Canton truck driver gets four years for fatal accident

A Canton truck driver was sentenced to four years in prison Tuesday for causing a 2006 accident that killed several students from Indiana's Taylor University. The accident garnered national headlines because authorities confused the identities

of two of the crash victims.

Judge Brian Hutchison of Indiana's Jay Circuit Court sentenced Robert F. Spencer, 38, to eight years but suspended four years, which he will serve on probation. On May 29, Spencer pleaded guilty to five counts of reckless homicide and four counts of

criminal recklessness resulting in serious bodily injury.

Spencer has already served more than a year behind bars, and with time off for good behavior, he could be released

in about a year, according to the prosecutor in the case. The judge also fined Spencer \$5,000, ordered him to perform 500 hours of community service, and permanently took away

his commercial driver's license.

"Your driving days are done as a way of making a living," Judge Hutchison said when he

Fewer kids could be walking to school

It appears the effort by the Plymouth-Canton Schools Board of Education to save \$206,000 in busing costs by increasing the elementary walking distance from a mile to 1.5 miles will net only a fraction of the desired cost savings.

After complaints by parents about unsafe walking conditions, the board — at its June 26 meeting — reduced the number of affected students from 2,400 to 641. The budget savings dropped to about \$40,000.

At Tuesday's meeting, more residents complained about young children crossing busy streets to get to Dodson and Bird elementaries School board President Judy Mardigian requested Supt. Jim Ryan once again evaluate the busing situation, which will most likely result in little, if any relief, on the budget.

we're concerned when the weather gets bad it's going to be dangerous for the kids," said Matt vanRuiten of Plymouth Township, who represented 10 families. "And Bird can't handle the number of cars."

Bruce Christenson of Canton Township, whose children walk to Dodson, said students in the Fairways subdivision would be crossing a busy Glengarry Road to get to class.

"Children will have to weave their way through the subdivision, and there are a lot of crossroads, a lot of courts and a lot of traffic," Christenson said.

Mardigian, said the safety of students - not money - is the main concern.

"We've made exceptions for safety issues, and we need to review and evaluate it again," Mardigian said. "If there are buses already in their neighborhood with space available, that would be a nice compromise."

Michigan Avenue ramp opening delayed until this weekend

Motorists and business owners waiting for the Michigan Avenue exit ramp on southbound I-275 to re-open are going to have to show a little more patience.

Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) officials have delayed the ramp's opening until this weekend. "We're looking at Saturday, probably

towards the end of the day. That's our anticipation," said MDOT spokesman Rob Morosi. The ramp was closed in July and was

originally scheduled to be re-opened last week, which was then pushed back to Aug. 15. Construction crews could not make that deadline, however, due to wet weather last

Morosi said the main hang-up now is getting power to the new signal at Michigan Avenue.

"We're waiting on some work from DTE for the new signal that is being installed. Once we can get that power hooked up and everything along that line, we can open up that ramp," he said.

Business owners near the ramp have been frustrated with the closing, and have seen a sharp decline in business.

The project, which is being done by MDOT, involves creating an additional lane to provide dual right- and left-turn lanes and reconfiguring the median crossover to keep trucks from overtopping the existing curb.

Traffic signals will also be reconfigured.

The roadwork began in June and is expected to last until early September.

New firm helps sellers move properties without the hefty commissions

When Joan Bellemare describes her 1,500-squarefoot ranch home on 2.1 acres in Canton Township, it sounds like a little piece of heaven on earth.

"It's close to everything you need, but yet it's like being Up North, the deer just pass through here," said Bellemare of the three-bedroom home with cathedral ceilings, a walkout basement and five-car garage. "It's so peaceful, your blood pressure drops 10 points

when you come up the drive." However, with home sales on a downward spiral and mortgage foreclosures at record numbers, not even the gods are smiling on this slice of heaven,

much to the disappointment of Bellemare and her husband,

We've had it on the market for about a year," said Joan Bellemare, "but, we've only had a few nibbles.

The Bellemares, whose home was appraised at \$400,000 last year, started with a selling price of \$385,000. Since then, they've dropped it several times, and are still having trouble getting interested buyers at \$349,000.

The Canton couple sold three previous homes themselves, saving thousands of dollars in Realtor commissions.

"However, it was at a point where we thought we'd have to get a Realtor involved," said



Either way, Cifaldi, 64, of Canton says she had a ball in the Western Wayne County Senior Olympics and is thrilled about this year's activities, which kick off Monday.

After throwing out a couple of the competitions she was in, Cifaldi chuckled and said she thinks she got the silver for the frisbee toss.

"That was great, but it wasn't about that. I was there more for the fun," she said.

The Olympics will open Monday, Aug. 20, with an 8 a.m. 5K run in Heritage Park. Other activities include the traditional breakfast at 9 a.m. and the opening ceremonies at 10 Janet Brady, Canton's senior program supervisor, said more than 400 people from 16 communities have signed on to participate in the festivities.

The five-day event, which includes competitions such as tennis, baking, creative writing, swimming and shuffleboard, will feature residents from Westland, Livonia, Plymouth, Garden City, Redford Township, Wayne, Belleville and Van Buren Township.

"It's amazing to see this," Brady said. "All you can say is 'wow.' We are all very excited."

Open to western Wayne County men and women age 50 and older, gold, silver and bronze medals are up for grabs — even if not too many people seem to want them.

"It's a fun thing — my friends and I cheer each other on," said Rose Treusch, 73. "We get a little chuckle out of it. It's more fun than competitive." Treusch of Canton plans to participate in the ring toss, soccer kick, softball throw, frisbee toss and photography contest.

"I'm always going around taking pictures and a couple people said, 'Why not get in that photo contest?' I'm not a professional, but I think it will be fun," she said.

The 2007 Olympics include several new competitions, including a 12-mile bicycle contest.

"I think people really enjoy being with each other and being active," Brady said.

"They get out there, have fun and form friendships."

The event will close at noon Friday, Aug. 24, with a banquet at Fellows Creek Golf Club. Spectators are welcome to attend the competitions.

The 3 E's

McCotter gives business group look at D.C.'s view of Michigan

There were no protesters nor was there a mention of the Iraq war when U.S. Congressman Thaddeus McCotter stopped by to talk to members of the Garden City Chamber of Commerce last week.

Instead, the Livonia Republican spent the time talking about the three E's - the economy, education and employment.

McCotter expressed frustration at trying to make his colleagues understand that Michigan is vastly different than other states, that while they are experiencing economic growth, "what is happening here is a one-state recession.

"Las Vegas is experiencing 1,000 new residents a week; in the rest of the country, unemployment is 4.6 percent,"

sure their state is economically competitive. Government will not lead the people to prosperity. 'It's going to be the creativi-

ty and the genius of the people of Michigan to lead it to prosperity," he added.

Michigan who must make

The Northeast and Midwest are losing population to the South, McCotter predicts that state will probably lose one House seat in the next population count.

The state also is losing its young people, a loss McCotter calls the "subsidizing of workers for other states.'

"Michigan can't compete with Indiana for jobs, Michigan can't compete with India for jobs," he said. "The people of Michigan have to make this state economically competitive."

When asked what could be done at the federal level to control college tuition,

McCotter told his audience he couldn't see anything coming from the federal government to "hold down tuition." College costs have increased higher than health care costs and part of the problem is a lack of competition, he said.

