### Canton store expected to draw millions to area

Canton resident Diann Geran has mixed feelings about next week's grand opening of IKEA.

On one hand, she is really looking forward to shopping at the store, having previously shopped at an IKEA store in Pittsburgh. On the other hand, she is worried about all the new traffic the store will create along Ford Road, which is not too far from her home.

"If I didn't live in Canton, I would probably be more excited," said Geran, a social worker at The ARC in Westland.

Despite her traffic fears, though, she is pretty excited about shopping at the store, and is even thinking about braving

the crowds to attend Wednesday's grand opening. She said the store's appeal is pretty simple to figure out.

"IKEA has nice, cheap stuff, and lots of it," Geran said. "They just have a great selection of furniture. You can really redo a whole room of your home for very little money. It's just a really cool store."

That's the sentiment that is expected to draw two million shoppers a year to the store at Ford and Haggerty roads in Canton, just a stone's throw from I-275. When the new IKEA Canton store opens Wednesday, the cash registers will start ringing, pumping millions of dollars into the state and local economy. And Monday, the store will allow its first

### **Grant helps** teachers bring history to life

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools has received a nearly \$1 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education to help bring American history alive in the classroom.

The \$999,819 grant, to be used over a three-year period, is part of \$118.2 million in Teaching American History awards given out by the Education Department to 124 school districts nationwide.

We were thrilled," said Cindy Swift, director of elementary education for Plymouth-Canton Schools, after receiving word of the grant Thursday. "We have a summer institute planned so teachers will be able to get to work right away." Swift said the district's Laying Foundations II proj-

ect will provide field experiences and workshops for elementary teachers in partnership with the University of Michigan-Dearborn, The Henry Ford, Michigan Historical Museum and the Plymouth Historical Museum.

"Teachers will learn how to use those resources, and learn from history experts by exploring authentic sources and learning how to use artifacts and actual documents in their own instruction," Swift said. "They will be learners first, and then teachers.

"Our hope is that we can spread the learning throughout our elementary program," she said. "Nearly 2,100 students will be touched by this, one way or another."

Plymouth-Canton Schools received a similar \$807,000 federal grant in October 2003 for middle and high school history teachers. Wendy Flynn, Miller Elementary fifth-grade teacher, said she and a few of her colleagues were able to take part in that grant program, taking classes with professors from U-M-Dearborn and Eastern Michigan University, as well as visit exhibits as The Henry Ford.

Flynn said with the new grant, all the fifth-grade teachers in the district will get the opportunity to study the time period from 1500-1812, encompassing the colonization of the U.S. and the Revolutionary

"We will be able to give the kids more information, and motivate them more," Flynn said. "It will bring a real richness to the social studies curriculum.

"When students read a history book, they'll be able to read it with a critical eye, giving them more background so they can come up with more conclusions and different points of view," she said.

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#### Board looking at \$2 million in repairs at Fellows Creek

The Canton Township Board of Trustees could vote at its June 13 meeting to borrow more than \$1 million to make \$2.13 million worth of repairs and improvements to the course during the next five years. At the same time, the township board could vote to approve a 10-year contract with Fellows Creek Management, the private company that has managed



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

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#### Salesmen say union stance got them fired

Four salesmen at Don Massey Cadillac believe it's more than just coincidence they were fired a week after the sales staff voted 10-5 to be represented by the Teamsters union.

The four, joined by members of the United Auto Workers, picketed Thursday in front of the dealership on Ann Arbor Road at I-275, acknowledging honks from supporters.

"They said it was my productivity, but it was primarily because we voted the union in," said Bob Adas, who has been selling cars at Massey since 1980. "We were the most vocal."

The four — Adas, Richard DeTata, Gary Hachigian and Matthew Sebastian — said they led the effort to join Teamsters Local 283 in Wyandotte after the company established a wage scale that cut their pay by 60 percent.

Adas said last year he earned \$70,000 in commissions, and was looking at earning less than half that amount this year.

"Somebody has to stand up and take a stand," said Adas, 63, from White Lake Township. "They just can't push people around. We stood up and said 'enough is enough."

The salesmen say Sonic Automotive, Inc. began making pay cuts soon after the corporation bought Don Massey's 16 car dealerships in 2002. With the latest wage cut in March, in which commissions

went from \$400 to \$200 a vehicle, a majority of the sales staff voted for union representation in an effort to re-estab-

lish the former wage scale. Sonic released a statement taking issue with the Teamster claims the four were fired for union activities.

'Sonic-Don Massey Cadillac regrets that the Teamsters union has chosen to picket at the dealership," read the statement. "However, the personnel actions at issue were taken for legitimate business reasons and these personnel decisions are completely unrelated to the outcome of the May 17 union representation election. Sonic-Don Massey Cadillac intends to defend vigorously any claim that these actions somehow were unlawful."

The Teamsters have asked the NLRB to issue an injunction to put the salesmen back to work while a contract is being negotiated.

Hachigian, 52, has been at Massey for a couple of years since being recruited by Don Massey, and has been selling Cadillacs for 17 years.

"At first they told us we were grandfathered, and wouldn't be affected by the new pay scale," Hachigian said. "We went about our business of selling cars and we became No. 1 in the world for two months straight. Then they hit us with

the new pay plan, and said we had no choice, sign it or walk."

That's when the sales reps contacted the Teamsters, which won the election May 17.

"On the seventh day, the company fielded an objection with the National Labor Relations Board, which is typical," said Todd Lince, Local 283 organizer. "But, last Thursday they fired four of our main supporters. We asked the company to put them back to work, and gave them notice we were coming out to picket."

Richard DeTata, 64, of Livonia has been selling cars for two decades.

"After 20 years, they said my production wasn't normal," DeTata said. "If my production wasn't normal, they would have found out 20 years ago. They're trying to get rid of the union at our expense."


Matthew Sebastian of Westland said he was originally hired to be the Internet sales manager.

