Officials say racial bias plays no role in police department

When 33-year-old
Hussein Hojeije was dismissed more than a year
ago from duty with the
Canton Police Department,
he filed a complaint claiming ethnic discrimination.
Though the details of the
suit, filed in May, still need
to be worked out at trial,
Hojeije's statements that
the department lacks diversity are documented in
black and white.

It's part of the nature of law enforcement, particularly in the suburbs, that non-urban police departments are mainly staffed by men, and white men in particular, according to Canton Public Safety Director John Santomauro. Canton's department is no different of the sworn officers, approximately 10 percent are women, and there are no minority officers. But that is not indicative of personal or institutional racism in the department,

Santomauro said.

"It really is a reflection of what type of applicants we get when we have a vacancy" Santomauro said.

cy," Santomauro said.

"It's impossible for us to tell if an applicant in any department, not just public safety, is a minority," according to Township Supervisor Tom Yack. "We don't even want people to send us their photographs

when they apply for a job, because we believe race and ethnic background should have no part in the hiring process."

The police department hires only applicants who are either certified officers or candidates who have the ability to become certified (generally those officers that are in the process of completing academy training prior to application in Canton), Santomauro said.

"What we look for, and what we recruit, are officers who are already certified. What we don't do is implement a quota or affirmative action policy. We just want qualified candidates," he said.

Even if the department had an affirmative action policy, it would mean the hiring of negligible numbers of minority applicants. According to the 2000 census, 85 percent of the township's population were identified as white, non-Hispanic.

"There is a small, though growing, Asian population in Canton, but we just don't get applications from them because it's more common for them to be interested in other professions than law enforcement," Santomauro said. Canton's Asian population during the 2000 census was 8.7 percent, and just 4.5 percent of Canton

Leadership Canton looking for best and brightest

Family mission

Three generations of dentists follow calling, strive for perfection

It's one thing to walk in another man's footsteps, but quite another to fill his shoes. Two generations of Robison men have been trying to do

John Robison and his son, J.D. Robison, who own Robison Dental Group in Canton, have each followed the professional and personal path of their father and grandfather, Jack Robison, who had a dental practice for some four decades in Plymouth and Canton.

Since John Robison graduated from dental school and joined his father's practice in 1975, he's tried not only to be the doctor his father was, but also has striven to be the same

kind of man. "Everyone knew Jack Robison," John said. The eldest Robison opened his prac-

tice in the 1930s in Plymouth, on Penniman Ave., where the Plymouth Coffee Bean is now. Jack retired from practice in 1980 and died in 2000, but his son and grandson say they never forget the lessons about dentistry and humanity they learned from him.

"I knew when I was 10 years old I was going to be a dentist," John said, pausing to take a breath, fearing he would cry. "I admired my dad so much, I wanted to be just like him. He was there not for himself, period. He was there for his patients."

John recalled many nights and weekends when his father would without complaint or question leave the house to see a patient with an emergency.

"He literally did everything perfect. He never did anything wrong because he always had the right reason for doing it," John said.

J.D., who joined the practice last month after graduating from University of Detroit-Mercy Dental School, wasn't as sure about dentistry as his father was. He enrolled in college to study engineering but it only took about one semester before he changed his mind

and his major. "My dad tried to talk me out of being a dentist, just to be sure I wasn't doing it just because he and my grandfather were dentists," he said.

Even if he weren't family, John would have hired his son in a heartbeat, and he's now not only J.D.'s father, but his patient.

"My opinion is that he can exceed me," John said of his son. "The good thing is he's avoided the 'I have to learn everything myself' trap. While he questions everything, he doesn't feel like he has to learn it all on his own.

Instead, he can build on all the blocks I've collected."

Though John said their personalities are different (J.D. is more like his grandfather than his father), the two doctors share a passion for treating patients, see the value of dentistry as part of their patients' overall health, and a strong tendency toward perfection-

"I want to spread the mission we've established, and build on it for the future," John said. "J.D. is the perfect person

residents are African-American.

NO MINORITIES

The department employs 64 officers and 15 command officers, none of whom are identified as ethnic minorities. Seven officers, one sergeant and one of the department's two deputy chiefs are women. However, of the department's 32 civilian employees (15 public safety service officers and 16 clerical workers) more than half are women and minorities - 22 are women and three are minorities, according to the department's human resources statis-

Never before has an employee of the department filed an ethnic discrimination suit against the Canton police, nor has there ever been a complaint of discriminatory hiring practices. The department has never had a valid suit brought against it from the public at large. Since 2000, there have been 38 racial profiling complaints against the Canton Police Department, all of which were unfounded, according to department

Hojeije, a Dearborn resident, was born in Lebanon and is Muslim. He became an American citizen in 1986. He had worked as a police officer in Detroit, and was hired by the Canton Police Department in March of 2004. Hojeije was fired on June 1, 2004, at the end of his probationary period, according to Andrew Baran of the law firm Cox, Hodgeman and Giamarco, which represented the township after Hojeije filed a complaint with the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC).

Since 1998, five newly hired officers failed to make it successfully through Canton Police Department field train-

'REASONABLE CAUSE'

According to police department documents, during the internal investigation, Hojeije said he didn't think he was receiving proper training or help to improve because of his ethnic background. He stated he wasn't sure if the department's lack of ethnic diversity was a factor, but did feel he had been treated differently than other officers in training.

Hojeije filed a complaint with the EEOC, which deter-

mined that "there is a reasonable cause to believe that (Hojeije's) allegations are true."

But Canton officials aren't sure how the EEOC made such a determination, since no one with the commission had interviewed any Canton officers, and attorney Ronald Acho has filed a complaint against the EEOC on behalf of the township, claiming that the "investigation that was conducted was biased and superfi-

In the meantime Hojeije's complaint is being investigated by the U.S.