"A lot of students want to go to college and as the numbers increase, you would think the universities would want to keep their costs down to attract more students," he said. "But they don't do that, they don't compete."

McCotter believes there should be rewards, like more federal money, for colleges and universities which do keep tuition down.

"If we continue to subsidize them, they will spend the money as they see fit," he said. "The federal government keeps giving them money, but it doesn't seem to be going to the students, it's going to administration.

A bright spot for the state in Washington is the lack of higher fuel standards in the current energy bill. McCotter said it took a bipartisan fight to prevent the government from "arbitrarily raising standards."

"In Washington, they believe the auto industry is responsible for the problem of global warming, when it's the auto industry that is the leader in green technology," he said.



District waits for Lansing to fix budget

With start of the 2007-2008 school year just weeks away, Wayne-Westland school officials are still waiting to hear what, if any money they will be receiving from the state.

Will the school aid payment remain the same as last year? Will it be cut? Will it be more? Those are the questions they would like an answer to now rather than latter.

"I've never seen it this bad in the 33-34 years I've been in education, the state has really done nothing," said Wayne-Westland School Superintendent Greg Baracy. "From everything I've read, it doesn't seem that they are willing to sit down and work.'

State lawmakers were able to resolve this year's budget deficit with what Gary Martin, deputy superintendent for administrative and business services, has called "gimmicks," and come up with a replacement for the state's Single Business Tax.

But when it comes to erasing a billion-dollar deficit in next year's budget, nothing has been accomplished to date.

"It's puzzling and perplexing for us," said Baracy. "Once again, we're trying to estimate what the revenue will be for the another year. We've been dealing with the issue all summer to get ready for the fall, but we don't see that same commitment in Lansing."

Close to 76 percent of Wayne-Westland's revenue comes from the state. Martin has projected the district will get \$89.6 million from the state, but according to Baracy, the actual amount "has been all over the board."

The school board approved a new budget in June with no increase in state school aid, but there's also been rumors of rollbacks and increases.

"The question we have to ask ourselves is how can we plan intelligently under these conditions," Baracy said. "If they expect high standards and high accountability, we have to have a very prescriptive process and goals in place before the fiscal year starts."

The district had some \$25 million in reserves five years ago, but that has been eaten up covering shortfalls in state revenue. According to Baracy, the district is now facing the prospect of borrowing money to cover expenses.

"We've held off as long as long as we could," he said. "We're looking at severe cuts in 2008-2009, if the state doesn't come through with a revenue enhancement. We can't hang on anymore."


Baracy said cuts will be made in areas that will not impact student programs.

The district has been trimming expenses for years, saving \$18 millions through such things as negotiated changes in employee health care.

But those kinds of cuts can only go so deep. As a result, the solution to the school districts' woes are in the hands of state lawmakers.

The leaders in Lansing have to solve the budget crisis and they haven't done that yet," he said. "We have no more rabbits to pull out of our hats.'

Residents urged to conserve water

In an effort to help protect water resources, Canton residents are urged to conserve water during the month of August. By over watering lawns, pollution is easily carried into storm drains that lead directly to lakes and streams. By using less water you can help prevent pollution and save money.

Canton officials offer the following simple steps to help conserve water and protect lakes and rivers from pollution:

■ Water wisely: In general, lawns need about an inch of water a week. Over watering lawns results in shallow-rooted plants that are less tolerant to heat and drought, making them more prone to disease.

Avoid over watering by using a rain gauge and watering only when necessary.

■ Residents and businesses can also help conserve water and lower water rates by voluntarily limiting outdoor water usage to odd/even days. Residents and businesses with odd numbered addresses are asked to water only on odd

numbered dates. Likewise, those with even numbered addresses should water lawns, fill swimming pools, and wash cars only on even numbered

■ Residents are asked to voluntarily limit outdoor water use between the hours of 5 a.m. and 9 a.m. Water consumption is often at its peak during

this time of day and observing water use restrictions enables all customers to continue receiving an even distribution of water with minimal low-

pressure problems. ■ Improve your aim: Adjust your sprinklers to water only your lawn and plants, not your driveway, sidewalk, or street.

■ Use mulch: Place a thick

layer of mulch, about four inches, around trees and plants. This helps to retain water, reduce weeds, and minimize

the need for pesticides. ■ Sweep it: Clean sidewalks and driveways with a broom instead of a hose. You'll save water and keep unwanted pol-

lutants out of the storm drain. ■ Put rainwater to work: Use rainwater to water your plants. Direct downspouts toward your plants and green areas or collect water with rain barrels for later use.








Carnival raises money to fight slavery

Youngsters involved in a Westland church's youth group have spent much of their summer tackling a weighty issue - slavery. Their efforts at St. John's Episcopal Church will culminate Sunday with a special carnival aimed at raising money and drawing attention to the world problem of slavery.

Youth group leader Jessica Clark, 22, learned how widespread the problem of slavery is after her Adrian College chapter of Alpha Sigma Alpha sorority became involved in the international, anti-slavery Not For Sale

campaign. Clark, a senior majoring in Japanese studies and theater, brought the issue back to her church at 555 S. Wayne Road at Bayview. The youth group she oversees enthusiastically took up the anti-slavery cause.

"Out of 27 million slaves in the world, 13 million of them are children, so it really is a child's cause," Clark said Wednesday.

Even in the United States, even in suburban communities, some guardians have forced children to drop out of school and to serve as slaves, Clark said. Sometimes, she said, the problem involves sexual abuse.

Clark had to carefully teach her youth group, ages 8 to 16,

about the problem of slavery. She consulted church leaders to determine what was appropriate - and what was too graphic for the children.

As a result, the youth group has organized a Not For Sale carnival from noon to 6 p.m. Sunday at the church. The event will help raise money for the International Justice Mission, which fights slavery and other issues of oppression. "Every single penny we raise is going toward the International Justice Mission," Clark said. The carnival will include a taco bar by Qdoba Mexican Grill, music and entertainment, a moon walk, a pie-throwing contest, a cake walk, Emagine Theater passes, T-shirts, a dunk tank and many more

Despite all the fun, the carnival will have a sobering message about slavery, with youngsters passing out fliers and engaging carnival-goers in conversations to teach them about the problem, Clark said. She urged anyone who wants more information to go online to the Not For Sale campaign at www.notforsale.org or to the International Justice Mission's Web site at www.ijm.org.





hen I first got involved in this business more than 20 years ago, it was very unusual for a mutual fund to have a change in managers. However, as the mutual fund industry has exploded in size — where in the past there were only hundreds of funds and today there are thousands of funds — it is no longer unusual to have a change in management. In fact, it has become a regular occurrence in the mutual fund industry.

The issue that you and I as investors need to be concerned with is what we should do when a mutual fund that we are invested in has a change in its management team.

There are many reasons why a mutual fund manager leaves. In the past few years, many successful managers have left to work for their own hedge funds. Managers also leave a fund to sometimes manage another fund at the same mutual fund company or to start their own mutual fund. Of course, another reason why mutual fund managers leave is because of their performance.

My general rule is that I do not automatically sell an investment because of a portfolio manager change. A change in manager can be good or bad for a fund and there are no set answers as to how an investor should react. Therefore, whenever a fund that I recommend or that I invest in has a management change, I first want to do some research on the situation before I react. I want to know why the manager has left.

