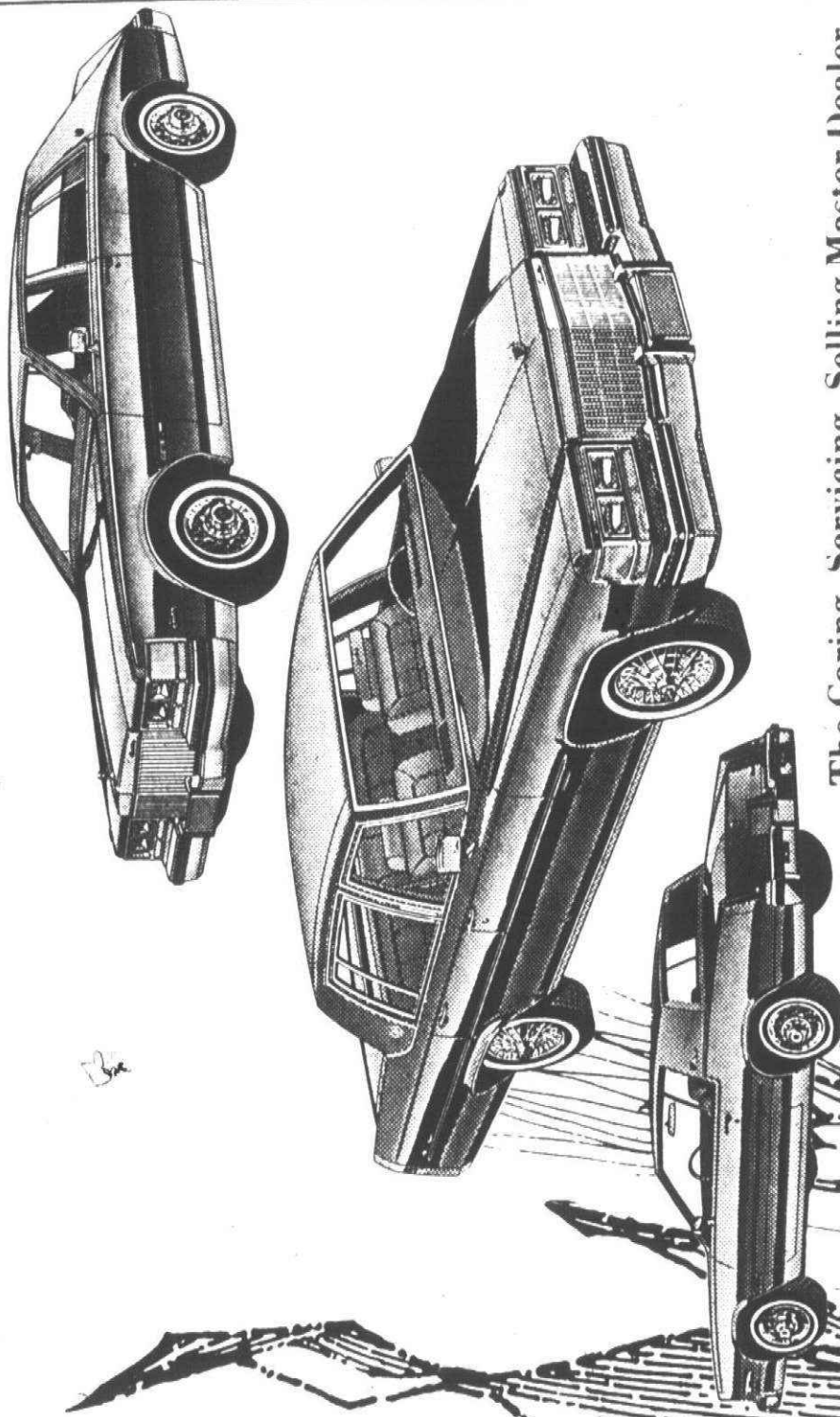

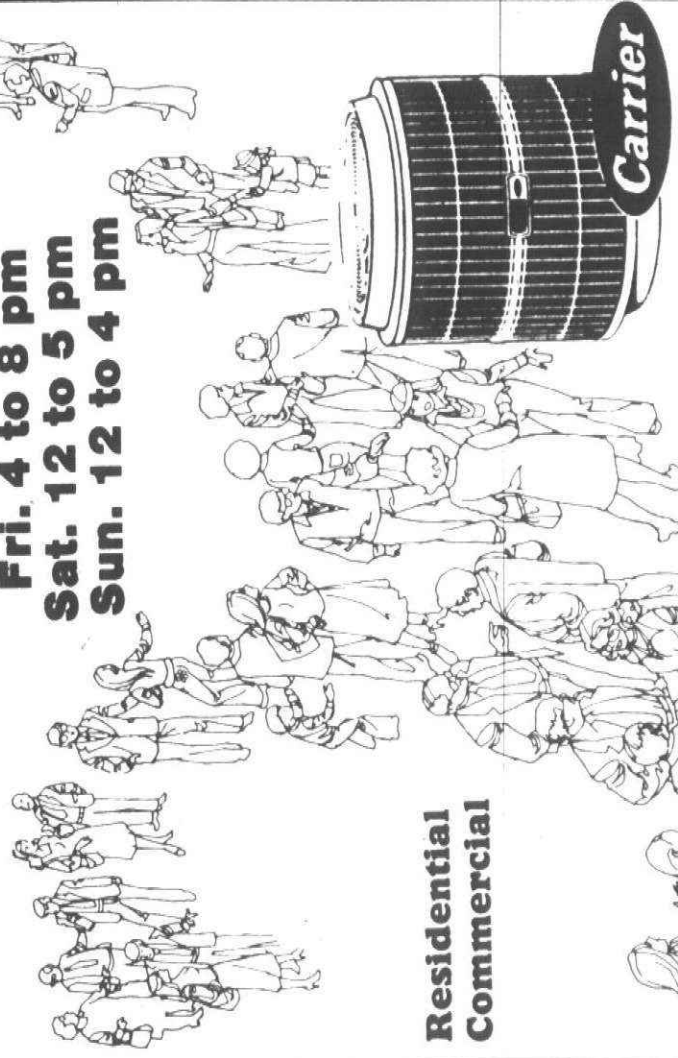

How to get to Festival

Many of the Fall Festival activities are in Kellogg Park and along Penman Avenue in downtown Plymouth.

For out-of-towners, Kellogg Park is downtown in the city of Plymouth at Ann Arbor Trail and Main. Penman Avenue is a one-way street from Main to Harvey west of Main.

Routes to Kellogg Park and Main include: From I-275 south of Ann Arbor Road, west to Main Street, and north on Main to the park; Plymouth Road west to Mill where Plymouth Road is renamed Main Street and changes directions from east/west to north/south; Ann Arbor Trail west to the heart of the downtown area; M-14 to Sheldon Road exit, west on Shel-

don to Ann Arbor Trail and east on the Trail to Main.

Central Middle School is at Church and Main near City Hall, two traffic signals north of Penman Avenue (easily within walking distance of Kellogg Park).

Cultural Center is at Theodore and Farmer and is easily accessible by taking Main Street to Theodore, which intersects Main at the C&O Railroad tracks.

The Grange Hall is on Union Street near the northeast corner of Kellogg Park. Parking areas include: Lot at Cultural Center at Harvey and Theodore; East Central Lot between Church and Penman Avenue, Union and Main; the Central Lot between Ann Arbor Trail and Penman, Main and Harvey.