"They brought me in and told me I was gone, but they didn't tell me why," said Sebastian.

"I made about \$50,000 last year, and this year was looking like only \$35,000. The opportunity just wasn't there."

year ago, IKEA was the "the store that almost wasn't." At one point IKEA had called off its plans to build the 311,000square-foot furniture store in Canton. In February 2005, IKEA officials had backed out of a deal to buy the former site of the Super Kmart at Ford and Haggerty, because of a dispute over shared parking spaces at the adjacent ABC Warehouse property. Ultimately, IKEA bought the property, and is leasing it to ABC Warehouse through 2015, with three fiveyear options after that.

Demolition of the old Super Kmart began May 17, 2005. Ever since, Canton officials -- and more than a few eager shoppers - have been anticipating the cutting of the

Swedish log, which will be at 8:30 a.m. June 7.

"Instead of ribbon cuttings, we have a log cutting," IKEA Canton store manager Mark McCaslin said. "It's a tradition—cutting the log brings good luck to our new home and to all those who enter it."

What some local officials hope it will bring is money and lots of it.

IKEA is expected to generate about \$1 million in annual property taxes and about \$5 million in state sales taxes. It also is expected to pump up the local economy, bringing in about \$13 million for local stores, gas stations and hotels.

Canton officials believe the store will be a destination location - with visitors not only from metro Detroit, but also from other areas of Michigan, northern Ohio and even Ontario. Currently, the closest IKEA store is in Illinois. The retailer has a total of 22 stores in the United States, and did \$1.7 billion in sales from those locations last year.

### IKEA knows its customers

#### All 56 showrooms are set up for a specific demographic

You can tell by the woman's kitchen that she has two things - an impeccable sense of style and at least one young child. In her traditional country kitchen, whimsical kitsch sits on the ultra-clean wood cabinetry painted high-gloss white. Except no one ever really cooks or makes coffee for friends in that kitchen, because it's a showroom inside IKEA Canton, which opens for busi-

ness Wednesday. Still, the fictitious woman who owns the kitchen exists in the mind of IKEA design manager Heidi Tippery. Every room design in the store's showroom starts with a fictitious person — or family with lives very similar to the people who may be shopping

"We get quite deep into their thoughts," Tippery said. "She likes to bake and she's into collectibles." And, of course, because the divorced working mother with young children is very safety-conscious, so are the design managers, who integrated guards on the stove to keep splatters and pot handles away from the imaginary woman's children.

Every one of the 56 room designs in IKEA starts out exactly the same way. IKEA spokesman Joseph Roth said. A team of design managers gets together and decides who "lives" there, and what type of lives they lead. Then they brainstorm. A young person with a tiny apartment needs plenty of storage, and a loft in her efficiency apartment's single room. A young couple with a baby needs a small apartment that's practical and stylish, but still safe for the baby. A single professional man needs his small kitchen to be clutterfree. And an empty-nester couple needs plenty of room in the upscale kitchen with granite countertops, and a wine cellar just off the dining area.

"From there, the designs are tweaked depending on the demographics of the community," Roth said. For example, Canton shoppers, and other suburban visitors, are more likely to have children at home than their urban, loft-dwelling counterparts. "Every room is designed with a different lifestyle in mind."

Like the 592-square-foot "home" set up inside the store.

"He's a paramedic, and she's a copywriter, and they have 6month-old baby," store manager Mark McCaslin said.

The apartment combines the four style groups at IKEA modern, Scandinavian, country and "young Swede," which includes more do-it-yourself

elements than the rest of IKEA's furniture. All IKEA furniture is assembled at home, but "young Swede" styles also appeal to those shoppers who are willing to paint their own furniture, and who are going for brighter colors and the lowest prices, according to Tippery.

Every design element in IKEA is at eye-level, though, Roth said. When shoppers look down, they see unembellished concrete floors, and if they look upward, they see bare open steel beam ceilings.

"We try not to invest too much in the structure of our store," Roth said. "We put everything into the things you came to see, not in the building itself."

IKEA opens its doors at 9 a.m. June 7. Regular business hours will be 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily. It is located in Canton, off I-

275 at Ford Road.

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### Don't forget about those IKEA 'extras'

It's a clever mix between D.I.Y. and V.I.P.

At IKEA, you can shop solo, fetch your own goods off the warehouse shelves, ring up your items at self check-out, load your own treasures into your vehicle and even grab the trusty Allen wrench to assemble your goods yourself at home.


Or, not. Leaving the "work" up to the customer keeps product prices low, but IKEA strikes a balance by adding those little extras we're all looking for when daring to tackle the typical 311,000-square-foot home

decor kingdom. When planning a trip to the new IKEA store on Ford Road and Haggerty in Canton, keep in mind, there are comforts to be found amid the sea of sofas and droves of draperies and duvets.

#### KIDS RULE

For starters, know that IKEA loves children and they're not afraid to cater to

them. "Children can run around and climb on the furniture, and no one will clip their fingers," said Carl Proctor, a UK transplant who is an assistant manager at the new Canton IKEA. "In addition to being an adult playground, you can bring your children to have

From the bottle warmer in the 300-seat IKEA Restaurant to the various playhouses strategically placed in each department, there's no doubt kids rule at IKEA.

"We are a unique retailer in this market," said Proctor. 'We're very family-friendly."

For parents who'd rather shop sans kids, there is the magical Swedish forest called Smaland, a supervised children's play area that replicates a Swedish farmhouse and forest. Drop-off is by in-store appointment and there is a 45minute limit.

There is also an interactive

Children's IKEA area in the showroom to occupy the little ones while moms and dads shop. Other family-friendly features include strollers, which resemble shopping carts, but instead of a bulky shopping basket, there is a space to hang your yellow IKEA shopping bag as you travel through the store. Baby care rooms and private rooms for nursing mothers are also available.