Unfortunately, the mutual fund companies don't automatically notify you that there is a change in management. This is one of those areas where you have to be proactive. There are a few different ways to know when a portfolio manager has left and prob-

When a portfolio manager leaves, you do not necessarily have to make a decision immediately. You have time to do your research and make an informed decision. In reaching your decision, it is important to know and to understand the fund itself. Some mutual funds are managed by a team, while other funds may be managed by a sole manager. In general, if the fund is managed by a team and one member of the team leaves, I generally will retain the fund. On the other hand, if a fund has been managed by one individual and that individual leaves, then more often than not I will generally sell the

When a fund is managed by one lead manager and that manager leaves, the fund is almost like a brand new mutual fund and it no longer has a track record. I believe one of the key reasons you invest in a fund is because of its performance; when a new manager takes over, it may be difficult to analyze its past performance. Of course, if the new manager has had a track record at another fund that I can independently analyze, that is one thing. However, if I do not have this independent information, my general view is that it is time to change funds.

I recognize that many people may question about selling a fund that they have done well in just because it has a new management team. However, my philosophy and my belief is that I am not loyal to an investment nor do I have any emotional attachment to an investment. I believe that when investors follow sound investment strategies, in the long run they end up making better investment decisions. When you make better investment decisions, you end up with more money in your pocket.

I know that the mutual fund companies do not want you to sell their funds and they certainly tend to underplay changes in portfolio managers. Some mutual fund companies are known to have a large turnover of managers and it is somewhat their strategy to constantly change management teams.

These funds will typically have a well-stocked bullpen of managers and changes in their management team historically have not caused a problem. However, funds like this are few and far between. As investors, we always have to be proactive and never be afraid to make changes when necessary. As investors, we should have no loyalty to our investments - after all, they don't have much loyalty to us. What you and I always need to focus on is how an investment fits into our portfolio and we should never hesitate to make changes where needed.

That doesn't mean that we should make changes for change itself; rather, we should make changes in our portfolio to give us a better opportunity to achieve our individual goals and objectives. Good luck!

Reopening I-275 exit should be a priority

Road officials are expected to reopen the Michigan Avenue exit ramp from southbound I-275 this week. Let's keep our fingers crossed and hope that's the case.

Actually, the ramp was originally scheduled to open Aug. 7, which was then pushed back to yesterday. Now Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) officials are saying it will likely reopen sometime late in the day on Saturday. They are waiting for DTE to hook up the new signal.

For most people living on the south end of town who use the freeway, the closing of the ramp has been a real inconvenience - they've been forced to either get off at Ford Road (never a desirable option) or drive south to the Ecorse Road exit and then double back to Michigan

Avenue (a waste of gas and time). However, for businesses on Michigan Avenue, espe-

cially those near the freeway, the ramp closing has been more than just an inconvenience. Gas stations, restaurants and hotels have ensure the ramp is reopened seen their business plummet since early July, when as quickly as possible. There MDOT closed the ramp. Some say business is down as much as 40 percent.

"Hurry up, man," was one frustrated business owner's

plea to road officials.

State and township officials have asked for patience. They say the improvements will be a big improvement to the exit, which has become much busier since development has come to the Michigan Avenue corridor in recent years.

Improvements being done include adding a lane to provide dual right and left turn lanes and reconfiguring the median crossover to keep trucks from overtopping the existing curb. Traffic signalization will also be reconfigured and upgraded as part of the safety

Even after the ramp is reopened, work on the project is scheduled to last until early September.

"Bear with us," Canton Township Engineer Tom Casari said. "The traffic will be much better right

While that is probably true, the township should do everything in its power to ensure the ramp is reopened as quickly as possible. There are a lot of businesses counting on it.

Governor's reforms are a good first step

In the ongoing debate about how to balance the state's troubled budget, everyone agrees that essential reforms are needed in how state government operates.

At the heart of that debate is the Michigan corrections system and state sentencing guidelines. Gov. Jennifer Granholm has proposed sentencing reforms in an attempt to reduce the state's prison and jail population and bring Michigan more in line with other state's in the

The reforms making their way through the Legislature include repealing 25 felonies that are rarely prosecuted such as adultery and dueling; changing 142 felonies to misdemeanors, including felonious driving and false election statements; dropping the maximum penalty for 58 felonies; reducing the dollar threshold for felony property crimes; and lightening penalties for drug offenses.

Michigan spends about \$2 billion a year on its prison system, more than it spends on its 15 state universities combined. The suggested reforms would result in 3,300 fewer inmates over three years and reduce the number of beds in county jails by 2,000, according to the Michigan Department of Corrections.

In an Associated Press story, Russ Marian, state corrections spokesman said, "We need these sentencing reforms. If we want to see significant cost savings, we need to decrease the prison population."

Attorney General Mike Cox and other enforcement officials have objected to the reforms. Cox called them "seriously flawed" and dangerous.

While some of his objections are worth considering, his immediate rejection of the reform package seems more

politically motivated than professional. At at a time when Michigan ranks at the top for incar-

ceration rate in the region (40 percent higher) and near the top nationally and prison costs are continuing to escalate, it is clear that strong reforms are overdue. The Citizens Research Council estimates that if Michigan has an incarceration rate equal to the average in the region, general fund spending for corrections in the Michigan budget might be reduced by as much as \$500 million.

We believe the governor's proposal is a good first step toward much needed reform and urge the attorney general and others to offer constructive alternatives without making a wholesale rejection of a much-needed reform.

No help in sight

I originally applied for Social Security disability in November 2003 and after being denied, requested an appeal hearing, which they received in March 2006. It has now been 19 months since the hearing request.

I have paid into Social Security for 30 some years and they always received the money right up front, but since my doctor told me I could no longer work, me and my dear wife of 31 years have suffered a long list of hardships. She was working two jobs at one time, trying to help out, but now that has taken its toll and her health is failing.

So with no insurance and no income. we are struggling to get her proper care. Cancer has been suggested and as of today has not been ruled out as she has more tests and more doctors to see. We have sold most of our belongings of any value and put our home of 24 years up for sale with no luck yet. Also, we have filed for bankruptcy, and we are still in danger of foreclosure, but trying very hard to keep our home.

I do receive food assistance and have applied to the state for medical disability assistance which, after being turned down and a subsequent hearing, I was declared disabled under SSI guidelines, guided by rule 201.10 by a state administrative law judge for purposes of SDA and MA programs, dated May 9, 2007, but I have yet to receive a dime from these programs.

A copy of this judgement along with a letter from my lawyer asking for a favorable ruling was mailed to the Social Security Administration office of disability adjudication and review, also in May, with no response. In the meantime, we are about to lose our house, and my poor wife's health is still in question. I have written Sen. Debbie Stabenow several times before with no results other than a letter from SSA saying basically they will get to me in their own sweet time while we lose everything.

It is really a shame that an institution such as the SSA can ignore a senator and ruin the lives of the very people they were created to serve and whom without they would not even exist.

optimistic on bridge project

might not have enough fingers to keep in the dike more commonly known as the Sheldon Road underpass project in Plymouth

But you have to give Helmkamp - the assistant Wayne County executive who has become, at least from the county's perspective, the face of the project - credit. He keeps trying to plug the holes. And any day now, he's probably going to have to take off

There are signs that all his plugging may very well be working, at least a little bit.

Last week, for the first time in months, there were actually construction workers in the construction zone, surely a welcome site, particularly for the businesses along that stretch of road that has been closed since April and will be closed for at least another 16 months.