Department of Justice, and he's also filed a suit in Wayne County Circuit Court because the statute of limitations on the original complaint will expire on June 1. Hojeije still has not found full-time work, according to his attorney. Shareef Akeel.

"Certainly one of the things we're looking into is the lack of diversity in the department. The EEOC made a specific finding. This is an independent body that made a finding that Mr. Hojeije's complaints were true. They deserve scrutinizing," Akeel said.

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District maintains program by tapping into reserve funds

The Wayne-Westland Community Schools district will spend more money than it takes in during fiscal 2005-06 to continue offering students a full educational program.

The school board Monday evening approved the district's new budget which anticipates revenues of \$113.07 million, about the same as last year, and expenditures of \$118.6 million. The \$5.5 million shortfall will be made up from the district's reserves, taking the fund down to \$10.6 million.

Gary Martin, deputy superintendent for business, said the district could be in the position of having to borrow money next year, if the state continues to underfund education.

"That's what the state did when it had a \$1 billion balance," Martin said. "It ran the rainy day fund dry and now they have to find a way to fill the holes."

STATE AID

The district anticipates receiving \$85.5 million from the state, reflecting the governor's proposed \$7,571 in per pupil state school aid. That's up from \$7,396 it has received the past three years.

But it does not include the additional \$50 per high school student the governor had proposed. That was stripped from the budget when district officials began hearing "rumblings" that it would not be included in the state school aid proposal, Martin said.

The district also expects to generate \$21.4 million in local non-homestead property taxes, with \$5.8 million coming from other revenue sources like the federal government. "We have no way to generate

more money," Martin said. "They (the state) control the purse strings without a doubt." A lion's share of the money

goes into the classroom.

Salaries will cost \$72.9 million, up marginally from 2004-05. Benefits, however will be increase to \$32.8 million, up almost \$3 million over last

The district will shell out more for in retirement costs. The rate will jump to 16.34 percent, and a double digit increase in health and benefit insurance rates is expected, but that blow will be softened by the lower health care costs the district has been able to negotiate with employee groups.

HEALTH COSTS

"Health care is the only piece we can have some control over" said Martin. "That's why we negotiated so hard with employees. We'd like to have better, but we can't afford it. Eighty-nine percent of our expenditures are salaries and benefits."

Martin also expects the cost of utilities to remain about the same as last year. The district purchases its electricity and natural gas as part of a cooperative and is able "to save pretty good money," Martin said.

As in previous budgets, the district is continuing its cost containment, trimming \$4.1 million in purchased services. Purchased services and supplies will be \$12.9 million, down \$3.1 million from last

That's the area where the

district has been able to trim expenses without cutting classroom programs and means no new school buses purchased in 2005-06.

School buses should be replaced every seven-eight years, and given the condition of the fleet which received 100 percent on its recent state inspection, Martin estimates the district can forego such purchases for a few years.

But that could set the district up for some larger expenses down the road, he said.

"We've been in cost containment since the early 1990s, this district learned to scale back early on," he said. "We were prepared for this, but we expected to cut a couple a million a year not \$5 million.

"We're lucky we had a cushion and didn't have to do a knee jerk reaction."

The budget also includes a projected loss of 200 students, with a blended student count of 13,737 in 2005-06. The 200 students is about what the district has averaged the last few years, although 2004-05 the actual number was less than expected.

Declining enrollment also means some teacher layoffs about 12 - according to Martin.

"We do what we can with the resources we have," said Martin. "We've not cut any programs and that should be an attractive commodity. We have a good range of housing to attract families."


Martin praised the school board for its wisdom to build up the district's reserves to more than \$20 million.

"The hits have been much worse than we ever dreamed," he said. "We were reading reports. We knew health care was going up. We anticipated a lot of stuff. We do five-year forecasts. We had a pretty good idea, but nothing like this. It's four years of disaster."



Local artists take a seat in street bench program

There are pop art automobiles displayed on the streets of downtown Detroit.

There were artfully designed Cows on Parade several years ago that lined the sidewalks in Chicago.

Not to be outdone, on June 24 Plymouth will have street art of its own in the form of 31 custom painted benches that will line the streets of the Plymouth community, as well as storefronts of local businesses.

We've got some great artists with some very cool designs," said Sheila Paton of Plymouth Newcomers & Neighbors, which is co-sponsoring BenchART.plymouth with the Plymouth Community Arts Council. "We've got interior decorators, a furniture painter and many fine artists coming together on this project.

"Plymouth Township has been labeled a hot town, and Plymouth is a cool city," she said. "It's a good fit for the Plymouth area, and is a great thing to get people to come to the area."

The benches, which are both adult and children's sizes, will be designed and created by local artists and displayed throughout the community this summer before being auctioned Sept. 23 at the Plymouth Cultural Center.

"Half of the proceeds will go to the Plymouth Community Arts Council, with the other half to be divided between Plymouth and Plymouth Township to be earmarked for beautification projects," added Paton, who noted each Amish poplar wood bench has a \$450 sponsorship to allow for all the auction proceeds to be

Paton, who organized a similar project when she lived in the Cleveland area, said some of the highly sought benches auctioned for \$1,500, with the average about \$700.

Laura (Lu) Autrey, 42, of Plymouth Township is a professional artist who will have two benches on display. Autrey entitled the adult bench, which also converts to a table, Reef Party.

"It's a festive undersea theme," Autrey said. "It has a desire to be put somewhere by a backyard

Autrey said the children's bench is dubbed Lady Bug Picnic, which looks like "a picnic blanket morphed out of shape with giant, oversized watermelon. slices and huge ladybugs crawling all over it."