For those who work up an appetite, the IKEA Restaurant offers traditional Swedish delights, such as shrimp sandwiches, salmon platters and of course, meatballs. Kids' meals are offered, and come with the essential bib.

The restaurant opens an hour early, at 9 a.m., and offers a 99-cent eggs and bacon breakfast plate.

Cafe Bistro, near the store's exit, has quick, carry-out foods such as 50-cent hot dogs, cinnamon buns, frozen yogurt and beverages.

"Some people will come and take 20 hot dogs back to the office," said Proctor.

To take home, there are Swedish delicacies offered in the Swedish Foodmarket. Items in this section include the "best of Sweden," including jams, crackers, cheeses, herring and yes, frozen meatballs to take to your dinner table.

#### **MORE AMENITIES**

IKEA has lockers for customers to stash their belongings, wheelchairs, an ATM, measuring tapes, store maps, pencils and large, yellow shopping bags to borrow while shopping.

While most shoppers will make their way through the massive store by following the arrows and using the store

map and shopping list, others may prefer a bit of assistance. That's where the home furnishing consultants come in. By in-store appointment, they will escort shoppers through the areas and assist them in retrieving the goods from the warehouse.

Consultants are also available to help small business people design an office.

"That's very popular," said Proctor, who noted owners of salons, restaurants and office buildings often seek this service.

He said IKEA shoppers never have to worry about pushy salespersons while shopping solo or with a consultant.

"We want you to take your time and buy what you want to buy," he said. "No one will pester you."



the course for the entire 28 years the township has owned

"We should have had (a new contract) last year," said Leisure Services Director Ann Conklin.

The contract between the township and Fellows Creek Management expired in Oct. 2004. But the township and the management company had both taken a "wait and see" approach to determine if the golf industry would bounce back from tough economic times. Industry-wide there is a glut of golf courses and fewer golfers, making the business less profitable than it was in the late 1990s, Conklin said.

The two parties waited until last October to start negotiating, then in February, negotiations stopped abruptly when a developer made an offer to buy the course for \$17 million. The township board rejected the offer, and negotiations resumed in March this year.

Usually, Conklin would not recommend a 10-year contract, she said. But if it's approved, Fellows Creek Management would agree to take responsibility for \$960,000 worth of the capital improvements. The management company has had contracts in the past which were as short as three years, and as long as 10 years, with options to extend the contract for five years.

The terms of the last contract are no longer reasonable, according to Conklin. Under the old contract, Fellows Creek Management paid an annual lease of \$400,000 to Canton. The township was responsible for paying the debt service (Canton made the last payment late in 2005), utilities and capital improvements, and the management company is responsible for operations and operating expenses. Last year, the township spent \$62,000 fulfilling the agreement, and the remainder went into the township's golf fund, which helps pay the debt service on Pheasant Run, the more modern of the two municipal cours-

#### LESS OF A DONOR

Historically, Fellows Creek has been the donor to the golf fund, and Pheasant Run has been the user. Fellows Creek has contributed \$2,249,602 total to the fund, or an average of \$224,960 per year for the past 10 years. Extending the average back to 1988 or 17 years, the average has been \$175,000, said Conklin.

But the golf industry is no longer as profitable as it was, and the \$400,000 payments just wouldn't allow the course to be profitable.

The new contract, if approved, would charge Fellows Creek Management a lease payment of \$150,000 per year for the first five years, and \$200,000 for the second five years. Additionally, the township would receive half of golf and golf cart revenues, over a base of \$1.25 million, and the management company would perform nearly \$1 million worth of the improvements at the course. So while Fellows Creek would break even, and even contribute to the golf fund, the contribution will be much smaller than it has in the past.

The contract would ensure that Canton gets a slice of the profits if the golf industry makes a strong recovery, said Fellows Creek General Manager Daniel Ross. But he's not holding his breath.

"The golf industry is still a little shaky," he said. "And we had two weeks of rain followed by 95 degree heat, which doesn't help." Conklin said she's not hopeful either.

#### **SHAKY TIMES**

Despite the perfect golf weather in April, Pheasant Run has this year to date brought in only \$3,000 more in revenue than it had last year at this time, Conklin said.

"It's a volatile industry," Conklin said. "There's nothing stable about it."

And so the maintenance issues are more important than ever. "If we don't stay current, golfers will go somewhere else," Conklin said. "We need to protect the asset we have."

A year ago, her hopes were high that the industry would turn around. At that time, Conklin predicted that revenues from Fellows Creek will increase steadily by 5 percent each year beginning this year, despite an erratic economy in which revenues have fallen or remained flat since 2000. Some of the increase would have been due to the golf industry leveling out after a big boom in the late 1990s and the subsequent drop when the country's economy went south in 2000 and 2001. But revenues have remained flat.

The township board will vote on authorization to sell bonds in the amount of \$1.3 million, to be paid over 15 years. Conklin estimated the payment would be \$108,000 annually.

This year, the township would complete \$315,000 worth of improvements, including tree stump removal, pump house repairs, irrigation pond drainage and a lightning prediction system, as well as \$120,000 worth of updates to the club house. Fellows Creek Management would be responsible for removing some 300 dead trees; Conklin estimated that if the township had to pay a contractor it would cost approximately \$75,000.

In the long-term, the parking lot needs to be replaced, the irrigation system needs upgrading, four holes need to be realigned, drainage improvements need to be made, and exterior signs need to be installed.

Township Supervisor Tom Yack, and most of the trustees favored the 10-year contract and the improvements at the course.

"Ten years seems like a lot but when you look at the numbers, I don't see any other way, from a fiduciary responsibility standpoint," said Trustee Todd LaJoy. Township Trustee Melissa McLaughlin and Yack noted that the 10-year contract only extends 8.5 years into the future, because it's retroactive to the date the old contract expired 1.5 years ago.

"The 10-year contract produces revenue right away,"
McLaughlin said. "It positions the course to be more profitable, and now is as good a time as any to make the investment, when things are a little slow."