Brad Kadrich We say "at least" because there isn't really anyone we can find - except Helmkamp - who thinks

this project is going to get done on time. On the other hand, there are many examples in Michigan's history that show more complicated projects done in reasonable time. Though the Mackinac Bridge Authority was established in 1950, the actual construction of the five-mile expanse took some 31/2 years and was finished in November 1957.

The 2.5-mile Ambassador Bridge connecting Detroit and Windsor was built in two years, as was the mile-long Detroit-Windsor Tunnel. Those might not be directly analogous, since the Sheldon Road underpass isn't slated to go over — or under — a river.

Of course, the Sheldon Road underpass has had to withstand perhaps the largest obstacle to progress known to man: government. And there's been plenty of that to navigate.

Wayne County is footing the largest portion of the bill, paying much of it with federal grant money. Early on, it secured commitments from both the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees and the Plymouth City Commission. However, as the planning dragged on and it appeared costs were going to go up, the city commission balked and actually at one point withdrew support until Helmkamp agreed to cap the city's commitment at some \$500,000.

Helmkamp, who wasn't involved at the project's outset but who has nevertheless had to deal with seemingly endless delays and problems, has also had to navigate resistance from CSX (oddly enough, since it has

s hard as he's tried, Alan Helmkamp just Helmkamp, who wasn't involved at the project's outset but who has nevertheless had to deal with seemingly endless delays and problems, has also had to navigate resistance from CSX (oddly enough, since it has one of the smaller financial commitments and stands to gain the most with a quality project) and from the Detroit Water and Sewerage Department. The DWSD had no trouble supporting the project, as long as any water work was limited to non-peak seasons in order to protect the department's prime price-gouging season.

People on Mackinac Island actually started talking about a bridge across the Straits of Mackinac around 1884, more than 70 years before the bridge was actually built.

Through all the problems, Helmkamp may have wanted to turtle himself into a shell. Instead, he remains positive and helpful, returning phone calls, answering questions.

"Call me the eternal optimist, but I'm sticking to that," Helmkamp said of the scheduled December 2008 completion date. "If this means we have to revise the schedule and add shifts, even in the bad months, we'll do whatever we need to do to get it completed by

County's point man remains | Cruise over to where the roar of the Fords began

lot of cars roaring along Woodward for Saturday's Dream Cruise will be

The name Henry Ford means cars. Ford didn't invent the car nor did he conceive of the assembly line. But he combined the two and put the world on wheels.

Ford left us another legacy: the birthplace of the Model T.

Tucked away in an old - very old — corner of Detroit called the Milwaukee Junction, just a few blocks south of East Grand Boulevard and east of Woodward,

stands Henry Ford's Piquette plant. This is perhaps the only original pioneering auto factory that is open to the public and still retains its original feel.

It should, considering much of the plant has not been changed since the day that Henry Ford left the building in 1910 for his new, gigantic factory in

Highland Park.

Ford built the plant in 1904, less than a year after he founded his company. The three-story brick building measures 402 feet long by 56 feet wide. It was here that Ford designed the Model T and built 12,000 copies of the car. You can still find a fleet of them on display in the

I went there on a steamy Saturday afternoon, and the solid brick structure retained the heat like an oven. That was fine - after all, when this plant was built, even Henry Ford didn't have air conditioning in his office.

The interior walls of his office are gone, although you can still see where they stood in a corner on the second floor, along with the foundation of the old vault that used to be there. On a remaining wall hangs a photo of Ford's office, and comparing it to the space around you leaves no doubt that this is where Henry Ford sat. There's even an exact replica of Ford's desk. It's surprisingly small. That says something, one of the docents told me. Ford was not a man to be bothered by paperwork. He was a hands-on engineer.

the first floor where the businesses officfloor stands the special room where Ford and his designers came up with the plans for the Model T. The plant is infused with age and his-

tory. The original massive steel fire doors are still in place. Overhead are heavy wooden beams, and looking out the windows you can see the railroad tracks adjoining the property. It is nearly identical to the view that Ford would have seen 100 years ago.

There is a variety of classic Fords on display throughout the plant. Some are still used to take visitors for a jaunt to the nearby New Center area, so you can still catch a whiff of car exhaust and hear the sputter of a Model T in motion.

The Piquette plant is a marvelous place to visit and get a sense of history. We have the Model-T Automotive Heritage. Complex, Inc., or T-Plex, to thank for its presence. Until 1997, the Piquette plant was just another abandoned building facing demolition.

Historian and educator Jerald Mitchell got wind of plans to tear down the plant and approached the Henry Ford Heritage Association with a proposal to form a committee to save the plant. That led to T-Plex and the ongoing efforts to restore the factory.


The T-Plex folks have done a marvelous job, but there is still much work to be. done. The windows have to be replaced and many of the display cases are empty. But step by step, the plant is coming back to its old grandeur.

The Piquette plant is open to the public on the first and third Saturday of the month between May and October. Find out more at www.tplex.org. Admission is \$10 per person.

It's money well-spent.



shocked," she said.


"My husband listens to them every day. He wrote the entry," said Michele, who works at Centerline Electric. The fact that Doug listens helped him



Snakes have the Cruise events are piling up in Birmingham law on their side

igns in natural areas are low on my like list. Leash your dog. No fires. Don't litter. Much of the information is common sense, but signs are needed to enforce laws.

Some signs, however, are refreshing, especially when they provide nature interpretation and remind the park owners that's you — that parks are not pacified playgrounds free of wild things and functioning aspects of nature's way. Many national parks are working on signage to educate the public on black bears, a potentially dangerous creature when they are habituated to our bad behavior. And cougar advisory signs can be found at Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore in Michigan. Some local parks are telling the tale of the eastern coyote, steps in the right direction.

Seven Lakes State Park, near Holly, deserves congratulations for its bold action in strategically placing a unique wildlife crossing sign. This sign stops you dead in your tracks for a second look, and that's what it's meant to do: inform, educate and protect a resource.

Seven Lakes is a wildland gem operated by the Michigan DNR. Enter the park and just a ways down the road you can't miss a prominent standard vellow highway sign. This one, in bold letters, proclaims: "CAUTION, SNAKE CROSSING, PROTECTED SPECIES". A detailed rattlesnake picture appears on the sign along with the words, "Eastern Massasauga Rattlesnake, Venomous-Protected Species."

It's my guess that many county residents have no idea massasauga rattlesnakes, Michigan's only venomous snake, true pit vipers, live in Oakland County. Many parks under management of the Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority and Oakland County Parks have placed small rattlesnake signs near trails and their naturalists pass the word. Well and good.

I chatted with DNR biologist Julie Oakes, who confirmed that the rattlesnake signs at Seven Lakes are unique. In her words, "We stole the idea from Sterling State Park that

after an offleash dog — a violation of law — was bitten by a rattler. The dog survived, but the owner was not happy that he did not know rattlers were in the park.

Fact of the matter, many nat-

ural areas in Oakland County have rattlesnakes. Some of my favorite "rattlesnakes parks" are Indian Springs, Kensington and Stony Creek metro parks, Independence and Orion Oaks county parks and the Bald Mountain State Recreation Area, along with many small protected areas and sanctuaries in northern Oakland County. Rattlesnakes also live in some new subdivisions that are adjacent to wetlands. The Paint Creek Trail, Polly Ann Trail, the Clinton River Tail and sections of the old tracks just west of the West Bloomfield Trail Network all have habitat that could very well support rattlers.