Autrey said creating the bench art gave her a chance to get the creative (right) side of her brain inspired.

"Sometimes I walk into a store and see a design and store it in my head," Autrey said. "Sometimes I just dream ideas in the twilight of sleep."

Jeremy Rheault, 33, of Westland – who grew up in Plymouth Township's Lakepointe subdivision - is excited about having his artwork displayed in his hometown.

An art teacher at Franklin High School in Livonia, Rheault is attempting to do what he tells his students.

"I teach being creative with a found object, with different materials and multiple surfaces," said Rheault. "The bench was a creative surface because of the planes of the bench. It wasn't a daunting challenge, but an interesting surface to work on."

As for Rheault's landscape

"Imagine standing on a rocky cliff looking up at a lighthouse with a skyline background on the back of the bench, then looking down on the seated portion of the, bench, which is a reflection of the lighthouse in a puddle of water," said Rheault. "I've been working on it in class, and allow my students to watch and critique me. I critique them all day, so this is their shot at me."

Rheault said he likes to use a lot of bright and contrasting col-



voters filling in ovals with a marker, replacing the current touch-screen voting.

Massengill received 18 new voting machines to replace the 22 purchased by the township in 1995. That means she'll have to put in a request to the township board to buy backup machines, which cost upwards of \$5,000 apiece.

"They basically said we don't care if you have \$300,000 tied up in equipment, this is what you're going to use," Massengill said. "Our equipment had recently been upgraded and would have been good for many, many years. I don't know what we'll do with it. Maybe it will go to the nearest dump."

Bennett said voters in Canton shouldn't be confused at all when the new equipment is used, as residents have already been filling in an oval to vote for candidates.

"The new machines are more voter friendly," said Bennett. "The screen is larger and more clear. And, the ballot will be rejected if you make an error. However, if you choose not to correct the ballot, voters can push a button and their ballot will be accepted."

Bennett said she received 50 new machines to replace the 50 the township owns, but plans on putting in requests for additional machines in the 2006 budget.

"We'll have to buy additional equipment to manage the growth in the community," she said.

Canton Township bought its current voting machines in 2000 for just less than

\$300,000.

"The software equipment has been updated to meet state requirements," said Bennett.

"They probably would have been good for another 10 years,

Bennett has already made the decision not to use the new equipment in the August election

"It's just too close to August to get everybody comfortable with the training," she said.
"It's yet to be seen if we'll use them in November. We may not use them until the first election in 2006."

Plymouth Clerk Linda
Langmesser believes Wayne
County officials, who had the
latitude in selecting machines
and a vendor for all the local
communities, made a bad
choice,

"I don't think these were the best to pick," said Langmesser, "I've had dealings with the company that sold us the equipment, and their service isn't the best."

Langmesser said despite Wayne County's insistence the machines be used in August, she'll wait until either the November elections, or possibly next year, to introduce the new machines to Plymouth voters.

"I've got a lot of regular election workers on vacation, so it makes it tough to get them all trained," she said.

As for her soon-to-be-out-

dated equipment,
Langmesser said it could be
as useful as an old computer.

"The Michigan Clerks
Association is researching to
find a use for the old optical
scan equipment," Langmesser
said. "If they can't come up
with anything, the machines
will just be scrapped."

Voters in Plymouth will find a minor change when the new equipment is introduced. Instead of connecting an arrow to cast a voter, residents will fill in the oval.

The Gillis Electric Co. has left its mark inside buildings all over metro Detroit for 50 years.

This year, the Livonia-based business is celebrating its golden anniversary as an enterprise that's installed electrical systems and wires at schools, churches, hospitals and shopping centers.


Today, the company is a second-generation family business with 70 union electricians and 14 office staff who are head-quartered at a building on Schoolcraft near Stark, the company's home since 1973. It has come a long way from its humble roots when John and Margaret Gillis created the business in 1955 and solely operated it for five years from their Livonia home.

The company has evolved into an operation that grossed \$18 million in 2004. Gillis Electric's recent major projects include new high schools in Novi, Woodhaven and Oxford, the Macomb County Jail and Pontiac's St. Joseph Mercy Hospital.

John Gillis' vision five decades ago to start a business that centered on larger buildings came after several frustrating years as an electrical contractor when he countered frequent layoffs, permitting issues and monotonous jobs wiring new houses.

"I wanted to go into industrial and commercial work because it was more interesting," said Gillis, 87, who has lived in Livonia since 1952. "Working on houses was too much like an assembly line."

He started his career an electrician shortly after his discharge from the Royal Canadian Air Force. He used the radio experi-

ence and determination he developed during his 4 1/2 years in the Canadian military.

The Nova Scotia native flew in battle aircraft in the European theater in World War II. During one mission in September 1943, his plane crashed into the sea off the northern English shore. One of his crewmates died in the crash, but he was among three survivors rescued by fishermen.

He left the Royal Canadian
Air Force in December 1945
and came to the DetroitWindsor area in search of work
and to reconnect with his sister, Helen, living in the area.
Through his sister, he met
Margaret, and the couple were
married a short time later.
Gillis had some electrical expe-

rience with his radio training in the military. He enhanced his skills by working at Ford Motor Co. in Detroit and attending a construction school in Windsor. The instability as an electrical contractor, however, moved Gillis to start his own operation.

"I was between a rock and a hard place," Gillis said. "I had a place to pay for, with five kids." He borrowed \$700, enrolled

his wife in a bookkeeping course and started the electric company. He relied on honesty, hard work and a focus on customer service, he said, to land jobs wiring schools, churches and municipal buildings, including the YMCA and the two city ice arenas in Livonia.