### Teachers get new contract

A tentative contract agreement has been reached between Plymouth-Canton Schools and its 1,100-member teachers union.

Teachers are expected to receive details of the pact Tuesday, one day after the union's executive committee reviews it.

Neither side is revealing much information about the contract, however Superintendent Jim Ryan said, "As is typical, it will be one year on salary and two years on language. It's hard to do long-term agreements because of the unsteady funding from the state."

The contract reportedly includes a small pay raise.
"There are things that are

attached to the money," said Chuck Portelli, Plymouth-Canton Education Association president. "We divided the salary and calendar from the non-economic

divided the salary and calendar from the non-economic issues, and we'll still continue to bargain on those."

The settlement reportedly came May 26, after only a handful of negotiating sessions. If it's approved, teachers will have a new deal before the current pact ends Aug. 30.

Portelli said having a contract and calendar will make for a smooth start of the 2006-07 school year.
Teachers report in August, with students returning Sept.

"It was important to get it resolved before teachers leave at the end of the school year," said Portelli. "Otherwise, we couldn't get them all together until the end of August. Our constitutional by-laws say we need

six days before a vote."

Portelli said there is a general membership meeting scheduled for Thursday afternoon at the Canton High School DuBois Theater, with voting to take place Friday and Monday, June 12.

Ryan said the Board of Education could ratify the contract at either its June 13 or June 27 regular meeting.



#### District makes pitch to House committee

Plymouth-Canton Schools representatives received praise by members of the state **House Education Committee** Wednesday for above-average student test scores and efficiencies in daily operation, despite a foundation grant that provides tens of millions of dollars less in state funding than received by neighboring school districts.

However, the author of House Bill 4828, Rep. Phil LaJoy, R-Canton Township, will have to do some compromising before the committee will consider passing on to the full House a bill that could result in changes to Proposal A and give Plymouth-Canton and five additional school districts an increase of \$750 per student. For Plymouth-Canton, that would mean an additional \$13 million a year in revenue.

LaJoy and district delegates want to increase per-pupil funding for school districts that are performing well and surrounded by three districts that each receive at least \$1,000 more per student. Plymouth-Canton currently is allotted \$7,200 per student. That compares to Ann Arbor at \$9,176; Livonia with \$8,280; Northville at \$8,225.

The bottom line really tells the story," said Patricia Brand, assistant superintendent for business services, in her testimony to the committee. "Livonia has, for the same number of students we have, \$20 million more to work with annually. So does Northville. And Ann Arbor has \$40 million more.

"That provides a lot of educational programs, a lot of things that are really difficult for us to accomplish," she said. "Effectively in 2007-08, we're out of business."

LaJoy explained his bill isn't designed to just throw money at school districts.

"I don't think you can just throw money at things and you're going to get improvement, not without criteria or standards," LaJoy said. "What we're talking about is efficiency and performance."

During the hour-long hearing, Plymouth-Canton touted its efficiencies, such as \$30 million in health care savings over the past 10 years, energy savings in its buildings, an administrative budget of 10 percent of the general fund, while putting 61 percent into instruction.

And, despite fewer state dollars, school officials evidenced improving MEAP scores, the largest number of Michigan Merit scholarship awards in the state and upgraded Adequate Yearly Progress reports.

"We're a lean, mean educating machine in Plymouth-Canton," Superintendent Jim Ryan told the committee. "We're very proud of our performance and accountability."

Committee member John Proos, R-St. Joseph, expressed sentiment given by a number of the legislators after the presentation by school offi-

"Linking performance and success in the classroom is a novel approach, and one we need to continue to talk about," said Proos.

"Should we address this in a more comprehensive fashion, one that tries to address these (funding) inequities on the whole, as opposed to just narrowly sending a rifle shot across to assist Plymouth-Canton? Other school

districts have the very same concern and complaints, and show great success, as you folks are today."

Immediately after the hearing, LaJoy was confident he heard other lawmakers expressing interest in compromise legislation.

"Obviously, we know when you get in committee, the way you want it isn't always what you get, and the word 'compromise' comes into play," LaJoy said. "The efficiency and performance, I think they buy into that. They want to look at expanding that a little bit, and we have to find ways to do that.


"We have an open door, we can't let it shut," he said. "I think we have a shot.'

Much better than "long shot," which is what school board vice president Judy Mardigian said days before testifying in Lansing. Afterwards, Mardigian was feeling a bit more upbeat about the district's chances.

"I feel very positive about making some adjustments to Proposal A to address inequities and tying them to performance and efficiency," Mardigian said. "I heard everybody say that's something to look at."

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

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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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### Manufacturing in Michigan undergoing massive rebirth

ome so-called advanced thinkers who have been claiming that manufacturing will "vanish" over the next generation would have been startled if they had attended the CEO Forum put on last month by the Michigan Manufacturers

I was asked to moderate a panel on the "Michigan manufacturing transformation and what it means to the state." The participants were some of our top manufacturing executives - and what they had to say made my eyes widen.

Manufacturing, they assured us, is anything but

In Michigan, of course, manufacturing plays an enormous role, accounting for nearly a quarter of

gross state product (almost twice the average national rate) and 15.3 percent of the state's workers. Nationwide, barely one in 10 workers toils in manufacturing

But manufacturing employment in Michigan has been plummeting for years. That's partly the result of offshoring of low-skill jobs to low-wage countries like China, but also the consequence of astonishing productivity gains.

So does that mean that manufacturing has no future in Michigan's economy? Not at all. Frank Fountain, senior vice president of DaimlerChrysler, characterized the future of the sector as "lean, smart, moving forward."

Power

How is that possible, with Michigan hemorrhaging jobs and the economy the raging political

A little dose of history might help us understand, especially when we consider the evolution of farming, once the mainstay of the American economy. In 1900, 40 percent of U.S. jobs were on the farm. Today, less than one percent toil in agri-

But that small number of farmers now produces enough food of high enough quality to feed the entire world — thanks to fantastic increases in productivity. Manufacturing accounted for around 40 per-

cent of all U.S. jobs in 1950. That had fallen to 14 And many economists estimate that will fall

further to less than 10 percent by 2025. Once again, that's mainly the consequence of enormous increases in productivity.