Every now and then, a massasauga bites a human. Humans survive. The snake usually does not. And they are not ankle bites. The great majority of the highly infrequent bites are direct result of harassment and stupidity and result in intoxicated adult males being bitten on their dominant hands seconds after the famous two-word phrase, "Watch this!"

In August, female massasaugas give birth to their live young in upland sites, then slowly slither peacefully back across roads to their wetlands, awaiting their season of hibernation, often in moist crayfish burrows. Give the snakes a break. It's the law.







Way to go: Loft living suits them just fine


A television on a turntable in the middle of a wall and a Murphy bed built from Lowe's cabinets and hardware found on the Internet demonstrate the creative customizability of the spaces available at SkyLofts MarketSquare in Royal Oak.

With a simple swivel, Tony Walser and Bob Burrell can watch their 40inch LCD TV from the living room in their loft or from the bedroom. For that matter, they can angle it for easy viewing from their open kitchen.

"It's a flexible space. The TV wall was just a divider - and not loadbearing," said Walser, a manufacturing engineer at Ford Motor Co. He used oak boards to craft a cabinet to frame the television screen and hold other electronic components. He stained it black to create a smooth backdrop. The power is simply fed through the wall up from the bottom and the cable wire comes in from the top. On the opposite side of the swivel is a contemporary painting. Depending on where they are watching television, the painting serves as a focal point in the opposite room.

To accommodate a home office as well as visiting friends and family, Walser built a bed that folds up against the wall in the loft's flex room. He assembled pantry-sized cupboards in a cherry finish to create depth and a frame around the bed, then built the bed's platform and mounted it between the cabinets, using the Create-a-Bed hardware found online. The bed uses a standard mattress. When overnight company arrives, they simply fold down the bed to create a guest room. When they do not have visitors, it is folded up and resembles a wall-to-wall armoire allowing more room for their home office. The loft's 10-foot high exposed concrete ceilings still leave plenty of room for decorative objects and pictures above.

"The legacy of lofts is that of spaces that are infinitely customizable,' said David Strosberg of Morningside Group, developer of SkyLofts MarketSquare, 101 Curry Avenue. "We adopt universally-appealing elements



of that legacy - high ceilings, exposed systems, open floor plans - while adding the amenities that today's homebuyers want. That still leaves plenty of room for the kind of creativity that Tony and Bob have demonstrated."

Burrell, 55, and Walser, 45, were living in a 1927 Ferndale "shotgun" house two years ago when they began an intense search for a new home. They looked all over southeast Michigan, from Ann Arbor to Mount Clemens. They considered every kind of housing, including attached and detached condos and single-family homes, but "every time we looked in our price range we found a 1950s bathroom and a kitchen needing work," Burrell said. "I said, 'I'm just too old for this." The Morningside concept struck an immediate chord. "We liked the modern feel – a little

industrial but with a more refined look," he said. They were the first residents to move into the building. Sand-colored walls in the loft

provide a backdrop for earth-toned furnishings, gleaming metallics and splashes of the primary colors that predominated in their former home. They shopped at a veritable Yellow Pages of Detroit furniture and accessories stores. The black leather sofa came from Macy's furniture outlet at Northland Center. The flex room's office cabinets are from IKEA, stools at the extra-long kitchen peninsula came from Bright Ideas, the print chair from Art Van and the coffee table from Scott Shuptrine. Then again, a coat of red paint and modern hardware on a 1940's era dresser in the bedroom turned it from bland blonde to a boffo contemporary piece.

Burrell has the eye for accessories and color and he likes to paint. He serves as Walser's assistant on their projects. One test of their relationship was remodeling the bathroom together in their old house, which was a success despite the incident with the sledgehammer and the toilet.

"It's a blessing and a curse with Tony," he chuckled."These creative types just go off sometimes." Burrell retired from a job in quality control at Ford Motor Co. in 2007. MarketSquare's location suits his new

"We wanted to be in a city, where there are plenty of things to do," he said. "Everything is so close. I can walk to the library, Superior Fish, CVS and a hardware store.

Fire protection engineeers urge: Get out!

A nationwide survey conducted by Bethesda, Md.-based Society for Fire **Protection Engineers reveals** Americans' first reactions to fire could place them in greater danger.

When asked "If there were a fire in your building, what would be your first action?" 39 percent of respondents said they would call the fire department.

"At first glance this seems like a sensible response," said Chris Jelenewicz, SFPE Engineering Program manager. "However, people should first exit the building and then call the fire department once in a safe location."

Only 28 percent of Americans answered that their first action would be to leave the burning building. Other responses included notifying others (24 percent), fighting the fire (4 percent)), searching for the source of fire (3 percent), and searching for

more information (2 percent). "The results of this survey are concerning," said Jelenewicz. "Delays before deciding to evacuate, time spent searching

for the fire, gathering belongings and trying to fight the fire are behaviors that have been observed repeatedly in real fire situations."

When comparing the results of this survey to research on how humans behave in fire, a study of 335 fire incidents that occurred in the U.S. found the top three first reactions were: notifying others (15 percent), fighting the fire (10 percent) and searching for the fire (10 percent). Exiting the building was not even among the top five things people do when they know there is a fire.

The survey also revealed that the elderly, who are statistically a high-risk group from fires, generally respond incorrectly. Over half of people 65 years old or older would first call the fire department, compared to 30 percent who would exit the

building first. The survey also shows that men are much more likely to try to fight the fire than women. Seven percent of men said that they would fight the fire, compared to less than 1

'There are significant differences in the way that men and women react to a fire," said Jelenewicz. "Generally, men are more likely to try and fight a fire. On the other hand, women are more likely to alert others and evacuate the building.

The survey was commissioned by the Society for Fire Protection Engineers in January 2007 by Synovate, and polled more than 1,000 American adults. The findings have a margin of error of plus or minus 3 percent.

Understanding how people might behave in fire emergencies is an important field of research in the fire protection engineering profession. This research is used by fire protection engineers to make buildings safer from fire.

Transfer fee rights are complicated

Q. I have heard about transfer fee rights being a buzz word on the real estate scene, where it is supposedly a technique for reserving future interests in the appreciation of the value of real property that's being sold. Do you have any information about it?

A. The transfer fee that you may be referring to starts with an agreement that is to be recorded at the chain of title. This agreement purports to be a servitude that attaches to the title of the land and burdens future owners for 99 years. In simple terms, this agreement provides for 1 percent of any future sale to be divided among the original covenantor, the company that licensed the use of the system, and the real estate broker. The transaction is much more complicated. The simple fact of the matter is that the transfer fee rights servitude provides that on any future sale, the future parties must pay I percent of the future gross sales price back to the consortium that holds these "transfer fee rights." How successful it will be remains to be seen.

Q. We made a purchase deposit on a house, but we cannot obtain financing to purchase it and we have not been able to close the deal. We have also acknowledged that we had an opportunity to inspect the property and related records, but did not condition the purchase on us getting a mortgage commitment. Do we have any chance of getting our money back?

you can negotiate something with the seller. The court would most likely hold that you should have done due diligence in inspecting the property and relevant records and in at least putting in a contingency with respect to your mortgage approval.

A. Probably not unless

You should also have a provision in your purchase agreement that it will be reviewed by your attorney before it becomes binding. These are all reasonable provisions which should be placed in any real estate contract before a house is purchased, and it is important to have an attorney review your contract before it becomes binding. Many times, purchasers think about getting an attorney for the "closing" and many times, the attorney cannot undo what turns out to be a bad purchase agreement.