By 1960, his business grew to a point he hired help to take on a bigger workload. Gillis said his company became successful because, "we weren't of afraid to hire people who were't smarter than we were," he

Diane Semanski, controller at Gillis Electric for seven years, will vouch for the company founder's honesty, encouragement and kindness.

"His integrity and honesty has always been so important to him," she said. "I've worked for other companies. When he sells \$20 worth of scrap, most business owners would just put the money in their pocket, but not Mr. Gillis. He reports every penny and does it by the book."

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Michigan school funding needs a 'SEA-change'

orrowing a well-known rallying cry from our beloved Detroit Red Wings, it's time to - "Get Your Red On!"

Con Tuesday, June 21, a virtual Red Sea of thousands of parents, grandparents, school employees and community members from across the state will inundate Lansing to demand a sea-change in the chronic underfunding of public education, pre K-16. The school kids of today deserve Stable, Equitable and Adequate funding – a "SEA-change" from the current fairy-tale system which has been underfunded from day one.

Let's Since the state took over the funding of local public schools 11 years ago, state government has systematically broken its promise to fully fund public schools and has brought the opera-

tion of most of its school districts to the brink of crisis. A
June 2004 report by the
Senate Fiscal Agency disclosed that only 28 out of 555
districts were better off today
under state financial control.
Nationally, Michigan has
slipped from sixth place in
per pupil funding to 16th.

tion grant for the 2005-06 budget year plus \$65 per middle school student to promote accelerated math and science sounds like legislators are beginning to "walk the talk."

superficial promise of \$175 more per student (absent the governor's additional \$50 for high school students) and read the fine print, you will discover that most schools will receive LESS funding from the state next year. The legislature plans to cut at-risk monies, funds for developmental kindergartens and the "20 J" funds for over half of the 51 hold-harmless districts. This political "shell game" will effectively put most districts back into the hole.

Term-limited legislators have taken a walk on public school funding. Over \$369 million has been cut from K-12, \$157 million from universities and \$35.5 million from community colleges in the past few years. Per pupil foundation grants for K-12 remained flat for three years and the state cut the promised grants in mid-year for the past two years.

School officials were left to scramble and scrape by in the middle of a school year when programs and personnel were already in place. Some made withdrawals from their everdiminishing fund reserves while others had to make more painful cuts or borrow money to keep the lights on, the buses running and the students learning.

Evidence of school belt-tightening is statewide. Most districts have fewer adminis-

trators. Many share services with other districts, dial-down in the winter, make do with outdated textbooks, computers and equipment, etć. Some have restructured programs and entire schools, renegotiated health care costs, instituted pay-to-play and eliminated programs or busing to make ends meet.

Last year, more than 2,000 teachers lost their jobs as many school districts reluctantly had to increase their class size. Even more regrettable for Michigan is the loss of the talent pool of recent graduates of our schools of education. We are losing our best and brightest future teachers to other states and countries, such as China, because most school districts can't afford to hire new teachers.

The revenues received from the state might have been adequate in the simpler times of the past century, but they have not kept pace with the costly demands of a 21st century education. School districts have had to foot the bill for more stringent security measures put in place after Columbine and 9/11. A 21st century global economy meant that schools had to have increased technology hardware and software. Rising energy and health care costs, more state and federal mandates such as No Child Left Behind, and the addition of 200 charter schools to the roster of school districts have diminished each school's share of the funding pie.

As for retirement and health care costs, there were once ample dollars in a prefunded state health care account for school retirees before the former governor raided the fund to pay for one of his tax cuts in the early 1990s. Presently, if unsound investments by a hired third party manager of the state's school employees pension fund is the reason for the escalating percentage increases in retirement costs rolled back to school districts, then this is unconscionable and the state needs to correct this now.

The lack of a Stable, Equitable and Adequate method to fund learning is not the fault of current school employees or retirees. The buck stops in Lansing. Legislators and other leaders have known that the School Aid Fund has had a structural deficit for the past 11 years, but have chosen to use the Band-Aid approach to cover up rather than fix each yearly shortfall. The hemorrhaging from the School Aid Fund must be stopped now.

If you are beginning to "see red" and believe that we need a "SEA-change" – more Stable, Equitable, and Adequate funding for our public school students – then, "Get Your Red On!" June 21 and join us in "winging" our way to Lansing. Our kids can't wait.

from the pornography industry in the U.S. is greater than that from all professional baseball, football and basketball franchise combined, greater than the combined revenues from ABC, NBC and CBS. It that true? It would be difficult to prove, but somebody is buying all those videos and magazines.

So, no matter how vociferously some might argue otherwise, sex has become a part of who we are as a nation. Figuring that out is the easy part. Trying to figure out how, as reasonable adults in a free society, we can hope to temper this overwhelming message for the good of future generations is the hard part.

Maintaining a head-in-the-sand attitude toward honest sex education hasn't gotten us very good results. Too many teenagers still become pregnant, too many people spread sexually transmitted diseases and too many women and children become victims of abuse.

Look at it this way. Our schools require every student to study mathematics, although few will ever become economists or engineers. We mandate that all students learn geography, although most will never become a cartographer or naturalist.

But, despite the fact that virtually every student in every classroom in every school in every state will at one time or another have a sexual experience, how can it be that a sizable number of people in this country feel that sex education has no place in schools?

We owe it to our children to teach them that sex is not an image to be bought and sold, that it's not a way to happiness, that in and of itself won't make them richer or more popular. We need to show children that promiscuity is a dead end filled with unwanted consequences, despite the daily blizzard of information to the contrary.