So what does this mean for us in Michigan? According to my panelists, it's all about autos. The special problems of manufacturing in our state are in very large part the result of particular problems of the domestic auto industry. That's because their business model is now out of sync with the globalizing world economy.

tracts hinder productivity growth. "Legacy costs" such as fat pensions and gold-plated health care programs add thousands to the cost of each car.

Yet once these problems get worked out, the future looks pretty bright. Peter Alvarado, vice president of U.S. Steel International, offered some interesting comparisons. The steel industry in the 1990s, he explained, went through much the same kind of transition the auto industry is experienc-

High wages and restrictive work rules made the industry's cost structure uncompetitive. Plants were closed, workers laid off. Companies went broke or consolidated. But a smaller and healthier steel industry arose from the wreckage; an industry that was more productive, competitive and

Look for the domestic auto industry to go much the same way. Already, factories like the Chrysler engine plant in Monroe County are showing that a skilled labor force (community college degree or better required), sane work rules and flexible labor contracts can result in productivity gains that make the plant cost competitive — even paying United Auto Workers' wages.

Nobody wants to talk about it, but plants like that will set the pattern for the national labor contracts that will be renegotiated in 2007. And already the auto industry is closing plants, laying off employees, shedding costly pension and health care practices.

Everybody hopes that the result will be a healthier, if smaller, industry. And a lot of it will be happily located right here in Michigan.

Toward the end of our discussion, talk turned to what, if anything, state government can to do help. In a series of straw votes, the manufacturing CEOs present produced some surprising conclusions. Making sure we have a quality educational system, both K-12 and higher education, was deemed the most important factor in the survival of manufacturers. Education was ranked ahead even of labor relations, restrictive union contracts and state tax policy.

Those who claim that cutting taxes alone is the recipe for a healthy Michigan economy ought to

Speaking of which ... at lunch, former Gov. John Engler advocated a "no skills, no sports" policy for high schools and urged that schools develop a specific skills plan for every student.

His remarks hammered home the message that in the game of economic survival, skills, talent and knowledge trump everything else. Gov. Jennifer Granholm, ĞOP challenger Dick

DeVos and all the rest of us would do well to pay

close attention.



Plymouth Christian Academy's extraordinary season was derailed Thursday afternoon by an extraordinary opponent.


The victory propelled the Pioneers into Saturday's final against a familiar foe crosstown Ann Arbor Huron.

MORE SPRING CLEANING The Michigan Department of Natural Resources recently has made several announcements regarding hunting regulations. At the May Natural Resources Commission meet-

The DNR will issue 11,845 tags for the fall bear hunting season, which is the same number issued as last year. The only change in the allocation is that in the Bergland Bear Management Ūnit, 90 licenses were moved from the third hunt period to the first hunt period; and in the Carney BMU, 50 licenses were moved from the third hunt to the first hunt. Bear specialist Dave Bostick says the change is in response to leftover licenses

Season dates and license quotas have been announced for this year's fall turkey hunt. Over 56,000 licenses will be available and the season will run Oct. 2-Nov. 14. Similar to last year, 14 hunt units will be open for the fall management hunt covering a total of 31,935 square miles.

The fall hunt is held in areas where biologists feel the population could stand to be reduced. It is legal to shoot both male and female turkeys in the fall season, which helps manage the size of Michigan's wild turkey population.

#### **CARP CONCERNS**

I was more than a little concerned last week to learn that DNR conservation officers and agents from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and U.S. Department of Agriculture confiscated 84 Asian carp from fish markets in Southfield and

These are the same fish state and federal governments have spent millions of dollars on inan effort to keep them out of the Great Lakes. Officials have gone so far as to erect a multimillion dollar electronic fish barrier on the Chicago Shipping Canal – which indi-rectly connects Lake Michigan to the Mississippi River where Asian carp have invaded - in an effort to keep the fish out of the Great Lakes.

DNR biologists think introduction of Asian carp into the Great Lakes could have devastating consequences on the freshwater ecosystem, including the sportfish populations it supports.

According to a DNR release. "Possession or transport of live Asian carp, which includes the grass carp, silver carp, bighead carp and black carp, as well as snakehead, is prohibited by state law." DNR officials said it was the first seizure of Asian carp in Michigan.

The DNR asks anyone with information on the possession, sale or importation of live prohibited species to contact the DNR Report All Poaching Hotline at (800) 292-7800.

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
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### Bucks draw Open Cup opener with Riverhounds

Bucks owner Dan Duggan also tried to put the game in simpler perspective.



"Having the opportunity to host the Pittsburgh team in Detroit is an honor," Duggan continued. "These guys have



### IKEA offers affordable, young style

can't recall just when IKEA appeared on my personal consumer radar. It might've been six years ago — during a visit to New York City. My stylish East Coast friend had an enviable shelving setup for his books and media.

Or maybe it was that posh public relations firm I visited a few years back. I coveted its modern furnishings, a perfect fit for a modest space. That unmistakable name just kept springing up wherever I went - IKEA.

It didn't take long before I'd sought out the Swedish retailer's Web site and requested a full catalog. Like many IKEA enthusiasts, I could easily imagine redecorating my tiny apartment and found myself pondering just how my dream home might come together. For the first time, my inner-interior designer was free to daydream, unrestrained by astronomical prices. For

once, I could afford the decor that suits my simple-but-pricey taste.

For young professionals, first-time homeowners and recent college grads, IKEA is not just a store. It's a source of affordable inspiration, a way to express personal style - without racking up credit card debt.

Sticker shock simply doesn't exist. Because it's a global company, employees say, IKEA can afford to keep its prices low.