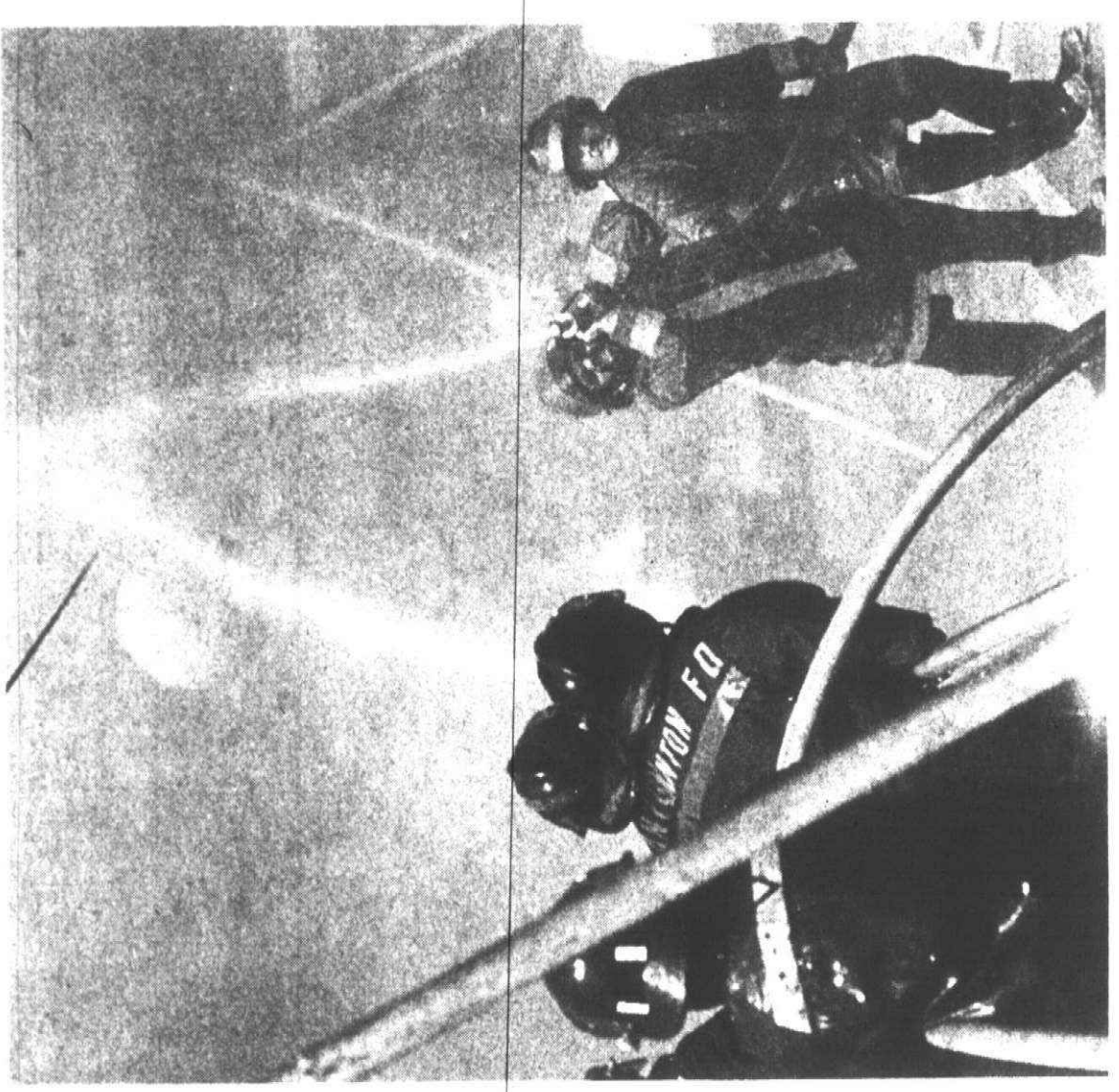



The show is open to kids through junior high age.

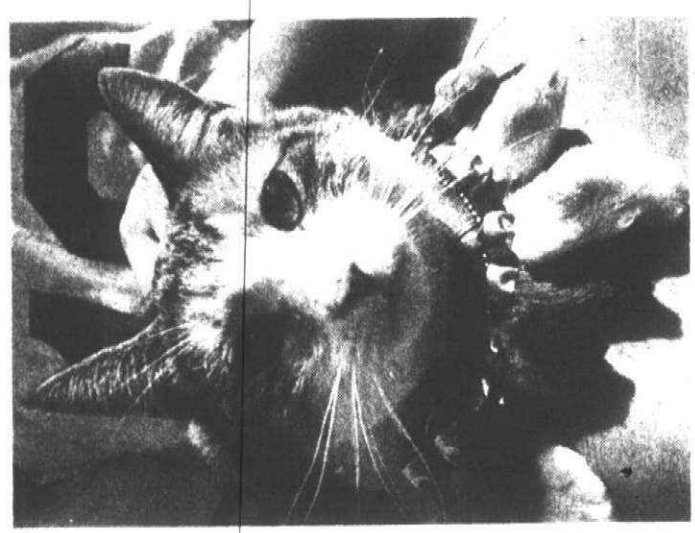
"We don't want high school students or adults," added Childs. "We are not looking for the best trained or the best groomed — we just want the kids to have fun."