STEERING CLEAR OF CRISIS ADDICTS

to handle the situation. This is particularly true when the person won't exit, for whatever reason. He could be your boss, the owner's son or daughter, a co-worker or even a key customer. What causes the chronic crises? How can you prevent them? What tactics can you implement if you can't?

Let's go to the root of the problem first. Russ Ouellette, president of Executive Advisory Services L.L.C., in Bedford, N.H., explains that the problem you face may be unrelated to the workplace. "It's usually a personal thing," he states. "It may have to do with self-esteem, how they learned to be in an organization and what they think is good management."An outdated authoritarian approach, for example, may well conflict with today's "more agile and flexible" management style, which empowers people and emphasizes teamwork.

It's critical to assess the situation before you take any action, indicates Noah Blumenthal, president of Leading Principles Inc., in New Hyde Park, N.Y., an executive coaching firm. "There's a level of personalitymanufactured crisis in a reasonable spectrum," he points out. "Worriers who are stressed out create stress for others, but they're not the same as those who are overthe-line into an unrealistic and potentially damaging view of reality." **CRISIS BEHAVIOR**

Business forecaster David Goldsmith, president of MetaMatrix Consulting Group L.L.C., in Manlius, N.Y., isn't optimistic about preventing this problematic behavior. "Spotting a personality-manufactured crisis,"he maintains, "is like asking someone to spot the early signs of a divorce. The signs are often so subtle everyone discounts the behaviors as normal day-to-day struggles."He advocates discussing the issue with people affected by the individual.

Sooner, rather than later, he recommends, say to the group, "This is what we know is going to come. You understand what's going to happen. Yes, we'll come up with some things we don't know about. If we stick together, it will work out." Keep the lines of communication open so that people update each other on the likelihood of the next outburst

Blumenthal, however, posits that the person may be feeling threatened, overreacting to a situation in which he sees only the negative, not the positive. That leads to misinterpretation. "When something is stated as a challenge,"he explains, "anyone can view it as a positive or negative. If a person sees the worst, he'll fear the worst.'

He suggests watching for "exaggerating behaviors, such as:

-- "expressing the belief that a problem is insurmountable;

-- "predicting an unrealistic catastrophe, such as being fired;

-- "believing that the problem happens all of the time, that nothing ever goes right;" or

-- "believing that the only resolution is an unrealistic one.'

He calls all of these manifestations of "crisis behavior, and there may or may not be a

resurface, what can you do when it does? Ouellette

points out that if you respond, you're "giving him some power. The person is trying to feed his own ego, using bad methods to communicate and get his way.

"Don't feed into the perceived power," he states. "If we don't allow the person to have that authority, he doesn't. As long as you allow a browbeating boss to do that, he'll continue to do it. Reactions empower, embold, give him some control. The more you put up with it, the more you send a message that this is acceptable



Those include returnees Rachaelle Mirto, Lia Melasi and Livonia Stevenson alum Andrea Muscat.


"We meshed very well and personally," Johnson said. 'I'm one to communicate a lot and they were really easy to communicate with. We all work well together."

MULTI-TALENTED

Diesels roll over Silverbacks

The Diesels just keep rolling

along. Using tight defense and a potent ground game, and after swapping scores like old clothes in the second half, the Detroit Diesels came back from a 6-0 deficit Saturday to roll to a 27-19 North American Football League win over the London (Ontario) Silverbacks at Labatt Park.

Detroit ran the ball down the Silverbacks' throat, but could not punch it in. The teams banged and battled back and forth to a 0-0 first quarter score.

"They gave us all we could handle; but, I'm proud of our defense as they held their own," Diesels coach Rob Street said.

But the second quarter would open up in a big way, as London scored on the first play of the second quarter. Detroit answered midway through the second quarter on a four-yard rollout keeper by Randy Sinnott (Westland John Glenn).

The Silverbacks opened with a 33-yard field goal to regain the lead, but Eric Newton (Redford Union) nabbed an 11-yard scoring toss from Sinnott to give Detroit a lead it would not relinquish.

With 1:05 left in the third, London put up another field goal, this time from 37 yards out, to get within 13-12.

Bob Curtis put in his piece with a 1-yard scoring run with 10:55 left in the game. Newton ran in the two-point conversion.

With 2:20 left in the contest, London took over on their 24yard line after a failed Diesels

fourth-down attempt, and proceeded to pull within 21-19.

But the Diesels iced the game when a tipped London pass found its way to the hands of Travis Farkas (Redford Thurston), who ran 50 yards for the second defensive touchdown of the year.

After the ensuing kickoff, linebacker Ali Bazzi (Dearborn Fordson) had a 40-yard interception return for his touchdown called back. But the game was in hand anyway.

Sinnott was 9-of-13 passing for 63 yards and on TD. He also ran for 34 yards on four attempts.

Newton was the player of the game, with 34 attempts for 112 yards and his two-point conversion, in addition to his touchdown catch. Curtis ran for 82 yards and a score on only nine

John Craven (Farmington) nabbed two receptions for 19 yards.

Defensively, Chuck Smith, Farkas, and Bazzi paced the Detroit defense. Bernard Evans (Wayne Memorial) had a quarterback takedown for the Diesels.

"It was a very hard fought game as it always is when we play the Silverbacks; but, I'm glad we got back on the winning track after the thrashing they gave us last year," Diesels general manager Allen Seder. "I look forward to our rematch in Livonia later in the season."

The Diesels nabbed their third straight win, and with a 3-0-1 division record, stand tied for first place in the Central Lakes Division with the Michigan Admirals.





ENCLAVE MAKES BUICK RELEVANT IN MOST IMPORTANT SEGMENT

With the unfortunate example of the fate of the Oldsmobile brand in its rear-view mirror, Buick has been trying to remake itself for several years now. This effort has produced mainly forgettable new products, such as the Rendezvous SUV, or those that have proved outright disappointments, including the Lucerne and Lacrosse sedans. Bravo, then, to Buick, for finally coming forth

with a new product that is relevant, and in a segment that is highly relevant to the survival of a brand in today's automotive marketplace. The 2008 Enclave, Buick's classy new crossover vehicle, proves a worthy competitor in a vital part of the market that is emerging as the segment of choice for consumers who want to pare down from gas-guzzling behemoths but aren't ready to give up all the advantages of an SUV.

What Enclave does is blend a gracefully designed exterior with an elegant, well-crafted interior, segment-leading fuel efficiency with room for up to eight passengers and space for cargo. Starting at a suggested retail price of less than \$33,000, Enclave is quieter and roomier inside than many of its competitors and purports to challenge true luxury makes.

Indeed, Enclave may prove a worthy platform for what Buick executives are predicting will be "the revival of Buick in North America." The only problem for Buick per se is that two of General Motors'other brands also have just fielded new crossover vehicles based on the same mechanical platform as Enclave: GMC's Acadia and the Saturn Outlook.

For Buick shoppers, Enclave offers some things that haven't been available to them in some time. One significant plus is jazzy styling: Close observers will notice that Enclave delivers on the promise of the stunning concept vehicle that debuted at the 2006 North American International Auto Show in Detroit. This includes hints at the brand's legendary deisgn cues, such as a new waterfall black chrome grille - with a bold tri-shield emblem -and

portholes that form a distinct "V" shape as they flow out from the grille and into the hood.