In exchange for that savings, DIY customers take on an independent shopping experience. Sure, help is available - and as close as the nearest yellow shirt. But IKEA employees won't trail you around the store, just to make a sale.

As a wide-eyed shopper, I'm happiest when left alone to wander and contemplate the items I might want or need. I'll see for myself how comfortable that Poang chair really is - thank you very much.

Gone are my days of warding off vulturelike sales people who work on commission. That technique has caused me to run for the door at other furniture stores.

And I know walking into IKEA, I'm expected to load my goods into a bag, or onto a cart and head to the self-checkout stations to make my purchase. Once I lug that shiny, new PS cabinet home, I know too that I'll be assembling it myself. Still, for under \$100, it's well worth the effort.

IKEA's designers can make a 300square-foot apartment feel spacious and trendy. That's reassuring to this longtime renter. The Canton store suits five styles from modern to country, Scandinavian to "Young Swede" — a love-it-or-hate-it style suited to the young, trendy and creative.

That combination of style and low prices has established IKEA as a 20-something's first stop for home goods. Its cult-like appeal carries over to bargain-hunters and sophisticated shoppers alike.

Once I was hooked on the brand, I began sending e-mail to IKEA's customer service employees, asking just when they might open a store in Michigan. To my delight, rumors swirled that a store might open in Troy — mere miles from my Ferndale home. IKEA staff said while they were looking for a Michigan location, they'd been blocked by city officials who just couldn't appreciate the massive blue and gold exterior so characteristic of an IKEA


Growing impatient, my sister, Paula, and I made the trek two years ago to visit the Schaumburg, Ill., store. We literally got lost in the vast sea of home decor, lighting, furniture and accessories. The sheer size of the store, which I likened to a small city, was overwhelming.

We wandered aisle to aisle, trying to keep one eye on the merchandise and the other on each other. We still share tales of those steep escalators and, our favorite invention, the escalators made specifically to transport your cart from floor-to-floor.

No cart-escalators are necessary at the Canton store. But at 311,000 square feet, it's still staggering in size and scope.

Like other seasoned Ikea shoppers, I'm anticipating the chaos June 7 will bring western Wayne County. We're awed and excited about the home makeover opportunities that exist behind those big blue walls.



Eric Johnston couldn't be more proud of the young dancers in his Detroit Ballet. After performing at the Detroit Institute of Arts last December during Noel Night, the company received an invitation to introduce young audiences to the beauty of ballet June 10-11, in the children's area at the Detroit Festival of the Arts.

"The dance of four was done in 1845. Choreographer Jules Perrot persuaded four of most famous ballerinas at that time to come together and dance," said Blair, 15.

Perrot choreographed the dance to showcase the personalities of the dancers. Blair says, that's what makes the dance interesting for her. In the past she has performed in a variety of ballets from The Nutcracker to Swan Lake, The Sorcerer's

Apprentice, and Persephone. "It's fun to get into the per-

sonality of the dancer," said Blair. "I love dancing classical ballet. It's so traditional and technical. You can really be expressive through yourself. I'll be dancing with four friends at the studio. It's fun to have this chemistry, to show their personalities, and I love wearing a long tutu."

Presently, Blair is practicing a Baroque dance set to Brahms waltzes.

### An apple a day

#### Researchers prove what registered dietitians already knew



Gail Posner and Darlene Zimmerman already knew that eating fruits and vegetables help a body stay healthy. The latest research on apples simply confirms studies that show healthy eating could prevent heart disease, cancer or Alzheimer's.

Most recently, researchers Dr. Eric Gershwin and Carl Keen at the University of California at Davis found an apple a day just might keep the doctor away by preventing damage to cells. The findings were published in Experimental Biology and Medicine in

Disease can occur when cells suffer damage or die. Several fruit products, including flavonoid-rich apples and apple products, are reported to increase antioxidant levels in humans thus preventing damage by free radicals.

Gershwin and Keen made a mash of fuji, golden and red delicious, and granny smith apples then exposed it to



human cells. They discovered that the nutrients in apples and apple products 'can actually help improve health, starting at the cellular level, according to Gershwin, professor of medicine at the University of California at Davis School of Medicine.

The study was funded through an unrestricted grant from the U.S. Apple Association and the Apple Products Research and Education Council.

"I found it interesting," said Zimmerman, a registered dietitian for the Henry Ford Heart and Vascular Institute's Heart Smart Program. Zimmerman teaches a class for cardiac rehabilitation patients at the Henry Ford Medical Center-Livonia.

"Try to keep in perspective that it is just one study looking at how apples, the components, affect cell communication.

That apple extract stopped that signal. We didn't see the damage occur. It was like a spam filter. The apple doesn't let spam come through and harm the

"It's another piece to support the evidence of eating fruits and vegetables. I don't want to downplay apples. It's a great fruit full of phytochemicals, antioxidants, vitamins, and fiber. There are 5 grams of fiber in a 5 ounce medium size apple. You need about 25 to 35 grams of fiber for the entire day. There's a lot of pectin, a type of fiber, helping to lower cholesterol in the blood."

Gershwin's previous study showed that the regular consumption of apple juice reduced LDLs, the bad cholesterol. Posner says while "apples aren't superstars or noted for being high in vitamin C." research is beginning to show they contain phytonutrients or chemicals such as quercetin. Zimmerman says, quercetin is also found in onions and black tea and some experts think it may

work as an antioxidant to fight free radicals which damage cells.

'We've always known that's there's a

link between healthy eating and avoiding heart disease, protecting against cancer," said Posner, who sees clients at Healthy Ways Nutrition Counseling (www.gailposner.com) in West Bloomfield.

At this time of year Posner's helping freshman who've put on 15 pounds at college. Boaters and those who spend time at cottages frequently put on weight as well. Posner encourages them to plan their meals and snacking ahead of time and purchase fresh fruits and a vegetable tray, but use salsa or fat free dips.