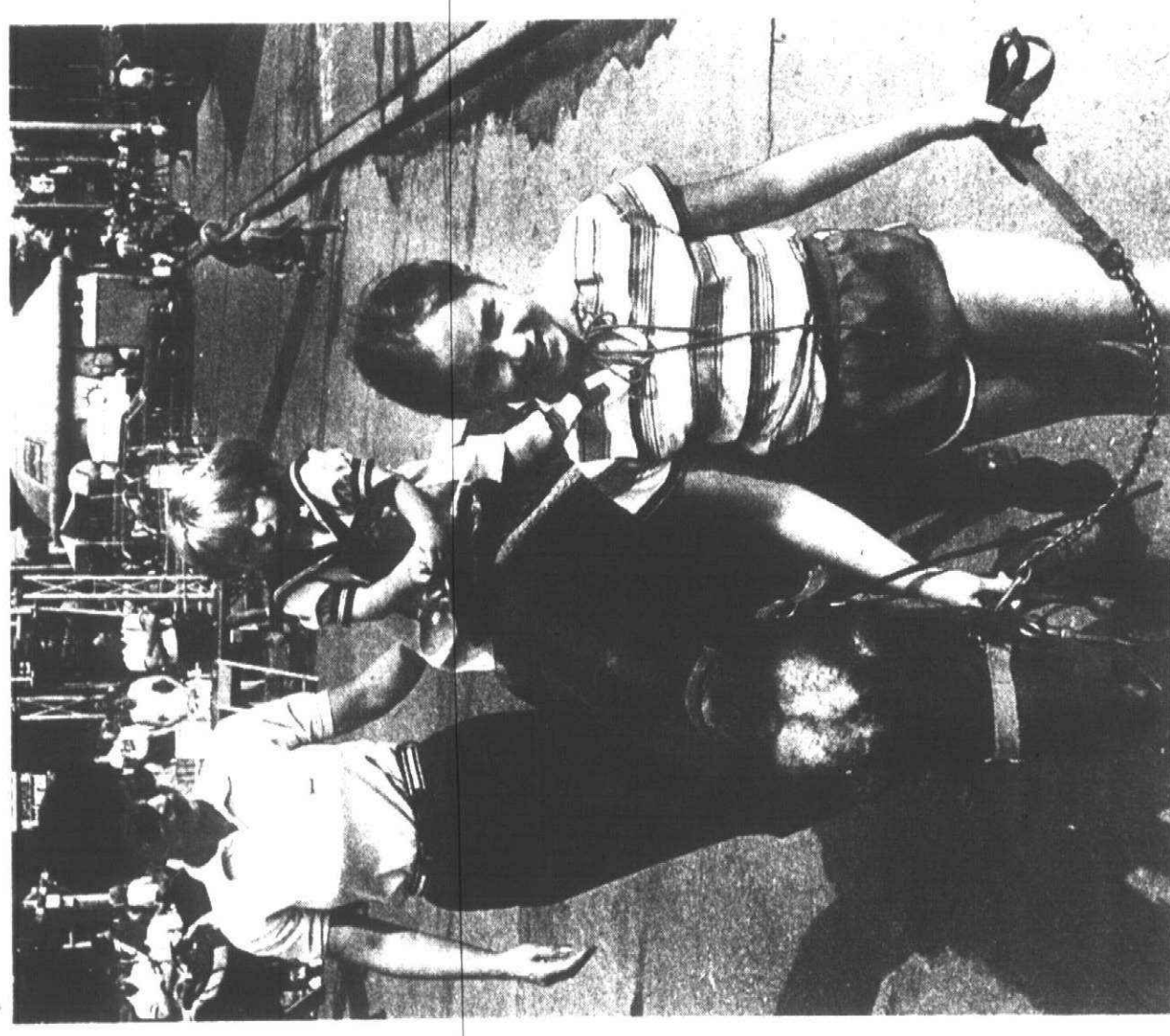

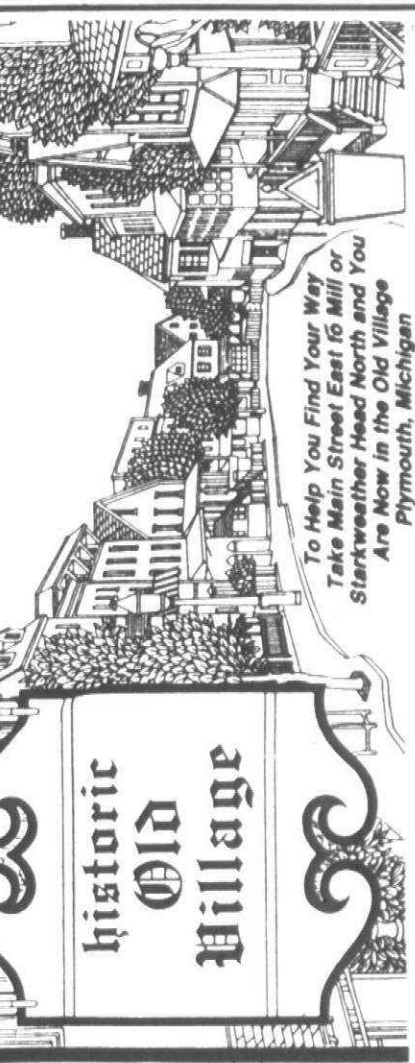

Rotarians raise sights for chicken dinner

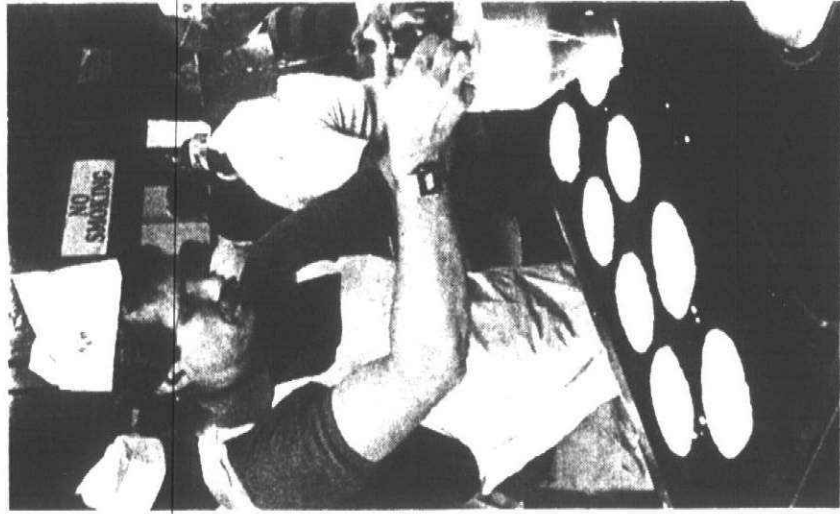
Although it offers the biggest chicken barbecue in the state of Michigan, the Plymouth Rotary Club is seeking a much higher goal for the major event of the Fall Festival.

If plans succeed, the Sunday event will be listed in the Guinness Book of World Records and thus receive worldwide recognition.

No chicken barbecue in the country comes near selling 15,000 dinners in only six hours, according to a preliminary survey.

That's the schedule arranged for this season with the serving of the meals — \$4 each — starting at noon and going on through the afternoon until 6 p.m.

Club members are optimistic because they have devised a plan for the carry-out dinners. With the speedier plan, the carry-out area at Sheldon and Ann Arbor roads

Clogging is an ethnic dance that came from Ireland, England and Scotland with the settlers and was blended into what it is today. The jig is one variation of clogging.

But clogging won't be the only type of dancing entertainment available at the festival, however. There will be the traditional square dancers with Ron Seime calling.

The square dancers will perform at 8:15 p.m. Friday, Sept. 10. People from the audience are welcome to come and swing their partners along with the dancers.

THE GOAL of 15,000 dinners was expected to be reached last year, but rain interfered, and the total was cut considerably. Now, with the barbecue under the new roof, a defense has been built against the weather, and the 15,000 goal is possible.