Even the headlights enhance Enclave's striking appearance, with a blue ring that has been integrated into the three-dimensional taillamp housings. Bulbous wheel wells round out Enclave's exposure as a true styling leader in the segment. Unlike GM's larger, full-blooded SUVs,

Enclave is fun and easy to drive. It rides on a long, 119-inch wheelbase and wide, 67-inch tracks, but Enclave delivers smooth and controlled driving and an immediate feel during turns that relies on a stiff structure, purpose-built suspension and its aerodynamic shape. And Enclave is noticeably quieter than predecessor SUVs by GM, showing good results from the company's conscious effort to dampen noise from inside and outside the cabin with components such as an acoustic-laminated windshield, triple door seals, and even flat-blade windshield wipers.

Enclave is powered by a V-6 engine featuring variable-valve timing that is mated to Buick's first six-speed automatic transmission. It delivers 275 horsepower and 251 lb.-ft. of torque, lending the vehicle plenty of oomph at all the right times – even loaded with passengers. Still, it's what's inside that really lends

Enclave its credentials as a strong near-luxury competitor in the hot crossover market. Its interior clearly is designed as an extension of Enclave's curvaceous exterior, with complementing curves and warm, inviting colors, as well as premium soft-touch, low-gloss materials. The instrument panel and other interior elements have precise attention to fit, finish and flushness throughout.

Of course, Enclave also has the passenger and cargo space that lend it credibility in the crossover segment. It can be confirugred for seven or eight passengers, with a bit of space remaining behind the third row of seats for gear. All of Enclave's second-row seat configurations feature GM's Smart Slide, which allows easy entry to the third row with the pull of one handle. And in the formation with captain's chairs in the second row, Enclave's interior space functions with a bit of the friendliness of a minivan.

Add to this overall soundness certain luxury touches - such as a front-row center console armrest that slides back and forth for personalized comfort; a second-row skylight; and automatic opening and closing of the rear hatch -and Enclave surfaces as a strong choice if you're looking for a crossover. Good thing for Buick.



High-definition DVD players like this Sony BDP-S300 carry high price tags and formatcompatibility issues, but they sure do make movies look great.

High-definition DVD pricey but worthwhile

here's a certain feeling that comes from uncrating a spiffy



ditional DVD players don't produce enough pixels — enough dots **Tech Savvv** - to take full advan-

tage of your highresolution TV. As a result, images tend to look grainy and, well,

disappointing. That's why Sony, Toshiba and other DVD-player manufacturers now offer high-definition, or HD, models, which can churn out enough pixels to

do justice to your TV. I've seen several of these players in action, and they're extraordinary. It's like the jump from standarddefinition TV shows to their high-def equivalents: Everything looks dramatically sharper and more vibrant.

In short, if you own an HDTV, you'll absolutely want a high-def DVD player to go with it.

There's just one problem. Actually, there are three problems, all of which you should keep in mind before investing in a player.

PROBLEMS

First, you have to pick sides. There are two competing standards in the high-def DVD universe: Blu-ray and HD DVD.

The formats are incompatible, so if you buy a Blu-ray movie, it won't play in an HD DVD player, and vice versa. And speaking of movies, here's the

second problem: To take full advantage of either a Blu-ray or HD DVD player, you'll need to buy or rent Bluray or HD DVD discs. So much for your current movie library.

Actually, the new players will play older DVDs, and even make them look better by "upscaling" the video to match your TV's capabilities.

But this "cheater HD" isn't nearly as good as the real deal, and it doesn't allow you to take advantage of various Blu-ray/HD DVD features.

The real issue here is long-term viability. If you buy a Blu-ray player today, and six months from now the movie studios decide to back HD DVD, you could wind up with the 21st-century equivalent of a Betamax VCR (did hardware manufacturers learn nothing from past mistakes?).

Which format is the likely winner in this stupid war? It's still anybody's ball game, though Blu-ray may be inching ahead: Blockbuster recently decided to offer only Blu-ray titles in stores and online. (Netflix, for its part, currently offers both formats.)

Of course, there may never be a winner. That's why a few manufacturers are producing hybrid DVD players that support both formats. LG was first out of the gate with





Healthy snacks

The Associated Press gives the following simple suggestions for healthy and tasty snacks for children. And be sure to offer water or low-fat or fat-free milk to drink.

■ Wrap ¼ cup canned beans in a whole-grain tortilla and top with diced tomatoes, lettuce and one slice of cheese.

One-half cup dried fruit, such as raisins, dried apricots, cranberries and prunes, with mixed nuts (unsalted, if possible).

■ Three-fourths cup dry whole-grain breakfast cereals with ½ cup low-fat or fat-free milk and sliced fresh fruit.

One cup sliced fresh vegetables, such as carrots, celery, broccoli and baby carrots, with ½ cup low-fat yogurt or sour cream-based dip.

■ A yogurt and fruit smoothie made from 1 cup low- or no-fat vogurt and ½ cup fruit.

Cleaning antique


The Carey Brothers, writing for the Associated Press, were asked: "I got carried away cleaning a brass antique with lemon and salt, and now it's rusty. How can I clean off the rust?"

Their reply: First, your antique isn't solid brass - it is brass-plated. Solid brass doesn't rust.

What is rusting is the iron or steel below your brass plating. The rust can be eliminated with most rust removers. Just about anything that contains phosphoric acid will do the trick, even some concrete cleaners.

After you have thoroughly removed the rust, be sure to coat the item with a coat of light machine oil.

Sewing machine oil is great for this purpose.

But it's really a new device designed to help water and fertilizer reach the root systems of your lawn.


Called "the ride way to aerate," the Mow-Aerator is a set of brackets and 1.5inch spikes that attaches to the tires of a riding or push mower. (It attaches to the rear tires of a lawn tractor.) As the lawn is mowed, the spikes aerate the soil, without leaving chunks of dirt behind.

The weight of the mower helps the spikes penetrate the root zone.

When aeration isn't needed, the Mow-Aerator can be easily removed.

The Environmental Protection Agency's ENERGY STAR program strongly recommends the use of CFL light-

I as well have been a strong proponent of CFLs. After hearing some of the criticisms, I thought I would do a little research into the subject.

A CFL does in fact contain

about 5 milligrams of mercury metal. As we know, especially here in Michigan, mercury can be hazardous to our health. This mercury is sealed in the glass tube. The potential dan-

ger happens when the bulb is broken or disposed of. Mercury becomes most dangerous when it goes from element (metal) form to a vapor and is inhaled. This happens readily if a CFL is broken. The

health risks from mercury are

due to not only the amount of the material, but also the duration of exposure.

According to many sources, a spill of this size shouldn't cause excess risk to you or your fam-

ily if handled properly. Here is a scenario I ran across. A CFL breaks in, say, a bedroom. The entire 5 mg of mercury vaporizes, which isn't

likely to happen. The concentration of mercury vapor in the room would be about 0.2 mg per cubic meter (mg/m3). This concentration decreases over a short time as the air is exchanged in the

Within an eight-hour spread, the concentration of mercury vapor would be about 0.023 mg/m3.

This is less than the U.S. Occupational Safety and dard of 0.05 mg/m3 for eight hours of exposure. And remember; this is assuming that all of the mercury is vaporized.

Still, it is wise to use caution when handling a broken CFL.