"Study after study shows that people who include fruits, vegetables, whole grains, fish, and healthy oils in their diets have fewer diseases," said Posner. "As nutrition is a young science, we're just starting to learn the specifics on what's in foods beyond vitamins. We're learning about phytonutrients in foods. We believe it has something to do with protecting against damaging oxidation."

A new study from the University of Massachusetts Lowell Center for Cellular Neurobiology and Neurodegeneration Research suggests that consuming apple juice could protect against cell damage in the brain that contributes to age-related memory loss. Even though the research was done on test animals, the findings, published in January in the Journal of Alzheimer's Disease, were

"Research is a sign of what's coming in the future," said Posner. "It's about how we're learning about other properties that make apples healthy. So enjoy. Apples are crisp, delicious, and come in a huge variety of flavors and convenient 100 calorie packages (medium apple)."

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#### Emergency physicians urge bicyclists to take precautions

For many of us, especially young people, summer means hopping on your bike and going for a ride. Unfortunately for approximately 500,000 people each year, it is a ride that ends in an emergency department.

În fact, more children ages 5 to 14 visit U.S. hospital emergency departments for injuries associated with bicycles than any other sport. The American College of Emergency Physicians (ACEP) is urging everyone who rides a bicycle to wear a protective helmet and ride in a safe manner.

"The use of helmets is the single most effective way to reduce head injuries and fatalities resulting from bicycle crashes," said Dr. Rick Blum, president of ACEP. "If everyone who rides a bike this summer would first put on a helmet, there would be far fewer bike riders in emergency departments with serious injuries."

Universal bicycle helmet use by children ages 4 to 15 would prevent between 135 and 155 deaths each year, plus up to 45,000 head injuries and 18,000 to 55,000 scalp and facial injuries, according to the National SAFE KIDS Campaign. However, there is no federal law requiring chil-

dren to wear bicycle helmets,

and as of February this year, only 20 states and the District of Columbia had helmet laws applying to young bicyclists.

Blum and the ACEP suggest you keep the following safety advice in mind as you head out on your biking adventures this

Make sure your helmet fits properly. Obey traffic signs and signals. Never ride against the flow of traffic. Use proper hand signals. Never carry another person on your bike and never ride with headphones. Make sure the bicycle is well-maintained and is the correct size for the rider. Blum says the best advice regarding bicycle

safety is to use common sense. "Many of the people, of all ages, that I've treated in the emergency department over the years for injuries sustained from a bike crash told me they were doing something they knew wasn't the right thing to do. And once they are treated in the emergency department, they vow never to do it again."


**SCOOTER AND SKATEBOARD** 

As scooters and skateboards gain popularity, so do the number of injuries related to their use. In 2000, as non-motorized scooters literally took off, the Consumer Product Safety Commission estimated more

than 40.000 emergency room visits were due to scooter injuries. The CPSC estimates more than 10,000 emergency room visits were the result of injures due to motorized scooters in 2003-2004. Two-thirds of those injured using motorized scooters were under 15 years of age. The ACEP urges parents to carefully monitor children using scooters and skateboards and to always have vour children wear pads protecting their elbows, wrists and knees.

"Kids don't typically ride as fast on scooters and skateboards as they do on bicycles," says Blum, "but falling on unprotected elbows and knees causes a lot of injures. One key way to reduce these injuries is to wear pads



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### Broadway spectacular


Band plays **American** music in British brass tradition



The Motor City Brass Band may not have 76 trombones on stage for its season finale, but director Craig Strain promises the concert will be a Broadway spectacular nevertheless.

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
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
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





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# Good life: Project set for downtown Ann Arbor

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
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# Walkout would be perfect for the Carriage Hills


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
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
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
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
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## Rotted posts imbedded in concrete can be repaired

Years ago, it was common practice to imbed porch and patio posts in concrete. It was simple: Dig a hole, set the post and pour concrete around it.

The idea was to enjoy the added strength provided by the concrete while at the same time creating a barrier between the post and the earth - all in hopes of improving lasting quality.

Whoops, it doesn't work. Actually, concrete is almost as porous as dirt and it doesn't prevent the wood it surrounds from being attacked by mois-

You have two repair choices and neither one requires concrete removal: You can fully replace the post, or you can trim an inch off the very bottom of the post and repair it using a metal post bracket.

In either case, you will need

to temporarily brace whatever it with one or two 16d box nails. is that the post supports - a porch beam, for example.

Measure the distance between the porch and the beam, add a half-inch to your measurement and cut a two-byfour to that length.

Next, snugly wedge the twoby-four between the beam and the porch. Don't try to get the brace perfectly plumb.

Tack the top of the two-byfour support to the porch beam

For safety, lay another two-byfour on the porch and wedge it between the base of the two-byfour support and something solid like a planter or the front of the house.

A couple of connectors will make either job quick and easy. The first hangar is a post base and is a surface-mounted connector. The second one, the column base, is designed to be imbedded in concrete. This is the one you would use if you were to dig out the old post and replace it with concrete.

Now it's time to determine whether to replace the entire post or just the lowest inch or

Use a screwdriver to prod the suspect area of the post. If the rot is confined to the area immediately adjacent to the concrete, simply cut off the lowest inch of the post.

First, cut the post off at the

concrete. Lay a handsaw on its side right on the concrete and cut away.

Next, tack the post in place with a couple of nails or screws (you'll have to toenail here). This will hold the post in place while the second cut is made.

Making the second cut is easy when you use the following technique:

Lay a 1-inch-thick spacer on the porch (a piece of wood, a book, whatever). Lay the side of your handsaw on the spacer, using it as a guide to make a perfect second cut that will remove slightly more than 1 inch of material between the porch and what is now the new bottom of the post.

At this point the porch post should be literally hanging off the beam about an inch away from the concrete. The hard part is done. All you have to do now is insert a post base bracket and a spacer into the void.

Push the post to the side just enough to mount the bracket over the existing hole. Nail or bolt it in place, insert the 1-inch spacer and swing the post into the connector and nail it to the bottom of the post.