A recent study published in Adolescent and Family Health magazine showed that remaining a virgin into adulthood can have quantifiable positive results in one's life. A team of physicians studied more than 7,000 men and women beginning in 1979 and following up 20 years later. The results showed that those who were virgins at the age of 18 had, on average, one year more of higher education; half the risk of divorce; annual income nearly 20 percent higher; and were half as likely to use welfare benefits.

It's that kind of information that should be distributed to every child across this land, along with real, useful knowledge about disease, pregnancy, contraception and the fulfillment that comes with being in a long-term, monogamous relationship.

Instead, we get Paris Hilton. Sometimes we get what we deserve.

Why was there no one to come down to his lane, offer some simple tips, and in general, show him a few of the simple basics to get him started in the right direction?

Could he have bowled better if he had a ball that fit his hand properly?

Bowling, as we know it, is a very enjoyable and satisfying pastime.

League bowling can be more fun yet, but this guy and millions just like him will never get to see that, unless a positive system is put in place.

It would be a real opportunity for the USBC to take charge and fire the silver bullet that will solve all of the problems of declining membership num-

They have already tried "Sport Condition Bowling," which provides a more difficult shot for those experts who need more of a challenge.

Harder conditions will never create more bowlers. We need to initiate a new system which will make it easy for people like Bob to come out to the lanes, get interested in the sport of bowling and eventually become a member of a USBC certified league along with thousands of other Bobs

who would find bowling a most pleasant and fun-filled pastime.

We need a networking system that will fulfill the needs of the entire bowling scene.

Let's call it the "Bowler's Club," to be operated as an affiliate of the USBC and its locals. Its purpose is to create new bowlers, many of whom will fill the ranks of bowling leagues everywhere.

Here's how the networking comes in.

Club members can open bowl at a reduced rate from the house, as seniors and youth bowlers usually do. The manufacturers then could offer specially designed balls for club members at a significantly lower price, perhaps \$50 or so.

The pro shop would fit and drill up the ball at a lower cost on a one-time deal. If you plant a few seeds and grow a garden, many of these people will become loval customers for years to come. These same consumers will develop into good bowlers who will ultimately enjoy the sport, join a league or two, and start buying

those high performance balls. The USBC and locals will make their presence felt by offering free or low cost coaching to anyone who participates in the program. The bowling centers would then offer a variety of casual league formats for club members only such as a

drop-in league, a short-season league, say eight weeks or so, anytime leagues, just bowl and

submit the scores. Each house would provide a weekly sheet with the names and averages. Having an average is very important, even to a

novice.

So what is your average? Of course you know it, but now our man Bob also knows his and is ready to try his hand a league play. And more leagues would have to be organized and set up, but making a lot of extra work for

somebody. You might even have to hire more people to handle all this new business, but it's worth it.

The members would be required to pay a modest annual fee to cover some of the costs. Visualize a complete circle or pie chart. Each slice of pie represents a segment of the bowling industry.

Every one of these would benefit greatly over the long run, because the pie itself will grow larger and larger as the greater number of people will be able to participate and enjoy this great sport.



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

"It took a while for me to get



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
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
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
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
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hen I saw George Atsalis at Showcase Plymouth last month, my first instinct was to take evasive action, cross the room or turn around.

I don't owe him money, he doesn't have some gross disfigurement nor is he always trying to sell me something. He's not a bad guy; in fact, he's a completely decent human being.

It's just that he's my dentist. I hadn't been to see him in quite some time, so when we shook hands and he said, "You should come and see me," I was sure I was getting rebuked for my lack of dental hygiene. But then he talked to me about getting my teeth ZOOMed, the all-the-rage teeth whitening program that's the fad du jour at the moment.

I hadn't really considered it, because those kinds of cosmetic things aren't generally things I think about. You don't get this girlish figure by worrying about how you look all that much. But when the Doc mentioned it, I thought perhaps it was time to try something new, in keeping with a phase I appear to be going through.

So, I made appointments both for me and for The Lovely Lisa, who was hot to be ZOOMed. She knew more about it than I did, and although her smile is much prettier than mine, she wanted the procedure.

When I called to make the appointments, Lisa Carr, who helps run the front desk at Comprehensive & Modern Dentistry (Atsalis' practice), reminded me it was also time for a cleaning and an exam.

That's why I was sitting in the chair one Monday morning while hygienist Theresa Borg set me up for X-rays and the like. Of course, I knew it had been a long time; I was hoping she didn't know. That hope didn't last long.

"So I see your last visit was in May," she said, letting the pregnant pause develop. "In 2003, her tone of voice clearly indicating her opinion two years might be a tad long to go with-

out a visit to the dentist. But that was really the extent of the rebuke. Instead, we talked about the surprise party she was throwing for her husband, who had just gotten his builder's license.

We talked about the cruise Lisa and I were about to take, and about her daughter Molly, who at 4 already seems smarter than me. And Theresa went about the business of finding a gazillion cavities, some small, one or two quite large. That'll teach me to go two years without visiting the dentist. But new fathers calm down after delivery

oseph Rohmfeld almost passed out in the delivery room at St. Mary Mercy Hospital as Christal Loerlein was delivering their first baby – Rebecca Renee, a healthy 6-pound, 9-ounce girl at

10:56 a.m. Wednesday, June 8. Originally from Houston, the former Navy man turned pale and got a funny taste in his mouth but never let on to Christal, who was just as nervous even though she works as an RN on the fourth floor.

"I was absolutely nervous, but couldn't let her know," said Rohmfeld, 24. "Everyone told me she

would yell at me. I said no problem. She was clawing me. But I was more nervous than she was."