The club has ordered 15,000 dinners, said James Somers, who handled the purchase of the meals.

The extra 2,000 ears of corn are to accommodate diners who want an extra cob and for people who come just for the corn portion of the dinner late in the afternoon.

Along with the order for chickens and corn, 15,000 buns have been ordered.

If the club sells enough chicken barbecues, it has a shot at world fame.

Kiwanians move pancakes outdoors

For the first time since the inception of the Fall Festival, the Plymouth Kiwanis Club will sell pancakes in the outdoors.

Under the new plan, the pancakes will be prepared under the roof of the pavilion between the Penn Theatre and the Masonic Temple, instead of being cooked inside the Masonic Temple.

With the move, the Kiwanians hope to double the sale from about 2,500-5,000, despite the 2 p.m. Saturday of the pancake feast.

Additional electric power now is available under the roof of the pavilion, and six new electric stoves will be added.

When the temple was used, the sales were limited because space and cooking equipment were limited. With the added room and the new stoves, there should be little wait for pancakes.

PANCAKES WILL go on sale at 7 a.m. Saturday. The 2 p.m. end of sales isn't expected.

Theatre Guild opens fest feast

In its new role of ushering in the dining portion of the Plymouth Fall Festival, the Plymouth Theatre Guild plans a real treat for the diners.