If the wood in the post hole is completely disintegrated, then dig it out and fill it with concrete. In this situation an "imbedded" style connector can be placed in the wet concrete patch.

If the rot is excessive and travels up the post, then installing a new post will be necessary.

Simply make a single cut into the post at the porch and swing it out to disconnect it from the beam (you may have to first unnail a bracket at the location where the post meets the beam).

Cut a new post to fit and use one of the two previously mentioned mounting procedures.

## Maintain sump pump regularly

As spring approaches, so do the rains and wet weather.

And with the rains comes the potential for basement flooding.

That's why it is vital for homeowners to ensure their sump pump is maintained properly and ready to handle the soaking rains that are sure to hit the Detroit area in the next few months.

According to Pete Wood, president of Rooter, MD in Livonia, faulty sump pumps are one of the main reasons homeowners have flooding problems in their basement, especially during the rainy sea-

To make sure the sump pump is working properly, Wood suggests following these maintenance tips:

Clean all debris from the pit and the screen on the water intake of the sump pump to make sure it isn't clogged.

Test the pump by taking the lid off and pouring about five gallons of water into the pit at one-gallon intervals. The pump should completely drain/pump each gallon out of the pit.

Check to make sure the outlet pipe for the sump pump isn't plugged and that it is directing water away from the house.

Install a water-activated backup for your sump pump to ensure your pump works even if your power is out.

Make sure the pump's electric cord and plug aren't defective. If the cord isn't working properly (or if it is unplugged), the sump pump won't work.

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## 2007 Toyota Fj Cruiser 4x4 Stirs Up The Neighborhood

My lawn service guy, my neighbor, a girl working a fast-food drive through -- they all had the same question: what is that you re driving?

They had a good reason for asking. What I was driving was a brand new model for 2007 and it has a rather unique look to it. The 2007 Toyota FJ Cruiser looks like the product of a marriage between a Range Rover and a Jeep.

Its heritage actually goes back to the FJ40 4x4, which Toyota built from 1960-83. This version is more sleek and stylish, but it s a rugged off-road vehicle that should find a nice niche. With only two doors, it s not really family transportation; it s aimed squarely at young singles and couples who like to live and play outdoors, going boating, off-roading or camping.

The FJ Cruiser, which comes in two- and four-wheel drive versions, looks ready to hit the road, or go offroad right away. It s got rugged 17-inch wheels, a roof rack, skid plates, and mudguards. The front fascia features two round five-inch headlights -which throw off very bright light -and in the back there is a rear mounted spare tire. The wide front windshield comes with three short wiper blades to cover the whole surface. There's a rear door that swings open, with a rear window that lifts up independently of the door to accommodate longer items like lumber.

Inside, the FJ looks and feels like it s ready for business. The seats are comfortable and provide good support, and are covered by fabric backed by a resin coating designed to make the seats easy to wipe down and clean. The driver s seat adjusts eight ways, while the passenger's seat adjusts four ways. The rear seat is a 60/40 split seat with removable bottom and back cushions to provide a flat cargo surface.

The instrument panel features a full package of gauges, including a tachometer, amp meter, and temperature gauge, and there's an oil change warning light, as well. The controls for HVAC and the optional locking rear differential are located in the center console. Power windows and locks are standard, as are

a rear defogger and tilt steering wheel. To get remote keyless entry, cruise control, rear wiper, daytime running lights, and power outside mirror youll need to spend almost 1900 extra bucks for Toyota s

Convenience Package for the FL Cruiser. Also included in that package is a rear parking sonar —very helpful because visibility to the side and rear is not very good. Backing out of a driveway is something you ll have to do even more carefully with the FJ.

The standard auto system in the FJ is an AM/FM/ CD system with six speakers, including two in the headliner, and it sounds pretty good. You can upgrade to a system that gives you eight speakers and an indash six-disc CD changer. Yet another optional system adds a ninth speaker -7.9-inch sub-woofer powered by its own dedicated amplifier. All the systems come with an auxiliary input for an mp3 player or other device but you ll have to supply the cord.

What you won t have to supply is power. The FJ Cruiser is powered by a 4.0-liter, 24-valve, DOHC V6 engine that s rated at 239 hp and 278 lb.-ft. of torque. It's mated with either a five-speed automatic or sixspeed manual transmission (only the automatic is available on the two-wheel driver version). The manual transmission is easy to shift with a smooth throw in the forward gears; reverse, however, can be tough to get into. When you get into reverse, you'll hear a warning beep to let you know. The 239 horses and the smooth transmission make acceleration relatively quick and easy, even for an SUV of this width. The EPA rating is 16/19 mpg; I got a little less, and it does require

premium fuel.

The FJ Cruiser is meant to work --with the optional trailer hitch you can tow up to 5000 lbs.

If all you do is city driving, the FJ s ride may not be to your liking; there are other SUVs that are more suited to city driving and smooth out the bumps a bit more. It s not unduly harsh, but you do get jostled around some on bumpy roads. A high-mounted, double-wishbone suspension system is up front featuring tubular shock absorbers, and anti-sway bar and a stabilizer bar. In the rear, it s a four-coil spring suspension with a lateral rod, tubular shock absorbers and an anti-sway bar.

The steering system is a variable-ratio, hydraulically-assisted rack-and-pinion system. The FJ also comes with Vehicle Stability Control, Traction Control and four-channel, four-sensor anti-lock brakes. Two rows of side-curtain airbags are available as an option.

The 2007 Toyota FJ Cruiser starts at about \$23,000. Add the Convenience Package -cruise 🐉 control, power outside mirror, rear parking sensor, daytime running light, remote keyless entry -and the optional towing hitch, and you re at about \$25,500. In these days of high gas prices, how many of these can Toyota sell? I m not sure, but based on the number of looks and questions I got about it, I m willing to bet they sell more than a few.

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