The Stevenson High School graduate disagrees. She went into labor at 2 a.m. at her parents' Livonia home. "I was so nervous I thought I was

going to die," said Loerlein, 22. Rohmfeld gently picks up his baby daughter wrapped in a Winnie the Pooh blanket. He's calmed down but still is thrilled about the tiny bundle in his arms.

"It's scary," said Rohmfeld, who leaves soon for military police training with the Army Reserves then plans to study criminal justice at Schoolcraft College. "Raising a baby is a crash course in reality. There's no time for eating or taking a shower."

The jitters are common among new fathers. Dr. M. Hassan Neal, a St. Mary Mercy Hospital obstetrician, has delivered hundreds of babies in the last four decades and rarely has seen a cool dad.

Although Neal seemed calm last week, he was on his own baby watch as a grandfather. Daughter Nancy was about to have her second child at St. Mary. His older daughter Susan gave birth to her fourth girl on May 18. Susan and her identical twin Sandra share a gynecology and obstetrics practice with their father in Livonia. Nancy, an attorney, has an office across the hall. All of the family lives within 10 minutes of each other

'Who will help if we're gone'

Son's disorder leads to foundation for disabled kids

When doctors told Dr. Steven Watson and his wife, Teresa, that their unborn son had Down Syndrome, he says there was never any thought of terminating the pregnancy. It was something they decided they would deal with and learn

Some three years later, Watson said Ryan, the middle of the couple's three sons, has been a blessing.


"We knew when she was pregnant. But we decided to go through with the pregnancy. It wasn't really a tough decision," said Watson. "Children with Downs are a very good blessing in dis-

Watson, who owns Canton Foot Specialists in Canton, said he has never seen a happier kid than Ryan, despite the Down syndrome, which is a genetic condition that can include cognitive disabilities and other developmental prob-

"Ryan wakes up in the morning smiling and laughing. He just loves life. It makes you re-think your own life," said

But Ryan's condition has altered the Watson household nonetheless. Teresa Watson, a physician, has been on leave from work because she has to care for Ryan 24 hours a day. One day, the couple had a conversation about what would happen to Ryan if something were to happen to them, and they were no longer around to take care of him. They began to research what types of programs were available to provide services to their son, especially housing and the other staples of life.

Report: More teens are abstaining from sex

ot all teens fit the sexcrazed stereotype – in fact, a majority of them don't. Raging hormones and stereotypes notwithstanding, 56 percent of teens (ages 13 to 17) say young people should abstain from sex until they

strong evidence that teens are putting thoughts about abstinence into action - or inaction. Sexual activ-

ity among

high school students has been declining for the past 13 years, according to U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). In 1991, 54 percent of teens reported having had sexual intercourse; that figure had fallen to 47 percent in 2003. Among girls aged 15 to 17, the birth rate fell 38 percent between 1990 and 2002.

Possible reasons for a decline in teen sexual activity are likely tied to the messages teens are getting at home, at school, or elsewhere. In a 2001 Gallup Youth Survey, 90 percent of teens said that they had talked about AIDS at school, 81 percent reported discussing sexually transmitted diseases, 85 percent had discussed pregnancy, and 77 percent had discussed abstinence until marriage. The State of Michigan encourages schools to teach about HIV/AIDS and parents are encouraged to serve on districtwide committees related to HIV/AIDS and sex education. Please contact your principal.

Elizabeth Walters, a clinician and health educator at HiTops, a teen sexual health center in suburban New

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Jersey, says that it could be teens' definition of sex that has changed.

"Oral sex has become a popular way to postpone intercourse. Teens don't think of it as 'having sex.' Also, there's less pregnancy because teens are better informed, better at contraception - especially with morning-after, emergencytype contraception."

Sentiment about premarital sex does differ slightly between girls and boys. Just under half of boys (48 percent) say that young people should refrain from sex until after they are married, compared with 64 percent of girls.

Nevertheless, sexual activity has actually declined more among boys than girls since 1991, according to the CDC. Fifty-seven percent of boys in 1991 said they had engaged in sexual intercourse.

That figure dropped nine percentage points to 48 percent in 2003. Sexual activity for girls fell slightly during the same period - from 51 to 45 percent.

Church attendance is a solid predictor of views about sexual activity. In the current survey, almost three-quarters (72 percent) of teens who had attended church or synagogue in the last week say young people should abstain from sex until they are married, versus 44 percent of those who had not attended.

Again, this may sound like good news for parents but someone who is up close and personal with teens' sexual mores may have a more skeptical view of teens' opinions.

"Abstinence education is certainly the reason for the decline in sexual activity," Walters said. "I have no doubt about it. Teens know the goal of abstinence education is postponing sex until marriage-and they know it's the right survey response. But whether or not they can live up to that ideal (until marriage) is another matter. Healthy Teens: Facing the

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Challenges of Young Lives (2000) indicated 75 percent of teens were sexually active before leaving high school.

Federal funding for abstinence-only programs has increased dramatically; \$170 million has been targeted for these types of sex education programs in 2005, twice as much as was spent in 2001. However, these programs have been criticized as much as they have been lauded. Existing data from studies on the effectiveness of the education approach are inconclusive, and a national evaluation of abstinence-only programs won't be released until 2006.

"My wife and I were thinking, we don't know if he is going to be independent some day. We didn't know what was out there for him," he said. "It's been a real education for us. It's amazing how many organizations and programs are out there, but there are still some needs that aren't being addressed for children with a disability like Ryan."

Watson said most of the organizations out there raise money for research, but few actually provide housing and healthcare. As a result, Watson decided to create a non-profit organization called the Athletes Who Care Foundation (AWC), which has the goal of providing those basic needs to uninsured and underinsured people with disabilities, particularly children.