The drama group will serve ham, German potato salad and all the trimmings — at \$3.50 each — for the Thursday meal.

The guild moved into the scene when the Colonial Kiwanis Club withdrew because of the high cost of roast beef.

The ham will be prepared, along with other portions of the meal, under the roof of the new pavilion. Tables will be set up in Kellogg Park and under the pavilion.

The dinner is the second major change in the area, again will be in charge.

With Moore will be veterans, including former mayor James Houk, the oldest of the lot. The other oldtimers will be former mayor James McKeon, Bryan Gilson and Leo Schultz. Oldtimer waiters will include Bud Schrader, the retired funeral director, and Bob Barbour of the National Bank of Detroit.

When the BPW found it difficult to maintain its German Night opening, the Thursday meal was taken over by the Colonial Kiwanis Club, which started with Italian Night and featured spaghetti.

Now with the withdrawal of the Colonial Kiwanis, the Theatre Guild takes over. It will begin serving the ham dinner beginning at noon Thursday.

Switch for JCs economical

The Jaycee Fall Festival Dinner rib dinner has become a victim of these tough economic times. Instead of ribs, the annual Saturday-night feast will be a dinner sausage on a bun, corn on the cob, cole-slaw, chips, dessert and beverage.

"The ribs alone were almost double last year's price," said Paul Foster, chairman of the Jaycee Dinner Committee. "The price would have been \$6 per dinner, and that would cost the average family of four \$24."

"We've noticed steadily decreasing sales and profit over the last four years," said Tim Sullivan, Plymouth Jaycee president, and member of the Jaycee Fall Festival Dinner Committee. "We would have to pass the cost onto the consumer, and in this region's economic state we couldn't justify selling a dinner at more than \$5 per person."

The Jaycees plan to sell 2,500 dinners this year. Dinners will be sold from the Plymouth Gathering (between the Penn Theatre and Masonic Temple), and diners will be able to chow down in Kellogg Park.

The sausages are from Spartan Distribution Center in Plymouth. Cost for the dinner is \$3 in advance and for senior citizens, and \$3.50 the day of the event.

Proceeds from the dinner will go to the Leukemia Foundation and to community service programs.

Dinner tickets can be purchased in advance from Plymouth Glass, 1382 S. Main.

Lions seek record for fish fry sales

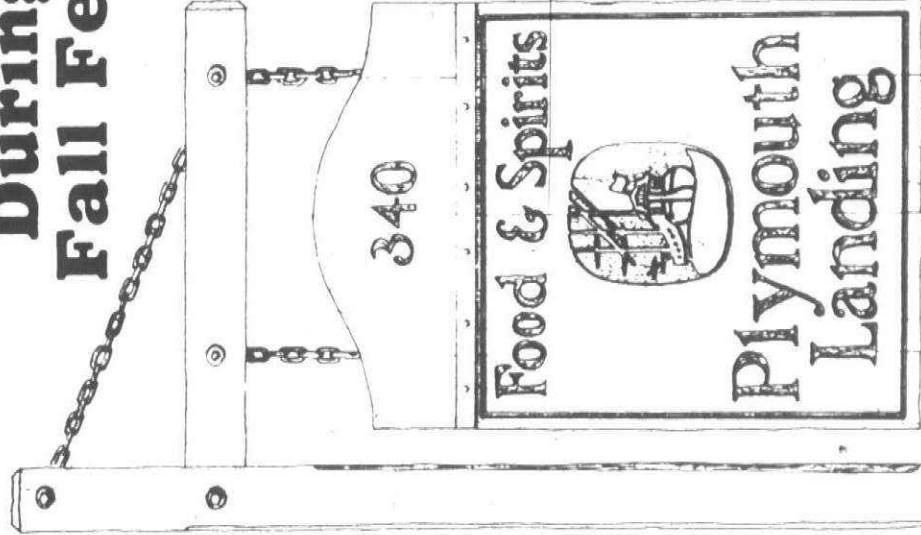

The preparation of the meal will be done in the new pavilion starting at noon. Prices are \$4 for a dinner, with senior citizens paying \$3.

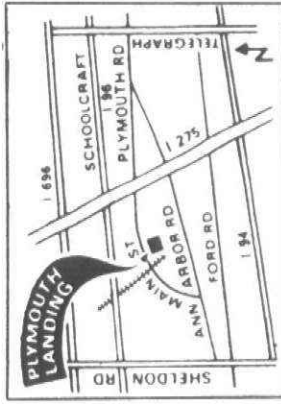