OTHER THINGS TO THINK

Using CFLs introduces about 8 mg less mercury into the environment than what is produced at a power plant to

power a standard incandescent

bulb. The use of CFLs takes less power, therefore cutting the amount of greenhouse gasses

produced. Disposal of incandescent bulbs introduces tungsten into

the environment. There is less mercury in a CFL than is typically used in tooth fillings.

ARE THERE ALTERNATIVES?

Though still in its early stages, LED (Light Emitting Diode) lighting is beginning to show up in the mainstream.

Though presently very expensive to buy, and limited as to the types of fixtures available, this technology is something to watch. LEDs use very little power for the amount of light they produce and run very cool.

I will be keeping myself up to date on this technology.

Exposure to any mercury isn't to be taken lightly. I'm sure, however, there are many of us who can remember playing with mercury as kids, and survived. But then we also traveled in cars, standing on the front seat without child seats or safety belts (I don't recommend this).

Weighing all the alternatives at this point, it is my personal opinion that CFLs are a good

problem with high-def DVD: price. You'll pay around \$500 for a current Blu-ray or HD DVD

player. That's not only outrageous, it leaves little incentive to buy a hybrid model.

Prices will drop, of course. Toshiba's HD-A3 (an HD DVD player) arrives in October for \$299.99, and you can already buy the company's first-generation model (the A2) at Costco for around the same price.

I propose another option: a game console.

Microsoft offers an HD DVD player for its Xbox 360 system, while Sony's PlayStation 3 plays Blu-ray discs right out of the box.

The latter costs \$499 about the price of a standalone Blu-ray player.

The Xbox HD DVD Player sells for \$179.99, while the Xbox 360 itself runs \$279.99 (for the Core model), for a total of around \$460. In both equations, you get a

killer game system out of the deal. Not a bad way to go! You can find out more about high-definition DVD — both the hardware and the movies



Michigan wines please judges

hether you get your wine information from newspapers, Web sites or magazines, you can't have missed that Michigan wines have been in the news in a big way this year.

With 50 commercial wineries (up from 17 only 12 years ago) producing a collective 375,000 cases of wine annually and



devoted to wine grapes, making Michigan the eighth in U.S. wine grape production. This vineyard acreage has increased 24 percent since 1997.

Yet, that's not nearly enough to satisfy growing

demand, especially for riesling. Pinot grigio, labeled by some wineries by its French name pinot gris, has also grown in popularity.

What Michigan needs most is investment capital. Bryan Ulbrich, proprietor and winemaker at Michigan's newest and first urban winery, Left Foot Charley in Traverse City, said, "It's going to take investment money from people who understand that grape farming does not offer a quick return. This is not a stock market game."

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

The Michigan Grape & Wine Industry Council within the Michigan Department of Agriculture has set a goal of increasing wine grape plantings to 10,000 acres by

To expedite this, the council handed out more than \$265,000 in grants as incentives to winery owners last year. Truly, this is a drop in the bucket and with the state's budget crunch now, expanding or even repeating this funding in 2007 and beyond holds some doubt.

Established wine grape growers such as Joe Herman of Karma Vista Vineyards and Winery in Berrien County recently expanded his vineyard to 50 acres.

Teamed with Dave Miller, St. Julian Winery's winemaker in Paw Paw, they are using grant money to form a consulting and management firm that will advise clients on selecting appropriate vineyard sites, grape vine planting and winery construction.

ANNUAL EVALUATION

Each August, the state's commercial

wines, made 100 percent from Michigangrown grapes, are judged at the Michigan Wine & Spirits Competition, held at the Kellogg Center in East Lansing. This was the competition's 30th anniversary.

Thus, on Aug. 7, 365 wines were evaluated by us and 22 other judges, including California owner/winemaker Scott Harvey of Scott Harvey and Janus wines; master of wine, master sommelier and Jefferson Cup Invitational Competition director Doug Frost; and two of Michigan's three master sommeliers, Claudia Tyagi and Ron Edwards, who are both consultants and wine educators.

Frost, who says he's selective about competitions in which he judges, noted he accepted Michigan's invitation this year "because I need to learn what's happening

'I'm particularly impressed by Michigan's aromatic whites and a variety like traminette, many of which came across varietally correct with gewurztraminerlike aromas. From Michigan, pinot grigio is as good as it gets anywhere in the U.S.

Master sommelier Ron Edwards praised four gold-medal winning white wines highly: the Double Gold and Best of Class Dry White, Left Foot Charley 2006 Pinot Blanc "Island View Vineyard" (\$18); the Double Gold 2006 Block II Riesling Bowers Harbor Vineyards; Gold medal winner 2004 Proprietor's Reserve Riesling Chateau Chantal; and Gold medal 2006 Whole Cluster Riesling Chateau Grand Traverse.

WINNING BIG

Double Gold and Best of Class Dry White, Left Foot Charley 2006 Pinot Blanc "Island View Vineyard," heralded by Edwards, was the competition's biggest winner for a number of reasons. As stated before, Left Foot Charley is the state's newest winery and the state's first truly urban winery, located in the developing Village of Grand Traverse Commons, in close proximity to Traverse City's Front Street shopping

Left Foot Charley, co-owned by Bryan Ulbrich (former Peninsula Cellars winemaker), his wife Jen and grower Werner Kuehnis, opened July 1, 2007. Island View Vineyard is owned by Kuehnis, who supplied the 12 year-old pinot blanc for the award-winning wine. Call it winning in

Each member of the family now has their own cubby area or locker in the mudroom to store their belongings.

"Dompierre just did a great job," Stefos Neufeld said.

"They met every need." And the needs were met with style. Brown, yellow and black are the colors. A porcelain floor from Virginia Tile, pendant lights from Brose, maple cabinets and laminate counter tops are among the elements.

ROOM FOR EVERYTHING

Every family member has an individual locker in the mudroom, each with a seat and with hooks on the back wall. Shoes and boots go in baskets from Target that roll out from under the seat. Smaller miscellaneous items go in containers on the top shelf.

'The kids love it," Neufeld said of the lockers.

Knickknacks from Pier One now line shelf space above the lockers. (Neufeld, a firefighter, wanted to use local businesses in the project. Lowe's and Home Depot were some of the other sources.)

The laundry area is across from the lockers. Laundry from the upper level is tossed down a chute (which Stefos Neufeld calls a "bottomless hamper") right into a basket near the new laundry room. In the mudroom, objects are

handy but out of sight. "I'm using every bit of space," Stefos Neufeld said. "My goal was to use every bit

of space for storage." Neufeld had the idea to put charging stations for cell phones and iPods inside the cabinetry. Pantry supplies are tucked away in a slender cabinet. Other cabinets and drawers hold the youngsters' craft supplies.

Near the back door is a cushioned bench, which opens for more storage room. The bead board wall behind it, stained ebony, could hold a calendar or the children's art-

work. In the laundry/locker area, Dompierre pitched the roof to let in more natural light. Windows and under cabinet lighting also illuminate the space.

Next to the laundry, at the back of the mudroom, is the bathroom. It features a tile shower with glass surround, and a cabinet vanity.


Stefos Neufeld had the idea to use colors inspired by nature - specifically, her former garden. Pollen Grain, a color from Behr paint that suggested a sunflower, covers some walls. The bathroom is painted a color from Pittsburgh Paint called Bronco Brown.

"They selected good colors," Dompierre said.

Everyone is delighted with the mudroom, which has garnered compliments from neighbors. The children and adults enjoy having a place where they can remove muddy garments and keep paraphernalia. "We have room to grow," Neufeld said.