The AWC recently received non-profit status, and held its first fund raiser on Valentine's Day with a comedy show at Joey's Comedy Club in Livonia. About 70 people showed up for the show and the AWC was able to raise enough money for basic operating costs. According to Watson, they have applied for a number of grants to help them get going, but it is a time consuming process and they are still waiting to find out if they will be

approved. Rob Bovitz, a Canton resident who co-founded the organization with Watson, said they would like to get professional athletes involved with the group. Hence, the name Athletes Who Care. That idea really came to fruition after the two attended a Detroit Red Wings charity golf outing for injured player Vladimir Konstantinov and masseur Sergei Mnastakanov.

Bovitz, a CPA, said a lot of professional athletes are looking for a charity to attach their names to, because they don't really have the time to set one up themselves. And, for the AWC, having a professional athlete act as a spokesperson would mean greater notoriety, and ultimately







Use the old apple for back pain

Rich from Dearborn Heights is suffering from golf-related back pain. He wants to know what to do for it.

Rich, here are some tips for getting back up to par. Many pros put an emphasis on winding or coiling the body, but that doesn't work for some older golfers. They might want to try letting the left heel lift off the turf on the back swing. Just allow the heel to be lifted by the motion of the swing. For golfers with bad backs the less tension the better. Relax at the top of the swing and allow the hips to rotate.

One time tested drill for making sure you're on the right track is called "don't bruise the apple."
Put an apple at the bottom of a weighted sock and swing it like a clab. If the back swing is correct, the end of the sock with the apple will gently touch your shoulder blades.

Walt from West Bloomfield is a regular golfer. He took up the sport as an easy and sensible form of exercise. He'd like to know the health pluses and minuses of the sport

sport. Walt, golf can be a healthy way to stay in shape, but it can be too strenuous for some folks with heart disease. Researchers followed 20 male golfers aged 49 to 78, half of whom had heart disease. They looked at each subject's fitness level and the oxygen consumption during nine holes of play. Each test subject walked the course pulling a cart. On average, those with heart disease worked at 57 percent of their lung capacity. That's a level that could be too intense for some with heart disease. I don't want to minimize the health benefits, just be sure to check with your doctor first to check everything out.

Experts offer tips for keeping seniors safe this summer

As chair of the Senate Committee on Senior Citizens Affairs, state Sen. Laura Toy is always looking for ways to improve the lives of older residents — including her mother Eileen, who will be 76 in

Eileen Toy, a Livonia resi-

dent, is lucky to have two daughters to check on her especially in summer, but not everyone has someone who cares, so Sen. Toy is launching a campaign to keep seniors safe this summer. In May, she taped *The Capitol Report*, a cable program with Sharon Gire, director of the Michigan Office on Services to the Aging, which helps to provide

meals, respite and in-home care, chore services and assistance to Michigan's 1.6 million seniors and their caregivers.

Much of the information covered during the program is on the Web site (www.senate.michigan.gov/toy) and available as printed material at senior centers in Garden City, Livonia, Redford and Westland, the Sixth District which Toy represents.

"My mom is bed-bound and we have to keep an eye on her," Toy said. "People who are bed-bound are especially at risk. Mom has a mattress with air pressure, but it's important to keep people rotated.

"We all forget about risks in the summer, particularly those with health problems. Lots of times people forget to drink water. They're out in the sun too long without a hat. We have a lot of picnics going on in the district and people with high blood pressure and diabetes are more at risk. You want to know the warning signs. If they're feeling dizzy, have a rapid heart beat, seek immediate medical attention."

It's estimated that 44 percent of heat-related deaths are people aged 65 years or older. The Michigan Office of Services to the Aging is trying to get the word out that "a life can be saved."

When a senior's body temperature rises above normal, it puts them at risk for heat cramps, exhaustion and weakness, dehydration, disorientation, heat stroke and death. It's important to limit exercise


and physically strenuous activities such as mowing the lawn, and watch for symptoms such as confusion, racing pulse, agitation and hyperventilation before one begins to convulse or lose conscious-

Gire provides more information on *The Capitol Report*, which can be seen on Bright House Networks in Livonia and Redford, and Comcast and Wide Open West in Garden City and Westland.

"People are more aware to be careful in the sun," Gire said. "I see golfers finding shade and carrying cold drinks, others no hat, no shade. Everyone's excited because we've finally gotten

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

good weather, but one of the things that hasn't been as clearly advised is there are a number of conditions and medications that can make you more vulnerable to heat as well as sunburn."

Not only do certain drugs for heart disease, high blood pressure and anxiety make people more susceptible, but also conditions such as diabetes and obesity.

"There are drugs people of every age may be taking, antidepressants, antihistamines," Gire said. "The elderly are more frail and on more medication. My mother-in-law prior to getting a pacemaker would be in 70-degree temperatures and would get exhausted. As people age, their thermostat doesn't work as well. You may be sitting in a room and sweltering and see a senior

likely to recognize the heat." Gire suggests if seniors don't have air conditioning to visit a library or senior center or go window shopping at the mall. Family and friends need to check on nursing home residents. According to Gire, 300 of the 440 nursing homes in Michigan are not air conditioned. The majority were built in the 1960s.

"There's no reason people can't use the old swimming pool, just remember the sun screen," Gire said. "You don't think about your hands and wash sun screen off, and men don't think about thinning hair on their scalp."

Dr. Kimberlydawn Wisdom worries about seniors developing skin cancer as well as suffering heat-related illnesses. It's her job as Michigan's surgeon general to promote health and protect citizens across the state. She speaks to senior groups throughout the year, warning them to use sunscreen, cover their head, stay out of the sun except for short periods of time and have routine checkups by their primary care provider. Wisdom was an emergency room doctor at Henry Ford Health System-Fairlane for more than 20

vears. "I saw a lot of seniors coming in due to heat and falls. A person stretches out their arm to fall and ends up with wrist, hip and head injuries," said Wisdom, a Southfield resident. "A little over 40 percent of falls occur on the same level, slipping on something on the floor or tripping over a throw rug. It's important for seniors to

fall-proof their homes. They experience changes in vision which can be adjusted with proper eye care, regular exams and adequate lighting."

Wisdom suggests visiting www.cdc.gov for tips on fallproofing homes.

"We want seniors to enjoy their summer and not be hospitalized due to a preventable " fall," Wisdom said. "And to stay" cool. When I say cool, I don't arr mean hip. The weather has been warm. They have to be cautious about that — watch for headache, nausea, cramping, feeling faint. They should 'ar have cool water on hand, wear lightweight clothing, remain indoors as much as possible and find cool spots around the community, senior discounts for the movies, and not stay in a warm home with a fan."

And don't forget the bug spray when outdoors. West Nile virus still poses a serious threat.

· "One problem is there weren't as many cases of West Nile virus last year, but we've already seen one infected bird in the state last month," Wisdom said. "It's important to prevent the virus as much as possible. Go around and make sure screens and doors are in good repair and get rid of breeding sites in flower pots, tire swings, children's wading pools, bird baths. Replace water regularly in pet dishes. If they do have symptoms like fever, headache, neck pain, aching, " they should seek professional help. We can't say what the season will be like this year. We have to look at the pattern as we see bird deaths, then we will be able to make predictions. Last year, we were very fortunate."

Second careers at sea beckon to veterans

While known for its entrylevel program, the Center also offers courses for veterans who have qualifying sea time in a deck or engine rating.

Separated and retired personnel who have the necessary deck or engine ratings required by the U.S. Coast Guard to sit for the able-bodied seaman's endorsement or the fireman/oiler endorsement may take advan-

> Deck students attend a 10week able-bodied seaman course and engine students attend an eight-week fireman/oiler course. Upon successful completion of the course and a passing grade on the Coast Guard exam, graduates are guaranteed a first job with a contracted company.

> As with the apprentice program, there are no fees for tuition, room or board. However, trainees must cover the costs of travel, clothing and a pre-entry medical exam.

All applicants must be able to

present a history of their assignments while in the military and an honorable discharge. They must be physically fit as determined by U.S. Coast Guard standards and eligible to receive a merchant mariner's document. Applicants cannot be on parole or probation and must have a valid driver's license.

The SIU represents unlicensed United States merchant mariners sailing aboard U.S.-flag vessels in the deep sea, Great Lakes and inland trades.

spend time looking for a new home. You need to decide if you want to buy or sell first. Sometimes people are afraid that they won't get their ideal house if they are pressured to buy and don't want to sell their home first, so they buy and then sell. I recommend selling first. The selling process usually takes much longer than the buying one. You don't wan to be in a position where you have to pay two mortgage payments or you are forced to take out a bridge loan.

This all-new Chevrolet Cobalt is not only a pleasure to drive, but also is perfect for teen's first car or someone who's going off to college. Heck, it's so versatile and roomy that anyone could drive it.

Granted, it's classified as a subcompact car, but it's far from what used to be classified as subcompact. Remember the Chevrolet Chevette? Now that was subcompact.

The 2005 Cobalt is quite roomy inside and seats five people easily and comes in a sedan or a coupe. The sedan is what was driven this week. It also has four trim levels to choose from: Cobalt, Cobalt LS, Cobalt LT and Cobalt SS Supercharged.

Driven for this test was the four-door LS sedan. First introduced in December 2003 at the Los Angeles Auto Show as a 2005 model, the Cobalt is geared to someone who appreciates refinement, quality and performance and wants economy and great gas mileage, too.

The Cobalt delivers that. My only complaint is that the noise from under the hood can be harsh. I'm so used to driving vehicles that make little or no engine noise that I must be spoiled. At least you knew when it turned over.

On the Cobalt SS Supercharged, you'll find a 2.0-lilter with a five-speed getting 205 horsepower.

LS and LT models provide you with a premium ride, while SS is geared toward someone who wants exclusive performance and handling. Safety issues are taken care of by a solid unibody structure, dual-stage air bags that are standard and side curtain air bags can be chosen as an option. There are five-point safety belts in all five seating positions as well. Four-wheel antilock brakes are standards as is PassLock theft deterrent, battery rundown protection, LATCH system for child car seats, emergency trunk release, daytime running lamps, heightadjustable seat belts and child security door locks to keep the kiddies in line.

Looking for a car that needs little maintenance? The Cobalt is your answer. There is no routine maintenance except the standard oil and oil filter changes recommended.

Other standard features you'd normally expect in a luxury car are built into the Cobalt. Things like air conditioning with an air filtration system, driver seat height adjustments, 60/40 split folding rear seat, tilt steering wheel, cruise control, power windows and locks, keyless entry, dual power outlets, rear defogger, floor mats and remote trunk release. The LS driven had extras like a leather-wrapped shift lever and steering wheel, sport fascia with fog lamps, rear spoiler, 16-inch aluminum wheels, chrome exhaust tip, automatic transmission, OnStar, side-curtain air bags, XM satellite radio and a Pioneer seven-speaker^{ARO} stereo system.

Even with all those options, it only bumped up the price by a hair over \$3,000. Value again. The automatic transmission and OnStar accounted for more than \$1,500 of that increase

The Cobalt is a vehicle deserving of a look-see when choosing your next vehicle for aroundtown driving. Loved the mileage the best, by the way: 24 mpg in the city and 32 mpg on the highway. That's valuable in this volatile gasoline market. Go take a look.



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
